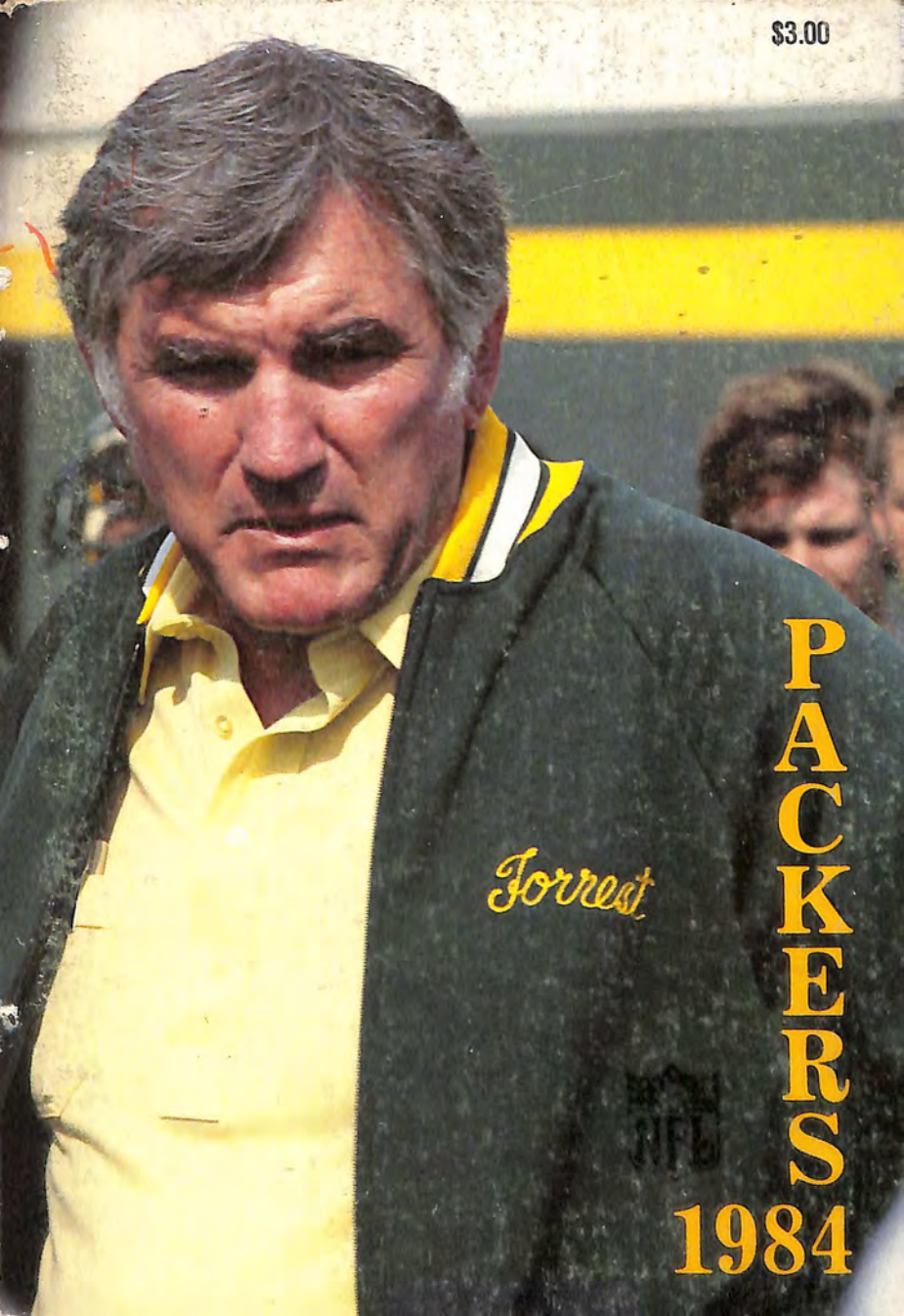

ELEVEN TIMES WORLD CHAMPIONS

The Green Bay Packers have won more championships — eleven — than any other team in National Football League history. They won their first three by league standing (1929, 1930 and 1931) and eight times since the NFL's playoff system was established in 1933 (1936, 1939, 1944, 1961, 1962, 1965, 1966 and 1967). Green Bay also is the only NFL team to win three straight titles, having done it twice (1929-30-31 and 1965-66-67).

In addition, the Packers won the first two Super Bowls (over Kansas City in 1967, 35-10, and over Oakland in 1968, 33-14).

Chicago's Bears rank second with eight NFL titles, followed by the Giants, Lions and Browns with four each.

The Green Bay Packer Football Team is a community owned non-profit corporation. 4,625 shares of stock are owned by 1,769 shareholders—none of whom receives any dividend on the initial investment. JUDGE ROBERT J. PARINS

President



Growth and change have marked the presidency of Judge Robert J. Parins, now in his third year as chief executive of the Green Bay Packers, Inc.

During his first two years in office, he presided over the planning and construction of two major additions to the Packers' physical facilities — a \$2,000,000 remodeling and expansion of the administration building and training quarters, which doubled the size of the existing structure, and building of a \$700,000 indoor practice facility.

In the same period, he also was called upon to guide the corporation through a 57-day player strike in 1982 and, at season's end, to direct and coordinate preparations for the Packers' first home playoff game since 1967.

Judge Parins, the first full-time president in the Packer organization's 65-year history, formally assumed his presidential duties on June 1, 1982, following his resignation as a Brown County circuit court judge (Branch 2 of the 8th Judicial District). He previously has been named principal executive officer at a board of directors' meeting October 11, 1981.

A member of the Packers' official family since May 23, 1966, when elected to the board of directors at the organization's annual stockholders' meeting, he is only the eighth man to hold the Packer presidency since the corporation was founded in 1922.

Judge Parins later was elected Vice President of the corporation at a board of directors' meeting August 1, 1979, automatically becoming a member of the Packer Executive Committee in the process.

Born in Green Bay August 23, 1918, he graduated from Green Bay East School in 1936. He later obtained a bachelor of arts degree in political science from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1940 and a law degree, also from the University of Wisconsin, in 1942.

Upon graduation from law school, he worked for Employers Mutual Insurance Co. in Minneapolis from 1942 through 1944 before returning to Green Bay, in 1944, to open the practice of law in partnership with the late Meyer Cohen. In 1949, he was elected district attorney of Brown County and served one, two-year term. Elected a circuit judge in the spring of 1967, he was formally vested Jan. 2, 1968. On the bench, he earned a state-wide reputation for the fair, efficient and expeditious disposition of the cases brought before him. Although he officially retired from the bench in 1982, he continues to serve as a reserve judge on occasion.

Judge Parins and his wife, Elizabeth, have five children and 11 grandchildren.

An active sportsman in private life, he owns a stable just outside Green Bay and regularly works with his horses there. He also is an ardent fisherman and shoots a respectable game of golf.

DOMINIC OLEJNICZAK

Chairman of the Board



Dominic Olejniczak, who served the organization as president longer than any other man in the team's history, now serves as chairman of the board of Green Bay Packers, Inc. He was elected to the position by the board of directors Oct. 11, 1981.

Mr. Olejniczak ended a 24-year tenure as corporation president May 3, 1982, when Judge Robert J. Parins was elected to succeed him. A former mayor of the City of Green Bay (1945-55), he used that experience in municipal government to help guide the Packers to unprecedented corporate prosperity.

A devout Packer fan since the 1920s, when he was a pupil at St. Mary of the Angels Grade School, he first began to develop close ties with the Packers in an official capacity during the mid-1930s.

Elected to the Green Bay City Council, he became involved with the team through the City of Green Bay and the Board of Education, which had jurisdiction over old City Stadium, where the Packers then played their games. He continued to work closely with the Packers while mayor and, in that position, was a prime mover in the drive to build the current stadium, Lambeau Field.

Elected to the board of directors July 10, 1950, Mr. Olejniczak subsequently moved up through the chairs, being named to the Executive Committee January 21, 1952, elected a vice president March 1, 1954, executive vice president Dec. 23, 1957, president April 28, 1958, and then chairman of the board in 1981.

The Green Bay Packers are unique in all of professional sports. From an organizational standpoint, they represent the only publicly-owned club in the 28-team National Football League. From a competitive standpoint, they have won more championships—11 in all—than any other team in the NFL's 64-year history.

Founded in 1922 at the urging of A. B. Turnbull, who became the organization's first president, Green Bay Packers, Inc., is a non-profit corporation. There are over 4,600 shares of stock owned by 1,789 shareholders. The corporation is governed by a seven-man Executive Committee, selected from a 45-man board of directors. Judge Robert J. Parins, eighth president of the corporation, was elected the organization's chief executive May 3, 1982.

BOB HARLAN Assistant to the President

Robert E. "Bob" Harlan, corporate assistant to the president, has been a member of the Packer management team since 1971. His major responsibility is the negotiation of all player contracts, an assignment which has become a vital year-around job in the field of professional football, whose contractual complexities have increased dramatically over the past decade.

The 47-year-old Iowan, a native of Des Moines, also handles all coaching contracts, except that of the head coach. In addition, he supervises all Packer ticket operations, as well as the public relations department, and is responsible for the hiring of all front office and secretarial personnel.

A graduate of Marquette University, where he earned a B.S. degree in journalism in 1958, Harlan had a short tour of duty in the U.S. Army before spending a year as a reporter for United Press-International in Milwaukee. He subsequently became sports information director at Marquette in 1959, serving six years in that capacity. He joined the St. Louis baseball Cardinals in 1965, serving as director of community affairs and speakers bureau for two years and director of public relations for 3½ years. He left that position to join the Packers as assistant general manager on June 1, 1971.

Bob and his wife, Madeline, have three sons, Kevin, 24, a sportscaster at radio station KCMO in Kansas City who is the play-by-play broadcaster for the Kansas City Kings of the National Basketball Association; Bryan 22, a member of the Chicago Bears' public relations staff; and Michael, 15, a sophomore at Green Bay Premontre high school.



TOM MILLER Assistant to the President

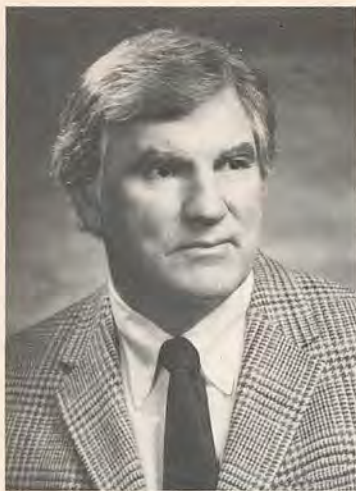
Thomas M. "Tom" Miller is the dean of the Packers' front office, having joined the organization in 1956. As assistant to the president for business, a position he has held since 1981, he wears a number of "hats." He arranges team travel and is responsible for scheduling of pre-season games, as well as all purchasing.

In addition to these duties, Miller is responsible for repair and maintenance of Lambeau Field in cooperation with the Green Bay Stadium Commission, and for the planning and construction of all additions to the Packer facilities. He has been heavily involved in the latter area in the past three years, during which the Packers erected a \$700,000 indoor practice facility and completed a \$2,000,000 addition to the administration building.

Possessor of an extensive football background, the Pennsylvania native played five years of professional football—the last of them for the Packers in 1946. An end, he launched his National Football League career with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1942, following graduation from Hampden-Sydney. After three seasons with Philadelphia, he moved to the Washington Redskins in 1945 before joining the Packers.

Miller subsequently coached for nearly a decade, coaching football and basketball at Wilkes College (1946-50) and football, basketball and baseball at Drexel College (1950-55). He rejoined the Packers as publicity director in 1956, serving in that capacity until 1965, when the late Vince Lombardi named him assistant to the general manager. He was appointed business general manager by Bart Starr in 1975 before being named assistant to the president.

Tom and his wife, the former Beverly Rusch of Green Bay, have three children: Tom, Jr., Nancy and Sue.



FORREST GREGG

Head Coach

Success and winning, born of a deep commitment to excellence, have been a life-long habit with Forrest Gregg.

The towering Texan already was a legendary figure in both Packer annals and the archives of the National Football League when he became the ninth head coach in Green Bay's history December 24, 1983, agreeing to a five-year contract.

—To date, for example, he is the only man in the game's history who has made it to the Super Bowl as both a player (with Green Bay and the Dallas Cowboys) and a head coach (with Cincinnati) since the classic was originated in 1967.

—As a player, he helped the Packers win five NFL championships during a seven year span in the 1960s, an achievement without parallel or precedent in pro football history. It included

three consecutive titles (in 1965-66-67), the only time this feat has been accomplished since the NFL's playoff system was inaugurated.

—In the process, he won all-pro honors eight times and was named to nine Pro Bowls during a distinguished Packer career which prompted the late Vince Lombardi to call him "the finest player I have ever coached."

—He also was the most durable athlete in the team's annals, playing in 187 consecutive games, a total which still ranks as an all-time Packer record.

—In 1977, he was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, the first time he was eligible following the mandatory five-year retirement period. He also was voted into the Packer Hall of Fame the same year.

—As a head coach, he developed the most successful team in the NFL over the 1981 and '82 seasons, a period in which his Cincinnati Bengals forged a glittering 19-6 won-lost record and qualified for Super Bowl XVI.

Both Gregg and the Packer faithful, who have universally acclaimed his selection, are confident the success story will continue, that he will mould the current Packers into consistent contenders in the years ahead.

The new leader promised as much in taking over the head coach's office at 1265 Lombardi Avenue in late December.

"I'm not a prophet, so I can't tell you what is going to happen in the next year," he said. "But I can tell you that I didn't take this job to field a losing football team. I took this job to field a winning team.

"That will happen."

Gregg had left Green Bay following the 1970 season, ending a 14-year Packer playing career which had begun in 1956 when then Head Coach Lisle Blackbourn made the Southern Methodist University captain Green Bay's selection in the second round of the NFL draft.

Subsequently persuaded by Tom Landry to play a 15th year, he joined the Dallas Cowboys in 1971 for a final season, capped by Super Bowl V, before going into coaching as an assistant on the San Diego Chargers' staff in 1972.

Leaving San Diego after the 1973 season, he moved to Cleveland, where he became offensive line coach in 1974. Just one year later, he was named head coach of the Browns by Art Modell. After a 3-11 rebuilding season in that role in 1975, Gregg turned the Cleveland franchise around in dramatic fashion the following year, maneuvering the Browns to a 9-5 record and earning "Coach of the Year" honors in the process.

His 1977 Browns won five of their first seven games to forge into contention for AFC Central Division honors. Injuries then struck, however, and they lost six of their last seven games. Gregg resigned with one game remaining in the season.

Out of football in 1978, he signed on as head coach of the Toronto Argonauts in 1979, compiling a 5-11 record with a young and inexperienced team.

That stint set the stage for a return to the NFL in 1979 as head coach of a Cincinnati team which had struggled to back-to-back 4-12 seasons in 1978 and '79.

In just two years, the purposeful Gregg had the Bengals in the Super Bowl. After improving the record to 6-10 in 1980, he directed them to an impressive 12-4 regular season record the following year, two playoff victories and a berth in Super Bowl XVI against the 49ers.

This achievement brought Gregg a host of honors, among them the prestigious AFC Coach of the Year Award. He also was chosen coach-of-the-year by the Associated Press, United Press International and the Professional Football Writers Association of America.

Refusing to permit the distractions of an eight-week player strike to disrupt his team, he followed that Super Bowl achievement by leading the Bengals to a 7-2 record in 1982 and another playoff appearance.

Last year, Gregg may well have done the finest coaching job of his career. After two starters were suspended for the first four games for using drugs and two others announced their signing with the United States Football League for future delivery, his team got off to an 0-6 start, but he rallied the Bengals to win seven of their last ten games — a remarkable comeback by any measurement.

A man who brings the same intensity to coaching that he did to the playing field, Forrest sums up his basic approach with typical economy of verbiage.

"First of all, I believe in discipline," he says. "I believe in a well-conditioned football team, and I believe in a football team's being drilled to a point where they make very few mental mistakes."

Straightforward at all times, he may have been best described by one of his former Bengal players, punter-wide receiver Pat McInally. "He has a strong personality and he has the ability to lead just with his presence," McInally said. "He doesn't have to just say words. He embodies everything that he believes in and tells his players.

"He's not phony. He's genuine, and that's very important — and he finds a way to relate to all his players."

Born Alvis Forrest Gregg in Birthright, TX., October 18, 1933, Gregg had established himself as a multi-talented, injury-free athlete by the time he joined the Packers as a player. He participated in football, basketball, baseball and track at Sulphur Springs, TX., High School, and then twice won all-Southwest Conference honors as a two-way tackle at SMU, captaining the Mustangs in his senior year.

A broken arm, incurred when he was a high school sophomore, was the only major injury he suffered during his athletic career. Later, in the NFL, a bruised knee almost kept him out of a game against Detroit in 1965, but he went into block on an extra point attempt to keep his consecutive game streak alive.

In 1960, the year that the Packers won their first Western Division title under Lombardi, Gregg was voted all-pro, the first in a string of eight straight years of all-league recognition. In 1965, an injury to Jerry Kramer necessitated his moving to guard but it had no effect on Gregg's "all" status. He was named all-pro at both guard (Associated Press) and tackle (United Press International) that season.

Only two players in the Packers' 63-year NFL history wore Green Bay's green and gold longer than the "Man from Birthright" — his immediate coaching predecessor, Bart Starr, who played for 16 seasons, and Ray Nitschke, a Packer for 15 seasons.

Although he has known great success as both an athlete and a coach, Gregg won perhaps his greatest battle off the field — winning a bout with cancer during the late '70s. In May of 1982, he went to the White House to accept the American Cancer Society's "National Courage Award" from President Reagan.

Forrest and his wife, Barbara, have two children — Forrest, Jr., and Karen, both students at the head coach's alma mater, SMU.

BOB SCHNELKER Offensive Coordinator

Bob Schnelker, a daring and imaginative strategist, presided over the most potent offense in Packer history during the 1983 season, his second as the team's offensive coordinator. Green Bay's attack, often succeeding with the element of surprise for which Schnelker has come to be known, amassed 429 points to set a club record. Only four other teams in the National Football League — Washington (541), Dallas (479), the Super Bowl champion Los Angeles Raiders (442) and San Francisco 49ers (432) scored more often last season.

Under his direction, the '83 Packer offense also rolled up more yards than any other team in the club's 65-year history (6,172), a mark which saw the Packers become only the fifth team in NFL annals to gain 6,000 yards in a season.

In the process, the Packers established a club record for passing yards in a season with 4,365, the fifth highest single season total in league history.

Green Bay also emerged as the No. 1 offensive team in the National Football Conference (first in passing, 21st in rushing) and second overall in the NFL.

The 55-year-old Schnelker, recognized as one of the NFL's foremost offensive "minds," is in his second tour of duty in Green Bay. He previously had served as the Packers' passing game and receivers coach under the late Vince Lombardi from 1966 through 1971, helping Green Bay win two consecutive league titles.

Schnelker returned to the Packers in 1982 after four years as offensive coordinator at Detroit, where he directed the NFC's No. 1 offense in 1981 while with the Lions. Although the passing game is supposed to be his forte, Schnelker displayed admirable ability to adjust to the personnel at hand when his Lion offense, paced by Billy Sims, led the entire NFL in rushing.

Bob, born Oct. 17, 1928, began his 21-year coaching career with the Los Angeles Rams in 1963. Joining the Packers in 1966, he served under Lombardi as Green Bay won NFL titles and the first two Super Bowls in '66 and '67, later under Phil Bengtson (1967-70) and Dan Devine (1971). He moved to the San Diego Chargers in 1972, to Miami in 1974, where he coached under Don Shula, and to Kansas City in 1975 before joining the Detroit staff.

A 17th round draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1953, he subsequently played for the New York Giants from 1954 through 1960, helping them win the NFL championship in 1956, before closing out his nine-year playing career in 1961 with Pittsburgh and Minnesota, where he caught the first of Fran Tarkenton's record 342 touchdown passes. A standout tight end, he was a two-time Pro Bowl selection.

Schnelker and his wife, B.J., have three children, Mindy, Jeff and Tina.



DICK MODZELEWSKI

Defensive Coordinator

Richard "Mo" Modzelewski, the Packers' new defensive coordinator, has an impressive football pedigree — as both a player and coach.

As a player, the former University of Maryland athlete won the Outland Trophy as the nation's premier collegiate lineman in his senior year (1952), then subsequently played on six conference championship and two NFL title teams — the 1956 New York Giants and 1964 Cleveland Browns — as a professional. He also was named to play in the 1964 Pro Bowl.

As a coach, the personable Pennsylvanian helped Cincinnati reach Super Bowl XVI in 1981, gain the playoffs again in 1982's strike-interrupted season and achieve No. 1 ranking in the NFL defensively last season while serving as the Bengals' defensive line coach. Earlier, while defensive coordinator at Cleveland in 1976, he guided the Browns'

defense to the highest finish it has had in the past decade.

Modzelewski, who accompanied Forrest Gregg from Cincinnati to Green Bay when No. 75 became Packer head coach, was named Green Bay's defensive coordinator by Gregg May 23, 1984 following Hank Bullough's resignation. He previously had been named defensive line coach December 30, 1983.

Dick began his pro coaching career with the Cleveland Browns in 1968 under Blanton Collier. He continued with the Browns under Nick Skorich, who succeeded Collier, and was re-hired by Gregg when he became Cleveland's head coach in 1975. Gregg later appointed Modzelewski defensive coordinator in 1976, a position he also held in 1977. "Mo" subsequently was appointed interim head coach of the Browns for the final game of the 1977 season. He served as defensive coordinator for the Giants in 1978, then joined the Bengals in 1979 as defensive line coach. Gregg later asked him to remain on the Cincinnati staff when Forrest became head coach of the Bengals in 1980.

Drafted in the second round by Washington in 1953, when Packer founder E. L. "Curly" Lambeau was the Redskins' head coach, Modzelewski later played for the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1955 before being traded to the Giants, with whom he became a principal in the Giant "Fearsome Foursome" which also included Andy Robustelli, Jim Katcavage and Rosey Grier.

After starring for the Giants from 1956 through '63, Dick was traded to Cleveland in 1964 and played three more seasons for the Browns before retiring in 1966.

Modzelewski was born in West Natrona, PA., February 16, 1931. He and his wife, Dorothy, have four children — Mark, Laurie, Terrie and Amie — and one grandchild.



LEW CARPENTER

Receivers Coach

Lew Carpenter, now in his 20th year of pro coaching, further enhanced his already imposing reputation as a receivers coach last season when the Packers were the only team in the National Football League to have four players with 50 or more receptions. James Lofton led the quartet with 58 catches, John Jefferson following with 57, Paul Coffman with 54 and Gerry Ellis with 52.

An eloquent testimonial to Carpenter's coaching expertise surfaced following the 1982 season when Lofton, Jefferson and Coffman all were named to the National Football Conference's 1983 Pro Bowl squad, marking the first time in NFC history that all three of one team's starting receivers were chosen to play in the post-season classic. Lofton and Coffman again were named to the NFC's Pro Bowl team following the '83 season.

In 1980, five Packers (Lofton, Coffman, Ellis, Eddie Lee Ivey and Aundra Thompson) had 40 or more receptions, another Packer first.

In 1982, the genial University of Arkansas alumnus also had once again demonstrated his ability to accelerate the development of a young receiver. Under his tutelage, Phillip Epps blossomed into the Packers' "Rookie of the Year," emerging with a team-leading average of 22.6 yards per reception.

These impressive credits have come as no surprise to those familiar with Carpenter's coaching acumen. During his long career, he has presided over the development of such talented receivers as Ahmad Rashad, Charley Taylor, Mel Gray, John Gilliam and Paul Flatley.

Earlier, as a player, Carpenter was one of the most versatile performers in NFL history, playing five different positions overall. Uniquely equipped for his current role, Lew played both wide receiver positions, tight end, halfback and fullback during an 11-year playing career.

An eighth round draft choice of Detroit in 1953, he was traded to Cleveland and later came to the Packers from the Browns in a 1959 trade engineered by the late Vince Lombardi. He became Green Bay's utility man on offense, helping them win successive NFL titles in 1961-62.

Carpenter launched his coaching career with the Vikings in 1965, later moving to the Falcons, Redskins, Cardinals and Oilers. He was named to the Packer coaching staff in January of 1975 by then coach Bart Starr with the assignment of redesigning the passing game. He subsequently was retained in January of this year when new Head Coach Forrest Gregg selected his staff.

Born in West Memphis, AR, Jan. 12, 1932, Lew is married (Ann) and the father of four daughters (Cheryl, 27, Cathy, 25, Lisa, 22, and Rebecca, 19).



VIRGIL KNIGHT **Strength/Conditioning Coach**

Virgil Knight, a 13-year coaching veteran of the college and high school ranks, has become the first full time strength and conditioning coach in Packer history. The 36-year-old Knight, who has been a member of the Auburn University staff for the past three years, was named to the position by Head Coach Forrest Gregg February 9, 1984.

Knight, previously a position coach, has had five year's experience as a strength coach, beginning in 1979 when he moved from Arkansas Tech to the University of Florida.

In addition to his duties in the strength/conditioning area, Knight assists Offensive Line Coach Jerry Wampfler with the offensive line.

Born January 30, 1948 in Clarksville, AR., Virgil began his coaching career at Sylvan Hills High School in Little Rock, AR., in 1971. After one year there and three years at Marist, GA., High School, he moved into the college ranks at

Arkansas Tech, where he coached the defensive line and linebackers for four years and also was head track coach. He then moved to the University of Florida, where he began to specialize in strength coaching in 1979.

Knight won all-state honors in football and was an all-district selection in basketball in high school at Clarksville. He later attended Northeast Oklahoma University, where he was named to the All-Oklahoma Collegiate Athletic Conference football team in both his junior and senior years and also competed in track.

Virgil and his wife, Becky, have two sons, Trent, 10, and Josh, 3.



HERB PATERRA Linebacker Coach

Herb Paterra, a former Buffalo Bills linebacker, is a veteran of coaching at every level — high school, college and professional — including the National Football League and the Canadian Football League.

Paterra most recently served as defensive coordinator of the Edmonton Eskimos of the CFL in 1983 before being named to the Packer staff by new Head Coach Forrest Gregg on January 5, 1984.

The 43-year-old Pennsylvanian joined Edmonton following three years on the staff of the Los Angeles Rams, where he coached the special teams in 1980, the linebackers in 1981 and served as defensive coordinator in 1982 under Ray Malavasi. He had entered the pro coaching ranks with the Charlotte Hornets of the World Football League in 1975 and later served as defensive line and linebacker coach for the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the CFL in 1978-79.

Paterra launched his coaching career at his alma mater, Michigan State, where he tutored the linebackers and defensive line from 1969 through 1971. He moved to the University of Wyoming in 1972, to Charlotte in 1975, then was head coach at North Mecklinburgh High School in Charlotte in 1976 and 1977 before moving to Hamilton in 1978.

A native of Glassport, PA., where he was born November 8, 1940, Herb played offensive guard and linebacker at Michigan State from 1960 through 1962. Drafted by Buffalo of the American Football League, he played linebacker for Bills in 1963 and '64. In 1965, he signed on with Hamilton, where he played for the Tiger-Cats for four seasons before closing out his pro playing career.

Paterra and his wife, Lou Ann, have two sons, Jeffrey, 19, and Craig, 17.



CHUCK PRIEFER Special Teams/Defensive Assistant

Charles "Chuck" Priefer, the Packers' new special teams coach and defensive assistant, is a veteran of 21 years in coaching.

The 42-year-old Priefer (the name is pronounced PREEFER) spent the past seven years in the college ranks as an assistant to Dick Crum, the first at Miami of Ohio, where he served as defensive line coach, and the last six years at the University of North Carolina. He coached the defensive secondary in 1978, his first year at UNC under Crum, then tutored the defensive line the past five seasons. Three of Chuck's former Tar Heel players are now in the National Football League.

In his new assignment, Priefer will assist Herb Paterra in coaching Packer linebackers in addition to coaching several of the special teams.

A 1963 graduate of John Carroll University, Chuck launched his coaching career the same year at Padua Franciscan High School in the Cleveland area, where he remained for 13½ years. He became head baseball coach in 1965, compiling a 151-59 record in that sport over an eight-year span, assistant athletic director in 1966, and head football coach in 1972, forging a 34-15 mark before moving into the college ranks at Miami of Ohio.

One of Priefer's football pupils during his Padua Franciscan tenure was Forrest Gregg, Jr., son of the Packer coach. "I've followed Chuck's career since he was a high school coach in Cleveland," Coach Gregg said in naming Priefer to the Packer staff. "We watched his progress as a coach and felt he really fit us perfectly."

A native of Lakewood, OH., where he was born July 26, 1941, Priefer moved to Parma, OH., with his family at the age of four and later spent 6½ years at St. Charles Borromeo Seminary before transferring to John Carroll University.

Chuck and his wife, Sheila, have four children — Mike, 17, Teri, 16, Jenny, 14, and Megan, 10.



KEN RILEY **Defensive Backfield Coach**

Ken Riley closed out a distinguished, 15-year career as a National Football League cornerback last December and became a Packer assistant coach just 18 days later.

Head Coach Forrest Gregg, who himself had only taken over in Green Bay the morning of Christmas Eve, named his former Cincinnati Bengal star defensive backfield coach January 4, 1984. Riley had spent all of his 15 NFL seasons with the Bengals, the last four under Gregg.

The former Florida A. & M. quarterback had closed out his playing career with a flourish, leading the American Football Conference in interceptions last season with eight and retiring as the fourth-ranking interceptor in pro football history with a career total of 65 while winning all-pro (Associated Press) honors.

"Ken is a very knowledgeable guy about the game, and he was a great technician as a player," Coach Gregg noted

in naming Riley to the Packer staff. "He knows secondary play from top to bottom. At Cincinnati, he helped a lot of our younger players with their techniques. He also was a real leader on the Bengal team."

Riley, a sixth round draft choice in 1969 (he was the 135th player selected), was a 14-year starter for the Bengals and had the longest playing career in the club's history. Along the way, he helped Cincinnati gain the NFL playoffs in 1970, '73, '75 and '82 and Super Bowl XVI in 1981.

Ken was born August 6, 1947 in Bartow, FLA., where he attended Bartow Union Academy. He and his wife, Barbara, have three children — Kimberly, 13; Ken, 11; and Kenisha, 7.



GEORGE SEFCIK **Offensive Backfield Coach**

George Sefcik, previously an aide to Forrest Gregg with both the Cleveland Browns and the Cincinnati Bengals, was the first assistant to be named to Gregg's new coaching staff when he became Packer head coach last December.

The 44-year-old Ohioan, hired as offensive backfield coach December 29, 1983, held the same responsibilities under Gregg at Cleveland from 1975 through 1977 and at Cincinnati from 1980 through 1983. Sefcik had joined the Cincinnati staff in 1978 upon Gregg's recommendation, serving under Bill Johnson for two seasons prior to Gregg's taking over as head coach of the Bengals in 1980.

A Notre Dame graduate, Sefcik is credited with returning the 1,000-yard rusher to the Bengal offense during his stay in Cincinnati. In 1981, Bengal fullback Pete Johnson rushed for 1,077 yards, thus becoming Cincinnati's first 1,000-yard rusher since Paul Robinson gained 1,024 yards in 1968. Two

years earlier, in 1979, his Bengal running backs gained more yardage collectively and scored more touchdowns than any such group in Cincinnati history.

George, born in Cleveland, OH., December 27, 1939, was a two-way halfback on the Notre Dame teams of 1959-60-61. Following graduation, he became head coach at Niles, IL., High School in 1962, then returned to Notre Dame a year later as freshman coach under Ara Parseghian. He served as an aide to Parseghian until 1964, when he moved to the University of Kentucky as offensive coordinator. Four years later, Sefcik launched his pro coaching career under Howard Schnellenberger with the Baltimore Colts in 1973. He then joined Gregg's staff at Cleveland in 1975 when Forrest became head coach of the Browns.

Sefcik is a graduate of Cleveland's Benedictine High School. He and his wife, Loretta (Lori), have three children.



JERRY WAMPFLER **Offensive Line Coach**

Jerry Wampfler, a 51-year-old veteran of 11 National Football League coaching seasons, joined the Packer coaching staff last January with a reputation for developing outstanding offensive linemen.

At Philadelphia, where he was a member of the Eagles' staff for the past five years, his prize pupils include Pro Bowl tackles Jerry Sisemore and Stan Walters.

Named to the Green Bay staff by Head Coach Forrest Gregg January 8, Wampfler had been running game coordinator as well as offensive line coach for the Eagles since 1979, serving under Dick Vermeil from 1979 through 1982 and under Marion Campbell in 1983.

The New Philadelphia, OH., native had launched his pro coaching career with the Eagles in 1973 as an assistant to Mike McCormack. He moved to the Buffalo Bills in 1976 and to the New York Giants in 1978 before rejoining the Eagles' staff in 1979.

Born August 6, 1932, Wampfler was a standout offensive tackle at Miami of Ohio from 1951 through 1954. An off-season back injury forced him to miss an NFL tryout as a Los Angeles Rams draft choice and he turned to coaching in the high school ranks — first at his native New Philadelphia, then at Lancaster and Massillon, OH., before returning to his alma mater, Miami of Ohio, as an assistant to Bo Schembechler when the latter became head coach there.

In 1965, Jerry moved to Notre Dame as offensive line coach on the staff of Ara Parseghian, then to Colorado State as head coach in 1970. Three years later, he entered the pro coaching ranks with the Eagles.

Wampfler and his wife, Carol, have three children — Nan, 27, Jody, 25, and Tad, 23.



DICK CORRICK **Director of Player Personnel**

One of professional football's most discerning evaluators of personnel, Dick Corrick has the overall responsibility for providing the Packers with new talent, the life blood of any National Football League team. He supervises and coordinates all Packer scouting activities and personnel operations as Director of Player Personnel.

In this highly important assignment, the ex-Oregon State athlete directs the club's extensive college scouting program, synthesizing input from Packer talent scouts, the United National Scouting combine and Packer coaches in making critical personnel decisions during the annual draft, the wellspring of every NFL team's talent supply. Named to his present position in 1978, Corrick responded by supervising drafts which have produced such quality performers as James Lofton, John Anderson, Greg Koch, Mike Douglass, Eddie Lee Ivey, George Cumby, Mark Lee, Tim Lewis and Dave Drechsler.

Immediately prior to assuming his current role, Dick had been associated with the coaching staff in the area of team development in 1977. He joined the Packer organization in 1971 as a college talent scout and later served as director of pro player personnel from May 6, 1975 until early 1977.

Born April 22, 1934, Corrick is a 50-year-old graduate of LaJolla, CA, High School. A 161-pound center-linebacker under Tommy Prothro at Oregon State, he later coached in the high school and college ranks for 16 years before joining the Packer scouting staff.

Dick is the father of two children, Traci, 25, and Rowdy, 23. He likewise is a chef of imposing talents who is fond of putting together a gourmet meal for himself and his wife, Bonnie, when at leisure.



BURT GUSTAFSON Director, Pro Player Personnel

Burt Gustafson's primary responsibility as Director of Pro Player Personnel is monitoring the competition. He maintains close surveillance of the National Football League's 27 other clubs with an eye to trade possibilities or opportunities to upgrade the Packers' overall roster by way of the waiver of free agent route.

A thorough and tireless scout respected for his dedication and football knowledge, Gustafson has served in his current capacity since April 2, 1979. He joined the organization in 1971 as linebacker coach, serving in that role through the 1974 season. Following a two-year stint as a college talent scout, he was named special teams coach in February of 1977, continuing in that role through the pre-season of 1978 before transferring to the pro scouting department.

Born in Marquette, MI, Nov. 30, 1925, Burt went on to become a 12-letter winner at Northern Michigan University in his home town. He later coached at Battle Creek, MI, High School at Northern Michigan, and at the University of Wyoming (1962-70) before joining the Packers. A firm believer in the benefits of physical fitness, he is a dedicated jogger and distance runner, frequently competing in marathon events.

Burt and his wife, Alice, have five children—two sons and three daughters.

John Anderson - 59

LINEBACKER • MICHIGAN • 7TH YEAR
HT: 6-3 • WT: 228 • BORN: 2/14/56 • (ACQ: D-1B, '78)

PRO: One of the most consistent and talented performers in Packer history, he has been voted the team's most Valuable Defensive Player each of the past two seasons by Wisconsin's sports media ... In capturing 1983 honors, Anderson shared the team lead in interceptions with five, emerged as the No. 2 tackler on the defensive platoon with 120 unassisted stops and knocked down 7 passes ... He also registered 4 quarterback sacks, forced one fumble and recovered one ... The versatile ex-Wolverine highlighted his personal season by returning one of his interceptions 27 yards for his first pro touchdown October 2, a day on which he helped the Packers forge a 55-14 victory over Tampa Bay in Green Bay's Lambeau Field ... A year earlier Anderson also was a standout during the strike-interrupted, 9-game season when voted the Packers' defensive MVP for the first time ... He led the defense in interceptions with three, shared the lead in fumble recoveries (two), forced two fumbles, was runnerup in knocking down opponent passes (7) and registered 50 unassisted tackles, third highest total on the team ... The consecutive MVP honors have underscored a story book comeback for Anderson, plagued by injuries during his first three seasons, in each of which he suffered a fracture of the left arm ... John initiated his comeback in 1981 when he amassed 117 unassisted tackles, led the team in fumble recoveries (four), was second only to cornerback Mark Lee in knocking down enemy passes (15) and made three interceptions ... Ranks as one of the most accomplished all-around athletes in recent Packer annals ... Compiled the highest overall grade in the team's pre-season athletic skills testing program in each of his first four seasons ... Wears a specially designed protective device to safeguard his left arm, broken for the first time in Game 14 of his rookie, 1978 season at Tampa, again in a training camp scrimmage July 28, 1979 and a third time in Game Nine at Pittsburgh, Nov. 2, 1980 ... Missed nine games of the '79 regular season and last seven of '80 ... Underwent remedial surgery in late 1980, a procedure in which bone was grafted from a hip onto the left arm, an operation designed to give the bone greater density ... Demonstrated his versatility upon returning to action in 1979 by kicking a 39-yard field goal against the Jets in his first—and to date, only—pro attempt ... Earned consensus NFL all-rookie honors in '78, when he became an instant starter, forging four interceptions in his first three games ... Could serve as backup punter (averaged better than 40 yards for a career total of 180 punts at Michigan).

Forging a personal season to remember, he threw for more yards (4,458) and more touchdowns (32) than any other passer in the league ... Yardage total set National Football Conference and Packer single season records ... Only one other quarterback in the NFL's 64-year history, San Diego's Dan Fouts, has passed for more yards in a season (4,715 in 1980 and 4,802 in 1981) ... Presiding over a Packer offense which scored more points

(429) and gained more yards (6,172) than any other in the team's 65-year history, Dickey also posted the league's highest average-gain-per-pass attempt of 1983, an imposing 9.21 yards ... In the process, the sharpshooting Kansan once again revised the passing records section of the Packer record book, establishing five new marks ... Rewriting his own records in all but one case, the curly-haired field general set Packer standards for most passes attempted in a season (484), most passes completed in a season (289), most yards gained passing in a season (4,458), most touchdown passes in a season (32) and most consecutive completions (18) ... He also tied a club record—one he already shared—by throwing five touchdown passes in the season opener at Houston, a 41-38, overtime victory in which he completed his first 18 passes en route to a 27-for-31 performance ... The latter matched the third best single game percentage (87.1) in NFL history ... Along the way, Dickey also set a Packer record for 300-yard passing games in a season with five—throwing for 333 yards vs. Houston Sept. 4 (271 of 31, with one intercept), 387 vs. Washington Oct. 17 (22 of 31, with one intercept), 383 vs. Minnesota Oct. 23 (23 of 41, with 3 intercepts), 366 vs. Atlanta Nov. 27 (25 of 37, with 3 intercepts) and 345 vs. Chicago Dec. 4 (16 of 34, with one intercept) ... Following that record-breaking season, the 34-year-old Osawatomie, KS, native now has thrown and completed more passes for more touchdowns than any other passer in Packer history except Bart Starr ... He has attempted 2,116 passes (Starr 3,149), completed 1,183 (Starr 1,808) for 15,968 yards (Starr 23,718) and thrown 93 TD passes (Starr 152) ... Dickey also owns the second best career passing efficiency percentage in Packer history, 55.90 (Starr's 57.42 leads) ... A year earlier, Dickey capped the strike-interrupted 1982 season with an assault on Packer playoff records, firing four touchdown passes in a 41-16 victory over St. Louis (January 8, 1983) to tie one mark and then passing for 332 yards against Dallas the following week (January 16) to set another ... Set all-time Green Bay single game percentage record (90.47) vs. New Orleans Dec. 13, 1981, completing 19 of 21 passes ... Tied club record for touchdown passes in a game for first time in that one, throwing for 5 TDs ... Also holds three other Packer regular season single game records—for most attempts (51), most completions

(35) and most yards gained (418), all set vs. Tampa Bay Oct. 12, 1980 ... Hampered by a series of injuries during the early years of his career, he has started 54 of the Packers' last 57 games since the beginning of the 1980 season ... Acquired from Houston in April, 1976 trade, he missed last four games of '76 season following shoulder injury suffered vs. Bears at Chicago in Game 10 ... Injured vs. Rams at Milwaukee Nov. 13, 1977, suffering a broken left leg which sidelined him for the balance of that season, the 1978 season and a major portion of the 1979 season ... Took over at beginning of second half of Game 13 vs. Philadelphia (Nov. 25, 1979) and, for all practical purposes, has been the Packers' starting quarterback ever since ... Had undergone three operations, plus many months of therapy and rehabilitation, during long layoff ... Previously had sat out the '72 season at Houston with a major hip injury ... Third round choice of Oilers in '71 draft.

PRO: Although he has been a Packer for just 38 games (the equivalent of only 2½ seasons), the remarkably sure-handed Texan already ranks among the Top 20 receivers in the Packers' 63-year National Football League history ... Enters the 1984 season in 17th place on Green Bay's lifetime list with 123 receptions ... Made 57 of those in 1983—finishing just one catch behind team leader James Lofton—for 830 yards (a 14.6 avg.) and 7 touchdowns ... Now has 322 career interceptions in only six seasons, 265 of them with the air-minded San Diego Chargers before being traded to the Packers, and 47 career touchdowns ... Veteran Packer receivers coach Lew Carpenter, commenting on Jefferson's extraordinary catching skills, says, "J.J. has the finest hand-to-eye coordination of any receiver I've ever seen" ... Acquired from Chargers Sept. 17, 1981 in exchange for flanker Aundra Thompson, the Packers' No. 2 draft choices in 1982 and 1984 and their No. 1 selection in '83, along with the right to exchange places in the first round of the '82 draft ... J.J. promptly made the trade a profitable one, helping to ignite a 6-2 Packer turnaround in the second half of the season with his infectious and uninhibited "cheerleading" ... On the field, he combined with the gifted James Lofton to put stout pressure on enemy defenses ... His ability to make the tough, "first down" catch consistently also has been a major contribution to the Green Bay attack ever since he made his first appearance as a Packer on September 27, 1981, when he made 7 catches for 121 yards against the Vikings at Milwaukee ... Though he had missed the first three weeks of the season, he made such an impact on Packer fans he was voted team's "Most Popular Player" in a late-season poll conducted by a Green Bay radio station ... Went without a touchdown reception during the 1982 regular season, but he made up for oversight during the playoffs, snaring two TD passes in Game One vs. St. Louis (Jan. 8, 1983) ... One of them, a 60-yarder, staked the Packers to a permanent 7-3 lead in the first quarter ... He closed out the game with 148 yards (on 6 catches), setting an all-time Packer playoff yardage record for receiving ... Was named to Pro Bowl for fourth time following season and emerged as game's MVP after making spectacular, diving fourth down catch to keep last-minute drive alive, then grabbing TD pass in end zone to produce come-from-behind victory ... Now has 22 100-yard receiving days to his credit, his most recent coming last November 6 when he had 7 catches for 102 yards and one TD in 35-21 Packer victory over the Browns at Milwaukee ... In 1980, while with San Diego, he became first player in NFL history to gain at least 1,000 yards receiving in each of his first three seasons, making a career high 82 catches in the process ... During this 45-game span, he caught 36 TD passes and was shut out only once—when he went without a catch against Buffalo Sept. 16, 1979, only because Chargers did not aim a pass at him when he was assigned double coverage, which helped contribute to a 245-yard team rushing performance ... Also has gone catchless only as a Packer—in 21-17 Green Bay victory over Bears Nov. 15, 1981 ... Led NFL in TD catches in 1978 as a rookie, and again in 1980, both times with 13.

The tireless "workaholic," easily one of the most dedicated athletes in recent Packer history, first began to gain long overdue recognition in 1981 when he was chosen on Pro Football

Weekly's All-NFC team, annually one of the most prestigious "all" teams selected ... A remarkably durable athlete, he enters the 1984 season with a consecutive game streak of 150, including 120 straight starts ... The former total tied him with Boyd Dowler (1959-69) for the third longest such streak in Packer history and brought him within reach of the runnerup in this category, Willie Davis (1960-69), who played in 162 consecutive games ... If McCarren should surpass that figure this season, he then would trail only his head coach, Forrest Gregg, who holds the team's durability record, having played in 187 consecutive games (1956, 58-70) ... JUST FOR THE RECORD

Before the 1984 season is over, the Packers will have played the 1,100th game in their history, which dates back to 1919 when they were founded as a town team by E.L. "Curly" Lambeau. They will play Game No. 1,100 on Thanksgiving Day (Thursday, Nov. 22) when they face the Detroit Lions at the Pontiac, MI., Silverdome.

Only two other teams in pro football annals, the Chicago Bears and St. Louis Cardinals, have played more than 1,000 games.

Going into the 1984 season, the Packers had played 1,083 games, of which they won 618, lost 418 and tied 47 for an overall winning percentage of .592. The total includes 812 league, playoff and Super Bowl games and 271 pre-season, mid-season and post-season non-league games. The league playoff breakdown reveals 442 victories, 334 defeats and 36 ties, a .567 percentage, and the non-league record 176 wins, 84 losses and 11 ties, a .649 percentage.

- Dec. 4** Jan Stenerud's 19-yard field goal with 3 seconds to play propels Packers past Bears, 31-28. Packers had led 28-14 early in fourth quarter prior to interception which ignited Bear comeback. Green Bay's best rushing performance of season — 184 yards — is complemented by Lynn Dickey's 345-yard passing performance, including a 76-yard pass-run collaboration with James Lofton which sets up winning field goal. Gerry Ellis rushes for career high 141 yards in 18 attempts to spearhead Green Bay ground game.
- Dec. 12** Jan Stenerud accounts for all Packer points with four field goals, his 23-yard bullseye at 4:07 of the overtime sealing a 12-9 Green Bay victory over the Buccaneers in the Packers' third "Monday Night Football" appearance of the season. Stenerud also breaks NFL's career FG record in process, running his 17-year total to 338 and surpassing George Blanda's previous mark of 335.

PACKERS MAKE 'MONDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL' HISTORY

The Packers made National Football League history — with an "assist" from the Washington Redskins — the night of October 17, 1983. Linebacker Mike Douglass scooped up a Joe Washington fumble and returned it 22 yards for the game's first touchdown with only 1:07 elapsed in the first quarter, triggering the highest scoring game in the 14-year history of ABC-TV's "Monday Night Football." The Packers eventually prevailed, 48-47, by dint of a 20-yard field goal with only 54 seconds remaining. The Redskins' Mark Moseley added a final dramatic touch to that explosive evening by missing a 39-yard field goal as time expired.

The previous "Monday Night Football" record for total points, 84, was established December 20, 1982, when the San Diego Chargers outscored the Cincinnati Bengals, 50-34.

The contest, witnessed by 55,255 fans, was the highest scoring game in which the Packers ever have been involved. The 95 points surpassed by eight the previous high of 87, set when the Packers lost to Detroit, 52-35 on Nov. 22, 1951.

THE PACKERS' SUPER BOWL STORY

Super Bowl I

January 15, 1967

Memorial Coliseum, Los Angeles, Calif.

Paid Attendance: 61,946

Green Bay 35, Kansas City 10

The Packers launched the Super Bowl series by whipping Kansas City's American Football League champions 35-10 behind the passing of Bart Starr, the receiving of Max McGee and a key interception by all-pro safety Willie Wood.

Vince Lombardi's repeating NFL champions broke open the game with three second-half touchdowns, the first of which was set up by Wood's 40-yard return of an interception to the Chief's 5-yard line with the Packers leading by only 14-10. The pass, authored by the Chiefs' Len Dawson, had been intended for Kansas City tight end Fred Arbanas.

McGee, filling in for ailing Boyd Dowler (injured on the Packers first offensive series) after having caught only three passes all season, snared seven from Starr for 138 yards and two touchdowns. Elijah Pitts ran for two other scores counting one on a 5-yard run in the third quarter and the other on a one-yard bolt in the final period.

The Chiefs' 10 points came in the second quarter; the only touchdown on a seven-yard pass from Dawson to Curtis McClinton.

Starr completed 16 of 23 passes for 250 yards and 2 touchdowns and was chosen the game's most valuable player. His scoring strikes came on a 37-yard collaboration with McGee in the first quarter and a 13-yard pitch to the aging end in the decisive third period.

The Packers collected \$15,000 per man and the Chiefs \$7,500 apiece — the largest single-game shares in the history of team sports.

Super Bowl II

January 14, 1968

Orange Bowl, Miami, Florida

Paid Attendance: 75,546

Green Bay 33, Oakland 14

Having acquired a third consecutive NFL championship just two weeks earlier, the Packers embellished that record-tying parlay by winning the Super Bowl title for the second straight year. This time, they dispatched the AFL champion Raiders, 33-14, in a game that drew the first \$3 million gate in football history.

Bart Starr again was chosen the game's most valuable player as he completed 13 of 24 passes for 202 yards and one touchdown and directed a Packer attack that was in control all the way after building up a 16-7 halftime lead.

Don Chandler kicked four field goals (39, 20, 43 and 31 yards), and all-pro cornerback Herb Adderley highlighted the Green Bay scoring with a 60-yard interception return of a Daryle Lamonica pass.

After leading by only 3-0 at the quarter, the Packers padded their margin to 16-7 at halftime by way of three Chandler field goals and a 62-yard scoring pass from Starr to split end Boyd Dowler. They then left the Raiders behind with a 10-point third period, Donny Anderson scoring on a 2-yard run and Chandler with his final field goal.

The game marked the last for Vince Lombardi as Packers coach, ending nine years at Green Bay in which he won six Western Conference championships, five NFL titles and two Super Bowls, a record unprecedented in pro football history.

THE PACKERS NFC (NFL) PLAYOFF HISTORY... GAME BY GAME

1936 — GREEN BAY 21, BOSTON REDSKINS 6. (Polo Grounds, New York) — Although New York was not represented in the title playoff, the game was played in the Polo Grounds because the Redskins franchise was being shifted to Washington, D.C., by George Marshall. A turnout of 29,545 saw Don Hutson take a 45-yard touchdown pass from Arnie Herber in the first three minutes, and the Packers were never headed.

1938 — NEW YORK 23, GREEN BAY 17. (Polo Grounds, New York) — The Packers overcame an early 9-0 New York lead, spawned by two blocked punts, but could not hold off the Giants in the second half. The Packers began to close in early in the second period, Arnie Herber capitalizing on a Paul (Tiny) Engebretsen interception by lofting a 50-yard touchdown strike to Carl Mulleneaux, cutting the Giants margin to 9-7.

The Giants shortly converted a mid-field fumble by Packer fullback Eddie Jankowski into a 16-7 lead before Green Bay again trimmed the deficit to two points before the half was over; Clarke Hinkle crashing over from the 6-inch line following a 66-yard Cecil Isbell pass to Wayland Becker. The Packers then forged in front in opening minutes of the second half for the first and only time in the game; an Engebretsen field goal presenting them with a 17-16 edge. The Giants, however, stormed back with a 61-yard scoring drive, capped by a 35-yard pass from Ed Danowski to Hank Soar. Soar fought his way over the goal line from the 2, with Hinkle clinging to one leg, for what proved to be the winning touchdown. A crowd of 48,120, a play off record, sat in on proceedings.

1939 — GREEN BAY 27, NEW YORK 0. (State Fair Park, Milwaukee) — The Packers made playoff history by scoring first shutout ever registered in NFL championship game. Despite bitter 35 m.p.h. wind, both Arnie Herber and Cecil Isbell passed for touchdowns in leading Green Bay to its fifth world championship before 32,279 fans.

Green Bay mounted a 7-0 halftime lead, by dint of a Herber scoring strike to Milt Gantenbein, and pulled away in the third quarter on a 29-yard field goal by Paul (Tiny) Engebretsen and a long TD pass from Isbell to Joe Laws. The Packers added 10 more points in the fourth quarter on a 42-yard field goal by Ernie Smith and a short scoring run by fullback Eddie Jankowski.

1944 — GREEN BAY 14, NEW YORK 7. (Polo Grounds, New York) — With peerless pass catcher Don Hutson employed primarily as

a decoy for the Giant defense, fullback Ted Fritsch emerged the offensive hero of Packers' sixth world title victory.

Fritsch scored both Green Bay touchdowns, one on a 2-yard run in the second quarter and the other on a 26-yard pass-and-run collaboration with Irv Comp in the third. Ward Cuff scored the Giants' touchdown with a one-yard plunge on the first play of the final period. Joe Laws, the Packers' veteran, 34-year-old all-purpose halfback, had a brilliant day, setting a playoff record with three interceptions and claiming ground gaining honors with 74 yards in 13 carries. Attendance: 46,016.

1960 — PHILADELPHIA 17, GREEN BAY 13 (Franklin Field) — Packers erected a 6-0 lead in the second period and were out in front by 13-10 in fourth quarter before yielding to late surge by Eagles, who scored the deciding points on a 5-yard burst by Ted Dean.

Green Bay moved ahead in first quarter on a 20-yard Paul Hornung field goal. Hornung added 23-yard FG in second quarter but Eagles tied it 6-6 on a 35-yard scoring pass from Norm Van Brocklin to Tommy McDonald and edged ahead via Bobby Walston's first conversion. Walston followed with a 15-yard FG for a 10-6 halftime lead.

The Packers stopped Philadelphia at their own four late in the third period, then recaptured lead on a 7-yard TD pass from Bart Starr to Max McGee. A 58-yard kickoff return by Dean, however, ignited Eagles and victory eluded Packers, making their first title game appearance in 16 years. Attendance: 67,325.

1961 — GREEN BAY 37, NEW YORK 0. (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — Paul Hornung, on leave from the Army, scored an individual record 19 points to key Packer decimation of Giants in first title game ever played in Green Bay.

A record Packer home crowd of 39,029 watched the Green and Gold erupt for 24 points in the second quarter. In all, the Packers scored seven times against the NFL's top defensive team of 1961, amassing four touchdowns and three field goals. The defense, meanwhile, was proving a devastating complement to the attack, intercepting four Giant passes and recovering one fumble.

Two interceptions, by Ray Nitschke and defensive back Hank Gremminger, set up touchdowns No. 2 and 3 while the fumble recovery by Forrest Gregg led to Hornung's second field goal and a Jess Whittenton interception to Hornung's final FG.

1962 — GREEN BAY 16, NEW YORK 7. (Yankee Stadium, New York) — Out front all the way in a raw, cyclonic setting, Packers weather siege by vengeful Giants in primitive, hand-to-hand struggle. Ray Nitschke proves principal frustration to New Yorkers, seeking redemption for shutout humiliation in '61 title game. His deflection triggers interception to blunt early Giant drive to Green Bay 10. On way to being named game's most valuable player, he also registers two interceptions, one of which led to the Packers' only touchdown of the afternoon. The other set up a 29-yard field goal by Jerry Kramer, whose trio of three-pointers provided eventual margin.

Giants' only TD comes on block of Max McGee punt in Green Bay end zone midway through the third quarter.

A battered Jim Taylor sets playoff record with 31 rushing attempts, good for 85 yards.

1965 — GREEN BAY 23, CLEVELAND 12. (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — Field softened by four-inch snow made Packer backs only run harder as Lambeau Field crowd of 50,777 celebrated third championship in five years. Jim Taylor and Paul Hornung amassed 201 yards rushing in rally that overcame Browns's early 9-7 lead.

Packers charged to 7-0 first quarter advantage on 47-yard Bart Starr pass to Carroll Dale and Don Chandler's conversion, but Cleveland moved in front on a 17-yard TD strike from Frank Ryan to Gary Collins and 24-yard Lou Groza field goal.

Green Bay rebounded, however, with 15 and 23 yard FGs by Chandler, the latter following a Willie Wood interception, to claim 13-7 lead subsequently trimmed to a single point by a second Groza FG shortly before the intermission.

Starr settled the issue in third quarter, escorting the Packers on a 90-yard 11-play

scoring drive climaxed by Hornung's 13-yard sweep of Browns' right perimeter.

1966 — GREEN BAY 34, DALLAS 27. (Cotton Bowl, Dallas) — Bart Starr has one of his finest hours, passing for four touchdowns as Packers win second straight title and fourth in six years. Tom Brown thwarts last-minute Cowboy bid, and the majority of 74,152 Cotton Bowl fans, with end zone interception of Don Meredith's fourth down pass from Green Bay 2.

Packers mounted quick 14-0 lead on a 17-yard Starr pass to Elijah Pitts and 18-yard scoring run with a fumble recovery by rookie Jim Grabowski, but led only 21-17 at halftime following explosive Cowboy comeback. After a 32-yard Villanueva field goal had cut Packer lead to a tenuous 21-20, Starr hit Dowler and McGee with 16-yard scoring passes to provide a cushion against the Cowboys' late surge.

1967 — GREEN BAY 21, DALLAS 17. (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — With thermometer shuddering at 16 below zero and 50,861 in stands, Bart Starr scores winning touchdown from one-yard-line with 13 seconds remaining, sealing record third straight championship for Packers and their fifth in seven years.

Starr's touchdown, on third down with no timeouts remaining, climaxed a 68-yard drive in 12 plays.

As was case in 1966, Packers grabbed early 14-0 advantage. But this time Cowboys came from behind to take the lead, forcing story book finish by Green Bay to win contest later voted the greatest game in pro football history.

Starr's touchdown passes of 8 and 46 yards to Boyd Dowler built the first quarter bulge, trimmed in second quarter by George Andrie's 7-yard scoring return of a Starr fumble and 21-yard Danny Villanueva field goal. Dan Reeves' 50-yard scoring strike to Lance Rentzel in the fourth quarter triggered the dramatic denouement.

1983 SUPER BOWL TOURNAMENT

1983—GREEN BAY 41, ST. LOUIS 16 (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — Making their first post-season appearance in Lambeau Field since celebrated "Ice Bowl" game of 1967 against Dallas, Packers halt Cardinal drive at one-yard-line in first quarter then proceed to forge an all-time club scoring record in their opening Super Bowl Tournament contest following 1982 season.

Out front 21-3 at halftime, they pad lead to 41-9 in fourth quarter before permitting Cards a consolation touchdown. Quarterback Lynn Dickey ties Packer playoff record before 54,282 fans by passing for 4 touchdowns (17 of 23 for 260 yards and 0 intercepts overall) and flanker John Jefferson sets club postseason mark with 148 receiving yards on 6 catches, including a 60-yard TD reception, another Packer playoff record. Placekicker Jan Stenerud also establishes a club playoff mark with a 46-yard field goal.

1983—DALLAS 37, GREEN BAY 26 (Texas Stadium, Irving, TX) — Packers amass 466 yards, a team playoff record, but are unable to overcome slow start, which finds them trailing 20-7 at halftime. They roll up 363 yards and out-score Cowboys 19-17 in second half, pulling within four points (30-26) on a 23-yard scoring runback of an interception by Mark Lee in fourth quarter, but Cowboys retaliate with 74-yard scoring drive to end Green Bay hopes with 63,972 fans looking on.

Quarterback Lynn Dickey throws for 332 yards (19-for-36) and all-time Packer playoff record in losing cause, split end James Lofton emerging with 109 yards on 5 receptions. Lofton also spices Packers' second half comeback with 71-yard reverse for a TD, tying all-time NFL playoff record for a run from scrimmage.

THE LAMBEAU FIELD STORY

Lambeau Field, the home of the Green Bay Packers, was constructed in 1957 with an initial capacity of 32,150. The cost of the original project, \$960,000 was shared equally by the Green Bay Packers, Inc. and the city of Green Bay. It was financed by means of a bond issue, which received voter approval in a referendum conducted April 3, 1956.

Since that time, there have been four additions to the stadium, all underwritten by the Packer Corporation. The capacity was increased to 38,669 in 1961, to 42,327 in 1963, to 50,861 in 1965 and to its present capacity, 56,155 in 1970.

The stadium was dedicated as City Stadium on September 29, 1957. It was later renamed Lambeau Field in 1965, following the death of the late E.L. "Curly" Lambeau, founder and first coach of the Packers.

Lambeau Field now is wholly owned by the city of Green Bay, retirement of the original \$960,000 indebtedness having been celebrated at a mortgage-burning ceremony in May of 1978.

PACKER PRO HALL OF FAMERS



1963 — E. L. (Curly) Lambeau, Founder, player, coach, vice-president (1919-49). Founded Packers in 1919 and served as team's only coach through 1949 season. Also played halfback from '19 through '27, a period during which he pioneered forward pass in professional football. Led Packers to six world championships and is one of only five coaches to record more than 200 coaching victories in the NFL, (others are George Halas, Paul Brown, Don Shula and Tom Landry). Also coached Chicago Cardinals (1950-'51) and Washington Redskins (1952-'53).



1963 — Johnny (Blood) McNally, HB (1928-'36). Also played for Milwaukee Badgers, Duluth Eskimos, Pottsville Maroons, Pittsburgh Steelers. An elusive runner and gifted pass receiver, he played major role in Packers' drive to first three championships in 1929, '30 and '31. Also helped Packers win a fourth world title in '36. Still ranks 14th in Packer lifetime scoring, four decades after departing Green Bay scene, with 224 points. Collegiate star at St. Thomas.



1963 — Don Hutson, E (1935-'45). Highest scoring receiver in pro football history with 99 touchdowns, all-time NFL record. Credited with inventing pass patterns, he led league in receiving 8 years and in scoring 5 seasons, both also lifetime marks. Caught passes in 95 consecutive games, third longest streak in NFL history. Currently ranks 15th lifetime among pro receivers with 488 catches and 18th in NFL career scoring with 823 points. Starred at U. of Alabama.



1963 — Robert (Cal) Hubbard, T-E (1929-'35). Also played for New York Giants, Pittsburgh Steelers. A legendary athlete, he was one of pro football's first genuine giants — a massive 6 ft. 3 inch, 265 pounder who was a devastating blocker on offense and relentless pursuer on defense as a premier, two-way performer. Was an all-pro choice in each of first three years (1931, '32, '33) such selections were made. Played college football at Centenary, Geneva.



1964 — Clarke Hinkle, FB (1932-'41). A four-time all-pro selection (1936, '37, '38, '41) ... One of the most versatile players in NFL annals, he was tough, bruising runner, fine blocker, good receiver and excellent placekicker as well as a shrewd, hard-hitting linebacker. Fourth-ranking rusher in Packer history with 3,860 yards in 1,171 carries. Played college football at Bucknell.



1964 — Mike Michalske, G (1929-'37). Also played for New York Yankees (1927-'28) before joining Packers. Rated one of game's greatest guards during pro football's "two-way" era. Two-time all-pro selection (1931 and 1935). A true 60-minute player, he was known as "Iron Mike" because of his great stamina and durability. Best asset was exceptional quickness, which made him equally effective on both offense and defense. Played college football at Penn State.



1966 — Arnie Herber, HB (1930-'41). Also played for New York Giants (1944-'45). Pro football's first great long passer. Won three National Football League passing titles and was all-pro selection in 1932. Teamed with Don Hutson to form NFL's first feared passing combination in mid-'30s. Shares fourth place in lifetime passing efficiency in Packer annals with 50.06 percentage for 9 seasons and ranks fifth in career touchdown passes with 51. Tough, durable athlete and accomplished punter as well as great passer. A Green Bay native, he played college football at Regis (Denver, Colo).



1966 — Walt Kiesling, T (1935-36). Also played for Duluth Eskimos (1926-27), Pottsville (1928), Chicago Cardinals (1929-33) and Chicago Bears (1934). All-pro selection in 1932. Two-way performer, he starred on both offense and defense. Although a giant of his time, he possessed impressive quickness for one of his dimensions. Later served as Packer assistant coach (1945-48). Also coached for Pittsburgh Steelers, Philadelphia-Pittsburgh combine and Chicago Cardinals. Played college football at St. Thomas.



1967 — Emlen Tunnell, HB (1959-61). Also played for New York Giants (1948-58). Second leading interceptor in pro football history. Intercepted 79 passes over 14-year career and returned them 1,282 yards, another National Football League record. Also holds NFL career record for punt returns with 258 and most yards punts returned, 2,209. Played college football at University of Iowa.



1971 — Vince Lombardi, Coach and General Manager (1959-'67). Also assistant coach for New York Giants (1954-'58) and head coach of Washington Redskins (1969). Directed Packers to five NFL championships in seven years (1961-'62 and 1965-'66-'67), a feat without precedent or parallel in pro football history. His 1966 and 1967 teams also made history by winning first two Super Bowls. Packers won nine of 10 playoff games under his leadership and overall, compiled a 98-30-4 record, a glittering .766 winning percentage. Lombardi, a guard, played his college football at Fordham, where he was one of the legendary "Seven Blocks of Granite."



1974 — Tony Canadeo, HB (1941-'43, 1946-'52). Became only the third 1,000 yard rusher in pro football history when he gained 1,052 yards in 1952. Still ranks as No. 3 ground gainer in Packer annals with 4,197 yards in 1,025 attempts, a 4.1 average. A durable, all-purpose halfback, he was an accomplished blocker, capable passer and good receiver in addition to being a highly effective kick returner. Also played defensive back during early years of his career. Played college football at Gonzaga, where he acquired nickname of "Grey Ghost."



1976 — Jim Taylor, FB (1958-'66). Also played for New Orleans Saints (1967). One of three running backs in pro football history to rush for 1,000 yards in five consecutive seasons (1960-'64). Also seventh ranking career rusher in NFL annals with 8,597 yards in 10 seasons. Ranks eighth all-time, in number of 100-yard rushing games with 26 and fifth in career rushing attempts with 1,941. Also shares NFL record for most rushing touchdowns in a season, 19 in 1962, and owns third highest lifetime total of rushing TDs, 83. Played college football at LSU.



1977 — Forrest Gregg, T (1956, 1958-70). Also played with Dallas Cowboys (1971). Drafted No. 2 in 1956. Gregg was named All-Pro eight times (including All-Pro at both Guard and Tackle in 1965) and 9 times to the Pro Bowl. Called by Lombardi the "finest player he'd ever coached." Gregg holds the Packer record for durability with 187 consecutive games. Head Coach of the Green Bay Packers. Also served as head coach of Cleveland Browns (1975-77) and Cincinnati Bengals (1980-83). Played college football at SMU.



1977 — Bart Starr, QB (1956-71). Drafted in 17th round in 1956. Starr became the winningest quarterback in football, directing the Packers to 6 Western Division Titles, 5 World Titles, 2 Super Bowl victories, and was named MVP in Super Bowls I and II. Starr led the League in passing in 1962, 1964 and 1966 and was named to the Pro Bowl 4 times. In 1972 he coached Packer quarterbacks, Head Coach of Green Bay Packers 1975-83. He played college football at Alabama.



1978 — Ray Nitschke, MLB (1958-72). Drafted in third round in 1957 after playing fullback at Illinois. Most Valuable Player in 1962 NFL Title game vs NY Giants. Named to the NFL All-50 year team. All-Pro in 1964, 1965 and 1966; Pro Bowl 1965.



1980 — Herb Adderley, DB (1961-69). Also played for Dallas Cowboys (1970-72). Packers' No. 1 draft choice (Michigan State) in 1961. Five-time all-pro at corner-back. Played in five Pro Bowls, four of first six Super Bowls (two with Green Bay, two with Dallas). Had 48 career interceptions, ran 7 back for TDs (second highest total in NFL history).



1981 — Jim Ringo, C (1953-63). Also played for Philadelphia (1964-67). Seventh round draft choice out of Syracuse in 1953. Went on to win all-pro honors six times, five as a Packer, and played in 10 Pro Bowls, seven as a Packer. Highly durable performer, once held NFL record for most consecutive games played (183). Helped Packers win back-to-back NFL titles in 1961-62. Traded to Philadelphia in 1964. Currently offensive line coach for New York Jets.



1981 — Willie Davis, DE (1960-69). Also played for Cleveland (1958-59). A 17th round draft choice, he came to Packers from Browns in 1960 trade. Became one of premier pass rushers in pro football history, winning all-pro honors six times and selection to Pro Bowl five times. Holds all-time Packer record for career fumble recoveries (21) and second longest consecutive game streak (162) in Green Bay annals. Helped Packers win five NFL titles during 1960s. Played college football at Grambling.

BIRTH OF A TEAM AND A LEGEND... THE PACKER STORY

On the evening of August 11, 1919, a score or more of husky young characters, called together by Curly Lambeau and George Calhoun, gathered in the dingy editorial room of the old Green Bay Press-Gazette building on Cherry Street and organized a football team. They didn't know it, but that was the beginning of the incredible saga of the Green Bay Packers.

There had been some preliminary talk and planning and that night's decision wasn't announced until two days later, but the big step had been taken. So August 11 is as good a birthday as any.

Actually the initial spark had been struck a few weeks before during a casual street corner conversation between Curly Lambeau and George Calhoun. It was apparently one of those "Why not get up a football team?" remarks, but once they got interested they wasted no time.

FIRST THEY TALKED Curly's employer at the Indian Packing Company into putting up some money for equipment.

Because the team's jerseys had been provided by the packing company, which also permitted the use of its athletic field for practice, the club was identified in its early publicity as a project of the company. With this tie-in the name "Packers" was a natural, and Packers they have been ever since, although the corporation had practically faded out of the picture before that first season was half over.

That first season the team won 10 games and lost only one against other teams from Wisconsin and Upper Michigan. Games were played in an open field with no fences or bleachers, and interested fans "passed the hat." But the team was so successful by 1921 that Lambeau was backed by two officials of the packing plant in obtaining a franchise in the new national pro-football league that had been formed in 1920. Cash customers didn't quite pay the freight and at the end of the season it had to be forfeited.

THIS WAS the first in a long series of troubles that the now famous team overcame, for in 1922 Lambeau gained other backers and bought the franchise back for \$250. Troubles continued during that season. One game was rained out and the insurance company wouldn't pay off because the official amount of rain was one one-hundredth of an inch short of that required in the policy.

Another storm late in the season when the Packers were scheduled to play the Duluth Eskimos, however, proved the founding of the modern community corporation. A.B. Turnbull, general manager of the Green Bay Press-Gazette, told the Packers to play anyway. He then went out and helped organize the businessmen of Green Bay in the support of the team, and the Green Bay

Football Corporation was formed.

FROM THOSE MODEST and somewhat tenuous beginnings, the Packers have gone on to earn national stature and virtual worldwide recognition by winning more championships (eleven) over the intervening half-century than any other team in professional football.

The fact that these achievements have come while representing a city of only 90,000 inhabitants, in competition with the country's population giants, has endeared them to the nation's football fans, many of whom are intrigued by the David vs. Goliath concept and the Packers' unique status as a community-owned corporation.

INEVITABLY, PROCEDURES at Packer games have come a long way since the sandlot years of 1919-20 when the Pack was subsisting on the contents of George Calhoun's hat. Then there were no ushers, no majorettes, no band and no public address system—the latter hadn't been invented yet, there weren't even any seats at first, and it didn't cost anything to get in.

When the Packers began their existence in 1919, they played on approximately the same site as the now abandoned City (East) Stadium, but with a mighty difference. Hagemeister Park, as it was called was just a big vacant lot with a football gridiron marked on it.

There were no gates because there wasn't any fence. Spectators just dropped off the Walnut Street streetcar and walked over to the sideline, or drove their own cars and parked about ten yards behind the ropes stretched around the playing field.

If they felt like it they either sat in their automobiles or on top of them, but most preferred to get out and follow the play up and down the field. By moving as the play progressed, you always had a "50-yard line" location and were handy to any donnybrook that might require a little help. In fact, when things got exciting the crowd sometimes spilled right onto the field, surrounded the scrimmage in a big circle and virtually took part in every play. Teams didn't huddle in those days, or the fans would have been in that too.

When the half ended teams grabbed blankets and adjourned to opposite end zones where they relaxed and talked over the tactics of the next half. Nothing private about those huddles. The crowd formed a ring around the players, a practice encouraged since it made a handy wind break. Fans weren't bashful about joining the discussions either, sometimes with surprising results. At least one early game was pulled out of the fire by a spectator's half time suggestion.

In 1920 a section of stands was built—just a small bleacher with a capacity of a couple

hundred—on one side of the field, and a fee charged to sit there. The next year a portable canvas fence was erected around the whole field and a regular admission charge inaugurated.

WHEN HAGEMEISTER Park was dug up in 1923 to make way for East High School, the Packers shifted to the new baseball grounds out on the end of Main Street. This was called Bellevue Park because it was just east of the old Hagemeister Brewery, which was renamed the Bellevue Products Co. during Prohibition. Things were Big Time out there, with crowds of 4,000 to 5,000 storming the fences to boo the hated Chicago Bears.

The Packers used Bellevue in 1923-24, but it was obviously inadequate and too far out, lacking about every facility needed for football. Agitation to build a new stadium somewhere near the original site culminated in the erection of old City Stadium just back of the new high school.

The new plant was barely completed in time for the 1925 opening, but was an immediate success, the Bear game that year drawing a record crowd of nearly 6,000. It was a typical small town park of its day, with wooden fences and stands on both sides, between the 30-yard lines. Seating capacity was gradually increased until it seated 15,000 by 1934, with the end zones still uncovered. With the filling in of the area around the end lines the ultimate capacity of 25,000 was reached.

AFTER WORLD WAR II, City Stadium gradually faded from its once proud position as one of the favored fields in the National Football League to an inadequate and obsolete installation. As pro crowds increased it was impossible to expand the stadium any further. With limited capacity, the Packers found it increasingly difficult to schedule top opponents at home. September 29, 1957 was a proud day for Green Bay and its Packers. A million dollar modern stadium with a seating capacity of 32,150 was dedicated. In 1961, the Stadium was expanded to 38,669, to 42,327 in 1963, to 50,861 in 1965 when the name was changed to Lambeau Field, and to the present 56,155 in 1970.

The Packers' colorful saga, spanning 65 years, can be roughly divided into eight chapters. They take us from the "Iron Man" period of the first decade under founder Curly Lambeau to the present day, which finds the Packer's legendary quarterback, Bart Starr, presiding as the eighth head coach in the team's history.

THE IRON MAN ERA—With good financial backing, Lambeau began to pick up college stars from all over the country, plus some unknowns who were going to turn out to be "greats." And in 1929 Green Bay won the national professional football championship.

They repeated in 1930 and 1931 with a team featuring such all-time pro greats as Red Dunn, Verne Lewellen, Cal Hubbard, Bo Molenda, Jug Earp, Mike Michalske, Johnny Blood, Bill Kern, Arnie Herber, Clarke Hinkle, Lavvie Dilweg, Tom Nash, Milt Gantenbein and Hank Bruder. Many games 12 or 13 players would go for almost the full 60 minutes. These teams were hailed all over the country as some of the greatest ever.

THE HUTSON PERIOD—Trouble flared again soon afterward. A fan fell from the stands, sued and won a \$5,000 verdict and the insurance company went out of business. The Packers went into receivership, were just about to fold, when Green Bay businessmen came to the rescue again, raised \$15,000 in new capital and reorganized the club. About this time a rather slight, lanky end by the name of Don Hutson came to the club. From his first game on, Hutson became the terror of the league and the secret of Green Bay's next three championships. With Herber and Cecil Isbell pitching and Hutson catching anything they threw at him despite any kind of a stop-Hutson defense, Green Bay won championships in 1936, 1939 and 1944, and all during the Hutson era they always finished in the first division.

RONZANI REGIME—After Hutson's retirement, Packer fortunes again went into a decline. The disastrous pro football war brought on another financial crisis after the 1949 season. In the midst of it Lambeau resigned to take a position as head coach of the Chicago Cardinals. Then began another major reorganization and rebuilding effort with Gene Ronzani of the Bears hired as head coach. Over \$125,000 was raised in a giant stock sale all over the state. Ronzani's teams improved each of the first three seasons until 1952. The Packers were in the thick of the title chase until the last weeks of the season. In 1953 the team played erratic ball and Ronzani resigned with two games remaining on the schedule.

BLACKBOURN TAKES OVER—The Packers overhauled their front office and coaching staff in 1954, hiring Verne C. Lewellen, all-time Packer great, attorney and businessman, as general manager. Reaching into college ranks for a head coach was the next step in the rebuilding plans and Lisle W. Blackbourn, coach of Marquette University, was signed to a contract. During the four-year Blackbourn regime the Packers won 17 while losing 31.

McLEAN MOVES UP—Likable Ray "Scooter" McLean moved up from an outstanding assistant coach to guide the destiny of the Packers for 1958. McLean resigned in December after a 1-10-1 record, worst in Packer history in his lone season as head coach.

THE LOMBARDI ERA—In 1959, the Packers announced the signing of New York Giant assistant Vince Lombardi as head coach and general manager.

In his first season, Lombardi lifted the Packers to a 7-5 record and was unanimously voted Coach of the Year. Then in 1960, the Packers captured the Western Division title and went on to win World Championships in 1961, 1962, 1965, 1966, and 1967. Never finishing lower than second since 1960, his teams became the standard of football excellence and the Packer franchise one of the most successful. Over a nine year span as head coach, Lombardi's teams racked up 141 victories against 39 losses and 4 ties for a remarkable .783 winning percentage. Even more noteworthy, however, is the record of Lombardi coached teams in post-season play. In 10 Division playoffs and World Championship Games, the Packers emerged victorious nine times.

BENGSTON PERIOD—Following the third consecutive title in 1967, Lombardi turned over the head coaching duties to Phil Bengtson and one year later announced that he was leaving Green Bay to coach and manage the Washington Redskins. Bengtson coached the Packers from 1968-1970, compiling a 20-21-1 record, and in December of 1970 resigned.

THE DEVINE DAYS—Dan Devine, one of the three most successful coaches in the nation's collegiate ranks, succeeded Bengtson as head coach and general manager in January of 1971. After settling for a 4-8-2 record during his first season, Devine and the Packers appeared on the road to new heights when 1972 produced a 10-4 record and the team's first Central Division title since 1967. But the Packers' Super Bowl hopes dissolved in the second half of '73 and they slipped to a 5-7-2 mark. They continued their recession in '74, emerging with a 6-8 record, and Devine resigned.

THE PRESENT—Bart Starr, the most successful field general in pro football history as Green Bay's quarterback of the '60s, accepted the challenge to lead the Packers out of the NFL wilderness, agreeing to a three-year contract as head coach and general manager on Dec. 24, 1974. Starr, who

led the Packers to five world championships from 1961 through 1967, asked for "the prayers and patience of Packer fans everywhere... We will earn everything else."

Although he had to settle for a 4-10 record in the baptismal season of a massive rebuilding project, Starr gave Packer fans new hope by assembling a sound organization and restoring a positive attitude, underscored by three victories in the last five games of the 1975 season. He continued the resurgent trend in 1976, leading the Packers to a 5-9 record, highlighted by a three-game, mid-season winning streak. Major and key injuries slowed the comeback in 1977 but a strong finish produced a 4-10 mark. Hopes soared in 1978 when the Packers posted their first winning record since 1972, an 8-7-1 record, only to be temporarily dampened in '79 by a record rash of injuries which spawned a 5-11 mark. Another injury epidemic, one which saw 27 players on injured reserve during the course of the season, struck in 1980, forcing the Packers to settle for a 5-10-1 record.

Rebounding strongly in 1981, they rallied from a disappointing 2-6 start to mount the most dramatic comeback in Green Bay history, closing with a 6-2 rush (an 8-8 mark) and coming within one victory of the playoffs.

The Packers continued the upsurge in 1982, when they qualified for the playoffs for the first time since 1972 by posting a 5-3-1 record during a strike-interrupted season. They then embellished that performance by routing St. Louis 41-16 in the first game of the NFL's Super Bowl Tournament before bowing to Dallas (37-26) despite a record-setting, 466-yard offensive effort.

Starr was relieved of his head coaching duties on Dec. 19, 1983, after the Packers finished the '83 season with an 8-8 record and missed the NFL playoffs on the final week of the year. He was replaced on Dec. 24 by Forrest Gregg, a former teammate and one of the premier offensive tackles in the history of the game as a player, who had maneuvered Cincinnati into Super Bowl XVI following the 1981 season. Gregg, whose Bengals' 19-6 record over the 1981-82 seasons was the best in pro football, received a five-year contract.

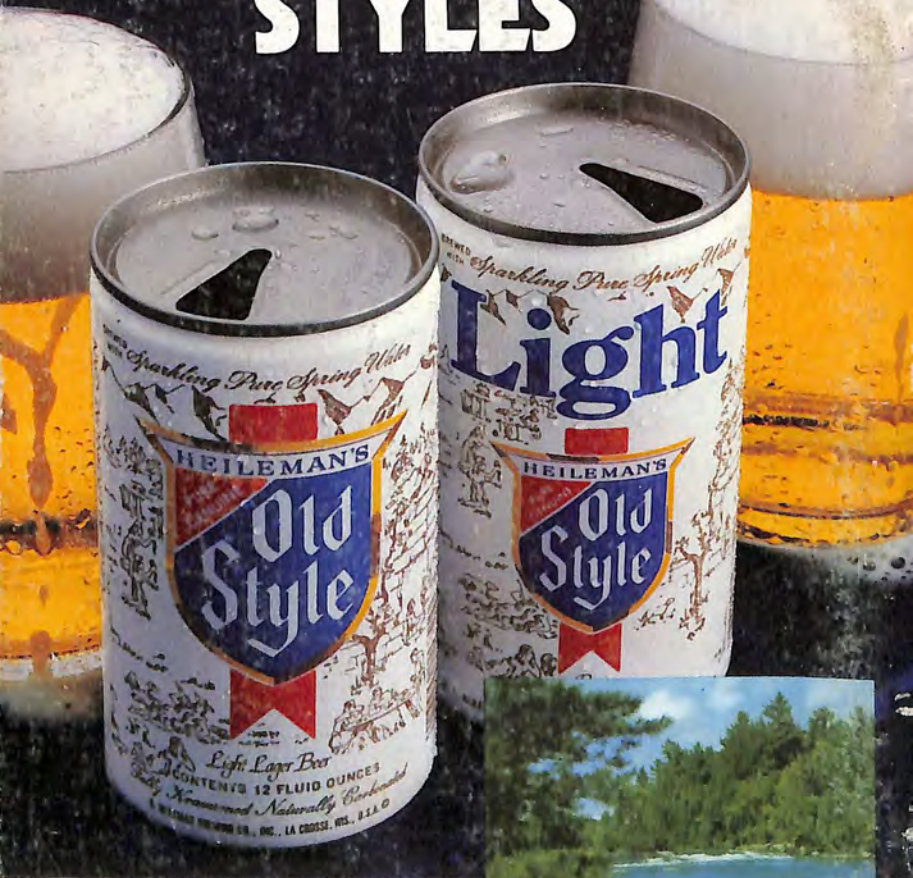
