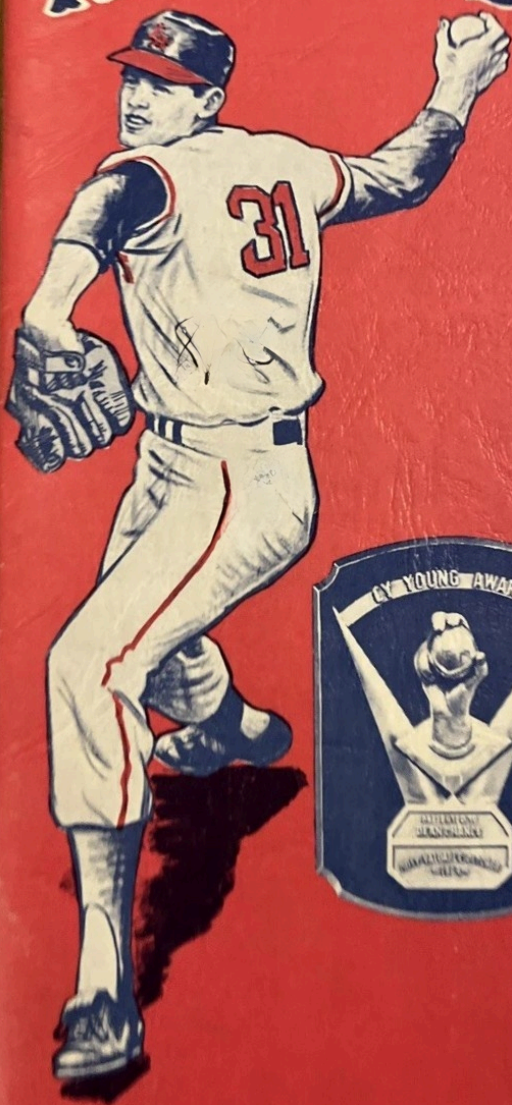

FARM SYSTEM

The Angels' farm system has a new and strengthened look in 1965—one which continues the policy of progress which has been the trademark of the Angels since their inception.

For the first time, the Angels have an ownership club in their organization. They purchased the Seattle club in the Pacific Coast League from Boston in December. This move helped ignite a reshuffling of clubs in the organization. El Paso has been added on a full working agreement basis, thereby becoming the first full Class AA affiliate the Angels have had.

In addition to these new clubs, four other teams long affiliated with the Angels are back. They are Reynosa in the Mexican League; San Jose in the California League; Quad Cities in the Midwest League and Idaho Falls in the Pioneer League.

Joe Gordon continues as the Angels' organization batting instructor. Tom Morgan is back for his second year as the organization's pitching instructor. Al Monchak, who was the coordinator of the Angels' Scottsdale team in the Arizona Instructional Winter League last fall, once again will work with future Angels at the club's new minor league training base at El Centro and Brawley, Calif.

WILMER DEAN CHANCE

Nickname — Prefers to be called Dean... Bats and throws right... Born June 1, 1941 in Wooster, Ohio... Still resides there... Brown hair... Blue eyes... Height—6-3... Weight—200... **YOUNGEST MAN IN HISTORY TO WIN CY YOUNG AWARD**—emblematic of most valuable pitcher in the Major Leagues... Led Major Leagues with 1.65 ERA, 11 shutouts (five by 1-0 scores, tying Major League record)... Fifth in American League MVP voting with 97 points... Went three scoreless innings as A.L. starter in All-Star Game, striking out two, giving up two hits... First man in Angel history to win 20 games... Top strikeout performer (career): June 2, 1964, 15 strikeouts against Boston at Chavez Ravine... Hit double-figures in strikeouts four times in '64; six for career... Third in American League with 207 strikeouts... Had nine-game winning streak from July 11-Aug. 18 (first game)... Had scoreless streak of 28 innings, June 2-June 11, 1964... He led American League with 15 complete games... In 1964, he pitched five two-hitters, one three-hitter, four four-hitters, four five-hitters, one seven-hitter and three eight-hitters... Career-wise, he has pitched one one-hitter (Sept. 10, 1962 at Minnesota, 5-0), six two-hitters, one three-hitter, four four-hitters, five five-hitters, two six-hitters, two seven-hitters and three eight-hitters... He was scored-on in only 35 of his 278 innings on the mound... At Chavez Ravine in 1964, he had 1.08 ERA, with 11-3 record... On the road, he had a 2.25 ERA, with 9-6 mark... Is off-season farmer... Last winter, also was on billiards tour... Busy on banquet circuit being honored at Chicago, Baltimore, Columbus, Houston, Philadelphia and Los Angeles... Married Judith Carol Larson, Jan. 14, 1961 in Winchester, Wis... One son—Brett Dean, born July 26, 1962.

ODDS-'N-ENDS — He made 11 relief appearances in '64 — with two saves... One of losses came in relief (Sept. 23 vs. Chi., 2-1)... His other losses were: May 15 at Balt., 6-1; May 29 vs. Balt., 3-2; June 15 at Wash., 3-2; June 27 vs. K.C., 2-1; July 1 at Balt., 4-2; Aug. 22 (1st game) at Cleve., 1-0; Sept. 11 at Bost., 3-0; Sept. 29 at Chi., 2-1... He gave Yankees only one run (a Mantle HR) in 50 innings in '64... He has one of best home run records in the Majors... He's given up only 31 homers in 751 innings... That figure breaks down to 1.8 walks per nine-inning game and was second best in '64 in the American League. Baltimore's Milt Pappas was first with a 1.7 average.
