# ROBERT RANDALL "Bobby" BRAGAN - THE MANAGER

10 **BOBBY BRAGAN**, one of baseball's most colorful personalities, brings to the Braves a dedication to his job that few can match and a background which superbly qualifies him to serve as the Braves manager in 1963.

Bragan entered professional baseball in 1937 and three years later was the Philadelphia Phillies regular shortstop as a rookie in the major leagues. From 1943 to 1949 he served the Brooklyn Dodgers as an infielder-catcher, with the exception of two years in the Army as a Pfc. and Second Lieutenant. In 1947, Bobby faced the Yankees in the World Series and doubled home a run in his only appearance at the plate.

While signing his contract with Branch Rickey at Brooklyn in 1948, Bobby informed the famed General Manager that he wanted to try his hand at managing. Later that season, the Dodgers' Fort Worth Club needed a skipper and Rickey, who had been impressed with Bragan's theories and ideas about the game, appointed the ambitious Alabaman.

Bobby was an immediate success. As is his nature, he put everything he had into his new endeavor and Fort Worth won 100 games, lost only 54 and won the Texas League pennant. In 1953, he was named manager of the Hollywood Stars and, when his club won 106 games to win the Pacific Coast League pennant, he was selected the Manager of The Year in the minor leagues. In 1956, Rickey, then at Pittsburgh, gave Bragan his major league opportunity. The Pirates moved from the cellar to seventh place under Bobby but late in 1957 he was replaced at the Pirates' helm by Danny Murtaugh.

Bobby's reputation as one of the finest young baseball minds in the game did not go unnoticed and Cleveland named him manager in 1958, but three months later he lost his job in a front office reorganization.

He then managed Spokane where he helped make baseball history by suggesting that Maury Wills, who was having trouble getting on base, might be more successful if he were to become a switch-hitter. Wills heeded Bragan's advice, became a much improved hitter and was on base so often in 1962 that it was one of the more important factors that contributed to his breaking Ty Cobb's all-time stolen base record. During the 1960 season, Bobby served as a coach with the Dodgers.

In 1961, Gabe Paul, then Houston General Manager, had a year to evaluate National League talent before choosing the players who would form Houston's first major league team. He needed a man who knew the senior circuit and whose judgment was considered tops. Bragan got the job and his shrewd observations later enabled the Colt .45s to choose with exceptional skill when deciding on their selections. Bobby was then named a Houston coach and his ability to work with youngsters was one reason the .45s did so well in their first season.

Bobby and his wife, Gwenn, make their winter home in Fort Worth, Texas. His son, Bobby, Jr., signed with the Boston Red Sox last year and attends Mississippi State University during the off-season. In addition, his daughter, Gwenn, attends the University of Texas and his brother, Jim, is a scout for Cincinnati.

## THE COACHING STAFF

**3 KEN SILVESTRI** - Ken is spending his first season as a Braves coach and will be in charge of the bullpen. He played seven seasons with the Yankees, White Sox and Phillies as a backstop and then managed several minor league teams before returning to the big leagues as a coach with the Phillies in 1959 and 1960. He then left Philadelphia to serve in the same capacity with Louisville the past two seasons.

**6 DIXIE WALKER** - Dixie was the N.L. batting champion with .357 in 1944 and his lifetime average for eighteen major league seasons was .306. This season, he'll be directing traffic from the first base coaching box and serving as batting instructor. Since his retirement as a player in 1949, Dixie has been a coach with the Cardinals and managed several minor league teams. He left the playing field in 1960 to scout the territory of Alabama, Tennessee and Northern Mississippi for the Braves and did an outstanding job before being appointed to Bragan's coaching staff. His brother, Harry, was a coach with the Cardinals last year and his father, Ewert, also played in the majors.

**4 JO JO WHITE** - The Braves were elated to acquire Jo Jo's services for the 1963 season. His career in baseball has been long and varied and he has earned a considerable reputation for his ability to teach fundamentals to young outfield prospects. During his twenty years as a player, Jo Jo was one of the fastest players in the game and excelled at base running and bunting and he will be teaching these fundamentals for Manager Bobby Bragan. After spending ten campaigns as an outfielder with Detroit, the Athletics and Cincinnati, Jo Jo managed in the minor leagues for nine seasons and scouted for Cleveland for five years. He then served as a coach with Cleveland and Detroit from 1958-1960 and has spent the last two years as a coach with Kansas City.

**5 WHITLOW WYATT** - Whitlow is considered the finest pitching coach in the major leagues. He has the rare ability to impart his knowledge of pitching to both veterans and rookies alike. Much of the credit for the development of the Braves' young pitchers in 1962 was attributed to the soft-spoken Georgian who brought glory to Milwaukee by winning 23 games for the Brewers in 1938. He then went on to record 106 major league triumphs for the Tigers, White Sox, Indians and Dodgers. This will be Whitlow's sixth season as Braves mound mentor.

## 1963 BRAVES PLAYER SKETCHES

**56 BLASINGAME, Wade** — PITCHER. . . Though he pitched only a half-season with Boise's Class-C entry as a rookie, the Braves thought so much of this exceptional prospect that they jumped him to Austin's Double-A Senators for his first full year as a Tribe farmhand. It proved to be a good move as Wade led the Senators in starting assignments and innings pitched while winning ten games. In addition, the native of Deming, N. Mex. flawlessly fielded 48 chances to top Texas League pitchers in fielding and his 4.27 earned run average was the seventh best in a circuit reputed to be a "hitter's league." Scouts from nearly every major league team camped on Wade's doorstep in 1961. Primarily because of his own ability, he had led his teammates to three consecutive titles, his junior high school team to three straight wins, his high school mates to three consecutive victories and his American Legion team to the State Championship. He stood 6'1½" and weighed 185 pounds when he reported to Boise and he began his professional career with a flourish by fanning 94 batters in 90 innings. Wade is only 19 years of age and is blessed with a good strong arm. Jimmy Brown, his manager at Austin, reported that Wade "came a long way last year and improved every day. I think he's going to make it big in the near future." So do the Braves.

**57 BRITTON, Jim** — PITCHER. . . In addition to scouting free agent talent, an important job for a scout is to look over the professional leagues in his area and evaluate the players under contract to other organizations in the event they might figure in a trade, become draft-eligible or be released. "Red" Hayworth, who scouts for the Braves in North Carolina, West Virginia and Washington, D. C., was doing just that one night when he saw an 18-year-old righthander named Jim Britton, who stood 6'5" and weighed 220 pounds and had a blazing fast ball. After learning that Britton had received an estimated \$35,000 bonus from Baltimore, Hayworth checked back later in the season for another evaluation, only to find that — after making another mound appearance — the youngster had left the club to attend Pennsylvania State University. Later, when the Braves' delegation arrived in Rochester for the minor league meetings in December, Britton surprisingly was eligible for the draft and was the immediate and only selection by the Braves. In his two appearances for Bluefield, Britton experienced control trouble and walked 15 in seven innings. But he struck out nearly as many — eleven — and the Braves are hoping they have come up with a real sleeper in this hard-throwing New Yorker.

**33 BURDETTE, Lou** — PITCHER. . . After averaging 19 wins per season for the last six years, Lou slipped to ten victories in 1962. He was off to his slowest start since the Braves moved to Milwaukee when he was unable to cop his first win until May 25th. He then added another victory on the 29th and was undefeated in four decisions in June while holding his opponents to seven runs and toppling the Dodgers twice. But Lou couldn't keep the pace and won only one game after August 7th. The remarkable righthander now shows 173 wins for the Braves and only four active pitchers have won more often — teammate Warren Spahn, and Early Wynn, Billy Pierce and Whitey Ford. However, none of them, including Spahn, was able to accomplish what Lou did against the Yankees in the 1957 World Series. Three times he started, three times he finished and three times he won — twice by shutouts. His final victory came with only two days rest

and the Yankees went down 5-0 to give the Braves the World title. Lou is one of the game's greatest competitors and a big season by famous Number 33 could enhance the Braves pennant chances considerably in 1963.

After toiling in the Braves farm system for five years, the native Georgian improved to the extent that he opened the 1962 season in Braves flannels. He made his major league debut the hard way — against the Dodgers — and worked two scoreless innings. In his next outing, "Cec" was credited with his first major league win in relief against Houston. After three more appearances as a fireman, the big 6'4", 195 pound righthander had allowed only three earned runs and nine hits in 13½ innings and he was rewarded with his first starting assignment. "Cec" came through with flying colors, permitting the New York Mets only six hits and three walks while throwing his blazing fast ball past seven batters. Final score: 3-2. On May 19, he again started against the Mets but began having trouble with his right elbow and pitched only twice more before undergoing an operation in July. He is expected to be as good as new after a full winter's rest and Manager Bobby Bragan is counting on him for considerable duty this season. He is big and strong and has an abundance of desire and determination.

**40 CLONINGER, Tony — PITCHER.** . . If this hard-throwing righthander can pick up in 1963 where he left off in 1962, the Braves may well hold title to one of the top pitchers in the majors this year. In August and September, the 6', 210 fireballer won six of seven decisions and was particularly effective during the latter month when he completed three of his four starting assignments. His final won-lost record was an impressive 8-3, as compared to his fine rookie mark of 7-2 the year before. Since the very first day that Tony donned a professional uniform, he has been considered one of the Braves' top hopes for stardom. He had a young pitcher's greatest asset — a blazing fast ball — when scout Gil English successfully battled a host of big league scouts for his signature in 1958. At that time, the fast ball was his only effective pitch but, since then, he has developed a good curve ball and a reputation for keeping the hitters from digging in on him at the plate. Highlighting Tony's success last season were his 1-0 shutouts over the Cubs and Cardinals. Tony's ambitions are to be a 20-game winner and to own a cattle farm when his playing days are over.

**31 CONSTABLE, Jim — PITCHER.** . . Jim's decision to resume his professional baseball career in 1962 certainly proved to be a wise one. He missed the 1959, 1960 and 1961 seasons due to illness, but confidence in his ability to bounce back was the deciding factor, and bounce back he did. One would think that Jim would be rusty after such a long layoff, but that wasn't the case at all. From the very start, he was razor sharp at Toronto and, when the Braves purchased his contract in late September, his record was the best in the International League. His won-lost percentage of .800 on 16 wins and only four defeats was the International League's top mark as was his earned run average of 2.56. In his first appearance with the Braves, Jim's change of speeds successfully stymied the Dodgers in relief. He then made his first major league start an occasion to remember by shutting out the Pirates 2-0 at Forbes Field on five hits after holding the Bucs to two safeties for 7½ innings. As a result, Jim has projected himself into the battle for a starting position on Bobby Bragan's staff. Before joining the Braves, he had previously worked in relief for the Giants, Indians and Senators. Jim hopes to become a small college baseball coach when his career has ended.

Throughout the "grapefruit league" schedule, fireballing Hank proved to be the Tribe's best "short man" in relief and the decision to add him to the roster was made just before the season opened. He continued his outstanding work during the first two months of the pennant chase, holding the opposition scoreless in 15 of his 18 appearances for a 1.71 earned run average. Thereafter, however, Hank had his troubles and, in August, was sent to Louisville to regain his early form. He is only 23 years old, has tremendous desire to win and is considered a talented base runner and excellent fielder at his position. Braves fans should be seeing a lot of this brilliant competitor.

**32 FUNK, Frank** — PITCHER. . . Relief ace Frank Funk was the man the Braves wanted in the Joe Adcock transaction. He was considered a standout in one of baseball's most difficult jobs during both of his first two years as a major leaguer and should give the Braves one of the strongest one-two relief punches in all of baseball when teamed with Claude Raymond. He wasn't having much luck early in his career until he tried pitching in relief at Corpus Christi in 1958. In 1960, he held Toronto's opponents to 2.10 runs per nine innings in 32 games and was called up to Cleveland. He got into nine games and amazingly won four while compiling an exceptional 1.97 ERA. His first full season with the Indians was just as successful the next year. Frank worked in 56 games, only seven shy of the all-time Cleveland record and won eleven while holding A.L. hitters to 3.33 runs per game. Last year, he spent some time with Salt Lake City (1.93 ERA) and returned to Cleveland to fashion a 3.22 earned run average in 47 appearances. Frank depends primarily on good control of his fine fast ball and excellent slider.

**23 LEMASTER, Denver — PITCHER.** . . . This exceptional southpaw prospect was easily the outstanding moundman in the American Association when the Braves summoned him to Milwaukee last July. At mid-season, Denny was selected unanimously to the league All-Star team and was leading the loop with 125 strikeouts at a time when no other pitcher had reached the 100 mark. He had won 10 and lost 4, completed 9 of 16 starts, compiled an ERA of 2.40 and allowed just 96 hits and 41 walks in 124 innings. His major league bow proved the Braves had something special in this 24-year-old lefthander. He held the hard-hitting Cincinnati Reds to just six hits and three walks while fanning seven, but lost 3-2 on an unearned run. Seven days later, Denny was credited with his first major league success after fanning nine Phillies in seven frames. In September, he finished strongly by completing three of his five starts and defeating the Phillies 9-0 and the Mets 6-3. Denny has shown signs of greatness ever since his first full season as a farmhand in 1959 when he fanned 19 Macon batters in one game at Jacksonville, eleven of them consecutively. The next year, he poured his hopping fast ball and excellent curve past 181 batters to lead the Texas League. During his career, Denny has struck out 849 batters in 913 innings.

Ron downed the Giants 3-2 on six hits as a surprise starter in the final game of the 1961 season to earn serious consideration as a regular starter in 1962, even though he had pitched almost entirely in relief since 1958. In his first five starts last season, the Canadian righthander won three games without defeat and pitched complete game victories over the Phillies (7-2) and the hard-hitting Reds (4-2). Then, in his next five appearances, Ron did an about-face, allowing 14 runs in a dozen innings and was optioned to Toronto to try to regain his early season form. Ron did just that, winning nine and losing only four and, in doing so, he re-established his right to bid for a Braves berth. Since joining the Milwaukee organization back in 1955, the soft-spoken native of Verdun, Quebec has put together an exceptional record. In fact, last year was the first time in eight seasons that Ron failed to finish with an ERA of less than three runs per game. He has won 97 games against only 55 losses and his career earned run average is 2.94.

He had come up with a new pitch at Toronto — the changeup curve — and was disposing of International League hitters in an amazingly successful fashion. **59 RIBANT, Denny — PITCHER.** . . Denny suffered some early "sophomortitis" pains in 1962, but, once they cleared away, he resumed the type of pitching that had made him one of the most talked-about youngsters ever to sign with the Braves. Denny's freshman year was almost unbelievable. At Quad City, he won 17, lost 2 and amazingly completed 17 of 19 starting assignments. His earned run average was 1.86 and Midwest League hitters could collect only 110 hits and 39 walks off him in 155 innings while he was striking out a hitter per inning. He was so overwhelmingly successful that he jumped from "D-ball" to Double-A to finish the season with Austin. But tougher competition seemed to inspire Denny to even greater heights. **26 SHAW, Bob — PITCHER.** . . The acquisition of Bob Shaw has to go into the records as one of the top deals ever made by the Braves. His work for the Tribe was sensational from the very beginning and only late season arm difficulties kept the native New Yorker from becoming the only Milwaukee pitcher to ever win 20 games besides Warren Spahn and Lou Burdette. As it was, he had the league's lowest earned run average at mid-season and eventually finished second only to the Dodger's Sandy Koufax with his fine 2.80 mark. His 15 victories included a dozen route-going performances and he led Tribe hurlers with three shutouts. The Shaw saga began in December of 1961 when the Braves obtained the strong-armed righthander from Kansas City, where he had won a dozen games for the last place Athletics. As recently as 1959, the handsome bachelor had led the Chicago White Sox to their first pennant in 40 years by winning 18 and losing only six for a .750 winning percentage, the league's best. The 29-year-old physical culturist is one of the hardest workers in the game and depends primarily on good control of his sinker and slider when on the mound. Last year, he walked only 44 batters in 225 innings. He considers his 1-0 World Series victory over the Dodgers in 1959 his biggest baseball thrill.

**21 SPAHN, Warren — PITCHER.** . . When "Wonderful Warren" Spahn defeated Pittsburgh 7-3 in Milwaukee on September 29, 1962, he became the greatest lefthand pitcher in the 86-year history of the major leagues. It was his 327th success since winning his first major league game on July 14, 1946, at the age of 25, and it was one more than any southpaw pitcher in history had been able to win. In the wake of Spahn's tremendous accomplishments lay the win totals of such great lefties as Eddie Plank (326), Lefty Grove (300), Eppa Rixey (266), and Carl Hubbell (253). It was a day to remember, but ahead lies an even greater date with destiny. Spahn's long range goal is the National League record of 373 wins, shared by immortals Christy Mathewson and Grover Cleveland Alexander. He has 46 to go. Although Warren didn't achieve his customary twenty victories in 1962, with a little better luck he could have had one of the finest years of his memorable career. The margin of defeat was extremely thin in nine of his fourteen losses. On three occasions, the Braves were shut out when he was on the losing end, three times he dropped 2-1 decisions and he lost another three games by 3-2 scores. His 22 complete games at the age of 41 led the National League for the sixth consecutive season and increased his major league record to eight. In addition, he again fanned over 100 batters to up his major league record to 16 consecutive seasons. Over-shadowed by his record-

breaking 327th win was the fact that, earlier in the season, Spahn broke Eppa Rixie's National League record for innings pitched by a lefthander and then shattered the all-time major league record of 4,504 frames by Eddie Plank. He has now won more games, pitched more shutouts, worked more innings, and compiled more 20-win seasons than any southpaw in history. When he strikes out his 69th batter in 1963, he will also have fanned more hitters than any lefthander. Happily for the Braves and their fans, "Wonderful Warren" just seems to roll right along with immortality already cinched. Recently, he was named "Pitcher of the Decade" by the Baseball Writers.

Last year, on September 15, Bob convincingly demonstrated why he was one of the most sought-after prep stars ever to sign a professional contract by doing something only five other players have been able to accomplish since the Braves took up residence in Milwaukee ten years ago — collect five hits in one game. Everyone connected with the Braves is confident that this feat will prove to be the spark that ignites a bright future for the 23-year-old catcher-outfielder who has thus far had his share of tough luck. Twice, calls to the military service have interrupted his career. In 1960, "Hawk" blasted 17 home runs and drove in 80 runs to help Louisville to the Little World Series title and he was to be given a chance to win the Braves left field position in 1961 but, by the time he was discharged from the Army's six months program and had worked his way into shape, the season was well along and Bob was used primarily as a pinch-hitter. Unfortunately, the Army called again after the season ended and he didn't return from Wisconsin's 32nd Division until August 9th last year. Bob played winter ball in Puerto Rico and should be in good shape to bid for a regular's job at West Palm Beach.

**44 AARON, Hank** — OUTFIELDER. . . "Hammerin Hank" had another of his "typical" seasons last year — typical for Hank meaning 45 home runs, 128 runs batted in, 191 hits, 127 runs scored and a .323 batting average. Although it's hard to believe, he actually has had better years. Take 1959 for example. That year, the graceful slugger won his second league batting title with a lofty .355 average while collecting 223 hits, hitting 39 round-trippers and batting in 123 runs. Or take 1957, the year he led the Braves to their first pennant by topping the senior circuit with 44 home runs, 132 runs batted in and 118 runs scored, and then batted .393 to top all hitters while the Braves defeated the Yankees for the World Championship. He has now hit more than .300 during seven of his nine years in the majors and his .320 lifetime bat mark is second only to Stan Musial's among active players. The 45 home runs the lithe slugger registered last season were a personal high and brought his major league total to 298. Two more circuit clouts and Hank will become the 21st player in big league history to collect 300 or more home runs. In 1957, he was his league's Most Valuable Player. Although he is only 29 years of age, he has led the National League in total bases five times; batting average, runs batted in, hits and doubles twice; and home runs, slugging percentage and runs scored once. Last summer he participated in the All-Star Game for the eighth straight year and his 25 consecutive game hitting streak was the longest in the majors. He was deservedly presented with an award for being the Braves' "Most Valuable Player" of 1962 by the Milwaukee Baseball Writers.

**45 BLACKABY, Ethan** — OUTFIELDER. . . Ethan is slated to make a considerable jump in the Braves farm system this year after enjoying an extremely successful sophomore year at Yakima and it shouldn't be too long before this fine young outfielder joins the Braves to stay. Seldom does one of the league's fastest runners hit with enough power to lead the circuit in total bases as well, but that is exactly what Ethan accomplished in 1962. He sped around the bases to account for 43 doubles, an all-time Northwest League record, and added 6 triples and 16 home runs to total 266 bases. At the plate, Tommie is a power swinger who also hits for average. As a Braves farmhand, he had consecutive home run totals of 26, 21 and 15 and batted .299 for both Cedar Rapids and Austin. After evaluating Tommie's potential, it is understandable why opposing pitchers are of the opinion that one Aaron is enough in the National League.

In addition, he led the National League outfielders in fielding both years. At the plate, Gus boasts a lifetime batting average of .282 based on 1,900 hits and he is a member of the select group to hit 200 major league home runs.

**24 MAYE, Lee** — OUTFIELDER. . . Lee was the Braves "hard-luck" player in 1962 due to illness. He never really had a chance to prove himself one way or another during the season that many felt would determine his future with the Braves. After joining the Tribe organization in 1954, Lee was considered a "sure thing" for major league stardom and, though he batted over .300 during four seasons in the minors and twice with the Braves, he still had not earned a regular's berth. 1962 was to tell the story and Lee was off to a fast start, batting over .300 in Florida "grapefruit league" competition but, as the Braves prepared to open the season against the Giants, Lee became ill. He pinch-hit in the opener and then entered a San Francisco hospital for two weeks with a virus and bronchial condition. He then spent the next month in Milwaukee Hospital and didn't rejoin his teammates until mid-June. Though he played regularly thereafter, Lee never completely regained his strength and was underweight. At the present, he is sound physically and looking forward to a big year. **41 MATHEWS, Eddie** — INFIELDER. . . When Eddie clubs his first home run of the 1963 season, he will join one of the most select lists of players in the major league record book — those who have hit 400 or more homers. Only seven players have preceded the Braves belter to this fantastic achievement and, of the seven, only the immortal Jimmy Foxx and Yankee slugger Mickey Mantle reached the remarkable total at an earlier age than Mathews (31). Baba Ruth, of course, is the all-time leader with 714, followed by Foxx (534), Ted Williams (521), Mel Ott (511), Lou Gehrig (494), Stan Musial (463) and Mantle (404). The Braves famous home run hitter has been terrorizing league hurlers ever since he began his magnificent career at Boston in 1952. Since then, he has averaged 36 roundtrippers per season and 98 runs batted in. While representing Milwaukee, he has done even better with an average of 37 home runs and 102 runs batted in per season. Although Eddie hit 29 home runs and drove in 90 runs last year, he was bothered from mid-May by pulled muscles in his right shoulder. Though he played the remainder of the schedule, Ed's shoulder was never quite the same and it is hoped that the Winter rest has made Mathews completely sound again. Eddie's other feats are almost too numerous to mention. He has been named to represent the Braves and the National League in the All-Star Game nine times (eight consecutively) and he has hit more home runs in one season and in his career than any major league third baseman. In addition, he holds league records for most years and most consecutive years with 30 or more home runs and has hit more homers on the road in one season than any other player. Last year, he received 101 bases on balls to lead the National League for the second season in a row and the third time in his career.

**30 JONES, Mack** — OUTFIELDER. . . Braves fans are hoping that 1963 will be "The Year" for this great young outfielder who can do so many things in major league fashion. Back in 1961, he joined the Braves in mid-season as one of the most heralded prospects in Tribe history. In his first big league game, he collected four hits to tie the National League record shared by Casey Stengel and Willie McCovey. A week later, he was batting .414, but went into a sudden slump and was returned to Louisville for further seasoning. He finished at .326 with the Colonels and then won a starting job with the Braves in 1962. After the first 40 games of the season, the young power hitter was leading the Braves in games played, at bats, runs scored, hits and triples and was second only to Eddie Mathews in home runs, runs batted in and bases on balls. He was hitting .307 at the time. Then he began to strike out at an alarming rate and, when his average dipped to .256 in mid-July, he was sent to Toronto. 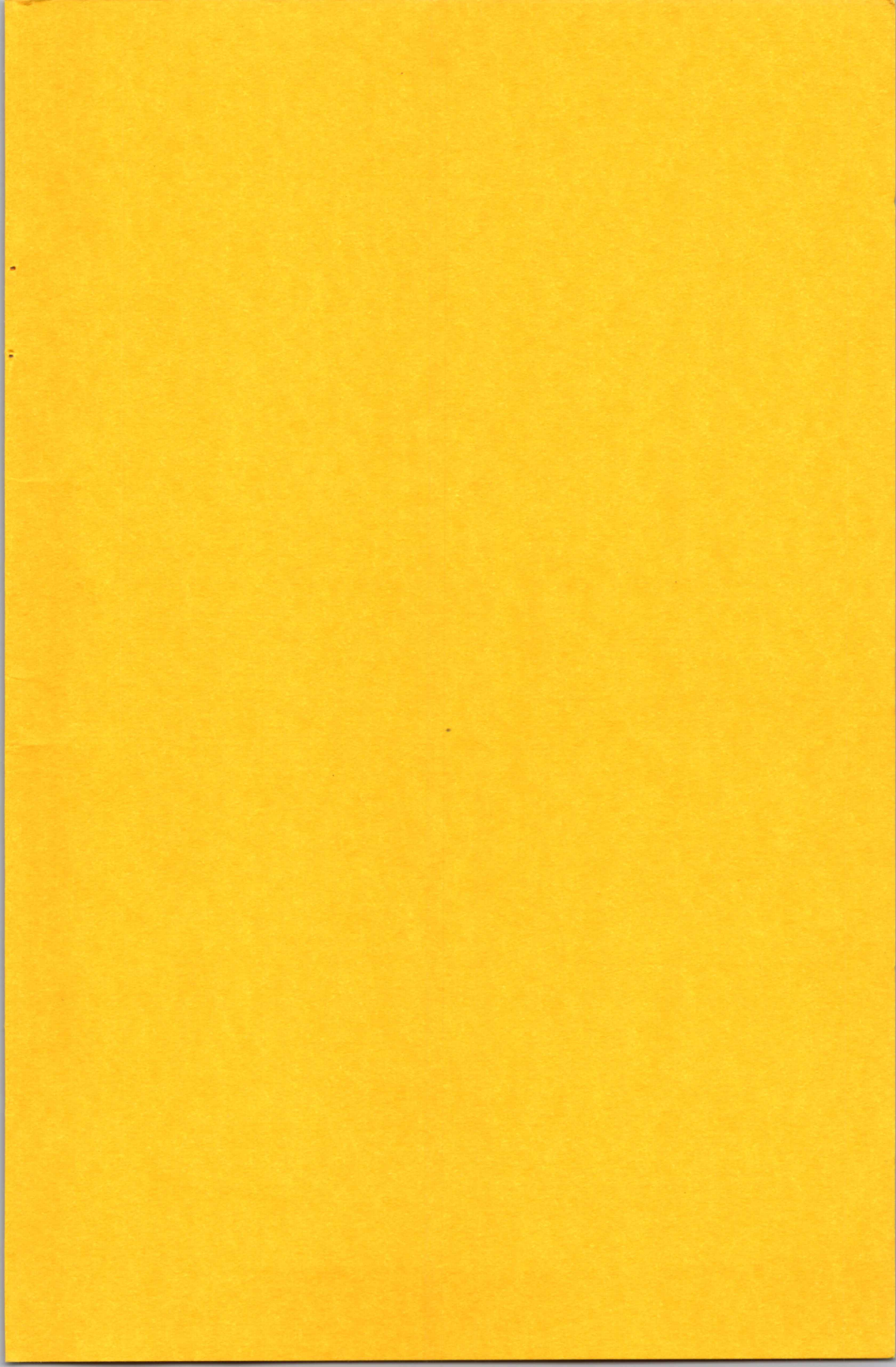
