LEO DUROCHER

MANAGER

Leo Durocher comes to the Cubs with a solid reputation as a baseball man based on his outstanding ability to get the best possible performance out of a major league squad. He is a keen strategist, knows how to develop talent, and has a remarkable gift of instilling confidence.

As a plus, Leo is a colorful, aggressive personality. This, with his intense will to win and his record of achievement, has gained an enthusiastic following among baseball fans.

Successful Record as a Manager

Durocher has 3 National League pennants to his credit, one as manager of the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1941, 2 more as leader of the New York Giants in 1951 and 1954. Led the '54 Giants to a World Series title over Cleveland in 4 straight games.

He was named player-manager at Brooklyn in 1939, coming from St. Louis a year earlier. Became manager of the Giants in mid season of 1948. Has been honored 3 times as Manager of the Year by The Sporting News—1941, 1951, and 1954.

Known as a Fiery Competitor

From the start of his career, Leo has been known as a fiery competitor who "comes to win." Made his major league debut with the Yankees in 1928. Moved to the Reds in 1930, and the Cardinals got him in '33. Starred at shortstop on the famed St. Louis "Gashouse Gang" that won the '34 pennant and tamed the Tigers in the World Series. Fielded 1,000 in 11 World Series and 2 All Star games, and was always a dangerous clutch hitter.

In 1965 he was a network TV sportscaster, after coaching for the Los Angeles Dodgers (1961-64). He first took up sports broadcasting after leaving the Giants managerial post in 1955.

THE COACHING STAFF

FRED FITZSIMMONS 3

Fitz is thoroughly experienced both in working with established pitchers and young prospects, and in running the bullpen. . . . He returns to the Cubs coaching staff this season after a 4-year retirement from baseball. . . . Coached for the Cubs from 1957 thru '59. . . . Was associated with Leo Durocher as pitching coach for the Giants (1949-55) and previously as a Dodger player. . . . Fitz won 217 games in his great 19-year pitching career with the Giants and Dodgers. . . . His .889 percentage (16-2) with the Dodgers in 1940 is a National League record.



WHITEY LOCKMAN 5

In his first season in the Cubs organization, Whitey led Dallas-Ft. Worth and was honored as Texas League Manager of the Year for 1965. . . . Starred with the New York Giants for many seasons, playing outfield and then first base when Leo Durocher managed the team. . . . Was coach for the Giants at San Francisco in 1961-63, then coached for the Mets in '64. . . . Joined the Cubs coaching staff on Nov. 28, 1964, and was assigned to run the Dallas-Ft. Worth team. . . . Was selected last November for his new assignment as third base coach for the Cubs.



VERLON (RUBE) WALKER 4

Rube was appointed to the Cubs coaching staff in January, 1961, after 4 successful seasons in managerial assignments with the organization's associated clubs. . . . At Paris, Ill., in 1957-59, and at Carlsbad, N.M., in 1960, he made a name for himself for his skill in working with young players. . . . Has been with the Cubs organization since 1948, when he began his playing career as a catcher with the Lumberton, N.C., club. . . . In his 6th season on the baselines with the Cubs, he's handling the coaching duties at first base.





LOUIS (LOU) KLEIN 60

Lou specializes in hitting instruction for young players coming up thru the Cubs' system. . . . Was manager at Houston (Am. Assn.) before joining the Cubs coaching staff in 1961. . . . Was head coach for the Cubs the latter part of the '65 season, and has managed at Carlsbad, Lafayette, Des Moines, Memphis, and Ft. Worth. . . . Led Ft. Worth to the Texas League pennant in '58. . . . A top-notch infielder, Lou entered the majors with the St. Louis Cardinals in 1943.



FRED MARTIN 58

Fred is pitching instructor for the Cubs' associated clubs, and has served with the coaching staff since the spring of 1961. . . . His remarkable career as a pitcher spanned a period of 24 years, with time out for 4 years with the Army in World War II. . . . Joined the Cardinals organization in 1955 and had several years of major league experience at St. Louis. . . . Was player-manager at Dallas, and in 1960 led the Cubs' associated club at St. Cloud.



ELVIN TAPPE 52

El Tappe specializes in working with young catchers and during his 12-year career as a catcher he was noted for skill in handling pitchers. . . . Began his coaching career with the Cubs in 1958, resumed active duty as a player in 1961-62, then returned to coaching. . . . Started out in pro ball with the Yankee organization in 1947. . . . El's 15 years of service in the Cubs organization began with Los Angeles (PCL) in '52. . . . Also handles scouting duties.



JOHN (BUCK) O'NEIL 53

Buck came with the Cubs as a scout in 1956. . . . A talented instructor, he was named to the coaching staff in 1962. . . . Has specialized in working with youngsters in the lower league classifications. . . . Was a star first baseman in his playing career, mostly with the Kansas City Monarch. . . . As manager of the Monarchs, he had Ernie Banks as one of his players. . . . Buck continues also as a scout.

STANLEY (STAN) HACK 54

Stan will manage and help develop Cubs' prospects at Dallas-Ft. Worth this year. . . . A star third baseman with the Cubs in 1932-47, he then managed in the Cubs' system, moving up from the old Los Angeles Angels (PCL) to manage the Cubs from '54 thru '56. . . . Coached at St. Louis and managed at Denver prior to temporary retirement from the game after the '59 season. . . . Managed at Salt Lake City in 1965.



LESLIE (LES) PEDEN 64

Les has been appointed to lead the Cubs' new AAA club at Tacoma this season. . . . Started his career in the Cubs organization as a third baseman at Des Moines in 1947. . . . Then became a catcher and had many standout years in AA and AAA baseball. . . . Played in the majors at Washington in '53. . . . Has 10 seasons of experience as player-manager and manager, and ran the Wenatchee club in 1965.



WALTER (WALT) DIXON 62

Walt played first base, the outfield, and pitched during an active playing career that covered 19 professional seasons, with 3 years off for military service. . . . He began serving as player-manager in his 7th year in pro ball (1949) and has been running ball clubs in the lower classifications ever since. . . . Came into the Cubs system in 1957, and has been re-named to lead Quincy, Mid-West League, in '65.



GEORGE FREESE 63

George's record of 2 pennants in a row at Caldwell (Treasure Valley), Idaho, in the Pioneer League, attests his outstanding ability in working with first-year players. . . . Has 14 years of experience as a player, and was especially outstanding in the Pacific Coast League. . . . Was appointed a member of the Cubs instructional coaching staff in 1963. . . . Handled Cubs' associated clubs as St. Cloud and Wenatchee before taking over at Caldwell in 1964.

Acquired in trades during the '65 season were pitcher Bob Hendley and outfielder Harvey Kuenn from San Francisco, and pitcher Bob Humphreys from St. Louis. . . . Pitcher Billy Hoelt and catcher Chris Krug were brought up from Cubs associated clubs during the season.

Post-season deals this past winter brought pitcher Bill Hands and catcher Randy Hundley in trade from the Giants; outfielder Ty Cline by purchase via the draft from the Braves organization; and Wes Covington in trade from the Phillies.

TED ABERNATHY

39

PITCHER. Throws Right. Bats Right. Born March 6, 1933. Height 6:04. Weight 215. Married, two sons. Home: Dallas, N. C.

In his first season with the Cubs, Ted Abernathy proved his extraordinary talents as a relief pitcher by setting an all-time major league record with appearances in 84 games. . . . He also tied the National League record by finishing 62 games. . . . Won the National League "Fireman of the Year" trophy awarded by The Sporting News for his 1965 record of 24 saves and 4 wins. . . . Ted was purchased from the Cleveland Indians on April 11, 1965, and less than 24 hours later he pitched one and two-thirds scoreless innings in the opening game tie with

the Cardinals. . . . He's a veteran who twice had to start his career over again. . . . Originally an over-hand pitcher, he injured his shoulder and returned to duty as a side-арmer. . . . After military service in 1954, he pitched at Washington and Louisville, and suffered further injury that led to bone-chip surgery. . . . Starting all over once more, Ted became one of the few submarine-ball pitchers in baseball history, delivering the ball from an underhand motion at the knee. . . . Was with the Braves organization before his two seasons with Cleveland.

OUTFIELDER. Bats Left. Throws Right. Born March 20, 1933. Height 6:04. Weight 195. Married, one child. Home: Chicago.

Big George got off to a good start last season and was hitting over .300 when sidelined in May by a thigh injury. . . . He didn't get to play regularly after that and his batting average suffered. . . . Altman returned to the Cubs when his contract was reacquired from the Mets on Jan. 15, 1965, in exchange for Billy Cowan. . . . George started his pro career in the Cubs organization and was an outfield regular with the Cubs from 1959 thru 1962. . . . Altman's .485 slugging percentage in '62 ranks fifth in the Cubs all-time top ten in this department. . . . In need of pitching, the Cubs traded him to the Cardinals with Don Cardwell and Moe Thacker for Larry Jackson, Lindy McDaniel, and Jim Schaffer, on Oct. 17, 1962. . . . Led the National League in triples in '61 and hit a pinch home run in the All Star game at San Francisco that year. . . . Was graduated from Tennessee A. & I. in 1955.

Thirteen of Joe's 26 hits last year were delivered in the pinch, and Joe again proved himself a valuable infield replacement at second base. . . . During his career he has had major league experience at all four infield positions, and has also played outfield. . . . Joe was acquired by the Cubs by purchase from the Tacoma club on March 29, 1964. . . . Started his pro career as a bonus player with the New York Giants in 1954. . . . Was selected by Houston from the San Francisco Giants in the expansion draft in October of '61. . . . The Giants re-acquired him in a trade with Houston in November, 1962. . . . On June 12, 1964, he hit his first major league grand slam home run to lead the Cubs to a 7-1 win over the Pirates. . . . Attended Loyola University (Los Angeles), was graduated from University of California.

ERNEST (ERNIE) BANKS**14**

INFIELDER. Bats Right. Throws Right. Born Jan. 31, 1931. Height 6:01. Weight 185. Married, 3 children. Home: Chicago.

Ernie completed another outstanding season in 1965, and in addition to his fine work afield, added more new batting records to his collection. . . . His most important achievement

was to set a new all-time club record for extra base hits, bringing his career total to 783 and breaking Cap Anson's record of 750, which had stood since 1897. . . . By batting in 106 runs last year, he broke his own club record of 104, set in 1962, for most home runs by a first baseman. . . . Ernie ranks first on the Cubs all-time list in career home runs, with a new total of 404 (Gabby Hartnett is second with 231). . . . Ranks 2nd on the all-time list in total bases (3,601); 3rd in at bats (6,915); 4th in runs scored (1,025) and hits (1,935); 5th in games (1,820); 7th in double (304); and 9th in triples (75). . . . He is one of only 11 players in major league history to hit as many as 400 home runs in a lifetime. . . . His 10 grand slam home runs top the National League list of active players. . . . And his 5 grand slammers in 1955 set an all-time National League season record. . . . Ernie led all National League first basemen in 1965 in putouts, with 1,682, and in total chances, with 1,790. . . . Has played in 11 All Star games. . . . Won the first annual Ken Hubbs Memorial Award "for excellent and exemplary conduct on and off the field" in 1965. . . . Came with the Cubs on Sept. 14, 1953, after purchase of his contract from the Kansas City Monarchs.

In his first major league season in 1965, Glenn proved to be a talented second baseman, winning his spurs as a regular. . . . A shortstop in his 3 previous seasons in pro ball, Glenn fielded his new position brilliantly, taking part in 101 double plays. . . . Under the Cubs instructional coaching staff, he began the change to second base in 1964 winter league and 1965 spring training. . . . Finished strong as a hitter in his rookie year, hitting safely in 18 out of the last 20 games of the '65 season. . . . Had the team's longest hitting streak in 1965—14 straight games. . . . The Cubs selected Beckert's contract in the first-year draft in the winter of 1962 from the Red Sox system. . . . At Wenatchee in 1963, he led the Northwest League in hits with 161. . . . Graduated in '62 from Allegheny College,

where he captained the baseball team. . . . Was All City in baseball and basketball at Pittsburgh's Perry High.

John blasted 20 homers, including a grand slam, and batted in 94 runs at Dallas-Ft. Worth last season. . . . Led Texas League first basemen in fielding with most putouts (1,314); most assists (132); and most double plays (129). . . . Reporting to the Cubs after the Texas League season, he hit two home runs in 12 times at bat. . . . One of the prime prospects of the 1963 college crop, Boccabella signed with Cubs organization and spent most of the 1964 season as the club's designated player at Salt Lake City, where he hit 23 home runs and had 78 RBI's. . . . Led all first basemen in the Pacific Coast League in '64 with 1,449 putouts, 117 assists, and participated in 159 double plays. . . . Was honored as the Pioneer League's Rookie of the Year in 1963. . . . Joined the Pocatello club that year after graduating from Santa Clara College, where he was a baseball sensation.

PITCHER. Throws Right. Bats Right. Born Aug. 27, 1935. Height 6:02. Weight 195. Married, 4 children. Home: San Jose, California.

Ernie Broglio had difficulty getting back into the groove following his arm operation in November of 1964, and was plagued by control problems during the 1965 season. . . . Came with the Cubs on June 15, 1964, in a deal with the St. Louis Cardinals which also brought Doug Clemens and Bobby Shantz to Chicago in exchange for Lou Brock, Jack Spring, and Paul Toth. . . . Ernie had a sensational 18-8 record with the Cards in 1963, posting an earned-run average of 2.99. . . . His credentials as a starting pitcher also include a 21-9 record and a 2.75 ERA in 1960. . . . Started out his pro career with the Giants organization in 1953 at Oakland. . . . After the 1958 season at

Phoenix and Toronto, in which he had a combined record of 17 wins and only 4 losses, the Cardinals obtained Broglio along with Marv Grissom for Billy Muffett, Hobie Landrith, and Benny Valenzuela. . . . Attended West Contra Costa Junior College.

1965 SEASON NOTES

The 1965 Cubs extended the club's National League record by hitting 100 or more home runs as a team for the 16th consecutive year.

* * * *

Tying the major league record, the Cubs completed 3 triple plays in 1965, and the total was more than all other National League clubs combined (the Giants had one, as did the Mets). . . . Bill Faul was the Cubs pitcher in all 3 games. . . . And Don Kessinger participated in all 3 of the triple plays.

* * * *

Ernie Banks slugged a total of 56 extra base hits in 1965 to take the all-time club leadership in that department from Adrian "Cap" Anson. . . . Ernie ran his career total to 783 in 1,820 games. . . . Cap got 750 extra base knocks in 2,253 games. . . . The immortal Cap still tops the Cubs' all-time list in games, at bats, runs, hits, singles, doubles, and batting percentage (.339 over a career span from 1876 through 1897).

* * * *

Larry Jackson led all National League pitchers in fielding in 1965, for the 3rd time in his career and the 2nd consecutive season, handling 76 chances for a perfect 1.000 record. . . . Four other members of the current Cubs staff were in the 1.000 fielding club—Ted Abernathy (3rd in the League with 52 chances), Cal Koonce, Bob Humphreys, Ernie Broglio.

* * * *

Ron Santo and Billy Williams share a new major league record for "iron man" performance, both appearing in every inning in 164 games (including 2 tie games) in 1965. . . . Ron now holds the major league record for most games by a third baseman, and Billy for most games by an outfielder.

* * * *

Three Cubs were named to the National League All Star squad in 1965: Billy Williams, Ernie Banks, and Ron Santo. . . . These 3 all batted in 100 or more runs during the season, first time since 1930 that the Cubs had 3 men who reached the century mark in that department. . . . Williams had 108, Banks 106, Santo 101. . . . The 3 Cubs sluggers in the Class of '30 were Hack Wilson (who achieved the all-time major league record of 190 that year), Kiki Cuyler, and Gabby Hartnett.

* * * *

Rookie Glen Beckert had the Cubs longest hitting streak of the year when he hit safely in 14 consecutive games.

* * * *

In the perfect game pitched by Sandy Koufax last season, Bob Hendley allowed only one hit in his tough 1-0 loss, and the hitter was left on base, so that the Dodgers and Cubs jointly set a major league record for fewest players left on base by both clubs: 1. . . . The same game set a major league record for fewest hits by both clubs.



CUBS TRAINING BASE AT LONG BEACH

The spring training base for the Chicago Cubs in 1966 is in Long Beach, known as "California's International City." Gifted with 11 miles of shoreline and a year 'round mild climate, the city is a mecca for vacationists and conventions.

In addition to its fame as a beach city, Long Beach is a bustling center of the oil, aviation, and shipping industries. The harbor, said to be the world's most modern, handles a billion dollars in cargo annually, and Long Beach is the West Coast's foremost Navy town, serving as home port for some 120 ships of the Pacific Fleet.

Top-Notch Playing Field for Workouts and Games

The Cubs spring workouts, intra-squad games, and home exhibition games center at Blair Field. This modern stadium was named after Frank T. Blair, late sports editor of the Long Beach Press-Telegram, who had a leading part in developing the city's outstanding youth program in baseball and other sports.

The seating capacity of Blair Field is more than 5,000. The playing surface is major league in caliber, as are the field distances: left and right fields, 348 ft.; center field, 400 ft.

Spring Exhibition Games Scheduled

The Cubs play a schedule of 8 exhibition games at Blair Field with the Los Angeles Angels, San Francisco Giants, and Cleveland Indians.

As visiting team, the Cubs will play the Angels in Palm Springs, Calif., the Giants at Phoenix, and the Indians at Tucson in Arizona. Exhibition games will also be played at Holtville, San Diego, San Jose, Stockton, in California; Las Vegas, Nevada; and Nogales, Arizona.

Spring training activities for the players with the Cubs' associated clubs are based at nearby Escondido, Calif.



THE STORY OF WRIGLEY FIELD—CUBS PARK

The home games of the Chicago Cubs are played at Wrigley Field, an attractive, well-kept ball park located in a residential section on the city's North Side.

The park provides 36,755 comfortable seats for baseball fans. The location at Clark and Addison Sts. is convenient to public transportation, including 2 bus routes and elevated trains.

Constant Program of Improvement Continues

In line with its long-standing policy of presenting baseball in pleasant, enjoyable surroundings, the Chicago National League Ball Club continues with its park improvement program each year. More than \$1,100,000, over and above regular maintenance, has been spent for this purpose in the last 8 years.

Completion of the washroom modernization project and more new painting are principal 1966 developments. Other recent projects include new box seats in the first 10 rows, modernized entrances and ticket offices, new concrete slab exterior walls.

Early History and Development of the Park

The Cubs moved to the present field from the old West Side park 50 years ago this season, in 1916. The site had been the playing field of the Chicago Whales in the short-lived Federal League. The grandstand was enlarged in 1922-23 and double-decked in 1926-27. In 1938 the club put in wider seats in the grandstand and boxes. This provided greater comfort for the fans, while reducing the seating capacity by several thousand.

To enhance the park-like atmosphere, the outside walls are covered with ivy vines instead of advertising signs. And there's no advertising to clutter up the big scoreboard and clock.

For some years the park was known as Cubs Park. In 1926 it was named Wrigley Field, after the late William Wrigley Jr. He acquired an interest in the club in 1916, and was majority

owner from 1919 until his death in early 1932. The Cubs won 2 pennants under his leadership, and 4 more under Phil Wrigley, present-day principal owner and president of the club.

How to Get Tickets

Reserved box seat tickets for all games are available by mail. Just send your order to Ticket Manager, Wrigley Field, Chicago, Ill. 60613. 22,410 grandstand and bleacher tickets go on sale the morning of every game.

You can also buy box seat tickets in advance at the Wrigley Field ticket office (Addison and Sheffield) and at Bond's downtown store, 234 S. State St., near Jackson.

Ticket Prices for Box Seats, Grandstand and Bleachers

For reserved seats in the first 10 rows (first tier): \$3.50 per person. Next 12 rows (second tier): \$3.00 per person. Upper deck box seats: \$3.00. All children's box seat prices same as for adults.

Grandstand seats are \$1.50 for adults, and \$1.00 for children under 14. Admittance to the bleachers is \$1.00 for all.

How to Get to the Park

Located at Clark and Addison Sts., 3600 North, 1000 West. Clark St. buses (No. 22) and Addison buses (No. 152) take you to main gates. North Side "L" trains (Addison St. Station) take you to ¼ block from ball park.

The Flags of Wrigley Field

At all Cubs home games Old Glory flies from the centerfield masthead, highest point in the park. The flags of the 10 National League cities and 8 states fly at the Clark St. entrance.

Before and during each game, 10 pennants, one for each National League Club, fly from the yardarms in the order of the League standings on the morning of the game—the first place team's pennant on top at the left, 10th place team's pennant on the bottom at the right.

The Chicago Cubs flag—red and white on a blue background—displays 16 red stars representing the Club's 16 National League Championships. The two blue stars represent the Club's two World Championships.
