IN MEMORIUM NICHOLAS F. (NICK) ROBERTS 1908-82

"Nick" Roberts, Maitre D' of the Bards' Room at Comiskey Park, passed away Jan. 7, 1982 at the age of 73. The Bards' Room serves as a gathering place for White Sox staff members, members of the Chicago media, and out-of-town media covering the White Sox. Nick greeted and seated those who gathered to talk baseball, and politely turned aside those who weren't supposed to be there; he was as much a part of the room as the rich wood paneling, the dusty trophies, and the faded pictures of bygone baseball heroes. He graced landmark dining rooms in Chicago for decades, joining the White Sox staff in 1976 after the famed Sirloin Room of the Stock Yard Inn, where he had been catering manager, closed its doors for the last time. A lifelong Chicagoan, he played baseball and football at Wendell Phillips High School, and later was president of Local 356 of the Federated Waiters' Union of Chicago for 13 years. He will be missed by his legions of friends in baseball.

In one short year, under the leadership of Jerry Reinsdorf and Eddie Einhorn, the White Sox have emerged as an aggressive organization that promises to be in the thick of the American League pennant race in 1982 and for years to come. The ink on the American League's approval of the purchase of the club was barely dry before the new ownership set to work; Carlton Fisk and Greg Luzinski were acquired before spring training had ended, and the ownership has continued to prove it is not afraid to "put its money where its mouth is" in an effort to bring a championship team to Chicago. When the sale of the White Sox to the Reinsdorf-Einhorn group was approved by the American League Jan. 29, 1981, it was a dream come true for Jerry Reinsdorf; a Brooklyn Dodger fan as a youngster, he fantasized about owning a major league team, never realizing it would really happen one day. In addition to his White Sox responsibilities, Reinsdorf is chairman and chief executive officer of the Balcor Company of Skokie, IL. Balcor is one of the country's largest real estate syndicators. It acts as a general partner in partnerships having aggregate real estate investments well in excess of one billion dollars. Jerry is a graduate of Northwestern University School of Law and is a Certified Public Accountant, as well as, an attorney.

EDWARD M. (EDDIE) EINHORN

The other half of the White Sox' "dynamic duo," Eddie Einhorn, originally planned to make only a minor investment in the team. But at the urging of Jerry Reinsdorf, Eddie took on a major role with the club and his influence has been one of the prime factors in the resurgence of the White Sox as a team with which to be reckoned. Not only instrumental in bringing Carlton Fisk to the White Sox, Einhorn put together a strong marketing department that may one day become a model for sports franchises, and spearheaded the founding of SportsVision, a subscription television company which will

offer hundreds of hours of sports programming to Chicago sports fans beginning in 1982. Einhorn also serves as president of SportsVision. Prior to purchasing the White Sox with Reinsdorf, Eddie was executive producer for CBS Sports, with primary responsibility for the CBS Network program "Sports Spectacular." Prior to that, he was chairman and president of the TVS Television Network, which he founded in 1961, and later sold to Dun and Bradstreet. Einhorn's first brush with the White Sox was in 1959 when they last won the American League pennant. Eddie hustled hot-dogs and soft drinks at Comiskey Park to earn money to continue his education at Northwestern University School of Law, where he was a classmate of Jerry Reinsdorf. Einhorn is a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania and the Northwestern University School of Law.

ROLAND A. HEMOND

During the past off-season, Roland Hemond was signed to a three-year contract as executive vice president/general manager of the White Sox—the first contract he had ever signed in his long and successful career in baseball management. That contract is an indication of the high regard in which he is held both by the White Sox ownership and other ownerships in the major leagues. Rated an astute judge of talent and an excellent trader by his peers in the major leagues, he is also quickly gaining a reputation for his ability to deal with player agents and the complicated contractual arrangements that have become commonplace in recent years. Hemond joined the White Sox in 1970 as director of player personnel, and has been credited with a combination of ingenuity and imagination in assembling competitive White Sox teams during periods when the Sox were unable to be competitive financially. Hemond was elevated to vice president in July of 1973, and was given the title executive vice president/general manager by the present ownership. Hemond appointed Chuck Tanner to his first major league managerial position late in 1970, and Tanner responded by leading the Sox to a 3rd place finish in 1971, and a second place finish in 1972; the Sox wound-up with one of their best won-loss records in recent years in '72 (87-67). The Sox have posted two additional 3rd place finishes during the Hemond regime: 1977, when they were 90-72 with Bob Lemon the field manager, and the past season. Hemond, a Rhode Island native, served in the United States Coast Guard from 1947-51 to save money to study journalism at Providence (RI) College. Following his discharge from the service, he traveled to Deland, FL to visit a cousin in spring training with a Pittsburgh Pirates' minor league club. While there, he met a couple who recommended him to the owner of the Hartford, CT, club in the Eastern League, thus launching his professional baseball front office career in the summer of 1951—sweeping out concession stands.

1981 SEASON - Tony La Russa led the White Sox to a 54-52 overall record in the strike-shortened 1981 season, good for a third place finish in the overall standings of the American League's Western Division. The White Sox owned a 31-22 record and were just 2½ games behind division-leading Oakland when the players' strike halted play June 11th. They opened the second half of the 1981 season with a 16-game Eastern road trip staring them in the face, but arrived back in Chicago August 27th with a record of 9-6 (and one rain-out) for the trip, sitting atop the Western Division. Making their first Comiskey Park appearance in nearly 2½ months, the Sox celebrated with a 3-1 win over the New York Yankees, but then the bubble burst. A 2½-week batting slump took the Sox out of the division race in the abbreviated second half.

MANAGING CAREER - In 4 seasons as a manager in the White Sox organization, both at the major and minor league levels, La Russa owns a combined record of 258 wins against 245 losses. Tony was a winner in his very first managerial assignment for the Sox; hired to pilot Knoxville of the "AA" class Southern League in 1978, he led the team to the first-half title with a 49-21 record. That performance earned him a promotion to the major league club as a coach for the remainder of the '78 season. That winter, Tony managed Estrellas in the Dominican Republic Winter League. He began the 1979 season as manager of the White Sox top farm club, the Iowa Oaks of the "AAA" class American Association. The Oaks were 54-51 in August when Don Kessinger resigned as manager of the parent club, and Bill Veeck put in a call to Des Moines for La Russa. Taking over August 2, 1979, he led the Sox to a 27-27 record in the remaining days.

PLAYING CAREER - La Russa signed his first professional contract with the Kansas City (late Oakland) A's, after a stellar athletic career at Jefferson High School in Tampa, FL. He made his major league debut with the A's in 1963 (34 games), and later spent time in the majors with the Atlanta Braves and Chicago Cubs. With the Cubs he appeared in exactly one major league game—as pinch-runner on Opening Day of the 1973 season, scoring a run.

MISCELLANEOUS - One of the youngest managers in the major leagues, he is senior skipper in the American League's Western Division in terms of tenure with one club. In fact, only 2 managers in the entire American League (Earl Weaver of Baltimore and "Sparky" Anderson of Detroit) have longer tenure. Tony is a licensed attorney in the State of Florida, and is associated with the law firm of Conley and Dooley in Sarasota, where he practices in the off-season, as time permits. He received his degree from Florida State University Law School (where he attended winter sessions

after playing ball summers), and passed the Florida bar the winter of 1979-80. A native of Tampa, FL, Tony speaks Spanish fluently.

If determination, drive, and the will-to-win counted in the won-loss column, the White Sox would have been World Series champions the last two seasons with Art Kusnyer (pronounced KUSH-ner) on the coaching staff. The aggressive, hard-nosed style that marked his playing days, still characterizes his approach to coaching. Art works primarily with the catchers and relief pitchers, and during games can be found pacing up and down in the bullpen. Kusnyer wound-up his playing career as a player-coach with the Iowa Oaks, then the Sox' "AAA" farm club, in 1979. A product of the White Sox farm system, Art signed his first pro contract with the Sox organization in 1966, and made his major league debut with the Sox in 1970. He also saw duty with the California Angels, Milwaukee Brewers, and Kansas City Royals along the way; in all he appeared in 139 big league games during his playing career.

Considered simply the best batting instructor in major league baseball today, Charley Lau joined the White Sox this past winter when he signed a 6-year contract to fill that position, thought to be the longest contract ever

signed by a major league coach. Charley was batting coach of the New York Yankees the past 3 years (1979-81), and prior to that was batting coach of the Kansas City Royals for 8 years (1971-78). In 13 seasons as a major league batting coach, Lau's teams have taken part in 2 World Series, won 2 American League pennants, 6 division titles, and finished 2nd in their division 4 different times. Only 3 times in 13 seasons has a team of which Lau has been a member finished lower than 2nd in a division race, and over those seasons, his teams have won 1,150 games, and lost 889. The author of a book, titled "The Art of Hitting .300," Lau began his coaching career in 1969 with Baltimore after an 11-year major league playing career.

Jim Leyland is another new addition to the White Sox coaching staff for the 1982 season. He will handle the "stop and go" lights at third base, replacing Bobby Winkles, who was promoted to director of player personnel during the off-season. Jim, another coach who was a catcher as a player, was "Manager-of-the-Year" 3 times in 5 years as a minor league pilot in the Detroit Tigers' organization. In his very first season as a manager, 1977, Leyland led the Lakeland, (FL) Tigers to the championship of the Florida State League to be named "Manager-of-the-Year" in that league. He repeated both feats the next season, 1978, and then was promoted to manager of Detroit's top farm club, the Evansville (IN) Triplets of the American Association. Jim then led the Triplets to the American Association championship in 1979 to be named "Manager-of-the-Year" again. This past year, 1981, Leyland piloted Evansville to the Eastern Division title in the American Association, only to lose the semi-final series to the eventual league champion, Denver.

running instructor for the Sox minor league system Feb. 6, 1981, and came to spring training in that capacity. But after watching him work, Manager Tony La Russa was so impressed, he named him to the major league coaching staff at the end of spring training to work primarily on base running and stealing. The result of Dave's work was easily measured at season's end—the '81 Sox stole 86 bases in 130 attempts (106 games) for a 66 percent success ratio. The previous year (1980), the Sox stole only 66 bases in 120 attempts in 162 games, a 41 percent success rate. Nelson had been assistant baseball coach at Texas Christian University when hired by the Sox. He broke into the major leagues in 1968, and appeared with Cleveland, Washington-Texas, and Kansas City in his 11-year big league career before injuries ended his career in 1978. He stole 51 bases for the Rangers in 1972, and 43 in '73, but his most memorable theft occurred Aug. 8, 1976 when he stole home against John "Blue Moon" Odom at Comiskey Park. He earned a line in the record books Aug. 30, 1974 when he became only the third player in big league history to steal second, third, and home in one inning (against Cleveland). One of Dave's 3 brothers, Maurice, is a Trappist Monk, Brother Dominic, living at the Trappist Monastery in Lafayette, Oregon. Dave attended Compton (CA.) Junior College and California State College.

RONALD RICHARD (RON) SCHUELER

In the opinion of Manager Tony La Russa, Ron Schueler is the most underrated pitching coach in the American League, and statistics bear-out La Russa's contention. In the 2½ seasons Schueler has been pitching coach, the Sox mound staff has shown an improved ERA each season: 4.13 in 1979, 3.92 in 1980, and 3.47 in 1981. Last year, the Sox' team ERA was the 4th best in the American League, just 7 percentage points out of 3rd place, and 45 percentage points better than the previous season. Ron was named pitching coach June 11, 1979, following the untimely death of Fred Martin. The 11-year major league veteran pitcher ended his playing career at that point and quickly made the switch to teacher/leader of a very young, but talented pitching corps. In 1981, 2 Sox pitchers wound-up in the top 5 in the American League ERA race; Dennis Lamp was 3rd with a 2.41 ERA, Britt Burns finished tied for 4th with a 2.64 ERA. Ron signed his first pro contract with the Atlanta Braves organization in 1967, making his big league debut with the Braves in 1972. He also played for Philadelphia and Minnesota before being signed by the White Sox as a free agent in December of 1977. 1981 SEASON - After 5 years in professional baseball, Juan Agosto made his major league debut last season, Sept. 7th against the Seattle Mariners at Comiskey Park. In that game, he struck-out the first batter he faced, Bruce Bochte, and then went on to allow only one run in 4.2 innings before tiring. Agosto began the 1981 season as the left-handed reliever for the Edmonton Trappers, the Sox' "AAA" class team in the Pacific Coast League, and when called-up to the parent club, had compiled a 7-10 record with 7 saves in 48 games, 44 of those appearances in relief.

CAREER - Juan has made a rapid rise in the White Sox organization since being signed as a free agent. Signed to his first pro contract by the Boston Red Sox organization in 1975 at the age of 17, he was released by them in 1978 after experiencing some arm trouble. He was out of pro ball in 1979, and then signed by the White Sox on the recommendation of former White Sox coach Orlando Cepeda. Juan repaid the White Sox' faith in him by having superb year at Appleton, with an 11-6 record, and a 2.59 ERA, 5th best in the Midwest League. In 1977, while still in the Boston system, Agosto fanned 98 batters in 119 innings with Winston-Salem of the "A" class Carolina League. Both a starter and reliever in his pro career, Juan is characterized as an excellent fielding pitcher with a good move to first.

MISCELLANEOUS - The 1982 spring training is the first major league spring camp he has been in with the White Sox organization. Agosto spent the past winter pitching for Bayamon in the Puerto Rican Winter League; he was 5-2 for Bayamon during the first half of the winter season. He attended Ponce De Leon High School.

1981 SEASON - If ever there was a bona fide Cinderella story in baseball, it was the story of Bill Almon last season. Released by the New York Mets following the 1980 season, he was "out on the street" looking for work. "I was thinking of opening a sociology store," he said of his plight. Ignored by other clubs, including the nearby Boston Red Sox, Almon was signed to a "AAA" contract by White Sox general manager and fellow Rhode Island native, Roland Hemond. Invited to spring training as a non-roster player, a combination of hard work on Bill's part and injuries to infielders Todd Cruz and Greg Pryor made Almon the White Sox starting shortstop on Opening Day 1981. Taking full advantage of the opportunity, Almon turned in his finest season ever in the major leagues: he topped all American League shortstops with a .301 batting average—the highest average for an American League shortstop since Luis Aparicio hit .313 for the White Sox in 1970—and led all A.L. shortstops with 16 stolen bases, and finished 2nd among league shortstops with 41 RBI. In addition, he equaled his entire career home run production during the 1981 season with 4 home runs. Not surprisingly, his favorite opponent was the Red Sox; he batted .379 against them in 9 games, with 2 homers and 6 RBI. An added plus was his performance in the field; he and second baseman Tony Bernazard developed into one of the better double play combinations as the season progressed. He began the season in spectacular fashion, defensively; Bill opened the season by handling 114 consecutive chances flawlessly before committing his first error of the year May 8 vs. Kansas City at Comiskey Park in his 24th game of the season. Bill was voted "Comeback Player of the Year" by the Chicago chapter of the BBWA, and finished second for American League "Comeback of the Year" honors.

CAREER - Prior to coming to the White Sox in 1981, all of Almon's previous major league experience was in the National League. He was signed to his first pro contract in 1974 by the San Diego Padres for a reported \$100,000 bonus following an outstanding college career. He made his major league debut with the Padres that same year, and in his first full season with San Diego (1977) he was a standout at shortstop, stealing 20 bases and setting a raft of San Diego rookie records. The following season (1978), he was shifted to third base. Reduced to a part-time player by San Diego in 1979, he was traded to Montreal in the off-season (along with Dan Briggs, in exchange for Dave Cash), then released by them in July of 1980. He was then signed by the Mets, but appeared in only 66 games all season.

MISCELLANEOUS - Bill's family operates a surgical supply business in Rhode Island where he works in the off-season. He was signed by the San

Diego Padres after a stellar career at Brown University (Providence, RI); he was named "College Player-of-the-Year" by *The Sporting News* in 1974 after hitting .362 his senior year while setting school records of 10 home runs and 31 RBI. 1981 SEASON - Harold Baines not only ignored the "sophomore jinx" in 1981, he came of age, establishing himself as one of the best right fielders in the American League. Harold's arm is one of the strongest and most accurate in the league and in 1981 he led all Sox outfielders with 10 assists, tying for 5th in that department in the league. On offense, he improved his batting average 31 percentage points from his rookie season (.255 to .286), tied for 2nd on the club with 10 homers, and his 7 triples placed him in a tie for 2nd place in the American League in that department. Harold was red-hot after the All-Star break; he hit .354 in the month of August with 5 home runs, then drove-in 15 runs in 17 games in September. He owned 25 multiple-hit games last season, including 2 4-hit games, and 8 3-hit games. Baines went 4-for-4 vs. Texas May 16, and 4-for-6 Aug. 23 at Toronto. One of his season highlights was defensive: Aug. 31, he started a triple play against the Detroit Tigers. But in the eyes of Manager Tony La Russa, Harold's most outstanding accomplishment of the year was when he raced in from right field to back-up a play at first base, handling an errant throw and saving a ball game. Harold missed 14 games in September because of a pair of injuries; Sept. 4th he pulled a rib cage muscle and missed 8 games, he then missed the final 6 games of the season after jamming his left wrist on a slide at 2nd base Sept. 27th in Oakland.

CAREER - Harold became a regular immediately in the major leagues; he appeared in 141 games his rookie season (1980) while hitting 13 homers

and driving-in 49 runs. He tied for the club lead with 6 triples. Harold gave a preview of things to come in the middle of the 1980 season when the Sox appeared in the annual "Hall of Fame Game" at Cooperstown, NY. He slammed a 3-run homer, and 2 doubles in 4 at-bats. Baines' textbook swing has baseball experts believing that—barring injuries—he should develop into one of baseball's premier power hitters, despite playing in spacious Comiskey Park. In his final minor league season (1979), Baines batted .298 with 22 homers and 87 RBI while leading the Iowa Oaks of the American Association in triples (8), total bases (246), and slugging percentage (.528). He also wrote a line in the league record book by slamming 2 home runs in the same inning (Aug. 4 vs. Oklahoma City).

MISCELLANEOUS - Harold was drafted first by the Sox in 1977, who passed up Paul Molitor and Terry Kennedy to select him, and there was a suspicion at the time that his selection was more sentimental than rational; Harold had been "discovered" by former White Sox President Bill Veeck as a 12-year-old Little Leaguer when Veeck was living on Maryland's Eastern Shore.

1981 SEASON - Bothered by painful nerve in his left foot the second half of the 1981 season, Ross had the nerve removed surgically Dec. 1, 1981, and looks to once again being a pain to opposing hitters in 1982, instead of having pain when he pitches. In spite of being plagued by the painful nerve the second half of the '81 season, Ross pitched a 3-hitter Sept. 22 at California; although he lost the game 1-0, it still stood as his best one-game effort of the year. He also had his strikeout pitch going the final month of the season, recording 16 whiffs in 9.1 innings, including 7 on 2 different occasions: Sept. 5 vs. Toronto, and Sept. 22 at California, one "K" short of his career one-game high. But overall, the first of '81 was a much better one for Baumgarten; he was 5-6 the first half, more than doubling his total wins of the previous season, and was involved in 3 shut-outs. May 17, Ross tossed a 4-hit, complete game shut-out vs. the Rangers for a 9-0 win, and also teamed-up with Lamarr Hoyt for 2 combined shut-outs (April 25 at Detroit, and May 27 at Oakland). His favorite opponent in 1981 was easily the Tigers; Ross posted a 0.64 ERA against them, giving-up only one earned run in 14 innings.

CAREER - Ross owns an impressive hits-to-innings pitched ratio in his major league career; in 3½ big league seasons, he has given-up 432 hits in 452 innings, and in his last 3 full seasons in the majors has never allowed more hits than innings pitched in any of those years. The 1980 season was one Ross would probably just as soon forget, compiling a 2-12 won-loss

record. Sox batters scored only 25 runs in his 24 appearances (23 starts, one relief stint), an average of one run an outing, and in 10 games, did not score any runs at all while he was on the mound. Highlight of his 1980 season was July 2 when he had a no-hitter going against the Angels for more than 6 innings; Rod Carew singled in the 7th, but Ross settled for a one-hitter and a 1-0 victory when the Sox scored an unearned run. Baumgarten spent a month of the '80 season on the Disabled List (July 23-Aug. 23) because of stiffness in his left shoulder. Breaking into the major leagues in only his second season as a pro, Ross was a winner in his very first big league appearance: he defeated the Texas Rangers 6-2 at Texas, Aug. 16, 1978. Eleven days later, he pitched his first big league shut-out, blanking Cleveland 6-0 on 5 hits. In 1979, Baumgarten led the Sox staff in winning percentage (13-8, .619) and ERA (3.53), tied for the team lead in shutouts (3), and owned a pair of 4-game winning streaks.

MISCELLANEOUS - Ross owns a pair of one-hitters in the major leagues, both against the California Angels (July 2, 1980; May 25, 1979). He was named "Chicago Rookie-of-the-Year" by the Chicago Chapter of the BBWA after the '79 season. Reared in the north Chicago suburb of Glencoe, Ross was an all-suburban pitcher at New Trier East High School. An admitted fan of the Chicago Cubs while growing up, Baumgarten wears the same uniform number as his boyhood hero, the Cubs' left-handed ace of the late 60's, Ken Holtzman.

1981 SEASON - Tony Bernazard emerged as one of the American League's finest second basemen in 1981, teaming with shortstop Bill Almon to provide the White Sox with their best keystone combination in many a season. Appearing in all of the Sox' 106 games last year, Tony excelled both offensively and defensively; only 2 A.L. second basemen hit for a higher average last year (Boston's Jerry Remy, .307, and California's Bobby Grich, .304), and Tony's 7 game-winning RBI placed him second in the league among second basemen. In addition to games, Tony also

topped the 1981 Sox in at-bats (384) and hits (106), while finishing second in game-winning RBI, and runs scored (53). Bernazard had 25 multiple-hit games, including a pair of 4-hit performances (going 4-for-5 April 21 vs. Baltimore and May 23 at California). He hit well on both ends of the season, batting .362 in April and .327 in September and October. Also spectacular in the field, he committed only 7 errors in 355 total chances for a .987 fielding percentage, and at one point, put together a string of 49 consecutive errorless games in which he handled 268 total chances flawlessly.

CAREER - In spite of credentials that indicated great things for Bernazard in the future, he was only a part time player his first 2 seasons in the major leagues (1979 and 1980 with Montreal). He made his major league debut July 12, 1979 with the Expos after hitting .300 in 82 games for their top farm club, the Denver Bears. He then finished the '79 season with the parent club, also hitting .300. He reached base 28 times in 56 plate appearances in his first 22 major league games, for a .500 on-base percentage. Tony hit his first major league homer July 21, 1979, off the Dodgers' Don Sutton. Bernazard enjoyed his best minor league season in 1978; April 23 of that season he wrote his name into the American Association record book with a 6-for-6 performance that included 2 home runs, 3 doubles, and 6 RBI—all in one game. His 15 total bases in that game eclipsed the old record of 14 (shared by Marv Throneberry and Roger Freed) and made him only the 24th player in A.A. history to get 6 hits in one game.

MISCELLANEOUS - The Bernazards, who are expecting their third child during the 1982 season, hope to make their permanent residence in the Chicago area. Tony began to switch-hit during the 1977-78 Puerto Rican Winter League season.

1981 SEASON - In only 2 seasons in the major leagues, Britt Burns has established himself as one of the premier pitchers in the American League. Already established as the ace of the Sox' starting corps, Britt topped the 1981 club in wins (10), innings (156.2), and strike-outs (108), tied for the lead

in complete games (5) and was second on the team in ERA (2.64) and starts (23). In addition, Burns was second in the American League in strikeouts, and his ratio of 6.2 whiffs per 9 innings was bested only by Cleveland's Len Barker and New York's Ron Guidry. His ERA ranked 5th in the American League. In addition, Britt tossed 30 consecutive scoreless innings in August (the 4th best string in team history), and won 6 games in a row in mid-season. The White Sox' Opening Day pitcher at Boston, Britt had 6 games of 8 or more strikeouts during the season, including 3 consecutive 8-strikeout games in late May. Britt's best outing of the year came at Seattle Sept. 16 when he gave up only 3 hits (matching his career best), fanned 9 (also matching a career one-game high), and went the distance in the Sox' 3-1 victory. He also had a pair of 4-hit games and shared another pair of 4-hit wins. For his efforts, Britt was named to the American League All-Star Team (he did not appear) in only his sophomore season in the major leagues. However, all of Britt's good fortune was tempered by tragedy last year; July 16, his father, Charley, was struck by an automobile as he stood by the side of the road at the Burns' summer home outside of Birmingham, and subsequently passed away, without regaining consciousness, Sept. 12. During that 2-month period, Britt commuted between his father's bedside and where the Sox were playing without missing a single pitching turn.

CAREER - Burns numbers California, Texas, and Boston among his favorite opponents; he is 5-1 lifetime against the Angels, with a 1.69 ERA in 48 innings. vs. Texas, Britt is 2-1 with a 1.50 ERA in 30 innings, and against Boston he is 1-0 with a 1.62 ERA in 16.2 innings. Signed by the White Sox in 1978 out of high school, he made his big league debut that same summer with 2 starts, both against Detroit. He made 3 different stops in 1979, coming-up to the parent club to stay late in the season. Burns appeared in a grand total of 37 minor league games before coming to the major leagues on a permanent basis.

MISCELLANEOUS - Called "Hoss" by his teammates because of his size and mild manner off the field, the story of Britt's "discovery" by the White Sox is the stuff of which legends are made: In April of 1978, the former book critic of the *Chicago Tribune*, and host of the television program "Cromie's Circle," Robert Cromie, was passing through Birmingham, AL on a business trip. Reading a story in the *Birmingham Post-Herald* about a local pitching sensation who had struck-out 18 batters in a high school game, Cromie tore the article out and mailed it to old friend Bill Veeck, then president of the White Sox, with a message scrawled across the top of the article: "Dear Bill, for your 'dream file.' Best, Bob Cromie." Britt ran-up some incredible records while pitching for Birmingham's Huffman High; he had a career ERA of 0.12, won 35 games against only 2 losses (including an 18-game winning streak), and gave up just 30 hits and only 30 walks against 292 strike-outs in 139 innings.

MISCELLANEOUS - A blond, green-eyed Cuban native, Castro has to explain everywhere he goes that his late grandfather was a fair-complected Spaniard. Jose spent the first 7 years of his life growing-up in Santiago de Las Vegas, Cuba before his family fled to the United States in 1965. Castro was moving through the Philadelphia organization with another talented infielder, traded away by the Phillies last April, giving Jose—he thought—a clear shot at the majors. The other infielder: Jay Loviglio, also now with the White Sox.

took full advantage of it. Signed as a free agent, Keith was assigned to the White Sox' "A" class team at Appleton, Wis. He was among Midwest League leaders in ERA (3.12) when promoted to the Sox' "AA" class club at Glens Falls, (NY) For the Glen Sox, he put together an 8-3 record and a 3.42 ERA in 14 games (13 starts) to finish 2nd on the club in ERA and tie for 3rd in won-loss percentage (.727). In addition, both his hits-to-innings-pitched and strike-outs-to-walks ratios were excellent; for the season, he allowed only 146 hits in 170 innings, and struck-out 102 batters against only 75 walks.

CAREER - Keith's professional career appeared to be over almost before it got off the ground. Signed originally by the Detroit Tigers' organization in 1979, he pitched only one season in their system before being released in spring training of 1980 after Detroit decided he did not have a baseball future. However, Desjarlais continued to pitch, and was seen during the summer of 1980 pitching for a local league in Detroit by White Sox scout Marvin Lane, who recommended a second chance.

MISCELLANEOUS - He attended Henry Ford Community College after graduation from Cody High School in Detroit in 1976. He was a member of the All-Detroit baseball team after posting a 12-4 record for Cody High his senior year. Desjarlais was also a member of the 1976 Michigan State Junior American League Baseball championship team.

1981 SEASON - Richard Dotson, in only his second full season in the major leagues, was the White Sox' most effective starter the first half of 1981. When play was interrupted, Richard led Sox starters with a 7-3 record, a 2.82 ERA, 89.1 innings, and was 2nd with 41 strike-outs. In addition, he was among the American League leaders in several of those categories for the first half: he was tied for most shut-outs in the A.L. (4), tied for 4th in wins, 8th in ERA, and 10th in innings pitched. In addition, he recorded the second best consecutive scoreless innings streak of the season by a White Sox pitcher; he put together 21 straight shut-out innings from May 3 through May 15. Richard also had a pair of 4-game winning

streaks during the season. His best one-game performance of the year came in the first half when he matched his low-hit career record, limiting the California Angels to 3 hits May 30 for a 9-0 shut-out win. The second half was a struggle, however, and consistency eluded him throughout the latter half. In spite of a rough second half, Richard still wound-up tied for first place in the American League with 4 shut-outs, and led the White Sox staff in starts (24) and shut-outs, and tied for the team lead in complete games (5).

CAREER - Richard has never had a losing season in his 2 and one-third years in the major leagues. He made his major league debut late in 1979 (in only his 3rd season in pro ball), and registered a 2-0 record, and since has had season records of 12-10 and 9-8. Dotson recorded his first major league shut-out in only his 2nd big league start (7-0 on 6 hits vs. Oakland, Sept. 9, 1979), and that was his only shut-out until recording 4 the first half of 1981. The only right-hander among the White Sox' "Kiddie Corps" of talented young starters, Richard was second only to Britt Burns on the Sox' 1980 team; he was second in wins (12), strike-outs (109), and complete games (8), and tied for first with 32 starts. He also established his one-game strike-out high in 1980, whiffing 9 batters in a game on 2 different occasions. Richard made the jump into the major leagues in 1979 directly from the "AA" level.

MISCELLANEOUS - Richard, usually called "Dot" by his teammates, possesses one of the best change-ups in the American League. He credits the late Fred Martin with teaching him that pitch in 1979. "I was trying to throw a change-up on the sidelines one day and he came over and said, 'That doesn't seem to be working, try this,' and he showed me a proper grip on the ball." Richard teams his change-up with a fast breaking ball that Pitching Coach Ron Schueler calls a "slurve," a cross between a slider and a curve.

1981 SEASON - Jerry Hairston returned to the major leagues after a 4-year absence to give the White Sox some added pinch-hit punch, and provided some immediate dividends. Making his first appearance Sept. 15, he successfully pinch-hit at Seattle in the 9th inning, and went on to hit safely in 3 of his first 4 games, for a .364 average (4-for-11). He capped his return to the majors the final day of the 1981 season by smacking a grand slam homer off Don Cooper of Minnesota, and driving-in 6 RBI for the day—including the game winner in the 9th off Twins' relief ace Doug Corbett—to give the Sox a 13-12 win and clinch 3rd for them. Prior to being acquired by the White Sox, Hairston had his best season ever in the Mexican League, hitting .293 with 7 homers, 74 RBI and 32 stolen bases in 123 games to lead the Mexico City Reds to the Mexican League championship. In addition, he chalked-up 123 walks against only 33 strike-outs in

those 123 games. In the playoffs, Jerry hit .345, and set a new Mexican League playoff record with 17 RBI.

CAREER - Hairston signed his first pro contract with the White Sox in 1970, and made his big league debut with the Sox in 1973. He spent 5 partial seasons with the Sox, appearing in anywhere from 44 to 69 games in each of those years. His best season was 1975 when he batted .283 and drove-in 23 runs. A real handyman, he was used as an outfielder, designated hitter, pinch hitter and bullpen catcher by the Sox. Jerry was acquired by the Pittsburgh Pirates June 13, 1977 for a cash consideration and finished the year with the Bucs, going to Mexico in 1978.

MISCELLANEOUS - Jerry is the son of White Sox scout and minor league instructor Sam Hairston Sr. Hairston's brothers John and Sam Jr. also played pro ball at one time. An all-star and captain of his Gardendale (AL) High School team, he attended Lawson State Junior College in Birmingham before signing a pro contract.

Overall, he has the 3rd best efficiency rating among Sox relief pitchers, allowing only 15 of 54 inherited base runners to score, a 72 percent rating, better than veteran reliever Ed Farmer. Hickey was one of only 3 Sox relievers to record saves; he claimed 3 while Lamarr Hoyt and Ed Farmer owned 10 each.

CAREER - In 1980, Kevin enjoyed his first winning season in pro ball, posting a 9-7 record for the Sox' class "AA" Glens Falls, (NY) White Sox. More importantly, he was named winner of the "Silver Glove" award as the best fielding pitcher in all of the minor leagues in 1980. He pitched 169 innings for the Glen Sox, all as a starter, committing no errors and leading all Eastern League pitchers by taking part in 8 doubleplays. In addition, he was named "White Sox Minor League Player of the Year" in 1980 by the Pitch & Hit Club of Chicago.

MISCELLANEOUS - The Kevin Hickey "story" is that of a dream come true. He did not play baseball in high school, growing up on Chicago's Southside just a few blocks from Comiskey Park, in the city's Brighton Park area. Following graduation from high school, he went to work for a local steel company, and played 16-inch softball (a game peculiar to Chicago), leading his team, the "Bobcats", to the 1976 world 16-inch championship. Because of a change in shifts at the steel plant, Kevin forced himself to give up his softball team and switched to playing weekends for the Markham Cardinals, a semi-pro baseball team. Invited to a White Sox summer try-out at Comiskey Park in 1978, he impressed Sox personnel enough to be offered a contract. Hickey graduated from Kelly High School on Chicago's Southside after also attending St. Rita High School in Chicago, alma mater of former Sox Pitcher Ed Farmer (now with Philadelphia) and Toronto pitcher Jim Clancy. He learned to throw a change-up during the 1979-80 winter instructional league.

1981 SEASON - Marc Hill was a member of what was regarded as one of the best catch-corps in baseball last season (along with Carlton Fisk and Jim Essian). But because of that, and the interruption of play in mid-season, Marc was used only in a reserve role, and saw minimal action.

However, Hill made himself an integral part of the team in many other ways, and impressed Manager Tony La Russa enough that the Sox felt comfortable in dealing Jim Essian to Seattle in the off-season as part of the deal that brought Tom Paciorek to Chicago. Marc appeared in only 15 games last year, and in those 15 games he pinch-hit 3 times, caught 14 times, played first base once and third base once. Characteristic of his nature, he agreed to be optioned to the Sox' minor league club at Glens Falls, (NY) late in August (Aug. 15-Sept. 1) to help the club with a numbers problem on the big league roster. At Glens Falls, he appeared in 2 games, going 3-for-7 (.429). With the departure of Essian, Marc becomes the primary back-up to Fisk, and Manager La Russa expects Marc to see a good deal of action in 1982.

CAREER - The San Francisco Giants' regular catcher 3 seasons in a row (1977, '78, and '79), Marc began the 1980 season as a back-up receiver, and then after appearing in only 17 games for the Giants he was acquired on waivers by the Seattle Mariners June 20. However, a broken left wrist, suffered July 24 in a collision at homeplate with John Stearns of the Mets, cut the '79 season short for him. In his 63 games for the Giants in '79, Marc committed only 3 errors and led all San Francisco catchers in caught-stealing percentage, gunning down 28 would-be base stealers. Hill spent a total of just over 5 years in the San Francisco organization, after 5 seasons in the St. Louis Cardinals system. He was signed by the Cardinals in 1970, and made his major league debut with them Sept. 28, 1973 at the age of 21. In that game, he caught a 2-hit shut-out against Philadelphia. Hill was named to all-star teams at 3 different levels of minor league play enroute to the majors.

MISCELLANEOUS - Marc was born and raised just 50 miles from Busch Stadium in St. Louis. An all-stater in baseball and basketball, he was the first athlete in the history of Lincoln County (MO) High School to win letters in 3 sports (baseball, basketball, track) in his sophomore year. His father, Edward, was a pitcher in the St. Louis Browns' organization in the 40's. In the off-season, Marc works with his father in the home-building business.

1981 SEASON - Lamarr Hoyt has won 18 games and lost only 6 (a .750 won-loss percentage) over the past 2 seasons, as well as tying for the team lead with 10 saves in 1981 (ranking him in a tie for 7th in the American League in that department). That in a nutshell is the reason the White Sox were not overly concerned this past winter when Ed Farmer opted for free agency, and eventually signed with the Philadelphia Phillies. In addition, Hoyt set a personal career high by appearing in 43 games last year, tops on the Sox' pitching staff, and 5th most in the American League. With the exception of a short period at the beginning of the second half, Lamarr was the Sox most consistent relief pitcher, and Manager Tony La Russa came to rely on him as his right-handed "stopper" in crucial situations. He owned ERA figures of under 2.00 against 5 different American League opponents last season, and had perfect 0.00 ERA's against Detroit, Milwaukee and Minnesota. He had a 1.59 ERA against Cleveland, and a 1.89 figure vs. Oakland. He finished out the 1981 season winning 5 decisions in a row, along with 3 saves.

CAREER - A starter most of his professional career, but during the winter of 1978-'79 Manager Tony La Russa, then manager of the Sox' minor league club at Knoxville, advised Hoyt that the fastest route to the major leagues was as a reliever. He began working in relief in 1979, and made his big league debut with the White Sox that same season. Working both in relief and as a starter in 1980, he won 5 of his last 6 decisions of the season as he established himself in the majors. The 1980 season was one of "firsts" for Hoyt: after opening the year at Iowa, he was called up June 17 and posted his first big league win in his first appearance—on that date—at Cleveland. He made his first major league start July 26 at Texas and pitched his first big league complete game for a 4-3 win. In his short major league career, Lamarr has established a couple of favorite foes; he owns a career record of 4-0 against Milwaukee with a 2.84 ERA in 19 innings; his best ERA is a career 1.69 mark vs. Detroit in 16 innings. Signed by the Yankees to his first pro contract in June of 1973, he was told he was being groomed to replace "Catfish" Hunter of the Yankee staff after the 1976 season when he was 15-8 with a 2.50 ERA for the Yankee farm club at West Haven. Shortly thereafter, he was acquired by the White Sox. He struggled his first season in the White Sox system, but finally turned it around in 1978, leading the Midwest League with 18 wins.

MISCELLANEOUS - Hoyt prefers his middle name, "Lamarr." His father, a former minor league pitcher is also named Dewey Lamarr Hoyt. "He was always called 'Dewey' and I've always been 'Lamarr,'" he said. After hitting 34 homers in 20 games as a Little Leaguer, Hoyt decided to switch to pitching as a sophomore in high school. He hurled a no-hitter in his first

1981 SEASON - Steve Kemp's addition to the Chicago White Sox line-up in 1982 gives the Sox two genuine left-handed homerun threats in the line-up together for the first time since 1977 (Oscar Gamble, Jim Spencer, Jorge Orta). Last season with the Tigers, Kemp hit .277 and led Detroit in hits (103), doubles (18), RBI (49), walks (70), tied for 2nd with 9 homers and was 3rd on the Tigers with 9 stolen bases. Steve also led Detroit in Game-Winning-RBI for the third straight season; he had 10 last year, 10 in 1980, and 14 in 1979. Kemp, also newly-acquired Tom Paciorek (13), and Greg Luzinski (10) combined for 33 Game-Winning-RBI in the American League last season. Each led their respective teams in '81 in that department—Kemp, Detroit; Paciorek, Seattle; Luzinski, White Sox.

CAREER - Kemp exceeded 100 RBI and 20 homeruns in both 1980 and '79, driving-in 101 runs and hitting 21 homers in 1980, and driving-in 105 runs and hitting 26 homers in 1979. Among the American League's leaders in clutch hitting, Steve has driven-in a total of 422 runs in his five-year major league career, an average of 84.4 RBI per season. He was named to the American League All-Star team in 1979 after winning Detroit's triple crown. Steve has recorded 11-game hitting streaks 3 times (once in 1980, twice in 1978), and hit 2 home runs in one game on 3 different occasions during the 1980 season. He has also collected 4 or more RBI in one game six different times, the last time May 24 vs. Baltimore. In addition, he has hit 2 home runs in one game 8 different times in his career. Kemp hit his last grand slam homer Sept. 20, 1980 off Ross Grimsley of Cleveland; he hit his last inside the park home Sept. 4, 1977 at Tiger Stadium, vs. Oakland.

1981 SEASON - Ron Kittle was named "Most Valuable Player" in the Eastern League after enjoying a superb season for the White Sox "AA" farm club at Glens Falls, (NY). He led the Eastern League with 40 home runs (including 2 grandslams), and 103 RBI, and his .324 narrowly missed winning the Triple Crown because of a rule technicality. Kittle actually had the highest batting average in the Eastern League among batters with enough at-bats to qualify for the batting crown. However, another batter who did not own enough at-bats, had his average "adjusted" to nose Kittle out by 5 percentage points. Ron was the best of a bumper crop of home run hitters at Glens Falls last season; the Glen Sox hit more homers than any other team in pro ball in 1981 (179), and Kittle single-handedly accounted for nearly one quarter of those himself. In addition, he led the league with 269 total bases and finished second in runs scored with 97.

CAREER - His outstanding 1981 season came on the heels of a promising 1980 season when he hit .316 in 61 games at Appleton and was named to the Midwest League All-Star team, and then promoted to Glens Falls, where he hit .308 in 17 games. But things were not always so rosy for the Gary, IN native. Signed to his first pro contract by the Dodger organization in 1977, he hit poorly both that season and the next, and he said, "My right arm felt like it was partially paralyzed." After many fruitless tests and examinations, his problems were diagnosed as a pinched nerve in his neck, traced to a pair of crushed vertebrae. The cause of the injury remains

a mystery to him. "I guess somewhere along the line, sliding into home or something, I damaged my neck." He underwent spinal fusion surgery in 1978 and was in a neck brace for 4 months. The Dodgers, thinking his baseball career over, released him. Then, in September of 1978, while he was working as an iron construction worker, former Sox great Billy Pierce arranged a special try-out for him at Comiskey Park. Injuries continued to haunt him in 1979; he missed a month of the season with torn tendons in a thumb, but tenacity on his part and patience on the White Sox' part has begun to pay dividends.

MISCELLANEOUS - 1982 is Kittle's first spring training in a major league camp. Ron graduated from William Wirt High School after lettering in 3 sports. He was an all-state basketball player in a state noted for outstanding prep cage teams.

1981 SEASON - Jerry Koosman will be assuming a new role in his long and successful major league career in 1982, one he began in 1981—short relief. "Every team needs a short relief specialist who is a stopper, and a veteran who has been through the post-season wars to add stability," said Manager Tony La Russa. "We are expecting big things from him in 1982 because of his knowledge and experience." A starter throughout his big league career, the Twins converted Jerry to short relief at the start of the second half last season, and he chalked-up 5 saves in 7 appearances for Minnesota. For the White Sox he worked both in relief and as a spot starter. His best effort of September for the Sox came Sept. 27th when he recorded the 129th complete game of his big league career with a 10-3 win at Oakland.

CAREER - Only 2 pitchers in the American League have won more games than Koosman: Jim Palmer and Tommy John. He recorded his 2000th career strike-out June 3, 1980 when he fanned Boston's Dwight Evans, and heads into the 1982 season with 2,181 "K's" to his credit, 29th on the all-time major league list, just 17 whiffs short of Grover Cleveland Alexander. A native of the Minneapolis-St. Paul area, Koosman spent 2½ seasons with

the Twins after a little more than 11 seasons with the New York Mets. During that period he was a member of the "Amazin' Mets" who won the World Series in 1969. He appeared in 2 National League Championship Series and 2 World Series, all with the Mets, and owns a combined, perfect 4-0 record in post season play, including 2 wins over the Baltimore Orioles in the '69 Series. With Minnesota, Koosman tied the club all-time one-game strike-out record June 23, 1980 when he fanned 15 Kansas City batters in Minnesota. In 1982, Jerry is entering his 15th season in the major leagues.

MISCELLANEOUS - A 2-time National League All-Star pitcher (1968-'69), Koosman was signed by the New York Mets in 1965. He made his major league debut with the Mets in 1968 and recorded a brilliant rookie season, setting Mets club one-season records for wins (19), ERA (2.08), and shut-outs (7) to be named National League "Rookie Pitcher-of-the-Year." Earned a line in baseball trivia books by becoming the first pitcher in New York Mets history to win a season opener, beating San Francisco 3-0 (That game also marked his first big league win and shut-out). Jerry has won 20 or more games twice in his major league career (21-20 in '76 with Mets, 20-13 in '79 with the Twins). He attended the University of Minnesota.

1981 SEASON - Rusty Kuntz spent the entire 1981 season in the big leagues, the first time in his pro career he has accomplished that feat, and fulfilled a vital role as the Sox 4th outfielder, filling in at all 3 outfield positions. An outstanding defensive outfielder with excellent range and an excellent arm, Rusty did not commit a single error last year in 54 total chances. In fact, in 108 games in the big leagues, Kuntz has committed only one error in 115 total chances. Rusty, who usually only gets one at-bat a game as a defensive replacement late in games, had his best hitting year thus far in the majors, batting .255. The biggest single day of his young career came Sept. 20 vs. Oakland, as he went 2-for-2 and drove-in 3 runs. The offensive highlight of Rusty's year didn't count in the record books, unfortunately; last spring training (March 24) against the St. Louis Cardinals he went 3-for-3 with a home run and a triple to drive-in 6 runs for the day.

CAREER - Kuntz enjoyed 2 big seasons with the Sox' "AAA" class farm club in both '79 and '80 before being called-up to the parent club; he batted .294 for Iowa in 1979 and .292 in 1980 with 26 homers and 111 RBI in 223 games. In 1978 with Knoxville, he was second in fielding among outfielders with a .988 percentage (3 errors).

MISCELLANEOUS - Rusty has attended Cuesta Jr. College (San Luis Obispo, CA) and California State University. He graduated from Paso Robles (CA) High School in 1973 after starring in 3 sports: baseball, basketball, and football.

FOX CONSECUTIVE GAME STREAK

1981 SEASON - The acquisition of Dennis Lamp late in spring training of last year proved to be another brilliant move by the White Sox. Used both in relief and as a starter, Dennis was equal to either task, coming within an eyelash of putting together the best ERA in the American League. In a neck-and-neck race for the ERA leadership going into the final week of the season, which upped his ERA just enough to drop him to 3rd in the league's ERA standings at season's end with a 2.41 mark—nothing to be ashamed of by any means. Dennis also came within an eyelash of pitching a no-hitter in 1981; Aug. 25th at County Stadium in Milwaukee, he pitched 8 innings of no-hit ball against the Brewers before Robin Yount poked a dying quail double into short left-center field to lead-off the 9th inning. Dennis then settled for a one-hitter, the second of his major league career (the other occurred June 9, 1978 vs. the San Diego Padres), and a 5-1 win over Milwaukee. A steady performer all season long, Lamp was particularly effective on the road for the Sox, compiling a 5-0 record and a 1.95 ERA away from Comiskey Park. He owned ERA's of 2.00 or less vs. 6 different American League opponents, but his favorite foe was Boston; vs. the Red Sox, he owned a 0.93 ERA in 9.2 innings.

CAREER - Lamp signed his first pro contract with the Chicago Cubs in 1971, and made his major league debut with them in 1977 after a stand-out season with the Cubs' "AAA" class farm club at Wichita; with the Aeros he was 11-4 with a 2.94 ERA and led the American Association with fewest walks-per-innings-pitched, 23 in 129 innings. One note about Lamp's major league debut; he singled in his first 2 at-bats in the National League. In 1978, Dennis owned the lowest ERA of any Cub starter and his season was capped by the one-hit effort against San Diego June 9 at Wrigley Field; on 4 occasions during the '78 season, the Cubs were shut-out when Dennis was the starting pitcher. In his 4½ seasons in the minor leagues, Lamp was named to all-star teams twice, in 1973 in the Midwest League, and again in 1977 in the American Association.

MISCELLANEOUS - A California native, Dennis was a standout baseball

1981 SEASON - Ron LeFlore had what for him was an off year, and still managed to finish 3rd in the American League in stolen bases with 36. He posted the worst batting average of his major league career in 1981 (.246), getting off to a slow start, partly because of an injured adductor muscle. "It wasn't just that," he said afterward. "I was pressing. I was trying to impress the new owners and the fans. I was over-reacting at the plate, searching for the right stance, the right grip—that's something a professional cannot do." But Ron will probably move back to the more familiar position of center field for the White Sox in '82 (replacing the departed Chet Lemon), and he feels he'll return to form this season. "I'll be working a lot with Charley Lau (the Sox' premier batting coach); I know he can help me tremendously." LeFlore's 36 stolen bases in the shortened '81 season represented the most swipes by a White Sox player in 15 years (outfielder Tommie Agee stole 44 bases in 1966). LeFlore's favorite opponents in '81 were Boston and Milwaukee; he hit .417 vs. Brewer pitching and .345 vs. Red Sox hurlers (his Red Sox marks upped his career batting average against Boston to .324, 111-for-343).

CAREER - Ron is the only player in major league history to lead both leagues in stolen bases for a season; in 1980 he swiped 97 bases in 116

attempts for the Montreal Expos, and he stole 68 bases for the Detroit Tigers in 1978 to lead the American League that season. In order to win the base-stealing title in the National League in '80, Ron had to steal 2 bases on the final day of the season to edge out Pittsburgh's Omar Moreno, who had 96 for the year. Ron goes into the 1982 season ranked 43rd on the all-time list in stolen bases; he is only 79 stolen bases behind the White Sox' all-time leader in that department, Luis Aparicio (506). LeFlore came into his own as a star in 1976 when he scored 93 runs and stole 58 bases and was elected to the American League All-Star Team. He also put together a 30-game hitting streak in '76, the longest streak in the A.L. in 26 years prior to that season, and the longest streak in Detroit in 42 years.

MISCELLANEOUS - The Ron LeFlore story is well-known by this time; he did not play baseball in high school, but learned to play in a recreational program at Southern Michigan Prison (Jackson, MI). His abilities came to the attention of the Detroit Tigers, who signed him to a pro contract July 2, 1973. He went from prison to a Detroit farm club, and played in only 134 minor league games before making his major league debut July 31, 1974. Ron and Detroit sportswriter Jim Hawkins collaborated on a book about his prison experience titled "Break-Out," which was published in 1978. His story was also the subject of a made-for-television movie.

player on a 25-man roster, and thus spent the major portion of last season with the Sox' top farm club at Edmonton, Canada. Playing second base every day for the Trappers, Jay had an excellent season, finishing 2nd on the team in batting (.298) and stolen bases (41). In addition, he was 3rd on the club in RBI (57) and tied for 3rd in home runs (11). A tough competitor with blazing speed, the Sox management feels he is ready for the big leagues.

CAREER - Jay made his major league debut in September of 1980 with the Philadelphia Phillies, but with veteran all-star Manny Trillo camped on the Phillies' second base position, he did not hold much hope of getting much playing time there. He has been a lead-off hitter most of his career, and in that position for Oklahoma City in 1980, he set personal highs in runs scored and triples, finishing second in the league in runs scored (98) and third in stolen bases (33). In 1979, Loviglio led the Eastern League in stolen bases (55) and posted the best fielding percentage for a second baseman to be named to the Eastern League all-star team.

MISCELLANEOUS - Jay grew-up on Long Island (East Islip), where he graduated from East Islip High School in 1974. He played Little League, Babe Ruth, and Connie Mack baseball in his hometown before being signed to his first pro contract by Philadelphia in 1977.

1981 SEASON - For the Chicago-born Greg Luzinski, 1981 was a homecoming, and he made the most of it. One of the mainstays of the Philadelphia Phillies' offense for 8 seasons, the "Bull" and the Phillie management did not see eye-to-eye during the 1980 season. Thus he became available, and the White Sox purchased his contract during last spring training as another step in their overhaul project. Used exclusively as a designated hitter by the White Sox in 1981, Luzinski delivered by

having his best season since 1978; he led the Southsiders in 5 different offensive categories, more than any other Sox batter; home runs (21), RBI (62), game-winning RBI (11), runs (55), and walks (58), and his home run total set a new White Sox team record for homers by a "DH" in one season, eclipsing the old record of 20 established by Oscar Gamble in 1977. At season's end, he was named American League "DH of the Year" for leading all A.L. designated hitters in games (103), runs (55), total bases (180), homers (21), and game-winning RBI (11). His home run total was second best in the league, and his GW-RBI total tied for 4th best in the A.L. He was also named "Comeback Player of the Year" by U.P.I. He particularly enjoyed the pitching of Toronto and California last season; Greg pounded Angel pitchers for 4 homers and 15 RBI in 13 games, and Blue Jay pitching for 14 RBI and 4 homers in 11 games. On 2 separate occasions in 1981, he hit a pair of home runs in one game: May 18 at Toronto, and May 22 at Anaheim, the 18th and 19th times in his career he hit 2 homers in one game. The game of May 18 was his best single game of the season; in addition to the 2 homers, he went 3-for-4 and drove-in 5 runs. At season's end, he was rewarded by the White Sox with a 3-year contract.

CAREER - In his final season with Philadelphia, Luzinski experienced a roller-coaster year; he hit a game-winning 3-run homer in his very first at-bat of the season, and pounded-out 8 homers (and drove-in 18 runs) in May; he injured his right knee sliding into second base July 5 at St. Louis, and underwent corrective surgery July 28. He was reactivated Aug. 24 after missing 45 games, then came back to homer in the first game of the National League championship series and drive-in the winning run in the 4th game with a pinch double. In 1978, "Bull" received more votes than any other player to win a starting spot in the National League All-Star Team. He hit safely in 13 consecutive National League CS games before going hitless in game #3 of the series in 1980. His best one-game RBI performance occurred June 11, 1977 when he drove-in 7 runs vs. Atlanta. Greg owns more grand slam home runs than any other Sox batter; he has hit 5 in his career, his last Aug. 5, 1979 against Pittsburgh (off Bert Blyleven). He missed 74 games during the 1974 season following surgery to repair torn ligaments in his right knee.

MISCELLANEOUS - Reared in northwest suburban Prospect Hts., Greg starred in football, as well as baseball, at Notre Dame High School in Niles, IL. One of the most sought-after football prospects in the Midwest, he received 150 football scholarship offers his senior year in high school and appeared headed for the University of Kansas before signing with Philadelphia. He purchases \$20,000 in tickets each season for underprivileged children in a section at Comiskey Park known as the "Bull Ring" (He began the program several years ago in Philadelphia).

1981 SEASON - A veteran infielder, Pete Mackanin did a little of everything for the Minnesota Twins last season: he played first base (10 games), second base (31 games), shortstop (28 games), third base (4 games), was a designated hitter (6 games), and did some pinch hitting (9 games). He got a dramatic game-winning RBI Aug. 27 against the Tigers; in the bottom of the 9th inning with 2 outs and the bases loaded, Pete singled off Detroit relief pitcher Dave Tobik to drive-in 2 runs and give the Twins a come-from-behind 4-3 victory. Mackanin also hit a pinch homer for the Twins in '81, Aug. 11 vs. Oakland to drive-in 2 runs. The Chicago native obviously enjoyed White Sox pitching last season; he hit .364 vs. the Sox in 4 games (4-for-11), but his favorite foe was Boston; he hit .417 vs. the Red Sox (5-for-12).

CAREER - Mackanin made a comeback in 1980 after almost seeing his major league baseball career end in 1979; he appeared in only 13 games in '79 because of bone chips in the elbow of his throwing arm. However, he came back to play in 108 games for Minnesota in 1980, the most games he had appeared in since 1976. He was platooned at second base most of the season, but also appeared in 30 games at short, 4 games at first, and 3 at third base. As a pinch hitter, Pete batted .333 with 5 hits in 15 at-bats. His most productive day in the big leagues, came July 10, 1980 in Seattle's Kingdome; he went 4-for-5 to lead the Twins to a 12-4 victory. Pete was signed to his first pro contract by the Washington Senators' organization in 1969, and made his major league debut with the Texas Rangers (formerly Washington Senators) in 1973. After 2 brief appearances with the Rangers in '73 and '74, he was traded to the Montreal Expos in December of '74,

along with pitcher Don Stanhouse in the deal that brought Willie Davis to the Twins. Sent to Denver in 1978, Pete's contract was picked-up by Philadelphia at the end of the '78 season, and he appeared in 5 games with them down the stretch. Then in '79, arm trouble struck and he spent most of the year on the Phillies' Disabled List.

MISCELLANEOUS - Born and reared on Chicago's Southside, not far from Comiskey Park, Pete graduated from Brother Rice High School after attending St. Gall Elementary School. He played Pony League, Little League, and Connie Mack baseball, playing on the same Connie Mack team that former Sox pitcher Ed Farmer had played on previously. Pete attended the University of Illinois/Circle Campus for 2 years in the off season in the business program.

1981 SEASON - Acquired during the second half of 1981, the White Sox are counting on Lynn McGlothen to shoulder a big load in the Sox bullpen in 1982. Arriving on Chicago's Southside after 3½ seasons with the Cubs, Lynn was sent immediately to the Sox' bullpen and made 11 appearances, all in relief, during the remainder of the season. Although his ERA was not sensational (4.09), he had the best efficiency percentage among Sox relief pitchers, allowing only one inherited base runner to score, and allowing no home runs in his 21 innings pitched for the Sox. In fact, he gave-up only one home run in a total of 77 innings all season for both teams. He pitched very well for the Sox in August and September, allowing runs in only 2 of 6

appearances, with a 2.03 ERA in August over 13.1 innings.

CAREER - The 10-year major league veteran has proven very versatile over his career, working both as a starter and in relief in both leagues. Signed originally by the Boston Red Sox in 1968, he made his major league debut with them in 1972. Acquired by St. Louis in 1974, he started 97 games for them in 3 seasons, compiling a 44-40 record for the Cardinals. A member of the National League All-Star Team in 1974, he accomplished an unusual feat in 1975: he struck-out 3 consecutive batters in one inning on 9 pitches. Traded to San Francisco in 1977, Lynn spent most of the '77 season on the Disabled List because of a shoulder injury. He was obtained by the Cubs June 15, 1978 for Hector Cruz and cash, and was one of the Cubs' top starters in 1979, leading the team in strike outs (147) and tying team mate Dennis Lamp for first with 6 complete games. One of the highlights of McGlothen's big league career was July 4, 1972—he pitched a 3-hitter against Minnesota for his first major league victory.

MISCELLANEOUS - McGlothen attended both Grambling (LA) high school and Grambling College, and was one of the best prep athletes in the State of Louisiana during his high school career. He earned 16 letters in 4 different sports (baseball, football, basketball, and tennis), was the Louisiana state high school tennis champ 3 years in a row, a member of the all-state football team in his senior year, and lost only 2 baseball games as a pitcher during his entire prep career.

1981 SEASON - Bobby Molinaro was the White Sox number one pinch hitter in 1981, leading the team in just about every pinch hit category: pinch appearances (44), pinch at-bats (34), pinch hits (9), pinch RBI (9), pinch game-winning RBI (2), walks (8) and pinch sacrifice flies (2). In addition, he led the club in on-base percentage as a pinch-hitter (.405) and hit the team's only pinch home run of the season (at Toronto Aug. 23). Molinaro started out the 1981 season looking like the greatest pinch hitter in the history of the game; in his first 11 pinch appearances of the season, he walked 7 times, got 2 hits, hit a sacrifice fly, and reached base on a very questionable error. He was not successfully retired as a pinch hitter until his 12th appearance, May 15 vs. Texas. "Molly" isn't totally pleased with his role as a pinch hitter, but he concedes, "... It's not a role I'd choose to take, it's the role that's been given to me ... but on a contending team, a pinch-hitter who can come through consistently is worth his weight in gold."

CAREER - Bobby played as both a designated hitter and pinch hitter in 1980 for the White Sox and did an outstanding job in both roles; he hit .319 as a "DH," 4th in the American League, and hit .333 as a pinch hitter (7-for-21). He also led the 1980 Sox with 18 stolen bases, and in one game swiped 3 bases (Aug. 29 at Cleveland). Bobby is in his second tour of duty with the White Sox. His contract was purchased by the White Sox in September of 1977 from the Detroit Tigers, then after spending all of the '78 season with the Sox, tore-up the American Association as an outfielder with the Iowa Oaks in 1979 before being sold to the Baltimore Orioles Aug. 31. He was re-acquired by the White Sox in October of '79. At Iowa during that season, he was the MVP of the Oaks, hitting .328, smacking 13 homers, driving-in 93 runs, and stealing 50 bases. Molinaro was selected #2 by the Detroit organization in the June, 1968 Free Agent Draft, and labored 10 years in the Detroit farm system, making one brief appearance in the majors with the Tigers in 1975 (6 games). During his years in the minors, Bobby hit over .300 in 5 different seasons and stole 20 or more bases 6 different seasons. Molinaro's first major league hit was a triple off Luis Tiant in 1975.

MISCELLANEOUS - Bobby seriously considered quitting pro baseball after the 1975 season; he spent that winter working as a blackjack dealer in a Las Vegas casino, but was lured back to baseball by the Tigers in 1976. He graduated from Essex Catholic High School (Newark, NJ) where he was an all-star outfielder. As a prep star, he played against Richie Zisk of the Seattle Mariners, who was in the same conference. Bobby served 6 years in the New Jersey National Guard.

1981 SEASON - Jim Morrison returned to his original position in 1981—third base—and while doing a yeoman's job in the field, struggled most of the season to get his bat in gear. After being the Sox' everyday second baseman in 1980, Jim was back on familiar ground at third, but turned in the worst batting average of his major league career (.234). After getting off to a slow start, he began to get on-track in June, and was hitting .303 for the month, with a home run and 6 RBI, when play was halted. Morrison got off to an even slower start the second half, but things started to fall into place the final month of the season when he hit .263, with 5 homers (half his season total) and 11 RBI in 30 games. In spite of struggling with the bat, he still wound-up with 10 homers for the season, tied for 2nd on the club.

CAREER - Jim was the White Sox' most outstanding everyday player in 1980; he appeared in all 162 games, led the team in hits (171) and doubles (40-3rd best total in the American League), and tied for the club lead in homers with 15. In addition, he recorded 2 4-hit games and set the Sox' one-game season high with 5 RBI in a game May 10 at Texas. He also put his name in the trivia books by tying a strange record set originally by former major leaguer Cookie Rojas: most at-bats in one season (604) without hitting a triple. Jim's acquisition by the White Sox halfway through the 1979 season proved to be the best deal of that year for the Southsiders: in just 67 games he belted 14 homers (2nd best on the team) and had a slugging percentage of .508. Highlight of his '79 season was Sept. 27 when he went 5-for-5 at Minnesota and smacked a 2-run homer in the 10th inning to give the Sox a 4-2 win. Jim was hitting .320 with 22 homers for Oklahoma

City in '79 when acquired by the Sox. He made his big league debut with Philadelphia in 1977, hitting .429 in 5 games, and appeared briefly again with the Phillies in '78. Signed originally by the Phillies in 1974, Jim led the Carolinas League with 20 homers in his sophomore year as a pro. In 5 minor league seasons, he belted 87 home runs.

MISCELLANEOUS - Morrison, a highly sought player as an amateur, was drafted by Pittsburgh twice (January, 1972 and June, 1972), but did not sign until 2 years later when selected by Philadelphia in June of 1974. "MVP" of his team at Georgia Southern College in 1974, he owned a career batting average of .343 with 21 homers and 134 RBI in 2 collegiate seasons. He completed his education after becoming a pro, receiving his degree in 1975. An oddity in Jim's career stats: although he has hit only 2 triples in his entire major league career (1,249 at-bats), his 40 doubles in 1980 were the most by a Sox infielder since 1942 when second baseman Don Kolloway hit the identical number.

1981 SEASON - For Fran Mullins, 1981 was only half a season. Struck on the right wrist by a pitch in the final days of last spring training, he suffered a chip fracture, and was sidelined for more than 6 weeks. Scheduled to be the starting shortstop for the Edmonton Trappers, the White Sox' top farm club, he didn't get to see any action until late May. Mullins got into 77 games in '81, collecting 8 homers and 28 RBI, and is still considered by the White Sox to be a very bright prospect for a major league uniform.

CAREER - Fran made his major league debut with the White Sox in 1980, only his 2nd year as a pro. He spent most of the year at Glens Falls, the Sox "AA" class team, and Iowa, then the Sox "AAA" affiliate, and proved equal to the task as a sophomore pro; he collected 18 homers and 74 RBI in 112 games with both clubs, and earned a September trip to Chicago. In 21 games with the parent club that fall, he proved that defensively, he could

hold his own in the majors. After signing his first pro contract in '79, he was assigned immediately to "AA" ball, and hit .268 in his first year as a pro.

MISCELLANEOUS - Fran graduated from the University of Santa Clara in 1979 after an all-star baseball career there. Named MVP of his college team in his sophomore year, he was originally drafted by Detroit in June of 1978 (the same draft in which the Tigers selected Kirk Gibson). He elected to stay in school, but signed in '79 when drafted by the White Sox. Mullins received his degree in accounting, and during the off-season works for Price, Waterhouse in San Jose. Fran was an all-conference baseball and basketball player at St. Mary's High School (Berkley, CA), and lettered in tennis as well. Scouting reports began early on Mullins; he was MVP of his elementary school baseball and basketball teams, and hit .615 at a 10-year-old Little League for the Monclair (CA) Lions.

1981 SEASON - Wayne Nordhagen led the White Sox in hitting last season with a .308 average (2nd best figure of his major league career), but appeared in only 65 games thanks to the shortened season and sharing outfield duties with Harold Baines. Highlight of his season came June 9 at Comiskey Park when he hit an inside-the-park home run, the first by a Sox batter at home in 8 years, to drive-in 2 runs and lead the Sox and Richard Dotson to a 3-0 shut-out win over Toronto. An oddity: Wayne's inside-the-parker came 8 years to the date that Ron Santo hit the Sox' last inside-the-park homer in 1974. Wayne pounded most pitching staffs

last year (he hit .300 or better against all but 4 opposing teams), topped by a .750 mark against Milwaukee (3-for-4). He hit over .400 against 2 clubs: .471 against Toronto (8-for-17) and .444 against Texas (4-for-9). Overall, he batted .336 vs. the entire Eastern Division in '81. Over his major league career, Wayne's favorite staff has been Baltimore; going into 1982, he is batting .324 against the O's, with 7 homers and 24 RBI in 33 games. Demonstrating he doesn't like to be platooned, Nordhagen, who was the Sox' best hitter against left-handed pitching in 1980 with a .303 average, in 1981 was the Sox' top hitter against right-handers, hitting .308 against them (41-for-133) in 36 games. vs. lefties in '81, he hit a mere .307 (23-for-75).

CAREER - Nordhagen has hit .300 or more in 3 of the 6 seasons he has been in the majors. In 1980, he tied for the club lead in home runs (15) and game-winning RBI (10), led the club in most pinch-hits (6), and as a designated hitter pounded-out a .442 slugging percentage. He enjoyed his major league highs in almost every offensive department in '80: games (123), at-bats (415), runs (45), hits (115), doubles (22), triples (4), homers, and RBI (59). In 1979, Nordhagen did everything except sweep out the ball park; he was an outfielder, designated hitter, pinch hitter, caught a few games, and even made 2 appearances as a pitcher. He caught in 5 games, and appeared as a relief pitcher May 27 vs. California and June 4 vs. Milwaukee (pitching a total of 2 innings, he gave-up 2 runs on 2 hits in his first appearance and no runs or hits in his second appearance). Wayne celebrated his birthday in 1979 by driving-in 4 runs in a game at Cleveland. Signed originally by the Yankees in 1968, Wayne saw service in 4 different organizations before breaking into the majors with the White Sox in 1976. The Yankees traded him to the Atlanta system in 1973, and he spent time in the Cardinals' and Phillies' organizations before coming to the White Sox. He was on the International League All-Star Team in 1974 after hitting a minor league high 16 homers.

MISCELLANEOUS - Although an outfielder throughout his pro career, Wayne has caught in a total of 25 games in 5½ seasons in the big leagues with the White Sox. Although born in Minnesota, he grew up in Oregon, attending Treasure Valley Community College (Ontario, OR) and Portland (OR) State University where he played both football and baseball. His off-season home in Valencia, CA is in the shadow of Dodger Stadium.

1981 SEASON - The White Sox are looking to Tom Paciorek to supply additional punch to the 1982 line-up, after coming off the finest season of his major league career. Paciorek was the second best hitter in the American League in 1981, batting .326, and recording 13 game-winning RBI (also second best in the A.L.). He also ranked 3rd in the league in doubles (28) and total bases (206). His .326 season batting average set an all-time Seattle Mariner season record, and as a result, he was named Seattle's "Most Valuable Player" by the Seattle chapter of the BBWA. In 1981, Tom also made his first appearance on the American League All-Star team, delivering a pinch single in his only trip to the plate.

CAREER - Selected in the 5th round of the June, 1968 Free Agent Draft by the Los Angeles Dodgers, Paciorek spent 8 seasons in the Dodger organization, and was named "Minor League Player-of-the-Year" by *The Sporting News* after batting .307 and slamming 27 home runs with 107 RBI for the Dodgers' "AAA" class team at Albuquerque, New Mexico in 1971. He made his major league debut with the Dodgers in 1970, and after brief appearances with the big club in 1970 and '71, he made it to the major leagues to stay in 1973. He was traded to the Atlanta Braves in November of 1975 as part of a 6-player deal, hitting .290 for the Braves in 1976. Signed by Seattle part way through the 1978 season, he batted .299 in 70 games for the Mariners that season, and despite being selected by 3 teams in the Re-Entry Draft that fall, returned to Seattle, where he hit .287 in 1979. Tom's home run production increased dramatically the past 2 seasons: he hit 15 homers in 1980 and 14 in 104 games last season.

MISCELLANEOUS - An accomplished mimic, Tom was the star of the Seattle Mariners' promotional campaign the past 2 seasons, and was easily Seattle's most popular player. Not only a 2-time All-American on the University of Houston's baseball team, Paciorek also earned honorable mention All-American honors as a defensive back for Houston's football team. As a result, he was drafted by the Miami Dolphins on the 9th round of the 1968 American Football League draft. Although he wore uniform #14 most of his major league baseball career, Tom chose to wear #44 with the White Sox, his college football number. Tom is not the only athlete in his family; brother Mike played in the Dodgers' system, brother Jim was a star outfielder for the University of Michigan, and brother John signed a pro contract with the Houston organization.

1981 SEASON - Reggie Patterson, a youngster the White Sox consider to have a very bright future, made his major league debut in only his 3rd season as a pro. Aug. 13, 2 days after his contract was purchased from the Sox' Edmonton, Canada, farm club, Reggie found himself standing on the mound in Fenway Park in Boston as the starting pitcher. His debut was short, just 1.2 innings, and came to an end when an old pro, Carl Yastrzemski (who is 19 years older than Patterson) homered. To his credit, Reggie came back 2 days later at Baltimore and pitched 3 innings of shut-out ball for the White Sox. Patterson spent the first 2/3rds of the 1981 season as a member of the starting rotation for the Edmonton Trappers, the Sox "AAA" farm club, where he was 10-8 with a 3.31 ERA, the best ERA and second best win total on the club. He also led the club in complete games (6) and tied for second in starts (20) and strike-outs (79).

CAREER - After just 2 seasons of pro ball, the young pitcher attended his

first major league spring training camp a year ago. His overall minor league won-loss record in just under 3 full seasons is 27-21, and he has been under .500 only once with 5 different minor league clubs.

MISCELLANEOUS - Reggie was "discovered" by Sox scout Sam Hairston (father of Sox outfielder Jerry Hairston) while playing in a summer league in Bessemer, AL in 1979. He graduated from Jess Lanier High School (Bessemer) in 1977 after being captain of both his baseball and basketball teams his senior year. Patterson throws a wide assortment of breaking pitches, and credits an older brother, Robert, with teaching them to him. Robert was signed by the Boston Red Sox organization as a pitcher in 1971, but suffered a severe leg injury the result of an auto accident following the '71 season and was unable to return to pro ball.

1981 SEASON - Greg Pryor continued in his role as "Super Sub" for the White Sox last season, playing third base, a little shortstop and even a few games at second base, as well as pinch hitting. Greg appeared in the fewest games ever since breaking into the major leagues with the Sox in 1978, but that was more because of the shortened season than any other factor. He played 28 games at third base, while also spelling Bill Almon at short, and Tony Bernazard at second base. Greg does not relish the vital role he has filled for the Sox the last 3 seasons, but Manager Tony La Russa describes Pryor as "the best all-round utility infielder in the American League." His situation may be a dilemma for Greg, but as far as the White Sox are concerned, he is a key member of the team.

CAREER - Pryor is not exactly known as a home run hitter (he has 6 in his major league career) but the highlight of his 1980 season was a pinch home run at Comiskey Park July 6 in the bottom of the 9th inning which gave the White Sox a 5-4 come-from-behind victory over Oakland. As in 1981 and '80, Greg played all 3 left side infield positions for the Sox in '79; appearing in a career high 143 games, he played in 119 at short, 25 at second, and 22 at third base, frequently playing 2 positions in the same game. He set his

1981 SEASON - Rick Seilheimer completed his 3rd season in pro ball last year, while turning just 21 late in the season. He was the regular catcher for the Glens Falls (NY) White Sox, the best team in the White Sox minor league system in 1981. The Glen Sox won both halves of the North Division of the Eastern League going away, finishing the year with a 94-52 record, 42 games over .500. Rick's season batting average was almost exactly what it was the previous season, but his hit and home run total was off slightly from 1980. Though just a youngster, Seilheimer continues to improve both behind the plate and as a batter and is considered a major league prospect.

CAREER - Rick made his first appearance in the major leagues at the ripe old age of 19. That was July 5, 1980 at Comiskey Park. He made 21 appearances for the White Sox during the middle of the '80 season, and—at the time—was the youngest player in the major leagues. 1981 SEASON - Anyone who has watched the White Sox the last couple of years knows it, but it took a little time for the rest of the baseball world to realize it, and the result was that Mike Squires was named winner of the "Gold Glove" at the end of the 1981 season as the best fielding first baseman in the American League. He committed only 6 errors in 793 total chances for a .992 fielding average. In addition, Mike completed a spectacular double play against the Yankees in Yankee Stadium Aug. 19 in the 8th inning to preserve a 6-5 Sox win. In that play, New York batter Rick Cerone hit a potential double play grounder to shortstop Bill Almon; Bill tossed the ball to second baseman Tony Bernazard who forced the runner from first at second for out number one, but Bernazard's relay to Squires at first was wide of the mark; Mike dashed back toward the wall, fielded the errant throw off the wall, and fired the ball to home plate to cut down Yankee runner Reggie Jackson, who was trying to score the tying run from second base, for the final out of the inning. Offensively, Mike fell off at the plate in 1981, although he continued to be the toughest White Sox hitter to strike-out, whiffing only 17 times in 294 at-bats. He also found Minnesota and Texas pitching to his liking; he hit an even .500 vs. the Twins (7-for-14), and .400 vs. the Rangers (6-for-15). Squires hit .312 the first half of 1981, but fell to .214 the second half.

CAREER - Mike continues to be among the toughest batters in the Ameri-

can League to strike-out; in his major league career, he has fanned only 77 times in 1,150 at-bats, or only once every 14.9 times. In 1980, he had his best season batting average in his major league career to date (.283), while committing only 5 errors in 977 total chances for a .995 fielding percentage, 3rd best in the American League behind only Bruce Bochte (.996) of Seattle and Cecil Cooper (.997) of Milwaukee. In 1980, he did not commit his first error until Aug. 12, his 83rd game of the season. Squires established himself as a major leaguer in 1979, batting .264 for the season (.279 the second half) and finishing 3rd on the club with 15 stolen bases. In 1978, Squires batted .312 for the Iowa Oaks, the Sox "AAA" farm club, and set a club record by hitting safely in 33 consecutive games. In 1976 at Iowa, Mike went 76 straight games without an error and led all American Association first basemen in fielding. He was a member of the Southern League All-Star Team in both 1974 and '75; in '74 he set a league fielding record with a .996 percentage, and in '75 he batted .304 for Knoxville to be named "MVP" of the league. In 9 seasons of professional baseball, Mike has committed an average of only 5.6 errors a season, or only one error every 22.2 games.

MISCELLANEOUS - Also known as "Spanky," Mike is a candidate for Ripley's "Believe It or Not;" he caught in 2 games for the Sox in 1980 (May 4, 7), to become the first left-handed catcher to perform in the majors since Dale Long caught 2 games for the Chicago Cubs in 1958. Squires hopes to have the opportunity to manage after his playing career, and Manager Tony La Russa says of Mike, "He has a good head for the game, that's an asset." Squires attended Kalamazoo (MI) Valley Community College and Western Michigan University, playing baseball all 4 years, and was captain of his football and baseball teams at Kalamazoo (MI) Central High School.

Trappers. With the Trappers, he swiped 51 bases in 123 games to lead the club, and rank 4th in that department in the Pacific Coast League. Leo was called-up to the parent club in September, and appeared in 11 games toward the end of the season.

CAREER - Leo made his major league debut in 1980, and what a debut it was; called-up to the Sox August 10, Leo hit safely in his first 5 major league games in a row, including 5 hits in his first 8 major league at-bats. He went on to hit safely in 10 of his first 11 big league games. But the first major league game in which he appeared will remain one of the highlights of his career: he singled in his very first big league at-bat, August 11 off Rudy May in Yankee Stadium. And that wasn't the end of it. In that first game, he went 2-for-3, stole his first major league base and sacrificed successfully in the 9th inning. Not a bad beginning. Leo has stolen at least 29 bases in 5 of his 6 pro seasons: 51 in both 1981 and '78, 49 in '77, 30 in '79, and 29 in 1980. In all, he has purloined a total of 229 bases in 6 pro seasons, an average of 38 a year.

MISCELLANEOUS - The White Sox selected Sutherland in the secondary phase of the January, 1976 draft after the Cleveland Indians drafted him originally in 1975, but failed to sign him. Leo attended Golden West Junior College (Huntington Beach, CA) after graduation from Garden Grove High School, where he was Orange County (CA) "Player-of-the-Year" and All-Southern California player. Leo and his family came to the United States from Cuba after that island nation had been cut-off from the rest of the world, but he prefers not to discuss how they came to the U.S.

1981 SEASON - Last season was an up-and-down one for the talented young left-hander as consistency eluded him all year long. He finished the season above .500 (8-7), and at times was brilliant. Early in the second half, he went 10 straight appearances (8 starts, 2 relief stints) without allowing more than 3 runs in an appearance, covering 61.2 innings. After giving-up 5 home runs in the first half of the season, he only allowed 2 in

55.1 innings the second half of the year, and in fact, only allowed one home run from May 24 to Sept. 23 (that one homer was by New York's Lou Piniella June 11) covering 69.1 innings. Steve was among American League ERA leaders when play was interrupted June 11; he owned a 2.73 mark and a 5-3 record in 69.1 innings. Steve equaled his one-game strike-out high twice during the season, whiffing 7 batters April 24 at Detroit, and 7 more May 18 at Toronto. Trout's favorite opponent in '81 was Boston; he had a 0.84 ERA and a 2-0 record vs. the Red Sox in 10.2 innings. Additionally, he had ERA's under 2.00 against 3 other foes: Minnesota (1.59), Cleveland (1.80), and Texas (1.80). Steve has one of the best moves to first base of any pitcher on the White Sox staff, and that helps keep runners close to the bag; because of that Sox catchers had the best caught-stealing ratio when Trout was on the mound last year; 4 of 6 would-be stealers were gunned down when he was pitching.

CAREER - Steve has been a regular member of the White Sox starting rotation almost from his first day in the majors in 1979, although he has also worked in relief along the way. In 1980, Trout was second on the staff in innings (199.2), and third in wins (9), starts (30), complete games (7), and strike-outs (89) while leading the staff with a pair of shut-outs. He also claimed the staff one-season record for consecutive shut-out innings with 27 (July 1-13). Steve was almost involved in a double no-hitter during '80; July 13 at Comiskey Park he and Rudy May of the Yankees locked-up in a double no-hitter for 7 innings. Steve eventually lost the game 3-1, but not before completing a spectacular doubleplay. Steve's first extended stay in the major leagues came in 1979 when he was called-up May 5 to remain the rest of the season. Up briefly in '78, he posted a 3-0 record in his first big league action.

MISCELLANEOUS - Born in Detroit, Steve grew-up in south-suburban South Holland, IL while his father, former major league star Paul "Dizzy" Trout, worked in the White Sox front office. One oddity: "Dizzy," who spent most of his major league career with the Detroit Tigers, was a right-hander—Steve is a southpaw. There are those who think the nickname "Dizzy" also applies to Steve, but only one to a family, he is stuck with the nickname his teammates at Thornwood High School (South Holland) hung on him: "Rainbow."

In 1971, White Sox pitcher Wilbur Wood made 14 starts with only two days rest, winning 8 of those games and losing only 4; he tossed 11 complete games of those 14 and his ERA was 1.86 over that span.

On May 9, 1975, pitcher Jim Kaat set a new White Sox record when he won his 12th consecutive game; Kaat started the streak Sept. 4, 1974. It surpassed the previous club record of 11 straight, originally established by John D. Rigney in 1939 and equalled by Gary Peters in 1963.

WHITE SOX PLAY CUBS IN 1982 "HALL OF FAME GAME"

The Chicago White Sox are scheduled to play in the annual "Hall of Fame Game" Monday, Aug. 2 (2:00 p.m. EDT) at Cooperstown, NY, and for the first time in the history of the annual exhibition game, they will play the Chicago Cubs. A SHORT HISTORY OF THE WHITE SOX

The Chicago White Sox are a charter member of the American League. Charles Albert Comiskey—son of the first head of Chicago's City Council and itinerant pitcher, first baseman and manager—moved the St. Paul, MN franchise of the Western League to Chicago to play in 1900. The league was re-organized and re-named the "American League" in 1900, but was not recognized as a "major" league until the following year. Despite a howl of protest from the established National League team in Chicago, Comiskey adopted the name "White Stockings" for his new team. The National League club had been known as the "White Stockings" for many years, but had dropped the nickname several seasons earlier.

Comiskey's new franchise got off to an auspicious start in 1900, and again in 1901. The White Stockings won the league title in 1900 with an 82-53 record, and then came back to win the first "official" American League pennant in 1901 with an almost identical record (83-53). The first game ever played in the American League was in Chicago April 24, 1901, as the White Sox (as they were then called) defeated Cleveland 8-2 in a one-hour, 30-minute game in front of a reported 14,000 at the Sox' home grounds (then on 39th Street between Wentworth and Princeton, leased from the Chicago Cricket Club). The White Sox first manager was Clark Griffith, later to become owner of the Washington Senators.

SOX HAD MANY FIRSTS

There were many other interesting "firsts" by the White Sox in those early years: Herm McFarland and "Dummy" Hoy hit grand slam home runs in the same game May 1, 1901 to become the first batters in the American League to hit grand slams—and the Sox have not hit 2 grand slam homers in the same game since. Jim Callahan, later to become manager of the Sox, pitched the club's first no-hitter Sept. 20, 1902, beating Detroit 3-0. The first World Series was played in 1903, but the Chicago nine suffered through a couple of "down" years before making their first appearance in the Fall Classic in 1906, and that Series proved to be the one-and-only meeting in a World Series between the Chicago cross-town rivals in the history of baseball to date. The White Sox, setting the pattern that was to be their style for many decades to come, finished the 1906 season second in the American League in pitching, and dead last in hitting. The Cubs were heavy pre-Series favorites, but the "Hitless Wonders" of the Southside took the World Series 4 games to 2. The White Sox won the American League pennant again in 1917, and defeated the New York Giants in 6 games—and little did Sox fans know at the time that would be the last World Champion for the Southside, as least through the 1981 season.

A LONG DRY SPELL

Many famous personalities wore the White Sox flannels through their early years including "Big Ed" Walsh, Griffith, Ed Collins, Harry Hooper, Fielder Jones, "Doc" White, Lee Tannehill, Nixey Callahan, and many more. But their deeds were over-shadowed by the heartbreaking experience of the infamous "Black Sox" scandal, when several members of the Sox were found guilty of conspiring with gamblers to lose the 1919 World Series (although the scandal was not uncovered until the end of the 1920 season). Eight players were eventually expelled from baseball for life, and that scandal had a tremendous bearing on the club's fortunes for an extended period. It would not be until 1957 that a White Sox team would again finish as high as second place.

From 1957 through 1967, the White Sox again became a highly respectable team by establishing a .500 or better won-loss record every one of those seasons, through the '67 campaign. During that era, names like Nellie Fox, Louie Aparicio, Minnie Minoso, Billy Pierce, Sherm Lollar, Al Smith, Gary Peters, Joel Horlen, Jim Landis, Dick Donovan, "Jungle Jim" Rivera, Early

Wynn, Eddie Stanky, and Al "The Señor" Lopez grabbed Chicago's sports headlines. Lopez, whose teams finished second or better in 6 of his 9 years as a White Sox manager, brought joy back to Southside fans by giving them the club's 5th American League pennant in 1959, the first pennant for a White Sox team in 40 years (and last, to present day). It was a happy era for White Sox fans, despite the fact that the "Go-Go Sox" lost the World Series to the Los Angeles Dodgers in 6 games.

"THE SEÑOR" LEFT VOID

Following 1967 and the departure of "The Señor" from the Sox, there was a demise both on the field and at the gate. The low-water mark came in the dismal 1970 season when the White Sox recorded the worst won-loss record in baseball (56-106), and season attendance plunged to its worst since 1942 (496,355). But toward the end of that season, a pair of changes were made in the management of the club that were to signal the dawn of a new era of excitement on Chicago's Southside: Roland Hemond was hired as director of player personnel, and Chuck Tanner was hired as field manager. The team was very active in the off-season and the 1971 White Sox team that took the field on Opening Day was unrecognizable to the few fans who remembered what the 1970 team looked like. In addition to a raft of new faces, Tanner made two significant changes involving players already in place; he moved Bill Melton from right field to third base, and converted relief pitcher Wilbur Wood to a starting role. Melton went on to win the American League home run crown in '71 with 33 homers, the first modern Sox hitter to win a league home run title, and Wood went on to post 20 or more wins for 4 seasons (22, 24, 24, 20).

The pinnacle of Tanner's reign at the helm of the White Sox came in 1972, when the newly-acquired slugger Richie Allen led the Sox to 2nd place in the American League Western Division, the first time they had finished that high since the final year of Al Lopez' command (1965), and they broke a

million in attendance (1,186,018) for the first time in 7 years as well. And what a year Allen had: not only did he belt 37 home runs to set a new White Sox record, but he led the American League in home runs, RBI (113), and in slugging percentage (.603) to be named the league's "Most Valuable Player." Tanner was named "Manager-of-the-Year" and Hemond "Major League Executive-of-the-Year" because of the rapid turn-around.

But alas, financial troubles once again plagued the ownership of the White Sox, and after the great promise of '72, the team once again began to fade. Money troubles reached such great proportions in 1975 that it appeared for a time the White Sox might be moved out of Chicago. The team, and its fans, were saved that fate late in 1975 when the irrepressible Bill Veeck rode into town at the 11th hour and put together a group to purchase the team and give Veeck the opportunity of a "second go-round" with the team he owned in 1959 and '60. Player salaries began their historic escalation in 1976, and Veeck turned to his now-famous "Rent-a-Free-Agent" scheme that gave Sox fans a flash of brilliance in 1977. That year, Hall-of-Fame pitcher Bob Lemon led the White Sox, stocked with one-year free agents such as Oscar Gamble, and Richie Zisk, to a 3rd place finish in the American League West. The slugging White Sox, the most potent Sox team since the teams of the early 70's, pounded-out 192 homers, led by Oscar Gamble's 31, Richie Zisk's 30 and Eric Soderholm's 25. Tissue-paper thin financing once again caught-up with the White Sox when the team was unable to retain many of the players that sparked them in '77, and Veeck ran out of mirrors with which to stock the team. The club went on the sale block in late 1980.

Veeck left White Sox fans with a legacy, however, in the persons of the new dynamic ownership of Jerry Reinsdorf and Eddie Einhorn, the knowledge and experience of Roland Hemond, and a young, but very talented manager in Tony La Russa. Only one being in this universe knows for certain what the future holds; but barring the unforeseen, the years ahead never looked brighter for the White Sox and their fans.

COMISKEY PARK—HOME OF RICH TRADITION



Comiskey Park has a unique distinction—it's the oldest park in the major leagues, housing a hunk of the rich tradition of Chicago's robust Southside, and it's also the site of the newest in baseball entertainment. Completed in 1910, the 71-year-old ballpark received a major facelift this past winter, including the installation of a full color Diamond Vision scoreboard, creation of 2 new seating areas, replacement of more than 5,000 seats, construction of new dugouts, new auxiliary scoreboards, and construction designed to improve sight lines in the lower deck box seats. Estimated cost of the improvements has been set at \$8,000,000.

Other improvements on the drawing boards, but not included in last winter's construction schedule involve additional restrooms, additional concession stands in the upper deck, and "Supersuites" in the upper deck.

Installation of the Diamond Vision scoreboard is certainly the most dramatic change at Comiskey Park over 1981. The full-color scoreboard contains a color video display board, along with a full matrix message board. Diamond Vision offers a full-color instant replay and slow motion function, along with live pictures and television programming capabilities. It is described by its manufacturer, Mitsubishi Electric America, as the most sophisticated system yet installed in the United States.

Only one Diamond Vision scoreboard was in operation in 1981, that at Dodger Stadium. This season, Seattle's Kingdome and Shea Stadium in New York are scheduled to have Diamond Vision boards in operation as well as Comiskey Park.

COMISKEY PICKS A SOUTHSIDE SITE

Comiskey Park today is certainly a long way from the vision Charles Comiskey had in his mind when he moved the St. Paul franchise of the Western League to Chicago in 1900 to form the Chicago franchise in the newly organized American League. Comiskey wanted a ballpark on 39th Street and Wentworth Avenue (Wentworth contained a major north-south streetcar line from Chicago's "Loop" to the far Southside). He leased land near that site which was owned by the Chicago Cricket Club. The White Stockings (as they were known originally) played there for 10 years, while Comiskey attempted to purchase the site. Finally giving-up on that attempt, Comiskey purchased vacant land at 35th and Shields from the estate of

Chicago's first mayor, John Wentworth, and appointed a committee to study plans for a new park. One member of the committee was Ed Walsh, the White Stockings' premier pitcher of the day, and Walsh's influence is said to be responsible for the park's generous outfield dimensions. The original dimensions were 362 feet down the foul lines and 420 feet to straight-away center field—a pitcher's park if ever there ever was one.

The park, originally named "White Sox Park," was constructed in great haste in early 1910, and opened its doors officially July 1, 1910 with a seating capacity of 35,000. Comiskey, aware of his working class following, was careful to include a generous mix of "cheap" seats at 25c. The Sox opened their new park July 1 by losing 2-0 to the St. Louis Browns, with Ed Walsh the losing pitcher, before a crowd that was estimated at 24,000 paid, 28,000 total, an exceptionally large crowd by that day's standards. The first home run hit in the new park was by the Sox' Lee Tannehill July 31, 1910, a grand slam against Detroit.

During its first decade of existence, Comiskey Park (as it had become known by 1913) was host to 3 consecutive World Series in 1917, '18, and '19. The Sox were in the 1917 and '19 Series, and the Cubs leased Mr. Comiskey's new edifice when they took part in the 1918 World Series.

GEHRIG, RUTH DICTATED CHANGES IN MID 1920'S

The first major changes took place in the mid-1920's when the popularity of the New York Yankees, led by Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig, always drew overflow crowds. After the 1926 season, the original wooden bleachers were torn down and replaced with a permanent steel and concrete structure, the outfield pavilions were double-decked, and the present bleacher structure was built. Original plans called for a seating capacity of 55,000 but fire codes held it to 52,000.

Doupledecking of the outfield pavilions created interest in how far a ball would have to travel to clear the roof, and a surveyor's team reckoned a drive would require a ground-to-ground distance of at least 474 feet to clear either the left or right field roof. It didn't take long for Gehrig and Ruth to make history in the new renovated park. Gehrig hit the first homer ever into the new pavilion in the expanded park in the very first Yankee series (May 7, 1927, a grand slam off Ted Lyons), and Ruth hit the first homer over the pavilion roof later that same season (Aug. 16 off Tommy Thomas). (Gehrig hit the second homer ever over the roof 2 years later off Red Faber, May 4, 1929.) The first home run into the new bleachers did not come for 11 years; Hank Greenberg hit it May 27, 1938.

In all, 20 home runs have been recorded that cleared the roof, and only 4 have ever been hit into the centerfield bleacher seats. (It is 440 feet to the wall of the bleachers, and the wall is 11 feet high).

ONLY MINOR CHANGES MADE IN LATER YEARS

In 1934, the infield was moved out toward the outfield by 14 feet to provide Al Simmons with a better shot at the fences. Later, inside fences in the left and right fields were tried in 1949 and again in 1969 and '70, but abandoned. A fence in center field reducing that distance from 440 to 400 feet was erected in 1949, taken down in 1976, and re-installed for the 1981 season. To their credit Bill Melton (1971) and Dick Allen (1972) won their American League home run crowns with the park's basic 1927 dimensions. The late Sherm Lollar holds the record for most career home runs in Comiskey Park (66 in his 18-year career).

The first night game was played at Comiskey Park Aug. 14, 1939, and the foe was the same one that helped open the structure 29 years earlier, the St. Louis Browns. The center section of the bleachers was blocked-out in 1947 to provide a better background for hitters, and the first electric scoreboard was installed in 1951. The now-famous "Exploding Scoreboard" was installed by Bill Veeck to open the 1960 season.

Comiskey Park, as it stands today, is essentially in its 1927 state. Many millions of dollars have been spent over the years to maintain it and improve comforts, and the main concourse—likened by a visiting journalist to that of a carnival midway—with its many ethnic restaurants, bars and festive atmosphere, help maintain the peculiar Southside Chicago flavor that has made it as much fun to visit for itself, as to watch the White Sox do battle with American League opponents.

DON DRYSDALE

Former Brooklyn and Los Angeles star Don Drysdale joins the White Sox for the first time in 1982. Don compiled a 209-167 record with a career 2.95 ERA in 14 major league seasons with the Dodgers. A 9-time, National League All-Star pitcher, he took part in 5 World Series, and in 1968 set a major league record by throwing 6 straight shut-outs, a total of 58.2 scoreless innings. Drysdale has been broadcasting California Angels games and has been a regular on ABC's weekly baseball telecasts the past few seasons. He joined ABC in 1977 and has worked baseball, college football, and World Series telecasts for the

network. He began his broadcasting career with the Montreal Expos in 1970.

Better known as "Hawk," Ken Harrelson is also a newcomer to White Sox broadcasts. Harrelson helped lead the Boston Red Sox to the American League pennant in 1967, then became a folk hero in Boston when he hit 35 home runs and drove-in 109 runs the following season. He had come to the Red Sox in '67 as a free agent player following a celebrated feud with Charley Finley. The Red Sox traded him to Cleveland in 1969, setting-off such a furor that Red Sox fans picketed Fenway Park. A broken leg ended his career in 1971. After a whirl on the pro golf tour, Harrelson joined the Red Sox

broadcast team in 1975, and has delighted Boston fans the past 7 years with his colorful and often pointed analysis of Red Sox baseball.



JOE MCCONNELL

One of the most experienced sportscasters in the business, Joe McConnell returns to the White Sox for his 3rd season. An Indiana native, Joe had been the voice of both the Minnesota Twins and the Minnesota Vikings of the NFL before moving to Chicago. As well as doing play-by-play for the White Sox, Joe has been the voice of the Chicago Bears since 1977. Joe has also broadcast Denver Broncos games and on the collegiate level, Indiana State University. A man with a versatile background, McConnell also has on his credits play-by-play reporting of the Indiana Pacers and Phoenix Suns of the NBA, has been heard

on live coverage of the famed Indianapolis 500 motorcar race, and other auto races. He has also broadcast golf tournaments nationally.

The name of Early Wynn is no stranger to Chicago White Sox fans even though he will be in the Sox broadcast booth for the first time. Wynn was a member of the last White Sox team to win an American League pennant (1959), and in doing so, he posted a record of 22-10 that season to win the "Cy Young Award" as the best pitcher in the league, the only White Sox pitcher ever to win the award since its inception. Wynn played in 4 decades (1930's, 40's, 50's, 60's) posting his 300th win in 1963 with Cleveland at the age of 43. Elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1972, "Gus" was a pitching coach for Cleveland and Minnesota, as well as working as a minor league manager and major league scout before launching his broadcasting career in 1976 with the Toronto Blue Jays. Early is a perennial favorite on the winter banquet circuit.

DID YOU KNOW...

Bob Elson, the long-time voice of the White Sox, is one of the few broadcasters enshrined in the Hall of Fame. Elson broadcast his first Sox game in 1932, and described nearly 7,000 games before leaving after the 1971 season. His only absence from the Sox mike was for 4 years during World War II when he rose to the rank of commander in the U.S. Navy, thus earning the affectionate nickname that would follow him the rest of his life.

FREE AGENT DRAFT REGULATIONS

FREE AGENT DRAFT RULE — A BRIEF SUMMARY: Major League and National Association clubs meet twice a year for the purpose of drafting free agent player talent. Selection of a free agent entitles the club to the exclusive right of negotiation with that player for a specified period (from date of selection until 15 days prior to next draft meeting).

There are two phases to each draft meeting:

(1) Regular Phase — Clubs choose in inverse order of major league standings, selecting free agents and previous draftees who had not signed contracts but had instead enrolled in four-year colleges and since had either completed his junior year or become 21 years of age. . . Each organization may select only one player for each of its major league, AAA and AA rosters but is not limited to the number of picks for "A" level. . . Minor league clubs select in the same relative order as their parent clubs.

(2) Second Phase — Selection of free agents who had been drafted previously but who had not signed contracts before the negotiation right expired (except those draftees who had enrolled in a four-year college and had since graduated or become 21 years of age — now drafted in Regular Phase). . . It is possible for a club to redraft a player whom it had been unable to sign after the original selection, but only with the express written consent of that player. . . The order of selection is by lot with the 26 major league clubs divided into two 13 team groups with the groups alternating having first selections in respective drafts.

HOW TO DETERMINE . . .

BATTING AVERAGE — Divide the number of at bats into the number of hits.

BATTING & PITCHING (ERA) CHAMPION — To qualify, a player must have 502 or more plate appearances; 162 or more total innings pitched.

CONSECUTIVE HITTING STREAKS — A consecutive hitting streak shall not be terminated if the plate appearances results in a base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or a sacrifice bunt. A sacrifice fly shall terminate the streak.

EARNED RUN AVERAGE — Multiply the number of earned runs by nine; take the number and divide it by the number of innings pitched.

FIELDING PERCENTAGE — Divide the total putouts and assists by the total of putouts, assists and errors.

GAME WINNING RBI — The run batted in that gives a club the lead it never relinquishes.

MAGIC NUMBER — Determine the number of games yet to be played, add one, then subtract the number of games ahead in the loss column of the standings from the closest opponent.

RULES MOST ASKED ABOUT . . .

AMERICAN LEAGUE CURFEW RULE — All night games must be called at 1 a.m. local time. But if an inning is started prior to 1 a.m. city time, it can be completed.

SUSPENDED GAME RULE — A game terminated by curfew or by a prearranged time limit is a suspended game if it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e., 4½ or 5 innings) (Rule 4.10).

A game terminated by light failure or malfunction of a mechanical field device under control of the home club is a suspended game any time after it begins.

Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension immediately preceding the next scheduled, single game between the two clubs on the same ground . . . if this is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in American League Regulation 4.12 . . .

Any LEGAL game called due to weather with the score TIED is a tie game and must be replayed in its entirety.

NIGHT GAME — Any game scheduled to start after 6 p.m. will be considered a night game. If a game is scheduled to start at 6 p.m. and is delayed for any reason, it will be considered a day game. If a game is scheduled to start at 6:01 p.m., it will be considered a night game. Two-night double-headers shall be included in double-header statistics and shall be considered two night games. When afternoon and night games (separate admissions) are played on the same date, the games shall be day and night and count as single games.

PLAYER LIMITS — 40 until Opening Day, when the number must be reduced to 25 until September 1, when it again becomes 40.

DISABLED LIST — Pitchers must be on for a minimum of 21 days. All other players may be placed on a 15 day list.

DESIGNATED HITTER RULE — A hitter may be designated to bat for the pitcher in any spot in the batting order in any game without affecting the status of the pitcher. The designated hitter must be selected and be included on the lineup cards presented to the umpire-in-chief prior to the game. The DH is "locked" into the batting order but may be removed for a pinch-hitter or pinch-runner, who in turn becomes the DH. The DH, while still in the game, may be used defensively but the pitcher then assumes the batting order of the replaced defensive player, thus terminating the DH role.

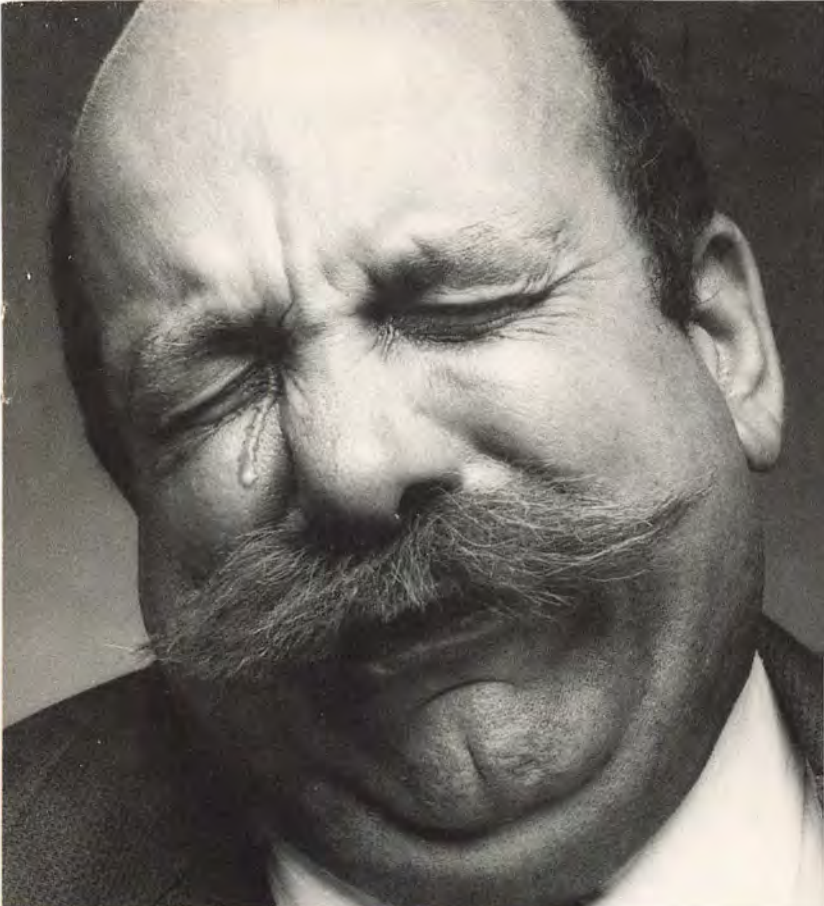
