Marge Schott, the First Lady of Cincinnati baseball, saw her dreams come true in 1990. Her Cincinnati Reds went "wire-to-wire" to win the National League Western Division championship and then went on to capture the N.L. pennant, followed by a stunning World Series sweep over Oakland.

The Reds became the first N.L. team to be in first place every day in a 162-game season.

Mrs. Schott led the Reds' World Series victory parade and celebration at Fountain Square in downtown Cincinnati and she headed the Reds' contingent honored by President Bush at the White House following the Series.

While providing the leadership and financial support needed to build a winning team, Mrs. Schott has helped bring back the excitement of Reds baseball to Riverfront Stadium. The Reds have drawn more than 12 million fans to Riverfront in her six years as the club's principal owner. Season ticket sales have reached new highs.

Providing Reds' fans with quality entertainment has been the top priority during her tenure as owner of the Reds. Mrs. Schott, a native and sixth

generation resident of Cincinnati, had been a Limited Partner in the team since 1981 and then became the General Partner of the ownership group on Dec. 21, 1984. She became President and Chief Executive Officer on July 8, 1985.

In addition to the enjoyment of watching the Reds on the field, Mrs. Schott has had some thrills away from the stadium as well. In 1989, she had lunch at the White House with President Bush; was a special honoree at a Women in Business luncheon during the President's Inauguration Week festivities; and made a baseball visit to Japan.

Among other highlights were a 1988 visit to the Vatican, where she presented the Pope with a Reds' jacket; a feature interview on the highly regarded "60 Minutes" TV show; and a salute by Savvy Magazine as the operator of one of the 40 largest businesses in the country to be headed by a woman.

In Dec. 1986, she was among 85 women entrepreneurs from all over the country who were honored by President Reagan at a White House reception. Earlier that year, she was named Woman of the Year by the American Legion Auxiliary at its

national convention. Mrs. Schott was singled out for having made significant contributions to community life. She was inducted into the Complex Women's Hall of Fame for women in sports in 1987.

Mrs. Schott was inducted into the Ohio Women's Hall of Fame in Nov., 1985, for her achievements in business, industry and athletics. A year earlier, she was honored as one of the 1984 Women of the Year in Cincinnati, cited for her role as hostess for the Reds' Rally, a major fund-raiser for the Children's Heart Association at Children's Hospital, and for her work with the famed Cincinnati Zoo.

Mrs. Schott became a businesswoman by necessity when her husband, Charles, died in 1968, leaving her in charge of a business empire that included such divergent holdings as an auto agency, cement, truck and brick companies and real estate holdings. She has since added holdings of her own.

It took her 2 1/2 years to convince General Motors to make her the first U.S. woman ever to be awarded a major metropolitan area G.M. dealership. Later, she became the first woman ever named to the board of trustees of the Cincinnati Chamber of Commerce.

Mrs. Schott is only one of two women currently involved in primary ownership of a major league baseball team, joining Mrs. Jean Yawkey of the Boston Red Sox, who took over the team upon the death of her husband.

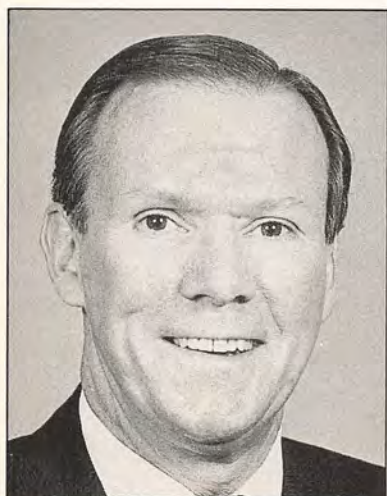

Schott works actively with Mrs. Schott and oversees all of the Reds' operations. He joined the club in Sept., 1988 after four years as an investment banker on Wall Street in New York City. He is a Senior Vice President of Shearson Lehman Hutton/American Express, where he continues as a member of their Chairman's Council and Director's Council. He also served previously on the Executive Council of Drexel, Burnham and Lambert. A native of Cincinnati, Schott played football at Denison University in Granville, OH. He received his degrees in Broadcasting and Legal Studies. He continued his studies abroad in the Business program at Warnborough College in Oxford, England. Schott is currently a Director on the State of Ohio Sports & Law Commission, where he serves as an advisor and lecturer on baseball arbitration and free-agent negotiations. Stephen also serves on the advisory board of the Cincinnati Sports & Events Commission where he is an advisor on the development and the future of Sports and major events in Cincinnati.

BOB QUINN

Vice President & General Manager



Quinn's first year in Cincinnati was a resounding success. He was a key architect in building the 1990 World Champion Reds and his efforts were rewarded with his selection as Major League Executive of the Year by The Sporting News — selected in a poll of his peers. After joining the team on Oct. 13, 1989, Quinn engineered trades that brought relief ace Randy Myers, infielders Hal Morris and Bill Doran, and outfielders Billy Hatcher and Glenn Braggs to the Reds. Bob's extensive baseball background began with two years (1959-60) as GM of the Eau Claire team. After several years in private business, he returned to baseball as GM of the Reading Phillies (1967-68) & the Omaha Royals (1969-1970). He was named Class AA Executive of the Year by The Sporting News in '67 and American Association Executive of the Year in '69. Quinn joined the Milwaukee Brewers as Director of Minor League Operations in 1971. He spent 12 years with Cleveland, beginning in 1973 as Director of Minor League Operations. He was promoted VP/Player Development & Scouting in 1980. Quinn joined the N.Y. Yankees in Sept. 1986, as Assistant VP and was promoted to VP/Baseball Administration the following month. He was VP & GM in June, 1988. Quinn's grandfather, J.A. Quinn, was GM of four major league teams. His father, John, was GM of the Boston and Milwaukee Braves for 23 years and the Philadelphia Phillies for 13 years. A graduate of Marquette University, Quinn was born in Boston. He and his wife, Kathryn, have two sons, Mike and Bob.

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A Symbol of Champions

The 1990 Cincinnati Reds proved to the baseball world that a championship club doesn't always have to end the season with a bang. In fact, last year's Reds team ended the season with a ring.

World Championship rings are the pride and joy of thousands of professional athletes. Some athletes, like Ted Williams and Ernie Banks, play their entire careers setting numerous records, yet are unable to sport a championship ring.

The first championship rings appeared in 1922 when the New York Giants won the World Series. At that time, the rings were valued at approximately \$100. During the years 1923-1925, charms or watches were presented to the winners of the World

Series. Rings were given out again in 1928-1929, but a tie clasp was given in 1930.

World Championship teams often ask for special designs on the rings so they can be sure it is distinctive from all other rings. The sides of the rings (known as the shanks) can display some unique artistry, messages or symbols. An example of this can be drawn from the 1979 Pittsburgh Pirates team whose rings had the words "We are Family" and the Greek symbol \star (representing family) incorporated in the design of the rings. The 1984 San Diego Padres National League Championship ring has the phrase "Dreams Can Come True" on the shanks.

The two jewelry companies that have

manufactured the majority of championship rings for professional sports are Balfour and Jostens. Balfour, who manufactured the Reds' 1972, 1975 and 1976 World Series rings, also produced the 1990 ring. "The Cincinnati Championship ring is crafted in 10 karat yellow gold, spelling out Cincinnati Reds World Champions," said Bill Dolbier, Territory Manager for Balfour. "On the base, a red ruby with a gold Cincinnati 'C' logo contains 11 diamonds. One shank features the player's name and number, Riverfront Stadium and the phrase 'Wire to Wire,' reflecting Cincinnati's leadership position from Opening Day through the playoffs to the championship. The other shank features a ribbon emblazoned with the sweep score: 'C-4, A's-0'."





above the Major League Baseball Trophy and '9th,' indicating the ninth time Cincinnati has appeared in the World Series."

Through the years, many fascinating stories have circulated about lost or stolen rings. Lou Gehrig's New York Yankees Championship ring from 1936 was sold by a man named Thomas Horton for \$17,500. Horton's father, Dr. B.T. Horton, was the doctor who diagnosed Gehrig's amyotrophic lateral sclerosis at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota. Gehrig had given Dr. Horton his ring as a gift.

From 1932-1962, Frank Crosetti either played on or coached 17 New York Yankee World Championship teams. Instead of just adding to his collection of rings, Crosetti received five World Series shotguns, seven World Series watches, a World Series trophy and just four World Series rings. Crosetti was faced with a problem no man may ever be faced with again: too many championships. The World Series record for



most rings won by a player belongs to Yogi Berra, who won 10. He also received five rings as a coach and one Hall of Fame ring.

The 1926 St. Louis Cardinals were presented with their rings by Charles Lindbergh after his solo Trans-Atlantic flight. One of the Cardinals who received his ring from Lindbergh was Grover Alexander who shortly thereafter fell upon hard times. To offset some of these financial problems, Alexander was known to have had his ring hocked for cash. However, Rachel Breadon, the wife of Cardinal owner Sam Breadon, had asked all St. Louis pawn shops to notify her if Grover hocked the ring. She then bought it back and returned it to Alexander.

Mike Shannon, who played on the 1964 Cardinals World Championship



team, had his World Series ring blow off his hand while he was driving his car. He looked up in his rear view mirror in time to see his ring bouncing down the road. Lucky for Mike, the people at Balfour were able to repair it.

Gene Brabender, a Baltimore Orioles' pitcher in the 1966 World Series, used his ring for collateral for a loan. When he was unable to buy it back, the bank chose to foreclose on it. However in 1981, an anonymous buyer bought the ring and Brabender received it in the mail without any explanation.

"The rings represent the dreams of men and boys, love, happiness, fun, friendship and disappointment," said



Jerry P. McNeal one of the top authorities of championship rings in the country. "There is no greater fraternity than that of the professional athletes and they are bound together by one common goal: to wear the sports world's most sought-after symbol of achievement."

The 1990 Reds proved to the baseball world that winning a World Championship takes hard work, determination and the ability to believe in themselves when no one else would. The fans of Cincinnati will talk about the World Series for years to come and the players will cherish the moment for the rest of their lives. But when the cheering stops, and the financial rewards are gone, the memories of a dream season can be rekindled with a quick glance at a glittering reminder of "The Rarest Ring of All," the World Championship ring.

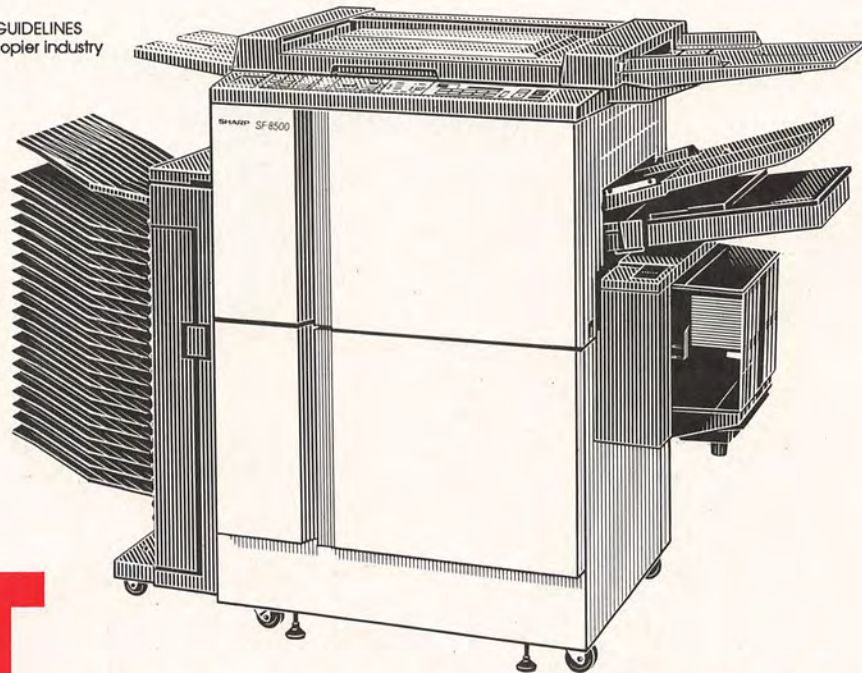

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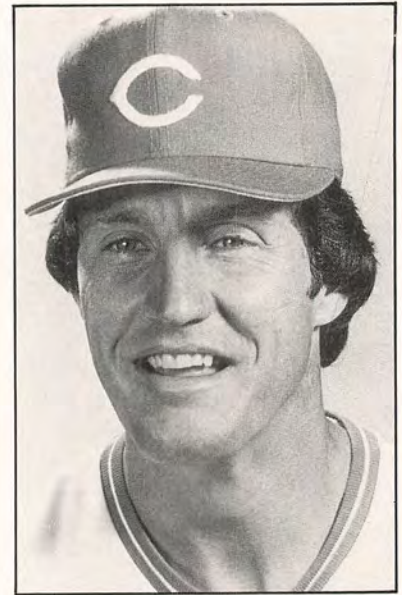
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Red Seat Home Runs

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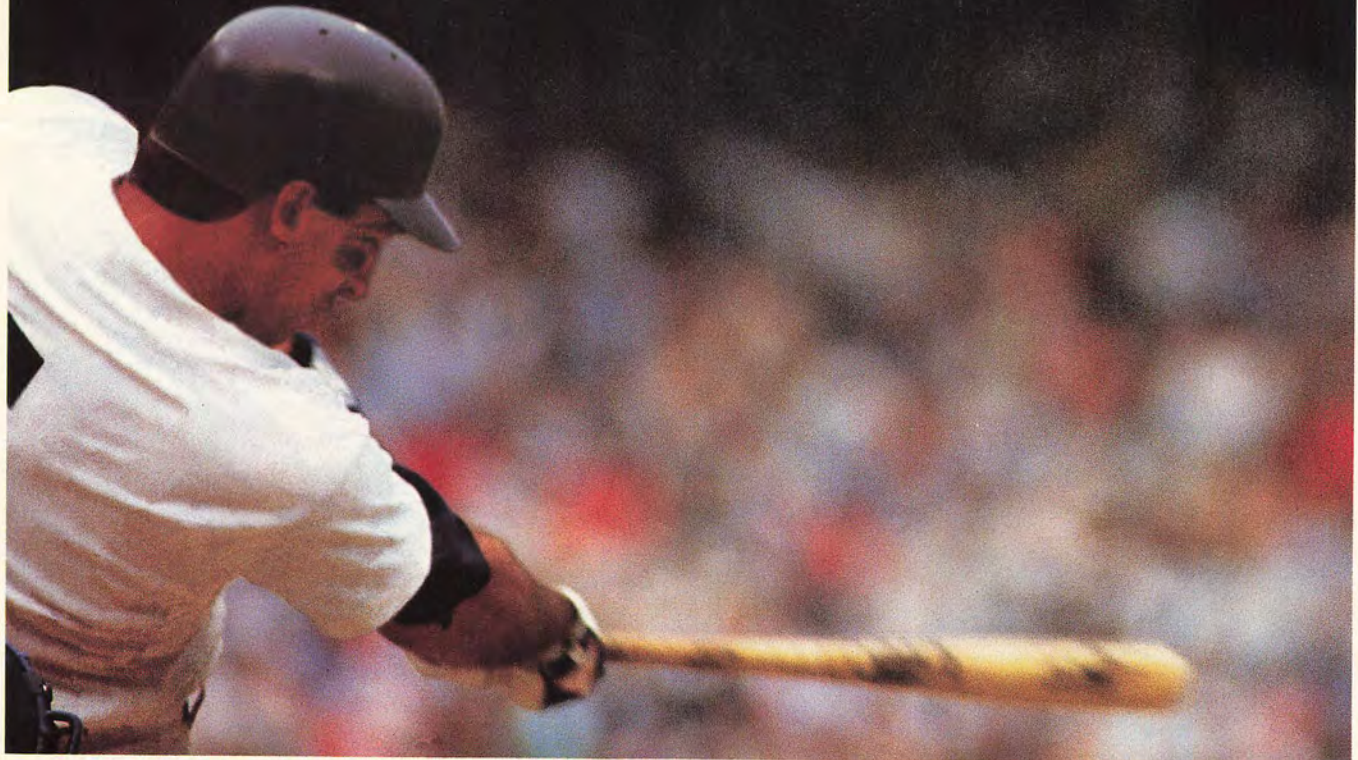

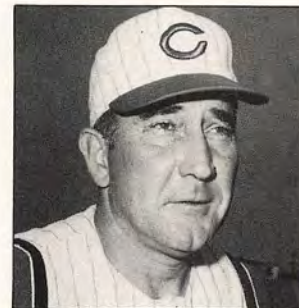

Retired Uniform Numbers

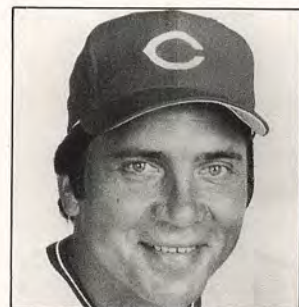
The Reds have officially retired two uniform numbers — the No. 1 worn by the late Fred Hutchinson and the No. 5 worn by Johnny Bench.

Hutchinson managed the Reds from 1959-1964, winning the National League pennant in 1961. His No. 1 was retired after he died of cancer in 1964.

Bench's No. 5 was retired Aug. 11, 1984. Bench played more than 16 seasons for the Reds and retired following the 1983 season as the team's all-time leader in career home runs (389) and runs batted in (1,376). He won two N.L. Most Valuable Player Awards (1970 & 1972); World Series MVP (1976); N.L. Rookie of the Year (1968); and he holds the National League record for career home runs by a catcher (327).

After spending his entire major league baseball career (1968-89) in the American League — first as a player and then as a coach, manager and front office executive — Piniella made the transition to the National League in 1990 with sensational results. He guided the Reds to their first Western Division title since 1979; their first N.L. pennant since 1976; and then a stunning World Series sweep over Oakland. The Reds set a team record by winning their first nine games and then stayed in first place the entire season to become the first N.L. team to go wire-to-wire in a 162-game season. When the Reds swept Oakland in the World Series, Piniella became the first manager whose team swept the Series in his first year with a club. His overall managerial record (Cincinnati & New York) is 315-264 (.544).

As a player, Lou hit over .300 seven times in his 18-year big league career, while compiling a .291 lifetime average. He hit .319 in 22 World Series games and .305 in 18 American League Championship Series games. He was American League Rookie of the Year in 1969 as an outfielder with the Kansas City Royals.

Lou was named Reds' manager on November 3, 1989.

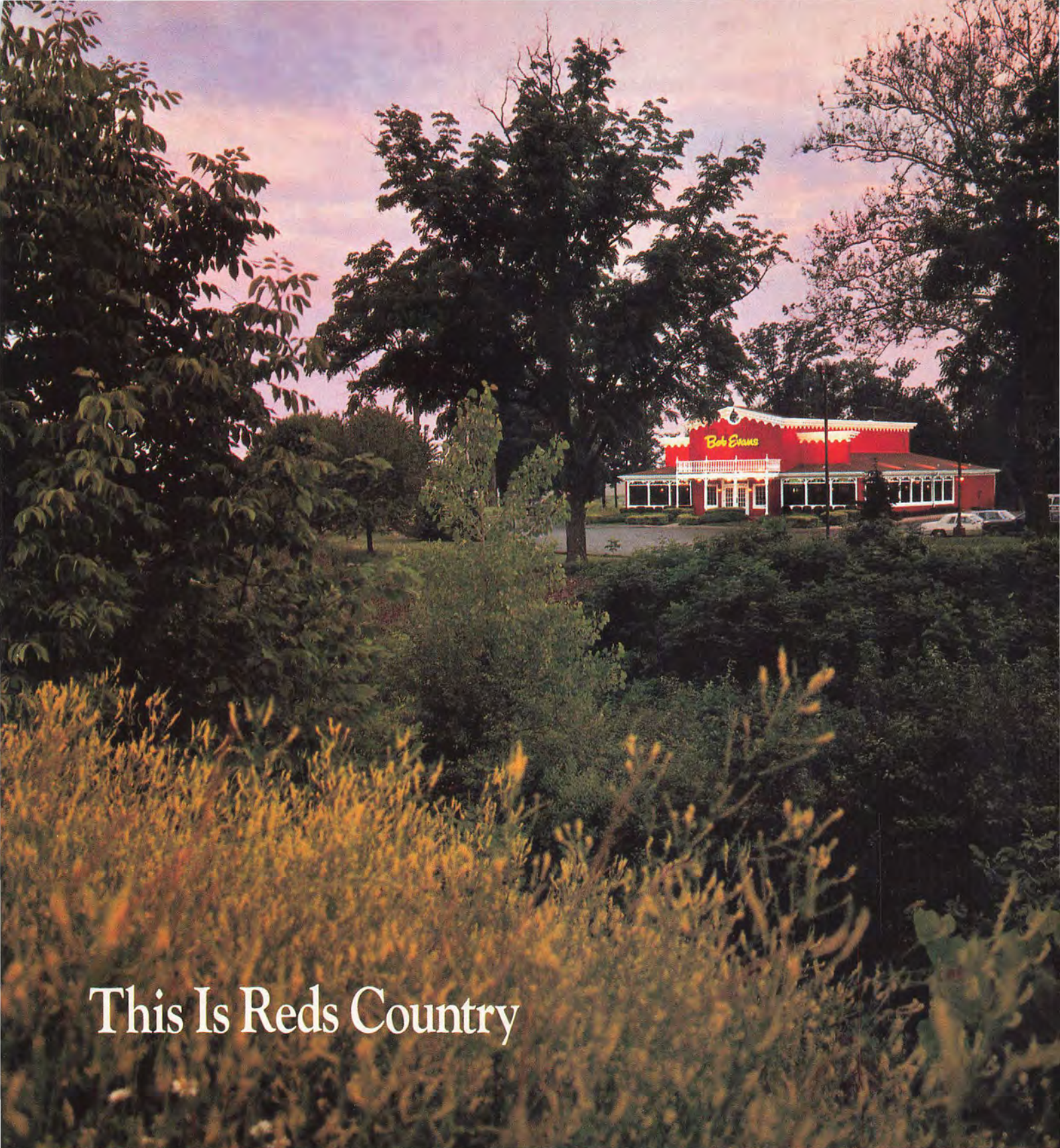

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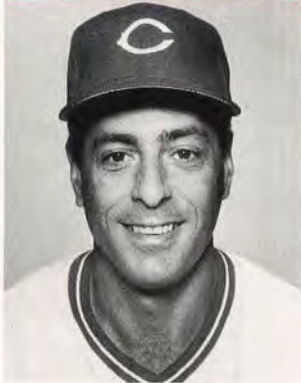

24 Tony Perez

Perez is in his fifth season as a Reds' coach. He was the first base coach in 1987, the hitting coach in 1988 and 1989, and now has both jobs. Tony's 23-year big league playing career included 16 seasons with Cincinnati (1964-76, 1984-86); three with Montreal (1977-79); three with Boston (1980-82); and one with Philadelphia. His 379 career homers tied Orlando Cepeda for the major league record among Latin-American players. A first baseman during most of his career, Tony ranked among the Reds' all-time Top Five in games, at-bats, hits, doubles, homers, extra base hits, total bases and RBIs when he retired. Tony was the picture of consistency, collecting at least 90 RBIs in every season from 1967-1977. Tony and his wife Pituka live in Santurce, Puerto Rico.



2 Sam Perlozzo

Sam was named third base coach of the Reds on Nov. 8, 1989, after spending three seasons as third base coach for the New York Mets. Prior to that, he managed in the Mets' farm system for five seasons, where his teams won 3 championships and never had a losing record in compiling an overall record of 364-263 (.581). Perlozzo was Carolina Manager of the Year in 1983, when his Lynchburg club won the regular season and playoff titles. He was selected Texas League Manager of the Year in 1984 by Baseball America after directing Jackson to the regular season and playoff titles. Sam was an infielder in pro ball from 1973-81, playing in the majors with Minnesota in 1977 and San Diego in 1979. Sam lives in Cumberland, MD.



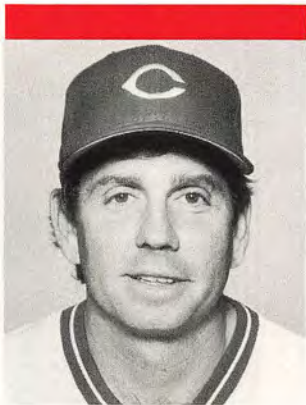
35 Stan Williams

Williams returned to the Cincinnati organization in 1990 as the team's pitching coach, a position he previously held in 1984 under manager Vern Rapp. Except for the 1984 season, Stan was with the N.Y. Yankees as a scout or coach every year since 1979. Williams worked with the Yankee pitchers when Lou Piniella managed the team in 1987 and 1988 and was the Yanks' pitching coach from 1980-82, when Piniella was still active as a player. Stan pitched in the big leagues with the Dodgers, Yankees, Indians, Twins, Cardinals and Red Sox, winning 109 games. He pitched in the 1959 World Series for L.A. and was named to the 1960 N.L. All-Star team. Stan and his wife Elaine live in Lakewood, CA.



4 Jackie Moore

Moore was named dugout coach for the Reds on Nov. 8, 1989, after 3 seasons as third base coach for the Montreal Expos. Jackie has been a major league manager or coach since 1970 with Milwaukee (1970-72), Texas (1973-76, 1980), Toronto (1977-79), Oakland (1981-86) and Montreal (1987-89). He began his managing career with Boston farm teams at Jamestown, NY, in 1968 and 1969. A former catcher, he played 11 years (1957-67) of professional baseball, including most of the 1965 season in the major leagues with Detroit. Jackie and his wife Jo Ann live in Arlington, TX.



3 Larry Rothschild

Larry was named bullpen coach on Nov. 16, 1989. He served as a roving instructor in the Reds' farm system for the previous four seasons. Rothschild worked with young pitchers on the Reds' two Rookie and two Class A teams in 1986 and 1987 and expanded that to all six farm teams in 1988 and 1989. Larry pitched professionally from 1975-85, including two stints in the big leagues with Detroit (1981-82). He spent his first six years of pro ball in the Reds' farm system, and then was drafted by Detroit in December, 1980. After recording 15 saves at Evansville in 1981, he was called up to the Tigers late in the 1981 season, recording one save and a 1.50 ERA in five appearances. He and his wife Jane live in Great Neck, NY.

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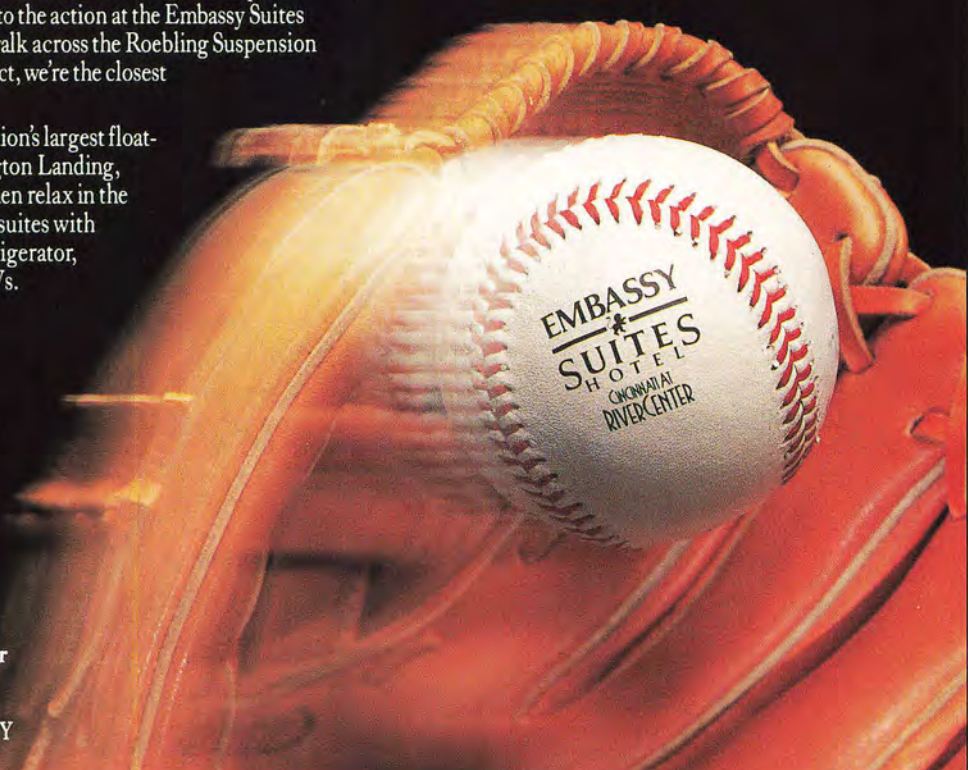

Rules of Interest

DETERMINING BATTING AVERAGE: Divide the number of at bats into the number of hits.

DETERMINING AN EARNED RUN AVERAGE: Multiply the number of earned runs by nine; take the number and divide it by the number of innings pitched.

DETERMINING SLUGGING PERCENTAGE: Divide the total bases of all safe hits by the total times at bat (At bats do not include walks, sacrifices, hit by pitcher, or times awarded first base because of interference or obstruction).

DETERMINING ON-BASE PERCENTAGE: Divide hits plus total walks plus hit-by-pitch by at bats plus total walks plus hit-by-pitch and sacrifice flies. (Times awarded first base on interference or obstruction are not figured into on-base percentage.)

DETERMINING PERCENTAGE OF GAMES WON AND LOST: Divide the number of games won by the total games won and lost.

CONSECUTIVE HITTING STREAKS: A consecutive hitting streak shall not be terminated if the plate appearance results in a base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or a sacrifice bunt. A sacrifice fly shall terminate the streak.

CONSECUTIVE-GAME HITTING STREAKS: A consecutive-game hitting streak shall not be terminated if all the player's plate appearances (one or more) result in a base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or a sacrifice bunt. The streak shall terminate if the player has a sacrifice fly and no hit.

CONSECUTIVE-GAME PLAYING STREAK: A consecutive-game playing streak shall be extended if the player plays one half-inning on defense, or if he completes a time at bat by reaching base or being put out. A pinch-running appearance only shall not extend the streak. If a player is ejected from a game by an umpire before he can comply with the requirements of this rule, his streak shall continue.

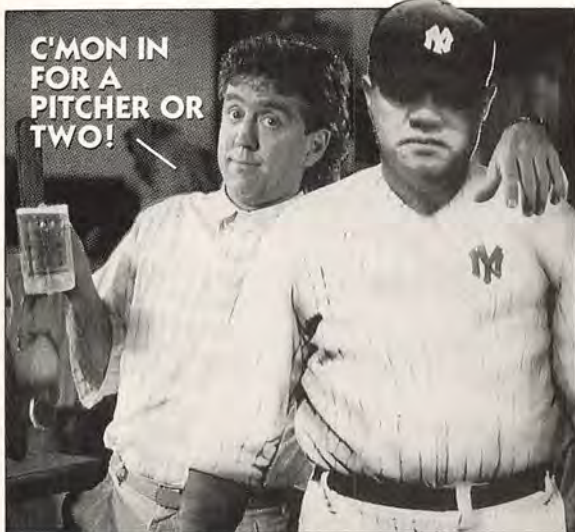
TRADING REGULATIONS: Players are available on waivers in reverse order of standings, at the time waivers expire, if more than 30 days after start of the season; otherwise in reverse order of standings at close of preceding season. Waivers are required for any inter-league or intra-league assignment during the period beginning Aug. 1 and ending at 5 p.m. EST. the day after the end of the season. During the other 10 months no waivers are needed.

BATTING AND ERA CHAMPION QUALIFICATIONS: 502 or more plate appearances. 162 or more innings pitched.

ROOKIE QUALIFICATIONS: A player shall be considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has (A) exceeded 130 at bats or 50 innings pitched in the major leagues; or (B) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a major league club or clubs during the period of the 25-player limit (excluding time in military service).

DETERMINING MAGIC NUMBER: To figure "Magic Number" in pennant race, compute the number of games yet to be played, add one, then subtract the number of games ahead in the lost column of the standings from the closest opponent.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR A SAVE: Pitcher is credited with a save when he meets all 3 of the following conditions: (1) he is the finishing pitcher in game won by his club; (2) he is not the winning pitcher; (3) he qualifies under one of the following conditions; (a) he enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitches for at least one inning; (b) or he enters the game with the potential tying run either on base or at bat or on deck; (c) or he pitches effectively for at least three innings.

Minor Miracles

Reds Honor Minor League Most Valuable Players

Every year, the Reds and Budweiser honor the Most Valuable Players from the Reds' six farm teams. The 1990 farm MVPs were Chris Hammond, Nashville pitcher; Adam Casillas, Chattanooga first baseman; Reggie Sanders, Cedar Rapids outfielder; Tim Pugh, Charleston (WV) pitcher; K.C. Gillum, Billings outfielder; and John Roper, Plant City pitcher.

Hammond, a 25-year-old lefthander, had a spectacular season for American Association Eastern Division Champion Nashville, going 15-1 with a 2.17 ERA and 149 strikeouts in 149 innings. He led all Triple-A pitchers in ERA and led the American Association in wins and strikeouts. He was selected the league's Most Valuable Pitcher. Hammond, who also pitched in the major leagues for the

Reds last season, was Cincinnati's No. 6 draft choice in January, 1986, out of Gulf Coast (FL) Community College. This is his second Reds Minor League MVP Award. He was Chattanooga MVP in 1988.

Casillas, 25, is also a two-time MVP, having previously earned the honor in 1989 at Cedar Rapids. A lefthanded hitter, Casillas led the Southern League (Class AA) in hitting this season with a .336 average for his second consecutive batting title. He led the Midwest League in '89 with a .321 mark. Casillas played college baseball at Oral Roberts University and was acquired by the Reds from the (independent) Salt Lake Trappers of the Pioneer League in September, 1987.

Sanders, 22, hit .285 with 17 homers, 63 RBIs and 40 steals for Cedar Rapids in the Class A Midwest League. He tied for second in the league with 89 runs scored; ranked 3rd with 213 total bases; tied for 4th in home runs; and tied for 10th in batting. He was selected by Midwest League Managers as the league's best prospect and he was named to the league's post-season All-Star team. Sanders was the Reds' No. 7 draft choice in June, 1987, out of Spartanburg Methodist College.

Pugh, a 24-year-old righthander, was 15-6 with a 1.93 ERA, 8 complete games and 154 strikeouts in 177.1 innings pitched for the Class A South Atlantic

League champion Charleston (WV) Wheelers. He led the league in wins and complete games; ranked 2nd in ERA and innings; and was 4th in strikeouts. He was named to the SAL's post-season All-Star team. Pugh was the Reds' No. 6 draft pick in June, 1989, out of Oklahoma State University.

Gillum, 20, hit .356 with 43 RBIs and 13 steals in 57 games for Billings in the Short-A Pioneer League. He set a league record with a 27-game hitting streak. The lefthanded hitter finished second in the league in batting; ranked 5th in hits; and was named to the Pioneer League post-season All-Star team. Gillum was the Reds' No. 5 draft choice in June, 1988, out of Westerville (OH) North High School.

Roper, an 19-year-old righthander, made his professional debut this season, going 7-2 with a remarkable 0.97 ERA and 76 strikeouts in 74 innings for Plant City in the Rookie Gulf Coast League. He ranked 2nd in the league in ERA; tied for 3rd in wins; and finished 4th in strikeouts. Roper was the Reds' 12th round selection in this summer's draft out of Hoke County High School in Raeford, NC.

The Reds' farm system MVP awards have been given annually since 1977. The winners, from 1977 through 1990, include 30 players who have played in the major leagues.

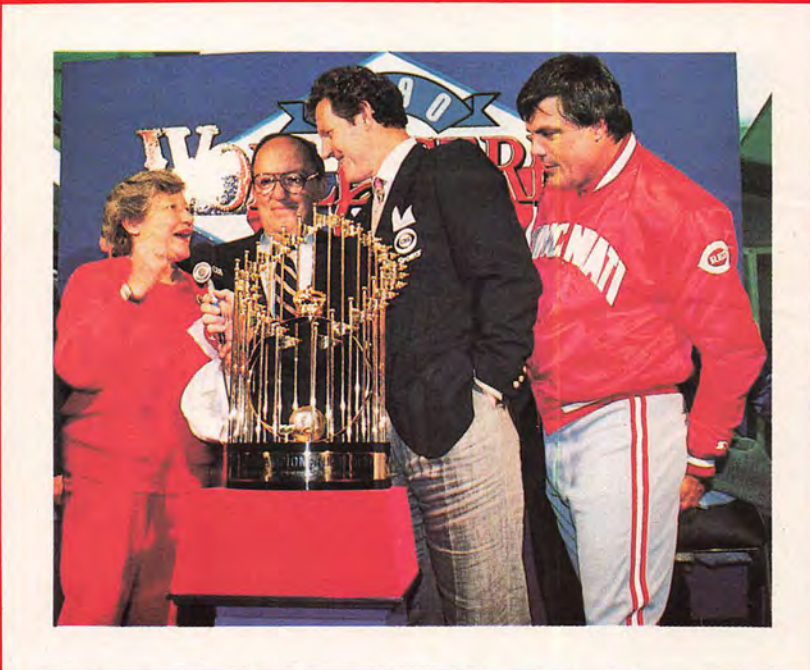

Riverfront Stadium

Alcohol Policy

The consumption of alcohol on Riverfront Stadium property (including inside motor vehicles) directly before, during and after Reds games is prohibited by law, unless it is purchased from Sportservice and consumed within the stadium. Removal of alcoholic beverages from inside the stadium is prohibited. Please don't drink and drive!

Autographs

Fans may seek players' autographs from the Blue Level seating area along the railing near the dugouts and field from the time the gates open until the end of batting practice. Fans with tickets from the Green, Yellow or Red Levels may "exchange" their tickets at the Green Level Customer Service Desk for an autograph pass. At the completion of batting practice, fans should turn in their autograph passes at the Green Level Customer Service Desk and have their tickets returned to them. (On certain special occasions, this practice will be suspended.) Players are not available for autographs after batting practice or between games of doubleheaders.

Banners

Banners and signs are welcome at Riverfront. They must be in good taste and they may not be hung or displayed on any part of the playing field or in any way that obstructs the view of anyone in the stands. An ideal location is the facade of the Green or Red seats, which can accommodate a four-foot deep banner. Banners cannot interfere with the sightline of the batter (the gray background behind the center field wall), the pitcher or umpire looking down the foul line. Reds management reserves the right to remove any banner or sign that is viewed to be in bad taste or is causing an obstruction.

Cameras

Fans are encouraged to take photos of their favorite Reds at Riverfront. Tripods, monopods, standing in the aisles or otherwise obstructing the view of others is not permitted.

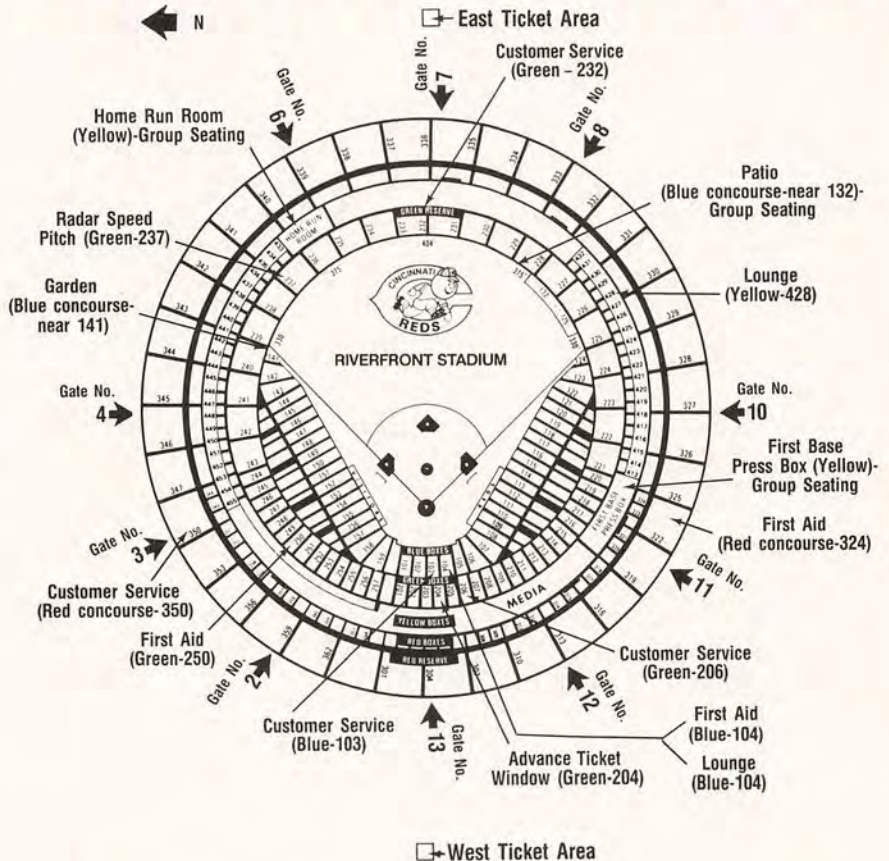
Carry-In Items

No cans, bottles or alcoholic beverages are permitted to be brought into the stadium. Plastic or thermos containers are permitted in the stadium, providing they can fit comfortably under a seat. To ensure the safety of fans, players and employees, carry-in items are subject to inspection.

Doctors and others expecting emergency phone calls should leave their seat locations at the Customer Service Desk on the Green Level behind aisle 206. Paging is not permitted.

Evacuation

It is very unlikely that fans will need to evacuate the stadium. However, if the need arises, please exit the seating area immediately upon request and proceed calmly and in an orderly manner to the nearest stadium gate or follow the directions of Reds personnel. Once you have exited safely, you will be instructed on where to proceed. Reds management strongly suggests that you familiarize yourself with the locations of stadium exits. If you have any questions or are in need of directions, please see your Reds usher or visit any of the Customer Service Desks.

First Aid Rooms

Three first aid rooms are in the stadium—on the Blue Level behind aisle 104, on the Green behind aisle 250 and the Red behind aisle 324. If you are unable to go to a first aid room, please inform any Reds employee, who will have the medical staff respond to your location. (In emergencies only)

Gates Open

Riverfront Stadium gates open 90 minutes before game time.

Ground Rules

Anyone who ventures onto the playing field or into a restricted area, throws objects or interferes with a ball in play will be prosecuted.

Hardee's Speed Pitch

Fans can test their throwing arms at the Hardee's Speed Pitch booth, located behind aisle 237 on the Green Level. Fans get three throws and receive a coupon from Hardee's. The Speed Pitch is the same equipment used by Reds scouts and by the TV networks. It is open before and during games.



Lost and Found

If you've lost something, or found something somebody lost, please go to a Customer Service Desk.

Parking

There is plenty of parking at and near the stadium. Three levels of the parking garage can accommodate 3,180 cars, while the Plaza Level has additional spaces for 100 buses and vans. Another 1,819 cars can be parked on surface lots to the east and west of Riverfront. Within a 12-block radius of the stadium, there are enough facilities to handle about 20,000 cars. There are 38 parking spaces on the plaza for handicapped persons. Rates for games are \$5.00 in the garage and \$3.50 on the surface lots. Parking for buses, campers and vans on the Plaza Level costs \$15.00 per vehicle.

Pass Out Checks/Exiting the Stadium

Once you have exited the stadium, you will not be permitted to re-enter without another ticket. Pass out checks are only issued in emergency situations. If it becomes necessary for you to leave the stadium, please visit any of the Customer Service Desks.

Plaza Parking

While purchasing tickets in advance, fans may park free on the Plaza until two hours before game time. The bus/taxi ramp leading to the Plaza is accessible from Main and Sycamore Streets (between Third and Fourth Streets) in downtown Cincinnati.

Rain Checks

If a game is postponed due to rain before it is officially completed, the Reds will exchange rain checks for tickets to a future regular season home game this season, subject to availability. Rain checks may be exchanged at Riverfront Stadium, the Gift Shop at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in downtown Cincinnati or by mail. See the back of the ticket for more information. If a game is postponed, fans will be promptly notified via the stadium public address system and scoreboard.

Safety

Please do not lean over any stadium railing or guide wire or stand on any stadium seat. Failure to observe this rule could result in serious injury to you or another person.

Scoreboard/Video Board

Riverfront Stadium, already home of one of the largest scoreboards in the country, added a 32' x 24' Sony JumboTRON color video replay board during the 1987 season as part of a 5.2 million dollar reconstruction of the entire scoreboard system. A production crew, ranging from nine to 11 members, operates the video board and scoreboard system from a control room that rivals that of a TV studio.

Taxi Service

Taxi service after Reds games is available on the west side of the Plaza. If you need assistance, please go to a Customer Service Desk. Please don't drink and drive!

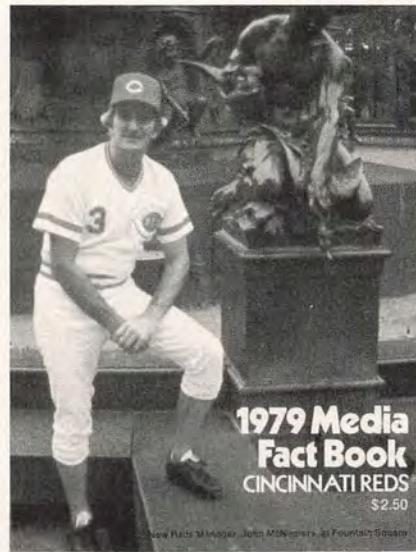
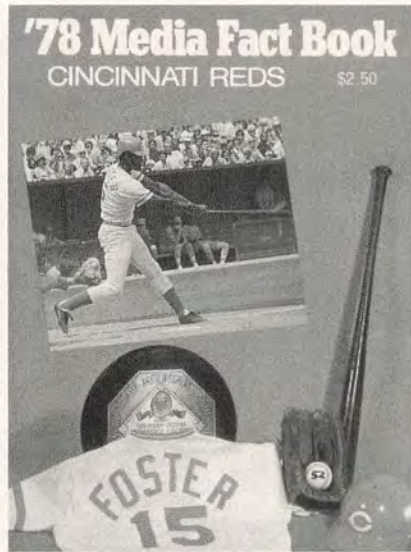
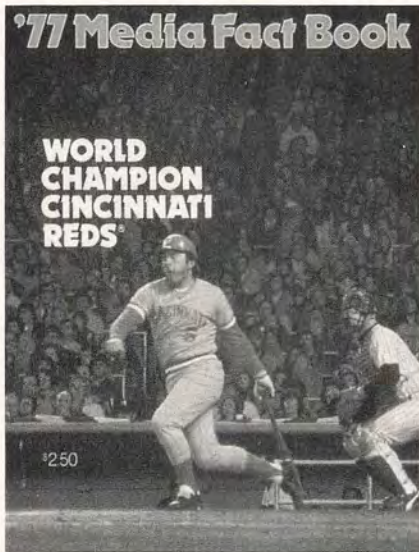
Unauthorized individuals selling or soliciting tickets or merchandise on the stadium plaza or inside the stadium are subject to arrest and removal from the premises.

The Making of the Media Guide

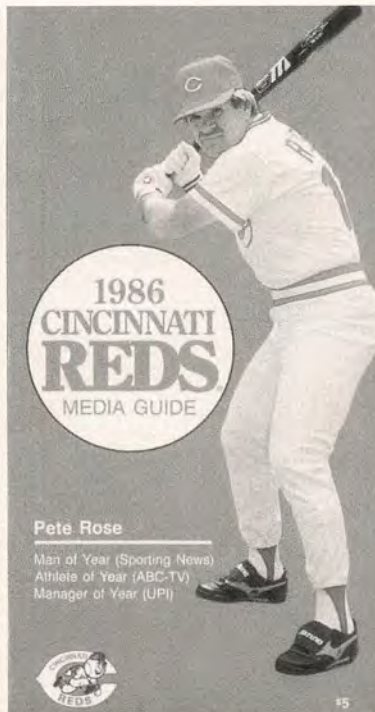


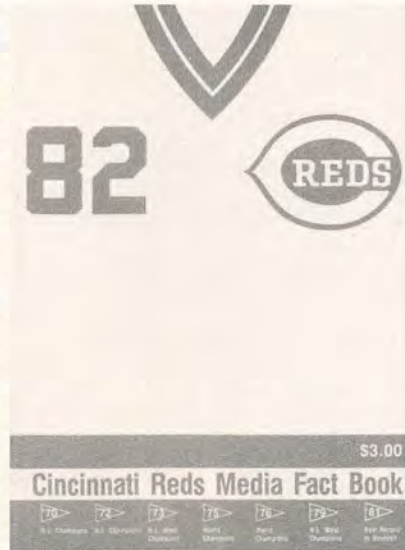
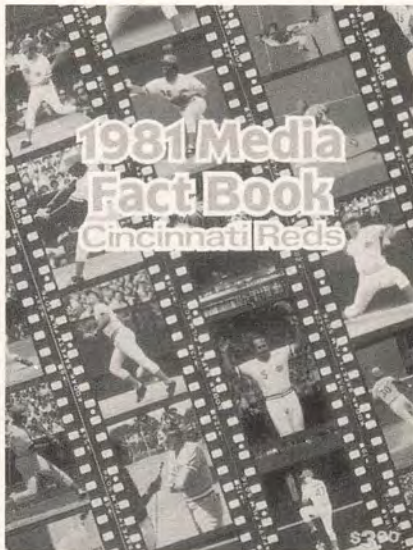
Quick, which Reds pitcher won the Opening Day game in 1949? When was the last time the Reds scored 20 runs in a game? The easiest way to find the answers to questions like these is to look in the most useful reference tool for writers and broadcasters; the Reds Media Guide.

Produced yearly by the Reds' Publicity Department, the Media Guide contains information which is gathered throughout the season. Published in February, the book has player biographies which are alphabetically listed, and detailed information including career statistics of every member of the Reds minor league teams.

The first Reds fact book appeared prior to the 1960 baseball season. At that time, the book consisted of just 48 pages, 35 of those devoted to the players alone. The book contained no pictures, no color and no radio or television information. By 1977, pictures were added to the guide and the number of pages had increased from 48 to 144.

A big change took place in the Media Guide in 1984. The minor league player biographies which had originally been printed in an entirely separate publication, appeared for the first time in the back of the book. The Reds' Publicity Department set aside 23 pages to be devoted solely for the biographies of the younger players in the organization. This move enabled the media to have all





pages to be devoted solely for the biographies of the younger players in the organization. This move enabled the media to have all the information on every Red, major or minor league, available to them at all times.

Even though each baseball team is responsible for producing a media guide, the difference in the layouts of each guide differs from team to team, and year to year. Some teams have guides that run close to 300 pages with full color ads in the middle of the book. Other teams choose to limit the book to 140 pages, with no ads.

Some of the more unique categories that are covered in the 1991 Reds Media Guide are turf information, red seat homers, spring training information and career transactions for each player. The All-Time Reds Roster lists every player who ever appeared in a single game for the Reds since 1900. A history of the Reds section also appears along with Riverfront Stadium highlights, as well as a section filled with last year's post-season box scores.

Baseball fans want to know as much as they can about their favorite team. Knowing this information is now made easy with a portable encyclopedia of baseball knowledge, more commonly called the Media Guide — a small, but unreplaceable book of facts. *The 1991 Reds Media Guide is available at the Reds Gift Shop in the Hyatt Regency Hotel for \$6.00.*

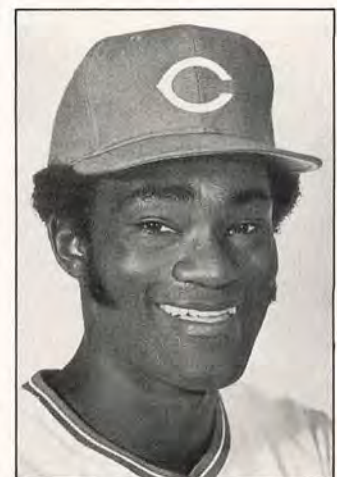

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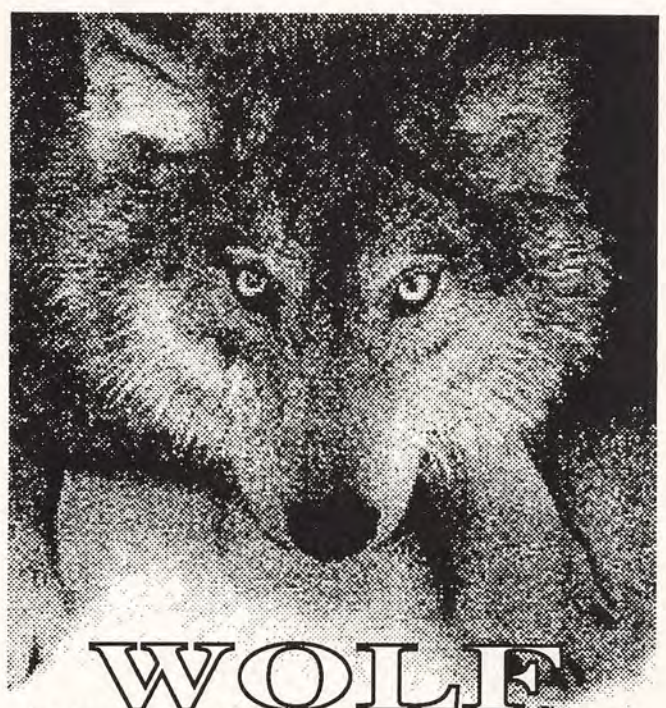
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How to Score

Number Players As Follows:

1—Pitcher; 2—Catcher; 3—First Baseman; 4—Second Baseman; 5—Third Baseman; 6—Shortstop; 7—Left Fielder; 8—Center Fielder; 9—Right Fielder.

Every time a batter goes to the plate, use the numbers to indicate how he was retired or how he reached base.

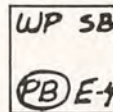
Fielding plays retiring batters or runners also call for use of the numbers. For instance, the batter who grounds out to the shortstop is retired 6-3 in your scoring. If he flies to the right fielder, merely use the figure 9. If it is foul: 9F.

The lower left hand corner of the scoring block should be considered as home plate. Progress is counter-clockwise with progress to first base indicated in lower right hand corner, to second in upper right hand corner, to third in upper left hand corner, and to home in lower left.
