THE FARM SYSTEM

The Tigers have made one change in their farm system for 1966, transferring a Class A affiliation from Jamestown of the New York-Pennsylvania League to Statesville of the Western Carolinas.

Agreements were renewed with Syracuse as the Class AAA affiliate, Montgomery in Double A, and Daytona Beach and Rocky Mount in Class A.

Numerous performances of note, particularly in the pitching department, kept attention focused on the minor league organization in 1965. Fritz Fisher led the Southern League with a 14-6 record and was second in earned run rating with 2.37.

Bill Graham tied for the International League lead in complete games with 11. Jack DiLauro, 2.64, and Leo Marentette, 3.03, were third and eighth respectively in the Carolina League. Gary Hart and Bruce Buys were 2.80 and 2.98 in the New York-Penn League. Mike Kilkenny, Jerry Napoli and John Skulley among them won 40 games for Daytona Beach and Skulley had a 2.13 ERA.

Hitting sensation of the system was Wayne Redmond, 19-year-old Detroiter, who, in his first season of pro ball, hit 31 home runs, 13 for Jamestown, 18 for Montgomery. Catchers Arlo Brunsberg, Montgomery, and Carl Solarek, Jamestown, each hit 17 homers. Two of Brunsberg's were pinch hits.

Wayne Comer, Montgomery outfielder, led the Southern League in stolen bases with 31. Mike Holodick pilfered 43 for Daytona Beach.

SPRING TRAINING

After training at Henley Field in Lakeland since 1934, the Tigers now are based in a new location, a mile away, in Marchant Stadium, a new all-concrete stand erected by the City of Lakeland at a cost of more than \$350,000. It is situated on a 12-acre tract adjacent to Tiger-town, which has been the club's minor league training site since 1953.

It is slightly east of Lakeland Hills Boulevard, one of Lakeland's principal north-south arteries and a short driving distance from the trans-Florida highway, Interstate No. 4.

Dimensions approximate the Tiger Stadium field area in Detroit, drainage is excellent and the turf is maintained on the same standard as Henley Field, considered the finest in Florida.

The new grandstand seats 4,025, including 400 box seats. The clubhouse, costing \$48,000, accommodates up to 150 players in each club section with added quarters for umpires. The pressbox, 104 feet long, has spacious quarters for writers and broadcasters, plus a photographers' deck.

TIGER STADIUM

The capacity of Tiger Stadium is 53,089 seats. Official figures list 9,377 box seats; 22,210 reserved; 11,502 unreserved grandstand; and 10,000 bleacher seats.

Baseball has been played at the site since 1900, a year before the American League was born with the Tigers as a charter member. Known as Bennett Park at the time, it became Navin Field in 1912, Briggs Stadium in 1938 and Tiger Stadium Jan. 1, 1961.

The playing field and stands at Tiger Stadium are considered among the finest in baseball. Facilities for players, fans, press, television and radio personnel are excellent and improved whenever possible. Although occupied frequently by more than 50,000 fans, it can be emptied in less than 10 minutes.

More than 10,000 square yards of sod are needed annually to repair the wear and tear of both baseball and football on the playing area. Sprinkling and drainage facilities are among the best and the latest-type field cover can be placed in less than a minute.

STADIUM FACTS

CAPACITY — 53,089 (Attendance records on Page 10).

LIGHTING — Eight towers, 1,428 lamps of 1,500 watts each. Installed in 1948.

DUGOUTS — Connected with clubhouses by tunnels, visitors on first base side, home club on third base side. Depressed, dugout-type bullpens new in 1963. John Hand is chief clubhouse attendant and equipment manager.

CONCESSIONS — Operated by Detroit Sportservice, Inc.

FENCES—Left field, 340 feet from plate; left-center, 365; center field, 440; right-center, 370; right field, 325. All fences uniformly nine feet high.

HEIGHTS — From ground to facing of upper deck, 34 feet; ground to first tier of third deck pressbox, 82 feet; ground to roof of third deck pressbox level, 94 feet; ground to top of light towers, 155 feet. Flag pole in center field is 125 feet.

Fly ball striking lights underneath upper stands from right field to center field on fair territory and bounding back on field: home run.

Ball striking flag pole above base and bounding into stands: home run.

Ball striking base of flag pole and bounding into stands: two bases.

Fair bounding ball going onto roof of either bullpen dugout: two bases.

Ball going through or sticking in screen on fair ground: two bases.

Pitched ball sticking or remaining on back stop screen: one base.

Thrown ball: two bases.

Fly ball going over wire fence of space covering canvas in center field: home run.

Fly ball striking protective fence which protrudes into stands in left and right field: home run.

TIGER BROADCAST TEAMS

As they were in 1965 for the first time, the Tigers' 1966 games will be aired by two separate broadcasting teams - selected games on television by George Kell and Ray Lane; all games on radio by Ernie Harwell and Gene Osborn.

Fourteen seasons as an American League infield star and seven years behind a baseball microphone are Kell's credentials. He was American League batting champion in 1949 when he hit .343 for the Tigers and completed his career with a lifetime average of .306. He broke into TV broadcasting with a pre-game network show in 1958, moved into the Tiger TV booth in 1959 and has been there ever since except 1964.

Lane, who joined Kell in the TV assignment in 1965, is a former Michigan State diamond star with a brief minor league background. Sports director of WJBK-TV in Detroit, he previously had radio-TV experience in Kansas, Minnesota, Illinois and Iowa.

Harwell's broadcast background goes back to 1940 and he has been on the major league scene since 1948; describing the action for the Brooklyn Dodgers, New York Giants and Baltimore Orioles before coming to the Tigers in 1960.

Osborn spent 12 years broadcasting minor league games and three more "creating" major league games from telegraphic reports before moving into the Tiger radio booth in 1965. A free-lance sportscaster in the off-season, he worked in Iowa and New Mexico before coming to Detroit in 1960.

CLEARING THE ROOF

Since then, the feat has been accomplished nine more times, including the first blow over the left field roof, by Harmon Killebrew in 1962.

Longest of the eight homers over the right field stands is credited to Norm Cash, for a blow July 29, 1962 which was estimated at 560 feet.

TIGERS REACH MILESTONE

Late in the 1965 season, the Tigers became the first team in the American League to play its 10,000th game—including ties and replays. The historic contest turned out to be a 14-inning 5-4 loss to the Indians at Cleveland, Sept. 20, celebrated four nights later with appropriate ceremonies at Tiger Stadium—the Indians again winning in 10 innings, 3-2. Midway through the previous season, the Tigers recorded their 5,000th American League victory and enter the 1966 campaign with 5,133 to their credit. Only two teams have won more games in the league—New York 5,590 and Cleveland 5,232.

FETZER 10th TIGER PRESIDENT

John E. Fetzer, sole owner of the Tigers since Nov. 14, 1961, is the 10th in line to hold the position of club president. The nationally-prominent television-radio executive, with holdings in Michigan and Nebraska, has taken an increasingly-active role in baseball administration since entering the game in 1956 as head of a syndicate purchasing the Tigers from the estate of the late W. O. Briggs. Angus (1902-1903), William H. Yawkey (1904-1906), Frank J. Navin (1907-1935), Walter O. Briggs (1936-1951), Walter O. Briggs, Jr. (1952-1956), Fred A. Knorr (1956), Harvey R. Hansen (1957-1959), William DeWitt (1960), and Fetzer since Oct. 11, 1960.

HOW THEY BECAME TIGERS

Recent research reveals that the nickname "Tigers" first was applied to the Detroit baseball club in 1895—a year earlier than previously reported.

Baseball historians long have credited Philip J. Reid, city editor of the Detroit Evening News, with first using the name in print in 1896. However, George Stallings, manager of the Detroit team which was then a member of the Western League, took credit for the move which resulted in the nickname when he put his players in black-and-brown striped stockings which, he said, reminded the fans of "tiger stripes."

New evidence makes it appear that an unidentified headline writer at the Detroit Free Press actually originated the Tiger nickname in 1895, a year before Stallings became manager and before the team was wearing striped stockings.

In its early years, the team was simply called "Detroit," "the Detroit," sometimes the "Wolverines" (a name more familiarly associated with the University of Michigan) and at times the "Creams."

The "Creams" broke into print in 1894, the year Detroit entered the Western League under the ownership of G. A. Van Derbeck, a transient from Los Angeles. A writer of the time derisively referred to his aggregation as "what is purported to be the cream of California baseball players"—which may account for the name.

Then on April 16, 1895, the Free Press printed a headline over a baseball story which read: "Strothers' Tigers Showed Up Very Nicely." On the same page, a string of baseball notes was headed: "Notes of the Detroit Tigers of 1895." Curiously, not once in either story was the word "Tigers" used.

From then on, the Free Press fairly regularly called them the "Tigers" and in May, 1895, the Sporting Life began using "Tigers" in its dispatches from Detroit. However, up to July 1, 1895, careful search of the files discloses that neither the Detroit Evening News nor its Sunday paper, the News-Tribune, had used "Tigers."

Thus it seems that the Detroit Free Press must get credit for originating the Tiger nickname in 1895—unless someone has other new evidence to the contrary.
