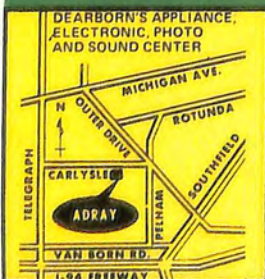

Ralph Houk Comes to Tigerland

When the Tigers signed Ralph Houk to become their 1974 manager, they acquired a real winner.

Now dean of American League pilots with 11 seasons under his belt, Houk ranks 14th in won-lost percentages among the 38 managers in the modern history of the game who lasted 10 seasons or more.

Entering the current campaign with 944 victories and 806 losses, he was 138 games over the break-even point — which is a lot of working room.

Success was the hallmark of Houk's career as manager of the New York Yankees, whose reins he relinquished on the final day of the 1973 season, despite two years remaining on his contract. Two weeks later, he succumbed to the blandishments of Jim Campbell, Tiger general manager, to become a Tiger.

Houk's first three Yankee teams (1961 - 62 - 63) were pennant winners.

The first two (1961 - 62) wore the crown of World Champions.

Twice (1961 and 1970), Houk was proclaimed Manager of the Year and Yankee partisans rank him with the three other greats of their long history — Miller Huggins, Joe McCarthy and Casey Stengel.

Houk cut some long-standing ties when he resigned at New York. For the first time in 35 years, it is not the Yankees paying his salary this year.

Signed to his first contract as a player in 1939 after spurning a football scholarship at the University of Kansas, Houk chalked up this distinguished career as a Yankee:

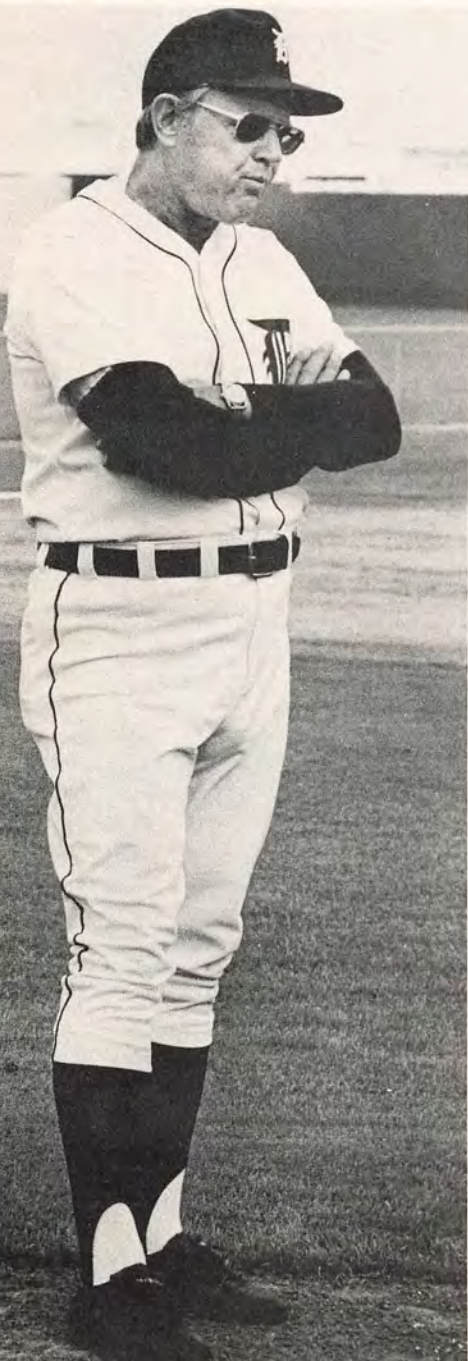
Ten years (1939-52) as a player, minor and major league, with four years (1942-45) out of action for military service.

Five years (1953-54 and 1958-60) as a Yankee coach.

Three years (1955-57) as a minor league manager for the Yankees.

Eleven years (1961-63 and 1966-73) as their manager.

Two years (1964 until May,

1966) as general manager of the club.

Houk is known as a "players' manager" because, as one veteran baseball observer once said: "he treats his players as men, defending them on the field and protecting them from criticism."

"When I was a player . . . that was the way I wanted to be treated," says the 54-year-old Houk.

With all of his consideration and good humor, Houk also is noted for his explosive outbursts under fire, including some fine dirt kicking and cap throwing.

His military record supports the courage he has to back up his convictions.

A combat leader with the 9th Armored Division in World War II, he was attached to the Rangers. Seeing action in the Battle of the Bulge, he rose through battlefield promotion from private to major and won the Silver Star for "bravery above and beyond the call of duty."

He also won the nickname of "The Major," which he finally has come to accept with resignation.

"War records are something I don't like to talk about," Houk says. "There were a lot bigger heroes

than I was in the war."

Houk's robust laughter and keen sense of humor are widely appreciated in baseball.

Once picked manager of the year in Puerto Rican winter baseball, he quipped:

"You see, it was a five team league. Two managers got fired, one finished below me and one hit a sportswriter. So, they were stuck with me."

Houk doesn't claim that becoming a major league manager was a boyhood dream of his.

As a farm youngster in Kansas, he insists, "all I ever hoped for as a kid was that it would rain and I wouldn't have to pitch hay the next day."

However, there was time for baseball as well as hay-pitching, and he became a 19-year-old catcher in 1939 at Neosho, Mo., the bottom rung of the Yankee chain.

By 1947, he was with the Yankees. However, it was not the most distinguished job on the premises as Houk spent most of his time in the bullpen, appearing in only 91 games in eight seasons.

Time wasn't wasted, it appears, as the alert Houk studied every move of every game. By 1953, he was tapped by Casey Stengel to become one of his coaches.

After two seasons in that post, he moved on to an apprenticeship as a manager, at Denever. There, his 1957 team won 32 of its last 38 games to finish second, then swept 12 of 15 playoff games to become Little World Series Champions and rule the entire minor league domain.

Yankee catcher in 1950s



That took Houk back to Yankee Stadium for a three-year term as No. 1 coach on Stengel's staff and when Stengel departed, Houk was named his successor in 1961.

That year, he became the first freshman manager in the American League since 1934 to win a pennant and in 1962 the first in the history of baseball to win two World Championships in his first two years.

After 1963, Houk pulled off his uniform to become general manager but by May, 1966, was back on the field directing the Yankees in eight more campaigns.

The field, he now says, is just where he wants to be the rest of his career. And that, according to those who know him best, is where Ralph Houk is the best.

It was Dan Topping, Yankee owner of the early 60s, who was asked: "What if your new manager doesn't make it?"

"Obviously," Topping replied with a wry expression, "you don't know Ralph Houk."

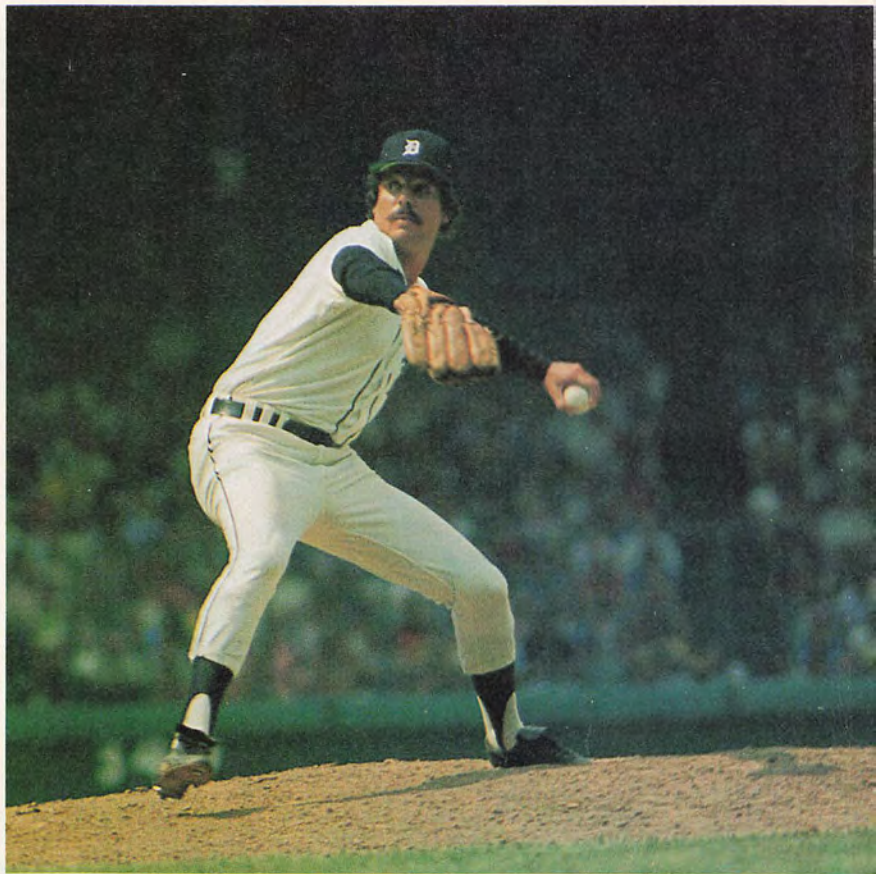

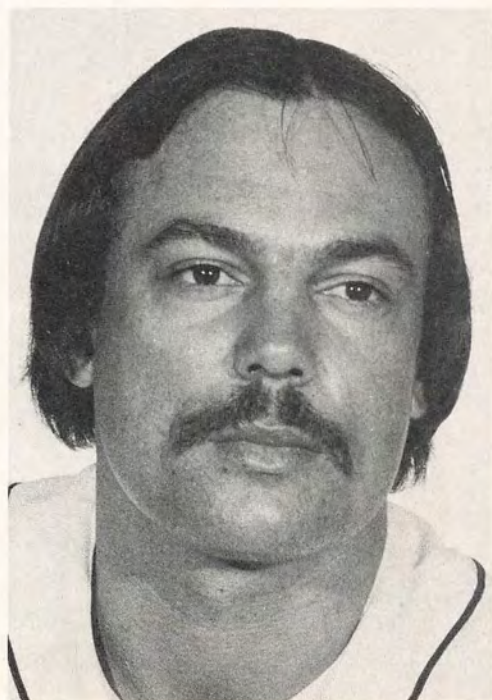

John Hiller

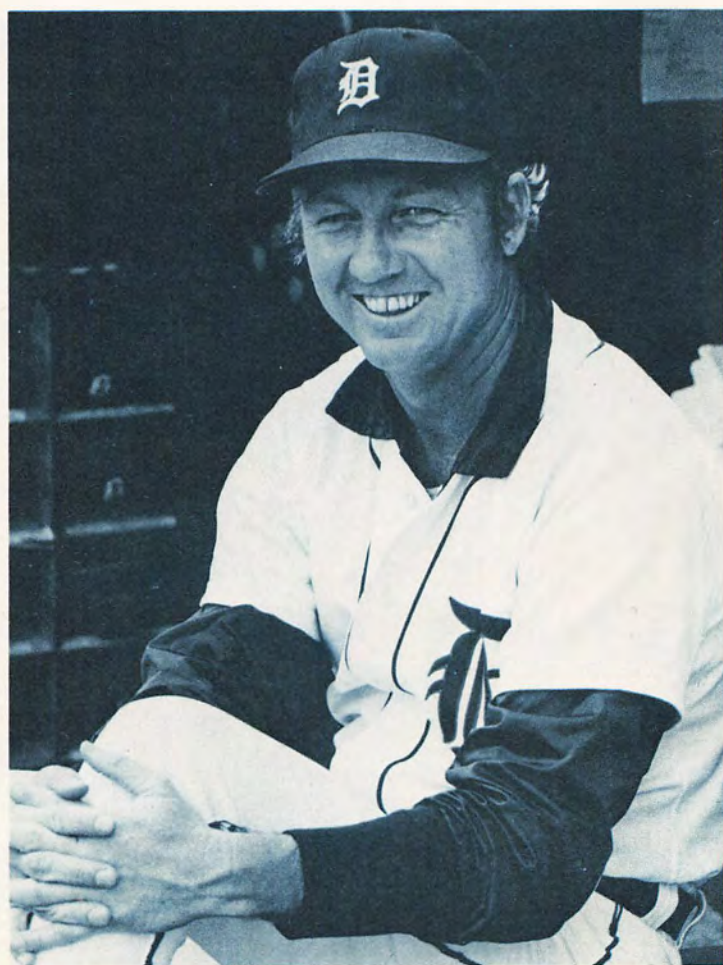
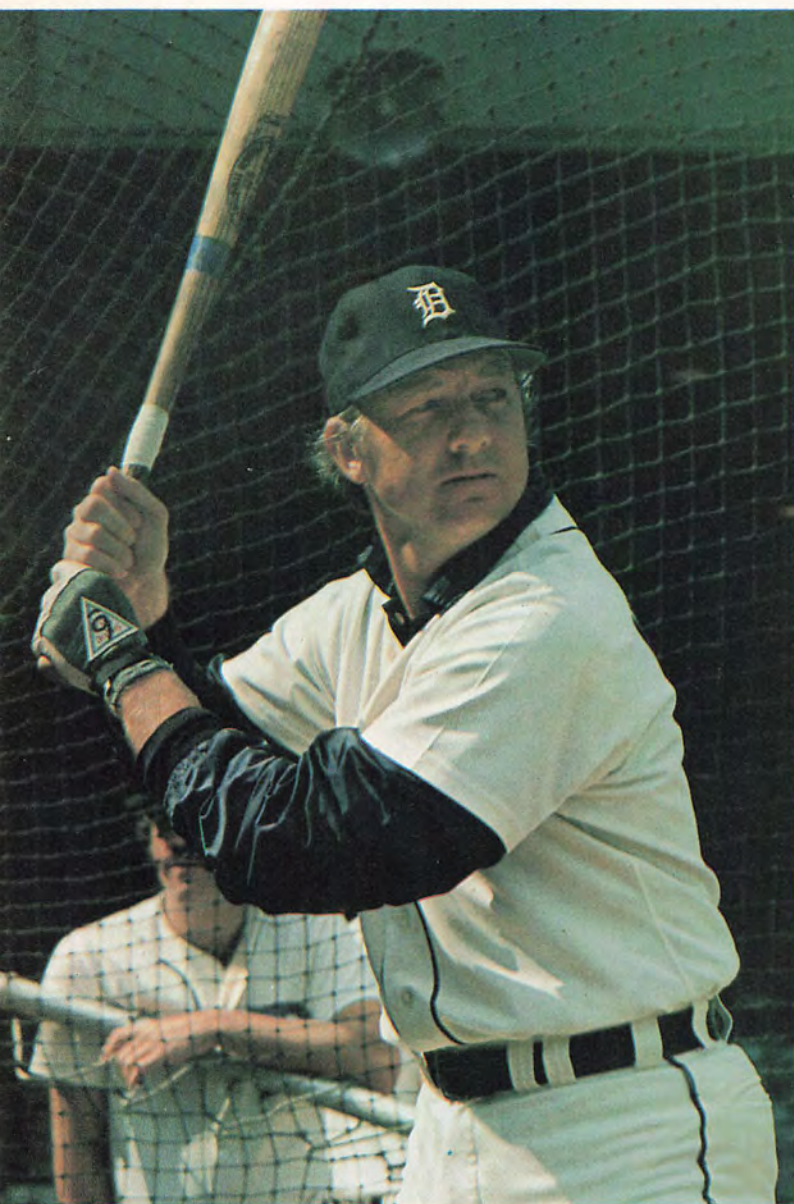


A comeback beyond belief was the story for John Hiller in his exciting season of 1973. Out of action most of two years because of his heart attack, the bullpen star established a fistful of records and reaped a harvest of awards with his 38 saves, 10 victories in relief and 60 game-finishing performances. Small wonder he was Tiger of Year, King Tiger, Fireman of Year, Comeback Player of Year and winner of the Hutch Award, plus salutes from civic and health organizations.

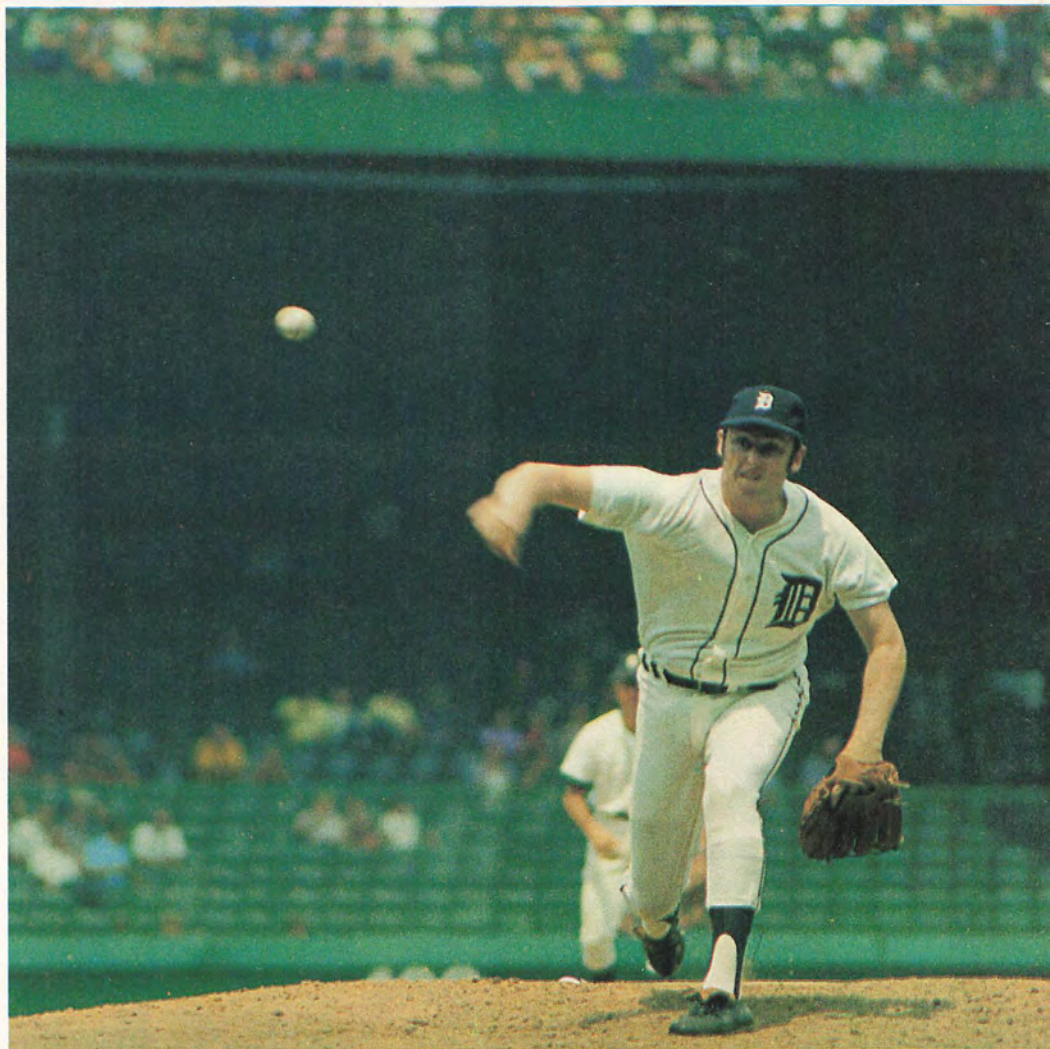


Al Kaline

There's magic in the number 3,000 for Al Kaline, the Tiger superstar whose career statistics put him high among the greatest of the game. As he entered 1974, Kaline was just 139 hits shy of the 3,000 mark — a total achieved by only 11 players in the history of baseball. Now in his 22nd season as a Tiger, Kaline already was club leader in home runs and was topped only by Ty Cobb in six other batting departments. Among all active American League players, he was the leader in games and hits, second in six other categories.

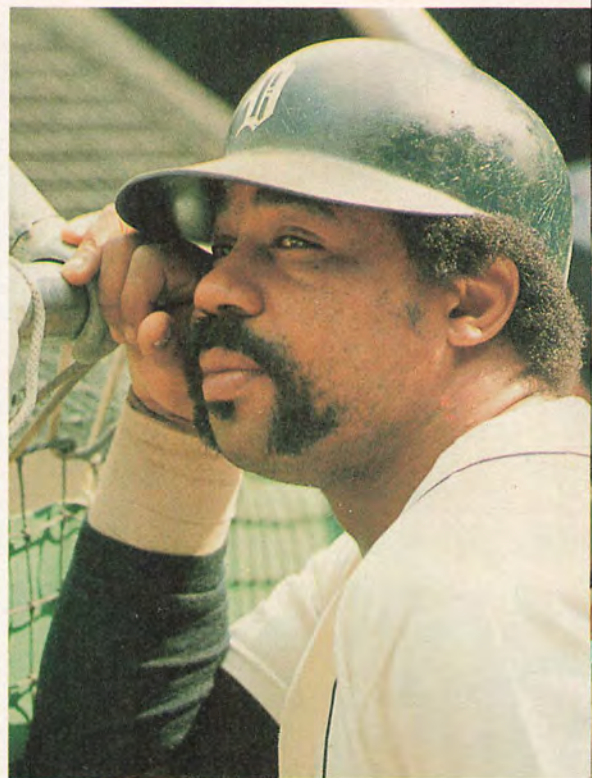
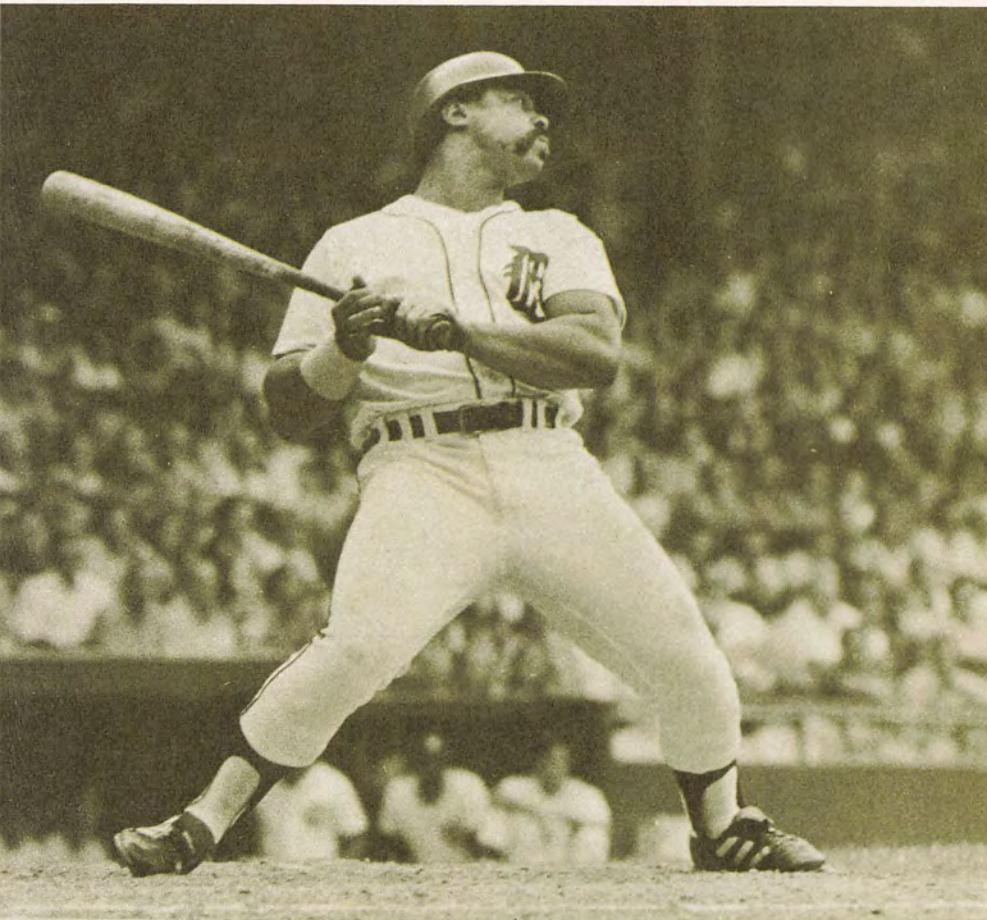


Joe Coleman



Maturity arrived in 1973 for Joe Coleman, as the Tigers' righthander scored 23 victories, which rounded out a three-year mark of 52-38 since he was acquired from the Senators in 1971. Joe, whose father also was a Tiger pitcher, was especially effective at Tiger Stadium last season, winning 13 and losing five on the home diamond and in day games, when he was 12-4 for the year. Coleman's strikeouts have been well over the 200 mark every year as a Tiger with a peak of 283 in 1973.

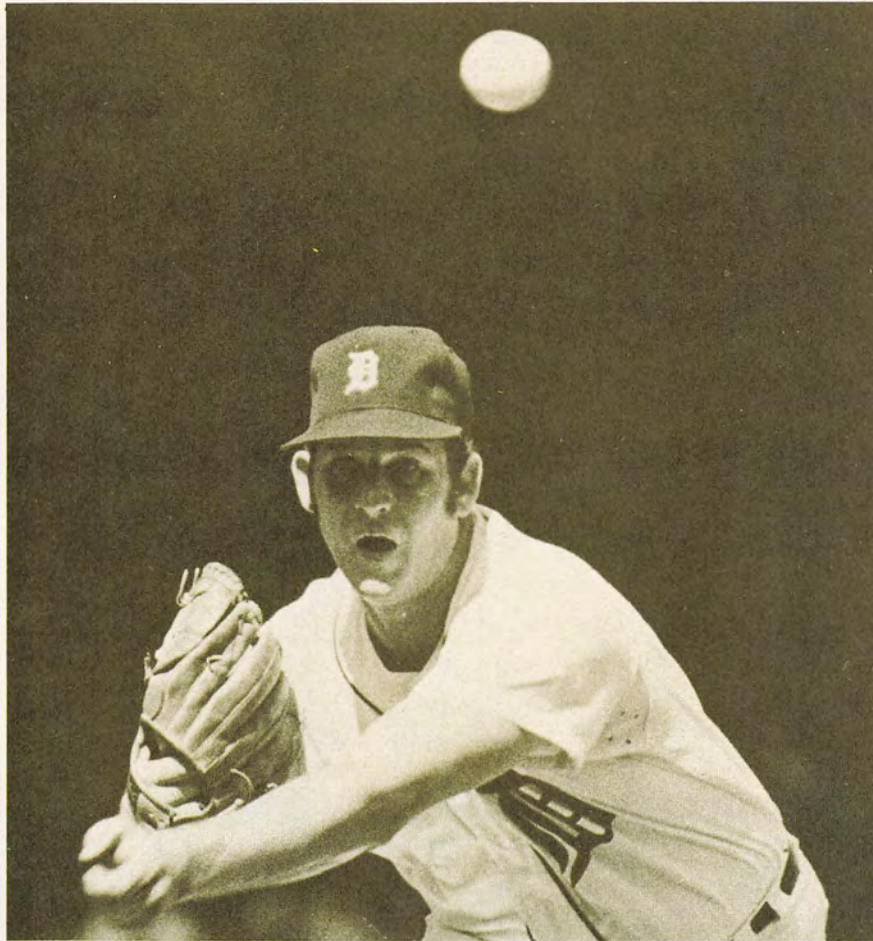
Willie Horton



There was much to cheer the Tigers in Willie Horton's performance in 1973 following a sag in 1972. His .316 at the plate was the club's highest mark, although he lacked enough appearances to challenge in the league batting race. He also avoided major injuries all season, probably because of his diligent attention to his physical condition and long hours of exercise. Horton also had the team's longest hitting streak — 15 games — and hit 17 homers to reach fifth in the Tiger all-time standings.



Mickey Lolich

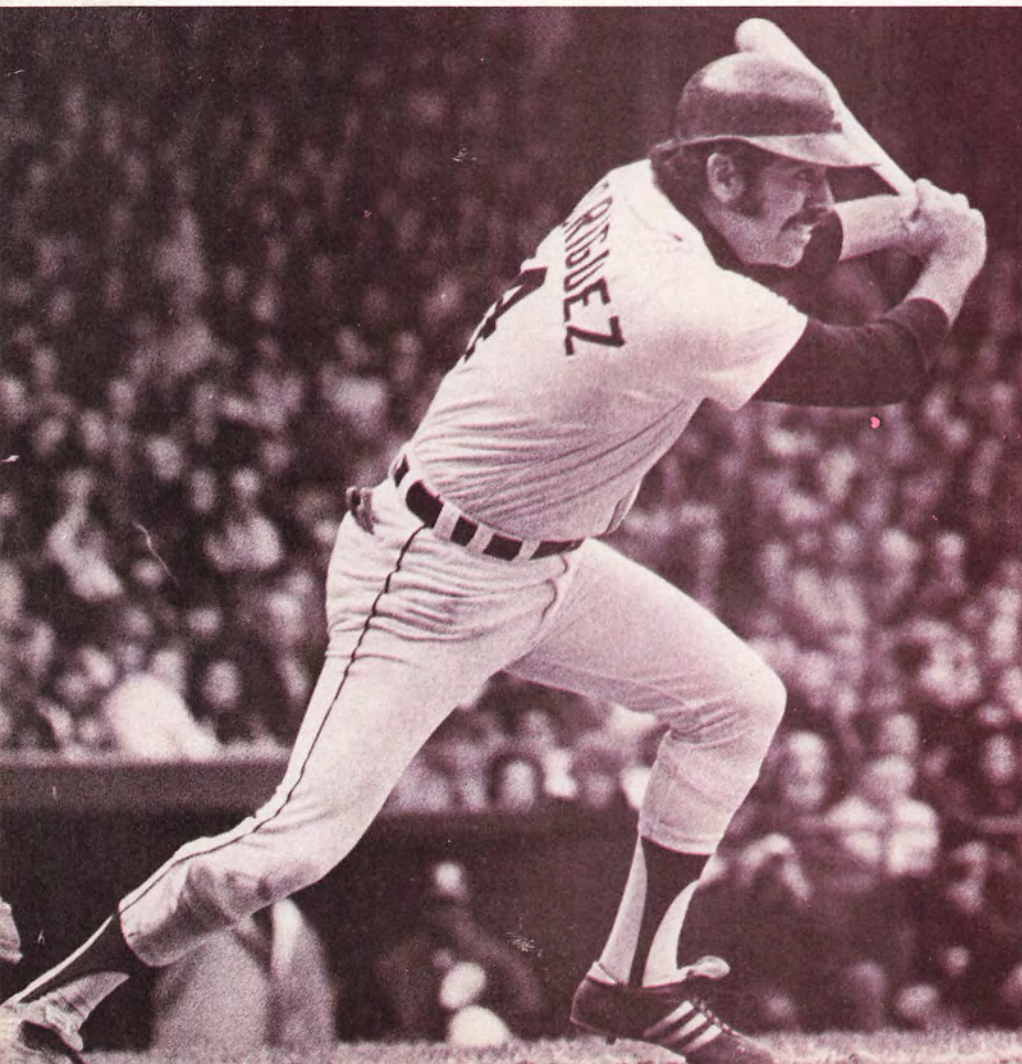


Already the leading strike-out and shutout pitcher of Tiger history, Mickey Lolich is zooming in on a number of other Detroit pitching marks. He entered 1974 with 2,338 strikeouts and 35 shutouts, both Tiger records, while needing just 39 starts for another club standard. With 179 victories in 350 games and 2,814 innings pitched, three more club records were not far ahead of the veteran southpaw. In all of the mound marks listed, Lolich ranked high among all active major leaguers of the day.



Aurelio Rodriguez

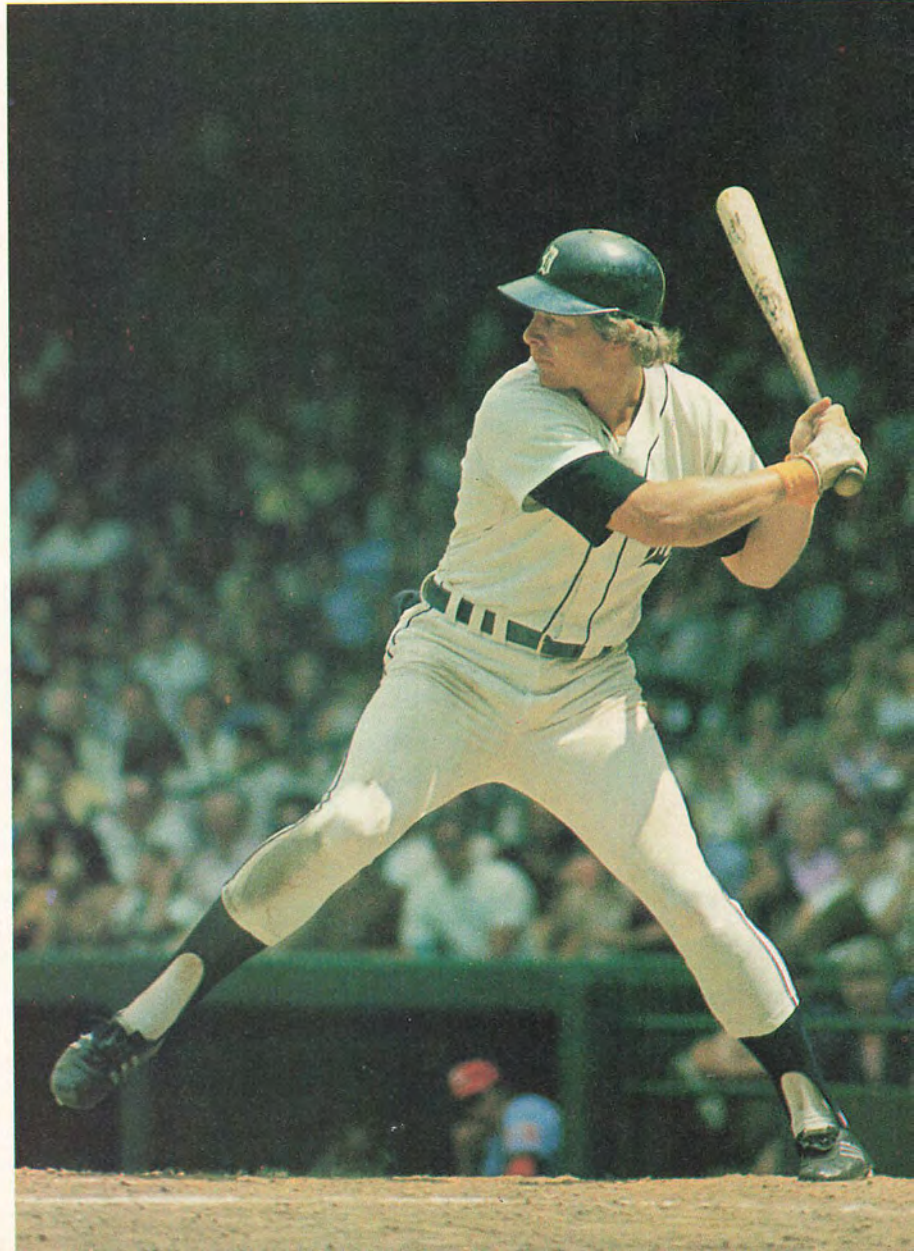
He was as durable as ever and as reliable as always with the glove, but Aurelio Rodriguez presented some puzzles at the plate in 1973. The slick third baseman missed only two games and finished .00002 from the top in fielding at his position. His batting produced a mark of only .222 — yet he led the Tigers in runs batted in, with 58, and in doubles, with 27. There's no puzzle, however, about his key position in the Tigers' strong defense, one of the best in baseball.



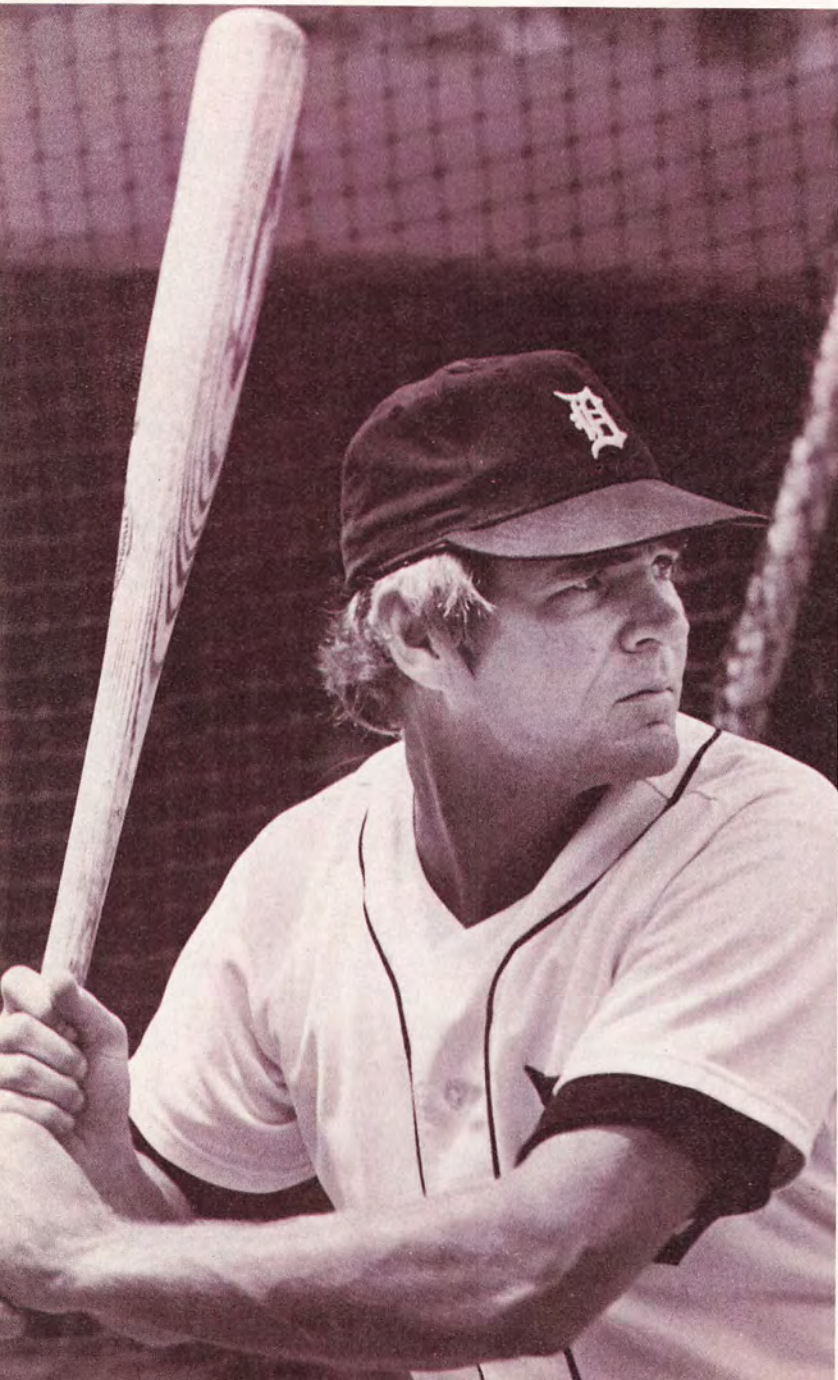
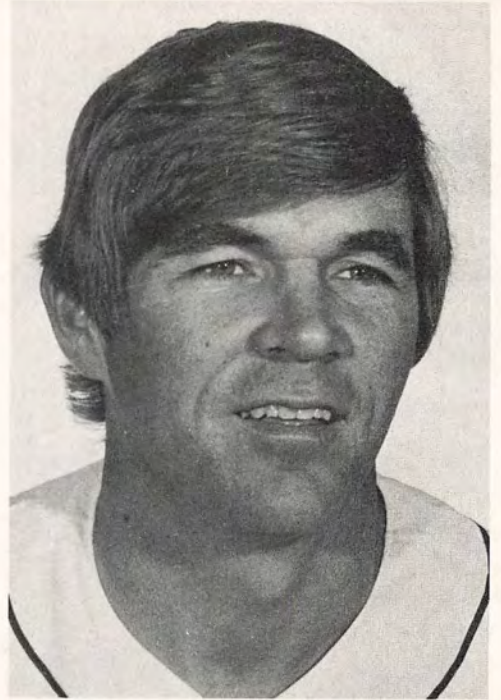
Jim Northrup



The hottest hitter in the American League the last three months of 1973 was Jim Northrup, whose figures for July, August and September were scorchingly and respectively .341, .363, .346. That gave the hard-driving Tiger outfielder a season mark of .307 for the best in his major league career. He also led the Tigers with seven triples and hit 12 home runs — but neglected to add any grand slam efforts to his career total of nine, including one in the 1968 World Series triumph over St. Louis.



Mickey Stanley



Whenever centerfield is the subject of discussion, the Tigers gladly nominate Mickey Stanley, whose exploits in the middle garden are recognized throughout baseball. In 1973, atoning for oversights of the previous two years, Stanley won his fourth Gold Glove trophy for fielding excellence and tied an American League record for centerfield putouts with 11 in one game. He also led the club at the plate in at-bats, runs, hits and sacrifice flies — just to show that it isn't all done with the glove.

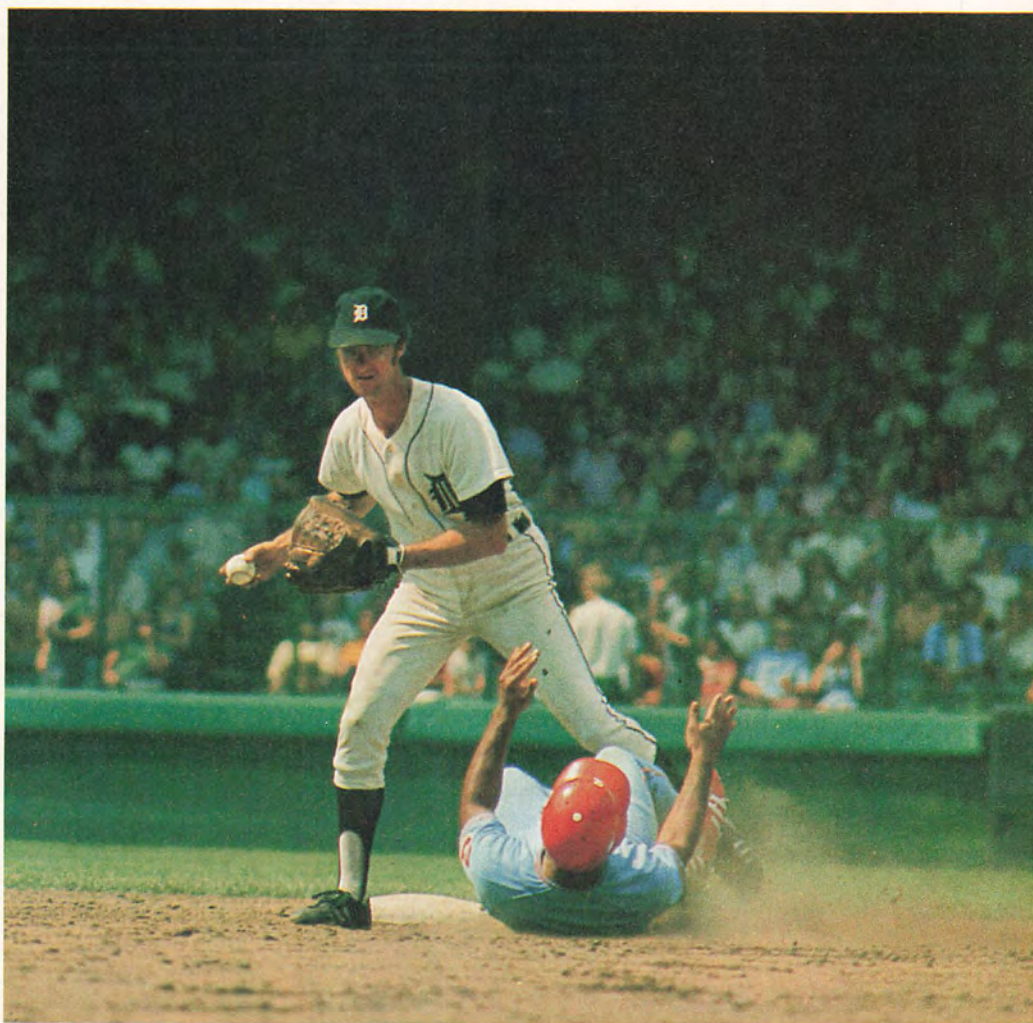
Bill Freehan



Baseball has never seen a catcher with a finer fielding average than Bill Freehan's. During the 1961-73 span of his career, all as a Tiger, Freehan has elevated his fielding average to .9931, which is a major league career record. He is tied for another major league record with a total of 8,735 putouts and holds the American League record for chances accepted in one game with 19. During 1973, the Tigers' big backstop led the league's catchers for the third time in his career with a .995.

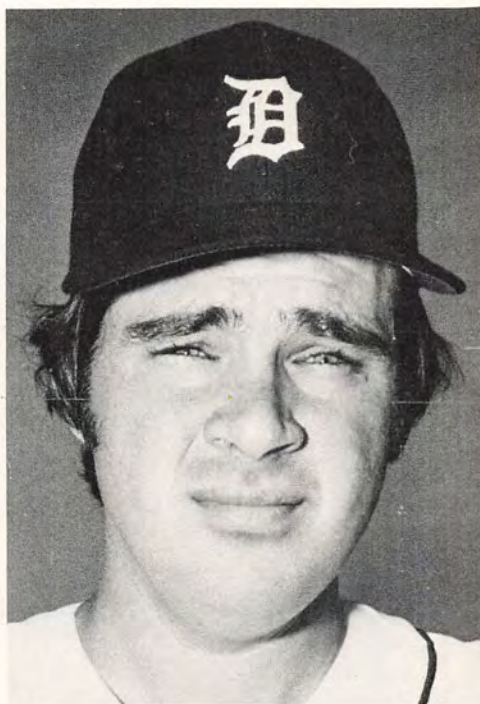


Ed Brinkman



There are shortstops and there are shortstops. Then there is Ed Brinkman, the slender star the Tigers rate with the best. He established all kinds of fielding records in 1972, but had to have back surgery at the end of the season. However, that didn't slow him down a bit in 1973 as he played all 162 Tiger games and grabbed a position in the All-Star Game for the first time in his fine career. Brinkman entered the 1974 season with 347 consecutive games — and only one major league performer had more.

Jerry Moses

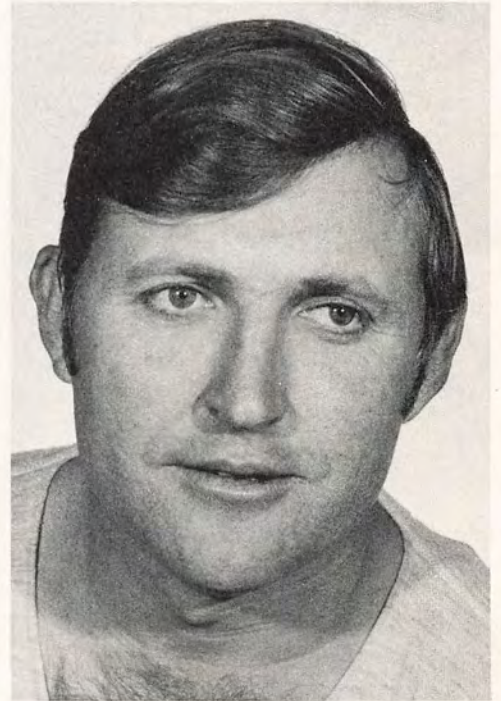


A late arrival on the 1974 Tiger scene was Jerry Moses, who reached the Tigers in a three-cornered trade near the end of spring training. An able catcher with a substantial bat, Jerry broke in with the Red Sox, played with the Angels, Indians and Yankees before coming to the Tigers. The 27-year-old personable Mississippian was an outstanding high school football player but turned his back on the gridiron after one year at the University of Mississippi. A bonus reported to be \$75,000 helped sway his decision.

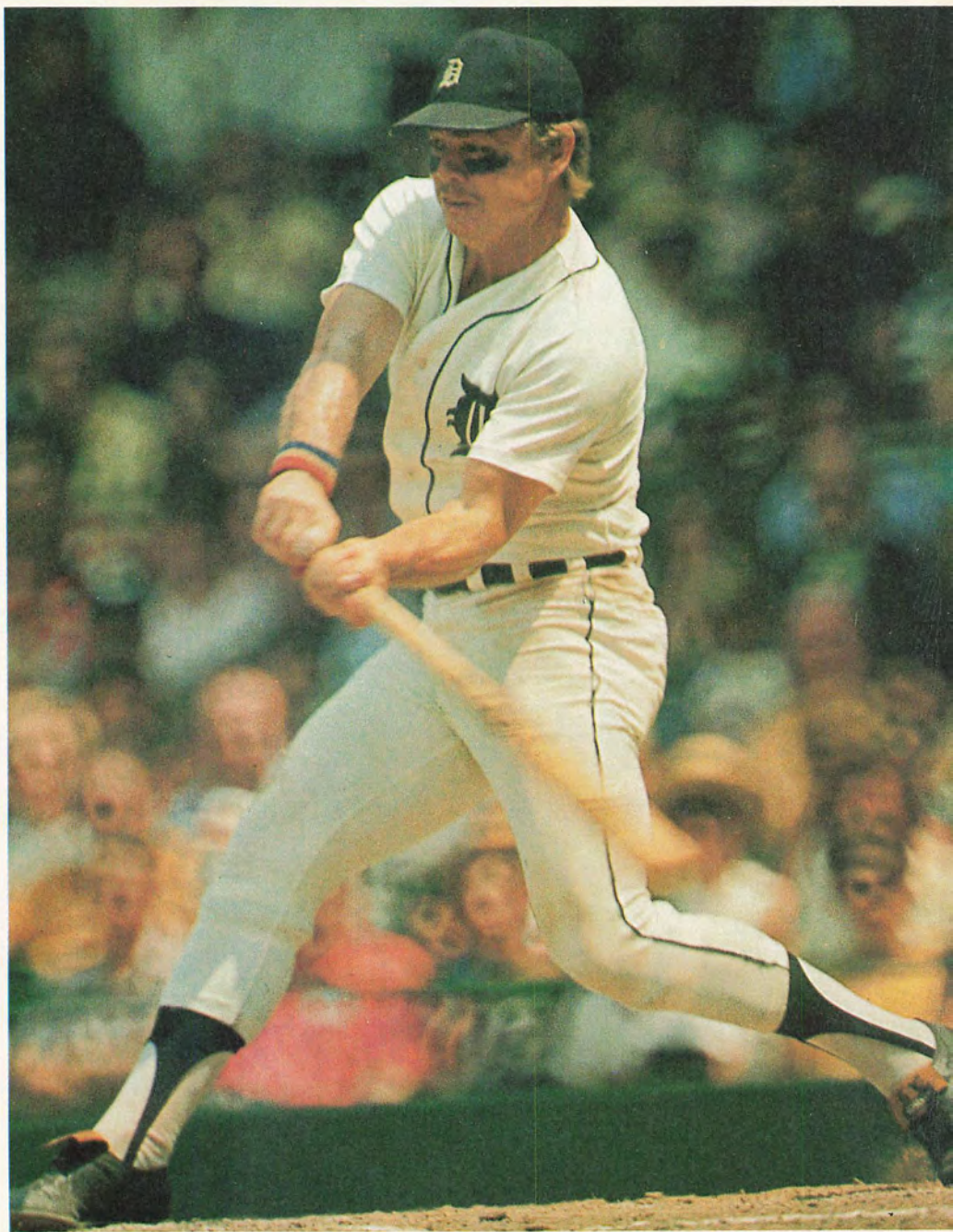
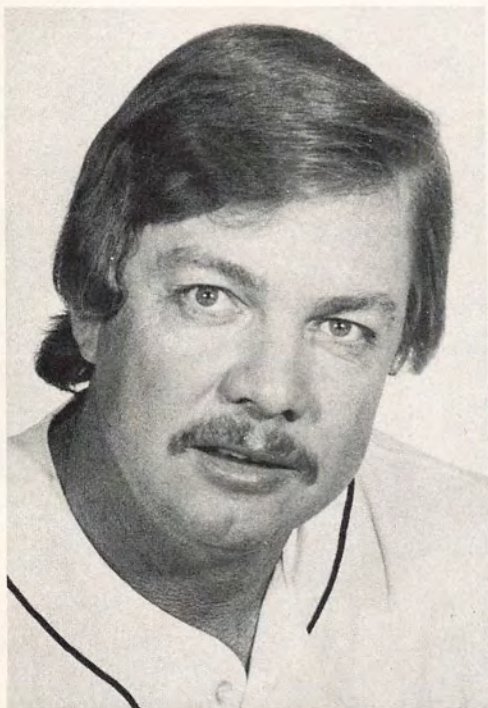
Woodie Fryman



The Tigers always will be grateful to Woodie Fryman for the outstanding performance he gave them in their 1972 stretch drive to the American League East championship, including an August-September mark of 10-3, five straight wins in September and the division title clincher. The hard-working southpaw encountered some bumps in 1973 but appeared in 34 games and fanned 119 batters in 200 innings, both high marks for him since 1969 when he was toiling for the Phillies.

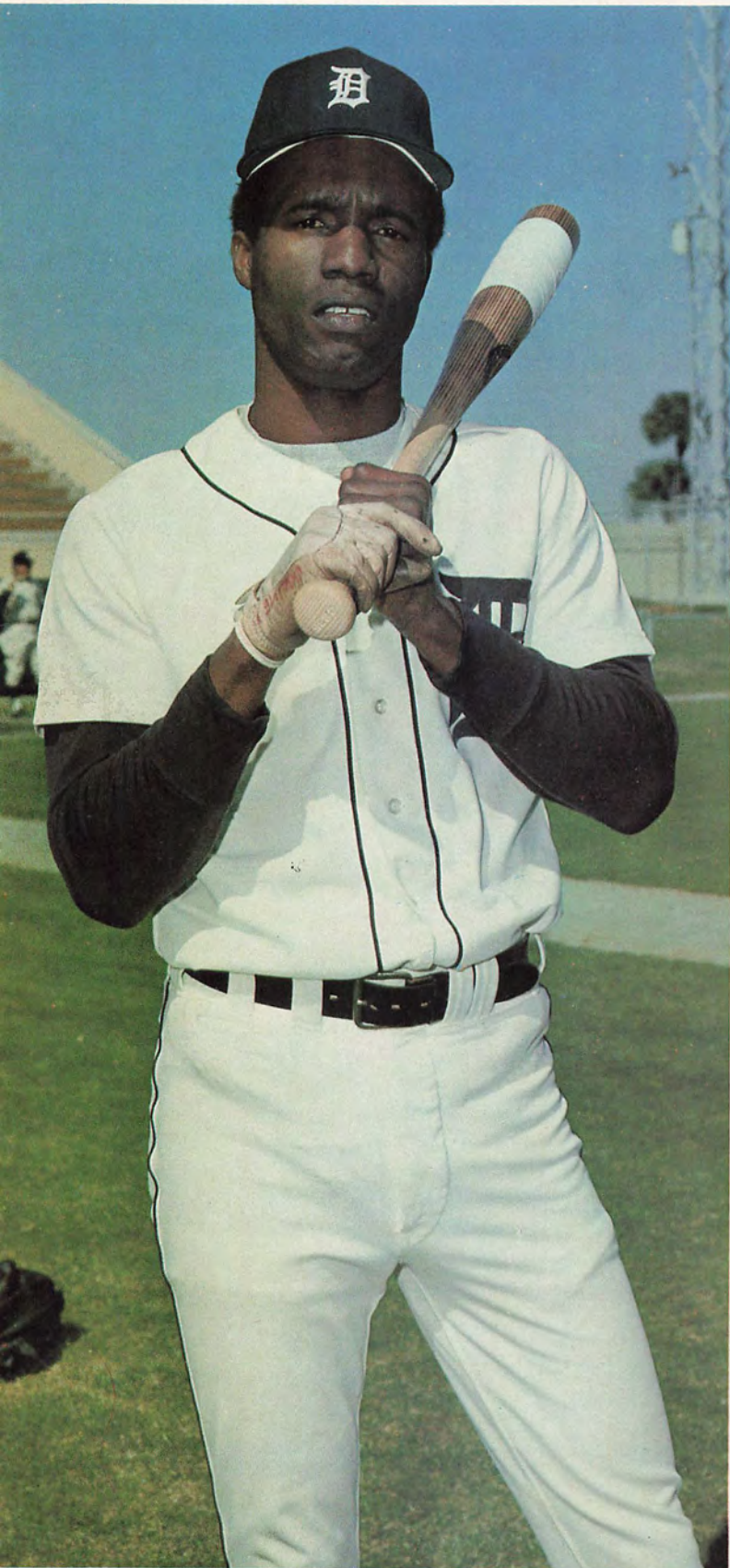


Norm Cash



Distinctive is the word for Norm Cash's Tiger career, now in its 15th chapter. The personable veteran has more games to his credit than any first baseman in the club's history, 1,965 entering 1974, and only Al Kaline has hit more home runs than Cash's 366 for his 1960-73 era as a Tiger. In seven other batting categories, Cash has a spot among the Top Ten Tigers of all time and in 1973 his 19 home runs led the Tigers for the third straight year and the sixth time in Cash's career.

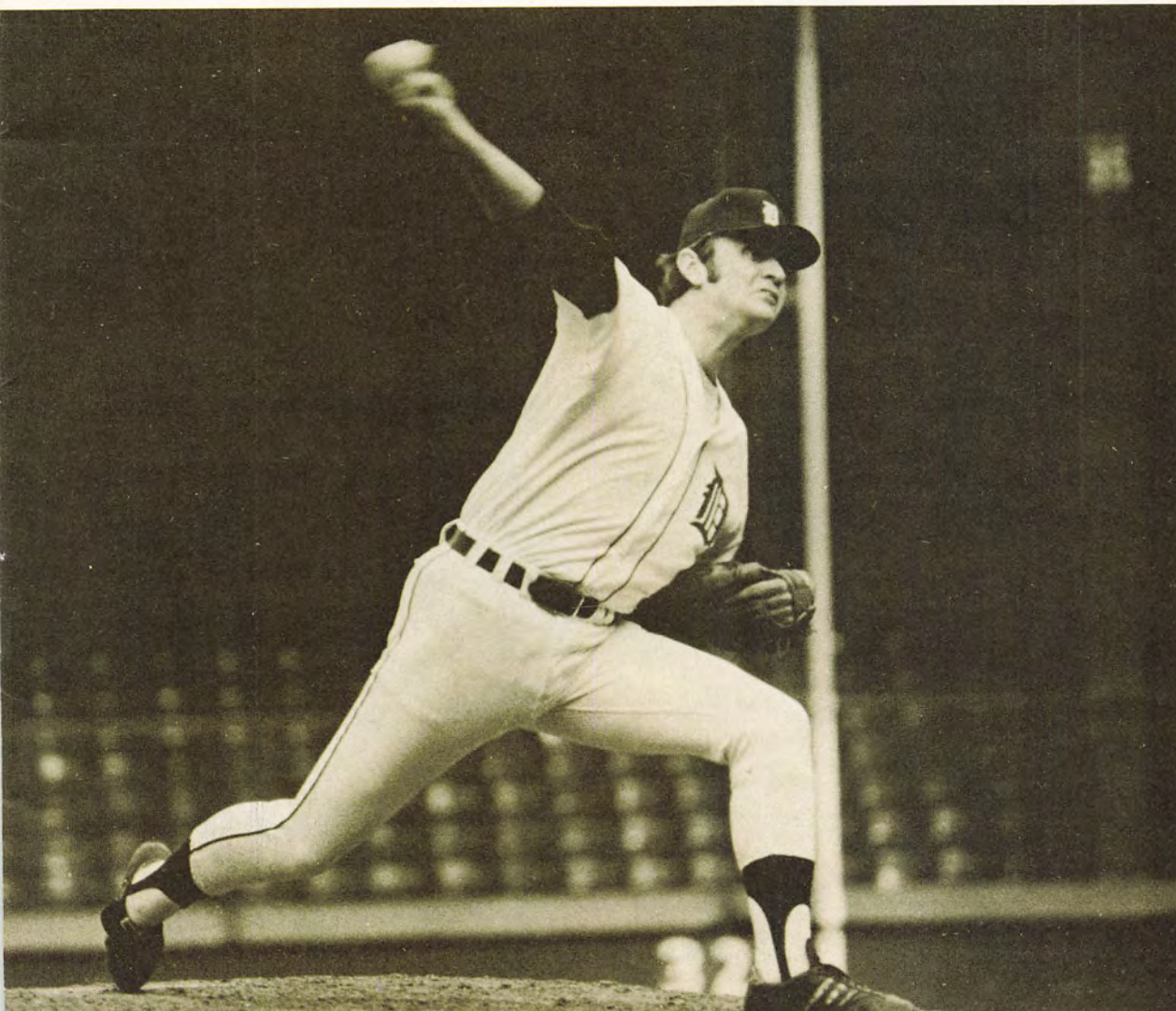
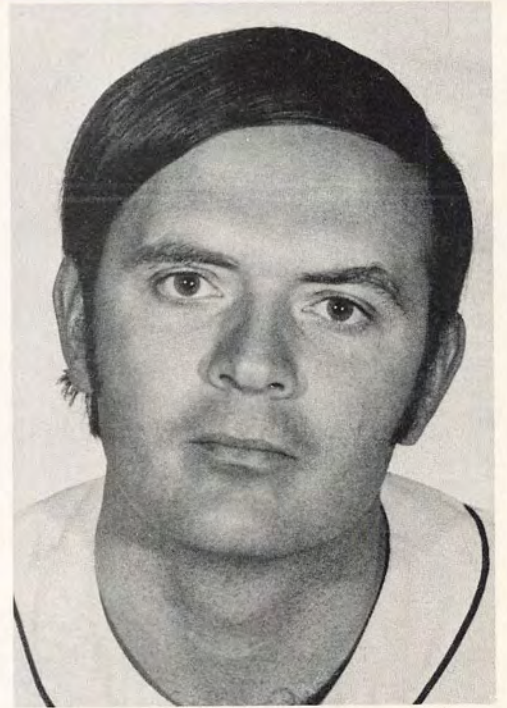

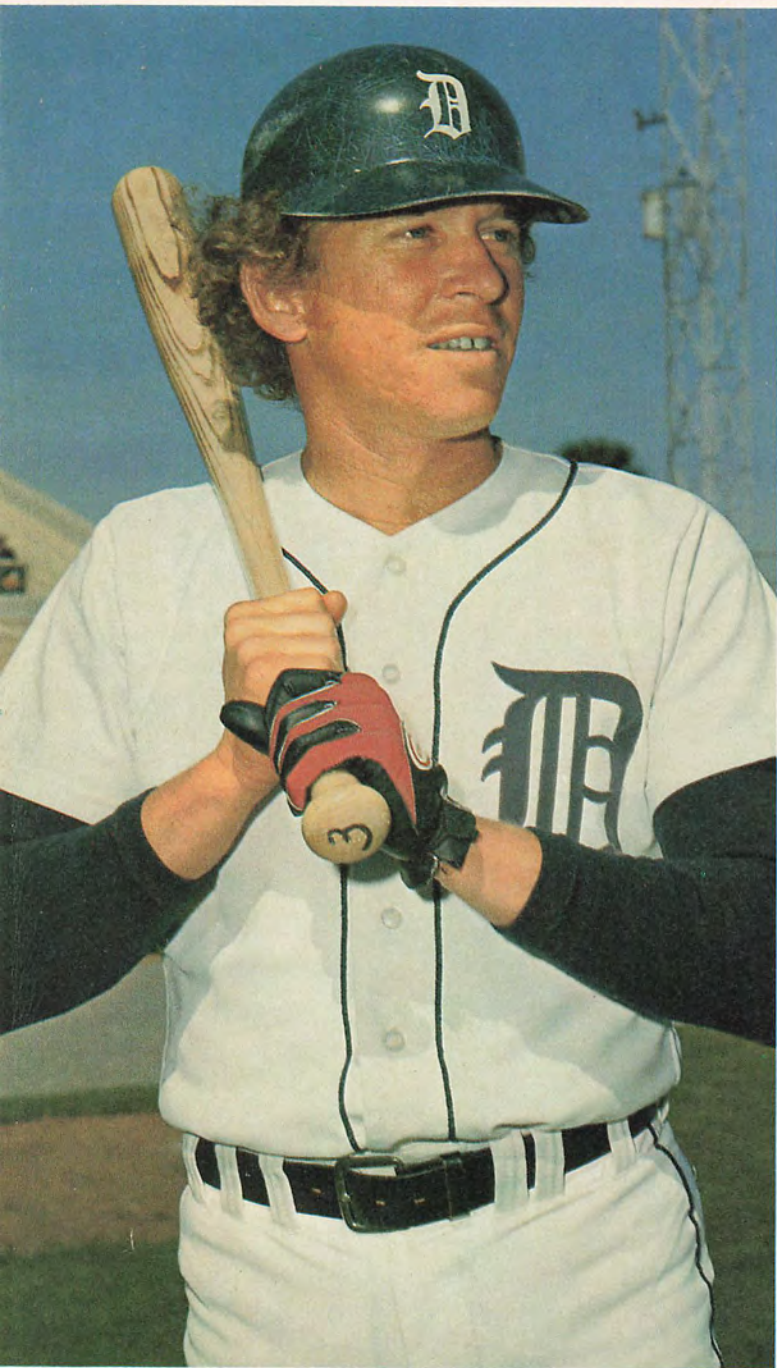


Lerrin LaGrow

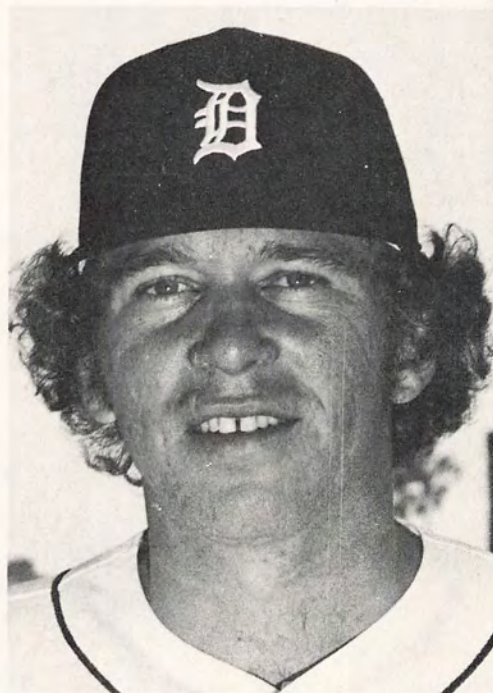
A bright future is forecast for Lerrin LaGrow, the towering Tiger righthander who started in 1969 trying to win a job at Tiger Stadium after a sensational two-year 19-1 college career at Arizona State. It seemed that 1973 might be the year when LaGrow opened as No. 1 righthander in the bullpen but he was sidelined by a broken wrist in June and spent most of the rest of the season in the minors, returning in time to notch his first major league win in a September game with the Indians.



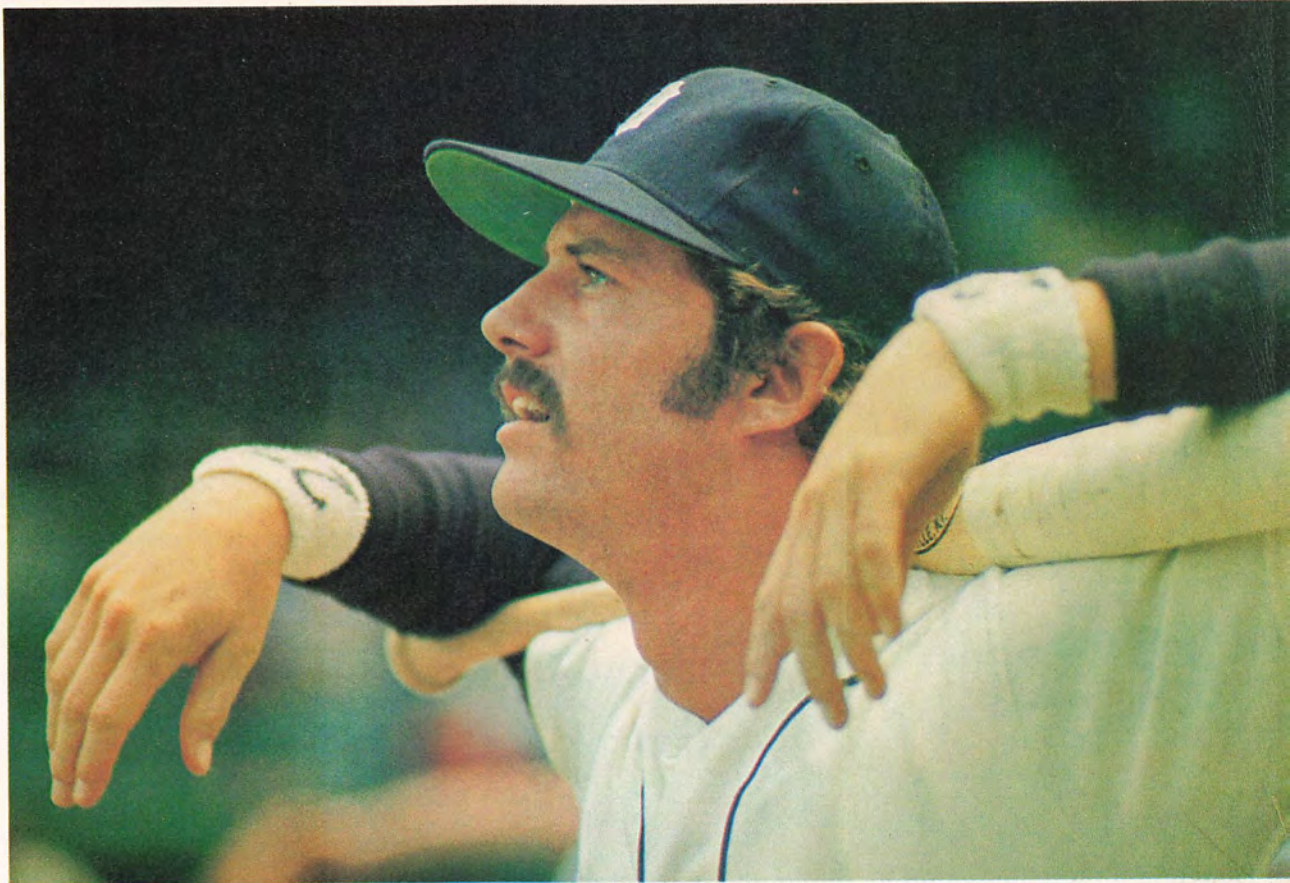
Gary Sutherland



A five-year veteran of the major leagues at Philadelphia in 1967-68 and at Montreal 1969-71, Gary Sutherland arrives at Tiger Stadium with the billing of "a second baseman who can make the double play with the best." At Denver, where he played for the Astros in 1973, Sutherland took part in 114 double plays and made only 15 errors to lead the American Association in DPs and fielding. He also hit a sturdy .294 and drove in 80 runs before the Astros recalled him and traded him to the Tigers.



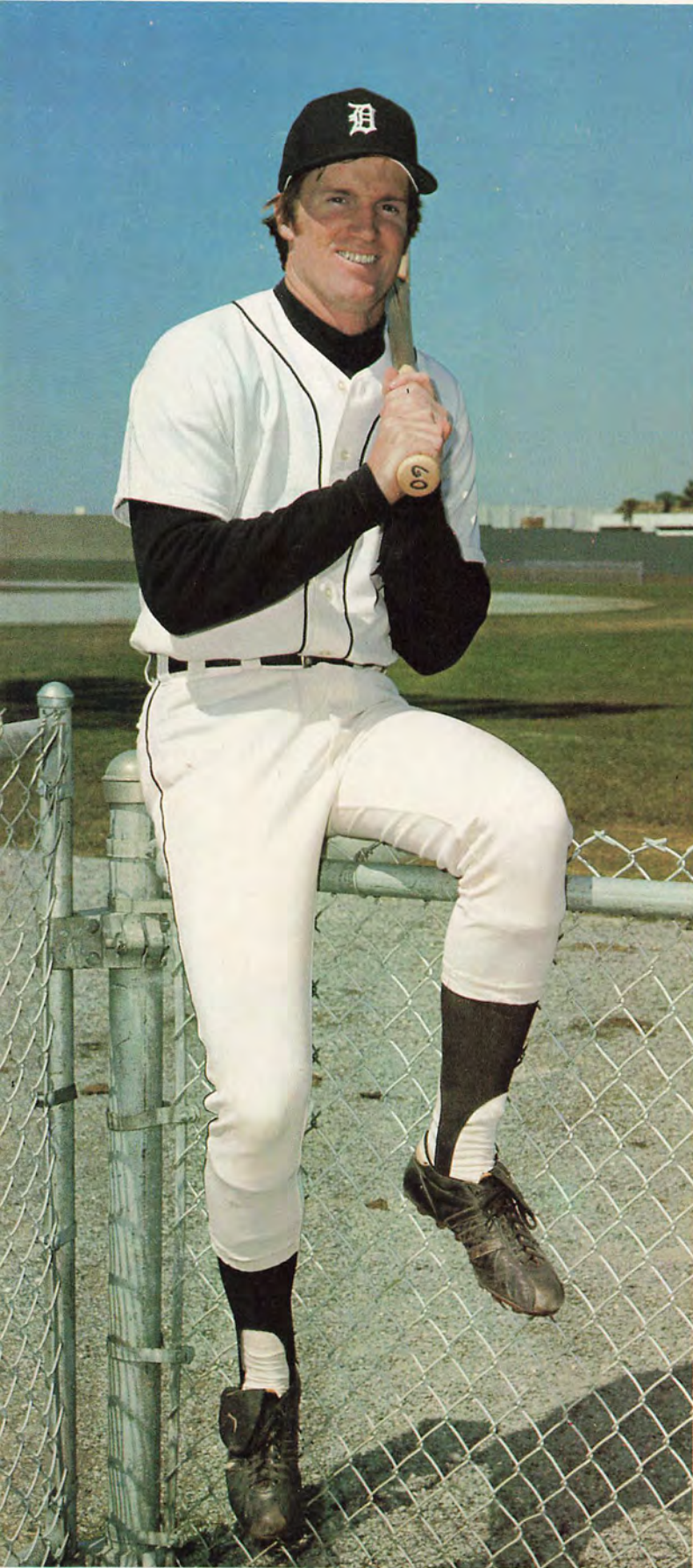
Dick Sharon



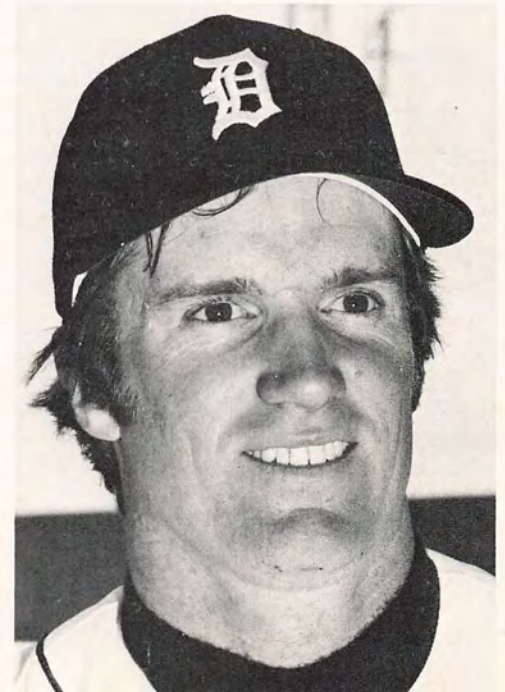
The newcomer who made the biggest splash with the Tigers in 1973 was Dick Sharon, young outfielder who was recalled from the minors in mid-May to become Tiger Rookie of the Year on a vote of the Detroit Sports Broadcasters Association. A first draft choice of the Pirates in 1968 and a sure-handed flyhawk from the start, Sharon saw his batting average improve every year of five seasons in the Pittsburgh farm system before he was traded to the Tigers following the 1972 campaign.



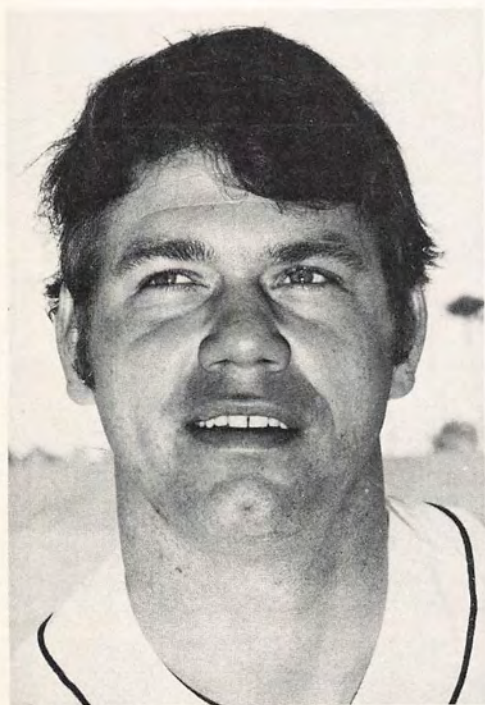
John Knox



If hustle and hard work can get the job done, there should be a bright future ahead for John Knox. A product of Bowling Green State University, he was a high draft choice in 1970 and advanced to the Tigers after a solid four-year minor league career which was highlighted by a .294 1972 season at Toledo. An agile infielder and left-handed hitter, he had two season-ending trials with the Tigers, including 12 games in 1973 in which he hit an impressive .281.



Jim Ray



When the Tigers acquired Jim Ray for their 1974 bullpen in an off-season trade, they gained one of the National League's top-grade relievers. There was no guesswork in the deal, however, because the Tigers had known about Ray ever since his prep days at Holly, Mich. Signed by the Orioles in 1962, he was drafted by the Astros in 1963 to become a Houston standout. In his 280 National League appearances, Ray made only 20 starts and none since 1971, had five straight winning seasons.

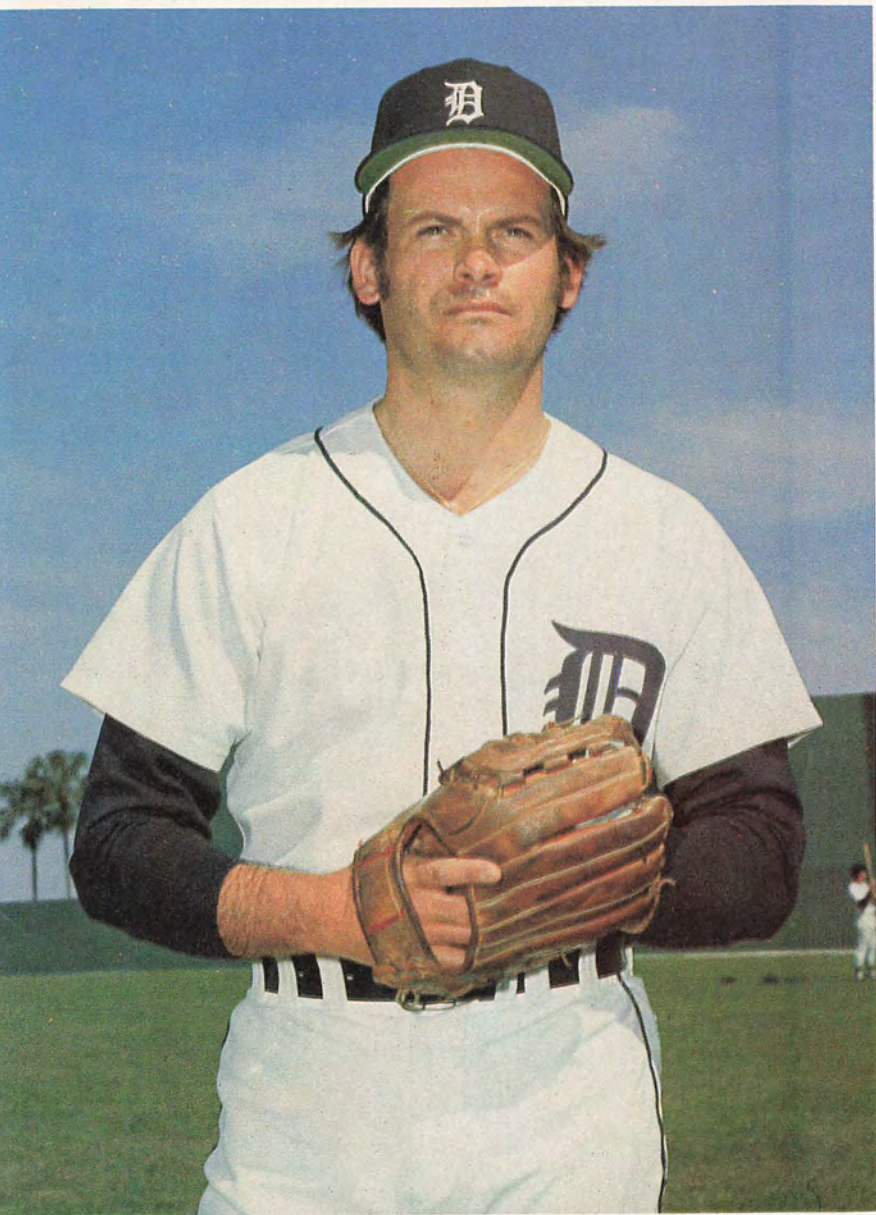

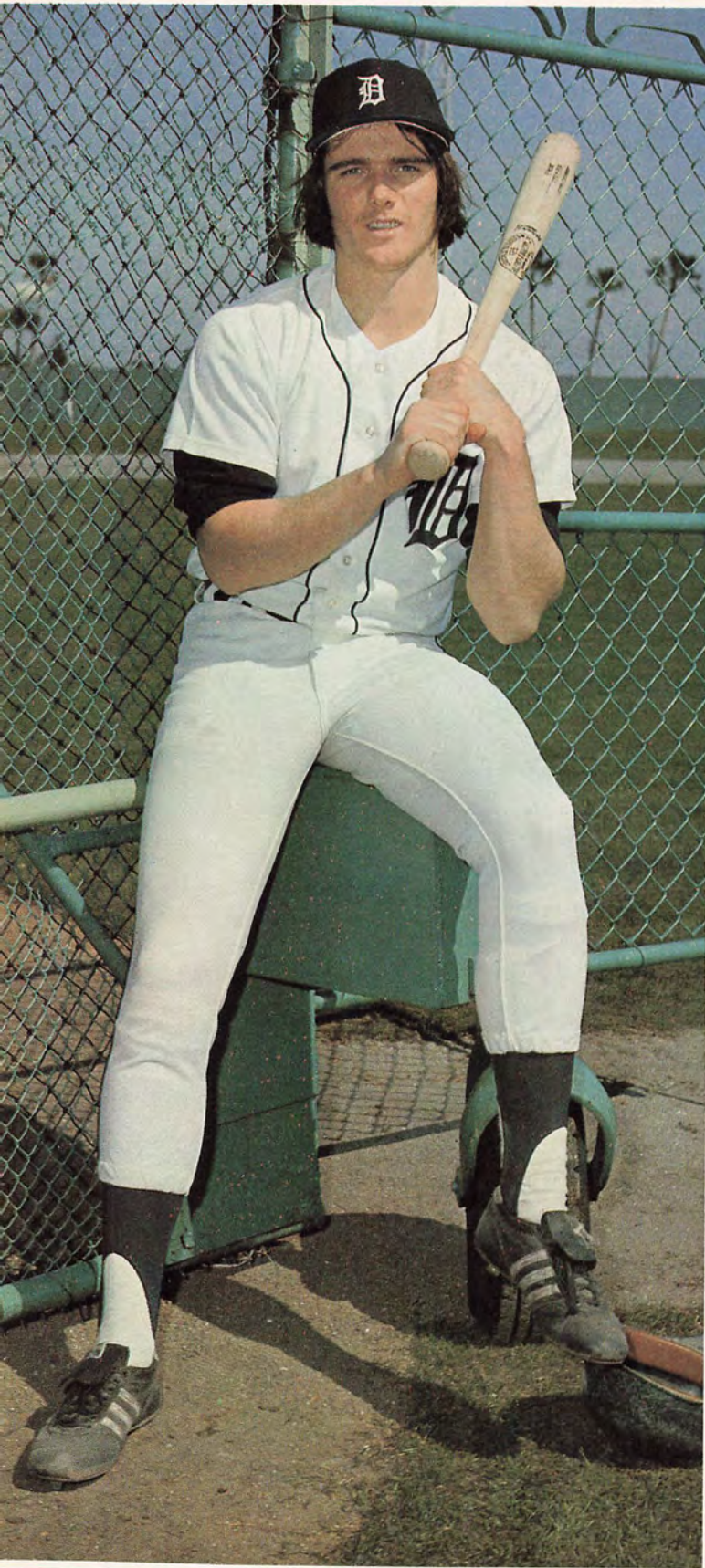
Luke Walker



A southpaw from Texas with a good arm, a live fastball and a sharp curve — that's "the book" on Luke Walker, Tiger newcomer purchased from the Pirates for relief and starting duty. First signed by the Red Sox and drafted by the Bucs, Walker was Pittsburgh's top pitcher in 1970 with a 15-6 record and came within three outs of a no-hitter against the Dodgers in 1971. He probably welcomes the American League's designated hitter rule since he once went to the plate 39 times without a hit.



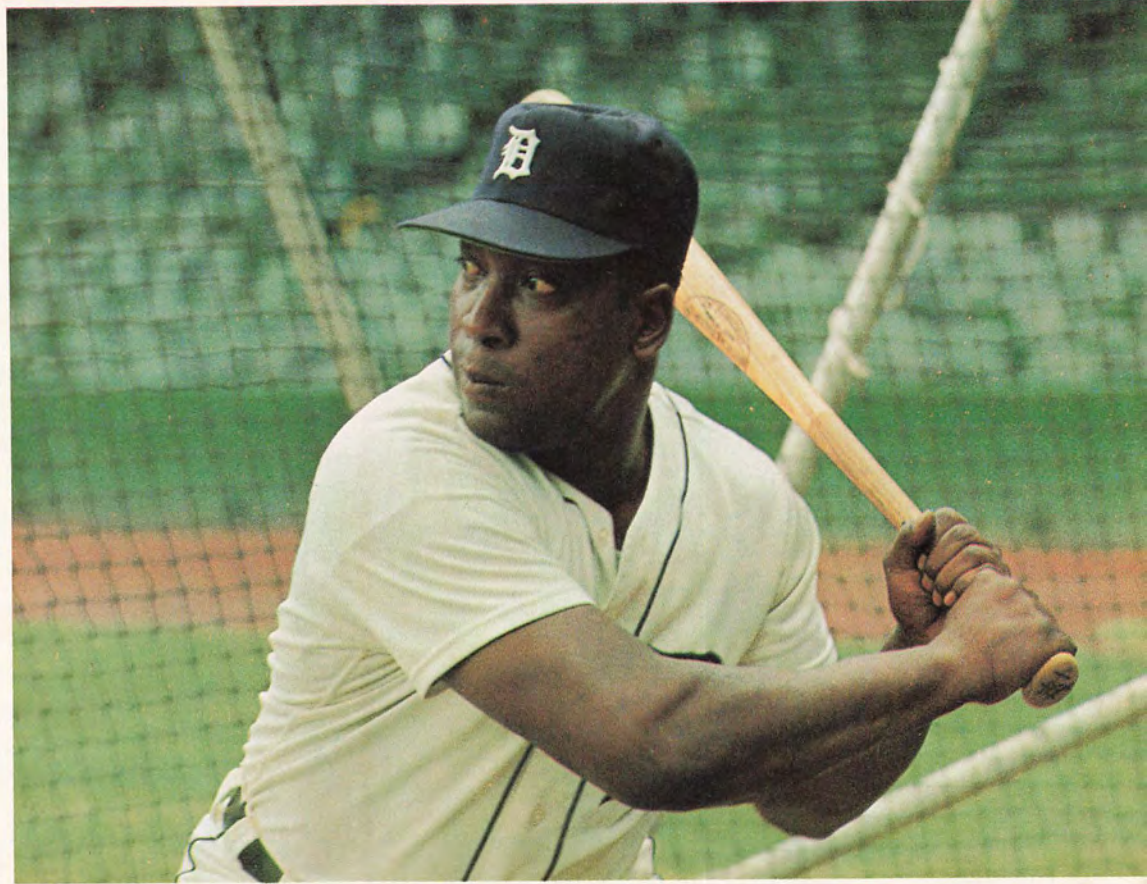

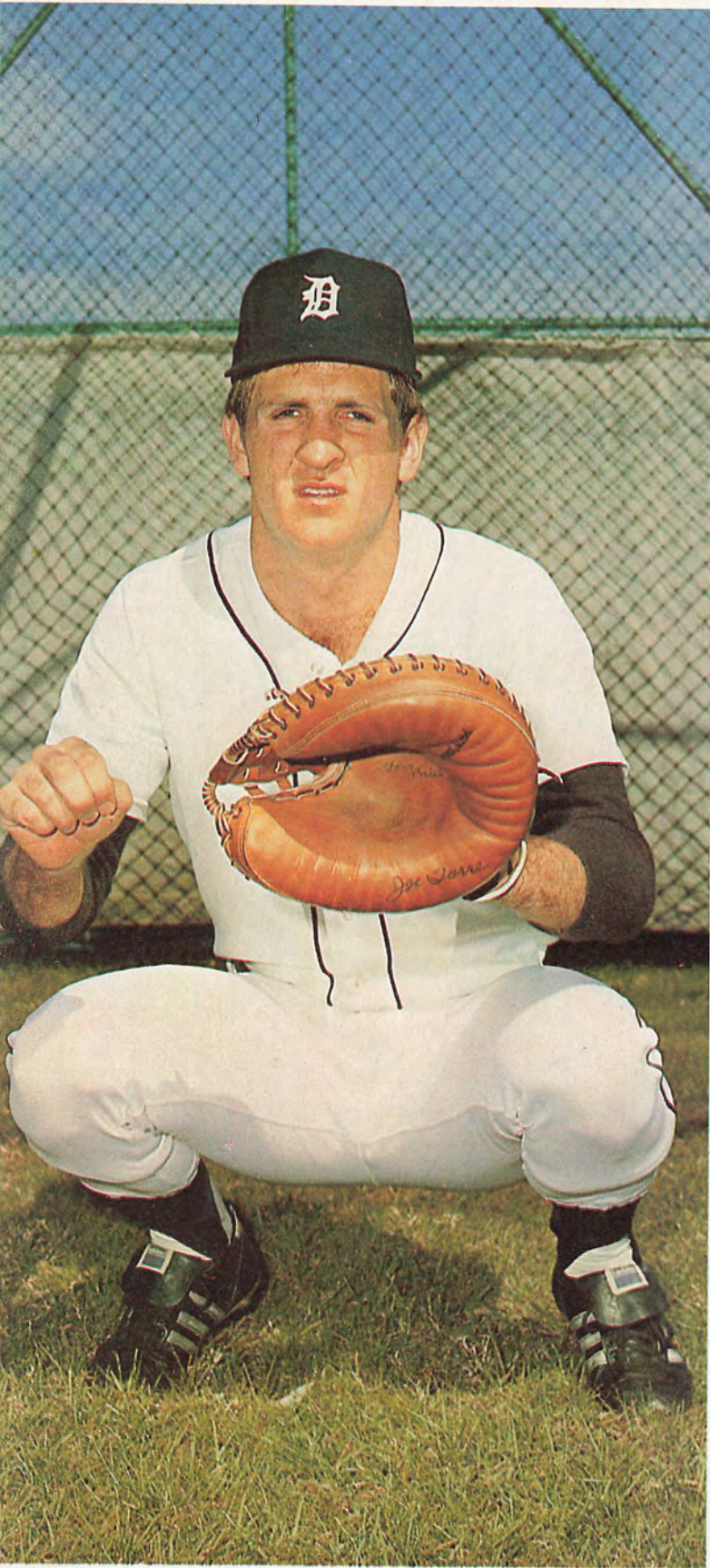


Gates Brown



Unless the American League does away with its designated hitters, Gates Brown has a place in the record books which may never be threatened. The big Tiger slugger has made more pinch hits than any batter in the history of the league and no one is likely to imperil his mark until pinch hitters replace designated hitters. He set the record in 1971 and pushed his career total to 85 emergency blows in 1972. Diverted to DH duty in 1973, he was unable to pad the figure but no one threatened it, either.

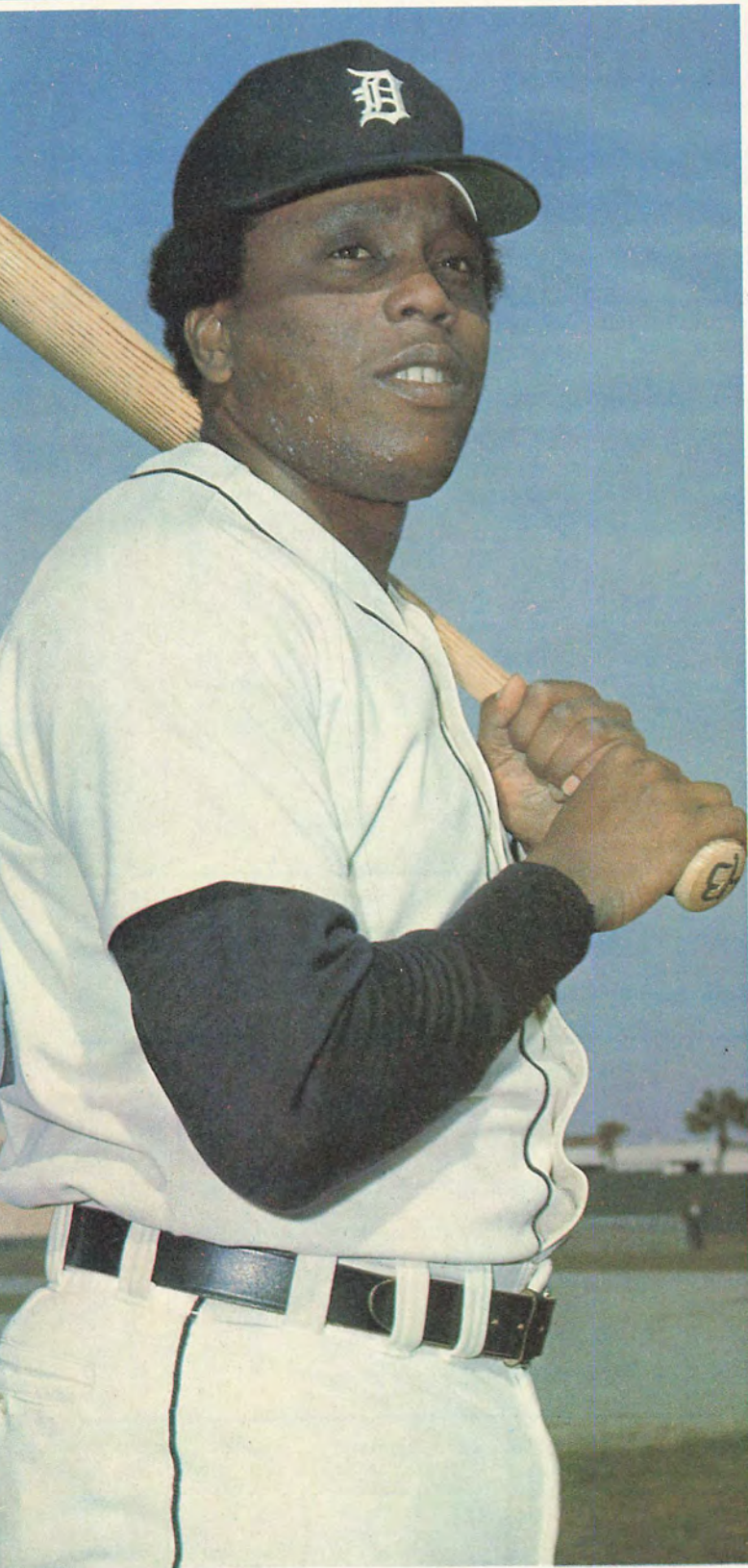

Baseball Hands More Honors To Tiger Owner

The key role which John E. Fetzer plays in major league baseball was highlighted during the off-season when he was elected by the other clubowners of the American League to the game's executive council and, at the same time, was appointed chairman of the American League planning committee.

The seven-man executive council is the policy-making high command of the two major leagues. Other members include Commissioner Bowie K. Kuhn, American League President Lee MacPhail, National League President Charles Feeney, Ed Fitzgerald of the Brewers, Walter O'Malley of the Dodgers and John McHale of the Expos.

The American League planning committee which Fetzer heads is a new unit created by MacPhail to consider "long range development affairs" of the league.

His new assignments are the latest of many important ones handed to Fetzer since he first bought an interest in the Tigers in 1956, then gained two-thirds control in 1960 and became sole owner in 1962.

He previously served on the executive council five years, 1961-65. As chairman of the major league television committee, he supervised negotiation of major league TV contracts and was the first to advance a plan for "baseball spectaculars" which developed into the popular NBC Monday night series.

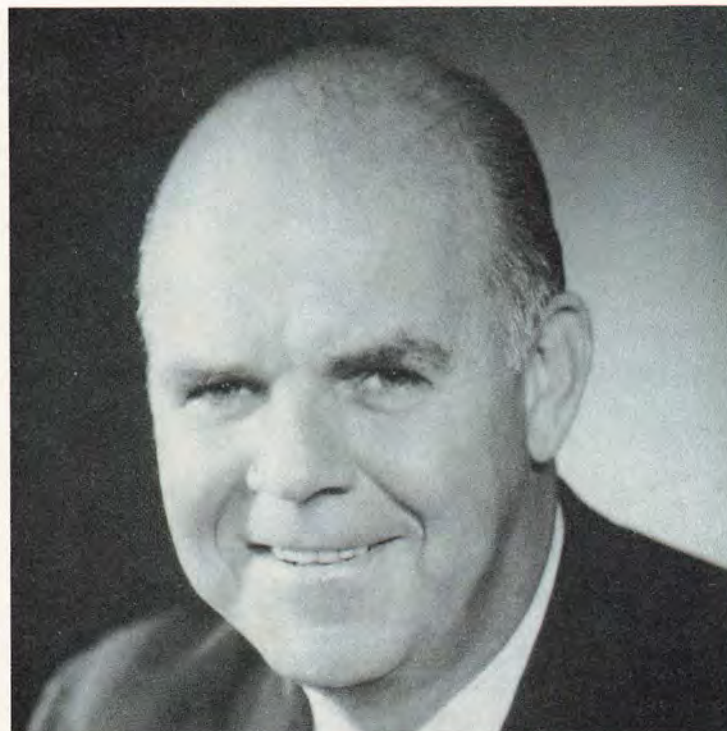
In committee work, he has helped select a league president, settle a fight over league expansion, draft bonus legislation and set up the player pension plan which is the finest in professional sports.

With all of his work at the major league level, Fetzer still maintains close touch with the daily operations at Tiger Stadium through Jim Campbell, the club's hard-working astute executive vice-president and general manager.

Campbell, whose front office career started as business manager of a Class D club in 1949, joined the Tiger Stadium staff in 1953 and assumed his present post in 1962.

Where Detroit's Love Affair with Baseball Began And Still Thrives

There is something about Tiger Stadium, something special for so many in and around Detroit.

"One of the pleasant things that 'progress' doesn't seem to threaten," is the way E. A. Batchelor Jr. put it in The Detroit News recently when he nominated Tiger Stadium as one of the 'right things' of Detroit.

In an age when they are building more and more multi-purpose stadia, seemingly stamped out of the same mold, Tiger Stadium remains one of the few parks designed and built for the sole purpose of playing baseball.

It's where, back in the years, most Detroiters' love affair with baseball got its start.

It's where Ty Cobb, Harry Heilmann, Charley Gehringer, Hal Newhouser, Al Kaline and all of the others swung their bats, stole their bases and toed the rubber.

It's where the mighty Babe Ruth hit the 700th home run of his great slugging career.

It's where Commissioner Landis had to halt a World Series game in 1934 to stem the barrage of vegetables from the stands.

It's where the ailing Lou Gehrig finally came to the end of his long

consecutive game playing string.

It's where the Tigers pulled together a strife-torn city in 1968 with a World Championship.

It's where so many things happened to interest or delight or thrill so many in so many ways.

Baseball has been played on the site of Tiger Stadium since 1900. Then, it was called the Haymarket, later Woodbridge Grove and eventually Bennett Park, in honor of a Detroit catcher of the 1881-89 days of the National League in the Motor City.

Capacity then was about 8,500 and home plate was in the corner which is now right field.

Seating in wooden stands grew to about 14,000 before, in 1912, the whole place was rebuilt. The diamond was turned around, single deck concrete stands were built for 23,000 and the name was changed to Navin Field.

Expansions in 1924 and 1936 pushed the seating to about 36,000. Then in time for use in 1938, the playing area was almost entirely encircled by a double-deck grandstand, capacity was raised to 53,000 and Briggs Stadium became the new name.



That was the last major alteration except for installation of lights in 1948 and the final change of name came in 1961 when "Tiger Stadium" was adopted.

In the pre-1900 days, baseball in Detroit was a sometime, someplace affair. Early parks were at what is now Brush and Brady, also Helen and Lafayette on the eastern outskirts. Blue laws of the early 1900s forced Sunday games to Burns Park, beyond the western city limits.

But, perhaps here is the start of it all, this item from the first issue of The Detroit Evening News, back on Aug. 23, 1873:

"The 'Red Stockings' of Boston and the 'Empires' of this city played a match game of base ball at the Peninsular Cricket grounds on Woodward Avenue . . . resulting in a score of 37 for the Bostons against four for the Empires. The Empires suffered six whitewashings and the Bostons two."

Ah, those good old days!

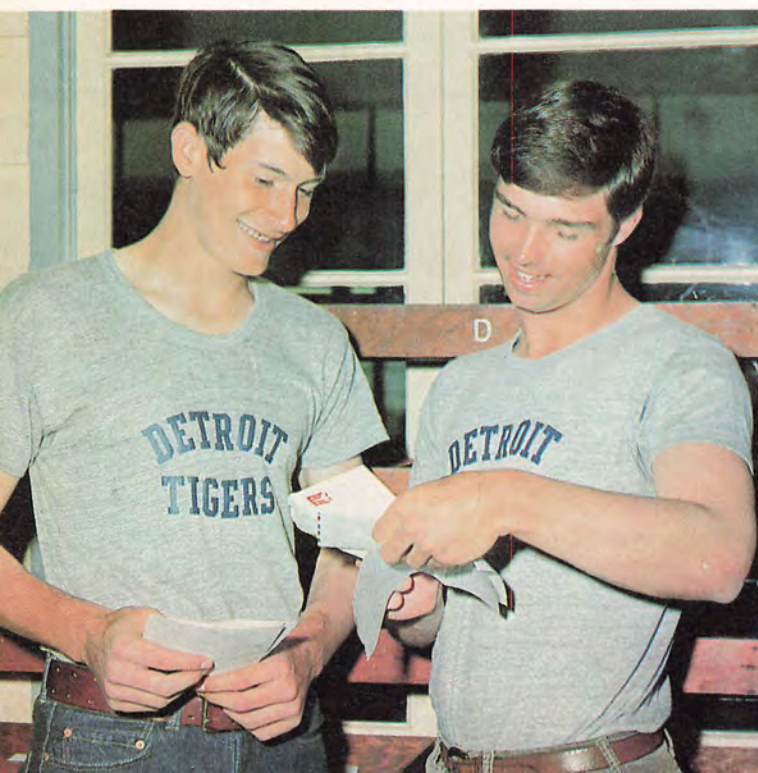

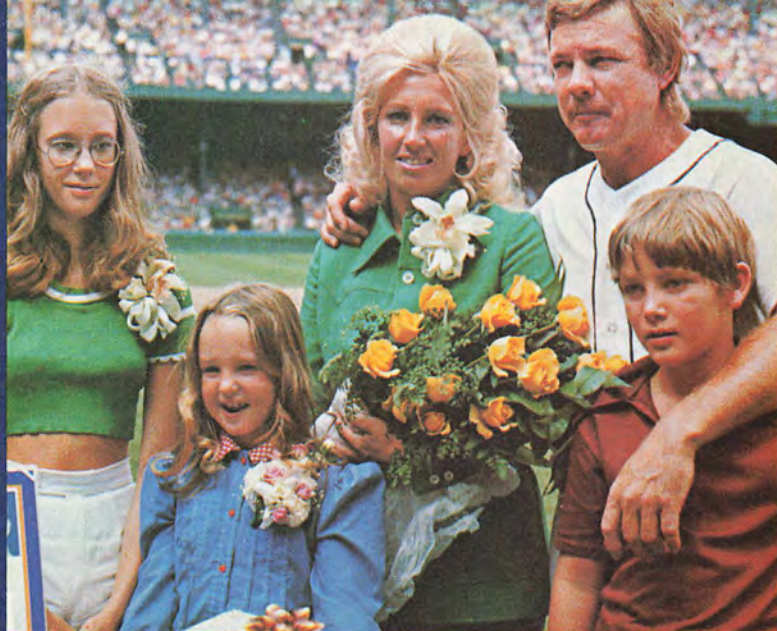

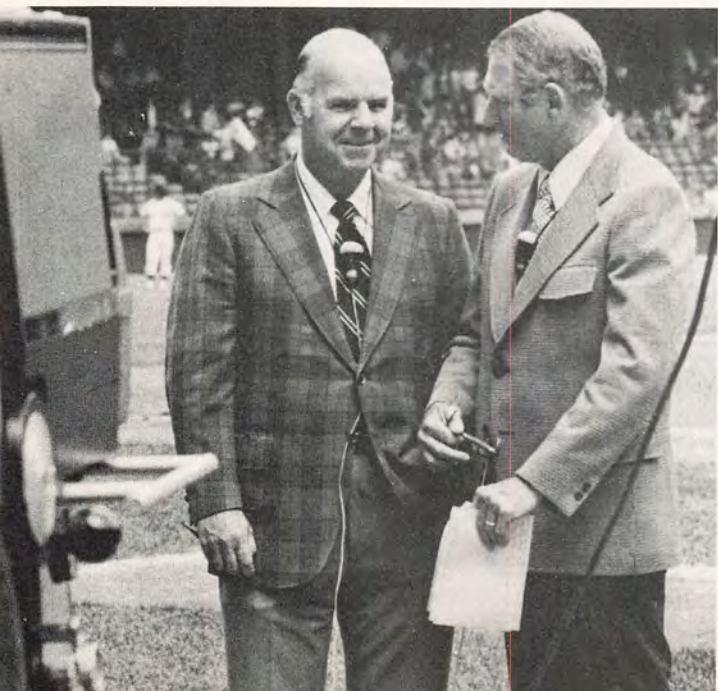
