Spring training in 1980 was almost a whole new ball game for Sparky Anderson — new because it was the first opportunity for the 46-year-old pilot to put the Tigers through their spring drills and almost new because he actually took charge in June, 1979 after nine successful seasons at Cincinnati, where he directed the Reds to two World Championships, four National League pennants and five division championships. With a .591 winning percentage, he entered 1980 as the fifth-winningest manager (10 years or more) in the history of baseball with only one other (Baltimore's Earl Weaver) still active. 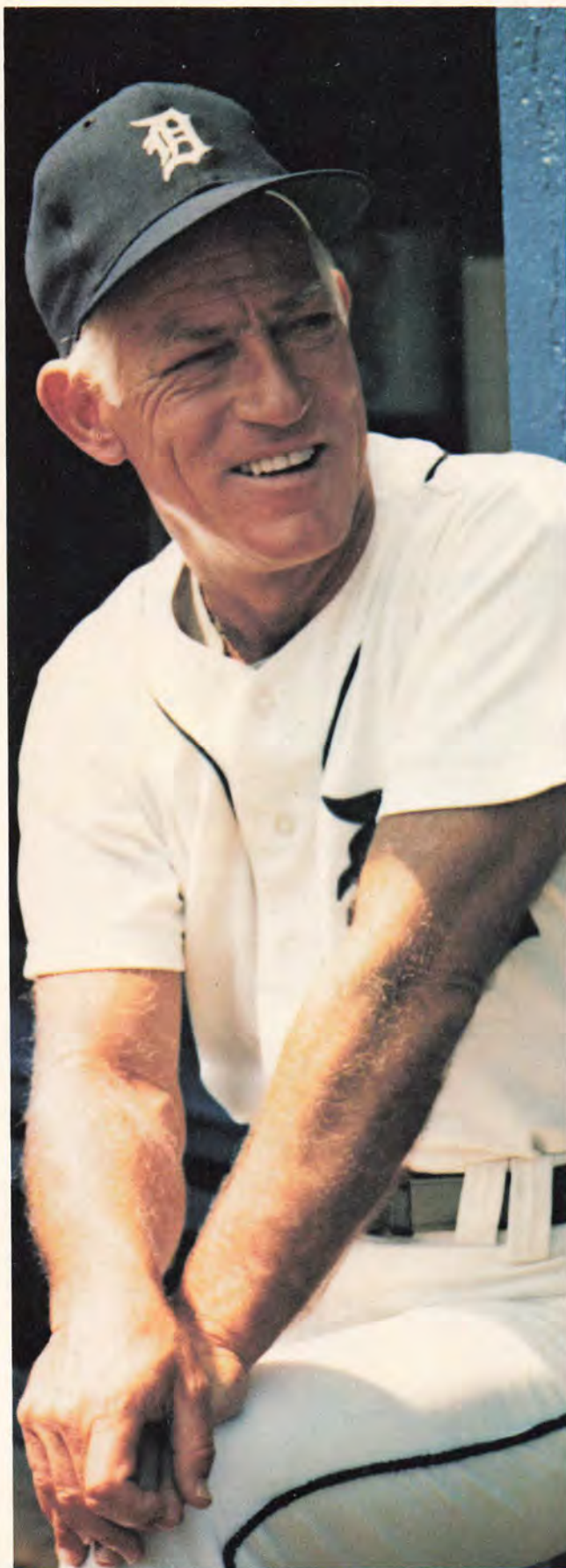

SPARKY: FACTS, FIGURES

ANDERSON, George Lee

At only 46-years of age, Sparky Anderson already has achieved a level of managerial prominence reserved primarily for baseball legends.

With a winning percentage of .591, Anderson enters 1980 as the fifth winningest manager in history for those with at least 10 years of experience. Of the four ahead of him, only Baltimore's Earl Weaver is active.

Ahead of Anderson are Joe McCarthy (.614), Weaver (.597), Billy Southworth (.593) and Frank Chance (.592).

That's pretty exclusive company and Anderson has compiled that impressive winning percentage with a 919-636 record.

Anderson brought his mark of distinction to Detroit when he became the 28th manager of the Tigers, effective with the game of June 14, 1979, signing a contract that runs through the 1984 season.

Under Anderson, the Tigers were 56-50 in 1979. Before that, the two-time National League Manager of the Year directed the Cincinnati Reds to a 863-586 mark between 1970 and 1978.

Under the leadership of Anderson, the Reds won two world championships, four National League pennants and five West Division titles from 1970 through 1978. During that period, the Reds finished first or second each year except 1971 when they finished fourth.

Born Feb. 22, 1934 in Bridgewater, S.D., but raised in California, Anderson played in the minor leagues as an infielder for six years before playing for the Philadelphia Phillies in 1959.

That was his only season in the major leagues as a player. In 152 games, he batted .218 with no home runs and 34 runs batted in.

Anderson then returned to the minor leagues and played four more seasons with Toronto in the International League before taking over as manager at Toronto in 1964. He then managed in the minor leagues four more years before becoming a coach for the San Diego Padres in 1969. He was added to the California Angels' coaching staff that October — but within 24 hours was named manager of the Cincinnati Reds on Oct. 9, 1969.

In Anderson's first year as a major league manager, the 1970 Reds won 102 games before sweeping Pittsburgh in three games in the playoffs and then losing the World Series to Baltimore.

The 1972 Reds won another National League pennant before losing to Oakland in the World Series. In 1973, the Reds won the National League West Division, but bowed to the New York Mets in the playoffs.

The Anderson-led Reds made the most of their next two trips to the World Series by winning back-to-back championships in 1975 and 1976. The Reds defeated the Red Sox in seven games in 1975 in a memorable struggle.

They came back in 1976 to sweep the New York Yankees in four games. Anderson was named National League Manager of the Year in 1972 and 1975. He credits the late Charlie Dressen, former Tiger manager, for having the most influence on his becoming a manager.

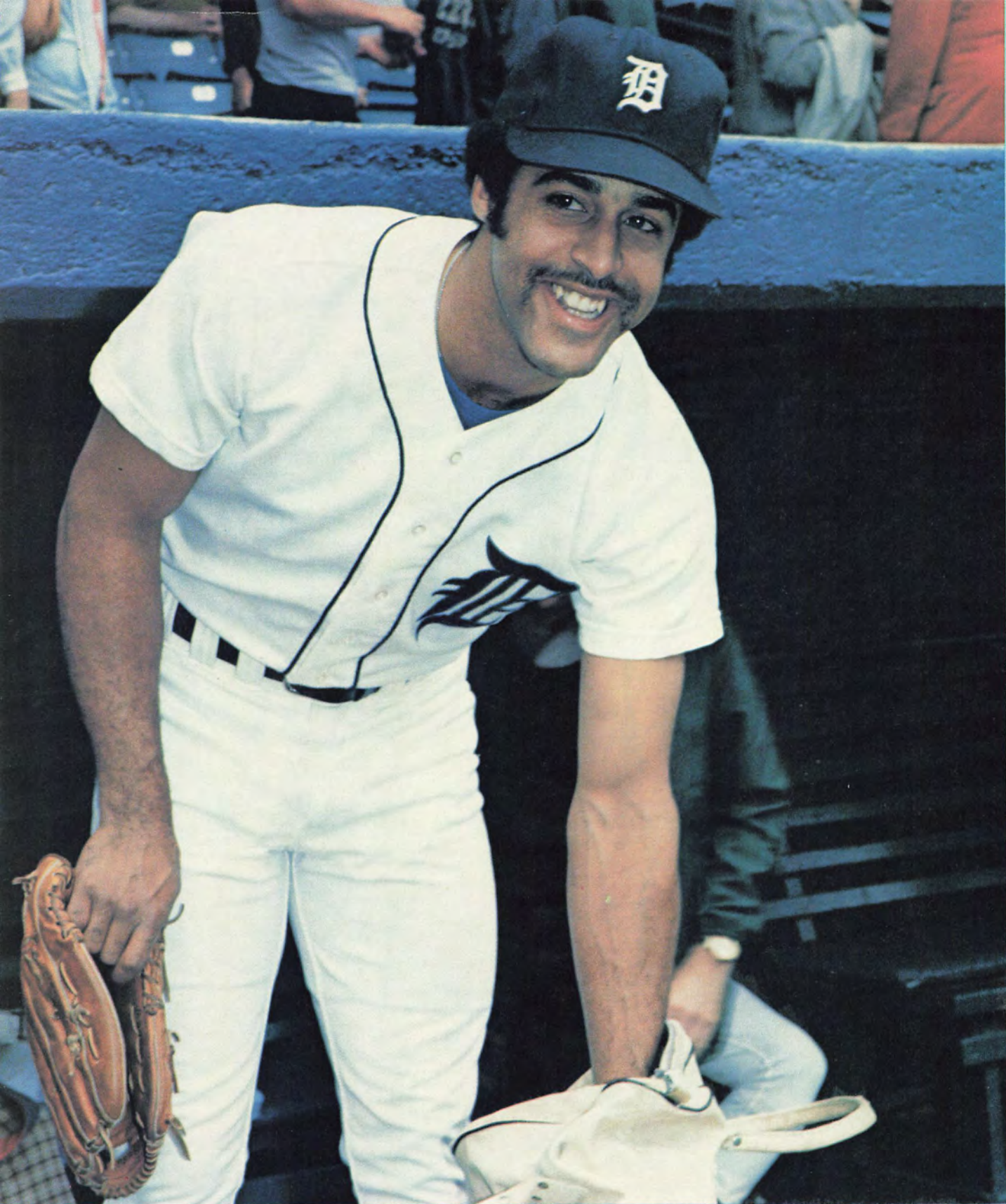




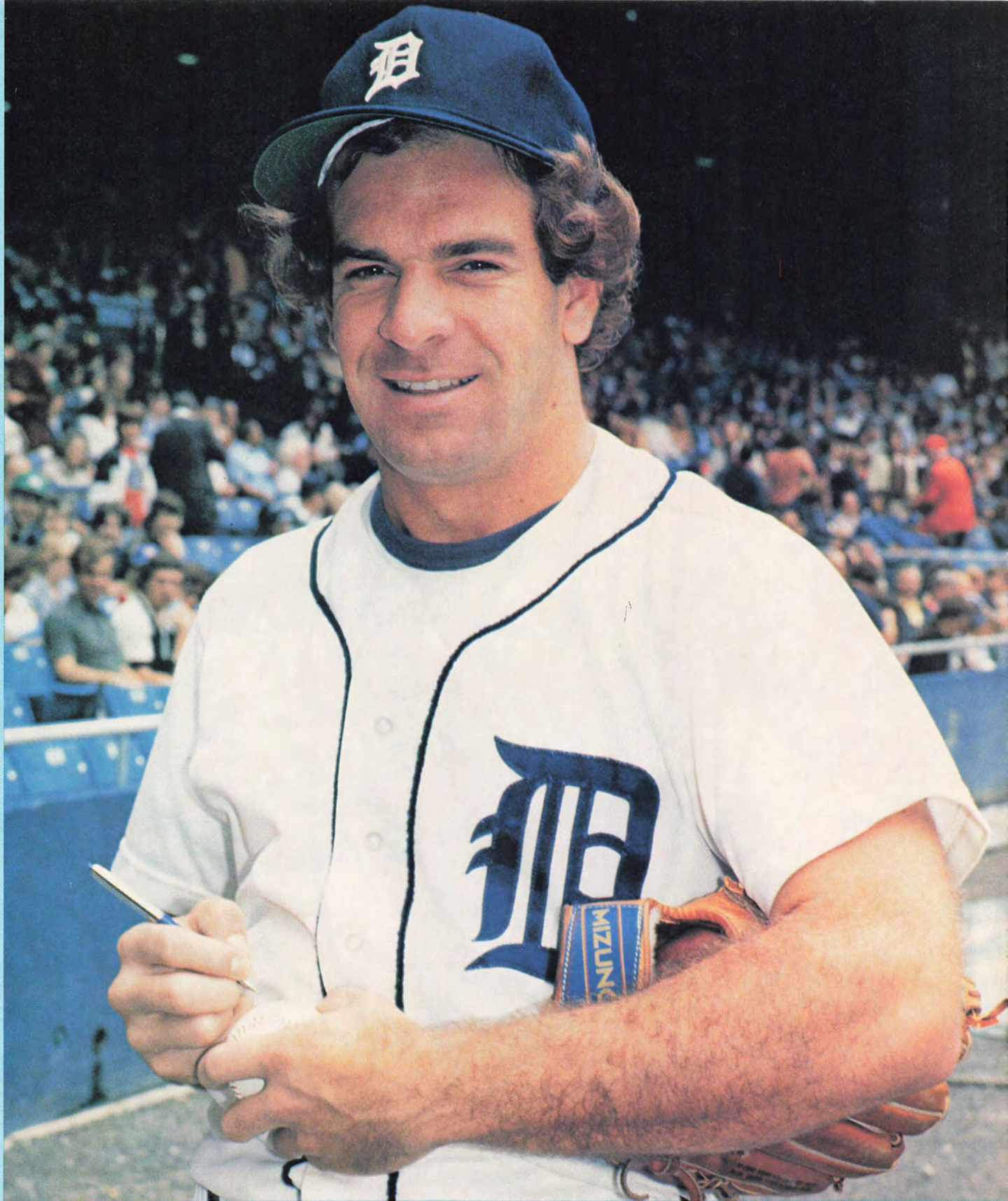
ALAN TRAMMELL has a short major league career, little more than two full seasons, but he can be proud of what he has already done at shortstop for the Tigers. Outstanding in 1978 when he made only 14 errors and took part in 95 double plays, the slender youngster discovered prowess at the plate in 1979. Using a fast start (.464 in April and .306 in June), he lifted his batting average to .276, banged out six home runs and had 50 RBI—all highs for his short career in the majors. He also stole 17 bases, including a theft of home against the A's, a total topped by only two other Tigers on the basepaths.



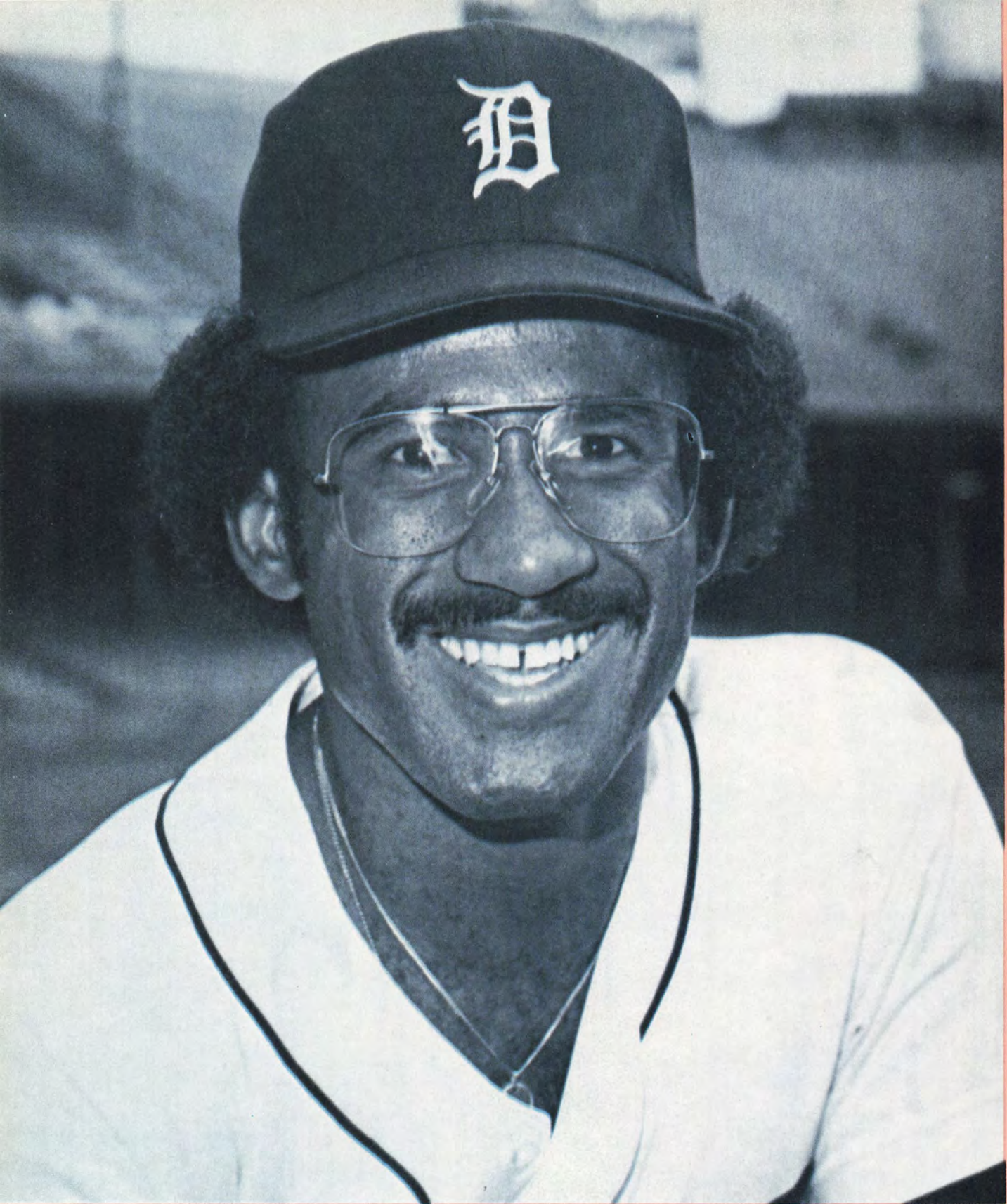
LOU WHITAKER finds little to frighten him on the road to certain stardom at second base for the Tigers. The slender youngster who was the 1978 American League Rookie of the Year discovered that 1979 concealed no threat of a "sophomore jinx"—so why should he fret about 1980? Still only 22 years old, "Sweet Lou" improved his performance figures in six categories last season, including 20 stolen bases and 14 sacrifice bunts, the latter mark leading the Tigers for the second straight year. The only problem was a 20-game absence from the lineup and 15 days on the disabled list because of injuries to his back and a finger.



LYNN JONES has proved to the Tigers that he knows **WHEN** to hit! Drafted last season from the Cincinnati Reds' farm club at Indianapolis, the stocky reserve outfielder appeared in 95 games to collect 63 hits—seven of which figured in late-inning rallies. For that and for his substantial fielding skills, the Thiel College graduate was voted Tiger Rookie of the Year by the Detroit Sports Broadcasters Association. A 10th-round draft pick of the Reds in 1974, Lynn got his first big league chance with the Tigers after a minor league career marked by sterling defensive records all along the way and a .328 batting mark at Indianapolis in 1978.



STEVE KEMP left little room for doubt when it came time for the Detroit Baseball Writers chapter to pick the Tiger of the Year for 1979. It was Kemp in a landslide and that was entirely proper since he already was the club's Triple Crown winner with his .318 average, 26 homers and 105 RBI — the first Tiger to lead in all three since 1975. It was truly an All-Star season for the slugging outfielder who was the Tigers' only representative in the classic at Seattle. Steve's homers included two in one game three times and three in a doubleheader. He had four hits in a game three times and led the team in doubles, game-winning RBI, slugging and on-base percentage.



AL COWENS came to the Tigers at the one-quarter mark of the 1980 season — from the Angels in exchange for Jason Thompson — to end an intensive search for an experienced righthanded hitter. The talented outfielder arrived with all the qualifications of a star, including a tremendous season at Kansas City in 1977 when he was second in MVP voting with a .312 average, 23 home runs, 112 runs batted in, 16 stolen bases, a 16-game hitting streak and a Gold Glove award for superb fielding which included 14 assists. The 28-year-old California native spent six notable seasons with the Royals before being traded to the Angels.

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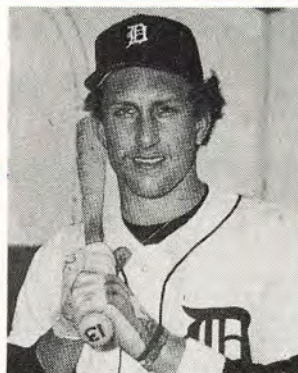


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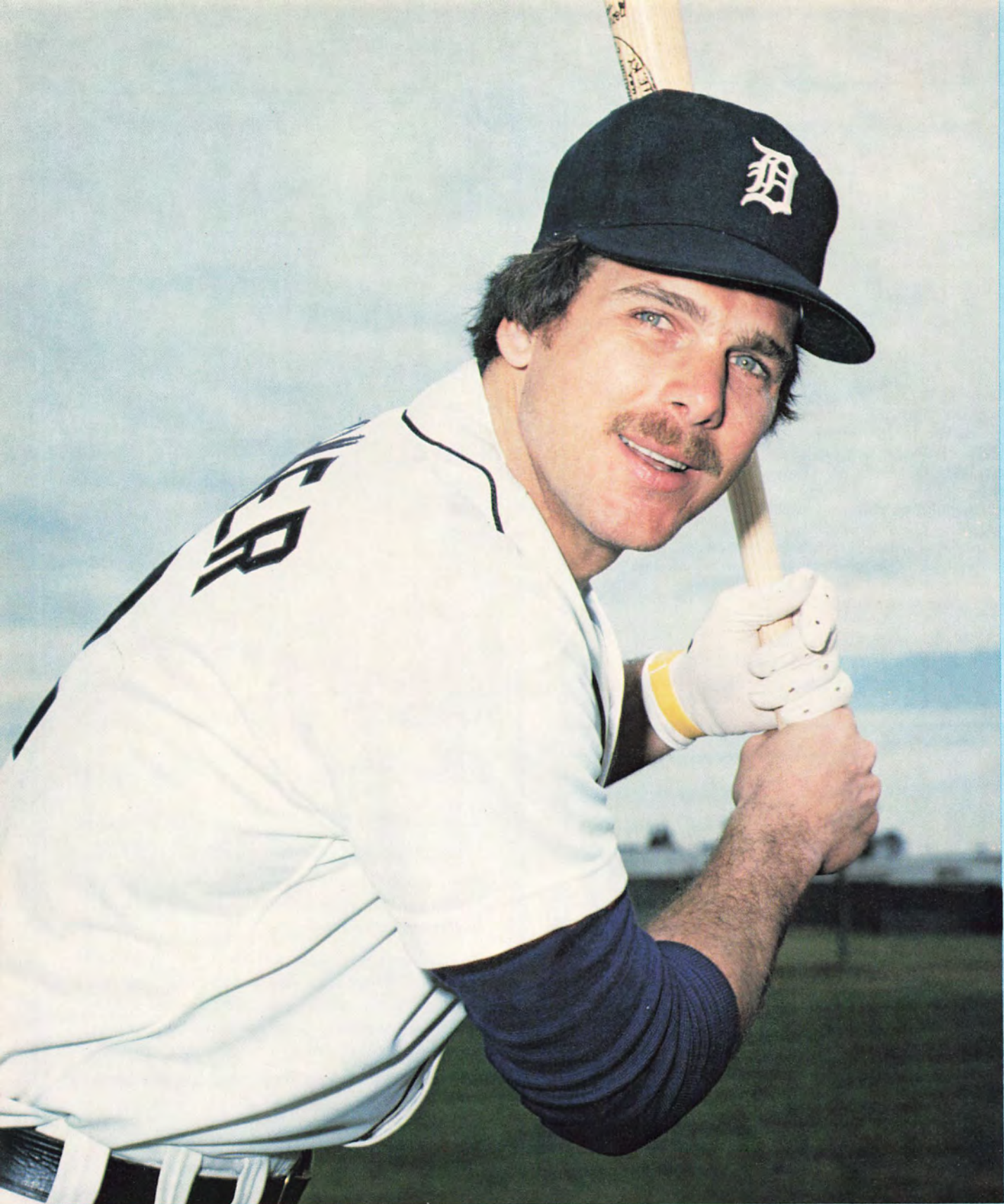
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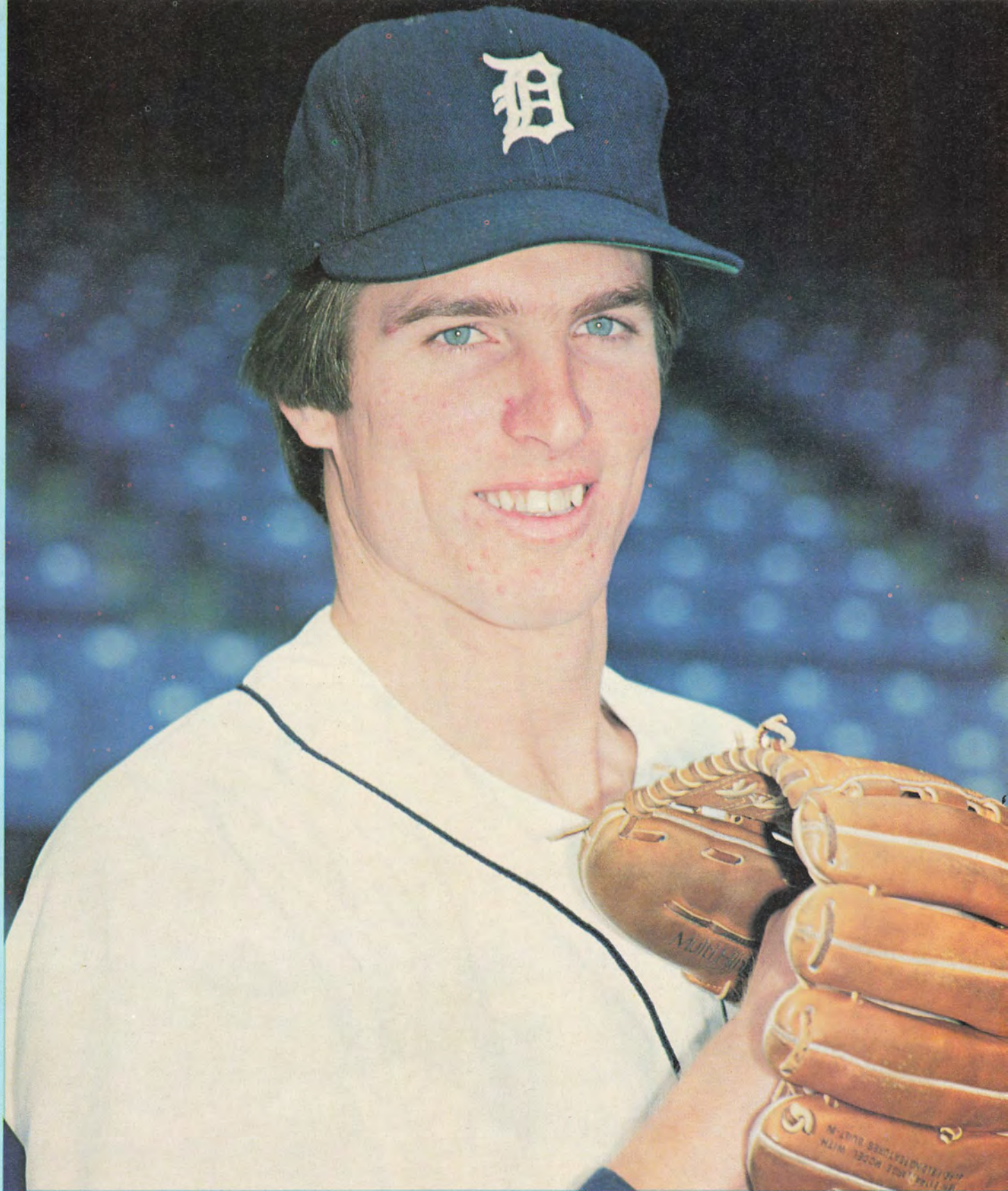


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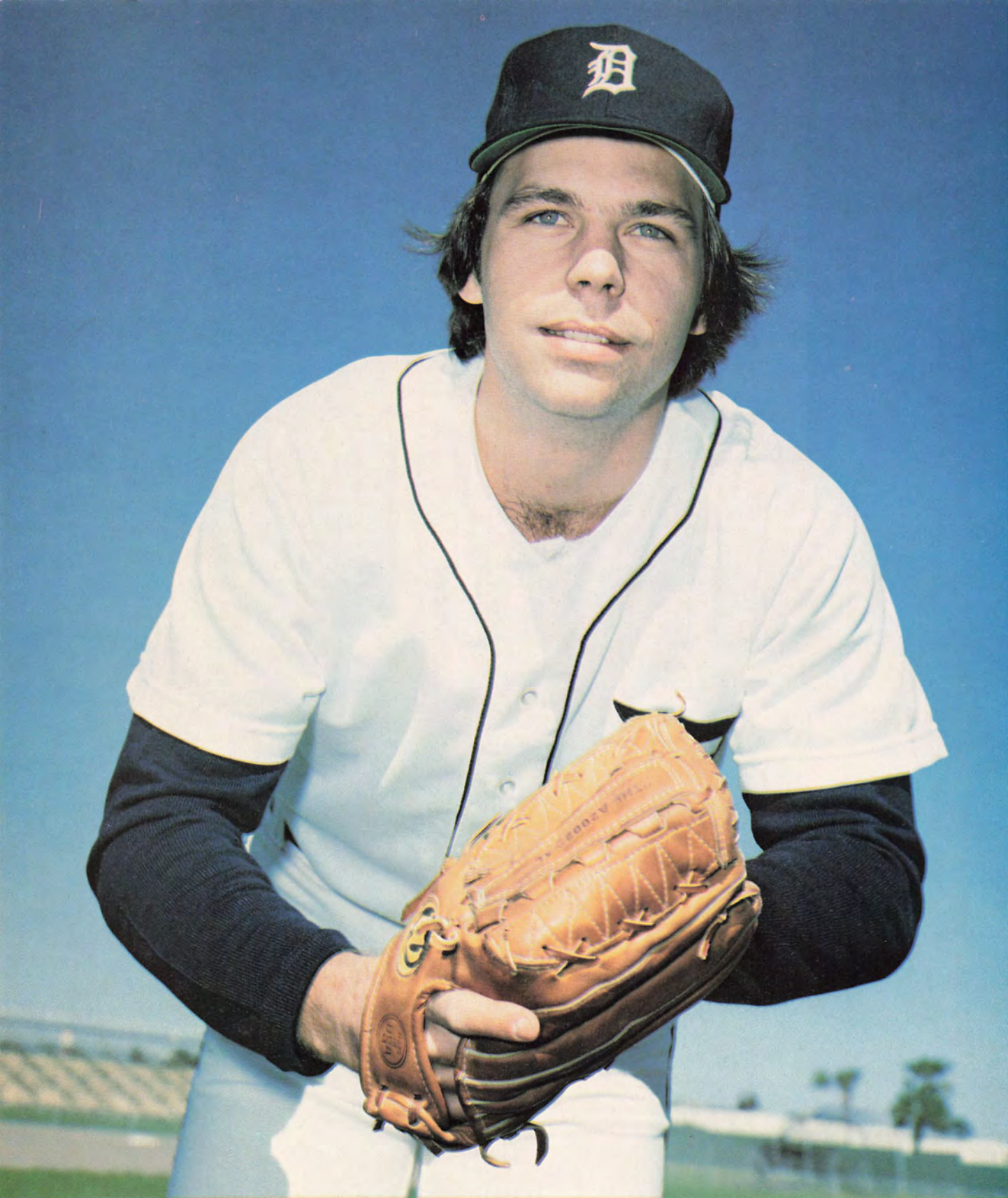
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RICHIE HEBNER came to the Tigers for the 1980 season with an 11-year National League record averaging 15 home runs and 63 RBI per season to go with his lifetime batting mark of .276. A lefthanded hitter and regularly a third baseman, Richie was obtained from the Mets for Jerry Morales and Phil Mankowski but was originally signed by the Pirates, for whom he played eight seasons and was a .300 hitter twice. He then became a free agent and was signed by the Phillies to play first base two seasons before going to the Mets in 1979. A prep hockey and baseball star, he spurned an ice offer from the Boston Bruins to play baseball.



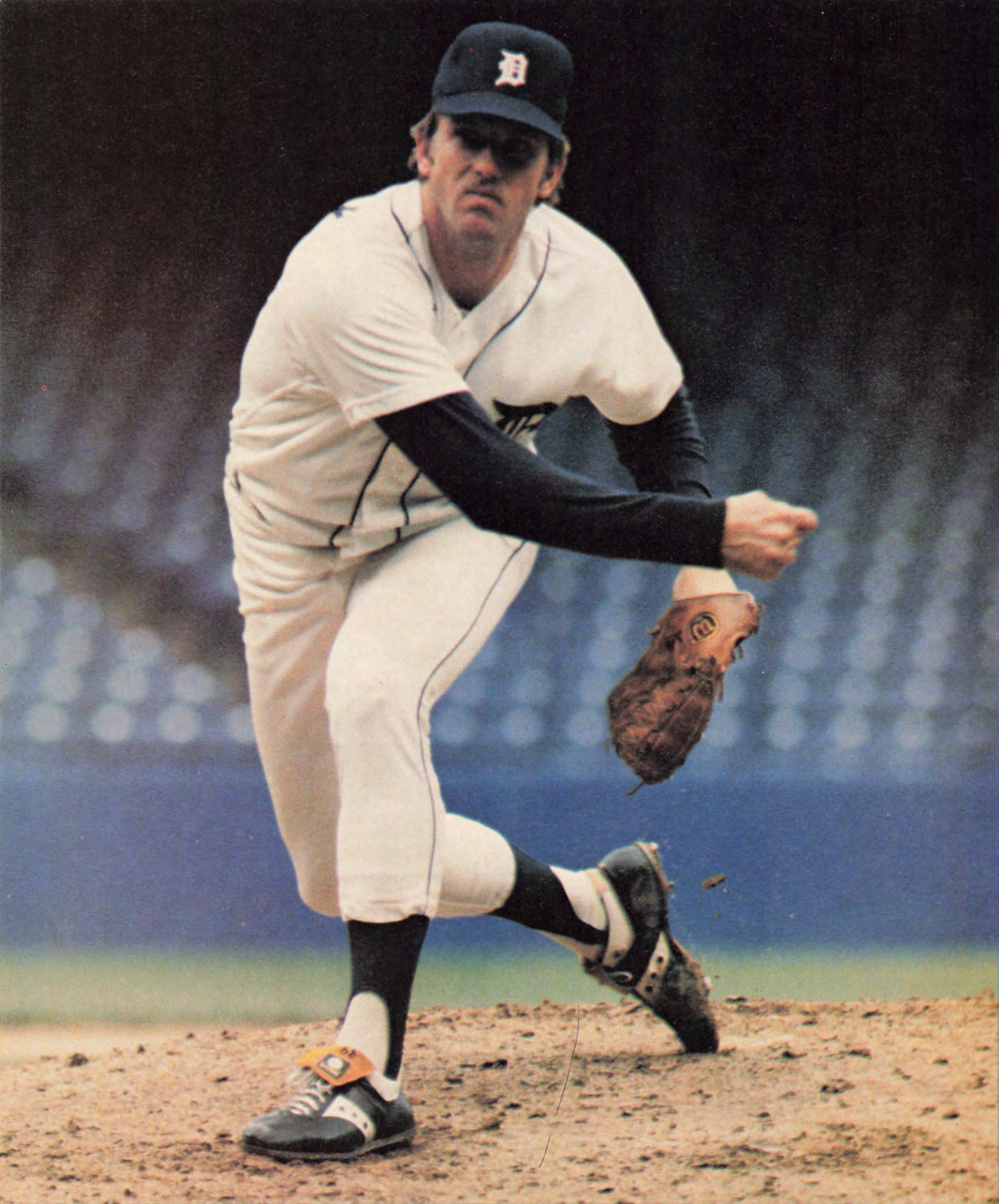
JACK MORRIS wants to see what a full season with the Tigers will do for his record. After spending a month in the minors in 1979, the hard-throwing youngster still found time to chalk up 17 victories and a 3.28 ERA, one mark tying and the other topping righthanded starters in the American League. Finishing especially strong, Jack won his last four, 10 of his last 12 and 13 of his last 16 decisions. He had a four-hit shutout vs. the league champion Orioles and was 3-0 vs. the Brewers. Shoulder problems limited Morris' action in both 1978 and 1977, when he was first called up to replace the injured Mark Fidrych.



DAN SCHATZEDER was hailed as the best young southpaw pitching prospect in the National League when he was obtained by the Tigers from Montreal for Ron LeFlore following the 1979 season. With the 1979 Expos, Dan won 10 games, lost half that many and compiled a 2.83 earned run average which was the lowest for any lefthander in the National League. Schatzeder had a late-season five-game winning streak and won six of his last eight decisions. A native of Illinois, he now lives in Colorado, is a graduate of the University of Denver and played semi-pro baseball in Alaska before signing his first contract with the Expos in 1976.



AURELIO LOPEZ, the Tigers' new relief star, answers to two nicknames which amount to the same thing. They are "Senor Smoke" and "El Lanzallama," both reflecting the stout Mexican's flame-thrower pitching which stood him in such good stead in 1979. Acquired in an off-season trade from the Cardinals, Lopez was little used until Sparky Anderson became manager, then got very busy for a season total of 50 appearances (seventh straight year) to win 10 and save 21 games with a 1.87 ERA. A real surprise package after limited major league experience elsewhere, Aurelio found himself among the American League leaders in appearances, saves and relief points.



MILT WILCOX hopes for kinder treatment in 1980 from the old gal the players are prone to call "Lady Luck." The veteran righthander, with three solid seasons as a Tiger behind him, won 12 games in 1979 but pitched well enough to win a few more — including two decisions lost by 2-1 counts and another 3-1. Milt isn't complaining, however, since he was the Tiger leader in games started with 29 and second in three other important departments: complete games, innings pitched and strikeouts. That's nice work for a man rescued by the Tigers from the minors after service with the Reds, Indians and Cubs.

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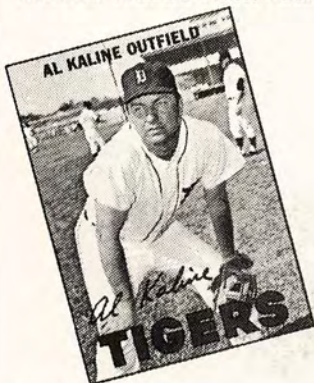
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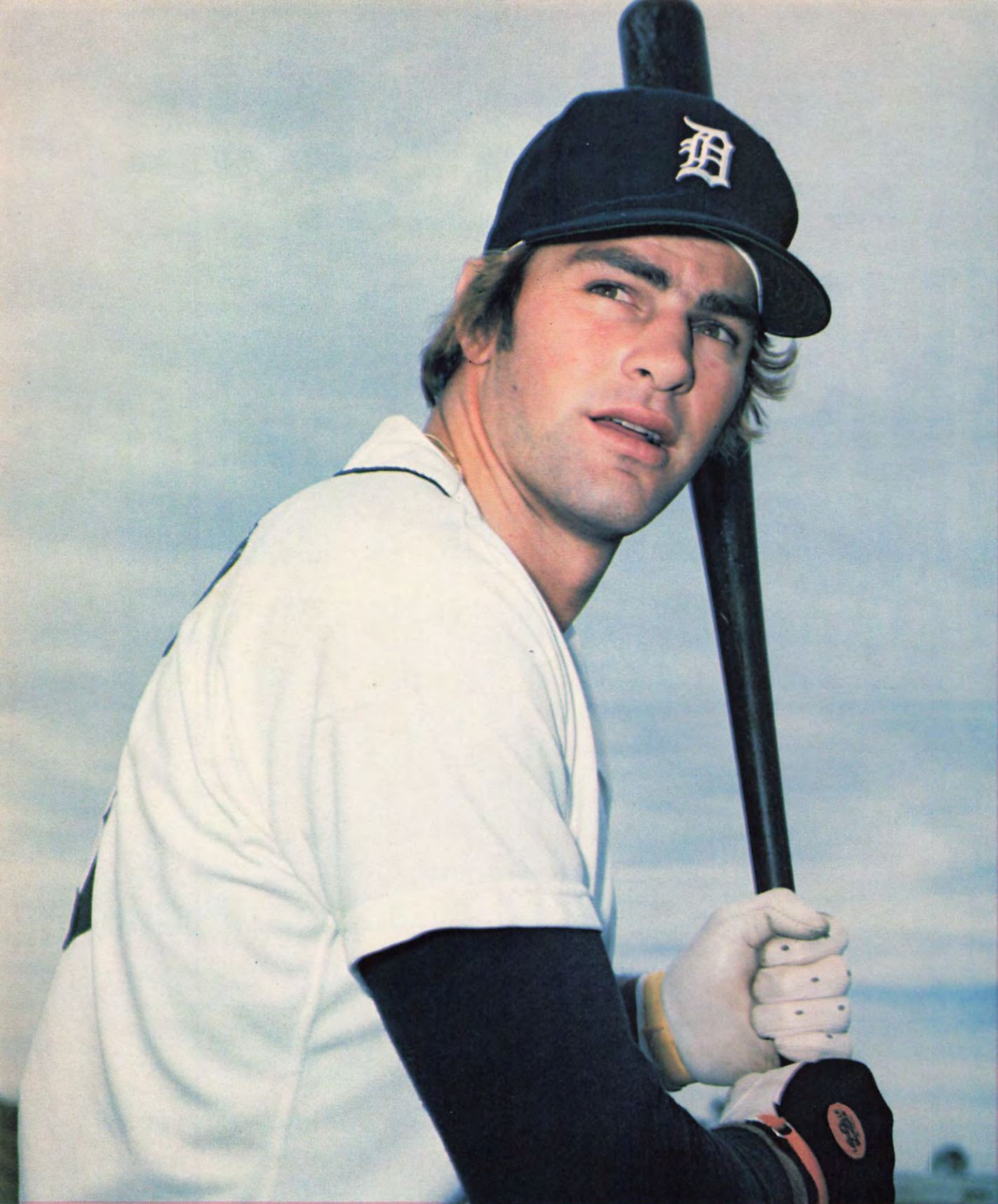
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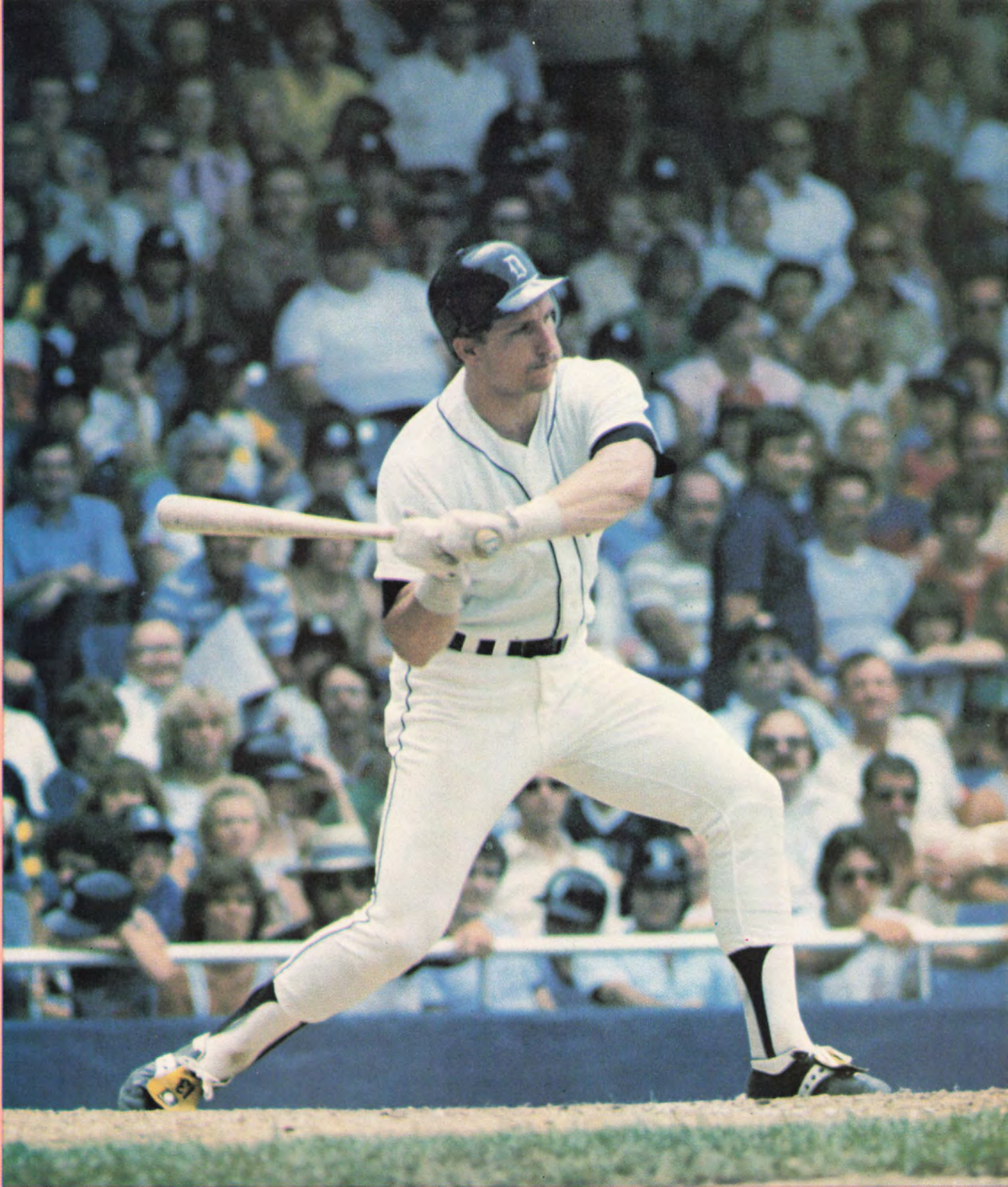
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KIRK GIBSON, who spurned sure success in pro football to pursue a baseball career, has shown the Tigers he has a good chance to make it big. The 210-pounder with burning speed was signed out of Michigan State in 1978 although playing only one season of college baseball. Allowed to finish his Spartan gridiron career that year, the big outfielder with big power was impressive at Lakeland in 1978 and a regular at Evansville in 1979 before a late arrival at Tiger Stadium to appear in 12 games. Gibson was a sensation in the '79 American Association playoffs, which Evansville won, batting .429 and stealing three bases for a total of 26 with the Triplets and Tigers.



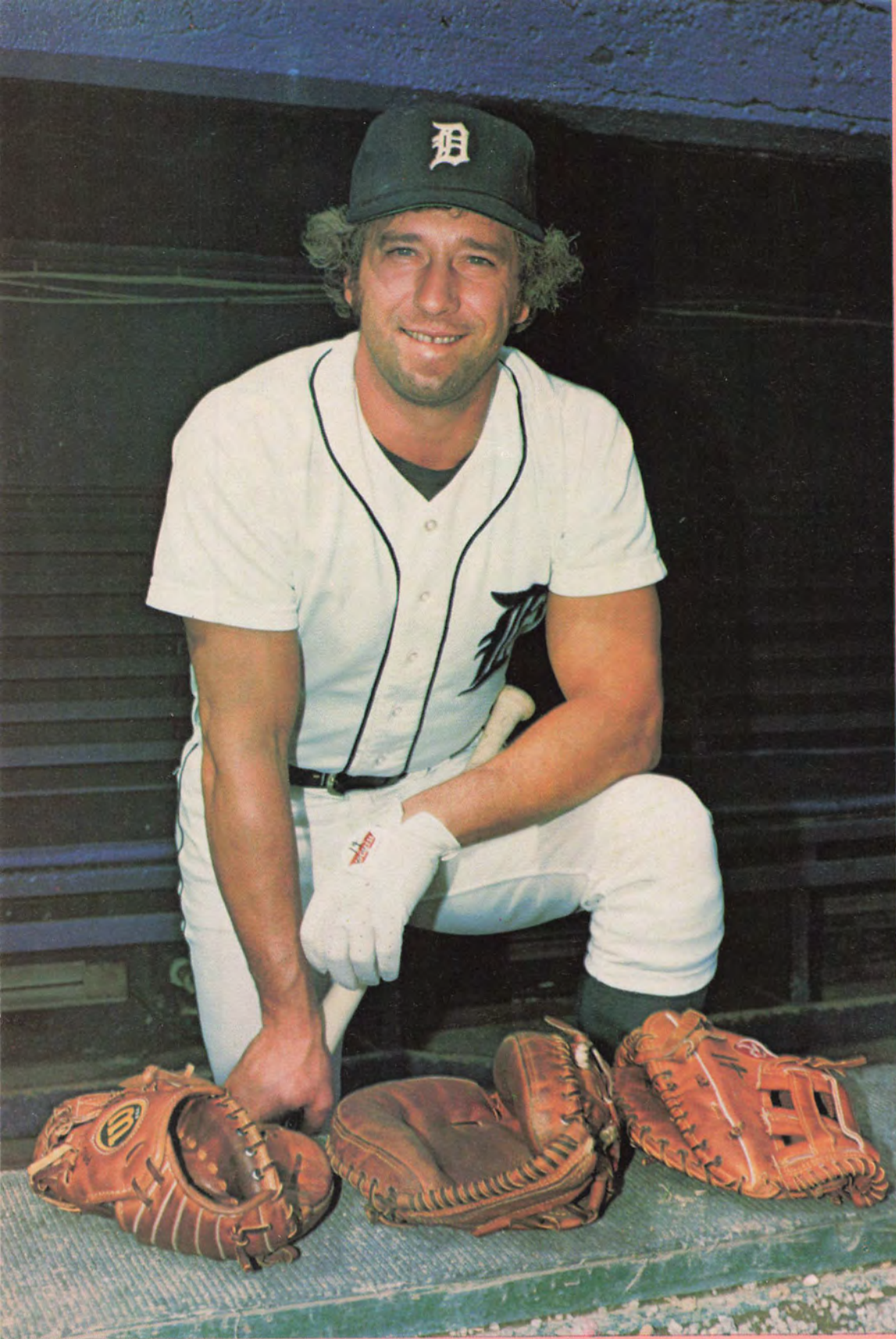
LANCE PARRISH is the Tiger whose name usually comes up first when other teams start talking about trades—which is no surprise to anyone who has seen the young catcher in action. Handed the No. 1 job behind the plate early in 1979, Lance responded with a good start and a solid season, notably in throwing out potential base stealers. He was American League Player of the Week for the period of May 28-June 3 during which he batted .519 with three doubles, two home runs and an .852 slugging percentage. The hefty Californian, who started as a third baseman but converted to catching in 1975, twice hit two homers in a game.



DAVE ROZEMA sees the 1980 season as a pivotal one in his Tiger pitching career. After a number of arm problems, he came back strong enough during 1979 spring training to become the Opening Day pitcher and chalk up such early-season triumphs as a three-hitter against the Blue Jays and a 2-0 shutout of the A's. However, his shoulder started acting up again and Dave went on the disabled list June 16 with a 4-4 record in 16 starts and remained there the rest of the year. Time off was helpful and in Florida winter play, Rozema showed signs of a return to his form of 1977 when he won 15 games and was Tiger Rookie of the Year.



JOHN HILLER needs only a little more time to become the Tiger pitcher most seen on the mound. Already the club's leading relief hurler with 125 official saves, the veteran lefthander closed the 1979 campaign with a total of 534 games to his credit. He needed only five more to pass Hooks Dauss, the all-time Tiger leader with his total of 538 appearances. Hiller could have made it last season if a shoulder problem had not forced him on the disabled list in late August. At that, he finished with nine more saves, second in the Tiger bullpen and another notable milestone for the courageous comeback king who was nearly kayoed by a 1971 heart attack.



JOHN WOCKENFUSS is the Tigers' special sort of MVP. That's what they call him because they consider him their Most Versatile Performer. Popular with the fans as well as his teammates, John was a catcher, first baseman, outfielder and designated hitter in 1979 and plans to continue his jack-of-all-trades role in 1980. Wockenfuss reached a career high of 15 home runs last season, including a grand slam effort against the Rangers which was his second homer of the game. The affable veteran, who started playing in 1967 and became Tiger property in a 1973 off-season minor league deal, set six other personal highs in his 87 games.



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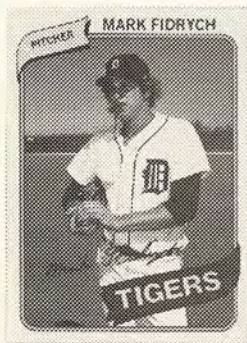
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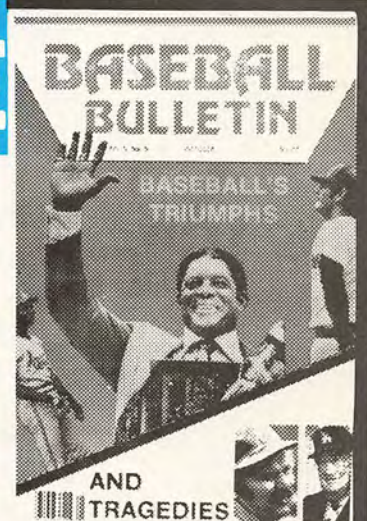
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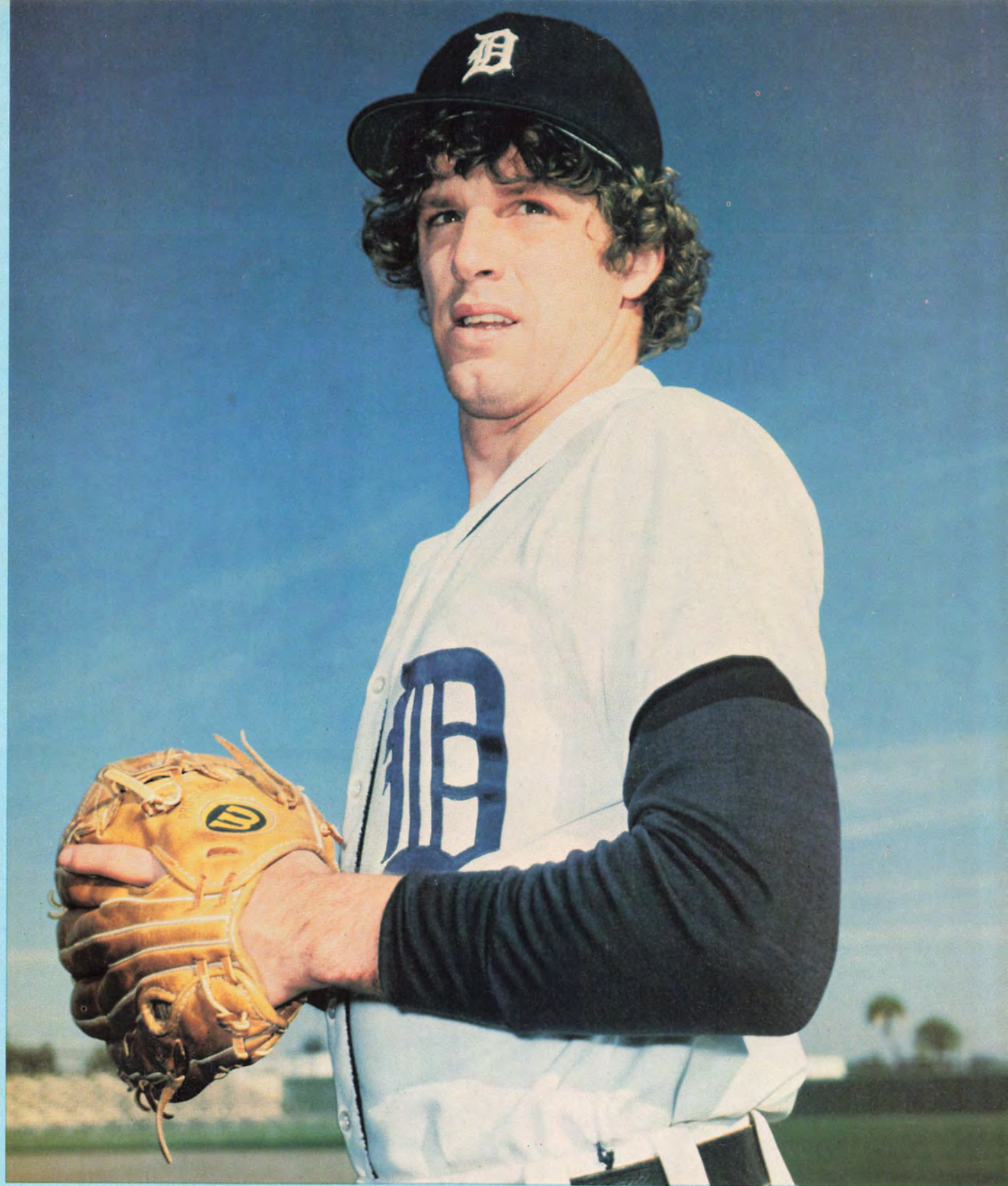
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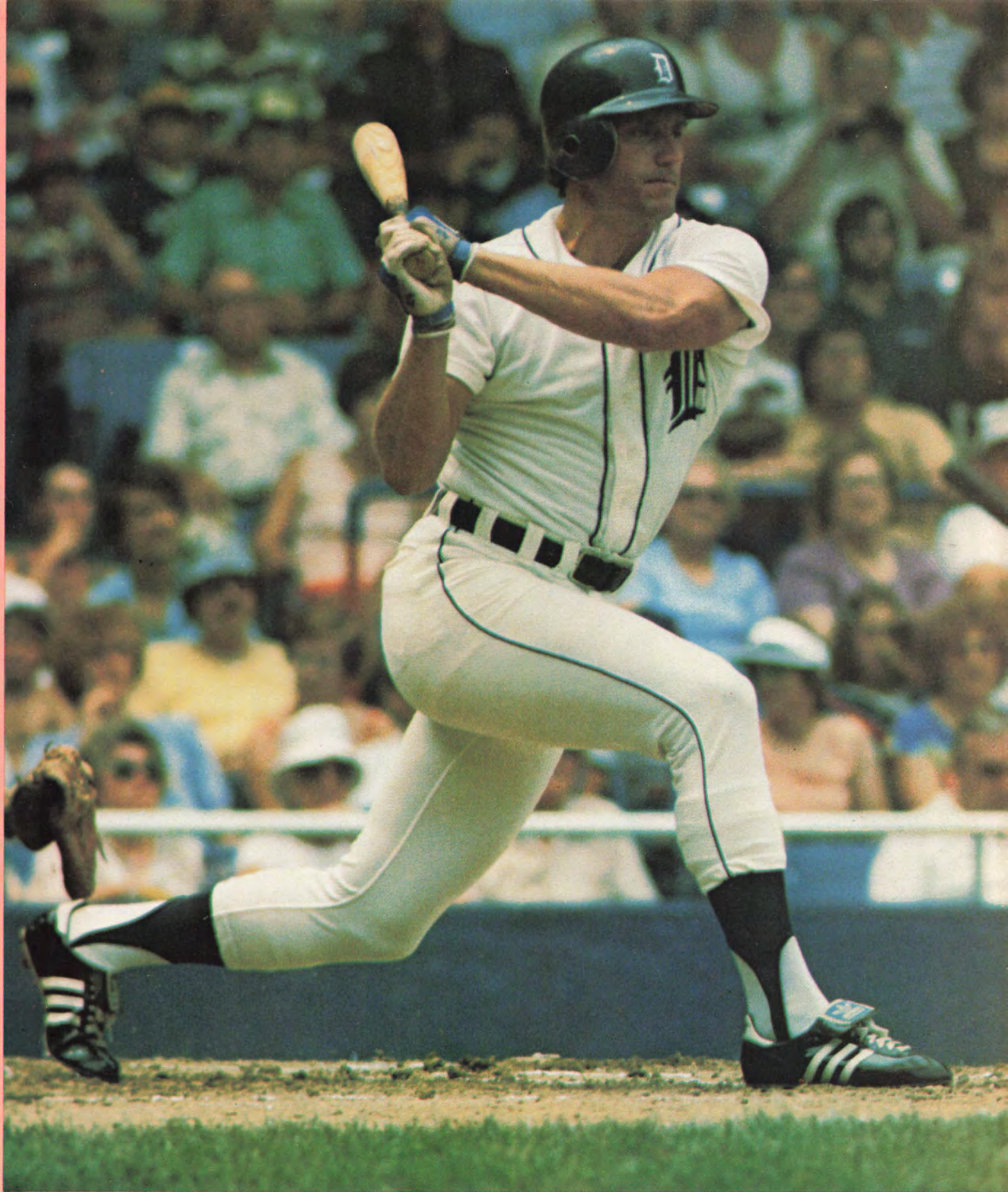
DAVE STEGMAN has all the fielding credentials any major league flychaser needs. Now, the Tigers believe, he has developed the batting skills needed to make him an important cog in their diamond machine. All-America twice in his career at the University of Arizona, Dave also was a Silver Glove winner for fielding excellence at Evansville in 1978. Then came a .302 average for the Triplets in 1979, sending Stegman's stock soaring in his third bid for a job with the Tigers. In 12 games with them last September, Stegman's action was limited but he is proud of the three home runs he hit — against Ron Guidry, Mike Flanagan and Scott McGregor.



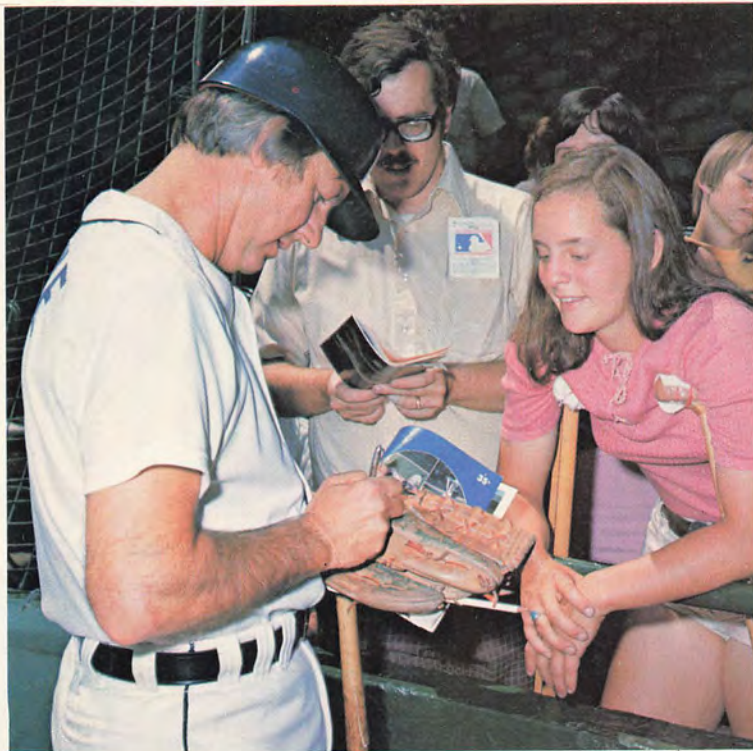
MARK FIDRYCH, while always optimistic, approached the 1980 season with a very large question mark over his curly-haired head. Three seasons went down the drain for Mark after he set the baseball world on its ear in 1976, when he was all-everything and the darling of millions. Since 1976, with his pitching arm on the blink, Fidrych was able to appear in only 18 Tiger games, thereby disappointing his multitude of fans and dampening the Tigers' chances. However, new treatments by a California specialist and a no-pain campaign in the Florida Winter Instructional League have revived Mark's hopes — and the Tigers' — for better things in 1980.



DAVE STEFFEN is one of the Tigers' local products who should make quite a name for himself in the future. Although sidelined by a sore arm most of the season, at Evansville, the big righthanded relief pitcher plays a big part in the Tigers' plans. A graduate of nearby Flat Rock High School, Dave also excelled in football and wrestling. He won the state Class C heavyweight championship in his senior year. But Dave is best on the baseball diamond where his fastball intimidates enemy hitters. Dave has pitched professionally since 1977 and many experts expect to see him pitching in Tiger Stadium soon. It could be as a starter or reliever.



CHAMP SUMMERS is sure he has found a home at Tiger Stadium after considerable wandering about since starting his pro career in 1971. Acquired from the Reds last May, the colorful lefthand-hitting outfielder quickly became a fans' favorite and rewarded them with 20 home runs and a .313 average. It was the best season ever for Champ, who had played with the A's, Cubs and Reds, as well as spending some six seasons in the minors, before the Tigers grabbed him. What impressed them most about his background were Summers' figures at Indianapolis in 1978, when he batted .368, hit 34 homers and had 124 RBI. The homers and RBI were tops in his league.



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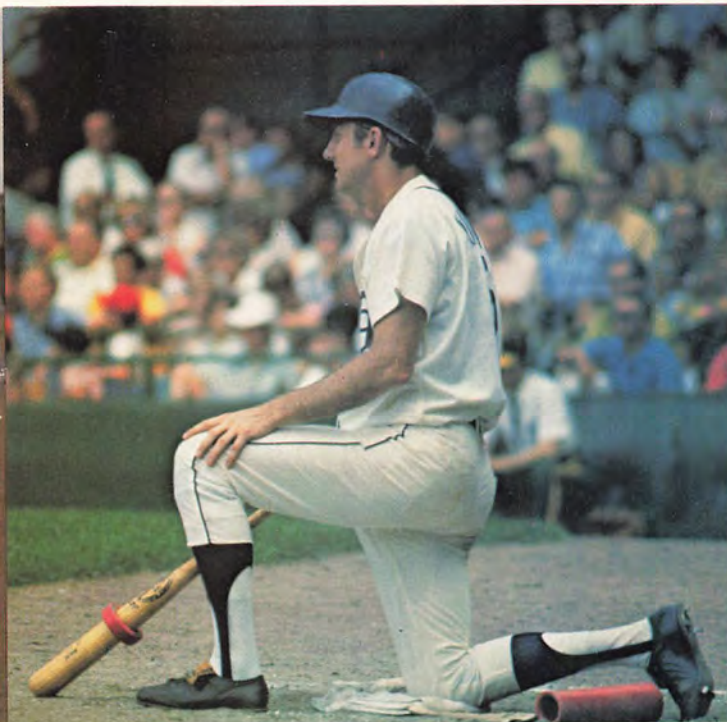
He was accorded 340 votes, 88 per cent of the total cast by the writers.

He became the 19th Tiger elected to the Hall of Fame but only the second who spent his entire career in Tiger uniform. The other was Charley Gehringer.

His election brought retirement of his uniform No. 6 — the first uniform number ever retired by the Tigers.

Al Kaline's contributions to Tiger history cannot be measured by numbers alone. But the figures are impressive for the 18-year-old bonus rookie of 1953 who developed into the premier rightfielder of his time.

He played more games, hit more home runs and had more walks than any Tiger in history. In seven other categories, he ranked second or third.

He was the youngest batting champion in American League history, with a .340 average in 1955 when he was only 20 years old.

He reached the coveted 3,000-hit goal on Sept. 24, 1974, the 12th player at the time to attain that mark, and closed his 22-year career eight days later with a total of 3,007 hits.

He won 10 Gold Gloves for his fielding skill.

He was a member of 15 All-Star teams, 13 in a row, started seven times and posted an All-Star average of .324.

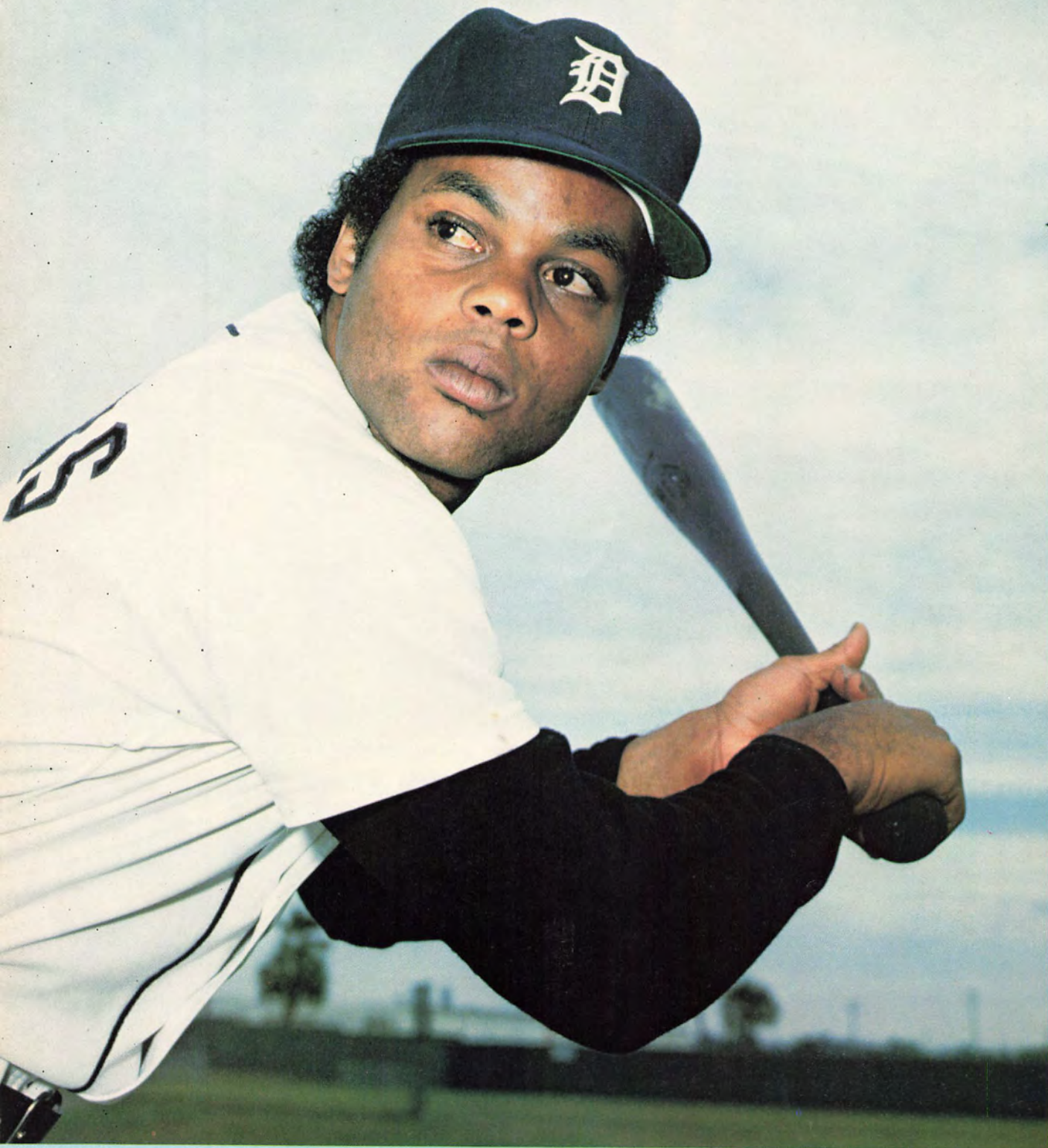

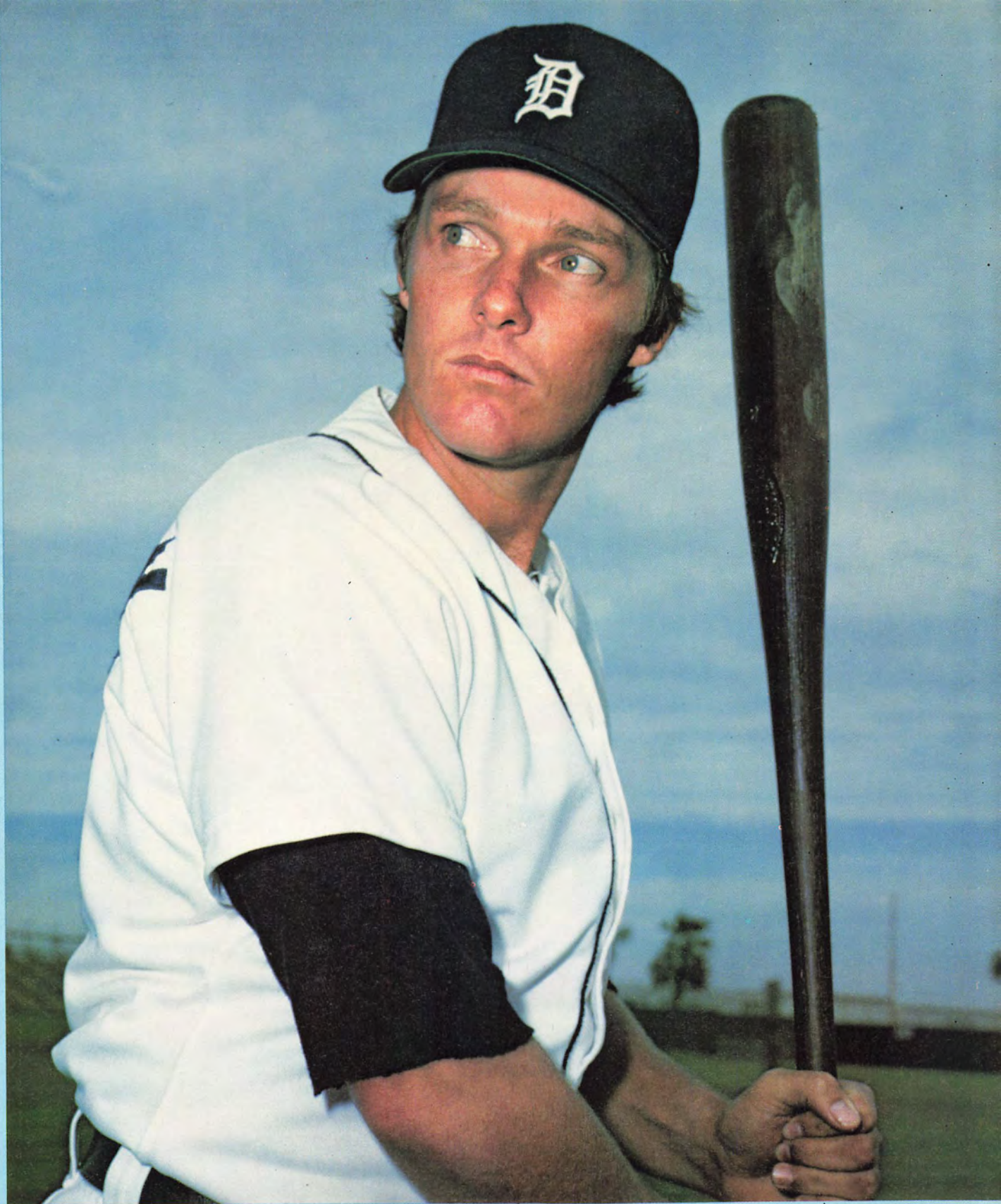

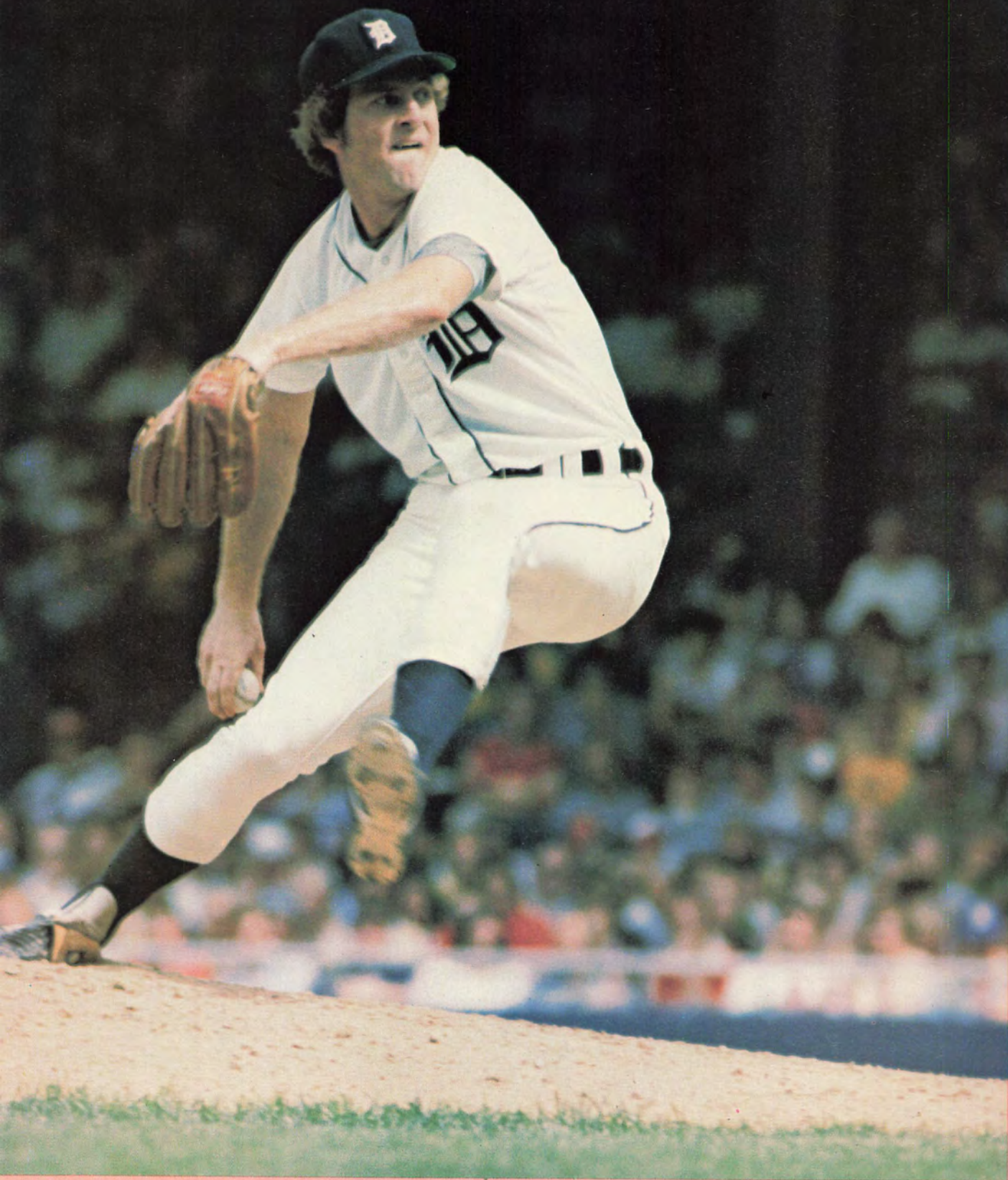
Final farewell: 1974



RICK PETERS, one of the host of Californians on the Tiger roster, is given a good chance of becoming a fine utility man because of his versatility and quickness. With only three years of pro experience, he didn't join the Tigers in 1979 until after the American Association playoffs, where he was a key man in Evansville's drive to another championship. Batting .320 during the regular season, he upped that to .333 in the playoffs, then hurried to Tiger Stadium. Rick's debut was as a pinch-runner but he also was a pinch hitter, outfielder, second baseman and third baseman before the year ended. In 12 games, he managed a respectable .263 average.

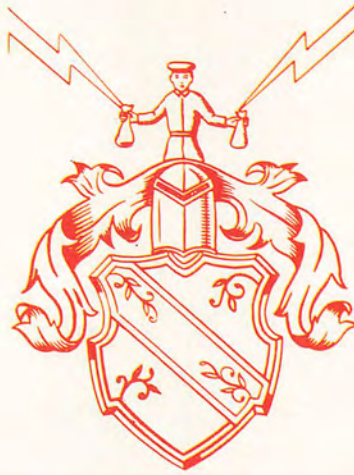


TIM CORCORAN has batted his way back to the big time for his fourth Tiger trial. Signed as an undrafted free agent in 1974, Corcoran has insisted his potent hitting will do the job and he has the figures to prove it. A .309 at Montgomery in 1976 got Tim his first chance as a Tiger in 1977, when he was the club's leading pinch hitter, and he spent all of 1978 at Tiger Stadium. Despite a good spring training in 1979, the lefthand-hitting Californian faded early in the regular season and returned to Evansville to hit .338 in 87 games for the Triplets and get one more shot at the big time in 1980. This time, Tim hopes the move is nothing temporary.



DAN PETRY has surprised some observers with his rapid development as a starting pitcher but the Tigers' high command has placed much faith in the 6-foot-4 California righthander who entered the 1980 season with a record of 96 professional appearances — and every one of them in a starter's role. Fifteen were made for the Tigers after Dan was called up from Evansville last July 5, about three years following his signing as a No. 4 draft choice. Petry won six of his 11 decisions with the Tigers, including a four-hitter against the White Sox, and had two complete games in the first four starts of his initial season in a Tiger uniform.

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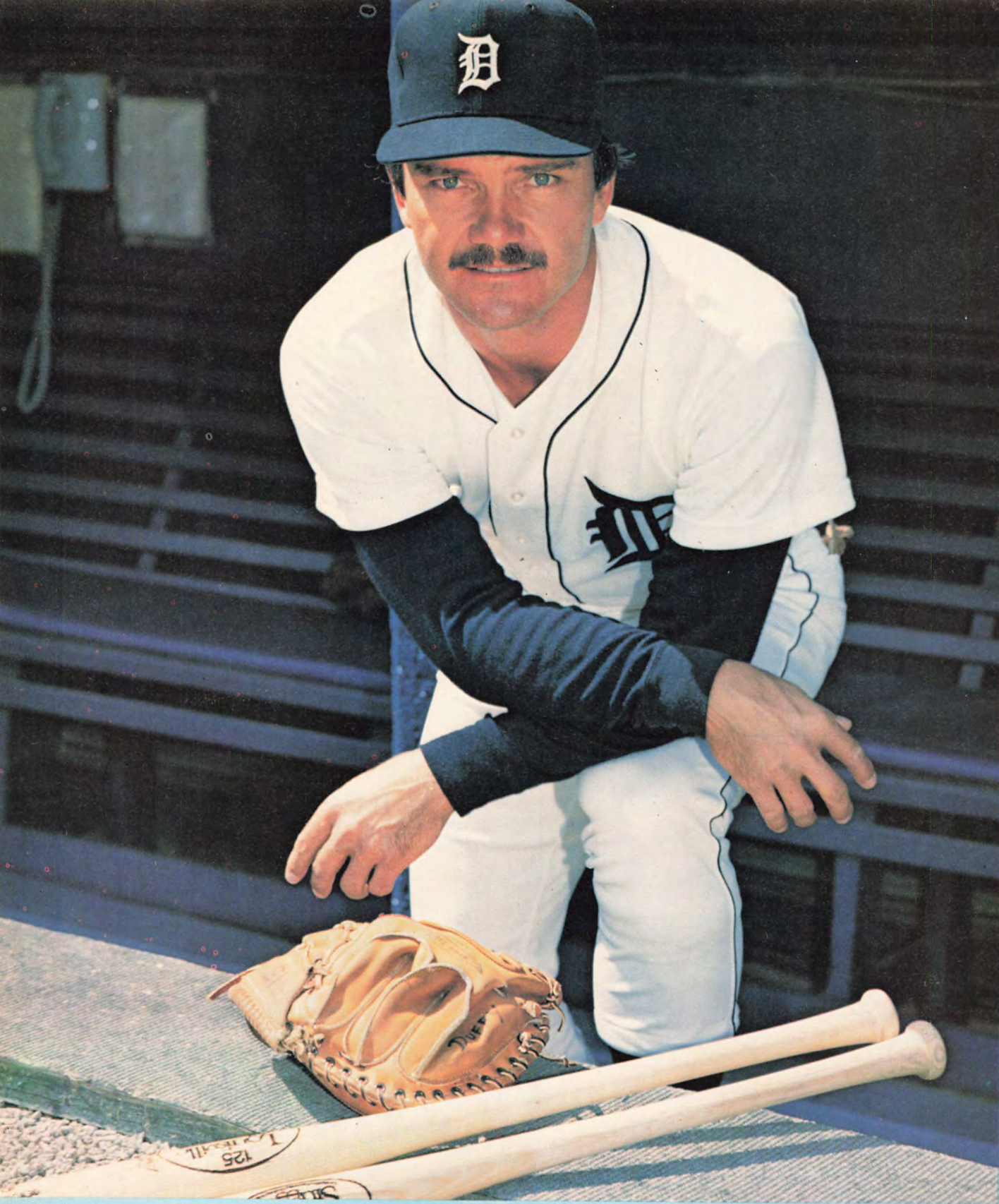
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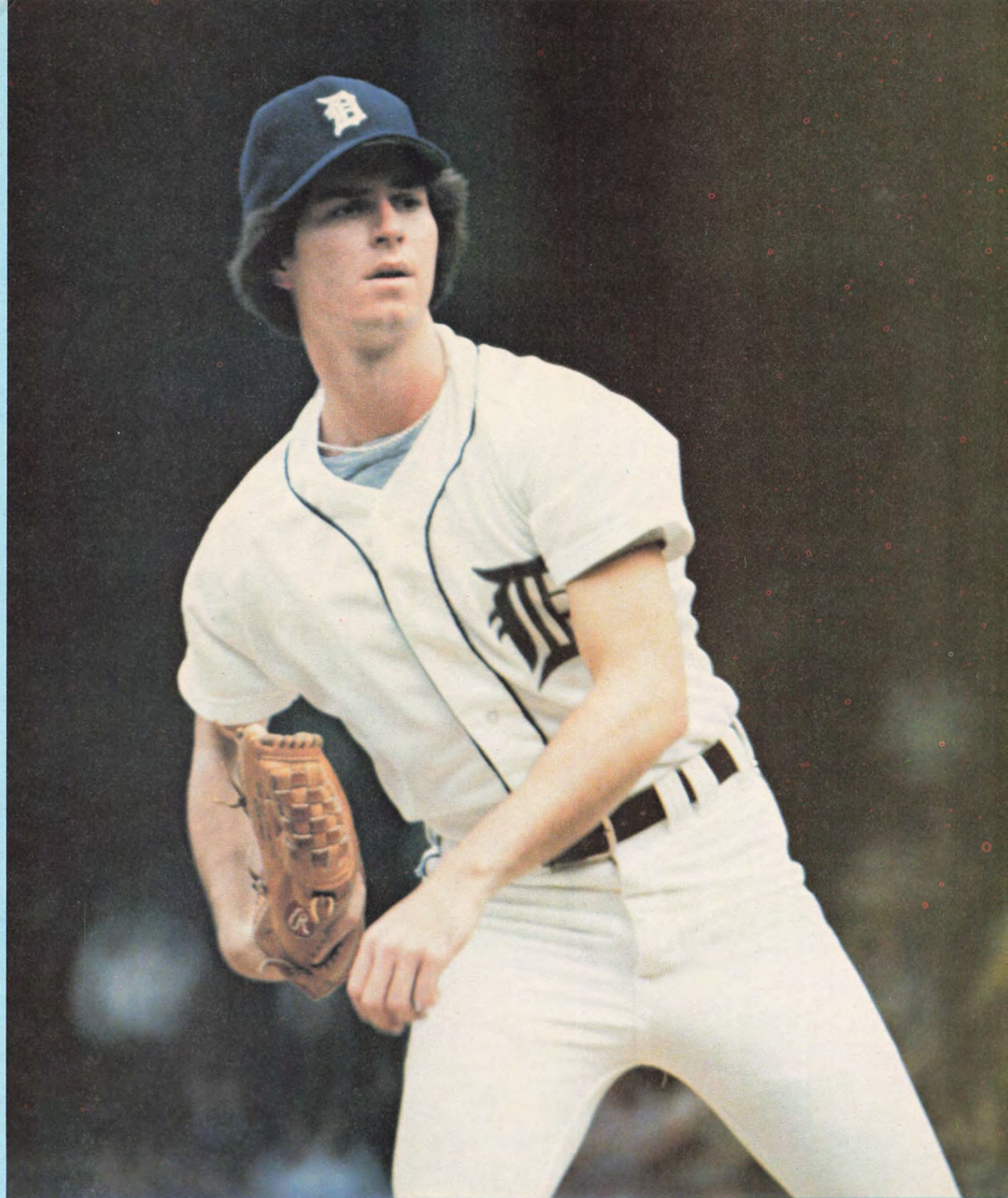


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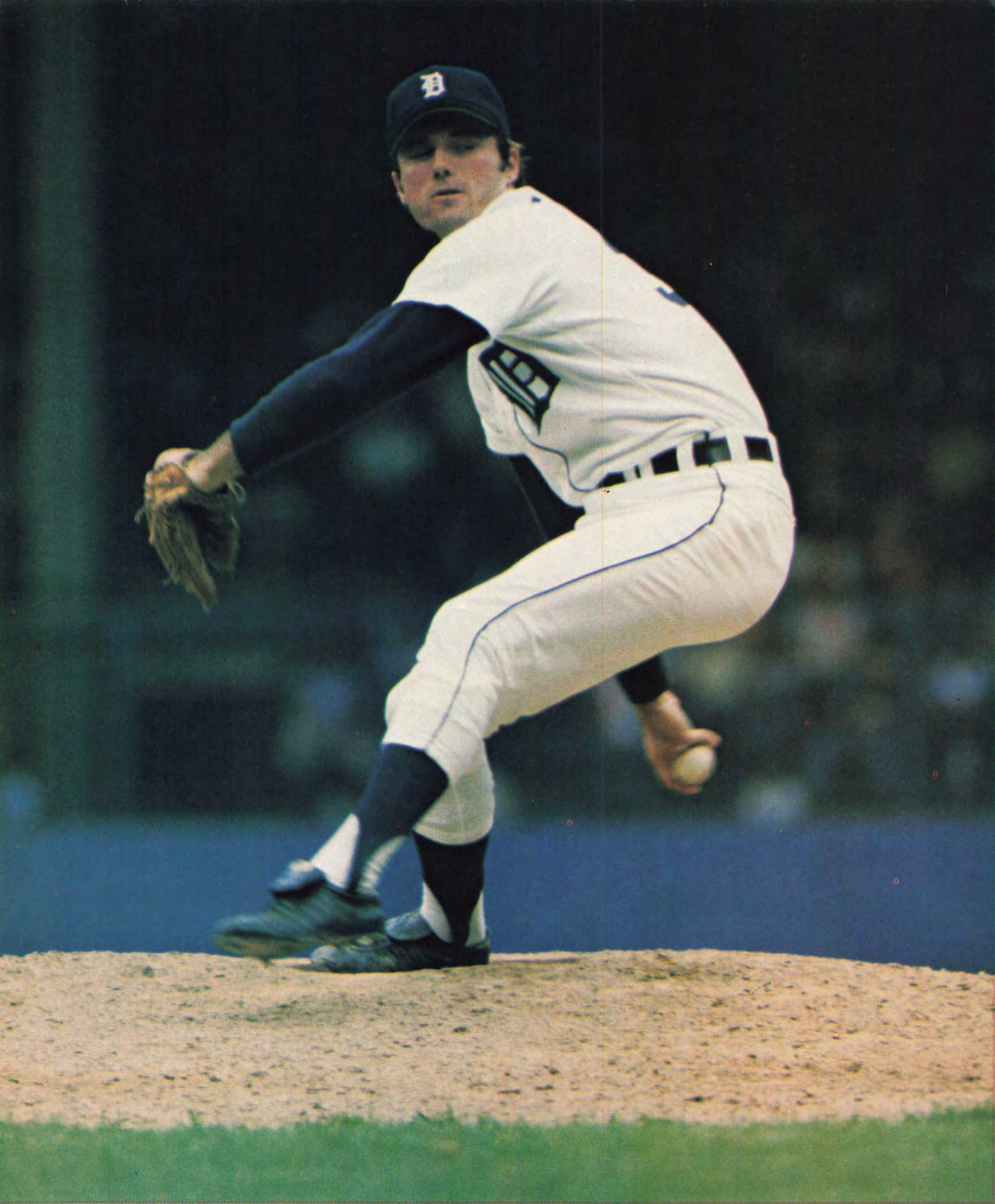
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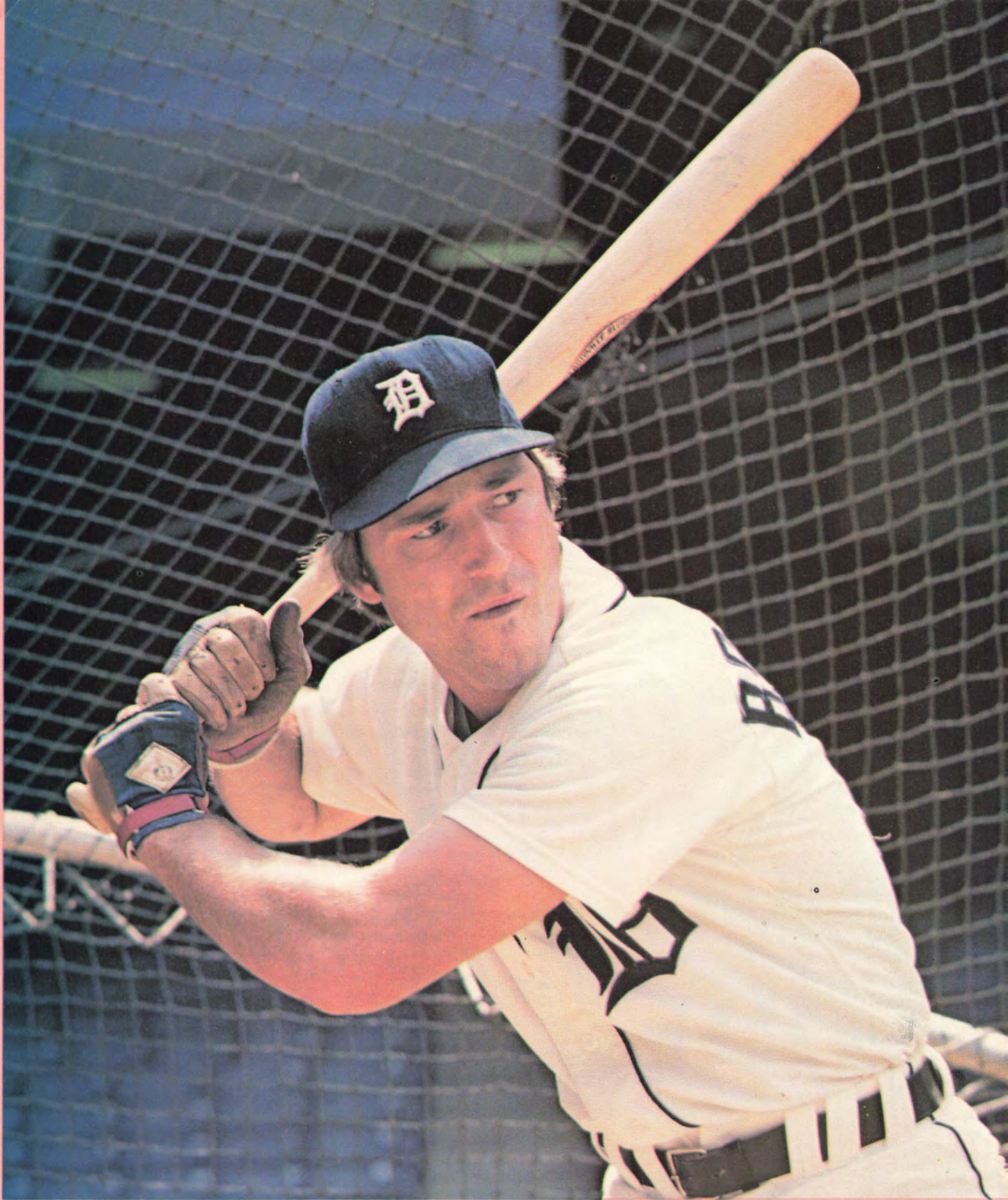
DUFFY DYER came to the Tigers as a 1980 spring training addition after 11 seasons behind the plate in the National League with the Mets, Pirates and Expos. In his National League days, the veteran catcher was on three division championship teams and two World Series teams. A right-handed hitter, Dyer came up through the Mets' farm system to reach Shea Stadium in time for the 1969 pennant rush; was traded to the Pirates after the 1974 campaign; then became a free agent and was signed by the Expos in November, 1978. A native of Dayton, Ohio, Duffy attended Arizona State University and now lives in Phoenix.



MIKE CHRIS, the slender, youthful left-hander, created a sensation soon after arriving at Tiger Stadium from the Evansville farm club late in 1979. His very first effort was a start against the Royals and he made headlines by pitching six no-hit innings before needing help on the way to the first of his three victories for the season. A Californian with good credentials, Mike was a No. 1 draft choice in 1977 and lived up to his billing with a sizzling beginning at Lakeland, where he was 18-5 with a 2.01 ERA. For that, he was voted winner of the Win Clark Memorial Award, a trophy for products of Southern California won earlier by Steve Kemp.



DAVE TOBIK hopes that two terms with the Tigers last season were enough to reserve a seat in the bullpen for him during 1980. The 27-year-old righthander from Ohio University who was a first-round draft choice in 1975 was shuttled up from Evansville long enough to appear in 37 games—all in relief. Dave is accustomed to such steady relief work because, during the past three seasons, he has started only once in 134 games. That includes the five games he had with the Tigers in 1978, when he fanned 11 batters in 12 innings. All of that gives him a total of 59 whiffs in 81 innings — a mark to be envied by any bullpener.



TOM BROOKENS spent 4½ seasons in the minors before getting his big chance with the Tigers last July. His steady play at third base, plus some action at second, indicated a promising future for the 26-year-old Pennsylvanian. Climbing steadily at the plate in the minors, Brookens was summoned from Evansville when he reached a mark of .306 last year and followed up with a .263 for the Tigers. Unforgettable thrills marked Brookens' initial big league experience as he singled on his first time at bat (against Geoff Zahn of the Twins) and stole home twice. A cousin of Ike Brookens, one-time Tiger pitcher, Tom likes dart throwing as a pastime.



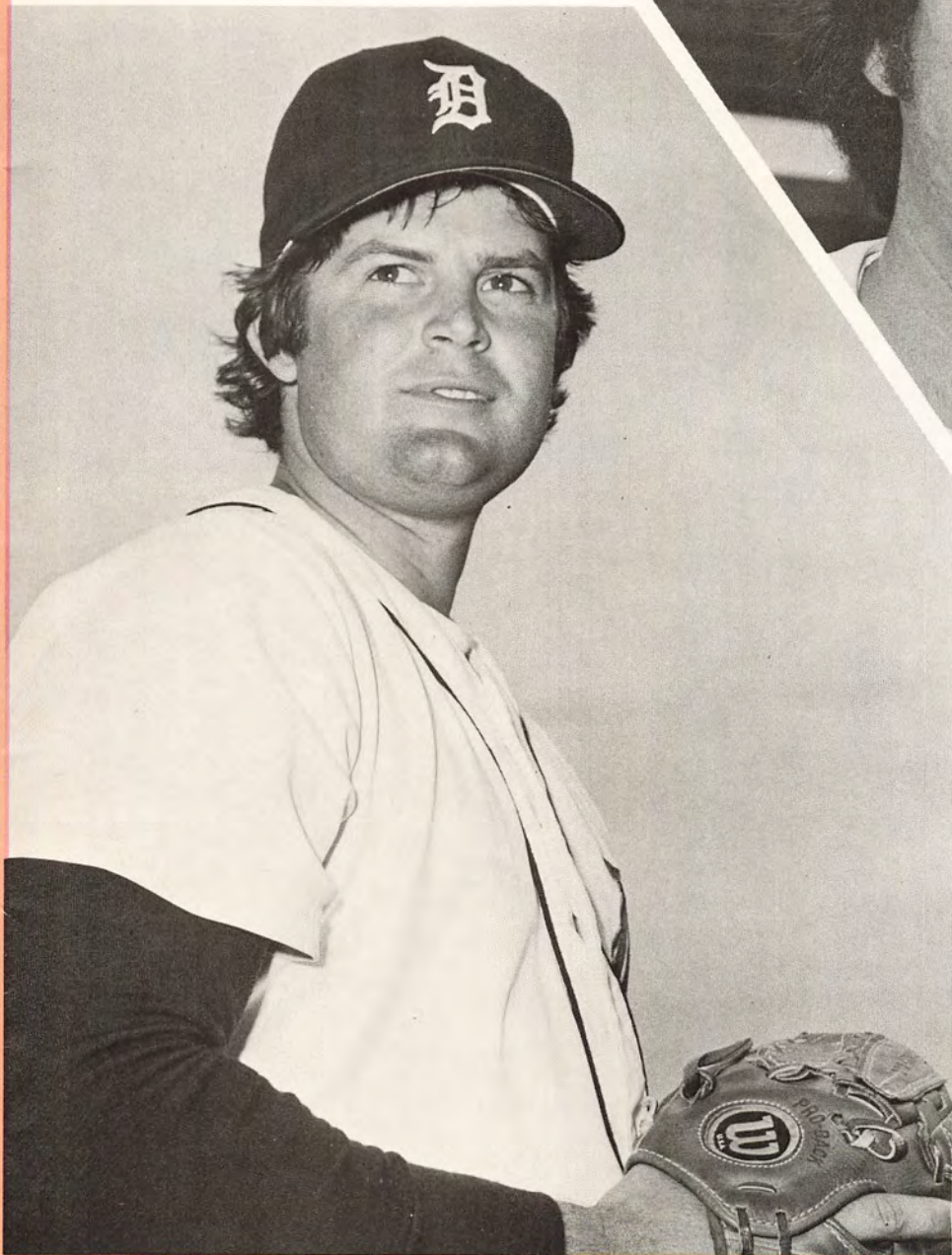
PAT UNDERWOOD, the Tigers' lanky young southpaw, has a secure place in the annals of baseball despite his brief experience. A No. 1 draft choice in 1976, Pat was called up from Evansville last May to make his major league debut in a starting role against his brother, Tom, then with the Blue Jays. It was the first known instance of a pitcher making his bow against his brother and it was a dramatic event at Toronto with television looking on. At the end, it was Pat who got the decision, 1-0, although needing help in the ninth inning. It also was a great takeoff for the youngster who won five straight before losing.



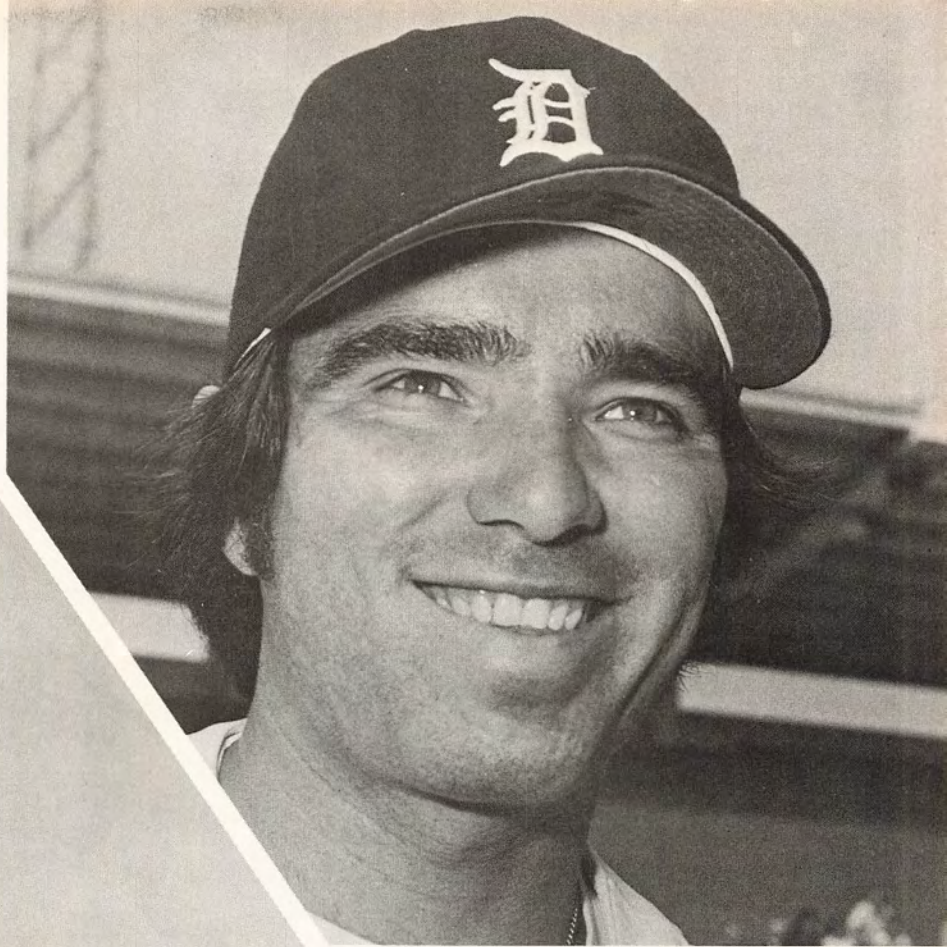
BRUCE ROBBINS is considered by the Tigers as one of the several surprise packages they have been able to spring on the major leagues recently. Signed in 1977 at the age of 17 as a No. 14 draft choice, the handsome young lefthander jumped all the way from Class A to the majors during 1979. He hit his stride after promotion from Lakeland to Montgomery early in the year, posting a 7-1 mark there before called up by the Tigers July 25. Three days later, Bruce held the Blue Jays to one hit in the first five innings of his debut, eventually losing but later gaining three victories, two against the Angels, before the end of his 10-game season.



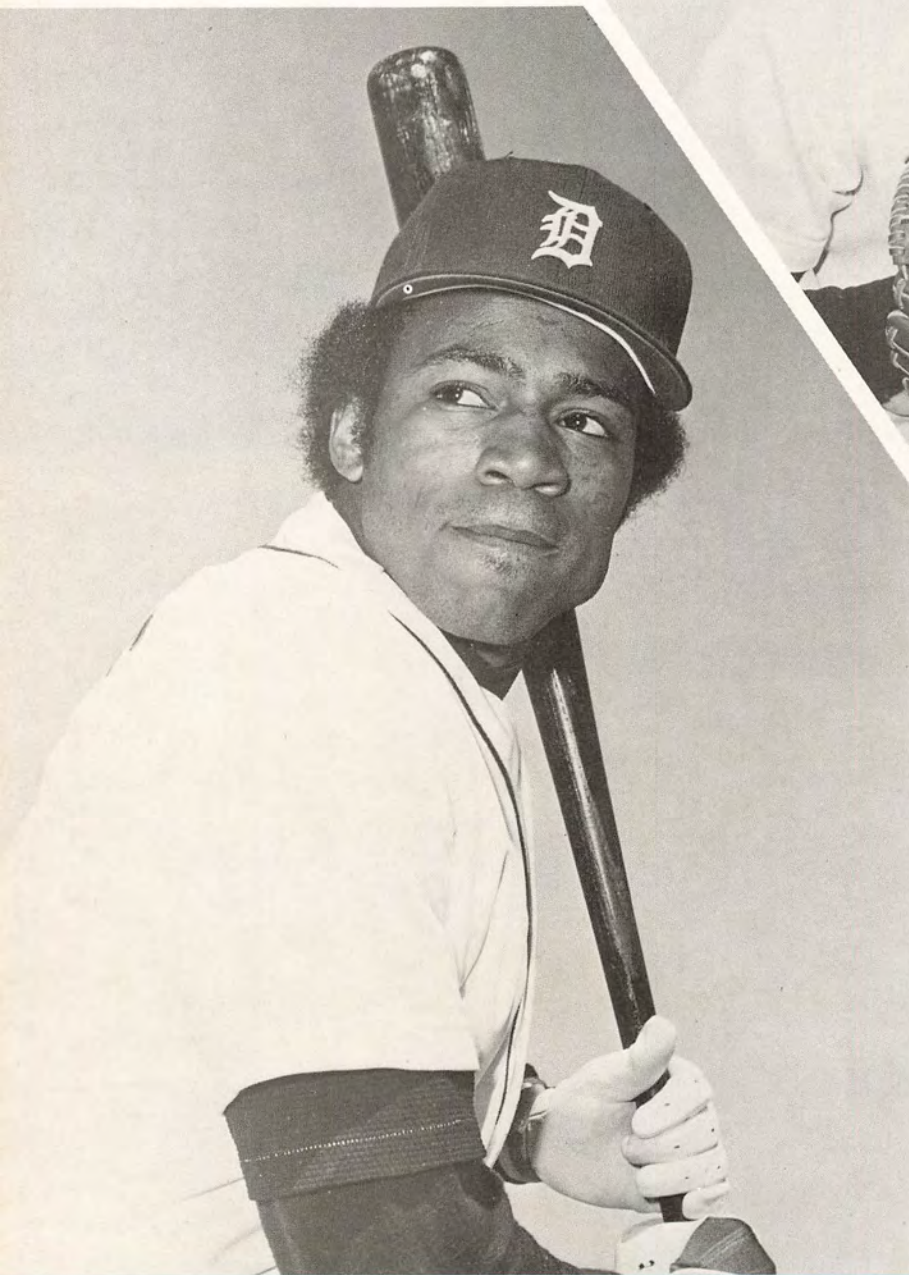
MARK WAGNER is counting on his versatility, added experience and an improved batting mark to give him more playing time during the 1980 season. First signed in 1972 and rushed to Tiger Stadium in 1976 to replace an injured shortstop, Wagner also has performed at second and third base. He got into 75 games last season, more than any other campaign with the Tigers, and elevated his batting average 35 points to .274 with a strong start and a potent finish. That also was a personal high for the likable Ohioan whose career was set back once by a complicated fracture of the leg and later by a case of tendonitis in one of his ankles.

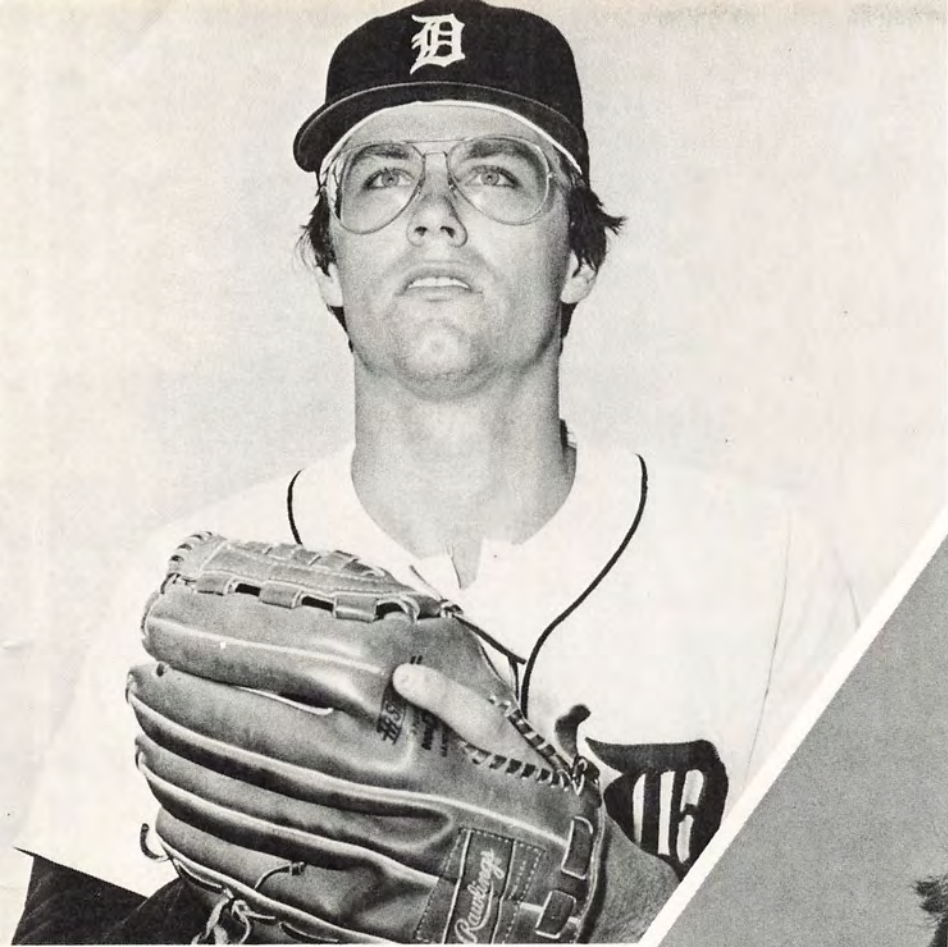

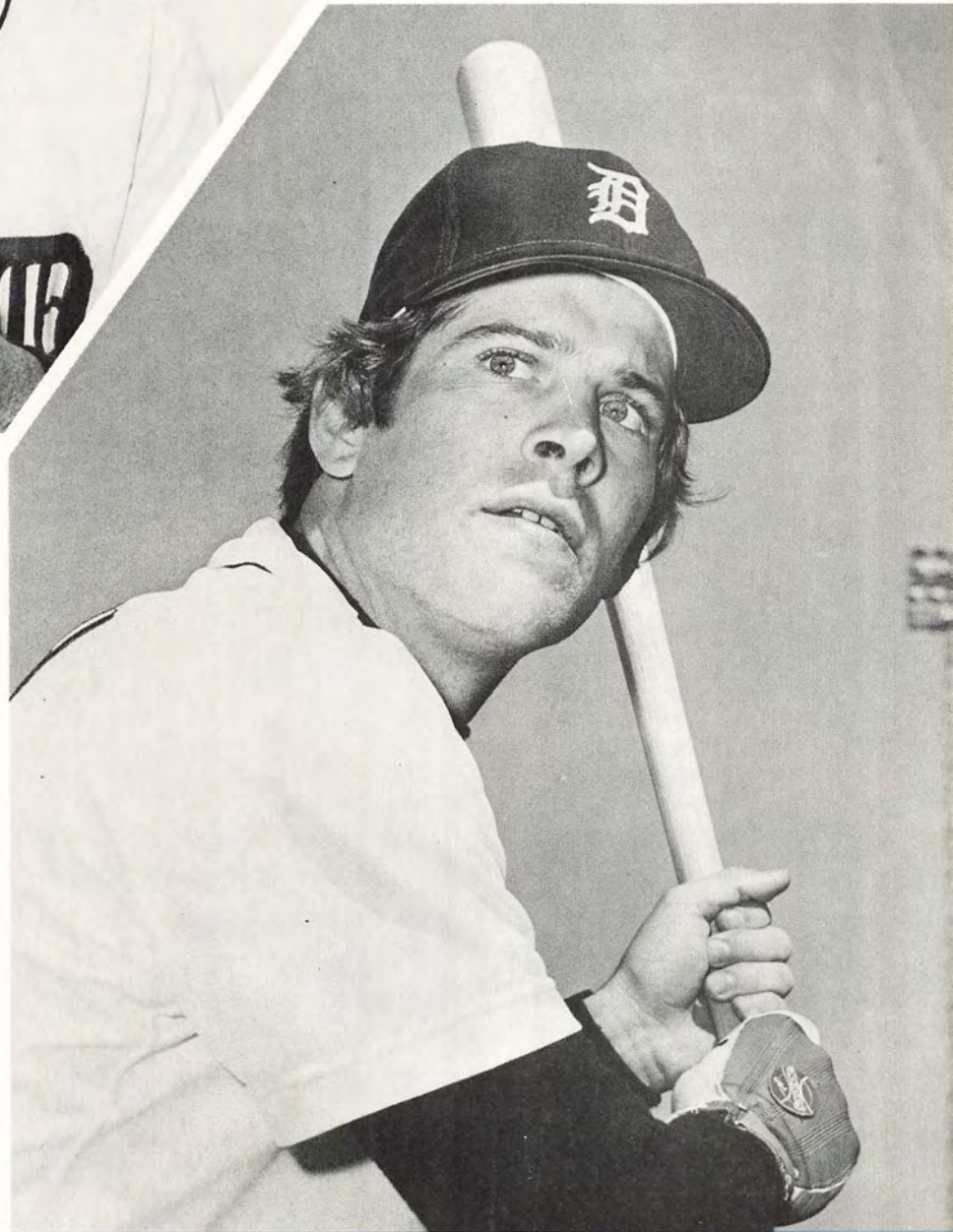

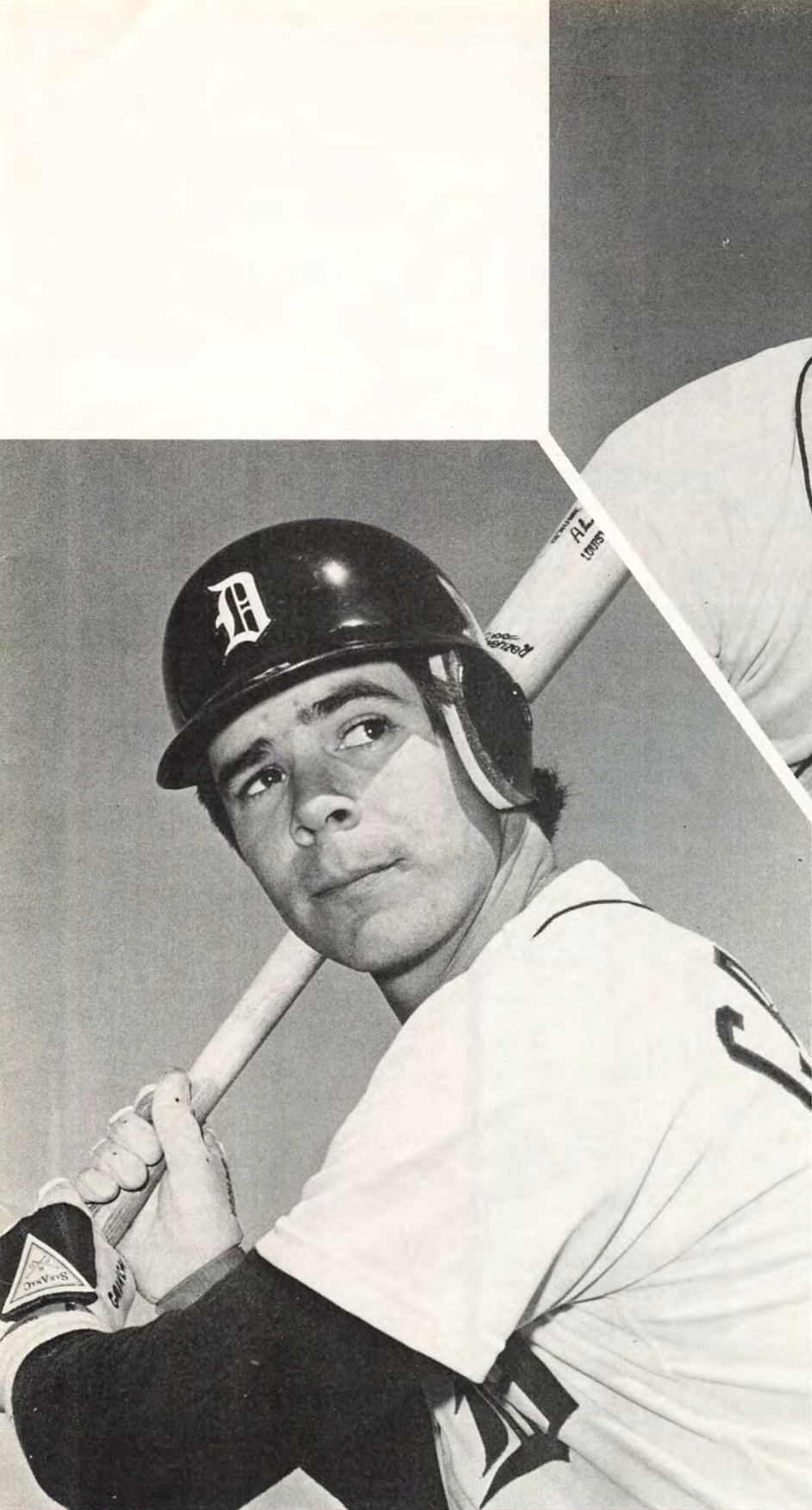

The Advance Ticket Office at Tiger Stadium, Michigan and Trumbull, is open 9:00 to 6:00 daily, with tickets for any game.

Ticket prices, still the lowest on the Detroit sports scene:

General admission 3.50
Bleacher seats 2.00

General admission and bleacher tickets are not sold in advance unless box and reserved are sold out.

Hudson's Ticket Service outlets, now numbering 16, also have tickets for any game for sale over the counter.

Other Tiger agencies, 10 of them, offer tickets for night games, weekends and holiday events. (See list of ALL agencies below.)

As something new this year, the Tigers now sell tickets by telephone on credit to fans using Visa or Master Charge cards. (See instructions in column at left.)

Special attention is given to group orders for baseball parties, including preferred seat locations and assistance with travel plans or hotel/motel accommodations. Write: Group Sales, Tiger Stadium, Detroit, Mich. 48216 or call (313) 962-4000 and ask for Group Sales.

Gift certificates for Tiger tickets are sold in \$6.50 and \$5.50 denominations. Good for any game, they can be ordered by mail or picked up at the Advance Ticket Office.

For recorded schedule and ticket information, fans can dial (313) 963-9944 any time.

Family Nights are big bargains at Tiger Stadium.

They are held on Monday nights, when the head of the family group pays the regular \$5.50 admission charge and others in the family pay only \$1.50 each.

Another popular bargain event at Tiger Stadium is Tiger Day.

It is a Saturday afternoon special, with \$1.50 admission for women and girls, boys 14 or under and senior citizens.

Tickets for both Family Nights and Tiger Days are on sale in advance, can be ordered by mail or purchased at the gate two hours before game time.

The big day for young fans at Tiger Stadium will be Sunday, June 15 — Free Helmet Day.

There will be a free souvenir plastic helmet for every boy and girl 14 or under on a full-price ticket that day.

FACE-LIFTING IS EYE OPENER

Tiger Stadium has that new look for the 1980 season!

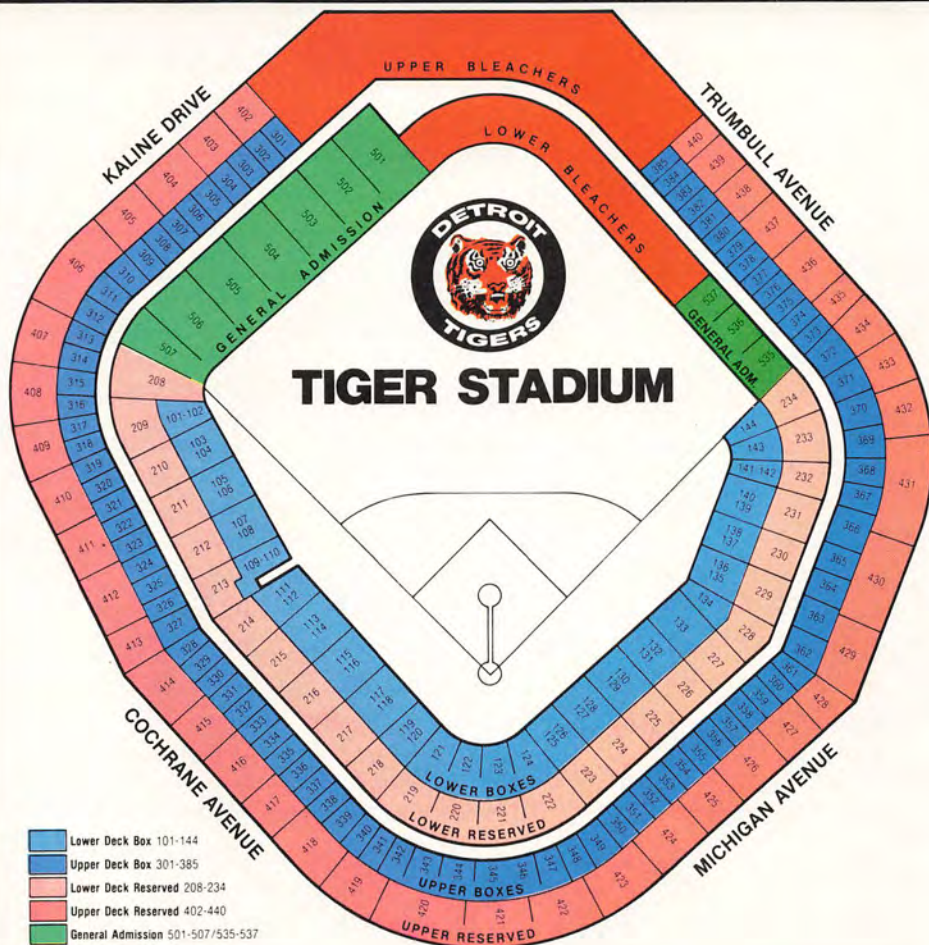
The initial phase of renovation has been completed — with all new blue and orange seats, a modern electronic scoreboard and a new broadcast area popping the eyes of the fans.

There has been more, including a new roof, a lot of painting and similar work.

There also is more to come in the near future with plumbing and electric circuits modernized, new elevators installed and additional painting to be done.

While much has been done to spruce up and extend the life of 68-year-old Tiger Stadium, some of the features originally planned have had to be "scrubbed" because inflation and increased construction costs took large bites out of the \$13.5 million budget.

Some of those features may be restored later by the City of Detroit, which owns Tiger Stadium, if funds become available.

Information and entertainment!

That's the recipe for the new two-million dollar scoreboard at Tiger Stadium, unveiled in 1979 and promising even better things for the 1980 season.

It's a gigantic affair, 59 feet long and 25 feet high, looming over the centerfield bleachers with a total of 15,360 lamps to keep fans informed and entertained. It is one of the largest scoreboards in the major leagues and one of the most versatile.

In addition to keeping everyone up to the minute on the game being played, it posts scores of other games almost continuously and tells about all the developments everywhere.

The replay feature has made a big hit with the fans, giving them a second look at unusual plays they have just seen on the field.

During weather delays, the big board becomes a movie screen, showing feature films, such as World Series and All-Star games, plus the popular "This Week in Baseball" television series.

When the hands were dealt, the Tigers "drew" three more aces to go with the one they held for the managerial lineup of their four-club system.

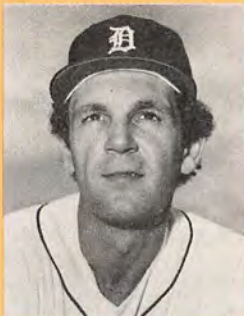
Jim Leyland returned to Evansville, where in 1979 he steered the Triplets to another American Association title and garnered his third Manager of the Year award in three seasons.

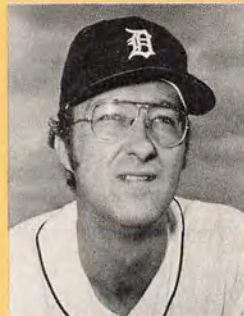

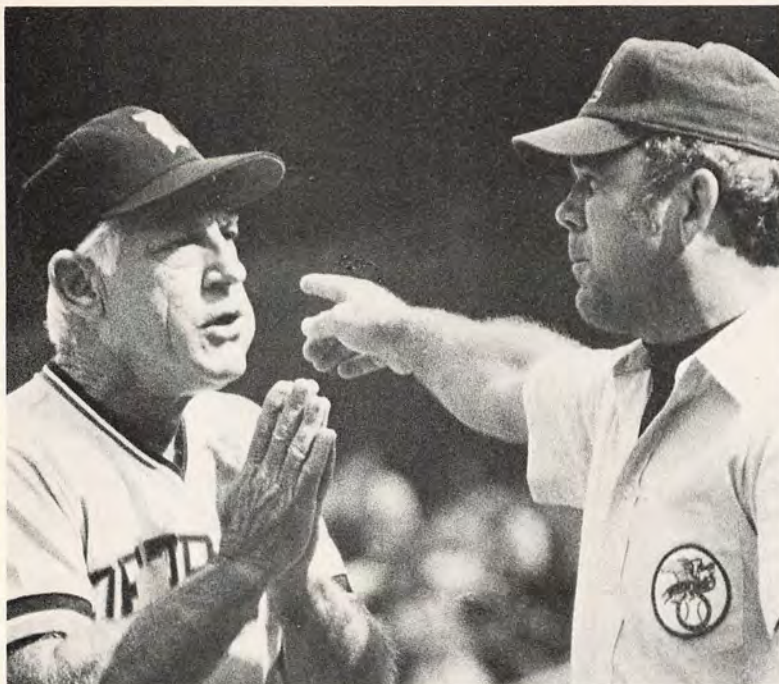

A schedule of 52 regular-season games and three spring training exhibitions was arranged for the two air stars with Detroit Station WDIV (4) originating for the sixth straight season.

Their network includes: WWTW, Cadillac; WKZO-TV, Kalamazoo-Grand Rapids; WILX-TV, Lansing-Jackson; WNEM-TV, Bay City-Saginaw-Flint; and WWUP-TV, Sault Ste. Marie.

Six of the regular-season games will be aired by WDIV only.

Kell, a 14-year American League infield star with the Tigers and four other teams, has been on the air for the Tigers since 1959, except for 1964.

Kaline, elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in January in recognition of his 22 seasons in the Tiger outfield, is spending his fifth season in the TV booth.

Twenty week-night home games are booked for showing to subscribers of ON-TV pay television seen on WXON (20).

IT'S HARWELL, CAREY DAILY

Ernie Harwell in 1980 is starting his third decade in the Tiger radio booth, with Paul Carey at his side for the eighth straight season.

They describe the action of every Tiger game — home and road — for the listeners of Detroit Station WJR (760) and a network of about 50 stations in the Tigerland area.

This is the 17th straight season that powerful Station WJR has been the flagship of the Tiger radio network.

Harwell, one of the nation's most-respected broadcasters, initially began describing Tiger action in 1960, following service with the Brooklyn Dodgers, New York Giants and Baltimore Orioles in a major league career dating back to 1948.

A native of Georgia and an off-season resident of Florida, Harwell made his air debut in 1940 as a youngster in Atlanta.

Carey, a Michigan native who started broadcasting in 1949 and has been assistant sports director of Station WJR since 1958, has been Harwell's partner since 1973.

One of the big reasons for Detroit's high standing among major league franchises is the intense attention devoted to the Tigers by the newspapers and broadcast stations of the area.
