Sparky Anderson



Sparky Anderson, a man who genuinely loves baseball, has this explanation of the pastime: "The easiest game ever invented. You hit, you catch, you throw . . . If you have common sense, you can play baseball." With that philosophy, the Tigers' manager views every game and every season with enthusiasm, confidence, optimism and a sense of enjoyment. Now in his 13th major league season as a manager, Sparky took on the Tigers in June, 1979 after two World Championships, four National League pennants and five divisional titles at Cincinnati. As he sees it, glory days like that are getting closer and closer for the Tigers.



The Coaching Corps

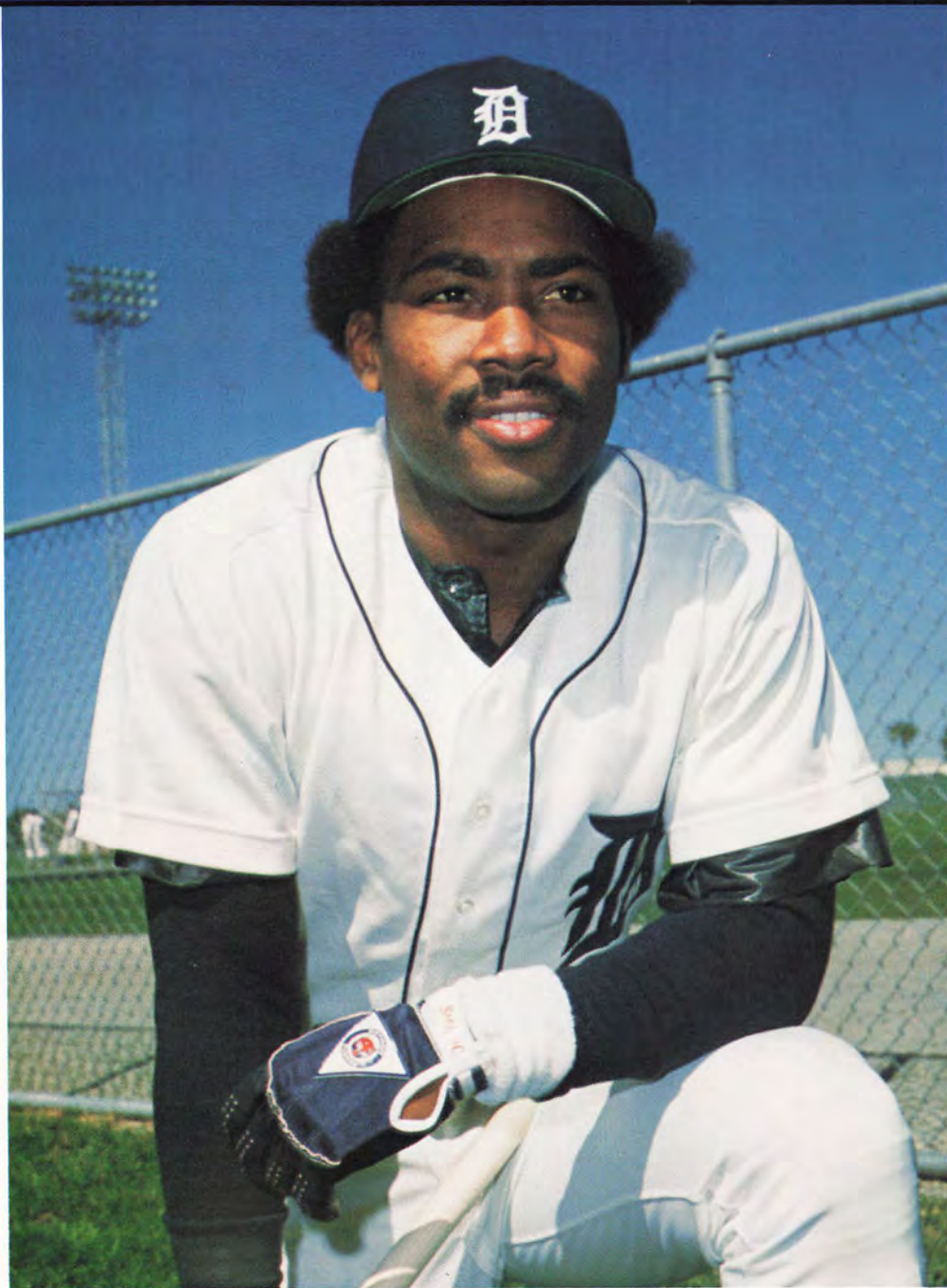

Chet Lemon



When the Tigers obtained Chet Lemon from the White Sox in last winter's celebrated trade for Steve Kemp, it was written:

"He covers a lot of ground, he has a fine arm, he stings the ball and, in general, knows how to play the game."

Tiger fans like that assessment of the 27-year-old Lemon, who is rated as one of the best defensive outfielders in the major leagues and who hit .300 or better three of the last four seasons, with a 1975-81 lifetime mark of .288.

A native of Mississippi, Lemon grew up in Los Angeles, where he attended Fremont High School, the spawning ground of such noted major leaguers as Gene Mauch, Bobby Doerr, Bob Watson, George Hendrick, Dan Ford, Willie Crawford and Bobby Tolan.

A first-round draft choice in 1972, Chet started his career in the Oakland farm system and quickly made headlines as a 1973 Midwest League all-star third baseman at Burlington. Traded to the White Sox in 1975, Lemon went to the outfield and became a regular the next spring. He quickly peaked in 1977 by leading the club with 99 runs and by breaking 30-year-old American League records with 524 fielding chances and 512 putouts.

Chet reached .300 at the plate in 1978, led the White Sox at .318 in 1979, batted .292 in 1980 to again lead his club, and posted a .302 last season when he also stole 16 bases for a career high.

Lemon represented Chicago in the All-Star games of 1978 and 1979.



One of the most exciting players to reach Tiger Stadium in several seasons is Kirk Gibson, the big, fleet All-America football-baseball star from Michigan State.

Sidelined most of 1980 because of an injury to his left wrist, the husky outfielder bounced back with a second-half performance in 1981 which thrilled the fans and almost took the Tigers to the playoffs.

His .375 average following the players' strike was the best in the majors for that period and his

.328 for the season was tops for the Tigers. Hitting safely in 41 of the last 49 games, he never was more than one game without a hit and his 10-game streak was longest for the Tigers all year.

There were two notable home runs among his nine for the season, one in August against the Yankees with two on and one out in the ninth which nailed down a 5-4 victory and another against the Orioles near the end of the season which cleared the Tiger Stadium roof but bounced back after hitting an obstruction.

While one of the big men of the game at 6-4 and 220, Gibson used his great speed to steal 17 bases, another Tiger top for the year.

Curiously, the lefthand-hitting Gibson found southpaws no puzzle

in 1981, hitting .366 against them and .299 against righthanders.

Gibson twice was named Player of the Week in the American League, for the last week of August and again a month later.

Gibson's brilliance was the more remarkable because of the surgical plate in his wrist, inserted after his 1980 operation but removed during the 1981-82 off-season.

Lance Parrish



His ranking among the topmost catchers in the major leagues is now more secure than ever for Lance Parrish — with three years as the Tigers' No. 1 backstop behind him.

Great defensive improvement marked Parrish's performance in 1981, when he cut down sharply the base stealing against him —

with three pickoffs helping — and when he reduced the passed balls count from 17 to seven.

At the same time, the towering Californian used his potent bat to produce a succession of key hits, two vital ones in overtime contests.

Parrish had two home runs in one game with the Orioles among his total of 10, which gave him the Tiger leadership in homers for the second straight year.

Lance had some favorite targets at the plate, bombarding Boston's pitchers at a .360 clip and Minnesota's at .321. He had three of his homers against Texas and collected 11 RBI off the Rangers.

All of that was in keeping with Parrish's performance of the year before, when he was honored as the most productive catcher in the American League on his .286

average, 24 home runs and 82 RBI.

The Tigers' first draft choice in 1974, Parrish was a third baseman at the time but returned to catching, his position in high school, in 1975 and became the Tigers' regular in 1979.

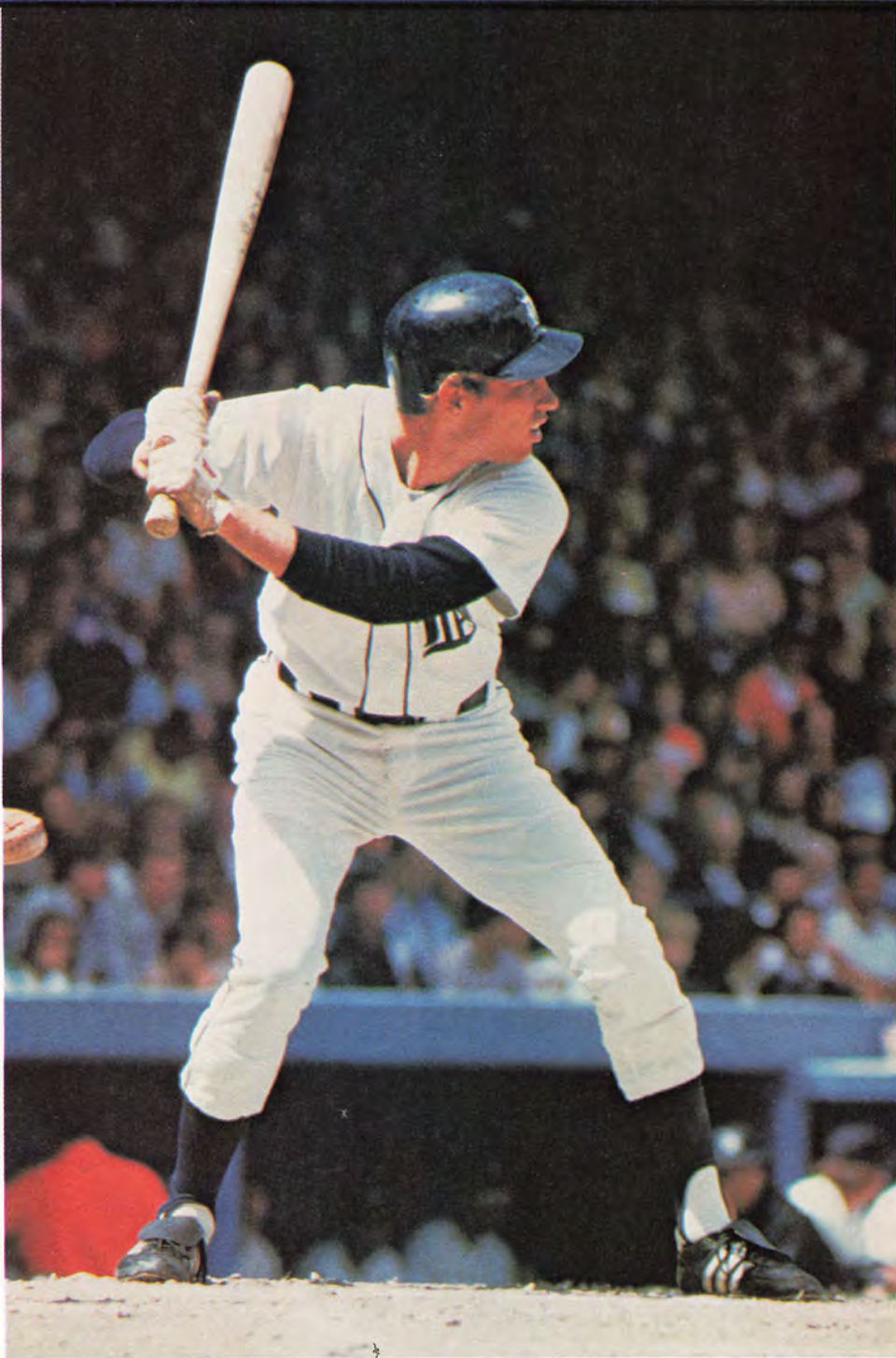

Alan Trammell



His position among the foremost shortstops in baseball has been nailed down by Alan Trammell.

Still only 24 years old but with four full major league seasons behind him, the lithe, far-ranging Tiger infielder has all the credentials necessary for the acclaim he has been getting.

In 1981, Trammell won his second straight Gold Glove trophy for fielding skill with a .983 average, putting him in a dream infield of Mike Squires, White Sox; Frank White, Royals; and Buddy Bell, Rangers.

In 1980, he was the Tiger of the Year, and a member of the American League All-Star team.

And, as they say, the best is yet to come. If you don't think so, just ask Manager Sparky Anderson.

Although Trammell's batting average slipped from .300 to .258 in 1981, he never went more than three games without a hit.

He was a key figure in the Tiger attack, leading the club with 392 at-bats and 16 sacrifices (also first in the American League). He tied for the Tiger lead with his 52 runs scored and was second with his 101 hits.

His four hits in one game were one of only nine such performances in the 1,394 major league games played in 1981.

Against four teams, Alan was especially deadly: .385 vs. Toronto, .324 vs. Texas, .304 vs. Baltimore and .302 vs. Minnesota.

The Tigers' No. 2 draft pick in 1976, Trammell reached Tiger Stadium with Second Baseman Lou Whitaker after less than two years in the minors.

Both stepped immediately into starting roles — and are expected to be there for a long, long time.

The right to be called "the best righthander in the American League" belongs to Jack Morris, Tigers' fastball-slider specialist.

The starting pitcher in the 1981 All-Star game (two scoreless innings), Jack was recognized at the end of the year by The Sporting News as American League Pitcher of the Year and named to the United Press International's All-Star team. He was third in voting for the Cy Young trophy.

A look at his season statistics support the attention they got.

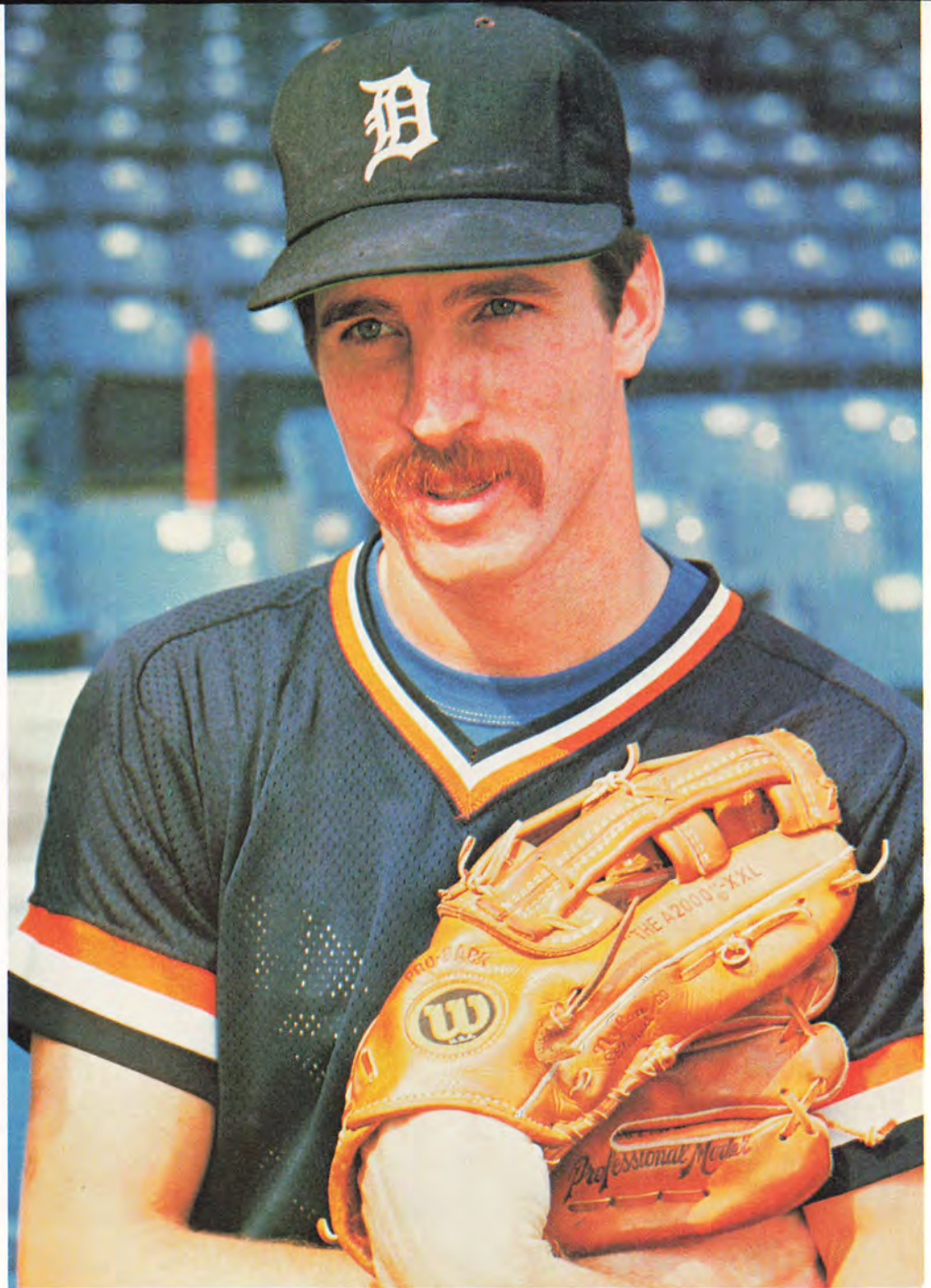
In the American League, Morris tied for first with 14 victories (seven losses, five by one run); was second with 198 innings pitched; tied for second with 25 starts; third with 15 complete games and seventh with 97 strikeouts.

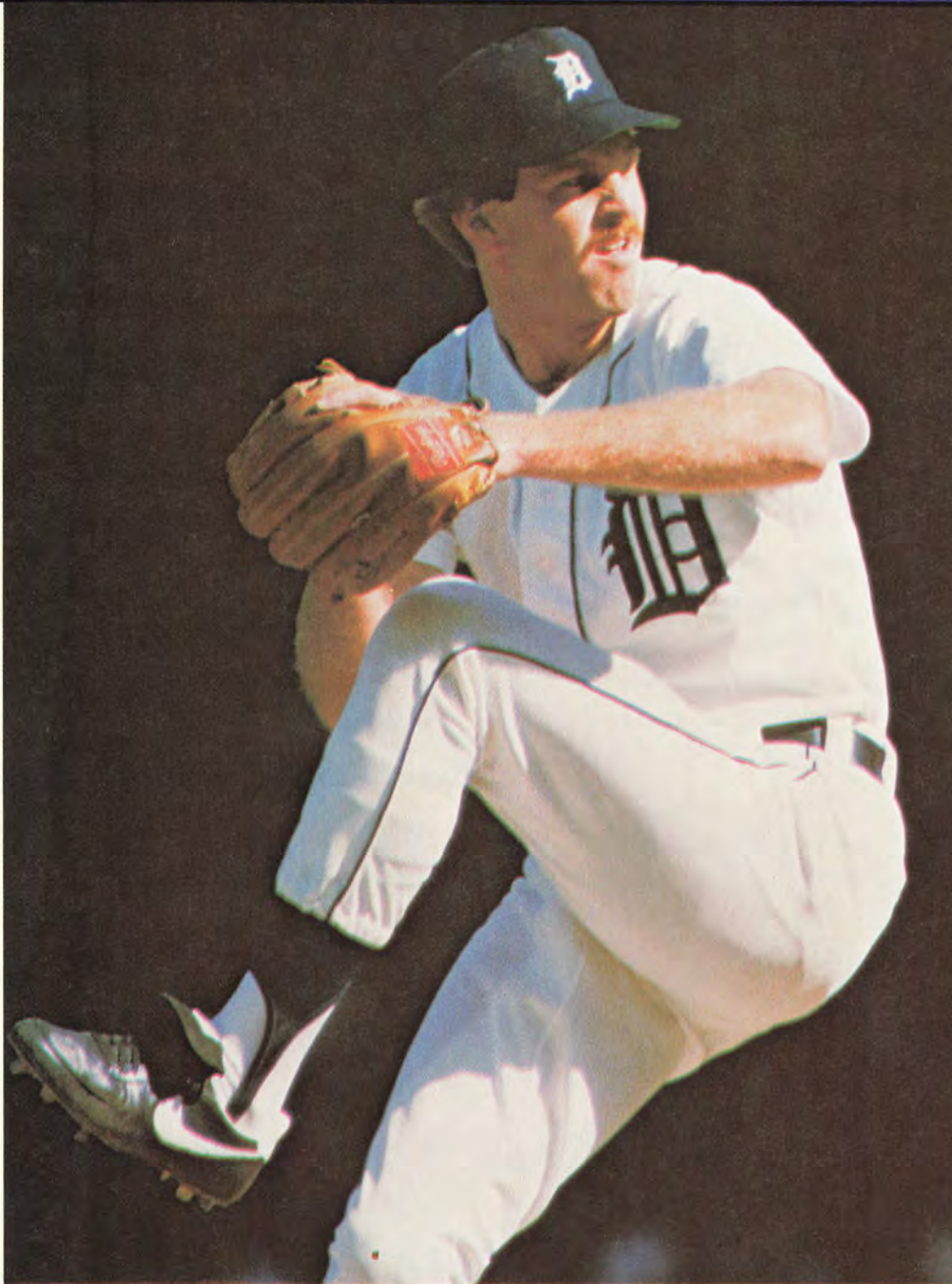
The seven-week players' strike probably cost Morris a chance for even better figures. Before that break, he was 9-3 with a streak of eight straight in May and June, the last seven complete games.

After that, he was 5-4, but his best performance came late — a two-hit 3-1 decision over the Red Sox on September 7.

Morris mowed them all down in 1981 with a perfect 11-0 combined record against six opponents — Baltimore, California, Cleveland, Minnesota, Seattle and Texas. Only Milwaukee and Toronto were able to beat him as much as twice.

Reaching his peak has not been a leisurely stroll for Morris. A sore shoulder sidelined him in 1977 and shortened his 1978 season. He opened 1979 at Evansville but came up in May to win 17 games and has been rolling since, with a record of 47-29 in three seasons.





Maturity is the word for Dan Petry, the strong-arm righthander who entered 1982 with two strong seasons under his belt — the true mark of success in baseball.

The Tigers' best pitcher in the second half of the strike-marred 1981 season, Petry won 10 games for the second year in a row.

He also posted a 3.00 ERA which was the best for the staff, to go with his 3.94 of 1980 which was the best for the starters that year.

His two shutouts of 1981 (now five in two years) tied him with Dave Rozema for most among the Tigers and the two of them combined with Kevin Saucier to share in a third whitewash job.

During his second-half surge, in which he was 6-4 with a 2.18 ERA, Dan had a streak in which he gave up only two earned runs in 38 innings spread over five games for a glittering 0.47 ERA for the span.

He fanned eight batters in one of his shutouts, 1-0, at Texas in September. Another shutout also was 1-0, against Seattle in May and the shared blanking was a 2-0 score against Texas in August.

His outstanding pitching landed Petry among the league leaders, tied for eighth with his two shutouts and twelfth with his 3.00 ERA.

Signed in 1976 as a fourth-round draft choice, the hefty Californian has been almost-exclusively a starter throughout his career.

Going into the 1980 season, Petry had never relieved, while starting 96 times. That year, he relieved twice for the Tigers, while starting 25 times.

In 1981, he relieved once, while starting 22 games. Thus, he entered the 1982 season with 143 starts out of 146 games.

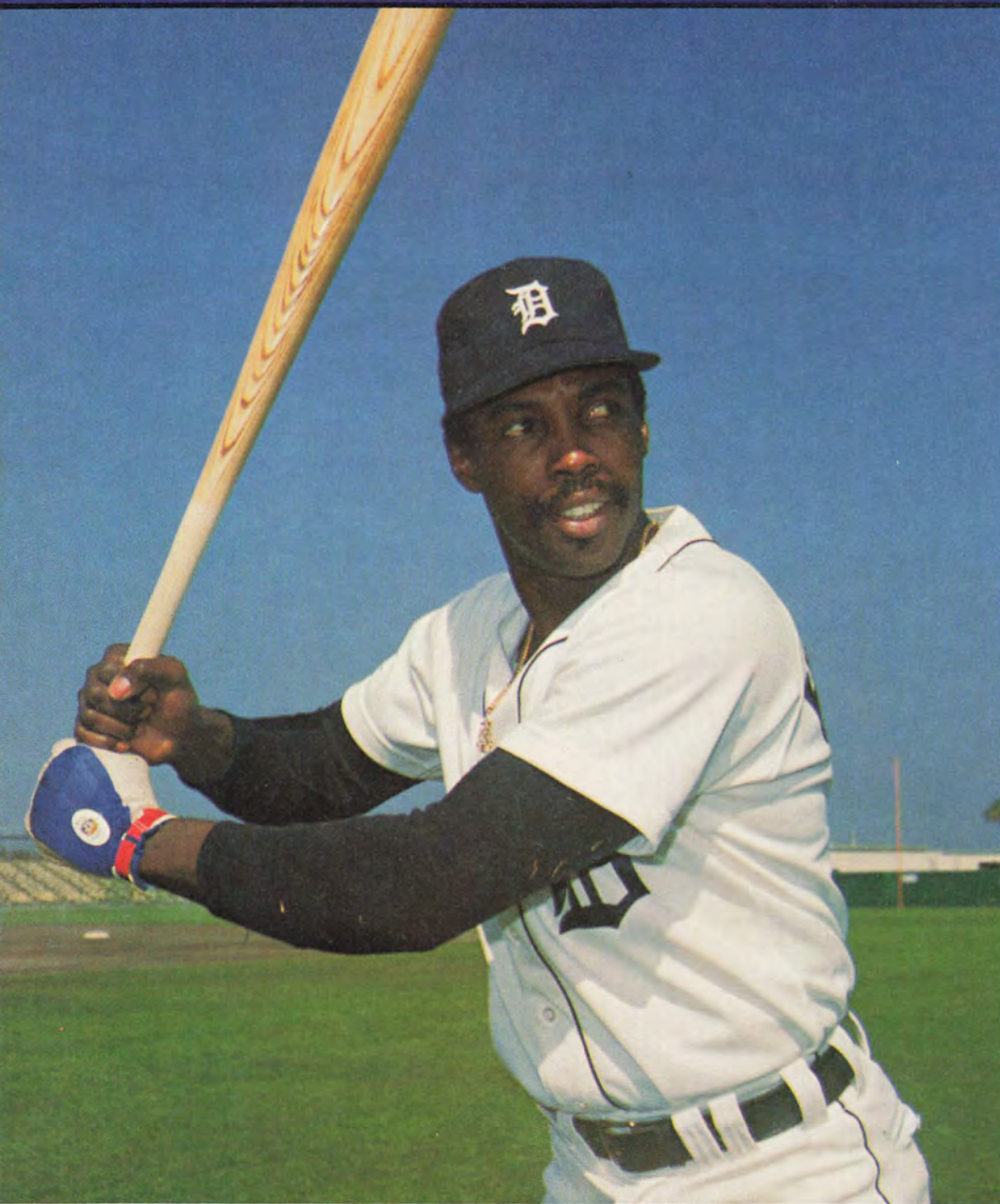

Larry Herndon



The Tigers acquired one of the National League's most exciting and aggressive players when they got Larry Herndon from the San Francisco Giants in a 1981-82 off-season trade.

A strong athlete with a line drive bat and good speed, Herndon played all three outfield posts during his six seasons with the Giants and gained stature as he gained experience.

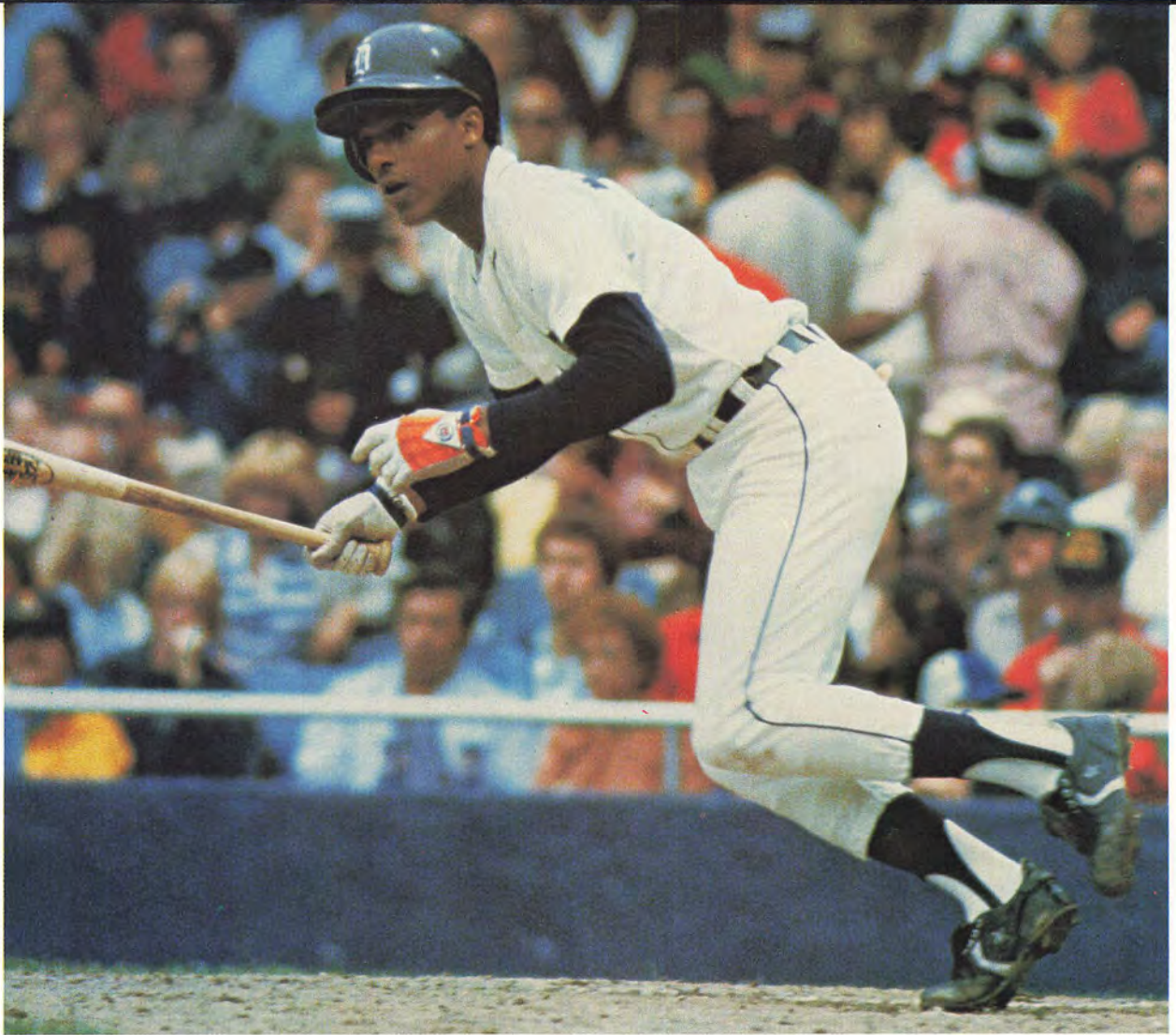
A Mississippian by birth, Herndon was a four-sports star at Douglass High School in Memphis before the Cardinals made him their third choice in the June, 1971 draft. The Cardinals kept him in their farm system until May, 1975 when they traded him to the Giants.

Farmed to Phoenix at the time, Herndon also opened 1976 there — only to be summoned to Candlestick Park after 14 games. The young outfielder responded by hitting safely in 24 of his first 26 games and kept right on going to become the National League Rookie of the Year in selections made for *The Sporting News*.

In 1981, Herndon enjoyed a year much like his rookie season. He batted .288, matching his 1976 mark.

He collected 105 hits, most for any San Francisco batter; drove in 41 runs, second highest in his career; and stole 15 bases, a total in keeping with the potential which permitted him to swipe 91 in two back-to-back minor league seasons.

Married and the father of three, Herndon has attended Tennessee Agricultural and Industrial State University.



The outlook is brighter for Lou Whitaker, who found in 1981 that he had the stuff to bounce back from a somewhat disappointing year in 1980.

His batting average rose 30 points and his errors dropped from 12 to a sensational three as the lean, limber second baseman put it all together again. His five home runs were the most of his career.

Lou appeared in all 109 games

of the Tigers' strike-shortened season, the only Tiger to make them all and one of only six in the American League to play all of their teams' games.

Whitaker continued in 1981 to assault his favorite teams: .381 vs. Cleveland, after .302 in 1980; and .353 vs. Toronto, after .319 in 1980. But the best was saved for Seattle as Lou whacked the Mariners' pitchers for 10 hits on 17 at-bats and a .588 reading.

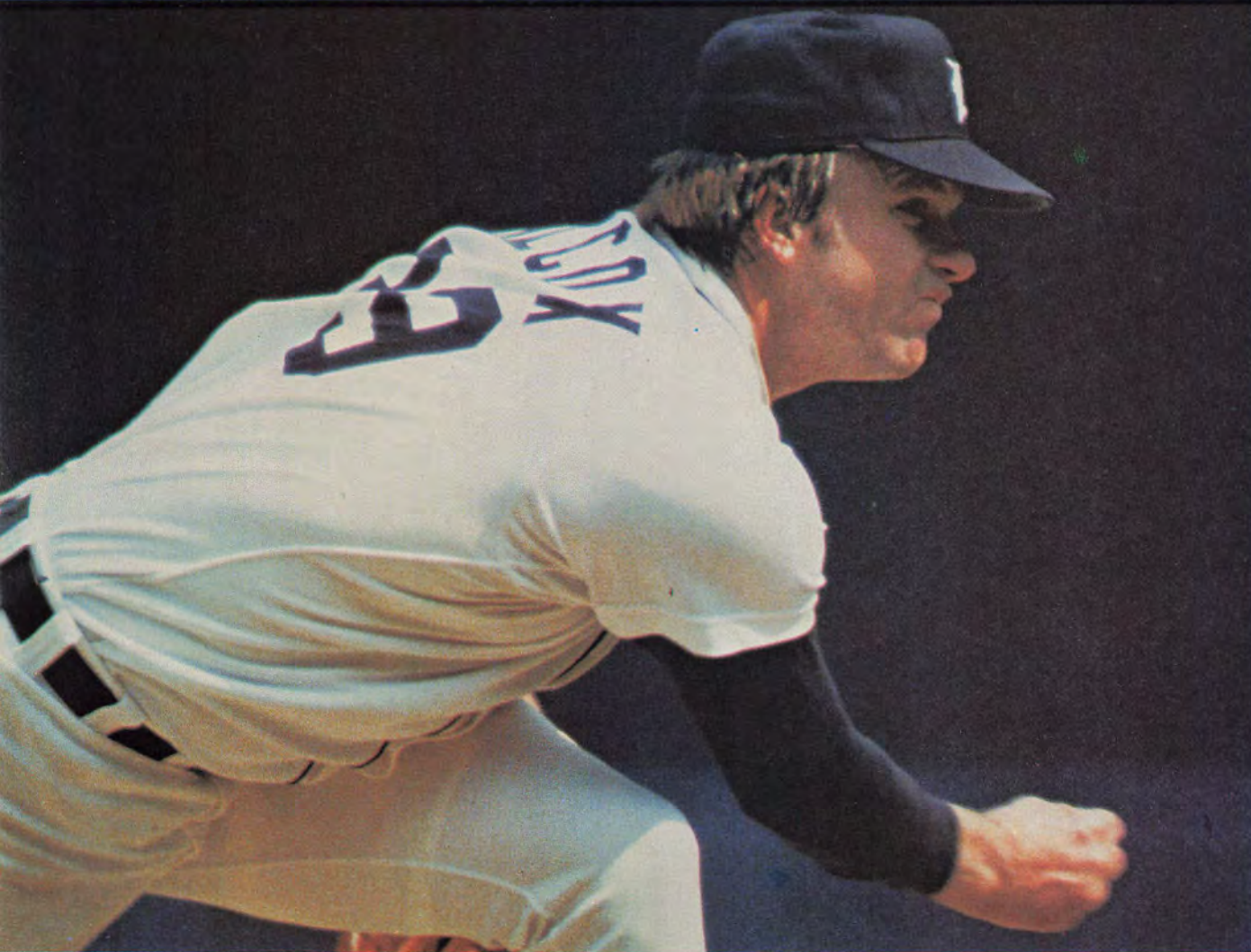
Whitaker, who was born in Brooklyn but raised in Virginia, was a fifth-round draft choice in 1975, a year before the Tigers signed Alan Trammell, who soon joined "Sweet Lou" to form their sensational infield duo.

A third baseman in the beginning, Whitaker moved to second and joined Trammell at

Montgomery in 1977 following selection as MVP of the Florida State League at Lakeland in 1976. It was instant success for the pairing and both reported to the Tigers before the 1977 season ended.

In 1978, they combined for 95 double plays among the Tigers' 177 which led the American League and Lou was named American League Rookie of the Year, the third in Tiger history.

Whitaker reached his peak at the plate in 1979 with a .286 but missed 20 games with injuries and dropped to .233 in 1980 before getting back in stride.



A model of consistency is Milt Wilcox who, in his four full years with the Tigers has pitched his way to 12 or 13 victories each season.

Counting the half-season during which he first joined the club in 1977, the 31-year-old righthander entered 1982 with a reading of 56 victories against 44 losses as an anchor of the starting staff.

Although interrupted by the players' strike, the 1981 season was a good one for Milt, whose 3.03 ERA was the best in his major league experience.

In various categories, he ranked among the Top Fifteen of the American League five times: tied for fifth with 24 starts, tied for seventh with 12 victories, ninth

with 166 1/3 innings pitched, 13th with his 3.03 ERA and tied for 14th with eight complete games.

His two victories without loss against Seattle raised his career record against the Mariners to 7-1 and he was unbeaten by four

other clubs: the Indians, Blue Jays, Twins and A's.

Among his other accomplishments: a 1-0 shutout of the Yankees, to whom he did not give an earned run all year (16 innings); a complete game against the Brewers in which he did not walk a batter; and five pickoffs during the season, most for any Tiger pitcher.

Wilcox pitched for the Reds, Indians and Cubs before arm trouble sent him to the minors in 1975. The Tigers rescued him in 1976 for the farm system, then brought him to Detroit in 1977 to win his first six games.

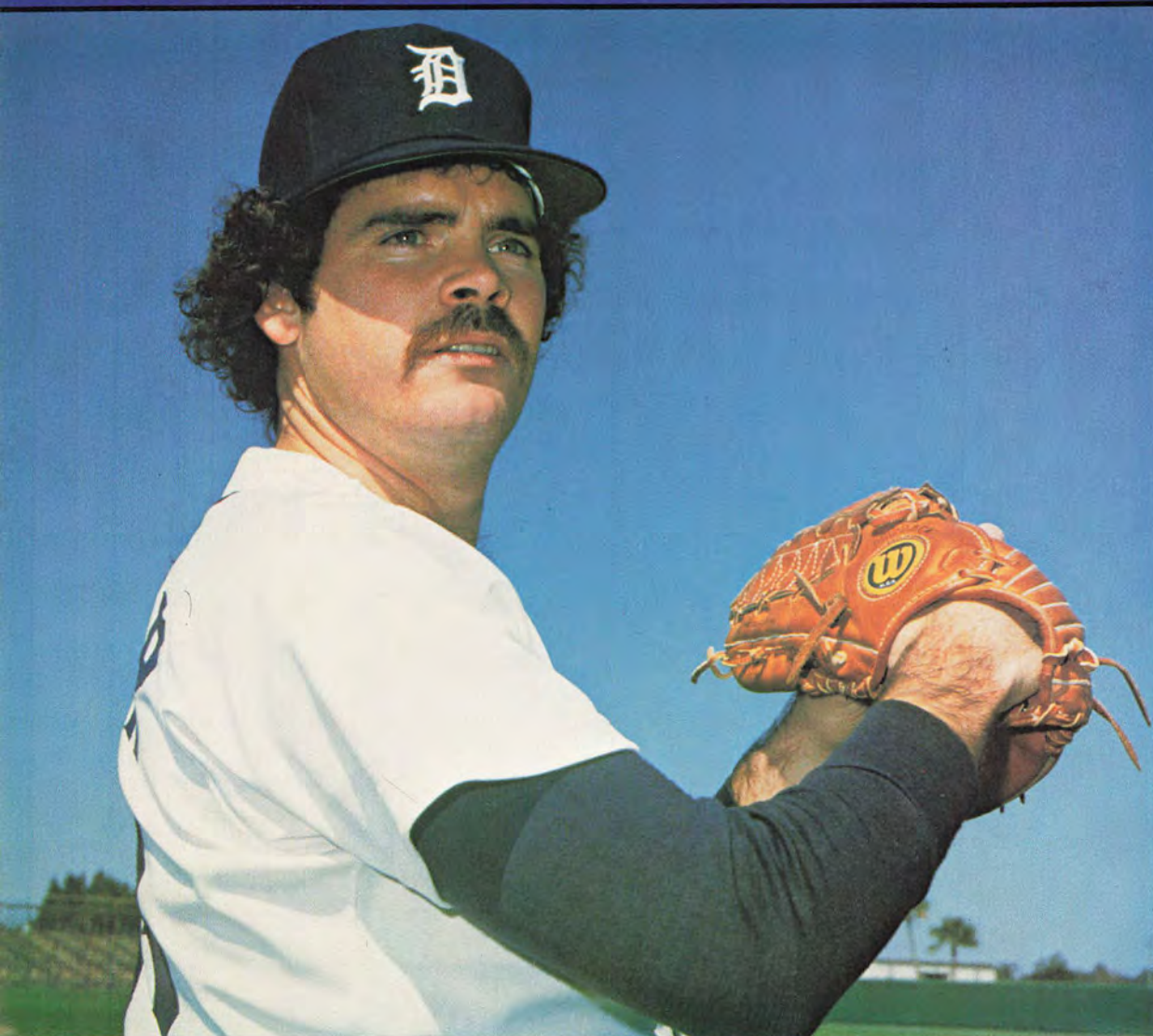

Kevin Saucier



A most enthusiastic member of the Tiger mound corps is Kevin Saucier, the lively lefthander who is nicknamed "Hot Sauce" for good reason.

The fans like his joyous antics after a Tiger victory as much as they approve of his efficient work out of the bullpen.

Saucier came to the Tigers in 1981 to relieve 38 times, for four victories and 13 saves (fifth in the American League) with a 1.65 ERA for 49 innings of toil. During one particularly hot span of 20 assignments covering 31 $\frac{2}{3}$ innings, he was virtually untouchable, yielding just one run, to pick up 10 of his saves and one victory with a remarkable 0.28 ERA for the period.

Signed by the Phillies in 1974 out of a Pensacola high school,

Saucier's career has been sharply divided. During five minor league seasons of 1974-78 he was a starter in all of his 104 games. Since then, he has started only three times in 132 major and minor league games.

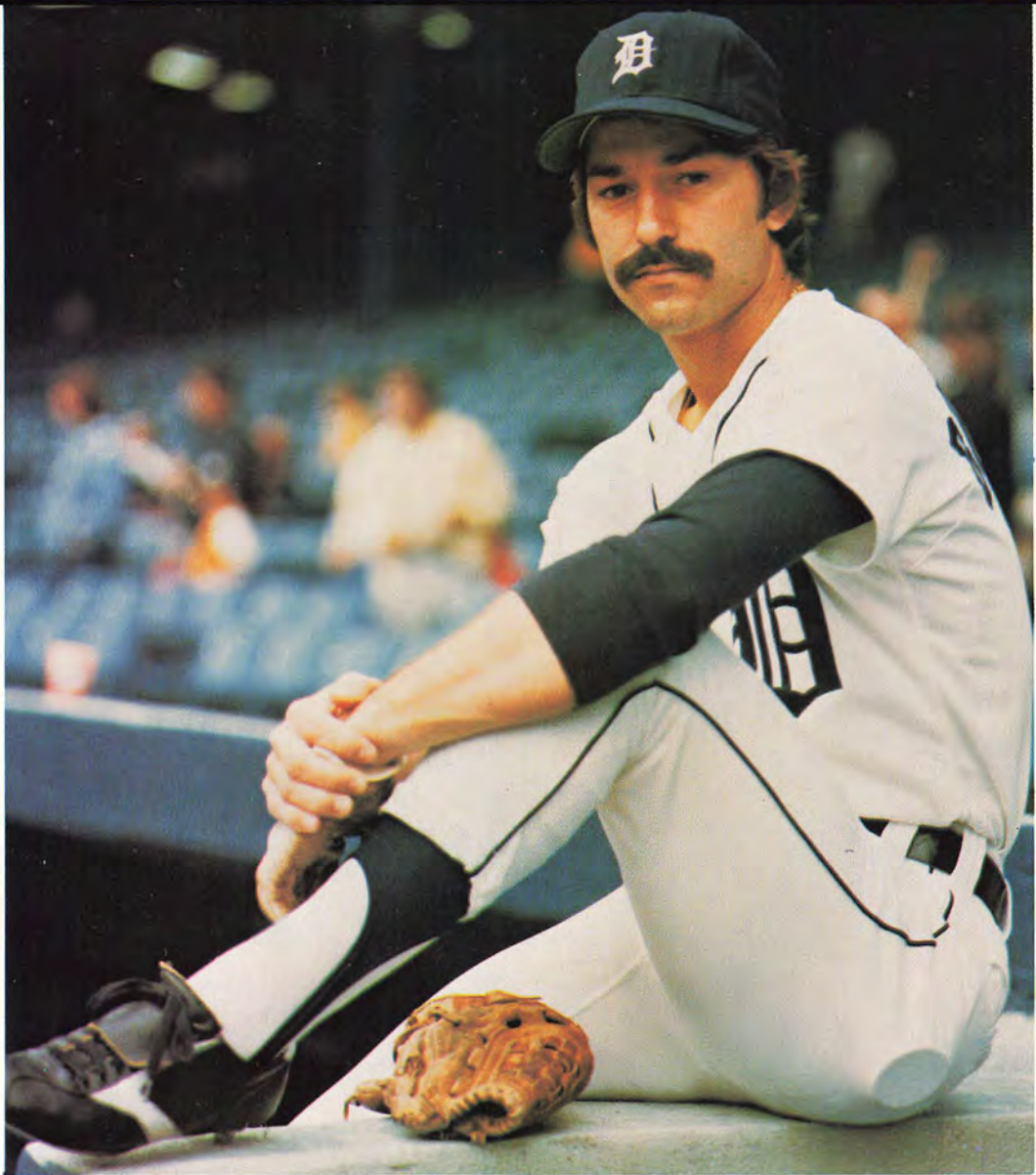
Success did not come instantly for the animated Saucier. He lost

his first 12 decisions of 1977 at Reading and the following year had a 7-12 record at Oklahoma City.

That was when he went on relief, posting a 2.11 ERA in 23 rescue jobs at Oklahoma City, then finishing the year at Philadelphia with 27 more in relief.

With the Phillies all of 1980, Saucier relieved 40 times, made two appearances in the playoffs and one in the World Series before going to Texas to complete a deal for Sparky Lyle.

It was from the Rangers that the Tigers acquired the salty southpaw.



A season without injury would be the first request of Tom Brookens, the quiet man who plays third base for the Tigers.

His .304 spring training in '81 fanned his hopes for another fine season. Then he pulled a hamstring muscle. Just recovered from that, he injured his ankle. That meant all of April missed and only 71 games played in a season which saw him drop from .275 to .243 at the plate, despite two six-game streaks and some timely shots.

It was something of a contrast for Brookens, who led the Tigers with 151 games played in 1980 and who was a Player of the Week in August when he had a hot period which included a 5-for-5

game in which he started a triple play.

Although the Tigers selected him first in the January, 1975 draft, Brookens did not rush into the key position he now holds at Tiger Stadium.

He was 26 years old and in his fifth minor league season when he was summoned to Detroit. That was in July, 1979, when he was hitting .306 for the Evansville Triplets.

In 60 games with the Tigers

that season, he moved into a vital role the following May when he "inherited" the third base job from Richie Hebner, who was moving to first. Brookens, a steady fielder with a strong arm, responded with his fine season of 1980.

Brookens, a Pennsylvanian who attended Mansfield State College, started his career as a shortstop. That was in 1975 at Montgomery and it was two years later before he moved to the hot corner for the Triplets.

A sore arm limited him to 65 games at Evansville in 1978 but he came back strong in 1979 to lead the Triplets at the plate through the first half of the season and earn his promotion to the Tigers.

Dave Rozema



A pattern has been set for Dave Rozema, now a veteran of five major league seasons although only 25 years old.

The personable righthander from Grand Rapids has discovered some success as a starter the past two seasons — but more in relief.

For instance, in 1981, Dave had a 2-5 record and 4.59 ERA in nine starts but a 3-0 mark and 2.49 ERA in 19 relief jobs. It was almost the same in 1980 when he chalked up a 4-5 reading and 4.05 ERA in 13 starts but reduced his ERA to 2.59 in 29 rescue assignments, with two victories and four saves.

Rozema's first four outings in

1981 were starts and two of them were sensational complete game shutouts: 4-0 against Kansas City on six hits and 2-0 against Seattle on two hits two weeks later. Those shutouts tied him with Dan Petry for the Tiger lead and a tie for eighth in the American League. Dave also shared another shutout with Petry and Kevin Saucier.

Two of Rozema's trade marks are his control and his mastery of the Cleveland and Seattle clubs.

He issued only 25 walks in 104 innings in 1981 and has a career record of 179 passes in 773 innings — about one every 4 1/3 innings, or two per game.

He entered 1982 with a 6-0 mark against the Indians and 7-1 against the Mariners, both 0-1 against him in 1981.

Signed in 1975 after spurning

selection by the Giants, Rozema was Tiger Rookie of the Year and American League Rookie Pitcher of the Year in 1977 when he topped all Tiger winners with 15 victories.

The next two seasons brought arm trouble, however, including a time on the disabled list. It was after that when Dave discovered there is a reward for relief, making his first bullpen outing in 1980.

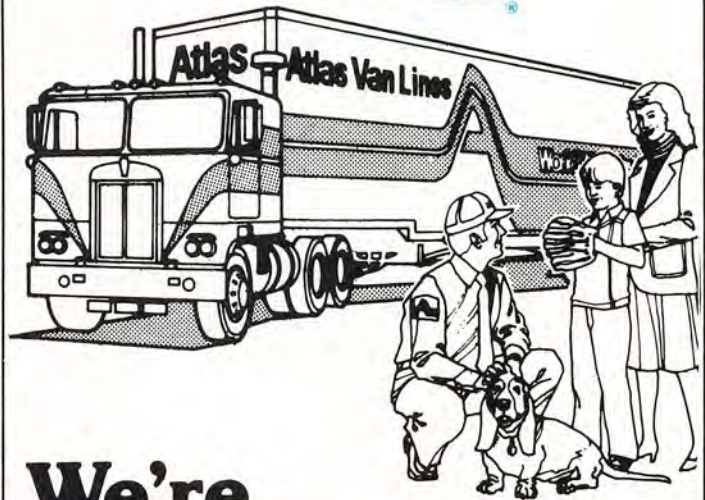

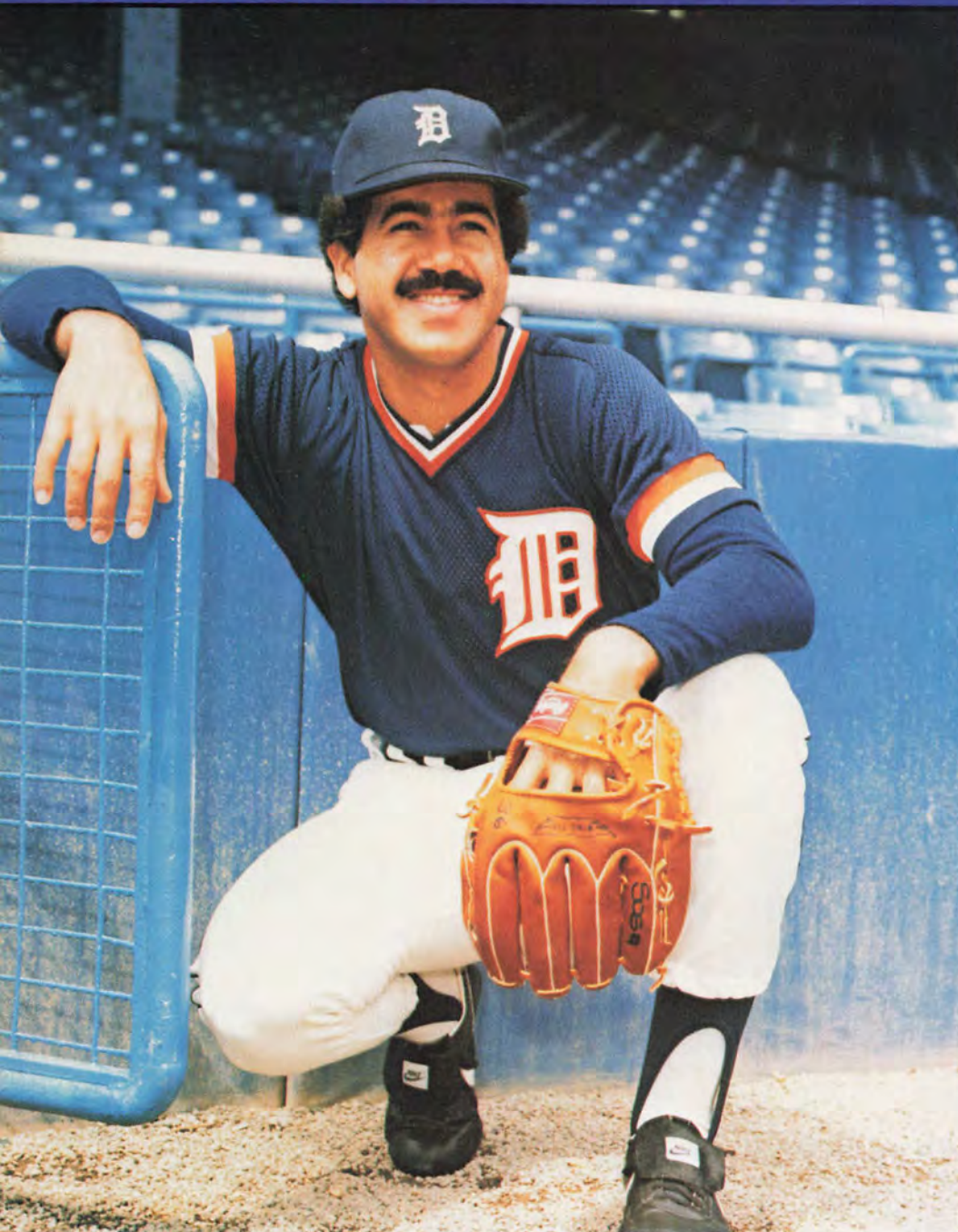

Elias Sosa



A late addition to the Tigers' 1982 bullpen was Elias Sosa, who was purchased from the Expos near the close of spring training.

A 31-year-old righthander from the Dominican Republic, Sosa is regarded as one of the game's most dependable relievers with 10 years of experience in the majors.

His record reads like a tourist itinerary since eight teams now have owned his contract, although he actually played with seven.

Sosa was signed at 17 in 1968 by the Giants and by 1973 was a bullpen mainstay at San Francisco. However, trades sent him to the Cardinals in 1975 and to the Braves the same year.

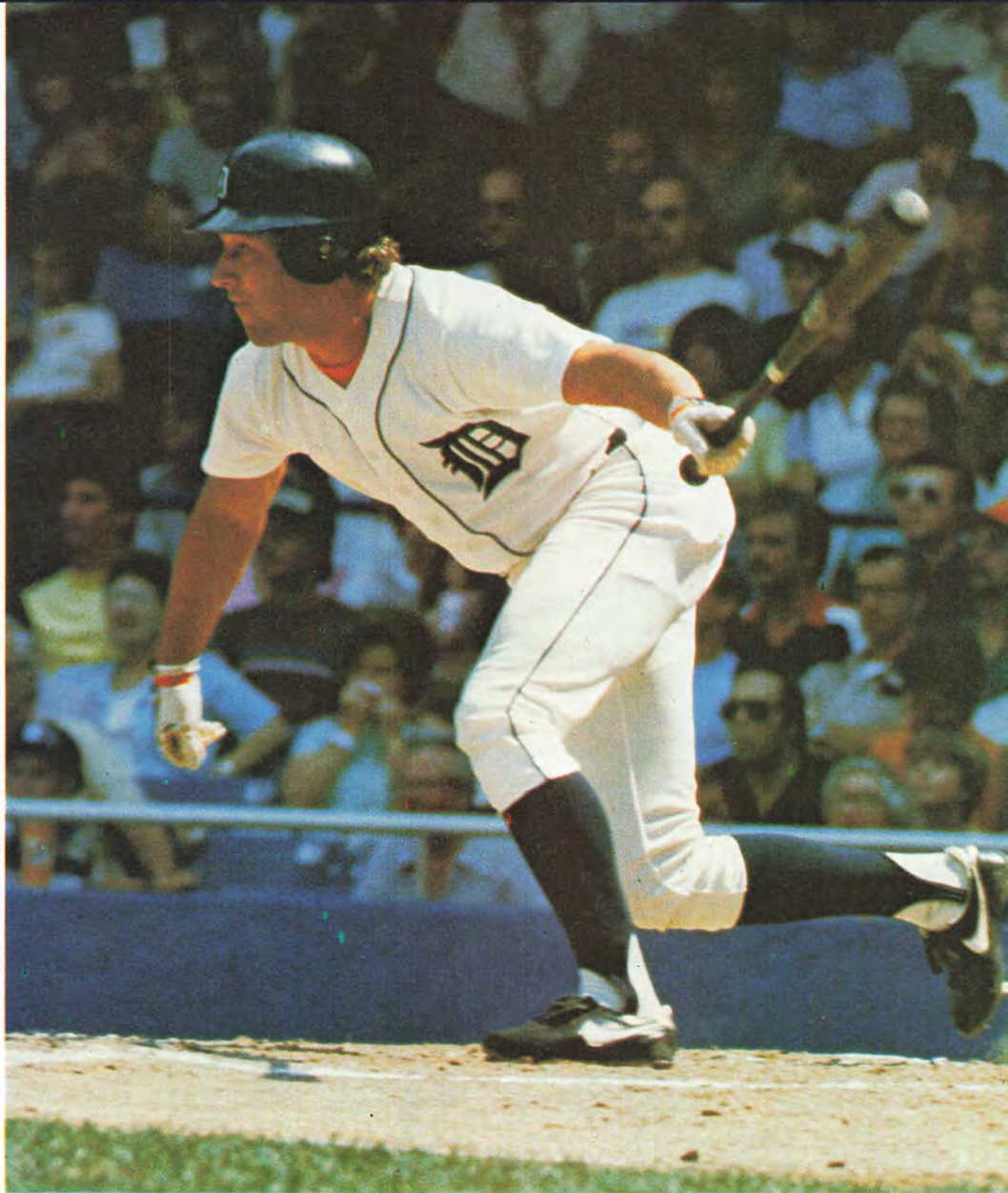
He went to the Dodgers in 1976, and they sold him to the Pirates early in 1978. The Bucs sent Sosa in a package trade to Oakland before that season opened and at the end of 1978, he became a free agent. That was when the Expos inked him.

In all of that travel, Sosa was in a total of 522 games — but only two in a starting role, one in 1973 and one in 1975.

In his other 520 games, Sosa compiled 78 saves, including 18 in 1973 at San Francisco and 18 more in 1979 at Montreal. He also accumulated 55 victories against 44 losses, a neat balance for a relief hurler.

Three times in his career, Sosa has pitched more than 100 innings in a season and two more times topped 90 innings — sure proof of his durability.

And if that weren't enough, he also pitches winter baseball in his native Dominican Republic.



The Tiger with the most jobs is John Wockenfuss, whose trade mark is the team's most unusual batting stance.

Able to perform behind the plate, at first base and in the outfield, the popular slugger also serves as a designated hitter and a pinch hitter when called upon.

It was not a vintage year in 1981

for Wockenfuss, whose overall bat mark dropped to .215 from a peak of .283 in 1978 but he finished strong by hitting .313 in September. Five of his home runs were hit in that month, including two in one game at Baltimore.

Although his home run total in the shortened season dropped to nine from 16, he hit them at the rate of one for each 19 at-bats.

John was in 39 games as a designated hitter, 17 as a pinch hitter among the 70 he played, out of the team's total of 109.

Now 33 years old, Wockenfuss first was signed in 1967 by the Washington club which later moved to Texas and became the

Rangers. Later acquired by the Cardinals, he spent all of seven seasons in the minors before the Tigers got him in December, 1973 for their farm system.

Called to Tiger Stadium in June, 1974 when injuries caused an emergency, he was in 13 Tiger games that year, came back for 35 in 1975 and has been on hand since.

What's more, Wockenfuss has his own MVP (Most Versatile Performer) trophy — bestowed by Detroit baseball writers in 1979.



There are some seasons players would like to forget — and Richie Hebner entered 1982 with the idea of forgetting 1981.

It was not a prime season for the veteran first baseman whose forte is driving in runs.

Coming to Tiger Stadium in 1980, Richie sent 82 across the plate that season, his personal high, and could have made it 100 if he had not virtually ended his season in late August because of

strained ligaments in his right instep. He also batted .290 in his first year as a Tiger, his highest mark in six seasons.

All appeared to be well during the spring training which followed as Richie posted a .362 average in exhibition play, one of the top marks for Tiger regulars.

Opening Day also was a success with a seventh-inning homer which was the game-winning RBI against the Blue Jays.

But a slump set in and Hebner had to battle it all the way to settle for a final average of .226, lowest of his long major league career,

while appearing in 78 games, 15 as a pinch hitter.

There was a period, however, near the end of the season in which Hebner stroked a nifty .287 and two home runs in one game in September indicated the power was still there.

The Tigers are counting on that.

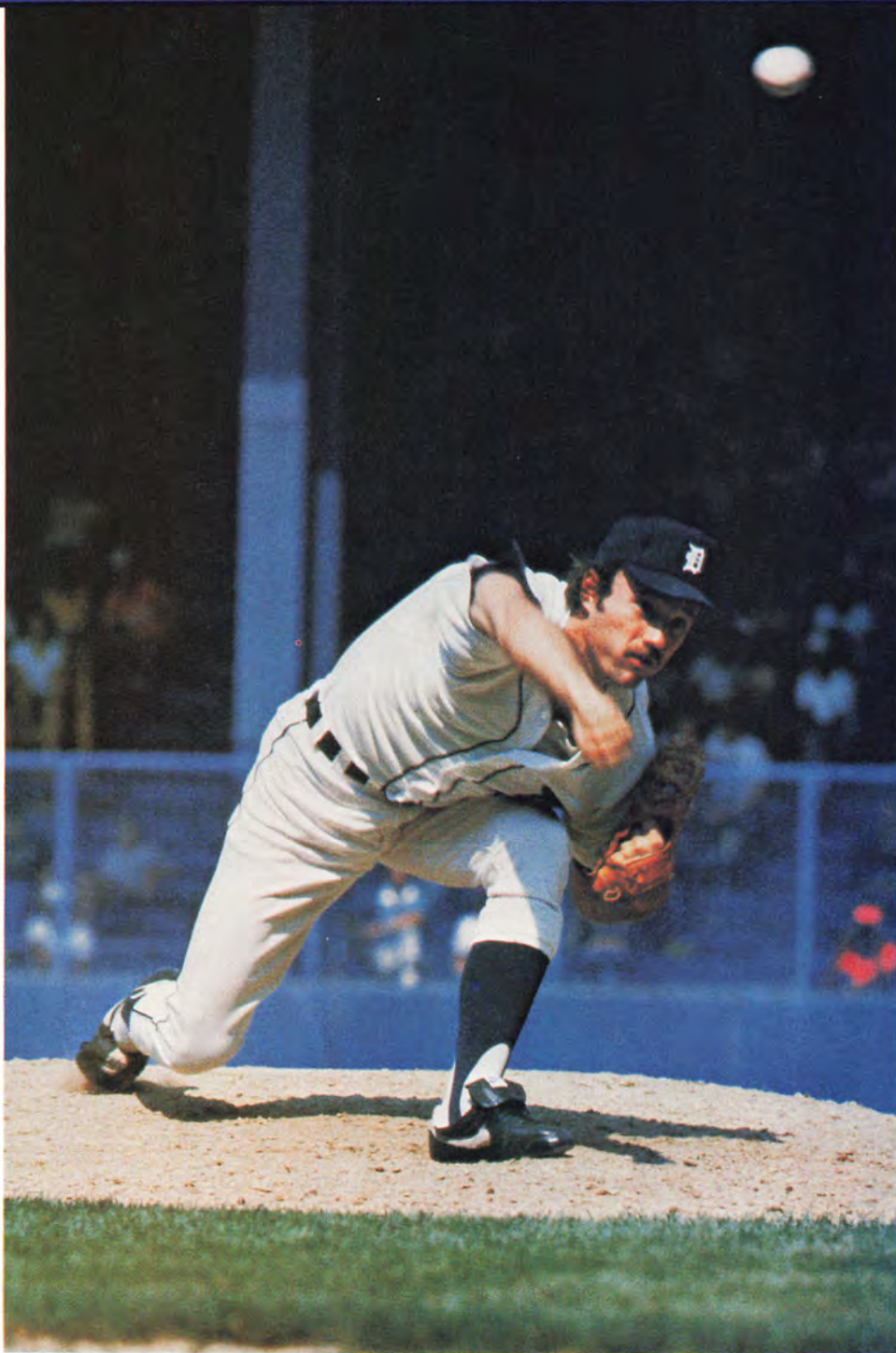

Dave Tobik



A righthander who has found a home in the Tiger bullpen after considerable travel is Dave Tobik, who came out of Ohio University as a first-round draft choice in 1975 to advance on a "split season" schedule through the farm system.

Until 1981, Dave had performed for two teams every year, the last three travelling between Detroit and Evansville.

A starter at the beginning of his career, Tobik turned to relief in 1977 and entered 1982 with only two starts in his last 207 outings. One was in the waning days of the Tigers' 1980 campaign, when he decided the Yankees in New York.

Dave picked up with a sterling spring training in 1981, posting a nifty 1.38 ERA in exhibition games, and followed with strong rescue work in the regular season. In his 27 assignments during the shortened season, he garnered two victories and shaved his ERA to 2.69, well below his previous lifetime of 4.12.

Tobik was especially effective during one span of 35 innings spread over 15 games, in which he picked up both of his victories, collected one save and gave up only two earned runs for a sensational ERA of 0.51.

He also was efficient at Tiger Stadium, establishing a 1.22 ERA for the 37 innings he pitched in the park so many hurlers fear.

One reason for Dave's success is found in his strikeout mark: 125 whiffs in 202 innings of his four-season career.

There is a new way of life for Aurelio Lopez, the Tigers' rotund righthander from Mexico.

For two seasons one of the top relief stars of the major leagues, "Senor Smoke" became a spot starter in 1981 with his work load trimmed.

For instance, he handled three starting assignments — for a total of only nine in his 190 appearances as a major leaguer.

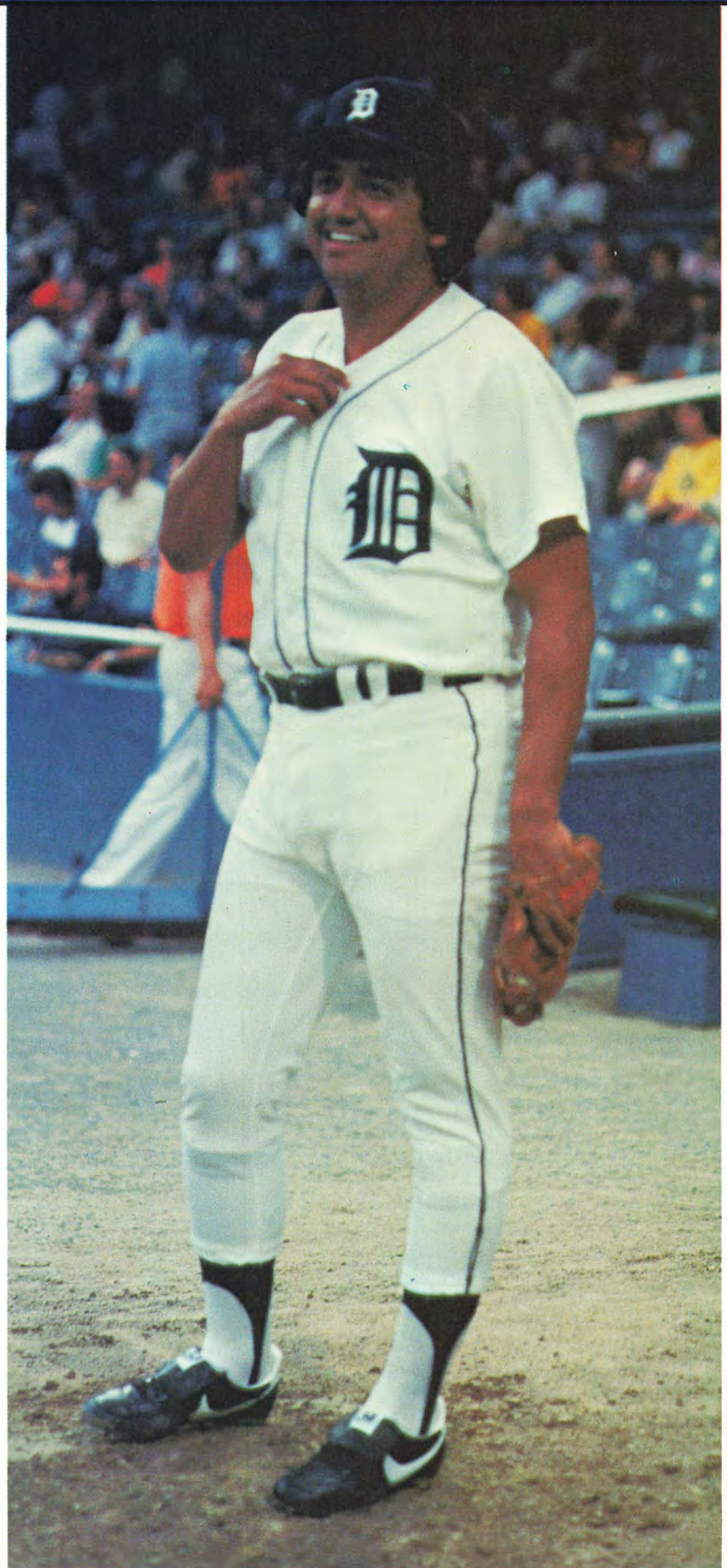
His relief work was reduced, as he was held ready for starting calls, to 26 outings — less than half his 61 of 1979 and 66 of the 1980 season.

His total of 29 appearances marked the first time since 1972 that he had not been in at least 50 games per season.

Innings worked also showed a reduction, from 129 in 1979 and 124 in 1980 to 82 in 1981.

However, the balance sheet for The Senor was on the winning side in both of his roles. As a starter, he was 2-1; in relief, it was 3-1 with three saves. That gave him a total of 26 victories and 45 saves (with 13 losses) in his three years as a Tiger hurler.

The Tigers acquired Lopez from the Cardinals in a 1978-79 off-season trade but he pitched almost all of the 11 seasons preceding 1978 in Mexico, starting in 1967 when he was only 19. He spent part of 1974 at Kansas City as the only break in his prolonged service south of the border.



A "quick learner" would be a good description of Rick Leach, who needed less than two years to reach Tiger Stadium after signing a bonus contract in June, 1979 following a brilliant two-sport career at the University of Michigan in which he set school, conference and national records in football and batted a hefty .349 in four baseball seasons.

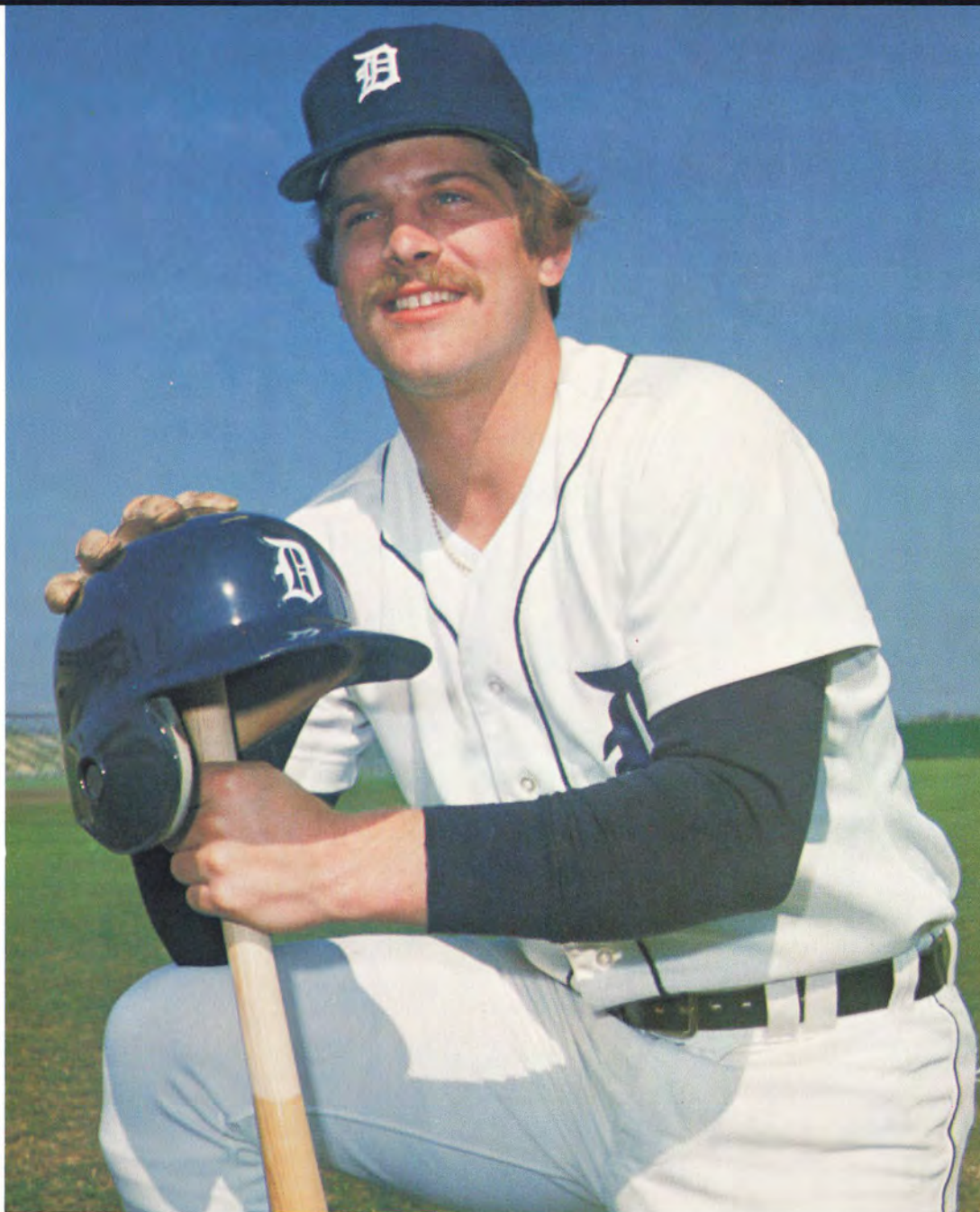
A lefthander all the way, Leach spurned two drafts by the Phillies and football offers from two clubs to join the Tigers as their No. 1 draftee.

Success came quickly, with a .302 average at Lakeland in 1979 and .272 at Evansville in 1980.

Leach was hitting .409 for the Triplets in 1981 when he was given his promotion to Tiger Stadium after 13 games. His major league debut came on April 30 and at the end of the season he had appeared in 54 games, 13 as a pinch hitter.

The highlight was his first major league home run, against the Twins, to provide all the runs in a 3-0 triumph for the Tigers.

A line drive hitter with a strong throwing arm, Leach is an outfielder who also plays first base with skill — completing his first major league season without making an error at either position.

Coming to Tiger Stadium was a homecoming of sorts for Bill, who was born in Detroit, graduated from Redford Union and attended both the University of Detroit and St. Clair Community College, as well as the University of Tampa.

His catching career started with the Texas Rangers when they still were the Washington Senators but he was traded to San Diego in 1979 to play 166 games during two seasons there before moving on to Detroit during spring training of 1981.

His official Tiger debut was delayed for a month when he received a broken wrist during the spring exhibition campaign. That was just one of a long series of injuries for the hard-driving backstop; the others including broken ribs, punctured lung, broken hand and broken nose.



A spring training addition to the Tiger roster was Enos Cabell, 10-year veteran of the majors obtained by the trading route from the Giants.

Detroit fans remember the lanky, versatile infielder from his early days at Baltimore but his development into stardom came during six seasons with the Astros and one with the Giants.

In the National League, Cabell was known as a "durable and consistent" player. Some figures

show how well the description fits.

Until the abbreviated season in 1981, Cabell had four straight with 600-plus times at bat; five straight with 150 or more hits; and a string of 213 consecutive games with the 1977-79 Astros for a club record.

Cabell came to the Tigers with a lifetime average of .273 for his 1,091 major league games and top campaigns in 1977-78 when he batted .282 and .295 with two-year totals of 67 doubles and 42 stolen bases.

In the curtailed 1981 season, he appeared in 96 of the Giants 111 games to bat .255. Although Enos

considers himself primarily a third baseman, he was at first base in 69 Giants' games; at third in 22.

In other seasons, he also played second, short and the outfield.

Born in Kansas but now living in California, Cabell was signed by the Orioles in 1969 and twice was Player of the Year in the minors before sticking with Baltimore in 1974. He went to Houston in a significant trade for Lee May in 1975, then to the Giants in a swap for Bob Knepper in 1981.

Pat Underwood



A southpaw who thrives on work is Pat Underwood, who honed his southpaw slants at Evansville in 1981 as the Triplets' busiest starter (26 games) and strikeout leader (90 in 165 innings).

Also significant in Underwood's '81 performance were only 44 walks in all that toil, producing a 9-8 record and 3.98 ERA.

In 1980, Pat spent the entire season with the Tigers, making 49 appearances, second high for the

staff, and posting a 3.59 ERA, the staff's lowest.

The Tigers' No. 1 draftee (second in the nation) in 1976, Underwood is the brother of Tom Underwood, now with Oakland. Their matchup in 1979 in Pat's major league debut was a classic event of the season.

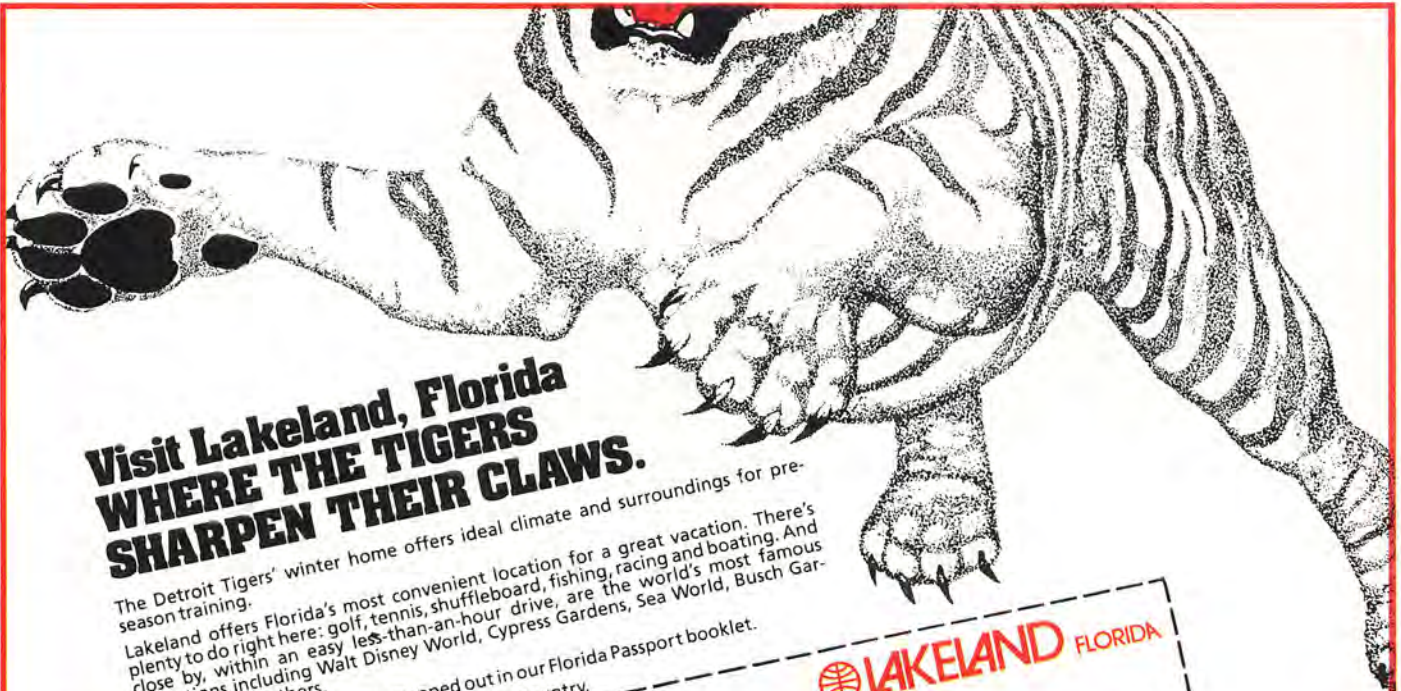

Mike Ivie



When the Tigers started looking for a designated hitter who could fill the cleanup position in their 1982 batting order, about a month after the season started, it was Mike Ivie who answered the call.

A 29-year-old righthanded hitter with a National League background, the husky Georgian (6-4 and 215) was a free agent at the time, following service with the Padres, Giants and Astros — 1975-77 at San Diego, 1978-80 at San Francisco and 1981 at Houston.

Ivie was the first player picked in the draft of June, 1970, when the Padres looked at his brilliant high school record in Atlanta and handed him a hefty bonus to sign. His prep credentials included a career average of more than .400 and a senior season reading of .525 with 21 homers in 21 games.

Only 19 when he got his first taste of major league action in 1971, Ivie made the grade on a full-time basis in 1975 and compiled a National League record of .276 with 67 home runs and 366 RBI in 765 games.

A catcher when he first signed, Mike also played first and third, with some outfield experience and much service as a pinch hitter.

His best season average was .308 in '78 with the Giants with other top marks of 27 homers and 89 RBI in '79 for the same team. His .387 pinch-hit performance with the '78 Giants included two grand slam home runs that season.

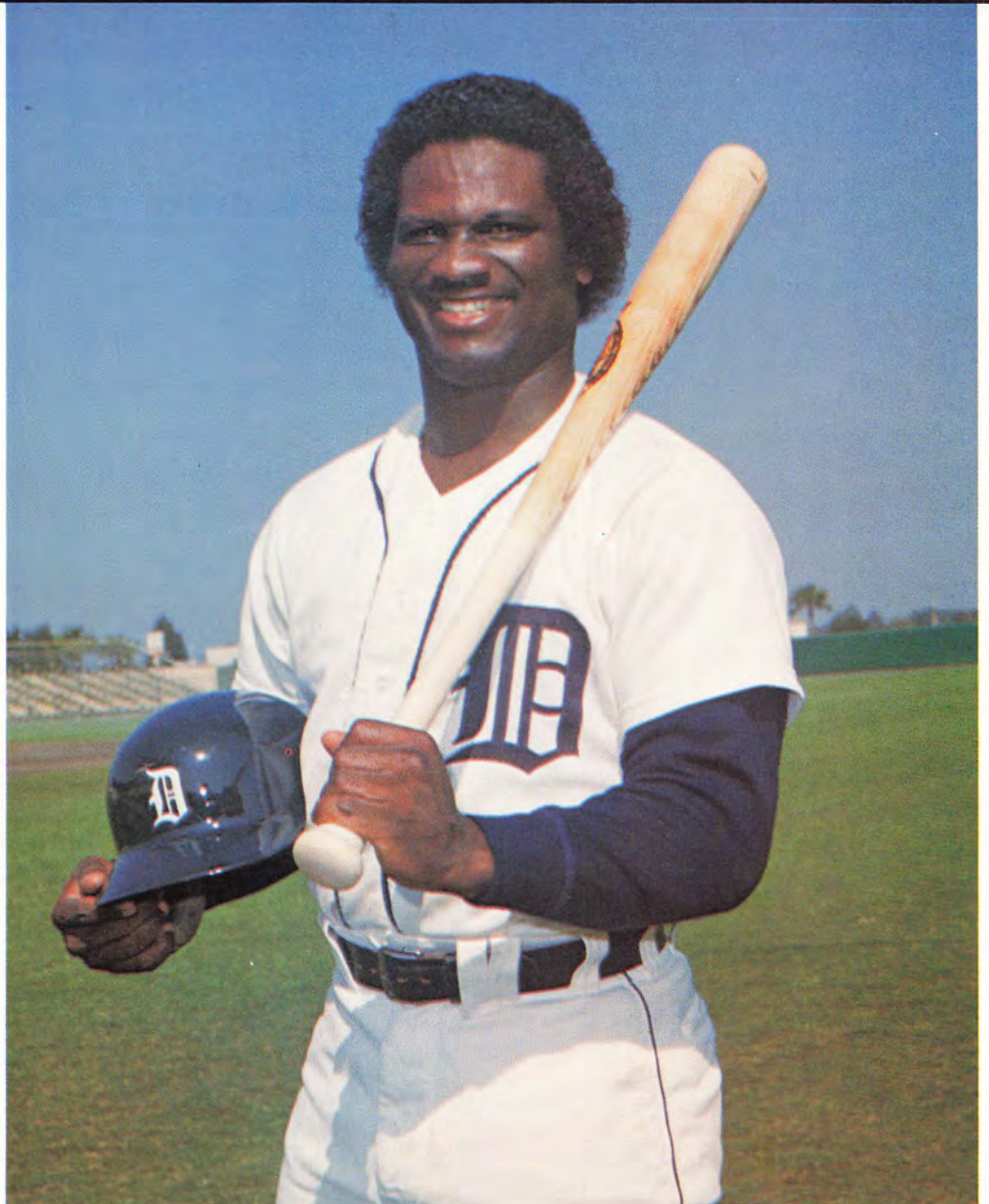
One of the game's most proficient pinch hitters and a dangerous base stealer is Jerry Turner, who was signed by the Tigers from the free agent ranks just before the start of 1982 spring training.

Turner, who played six seasons with the Padres and 10 games with the White Sox at the end of 1981, was most brilliant as a pinch hitter in 1978 when he had an emergency average of .408 with five home runs (one under the major league record) and 19 runs batted in during 49 pinch assignments.

The stocky, lefthand-hitting outfielder followed with the best season of his career in 1979 when Roger Craig, now a Tiger coach, was his manager: 111 hits in 138 games with a .248 average.

Although limited in 1980 action because of an injury, Turner managed eight stolen bases out of 11 attempts with two swipes of home. Last season, the Padres revamped their outfield with newcomers and Turner was used sparingly before going to Chicago in early September.

A native of Arkansas, Turner had some outstanding marks in his five minor league seasons, leading the Northwest League at .377 in 1972, his first pro season, and the Pacific Coast League with 176 hits in 1975.





Perhaps Lynn Jones personifies best the Tigers' "Riders of the Lonesome Pine" — their key reserve players who helped so much in 1981.

With Jones, it appeared that almost every time he came off the bench in an emergency role, things started happening.

It has been that way with the good-natured outfielder ever since the Tigers drafted him from the Cincinnati farm system in 1979. Involved in seven late-inning rallies with base hits that year, he was voted 1979 Tiger Rookie of the Year by the Detroit Sports Broadcasters Association.

Unfortunately, an operation on his knee kept Jones out of action in 1980 except the first and last months of the season.

But he was back on the firing line in 1981, making some key contributions when called upon.

On his first appearance at the

plate, in a pinch hitting role, he delivered a home run. Twice, while getting full-fledged outfield opportunities, he packaged four hits in one game.

Then there was "the catch," a sensational fielding play which the Tigers consider their best of the entire 1981 season.

Jones made it June 3 in a game with the Brewers at Tiger Stadium. On a line drive by Cecil Cooper to right field, Jones made a sliding grab of the ball, jumped to his feet and promptly threw out Charlie Moore, trying to tag up and score after the catch.

Larry Pashnick



A pitching prospect to eye with care is Larry Pashnick, who came out of Michigan State in 1979 to post some impressive minor league earned run averages.

A product of Wyandotte Roosevelt High School, Larry tacked up a 3.50 ERA at Lakeland in 1979, trimmed it to 2.96 at Montgomery in 1980 and forged another reduction to 2.89 at Evansville in 1981.

That was the lowest for any pitcher in the American Association last season.

Starting in all 25 of his 1981 appearances, Pashnick hurled four shutouts for the division champs and had a no-hit game among his efforts.

He and Pat Underwood were tied for the club lead in innings pitched, with 165 each.

Excellent glove work and fine leadership are qualities the Tigers like about Mark DeJohn, their infield veteran of 11 seasons in the minor leagues.

They are the qualities which made DeJohn the Most Valuable Player on the Evansville roster in 1981, his fourth campaign in the Tiger farm system.

Still only 28 years old, Mark spent seven years in the Mets' minor league chain, the last three with Tidewater (AAA), before the Tigers signed him as a free agent for the Triplets in 1978.

A steady performer who can come up with some key hits, DeJohn has appeared in 100 or more games every one of his last nine seasons.

He got his first taste of Tiger major league action as a non-roster player in the club's 1981 spring training and came back on the varsity roll in 1982.



The speed merchant that Manager Sparky Anderson was seeking for the Tigers turned out to be Ed Miller, acquired from the Braves in a trade near the end of 1982 spring drills.

Miller, a stocky 24-year-old switch hitter, literally blazed his way to the majors — leading all six of his minor leagues in stolen bases during his dash to the Big Time.

A California native, he was the Rangers' No. 2 pick in the June, 1975 draft after graduation from a Richmond, Calif., high school. He had a brief term at Texas in 1977, then was included in a four-team,

11-player swap which sent him to Atlanta, where he got in his first full major league season in 1981.

En route to the Braves, Miller showed his heels to anxious foes with these league-leading stolen base performances:

1975 - Gulf Coast League, 30 SB in 51 games.

1976 - Western Carolinas, 65 SB in 116 games.

1977 - Texas League, 80 SB in 100 games.

1978 - International League, 36 SB in 130 games.

1979 - International, 76 SB in 135 games.

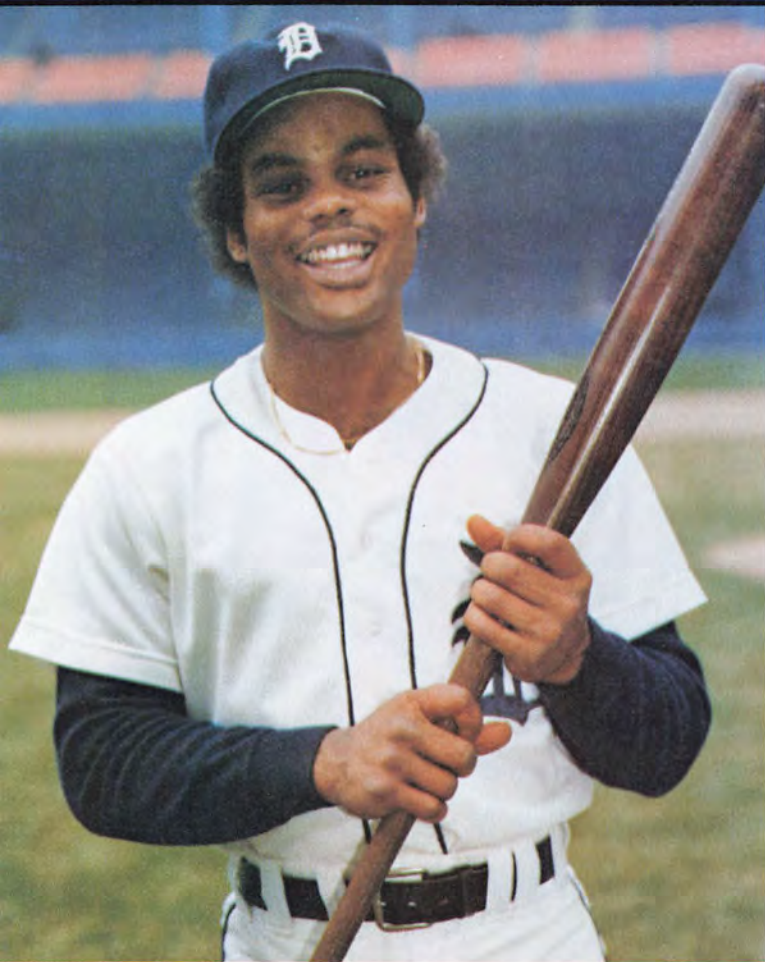
1980 - International, 60 SB in 110 games.

The Blazer kept right on going, once he reached Atlanta in 1981,

with 13 straight successful steals at the start of the season and 23 of the Braves' 98 stolen bases for the season.

When not stealing bases, Miller covers a lot of ground in the outfield and normally leads off in the batting order.

Rick Peters



One Tiger hoping for a turn in the road is Rick Peters, the flashy flyhawk and switch hitter.

The Tigers' Rookie of the Year in 1980, Rick encountered some rough going after acquiring that honor.

In October, 1980, there was an operation to remove bone chips from his right elbow. Then in May, 1981, Rick lost an engagement with the outfield wall at Tiger Stadium — emerging with the right elbow sore again and the ribs on his left side bruised and tender.

Time was expected to restore Rick to full flower but in 1982 spring training, there was new arm trouble and more surgery ordered.

Peters was the Tigers' seventh draft pick in 1977 — as an infielder from Arizona State.

Marty Castillo



The Tiger roster says Marty Castillo is a catcher but the strong-armed Californian has spent a lot of time at third base.

That's where the Tigers used him in 1981 after a call-up in August from Evansville, where he had two straight strong seasons at the plate.

He also went behind the plate before the season ended and made an emergency outfield appearance which ended with a knee injury a few days before the close of the campaign.

A fifth-round draft selection in June, 1978, Castillo set personal highs in almost every batting department at Evansville in 1980 and was the club's 1981 leader in home runs with 17 and runs batted in, with 69.

Dave Rucker

Another lefthander who has found success coming out of the bullpen is Dave Rucker, husky Californian who opened the 1981 season with the Tigers but spent most of the year at Evansville.

Dave made the leap to Tiger Stadium on the strength of a good spring training in which he gave up only two earned runs in 16 innings on the mound.

He relieved twice against the Blue Jays early in the regular season but was returned to Evansville, where he relieved 35 times without a start for a 7-4 and 3.76 record.

With the Triplets the previous season, Rucker was in relief 46 times and he entered 1982 with only 19 starts among the 104 games of his career which began in 1978 as a 16th draft choice.



Augie Ruiz



Well-traveled is August Ruiz, a new man in the Tiger system.

The 25-year-old southpaw was born in Honolulu, a distinction he shares with Milt Wilcox; graduated from a high school in Germany; has attended the University of Miami; and has pitched winter baseball in Puerto Rico.

First signed by the Dodgers in 1978, Ruiz hit his stride in 1980 at Vero Beach, where he relieved 40 times with a 2.33 earned run average. The following winter, he was purchased by Kansas City but passed along to the Tigers in April.

Assigned to the Birmingham farm club, Ruiz relieved 58 times for the Barons and finished with an earned run average of 3.15 for his 123 innings of action.

Bruce Robbins



Physical problems and surgery have Bruce Robbins looking for a fresh start with the Tigers.

The young southpaw, still only 22 years old with five seasons under his belt, pitched only 10 times at Birmingham during the 1981 season for a 3-2 record.

Bruce split the two previous seasons between Tiger Stadium and the minor leagues, 11-10 with the farm clubs and 7-5 with the Tigers.

He first saw Tiger Stadium in mid-1979 after posting a 7-1 mark at Montgomery, and split his first six major league decisions.

He opened 1980 at Evansville but again finished with the Tigers, 2-2 in six starts and 2-0 in nine relief assignments.

Glenn Wilson

A rosy future was the prediction for Glenn Wilson after his strong performance as a non-roster player in spring training and a subsequent impressive showing while on emergency duty at Tiger Stadium during an early 1982 manpower shortage.

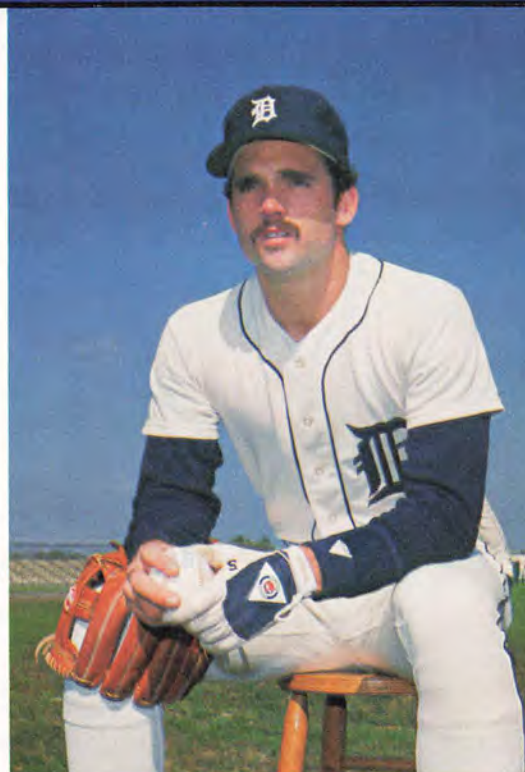
The 23-year-old Texan had less than two years of experience when he got his major league baptism.

Selected first by the Tigers in the June, 1980 draft, Wilson played first at Montgomery in 1980, when he was a third baseman, and came on effectively at Birmingham in 1981, when he moved to the outfield, with a short term at Evansville closing the season for him.

A native and resident of the Houston area, Wilson spent three years at Sam Houston State before signing with the Tigers, playing football there as well as twice getting All-America recognition in college baseball.



Howard Johnson



A "base hit machine" is what the Tigers see in Howard Johnson, their young infield prospect from Clearwater, Fla.

Drafted No. 1 in January, 1979, Howard collected 372 hits in his first three minor league seasons, two at Lakeland and 1981 at Birmingham.

For the Barons, Johnson showed some real power at the plate with 22 home runs, 28 doubles and 83 runs batted in.

In the subsequent Florida winter league, with its 48-game schedule, Johnson kept up the pace by notching a .324 average, the top figure for his brief career.

Larry Rothschild



The Tigers are intrigued by the development of Larry Rothschild as a potential right-handed bullpen performer.

Drafted from the Reds' farm system in December, 1980, the split finger fastball hurler got his first taste of major league action with the Tigers last September and responded by giving up only one run in 5 2/3 innings of emergency duty.

A Chicagoan who now lives in one of the Windy City's suburbs, Rothschild helped pitch Florida State into the 1975 College World Series.

The Reds promptly signed him and groomed him through six minor league campaigns before the Tigers came along to pluck him off the Indianapolis roster.

At Evansville in 1981, Larry was a busy man, relieving 56 times.

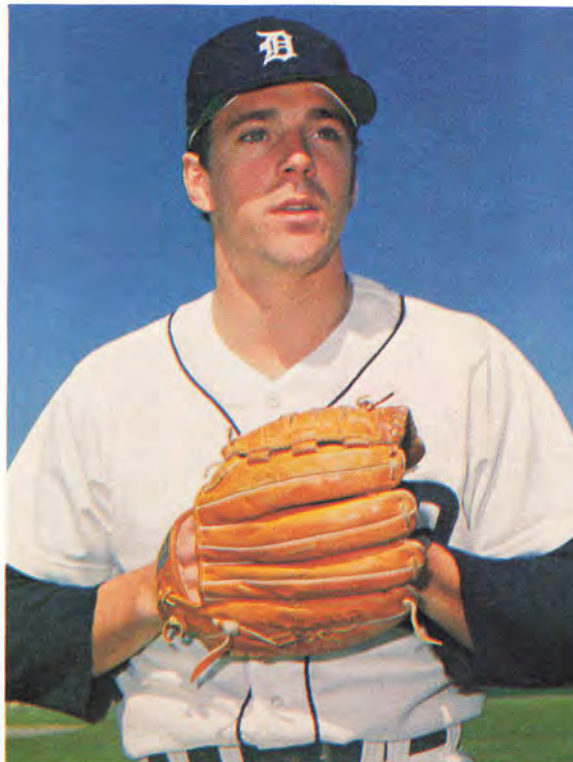
Howard Bailey

He was a non-roster player in the Tigers' 1981 spring training but Howard Bailey made the most of his opportunity.

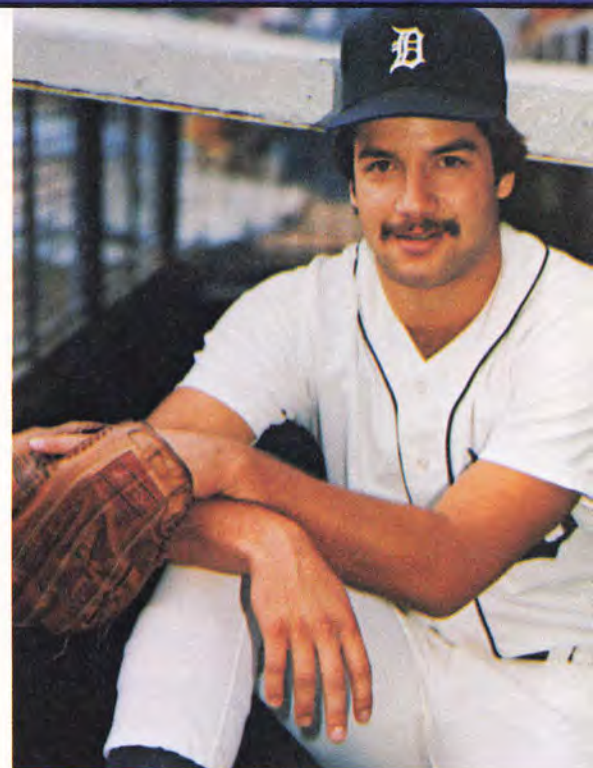
A sensational effort during the exhibition campaign landed him on the major league roster for opening day and he made five starts in the first month before a swollen ERA sent him off to Evansville.

There he encountered some arm trouble which sidelined him for a while but he showed enough in his 14 starts to merit another look by the Tigers.

A native of Grand Haven, the young lefthander was signed as an undrafted free agent in August, 1978 and pitched his way to Tiger Stadium after minor league stops at Lakeland and Montgomery.



Jerry Ujdur



Another of the promising hurlers in the Tigers' corps of youngsters is Jerry Ujdur, a righthander from the University of Minnesota.

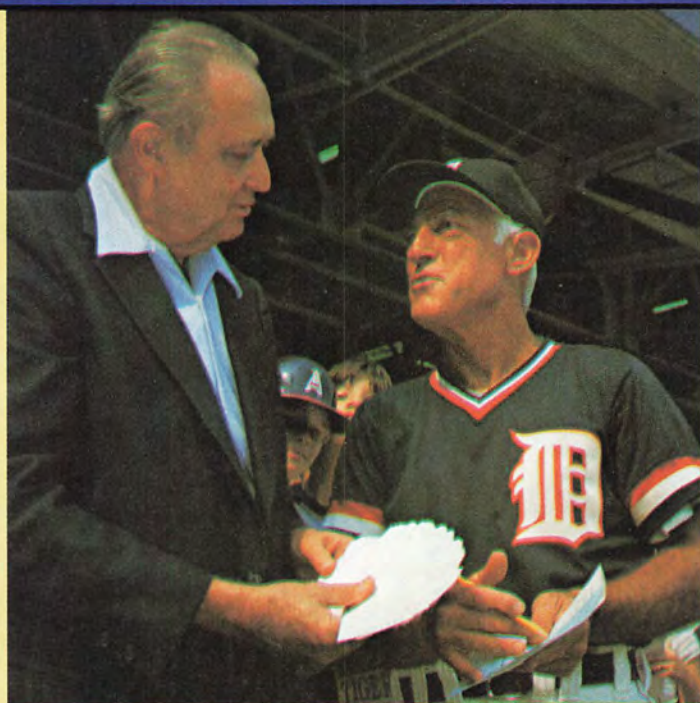
The Tigers' No. 4 selection in the June, 1978 draft, Jerry had season-ending trials at Tiger Stadium in both 1980 and 1981 — winning his only decision the first time but reaching no decisions in four starts last September.

Ujdur was the top pitcher at Evansville in 1980, leading the Triplets in victories and ERA with 9-4 and 3.37 figures.

An excellent spring training with the Tigers in 1981 followed, Ujdur winning twice without a loss and hanging up a 2.25 ERA. He spent most of the year, however, at Evansville with marks of 7-10 and 4.09. His 163 innings of action were exceeded by only two Triplets and his 88 strikeouts were second for the staff.

The 1,000th Tiger

The Tigers are passing another milestone this season, with a big welcome for the 1,000th player to pull on their uniform since it all began in 1901.

The figure was No. 995 as the club entered the 82nd campaign of its American League history. That put the finger on the fifth newcomer of the current season as No. 1,000.

The man holding the No. 1 position in the historic parade was a speedy lefthand-hitting third baseman whose true name was James Patrick Casey, but who was called "Doc" because he turned out to be a capable dentist.

Casey was the leadoff batter in the Tigers' very first game in the American League on April 25, 1901.

Of interest to faithful Tiger fans are Casey's counterparts in the subsequent march through history (No. 100, No. 200, etc.), although few of them made big headlines in their playing days.

No. 100 — Red Downs, who came out of Iowa to join the 1907 Tiger infield but played only two more seasons in the majors with a three-year interruption.

No. 200 — Ray Demmitt, whose only Detroit experience in a seven-year career was one game as an outfielder in 1914.

No. 300 — Bob Fothergill, the rotund outfielder known as "Fats" who was one of the Tigers' most capable batters in a Detroit career of 8½ seasons. Starting in 1922, he finished with a 12-year average of .326.

No. 400 — George Susce, who

caught just two games for the Tigers in 1932, played infrequently in seven other seasons elsewhere but became a veteran coach nicknamed "Good Kid." His son, of the same name, pitched for the Tigers in 1958-59.

No. 500 — Earl Cook, a Canadian righthander whose entire major league career consisted of one game with the Tigers in 1941.

No. 600 — Jim Delsing, one of the most capable glove men of his time and a 10-year man with five American League teams. He joined the Tiger outfield in 1952 and stayed until 1956.

No. 700 — Herb Moford, a righthander whose 25 games with the Tigers in 1958 represented exactly half of his four-year major league total.

No. 800 — Leo Marentette.

Detroit-born righthander who was a stalwart of the farm system but pitched only two games for the Tigers in 1965.

No. 900 — Jim Nettles, outfielder brother of Graig Nettles who spent half of the 1974 season at Tiger Stadium and later played in Japan.

For the statistically-minded, the 995 players used in 81 seasons make an average of about 12 a year. Three seasons were on that mark, 43 above it and 35 below it.

The most newcomers in one season was 33 in 1912, with 20 or more in four other years. The fewest was three in 1947, with four in 1935 and five each in 1924 and 1948.

There is an explanation for the big crop of 33 in 1912. That was the year the Tigers went on strike over Ty Cobb's suspension for attacking a fan. Faced with the prospect of a forfeiture, Manager Hughie Jennings enlisted a team of collegians and sandlotters to face the Athletics in Philadelphia on May 18 and lost a 23-2 decision.

Eight of the amateurs never played again in the majors: Ed Irvin, Bill Leinhauser, Jim McGarr, Dan McGarvey, Pat Meany, Jack Smith, Allan Travers and Hap Ward. Neither did Joe Sugden, one of Jennings' coaches who had not seen action for six years following a 12-year career as a catcher.

Another sandlotter, Billy Maharg, played just one more game, in the National League in 1916, but is remembered because his name was linked with the Black Sox scandal of 1919.

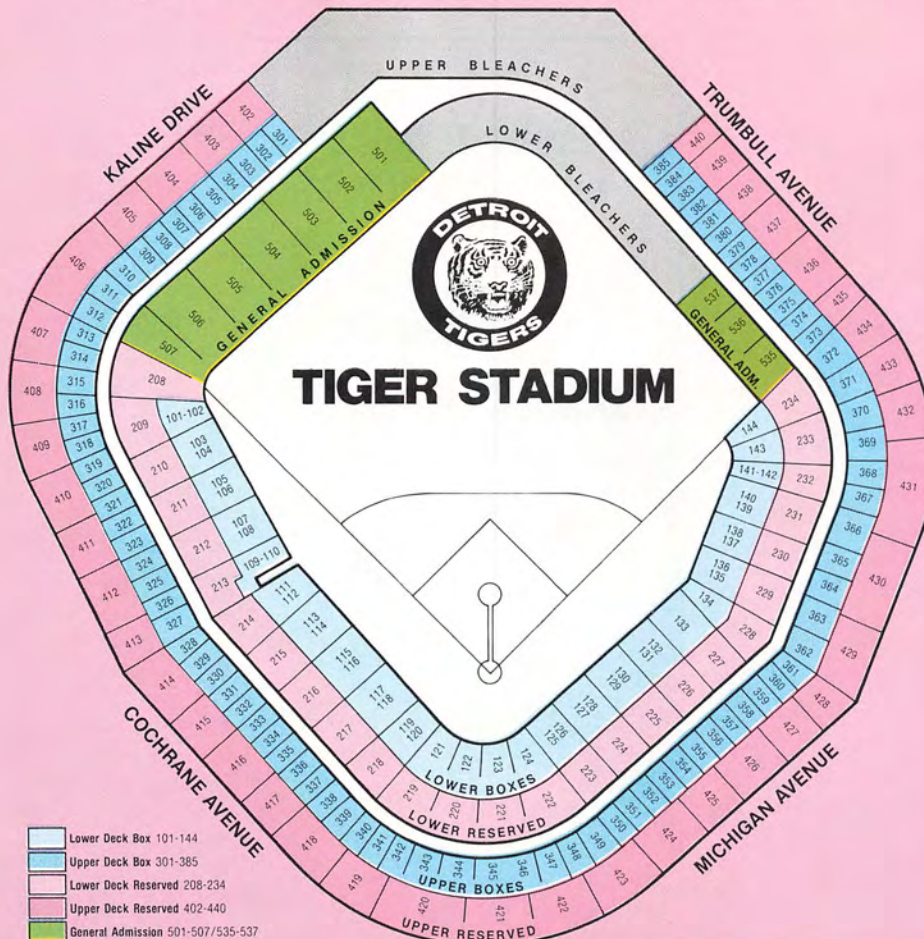

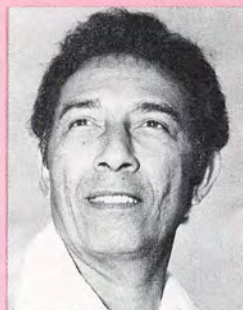

Although relying on the Major League Scouting Bureau for much field work, the Tigers depend on their own experts for final evaluations of the prospects they hope to sign.

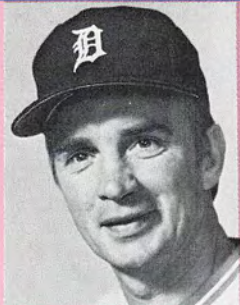

New battle lines were drawn for Tiger minor league campaigns in 1982 on a five-team front.

Dave Miller moved in to become the administrator of the player development program under the guidance of Bill Lajoie, vice-president/baseball with Hoot Evers continuing as field director of the program.

On the managerial front, there were other changes.

Roy Majtyka was promoted from Birmingham to Evansville, the top spot in the Tiger farm system, to mark his third season in the chain.

Bruce Kimm, another former Tiger, returned to take over the reins at Lakeland. After several seasons in the minors, Kimm became noted as Mark Fidrych's "regular" catcher in 1976. He was with the Chicago White Sox the past two seasons.

Ted Brazell, another veteran of the Tiger farm system who started managing in 1980, has moved from Lakeland to Macon this year while Boots Day, who has been playing occasionally but coaching most of the last two years, got the assignment at Bristol.

John Grodzicki and Billy Muffett are continuing as minor league pitching coaches.

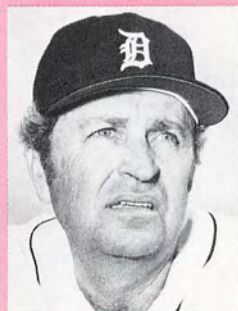
While continuing to provide valuable manpower to the major league Tigers, the farm system in 1981 was again successful — with three of the five clubs above the .500 mark.
