ROYALS STADIUM

Royals Stadium and the unique Harry S Truman Sports Complex have become landmarks in Kansas City. Built exclusively for baseball, Royals Stadium has drawn rave notices since opening in 1973. Maybe United Press International's description, "perhaps the finest facility for the game ever erected," describes it best.

The stadium opened April 10, 1973, with the Royals defeating Texas 12-1 before 39,464 fans. That culminated the dream which had been building since the citizens of Jackson County okayed by more than the two-thirds majority needed \$43 million in general obligation bonds on June 27, 1967.

Inflationary costs led to \$13 million of revenue bonds, and personal investments by franchise owners Ewing Kauffman of the Royals and Lamar Hunt of the neighboring Kansas City Chiefs brought the cost of the total project beyond \$70 million.

The Stadium's affect has been tremendous as Kansas City has topped the million mark 6 consecutive years in the new home capped by last season's all-time Kansas City record of 2,255,493 fans. A total of 9,458,830 have paid their way into the Stadium since opening day for an average of 1,576,472 fans per season.

The features of Royals Stadium are numerous, but the Tartan Turf surface which covers both the infield and outfield, a 12-story high scoreboard and 322-foot wide water spectacular which cost more than \$3 million and a \$1,500,000 stadium club are among the most talked about items.

The scoreboard, in the shape of the Royals' crest, flashes statistical data, much of it figured instantaneously by 1 of the 2 computers, and shows animated cartoons. The board contains 16,320 light bulbs, most of them on the 40-foot wide, 60-foot high screen.

The water spectacular, the largest privately-funded fountain in the world, is a regular part of each Royals Stadium show.

It runs from centerfield toward the rightfield corner and contains a 10-foot high waterfall which descends from the upper cascade pool which serves as a background for 2 water fountain pools 40-foot wide. It terminates with 5 10-foot high horseshoe falls in front.

The water show includes 150 combinations of spray and color effects, with an awesome number of possible variations. It takes nearly one half million gallons of water to fill all the pools, and up to 50,000 gallons of water can be thrust into the air at one time. There are 638 nozzles and underwater illumination is by 670 500-watt lamps.

The stadium club, located on the third base side of Royals Stadium, provides 4 tiers of dining area, each with an unobstructed view of the playing surface. Nearly 500 fans may enjoy the indoor dining comfort while they watch the game. Another 250 may take advantage of 3 beautiful banquet rooms for pre or post-game events.

Only members and their guests may use the main dining area. The banquet rooms are available to any group.

Twenty privately-leased business suites, decorated by the individual company, also are available to add to the total enjoyment of many.

Press representatives work in the air conditioned comfort of a modern press box. The level just above includes 7 broadcasting booths and there are ground level and press level photographer and television camera positions.

Four circular ramps and 4 escalators make all sections easy to reach. Some 20,324 of the 40,760 seats are on the lower level with 2,616 on the club level (even with the press facilities) and 17,820 on the upper level. Every seat has an unobstructed view.

Parking spaces are available for a very ample 16,000 automobiles and 80 buses, and the stadium is conveniently located just off Interstate Highways 70 and 435. The Truman Sports Complex is 10 minutes east of downtown Kansas City.

EWING KAUFFMAN President

Ewing M. Kauffman is the Owner and President of the Kansas City Royals. He officially became owner of the American League expansion franchise on Jan. 11, 1968.

Kauffman's dynamic and stable leadership have been key factors in the young organization's development into 1 of the top franchises in major league baseball and the most successful of the 1969 expansion clubs. His willingness to purchase the new team in 1968 was a vital factor in major league baseball returning to Kansas City after only a 1-year absence.



"Mr. K" devotes the majority of his time to Marion Laboratories, Inc., the highly successful Kansas City based pharmaceutical firm he founded and still heads. It was while building Marion Labs that Kauffman began receiving recognition for his outstanding leadership and ability to motivate those around him.

The Royals' owner leaves the day-to-day operation of the baseball team up to the executives he selected, but keeps up to date on the entire operation. At the same time, he devotes considerable time to special Royals' projects and takes an active role in various American League and major league projects.

He sponsored formation of the Royal Lancers, a group of business men and women who have consistently kept Kansas City among the leaders in season ticket sales. He has personally instructed various organizations, upon request, on the values and manners of starting and coordinating such organizations as the Royal Lancers.

Kauffman's life began on a farm near Garden City, Mo., a small town 60 miles southeast of Kansas City. The family moved to Kansas City when he was a youngster and he attended high school (Westport High) and junior college locally before entering the Navy in 1942. Upon discharge he went to work for a pharmaceutical firm in 1946. He founded Marion Laboratories in the basement of his home in 1950 and quickly built it into 1 of the most successful pharmaceutical firms in the nation.

His business and sports leadership have resulted in many honors for the popular Royals' owner. The Kansas City Press Club named him Man-of-the-Year in 1973. He was honored as "Mr. Baseball" at the 1976 Kansas City Baseball Awards Dinner and later that year was inducted into the Missouri Sports Hall-of-Fame on Oct. 31.

JOE BURKE **Executive Vice President** **and General Manager**

Joe Burke has the demanding and complex responsibility of directing the Kansas City Royals' operation as Executive Vice President and General Manager.

Burke was appointed to the Royals' executive position on June 11, 1974, and under his guidance and leadership baseball has achieved the greatest success it has known in its 23-year history in Kansas City. The Royals have won three consecutive American League Western Division Championships while attendance has climbed from 1,173,292 in 1974 to an incredible 2,255,493 in 1978. On the field he has brought in Whitey Herzog as manager and has retained the Royals' nucleus of stars while adding such players as Larry Gura, Darrell Porter and Al Hrabosky via the trade route.

It's no surprise that the 55-year old executive has molded the Royals into one of the smoothest run and financially sound operations in baseball as he relies on 31 years of baseball experience.

Throughout his 18 seasons of administrative work in the major leagues he has been an active member in the continued development and structure of Major League Baseball. As the Chairman of the Committee on Divisional Play he was influential in the current structure of the four divisions and the beginning of the League Championship Series. He was also a member of the Committee on expansion and has served on the Schedule Committee, Division of Receipts Committee and the Advisory Committee for Player Relations.

In recognition of his efforts and leadership in bringing Kansas City its 1st division championship in 21 seasons, Burke was named 1976 Major League Executive-of-the-Year by The Sporting News. He was selected to the prestigious honor by a vote of the other major league executive officers. Following the Royals' 2nd straight division quest in 1977, Burke received the "Mr. Baseball" Award at the Seventh Annual Kansas City Baseball Awards Dinner in January, 1978. The award is presented annually for outstanding service to professional baseball in Kansas City.

Prior to his appointment as the Royals' chief executive, Burke served as Vice President-Business after joining the Kansas City front office on Sept. 3, 1973. He was Vice President and General Manager of the Washington-Texas organization for 5 years prior to joining the Royals. Burke 1st joined the Senators as Assistant General Manager in 1961. He became Business Manager and Treasurer in 1963 and was named Vice President and Treasurer in 1968.

His 1st 12 years in baseball (December, 1948-60) were with the Louisville Colonels in his hometown. He was selected Man-of-the-Year by the Louisville baseball writers in 1960 when the Colonels, then affiliated with the Milwaukee Braves, won the Junior World Series. Burke was General Manager at the time, having taken over the duties in 1956. He started with Louisville as Ticket Manager and was Business Manager for 6 seasons from 1950-55.

Burke and his wife Mary make their home in suburban Kansas City. They have 7 children: Joe, Mary Ann, Jimmy, John, Alice, Bobby and Vincent.

SPENCER T. "HERK" ROBINSON **Vice President**

Herk Robinson has developed a strong overall background during his 17 years in major league baseball and serves as a Vice President. He is responsible for many of the administrative functions of the day-to-day operations of the front office and stadium. Included in his responsibilities are the ticket office, stadium club and all stadium activities such as crowd control, ushering, parking, concessions, maintenance and special events.

Robinson, 38, has been with the Royals since December of 1969 when he began as Assistant Scouting Director, a position he held until promoted to Director of Stadium Operations in November of 1973. While working in scouting he was instrumental in the search and signing of many of the current players in the Kansas City organization.

Prior to joining Kansas City, Robinson worked for the Cincinnati Reds (1962-67), Baltimore Orioles (1968) and an advertising and public relations firm. With the Reds his experience included serving as secretary to the minor league clubs, administrative assistant to the minor league clubs and scouting and assistant farm director. During his year with the Orioles he was a full-time scout.

Robinson attended the University of Miami in Coral Gables, Fla., and Washington University in St. Louis, majoring in business administration and minoring in journalism. He and his wife Kathy and daughters Ashley and Amanda reside in suburban Kansas City.



JOHN SCHUERHOLZ **Vice President**

Administrating minor league operations and heading scouting and player development are the responsibilities of John Schuerholz, vice president.

His duties include supervision and assignment of the Royals' full-time scouting staff and coordination with the Major League Scouting Bureau in the club's comprehensive search for player talent. He is also responsible for the operation of the organization's minor league teams. He is the only person in the Royals' operation who has been involved with every player that has come through the Kansas City farm system.

The 38-year old Baltimore, Md., native possesses strong qualifications to head the vital life-line of player talent for Kansas City. He was part of the Royals' staff back in 1968 when Kansas City formed its original roster in the expansion draft and has played a key role in the organization's continued development of talent. Schuerholz was named as Director of Scouting and Player Development in April of 1976. He was appointed as Farm Director in September of 1975 after serving as Assistant Director of Player Procurement and Development. He originally joined the Royals in August of 1968 as an Administrative Assistant and then became Assistant Farm Director 16 months later.

Schuerholz' 1st exposure to Major League Baseball came with Baltimore where he served as assistant to the minor league and scouting department for 2 years. He is a graduate of Towson (Md.) State College, where he was an all-conference choice in baseball and soccer and was Athlete-of-the-Year in 1962. He was inducted into the school's Athletic Hall-of-Fame in 1973. He and his wife Karen reside in suburban Kansas City.



THE MANAGER

HERZOG, DORREL NORMAN (WHITEY) #24

Whitey, 5-11, 195, age 47 (turns 48, November 9, 1979), was born in New Athens, Ill. . . . he and wife Mary Lou have 3 children: Debra (1-31-55), who is married and lives in suburban Blue Springs, Mo.; David (9-8-57), who is married and attends the University of Missouri, and Jim (8-11-61), a 1979 graduate of Raytown High School . . . the Herzogs have made their home in Independence, Mo., a suburb of Kansas City, since 1958 . . . a popular and well-known personality in baseball, Whitey is recognized for his never-ending enthusiasm, frankness and honesty . . . he has spent more than half of his life in professional baseball as his career started 28 years ago as a minor league player . . . he was nicknamed Whitey by Bill Speith, McAlester sportscaster, because of his light hair.



On the field, Whitey is 1 of the most respected and successful managers in the game . . . the KC skipper has guided the Royals to Western Division championships in each of his 3 full-seasons at the Royals' helm . . . his 3½ years at the helm of the Royals gives him the third longest tenure with the same club of the 26 managers behind Earl Weaver and Danny Ozark . . . in 1976, his 1st full-season, he proved to be the final link in KC's drive to a championship season by guiding the club to its 1st division crown . . . despite numerous injuries, particularly to the pitching staff, he juggled players and pieced together his pitching staff to pace KC to its 1st major league championship in 21 years of professional baseball . . . for his task he was named 1976 American League Manager-of-the-Year by UPI and Baseball Bulletin . . . under his leadership in '77, the Royals marched to their 2nd straight division title and compiled a 102-60 record that ranked as baseball's best . . . once again he utilized his pitching staff to its fullest, directing the versatile unit to league leading ERA and save figures . . . offensively, he molded an exciting and aggressive attack that virtually rewrote the Royals' record book . . . keying the drive to the division flag was 1 of the finest stretch performances in American League history . . . from June 17 until they clinched the pennant on Sept. 23, the Royals registered a glowing 68-24 record for a .786 pace . . . included was a stretch of 20 victories in 21 outings and an amazing 16-game winning streak, the longest in the major leagues in 24 years . . . for his leadership in the brilliant season, Whitey was named Manager-of-the-Year at the Seventh Annual Kansas City Baseball Awards Dinner . . . he was also honored with "Whitey Herzog Days" in both New Athens, his birth place, and Independence, his current residence . . . Whitey's philosophy of solid defense and aggressive offense have sparked the club to a host of team records the past 3 seasons . . . since being appointed skipper on July 24, 1975, the Royals have posted an impressive mark of 325-227 (.589) record . . . after taking over duties in '75, KC jumped from 50-46 to play at a 41-25 (.621) clip the remainder of the season—an improvement of 16 games . . . the performance under Herzog carried the club to a then club record mark of 91-71 . . . prior to joining the Royals, Whitey spent a season-and-a-half as third base coach for the California Angels . . . while with the Angels he served as interim manager from June 27-30, 1974, between Bobby Winkles and Dick Williams . . . he also managed the youthful Texas Rangers through most of the 1973 season (until Sept. 7) when Joe Burke was the General Manager of the Rangers . . . Herzog's experience also includes 7 years in the New York Mets' organization . . . he served as third base coach for the Mets in 1966, spent a year (1967) as an assistant to General Manager Bing Devine and for 5 years was Director of Player Development . . . Whitey spent 1964 as a scout for the Kansas City Athletics and became a coach for the club in '65 . . . he logged 8 years in the majors as a player, including stints with Washington, Kansas City, Baltimore and Detroit as an outfielder-first baseman . . . his last year as a player was 1963 with the Tigers . . . he compiled a .257 lifetime batting average and his top season was 1961 with Baltimore when he hit .291 in 113 games with the Orioles . . . Whitey was originally signed by the New York Yankees immediately following his graduation from New Athens High School.

BOROS, STEPHEN, JR.

Steve, 6-0, 185, age 42 (turns 43, September 3, 1979), was born in Flint, Mich. . . . he and wife Sharla and daughter Sasha Ayn (2-17-74) and son Stephen (12-24-75) reside in Sarasota, Fla., during the off-season . . . he attended the University of Michigan.

The 1979 season is Boros' 5th with the Royals . . . he has handled first base coaching duties since '75 after serving as the third base coach his initial year . . . he has been instrumental in the development of the Royals aggressive baserunning and keeps records on opposing catchers and pitchers . . . prior to joining the major league club, Steve served as a minor league instructor in the Royals' farm system for 5 years . . . he directed San Jose (AA) in 1973 and '74 . . . his 1974 Bees posted an 81-59 record, winning the pennant in the 2nd half of the California League . . . Fresno edged the Bees, 3 games to 2, in the league's championship series . . . that season his San Jose unit set a professional baseball modern day record by stealing 372 bases . . . in '72 he was the Royals' Manager-of-the-Year in the KC farm system while at Waterloo . . . he managed 2 seasons in the Puerto Rican League at Arecibo . . . primarily a third baseman during his 13-year pro career, Steve played for all or parts of 7 major league seasons with the Detroit Tigers, Chicago Cubs and Cincinnati Reds . . . his best season was in 1961 when he hit .270 with 62 RBI in 116 games at Detroit . . . he played in 50 consecutive errorless games at third base from May 12-July 4 in 1964 with the Reds . . . in 1960 he led the American Association in runs and total bases, tied for the league lead in RBI, was 2nd in hits, home runs and doubles . . . he was the loop's MVP and All-Star third baseman that year . . . a graduate of Flint Northern High School in 1954, Steve played basketball, football and baseball before entering the University of Michigan . . . as a collegiate he played baseball and was the Wolverines' captain-elect when he decided to enter pro ball . . . began career with semi-pro team at Pierre, S.D., in the Basin League.

Galen, 5-11, 210, age 41 (turns 42, March 7, 1979), was born at St. Marys, Ohio, where he and wife Martha and sons Galen (Chip) Jr. (9-5-58) and Jeff (12-31-61) now reside . . . Galen has a Bachelor of Science Degree in Education from Ohio State, where he was a standout athlete.

Cisco is now in his 8th year as the Royals' pitching coach and has the longest tenure on the staff . . . he moved into that post after serving as pitcher-coach for the 1970 American Association champion Omaha Royals, thus, he has been able to work with many of the pitchers who grew up in the KC farm chain . . . under his tutelage the Royals' pitching staff has finished among the top 3 in the A.L. in each of the division champion seasons . . . Galen joined the Royals' organization in 1969, the next-to-last season in a 13-year pitching career in which he hurled for the Boston Red Sox, New York Mets and Royals . . . KC purchased him from Boston's Louisville farm club after he led the International League in ERA and shutouts in 1968 . . . he spent the last half of '69 with the parent Royals, winning his last major league game June 28, 1969, and lifting his major league time to nearly 6 years . . . his big league accomplishments include tying a record Sept. 21, 1962, when he struck out 4 Chicago Cubs' pinch hitters . . . Galen's individual successes weren't always in baseball . . . he was a starting fullback for 3 years at Ohio State . . . the Buckeyes won 2 Big Ten titles in that time, and claimed the national crown in 1957 when Cisco captained the unit which defeated Oregon, 10-7, in the Rose Bowl game played Jan. 1, 1958 . . . he also lettered twice in baseball . . . Galen signed his pro pact for Boston's Dennis Galehouse following his career at Ohio State.

Hiller is in his 4th year in the Kansas City organization as third base coach . . . Chuck held down the same position for the Royals' skipper during the '73 season when Whitey managed the Texas Rangers . . . PERSONAL: George, 6-0, 200, age 25 (turns 26, May 15, 1979), was born in Glen Dale, W. Va. . . . he is single and resides in Kansas City . . . grew up in Hermosa Beach, Calif., and has attended El Camino Junior College . . . is the younger brother of California Angels' pitcher Ken Brett . . . in the period of just 5 years he has established himself among the outstanding all-around performers in baseball . . . defensively, he has good range, quick hands and a strong arm . . . may have enjoyed his finest defensive showing in '78 while also recording another sterling year at the plate . . . his consistency at the plate and aggressiveness on the bases make him 1 of the game's most exciting and proficient hitters.

1978 HIGHLIGHTS: Despite missing considerable action due to injuries, George was 1 of the biggest factors in KC's 3rd straight Western Division crown . . . was selected to the A.L. All-Star starting lineup for the 3rd consecutive year . . . narrowly missed recording his 4th straight .300 season (.294) . . . a pair of injuries limited his overall production as he missed over 30 contests . . . was out from April 28-May 19 with a severely bruised left shoulder and then was sidelined with a bone chip at the base of his right thumb . . . despite missing considerable action he still led the league in doubles (45) and reached a new high for stolen bases (23) . . . he was 2nd on the club in average (.294), hits (150) and runs (79) . . . George was also 1 of 7 Royals with 20 or more stolen bases in '76 . . . 1 of his greatest individual games came

on Sept. 10 when he was 5-for-5 with a game-winning single in the bottom of the 10th against the California Angels . . . for his '76 efforts he was selected to the All-American League team at third base by The Sporting News, UPI and Baseball Bulletin and to the All-Major League unit by the Associated Press . . . he was named Royals' Player-of-the-Year by the local baseball writers for the 2nd consecutive season . . . in 1975, with only 1 previous full season under his belt, George led the American League with 195 hits . . . he also paced the league in at bats with 634 and his .308 average topped the Royals and listed 6th in the league . . . he tied for the loop championship with 13 triples and was 5th in total bases with 289 . . . George was named to the All-Major League team by UPI and led his A.L. counterparts in every offensive department except homers . . . among his numerous individual accomplishments was a 5-for-5 outing with 4 RBI and a game-winning hit Sept. 3 vs. California . . . also collected 13 consecutive hits off Angels' pitcher Ed Figueroa and ended the season with 14-for-16 (.875) vs. the tough righthander . . . PERSONAL: Steve, 6-2, 190, age 29 (turns 30, Sept. 29, 1979), was born at Burbank, Calif. . . . he and wife Terri and daughters Melissa (5-15-73) and Michelle Lynn (11-28-74) reside in Yorba Linda, Calif. . . . he attended the University of Southern California, majoring in business analysis . . . the mainstay of the Royals' pitching staff from 1973-75, Buzz missed the last half of the 1976 season and all of '77 due to a lingering shoulder injury that originated late in the '75 campaign . . . underwent surgery to repair a torn rotator cuff in his right shoulder on July 19, 1976 and also underwent surgery to correct long-time knee problem . . . once considered 1 of the brightest young pitchers in the game, he returned to the big leagues last season following a stint in the KC minor league system . . . has a good command of all pitches and has developed a forkball to go with fastball, slider and curve.

1978 HIGHLIGHTS: Steve split time between the Royals and the minor leagues in '78 . . . opened year with KC, but was sent to Omaha on April 28 . . . pitched with Royals' Triple-A club until July 7 and then went to Sarasota from Aug. 2-27 before being recalled to KC . . . between Omaha and Sarasota he spent a week in hospital in KC in traction for a back injury . . . with the Royals, Steve was 1-0 over 7 appearances and 5 starts . . . he won his 1st start of the year on April 9 in Cleveland when he worked 5.1 innings allowing 2 hits with no runs and 3 walks in 5-4 win . . . in next 3 starts he did not figure in final decision although the Royals won all 3 contests . . . following his recall he made 3 appearances, including a start . . . the start came Sept. 30 vs. Minnesota . . . didn't figure in decision while working 5 innings, allowing 4 hits and 4 runs with 4 walks and 2 strikeouts . . . while at Omaha, Steve made 12 starts, posting a 3-7 record and 5.43 ERA over 66.1 innings . . . his most impressive start was a 2-hit, 3-0 win over Evansville on May 16.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS: In the 3 full seasons prior to his injuries, Steve accomplished more than most veteran hurlers and virtually rewrote the Royals' pitching annals . . . included were a pair of no-hitters, a Royals' record for 22 wins in 1974 and 2 A.L. All-Star team berths . . . during the 3-year span

prior to his injury-plagued '76 campaign, he averaged 18.6 wins, 36.3 starts, 260 innings pitched, 177.3 strikeouts and 15 complete games per year while building a reputation as 1 of the game's premier hurlers . . . in 1975 he was the Royals' pitching leader in every major department for the 2nd consecutive year . . . his ERA was tops among starters and he was the team leader in wins, complete games, innings pitched, strikeouts and tied for the club high in shutouts . . . was named to the A.L. All-Star team for the 2nd straight season and made his 1st All-Star Game appearance . . . soreness developed in his shoulder late that season and was the only factor that kept him from reaching the 20-win circle a 2nd time . . . prior to the injury he was 15-9 with a 2.75 ERA . . . during his brilliant career Steve has received honors as The Sporting News American League Rookie Pitcher-of-the-Year in 1973 and Royals' Pitcher-of-the-Year in 1974 in addition to earning All-Star laurels in both 1974 and '75 . . . perhaps his most outstanding accomplishments are his 2 major league no-hitters as he is the 1st hurler to ever toss gems in each of his 1st 2 full big league campaigns . . . the initial no-hitter came in only his 10th major league start on April 27, 1973, at Tiger Stadium in Detroit where there had not been a no-hitter in 21 years . . . he walked 6 and struck out 4 in the 3-0 triumph . . . 1 week later he came within 11 outs of back-to-back no-hitters with a 5-3 verdict over Milwaukee . . . his 2nd no-hitter, June 19, 1974, at Milwaukee's County Stadium was near perfect . . . the only Brewer to reach base was George Scott, who led off the 2nd inning with a walk . . . Steve then retired 24 consecutive batters while fanning 3 in the 2-0 masterpiece . . . in his next start, against Chicago on June 24, he retired 9 straight before walking Pat Kelly to lead off the 4th . . . the 33 consecutive batters retired are an American League record . . . Kelly came back with 1 out in the 6th frame to single to rightfield, becoming the 1st in 55 hitters to collect a hit off Busby since an Al Kaline double on June 14 . . . 3 of the previous 54 walked and the others were retired, giving Buzz a total of 17 consecutive hitless innings . . . Ron Santo's 1-out, 2-run homer triggered a 3-run 7th inning for the White Sox and snapped the string of scoreless frames at 22.1 . . . 1974 stands as Steve's top individual season as he set club and KC records for victories, innings (since broken by Dennis Leonard), complete games (since broken by Leonard) and starts (tied with Paul Splittorff) . . . he picked up win number 20 that year with a 3-hit, 2-1 win over Oakland . . . number 22 was a 10-1, 5-hitter over California . . . Steve was the Royals' opening day hurler in both 1973 and '75 . . . on May 10, 1973, he fanned 13 Brewers at Milwaukee to establish the club mark he now shares with Leonard . . . the 1976 season was difficult and frustrating for the former Royals' ace . . . after his shoulder failed to respond in spring training he opened the campaign on the disabled list while receiving work at the Royals' minor league complex . . . he joined KC on April 17 and chalked up 3 victories before being placed on disabled list on July 15 . . . underwent surgery to repair right shoulder 4 days later . . . for all practical purposes Steve missed all of '77 due to shoulder and knee woes . . . went to spring training in hopes of rebounding from shoulder injury but was not able to return to form by beginning of season . . . was placed on 21-day disabled list on April 1 . . . was reinstated from disabled list on May 4 and then optioned to Daytona Beach for additional conditioning purposes . . . Steve's brief minor league career was dotted with numerous outstanding accomplishments as well . . . at Omaha in 1972 he tied an American Association season high with 16 strikeouts against Tulsa . . . equalled another loop record by fanning 8 Oilers in a row another time . . . Buzz hurled a 2-hit shutout in his 1st pro game for San Jose on July 19, 1971 . . . he was named the outstanding pitcher in the Southern Division of the Florida Instructional League that fall . . . at USC he led the Trojans to the Collegiate World Series title in 1971 . . . he was the winning hurler in the championship game with a 7-2 victory over Southern Illinois . . . an All-American selection that year as a senior, he had an 11-2 record and 1.95 ERA . . . Steve was a baseball, basketball and football star at Union High in Burbank.

SCORING RULE—PINCH HITTERS

A player shall be considered a pinch hitter only if he enters the game as a substitute batter and then only on his first time at bat which must be before he becomes a fielder. (If the team bats around and a pinch hitter comes up a second time in the inning in which he first appeared, he will not be considered a pinch hitter during that second time up.)

A substitute hitter for a designated hitter is both a pinch hitter and a designated hitter on his first time at bat. On subsequent trips to the plate he is a designated hitter only.

PERSONAL: Al, 5-11, 180, age 29 (turns 30, July 21, 1979), was born in Oakland, Calif. . . he and wife Dee and daughter Lisa Deann (5-10-72) now reside in Shawnee, Ks. . . has attended Fullerton (Calif.) Junior College, where he majored in business management . . . is a former No. 1 draft pick of the St. Louis Cardinals (January, 1969) who earned recognition as a premier relief artist with the National League club . . . is nicknamed the "Mad Hungarian" in reference to his ethnic background and flashy mound antics . . . a power pitcher who relies primarily on his fastball . . . will again be counted on to anchor bullpen in '79.

1978 HIGHLIGHTS: Colorful relief artist turned in solid 1st season in KC uniform and was 1 of the league's top firemen . . . led the Royals and was 5th in the league with 20 saves . . . the total lists 2nd on the Royals' all-time charts as only Ted Abernathy (23 in 1971) ever notched more in a season . . . the total was also the 2nd highest of his career . . . PERSONAL: Dennis, 6-1, 190, age 27 (turns 28, May 8, 1979), was born in Brooklyn, N.Y. . . . he and wife Audrey and sons Dennis, Jr. (12-25-73) and Ryan Andrew (7-19-77) reside in Sarasota, Fla. . . . make suburban Blue Springs, Mo., their home during the season . . . has attended Iona College in New Rochelle, N.Y., and has 3 years of credit toward a degree in Economics . . . is probably the hardest thrower among Royals' starting regulars and ranks among the league's top strikeout artists . . . mixes fastball, slider and curve for primary pitches . . . in 5 seasons he has emerged as 1 of the American League's most consistent winners . . . again is expected to be the workhorse of the KC staff in '79.

1978 HIGHLIGHTS: Dennis was again 1 of the A.L.'s premier pitchers and the iron man of the KC staff as he became the 1st KC hurler to notch back-to-back 20-win years . . . paced the Royals in nearly every department and ranked among the league leaders in 6 categories . . . tied with Mike Flanagan of Baltimore for the loop lead in starts (40) and tied for 3rd with Jim Palmer in

Dennis tied a club record for 7 consecutive winning decisions as a starter from July 21-Sept. 3 ... from July until season's end he posted a sparkling 12-2 record and was the club's most effective hurler ... 1st big league win was May 16 at Fenway Park against the Red Sox with a 5-2, 5-hitter over the American League champs ... Dennis was named A.L. Player-of-the-Week for Aug. 25-31 when he put together back-to-back victories over Cy Young Award winner Jim Palmer and Jim "Catfish" Hunter ... the young righthander progressed rapidly to the majors ... in 3 full seasons in the minors he logged brilliant strikeout ratio of 513 batters to 537 innings ... he made his major league debut with the Royals on Sept. 5, 1974, 4 days following his recall from Omaha ... it was against Chicago and he allowed 1 hit in 2 innings ... Dennis was the leader on Omaha's staff in '74 and topped the American Association in innings and complete games ... he was also 2nd in strikeouts and posted 7 games with 10 or more K's ... Dennis has hurled 8 no-hitters since graduating from high school ... on April 23, 1973, at San Jose he came within 1 hitter of throwing a perfect game ... walked 1st batter and then set down 27 straight hitters ... twice in pro career he has homered in the same game he tossed a no-hitter ... after graduating from Oceanside (N.Y.) High in 1969, Dennis attracted attention by starting his no-hit string with 3 7-inning gems in a summer league for boys, age 17-20 ... Dennis played baseball at Oceanside and Iona College, where he was an All-Metropolitan Conference selection.

HERZOG ON LEONARD

"Dennis has been as good as any pitcher in the league the past 3 or 4 seasons. About the only thing more we can ask him to do is to get off to a better start. He has fallen about 4 games under .500 early in the season the past few years, then finished strong. If he can jump off to a big start he just might win 25 games.

SAVE RULE

Saves shall be awarded to relief pitchers under the following criteria:

Rule (10:20) tells the official scorer to credit a pitcher with a save when he meets all 3 of the following conditions: (1) He is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club; and (2) He is not the winning pitcher; and (3) He qualifies under one of the following conditions: (a) He enters the game with a lead of no more than 3 runs and pitches for at least 1 inning; or (b) He enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, or at bat, or on deck (that is, the potential tying run is either already on base or is 1 of the 1st 2 batsman he faces); or (c) He pitches effectively for at least 3 innings.

R-R McGILBERRY, RANDALL KENT (P) #28

PERSONAL: Randy, 6-1, 195, age 25 (turns 26, Oct. 29, 1979), was born in Mobile, Ala. . . . he and wife Roxie reside in Satsuma, Ala. . . . attended Louisiana Tech University in Ruston . . . he owns an Associate of Science degree and teaches school in the off-season . . . is a control-type pitcher with good slider and fastball . . . will bid for spot in Royals' bullpen again in '79.

1978 HIGHLIGHTS: Randy turned in steady relief work with KC the final 3 months of '78 after opening the year at Omaha . . . was especially effective late after gaining experience . . . top stretch was over 8-game span from Aug. 12-Sept. 16 . . . worked 14.2 innings, allowing 12 hits and only 2 runs while striking out 8 for glowing 1.23 ERA . . . used basically as a short reliever, his longest bullpen stint was 4.1 innings at Toronto on August 11 . . . top performance came in 1st game of doubleheader at Minnesota on Aug. 16 when he limited the Twins to only 3 hits during 4.0 scoreless frames . . . while at Omaha he was 1 of the American Association's premier firemen . . . owned 5 saves and 2.84 ERA (10th in league) over 25 games when he was recalled to the parent club.

PERSONAL: Hal, 5-11, 180, age 32 (turns 33, July 10, 1979), was born in Avon Park, Fla. . . . he and wife Johncynca, sons Brian (8-17-67) and Cullen (4-15-73) and daughter Leah Deanna (10-30-77) reside in Bradenton, Fla. . . . has attended Florida A & M in Tallahassee . . . is regarded as 1 of the premier designated hitters in American League history in addition to being an aggressive player . . . underwent surgery this past winter to correct right shoulder injury that bothered him during '78 campaign . . . his offensive contributions will again play a big role in KC's attack in '79.

1978 HIGHLIGHTS: Hal was a vital cog in the Royals' offense and was 1 of the league's most dangerous hitters . . . he was among the top 3 in the A.L. in doubles (39), was 8th in runs (90), tied for 8th in hits (170) and was 11th in total bases (267) . . . Hal led the Royals and was 4th in the league in at bats (623) . . . his 16 homers ranked 2nd on the club and his 72 RBI were 3rd . . . he tied for 2nd with 10 game-winning RBI . . . PERSONAL: Amos, 5-11, 170, age 31, (turns 32, April 26, 1979), was born in Mobile, Ala. . . he and wife Belva, sons Barry (8-31-67) and Cory (6-20-74) and daughter Dawn (4-20-70) reside in Chesapeake, Va. . . the lean outfielder has been considered 1 of the top all-around centerfielders in baseball throughout his career with the Royals . . . leads the Royals in virtually every career offensive department . . . owns outstanding talents—a strong arm, speed, exciting baserunning ability and power . . . his play and run production will again be important to the Royals' performance in '79.

Marty's major league career covers 11 seasons in which he has excelled both as a starter and reliever ... will serve in both capacities for the Royals in '79.

DESIGNATED HITTER RULE

A hitter may be designated to bat for the pitcher in any spot in the batting order in any game without affecting the status of the pitcher. The designated hitter must be selected and be included on the lineup cards presented to the umpire-in-chief prior to the game. Failure to do so precludes the use of a designated hitter for that game.

The designated hitter is "locked" into the batting order but may be removed for a pinch-hitter or pinch-runner, who in turn becomes the designated hitter. The designated hitter, while still in the game may be used defensively but the pitcher then assumes the batting order of the replaced defensive player, thus terminating the designated hitter role.

The designated hitter is eligible for all American League batting titles.

Charlie Moore's pinch hit single with 2 out in the 8th inning spoiled his no-hit bid in the 3-0 win ... he walked 3 and fanned a season high 9 batters in the contest ... in 1976, Paul recorded 1 of his top campaigns despite suffering a finger injury that forced him out of action from mid-season until the final days of the season ... all but 3 of his appearances and 1 of his starts came prior to August ... he overcame a slow start and 3-6 record to reel off a club record of 8 consecutive winning decisions from June 6-July 22 ... he suffered a critical setback on July 27 at California ... after 5 innings in that game Splitt was forced to leave the contest with a swollen index finger on his left hand ... he was placed on the disabled list the following day and treatment for the tendonitis injury shelved him until Sept. 10 ... the return paid big dividends to the Royals in the ALCS as the veteran southpaw posted a victory in 2 relief appearances while limiting the Yankees to only 2 runs and 7 hits in 9.1 innings ... in 1975 Paul also overcame a slow start to finish the season as 1 of the team's most effective hurlers ... keying the resurgence was a sterling mid-season stint in the bullpen—his 1st as a pro—in which he posted a 2.22 ERA and recorded a victory and save in 24 innings ... once back in the starting rotation he kept his touch by twice putting together long strings of near-perfect work ... 1st stretch was a 25 inning period without an earned run that began Aug. 3 and spanned 4 starting appearances ... setting the feat in motion was a brilliant 1-hitter over the Oakland A's ... 1978 HIGHLIGHTS: Although he didn't play on an everyday basis, Willie still played a major role for the Royals during his rookie campaign . . . was named to Baseball Bulletin's A.L. NO-HITTERS

Steve Busby and Jim Colborn are the only pitchers in Kansas City's modern major league history to have hurled no-hitters.

Busby accomplished the feat on two occasions, the first coming in Tiger Stadium when he held Detroit hitless on April 27, 1973. Busby gave up 6 walks and struck out 4 as Kansas City won 3-0. His 2nd gem also came on the road on June 19, 1974 at Milwaukee's County Stadium where he blanked the Brewers, 2-0. It was in near perfect fashion as the only baserunner was George Scott, who walked to lead off the 2nd inning.

Colborn recorded the 1st no-hitter by a Kansas City pitcher at Royals Stadium on May 14, 1977, when he blanked the Texas Rangers, 6-0. It too was nearly a perfect outing as Colborn walked one batter and hit another while facing only 28 hitters.

Busby and relief pitcher Doug Bird teamed up for a no-hitter against Detroit April 23, 1973 during the exhibition season. Busby pitched the 1st 6 innings and allowed only 2 baserunners—1 reached by a walk and the other on an error. Bird pitched the final 3 innings and allowed only 2 walks as KC won 4-1.

After dusting off the record books, it has been discovered that back in 1888 Henry Pater hurled a no-hit game for Kansas City's American Association major league club. It was a 4-0 win in Baltimore as the righthander walked 2 batters.

Until Busby and Bird teamed up for their gem, the last professional no-hitter by a Kansas City hurler had been Ernie Nevel's 7-inning gem in the Triple-A American Association in 1951.

Kansas City had 5 minor league 9-inning no-hitters while it was in the American Association, the last 1 Carl De Roses' perfect game in 1947.

California Angels' ace Nolan Ryan recorded the 1st no-hitter in Royals Stadium on May 15, 1973. He struck out 12 and allowed only 3 base runners—all on walks.

The only other no-hitter thrown against Kansas City came when Jack Kralick of the Minnesota Twins no-hit the Athletics at Bloomington on Aug. 26, 1962, for a 1-0 victory. He came within 2 outs of pitching a perfect game. With 1 out in the 9th inning, he walked pinch hitter George Alusik on a 3-2 pitch.

Carl DeRose of the Blues of the American Association hurled the only professional no-hitter in Municipal Stadium when he blanked Minneapolis 5-0, on June 26, 1947. He faced only 27 batters, making it the first perfect game in American Association history.

The Royals' farm system is under the guidance of John Schuerholz, vice president and Dick Balderson, assistant farm director. The Royals have made 1 change in the minor league system since last season, adding a new Rookie club at Sarasota. With the addition of the 2nd team at Sarasota, Kansas City now operates 5 minor league clubs with 2 teams on the Rookie level and 1 at each level from A through Triple-A.

Kansas City's minor league operation has been recognized as 1 of the most progressive and successful in baseball and annually produces 1 of the top overall winning percentages. The minor league chain enjoyed another overall winning year in 1978 by compiling a 237-219 (.520) regular season record. Much of the farm system's success can be attributed to balance throughout the organization as Omaha turned in another championship season and KC's other 3 clubs from Rookie through Double-A all enjoyed winning campaigns. Omaha captured a 3rd straight Eastern division crown in the American Association en route to winning the league title in playoff action, both Ft. Myers and Sarasota captured division titles in split season play and Jacksonville just missed winning the Southern League pennant.

The most accurate method to measure the success of a farm system is the number of major league players it provides for the parent club. Twenty-three of the 35 players on Kansas City's 1979 winter roster are products of the Royals' minor league system, including 10 of 14 pitchers. Playing on a regular basis as farm system products are pitchers Paul Splittorff, Dennis Leonard, Rich Gale and Doug Bird along with Al Cowens, George Brett and Frank White. Additionally, young players Clint Hurdle, Willie Wilson, U.L. Washington and Joe Zdeb and veterans John Wathan, Tom Poquette and Steve Busby are farm system products.
