THE ROYALS SUCCESS STORY

The Kansas City Royals are the most successful expansion team in major league history.

The Kansas City Royals are the most successful team in the American League Western Division the past decade.

Exaggerations? Here are the facts.

The Royals have appeared in more post-season contests than all the other big-league expansion clubs (Mets, Angels, Brewers, Expos, Padres, Blue Jays and Mariners) combined. In fact, KC has participated in post-season play six of the last nine years. No other major league club can make that statement. The Royals have won five A.L. West titles, an American League Pennant and played in a World Series (1980) since 1976, in addition to participating in the A.L. West playoff series in the strike-shortened 1981 campaign.

The Royals have compiled the best record among A.L. West clubs during the last decade (860-701, .551). In fact, the Royals are the only club in the division that can boast a winning percentage above .500. KC also is the only A.L. West member to own a winning record against A.L. East clubs since 1978 (289-259, .527).

The youthful Royals, who displayed a dramatic touch when they won the division title in 1984 with a strong second-half finish, have the fourth-best record of all American League clubs (behind New York, Baltimore and Boston) the last 10 years.

Whether it has been with overpowering grace (as it was in 1977 and '80 when KC won the A.L. West by eight and 14 games, respectively) or scrappy determination (which typified the '76, '78 and '84 title drives), one thing is certain—the Royals are Major League Baseball headliners.

EWING KAUFFMAN
CO-OWNER
Chairman of the Board

There is something about a challenge that brings out the best in Royals' co-owner, Ewing Kauffman.

A daring and tireless man who purchased the Kansas City Royals in 1968, Kauffman has retained 51 percent of the club and serves as Chairman of the Board since selling 49 percent of the franchise to Avron Fogelman on May 17, 1983.

Mr. K., as he is known to associates, devotes a good part of his time to Marion Laboratories, Inc., the Kansas City-based pharmaceutical firm which he founded a quarter of a century ago. Today he guides the company in his daily advisory role as chairman of the board and chief executive officer. It was while building Marion to more than \$200 million annual volume that he attracted national recognition for his ability to motivate those around him, a philosophy based upon the concept of sharing with Marion people the profits which they help generate.

As to the Royals, Kauffman leaves day-to-day decisions to his executives. He is kept advised of developments and devotes much time to specific American League and major league projects.

He sponsored formation of the Royal Lancers, a group of business men and women who have consistently kept Kansas City ahead of league leaders in season ticket sales. He has addressed numerous organizations on the value of starting and coordinating similar organizations.

Kauffman's life began on a farm near Garden City, Mo., 60 miles southeast of Kansas City. The family moved to Kansas City when he was a youngster. He attended high school and junior college locally, then spent four years in the Navy.

After a brief stint as a salesman for a pharmaceutical firm, he began in 1950 what was to become Marion Laboratories in the basement of the modest family home in Kansas City. The enterprise grew rapidly as a result of the intense personal efforts of its young owner, combining his unusual sales skills with his talent for motivating others.

He and Mrs. K. funded and started Kansas City's model CPR program that trained nearly 200,000 Kansas Citians in the life-saving technique.

Kauffman's business and sports leadership have brought numerous honors to the Royals. The Kansas City Press Club voted him Man-of-the-Year in 1973. He was the "Mr. Baseball" honoree at the 1976 Kansas City Baseball Awards Dinner, and later that year was inducted into the Missouri Sports Hall-of-Fame.

Ewing's wife is Muriel.



AVRON FOGELMAN
CO-OWNER
Vice-Chairman of the Board

It is more than coincidental that where Avron Fogelman goes, success follows.

Fogelman became co-owner of the Royals on May 17, 1983, when he purchased 49 percent of the club. He will purchase the additional 51 percent from Ewing Kauffman no later than 1991.

A product of Memphis, Tennessee, where he has established an indelible mark as a businessman, community and civic leader, as well as sportsman, Fogelman possesses the dynamic entrepreneurial spirit that go hand-in-hand with success.

Memphis is also the home of Fogelman Properties, Inc., a highly successful real estate conglomerate owned by Fogelman, which develops and manages apartment complexes, office buildings and commercial developments. In addition, Fogelman Properties has affiliate companies in mortgage banking, real estate sales and other integrated real estate operations.

Fogelman's influence in civic and community organizations is wide-ranging. He currently is President of the Memphis Chamber of Commerce, has been honored as the recipient of the "Outstanding Citizen of Memphis Award," was the recipient of the "Liberty Bell Award" from the Memphis Bar Association for outstanding civic contributions and recipient of "Outstanding Community Salesman Award of Memphis."

The Memphis State University Business School is named after Fogelman. He is on the Board of Administrators at Tulane University. In addition Fogelman is an Entrepreneurial Fellow at Memphis State, chairman of Memphis and Shelby County Planning Commission, a member of the Board of Directors of the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame, a member of the President's Council of Southwestern College and a member of the Board of Directors of the Governor's Technology Foundation for the State of Tennessee.

With all that, Fogelman can frequently be seen around Royals Stadium and the Kansas City area.

He and his wife, Wendy, have three sons: Hal (21), Rick (19) and Mark (15).

JOE BURKE

President

More than 35 years ago Joe Burke began his career in professional baseball. He climbed through the minor league and major league ranks to become one of the industry's most respected chief executives. In addition to serving as President of the Royals, he has also been called on by Major League Baseball for leadership on many key committees.

Following a nine-year tenure as Executive Vice President and General Manager, Burke was named President, October 8, 1981.



Under Burke's guidance, baseball has achieved the greatest success it has known in its 28-year history in Kansas City. To wit, the Royals have won an American League pennant, brought the World Series to Kansas City for the first time and been American League Western Division champions five times.

With more than 23 years of administrative experience on the major league level, it is no surprise that the 61-year old Burke has molded the Royals into one of baseball's most respected organizations.

An active participant in the continued development and growth of Major League Baseball, Burke was influential in the current structure of the four divisions and the beginning of the League Championship Series. Chairman of the Committee on Divisional Play is just one of the many avenues Burke has traveled in baseball. He also was a member of the Committee on Expansion and has served on the Schedule Committee, Division of Receipts Committee and the Player Relations Committee.

In recognition for his dedication to bringing Kansas City its first division championship in 21 seasons, Burke was named the 1976 Major League Executive-of-the-Year by The Sporting News. He was selected for the prestigious honor by a vote of the other major league executive officers. Following the Royals' second consecutive division title in 1977, Burke received the "Mr. Baseball" Award at the Seventh Annual Kansas City Baseball awards Dinner in January of 1978. The award is presented annually for outstanding service to professional baseball in Kansas City.

Burke served as Executive Vice President and General Manager from June 11, 1974, until his appointment as President. He joined the Royals organization in September of 1973 as Vice President—Business. Prior to that he served as Vice President and General Manager of the Washington Senators—Texas Rangers organization for five years (1968-73). Burke first joined the Senators as Assistant General Manager in 1961. He became Business Manager and Treasurer in 1963 and was named Vice President in 1968.

Burke's first 12 years (1948-1960) were with the Louisville Colonels in his hometown. He was selected Manager-of-the-Year by the Louisville baseball writers in 1960 when the Colonels, then affiliated with the Milwaukee Braves, won the Junior World Series. Burke was General Manager at the time, having taken over those duties in 1956. He began with Louisville as Ticket Manager and Business Manager.

Burke and his wife, Mary, make their home in Overland Park, Kansas. They have seven children: Joe, Mary Ann, Jimmy, John, Alice, Bobby and Vincent.

JOHN SCHUERHOLZ

Executive Vice President and General Manager

John Schuerholz provides the Kansas City Royals with firm and steady leadership as he calls on 17 years of experience in player development in the Kansas City organization to direct the operation.

The 44-year old Executive Vice President and General Manager has quietly been a major factor in the franchise's success as a strong believer in developing talent through the club's minor league system. At the same time, he has engineered a number of player trades and transactions over the past several seasons that did not grab headlines but proved to be vital in the '84 championship season.



A product of Baltimore, Maryland, Schuerholz is the only person to have been involved with every player who has come through the Royals' farm system. He was a member of the Royals front-office staff before the franchise played its first exhibition game and in 1968, was involved in the expansion draft that was to be the first-ever Royals' roster.

He joined the organization in August of 1968 as an Administrative Assistant. In 1970 he was named Assistant Farm Director and held that post until 1975 when he became Farm Director. After a year in that position, Schuerholz moved up to become Director of Scouting, Player Procurement and Development. In 1979 at the age of 38, he was named Vice President—Player personnel. He assumed his current position, succeeding Joe Burke as Executive Vice President and General Manager, in October of 1981.

Among his many accomplishments during his 17-year association with the Royals, Schuerholz has overseen the administration of the entire minor league system, supervised scouts, hired managers and coaches and negotiated player contracts and trades.

Prior to joining the Royals, Schuerholz received his first exposure to major league baseball with the Baltimore Orioles, serving as an assistant to the minor league and scouting departments for two years (1967-68).

A graduate of Towson (Md.) State University, Schuerholz was an all-conference choice in baseball and soccer. He was named the school's Athlete-of-the-Year in 1962. He was inducted in the Towson State University Athletic Hall of Fame in 1973.

Schuerholz and his wife Karen, daughter Gina, and son Jonathan, reside in Leawood, Kansas.

SPENCER T. "HERK" ROBINSON **Executive Vice President—Administration**

Versatility is a trademark of Herk Robinson, the Royals' Executive Vice President—Administration.

Robinson, 44, has developed a strong overall background during his 21 years in major league baseball—15 with the Royals. He is responsible for the administrative functions of the day-to-day operations of the front office and stadium. Included in his responsibilities are the ticket office, Stadium Club and all stadium activities such as crowd control, ushers, parking, concessions, maintenance and special events.

A member of the Royals front office since December of 1969, Robinson began his career with Kansas City as Assistant Scouting Director, a position he held until promoted to Director of Stadium Operations in November of 1973.

Prior to joining the Royals, Robinson worked for the Cincinnati Reds (1962-67), Baltimore Orioles (1968) and an advertising and public relations firm in St. Louis. With the Reds his experience included serving as secretary to the minor league clubs, administrative assistant to the minor league clubs and scouting and assistant farm director. During his year with the Orioles, Robinson served as a full-time scout.

Robinson attended the University of Miami (Fla.) and Washington University (Mo.), majoring in business administration and minoring in journalism. He and his wife Kathy and daughters Ashley and Amanda reside in Leawood, Kansas.



DALE ROHR **Vice President—Controller**

Dale Rohr has the responsibility for the Royals' accounting and financial matters along with the supervision of the data processing area as Vice President-Controller.

The 37-year old Kansas City native joined the Royals in July of 1974 as Controller and was appointed to his present position in November of 1980. Rohr was born in Denver, Colorado, but grew up in the Kansas City area where he attended Bishop Miege High School. He received his Bachelor of Science Degree in Accounting from Kansas State University in 1970.

Rohr and his wife, Mary, son Tommy and daughter Julie, reside in suburban Kansas City.

THE MANAGER

HOWSER, RICHARD DALTON

#10

Dick, 5-9, 155, age 48 (turns 49, May 14, 1985), was born in Miami, Fla. Dick and his wife Nancy live in Tallahassee, Fla. He grew up in West Palm Beach, Fla. and has twin daughters, Jan and Jill, who live in Beverly Hills, California. He attended Florida State University and received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Education.

He has compiled a solid 376-305 record in 4-plus seasons as a major league manager for a .552 winning percentage. His record at the Royals' helm is a 273-246 mark which is highlighted by the 1984 western division title and a pair of 2nd place showings the previous 2 years. He was runner-up to Detroit's Sparky Anderson for the 1984 A.L. Manager-of-the-Year Award. He was named Manager of the Year by ESPN. Howser's managerial skills were tested in '84 as most baseball prognosticators picked the club to finish in the 2nd division . . . Howser and the Royals opened the season with but 3 returning starters in the opening day lineup, 5 rookie pitchers and with George Brett and Willie Wilson not available for the first 6 weeks . . . injuries hindered the club throughout the season as Howser's starting lineup was together for only 50 of the 162 contests . . . the club fell to 40-51 in 6th place 8 games off the pace on July 18 for the low point of the season and his leadership became especially important . . . KC then turned it around and posted a 44-25 (.637) record together through the division clincher on September 28.

Dick was named Royals' manager, August 31, 1981. He guided the club to a 20-13 record and sparked the club to the 2nd half championship in the American League West . . . in 1982 the Royals were 90-72 . . . Howser is a veteran of 25 years in professional baseball, including 8 years as a major league player, 10 years as a coach and 3 years as a manager . . . he managed the 1980 New York Yankees to the best record in baseball with a 103-59 (.635) slate and the American League Eastern Division Championship . . . Dick became only the 4th manager in history to win 100 or more games as a 1st year manager (Ralph Houk won 109 in '61, Sparky Anderson won 102 in '70 and Mickey Cochrane won 101 in '34). Howser was the Yankees' 3rd base coach for ten years (1969-78) succeeding Frank Crosetti . . . he also managed the Yanks' instructional league team for 2 years and managed New York in Kansas City on July 24, 1978, when Billy Martin resigned . . . Dick began his professional career in 1958 following his collegiate playing days at Florida State. He was signed by the Kansas City Athletics and spent 3 years in the minors . . . he led the Three-I League in stolen bases in 1959 with 31 thefts and hit .349 at Sioux City and .338 at Shreveport in 1960 in his final minor league campaign . . . Dick was named The Sporting News American League Rookie-of-the-Year in 1961 as a member of the A's. During his rookie campaign, he was also selected for the A.L. All-Star squad . . . with the Indians in 1964, he tied the A.L. record for most games played by a shortstop (162) and tied for the league lead with 6 sacrifice hits . . . he compiled a .248 lifetime major league batting average in 789 games . . . Howser coached FSU's baseball team in 1979 leading the Seminoles to a 43-16 record and to the NCAA Eastern Regionals in his 1st year as a collegiate coach . . . he played for the Seminoles from 1954-58 earning All-American honors as a shortstop in 1957-58. As a sophomore he set the school record with a .422 average and he followed with .375 and .345 marks as a junior and senior . . . Florida State reached the college World Series when he was a junior (1957) . . . he holds the unusual distinction of having been honored as Amateur Athlete-of-the-Year in Florida (1958) and the Professional Athlete-of-the-Year in Florida (1961) . . . he is a member of the Florida Sports Hall of Fame.

Gary, 6-1, 220, age 53 (turns 54, October 11, 1985), was born in Clarkton, Mo. . . . resides with wife Joy in Malden, Mo. . . . begins his 2nd season as KC's pitching coach . . . was instrumental in the success of the youthful Royals' '84 pitching staff, which featured 5 rookies and a total of 9 (out of 11) hurlers younger than 30 years old.

His professional career spans 34 years—13 as a player, 9 as a manager and 11 seasons as a scout . . . began his career in 1950 and has a lifetime minor league mark of 128-111 (.536) . . . in his 2nd season he led the Appalachian League with 26 complete games and 248 strikeouts while posting a 23-6 mark . . . appeared in the majors in 1959 with St. Louis (26 games) in the National League and New York (15 games) of the American League . . . has a big league mark of 4-6 with a 4.79 ERA . . . concluded his playing career in 1963 . . . began managing in 1964 and was named Pioneer League Manager-of-the-Year in 1972 and 1973 as he guided Billings to consecutive loop titles . . . worked as a KC scout through the 1980 campaign and was named Minor League Pitching Instructor in 1981 . . . prepped at Clarkton High School and lettered in basketball, softball and track.

hamstring . . . that injury was incurred August 20 at Boston when he went from a home run trot to an all-out sprint after hitting a ball off the top of the "green monster" in the first inning of what would be an 8-5 KC victory . . . marked the first time since 1978 he failed to hit .300 . . . collected his 1,700th major league hit (a single off Seattle's Matt Young, June 7 at Royals Stadium) . . . was one of only 2 Royals to collect a 6-RBI game, May 26 at Boston via a single, triple and home run . . . had a streak of 4 home runs in a span of 4 games, June 1-4 . . . 1983—George turned in another solid season with a .310 average, career-high 25 home runs and 93 RBI . . . it was his 5th consecutive season over the .300 mark and the 8th season he has hit .300-plus . . . was also selected for his 8th consecutive American League start in the Major League All-Star Game at 3rd base . . . led the club in homers, RBI and slugging pct. (.563) . . . was tops in the league in slugging, 8th in average, 9th in doubles (38) and 10th in on-base pct. (.387) . . . only a mid-season broken little toe (left) on June 7 when he struck a door jam in his house held his totals down . . . was on the disabled list from June 8-28 . . . was hitting .369 at the time of the injury with 12 homers and 39 RBI in 43 games . . . also missed 5 games (April 30—May 5) with a pulled hamstring in his left leg . . . opened the season on a hot note by hitting safely in his first 19 games posting a .449 (35-for-78) average with 22 runs, 12 doubles, 1 triple, 8 homers and 26 RBI . . . was A.L. 11 games from August 14-24 with tendonitis in his right wrist . . . **1981**—Brett won the Gillette Trophy as he received the most votes among the major league players in the balloting for the All-Star Game . . . was team leader with his .314 average, .484 slugging percentage, 168 total bases, 27 doubles and was tied for the team lead with 7 triples . . . ranked 6th in the loop batting race, was tied for 2nd in triples and tied for 3rd in doubles . . . it was his 6th 300-plus season . . . **1980**—George recorded one of the most exciting and productive offensive displays in major league history in 1980 . . . was named the MVP of the American League and Man-of-the-Year by *The Sporting News* in addition to earning countless other honors . . . paced the league in 3 offensive departments and ranked among the top 10 in 5 other categories despite missing 45 games . . . his league-leading .390 average was the highest in the big leagues since 1941 when Ted Williams hit .406 with the Red Sox . . . it also equalled the highest average ever recorded by a 3rd baseman as John McGraw hit .390 in 118 games for Baltimore of the National League in 1899 . . . the previous best for an A.L. 3rd baseman was .347 established by Frank "Home Run" Baker with Philadelphia in 1912 . . . the KC 3rd baseman also paced the American League in slugging percentage (.664) and on-base pct. (.461) . . . was 3rd in RBI (118), 5th in game-winning RBI (14), tied for 6th in triples (9), 8th in total bases (296) and tied for 9th in homers (24) . . . his RBI performance of 118 in 117 games enabled him to become only the 17th player in major league history to eclipse the 100-RBI plateau and average at least 1 RBI per game . . . the last player to accomplish the feat prior to George was Walt Dropo who registered 144 RBI in 136 games for Boston in 1936 . . . in reaching the 100-RBI mark George became only the 2nd player in Royals' history to collect back-to-back 100-RBI campaigns . . . John Mayberry drove in 100 runs in both 1972 and '73.

George's remarkable season came despite missing extensive service due to assorted injuries . . . missed 9 games with a bruised heel (April 29—May 6) . . . was sidelined for 26 contests while on the disabled list with torn ligaments in his right ankle (June 11—July 10) . . . his final injury woe, tendonitis in his right hand, sidelined him for 9 games (September 6-17).

From the All-Star break until the close of the season George put on a strong offensive display . . . at the break he owned a .337 average (57-for-169) with 8 homers and 41 RBI in 45 games . . . after the All-Star break he hit in 63 of 72 games for a .420 average (118-for-281) with 54 runs, 16 homers and 77 RBI . . . became the 15th player in A.L. history to hit in 30 or more consecutive games by wiring together a 30-game skein from July 18—August 18 . . . during the span George hit .467 (57-for-122) with 6 homers and 42 RBI . . . the skein was snapped at Texas by the Rangers' Jon Matlack.

George first went above the .400 mark (.401) on August 17 (128-for-319) and was above the magical plateau as late as September 19 (.400, 161-for-403) . . . was the club's Player-of-the-Month in both July and August . . . in July he hit at a .494 clip with 3 homers and 25 RBI in 21 games to share the loop Player-of-the-Month laurel with the Yankees' Reggie Jackson . . . his August output included a .430 average with 26 runs, 6 homers and 30 RBI.

On August 26 at Milwaukee he was 5-for-5 with a pair of runs, a double and a RBI in raising his average to a season highwater mark of .407 (144-for-354) . . . another highlight came September 28 at Minnesota when George blasted his first big league grand slam off the Twins' Pete Redfern . . . hit a pair of homers in ALCS, including dramatic 3-run shot into upper deck at Yankee Stadium off Rich Gossage in Game 3 that secured the Royals' first A.L. pennant . . . capped off year with .375 World Series showing (9-for-24) with homer and 3 RBI against Phillies . . .

1979—George was selected as baseball's Player-of-the-Year by both *Baseball Digest* and *Baseball Bulletin* magazines . . . finished 3rd in balloting for league MVP honor, receiving a vote on every ballot . . . tied or set 14 club offensive records . . . finished the year setting club and all-time KC standards for runs (119), triples (20), at bats (645), total bases (363) and slugging pct. 1984 HIGHLIGHTS: Dennis continued the rehabilitation of his left knee and was sidelined the entire '84 season ... underwent his 3rd operation on the damaged knee (torn tendon) June 19 in Cincinnati for the purpose of finding the cause of an infection that was slowing the healing process ... a 4th operation was performed July 31 to re-graft the damaged tendon tissue ... doctors took tendon from the back of his knee and grafted it to the front ... will probably miss all of 1985.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS: Major injuries the past 3 seasons have sidelined Dennis after he established himself as the winningest right-hander in the Major Leagues since he joined the staff in 1975 ... From 1975-82, Leonard posted a glowing 130-86 mark ... only Steve Carlton (152) had more wins in the span ... the injuries have limited Leonard to a 16-9 mark and 193.2 innings over the past 3 seasons ... he is a 3-time 20-game winner ('77-'78 and '80) and ranks as the only hurler in Royals' history to post more than one 20-win season ... he holds many of the club's individual season pitching records including: starts (40-1978), complete games (21-1977), innings pitched (294.2-1978) and strikeouts (244) ...

DESIGNATED HITTER RULE

A hitter may be designated to bat for the pitcher in any spot in the batting order in any game without affecting the status of the pitcher. The designated hitter must be selected and be included on the lineup cards presented to the umpire-in-chief prior to the game. Failure to do so precludes the use of a designated hitter for that game.

The designated hitter is "locked" into the batting order but may be removed for a pinch-hitter or pinch-runner, who in turn becomes the designated hitter. The designated hitter, while still in the game may be used defensively but the pitcher then assumes the batting order of the replaced defensive player, thus terminating the designated hitter role.

The designated hitter is eligible for all American League batting titles.

THREE HOME RUNS IN A GAME

Three players in Royals' history have hit 3 home runs in a game. John Mayberry accomplished it twice—at Texas, July 1, 1975, and at Toronto, June 1, 1977. Tony Solaita hit 3 homers at California on Sept. 7, 1975 (11 innings) and George Brett has done it 3 times. He first accomplished it at Texas July 22, 1979 and most recently duplicated the feat April 20, 1983 at Detroit. He also accomplished the feat in post-season play, Friday, October 6, 1978 at New York. No Royals player has ever hit 3 homers in a game at Royals Stadium. Saves shall be awarded to relief pitchers under the following criteria:

Rule (10/20) tells the official scorer to credit a pitcher with a save when he meets all 3 of the following conditions: (1) He is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club; and (2) He is not the winning pitcher; and (3) He qualifies under one of the following conditions: (a) He enters the game with a lead of no more than 3 runs and pitches for at least 1 inning; or (b) He enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, or at bat, or on deck (that is, the potential tying run is either already on base or is 1 of the 1st 2 batsman he faces); or (c) He pitches effectively for at least 3 innings.

NO-HITTERS

Steve Busby and Jim Colborn are the only pitchers in Kansas City's modern major league history to have hurled no-hitters.

Busby accomplished the feat on 2 occasions, the first coming in Tiger Stadium when he held Detroit hitless on April 27, 1973. Busby gave up 6 walks and struck out 4 as Kansas City won 3-0. His 2nd gem also came on the road on June 19, 1974 at Milwaukee's County Stadium where he blanked the Brewers, 2-0. It was in near perfect fashion as the only baserunner was George Scott, who walked to lead off the 2nd inning.

Colborn recorded the 1st no-hitter by a Kansas City pitcher at Royals Stadium on May 14, 1977, when he blanked the Texas Rangers, 6-0. It too was nearly a perfect outing as Colborn walked one batter and hit another while facing only 28 hitters.

Busby and relief pitcher Doug Bird teamed up for a no-hitter against Detroit April 23, 1973 during the exhibition season. Busby pitched the 1st 6 innings and allowed only 2 baserunners—1 reached by a walk and the other on an error. Bird pitched the final 3 innings and allowed only 2 walks as KC won 4-1.

After dusting off the record books, it has been discovered that back in 1888 Henry Pater hurled a no-hit game for Kansas City's American Association major league club. It was a 4-0 win in Baltimore as the righthander walked 2 batters.

Until Busby and Bird teamed up for their gem, the last professional no-hitter by a Kansas City hurler had been Ernie Nevel's 7-inning gem in the Triple-A American Association in 1951.

Kansas City had 5 minor league 9-inning no-hitters while it was in the American Association, the last 1 Carl De Roses' perfect game in 1947.

California Angels' ace Nolan Ryan recorded the 1st no-hitter in Royals Stadium on May 15, 1973. He struck out 12 and allowed only 3 base runners—all on walks.

The only other no-hitter thrown against Kansas City came when Jack Kralick of the Minnesota Twins no-hit the Athletics at Bloomington on Aug. 26, 1962, for a 1-0 victory. He came within 2 outs of pitching a perfect game. With 1 out in the 9th inning, he walked pinch hitter George Alusik on a 3-2 pitch.

Carl DeRose of the Blues of the American Association hurled the only professional no-hitter in Municipal Stadium when he blanked Minneapolis 5-0, on June 26, 1947. He faced only 27 batters, making it the first perfect game in American Association history.

Baseball fans have a wide variety of opportunities to follow Kansas City Royals baseball during the 1985 season. The 1985 broadcasts feature the Royals Radio Network, the Royals Television Network and (pay-cable television) Sports Time Cable Network. Dennis Cryder, director of marketing and broadcasting, directs the Royals' broadcast activities.

RADIO

WIBW/ROYALS RADIO NETWORK: The Royals Radio Network, composed of over 110 stations in 10 states, consistently ranks as one of the country's largest baseball networks. Radio rights to Royals' games since 1975 have been held by Stauffer Communications of Topeka, Kansas, which is entering the 5th of a 5-year contract. Stauffer's WIBW (580-AM) in Topeka serves as the Royals' flagship station, with KCMO (810-AM) serving as the Royals' network affiliate in Kansas City for the 3rd straight year. Headed by General Manager Bob Fromme and Stauffer Vice-President-Broadcasting Jerry Holley, the Royals Radio Network will broadcast 15 spring training games and the entire 162 game regular season schedule. Returning for his 17th consecutive season is producer/engineer Ed Shepherd.

TELEVISION

WDAF-TV/ROYALS TELEVISION NETWORK: With a network of nearly 18 affiliates in Nebraska, Kansas, Colorado, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Missouri and Florida the Royals Television Network is one of the largest in Major League Baseball. WDAF-TV 4 in Kansas City is entering the 5th year of service as the Royals' flagship television station. Headed by Vice-President and General Manager Earl Beall and Operations Manager Buddy Turner, WDAF is owned and operated by Taft Broadcasting Company, which is a major stockholder in the Philadelphia Phillies.

ANNOUNCERS

Denny Matthews and **Fred White** return to the radio booth in 1984. Matthews has broadcast the Royals' games since the club's inception in 1969 and missed only 4 contests in the 16-year span. Matthews provided the play-by-play for CBS Radio during the 1982 Brewers-Cardinals World Series. White, who is often seen and heard nationally on ESPN for college basketball and football and has worked extensively for CBS, NBC and TVS, returns for his 12th season. **Denny Trease** returns to the television booth for the 6th consecutive season for WDAF-TV. He spent 7 years as the "voice" of the University of Kentucky football and basketball before coming to Kansas City. Matthews and White will also join Trease for play-by-play on the WDAF-TV television network.

1984 ALCS—vs. DETROIT TIGERS

Kansas City's Cinderella 1984 season culminated with its 5th American League Championship Series appearance in 9 years—and first against a team other than the New York Yankees. The Royals were defeated by the Detroit Tigers in 3 straight as KC's bats were silenced by a Detroit pitching staff which allowed but 4 runs and 18 hits in the 3 games. The lack of offensive support overshadowed some outstanding pitching performances by Kansas City's Bret Saberhagen and Charlie Leibrandt. The 20-year-old Saberhagen became the youngest pitcher to start an ALCS game. He pitched 8 innings in Game #2, permitting 6 hits and 2 earned runs. He allowed no runs and 2 hits during his final 6 innings of work. Detroit eventually won the game, played at Royals Stadium, by a 5-3 count in 11 innings. Leibrandt waited until Game #3 of the ALCS to pitch his first complete game in the big leagues in three years. The lefthander, in perhaps his finest outing as a professional, pitched a 3-hitter but lost 1-0 at Tiger Stadium. Detroit scored the only run of the game in the second inning when KC narrowly missed turning an inning-ending double-play which allowed Chet Lemon to score from third base. Catcher Don Slaught led all Royal hitters with a .364 average (4-for-11) during the ALCS. Kansas City set a League Championship Series record in Game #2 when 3 consecutive Royals' pinch hitters gathered basehits (Dane Iorg, Lynn Jones and Hal McRae). KC also set an ALCS record in Game #2 as all 16 non-pitchers on the Royals post-season roster saw action in the 11-inning loss.

ROYALS WORLD SERIES REVIEW

1980 WS—VS. PHILADELPHIA PHILLIES

The 1st World Series in Kansas City history matched the Royals against the Philadelphia Phillies, who put on a storybook surge to capture their 1st National League pennant since 1950. The Phillies claimed the World Championship in 6 games, using wins in the opening 2 contests at Philadelphia to jump to a commanding advantage. The Royals then edged the Phillies 2 straight at Kansas City to even the matchup after 4 games, but the National League club rallied for a pair of runs in the final frame of Game #5 at Royals Stadium to record a 4-3 triumph that ended the Royals' hopes. The showdown returned to Veterans Stadium for Game #6 and the Phils secured the title in front of the home fans with a 4-1 verdict in the final game. In an exciting series spiced by several outstanding individual performances, Willie Aikens blasted 4 homers while hitting .400 and Amos Otis supplied a .478 clip with 3 homers in leading KC's offensive showing.

The 37-year old product of Council Bluffs, Iowa, also managed in the Royals' system at Charleston (A) in 1981 and at Ft. Myers (A) in 1982 and 1983.

A graduate of Drake University, Mathews was a member of the Bulldogs' pitching staff and compiled a two-year record of 9-5. He earned a master's degree from Northeast Missouri State in 1975.

He and his wife, Mary, have two children (Jonathan and Sarah).

SCOUTING

Responsible for the discovery and subsequent signing of several current and future Kansas City Royals players, Art Stewart joins the Royals front office in 1985 as Director of Scouting.

The 57-year old Chicagoan moves to his Royals Stadium office after 15 years of covering the Midwest's sandlots, high schools, junior colleges and universities in search of talent for the Royals organization.



Stewart, who was the manager of the Chicago Yankees semi-pro team from 1948-50 (a team that featured 31 future big leaguers including Jim Bouton), will oversee the entire Royals' scouting operation in the United States and Latin America. He will guide KC's 17 full-time and 17 part-time scouts in addition to, supervising the Royals' June and January Free Agent drafts.

An integral part of what is generally regarded as one of the most successful organizations in baseball, Stewart received the first-ever Ewing M. Kauffman Scouting Award in 1970. He won the same award in 1983. He received a special recognition award for "Meritorious Service to the Chicago Public High School Baseball League" in 1979.

Daily or season credentials will be issued only to **working** members of the media. Daily credentials must be displayed while at Royals Stadium. Parking credentials should be requested with press credentials and will be filled when available. A limited number of media tickets are available for sports and news personnel and must be requested by **noon** on game days. Requests for media tickets should be directed to the Royals' P.R. office and can be picked up the day of the game at the Press-Radio-TV window, also located on the south side of the stadium adjacent to the main lobby. The window opens 1 1/2 hours prior to the game. After picking up credentials or media tickets you should enter Royals Stadium through the press gate located on the south side adjacent to the main lobby. To enter the press box turn left on the concourse and walk back to the main lobby where the elevators are located. The Royals' offices are located on level 5, the press box on level 4, parking lot on level 3 and the clubhouse and field on level 1.

INTERVIEW periods are arranged prior to and following Royals' games. Dick Howser, the coaches and players are usually available on the field or in the clubhouse during batting practice as long as the interview does not interrupt their pre-game routine (hitting, running, infield, etc.). Dick Howser will usually arrive by 3:30 p.m. prior to night games and be available to the press. Pre-game interviews should be conducted prior to the conclusion of batting practice. We request that reporters and broadcasters leave the field and dugout area when infield practice begins (12:50 p.m. for day games and 6:50 p.m. for night games) and that photographers report to their assigned photo positions.

ROYALS' CLUBHOUSE will be open to media with clubhouse credentials until 30 minutes prior to the game and immediately following each game. Film interviews may also be conducted in the clubhouse. The Royals' clubhouse will be closed between games of doubleheaders. There will be occasions when the Royals may request the clubhouse be cleared for team meetings and we ask your cooperation at these times. **The training room is closed to everyone except players and Royals officials.** There is an interview room located adjacent to both clubhouses and we will bring players to this area when necessary. The dugout is off limits in accordance with American League rules during the game for everyone except the manager, coaches, players and certain club officials.

PHOTOGRAPHERS will be assigned to photo bays on the field at the end of each dugout, the field level bay behind home plate or the bay located in the main press box. Photographers in the dugout field boxes should remain in the photo bays at all times during the game. If absolutely necessary, photographers who have to meet deadlines before the game ends should leave between innings only. Photographers shooting from the field level bay behind home plate must keep the gates closed. Photos are allowed during batting practice, but photographers

should remain in foul territory in the area behind home plate. Photographers should assume their assigned positions at the conclusion of batting practice.

PRESS BOX is located on level 4 at Royals Stadium. Space is available for accredited members of the media on assignment only. The lower level is reserved for writers and broadcast reporters. The upper level is divided into individual broadcast booths for live coverage by radio and television networks. Phones are available and Sportscom is available on advance request. The **Press Room** is located adjacent to the press box for a pre-game meal and refreshments and is open for the media with appropriate credentials approximately two hours prior to the game and one hour following the game. Complete **NOTES, STATISTICAL INFORMATION** and **LINEUPS** are available approximately two hours prior to the game on the lower level of the press box.

DIAL-A-ROYAL is a daily audio service featuring interviews with the manager, coaches and players along with a game report and other pertinent information concerning the Royals. The service begins with spring training and is available throughout the season. On game days we make every effort to record a new message within an hour following the contest. The number to call is 816/921-1054. Please do not pass this number on to people other than those who will utilize this as a news service. The Royals have a special fan information line: 816/921-8800.

ROYALS STADIUM

Recognized throughout baseball as one of the game's most beautiful ballparks, Royals Stadium opens its doors for the 13th season.

Over 20 million people have visited Royals Stadium since it opened in 1973, with attendance topping the 2 million mark in 4 of the last 7 campaigns.

The stadium opened April 10, 1973 with the Royals defeating Texas 12-1 before 39,464 fans. Since then, many exciting games have been contested here, including the 1973 All-Star game, two no-hitters, play-off games in 1976, 77, 78, 80, 81 and 84 and three World Series contests in 1980.

Royals Stadium features a new \$1.7 million Astro Turf-8 Drainthru playing surface (manufactured by Monsanto) which covers both the infield and outfield, a 12-story high scoreboard and 322-foot wide water spectacular. The scoreboard contains 16,320 light bulbs, most of them on the 40-foot wide, 60 foot high screen. The water spectacular runs from centerfield to the rightfield corner and is the largest privately funded fountain in the world.

Four circular ramps and 4 escalators make all sections easy to reach. 20,316 of the 40,625 seats are on the lower level with 2,487 on the club level (even with the press facilities) and 17,822 on the upper level.

Media representatives work in the air conditioned comfort of a 2-level press box. The upper level includes 7 broadcasting booths with the lower section containing working space for the print media. There are also field and press level photographer and television camera positions.
