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DEAN OF MANAGERS

... Alston in 15th season

WHEN WALT ALSTON came up from the Farm System to take on the job of leading the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1954 there was a chorus of voices asking: "Who?"

Despite his success in St. Paul, Montreal and other stops along the way, Alston, the Quiet Man then as now, didn't hit the headlines very often.

But he has had more than a fair share since. And, as he moves into his fifteenth campaign with the Dodgers, four in Brooklyn and eleven in Los Angeles, Skipper Walt is the dean of major league managers by a wide margin. Bill Rigney, of the Angels, who has been their only pilot (1961-1968) is the only man who has held his job any great length of time in recent years and even Bill was let out by the San Francisco Giants.

You get the idea when you realize that Walt's contemporaries back in '54 included Leo Durocher, then with the Giants; Eddie Stanky, then with the Cards; and Terry Moore, Fred Haney, Stan Hack, Birdie Tebbetts and Charlie Grimm in the National League and over in the American League the dugout bosses were Bucky Harris, Jimmy Dykes, Eddie Joost, Lou Boudreau, Paul Richards, Al Lopez, Casey Stengel and the late Freddie Hutchinson. More than one hundred managerial changes have been made in the majors as Alston, season after season, signs his one-year contracts.

Only three times during his long tenure with the Dodgers has the club finished in the second division. This included last year — and thereby hangs a challenge. In each of his other low-pulse seasons, 1958 and 1964, the Dodgers came bouncing back the following campaign to go all the way to a World Championship. From seventh to the peak in 1958-'59 and from a tie for sixth in '64 to a pair of pennants in 1965 and 1966, plus a World's Series triumph in '65.

Alston's Dodgers have won six pennants — 1955, 1956, 1959, 1963, 1965 and 1966. They won the World Series in four of them and the highlight of October play was a four-game sweep over the Yankees in 1963. Alston-managed National League All-Star teams have taken six of eight games. Over-all he has a 25-and-18 won-lost record against the American League and in the history of the National League no other manager can match that achievement.

Born December 1, 1911, Alston was a first baseman and a minor league swatter of some ability in the Farm System of the St. Louis Cardinals. He had the misfortune of trying to make a ball club which had first basemen galore and dropped back into the minors after the briefest of trials in 1936 — went to bat once and was fanned by Lon Warneke. In seven minor league seasons he hit .300 or better, including .350 in 1944, by which time his managing career was well on its way. In those days, to meet the family budget, he taught school in Ohio during the off-season.

When he isn't busy managing the Dodgers, Alston gets his biggest kick out of gunning (a fine skeet shot), hunting, fishing, billiards, horses (riding them), carpentry and trying to fool his grandson, Robin Ogle, with what's left of a cunnythumb curve ball. Robin, a switch hitter, has just about convinced Walt to put away his pitching toe plate.

The Skipper's Aides...

WALT ALSTON'S coaching staff came from different segments of the game of baseball but they've formed a cohesive unit since assembled in 1965. Until the team bogged down last year they had a perfect record—two pennants in two seasons.

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JIM GILLIAM (Born Nov. 17, 1928), a Dodger star for many seasons, spent all but one of his professional campaigns with Alston, joining him in Montreal in 1951, but beating him to the Dodgers in 1953, when he won Rookie-of-the-Year honors.

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DANNY OZARK (born Nov. 26, 1923) has been affiliated with the Dodger organization as a player, manager and coach, throughout his career. He and Alston first became acquainted when they were fellow pilots in the farm system, meeting each year at Dodgertown, Vero Beach, Fla.

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PRESTON GOMEZ (christened Pedro April 20, 1924) had a fling with the old Washington Senators as an infielder, managed in the Mexican, International and Pacific Coast Leagues and came back to the Dodgers from the Yankees organization.

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HAROLD (LEFTY) PHILLIPS (born May 16, 1919) is the only native Californian on the Dodger staff. He has been in baseball since 1939 when arm trouble cut short his pitching career. Serving as a scout for the Reds and Dodgers, Lefty signed several highly successful major leaguers, including the Dodgers' Don Drysdale.

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CARROLL BERINGER (born Aug. 14, 1928) serves in two capacities. Before games he pitches batting practice. During games he's boss of the bullpen, keeping relief pitchers ready for a call from the dugout. "C.B." pitched in the Dodger farm system from 1946 through 1960 and was getting better with age when he called it quits. In his last three campaigns, Beringer won 39 games and lost only 10.

Meet Dodgers of 1968...

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PITCHERS

JACK BILLINGHAM... One of the reasons the Dodgers felt they could trade two relief pitchers during last Winter's David Harum maneuvers was the fact that Jack Billingham did so well during the 1967 season — not only at Spokane where he had an earned run average of 3.00 in fifty-one outings but also in Arizona during Winter Instructional League play. Billingham was a major factor in the runaway pennant victory by Lefty Phillips's club and convinced Dodger officials he was ready for his big try with the Dodgers. A member of the Dodger system since 1961, he has been used almost exclusively as a relief pitcher his last four campaigns, starting only ten games over that span. In St. Petersburg, Fla., in 1964, and Albuquerque, N. Mexico (Texas League), in 1965, Jack had earned run averages of 1.03 and 1.78, respectively. His strikeout record of 108 in 123 innings last year in Spokane would seem to indicate he is a pitcher in the Dodger tradition.

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JIM BREWER... When the Dodgers traded Ron Perranoski to the Twins last Winter they paid a sincere compliment to Jim Brewer because this left Jim as the only southpaw in the Dodger bullpen. Brewer, who has had more than his share of tough breaks, has a chance in 1968 to come into his own. His earned run average of 2.67 last year, second only to Perranoski, was compiled both as a starter and a reliever. A few years ago Jim underwent an operation for the removal of some bone chips and his salary arm has been getting stronger ever since. This could be the year he'll get more regular duty. His finest effort last year was produced in mid-August against the Cincinnati Reds. Brewer (going seven) and Perranoski (two) combined to shut out Cincinnati 5 to 0. Stay with Jim and you'll bump into one hard luck story after another. Early in his career he suffered a broken jaw in a baseball free-for-all. In Japan during the Dodgers' Goodwill Tour, he was robbed of \$700. But the all-time topper had to be when he and Claude Osteen went fishing on a Vero Beach stream. Making a great cast, Jim was, to put it mildly, chagrined when he looked out on the waters and saw his wallet floating downstream. Even wallets don't float forever.

DON DRYSDALE . . . Big-D had an early-July record of 7 victories and ten defeats. He had just lost three straight decisions. And yet, he was elected by Walt Alston to represent the National League in the 1968 All-Star Game at Anaheim. Not only that, he proved to be the winning pitcher. Alston, a student of statistics as well as pitching, knew that Don was having one of his better seasons despite the sub-.500 won-lost record. Before the end of the year Don was to lose a total of sixteen games. But, get this, in the sixteen games Don lost the Dodgers had scored a TOTAL OF FIFTEEN runs. A fantastically consistent workhorse throughout his career, Don has missed only three starting turns since he became a regular starter back in 1957. For eleven years he has averaged more than forty games per season and every inning he pitches adds another to the Dodger club record. He goes into the 1968 season seeking two more club standards — most victories (tied Dazzy Vance at 190 with his final win in '67) and shutouts (even with Sandy Koufax at 40 after Sept. 15, 1-to-0 victory over the Phillies). When Don won his 190th game (Sept. 26 over Pirates) he was told he had tied Vance. He also was informed that Vance scored his FIRST major league triumph at the age of 31, Don's age. Did Don think this gave him a shot at 380 wins? "Forget it," cracked a somewhat weary Big-D.

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JOHN DUFFIE . . . Let there be no doubt that big John Duffie, the 6-foot-7 right-hander, is seeking the workhorse role in the Dodgers' future. John has pitched professionally only two years but he already has indicated his love for work. In 1966 at Jamestown, John started twenty-four times and hurled fourteen complete games, leading the league in both starts and complete efforts. In '67 at Albuquerque his twenty-two full games and 229 innings led the league in those departments as did his sixteen victories. His earned run average of 2.40 was third best in the circuit and his 171 strikeouts trailed only Leon Everitt (200). Duffie hurled four shutouts and was named Texas League Pitcher-of-the-Year. Brought up to the Dodgers late in the season Duffie was charged with two defeats but compiled a sub-3.00 E.R.A. against the Mets and Phillies. A native of Greenwood, S.C., Duffie won All-State honors in both basketball and baseball and at Brewton-Parker Junior College had an 8-and-1 record and in seventy-six innings fanned 109 batters. Dodger scout Leon Hamilton wasted no time steering him into a professional future.

LEON EVERITT . . . Strikeout king of the Texas League in 1967, Leon Everitt fanned two hundred batters, twenty-nine more than his team mate, John Duffie, his closest pursuer in this department. Leon also led Duffie, 30 to 29, in starts. Twice Everitt fanned eleven batters and his best game was a brilliant two-hitter against Arkansas in July. Leon won 11 and lost only 4 at Jamestown in 1966 and when Don Sutton was unable to make the trip to Japan because of a forearm injury, Everitt was rushed into the breach. He pitched a fine game against the Hawaiian All-Stars but came up with a sore arm during that performance and was unable to pitch effectively in Japan. A native of Marshall, Texas, Everitt pitched for H. B. Pemberton High and in 1964 hurled his club to the state championship. He won 16, lost none. He also was unbeaten in 1965 (6 and 0) and in 1964 averaged sixteen strikeouts per game.

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ALAN FOSTER . . . In the free agency draft of June, 1965, the Dodgers' second choice was Alan Foster, son of a Hacienda Heights doctor. The Dodgers have been thanking their stars ever since that no other club stepped in and grabbed Foster before the club's turn came around. Going into his fourth pro season, Foster is rated one of the outstanding young prospects in the game. He had a 5-and-2 getaway season at Santa Barbara after being graduated from Los Altos High and followed up with an 11-and-5 record at Albuquerque in 1966. The Dodgers invited him to make the tour of Japan that Winter and he stole the show from veteran Dodger moundsmen, winning three games and compiling a 2.53 E.R.A. in thirty-two innings. If it had not been for military service, which took him out of Spring training in '67, Foster might have battled Bill Singer for the fourth starting job with the Dodgers. Instead he went to Spokane where he hit the headlines by pitching two no-hit, no-run games, both against Seattle and in successive appearances against that club. At Los Altos High, Foster starred in baseball, football and basketball and, in his senior year, struck out 188 batters in 99 innings. Then his Dad wrote out a prescription for the Dodgers which brought the youngster close to \$100,000 in bonus money.

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JIM GRANT . . . In the World Series of 1965 the Dodgers were beaten twice by Jim (Mudcat) Grant. And, just to rub it in, Mudcat helped beat them with his bat in Game No. 6, swatting a three-run homer. But all is forgiven now. Mudcat is now a Dodger. He came to Los Angeles with Zoilo Versalles in the Winter deal which sent John Roseboro, Ron Perranoski and Bob Miller to Minnesota. A 10-year major league veteran (Cleveland and Minnesota), Grant was a 21-game winner and the top American League pitcher during that 1965 season which he climaxed by beating the Dodgers twice, 8 to 2 and 5 to 1. Between those two, Don Drysdale beat Grant, 7 to 2. Among his many fine accomplishments in that '65 season, Grant had six shutouts. He was named American League pitcher of the Year. On his way to the majors, Grant starred at San Diego, winning eighteen games in 1957, his final minor league season. Cleveland traded him to Minnesota in 1964. Next year he pitched the Twins into the World Series. The Dodgers are hopeful he can do that sort of thing once again.

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MIKE KEKICH . . . John Duffie led the Albuquerque Dodgers of 1967 in victories (16). Leon Everitt led the club in strikeouts (200). And Mike Kekich, stylish southpaw, had the best won-and-lost percentage record, winning 14 while losing only 4. Which of the three will win the most headlines in the Dodger future? A football, basketball, track and baseball star at Lynwood High, Mike had the distinction of going all the way from Santa Barbara to the Dodgers in 1964. Along the way he also pitched at St. Petersburg and Spokane. While he didn't get into a game with the Dodgers that year, he stayed with them all of '65 under the rules of baseball which made him vulnerable to waiver claim. That was very much a wasted season for the young lefthander and his 1966 campaign was strewn with injuries. But in 1967 the youngster started a "comeback." His E.R.A. of 3.24 was fifth best in the Texas League. Twice he fanned ten batters in a game. Then, after the season's end, he reported to Lefty Phillips for Winter Instructional League play in Arizona where he won 4, lost 1 and had an E.R.A. of 2.66.

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RAY LAMB . . . No player got more glowing reports out of Winter Instructional League Play in Arizona than Glendale-born Ray Lamb, former U.S.C. right-hander signed to a Dodger contract by Ben Wade. Even if no one had mentioned his name, his "stats" would have spoken eloquently. Lamb, who won nineteen and lost seven in two seasons of minor league pitching, had a 5-and-1 record for Lefty Phillips's club and the Arizona League's best earned run average, 1.55. He tied for the league lead in strikeouts, 41, and walked only EIGHT batters in fifty-eight innings. Only team mate Leon Everitt's 8-and-0 record took the won-lost percentage crown from him. A graduate of Hoover High (1962), Lamb helped Rod Dedeaux's Trojans to California and NCAA District 8 titles in 1964 and 1966 and in the College World Series of '64 fanned ten and walked only one in six innings of relief pitching. His control is uncanny. In two minor league seasons he hurled 188 innings and walked only 43 batters, while fanning 201.

CLAUDE OSTEEN . . . Last June 30 was a banner night in the career of Claude Osteen. Not only did he become the first major league pitcher to win eleven games in 1968 but he won his own game by blasting a ninth-inning home run in the Houston Astrodome. It seemed certain Osteen would, at long last, become a 20-game winner. But it didn't work out that way. In his last twenty starts, Osteen won only six and all were stylish performances, 2-0, 5-4, 7-3, 8-0, 6-3 and 3-0. All but one were complete-game jobs. On the other hand he lost some tough decisions, the Dodgers scoring a total of twenty runs in his remaining ten defeats. Two other Osteen starts were lost by the Dodgers, 2 to 1, in the twelfth and eleventh innings, but in these he escaped the setback. Claude led the Dodgers in full games, fourteen, as he trudged down to the finish with a 17-and-17 record and a 3.22 earned run average. This was his first year over the 3-run mark since he became a Dodger in the multi-player deal with the Washington Senators. His five shutouts also led the club in that department. Claude, who began pitching in the majors at the age of eighteen, has a double incentive to make 1968 his first 20-win campaign. He's also shooting for victory No. 100 — needs eighteen to hit it. In his last four years he has won 15, 15, 17, 17. A consistent young man!

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JOHN PURDIN . . . Tall, slender, handsome John Purdin has a rooter in the Dodger family who swings a lot of weight. Club President Walter O'Malley has the "my boy" tag on him because the Dodgers signed him, about an hour ahead of the Cincinnati Reds, because a couple of Dodger fans wrote to O'Malley and the boss spurred the scouting staff into quick action. Purdin was signed before the Dodgers ever saw him in a ball game — shortly after he returned from a tour of duty with the Air Force in Germany. In the Winter of 1966-67 Purdin could have been drafted by any other major league club but they all passed him up and now he's battling for a Dodger job — and with mighty fine 1967 credentials. Last Summer John helped lead the Spokane Indians to their P.C.L. division championship. He had more starts, 31, than any man on the staff and led the league in shutouts with six. Earlier in his career, with Salisbury, N.C., Purdin hurled a seven-inning perfect game in the Western Carolinas League, where he had a fantastic 14-3 record and a 1.91 E.R.A. In Germany, pitching for the Weisbaden Flyers, Purdin averaged fourteen strikeouts per game and won 20 games, against 4 defeats. During the year 1964, his achievements included 20-4 in Germany, 14-3 in Salisbury, 0-1 at Spokane, 2-0 with the Dodgers and 6-1 in Winter Instructional play — all told 42 wins, 9 losses.

PHIL REGAN . . . It took the National League a year, almost to the day, to clip the feathers of Phil (The Vulture) Regan. He had lost a game May 13, 1966, to the Pirates, but was unbeaten in his next seventy-one games. Then, on May 15 last season, Houston's Astros shot him down in extra innings. In his year-long reign as King of the Vultures, Phil took part in forty-two victories, was credited with fifteen of them and had seven saves. And all of this was accomplished by an American League veteran, rescued from Syracuse in a trade which sent Dick Tracewski to the Tigers. When Regan reported, the Dodgers told him about their plans to convert him to relief work. It wasn't exactly what he wanted — or expected — but he won Comeback of the Year Honors and received countless bird-like good-luck charms from his fans. But Dodger starting pitchers, intent on their own collection of victories, almost shunned him. It got to be quite a gag putting one of Phil's vultures atop the locker of the starting pitcher but, for them, it wasn't funny. Without Regan the Dodgers could not have won the 1966 pennant, however, so everyone was happy by October. Regan had a fantastic E.R.A. of 1.62 in 1966 and 3.00 last season, both far below his lifetime mark which hovers around four runs per game.

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VICENTE ROMO (Navarro) . . . The Dodgers thought they had Vicente Romo in 1966 but, after purchasing his contract from the Mexico City Tigers for \$30,000, they learned Romo was the property of the Cleveland organization at Portland. So, they waited a year and captured him in the draft last Winter for \$25,000. There is nothing gaudy about Romo's P.C.L. record last year (3-11 and an E.R.A. of 4.15) but Dodger scouts saw him during the Winter and he was the club's only drafted player. The night before the Dodgers nabbed him in the Winter grab bag, Romo fanned eighteen batters in Mexico. Fortunately the news was delayed in reaching the big league meetings. Romo was born in Santa Rosalia, Baja California, and lives in Guaymas, Sonora, Mexico. During the off-season he's an expert mechanic. His hobby is billiards, which may get him in trouble with his manager, Walt Alston, one of the best in baseball at the game. When Romo scored sixteen wins for the Mexico City Tigers in 1964, the Indians signed him. He was back in Mexico in 1966, winning seventeen, and that's when the Dodgers thought they had bought him. The case went to the Commissioner's office for settlement.

BILL SINGER . . . Bullet-balling Bill Singer caught fire along about the middle of the 1967 National League season and, for a two-month stretch, was the hottest pitcher in baseball. From mid-July through mid-September, Bill won ten and lost two, including a seven-game winning streak in which he gave up a total of four runs. Tagged for four more in a 3-win spurt in September, Singer's ten-victory allowance was a mere eight runs. Six of his ten triumphs were scored in complete-game efforts and in none of them did he need bullpen aid earlier than the eighth inning. In that stretch Singer came of age as a major league pitcher. They began calling him the Singer Throwing Machine as he sewed up one victory after another. He finished the season with a 12-and-8 record and a 2.65 earned run average. This was even more impressive than Sandy Koufax's accomplishments at the age of twenty-three. Bill has been in the Dodger organization since he was handed a sizeable bonus following his graduation from Pomona High. He has the Dodger strikeout trademark. In 1964, at the age of 19, he fired a no-hit, no-run game against Dallas and two years later, almost to the day, he fanned eighteen Vancouver batters, one short of the P.C.L. record. With a smattering of Dodger tries in 1964, 1965 and 1966, Singer didn't have a major league win until May 29 last year when he topped the Mets. But that sure was the start of something big!

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LARRY STAAB . . . Spring after Spring Larry Staab looms as a potential Dodger. Perhaps 1968 will be the year he makes it. Staab, who was only eighteen when he first "made" the Dodger spring roster (1962), has improved steadily in one department or another every year and last season he fashioned the best earned run average of his career, a commendable 3.13 in the Pacific Coast League where he won twelve games, matching his personal high. Coming out of St. Joseph's Military Academy in Hays, Kansas, Staab was one of the most sought-after pitchers in history. He allowed one hit to the last SEVENTY-THREE men he faced. Selected for MVP honors in the state tourney at Wichita, he was signed by Bert Wells and fanned 119 batters in 101 innings in his first taste of professional baseball.

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DON SUTTON . . . There weren't too many high spots for the Dodgers as they trudged to an eighth-place finish in 1967 but one of their happiest spans was in late June when the pitching staff flashed some of the old-fashioned Dodger mastery. Pitted against the Giants and Reds they put together four straight complete-game victories and three of the victories were shutouts. Don Drysdale gave up one run in his 2-to-1 triumph as Bill Singer won, 2 to 0, Claude Osteen, 3 to 0, and Don Sutton fired a two-hitter at Cincinnati in a 9-0 romp. During the year Sutton hurled three shutouts but the two-hitter was his best effort of the year. Sutton, like Jim Lefebvre, spent much of his season in military service, pitching some games on leave from camp. Late in August he came down from Camp Roberts and flipped a 6-to-1 win over the Braves. Sutton rated it his best game of the year — "the first time I put everything together consistently." Sutton, an outstanding freshman until he suffered a forearm injury, has one of the better curves in baseball but it wasn't until after mid-season last year that it was effective. There were some who thought he was favoring his arm. Others that he was experimenting too much. Sutton favored the latter explanation. "I was trying to pitch like a 35-year-old and I don't know that much. But I just decided to rear back and throw — and forget the fancy stuff."

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BATTERS

LUIS ALCARAZ... A member of the Dodger farm system since 1960, Luis Alcaraz had his finest season last year when he won the batting championship of the Texas League with an average of .328 and was, in late season, promoted to the Dodgers. Luis, a cousin of Orlando Cepeda, led the league in hits (156) and total bases (263) for the Albuquerque Dodgers. His extra-base punch produced 31 doubles, 5 triples and 22 home runs. He hadn't enjoyed a season like that since his 1961 campaign in the Sophomore League at Artesia and there were some who thought Alcaraz played his best baseball in the Caribbean Winter Leagues. On his way to the Texas League title last year, Alcaraz finished with a flourish. He was batting .310 with less than three weeks remaining to be played and crowded 38 hits into his last 74 times at bat. He also led the league's fielding percentages at second base. Alcaraz was named to the Class AA-West All-Star team at second base and two of his infield mates, Don Williams, ss, and Bill Sudakis, 3b, as well as outfielder Willie Crawford and pitchers John Duffie and Mike Kekich were similarly honored. In Alcaraz's first appearance at the plate in the majors he faced Mike McCormick, eventual Cy Young winner. Mike was looking for victory No. 20 that evening but a single by Alcaraz helped beat the Giants' southpaw. After being blanked in his second game, Luis got a pair of hits each of the next two and carried a .357 batting average for awhile.

BOB BAILEY... Does the position a man plays defensively have an effect on his batting? There are many who believe this had something to do with the poor showing by Bob Bailey last year. Uncomfortable in left field, Bob also slumped at the plate and was relegated to pinch-hitting chores. When, late in the season, he was moved into third base on a regular basis his hitting suddenly perked up and, in one stretch of about a dozen games, he hit more than .400. Walt Alston also was impressed with Bailey's consistency afield and it was taken for granted "Beetle" would start the 1968 season there. Bailey, only 25, came to the Dodgers in the deal which sent Maury Wills to Pittsburgh. The Pirates had signed him for a bonus reported to be \$175,000. Reared on the sandlots of Long Beach, Bailey regarded his trade to the Dodgers as a homecoming. Perhaps he pressed, trying to make good for the Dodgers. Perhaps he was confused by a Spring training program which saw him play first, third and the outfield. Whatever the cause, he got off to the worst start of his career and didn't come out of it until mid-August.

JIM CAMPANIS . . . When the Dodgers traded John Roseboro to the Twins last Winter, Director of Dodger Scouting Al Campanis got an urgent call from his daughter-in-law, Brenda. It seems the news had a strange effect on her husband, Jim Campanis. "He won't eat at all, Dad," Brenda explained by long-distance telephone from Venezuela. That didn't sound like Jim to Al and so a puzzled Dad asked, hesitatingly, "Why?" "As soon as he heard Roseboro had been traded, Dad, he put himself on a diet. He has lost four pounds already. What'll I do?" Al, who knows more about his son's appetite than Brenda, advised her to let nature take its course. "Don't worry, he'll eat," said Al. But there can be no doubt that the departure of Roseboro has given Jim the hope for more quickly obtaining his goal of being a major league catcher — and a Dodger regular. He figures to battle Jeff Torborg for the job and Jim's heavy bat could win the post. He has the extra-base sock the Dodgers seek. Used almost exclusively as a pinch hitter early last year he carried a .333 average into mid-June. His first big league hit was a smoking double which started a rally to beat the Cardinals in the 13th. His first home run struck the left field foul pole at Dodger Stadium. He hit another against the Cards in St. Louis in August. Jimmy, who starred in baseball and football at Fullerton, was "loaned" to the Angels' Seattle club in 1966 when Merritt Ranew was struck on the head by a bat in an unpleasant P.C.L. incident. He led Seattle to a pennant and the Angels have tried to get him by trade ever since.

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WILLIE CRAWFORD . . . One of the top prospects in the Dodger farm system is Willie Crawford, fleet and powerful outfielder, who had a fine season in 1967 at Albuquerque. Just when the Dodgers began to despair over the fact Willie fanned too often, he began making consistent contact, wound up the Texas League with a .305 average, was selected on the Double-A All-Star team and his twenty-one homers represented the best output of his career in that department. He followed this campaign with Winter ball in Arizona where the Dodger staff was impressed by his take-charge attitude and his excellent defensive play in centerfield. Crawford, signed by the Dodgers for a bonus of \$100,000, has had three years of minor league baseball — 1964, 1966 and 1967. He was forced to remain with the big-league Dodgers in 1965 and at the age of nineteen, had the thrill of going to bat twice in the World Series. He has a .500 average to show for it, too. The Dodgers hope in the not-too-distant future to put Willie Davis and Willie Crawford in the same outfield and dream about watching the two of them run the bases. There's little to choose between them in speed so Dodger fans have some dusty scampering to watch when these two start to churn up Dodger Stadium basepaths.

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WILLIE DAVIS . . . How do you figure a Willie Davis? His upsie-downsie record is amazing — every other year a good one and every other year, conversely, a so-so campaign. In 1968 he's due to roar again. Look at his batting averages over the years since he came up from the minors after winning two batting titles at Reno and Spokane318 late in 1960, .254 the next year and then back up to .285 in 1962. Subsequently: .245, .294, .238, .284 and last year's downbeat .257. Last Winter there was considerable talk about trading

Willie but, while other Dodgers departed, Willie remained — and now he, among all Dodgers, is on the spot to make a comeback and take the Dodgers along with him. Willie, in a good year, could be the gate-attraction man of the club. His great speed, his basepath daring, his fantastic catches in center-field, his accurate arm, his power at the plate — all put together could make him one of the stars of the National League. The fans — and his manager — would love to see Willie bunt more often. They'd like to see him hit more balls on the ground and beat out more infield hits with his Olympian speed. In justice to his comparatively poor showing last season, Willie suffered a bad leg injury during Spring training and never really had full-strength underpinning all season.

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TOMMY DEAN... The best fielding shortstop in the Pacific Coast League last year was Tommy Dean, whose percentage of .969, was tops in the circuit. This was Dean's fourth year in the Dodger organization and, late in the year, he came up to the big club and took part in a dozen games. Walt Alston had an earlier look at Dean during the club's trip to Japan. Roy Hartsfield, Spokane manager, claimed, before he sent Dean to the Dodgers, "Dean can field better than half the shortstops now in the major leagues." Unfortunately, Tommy has had a hitting problem although there are many who believe he'll some day conquer it. He hit .223 in the Coast League in '67 but, in his second minor league season, at Albuquerque, Dean hit .268. Dean, a native and Winter resident of Iuka, Miss., got a chance to become a major leaguer because an older brother helped build a ball field and then convinced the high school to have a baseball nine. Dean showed his gratitude with a 4-year batting average of .510 and the Dodgers showed theirs by handing him a \$60,000 bonus which, appropriately, he split with his brother. Dean also competed in basketball and track for Iuka and won honorable mention for All-American Prep on the court. There were so many baseball scouts on his trail after he finished high school it was decided to have a drawing, numbers in the hat and all that sort of thing, as to who could talk first to Tommy. The Dodgers signed him the night before the scheduled drawing. Ah, the good old days of scouting!

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JIM FAIREY... On the Dodger Spring roster for 1968 is an outfielder who has never hit under .300 during his career. He's Jim Fairey, who blasted California League pitching at a .323 pace in 1965, Texas League flipping for a .301 average in 1966 and Pacific Coast League hurling for a .303 mark last year. A chunky 190-pounder who measures 5 feet, 10 inches, Fairey was graduated from Orangeburg, S.C., High in 1962 after lettering in football, track and baseball. He then attended Erskine College at Due West, S.C., and hit .406 in 32 games, batting in 31 runs, compiling a slugging average of .828 and leading his N.C.A.A. division in homers (11) and triples (7). He has been named on the All-Star team of all three leagues in which he has played. He won honorable mention for baseball All-American in both 1963 and 1964 and, in American Legion play, had a .420 batting average. He, naturally, enjoys batting more than anything else in sports — but his off-the-diamond hobby is, of all things, water skiing.

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RON FAIRLY... If it's all right with you, Ron Fairly would just as soon not discuss 1967. You can't blame him. For a guy with a lifetime batting average of .272, a consistent RBI count averaging about seventy per year, and a classic batting stroke, the collapse of his batting average all the way to .220 is just one of those things you don't try to explain. There was only one real highlight in Ron's season. He had the honor of hitting the first Dodger homer of the year — in late April against the Cards. And on that day he also drove in five runs, adding a double to his collection. At that point Ron was hitting .378 and it seemed like he was headed for one of the finer seasons of his career. Fairly is now one of the established veterans of the Dodgers. Don Drysdale is the only man on the roster who pre-dates Ron's inaugural back in 1958. Signed off the U.S.C. campus, Ron saw some late-season action that year, spent all of '59 with the Dodgers and then, after dropping back to Spokane for further seasoning in 1960, has been a Dodger ever since. Just as he was a disappointing batter most of last year, Ron can be, on occasion, one of the club's hottest hitters. In 1966, for instance, Ron drove in twenty-two runs in September to lead the Dodgers from third place to first. It was a typical redhot span for the popular Redhead.

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AL FERRARA... The No. 1 Dodger of 1967 was, for a greater part of the season, the club's No. 1 substitute. But Al Ferrara hopes he has shaken his bench-sitting role and when the Dodgers traded Lou Johnson to the Cubs last Winter one of the reasons was to give Al regular duty against both right and left-handed pitching. Ferrara led the Dodgers at the plate last year (.277) and in home runs (16). He was named by the Baseball Writers, the Long Beach Independent Press Telegram and the fans as the Dodger of the Year. During the off-season he was the club's busiest speaker and wowed them all — Kids Clinics or Fraternity meetings. When the season began the Dodgers figured Al would give them terrific potential on the bench as the No. 1 right-handed pinch hitter. It's a chore he didn't relish and he likes it less after batting only .179 in that department. If he hadn't been used as a pinch hitter, he would have batted almost .300. Dodger Stadium isn't supposed to be a hitter's paradise but Ferrara hit .312 there last year — and .241 on the road. Ferrara is not the greatest outfielder in the business and he doesn't mind being taken out for defensive purposes in the late innings — now and then. But, watching a football game in which one club had lost the ball several times to the opposition, the Bull was moved to say: "One thing about my fumbles — the other team never recovers the ball."

LEN GABRIELSON... One of the few deals the Dodgers made during the 1967 season landed Len Gabrielson from the Angels for another ex-Trojan, Johnny Werhas. Len was a valuable performer both as a pinch hitter and outfielder. He comes from a baseball-playing family. His Dad, Len, sr., played for ten years in the Pacific Coast League and an uncle, Bill Matheson, was in the Yankee Farm system. A younger brother, Doug, has been signed by the Giants. Gabrielson, signed off the USC campus by the Milwaukee Braves in 1960, moved up to the parent club after hitting .290 at Denver and has been in the majors ever since 1963, playing for the Braves, Cubs, Giants, Angels and Dodgers. He has been managed by Chuck Dressen, Birdie Tebbetts, Bobby Bragan, Bob Kennedy, Herman Franks, Bill Rigney and Walt Alston which must be some sort of record for a 5-year veteran of the majors. He proudly claims that his Dad did more for him than any manager or coach and recalls that, while he played on his own as a youngster, his father didn't bear down on his instructional program until he (Len, jr.) was fourteen. Gabrielson explained it this way: "Dad felt there's plenty of time for a boy to engage in formal competition between the ages of 13 and 18. Before that he should enjoy himself without the pressures of winning." And that's just the sort of program Len Gabrielson 3rd, now five, is undergoing.

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BILLY GRABARKEWITZ... Look over the statistical line for Billy Grabarkewitz at Santa Barbara last year and you get the idea why he's so high in the Dodgers' future book. Billy led the California League in runs (122) and stolen bases (39). He had an excellent extra-base record—18 doubles, 4 triples and 24 homers. And, despite a horrible mid-season slump, he hit a highly respectable .287, well over his pro rookie year in the Northwest League. In addition to making 137 hits in 135 games, Billy walked 123 times, which means he was on base just about twice a game. Is he the lead-off man in the Dodger future? He has great speed, too. In 1966, with Tri-City, he stole four bases in one game. Playing Winter ball in the Arizona Instructional League, Grabarkewitz was the top fielding shortstop. Must have been a great athlete in high school at Alamo Heights (San Antonio) where he lettered in baseball, basketball, football, track and golf. At St. Mary's University he was named shortstop on the N.I.A.A. All-American second team in 1966 when he hit .376.

RON HUNT... Assorted injuries cut down the 1967 contribution of Ron Hunt but the Dodgers rate him as a vital part of their 1968 plans. Hunt may wind up at any one of three positions—second, where he played most of last year, first or third. Hunt's hustle on the basepaths proved his undoing last year. Diving headfirst into second base he suffered a shoulder injury which plagued him the rest of the season. On another occasion he was sidelined by a groin injury. That was in August when his batting average was a highly commendable .280. Skipper Walt Alston considered Hunt one of his best offensive players and all of his efforts in this regard do not show up in the "stats". Many times Hunt sacrificed himself by pushing a ball to the right side to move a runner along a vital base. Hunt, who brought a lifetime average of .282 to the Dodgers, was obtained with Jim Hickman in the deal which sent Tommy Davis to the Mets. Hunt hit .303 for the Mets in 1964 and .288 for them in 1966 but injuries ruined his 1965 season too, when he played in only fifty-seven games. The Dodgers hope he can escape the infirmary in '68.

Hutton is a former South Pasadena prep star who was signed by the Dodgers in the Winter of 1964. In 1966 Tommy was named Texas League Player of the Year when he hit .340 for the circuit's batting title before being shipped to Spokane late in the year. The year before at Albuquerque James hit .308 and he topped the .300 mark twice earlier in his minor league career. Reared in Palm Springs, California, Cleo lettered in basketball, baseball, football and track. He was named his club's MVP in 1959 when he led Palm Springs to the CIF play-offs. Picked All-Riverside in both baseball and football, James starred in both sports in junior college ranks and then was signed by Dodger scout Kenny Myers. His biggest baseball thrill came during his first year (at St. Petersburg) when he stole five bases in a game. In 1964, when he hit .321 at Salem, he also set the Northwest League stolen base record at 64. He won National Association Class AA-West All-Star honors in 1966. Another department in which he excels is being hit by pitches. He has led two leagues at it, including the PCL last year when he was plunked fifteen times. Shades of Lou Johnson.

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JIM LEFEBVRE... Los Angeles baseball writers picked Jim Lefebvre as Rookie of the Year in 1965 and Sophomore of the Year in 1966. They almost forget he was a member of the Junior class — and Jim wishes he could forget '67, too. Beset by an injured hamstring muscle, Jim was sidelined on several occasions, took on some excess weight and lost his ability to pull the ball. A 24-homer hitter in his second year, Lefebvre was able to send only eight balls out of the park in 1967. He had hit twelve his first year. His batting average dropped to .261 and his RBI count from 74 to 50. By season's end Jim was truly worried about his future and put himself in the hands of Dr. Bob Kerlan. He was warned that he must take off weight, speed up his reflexes and strengthen his wrists. There were times during the Winter when it seemed Lefebvre was training to get into a boxing ring. He rode bicycles, skipped rope, punched the light bag, ran a mile a day on the beach — and, above all, went on a diet. Lefebvre was batting close to .300 in late May when he suffered his first hamstring muscle pull. He had trouble with his legs the rest of the year. He put on one terrific batting spurt, just before the All-Star Game intermission, and that hauled his average within a few points of .300 but it was mostly downhill in the second half of the season. Now he's on the comeback trail and, physically, he's ready for it.

NATE OLIVER... On the verge of quitting baseball when he was assigned to the Spokane club for Spring training last year, Nate (Pee Wee) Oliver had further reason to despair when he got to Vero Beach. On the day when the big club broke camp, leaving Oliver behind with the rest of the minor league squads, Pee Wee hurt an ankle. It later proved to be broken although he had played on it for three weeks. When his ankle was placed in a cast, Oliver became a spectator and spent a lot of time looking at a rival infielder named John Donaldson, of Vancouver. Donaldson was fifteen pounds lighter but with a fully closed stance was hitting .500 and leading the PCL. Oliver decided he would try the same stance and, to make a short story shorter, he was back in the majors not long thereafter. He looked like a different hitter and, hitting safely in his first five games, he suddenly was batting .529. That didn't last, of course, but Nate, nevertheless, had some fine days and nights thereafter and stayed with the club all the way. He got three hits in three tjmes at the plate, including a triple, against Houston, had 3-hit days against the Mets, Braves and Giants but his all-time topper was a 4-for-4 night in Houston which raised his season average to .308 in mid-August. Unfortunately the tobaggon which gave the rest of the Dodgers a downhill ride over the last six weeks caught up with Pee Wee, too.

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WES PARKER . . . Several clubs in both the National and American Leagues sought Wes Parker, the Golden Glove Award-winning first baseman, to make an outfielder out of him. This is a tribute to slick Wes's versatility, speed and throwing ability. Matter of fact, Wes, who coveted the Golden Glove award ever since he became the Dodgers' regular first baseman, started the 1967 campaign in centerfield because Willie Davis had been sidelined by a Spring training injury. In four seasons at first base Wes has had 4,009 chances and made only twenty-two errors. Last year he made only four errors and handled almost a thousand chances — 985 to be exact. He also led the league's first basemen with a .997 mark in 1965. Parker was one of the few Dodgers who hit close to his lifetime average at bat last year, too — only four points away. Switch-hitting Wes is a streaky hitter and Walt Alston can't make up his mind whether Parker's streakiness is mental or physical. "When Wes is hitting, he looks like one of the best. When he's not, he looks like one of the worst". Alston also hopes that Wes, who has been playing pro ball only five years, will become a bit bolder on the bases. He has the speed to steal a great many more bases than he has. "Wes," says Alston, "would be a lot better ball player if he'd get mad now and then. Sure wish he could get as mad on the ball field as I've seen him in a game of bridge. At that game he's a pretty good 'redneck'."

In 1958 he was picked to play in the annual Hearst Sandlot Classic game in New York and the Cubs signed him shortly thereafter. He led the Texas League second basemen afield and in double plays in 1961, repeating this accomplishment in 1963. Moved up to the Pacific Coast League in 1965, he again was the top second baseman. A new switch hitter in 1967, Popovich batted .202 as a left-handed swinger last year and .240 right-handed. The Dodgers were impressed with his glove when he filled in at short for Don Kessinger.

BILL SUDAKIS . . . The Dodgers converted Bill Sudakis from a right-handed hitter to a switch-hitter during their Arizona Instructional play in 1966 and he batted a resounding .357. He had hit .264 that Summer at Santa Barbara. Promoted to the Texas League, he batted .293 for Albuquerque and was named All-Star third baseman. Sudakis, who is of Norwegian-Lithuanian descent, was a baseball-football-basketball star at Joliet (Ill.) High and won All-State honors on the basketball court. He played on the Joliet Colt League World Champions and pitched the title-winning game against Charlotte, N.C. Sudakis produced a healthy collection of extra-base hits for the Albuquerque Dodgers last Summer, 27 doubles, 11 triples and 9 homers. JEFF TORBORG . . . No one will be rooting harder for Jeff Torborg to do a good job for the Dodgers in the 1968 catching department than John Roseboro, the man he replaces. "Gabby" was Jeff's strongest booster and rates the youngster as one of the better receivers in the game. Torborg credits Roseboro with a great teaching job. "I learned a lot just watching John and during the trip to Japan he really did a job on me." When there was talk of sending Torborg to the minors (for experience) last year, Roseboro was first to deny that was necessary. "They shouldn't send Jeff out," said Roseboro. "He's ready to catch in the majors now." Relaxation was the secret to Jeff's sudden improvement. He had been too tense. One of his big faults was in going out to meet the ball on throws to the plate instead of waiting for them. This, too, was a matter of tension. Torborg was in 76 games last season—more action than he had seen in the minors or majors since his graduation from Rutgers University and acceptance of a sizeable bonus to sign with the Dodgers. He had several flurries at the plate, including a July splurge of eight hits in twenty-two times at bat. In August he had an evenful month. He had his nose broken when he misjudged a practice pop foul, he got his first stolen base in the majors and he broke up a 12-inning game with a pinch single.

ZOILLO VERSALLES . . . When Walt Alston signed his fifteenth Dodger contract during a Stadium Club press conference he told the assembled news media representatives: "We can bounce back from our eighth-place finish in 1967 to a pennant in 1968. It's a great challenge, though, and there are a lot of 'ifs'. To begin with, we've got to come up with a topflight shortstop. . ." And landing that shortstop was the first order of business for General Manager Buzzie Bavasi when the trading season opened in Mexico City. The Dodgers shook up the meetings with a deal which sent John Roseboro, Ron Perranoski and Bo's Miller to the Minnesota Twins for Zoilo Versalles and Jim (Mudcat) Grant. Versalles was "that topflight shortstop" Alston was talking about. Most Valuable Player in the American League in 1965, Versalles had run on a couple of lean years the following two seasons but the Dodgers have some of their own players on a Bounce-Back program and were happy to add Versalles. The deal was made a few days before Zoilo's twenty-seventh birthday. He has been in organized ball since signed out of Cuba in 1958. He was All-Star shortstop in 1965 and, with a .273 batting average, amazingly led the American League in total bases. His 182 hits included 45 doubles, 12 triples and 19 homers. He tied for the league lead in doubles and triples. Twice the winner of the Golden Glove award at short (1963 and 1965), Versalles has the qualities of leadership the Dodgers needed so badly last year. He was reluctant to leave the Twins (nee Senators) with which club he had played since 1959 but if he can flash any of his 1965 zing at Dodger Stadium Los Angeles fans will make him forget what league Minnesota is in.

1967 PITCHING STATISTICS

Two Dodgers qualified among the top fifteen in the National League's Earned Run Average leaders. Bill Singer had the best E.R.A. among rookies, 2.65, and was sixth in the league behind Phil Niekro, Jim Bunning, Chris Short, Gary Nolan and Gaylord Perry. Don Drysdale, with an E.R.A. of 2.74, was ninth in the league. The staff's earned run average was 3.21 and that placed Los Angeles fifth. Cincinnati led in shutouts at eighteen and Los Angeles finished in a four-club tie for second in this department. Philadelphia's Jim Bunning led in shutouts (6) and Claude Osteen tied for runner-up honors at 5 with San Francisco's Mike McCormick, Cy Young Award winner. Claude also was one behind Bunning, who led the N.L. in starts at 40. Cincinnati's Ted Abernathy and the Dodgers' Ron Perranoski finished in a tie for most appearances, 70. Don Wilson, of Houston, hurled the only N.L. no-hit, no-run game for 1967 against Atlanta June 18. Don Sutton's two-hitter against Cincinnati June 27 was the lowest for the Dodgers during the year.
