

The Dean Of Major League Managers — Walt Alston



he press release which first ar nounced Walt Alston as the manager of the Dodgers was to the point: "WALTER EMMONS ALSTON was named manager of the Dodgers today. Alston, who was born on December 1, 1911, at Hamilton, Ohio, now lives in Oxford. Ohio." The release was dated 11/24/53. Twenty-one baseball seasons later Walter Alston remains as the manager of the Dodgers. Alston's accomplishments have stamped him as one of the most successful managers of all time. Only two men — Connie Mack (50 years with the Philadelphia Athletics, 1901-50) and John McGraw (31 years with the New York Giants, 1902-32) — managed one club for a longer period of time than Alston. Only eight men have managed for more than 20 years — Mack, McGraw, Bucky Harris (29 years), Casey Stengel (25), Bill McKechnie (24), Joe McCarthy (24), Leo Durocher (24) and Jimmy Dykes (21). Walt has been the manager of all four World Championship teams in Dodger history (1955, 1959, 1963 and 1965) and has managed six Dodger teams to pennants. Only four managers in the history of Major League baseball have won more pennants and only three have won more World Championships.

# Dodger Coaches...

RED ADAMS (born Oct. 7, 1921).... If you ask Charles Dwight (Red) Adams to comment on his role as the pitching coach of the Dodgers there is a good chance you will receive a light-hearted answer. "They say that if you want to be a good singer you should hang around good singers," says Red. "If you want to be a good pitching coach you should hang around good pitchers." Red Adams never takes himself too seriously. He goes about his job, however, with a very serious attitude. Adams' success in accomplishing his duties is reflected in the statements of the Dodger pitchers. "He's the best thing that ever happened to my career," says Don Sutton. "He's so unappreciated except by the people who work for him." Red says his formula as a pitching coach is one of fundamentals. "I read something once that I firmly believe in," he says. "It was that a good coach is someone who doesn't make an opponent out of his student. Three words are important: flexibility, communication and common sense. I also feel it's very important to acquaint myself with each player as a person as well as a pitcher."

MONTY BASGALL (born Feb. 18, 1922)... There were times during the 1973 season when Monty Basgall was referred to as one of the "new members of the Dodgers." True, Monty was in his first year as a Dodger coach but his association with the Dodgers spans more than 30 years. After an outstanding career as a high school athlete in Bison, Kans., Monty was signed by Dodger scout Berl Wells in 1941. After three seasons in the Dodger minor league organization and three years in the service Monty was traded to the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1947. He played 200 Major League games, all with the Pirates. A dozen years after being traded by the Dodgers, Monty Basgall returned. This time as a Dodger scout. And the man who saw the potential of Monty Basgall as a scout was the same man who saw that potential as a player — Bert Wells. Monty was a Dodger scout for 12 years, returning to the uniform ranks in 1971 as the manager of Albuquerque. Last season Monty moved back into the Majors as a Dodger coach. Basgall receives, and deserves, the credit for the Dodgers' improved infield defense of 1973. He is regarded as one of the finest instructors of infield play in baseball.

JIM GILLIAM (born Oct, 17, 1928, Nashville, Tenn.)... When the name Jim Gilliam is mentioned there is the image of the quiet but professional baseball man — a steady and clutch Major League player and a veteran and reliable coach. Jim Gilliam also wants to make it clear he is interested in becoming a Major League manager when the opportunity presents itself. Gilliam spent the Winter managing San Juan of the Puerto Rican League and his team reached the semifinals of the league championship where it lost to eventual Caribbean Series champion Caguas. Gilliam has spent 23 seasons in the Dodger organization and has been with the parent club as a player and coach for 21 years. In 1953 he was selected the National League's Rookie of the Year. When Jim broke into organized baseball in 1951 with Montreal his manager was Walt Alston. For 22 of the past 23 seasons Gilliam and Alston have served on the same team (when Jim broke into the N.L. in 1953 Alston was managing Montreal). "Jim was a complete player," says Alston. "And he's also a complete coach." Gilliam has been a member of every Dodger World Championship team (1955, 1959, 1963 and 1965) and has been with six Dodger pennant-winning leams.

TOMMY LASORDA (born Sept. 22, 1927)..."You know what I bleed when I bleed?" asks Tommy Lasorda. Those who have been around Tommy know the answer. "Dodger Blue." Tommy is "Mr. Enthusiasm" of the Dodgers, He is perpetual motion, shouting words of encouragement to the Dodgers, taunting the opponents. Jim Murray of the Los Angeles Times offers this description: "Tom Lasorda is as noisy as a bowling alley, about as self-effacing as the Gabor sisters and as truculent as a tom cat." Tommy spent 14 seasons as a pitcher, most of that time on the Dodgers' Montreal club of the International League. "That pitching mound is what I call the 'hill of thrills'," says Tommy. Tommy was released as a player on July 9, 1960, and one day later signed as a Dodger scout. Tommy remained a scout until 1966 when he took the assignment of managing Ogden of the Pioneer League. In seven minor league seasons Tommy's teams won five pennants with one second place tie and one third place finish. In 1970 Tommy was voted the Minor League "Manager of the Year" as his Spokane team won the Pacific Coast League pennant by 26 games. Tommy has managed Licey to the Dominican League championship the past two winters and in 1972-1973 his Licey team won the Caribbean Series. Tommy signed his first baseball contract with the Philadelphia Phillies' Concord club of the North Carolina State League in 1945 but he was drafted by the Dodgers' organization in November of 1948 and Dodger Blue.

# The Dodgers-1974

AGEE, TOMMIE LEE

Born 8-9-42, Magnolía, Ala. Bats-R. Throws-R. Ht. 5-11. Wt. 185. Wife's name: Barbara. Children: Janeen. How obtained: Traded from the St. Louis Cardinals to Dodgers for pitcher Pete Richert, December 5, 1973.

Like many players, Tommie Agee has had his ups and downs in 12 Major League seasons. Both the Dodgers and Tommie are looking up as far as the 1974 season is concerned. A two-time American League All-Star and A.L. Rookie of the Year in 1966, Tommie has been plagued by injuries the past two years. However, the Dodgers know a healthy Agee will give them three pluses — power, speed, and defense, Tommie was signed by the Cleveland Indians for a reported \$65,000 off the Grambling College campus where he won a football scholarship. Prior to entering Grambling, Agee combined with Cleon Jones as the one-two high school punch in Mobile, Ala. Agee was a pitcher-shortstop in baseball, an end in football, forward in basketball and ran 9.7 in the 100-yard dash. He is one of 11 children (nine sisters). Last year Agee split the year between Houston and St. Louis and 22 of his 59 hits were for extra bases. Agee starred five years with the New York Mets. His finest year was 1970 when he hit .286 with 24 home runs, 75 runs batted in, and 31 stolen bases. He also had hitting streaks of 20 and 19 games and in one month hit 11 home runs. Agee also captured Gold Glove honors. Agee is best remembered as a hero for the "Miracle Mets" of 1969 when he paced them in the Championship Series and made two saving catches in the third game of the World Series.

### ALVAREZ, JESUS ORLANDO

Born 2-28-53, Cienega Baja, P.R. Bats-R. Throws-R. Ht. 6-0. Wt. 165. Single. How obtained: Signed by Dodgers as free agent in May, 1969.

There was no fluke to the first Major League hit of Orlando Alvarez, Pinchhitting on Sept. 2 at Dodger Stadium, Orlando slugged a double down the third base line. The slashing power of the swing flashed a potential of Major League stardom. "Orlando is a Clemente-type ballplayer," says former Dodger Don Le John, who was Orlando's manager at Waterbury (Conn.) of the Eastern League. "He'll hit anywhere from 15 to 18 to 20 home runs a season in the big leagues," predicts Le John. "All he's got to do is realize he has to hit the ball where it's pitched." Alvarez established a Waterbury record for runs batted in by driving home 106 (Richie Zisk of Pittsburgh had set the record at 88 in 1970), Orlando also led the league in hits with 139 and batted .303. He hit 16 home runs and stole 12 bases. Alvarez was selected to the Class AA All-Star team for 1973. "I want to do everything, home runs, RBI, average," says Alvarez. "I try to concentrate. I try to hit the ball hard." Orlando Alvarez wasted no time in showing Dodger fans he can hit the ball hard.

### AUERBACH, FREDERICK STEVEN

Born 2-15-50, Glendale, Calif. Bats-R. Throws-R. Ht. 6-D. Wt. 165. Single. How obtained: Purchased from the Milwaukee Brewers, October 27, 1973.

The Dodgers were looking for protection at shortstop in 1973. Rick Auerbach may be the man to fill that need in 1974. Bill Russell was the only National League infielder to play in all 162 games last year. Most players agree an occasional rest is beneficial. Russell should be able to take a break now and then with Auerbach around. Auerbach, purchased from the Milwaukee Brewers in October of 1973, should fill the need in fine fashion. And he won't be stepping into a new situation. He does possess a valuable asset for a shortstop—experience. Rick played the entire 1972 season as well as part of 1971 year at short for the Brewers. Last year at Albuquerque he was hampered most of the season by a pulled hamstring injury. Rick spent the winter playing for Licey of the Dominican Republic League. Auerbach possesses a great deal of speed. In 1972 at Milwaukee he stole 24 bases, seventh best in the American League. Dodger Stadium won't be a totally new surrounding for Auerbach. Rick, a graduate of Taff High School and Pierce College in Woodland Hills, has been an avid Dodger fan for several years.

### BREWER, JAMES THOMAS

Born 11-17-37, Merced, Calif. Bats-L. Throws-L. Ht. 6-1. Wt. 190. Wife's name and wedding date: Patricia (12-15-56). Children: Mark (10-8-58), Scott (11-6-62), Shanan (10-7-65). How obtained: Traded with catcher Cuno Barragan from the Chicago Cubs to Dodgers for pitcher Dick Scott, Dec. 13, 1963.

The 1973 baseball season was one of peaks and valleys for Jim Brewer, the even-tempered relief pitcher from Broken Arrow, Okla. The low points in-

cluded an uncertain Spring as Jim battled his way back from off-season arm surgery. And there was the struggle of early September when Jim's back bothered him so much he had to check into Centinela Valley Hospital to go into traction for three days. In the same season marked by physical pain, Jim experienced the thrill of being selected to the National League All-Star team for the first time in 14 campaigns. An even greater tribute to Jim's ability came in a compliment from Dodger manager Walt Alston. "I'd say Jim has earned the qualification as the best relief pitcher I've had," said Alston. "And I've had some pretty good ones." The term "save" became an official part of the baseball records in 1969. It is a statistic used to salute the work of baseball's relief pitcher. In the five seasons from 1969 through 1973 Jim Brewer has averaged 20 saves and 7 wins per year for the Dodgers. To put these figures in their proper perspective Brewer has taken part in nearly one of every three Dodger wins during the last five years. Brewer recorded 20 saves in 1973 and the only N.L. pitchers who had more were Mike Marshall (31) and New York's Tug McGraw (25).

The trademark of Bill Buckner as a hitter during the 1973 season was his consistency — with one glaring exception. Bill Buckner started the 1973 season by collecting only one hit in his first 15 at-bats during the Dodgers' first four games. Shaking loose from the spell, Buckner collected 9 hits in 18 at-bats during the next four games to bring his average to .303. "For some reason I was trying to be a slugger," said Buckner of his slow start. "I was holding the Lat down at the end and trying to pull everything. That's just not my style." The style of Bill Buckner is a keen eye and quick bat and it is a style which seems certain to one day place Bill among baseball's elite group of players who collect 200 hits in a season. Bill collected 158 hits in 1973, ranking third on the Dodger team behind Willie Davis (171) and Bill Russell (163). Buckner's competitive spirit often shows itself during the game in the form of a tossed helmet or bat. "That's just the way I am," he says. "I'm out to win. Sure I hear other guys getting on me. I must have been called 'hot dog' a thousand times. I couldn't care less. All I'm trying to do is win and I get wrapped up in it."

If a writer felt inspired to do a book on the third basemen in Los Angeles Dodger history he might want to toss around the title "From Gray to Cey." When the Los Angeles Dodgers played their first National League game in 1958 the starting third baseman was Dick Gray. Sixteen seasons and 45 third basemen later Ron Cey has supplied the power to half the merry-go-round. Cey slugged 15 home runs for the Dodgers and drove in 80 runs. In addition he provided defensive stability at third base by making only 18 errors. Cey's hottest streak of the season took place in mid-May as he batted .522 (12-for-23) during a one week period and drove in 10 runs to gain National League "Player of the Week" honors. On May 13th Cey went four-for-five against the Giants and drove in five runs. Ron is nicknamed "The Penguin." Jim Murray of the Los Angeles. Times observed: "They call him 'The Penguin' because he looks like something that came off a box of menthol cigarets or as if he was recruited by Admiral Byrd - splay-footed walk, square shoulders, bulging calves." He also looks like the Dodgers' third baseman for many years to come. Cey's 80 RBIs placed him second on the Dodgers and he ranked third on the club in home runs with just one less than Willie Davis and 10 fewer than team leader Joe Ferguson. Dodger third basemen combined to make 53 errors in 155 games in 1972. Cey made only 18 in 152 games.

The 1973 season was the most successful in the 10-year Major League career of Willie Murphy Crawford, age 27. He obtained a regular spot in the lineup and reached seasonal highs in runs (75), hits (135), home runs (14) runs batted in (66), stolen bases (12) and batting average (.295). What was to be Willie's most successful season started off in frustrating fashion. Crawford finished April with a batting average of .206, no home runs and only five runs batted in. And then came May, During the month of May Crawford batted .404 (38-for-94), hit five home runs (including his first Major League grandslam) and drove in 20 runs in 27 games. He had two four-hit games. He was a runaway selection as the National League's "Player of the Month." Willie led the Dodgers in scoring the winning run (18) and was second in driving home the decisive run (13). Willie's explanation for his success in 1973: "Over the last four years I couldn't relax. Dick Allen was here, and Frank Robinson. And Manny Mota was always hitting .300. I'd be in two or three days and out two or three days. It was a whole different way of playing baseball. And I'd never see lefthanders." Willie was an outstanding high school athlete at Fremont High in Los Angeles and his achievements gained him a great deal of publicity, including articles by a high school yearbook sports editor named Dee Johnson - now Mrs. Willie Crawford.

Youngsters such as Houston's Cesar Cedeno are blossoming and the Dodgers are hopeful that Henry Cruz will too. Cruz, who signed as a free agent, didn't have much luck in his pro debut. He suffered a broken leg in Spring training of 1971 and was on the disabled list for the year. Cruz' play during the past two years has earned him a spot on the Dodgers' 40-man roster and a shot at making the Majors -- a lifetime dream, Cruz, a graduate of Fajardo High School in Puerto Rico. starred on the baseball, track, basketball and volleyball teams in his prep days. Voted the most valuable player in baseball, Henry also excelled in track. His speed snapped prep records for the 100-yard dash and the 200-meter run. Before signing a Major League contract he attended Inter-American University where he majored in Eusiness administration and again participated in four sports. He etched his name in the track record books by setting the 200-meter run mark as well as establishing himself as the MVP in baseball and an all-star in basketball. Henry's speed on the bases and on the track has corresponded with his swiftness in advancing in the Dodger organization.

The following year he moved to Bakersfield and led the California League shortstops in assists (311) and double plays. He had his finest year in 1972 when he was selected to the All-Star team after leading the FSL in assists (452) and chances accepted (639). His greatest thrill came when he was honored as Topps Player of the Month for May in the Florida State League. The flashy 21-year-old shortstop batted .281 with eight doubles and 18 RBIs for the month and led his team to a first place standing. De Jesus has fine speed as evidenced in the past by an inside-the-park grand slam in 1972 as well as his 19 stolen bases last year. "He has great range and a fine arm," says Bill Schweppe, vice-president in charge of minor league operations. "The potential and determination are there, Ivan has the makings of a fine shortstop."

Now 32, Alphonso Erwin Downing wants to be back in the World Series. "There's no feeling like playing in a World Series," says Al. "That's what it's all about." Al got off to a good start in 1973 by winning five of his first six decisions. His best game was a twohit shutout victory over St. Louis on May 6th. It was Al's sixth two-hit victory, two with the Dodgers and four with the Yankees. Al also defeated the Cardinals on July 19th, giving him a record of 7-0 against St. Louis in National League games. Al also defeated Atlanta twice to run his lifetime record against the Braves to 5-0. Al is an excellent student of the game of baseball and one of his most important tips came from the immortal Satchel Paige. In 1960, when he was 19, Al pitched an exhibition game against a semipro team, the Wichita Weller Indians. The opposing pitcher was Paige, whom Downing later asked for advice. "Throw strikes, son, and keep the ball down," said Paige. Al has put the advice to good use.

Bruce Ellingsen figures the third time should be a charm. The past two years he has been sent to the minors on the final day of Spring training. In 1972 it was the California Angels who cut Bruce from their roster after it appeared he had won a spot as a relief pitcher. In that the Angels drafted Bruce from the Dodgers and decided not to keep the lefthander as part of their 25-man squad for 1972 the Dodgers were able to reclaim him. Bruce had a great season for the Dodgers' Albuquerque team in 1972 and it appeared he had won a berth with the Dodgers last Spring. Bruce, however, departed to the minors as the final day of Spring training arrived. Bruce figures he's due for good news this time around. "I've proved I can pitch in double A and in triple A," he says. "I proved I can pitch in the Dominican winter league which is a high level of baseball. Now I want to prove I can pitch in the majors." Bruce has spent the past three seasons in the Pacific Coast League while perfecting his talents as a relief pitcher and working in the amazing total of 121 games during this time. Bruce was a starting pitcher until the Spring of 1971. That's when Tom Haller busted Bruce's jaw with a line drive. By the time Ellingsen was wired back together the PCL season had started and Spokane's starting staff was set. So Tom Lasorda, then the manager, sent Bruce to the bullpen. Bruce is nicknamed "Little Pod" due to a similarity in mannerisms between himself and former Dodger lefthander Johnny Podres. Bruce hopes one day he will be compared with Jim Brewer, the Dodgers' relief ace who has taught Bruce the technique of throwing the screwball.

### FERGUSON, JOE VANCE

Joe Ferguson's first hit of 1973 was a home run. And so was his second, His third hit was a double, as was his fourth and his fifth. His first eight hits of the season produced seven runs. Joe Ferguson had picked up where he left off in a record-breaking Winter League season. And he kept right on going. When the 1973 season was complete Ferguson had established a Los Angeles Dodger record for catchers by hitting 25 home runs and driving in 88 runs, leading the Dodgers in both departments. Joe also set a Major League record for catchers by making only three errors during the season while compiling a .996 fielding average. Ferguson's power accomplishments are even more remarkable when it's realized he was out of the lineup from June 21 through July 9th due to a fracture of the right thumb. "I think Joe Ferguson is one of the best young power hitters to come into our league in some time," declared Cincinnati manager Sparky Anderson. "He has a chance to hit over 30 homers. He can be the same type of power hitter as Johnny Bench." Joe's successful season with the Dodgers was preceded by a Winter League campaign in which he established a Venezuelan League record by driving in 63 runs. Of all of the runs produced by Ferguson none was more dramatic than a two-out, two-run homer in Chicago on August 19th to defeat the Cubs 2-1. And, just to top off the day, Joe picked Don Kessinger off second base in the bottom of the ninth. Ferguson led the Dodgers in gamewinning hits with 17, including six home runs, and only Pittsburgh's Willie Stargell had more game-winning hits in the N.L. Joe hit 13 of his home runs at Dodger Stadium. The only Dodger to hit more homers in one season at Dodger Stadium was Tommy Davis (14 in 1962).

Some players look upon the assignment of pinch-hitting as punishment. Steve Garvey saw it as an opportunity. Some players complain when the word platoon is mentioned. Steve Garvey smiled and said thanks. After more than two months of the 1973 season Garvey had started less than a dozen games. His role had been that of the pinch-hitter and he met the assignment with success by collecting 10 hits in his first 24 appearances. His pinch-hitting ability finally earned him a chance to break into the lineup against left-handed pitchers. "I thought the pinch-hitting was a stepping stone to getting into the lineup," said Steve. Batting ,228 on June 15th, Steve had an opportunity to start on June 23rd and hit safely in 9 of 10 games to increase his average to .315. He kept his average near .300 for the remainder of the season and finished with a .304 mark. A third baseman in his first five years of professional baseball. Steve saw most of his action at first base in 1973. He showed remarkable ability, particularly when it came to digging balls out of the dirt. "I think first base is my position," says Steve. "In the past most of my errors have been throwing errors and not fielding errors. Walt Alston thinks first base is my strongest position too," Steve's .304 batting average was the highest among Dodgers who played in 100 or more games and he also led the Dodgers in pinch-hitting with an amazing .400 average (12-for-30).

John Hale is a Dodger with power potential. "He's as strong as a bull," says Bill Schweppe, vice-president in charge of minor league operations. At 6-2, 205, Hale had his finest year in 1973 and showed the power he is capable of supplying. Hale batted .264 for Bakersfield while hitting 10 homers and driving in 67 runs. The 20-year-old Hale was a prep star at Wasco (Calif.) Union High where he played baseball, basketball and football and won all-league honors in all three sports in his senior year. In leading the baseball team to the league championship while batting .510 and playing third base Hale was voted the Most Valuable Player of the league. Hale has since switched positions with experience at first base and in the outfield. "He's a Johnny Mize type hitter," says Schweppe. "Hale runs quite fast for a big man and has a fine arm. And his improvement over the last three years has been quite noticeable."

Heydeman did get a chance in the big leagues when he was called up late in the year. Prior to that he picked up a few laurels and raves as he was selected the Eastern League's outstanding pitcher of the year. Earlier in the year he was selected to start for the American Division All-Stars, His live fastball enabled him to lead the league in strikeouts as he whiffed 179 in 155 innings while earning an 11-10 mark for the year and compiling an earned run average of 3.19, just one-hundredth of a point off the league title. A native of California, Greg pitched a no-hitter in college at Monterey Peninsula where he was 9-3 with an earned run average if 0.94. He also earned honors as Coast Conference Player of the Year as well as earning berths on the All-Northern California and All-State teams before signing with the Dodgers.

Charlie Hough admits he's a one-pitch pitcher. Fortunately for Charlie the one pitch can go up or down, right or left. Charlie Hough throws a knuckleball. "It's a little scary going out on the mound with only one pitch," says Charlie. "I know I'm going to throw the knuckleball and the batter knows it. But if it's a good one the batter isn't going to hit it anyway." It is the knuckleball which has carried Charlie Hough to the Dodgers. He had brief flings with the Dodgers in 1970, 1971 and 1972 but the 1973 season was Charlie's first full year in the Majors. Charlie first toyed with the knuckleball in the Arizona Instructional League of 1969. "I hurt my arm in 1969 in Albuquerque. I guess mediocre is a pretty good description of my pitching at the time. I went to Arizona that Winter and the first day down there Goldie Holt (Dodger scout) asked me if I'd ever thought about the knuckleball. That's when it all started." Hough says of learning to throw the knuckleball: "It's the hardest thing I've ever had to do." The Dodgers are hopeful opposing batters will find Hough's knuckler the

hardest thing they have ever had to hit. The 1973 season could prove to be the turning point in Charlie's career as a relief pitcher. Despite the fact he appeared in a total of 37 games he didn't lose a game after July 1, pitching in 19 games after that date. Charlie finished the season very strongly, giving up only two earned runs in 16 innings (1.69 ERA) in his final seven games beginning Sept. 13. Charlie ranked third among the Dodger relief pitchers with five saves and he recorded 70 strikeouts in 71.2 innings.

The phrase "good things come in small packages" is evident when the Dodgers speak of Rex Hudson, Hudson, one of the smallest pitchers on the roster, makes up for his size with his arm - an arm the Dodgers hope will bring big things in the future. The future may be now for Rex, who has looked superb with his large assortment of pitches since coming into the Dodger fold. Although Hudson didn't have the numbers to make his won-lost mark sparkle at Waterbury last year (9-12), he did have other statistics and bright spots during 1973. In 181 innings of pitching he fanned 151 batters and had an earned run mark of 3.43. Of the 27 games he started Rex completed 11 and at one stage of the season had six straight complete games. His high strikeout game and best performance of the year saw him strike out 17 Sherbrooke batters in pitching a five hit 1-0 win in 11 innings. A high strikeout ratio is nothing new for Rex, who started out with a bang in his first year with the Dodgers at Ogden. He set down 127 men on strikes in 90 innings to lead the league and in one span had 68 strikeouts in 44 innings spinning games of 16, 14, 13, 13 and 12. Hudson, who was all-state and all-city at Nathan Hale High School in Tulsa, Okla., could prove to be a pleasant surprise package in 1974.

Many fans will remember Tommy John's 1973 season for the manner in which he finished as he won his final five decisions to reach a career high of 16 wins. Whereas Tommy's finish is deserving of recognition the Dodgers may never have got started without him. The Dodgers lost their first two games of the season before Tommy turned back San Diego 4-0. Then came four more losses in a row before T.J. defeated Atlanta 6-3. One week into the National League schedule the Dodgers were 2-6 and Tommy John was 2-0. Stopping Dodger skids was nothing new for Tommy. In his first Dodger season in 1972 eight of Tommy's first eight victories came after Dodger defeats. Over-all in 1972 eight of Tommy's wins came after the Dodgers had lost. Again last season eight of Tommy's vins came after Dodger defeats in the previous game. Tommy's 3,10 earned run average was the best among the Dodgers' starting lefthanded pitchers. All in all it was an outstanding season for Tommy, particularly since he had undergone off-season surgery for the removal of bone fragments in his left elbow. "When they operated on my arm I asked the doctor if he could put a Koufax fastball in there," kids Tommy. "Well, he did, but it was a Mrs. Koufax fastball." Von Joshua was sure the 1973 season was going to be HIS season. He had won the Pacific Coast League batting championship in 1972 and followed this up by winning the Dominican League batting title. More confident and relaxed in the Spring, Von won a spot with the Dodgers and in the second game of the season — at San Diego — he received a chance to pinch hit and singled to produce a run. Von was on his way. The pinch single earned him a chance to start the next night and Von went two-for-five and had himself a starting position in left field. In the Dodgers' first five wins Von drove home the winning run twice — including a three-run homer to beat Atlanta 6-2 on April 15. Through games of that date Von was batting .348. At last, Von had received his big break and had made the most of it. Then came the break that turned the entire season around. On April 16th Von was struck by a fastball thrown by Houston's Ken Forsch and Joshua suffered a broken bone in his left wrist. He was placed on the disabled list and didn't return to action until May 24. "I was just starting to feel comfortable and get my confidence," said Von of the injury. Von made several starts for the Dodgers in June but by the end of the month his average had dipped to .253. His starting assignments in July and August were few. By Sept. 6 Von was batting .229 but he had the opportunity to play more during the final stages of the season and finished with 8 hits in his last 19 at-bats to bring his season average to .252. It was not a season to judge the ability of Joshua. "I know I can hit if I play regularly," says Von. "Manny Mota has helped me a lot with my hitting. He's really worked with me in hitting the ball to the opposite field." Von regards himself as a line drive hitter and he has found a lighter bat works best for him. The Dodgers' line on Von is that he will be an outstanding hitter.

The darkest day for Cincinnati in 1973 happened to be one of the few bright days for Lee Lacy. It was the final day of June and Lee singled in the 13th inning to produce a run and an 8-7 Dodger victory over the Reds. The defeat was the eighth in 11 games for the Reds and they dropped 11 games behind the Dodgers. Then came July and the start of the Reds' comeback. For Lee Lacy it was the start of the most frustrating period in a frustrating season. Lee didn't have another hit (going to bat only eight times) until August 13th when he went two-for-four against Houston. In 1972 Lee had made his initial Major League start for the Dodgers on June 30th and proceeded to hit safely in 12 of his first 13 games. He was in solid as a starter until Cincinnati's Hal McRae knocked the legs from under him in a game on Sept. 4. Lee spent the Winter working his left knee back into shape and won a starting spot at second base in the Spring after a battle with Davey Lopes. Lee started the first 16 games at second base for the Dodgers but Lopes got a chance to play on April 22nd and Davey took over the job with a sizzling bat. The Dodgers hadn't had a rookie start as fast as Lopes since, well, since Lee Lacy in 1972. Lee, who won All-Star honors at three different infield positions in the minors, remains confident. "I just know I can play," he says. "I'm not saying anything about trading me or anything like that. But I just know I can do the job."

One of the things which makes Davey Lopes an outstanding athlete is his ability to retain his cool while others get heated. When Lopes was leading the National League in batting in May with .370-plus averages the news media kept a closer eye on Davey than opposing ptichers. "I'm not a .370 hitter," Davey told the reporters. "I'm not sure what I'll hit but it won't be ,370," And when Lopes stole 13 bases in his first 13 attempts of 1973 he was referred to as "another Maury Wills," Replied Davey: "I'm not in the same category with Maury. Maury has helped me but I'm not Maury Wills," While Davey refused to get excited about his peak performances his steady play in the field and tremendous speed on the bases produced great excitement for Dodger fans in 1973. Dave accomplished in 1973 what he thought he could do, batting .275 and stealing 36 bases. He was selected as the second baseman on the Topps Major League Rookie All-Star team. Even in the Spring of 1973 the remarkably mature Lopes kept his cool in a hot battle for second base with Lee Lacy. "Whoever wins the job had better not falter," said Davey. "The other will be standing right there ready to had better not taiter, said Davey. The other will be said and the proceeded take over." When Davey received a chance to start on April 22nd he proceeded to hit safely in 26 of the next 31 games and was batting .341 at the close of May, He also had put a lock on the second base job. Lopes' hitting was remarkably consistent. His longest streak without a hit was four games. Every time it appeared his average might falter Davey came back with a hot streak. He never lost his cool.

National League batters have found it almost impossible to figure out Mike Marshall's screwball. Marshall says there's a logical answer to the secret of the screwball-kinesiology. Webster defines kinesiology as "the study of the principles of mechanics and anatomy in relation to human movement." Marshall is enough of an expert on kinesiology to have taught it at Michigan State University. Since 1960 Mike has spent his off-seasons in pursuit of a Ph.D. at Michigan State. His major is physiology and he has done his course work in physiological psychology. In the summers Mike has spent his time studying and working against the batters in the National League. He was so successful last season he finished second in the voting for the Cy Young Award and was fifth (and the first pitcher listed) in the balloting for the Most Valuable Player. Mike established a Major League record in 1973 by appearing in 92 games for the Montreal Expos. He led the N.L. in games saved with 31 and had a record of 14-11, thus having a hand in 45 of Montreal's 79 victories. Mike became a Dodger during the Winter meetings in Houston as a result of the trade which sent Willie Davis to the Expos. Despite his record-setting performance in 1973 Mike says "my arm was never sore, never fired or never fatigued. The secret is training and the secret to training is specificity. I jog four miles every day, I have an intricate, well-designed program." Mike began his career as a shortstop and then switched to the mound in 1965. It was the screwball pitch which propelled Mike to the majors. And it is the screwball pitch-and kinesiology-which has established him as the league's finest relief pitcher.

Terry McDermott is confident he can play in the Major Leagues if he can get through a season where he can play without being hampered by injuries. In five seasons of professional baseball Terry has been bothered more by injuries than opposing pitchers. Nevertheless the Dodgers are firm in their conviction a healthy Terry McDermott is a definite Major League player. Terry played in 99 games with Albuquerque last season, the most games he has played in a season since launching his career with Ogden in 1969. Terry batted .260 for Albuquerque, collecting six home runs and driving in 43 runs. Terry has made a steady climb in the Dodgers' minor league system and his combined average is an impressive .295. The Dodgers' No. 1 draft selection in June of 1969, Terry was a star catcher at St. Agnes High on Long Island but he was switched to first base after his initial professional season. Terry's best season was in 1972 when he batted .343 for El Paso of the Texas League and earned a late season promotion to the Dodgers (collecting 3 hits in 23 at-bats as a 21-year-old rookie.) "My greatest thrill was playing in that first Major League game," says Terry. Terry was one of the greatest prep athletes in the history of St. Agnes, winning All-America honors in baseball and all-state honors in both baseball and basketball. He attends St. John's University in the off-season.

"Considering the number of times he went to bat, I've never had a player deliver more in the clutch." The man speaking was Walter Alston, who has managed the Dodgers for 20 seasons. The reference was to Ken McMullen. There are two ways to look at Ken McMullen's season. He played in only 42 games and had 21 hits, 95 fewer games and 106 fewer hits than Ken had in 1972. But

when Ken was asked to go to bat he delivered. Exactly one third of his hits won games for the Dodgers, And four of his seven game-winning hits came as a pinch-hitter. Ken batted .316 as a pinch-hitter (9-for-16) and drove in nine runs. McMullen had a flare for dramatic achievements as all four of his game-winning hits as a pinch-hitter came in the Dodgers' final at-bat. None of Ken's hits was more dramatic than a two-out, two-run homer in the bottom of the ninth inning to beat Montreal on August 14th. "Considering the circumstances of don't think I've ever had a bigger hit," said Ken. Few people were aware of the circumstances of Ken's season. Not until August was it revealed Ken's wife, Bobbie, had cancer and had undergone surgery in May for the malignancy. Ken admitted he considered quitting baseball to be with Bobbie but his wife had talked him out of It. The season started on a frustrating note for Ken as he was batting .368 on April 12th when he was forced out of the lineup with a bad back. Ron Cey took over at third base and won the position. Ken didn't receive another chance to start until Cey was injured in a game with Cincinnati on June 23rd. McMullen stepped in and beat the Reds with a three-run homer and proceeded to hit three homers in three games and had a pair of game-winning hits against the Reds.

### MESSERSMITH, JOHN ALEXANDER

Born 8-6-45, Toms River, N.J. Bats-R. Throws-R. Ht. 6-1. Wt. 200. Single. How obtained: Traded with Ken McMullen from California Angels to Dodgers for outfielder Frank Robinson, infielders Bill Grabarkewitz and Bobby Valentine and pitchers Bill Singer and Mike Strahler, Nov. 28, 1972.

One of the cliches of baseball is to say a "pitcher was better than his record indicates." Ironically the cliche fits Andy Messersmith, a crossword puzzle addict who works at improving his vocabulary and hates cliches. Messersmith's record was 14-10. He was better than that. Andy's 2.70 earned run average was the eighth best in the National League among pitchers involved in 10 or more decisions. He recorded 177 strikeouts, tying for fifth in the N.L. In typical Messersmith fashion Andy finished strongly as he won seven of 11 decisions beainning on July 12th and recorded wins in his final three outings. Andy's four defeats after July 12 came in games which the Dodgers lost by scores of 1-0, 5-1, 4-0 and 2-0. In two of the games Andy yielded only two earned runs and in another loss during this period he gave up only one earned run. In Messersmith's 10 losses during the season the Dodgers scored a total of 13 runs. Andy's strong finish was no surprise. In five American League seasons his second half record was a combined 41-18, a winning percentage of .695. Andy placed his name in the record book on May 28th when he struck out Philadelphia's first six batters to set a N.L. mark and tie a Major League record for consecutive whiffs at the start of a game. Andy finished the game with 12 strikeouts, his season high and one away from his career high, In 19 of his 33 starts Andy yielded two or fewer earned runs, And yet in these 19 games Andy had three losses and six no-decisions. If you're figuring out a crossword puzzle and come across the clue "Outstanding Pitcher" and find 11 spaces to work with here's the answer - MESSERSMITH.

Nine players entered the 1973 season with lifetime batting averages of .300plus compiled during 10 or more years. These are the men who have been baseball's best hitters — Tony Oliva, Hank Aaron, Matty Alou, Pete Rose, Willie Mays, Joe Torre, Al Kaline and Frank Robinson. Oh yes, and Manny Mota — the man who always seems to be overlooked. Of the elite group, only Pete Rose — who won a National League batting championship — had a better average than Manny's .314 mark last season. Batting .300-plus has become old hat for Mota, particularly during his days as a Dodger. Traded to the Dodgers in June of 1969, Manny batted .323 as a Dodger that season. He hit .305 in 1970. .312 in 1971, and .323 in 1972. It all adds up to a .311 average for Manny during five Dodger seasons. Furthermore, he has increased his lifetime average to .303 and now only four players — Oliva, Aaron, Matty Alou and Rose — have superior lifetime averages to Mota during 10-plus seasons. A modest man, Mota admits to two ambitions—(1) playing on a pennant-winning team and (2) winning a batting championship. "The batting title would be nice," says Manny, "but winning the pennant is the most important thing." One of Manny's dreams was fulfilled last season when he was selected to the N.L. All-Star team. Manny was thrilled by the selection, although it wasn't as if he had received an undeserved honor. After all, when a man is leading the league in batting with a .351 mark at All-Star time he's deserving of honors. Manny's biggest roadplock to the batting title is not opposing pitchers but instead the statistical column fitled "AB" (at bats). It takes 502 appearances to qualify for a batting title and Manny has never achieved this mark in a dozen Major League seasons. So Manny settles for .300-plus seasons and continues his dream to help produce a pennant.

The thing the Dodgers like about Rick Nitz is his ability to complete a job. Rick split the 1973 season between Waterbury and Albuquerque and he completed 10 of 27 starts. In 1972 Rick recorded 10 complete games at Bakersfield in 28 starts. Not bad statistics for a 21-year-old pitcher just four seasons removed from his high school days at Hoover High in Glendale (Calif.). Rick has had a steady march up the Dodgers' minor league ladder since his start with Ogden of the Rookie League in 1970. "He has great control and he knows how to pitch well for a young man," says Al Campanis, the Dodgers' vice-president in charge of player personnel. Rick figures his improvement has been in two areas—size and savvy. "I'm stronger than ever," he says. "I've grown about two inches since high school days and I weigh more. I'm 6-3 and 195 pounds. Second, I've learned a lot about pitching. In high school I relied almost completely on my fastball. Now I've added a slider and I have better control of the curveball than I've had before. Also I've come up with a change. I'm more aware of setting the hitter up for the pitch I want to throw." Rick was graduated from Hoover High in 1970 and was selected the Most Valuable Player of the Foothill League that season. In 1972 he won All-Star honors at Bakersfield, leading the league in innings pitched with 211 and in wins with 18.

Tom Paciorek has been a college All-America baseball player and the best player in the minor leagues. He has spent a half-dozen seasons preparing for what he hopes will arrive in 1974 — a chance to play regularly. "I want to play and I think I deserve the chance," says Tom. There is reason behind Paciorek's confidence, In three minor league seasons (1970-72) he drove in the amazing total of 320 runs and in 1972 was selected as The Sporting News' "Minor League Player of the Year," Paciorek's potential as a Major League player was revealed in September of last season. In 24 games in the final month Tom batted .298 (25-for-84), hit four home runs and drove in 14 runs including two to win games for the Dodgers, He increased his over-all average from .234 entering September to a final .262. Tom hit safely in 18 of the 24 games in the final month, including an eight-game hitting streak and a six-game streak to close the season. A native of Detroit, Tom was graduated from St. Ladislaus High where he was a three-sport letterman (baseball, football and basketball). He played baseball and football at the University of Houston, twice gaining All-America honors in baseball. He helped defeat Michigan State (and a halfback named Steve Garvey) in a 1967 football upset and he was the ninth-round draft choice of the Miami Dolphins. Tom entertains his teammates in the clubhouse with impersonations of John Wayne, Liberace, Ed Sullivan and Flip Wilson's Geraldine. He's now hoping to entertain Dodger fans with a performance which won't be an impersonation. It will be the real Tom Paciorek, super slugger.

His name is Kevin Patrick Pasley. His hair is red and his face is freckled. It comes as no surprise he has the reputation of a battler. He's also a Major League prospect. Asked to sum up Kevin Pasley's future in a couple of words, veteran Dodger minor league manager Stan Wasiak replied: "Definite Prospect." At age 20 Kevin Pasley has played three seasons of professional baseball. He has advanced from Medford of the Northwest League to Daytona Beach of the Florida State League to Waterbury of the Eastern League. In fact Pasley reached the Major League plateau when he was called up by the Dodgers last September. Kevin didn't get into a game with the Dodgers but it appears only a matter of time before he makes the breakthrough as a Major League catcher. "This kid is a battler," says Wasiak. "At age 18 he was the team leader at Daytona Beach." Kevin was selected the Florida State League All-Star catcher in 1972 and was voted Daytona Beach's Most Valuable Player, "I've always liked catching," says

Kevin "I guess it began when I was about eight and in Little League." Kevin was signed by the Dodgers after being graduated from Chaminade High School in Mineola, New York, where he won all-league honors in baseball, basketball and football. He batted .432 in his senior year. Kevin credits Dodger scout Guy Wellman for improvement as a catcher. "Guy helped me defensively and with my throwing," says Kevin. "He also helped me with the technique of catching."

Doug Rau's role with the Dodgers last season was one of the most difficult in baseball — spot starter and occasional relief pitcher. Even so, Doug managed to contribute four victories and three saves to the Dodgers' season. "It isn't easy to stay sharp the way Doug was used," says Dodger manager Walt Alston. "But he hasn't complained. He's a hard worker and he has a future with this team." There seems to be no question about Rau having a bright future with the Dodgers, Doug feels his best chance to crack the Dodgers' starting rotation will come in the Spring of 1974. "It's not going to be easy but I think I can make it," he says. The more Doug pitched in 1973 the better he looked. He received an opportunity to start against Cincinnati in the second game of a doubleheader on July 1 and yielded only five hits and two runs in six and two-third innings. Rau's next start didn't come until the final day of August when he went eight innings against Houston, giving up only one run and four hits. Doug didn't have a decision in either game. Rau flashed his potential in his very first start as a Dodger on Sept. 2 of 1972 after being promoted from Albuquerque. Doug defeated St. Louis 5-1 on a three-hitter. Doug was graduated from Texas A & M in 1971, earning academic All-American honors (he had a grade point average of 3.85) and a bachelor of science degree in economics.

If Rick Rhoden's initial professional outing is indicative of things to come the Los Angeles Dodgers soon will have another strikeout king. Rick, the Dodgers' first selection in the June draft of 1971, was an instant hit in Daytona Beach, Fla. In his first pro start he fanned 13 Tampa batters and pitched a shutout. Strikeouts are nothing new to Rhoden. At Atlantic High in Delray Beach, Fla., he struck out 20 batters in an eight inning game and also had a total of 19 in a seven inning contest. In American Legion play he had 77 strikeouts in only 37 innings. But strikeouts aren't everything. "He has a major league fastball and outstanding control," says Bill Schweppe, vice-president in charge of minor league operations. Rick didn't get started in baseball until he was 14 years old. At the age of eight he injured his right knee and an infection developed into osteomyelitis. During the next four years he underwent treatments and had to wear a brace on his leg. Rick's determination to play professional baseball and his willingness to work has made him a "can't miss" prospect. Rick missed the last month of the 1973 season at Albuquerque with a minor arm problem but he came back in the Arizona Instructional League to dispell any thoughts his arm isn't sound by winning All-Star honors.

Jerry Royster has the nickname of "The Bird." Actually he's a very rare bird - one of those athletes who was passed up by every Major League team in the free agent draft and yet reached the Majors. Despite an outstanding athletic career at Sacramento High School, Jerry was not selected in the free agent draft of 1970. The man who saw the potential of Royster was Dodger scout Ray Perry. Perry died last summer before Royster broke in with the Dodgers. On August 14th Royster was batting ,302 for Albuquerque at the time he was called up by the Dodgers, almost three years to the day he was signed by Perry. The Dodgers not only are confident Royster will play regularly in the Majors, they feel he could play any one of several positions. A third baseman for Albu-querque at the start of the 1973 season, Royster was shifted to shortstop during the Summer to gain experience as a possible backup for Bill Russell upon being promoted to the Dodgers. Royster received further experience at shortstop during the Arizona Instructional League. The Dodgers are confident Royster will hit with consistency and Jerry's range is the best among Dodger third basemen.

Bill Russell was the best shortstop in the Majors in 1973. Who says so? The Major League players say so. In a poll of the players conducted by the Newspaper Enterprise Association, Russell finished first in the voting at shortstop with Chris Speier of San Francisco second and Bert Campaneris of Oakland third. No player contributed more to the success of the Dodgers in 1973 than Russell. He was the only infielder in the National League to play in all of his team's games (162; Montreal outfielder Ken Singleton also played in 162 games). Russell was the leader of an infield which went from porous in 1972 to proficient in 1973. Of shortstops in the National League who played in more than 100 games Russell had the best batting average— .265. Chicago's Don Kessinger batted .262, New York's Ken Harrelson .258 and San Francisco's Speier .249. He was the only shortstop in the N.L. to pass the 200 figure in total bases and his mark of 207 tied him for third on the Dodgers. Russell was second on the Dodgers in hits with 163, including seven game-winning hits. Russell's batting average was over the .270 mark from May 27th through Sept. 1 and he was above .300 during early July. It was on defense, however, where Russell excelled as he showed the ability to cover a great deal of ground and a rifle arm. Russell's outstanding season got off to a shaky start as he was booed in an early season game after some rough plays at shortstop. Walter Alston remained with Russell. And when Russell was voted the best shortstop in the Majors there had to be a lor of satisfaction for both Alston and Russell.

Lumberjacking has been a big factor in Greg Shanahan's success in baseball. No, Greg isn't sawing bats in half-he's just putting holes in opposing hitter's swings. It all started in 1969 when Greg donned a lumberjack's uniform. "That's when I filled out physically," he says. The righthander, who stands 6-2 and weighs 190, has been quite physical from a batter's standpoint. With the addition of a slider last Winter to go with his fastball, palmball and change-up, Greg has been baffling the batters. Over his four-year minor league career he has averaged more than 150 strikeouts per year and has been a workhorse. Greg usually is around to finish the work he has started. Last year at Albuquerque he tied for the league lead in complete games with 14. Shanahan pitched 198 innings and had a 12-12 record with 160 strikeouts before being called to Los Angeles where he proved an effective reliever. In 15 it nings of work ha fanned 11 and had an earned run mark of 3.37 without a decision. In 1972 Greg set an all-time El Paso record as he pitched 321/3 consecutive shutout innings and Lecame the first pitcher in El Paso history to post consecutive shutouts at Dudley Field.

Solomon, who hopes to pattern his pitching after his idol, Bob Gibson of the St. Louis Cardinals, baffled opposing hitters during Spring training and thus earned the "Dearie Mulvey Award" as the outstanding rookie in the Dodgers' camp, However the award and his outstanding statistics of the Spring—0.00 earned run average in 13 innings—didn't earn Eddie a ticket to Los Angeles. The Dodgers instead picked up veteran reliever George Culver prior to the season opener and Eddie was sent to Albuquerque where he would get to pitch often. The 22-year-old righthander was discovered by Dodger scout Rudy Rufer in 1969 while playing for the semi-pro Warner Robins Jets. The Cincinnati Reds, New York Mets and several other clubs showed an interest in the hard-throwing prospect. However the Dodgers were first in line. Solomon and his family were flown to Los Angeles where Dodger executives Al Campanis and Ben Wade took a look at Eddie. One look was all it look and Solomon became a Dodger. Last year al Albuquerque Eddie recorded a 9-12 mark in 178 innings. He fanned 133 and had an ERA of 4.25 before getting called to Los Angeles. Eddie is ready to stay in Los Angeles. "My main problem before was my rhythm," Solomon says. "I just couldn't find a groove, Now I feel I'm ready." And the Dodgers are ready for Eddie.

The success of Don Sutton's season is reflected in his statistics. His 2,42 earned run average was second to Tom Seaver of the New York Mets (2,08) among pitchers who worked in more than 150 innings. Sutton recorded 200 strikeouts to finish fourth in the National League and his 14 complete games tied him for fourth in the N.L. He led the Dodgers in victories (18), ERA, innings pitched (256.1), and strikeouts and tied for first on the staff in games started (33) and shutouts (3). In Don's 10 losses the Dodgers suffered four one-run defeats (scores of 5-4, 4-3, 2-1 and 3-2) and they were defeated by two runs on three occasions. Although Don had some late season shoulder problems he showed in his final effort that he is sound by beating Atlanta 5-1 on a four-hitter. The victory clinched second place for the Dodgers and Don kept Henry Aaron hitless in four at-bats. "I felt good tonight," said Aaron after the game. "But I ran into somebody a little better. When Sutton has his control he ranks up there with Tom Seaver as the best right-hander in the league," When it came time to vote for the National League's Cy Young Award winner, Sutton was right there with the elite of the league, Seaver won the award with Sutton finishing fifth in the voting. In a poll of the players by Newspaper Enterprise Association, Sutton was selected as one of the top five pitchers in the Majors along with Seaver, Ron Bryant (San Francisco), Jim Palmer (Baltimore) and Jim Hunter (Oakland).

Jimmy Wynn is one of those rare baseball players who has the ability to both hit with power and steal bases. He has hit as many as 37 home runs in a season and he has stolen as many as 43 bases. In 11 Major League seasons he has hit 223 home runs, ranking seventh among active players in the National League. Wynn's explosive bat has earned him the title of "The Toy Cannon." In 1974 the shots of the "Cannon" will be fired on behalf of the Dodgers as a result of a trade which sent pitcher Claude Osleen to Houston. Wynn's power has been evident to the crowds at Dodger Stadium. He has hit 13 home runs at Dodger Stadium, ranking third among opposing players to Atlanta's Hank Aaron (22) and Pittsburgh's Willie Stargell (15). Jimmy hit six home runs at Dodger Stadium in 1967, the high mark for an opposing player in one season. With the Astros in 1973 Jimmy slugged 20 home runs, drove in 90 runs and stole 14 bases. During the past nine years he has averaged 24 home runs per season. "I've always liked Los Angeles and playing in Dodger Stadium," says Wynn. "I'm happy to get away from the astroturf and the Astrodome," In addition to being an exciting hitter, Jimmy is regarded as a solid defensive performer. He had a fielding average of .986 last season, making only four errors in 139 games. His lifetime fielding average is .979.

At the conclusion of the 1973 season the Dodger management discussed the possibility of moving catcher Joe Ferguson to the outfield. Ferguson is regarded as one of the outstanding young catchers in the Major Leagues and there's only one reason the Dodgers would consider a change in positions for Joe. The reason is Steve Yeager. "Many clubs are desperate to come up with a good young catcher," says Al Campanis, the Dodgers' vice-president in charge of player personnel. "We are fortunate to have two." While Ferguson's forte is hitting, Yeager excels on defense. "The most important aspects besides catching the ball and throwing it are calling the game and keeping everyone on their toes," says When Ferguson was sidelined by a fracture of his right hand last year it was Yeager who stepped in and helped keep the Dodgers on their toes. Ferguson was injured on June 20th and at that time the Dodgers led the N.L. by three games. Yeager took over as the starting Dodger catcher and when Joe returned to the lineup on July 10th the Dodger lead was 41/2. The Dodgers won 11 of 20 games when Ferguson was sidelined and although Yeager's average slipped from .286 to .207 during the time he did an excellent job as a receiver. For the second straight season Yeager finished strongly as a hitter. He was batting only .200 on July 5th but he hit safely in 15 of his final 18 games (18-for-54—.333) to increase his over-all average to .254. "Steve's hitting in August and September was most encouraging," said Dodger manager Walt Alston.

Geoff Zahn always will associate the last game of the 1973 season with a first. Drawing his initial Major League starting assignment in the Dodgers' season finale at San Diego on Sept. 29, Zahn limited the Padres to one run in five innings and gained his first Major League win. The Dodgers figure it will be the first of many Major League wins for Zahn. Geoff is a "rookie" only in terms of classification. He is 27 years old, a graduate of the University of Michigan where he was an outstanding pitcher and a veteran of six minor league seasons. He has prepared himself well for what he hopes is a long Major League career. "He knows how to pitch," says Bill Schweppe, the Dodgers' vice-president in charge of minor league operations. "He's not overpowering but he's a very smart pitcher." Zahn had a 13-8 record at Albuquerque before his contract was purchased by the Dodgers on Sept. 1. He had a combined 17-3 mark in 1972 as he split the season between El Paso (7-2) and Albuquerque (10-1). "I have more confidence than ever on my ability to control my pitches," says Zahn. "I change speeds. I don't like a batter to get a look at the same pitch twice."

QUALIFICATION FOR BATTING CHAMPIONSHIP - highest batting average and 502 or more plate appearances.

QUALIFICATION FOR PITCHING CHAMPIONSHIP - lowest ERA and 162 or more innings pitched.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR A "ROOKIE" — not more than 45 days on a major league roster between opening day and Sept. 1, and has not exceeded 130 official Al-Bats (or 50 innings pitched).

QUALIFICATIONS FOR A SAVE — The Playing Rules Committee has adopted a new "Save Rule" for relief pitchers, effective in 1974. Under the new rule, a relief pitcher shall be credited with a save when, in entering the game, he finds the potential tying or winning run on base or at the plate or pitches at least three effective innings and, in either case, preserves the lead. When more than one relief pitcher qualifies for a save under the provisions of this rule, the save shall be credited to the relief pitcher judged by the scorer to have been the most effective. It is not mandatory to credit a save. Only one save can be credited in any game.

### DODGER STADIUM INFORMATION

The season of 1973 marked the 12th year of Dodger Stadium.

The first game ever played at Dodger Stadium was on April 10, 1962. The Dodgers lost to Cincinnati by a score of 6-3.

During the 1962 season there were 2,755,184 persons to view the games at Dodger Stadium — a Major League record.

In their first home game of 1971 — marking the tenth year of Dodger Stadium — the Dodgers saluted two key figures in the construction of Dodger Stadium — Captain Emil Praeger and Jack Yount. Praeger designed Dodger Stadium and Yount was the vice president and general manager of Vinnell, which handled the gigantic construction job.

The beauty of Dodger Stadium has been enhanced by the plants which surround the stadium and by a dozen years during which continual improvement of the stadium has been a motto.

Dodger Stadium is baseball's only privately-financed park since Yankee Stadium was built in 1923.

There are 56,000 seats and parking for 16,000 automobiles on 21 terraced lots adjacent to and about at the same elevations as the five different seating levels.

Chavez Ravine was a difficult site because of a network of washes, gullies and gulches that were interlaced with hills and twisting roads. Elevations in the ravine ranged from 400 feet to 700 feet above sea level. In order to compensate for this rough terrain, more than 8,000,000 cubic yards of earth were moved to reshape the area.

Some 21,000 precast concrete units, weighing up to 32 tons, were lifted into the stadium's structural framework.

Thanks to the cantilever theory every seat in the column-free stadium has a completely unobstructed view of the symmetrical playing field.

Fans are afforded the opportunity to watch games from seven front rows and no grandstand is deeper than twenty-odd rows.

The various levels are color coordinated (yellow, orange, green and blue) to correspond with the terraced parking levels. There also is a below-ground level which provides a "player's eye view" from dugout box seats.

Two gigantic electronic installations — the scoreboard in right field and the message board behind the left field pavilion — add to the entertainment one enjoys at Dodger Stadium.

It all adds up to baseball's finest — and most beautiful — stadium.
