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**Walt Alston —
Manager
of Year**



Walt Alston was honored as the "Manager of the Year" in 1974 by both the Associated Press and United Press International. The 1975 season is Walt's 22nd consecutive year as the skipper of the Dodgers and his career has been marked by success and awards. The 1974 season marked the sixth time Alston had been honored by AP and the fifth by UPI. The Dodgers' National League pennant in 1974 was their seventh under Walt and his teams have won four World Championships—the only four World titles in the history of the Dodgers. Only four managers in the history of Major League baseball have won more pennants than the 63-year-old Alston—Casey Stengel (10), Joe McCarthy (9), John McGraw (9) and Connie Mack (8). All four of these men are in the Hall of Fame. Only three managers have won more World Series than Alston—Stengel (7), McCarthy (7) and Mack (5). Only two men—Mack and McGraw—managed one club for a longer period of time than Alston. Mack managed the Philadelphia Athletics for 50 years and McGraw managed the Giants for 31 years. There have been only nine men who have managed in the Majors for more than 20 years—Mack, McGraw, Bucky Harris (29), Stengel (25), Bill McKechnie (24), McCarthy (24), Leo Durocher (24), Alston and Jimmy Dykes (21). In his 21 years as the Dodger manager, Alston's teams have won seven pennants with six second place finishes and two thirds.

Dodger Coaches...

RED ADAMS (born Oct. 7, 1921)... The Dodger pitching staff had its ups and downs in 1974. When the season was complete, however, the Dodgers once again led the National League in team ERA with a mark of 2.97. One of the major factors in the Dodgers' pitching success was the contributions of a mild-mannered man who pitched in professional baseball for 20 years and had a Major League record of 0-1 — Charles Dwight (Red) Adams. "Red is the best pitching coach in the world," states Don Sutton. "Red's personality makes it easy for him to adapt to other personalities. He's an easy going guy." Dodger Manager Walt Alston: "Red's relationship with his pitchers is about as good a relationship as I know of. Red can be funny but he can be real serious when he's talking about pitching. He knows pitching from top to bottom and he can get things across." Red Adams is a man who shies away from the spotlight but he never turns from the problems of his pitchers. "I try to familiarize myself with each pitcher's delivery," says Red. "And also, of course, the man himself." Red has succeeded in getting to know his pitchers. And the Dodger pitchers recognize Red Adams as baseball's best pitching coach.

MONTY BASGALL (born Feb. 18, 1922)... It is said that no baseball team can win without being strong up the middle. And in the heart of that middle line is the double play combination. In the case of the Dodgers that combination is formed by second baseman Davey Lopes and shortstop Bill Russell. A man who has had a great deal to do with the formation of the combination is Dodger coach Monty Basgall. Both Lopes and Russell began their careers as center fielders. During the Arizona Instructional League and in the Dodgers' Spring camp in Vero Beach, Fla., Basgall has spent countless hours working with Lopes and Russell. Monty's initial association with the Dodgers began in 1941, when he was signed as a second baseman by Bert Wells. Monty played most of his career in the Pittsburgh organization, including 200 games with the Pirates. Monty served as a Dodger scout from 1959 through 1970 and also managed Albuquerque and El Paso in the Dodgers' minor league organization prior to becoming a Dodger coach in 1973.

JIM GILLIAM (born Oct. 17, 1928)... The 1975 season marks Jim Gilliam's 23rd season as a uniformed member of the Dodgers and his 25th year in the Dodger organization. Jim started in the Dodger organization in 1951 as a player with Montreal and he reached the Majors in 1953, one year before his manager at Montreal — Walt Alston — arrived as manager of the Dodgers. Jim was a playing coach with the Dodgers in 1965 and 1966 and he has been a fulltime coach since 1967. Jim spent the Winter of 1973 managing San Juan of the Puerto Rican League. Jim admits he would like to manage in the Majors. "I've heard people say that I'm not tough enough or that I'm not the leader-type. I don't talk out much because I'm the first base coach. Period. As for being a leader-type, I don't buy that at all. All the years I was playing I considered myself a leader-type." What kind of manager would Gilliam be? "I think I'd probably be like most new managers," he says. "I'd be anxious to try some of my own ideas but basically I'd be borrowing strategy from every rival manager in baseball, plus those I've played under. The toughest part of managing is learning how to handle men and when to change pitchers." Jim was the National League's "Rookie of the Year" in 1953 and during his 14-year career as a Dodger he batted .265.

TOMMY LASORDA (born Sept. 22, 1927)... Tommy Lasorda never hit a home run in his Major League career but he called a home run shot for the Dodgers in 1974. The enthusiastic Dodger third base coach was equipped with an NBC microphone on June 1 when the Dodgers were playing Chicago at Wrigley Field in the NBC "Game of the Week." In the second inning, with two men on base and the count 3-1 on Ron Cey, Lasorda observed: "If they try to get a low fast ball by him he's liable to hit it out of the park." Cey hit the next pitch, a fastball, over the left field wall. Tommy Lasorda has been predicting big things for Dodger players since he began scouting for the Dodgers in 1961. Tommy has been a contributor to the Dodgers since he joined the organization as a player in November of 1948. Tommy turned from scouting for the Dodgers to managing in the minor leagues in 1966, becoming a Dodger coach in 1973. In seven seasons as a minor league manager in the Dodger organization Tommy's teams won five pennants with one second place tie and one third place finish. Tommy was voted the Minor League "Manager of the Year" as his Spokane team won the Pacific Coast League pennant by 26 games in 1970. During the past three winters Tommy has managed Licey of the Dominican Republic League.

The Dodgers—1975

ALVAREZ, JESUS ORLANDO

Born 2-28-53, Cienega Baja, P.R. Bats-R. Throws-R. Ht. 6-0. Wt. 185. Single. How obtained: Signed by Dodgers as free agent in May, 1969.

Orlando Alvarez is one of many who never will forget baseball great Roberto Clemente. In the Winter of 1971 Alvarez was playing baseball in his native country of Puerto Rico and Clemente was managing the San Juan Senadores. "Roberto came up to me one day after watching me in batting practice and talked about my hitting," recalls Alvarez. "He made me change my grip to take advantage of my wrist snap. It worked and we became close friends." Alvarez has played five seasons in the Dodgers' farm system and it appears he's ready to make a strong bid for a Major League job after batting .316 for Albuquerque last season. After going 0-for-4 in Albuquerque's opening game last season, Orlando put together a 23-game hitting streak (42-for-90—.467). On six occasions during the streak Orlando had three hits in a game and on seven occasions he collected two hits. "Orlando is one of the most aggressive hitters around," says Albuquerque manager Stan Wasiak. "He has power, great wrist snap and makes contact." Dodger batting coach Dixie Walker describes Alvarez as having a "natural swing and good power." Orlando showed that power by hitting 32 doubles, 8 triples and 9 homers at Albuquerque. In 1973 he established a record for Waterbury of the Eastern League by driving in 106 runs (breaking the mark of 88 set by Pittsburgh's Richie Zisk in 1970).

AUERBACH, FREDERICK STEVEN

Born 2-15-50, Glendale, Calif. Bats-R. Throws-R. Ht. 6-0. Wt. 165. Single. How obtained: Purchased from the Milwaukee Brewers, October 27, 1973.

The Dodgers' primary thought in obtaining Rick Auerbach was to have a reliable defensive performer at shortstop to spell Bill Russell. Thus when Rick batted .342 last season it's obvious the Dodgers were pleased with his contributions. Auerbach took every assignment the Dodgers had to offer—defensive replacement, pinch-runner and part-time player—and performed in admirable fashion. Remarkably, the easy-going Auerbach found himself involved in the Dodgers' two biggest brawls of the season. In a game at Montreal on July 7th, Auerbach and Expo shortstop Tim Foli exchanged punches after Auerbach attempted to break up a double play while sliding into second base. Later in the season, in a game against Cincinnati at Dodger Stadium, Auerbach found himself being waltzed around the infield by the Reds' Pete Rose. Auerbach and his Dodger teammates were running onto the field after a flareup occurred when Bill Buckner slid into Red second baseman Joe Morgan. "Pete grabbed me and said 'Where do you think you're going'," recalls Auerbach. "I told him 'nowhere!' I got the feeling I had become the team's designated punching bag." What Auerbach did become was a handy man in just about any situation.

BREWER, JAMES THOMAS

In the Dodger seasons of 1969 through 1973, Jim Brewer averaged 20 saves and 7 wins a year for the Dodgers. He was the key man in the Dodger bullpen. Jim had pitched in 50-plus games for the Dodgers from 1968 through 1973 but his activity in 1974 was limited due to a bad back. Jim went nearly two months, from July 15th through Sept. 12th, without pitching. Twice during that period he had to be placed on the disabled list. Jim started the season in sparkling fashion as he didn't yield an earned run in his first four games and had a 4-1 record after the game of May 1. When the season was complete, however, Jim had pitched in only 24 games — his lowest total since 1966 — and he wasn't credited with a save. Mike Marshall accounted for 21 of the Dodgers' 23 saves and no one applauded Marshall's performance more than Brewer. "Mike can help us win," said Brewer early in the season, "That's the only thing that counts."

One of the memorable features of the Dodgers' season of 1974 was an amazing series of spectacular catches by left fielder Billy Buckner. "I've never seen an outfielder make so many great catches in one season," said Dodger manager Walt Alston. Buckner's catches earned him the nickname of "Billy The Burglar." Billy is a player who goes all-out on everything he does and admits he admires Pete Rose's style of play. Buckner pushed his batting average over .300 in late April and he never fell below the .300 plateau, finishing at .314 to lead the Dodgers and place fourth in the National League. Buckner had 182 hits and only Steve Garvey, with 200, had more hits as a Dodger. Billy had the Dodgers' longest hitting streak of the season, 17 games in a row from April 25 through May 15. In only one stretch of the season (four games from May 19 through 22) did Billy go more than two games in a row without collecting a hit. One of the overlooked features of Buckner's season is the fact he stole 31 bases, five more than his combined total as a Dodger entering the 1974 season. "I went into the season deciding to run," said Buckner. "I've always been able to run but I never did before."

BURKE, GLENN L.

Born 11-16-52, Oakland, Ca. Bats-R. Throws-R. Ht. 6-0. Wt. 205. Single. How obtained: Dodgers' #17 selection in June, 1972, Free Agent Draft.

UCLA basketball coach John Wooden hoped to see Glenn Burke in action as a member of his Bruins. Wooden, a good friend of Dodger manager Walt Alton, may get to see Burke in action soon but in a Dodger uniform. Burke had two choices after two years at Merritt Junior College in Oakland — a Dodger contract or a UCLA basketball scholarship. He went for the blue and white of the Dodgers. Burke is the type of athlete who can beat opponents in many ways — with his arm, bat or speed. At Berkeley High, he paced the basketball team to a 32-0 season in 1970 as well as the state's number one ranking. Burke averaged 23.5 points and 11.5 rebounds per game and was named to virtually every all-star team and earned every honor a prepster could earn. As soon as basketball season ended he had three days to prepare for baseball. And then came his greatest amateur thrill in the game. After three days of practice, Burke hit three home runs — including a grand slam on opening day — the type of explosiveness the Dodgers hope he brings to Los Angeles.

After a revolving door situation at third base through most of their history, the Dodgers have found a power-swinging third baseman in Ron Cey. On June 1 Ron established a Los Angeles Dodger record by driving in seven runs in one game against the Chicago Cubs. The record set on the first day of June lasted only until the final day of July when the same Mr. Cey drove in eight runs in a game at San Diego. Ron had enjoyed an outstanding rookie season in 1973 and he never gave a thought to the so-called "sophomore jinx" as he improved in every major batting category with 151 hits, 18 home runs, 97 runs batted in and a .262 average. Ron was the batting hero of the Dodgers' second National League Championship Series victory over Pittsburgh as he collected four hits, including two doubles and a home run. Ron was one of four Dodgers to start for the National League in the All-Star Game and he was a standout in the N.L.'s victory. Ron's 97 runs batted in established an all-time record for a Dodger third baseman, surpassing Cookie Lavagetto's mark of 87 in 1939 and Richie Allen's

figure of 90 in 1971. Ron emphasizes RBIs. "Batting averages don't win games," he says. "What's important are the people who score runs and the people who drive them in. I'm supposed to be one of the people who drive them in. I did it in the minors and I'm pretty satisfied with the way I've been doing it up here." Ron led the Dodgers in game-winning hits with 17.

The Dodgers have enjoyed outstanding success in position switching. The switches primarily have come in the Arizona Instructional League where, among others, Davey Lopes, Bill Russell and Joe Ferguson all made the move from the outfield to other positions. Larry Corrigan also decided to switch rather than fight. Corrigan got tired of catching pitchers and decided to make like one. So now Corrigan is on the mound for the Dodgers, thanks to a suggestion by former Dodger pitching instructor Roger Craig. Corrigan was signed as a catcher out of Iowa State University where he was named as the Sporting News' College All-American catcher in 1970 as well as being selected as a pitcher the same year on the All-Conference and All-District squads. That season he tied the Big Eight conference record for most wins by a pitcher with eight while losing only one game and batting .353 — thus earning team MVP honors. After two years as a pro catcher for Spokane in 1972 and Bakersfield in 1973, Corrigan tried his hand once again as a pitcher in the Arizona Instructional League. And it paid off. He turned in an outstanding year at Bakersfield in 1974, completing 14 of 23 games with a 12-10 mark and a 3.70 earned run average. His control was amazing. Early in the season he pitched 65 innings and allowed just four walks, one of them intentional. Last Winter he was selected to the Arizona Instructional League All-Star team.

Willie went three-for-four in the Dodgers' opening game of the 1974 season and he was on his way. His average never dipped below .277 during the season. Willie scored the winning run in 12 games and delivered the winning hit eight times. He was a consistent performer from the start. During Spring training he batted .385 and led the Dodgers in hits with 25 and in runs batted in with 18. "I'm not going to worry about platooning," said Willie at the end of his great Spring. "If I remain a consistent hitter I'll play. But all I'm really interested in is winning." Willie Crawford was a key part of the Dodgers' National League pennant in 1974.

It marked the end of a season in which Cruz batted .304 with 6 home runs, 50 runs batted in and 26 stolen bases. Injuries have slowed the swift young Cruz in his bid to gain a spot with the Dodgers. Signed as a free agent out of his native Puerto Rico, Cruz suffered a torn ligament in his left knee in the Spring of 1971 and spent his first season of professional baseball on the disabled list. Cruz was his high school's (Fajardo, P.R.) Most Valuable Player in baseball and basketball and established school records in the 100 meters (10.9), 200 meters (22.3) and long jump (23-10). Cruz also attended Inter-Americana University in Puerto Rico and recorded marks of 21.6 in the 200 meters and 24-5 in the long jump.

At the age of 22, Ivan De Jesus has played five seasons of professional baseball. "The only thing that I've ever looked forward to is playing in the big leagues," says Ivan. "When I get there, I will have a lot of experience behind me—at an early age. My turn will come and when it comes I'll be ready." Ivan received a brief look at life in the big leagues when he was called up from Albuquerque late in the season and he had one hit in three at-bats—a single in the Dodgers' final game of the season. The 1974 season was far and away the best for De Jesus in his minor league career. He batted .298 for Albuquerque, an improvement of 57 points over his .241 average at Bakersfield in 1973. Even more important, De Jesus made a drastic cutback in his strikeouts as he fanned only 71 times in 510 at-bats (he had struck out 123 times in 519 at-bats in 1973). Ivan was selected as the Class AAA All-Star Shortstop. From the start of his professional career, De Jesus has been a defensive standout at shortstop. "I've got the same confidence in my hitting now as I have my fielding," he says. "If there's one thing I've done rather thoroughly in my minor league career, I've improved myself physically—and mentally."

Al Downing was in and out of the Dodgers' starting rotation in 1974 but when he was needed most he was ready. In one stretch in September Al had a streak of 20 consecutive innings without yielding a run, including an 11-0 shutout over San Francisco on Sept. 12. "At this time of the year the important thing to think about is making a contribution and winning," said Al after the shutout. It was Al's first start in a month and the victory was the Dodgers' fifth in a row and enabled them to maintain a four-game lead over Cincinnati on the eve of the final series with the Reds. While the Dodgers will remember Al for his contributions in the pennant drive, many fans will recall Downing's season in connection with Hank Aaron's record-breaking 715th home run. Downing, of course, is the man who yielded the homer on the night of April 8th in Atlanta. "It just happened that I was the guy who was on the mound when he broke the record," said Al. "I don't feel bad about it or anything like that. He did the same thing to a lot of pitchers." Downing first gained a national spotlight in 1956 when as a 15-year-old he hurled his Trenton, N.J., Babe Ruth League team to a 1-0 victory in the finals of the Babe Ruth World Series. That was on August 26th. On that same afternoon, Hank Aaron hit his 20th homer of the 1956 season and 60th of his career to lead Milwaukee to a 6-2 victory over the Dodgers.

In one respect, the 1974 World Series summed up Joe Ferguson's season. There were great moments for Joe in the World Series (his tremendous throw in Game No. 1 nailed Oakland's Sal Bando at the plate and his two-run homer in Game No. 2 gave the Dodgers a 3-2 victory) and moments Joe would rather forget (two errors in one game as a catcher to tie a World Series record). Joe struggled with the bat in the early part of the 1974 season and he was batting only .202 (17-for-84) entering the game of May 23. It was on May 23 that the Dodgers opened a four-game series in San Francisco—Joe's native city—and Joe went 10-for-18 in the series to increase his season average to .265. The game of May 23 also marked the start of a 14-game hitting streak for Joe and during the streak he increased his season average to .285. Joe suffered a torn muscle in his rib cage on August 6th and he wasn't able to return to the lineup until August 17th. Joe's average dipped to a low point of .236 on August 20th but he eventually regained his strength and his form and he batted .359 (28-for-79) with four homers and 12 RBIs from August 20 until the end of the season. Joe divided his playing time between right field and the catcher's spot. He originally signed with the Dodgers as an outfielder.

GARVEY, STEVEN PATRICK

From start to finish, Steve Garvey's 1974 season was a success story. The climax came when Steve was selected the National League's Most Valuable Player and on the same day he received notice as the N.L. Gold Glove winner at first base. Steve started the season in spectacular fashion, hitting safely in 11 of the Dodgers' first 12 games (18-for-49—.367) with five homers. And then there was a great mid-season, highlighted by the fact he was selected as a write-in to the National League All-Star team and won the Most Valuable Player award in the game. Five days prior to the All-Star Game Steve was struck by an ear and glandular infection. When the season was over Steve had led the Dodgers in runs batted in (111), hits (200), and doubles (32). He was third in the N.L. in both RBIs and hits and the first N.L. player to drive in more than 100 runs with 200 hits since Joe Torre in 1971. Only two other L.A. Dodgers—Tommy Davis and Maury Wills—ever passed the 200-hit mark. There wasn't much Steve didn't do in 1974. He was second on the Dodgers in batting at .312, in runs scored with 95 and in home runs with 21. Defensively he made only eight errors and he was uncanny at digging balls out of the dirt. And his batting consistency was unbelievable. When he went two games in a row on August 5th and 6th without a hit it marked his LONGEST hitless streak of the season—TWO GAMES. He never had more than three hitless games in a row and that mark didn't occur until late September. From April 13th until the end of the season Steve's average never dipped below .300. Steve batted .389 in the N.L. Championship Series and .381 in the World Series. "Steve is what you call a total athlete," says Dodger manager Walt Alston. "He has the aggressiveness and natural talents that let him adapt to any position on the diamond. Among other assets, he's smart enough to observe, improving himself by watching more experienced players."

So you think you know your Dodger baseball. Okay, who drove in what proved to be the winning run on Oct. 1 at Houston—the night the Dodgers clinched the West Division title? The same player scored the winning run in the Dodgers' final game of the season on Oct. 2 at Houston. In fact, he batted 1.000 for the season! The answer is John Steven Hale. And when you talk about an impressive debut you have to talk about John Hale. His second Major League hit was a two-run single in the Dodgers' West Division pennant-clinching 8-5 win over the Astros. He also had a double in the game. The next night, in the Dodgers' finale of the regular season, Hale went two-for-two again. Hale spent most of the 1974 season at Waterbury of the Eastern League, batting .271 with 8 home runs and 51 runs batted in. It was his best of four minor league seasons and he appears to be improving with each step up the Dodger ladder. He batted .228 at Ogden in 1971 in his first season, then .233 at Daytona Beach, and .264 at Bakersfield. If you toss in the .271 at Waterbury you can see young Mr. Hale is on the rise. At 6-2 and 195 pounds, John is an outfielder with power and speed (he stole 15 bases at Waterbury). John was a prep star at Wasco (Calif.) Union High where he played baseball, basketball and football and won all-league honors in all three sports in his senior year.

It was Mike Marshall who was the man in the spotlight in the Dodger bullpen in 1974 but Charlie Hough had a helping hand in the Dodgers' success. After losing his first decision of the season, Charlie reeled off six wins in a row to give him a mark of 6-1 in early June. In a period from May 18 through June 9 Charlie made six appearances in a row without giving up an earned run. Charlie finished the season with nine wins (only five Dodger pitchers won more games) and his 49 game appearances put him second on the Dodgers to Marshall's record-setting total of 106. Hough has been throwing a knuckleball since 1970, a year he won 12 games at Spokane with a 1.95 ERA and earned a late-season promotion to the Dodgers. Hough received some expert teaching on the knuckleball in 1971 when one of the masters of the pitch—Hoyt Wilhelm—joined the Dodger staff. Hough first was introduced to the knuckleball by Dodger scout Goldie Holt in the Winter of 1969 in the Arizona Instructional League. "I hurt my arm in the 1969 season at Albuquerque and when I went to Arizona there was no way to describe my pitching except to say it was mediocre," says Charlie. "The fast ball was gone. I didn't know where I was headed. Goldie and Tommy Lasorda talked me into using the knuckleball and they gave me the basics." Hough now appears to be headed for a long career. "Charlie is going to be a super star," says Jim Brewer, one of the Dodgers' all-time great bullpen performers.

He needed every bit of his competitive makeup in his first Major League assignment. There was Rex, age 20, on the mound at Atlanta last July 27th and the second batter he faced was Hank Aaron. "He just looked out at me, pushed his helmet down on his head, and smiled," recalls Rex. Hudson got Aaron to fly out to center field but the second time around Hank added rookie Rex to his long list of home run victims. Rex won 16 games at Albuquerque to lead the Pacific Coast League in victories. It was his top victory total in four minor league seasons. Hudson was selected to the Class AAA All-Star team. "Rex has a lot of poise for a youngster," says Dodger manager Walt Alston. "He isn't the type to be scared." Rex's statistics for complete games has been impressive since his first season (when he completed 7 of 12 starts at Ogden) and he had 11 complete games in 22 starts at Albuquerque. Rex won all-state honors while pitching for Nathan Hale High School in his native Tulsa, Okla.

For a pitcher who has led the National League in winning percentage two years in a row, Tommy John doesn't have much going for him when it comes to the law of averages. He is deserving of a better fate. Tommy had a 13-3 record and was the top winner in the National League when he was forced by injury to leave a game against Montreal on July 17th. The injury was described as a ruptured ligament in Tommy's left elbow and it was hoped rest might cure

the ailment. However, Tommy wasn't able to pitch again and on Sept. 25th underwent surgery on the elbow. A tendon from Tommy's right forearm was used in the reconstruction of the left elbow. Tommy's .813 winning percentage was the best mark in the N.L. for the second year in a row (he was 16-7, .696 in 1973). John's outstanding season in 1973 came after an operation to remove bone chips from his left elbow following the 1972 season, "I've got very good recuperative powers," says Tommy. "And I have quite a bit of pain tolerance. I pitched a lot of years with pain. I think I'll bounce back pretty well." Tommy started the 1974 season by winning five games in a row, giving him 10 consecutive wins dating back to the 1973 season when he closed with five victories. Just prior to Tommy's injury in July came another disappointment to him and Dodger fans as T.J. was left off the N.L. All-Star staff despite the fact he was the league's top winner. Tommy's start in 1974 was his best since 1968 when he was 10-5 with a 1.98 ERA for the Chicago White Sox after his first 25 games. That year, in early August, he was involved in a fight with Dick McAuliffe and suffered a broken collarbone, sidelining him for the season.

Don Sutton and Dennis Lewallyn both were discovered in Pensacola, Fla. The Dodgers hope that isn't the only thing they have in common. Lewallyn suddenly is coming into his own. After signing out of Chipola Junior College (Marianna, Fla.) Lewallyn resembled a young Don Drysdale and Bill Singer in appearance—tall, but on the skinny side. Since that time he has matured physically, gaining 25 pounds and the added pounds should help to make him a much stronger and improved pitcher. Lewallyn had a slow start in 1974 at Waterbury but he came on strong at the end of the season and progressed rapidly in the Arizona Instructional League. During this past Winter he was selected to the Arizona Instructional League All-Star team. Awards were numerous for Lewallyn from high school to junior college. At Escambia High School Dennis was an all-conference and all-state selection. He also captured the most valuable player award in the state all-star game as well as earning the Player of the Year award in Pensacola for 1971. Lewallyn went on to Chipola J.C. and as a freshman recorded a 7-1 record in 66 innings with 86 strikeouts. His outstanding performance earned him all-state J.C. honors. The Dodgers hope the honors keep mounting for Dennis as well as his progress to the Major Leagues.

The ability of Davey Lopes was reflected in a four-game period in late August. In that period Davey tied a Los Angeles Dodger record by hitting three home runs in a game against Chicago and then tied a 70-year-old National League record by stealing five bases in a game against St. Louis. Davey had 59 stolen bases. Only 16 men in Major League history have stolen 60 or more bases in one season. Only one player—Maury Wills—has been a more outstanding base stealer for the Dodgers. Davey's two stolen bases in the third game of the World Series tied a record shared by six players and last accomplished by Lou Brock in the 1967 World Series. "I owe Maury a great deal of credit for my success in stealing bases," says Davey. Davey had a slow start at the plate and was batting only .199 after the game of June 2nd but he finished the season at .266 (batting .289 from June 3rd through the end of the season). "I didn't reach two of my goals in 1974," says Davey. "I wanted to hit .285 and I hit .266. I wanted to score 100 runs. I scored 95. I don't know if I'll ever approach Lou Brock's stolen base record but I know one thing—I'm capable of stealing at least 75 bases." Davey originally was signed as an outfielder but he was switched to second base prior to the 1971 season.

MARSHALL, MICHAEL GRANT

Mike Marshall's record-setting performances and contributions to the Dodgers' National League pennant in 1974 earned him the Cy Young Award. Mike became the first relief pitcher ever to win the award. He joined three other Dodgers as Cy Young Award winners—Don Newcombe, who won the first award in 1956; Don Drysdale, 1962; and Sandy Koufax, a three-time winner—1963, 1965 and 1966. Mike finished third in the voting for the Most Valuable Player Award and for the second year in a row he was the leading pitcher in the MVP poll. Marshall established Major League records in 1974 for games pitched—106 (breaking his own mark of 92 which had been set in 1973); innings pitched in relief—208.1

(again Mike erased his own record of 179, set in 1973); games finished—83 (erasing the record of 77 set by Ken Sanders of Milwaukee in 1971); and consecutive games pitched—13 (shattering the mark of nine which had been shared by Elroy Face, George Shultz, and Tom Dukes). Along with winning the Cy Young Award, Mike became the first relief pitcher in 24 years to be selected National League Pitcher of the Year by The Sporting News (Jim Konstanty won the honor in 1950, becoming the first relief pitcher to win the award). Mike's 15 victories gave him 43 relief wins over a three-year span, and, with his 21 saves, Mike repeated as The Sporting News' Fireman of the Year in the N.L. He became the first pitcher to lead the N.L. in saves two years in a row. He led the Majors in games finished for the third year in a row, a Major League record. Marshall pitched in 65 of the Dodgers' 102 victories. Mike is completing work toward a doctorate in physiological psychology at his alma mater, Michigan State, and he teaches a course in kinesiology at Michigan State in the off-season. Marshall pitched in two N.L. Championship Series games and five World Series games, working a total of 12 innings (9 in the World Series) and giving up only six hits and one run.

Among the Dodgers there are some unique nicknames and none more unusual than Ken McMullen's tag—"Pound Cake." But it would be much more appropriate to call him "Mr. Clutch" for so he has been ever since the Dodgers re-acquired him. In 1973 one-third of his hits won ball games for the Dodgers and he still had the habit in '74. One of his finest performances came late in the season when he tied a game with a two-run homer in the ninth and then, remaining in the game, delivered a single in the tenth. Unfortunately for his clutch record, it didn't win the game. A pinch hit won a vital game for the Dodgers over the Giants in late June. He broke a 4-4 deadlock with a pinch hit home run in May so all three of his season homers were delivered as a pinch-hitter. In 1973 he had four game-winning hits and all of them came in the Dodgers' last time at bat. His drama-laden hitting was accomplished against great mental odds when he lost his wife, Bobbie, due to cancer. The ailment struck prior to the birth of their third child and Bobbie died during the 1974 season. Originally a Dodger in the early '60s, McMullen figured in two big Dodger deals. He went to Washington with Frank Howard as part of the deal which brought Claude Osteen to Los Angeles and returned, with Andy Messersmith, in the seven-player deal which sent Frank Robinson, Bobby Valentine, Bill Singer, Bill Grabarkewitz and Mike Strahler to Anaheim in the Winter of 1972-73.

MESSERSMITH, JOHN ALEXANDER

In his final start of the regular 1974 season Andy Messersmith, defeating San Diego, became the National League's first 20-game winner, thus becoming one of the few to bring a 20-win year over from the American League and repeat in the National. Andy, obtained by the Dodgers in the seven-player deal with the California Angels prior to the 1973 season, had been a 20-game winner at Anaheim in 1971. His two-year record as a Dodger is 35 and 16, including a Championship Series triumph over the Pirates. In the World Series, starting the first game, he also started a trend, losing by a 3 to 2 score. (Four of the five games played against Oakland reached that count.) When you tally Andy's two-season performance with the Dodgers you come up with some glittering figures... 72 starts, 23 complete games, 542 innings, 159 earned runs, 171 walks, 398 strikeouts, a 34-16 record and an earned run average of 2.64, exclusive of two exemplary games in post-season play in which his ERA was 2.40. It took an unearned run to ruin the first World Series effort in Andy's career. He gave up a homer to Reggie Jackson in the third and the A's squeezed home a run in the fifth but the run which beat the Dodgers came across on one of the few bad throws made by Ron Cey during his steady season at third. In the second game of the Championship Series, Messersmith was a 5-to-2 winner with relief help from Mike Marshall. Over the campaign, Andy had three shutouts, including two in a row, went ten innings without giving up a run in a game won by the Dodgers in 13 innings and fired seven innings of shutout ball in another win. Eight times during the campaign he did not give up an earned run. In his six defeats the Dodgers scored only nine runs. He was unbeaten in his last five regular-season starts—a typical Messersmith finish. Andy finished second to Marshall in the voting for the Cy Young Award. He was the winner of the Gold Glove Award among N.L. pitchers and also was selected as the top righthanded pitcher in the N.L. by the players (the vote announced by The Sporting News).

MILLER, NORMAN CALVIN

Norm Miller wasn't the most celebrated free agent during the Winter but the Dodgers, nevertheless, were happy to sign the veteran lefthanded hitter. For Norm, being a member of the Dodgers represents a homecoming. He was born in Los Angeles and attended Van Nuys High School and Los Angeles Valley College. In 1964, at the age of 18, Norm was signed as a free agent by the Los Angeles Angels and he broke into professional baseball as a second baseman for Quad Cities of the Midwest League. The Houston Astros drafted Norm from the Angels on Dec. 1, 1964, and Norm spent nine seasons with the Houston organization prior to being traded to Atlanta in April of 1973. Last season Norm played in 42 games with the Braves, going to bat 41 times and compiling an average of .171. The Braves released Norm at the end of the season and he received an invitation to take part in the Dodgers' Winter workouts. After looking at Norm the Dodger management was convinced (1) Norm had recovered from shoulder and back problems which had restricted him during two seasons with Atlanta and (2) he could help the Dodgers as a lefthanded pinch-hitter and reserve catcher. Although used primarily as an outfielder during his 10-year National League career, Norm has seen service as both a catcher and third baseman. Miller spent one Winter in the Arizona Instructional League learning the catcher's position and he caught briefly for the Astros in 1970 and 1971. Although a 10-year veteran of N.L. play, Norm is only 29 years old. His best year with the Astros was in 1969 when he played in 119 games, batted .264 and drove in 50 runs. He hit 21 doubles, 4 triples and 4 homers that season. It was a shoulder injury which restricted Norm's use last season. In 1973 he had been bothered by a back injury and underwent an operation. In 1971 he suffered a broken right wrist in August. Now healthy and back home in Los Angeles, Norm Miller appears ready for an enjoyable season in 1975.

It has been said of Manny Mota that he could wake up on Christmas morning, walk out to a baseball diamond and rip a single into right field. The statement is made with justification. Manny Mota is a baseball rarity, a lifetime .300-plus hitter (.303 to be exact) who has established his average over 13 seasons of Major League play. At age 37, Manny has lost neither his enthusiasm for the game nor his ability to perform with a bat in his hands. Manny led the Dodgers in 1974 with 15 pinch hits and 16 runs batted in as a pinch-hitter. In six seasons with the Dodgers Manny is batting .316 as a pinch-hitter (42-for-133) with 41 runs batted in. Manny has 84 hits as a pinch-hitter in his Major League career, ranking first among active National League players and seventh on baseball's all-time list (behind Smokey Burgess, 145; Jerry Lynch, 116; Red Lucas, 114; Gates Brown, 101; Dave Philley, 93; and Elmer Valo, 90). Manny's 15 pinch hits established a Los Angeles Dodger season record, breaking the mark of 13 set by Lee Walls in 1962. With the exception of one game in April, Manny was used exclusively as a pinch-hitter in 1974. "The manager thinks I can contribute off the bench and so do I," says Manny. "I like my job. I like to do things that help my team win games. Concentration is the key if you're a pinch-hitter. You have to swing at good pitches and you have to know the pitchers." A panel of 10 outstanding pitchers selected Mota as the only "honorable mention" in a story saluting baseball's best hitters for Family Weekly in 1974.

When the headlines in Los Angeles read "Local Boy Makes Good," they'll be talking about Rick Nitz who pitched a few miles from Dodger Stadium. Nitz, who was signed by Ben Wade, the Dodgers' director of scouting, was discovered in Glendale at Hoover High School, where he earned all-league and All-CIF honors in baseball. Rick, who also starred in basketball, was named the Foothill League Most Valuable Player in 1970. Rick's progress in moving up the minor league ladder has been impressive. His finest year came in 1972 at Bakersfield where he won California League all-star honors and led the league in victories with 18 and innings pitched with 211. Nitz, who has filled out since high school days and resembles a Don Drysdale in build, was a big factor in Albuquerque's success in capturing the Pacific Coast League title last season. Rick completed 10 of his 26 starts, only one away from the league lead, and won 12 games with fine control of his four pitches—fastball, curve, slider and change-up. Like most local prepsters, he attended many Dodger games and had one dream—that he would wear a Dodger uniform and play in Dodger Stadium.

Tom Paciorek still is looking for that chance to play regularly in the major leagues. Coming off a great set of minor league "stats," Tom is confident that, given the opportunity to play on a daily basis, he will realize his full potential in the National League. When Steve Garvey became one of the league's finest first basemen, sending Bill Buckner—a .314 hitter—to the outfield, and when Willie Crawford matched his .295 batting average of 1973, Paciorek was chained to the bench. Jim Wynn shut the door on him in the third outfield spot, of course. And so, 1974, which was to be Paciorek's season of opportunity, proved no such thing. He was in 85 games, went to bat only 175 times. Nevertheless the potential of his bat was evidenced in one category—extra-base hits. Tom had 42 hits but more than one third of them were long blasts. He had 8 doubles, tied Bill Russell for the club lead in triples (6) and his lone homer was a 3-run blast which beat Philadelphia back in April when Paciorek was hitting a robust .333. He cleared the bases with a triple June 4 against the Pirates, easing a shutout win for Tommy John. On the Dodger farms, en route to the big club, Paciorek drove in 320 runs in a 3-year span and in 1972 the "Sporting News" named him "Minor League Player of the Year." A three-sport star in Detroit scholastic circles, Paciorek played both football and baseball at the University of Houston. He was the ninth-round choice of the Miami Dolphins and helped defeat Michigan State in a big 1967 football upset. A halfback on that Michigan State team is now a teammate—fellow named Steve Garvey.

The odds on a 29th round draft selection reaching the Major Leagues are not favorable. Kevin Pasley, however, is too much of a competitor to be concerned about odds. Now at the age of 21, he has played well enough the past two seasons to receive a late season call to the Dodgers. He enjoyed his best of four minor league seasons last year when he batted .314 at Albuquerque and was selected as the all-Pacific Coast League catcher. When Kevin was at Chaminade High School in Mineola, New York, the Dodgers' draft form report on him contained the evaluation "Loves to Play, Real Hustler, Leader, Aggressive." Kevin was an outstanding athlete at Chaminade, winning all-county honors in baseball and all-league honors in basketball and football. Kevin has been a consistent hitter throughout his minor league career with season marks of .280 (Medford), .275 (Daytona Beach), .260 (Waterbury) and his .314 figure at Albuquerque last season. Kevin has been a catcher since the age of eight when he was playing Little League. "I played for the Bethpage, Long Island Tool and Hardware team," recalls Kevin. "I've always liked to catch. You're always in the game and I like that." Kevin credits Dodger Midwest scouting supervisor and former catcher Guy Wellman and Stan Wasiak—his manager at both Daytona Beach and Albuquerque—with helping him improve as a catcher. "And those guys (Steve) Yeager and (Joe) Ferguson have taken time in Spring training to help me," says Kevin. Kevin appreciates the help but it doesn't distract from his competitive bid to win a job as a catcher on the Dodgers.

He led the PCL in hits with 181 and was selected to the Topps Class AAA all-star team as the most outstanding second baseman in triple-A baseball. Randall makes contact. In 536 at-bats he struck out only 46 times. "He's a great guy to have on a club," said Bill Schweppe, Dodgers' Vice-President in charge of minor league operations. "Bob makes a team go and he's an outstanding double play man." In high school Randall earned all his honors as an all-stater in basketball in Kansas. Awards came later in baseball. At Kansas State University in 1969 he was chosen the All-Big Eight shortstop and then it was on with the Dodgers. While he has had his ups and downs, Bob led the Pioneer League in hits in 1969 and also the California League at Bakersfield in 1972 where he also was the all-star second baseman. The holder of a Bachelor of Science degree in business administration, Bob credits Dodger batting instructor Dixie Walker with his improved hitting.

There was a touch of Dr. Jekyll-and-Mr. Hyde characteristics in the 1974 performance of young Doug Rau, the promising Dodger southpaw. Through May his record was 5 and 1 and his lone defeat was in a 2-to-1 ball game. On June 5 he had a no-hitter broken up in the eighth by Pittsburgh's Richie Hebner. He didn't get credit for an eventual 3-to-2 Dodger victory. And he didn't take another decision until his last start that month by which time his record was 6 and 4. In late July and early August, however, he put together a five-game winning streak, including participation in two straight shutouts. Now he was 12 and 6 with a sub-3.00 earned run average and the Dodgers had reason to believe they had replaced the traded Claude Osteen with a star of the future. However, Doug won only one more game in his last 12 regular-season starts and, when he was bombed by Pittsburgh in the third game of the Championship Series, Rau lost his World Series start against Oakland to the veteran Al Downing. Nevertheless, a 13-game winner at 25 years of age and in his sophomore season in the majors, Rau remains one of the bright prospects of the staff. Rau was 4 and 2 in 1973 when he appeared in 31 games but made only three starts. The 13 games he won for the Dodgers fell only one short of his minor league career high with Albuquerque in '72 but he had never lost close to 11 as he did last season. A graduate of Texas A. and M. with All-American scholastic honors, Rau, when on the beam, is capable of flashy, low-hit performances. In his first major league start against the Cardinals in late-1972 he fired a three-hitter. He started his July winning streak by holding Philadelphia scoreless (two hits) for seven innings and next time out blanked Houston.

EVERY game's a big one in a stretch drive such as the Dodgers and Reds staged last year so it can be said that none was bigger than the game the Dodgers won behind the fine relief pitching of Rick Rhoden over the Padres Sept. 22. It certainly was a red-letter day for Rick and one he'll remember for the rest of his life because on that afternoon Rick won his FIRST major league game. Three unearned runs off Al Downing in the first two innings caused an emergency call to the bullpen and Rhoden, who had been recalled from the minors earlier in the month and had pitched two innings in a lop-sided loss five days earlier. "I didn't want to go to Charlie Hough that early," Walt Alston explained. No explanation was necessary when Rhoden fired six shutout innings, fanned six batters, allowed only two hits and carried the Dodgers into the ninth with a 6-3 lead. He gave up a single to the lead-off man in the ninth and was replaced by Mike Marshall. Rhoden got a laugh out of the horde of writers who surrounded him after the game. "It was easier out on the mound than it is talking to this many men at one time," he explained. Early in life Rhoden was an osteomyelitis victim and he wore a brace for three years. But his determination to play baseball paid off as he starred in high school and American Legion ball. The Dodgers took a chance on his disability, where other clubs shied off, and made him their No. 1 draft pick in June of '71. In his first pro game he fanned thirteen Tampa batters and he was on his way.

He played in Little League, Babe Ruth League, American Legion and Senior Babe Ruth League. In 1972 he led the Texas League in runs, 89, was fourth in doubles, 25, and was co-recipient of the El Paso MVP award. In the Spring of '74 he won the Jim and Dearie Mulvey Award as the Top Dodger Rookie at Dodgertown.

The Dodgers had one of the finest back-up shortstops in baseball in 1974 in Rick Auerbach. What's more he wielded a .342 bat. But you get some idea of the high regard Walt Alston holds for his No. 1 shortstop, Bill Russell, when you realize Bill played in 160 of the club's 162 games and all of the N.L. Championship Series and World Series contests. On July 3 Bill was kayoed and almost bit off a piece of his tongue in a bruising collision at the plate with Reds' catcher Bill Plummer. Bill was the starting shortstop the next day and drove in the winning run with a single in the ninth, capping a come-from-behind two-run rally. On July 6 Russell didn't start due to a cantankerous left elbow, which bothered him all season, but he was at short before the game ended. Alston gave him the last day of the season off—after the Dodgers had clinched the pennant. In October Russell underwent surgery on his left arm when Dr. Frank Jobe tied down a nerve in his "funny-bone" area. It had been anything but funny to Russell all year, bothering him tremendously at the plate. Despite the pesky nerve, Russell had an excellent season at bat. He had a ten-game April-May streak, batting .389, and a 12-game string in late May and early June, batting .434. When the Dodgers clobbered the Pirates in the decisive fourth game of the East-West series, Bill drove in three runs. He hit safely in four of the five World Series games and climaxed his October Classic performance with a two-run triple which put the Dodgers ahead in the fourth game. A converted outfielder, Russell has become one of the National League's finest shortstops—and most durable. He has had two games off in two seasons.

Cleo Smith is a Dodger with a lot of sock. And he hits for an average too. At Harry Ellis High (Richmond, Ca.), where he played baseball, basketball and football and gained honors in each sport, Cleo hit a blazing .462 as a senior and was an All-American first baseman. Only a year earlier he hit .406 in American Legion play. Cleo hit .309 in his first two years with the Dodgers. In 1972 at Ogden he earned Pioneer League all-star honors as well as Northern California Rookie of the Year laurels. One year later at Bakersfield of the California League he again was selected as an all-star after losing the batting title by one-hundredth of a point. His power was quite evident at Bakersfield after finishing second in the four-bagger title in 1972 at Ogden with eight. Cleo hit 23 homers and drove in 95 runs at Bakersfield. Last year his extra base and RBI output was outstanding, although his batting average fell below .300 for the first time in pro baseball. The Dodgers have high hopes for Smith's sock in the future.

Winner of the "Dearie Mulvey Award" in the Spring of 1973 at Dodgertown, Eddie Solomon will be shooting for a regular role among Dodger pitchers in 1975. "The King" had a so-so season at Albuquerque after a Spring in which he was untouchable—ERA in 13 innings; 0.00—but the Dodgers stayed with the

young right-hander and they were rewarded by an 11-4 performance in 1974 with 105 strikeouts in 138 innings. His control improved measureably as he walked only 42 batters, in marked contrast to 87 the year before. He led the staff in complete games with 11 (in 18 starts). Brought up to the big club in July, Eddie took part in four games, accomplished a 1.50 ERA and was retained by the club when the 25 players were designated for the World Series squad. He took part in one of the Championship Series games with the Pirates and hurled two shutout innings. The 23-year-old right-hander has a blistering fast ball and needs only additional experience to win consistently in the majors. He was signed as a free agent, after others had passed him up, by Rudy Rufer, who saw him playing semi-pro ball for the Perry Athletics and Warner Robins Jets in Georgia's back country. Being on a World Series team rates as his biggest thrill but he still has fond memories of his second year in pro ball—Daytona, 1970—when he started July at 4 and 5 and finished with a rush of seven wins in nine decisions to top the club's pitching staff. He has been moving up ever since.

When the Dodger season ended Red Adams' pitching staff had three candidates for Cy Young Award honors—Mike Marshall, Andy Messersmith and Don Sutton. For Sutton his 19-and-9 campaign, plus three victories in post-season play, was a thing of both exasperation and triumph. Can you imagine a pitcher of Don's ability going from May 14 to July 25—FOURTEEN starts—without a win? Hard to explain but it happened. Off to a glamorous 6-2 getaway and winning on successive shutouts May 9-14, Don suddenly plunged into his slump. The Dodgers won five of his next 14 starts but there was no reward for Don until after the All-Star game when he turned things around by winning 13 of his last 14 regular-season decisions, two over the Pirates, 3-0 and 12-1 in the championship series and the second game of the World Series, 3 to 2. His come-from-behind surge to win twenty games for the first time in his career fell short by one when he was lifted for a pinch hitter with L.A., trailing San Diego, 2 to 1, in the eighth inning of a Sept. 27 game. Had he won that one Don would have had his 20 for he scored No. 19 against Houston—the night the Dodgers clinched the title in the National League West. In the Championship Series with Pittsburgh Don was almost untouchable, giving up one run and seven hits in 17 innings. Once again he was the starter in another clincher—game No. 4. Sutton's gem of the season occurred against the same club which was to thwart his 20-game season—the Padres. On May 9—just before his inexplicable slump set in—he fired a one-hitter against San Diego. Johnny Grubb got a single off Bill Russell's glove in the second but was quickly snuffed out on a double play grounder by the next batter. Sutton then allowed only two men (via walks) to reach base the rest of the way. It was the third one-hitter of Don's career. His shutout of the Pirates in the Championship Series was the sixth of the season and the 37th of his career. His regular-season 36 shutouts leaves only three Dodgers ahead of him—Don Drysdale (49), Sandy Koufax (40) and Nap Rucker (38). Don finished fourth in the Cy Young voting behind teammates Marshall and Messersmith and Atlanta's Phil Niekro. Don's fielding was consistent and excellent from start to finish as he went through the season (40 games) without making an error.

It's unusual to find a "rubber arm" type pitcher but the Dodgers have two in Mike Marshall and Stan Wall. Wall can pitch at anytime or any day. Some pitchers like either to start or relieve, but not both. It's one or the other. To Wall it doesn't matter, just as long as he pitches, ala Mike Marshall. The crafty left-hander joined Los Angeles last year after his Albuquerque stay and although he didn't see any Major League action he threw batting practice practically every day. And when the season came to a close, he wanted to throw even more so the Dodgers used him in batting practice for the Championship Series and World Series. Signed by Dodger coach Monty Basgall, Stan graduated South High (Raytown, Mo.) in 1969 after pitching a no-hit game in his senior year. After one semester of college, he decided to sign with the Dodgers. His first year he was used primarily in relief (34 of 36 games at Ogden) but in 1970 at Daytona he started all 23 games he appeared and recorded an 11-6 record with a 2.58 ERA. He fanned 120 batters. It has been a back and forth situation as far as starting and not starting, but Stan doesn't mind, as long as there's a ticket to Dodger Stadium waiting.

Voted No. 5 in the Most Valuable Player poll in 1974, Jimmy Wynn enjoyed his happiest campaign. He made a World Series, something he predicted for the Dodgers as soon as he joined them. Statistics, alone, do not tell the full story of how much Wynn meant to the Dodgers because he was more than just a great hitter for them—he was their spirit, their fire, their leader. But let's take a look at the "stats," anyway. Jim batted a power-packed .271. He hit 32 home runs, the most for a Dodger since Duke Snider did his cannonading back at Ebbets Field, Brooklyn. He drove in 108 runs and with Steve Garvey (111) and Ron Cey (97) gave the Dodgers an RBI-punch they had not enjoyed in Los Angeles history. He added 17 doubles and 4 triples for a slugging average of .497. He WALKED 108 times, scored 104 runs and stole 18 bases. Jimmy set L.A. Dodger records for walks and sacrifice flies (11) in addition to homers. On May 11 against the Padres he hit three home runs, the first Dodger since Don Demeter to do that. He was walked his last time at bat in that game (having singled earlier). He drove in two-or-more runs in twenty-nine games. His high was five during his 3-homer game but he also had three 4-RBI games. On Sept. 15, in a key game with the Reds—their last against the Dodgers—Jimmy broke the back of the Reds' surge with a grand slam homer, quickly followed by a homer by Garvey. Wynn scored the decisive run in 13 Dodger victories, drove in the key run 12 times. Typical of his season-long heroics was a two-out, three-run homer which broke up a Giants-Dodger game in the 11th inning of an early-September contest. Jim hit a homer and drove in two runs in the N.L. Championship Series with Pittsburgh and kept Dodger hopes alive in the first World Series game with a homer in the ninth. And all of this was accomplished by a man who knew he faced post-season surgery for a balky right elbow which gave him considerable pain from April to October. In addition to finishing fifth in the MVP voting, Jimmy was selected the National League's "Comeback of the Year" and also was voted by the players as one of the top three N.L. outfielders.

To many fans the keeping of records... or reading about them... is one of the game's most enjoyable pastimes. Usually the feats of a player can be compared to some star of the past but occasionally a performance comes along which apparently has no precedent. So it was in 1974 when Steve Yeager, Dodger catcher, was behind the plate in twenty-four games before he tasted the dregs of defeat. It probably was an all-time high for a season start and no catcher had ever caught that many victories during any winning streak which could be checked. After all, how many TEAMS have won 24 in a row? Rated one of the finest receivers in Dodger history, Steve didn't stop with his amazing getaway gallop. During the regular season he caught in 93 games. The Dodgers lost only 26 of them. Strangely, his season highlight at the plate... a grand-slam against the Reds August 5—was followed by his only "catching slump." The Dodgers lost nine of the next eleven for which he put on the gear. But that span also represented one of his major triumphs of the year because he courageously played with a badly-pulled groin muscle, sustained August 6. In the same game Joe Ferguson suffered a pulled muscle in his rib cage and wasn't available again until mid-August. So, Yeager, limping badly, went behind the plate and won the admiration of all. Down the stretch Steve was back on the beam again and the Dodgers won 20 of the last 28 games in which he caught. Steve hit 12 homers to double his previous Major League total. Steve's excellent year made it possible for Walt Alston to send Ferguson to the outfield against southpaw pitching and much of the club's success was measured in the improved record against left-handers... 32 and 26 in 1973, 29 and 17 in 1974, Championship Series and World Series included.

"My role in 1974 was that of a spot starter and relief pitcher and I was happy to accept that role," says Geoff Zahn. The Dodgers were happy with the way Zahn performed in the difficult role. Geoff didn't receive his first starting assignment of the season until July 5. He responded to the call by yielding only one hit to Montreal in seven innings as the Dodgers blanked the Expos 7-0. Zahn started 10 games during the season and in these games his earned run average was an impressive 1.86 (13 earned runs in 63.1 innings). In four of his starts Zahn didn't give up an earned run although he had only one complete game—an 8-1 win over Atlanta on Sept. 9 in which Geoff gave up only four hits and the Braves' lone run was unearned. "You work all of your life to reach the big leagues and it's nice to find you can go nine innings," said Geoff. Zahn is a graduate of the University of Michigan, where he majored in biology and physical education. Geoff began his minor league career in 1968 and he had an outstanding record in the minors, winning 30 games and losing 11 during the 1972 and 1973 seasons while pitching for El Paso and Albuquerque.
