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# Walt Alston —

Dean of  
Baseball Managers



The 1976 season marks Walt Alston's 23rd consecutive campaign as the manager of the Dodgers . . . Walt will celebrate his 41st season in professional baseball in June of this year (he signed his first professional contract on June 19, 1935, with Greenwood, Miss.) and he will mark his 33rd anniversary as a manager in the Dodger organization on July 28 (his first managing job with the Dodger organization was with Trenton, New Jersey) . . . Alston's accomplishments as a manager are of Hall of Fame proportions . . . the 64-year-old Alston has been the manager of all four World Championship teams in Dodger history (1955, 1959, 1963 and 1965) and has managed seven Dodger teams to pennants . . . only four managers in the history of Major League baseball have won more pennants than Alston — Casey Stengel (10), John McGraw (10), Joe McCarthy (9) and Connie Mack (9), and this foursome is in the Hall of Fame . . . Only three managers have won more World Series than Alston — Stengel (7), McCarthy (7) and Mack (5) . . . only two men — Mack and McGraw — managed one club for a longer period than Alston . . . Walt has been honored as "Manager of the Year" by the Associated Press six times and by United Press International five times . . . Walt has won 1950 games as a Dodger manager and only five men in history have won more games — Mack (3776 in 53 years), McGraw (2840 in 33 years), Bucky Harris (2159 in 29 years), McCarthy (2126 in 24 years) and Leo Durocher (2019 in 24 years) . . . Alston has managed the National League All-Stars eight times and only Stengel has managed more All-Star teams (10) . . . Walt is the most victorious All-Star manager ever, having won his seventh classic in 1975.

# Dodger Coaches...



## 26—RED ADAMS

**CHARLES DWIGHT ADAMS** — Born 10-7-21, Harper, Calif.  
Ht. 6-2. Wt. 200. Threw and batted righthanded.

It was appropriate for Red Adams to accept the role of Santa Claus at the Dodgers' annual Christmas party for children... Red has been bringing joy to the Dodger pitchers for seven seasons in his role as the team's pitching coach... Red pitched in professional baseball for 20 years, most of that time in the Pacific Coast League... like Dodger manager Walt Alston, Red's big league trial was brief... he had one decision with the Chicago Cubs and his Major League record reflects an 0-1 mark... but Red has been a big winner as a Major League pitching coach... the Dodgers have had the best ERA in the Majors the past four years and the Dodger pitchers give Red much of the credit... Red is an outstanding instructor with the important ability to know a pitcher's style and to be able to detect a flaw in the pitching motion... new Dodger Burt Hooton, who compiled an 18-7 record as a Dodger, gives a great deal of credit to Red... "I enjoy working with pitchers," says Red. "Most of my life has involved the throwing of a baseball"... his philosophy in coaching? "I prefer to let a pitcher try something his way and then to come to me for help if things aren't working out well"... always willing to help, the results of Red's contributions are found in the Dodgers' team ERA mark.

## 54—MONTY BASGALL

**ROMANUS BASGALL** — Born 2-8-23, Pfeifer, Kan. Ht. 5-10 $\frac{1}{2}$ .  
Wt. 185. Threw and batted righthanded.

Monty Basgall has been a valuable member of the Dodger organization as a scout, minor league manager and in his present position as a Dodger coach... three of the Dodgers' four starting infielders have undergone position changes and Basgall has been a key man in these transitions (Steve Garvey making the switch from third base to first base and both second baseman Davey Lopes and shortstop Bill Russell moving to their positions after starting as centerfielders)... one of the first infielders Basgall worked with in the Arizona Instructional League was Jim Lefebvre, and Jim went on to win Rookie of the Year honors in 1965... four years later another Basgall pupil, Ted Sizemore, made the transition from catcher to second base in Arizona and Ted was the Rookie of the Year winner in 1969... Monty's initial association with the Dodgers began in 1941 when he was signed as a second baseman by scout Bert Wells... Basgall played most of his career in the Pittsburgh organization but he returned to the Dodgers as a scout in 1959 and later managed in the Dodger organization before becoming a coach in 1973.

## 19—JIM GILLIAM

**JAMES GILLIAM** — Born 10-17-28, Nashville, Tenn.  
Ht. 5-11½. Wt. 180. Threw right and batted right and  
lefthanded.

Jim Gilliam has been a success in every assignment he has had in professional baseball — as a player, as a player-coach, as a coach and as a manager in Winter baseball... he hasn't campaigned for a position as a big league manager but Jim will admit — when questioned — that he would like to try his hand at managing and he is confident he can do a good job... Gilliam has been doing a good job as a member of the Dodger organization for more than a quarter of a century, having joined the Dodgers' Montreal club in 1951... the 1976 season marks Jim's 24th season as a uniformed member of the parent Dodgers... Jim was the National League's Rookie of the Year in 1953 and his playing career extended through the 1966 season, serving as a player-coach in 1965 and 1966... Jim is the senior Dodger coach, having served as a member of Walt Alston's crew on a full-time basis since 1967... he spent the Winter of 1973 managing San Juan of the Puerto Rican League.

## 52—TOM LASORDA

**THOMAS CHARLES LASORDA** — Born 9-22-27, Morristown, Pa. Ht. 5-9. Wt. 175. Threw and batted left-handed.

The respect for Tommy Lasorda extends beyond the limits of the Dodger organization... "Braves Seek Lasorda" and "Lasorda Sought By Expos" were headlines in Southland newspapers during the late stages and after the close of the 1975 season... Tommy Lasorda remains a Dodger, because that's what he has been most of his life... Tommy first joined the Dodger organization in November of 1948 as a player and he has been with the organization almost continuously since then (a total of 27 seasons) as a player, scout, minor league manager and coach... in seven seasons as a minor league manager in the Dodger organization, Tommy's teams won five pennants with one second place tie and one third place finish... Tommy was voted the Minor League "Manager of the Year" as his Spokane team won the Pacific Coast League pennant by 26 games in 1970... Tommy became a Dodger coach in 1973... during the past four Winters he has managed Licey of the Dominican Republic League.

### DID YOU KNOW THAT...

Four Dodgers have hit home runs in their first Major League appearance and two of the four have come by a pitcher. All four hit home runs for Brooklyn. They are: pitcher Dan Bankhead, Aug. 26, 1947; pitcher Clise Dudley, April 27, 1929; outfielder Ernie Koy, April 19, 1938; and infielder Gordon Slade, May 24, 1930. Who will be the first Los Angeles Dodger to do it?

### IT NEVER RAINS AT DODGER STADIUM...

Only one National League game has ever been rained out at Dodger Stadium — April 21, 1967 versus St. Louis Cardinals (Don Drysdale vs. Bob Gibson). The game was called at 8:35 p.m. and it snapped a string of 737 consecutive games without a rainout. Prior to this season the Dodgers have played 724 games at Dodger Stadium without a rainout.





## 2—ORLANDO ALVAREZ

**ALVAREZ, JESUS ORLANDO** — Born 2-28-53, Cienega Baja, P.R. Bats-R. Throws-R. Ht. 6-0. Wt. 185. Single. How obtained: Signed by Dodgers as free agent in May, 1969.

As a hitter, Orlando Alvarez has gained some believers in his abilities... among them are Dodger batting instructor Dixie Walker and Stan Wasiak, Orlando's manager for the past two seasons at Albuquerque... "He has a natural swing and good power," says Walker. Wasiak says, "He has power, great wrist snap, and makes contact... he is one of the most aggressive hitters around"... to earn these compliments, Alvarez has hit over .300 for the past three seasons, batting .303 at Waterbury in 1973, and .316 and .303 the past two seasons at Albuquerque... he also has power, displayed by the 106 runs he drove in at Waterbury in 1973 to shatter Richie Zisk's three-year-old record of 88... he was named as the starting leftfielder for the East in last year's Pacific Coast League All-Star Game... a consistent hitter, Alvarez enjoyed a 23-game hitting streak (42-for-90—.467) for the Dukes during the 1974 season... a veteran of six years in the Dodger organization, Alvarez batted .298 and .287 for Bakersfield of the California League in 1971 and 1972... in 1970, his first year of pro ball, he hit .236 for Daytona Beach after signing with the Dodgers as a free agent in May, 1969.

## 1—RICK AUERBACH

**AUERBACH, FREDERICK STEVEN** — Born 2-15-50, Glendale, Calif. Bats-R. Throws-R. Ht. 6-0. Wt. 165. Single. How obtained: Purchased from the Milwaukee Brewers, October 27, 1973.

One of the early season heroes of the Dodgers in 1975 was Rick Auerbach... when Dodger shortstop Bill Russell suffered a broken bone in his left hand in the fifth game of the season the starting assignment was turned over to Rick... in the Dodgers' home opener against Cincinnati it was Rick who found himself in the spotlight as he stroked two hits and scored two runs. The Dodgers swept the Reds in four games with Rick at shortstop for the series... playing shortstop for the Dodgers is a dream come true for Rick... he was born in Glendale, grew up in Woodland Hills and was a star in Little League, at Taft High and at Pierce JC... Rick's favorite player as a youngster was the Dodger shortstop—Maury Wills... Rick was drafted by the Angels in 1968 while attending Pierce JC but he elected not to sign and then was drafted and signed by the Seattle Pilots in 1969... Rick's only season as a regular in the Majors came in 1972 when he played in 153 games for the Milwaukee Brewers... he batted .218 and stole 24 bases... Rick is regarded as an outstanding defensive shortstop. "He's crab-like in the way he plays shortstop," says Dodger announcer Vin Scully. Promising Dodger newcomer who is expected to step into the vacated center field position... a native Californian, Baker returns to the West Coast after spending the first eight seasons of his big league career with the Atlanta Braves... "I can always remember being a Dodger fan when I was a young boy," says Dusty, "and my favorite player was Tommy Davis... boy, could he hit"... ironically, Baker will be wearing Tommy D's old number—12... last year Baker led the Braves in runs batted in with 72, while hitting .261 and hit 19 home runs... his best season in the majors came in 1973, when he hit 21 homers, drove in 99 runs and stole 24 bases... the 26-year-old outfielder established himself in his first full year in the majors by hitting .321 in 1972, which was the third highest batting average among National League leaders... "We feel Dusty will be a big aid to our ball club in our bid to win the N.L. title," says Dodger Vice-President Al Campanis, who engineered the trade... "He can run, throw, field, and hit with power, and it's our feeling that he is yet to reach his peak. Our scouting reports on him have always been good"... Baker came into professional baseball as one of those steals baseball people dream of... passed up by every team in the major leagues, the Braves landed him in the free agent draft of 1967—in the 25th round... Baker was an all-around athlete at Del Campo High School in Carmichael, Calif., where he was a centerfielder in baseball, a halfback in football, a forward in basketball and a sprinter and long jumper in track and field... at the age of 10 Dusty almost set aside baseball because he wasn't making all-star teams... he wanted a paper route, but his dad had a talk with him and it set him on his way to playing major league baseball... loves to hunt and fish... admires former teammate Hank Aaron... Aaron on Baker, "Dusty Baker has more potential than any outfielder I've seen in all my seasons with the Braves. He can hit, run, throw and field and he wants to play the game. He'll be a fine power hitter."

The 1975 season was one of frustration for Bill Buckner... on April 18th, in a game against the Giants at Dodger Stadium, Buckner suffered a severely sprained left ankle sliding into second base... he had to be placed on the disabled list and the injury was to hamper Buckner all season... for Buckner the season ended early as he underwent surgery on his left ankle the first week of September... Buckner batted .243, his lowest mark during any full season of his professional career... in 1974 Buckner had led the Dodgers in batting at .314—the fourth best mark in the N.L.—and he had 31 stolen bases... hobbled by the injured ankle, Buckner stole only eight bases in 1975... never before had he encountered such frustration at bat... in his first professional season Buckner batted .344 to lead the Pioneer League... in his first full Major League season Buckner batted .277... his Major League average for six seasons entering 1975 was .292... Billy Buckner was accustomed to base hits... With all of his frustration, the battling Buckner never lost his confidence. "I'm swinging a lot better and, yes, I really do think I'm going to hit .300 this season," Buckner stated in early July, adding "but first I've got to hit .200"... the sprained left ankle wasn't Buckner's only injury of 1975... he also had to battle a pulled muscle in his right leg. "Between the two injuries I must have carried three pounds of tape around every night," said Buckner.

Burke also hit over .300 in both of his first two years of professional baseball, batting .340 at Spokane in 1972 and .309 at Daytona Beach in 1973... once an outstanding basketball player, Burke led his Berkeley High School team to a 32-0 season in 1970, averaging 23.5 points and 11.5 rebounds per game while being named to virtually every possible all-star team... Glenn signed with the Dodgers following an outstanding two-sport career at Merritt Junior College in Oakland, giving up the opportunity to play for UCLA on a basketball scholarship.

There's a clear trend in the batting performance of Ron Cey as a Dodger... for Cey and the Dodgers the trend is most encouraging; for opponents the trend has to be frightening... in three seasons as a Dodger regular Ron Cey has improved his home run totals from 15 in 1973, to 18 in 1974 and 25 in 1975... his RBI totals in these three years have been: 80, 97 and 101... and his batting average has jumped from .245 to .262 to .283... in 1975 Ron Cey established himself in a "star" class. His 25 home runs and 101 RBIs led the Dodgers and were ALL-TIME records by a Dodger third baseman... Ron ranked second among Dodgers in games played (158) and doubles (29), was third in hits (160) and fourth in runs (72)... he was voted to the N.L. All-Star team for the second year in a row and his All-Star totals show two hits in five at-bats... Ron's improvement is not without design. "I want to keep on improving," says Ron. "I don't want to stop improving or stop growing, either. I don't want to stop growing until I'm ready to quit"... Ron's improvement on offense has been matched by his defensive performance... "Ron made more diving stops in 1975 than I've seen in a long time," says Dodger manager Walt Alston. "In 1974 I thought he was much quicker than he was in 1973. And he was quicker in 1975 than ever"... only two N.L. players topped Cey in both homers and RBIs — Johnny Bench of the Reds and Greg Luzinski of the Phils... Ron tied for fifth in the N.L. in both departments.

But if I don't play every day I'll wait and be ready to play."... One of the highlights of Willie's 1975 season came on Sept. 15 when he hit a three-run homer in the bottom of the ninth to give the Dodgers a 5-4 win over San Diego — marking Burt Hooton's 11th win in a row as a Dodger as he tied a Dodger record shared by Sandy Koufax and Don Drysdale. When Hooton (who went on to win 12 in a row) was asked if he thought Crawford's hit was going to clear the fence in right field, he replied: "The ball was hit so hard that if it didn't go over the fence it would have gone through the fence."

Despite a rash of injuries that have hampered him from making it to the big leagues sooner, Henry Cruz appears ready to hold down a permanent spot on the Dodger's major league roster... playing with the Dodgers long enough to get into 53 games in 1975, Cruz hit .266, while impressing Manager Walt Alston with his ability to make contact and to play solid defense in the outfield... Henry spent the other half of the 1975 season at Albuquerque, the Dodger's AAA affiliate of the Pacific Coast League, where he batted .310 (fourth highest on the club) with seven home runs and 41 RBIs... Cruz was Fajardo High School's Most Valuable Player in baseball and basketball, and established school records in the 100 meters (10.9), 200 meters (22.3), and long jump (23-10)... he also attended Inter-Americana University in Puerto Rico and recorded marks of 21.6 in the 200 meters and 24-5 in the long jump.

"If he can hit .270 in the major leagues he could become one of the next great ones."... spending half the season with the major league club and the other half with Albuquerque, the Dodgers' AAA affiliate of the Pacific Coast League, De Jesus showed great promise in 1975, despite the shuffling... Ivan hit .271 in 62 games for the Dukes, while batting .184 for the Dodgers in 63 games... his fielding drew raves at both locations... De Jesus is a six-year veteran of professional baseball, despite being only 23-years-old... he got his first look with the big club late in the 1974 season, after batting .298 for Albuquerque and being named to the Class AAA All-Star team... De Jesus' hitting has shown considerable improvement in recent seasons after hitting below the .250 mark for the first four years of his career... "I've got the same confidence in my hitting now as I have in my fielding," says Ivan.

Bobby Detherage came into his own as a base-stealing threat in 1975, stealing 31 bases for Waterbury, the Dodgers' AA affiliate of the Eastern League... his efforts helped the club to a total of 201 stolen bases, second highest in modern E.L. history... in addition to his accomplishments on the basepaths, the young outfielder hit .252 at the plate, with four home runs and 35 runs batted in... although beginning only his fourth year in professional baseball he has shown enough promise to merit a spot on the Dodgers' 1976 40-man roster... Detherage spent the 1974 season at Bakersfield of the California League, where he batted .311, with 14 home runs and 77 RBIs... in 1973, his first season of professional baseball, he batted .348 for Ogden of the Pioneer League after a brief stay with Daytona Beach... once a pitcher of high regard, Bobby owned a 15-2 record playing American Legion baseball in Springfield, Mo., in 1972... however, his pitching was overshadowed by his record-setting .463 batting average... at Hillcrest High School in Springfield, Detherage received all-state honors in baseball for three straight seasons.

Dimmel, who signed a contract with the Dodgers in 1973 following a stellar prep career at Logansport High School (Logansport, Ind.), reported to Ogden, the Dodgers' A club of the Pioneer League, and hit .235 in 48 games... confident of my abilities as a pitcher now than I was when I came into the league in 1971," says Gentleman Al...used as both a spot-starter and a reliever, Downing pitched 74.2 innings last year, earning a 2-1 record...Al recorded both of his victories in relief last season, pitching two innings in a 6-5 win over San Diego on July 2, and two innings in a 5-4 win over San Francisco on July 5...However, Al's most impressive performances came when he was called upon to start...for example, he wasn't called upon as a starting pitcher until the 43rd game of the season, but performed admirably, pitching seven strong innings against St. Louis on May 23, giving up only two runs on three hits...nearly a month later, on June 22, Downing made his second start of the year and limited the Padres to just one run on five hits while working the first six innings..."I feel I can help the club most as a starter," says Downing, "but it's not in my nature to complain. It was late June and Joe Ferguson was fighting to hypo his batting average. "It's aggravating," he declared, "I'm hitting around .200 and I feel like I'm batting .300. I've belted more balls hard than I have hits." Joe Ferguson was looking for something to get himself started and the Dodgers started on a winning track. Unfortunately, Ferguson's season came to a halt on July 1st when he suffered a fractured right arm in a five-minute free-for-all that was triggered by a knockdown pitch from San Diego's Bill Greif at Willie Crawford's left hip. . . statistics that Joe Ferguson was hoping to improve became final statistics — including a .208 batting average . . . Fergie had suffered a miserable April, batting only .167 with no homers and six RBIs, but he started to warm up in May and in one five game stretch — May 21-25 — he went 8-for-18 and drove in four runs with two homers . . . "Once I get going, I'll keep hitting," said Ferguson. "It's a matter of gaining confidence." . . . the Dodgers are hopeful Ferguson will regain his form of 1973 when he slugged 25 home runs and drove in 88 runs . . . originally an outfielder, Joe made one of the memorable throws in World Series history in 1974 when he nailed Sal Bando at home plate in game No. 1.

Steve Garvey was the National League's Most Valuable Player in 1974... although he didn't repeat as the MVP in 1975 Steve did improve his performance in several key areas—collecting 210 hits (10 more than in 1974), batting .319 (seven points up from his MVP season) and playing in 160 of the Dodgers' 162 games (four more games than he played in 1974)... in 1974 Steve won the Gold Glove title by making only eight errors. He repeated his performance in the field in 1975 by making only eight errors for a .995 percentage and again won the Gold Glove... Steve became the first L.A. Dodger ever to have two 200-hit seasons in a row. The only other L.A. Dodgers ever to have as many as 200 hits in a season are Tommy Davis (230) and Maury Wills (208), both in 1962... Steve's 210 hits tied him for second in the N.L. with the Reds' Pete Rose as the Phils' Dave Cash won the hit title with 213... When the 1975 MVP vote was announced it showed Steve finishing 11th as the Reds' Joe Morgan won the award. Even before the announcement, Steve had declared "Joe Morgan has had a tremendous year and he'd get my vote if I had one."... in voting for the Dodger of the Year in a poll conducted by Datsun, Steve was the winner... he led the Dodgers in games, hits, doubles (38), and tied for the club lead in triples (6)... he finished second on the club in runs (85) and RBIs (95) and tied for second in homers with 18... he was voted to the N.L. All-Star team for the second year in a row and contributed a home run to the N.L.'s victory... Steve's biggest home run of the season came on Sept. 26 when he hit a two-run shot in the bottom of the ninth to beat Houston 3-2 and give Burt Hooton 12 wins in a row for a club record by a starting pitcher. "This is my happiest moment of the season," said Steve. "All of the guys know how much Burt wanted to win this one and I'm happy to have made a contribution."

John Hale is 22 years old and an outfielder with much promise and sock... he was called up from Albuquerque of the Pacific Coast League on June 30, 1975, and promptly was inserted into the starting line-up... Hale played in 71 games and hit .211 with six homers and 22 RBIs... showed outstanding power and fine speed... had an outstanding season at Albuquerque where he hit .283 with 11 homers and 46 RBIs... was hit in head by Tucson pitcher Leo Mazzone and was out two weeks... "I thought the side of my face was crushed," he said. "Without the flap at my temple, it might have been curtains."... returned to Dukes' lineup and hit four home runs in four consecutive days, went 11-for-21 at the plate for a .524 average and knocked in 10 runs... this prompted Dodger Vice-President Al Campanis to summon Hale to Los Angeles... prior to leaving for Los Angeles, Hale earned Topps Player of the Month honors for June in the PCL... he hit .288 with six homers and 21 RBIs for the month at Albuquerque... one of biggest thrills was a game-winning homer in the 12th inning to beat the Chicago Cubs on July 20th... has progressed at each step up the Dodger minor league ladder... in 1974 he was a perfect 4-for-4 with Dodgers after being called up in the final month from Waterbury... Hale drove in the winning run Oct. 1 at Houston — the night the Dodgers clinched the West Division title — and scored the winning run in the final game of the season the next night... was a prep star at Wasco (California) Union High School where he played baseball, basketball and football and won all-league honors in all three sports in his senior year... hit .510 in his senior year while playing third base... voted South Sequoia League's MVP... attended California State University at Bakersfield two years... signed with Dodgers and moved to first base and later converted to an outfielder... besides the beaming in 1975, Hale had another frightening experience... in 1971 at Ogden, the Dodgers' rookie team in Utah, Hale was hit by a bouncing ball squarely in the nose... his nose was packed at the hospital with 18 feet of packing... Hale took a swing in batting practice and it bled again for 45 minutes and it was packed again... when he was sent home and on a jet his nose bled again and the plane had to make an emergency landing in Reno... "I passed out on the plane," Hale said. "All I remember is they slid me down a chute to an ambulance. I thought I was gone."

Promising young right-hander Ubaldo Heredia earned a spot on the Dodger 40-man roster for the first time this past winter... a native of Nueva Esparta, Venezuela, Heredia signed with the Dodgers as a free agent in 1972 after pitching in the Juvenil World Series for his National team in Caracas, Venezuela, that year... Ubaldo has been used as both a starter and reliever in his brief career in the Dodger organization... last year, pitching for Danville of the Midwest League, he started 25 of the 26 games he appeared in, working 154 innings and finishing with an 11-13 record and a 3.33 ERA... he recorded 99 strikeouts... in 1974, Heredia was used strictly as a reliever for the Bellingham Dodgers of the Northwest League, making 22 appearances while recording a 2-0 mark... Ubaldo spent the 1973 season at Ogden, but suffered arm trouble and appeared in only two games... he began the 1974 season with Orangeburg before moving to Bellingham early in the season... tall and lanky in stature, Heredia's loose, easy motion makes his good fastball a deceiving one.

**HOOTON, BURT CARLTON** — Born 2-7-50, Greenville, Tex. Bats-R. Throws-R. Ht. 6-1. Wt. 200. Wife's name and wedding date: Ginger (12-30-72). Children: Eugene Carlton (11-2-75). How obtained: Traded from Chicago Cubs for pitchers Geoff Zahn and Eddie Solomon, May 2, 1975.

One writer described it as "The Great Arm Robbery"... the trade that brought Burt Hooton from the Chicago Cubs to the Los Angeles Dodgers on May 2, 1975, was just that for Dodger Vice-President Al Campanis, who gave up pitchers Geoff Zahn and Eddie Solomon for the talented righthander from Texas... Burt didn't like being in the bullpen and he received his chance to join the Dodger rotation on May 9 against Pittsburgh... he pitched six strong innings but was hit by a line drive and had to leave the game... first complete game victory came in his next outing on May 13 as he two-hit the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-0... many observers felt Burt couldn't win day games as he racked up his first six victories for the Dodgers under the lights, however he proved them wrong with a 4-3 mark in the daytime... he erased the names of Sandy Koufax and Don Drysdale from the Dodger record for consecutive victories by a starting pitcher as he won his last 12 straight... was 6-0 with a 1.06 ERA in August to earn National League Pitcher of the Month honors and duplicated the N.L. award in September as he recorded a 5-0 record with a 2.41 ERA... took a liking to Dodger Stadium as he lost only three games there and has not lost at home since July 1... 18 wins on the year is the most in his career for a season, as is his complete game total of 12 and strikeouts at 153... besides his two-hitter, he tossed three three-hit shutouts... his knuckle curve has been a big part of his success... two men, contact lenses and a change of scenery also proved to be a big help in Hooton's turn-around... the contact lenses helped him pick up the plate better and also helped his concentration... pitching coach Red Adams corrected two flaws in his delivery and hypnotist Arthur Ellen gave him a 20-minute visit... "I came away relaxed, calm, assured of what I would do. The hypnotist turned it around. He rid me of all my negative thoughts,"... Burt also lost 25 pounds via a daily jogging program... Hooton was selected by the Chicago Cubs in the June, 1971, free agent draft and made his first big league appearance 9 days later (June 17), striking out the first major league hitter he faced—Lou Brock... he was later sent to Tacoma and on Aug. 17 tied a Pacific Coast League record with 19 strikeouts—a record that had not been challenged since 1905... his next outing he fanned 16... recalled at the end

of the 1971 season, Hooton struck out 15 Mets on Sept. 15 to tie the Cubs' all-time strikeout record and on Sept. 21 came back to record his first shutout of his career against the Mets... prep days found him pitching Richard King High to the 1967 state championship in Texas with a 15-1 record... accepted a full scholarship to the University of Texas where he was a three-time All-America with a career record of 35-3 and a 1.14 ERA in 291 innings... in 1972, pitched a no-hitter against Philadelphia (April 16) in only his fourth career major league start... nicknamed "The Owl" because he would stay up all night watching TV... Coach Tom Lasorda labeled him "Happy" because he seldom looks like he is... after tying Koufax and Drysdale for the consecutive victory record for a starting pitcher, Burt said, "It's nice to be mentioned with those names, but it's even better to be mentioned on the Dodger roster."

A knuckleball pitcher normally seeks a lot of work... and Charlie Hough is no exception... with Cy Young Award winner Mike Marshall in the Dodger bullpen, Hough has been patient... his call came after Marshall was hurt and was out for the season on Aug. 31... Charlie reeled off a string of 16 relief innings allowing just one earned run (0.56 ERA) and after allowing the run came back to hurl 17.2 innings allowing one earned run (0.50)... the two strings saw him pitch 33.2 innings and allow just two earned runs for a 0.53 ERA... he appeared in 38 games for the year — third best on the Dodger staff... a three-time Pacific Coast League all-star pitcher (1970-71-72), Hough hurt his arm in the 1969 season at Albuquerque... "I went to Arizona and there was no way to describe my pitching except to say it was mediocre," Hough said. Dodger scout Goldie Holt introduced Charlie to the knuckleball in the Arizona Instructional League and his next season at Spokane in 1970 saw him record a 12-8 record with a 1.95 ERA... veteran knuckleballer Hoyt Wilhelm, who joined the Dodger staff, and former roommate Jim Brewer, also gave Hough advice... Hough was a star baseball player at Hialeah (Fla.) High and was signed as a third baseman... the one thing that Charlie remembers in his first professional game is striking out Pittsburgh Pirate outfielder Willie Stargell with the bases loaded... his father, Richard, played pro ball from 1928-38 and in World War II was a Japanese prisoner of war for three years, receiving the Silver Star with two clusters.

Tommy John hopes to become one of the greatest comeback stories in baseball...many persons seemed convinced T.J.'s career had ended after rupturing a ligament in his left elbow on July 17, 1974, against Montreal...Tommy underwent surgery on Sept. 25, 1974, as a tendon from his right forearm was used in the reconstruction of his left elbow...Tommy didn't sit around during the 1975 season...he ran five to six miles, threw in the bullpen, underwent therapy and took part in an exercising program every day...in mid-June he added throwing batting practice to his routine...he also charted his team-mates pitches and used a radar gun to measure velocity during the season...in September, 1975 he reported to Mesa, Ariz., for the Arizona Instructional League season...had outstanding season with 3-1 record and 2.90 ERA (10 earned runs in 31 innings)...control outstanding with only 10 walks...previously had surgery to left elbow for removal of bone fragments in 1972...Tommy's record in 1974 when he was injured was 13-3 (.813) and was the best mark in the N.L. for winning percentage for the second straight year (he was 16-7 at .696 in 1973)...had his best start in 1974 since 1968 when he was 10-5 with 1.98 ERA for the Chicago White Sox after his first 25 games...however, in early August, he was involved in a fight with Dick McAuliffe and suffered a broken collarbone, sidelining him for the season...has won in double figures in nine of his 12 years in majors...was selected to 1968 All-Star team...has great recuperative powers... Davey Lopes has established himself as one of the leading "bandits" in baseball...he loves to steal bases and has brought the chants of "Go, Go, Go" back to Dodger Stadium...Davey captured the Major League stolen base crown and it marked the 14th time a Dodger won the N.L. title as he swiped 77 bases last season...only six men in Major League history have stolen more bases in one season...the six are: Lou Brock (118), Maury Wills (104), Ty Cobb (96), Clyde Milan (88), Eddie Collins (81) and Bob Bescher (80)...Lopes rewrote the record books in stealing 77 bases as he stole 38 consecutive bases without being caught (see chart)...this topped the old mark of 31 set by Pittsburgh's Max Carey in 1922...in 1974 Lopes tied a 70-year-old National League record by stealing five bases in a game against the St. Louis Cardinals (Aug. 24)... "Experience is of tremendous importance in baserunning," Lopes said. "The more I play the better I'll become. A good baserunner doesn't have to guess. My memory bank and my ability to get a good jump are my greatest assets...I learned a lot last season, but I feel I will hit my peak in base stealing within the next two or three years and I think records will come with this." Davey received a compliment from one of the greatest catchers in the game — Cincinnati's Johnny Bench. Bench said, "He's the best there is at stealing. Lopes not only has the knowledge and the speed, but also the quick acceleration. He has everything. I agree with Lou Brock that if there's anyone around who can break his record at 118, it is Davey"...the 29-year-old second baseman, who comes from a family of 12, was signed as an outfielder but was switched to second base prior to the 1971 season...during the off-season Davey worked with the youngsters in the Arizona Instructional League on base stealing...a graduate of Washburn University (Topeka, KA) in 1969, Lopes considers this one of his greatest achievements, "mainly because not many kids from my area earned college degrees"...prior to Washburn University, Lopes earned All-State honors in basketball and baseball at LaSalle Academy in Providence, RI...Davey has taught elementary education...and now he's teaching the pitchers and catchers of the N.L. a lesson in stealing...

"I'm not saying Mike Marshall is the Messiah, but he's the only guy I've talked to about sore arms and throwing who's made any sense. Without Mike's help, there would be no way that I could have thrown a football effectively this year." These were the words of Minnesota football great Fran Tarkenton on Dodger pitcher Mike Marshall... Marshall knows a lot about arms and hopes to earn the title of "Dr." as he nears his PhD in physiology with a minor in physiological psychology this year... what he didn't know last year was a rib would break loose from the sternum in the left rib cage and give the 1974 Cy Young Award winner trouble throughout the '75 season... after appearing in a record-breaking 106 games with a 15-12 record and a 2.42 ERA in helping the Dodgers to a N.L. championship, Mike was 9-14 with a 3.30 ERA in 57 games last year... Marshall looked to be strong as ever as he was 2-1 with a 1.15 ERA in his first six games, but on April 19 against San Francisco Mike injured his rib cage in warm-ups... he returned on May 3, but in his second appearance, on May 9 at Pittsburgh, Mike reinjured the rib cage and was placed on the 21-day disabled list... Marshall returned to action June 6 and was selected to the N.L. All-Star Team... on August 31 against New York, Mike's season came to a close as he once again injured his rib cage... "I've been on a program during the off-season that I hope will rectify what happened last year," Mike said... Marshall, a professor in kinesiology at Michigan State became the first relief pitcher to win the Cy Young Award in 1974... he holds Major League records for games pitched (106), innings pitched in relief (208.1), games finished (83) and consecutive games pitched (13)... he became the first relief pitcher in 24 years to win N.L. Pitcher of the Year honors by The Sporting News in 1974... Marshall began his career as a shortstop and switched to the mound in 1965... it was the screwball pitch which propelled Mike to the majors and labeled him as one of the finest relief pitchers in the game...

Ken McMullen's first two hits of 1975 produced seven runs batted in and two Dodger victories... both were pinch-hit home runs, coming in the late innings with the Dodgers trailing... the first, coming on April 24 in San Diego, was a grand slam that ignited an 11-6 win... the second, a three-run blast at Dodger Stadium against Philadelphia, provided the headway for a 4-3 victory.... "It seems like every time I hit one out, it has a tendency to get the club going," says McMullen, who had three pinch hit home runs in 1974... ordinarily assigned specifically to pinch hitting duty, McMullen showed his versatility in the field late in the 1975 season, filling in at both first and third base for the Dodgers' two "iron men," Steve Garvey and Ron Cey... when Garvey was struck with the flu, McMullen played both games of the Sept. 1-2 San Francisco series at first base, playing flawless defense while picking up three hits and three RBIs at the plate... five days later Ron Cey injured a knee and Mac re-entered the starting lineup, playing two games at third without an error... originally a Dodger in the early '60's, McMullen figured in two big Dodger deals... he went to Washington with Frank Howard as part of the deal which brought Claude Osteen to Los Angeles in 1965... he returned in the winter of 1972-73, along with Andy Messersmith, in a trade that sent Frank Robinson, Bill Singer, Bobby Valentine, Bill Grabarkewitz, and Mike Strahler to the Angels.

Andy Messersmith termed his 1975 season with the Los Angeles Dodgers as his "best season ever" and the numbers back up his statement... Andy finished the year with a 19-14 record and had the second best earned run average in the National League at 2.29... of his 40 starts, he completed 19 games to lead the league... the 19 completions is the most by a Dodger pitcher since Sandy Koufax completed 27 games in 1966... Messersmith also topped the N.L. in most games started (40), most innings pitched (322), and most shutouts (7)... All of these numbers rank as personal highs for Andy in his career... Andy became the tenth L.A. Dodger pitcher to hurl 300 or more innings in a season and his total was the most since Sandy Koufax tossed 323 innings in 1966... Messersmith finished third in the N.L. in strikeouts with 213... Andy was selected to the N.L. All-Star team in 1975—the third time he has received all-star honors... he was named N.L. Player of the Week for Sept. 8-14 when he hurled two shutouts and allowed just eight hits against the Giants and Braves... although his 1975 statistics were impressive, they could have been greater as numerous times Andy didn't get much support... after winning his first seven straight games of the season and 12 of his first 16, the Dodger bats went into hiding... from July 4 on, Andy lost seven of his next eight decisions as the Dodgers scored a total of 10 runs in the seven losses... Andy finished strong, allowing just four

earned runs in his last 38 innings in recording four straight wins, including two three-hitters and two shutouts... Andy earned his second straight Gold Glove, awarded for fielding excellence... Messersmith pitched in two games in one day on May 31 at Chicago... he finished a suspended game to earn a save, but lost the second game, 2-1... noted for sensational starts, Andy pitched a one-hit shutout in his first professional game (June 26, 1966) as Seattle defeated Tulsa... and in his Major League debut (Sept. 6, 1968) Andy pitched a two-hit shutout as the Angels blanked Boston, 4-0... Messersmith placed his name in the record books on May 28, 1973, when he struck out Philadelphia's first six batters to set a N.L. mark and tie a Major League record for consecutive strikeouts at the start of a game...

Manny Mota is a manager's dream — he's "Mr. Pinch Hitter." ... he just comes off the bench and does his job — no questions asked ... Rick is ready for any competition ... he has established himself as the table tennis champion of Dodgertown and last year was the Dodgers' bubble gum blowing champion ... the title Rick is after, however, is that of a first-class starting pitcher ... the

Dodgers believe Rick is getting close. "Rick showed in 1975 that he is capable of starting," says Dodger VP Al Campanis... Rhoden started 11 games for the Dodgers, compiling a 3-3 mark with a respectable 3.09 ERA... "Rick has shown me good stuff and good control as well as a lot of poise," said Walt Alston in a late-season appraisal of the 22-year-old Dodger righthander... Rick's lone complete game of 1975 was a most impressive one as he defeated Cincinnati, 5-2 on Sept. 11 on a seven-hitter... he won by the same 5-2 score in his next outing against San Diego on Sept. 16... at age eight Rick was hurt in a freak accident while playing on a 40-foot strip of plastic—hosed down with water—upon which youngsters ran and slid for distance... one afternoon Rick's right knee was severely cut by a pair of rusty scissors that somehow wedged in the grass, concealed under the plastic... Rick thought little of the injury until two months later when he was stricken with a fever... doctors then found an infection in his leg. An operation revealed that osteomyelitis had damaged much of the knee tissue. More surgery removed the tissue. Rick wore a brace until the age of 12, and then walked with a cane... he underwent another operation to remove part of his left knee so his left leg would not outgrow his right... Some observers have compared the 6-3, 195-pound Rhoden to former Dodger great Don Drysdale. "I suppose anyone who is tall, righthanded and a pitcher reminds people of Drysdale," says Rick. Bill Russell would just as soon forget his 1975 season... after playing in all 162 games in 1973 (only one other player in N.L. played in all games) and 160 of 162 games in 1972, not to mention a mark of 392 of 394 games, Russell fought injuries for the entire 1975 season... after the 1974 season Russell underwent surgery on his left elbow to tie down a nerve in his "funny bone" area... he was all set for 1975 when he suffered a freak injury... on April 12 at Houston, Bill was tagging Cesar Cedeno at second base... with the tag came a broken left hand and the talented shortstop was lost for nearly a month... Russell returned on May 9 but the next day in Pittsburgh, he dove for a liner and injured his left knee and was sidelined again... he returned to action on June 30 and promptly hit in seven straight games... however, with loss of so much time it was like Spring training all over again for Russell... in 84 games in 1975, Russell hit .206... prior to 1975, Bill was one of the leading shortstops in the N.L. in hitting... he hit .272 in 1972 and came back with a .265 mark in 1973 and a .269 figure in 1974... has outstanding range and speed... broke in as an outfielder and was converted in Arizona Instructional League in 1970 to shortstop... Dodger coach Monty Basgall worked with Russell and the talented shortstop even tried switch-hitting... his first pro game as a Dodger is one he always will remember as he went four-for-four and hit for the cycle... in 1973 earned honors as Newspaper Enterprise Association's Major League shortstop in a poll of players... was selected to the N.L. All-Star team in 1973... nicknamed "Ropes"... attended Pittsburg High School (Pittsburg, Kan.) where he was a basketball star... loves to hunt and fish... "He makes plays other shortstops can't make," said manager Walt Alston. "When it comes to covering ground and for strength of arm he's right there with the best."

Don Sutton's accomplishments as a Dodger are best noted in the area of comparisons with other pitchers on the Dodgers' all-time lists... Don has recorded 40 shutouts, tying him with Sandy Koufax for second place on the all-time list. Don Drysdale (49) is the only Dodger with more shutouts. Sutton has won 155 games as a Dodger, ranking sixth on the all-time list. He ranks second on the Dodger all-time list in games started (353); Drysdale leads with 465; and is fourth in strikeouts (1913) and 11th in complete games (110). And he is on the move. Eleven more wins and Don will move past both Burleigh Grimes (158) and Koufax (165). Six more strikeouts and Don will surpass Dazzy Vance (1918). Don's next complete game will tie him with Don Newcombe (111) and five more will move him past Van Lingle Mungo (114)... in 10 seasons as a Dodger there have been high and low points for Don but, over-all his career has been marked by a high level of consistency... he has averaged 15.5 wins per season and in each of his 10 seasons he has been in the double figures each year. Don admits he is tired of being confronted with the question of why he hasn't won 20 games in a season... he has been within one victory of 20 on two occasions and in half of his 10 seasons he has missed the 20-win circle by three victories or less. "Certainly I want to win 20, just like a hitter wants to hit .300," Don said last season after posting his 16th victory on August 10th. "But the only time I really think about it is when I'm reminded that I've never won 20 before."... Don lost four decisions in a row after posting his 16th win and his season came to a frustrating end on Sept. 12 when he suffered a severe sprain of his left ankle... Don's 2.87 earned run average was the sixth best mark in the National League and was more indicative of his work than his final record.

Steve Yeager never has lacked for confidence... you might say it runs in the Yeager family... Steve's uncle, Charles (Chuck) Yeager, was a young man of 24 when he volunteered to fly the X-1 rocket plane in 1947 in an assault on the sound barrier. A temporary captain in the Air Force with only a high school education and little engineering background, Chuck Yeager's chances of receiving the assignment were slim. But his self-confidence helped him receive the opportunity and on Oct. 14, 1947, Chuck Yeager was the first man to fly faster

than the speed of sound... Steve Yeager has been attempting to break through a barrier that would establish him as one of baseball's best catchers... the final statistics of 1975 reveal Yeager had a fielding percentage of .992, second in the N.L. to the New York Mets' Jerry Grote (.995). Steve led the N.L. in putouts with 806, finished second in total chances (875) and his 62 assists were only one off the league's top mark... Steve is a hard-nosed catcher who will accept any challenge. When Joe Ferguson went to the sidelines on July 1st last season, Steve was the catcher in 736.2 of the Dodgers' final 759.2 innings... the 1975 season marked the first time in Steve's big league career that he has played in more than 100 games (135) and he responded with 103 hits and 54 runs batted in — both high marks in a professional career which started nine seasons ago in Dubuque... says manager Walter Alston of Yeager: "He's got some fire and life that seems to spark everybody on the club. He just loves to play baseball and his attitude is contagious."... Steve was one of the Dodgers' early season injury victims when he hurt his left thigh blocking home plate in a game at Houston on April 13th but he came back sooner than expected and was an iron man in the final three months.

## RULES OF INTEREST

**PLAYER LIMITS:** 40 until opening day, when the number must be reduced to 25 until September 1, when it again becomes 40.

**DETERMINING BATTING AVERAGE:** Divide the number of at bats into the number of hits.

**DETERMINING AN EARNED RUN AVERAGE:** Multiply the number of earned runs by nine; take the number and divide it by the number of innings pitched.

**DETERMINING SLUGGING PERCENTAGE:** Divide the total bases of all safe hits by the total times at bat (At bats do not include walks, sacrifices, hit by pitcher, or times awarded first base because of interference or obstruction).

**DETERMINING FIELDING AVERAGE:** Divide the total putouts and assists by the total of putouts, assists and errors.

**DETERMINING PERCENTAGE OF GAMES WON AND LOST:** Divide the number of games won by the total games won and lost.

**CONSECUTIVE HITTING STREAKS:** A consecutive hitting streak shall not be terminated if the plate appearance results in a base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or a sacrifice bunt. A sacrifice fly shall terminate the streak.

**CONSECUTIVE-GAME HITTING STREAKS:** A consecutive-game hitting streak shall not be terminated if all the player's plate appearances (one or more) result in a base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or a sacrifice bunt. The streak shall terminate if the player has a sacrifice fly and no hit.

**CONSECUTIVE-GAME PLAYING STREAK:** A consecutive-game playing streak shall be extended if the player plays one half-inning on defense, or if he completes a time at bat by reaching base or being put out. A pinch-running appearance only shall not extend the streak. If a player is ejected from a game by an umpire before he can comply with the requirements of this rule, his streak shall continue.

**SUSPENDED GAMES:** For the purpose of this rule, all performances in the completion of a suspended game shall be considered as occurring on the original date of the game.

**TRADING REGULATIONS:** Players are available on waivers in reverse order of standings, at the time waivers expire, if more than 30 days after start of the season; otherwise in reverse order of standings at close of preceding season.

**INTER-LEAGUE TRADES:** Midnight, five days after the World Series — Midnight, night preceding the last scheduled day of the Winter Meetings — No waivers are necessary. Midnight, night preceding the last scheduled day of the Winter Meetings — Midnight, June 15 — Waivers necessary in assignor's league. Midnight, June 15 — Midnight, the last day of the season, Major League waivers necessary. Midnight, the last day of the season — Midnight, five days after the World Series — Waivers necessary in assignor's league.

**TRADING WITHIN LEAGUE:** Midnight, the last day of the season — Midnight, June 15 — No waivers necessary. Midnight, June 15 — Midnight, the last day of the season — League waivers necessary.

**QUALIFICATIONS FOR A "ROOKIE":** A player shall be considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has (a) exceeded 130 at bats or 50 innings pitched in the major leagues; or (b) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a major league club or clubs during the period of the 25-player limit (excluding time in military service).

**DETERMINING the MAGIC NUMBER:** Determine the number of games yet to be played, add one, then subtract the number of games ahead in the loss column of the standings from the closest opponent.

**POST-SEASON CALENDAR:** The two major league Championship Series for 1976 are scheduled to start Saturday, October 9, in the parks of the American League East and National League East winners. The 1976 World Series is scheduled to start Saturday, October 16, in the park of the National League champion.

**GAME WINNING HIT:** The hit that gives your team a higher final total than your opponent.

**GAME WINNING RBI:** The run that gives your team a higher final total than your opponent.

**DOCTORED BAT:** If a filled or "doctored" bat is used, the player is to be ejected from the game and suspended three days. Any balls hit by an illegal bat do not count. If the umpire sees the illegal bat before it is used, he issues a warning, but there is no penalty.



## DODGER STADIUM INFORMATION

Beauty and baseball go hand in hand when you speak of Dodger Stadium.

The season of 1976 marks the 15th anniversary of Dodger Stadium.

The first game ever played at Dodger Stadium was on April 10, 1962. The Dodgers lost to Cincinnati by a score of 6-3.

During the 1962 season there were 2,755,184 persons to view the games at Dodger Stadium—a Major League record. Last year 2,539,343 saw the Dodgers play at Dodger Stadium—tops in baseball.

The Dodgers broke the Major League record for reaching one million fans in the earliest date ever. The Dodgers hit one million on June 9th, their 27th date snapping the Cleveland Indians mark set in 1948 in their 28th game.

The Dodgers also tied the mark for reaching two million fans in the earliest date ever. The Dodgers did it on their 55th date tying the 1970 New York Mets.

The 1975 season marked the 11th time the Dodgers have passed the two-million figure and in 18 years the Dodgers have averaged more than two million fans per season.

In their first home game of 1971—marking the tenth year of Dodger Stadium—the Dodgers saluted two key figures in the construction of Dodger Stadium—Captain Emil Praeger and Jack Yount. Praeger designed Dodger Stadium and Yount was the vice president and general manager of Vinnell, which handled the gigantic construction job.

The beauty of Dodger Stadium has been enhanced by the plants which surround the stadium and by a dozen years during which continual improvement of the stadium has been a motto.

Dodger Stadium is baseball's only privately-financed park since Yankee Stadium was built in 1923.

There are 56,000 seats and parking for 16,000 automobiles on 21 terraced lots adjacent to and about at the same elevations as the five different seating levels.

Chavez Ravine was a difficult site because of a network of washes, gullies and gulches that were interlaced with hills and twisting roads. Elevations in the ravine ranged from 400 feet to 700 feet above sea level. In order to compensate for this rough terrain, more than 8,000,000 cubic yards of earth were moved to reshape the area.

Some 21,000 precast concrete units, weighing up to 32 tons, were lifted into the stadium's structural framework.

Thanks to the cantilever theory every seat in the column-free stadium has a completely unobstructed view of the symmetrical playing field.

Fans are afforded the opportunity to watch games from seven front rows and no grandstand is deeper than twenty-odd rows.

The various levels are color coordinated (yellow, orange, green and blue) to correspond with the terraced parking levels. There also is a below-ground level which provides a "player's eye view" from dugout box seats.

Two gigantic electronic installations—the scoreboard in right field and the message board behind the left field pavilion—add to the entertainment one enjoys at Dodger Stadium.

It all adds up to baseball's finest—and most beautiful—stadium.
