BASEBALL IN THE OLYMPICS

Baseball will have its most significant presence in the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles.

A six-team modified round-robin tournament will be held at Dodger Stadium from July 31 to Aug. 7.

The sport has appeared in Olympic Games seven times previously, usually in a single game exhibition format in stadiums not designed for baseball. Baseball was played in Paris in 1900, St. Louis in 1904, Stockholm in 1912, Berlin in 1936, Helsinki in 1952, Melbourne in 1956 and Tokyo in 1964.

The United States is the host team for the 1984 competition. The other five countries participating: Korea, the 1982 World Champions; Cuba and Nicaragua will represent Latin America after earning berths with first and second place finishes in the 1983 Pan American Games; Italy will represent Europe after capturing the 1983 European Championships; and Chinese Taipei will represent Asia after capturing the 1983 Asian Baseball Championship.

The teams were divided into two divisions for the tournament — White and Blue. Cuba, Korea and Nicaragua will make up the Blue Division; with the United States, Chinese Taipei and Italy in the White Division.

LASORDA, THOMAS CHARLES—Born 9-22-27, Norristown, PA.
Ht. 5-9. Wt. 195. Threw and batted lefthanded. Wife's
name and wedding date: Joan (4-14-50).
Children: Laura (8-23-53) and Tom Jr. (5-6-58).

Tommy Lasorda skippered the 1983 Los Angeles Dodgers to the Western Division title of the National League and earned honors as Manager of the Year by the Baseball Writers Association of America, United Press International and Associated Press . . . the reward was a three-year contract to manage the Dodgers . . . Lasorda enters his 35th year in the Dodger organization as the "dean" of Major League managers along with Pittsburgh's Chuck Tanner . . . Lasorda has guided the Dodgers to three pennants and a Western Division title in seven years as skipper and he's been right there in the other three years with two second place and one third place finish . . . Lasorda has compiled a record of 608-479 as skipper of the Dodgers in seven years . . . only Walter Alston, Wilbert Robinson and Leo Durocher have won more games and skippered the Dodgers for a longer period of time . . . Lasorda's winning percentage of .559 is tied for 12th best among the all-time list of managers in baseball history . . . earned Associated Press Manager of the Year honors in 1981 by guiding the Dodgers to their first world championship since 1965 . . . Dodgers had best record in baseball (36-21) during first half of 1981 season and finished third-best overall (63-47), injuries knocking the club out of the second-half race . . . after team won World Series, Dodgers Vice President Al Campanis was moved to compliment Lasorda on now being a "complete manager," having mastered strategic aspects of game, in addition to his motivational ability . . . the 1980 season was equally exciting, rewarding and frustrating for the Dodger manager . . . only four teams in the major leagues had better won-lost records than the Dodgers — the New York Yankees, Baltimore Orioles, Kansas City Royals and Houston Astros . . . trailing by three games with three to play, the Dodgers swept the Houston Astros the final weekend of the regular season to force a one-game playoff for the National League West title . . . the Dodgers lost, 7-1 . . . injuries to several key players tested Lasorda's ability to juggle his personnel and he was able to come up with winning combinations . . . the emergence of several young stars also made it an enjoyable campaign for Lasorda in his fourth season at the Dodger helm . . . Lasorda rarely had a chance to relax in a season in which most games went down to the last out. The Dodgers played 98 games decided by two runs or less and posted a 55-43 record in those games . . . Lasorda had a more difficult time weaving some magic in 1979, when the club also was riddled by injuries . . . he suffered through a 36-57 first half that left the Dodgers 17½ games out of first place, but enjoyed post All-Star play as the club played at a sizzling .623 pace (43-26 record), second only to the World Champion Pittsburgh Pirates (52-25) . . . Lasorda became only the second manager in National League history to win league titles in his first two full years of managing in the majors in 1977 and 1978. The only other to do it in the N.L. was St. Louis' Gabby Street in 1931. American League managers to accomplish it are Detroit's Mickey Cochrane, Washington's Bucky Harris, New York's Ralph Houk, Detroit's Hughie Jennings and Baltimore's Earl Weaver . . . Lasorda became only the 19th manager in Major League history to win a league title in the first year of managing in the majors in 1977 . . . in doing so, Lasorda earned United Press International and Associated Press "Manager of the Year" honors . . . it was on Sept. 29, 1976 that he was named manager of the Dodgers as Walt Alston announced his retirement after 23 years . . . prior to this he served his apprenticeship . . . he served 11 years as a player in the Dodger organization, most of that time as a pitcher for Montreal of the International League . . . after his playing career ended in 1960, Lasorda served as a scout for the Dodgers for four years and then managed in the Dodger minor league system for eight years . . . Tom served four seasons (1973-76) as a Dodger coach . . . as a minor league manager Lasorda compiled an outstanding record, his teams winning five pennants in eight seasons . . . Lasorda spent his first four seasons as a manager with Pocatello and Ogden of the Pioneer League and he had a pennant-winning club the last three years . . . in three seasons as the manager of Spokane of the Pacific Coast League — 1969-70-71 — his clubs never finished lower than third . . . in 1970 Lasorda was voted the "Minor League Manager of the Year" award by The Sporting News as his team won the pennant by 26 games . . . Lasorda has managed winters in the Dominican Republic League, the Venezuelan League and the Arizona Instructional League . . . his career as a Major League pitcher consisted of two seasons with the Dodgers (1954 and 1955) and one year (1956) with Kansas City . . . he pitched in a total of 26 games and compiled a record of 0-4, all of the decisions with Kansas City . . . the south-paw once struck out 25 batters in a 15-inning game while pitching for the Schenectady Blue Jays against Amsterdam in 1948 . . . he holds the all-time International League record for career wins of 125 for the Montreal Royals . . . Lasorda pitched in four games for the 1955 Dodgers — the first Dodger team ever to win a World Championship . . . Lasorda was signed to his first pro contract by the Philadelphia Phillies . . . Lasorda resides in Fullerton with his wife Jo. They have two children — Laura and Tommy Jr. . . .

AMALFITANO, JOHN JOSEPH—Born 1-23-34, San Pedro, CA. Ht. 5-11. Wt. 179. Threw and batted righthanded. Wife's name and wedding date: Kay (10-30-82).

Joe Amalfitano has been a major league manager and coach for the last 17 years . . . he joined the Dodgers in 1983 as their third base coach . . . he was a coach for the Cincinnati Reds in 1982 . . . he managed the Chicago Cubs for portions of three seasons, compiling a 66-116 record. He was interim manager at the end of the 1979 season, after Herman Franks resigned on Sept. 24. Amalfitano managed the Cubs the last half of the 1980 season, taking over for Preston Gomez on July 25, with the club in sixth place, and he managed the Cubs for all of the strike-shortened 1981 season . . . Amalfitano served as a coach for the Cubs from 1967-71 and again from 1978-80, for the San Francisco Giants from 1972-75 and for the San Diego Padres in 1976 and '77 . . . he was an infielder for the Giants in New York and San Francisco, beginning in 1954, and also played in the majors with Houston and the Cubs, compiling a .244 lifetime batting average in 10 big league seasons . . .

Teaching is Monty Basgall's bag . . . in 12th season as Dodger coach . . . Basgall likes nothing better than to work with a youngster and help convert him to a new position or sharpen his defensive skills . . . it was Basgall who worked many hours with such infielders as Steve Garvey, Davey Lopes, Bill Russell and Ron Cey . . . Monty converted Lopes and Russell, both outfielders, to the infield and Garvey, a third baseman, into a first baseman . . . Basgall was busy working with first baseman Greg Brock and third baseman Pedro Guerrero as well as a host of youngsters in 1983 and he'll be working with them again in 1984 . . . one of Basgall's most recent projects has been Steve Sax . . . former Dodger rookies of the year Jim Lefebvre (1965) and Ted Sizemore (1969) also were tutored by Basgall . . . Sizemore won the award just one year after making the switch from catcher . . . Basgall's baseball expertise has been carried as far as Australia. He and former Dodger pitching coach Red Adams spent a month in Australia the winter of 1979-80, giving lectures and clinics . . . Basgall has served as a scout, minor league manager and major league coach in the Dodger organization for 25 years . . . a second baseman during his playing career, Basgall signed his first professional contract with the Dodgers, but played most of his career in the Pittsburgh Pirates organization . . . member of Kansas Hall of Fame . . .

When you talk about great pinch-hitters in baseball history, the name Manny Mota goes to the head of the list . . . Mota enters his 15th season with the Dodgers and fifth as a coach . . . serves as first base coach and hitting instructor . . . in 1982 he kept himself in condition and occasionally took batting practice, just in case club decided to activate him as it had in 1980 . . . he was activated in September and grounded out in one pinch-hitting appearance . . . Mota was supposed to be retired as player in '80, but he was activated Aug. 29, when Reggie Smith was disabled and, at age 42 and in his 19th major league season, responded with three pinch hits in seven at bats, increasing his record career pinch-hit total to 150 . . . has seventh greatest pinch-hit percentage (.299, 150-for-501) . . . as a Dodger, Mota's pinch-hitting average was .322 (106-for-329) . . . his overall batting mark as a Dodger was .315 (605-for-1923) . . . has overall lifetime batting average of .304 . . . Mota had 15 pinch hits and hit .357 in 1979, when he eclipsed the old pinch-hit mark of 144 set by Smoky Burgess . . . Mota played for four clubs in his 19-year career . . . San Francisco, Pittsburgh, Montreal and the Dodgers . . . one of the most popular players in Dodger history, Manny makes his off-season home in the Dominican Republic, where he has his own youth league — The Manny Mota League . . . it has been said that Mota could wake up on Christmas morning, walk out to a baseball diamond and rip a single into right field . . . "He strikes out about three times a month," wrote Jim Murray of the Los Angeles Times, "He could get wood on a bullet. He is no secret to the pitchers around the league. He has hit them so much they're beginning to hit him back. Pinch-hitting is a high art like putting out oil well fires or authenticating old master's paintings. They don't need you often, but when they do they need you like eyes. Manny's time comes when the building is burning, the babies are crying, the fort has to be rescued, and the wagons are circled," added Murray . . . The Los Angeles Dodgers pitching staff once again led the major leagues with the lowest earned run average in 1983 and a major reason for this stems from the tutoring of pitching coach Ron Perranoski . . . completed his third year as major league pitching coach after serving as minor league instructor since 1973 . . . has been instrumental in working with young Dodger pitchers . . . first year was hard to match for excitement what with the debut of Fernando Valenzuela and growth of young bullpen en route to World Series title . . . succeeded Red Adams in 1981 . . . "We're fortunate to have such an adequate replacement right here in our own organization," Al Campanis said at the time. "Ron has such a fine reputation with so many of our young pitchers who have come up through our own organization" . . . Perranoski was an outstanding relief pitcher for the Dodgers from 1961 through 1967 and also pitched for the Dodgers in 1972 . . . he compiled a lifetime record of 79-74 while pitching for Los Angeles, Minnesota, Detroit and California in his 13-year major league career . . . Perranoski led the National League in games pitched in 1962 (70) and 1963 (69), and tied for the N.L. lead in 1967 (70) . . . he pitched in the World Series for the Dodgers in 1963, 1965 and 1966 . . . his top winning season was in 1963, when he compiled a 16-3 record for the Dodgers and led the National League in winning percentage with an .842 mark . . . elected to National Polish American Sports Hall of Fame in 1983 . . .

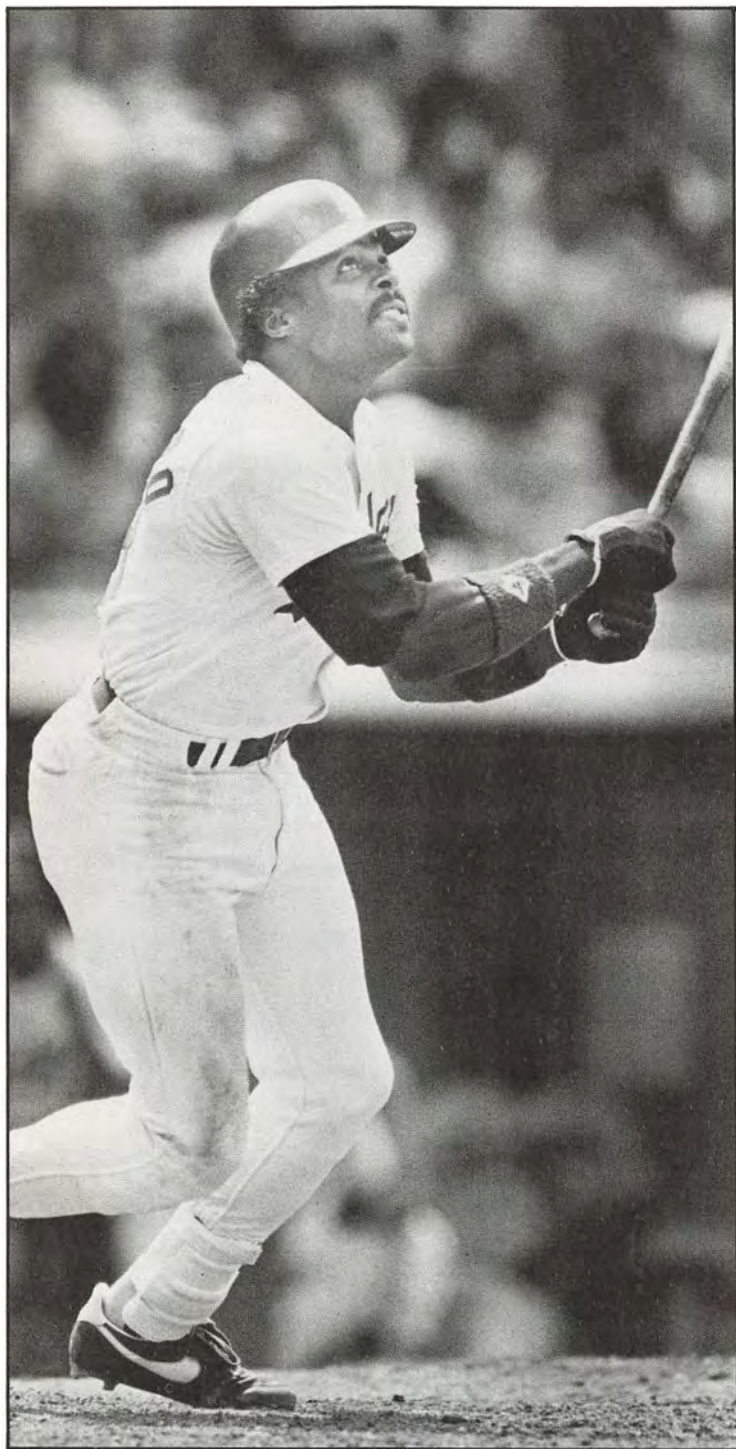

Bob Bailor may fit the definition of a "utilityman," but he doesn't like being called one because "it makes me sound like I change lightbulbs or something." ... there is no question, however, that Bailor is one of the most versatile players in the National League ... he played shortstop, third base, second base and all three outfield positions for the Mets during the 1983 season ... at the plate, he hit .250 with 30 RBIs, 18 stolen bases and four game-winning hits ... put together an 11-game hitting streak from July 18-28, during which he hit .333 (14-for-42) and raised his average 21 points ... his biggest game came on Aug. 9 at Montreal when he had three hits ... hit .314 with four runs scored and five RBIs vs. the Dodgers ... was acquired by the Dodgers to help fill the many shoes of free agent Derrel Thomas ...

THE NICKNAME "DODGERS" AND ITS ORIGIN

Brooklyn, an incubator of baseball in the pre-Civil War era, had such strong clubs as the Atlantics, Eckfords and Excelsiors and didn't take to professional baseball until joining the American Association in 1884. The AA champs of 1889 had so many newlyweds on the roster they were known as the Bridegrooms. The club moved into the National League the following year and became dubbed the Trolley Dodgers because of the maze of streetcar tracks in the borough. The name, shortened to Dodgers, became permanent, although during the managerial tenure of Ned Hanlon (1899-1905) it was changed to Superbas, and in Wilbert Robinson's reign (1914-1931) the team was often referred to as the Robins. But the name Dodgers is associated with some of baseball's all-time greats.

1983 . . . Pedro Guerrero made the switch in 1983 from right field to third base, but it certainly didn't affect his output . . . the talented youngster has become one of the superstars in the game . . . his batting average of .298 was 11th best in the National League . . . his home run total of 32 was tied for third best and his RBI count of 103 was fourth best . . . Rick Honeycutt was enjoying the finest season of his career, when the Dodgers acquired him from the Texas Rangers on Aug. 19 . . . the sinkerball specialist led the American League with a 2.42 ERA . . . he was named American League Comeback Player of the Year as he was 14-8 with Texas . . . started out quickly with Dodgers, recording 16 consecutive scoreless innings against Philadelphia in first two Dodger starts, a 6-0 victory Aug. 21 in which he worked seven innings before leaving the game with a blister (he also collected his first major-league hit in his first at-bat), and a complete-game, 6-1, win Aug. 27 in which he allowed just five hits and recorded 20 outs on ground balls . . . suffered through his next five starts without getting past the fifth inning . . . made two appearances out of the bullpen in the final weeks of the season while working with pitching coach Ron Perranoski on his delivery . . .

FAST STARTER . . . 1983 ... Burt Hooton suffered through a roller-coaster type season in 1983 ... after going through an up-and-down period in his first eight starts of the season, Hooton found himself and suddenly rattled off seven consecutive wins in 10 starts from May 25 to July 10 ... the seven straight wins was a high for a Dodger pitcher and two shy of the league high ... Hooton had a 2.15 ERA over the 10 starts as he allowed 15 earned runs over 62.2 innings ... he earned National League Pitcher of the Month honors in June with a 4-0 record and a 1.77 ERA ... just when Hooton seemed to have ironed out his early season flaws, the righthander lost his next five decisions and made it through the seventh inning only once in 12 starts ... September came and Hooton found himself working out of the bullpen to iron out his mechanics and to get back on track ... Hooton's two finest outings of the season were both complete games, stopping Philadelphia on May 30, 5-2, on seven hits, and dropping Cincinnati on June 19, 5-1, on just three hits ... had two hits and matched his career high for RBI in the May 30 win over Philadelphia ... was 7-2 with 3.36 ERA before the All-Star break ... bothered by a stiff back in the final weeks of the season ... recorded his 1,300th strikeout by fanning Gary Matthews on May 25 at Philadelphia ...

A SEASON OF PAIN ... Hooton was hit by a line drive just shy of his right knee cap in Spring Training and the 1982 season was suddenly one of pain and frustration ... the right knee developed swelling and after trying to pitch on it the first two months of the season, Hooton underwent arthroscopic surgery on June 21 for a bone spur and torn cartilage ... rehabilitation returned Burt to the active roster on Aug. 8 and he returned to the starting rotation on Aug. 11 ... he recorded a 3-3 record in 11 starts and a 2.83 ERA after surgery ... Hooton's finest game of the season came prior to surgery as he one-hit the Philadelphia Phillies on April 29, 4-0 ... only a fourth inning single by Ivan DeJesus kept Hooton from a no-hitter ... his other outstanding performance came Sept. 15 as he blanked San Diego on three-hits, 5-0 ...

MR. OCTOBER ... Burt Hooton was the Dodgers' "Mr. October" in 1981 as he was one of the key reasons the Dodgers captured the World Championship ... sported a 4-1 record and 0.82 ERA in five starts in the post-season ... was 1-0 with 1.29 ERA in Division Series against Houston, winning crucial third game ... was MVP of League Championship Series win over Montreal by winning first and fourth games and posting 0.00 ERA ... winning pitcher in final game of World Series ... the 1981 regular season saw Hooton enjoy the best start of his career by winning the first seven decisions while recording a 1.96 ERA in 10 outings ... hit double figures in wins for ninth time in 12 years ... finished third in National League ERA race at 2.28, lowest of his career ... had a string of 18.1 consecutive scoreless innings ... allowed just two earned runs over final 21 innings during season ...

A RECORD STREAK ... Hooton put his name in the Dodger record books in 1975 by winning 12 straight decisions ... that mark established a new club record for most consecutive wins in a season, topping the old mark of 11 set by Sandy Koufax and Don Drysdale ...

A GREAT OPENING ... Burt Hooton was signed by the Chicago Cubs in 1971 and he made his first major league appearance nine days after signing and struck out the first hitter he faced — Lou Brock ... set a club record later that year by striking out 15 New York Mets in one game ... pitched a no-hitter against Philadelphia on April 16, 1972, in only his fourth major league start ...

A HAPPY DODGER ... Hooton came to the Dodgers in May, 1975 from the Cubs for pitchers Geoff Zahn and Eddie Solomon ... he responded with a 18-7 record and 2.81 ERA and the following season he was tough down the stretch as he earned N.L. Pitcher of the Month honors in August with a 6-0 record and 1.06 ERA and followed it up by winning the same award in September with a 5-0 mark and 2.41 ERA ...

HIS FINEST SEASON ... The 1978 season was Hooton's finest as he paced the Dodgers in victories with 19 ... he finished fifth in the league in the ERA race at 2.71 ... tied with Atlanta's Phil Niekro as third leading winner behind San Diego's Gaylord Perry (21) and Montreal's Ross Grimsley (20) ... finished second to Perry in N.L. Cy Young voting ... was tough down the stretch when the Dodgers needed it as he won seven straight (Aug. 6-Sept. 12) ... won 14 of his final 18 decisions ... put together an unbelievable streak in which he reached the ninth inning in 12 of 13 starts (July 8-Sept. 12) and had a 10-1 record with a 1.86 ERA during this time (23 ERA in 110.2 IP) ...

HOOTON, BURT CARLTON

TOUGH LUCK ... 1983 ... Steve Howe's year began with great promise, but soon was troubled with personal setbacks ... Howe was suspended for the 1984 season by Commissioner Bowie Kuhn for his 1983 involvement with illegal drugs ... Howe worked hard during spring training and his effort paid off in a sensational beginning to the regular season, notching two wins and seven saves without allowing an earned run through May 17, when he re-entered treatment, this time at the CareUnit Hospital in Orange, CA ... he returned to the active list June 29 and was placed on a probationary program ... Howe was suspended for the first time by the Dodgers on July 16, after he reported three hours late to Dodger Stadium for the game of July 15. He was reinstated the next day, after he underwent a test to detect the presence of prohibited substances ... he was suspended for a second time on Sept. 23 ... in between his off-field problems, Howe was one of the top relievers in the game ... though he had a losing record for the second time in four years in the majors, Howe had a career-high 18 saves despite appearing in just 46 games and his 1.44 ERA was a career low ... permitted just two home runs in 68.2 innings ... continued uncanny control by allowing just five unintentional walks and striking out 52 ... did not allow an earned run until June 29 at San Diego in first appearance after returning to active list following release from CareUnit ... earned 16th save with longest outing of year, four innings, in second game of doubleheader Aug. 29 at New York ... career-high 18th save came Sept. 9 vs. Atlanta ... 56 career saves places Howe fifth on Dodgers' all-time list ...

CALM BEFORE STORM ... Howe led the Dodgers in ERA (2.08), games (66) and saves (13) in 1982 ... with his 13 saves and seven wins, he was the only Dodger pitcher to be directly involved in 20 wins ... matched career high in wins set as a rookie ... was named to N.L. All-Star team ... started slowly but made technical adjustment and had 5-1 record with 1.69 ERA by All-Star break ... also struggled through parts of July and August but had 1.84 ERA in 11 September appearances ...

SUPER SOPH ... Howe proved there is no such thing as a "sophomore jinx" in 1981, when he posted a 5-3 record, improved his ERA to 2.50 and led the team in saves with eight ... was particularly effective in April and May and down the stretch ... had a 2.45 ERA with one save during post-season play ... among his highlights was Aug. 26 at Pittsburgh, when Howe struck out Willie Stargell, Omar Moreno and Mike Easter in the ninth inning ... had most of his success against the top teams in the league — Cincinnati, Houston, Montreal and Philadelphia ...

FANTASTIC FRESHMAN ... With a little less than one-half a season of professional baseball under his belt, Howe beat the odds and made the Dodgers' big league club in spring training, 1980 ... his 94 MPH fastball impressed the Dodger brass enough to take a chance on him, even though he was a non-roster player at the time ... he went on to establish himself as the ace of the Dodger bullpen and grabbed N.L. Rookie of the Year honors ... he became the second of four consecutive Dodger Rookie of the Year award winners with fellow pitchers Rick Sutcliffe (1979) and Fernando Valenzuela (1981) and second baseman Steve Sax (1982) ... led the Dodger bullpen with seven wins, 17 saves and a 2.65 ERA ... the 17 saves tied for ninth best in the N.L. and established a Dodger rookie record, erasing the old mark of 15 set by Joe Black in 1952 ... he allowed just one home run, that to Houston's Joe Morgan on June 24 ... put together his finest month in July, when he appeared in nine games and was 3-1 with two saves and a 0.00 ERA ... had string of 41 outings (May 6-Sept. 20) in which he had an ERA of 1.00 in 63.1 innings and during the final 25 outings (July 3-Sept. 17) he allowed four earned runs in 41.2 innings for a 4-4 record, 10 saves and a 0.86 era ...

IN THE MINORS ... Howe became the Dodgers' number one selection in the June, 1979 Free Agent Draft and the 16th player taken in the draft as the Dodgers made use of Pittsburgh's selection rights as they signed free agent Lee Lacy ... upon signing, Howe spent the last half of the year in the Texas League where he was 6-2 with a 3.13 ERA at San Antonio ...

PERSONAL ... Howe was the all-time winningest pitcher at the University of Michigan after pitching just three years for the Wolverines ... he was 9-3 with a 1.87 ERA in his freshman season (1977); 11-3 with a 1.78 ERA as a sophomore (1978) and 7-2 with a 1.78 ERA as a junior (1979) ... thus his career totals at Michigan found him with a 27-8 record and a 1.79 ERA in 41 games (265.2 innings and 53 earned runs) ... he fanned 196 batters ... Howe was an All-Big 10 selection in his last two seasons at Michigan ... he shared the Ray L. Fisher Most Valuable award as a sophomore with teammate Rick Leach ... Howe pitched a one-hitter and shutout Baylor, 4-0 to open the 1978 College World Series ... graduate of Clarkston High School in 1976 ...

Ken Landreaux enjoyed his finest year since coming to the Dodgers and it would have been better if not for an ankle injury that hampered him part of the season ... hit career-high 17 home runs, including his first grand slam July 23 at St. Louis off Bruce Sutter ... finished second in league in game-winning RBI with 16, two behind Houston's Dickie Thon ... started quickly with three hits and matched career high with six RBI in first game of season at Houston ... drove in 20 runs in first 28 games ... hit four home runs and had five game-winning RBI in seven games from May 2-9 ... had first five-hit game of career on July 20 at Pittsburgh ... missed a second five-hit game six days later, as he had four hits and was called out for interference on a bunt in his second at-bat ... had his second consecutive 30-plus stolen bases season and passed the career 100 mark ... had 10-game hitting streak from Aug. 21-30 ... hit .364 with five homers and 17 RBI in July ... hit four homers vs. Atlanta and three each against Chicago, Montreal and Pittsburgh ... also improved defensively, playing a more aggressive center field, with .990 fielding percentage ... missed two weeks of action in late June and early July after injuring right ring finger in fight after being hit by pitch by Houston's Frank LaCorte ... ankle injuries occurred running into wall and in collision with right-fielder Mike Marshall ...

INJURY BUG ... Injuries also short-circuited Landreaux in 1982 ... he was struck on the arm and forearm by pitches and hurt his shoulder running into the fence in Montreal ... had career-high 31 stolen bases ... tied for club lead in triples with Steve Sax (7) ... had his errorless streak snapped at 142 games ... had .312 average at All-Star break, but slowed to .258 in second half due to injuries ...

THE STREAK ... Landreaux had the longest hitting streak in the majors in 1980 (31 games) ... the streak was the longest in the majors since Pete Rose hit in 44 in a row in 1978 with Cincinnati and the longest in the American League since Boston's Dom DiMaggia had a 34-game streak in 1949 ... WINTER WONDER ... Following the 1980 season, Landreaux played for Aguilas in the Dominican Republic winter league and led the circuit with a .388 average, capturing most valuable player honors ahead of the Dodgers' Pedro Guerrero ...

ANGELS TO TWINS ... Landreaux was traded to Minnesota along with infielder Dave Engel for pitchers Paul Hartzell and Brad Havens by the California Angels for Rod Carew on Feb. 3, 1979 ... he hit .305 that year to lead the Twins and was second on the club in home runs (15), RBI (83) and stolen bases (10) ...

IN THE MINORS ... Marshall received the opportunity to win the starting spot in right field for the Dodgers as Pedro Guerrero made the switch to third base . . . Marshall had a superb spring and he was ready for his first big opportunity . . . on the fourth day of the season, Marshall was hit on the helmet by a fastball from Montreal's Jeff Reardon . . . this, coupled with a collision with San Francisco's Duane Kuiper on May 27, had Mike off to a rocky start . . . 1983 . . . Monday spent the 1983 season as a pinch-hitter and a part-time player, but he was a great influence and steady force to the younger players . . . the veteran of over 17 years in the majors responded as the Dodgers top lefthanded pinch-hitter with eight pinch-hits and seven RBI . . . made rare starts to rest the regular outfielders and responded with several big games — on Aug. 28, he collected three hits and three RBI in an 8-3 win over Philadelphia and drove in the game-winning run to lift the Dodgers to a 5-3 win in Atlanta on Aug. 12 . . . hit two home runs in one game for the 20th time in his career on May 26 against San Francisco . . . his six home runs on the year marked only the second time in the last 15 seasons that he failed to reach double figures in that category . . . after a slow start in the first half of the season, Monday countered with a .390 average (16-for-41) in the month of July and a .316 mark (12-for-38) during August . . . hit .556 against the Phillies with five hits and five RBI . . . victimized the Giants with nine hits, including two home runs, and a .290 average . . .

THE MEMORABLE HOMER . . . The highlight of the 1981 season and perhaps of Monday's career came in the ninth inning of Game 5 of the League Championship Series at Montreal, when Rick's home run off Steve Rogers gave the Dodgers a 2-1 victory and sent them into the World Series . . . Monday hit .333 in the LCS and his season average in 1981 stood at .315 as he connected for 11 home runs, six versus Cincinnati, in just 130 at bats . . . Monday also hit a memorable home run in 1982 as he kept the Dodger hopes alive with a clutch eighth-inning grand slam on Oct. 1 in San Francisco for a 4-0 victory . . . the win kept the Dodgers one game behind Atlanta with just two games left in the season . . .

MR. RED, WHITE AND BLUE . . . Monday earned this title and gained national acclaim when he saved the American Flag from a possible burning in left field by a pair of protestors at Dodger Stadium on April 25, 1976 as a member of the Chicago Cubs . . . the 1976 season also was his finest in the majors as he belted 32 homers (third best in NL), scored 107 runs and drove in 77 more as the Cubs' leadoff man . . . while with the Cubs, Monday led N.L. outfielders in fielding in 1972 with a .966 percentage . . . also led N.L. in fewest times grounding into double plays at four and tied for the lead in most double plays by an outfielder at five in 1974 . . . hit three homers in a game on May 16, 1972 . . .

THE ACHILLES . . . The 1979 season was painful to Rick Monday . . . after a promising spring, he fell victim to injuries early in the season . . . after hitting .303 in the first 12 games of the season, Monday injured his left Achilles tendon . . . surgery sidelined him for the season . . . he suffered the injury on April 17 against Houston, when he caught a ball in foul territory and pulled up short to avoid crashing into the fence . . . rebounded in 1978 with fast start, but two injuries hampered him from mid-May to the end of the season . . . earned N.L. Player of the Month honors for April as he hit .353 (24-for-68) with eight homers and 22 RBIs . . . earned starting berth on N.L. All-Star team . . . suffered a pulled groin on May 15 and injured his left shoulder on June 17 as he hit the outfield wall . . .

THE AMERICAN LEAGUE . . . Rick Monday was the first player selected in baseball's first free agent draft in June of 1965 by the Kansas City Athletics . . . he spent six years with the A's and in 1972 was traded to the Cubs for Ken Holtzman . . . his first season in the A.L. in 1967, Rick tied for the A.L. lead in double plays by an outfielder (6) and was named to the Topps Major League Rookie All-Star team . . . in 1968, Rick was 10th in the A.L. batting race and played in the All-Star game . . . greatest thrill in majors was tying Lou Gehrig's American League record of 10 consecutive games with one or more RBI (April 20-30, 1969) . . .

PERSONAL . . . Was graduated from Santa Monica High School (Santa Monica, CA) in 1963 . . . played baseball, basketball and football . . . attended Arizona State University (Tempe, AZ) for two years, majored in secondary education and played baseball . . . in 1965, he hit .356 with 11 homers, 12 triples and 11 doubles to lead Arizona State to Western Athletic Conference, NCAA District Seven and College World Series championships . . . was named to All-Conference, All-District, All-College World Series and NCAA College All-American first teams and voted 1965 College Player of the Year . . . likes to play golf, hunt and fly airplanes . . . former member of U.S. Marine Corps Reserve . . . has worked for KABC-TV and KABC radio as sportscaster during off-seasons . . .

1983 ... Lefthander Jerry Reuss had a roller coaster type season, but one which featured several tough luck setbacks ... Reuss started the 1983 season with three victories and five wins in his first six decisions ... he later suffered through the longest losing streak of the season by a Dodger at seven straight (June 5-Aug. 11) ... Reuss went 11 starts without a win, six of the games being decided by one run and another by two runs ... had a sore elbow and received an injection on Aug. 1 and did not return to action until Aug. 11 ... later aggravated injury while lifting weights during off-season and had arthroscopic surgery Jan. 24 to remove small bone fragment from left elbow ... broke his losing streak on Aug. 16 as he stopped the Giants, 5-1, the first of a five-game winning streak for Reuss ... finished the year with a 12-11 record and a 2.94 ERA ... his earned run mark was sixth best in the league ... his strikeout total of 143 was his best since 1973 with Houston when he fanned 177 ... Reuss finished the season strong as he was 3-0 in August with a 2.03 ERA and 3-1 in September with a 2.28 ERA ... stopped the Atlanta Braves in an important game Sept. 23 at Atlanta, 11-2 ... struck out his 1500th batter of his career on June 20 when he struck out Alan Wiggins of San Diego ... lost two starts to the Phillies in the League Championship Series after beating the Phillies twice in the regular season and sporting a 1.50 ERA against them ... his seven game losing streak tied for the longest in the league ... Reuss had a high for a Dodger pitcher in strikeouts with 11 against Houston on June 25 and had the longest outing of the year by a Dodger pitcher at 10 innings, also on June 25 ...

REUSS AND 18 WINS ... Reuss matched his career high with 18 wins in 1982 ... was among league leaders in several categories: fourth in won-lost (18-11); ninth in earned run average (3.11); seventh in innings pitched (254.2), and tied for fourth in shutouts (4) ... had two one-hitters — April 21 vs. Houston and June 11 vs. Cincinnati ... Reuss recorded two wins on the same day in Chicago ... the Dodgers and Cubs played to a 1-1 tie in 17 innings on Aug. 17, when play was suspended due to darkness. Reuss was the scheduled starter Aug. 18, but he began his day's work by pitching the final four innings of the suspended game, earning the win as the Dodgers won, 2-1, in 21 innings. He worked the first five innings of the regularly-scheduled game to earn his second win in the same day as Dodgers won, 7-4 ... won four consecutive games down the stretch (Sept. 6-17) and also kept the Dodgers' pennant hopes alive by shutting out the Giants, 4-0, on four hits Oct. 1 at San Francisco ... his 254.2 innings pitched were the most since he worked 260 in 1974 at Pittsburgh and the third highest total of his career ...

KING OF THE HILL ... Over the past four seasons, Reuss has a combined 58-32 record ... he has 12 shutouts ... he has a no-hitter and two one-hitters ... he has a combined 2.76 ERA (264 earned runs, 860 innings) ... he has 443 strikeouts and has walked 167 ...

FOR STARTERS ... Reuss got his four-year roll started with a brilliant 1980 season ... he began the year in the bullpen and recorded a 3-0 mark with three saves and a 1.42 ERA in the first six weeks before being moved into a starting role ... he went on to lead the Dodger staff in victories (18), innings (229.1), complete games (10) and shutouts (6) ... his shutout total led the league and tied his career high ... he finished second to Philadelphia's Steve Carlton for the N.L. 1983 . . . Bill Russell has been one of the greatest clutch hitters in Dodger history, but his greatest accomplishment as "dean" of the club came in the clubhouse last year . . . seemingly headed in reverse and trailing Atlanta by 6½ games, Russell was one of several Dodgers to speak at a team meeting in Cincinnati after a 9-2 drubbing on Aug. 10 . . . the meeting brought the Dodgers together as a unit and they eventually rebounded to capture the Western Division title . . . Russell had several clutch hits in his 14th-plus season with the Dodgers — a squeeze bunt on April 11 to beat Houston, 4-3; a two-run two-out ninth inning home run to beat the Reds, 3-2 on June 11; and two hits and a game winning RBI in a 5-4 win over Atlanta on Aug. 14 . . . collected his 1700th hit in an 8-4 win over Chicago on July 14, one of four hits he had in the game . . . passed the man he replaced, Maury Wills, for ninth place on the Dodgers' all-time hit list . . . passed the 1800 mark in games played and only six Dodgers have played in more . . . in his third decade of major league action . . . good contact hitter . . . fanned just 31 times in 451 at bats . . . led the club with 12 sacrifice hits . . . had his two finest months of the season in May (.308) and July (.307) . . . his 13 steals was the most since 1980 when he also stole 13 . . .

THE COMEBACK . . . The 1982 season was a comeback for Russell after undergoing winter surgery to remove a piece of plastic inserted in his right index finger as well as to remove a broken bone in his left foot and arthritis under his big toe . . . his .274 batting average was his best since 1978 . . . his two hits May 9 at Montreal gave him 2,000 total bases in his career . . . went 26 games without an error from Aug. 18-Sept. 15 . . . came on strong after All-Star break, hitting .327 in August, .323 in Sept.-Oct. and .324 in the surge that saw the Dodgers go from 10½ games behind Atlanta to three games in front in August . . .

UPS AND DOWNS . . . Russell was voted the starting shortstop for the 1980 All-Star Game at Dodger Stadium, as he was hitting .291 at the break . . . but it was mostly downhill after that . . . he injured his right wrist as he slipped rounding second base Aug. 7 at Atlanta . . . his season ended prematurely Sept. 12 in Cincinnati, when he suffered a broken index finger on his right hand when struck by a Mike LaCoss pitch . . . break was so serious, pins were inserted in Sept. 14 surgery and were not removed until Jan. 12 . . . prior to the injury, Russell had a string of 47 games without an error (July 17-Sept. 9) . . .

PENNANT FEVER . . . Russell had big years in 1977 and 1978 as the Dodgers won pennants . . . he turned in his finest year in '78, when he hit .286 and was second on the club with 179 hits . . . he was the hero in the fourth and deciding game of the LCS, driving in the winning run in the 10th inning to give the Dodgers a 4-3 victory and their second consecutive N.L. pennant . . . hit .412 against the Phillies and followed up with a .423 average in losing effort against Yankees in World Series . . . he hit .278 in 1977 and combined on 102 double plays, more than any other N.L. shortstop . . .

MR. DURABLE . . . Despite the injuries in 1980, Russell has averaged 138 games the last 10 seasons, playing in 149 or more games all but once (not counting strike-shortened 1981) in the last nine seasons . . . in 1972-73-74, he played in 392 of the Dodgers' 394 games . . .

RUSSELL ROUNDUP . . . SAX, STEPHEN LOUIS—Born 1-29-60, Sacramento, CA. Bats-R. Throws-R. Ht. 5-11. Wt. 185. Single. How obtained: Dodgers' #9 selection in June, 1978 Free Agent Draft.

1983 . . . Steve Sax had an interesting season in 1983 . . . the second baseman, who makes the Dodgers' offense go, continued as team sparkplug even though he suffered through some tough times on defense . . . his enthusiasm, determination and drive proved to be a big part of the Dodgers' August-September stretch drive . . . had a 14-game hitting streak, matching Mike Marshall for the longest streak by a Dodger in 1983, hitting .350 (21-for-60) from May 3-20 . . . finished the season with a .281 batting average . . . led the Dodgers in runs scored (94), hits (175) and stolen bases (56) . . . he tied for fifth in the league in runs scored, tied for ninth in hits and was third in stolen bases . . . his 56 stolen bases bettered his output of 49 as a rookie and he became the first Dodger to steal 50-or-more bases since Davey Lopes swiped 63 in 1976 . . . his career total of 110 stolen bases in a little more than two plus seasons has placed him sixth on the all-time Los Angeles list . . . led the Dodgers in game winning runs scored (18) and in multi-hit games (46) . . . voted the starting second baseman on the 1983 National League All-Star team, his second straight appearance . . . the tough times Sax suffered on defense found him committing a league leading 30 errors . . . at All-Star break time, Sax had 24 errors, but his mental breakdown and mechanical flaws were suddenly corrected in the second half after long hours of work with coaches Monty Basgall and Joe Amalfitano . . . he did not commit an error over the last 38 games of the season . . .

ROOKIE OF THE YEAR . . . Stepped into starting second base role for the Dodgers in 1982 and became the talk of the National League . . . earned the National League Rookie of the Year honor, the fourth straight season a Dodger has earned the award . . . Sax delighted Dodger fans as he hit .282 in his lead-off role and led the Dodger club in at bats (638), runs (88), hits (180), triples (7) and stolen bases (49) . . . his stolen base total of 49 was fifth best in the National League and the best by a Dodger since Davey Lopes stole 63 in 1976 . . . the 49 stolen bases also established a new mark by a Dodger rookie, the old record was 40 set by Rudy Law in 1980 . . . his 180 hits ranked seventh in the league and only a late season injury kept him away from the 200 hit mark . . . Sax was hit on the right wrist on Sept. 9 at Atlanta by Rick Mahler and after playing two more games, the injury forced Sax to the sidelines for a period of 11 games, parts of which he performed in the field and as a pinch-runner . . . returned to action for final seven games and hit .375 (12-for-32) . . . led Dodger team in game winning runs scored with 20 . . . only rookie named to the National League All-Star squad . . . had a 16-game hitting streak, second best on the club, as he collected 22 hits in 69 at bats for a .319 average (June 11-27) . . . he scored 11 runs, drove in seven and stole 12 bases during the 16-game span . . . had 53 multi-hit games, 13 three-hit games and 40 two-hit games . . . had his best success against Atlanta as he hit .374 (31-for-83) with two home runs and 16 RBI . . . good contact hitter as he struck out only 53 times in 700 trips to the plate . . . named to United Press International Rookie team and Topps Major League Rookie All-Star team . . .

SAX APPEAL . . . "He is something special," said Dodger manager Tom Lasorda, likening his player to another great Dodger second baseman, Jackie Robinson. "Sax has the same aggressiveness, the same skills." Dodger Vice-President Al Campanis on Sax: "I'd say Sax has as much ability as Jackie Robinson did when he first broke in. Both have tremendous speed, acceleration and great aptitude. You tell Jackie something once and he had it. Sax is like that, too. He's a young man and he listens. And his enthusiasm . . . enthusiasm can overcome so many things. Certain players make me tingle when I see them. Koufax, Clemente and Willie Davis made me tingle. And so did Sax."

A CALL TO LOS ANGELES . . . After a successful stop at San Antonio of the Texas League, Sax was recalled to Los Angeles on Aug. 18, 1981 to replace Davey Lopes, who was placed on the disabled list with torn fibers in his groin . . . the young second baseman moved right into the starting lineup and hit a robust .364 in his first eight games with 12 hits in 33 trips . . . he finished the season at .277 and the youngster found himself in post-season play and part of a World Championship team . . . the season also saw Steve hit his first major league home run Aug. 23 off St. Louis' Bob Shirley; connect for his first hit in his first at bat off Chicago's Mike Griffin on Aug. 18 and collect a four-hit game against the Pittsburgh Pirates on Aug. 25 . . . his combined hit total for the 1981 season in San Antonio and Los Angeles came to 201 . . .

ANOTHER PETE ROSE . . . "Pete Rose is my idol," said Sax. "I've patterned my style after him, I'm a very aggressive player and try to give 100 percent all the time. I try to force mistakes, make things happen. This game is a year round profession for me. I try to improve myself as a player in the off-season. I work out eight hours a day Monday through Friday." Sax' schedule finds him jogging, working out at a Nautilus club, skipping rope, hitting a punching bag and throwing a tennis ball against a wall in the mornings and batting practice in the afternoons . . .

SAX, STEPHEN LOUIS

IN THE MINORS ... Sax, a one-time shortstop-third baseman who was converted to the outfield and then over to his present position of second base, came into his own in 1980 at Vero Beach ... Sax earned Florida State League All-Star honors while hitting .283 with 61 RBI and 33 stolen bases ... Sax was ninth in the league in hitting at .354 and led the league's second basemen in fielding and putouts ... his success continued at San Antonio of the Texas League as he earned Texas League Player of the Year honors in 1981 ... Sax won the batting title with a .346 average and he was named to the Texas League All-Star and Topps-National Association Class AA All-Star teams ... he started the Texas League season hot as he had 20 hits in his first 38 at bats for a .538 average and 16 runs scored ... Sax fanned just 32 times in 536 plate appearances at San Antonio ... Sax broke into the Dodger organization at Lethbridge in 1978 where he hit .328 ... he collected two hits in his first professional game and the over-excited youngster was picked off base both times ... he also had a string of six consecutive hits ...

PERSONAL ... Sax's brother, David, plays in the Dodger organization ... Steve is a graduate of James Marshall High in June, 1978 ... signed by Ronnie King ... earned All-American, All-California, all-City, all-League and MVP of league honors in 1977 at James Marshall High and his senior year found him repeating as MVP of League and earning All-City and All-California honors while setting four school records in baseball ... plays the drums ... Sax is a fan of Pete Rose and the Bay Area prep star was a fan of Willie Mays and the San Francisco Giants ...

1983 ... As far as Mike Scioscia is concerned, 1983 is a year he would just as soon forget ... after working seemingly endless hours in spring training to improve physically, offensively and defensively, Scioscia had his season end prematurely on May 14 in San Diego, when he suffered a slight tear to the rotator cuff in his right shoulder while throwing out Alan Wiggins attempting to steal second ... he spent the remainder of the season rehabilitating the shoulder and serving as the Dodgers' "Eye in the Sky," working with a walkie-talkie in the press box or stands to help position Dodger fielders ... ironically, Scioscia's only home run of the season came in that San Diego game, a two-run shot in a 4-1 Dodgers win ... he had three hits and four RBI in a 16-10 win May 6 vs. St. Louis ...

THE DOLDRUMS ... Scioscia had a disappointing season in 1982 at bat and defensively, except in the area where he perhaps excels more than any other catcher in the game: blocking the plate against a would-be run scorer ... he started slowly with the bat, built his average to .260 in late May, but then dropped off again ... he also was charged with 14 passed balls ... but he achieved career highs in home runs and RBI while platooning much of the year with Steve Yeager, except from July 10-Aug. 9, when Yeager was sidelined due to knee surgery ...

THE ROCK ... His ability to block the plate against an opposition baserunner has gained Scioscia recognition throughout the league. "I've never seen anybody better," said Dodgers' Vice-President Al Campanis ...

REGULAR DUTY ... Because the Dodgers faced so many right-handed pitchers, Scioscia was the regular catcher in 1981 and enjoyed a fine first full season in the majors ... batted near .300 most of the season ... threw out about one-third of the opposition's attempted base-stealers ... had 11-game hitting streak ... biggest Dodger Stadium thrill came when he hit home run in game one of League Championship Series against Montreal on Oct. 13, with his parents in attendance ...

THE SHUTTLE ... Scioscia was up and down between Albuquerque and Los Angeles in 1980 due to injuries to Steve Yeager and Joe Ferguson ... doubled against Houston April 20 in first major league at-bat ... before returning to minors, delivered triple in May 3 game at Philadelphia, his hometown, with his father, who would soon undergo open-heart surgery, watching ... was recalled again Aug. 25 when Yeager was disabled ... went 4-for-4 against Phillies in Sept. 6 victory in Los Angeles ... made just two errors in 54 games ...

1983 . . . The Dodgers needed one victory to clinch the 1983 National League Western Division title with three to play and they once again turned to their ace lefthander, Fernando Valenzuela . . . although the game didn't mean anything after San Diego had stopped Atlanta, Valenzuela and the Dodgers did stop San Francisco on Sept. 30, 4-3 and the champagne flowed . . . although Valenzuela didn't rack up the great numbers of his 1981 and 1982 seasons with the Dodgers, the 23-year-old led the Dodger pitching staff in starts (35), complete games (9), shutouts (4), strikeouts (189) and innings pitched (257) . . . he tied for the lead in victories with Bob Welch at 15 . . . among the National League leaders, Valenzuela ranked fifth in innings pitched, fourth in strikeouts, tied for sixth in victories, tied for second in shutouts and tied for fourth in complete games . . . Fernando's longest winning streak of the season was five games over seven starts (May 12-June 13) with a 2.04 ERA (14 ER in 61.2 IP) . . . during this stretch he put together his two finest outings of the year and they came back-to-back . . . Valenzuela stopped Philadelphia on just four hits, 2-0 on May 23 and then came back to blank San Francisco on just two hits on May 28, 5-0 (the two-hitter matching the low-hit game of his career) . . . suffered through the longest losing streak of his career at four straight games (Aug. 26-Sept. 16) . . . earned a spot on the National League All-Star team for the third time in as many big league seasons . . . had great success against Atlanta as he recorded three wins including an 11-5 victory on June 8 as he hit a home run and a single for three RBI to extend his hitting streak to six games . . . won Silver Bat award . . . was used as a pinch-hitter on June 11 at Cincinnati and struck out . . . beat the Cubs in Chicago with a 10-5 complete game on July 26, the first Dodger complete game in 33 games, snapping the longest drought in Los Angeles history . . . has pitched two two-hitters, two three-hitters, four four-hitters and seven five-hitters in his career . . .

ENCORE . . . After Fernando Valenzuela was the talk of the town with his great 1981 performance, the youngster came right back in 1982 with a 19-13 record and 2.87 ERA . . . finished third in the Cy Young Award voting behind Philadelphia's Steve Carlton and Montreal's Steve Rogers . . . among the top pitchers in the league as he tied for second in wins (19), fifth in earned run average (2.87), second in innings pitched (285), second in complete games (18), fourth in strikeouts (199) and tied for fourth in shutouts (4) . . . paced the Dodgers in all pitching categories but starts and shutouts, where he tied with Jerry Reuss . . . named to the National League All-Star team . . . was Dodgers' stopper as he recorded 11 of his 19 wins after Dodger losses . . . stopped seven Dodger losing streaks . . . played left and right field in wild 21-inning game against Chicago Cubs, Aug. 17-18, a suspended game the Dodgers eventually won, 2-1 . . . hit his first Major League home run in fourth inning off St. Louis' Steve Mura on Aug. 25 at St. Louis . . .

TALK OF THE TOWN . . . Fernando Valenzuela was the talk of baseball during the Dodgers' World Championship 1981 season . . . became the first rookie to capture the Rookie of the Year Award and the Cy Young Award in the same season . . . the list of honors goes on — Major League Player of the Year by The Sporting News, National League Pitcher of the Year by The Sporting News, National League Rookie Pitcher of the Year by The Sporting News, lefthanded pitcher on The Sporting News National League All-Star team, pitcher on the Topps Rookie team and the Baseball Digest Rookie team, the Silver Bat Award as the top hitting pitcher in the National League and named to the United Press International All-Star team . . . he also was the starting pitcher for the National League in the All-Star game . . .

THE NUMBERS OF 1981 . . . Valenzuela compiled a 13-7 record and 2.48 ERA . . . led the National League in shutouts (8), complete games (11), innings pitched (192) and strikeouts (180) . . . his win total tied for second best and his earned run average ranked seventh . . . led the majors in shutouts and strikeouts . . . tied the major league record for shutouts by a rookie previously set by Ewell Russell with the 1913 Chicago White Sox . . . first rookie pitcher since Cleveland's Herb Score to lead a league in strikeouts (Score did it in 1955) . . . had longest consecutive scoreless inning streak in National League at 36 straight innings and also had three other streaks — 32.2 innings and two streaks of 18 each . . . had two three-hitters, three four-hitters and three five-hitters . . .

A STRANGE START . . . The 1981 season started in a most unusual way for Fernando as he became the Dodgers' Opening Day starter after Jerry Reuss came up with a hamstring pull the day before . . . even though Fernando had pitched batting practice the day before, he took the call for the opener and blanked the Houston Astros on five hits, 2-0 . . . the opening day win was the first of eight straight to start the year, seven of which were complete games for an 0.50 ERA . . . he actually won 10 straight, including the final two of 1980 . . .

VALENZUELA, FERNANDO ANGUAMEA

THE CALL TO L.A. ... Fernando was promoted to Los Angeles on Sept. 10, 1980 ... the screwball artist with a deceptively speedy fastball was tossed into the pressure cooker as he made 10 appearances and stopped the opposition cold as he did not allow an earned run in 17.2 innings ... during his appearances, Valenzuela came up with two key wins and one key save ... made his Major League debut on Sept. 15 at Atlanta and did not allow an earned run in two and one-third innings of work ... his first victory came on Sept. 30 at San Francisco in a 6-3 10-inning contest as he hurled two innings and fanned four ... kept the Dodgers' pennant hopes alive in the first of a scheduled three games with Houston on Oct. 3 in a 3-2 10-inning win in which Valenzuela fanned three in two relief innings to earn his second major league win ... with his string at San Antonio, Valenzuela had not allowed an earned run in 52.2 innings ...

1983 ... Bob Welch was one of the Dodgers most consistent pitchers in 1983 ... he tied with Fernando Valenzuela for the most wins on the staff with 15, one shy of his career high set in 1982, and tied for fifth in the league ... third in the league in earned run average at a career-best 2.65, behind only San Francisco's Atlee Hamaker's 2.25 and Philadelphia's John Denny's 2.37 ... seventh in the league in strikeouts with 156 ... eighth in the league's Cy Young balloting ... eclipsed 200 innings pitched mark for third time in his career ... pitched with bone chip in right wrist from Aug. 17 on after being hit by pitch vs. Mets ... plagued by bursitis in left hip in last three starts of regular season and in only start of LCS ... pitched his second career one-hitter June 1 vs. Philadelphia and Steve Carlton, 1-0 (Von Hayes' fourth-inning single only hit) ... had two-hitter May 22 vs. Mets, 5-0 ... beat Mario Soto and Reds on six-hitter, 1-0, June 17, the lone run coming on Welch's first career home run ... had six-game winning streak (Aug. 6-Sept. 8) while allowing six earned runs in 42.1 innings for a 1.28 ERA ... had season-high 10 strikeouts vs. Atlanta Aug. 6 ...

COMING OF AGE ... Welch became a complete pitcher in 1982 and blossomed into one of the finest hurlers in the league ... he could easily have won 20 games (he was involved in six one-run games where he had no decision) ... set career highs in every pitching category ... matched career high for strikeouts with 11 on July 24 vs. Philadelphia ... pitched two three-hitters and two four-hitters ... played right and left field in wild 21-inning game at Chicago on Aug. 17-18, when Dodgers ran out of players but eventually won game, suspended due to darkness, 2-1 ... co-authored book "5 O'Clock Comes Early, A Young Man's Battle With Alcoholism" with New York Times' George Vecsey, detailing the struggle Welch won to keep his career on track ...

THE COMEBACK ... Though a mere 23, Welch found himself making a great comeback — in life and on the pitcher's mound — in 1980 ... prior to spring training, at the encouragement of the Dodgers, Welch spent 36 days at The Meadows, an alcoholic treatment center in Wickenburg, AZ ... he arrived in Florida with his drinking problems behind him, as well as a sore arm that plagued him the year before ... Welch won six straight decisions (April 30-June 3) and nine of his first 12 decisions to win a spot on the National League All-Star team ...

THE REVIEWS ... "I see a lot of Don Drysdale in Bob Welch," said Dodger manager Tom Lasorda. "He's got similar mannerisms and that same look in his eyes. The only difference is Welch comes over the top and Drysdale was a sidarmer." Former Dodger catcher Jerry Grote said, "He's up there with any other youngster I've ever caught. And that includes Seaver, Koosman and Matlack. He's got as much potential, as good a fastball as any of them had. And nothing seems to faze him." ...

A GREAT OPENING ... Welch joined the Dodgers at the age of 21 as he was recalled to Los Angeles on June 19, 1978 ... one day later, Welch was summoned from the bullpen for his first major league appearance against Houston (two innings, one hit and two strikeouts) ... in a matter of four days, Welch had picked up a win and a save ... earned his first win June 21 against Houston in relief ... saved an important game against Cincinnati June 24 ... earned his first start June 30 at Cincinnati and he shut out the Reds on five hits for six innings, while fanning six ... had 13 strikeouts in his first six appearances totaling 11.1 innings, and did not walk a man in his first six appearances totaling 17 innings ... was inserted as a regular in Dodger rotation in August and pitched one of the biggest games of the year on Aug. 5 against the San Francisco Giants ... trailing the Giants by four and one-half games in the standings and losers of six straight, Welch was placed in the rotation to replace ailing Rick Rhoden and he blanked the Giants on nine hits, 2-0 ... this was the start of a seven-game winning streak for the Dodgers and a push toward the Western Division title ... Welch put the Dodgers in a first place tie in his next start — Aug. 10 — and it came against the Giants and Vida Blue as he stopped them again, 12-2 — his next big outing as far as the Dodgers were concerned came Sept. 24 as he blanked the San Diego Padres, 4-0, on five hits and the Dodgers clinched the Western Division title ...

IN THE MINORS ... Signed by the Dodgers as their number one selection (21st player taken) in the June Free Agent Draft in 1977 out of Eastern Michigan University ... reported to San Antonio in mid-June and moved right into starting rotation ... reported to Arizona Instructional League following regular season and earned John Carey Award, as top major league prospect on the squad ... was 5-1 with 1.72 ERA in Arizona and he fanned 45 batters in 47 innings ...

PERSONAL ... 1983 ... Steve Yeager was enjoying one of his finest all-around seasons when his right wrist was fractured by a Fred Breining pitch July 31 at San Francisco ... Yeager spent the next three weeks on the disabled list and played sparingly after returning to the roster on Aug. 22 ... his 15 home runs were twice as many as Yeager hit in the previous three seasons combined (seven) and the most he had hit in a single-season since his career-high 16 in 1977 ... passed 1,000 game mark in his career May 9 vs. Chicago ... 96 career home runs places him 17th on Dodgers all-time list and eighth on L.A. Dodgers list ... hit two home runs in a game twice in '83 — May 22 at New York off Tom Seaver and July 22 at St. Louis — making fifth time in his career he has done that ... had three hits and four RBI June 9 at Atlanta despite not starting game and also had four RBI July 22 at St. Louis ... he also enjoyed one of his finest seasons defensively, throwing out 44 of 107 attempted base stealers for a .411 performance ... shared catching duties with Jack Fimple after returning from injury ...

Pat Zachry did an excellent job as a middle reliever for the Dodgers in 1983, appearing in a career-high 40 games ... won his first five decisions before suffering loss Sept. 4 at Montreal ... first win came April 13 with two scoreless innings vs. Houston ... made only start in second game of doubleheader Aug. 30 at New York, pitching six scoreless innings to beat his former team, 2-1 ... beat his former teams, Mets and Reds, twice each ... was 4-0 at home ... was 4-1 after All-Star break ... worked 16 scoreless innings in seven August appearances, posting 3-0 record ... longest relief outings were two strong three-inning appearances July 30 at San Francisco and Aug. 3 vs. Cincinnati ... most impressive relief job was pitching out of bases loaded, no out jam Aug. 13 at Atlanta, but Dodgers lost, 8-7, in ninth inning ...

FAST START ... Zachry shared National League Rookie of the Year honors with San Diego's Butch Metzger in 1976, after finishing fifth in the N.L. in ERA (2.74) to go with his 14-7 record and 2.74 ERA ... started and won the third game of the 1976 World Series for the Reds at Yankee Stadium ...

INJURY BUG ... Zachry's career has been plagued with injuries ... he underwent a hernia operation at the end of the 1976 season and developed soreness in his right elbow during the spring of 1977 ... suffered fracture of his left foot on July 24, 1978 when he kicked the dugout step after coming out of a game with Cincinnati and was on the disabled list the rest of the year ... developed sore right elbow April 18, 1979 and was placed on disabled list with irritation of ulna nerve on May 23. Recurrent pain caused him to be placed on DL for second time on June 10 and he underwent surgery to move ulna nerve on Aug. 7 ... started 1980 season on disabled list due to sore arm and came off May 3 ... has been healthy since then ...

REDS AND METS ... Zachry compiled a 17-14 record in 1½ seasons with Cincinnati before being traded to the Mets along with Steve Henderson, Doug Flynn and Dan Norman for Tom Seaver on June 15, 1977 ... he had a 41-46 record in 5½ seasons with the Mets ...

PETER O'MALLEY

President

Peter O'Malley has been president of the Los Angeles Dodgers for 14 years. He was appointed president in March, 1970. O'Malley began working full-time in the Dodger organization in January, 1962, when he was named director of Dodgertown, the Dodgers' spring training camp in Vero Beach, FL. In January, 1965, O'Malley was appointed president and general manager of the Spokane Indians, the Dodgers' triple A farm club in the Pacific Coast League. O'Malley came to Los Angeles in January, 1967, when he was named vice president in charge of stadium operations. Two years later, he was appointed executive vice president. O'Malley serves on the Executive Council of Major League Baseball, the Major League Long Range Planning Committee, the National League Executive Committee and he's co-chairman of the Restructuring Committee. He is also vice chairman of the Performing Arts Council of the Los Angeles Music Center, a trustee of the Los Angeles Police Memorial Foundation, a member of the Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee board of directors and a trustee of Phi Delta Gamma Educational Foundation. He is a member of the Bank of America and Union Oil Co. board of directors. O'Malley attended LaSalle Military Academy in Oakdale, NY, and majored in business law at the Wharton School of Business and Finance at the University of Pennsylvania, graduating with a Bachelor of Science degree in Economics in 1960.



FRED CLAIRE

Executive Vice President

Fred Claire was appointed Executive Vice President of the Los Angeles Dodgers in December, 1982. Claire has been with the Dodgers for 15 years, joining the team in July, 1969, as the club's director of publicity. He was appointed vice president in charge of public relations and promotions in February, 1975. Prior to joining the Dodgers, Claire spent 12 years in the newspaper field as a sports editor, columnist and baseball writer with the Long Beach Independent Press-Telegram, the Pomona Progress-Bulletin and the Whittier News. Claire covered the Angels and Dodgers for the Long Beach paper. During a nine-year period as the sports editor of the Pomona paper, the Progress Bulletin twice won the award as the top sports section in California in its circulation category. Claire graduated from San Jose State College in 1957 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Journalism. He also holds an Associate of Arts degree from Mt. San Antonio College. Claire is a member of the board of directors of the Major League Baseball Promotion Corporation. He also serves on the board of directors of the Greater Los Angeles Visitors and Convention Bureau and the Echo Park Chamber of Commerce. He is a member of the Los Angeles Rotary Club.



AL CAMPANIS

Vice President, Player Personnel

Al Campanis has been vice president, player personnel for the Dodgers for 16 years, his appointment coming in 1968. During Campanis' tenure, the Dodgers have won four National League pennants, one Western Division title, and one world's championship, they have seven second-place finishes and have finished third twice. Prior to that, Campanis served as the Dodgers' scouting director, beginning in 1957. Campanis joined the Dodgers' scouting staff in 1950 when he also was named director of the team's spring training camp in Vero Beach, FL. Campanis, who has been a player, scout, manager and instructor in the Dodger organization, signed such players as Sandy Koufax, Roberto Clemente, Tommy Davis, Bob Aspromonte, Sandy Amoros, Pete Richert and Al Ferrara. Koufax and Clemente are in the Hall of Fame. Campanis, 67, launched his professional baseball career as an infielder



with Macon, GA, of the Sally League in 1940. He started the 1943 season with Montreal of the International League and wound up that season with the Brooklyn Dodgers. Campanis entered the U.S. Navy in October, 1943, and while in the service coached the baseball team of St. Albans Hospital. Upon his discharge, he returned to Montreal in 1946 as a shortstop. Jackie Robinson, making his debut in organized baseball, was the second baseman. Campanis retired as a player in 1947 and the following three seasons managed at Nashua, NH, Lancaster, PA, and Newport News, VA. Born in Greece, Campanis came to the United States at the age of six. He graduated from New York University in 1940 with a degree in Education.

BILL SCHWEPPE

Vice President, Minor League Operations

Bill Schweppe has been vice president, minor league operations for the Dodgers since 1968. Schweppe has been with the Dodgers since 1946. A native of Illinois, Schweppe served as business manager of the Dodgers' farm club in



Newport News, VA, in 1946 and two years later at Danville, IL. In 1949, Schweppe became an assistant to minor league director Fresco Thompson in Brooklyn. Schweppe moved to St. Louis in 1950 as the Dodgers' Midwestern supervisor of scouting and farm clubs before moving to Los Angeles in 1958 as secretary of minor league operations. Schweppe received his law degree from the Missouri Institute of Accountancy and Law and was admitted to the Missouri State Bar and to practice before the United States Supreme Court.

MERRITT WILEY

Vice President, Marketing



Merritt Willey has been the Dodgers' vice president, marketing since Sept. 1, 1972. Prior to joining the Dodgers, Willey accumulated 26 years experience as an advertising, marketing and broadcasting executive. Willey previously held the position of vice president of Guild, Bascom and Bonfigli of San Francisco; vice president-manager of D'Arcy Advertising Co. in Los Angeles; vice president, public affairs, marketing and research, Lotus Theatre Corp. in Los Angeles and vice president-general manager of radio station KWKW in Los Angeles.

Dodger Department Heads

CHARLIE BLANEY, *Dodgertown Director*, is in charge of the Dodgers' 450-acre sports complex in Vero Beach, FL. Dodgertown consists of the Dodgers' training home, the New Orleans Saints' training camp, a conference center, two championship golf courses, a residential development, 70 acres of citrus, and one of the Dodgers' minor league teams, the Vero Beach Dodgers. Blaney has been with the Dodgers for 17 years.

STEVE BRENER, *Director of Publicity*, handles all media related matters for the Dodgers. Steve is in his 15th year with the Dodgers. He was named to his present position in April, 1975, at the age of 24, thus distinguishing him as the youngest publicist in the majors. Steve earned an A.A. degree at Los Angeles Valley College and his Bachelor of Arts Degree in journalism at California State University, Northridge.

ROY CAMPANELLA, *Community Relations*, rejoined his battery mate, Don Newcombe, on the Dodgers' Community Services team in November, 1978. He is the only Dodger in history to win the Most Valuable Player award more than once, winning in 1951, 1953 and 1955. Campanella was elected to the Hall of Fame in 1969. He was the Dodgers' starting catcher from 1949-57, compiling a Major League average of .276 with 242 career home runs.

JIM CAMPBELL, Merchandising Director, handles the Dodgers' gift shop, souvenirs, novelties and advertising program. Campbell started working for the Dodgers in 1961 on a part-time basis. He also served as merchandise manager at Universal Studios, Lion Country Safari and Busch Gardens prior to joining the Dodgers full-time in 1975 assisting the late Danny Goodman. This is his first year in his present position.

BILL DeLURY, Traveling Secretary, broke in with the Dodgers in 1950. Upon graduation from St. Leonard Academy, DeLury began work as an office boy. He moved up to work in the minor league department after the service called him in 1956 and upon his discharge in 1959. DeLury joined the ticket office staff in 1964. In 1979, Billy was named as the Dodgers' traveling secretary. He coordinates team travel, hotels, etc. for the Dodgers.

KEN HASEMANN, Controller, came to the Dodgers in March, 1962 after working as senior accountant for Peat, Marwick, Mitchell and Company. He was named to his present position in January, 1967. Ken received his B.S. degree at Bradley University.

IKE IKUHARA, Assistant to the President, has been a member of the Dodgers' organization since 1965. Before being named to his present position in January, 1982, Ikuhara worked in the minor league, scouting, accounting, ticket, concession and public relation departments. He obtained a Bachelor of Science Degree in 1959 from Waseda University in Tokyo, Japan and also majored in law.

LOU JOHNSON, Community Relations, joined the Dodgers' Community Services team in 1981 and deals mainly with the youth, traveling to schools speaking to youngsters on the hazards of drugs and alcohol. "Sweet Lou" spent 12 seasons in the minor leagues before being called up in 1965 when he led the Dodgers over Minnesota to the World Championship. The next season he hit .272 with 73 RBIs to help put the Dodgers in the Fall Classic again.

WALTER NASH, Director of Ticket Department, joined the Dodger organization in 1962 as internal auditor and became director of the ticket department in 1964. He worked as an auditor for Travelers Insurance (1952-62). Walter is a graduate of Rider College with a BA degree in accounting.

DON NEWCOMBE, Director of Community Relations, is actively involved in the minority communities for the Dodgers. Newcombe, who also speaks on alcoholism across the United States, was baseball's first winner of the Cy Young Award in 1956 and also was selected the National League's Most Valuable Player that season. He won 149 games during his 10 years in the majors — eight with the Dodgers. Newcombe was named N.L. Rookie of the Year in 1949 when he was 17-8. He joined the front office staff of the Dodgers in 1970.

ROBERT SCHENZ, Director of Stadium Club and Transportation, has been with the Dodgers since 1961 in his present position. Prior to joining the Dodgers, he worked for United Airlines since 1946. Bob attended the University of Cincinnati, Morehead State in Kentucky and Los Angeles City College.

BILL SHUMARD, Director of Community Services & Special Events, coordinates the organization's many-faceted community relations programs, as well as many Dodger-related promotions and special events staged both in and away from Dodger Stadium. Shumard joined the Dodgers in May, 1975 after serving as Sports Information Director at California State University, Los Angeles (1973-75) and at California State University, Long Beach (1972-73). Shumard earned a BA degree in journalism from CSULB in 1972, and an Associate in Arts degree from Compton College in 1970.

BOB SMITH, Director of Stadium Operations, joined the Dodgers in 1962 working in stadium operations for Allied Consolidated Services. He was named to head up operations in 1968. Formerly from Tennessee, Bob oversees the entire 300 acres of beautiful Dodger Stadium.

BARRY STOCKHAMER, Director of Ticket Marketing and Promotions, has been with the Dodgers since May, 1969. He is currently involved in handling the soliciting of ticket sales as well as overseeing group sales. He also directs promotional activities at the Stadium. Stockhamer was named business manager at Spokane in 1972 and also assisted the general manager at Albuquerque later that year. In 1973 he served as assistant camp director in Vero Beach, FL and then returned to Los Angeles to head up group sales. A graduate of the University of California at Irvine.

DAVE VAN de WALKER, Director of Dodger Network, handles the Dodgers' radio and television announcers and stations. He joined the Dodgers in 1970, but he was part of the Dodger family prior to his present position. Dave worked with Young & Rubicam from 1944-62 and then Smock-Waddell from 1962-70. One of his main assignments was coordinating of the Dodger broadcasts and telecasts. He also served as Radio/TV Account Executive on the Union Oil account for two years.

BEN WADE, Director of Scouting, has spent 26 years in the Dodger organization. He played for the Dodgers for six years and then turned to scouting for 10 years before earning the promotion to scouting director in 1973. Wade scouted for the New York Mets prior to joining the Dodgers. He spent 20 years in professional baseball, four in the majors. In one of Wade's Major League wins in 1952, he hit two home runs off Warren Spahn.

TOBY ZWIKEL, Director of Publications, is editor of Dodger Blue, the official newspaper of the Dodgers, assists Steve Brener with Line Drives, the Dodgers' newsletter, and the media guide, and also assists Brener with the day-to-day operation of the publicity department. Zwickel joined the Dodgers in January, 1981. Prior to that, he was a sports writer for the Daily News, covering the Dodgers. He also worked for United Press International in Chicago and Los Angeles. Zwickel is a 1970 graduate of Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, with a bachelor's degree in Government.

Dodger Radio-TV Team

VIN SCULLY, Broadcaster, is a master of the English language. Baseball fans have been able to see, and enjoy what Vin Scully has had to say since 1950 when he joined Red Barber on the Dodgers' broadcasting team. Inducted into the broadcast wing of Baseball's Hall of Fame in 1982, as he was selected the Ford C. Frick Award winner. Also had his star placed on Hollywood's Walk of Fame in 1982. A graduate of Fordham University, Scully has covered many of baseball's thrilling episodes. He is the only announcer to cover two perfect games. Other thrilling moments include the 18 strikeouts by Sandy Koufax in two different games; the four-game sweep over the Yankees in the 1963 World Series; the Dodgers' playoff win in 1959 over the Braves; Maury Wills' 104 steals in 1962; Dick Nen's pinch homer which beat the St. Louis Cardinals down the stretch in 1963; the Yankee-Dodger exhibition game which played to 93,103 in the Caliseum in honoring Roy Campanella; Don Larsen's perfect game in the fifth game of the 1956 World Series; Hank Aaron's 715th home run and Don Drysdale's 58 2/3 scoreless innings. Scully has done eight World Series and five All-Star games for television. Along with his broadcasting duties with the Dodgers, he works for NBC covering baseball and golf. Dodger fans proved their admiration of Scully in 1976 when they voted him "Most Memorable Personality" in Los Angeles Dodgers baseball history. Scully won the "Look" Magazine Award for his outstanding coverage of the 1959 World Series. Scully has been named the outstanding sportscaster in the nation three times by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association. He has been named the top sports broadcaster in California 16 times.

JERRY DOGGETT, Broadcaster, is a veteran of 40 years behind the mike. Jerry joined the Dodgers in 1956 after working for the Dallas baseball club as publicity director. Doggett started his announcing career in 1938 in Longview, Texas and moved to Dallas in 1941, where he did play-by-play for the Dallas club. He has handled assignments in football, basketball and ice hockey. Jerry and his wife, Jody, will celebrate their 44th anniversary early this season. He is one of an elite group of announcers with six decades of sportscasting. Jerry enjoys golf and traveling during the off-season.

ROSS PORTER, Broadcaster, joined the Dodgers broadcasting team of Vin Scully and Jerry Doggett in October, 1976 after serving 10 years as sportscaster for KNBC. Porter had his start as a play-by-play announcer in 1953, at the age of 14, and ironically, it was for a Dodger farm club — Shawnee, Oklahoma. A graduate of the University of Oklahoma, Porter earned a BA degree in radio journalism. Porter broadcast the 1977-78 World Series on CBS radio. He has done play-by-play for NBC for pro football and Pacific-10 basketball and continues to do college basketball during the off-season. Porter handled the NBC telecasts of the 1974 NCAA basketball championships as well as the 1975 and 1976 Rose Bowl games.

JAIME JARRIN, Spanish Broadcaster, is regarded as the number one Spanish sports announcer in the United States. Jaime has been covering the Dodgers since 1959. He was the first Latin American to win the Golden Mike Award, gaining the honor in 1970 and 1971. He has broadcast more than 25 world championship boxing matches. Jarrin attended Central University of Ecuador in Quito.

RENE CARDENAS, Spanish Broadcaster, Rene Cardenas is in his seventh year in the Dodgers' Spanish broadcast booth. This is his second tour of duty. Cardenas was the announcer on the Dodgers' Spanish broadcasts from 1958-61 and rejoined the club in 1982. Cardenas left the Dodgers after the 1961 season to work for the Houston Astros. When the Astros dropped their Spanish broadcasts, Cardenas returned to his native Managua, Nicaragua, where he worked in radio and television. He announced baseball and covered various championship boxing matches throughout the world. Due to political unrest in Nicaragua in 1978, Cardenas and his wife, Jilma, were forced to flee the country and returned to Houston. In 1979, Cardenas worked on an experimental Spanish broadcast schedule for the Texas Rangers, while serving as program manager for a Houston Spanish radio station, a position he held until rejoining the Dodgers. Jaime Jarrin began working with Cardenas on the Dodgers' Spanish broadcasts in 1959.

1983 DODGER HIGHLIGHTS

DODGERS WIN THE WEST . . . The Los Angeles Dodgers captured their fourth National League Western Division title in seven seasons under manager Tom Lasorda. The Dodgers clinched the crown on Sept. 30, the third-to-last day of the regular season. Over seven seasons (plus four games in 1976), Lasorda has compiled a record of 608-479 (517-408 prior to this year). Lasorda's winning percentage is among the top 12 of all-time at .559. Lasorda, who is in his 35th year in the Dodger organization, is the "dean" of Major League managers along with Pittsburgh's Chuck Tanner. In seven years, Lasorda has guided the Dodgers to three pennants, a division title, two second place finishes and one third place finish.

DODGERS BEST IN THE NATIONAL LEAGUE . . . The Dodgers finished the season with a 91-71 record for a winning percentage of .562, the best record in the National League and fourth best in baseball.

BASEBALL'S BIGGEST DRAW . . . For the fourth time in major league baseball history, the Los Angeles Dodgers attracted more than three million fans. The Dodgers drew 3,510,313 fans, thus hitting the magic mark for the second straight season. The Dodgers hit the two million mark on their 46th date in 1983, thus tying the major league record they set last year. The Dodgers also established a new major league record for drawing 27 consecutive crowds of 40,000 or more.

THE TEAM OF THE 80's . . . The Los Angeles Dodgers have been in four straight pennant races down to the wire in the 80's. The Dodgers captured the World Championship in 1981, finished second by one game in 1982, tied for the Division title in 1980 before losing a playoff game to decide the champion and they took the Division title in 1983.

DODGER PITCHING IS THE BEST IN BASEBALL . . . The Dodgers finished the season with a 3.10 ERA, the best earned run average in the National League. The Dodger team hit their lowest mark on June 22, when the team ERA dropped to 2.54. The Dodgers have won eight ERA team titles in the last 12 years.

DODGERS HIT THE LONG BALL . . . For the sixth time in the past seven years, the Dodgers led the National League in home runs as they belted 146. The Dodgers had six players in double figures in home runs — Pedro Guerrero (32), Greg Brock (20), Ken Landreaux (17), Mike Marshall (17), Dusty Baker (15) and Steve Yeager (15).

GUERRERO POWER . . . Third baseman Pedro Guerrero became the first Los Angeles Dodger and the fourth Dodger overall to hit 30 or more home runs in back-to-back seasons. Guerrero hit 32 round trippers in 1983, just one shy of the Los Angeles Dodger record of 33 set by Steve Garvey in 1977. He also hit 32 in 1982. Guerrero now joins the ranks of Duke Snider, Roy Campanella and Gil Hodges who all accomplished the feat while the Dodgers were in Brooklyn. Guerrero, who became the first Dodger in history to join the 30 home run and 20 stolen base club in 1982, did it again in 1983 with his home run total and his career high of 23 stolen bases.

THE 25TH ANNIVERSARY . . . The 1983 season was the 25th anniversary of the Dodgers in Los Angeles — 1958-83. The Dodgers played their 2,000th regular season game in Los Angeles on May 26, 1983 against the club they started it all with, the San Francisco Giants. The Dodgers played their first game in Los Angeles on April 18, 1958 at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum. Miss Bonnie Marvin, who had seen every Dodger home game in their 25 years in Los Angeles, threw out the first ball at the 2,000 game, which the Dodgers lost 5-3.

DODGERS BY THE MONTH . . . The Dodgers had a hot August as they finished with a 20-10 mark and thus set a record for wins in the month in Los Angeles history. The 20 wins in the month marked the seventh time in L.A. history a team had 20 or more wins in one month. The 20 wins also helped the Dodgers move from 6½ games back on the first of the month to a 1½ game lead on Aug. 31. The Dodgers were 14-6 in April, 18-8 in May, 14-14 in June, 11-17 in July, 20-10 in August and 14-16 in Sept.-Oct.

A TEAM MEETING AND TWO IMPORTANT WINS . . . Two victories and one important team meeting turned the tide in the 1983 season. After a thorough beating at the hands of the Cincinnati Reds, 9-2, on Aug. 10, manager Tom Lasorda called a team meeting and the players followed with a meeting of their own. Two come-from-behind key victories in the season came on Sunday, Sept. 11 at home against the Atlanta Braves and Monday, Sept. 26 at Cincinnati. The Dodgers trailed the Braves, 6-3 in the ninth inning and then scored four runs for the victory. In Cincinnati, they trailed 8-5 in the ninth, scored three to tie and four in the 10th inning for a 12-9 victory.

DODGER WINNING STREAK . . . The Dodgers posted their longest winning streak of the season in the month of August at eight games. The Dodgers put together eight straight wins, Aug. 18-24, all at Dodger Stadium.

BAKER AND THE MONTH OF JULY . . . Dusty Baker was named as the National League Player of the Month for July. Baker hit .370 (34-for-92) in the month with 15 runs scored, four home runs and 23 RBIs. During one week of the month, Baker hit .500 with three home runs and 12 RBIs.

1983 DODGER HIGHLIGHTS

HOOTON AND THE MONTH OF JUNE ... Burt Hooton was selected as the National League Pitcher of the Month for June. Hooton posted a 4-0 record with a 1.77 ERA in six starts during the month. Hooton also recorded the longest winning streak by a Dodger pitcher for the season by winning seven straight from May 25 to July 10.

DODGERS TOUGH ON THE ROAD ... The Dodgers had the second-best road record in the National League with a 43-39 record for a winning percentage of .524. The Dodgers had a 46-26 record against the Eastern Division and 45-45 record against the West. The Dodgers had the best record in the National League under the lights at 71-45 and they won more one-run games than any other team in the league at 30.

DODGERS ON THE RUN ... The Dodgers had 166 stolen bases, third best total in the league. It was the most stolen bases by a Dodger team since 1965 when they stole 172 to lead the league. Four Dodgers stole bases in double figures. Steve Sax led the club with 56. Ken Landreaux (30), Pedro Guerrero (23) and Bill Russell (13) followed.

LOW-HITTERS ... Dodger righthander Bob Welch threw his second career one-hitter on June 1 at Dodger Stadium as he beat the Philadelphia Phillies and Steve Carlton, 1-0. Welch allowed just a fourth inning single to Von Hayes. Welch threw his first one-hitter on May 29, 1980 against Atlanta. Fernando Valenzuela and Welch tossed two-hitters during the season. Valenzuela stopped the Gaints, 5-0 on May 28 and Welch topped New York on May 22, 5-0.

THE BULLPEN ... The Dodgers' bullpen had a 27-16 record with 40 saves and a 2.51 ERA (110 ER, 394.2 IP). The 40 saves are 12 more than the Dodgers had in 1982 and the most by the club since they had 42 in 1980.

DODGER PINCH-HITTING ... Jose Morales led the Dodgers with 12 pinch-hits, including three pinch-hit home runs and eight RBIs. Rick Monday, the Dodgers' top left-handed pinch-hitter, was second with eight pinch-hits and seven RBIs. On Sept. 11th, Morales doubled off Atlanta's Donnie Moore at Dodger Stadium to pass Jerry Lynch for third place on the all-time pinch-hit list with 117 in his career. Only Manny Mota at 150 and Smoky Burgess at 144 are ahead of Morales, who finished the year with 120 career pinch-hits.

THE LONGEST GAME . . . AND THE DODGERS PLAYED LONGER

The Brooklyn Dodgers and the Boston Braves played the longest game in Major League history when they went 26 innings on May 1, 1920 in Boston. The game ended in a 1-1 tie as the Dodgers' Leon Cadore and the Braves' Joe Oeschger went the distance. It was the start of three long days for the Dodgers. The Dodgers returned home the next day to lose to the Phillies, 4-3 in 13 innings. They left after the game for Boston where the following day the Dodgers and Braves went 19 innings before the Braves won 2-1. Thus in three days the Dodgers had played 58 innings, changing cities after each day.

HOME RUNS HIT AT DODGER STADIUM ON THE LOGE LEVEL

Only two players have ever hit a home run on the loge level (the second level) at Dodger Stadium. Frank Howard was the first one to do it for the Dodgers in the 1963 World Series. Howard hit it eight rows up in the fourth game on Oct. 6 and it was estimated at 420 feet. The second player to do it was New York Mets' Dave Kingman on June 4, 1976. Kingman hit three home runs in the game and drove in eight runs. He was the first player to hit three home runs in a game against the Dodgers in Los Angeles since Pittsburgh's Willie Stargell did it on June 24, 1965.

OPPONENT HOME RUNS

The most home runs by an opponent in a season against the Los Angeles Dodgers is eight. The record is held by Hank Aaron (Milwaukee) in 1963, Orlando Cepeda (Atlanta) in 1970 and Darrell Evans (Atlanta) in 1973. The most home runs hit by an opponent in a season at Dodger Stadium is six set by Jimmy Wynn of the Houston Astros in 1967.

Who will be the first Los Angeles Dodger to do it?

DOUBLE FIGURES IN HOME RUNS

Three Dodger teams have had eight men in double figures in home runs—the 1979, the 1961 and the 1953 Dodgers. The National and American League record is nine men. The 1961 Dodgers to do it were John Roseboro (18), Wally Moon (17), Duke Snider (16), Frank Howard (15), Tommy Davis (15), Willie Davis (12), Charlie Neal (10) and Ron Fairly (10). The 1953 Dodgers to do it were Duke Snider (42), Roy Campanella (41), Gil Hodges (31), Carl Furillo (21), Pee Wee Reese (13), Jackie Robinson (12), Wayne Belardi (11) and Billy Cox (10).

DODGER DIAMOND VISION

Dodger Diamond Vision was the first full-color matrix board in the world. The screen is 35 feet wide, and 25 feet high. The system works on the same principle as a home color TV set. Diamond Vision was built by Mitsubishi Electric Corporation of Japan and made its debut at baseball's All-Star Game at Dodger Stadium on July 8, 1980. The board is used to show replays and highlights of game action, outstanding defensive and offensive plays in slo-mo and freeze frame, as well as various statistical information about the players. Diamond Vision consists of 38,400 red, green and blue lights. These lights draw only 2 watts per tube (1/10 of a comparable incandescent lamp).

THE THREE AND TWO MILLION CLUB

The Los Angeles Dodgers became the first team in Major League history to hit the three million mark in attendance for the fourth time as they attracted 3,510,313 fans in 80 dates in 1983 to lead the Majors. It was the second greatest season attendance ever. The Dodgers established the record in 1982 at 3,608,881 fans and they also hit the three million mark in 1978 at 3,347,845 fans and in 1980 at 3,249,287. The Dodgers became the first team to play before five million fans total — home and road — in 1978 as the total reached 5,494,204. The Dodgers have since accomplished this figure three more times as they attracted a record 5,859,072 fans in 1982 as well as 5,747,526 in 1983 and 5,311,656 in 1980. The Dodgers have averaged more than two million fans a season since coming to Los Angeles in 1958. Of the top 10 all-time season marks, the Dodgers have seven of the 10 spots. The Dodgers have hit the two million mark 19 times — the most by any Major League team. The Dodgers hit the two million mark for the 11th straight season (1973-83). The Dodgers hit the million mark in 22 dates in 1981, the two million mark in 46 dates in 1982 and the three million mark in 67 dates in 1982 — all three establishing Major League records. The 1980 All-Star Game marked the first and only time the game has been played at Dodger Stadium. The game attracted 56,088 on July 8th.

DODGERS HAVE DRAWN 90,000 FOUR TIMES

The Los Angeles Dodgers hold the Major League record for the largest crowd to see a baseball game of 93,103 set on May 7, 1959. The fans paid tribute to Roy Campanella, who was injured in an automobile accident, and saw the Dodgers play an exhibition game with the New York Yankees at the Los Angeles Coliseum. The Dodgers drew three consecutive 90,000-plus crowds for the 1959 World Series games with the Chicago White Sox at the Los Angeles Coliseum. The Dodgers set the World Series attendance record for a game in the third game on Tuesday, Oct. 6, as they attracted 92,706 fans. The other two crowds were 92,394 on Sunday, Oct. 4 and 92,650 on Monday, Oct. 5.

Do you remember the inning? This is how it went: Billy Cox grounded out. Pee Wee Reese walked. Duke Snider homered to right. Jackie Robinson doubled to left. Andy Pafko walked. George Shuba singled Robinson home and Pafko went to second. Pitcher Ewell Blackwell was replaced by Bud Byerly. Pafko was thrown out trying to steal third and Shuba went to second. Gil Hodges walked. Rube Walker singled home Shuba. Chris Van Cuyk singled Hodges home. Cox singled home Walker. Reese singled home Van Cuyk to make it 7-0. Byerly replaced by Herm Wehmeier for Reds. Snider walked to load the bases. Robinson was hit by a pitch, scoring Cox. Pafko singled home Reese and Snider. Frank Smith relieved Wehmeier with the score 10-0. Shuba walked to load the bases again. Hodges walked to force in Robinson. Walker singled home Pafko and Shuba. Van Cuyk singled in the 14th run (Hodges) of the inning. Cox was hit by a pitch to load the bases. Reese walked forcing in run number 15 (Walker). Snider struck out. 15 RUNS, 10 HITS, SEVEN WALKS, TWO HIT BY PITCH, THREE LEFT ON BASE.

DODGER STEALS RECORD 38 STRAIGHT BASES

Former Dodger base-stealing artist Davey Lopes set a new Major League record in 1975 by stealing 38 consecutive bases without being thrown out. His efforts erased the old mark of 31 set by Max Carey of Pittsburgh in 1922. Lopes began his history-making string on June 10 by stealing second base against Montreal in the first inning. He stole his 38th straight base in the seventh inning of a game with the Expos on August 24, but was thrown out by Montreal catcher Gary Carter in the 12th inning of the same game to end the string.

RULES OF INTEREST

- PLAYER LIMITS:** 40 until opening day, when the number must be reduced to 25 until September 1, when it again becomes 40.
- DETERMINING BATTING AVERAGE:** Divide the number of at bats into the number of hits.
- DETERMINING AN EARNED RUN AVERAGE:** Multiply the number of earned runs by nine; take the number and divide it by the number of innings pitched.
- DETERMINING SLUGGING PERCENTAGE:** Divide the total bases of all safe hits by the total times at bat (At bats do not include walks, sacrifices, hit by pitcher, or times awarded first base because of interference or obstruction).
- DETERMINING FIELDING AVERAGE:** Divide the total putouts and assists by the total of putouts, assists and errors.
- DETERMINING PERCENTAGE OF GAMES WON AND LOST:** Divide the number of games won by the total games won and lost.
- CONSECUTIVE HITTING STREAKS:** A consecutive hitting streak shall not be terminated if the plate appearance results in a base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or a sacrifice bunt. A sacrifice fly shall terminate the streak.
- CONSECUTIVE-GAME HITTING STREAKS:** A consecutive-game hitting streak shall not be terminated if all the player's plate appearances (one or more) result in a base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or a sacrifice bunt. The streak shall terminate if the player has a sacrifice fly and no hit.
- CONSECUTIVE-GAME PLAYING STREAK:** A consecutive-game playing streak shall be extended if the player plays one half-inning on defense, or if he completes a time at bat by reaching base or being put out. A pinch-running appearance only shall not extend the streak. If a player is ejected from a game by an umpire before he can comply with the requirements of this rule, his streak shall continue.
- TRADING REGULATIONS:** Players are available on waivers in reverse order of standings, at the time waivers expire, if more than 30 days after start of the season; otherwise in reverse order of standings at close of preceding season.

Midnight, night preceding the last scheduled day of the Winter Meetings to Midnight, February 14; Midnight, March 15 to Midnight, June 15; and Midnight, the last day of the regular season to Midnight, five days after the World Series—Waivers necessary in assignor's league. Midnight, June 15 to Midnight, the last day of the season, Major League Waivers necessary.
- TRADING WITHIN LEAGUE:** Midnight, the last day of the season—Midnight, June 15—No waivers necessary. Midnight, June 15—Midnight, the last day of the season—League waivers necessary.
- DETERMINING the MAGIC NUMBER:** Determine the number of games yet to be played, add one, then subtract the number of games ahead in the loss column of the standings from the closest opponent.
- POST-SEASON CALENDAR:** The two major league Championship Series for 1984 are scheduled to start on October 2 in the parks of the American League West and National League East winners. The 1984 World Series is scheduled to start on October 9 in the park of the National League champion.
- GAME WINNING HIT:** The hit that gives your team a higher final run total than your opponent.
- GAME WINNING RBI:** The RBI that gives the club a lead it never relinquishes.
- DOCTORED BAT:** A batter is out for illegal action when he uses or attempts to use a bat that, in the umpire's judgment, has been altered or tampered with in such a way to improve the distance factor or cause an unusual reaction on the baseball. This includes bats that are filled, flat-surfaced, nailed, hollowed, grooved or covered with a substance such as paraffin, wax, etc. No advancement on the bases will be allowed and any out or outs made during a play shall stand. In addition to being called out, the player shall be ejected from the game and may be subject to additional penalties as determined by his League President. (Rule 6.06d).
- NIGHT GAME:** Any game that starts at 5 p.m. or after.

DODGER STADIUM INFORMATION



The 1984 season, an Olympic year in Los Angeles, will mark their 23rd year in beautiful Dodger Stadium for the Los Angeles Dodgers. It all began on April 10, 1962 when the Dodgers opened the Dodger Stadium gates. Unfortunately they lost on Opening Day, 6-3, to the Cincinnati Reds.

During the past 22 years, over 55 million fans have watched games at Dodger Stadium, an average of over 2.4 million. The Dodgers spent their first four seasons in Los Angeles at Memorial Coliseum, where they attracted 7,974,738 fans, an average of 1,993,685. In their 26 years in Los Angeles, the Dodgers have drawn 63,004,763 fans, an average of 2,423,260.

A total of 2,755,184 fans viewed games at Dodger Stadium in the inaugural 1962 season.

When the Dodgers drew 3,347,845 fans in 1978, they became the first team ever to hit the three million mark. The Dodgers did it a second time in 1980 as they attracted 3,249,287 fans and then set the all-time Major League season attendance mark in 1982 as they recorded a total of 3,608,881. They hit three million for the fourth time in 1983 as they attracted 3,510,313 fans.

The Dodgers reached the one million mark on their 22nd date, May 31, 1981, a Major League record for the earliest date, breaking the record of 25 dates they set in 1978. The Dodgers established two new Major League marks in 1982 as they hit the two million mark in 46 dates (July 24) and the three million mark in 67 dates (Sept. 5), the earliest dates ever.

The two million barrier has been eclipsed 19 times by the Los Angeles Dodgers, including the last 11 years.

For their 10th anniversary in Dodger Stadium, the Dodgers saluted two key figures in the construction of Dodger Stadium before their first home game in 1971. Captain Emil Praeger designed Dodger Stadium and Jack Yount was the vice president and general manager of Vinnell, which handled the giant construction job.

Dodger Stadium is baseball's only privately-financed stadium since the construction of Yankee Stadium in 1923.

There is seating for 56,000 and parking for 16,000 autos on 21 terraced lots adjacent to and at about the same elevations as the five different seating levels on the 300-acre site.

Making Chavez Ravine a difficult construction site was a network of washes, gullies and gulches interlaced with hills and twisting roads. Elevations in the ravine ranged from 400 to 700 feet above sea level. To compensate for this rough terrain, more than 8,000,000 cubic yards of earth were moved to reshape the area.

Some 21,000 precast concrete units, weighing up to 32 tons, were lifted into the stadium's structural framework.

By employing the cantilever theory, every seat in the column-free stadium affords the spectator a completely unobstructed view of the symmetrical playing field.

With seven front rows and no grandstand deeper than 20-plus rows, fans are presented an excellent opportunity to view the action.

The various levels are color coordinated (yellow, orange, blue and red) to correspond with the terraced parking levels. A below-ground level provides a "player's eye view" from dugout box seats.

Two electronic installations—the scoreboard in right field and the Dodger Diamond Vision full-color video display system in left field—add to the entertainment potential at the stadium.

All this makes Dodger Stadium perhaps the most attractive facility in baseball to fans and players alike.

DODGERTOWN

It was 37 years ago this spring, in 1948, that the Dodgers set up camp in Vero Beach, Fla., at the invitation of local businessman Bud Holman, after whom Holman Stadium is named.

Holman's brainstorm came after the United States government turned over a naval air station to the city of Vero Beach following World War II.

Vero Beach needed a tenant for the facility and the Dodgers were looking for a spring home after leading a nomad existence.

In the spring of 1948, the former naval air station grounds and barracks were invaded by 600 players in the Dodgers organization.

The players who spent that long ago spring at Dodgertown, as it came to be known almost from the outset, would not recognize the place today.

Replacing the old barracks is a modern 90-unit villa. A new 23,000 square foot administration building was constructed on the site of the former headquarters building in 1974. The building includes a major league clubhouse, minor league clubhouse, medical department, dining room and kitchen, main lobby, canteen, recording studio, photo dark room, Western Union office, interview room, stadium club lounge, press working area, trainers' room, equipment room and two laundry rooms. All of the landscaping was done with plants and flowers grown in the Dodgertown nursery.

There are three practice fields and a row of batting cages, in addition to Holman Stadium, dedicated in 1953, where the Dodgers play their exhibition games. The stadium has a seating capacity of 6,000.

Even the recreation facilities at Dodgertown have undergone radical change since that initial spring.

Two golf courses—an 18-holer called Dodger Pines Country Club and a nine-hole layout—outline the complex. The clubhouse is complete with locker room, dining room and pro shop.

Dodger personnel also have the use of a swimming pool, four all-weather tennis courts and a theater in which different movies are shown each night.

All this is a far cry from the horse-shoe pitching and badminton the 1947 edition of the Dodgers had to content themselves with.

Dodgertown, the only privately-owned training camp in the country, also includes a 70-acre citrus grove, 45 residences on the golf course perimeter and a conference center.

Since 1965, the Dodgers have purchased 450 acres from the city of Vero Beach.

Besides Dodger spring training, Dodgertown also plays host to the summer camp of the National Football League's New Orleans Saints, and is a conference center managed by Harrison Conference Centers. It is available to groups when the Dodgers and Saints are not training there.

The conference center is designed to provide the proper environment for business meetings and the most intensive learning objectives. There are 12 specially-designed meeting rooms, featuring the latest in audio visual equipment. The recreation program includes golf, tennis, baseball, swimming, basketball, volleyball and jogging trails.

Dodgertown accommodates up to 180 conferees. The facility has over 200 employees.

Holman Stadium also is the summer home of the Vero Beach Dodgers of the Class A Florida State League. In its first season in 1980, the franchise's attendance for 71 home games was 80,063, plus another 3,325 for three playoff games, a remarkable total because Vero Beach (population 17,033) is one of the smallest towns in America with a professional baseball club. The Dodgers broke the record in 1981 as they attracted 91,732 fans in 67 dates. The Dodgers are managed by Stan Wasiak. Terry Reynolds is the general manager.

Charlie Blaney, who has been with the Dodger organization since 1967, is director of Dodgertown. At Albuquerque from 1968-74, he was named "Minor League Executive of the Year" by *The Sporting News* in 1969 and Pacific Coast League General Manager of the Year in 1972 by members of the league's media.

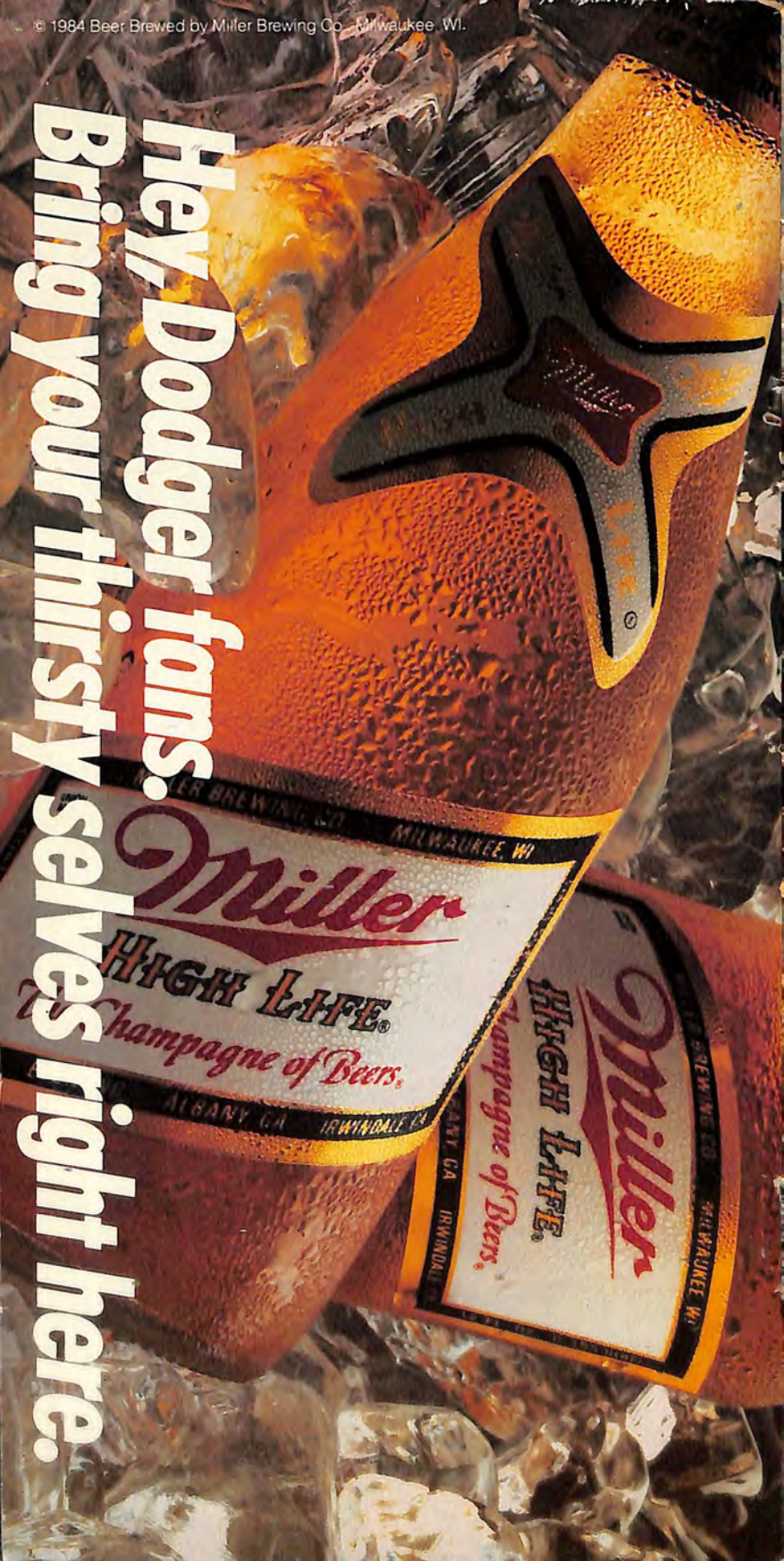
