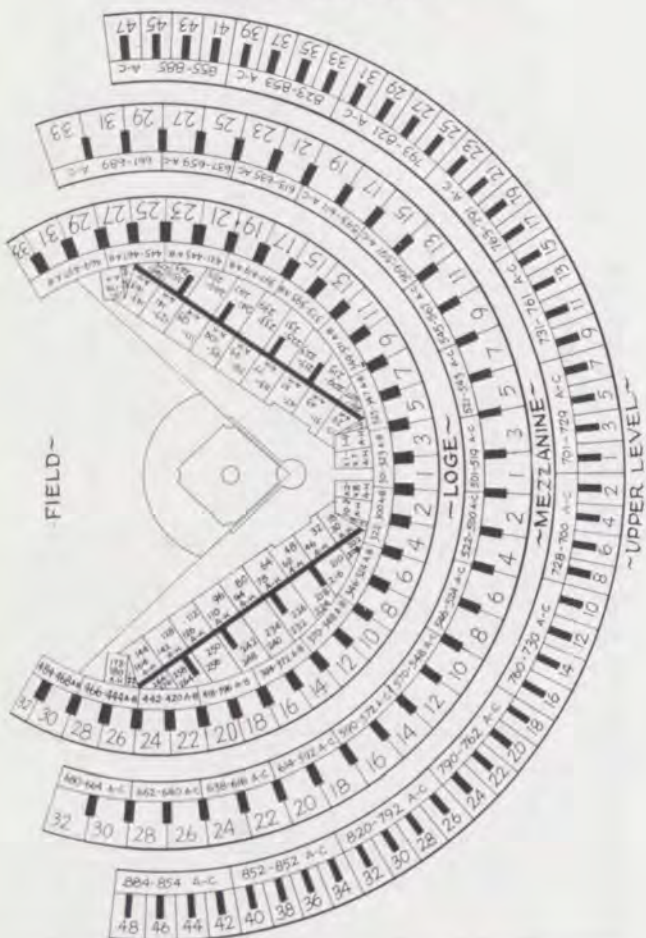

John J. Murphy

Johnny Murphy's appointment last Dec. 27 as general manager in the wake of Bing Devine's stunning resignation to return to the St. Louis Cardinals climaxed another dramatic chapter in the tumultuous history of the New York Mets.

However, the 60-year-old (on July 14, 1968) product of Fordham University took the shrieking headline news in characteristic cool and confident stride. Johnny Murphy is familiar with the hot and tight spots of baseball. He's been there before. Often enough to warrant the esteem accompanying his reputation as one of the greatest relief pitchers the game has ever known... and a vital factor in the intimidating pre-World War II Yankee dynasty.

The ownership of the Mets was equally confident in his ability to carry that playing field spirit and tradition into the challenging confines of the front office.

As Board Chairman Don Grant expressed it:

"It was the unanimous sentiment of the directors that no one was more qualified to assume command than Mr. Murphy. Having been associated with the club from the first day, no one is more familiar with the personnel of both the Met and minor league operations

"We feel extremely fortunate to have a man of his baseball background and stature available — and the fact that he was developed in our organization is a source of great satisfaction."

A native New York, Murphy officially joined the Yankee organization in 1929, following his graduation with the Bachelor of Arts Degree from Fordham.

After a five-year apprenticeship at Albany, St. Paul and Newark (including a brief 1932 stint with the Yankees), he made it to the majors on a varsity scale in 1934.

Under manager Joe McCarthy, Murphy developed into the premier relief pitcher of his time. He was a vital factor in seven American League and six world championships during his 11-year Yankee career interrupted by a two-and-a-half year World War II period in an administrative capacity with a Union Carbide Chemical subsidiary at Oak Ridge (Tenn.), associated with the development of the Atom bomb.

Upon being unconditionally released by the Yankees on the eve of 1947 season opener, Murphy was signed by the Boston Red Sox. It marked his final year of active competition. He concluded his major league playing career with 93 victories against 53 defeats in 415 games, and the distinction of being selected for three All-Star games.

In World Series play he made eight relief appearances covering 16-1/3 innings and was credited with victories in his only two series games of decision: a 1939 third game verdict over Cincinnati in 10 innings, 7-3, and a 1941 fourth game victory over Brooklyn, 7-4. The latter was the famous Ebbets Field encounter in which Hugh Casey nursed a 4-3 Dodger lead with two out in the ninth inning. Casey proceeded to fan Tommy Henrich for the out which would have ended the game. However, Mickey Owen let the third strike get past him, opening the door for a decisive four-run Yankee rally before the inning was completed.

After the 1947 campaign Red Sox general manager Joe Cronin signed Murphy as supervisor of Boston's New England scouting operation. A year later (in Oct. of 1948) he succeeded George Torporcer as director of player personnel after Torporcer retired because of failing health. Murphy functioned as farm director of the Red Sox until 1961.

Eager to return to New York, he joined the newly organized Mets as chief scout of the expansion club in the spring of 1961. After moving into the front office in an administrative capacity, Murphy was elevated to a vice-presidency in Sept. of 1964, a title he still retains.

The Yonkers-based Murphys (he and the former Elizabeth Havern of Greenwich Village observed their 36th wedding anniversary last New Year's Eve) are the parents of two sons: Thomas, and John, who have given them three grandsons.

The new general manager comes from a family of local political and athletic note. His father, Thomas, retired as Chief Clerk in the New York Department of Water Supply after 37 years of civil service. His older brother, Tom, is a former Police Commissioner of New York City. As a member of the U.S. Attorney General's staff, he had achieved a national reputation as the prosecutor who obtained a conviction against Alger Hiss. He subsequently won a Harry S. Truman presidential appointment to the Federal Judgeship he still holds.

Murphy's maternal grandfather, John White, and a cousin of the same name, had brief major league trials with Boston and Cincinnati, respectively.

Murphy actually played in organized baseball while he was a junior at Fordham, pitching for the Yankees' Middle-Atlantic League team in Scottdale, Pa., in 1928, under the assumed name of "Johnny McNamara." He compiled a 9-8 record and a 2.98 ERA for Scottdale during the Fordham summer hiatus.

The first Yankee player representative (and similarly the American League representative), in 1945, Murphy won many honors during his distinguished major league career. One which ranks among his proudest was his selection on the All-Time All-Star Yankee team voted by the New York baseball writers in 1952.

REQUIREMENTS FOR A "SAVE"

A "save" is credited to a relief pitcher on the winning team if he meets one of the following requirements:

- (1) Faces the potential tying or winning run.
- (2) Pitches one or more perfect innings in protecting a two-run lead.
- (3) Pitches at least two innings and finishes if his team was three runs ahead when he entered game.

The Manager: Gil Hodges

Gil Hodges rarely has more than a little to say. And when he says it, he says a lot.

Illustration: Asked not too long ago what kind of manager he'd like to be, he replied, "There are only two kinds of managers. Winning managers and ex-managers. I like to work."

He's the kind of manager the Mets wanted. The kind they're happy to have working for them since Oct. 11, when they gave the Washington Senators a good chunk of cash and a good chunk of pitcher — Bill Denehy — as payment for the best chunk of man to succeed Wes Westrum.

He had gotten to last place Washington in the first place because the Mets wouldn't stand in his way when the Senators offered him the opportunity to become a manager on May 22, 1963, after dismissing Mickey Vernon.

So he gimped to Washington on the crippled knee that forced him on the disabled list after 11 games and ended a brilliant 17-year National League playing career at age 39. And began a major league managing career that undoubtedly will live as long as he wants it to.

Gilbert Ray Hodges, born April 4, 1924, in Princeton, Ind., is safe at home — his adopted home of New York City since he married Brooklyn-bred Joan Lombardi in 1948, a date that coincides with his first year as a member of the Brooklyn varsity.

They never forgot him. He left too much to remember as the soft-spoken giant of a gentle man; and as much to remember as a player of idolatry. The record speaks eloquently for itself.

When that crippled knee ended his active career, Hodges had: hit more home runs (370) than any righthanded batter in National League history — a figure then exceeded by righthanders in the majors only by Jimmy Foxx (534); established a still-standing National League mark of 14 grand slams; become the 6th player to hit four circuit blows in one game (Aug. 31, 1950, against the Braves); accumulated 22 or more home runs 11 consecutive seasons; accounted for 100 or more RBI seven consecutive years; played in seven World Series and been selected on eight National League All-Star squads.

Hodges first attracted Dodger attention during his sophomore semester at St. Joseph College (Rensselaer, Ind.) in 1943, when he was approached by Stan Feezle, a Brooklyn scout. He had been a catcher and shortstop but his major league debut at the end of the 1943 campaign was at third base ("I remember it well; I struck out twice against Johnny VanderMeer and made two errors").

The next two years were devoted to World War II service as a Marine sergeant, and after the post-war 1946 season on the Newport News farm as a catcher, he was brought up to the Dodgers the following year, and utilized sparingly, in 28 games.

In June of 1948, however, Leo Durocher made a decision born of inspiration. He transferred Hodges to first base. And, in turn, one of the greatest defensive agents the sport has ever known at the position, was born.

He accompanied the Dodgers westward to Los Angeles in 1958 (on an occupational basis only; Brooklyn was, as it still is, "home") and when National League baseball was restored to New York, Hodges was selected for \$75,000 as an "Original Met" in the expansion draft of Oct., 1961.

Gil and Joan Hodges have six Met rooters in the family: daughters Irene, Barbara and Cynthia; a son, Gil II; "Bambi" a 12-year-old mongrel, and "Lady Gina", a 3-year-old German shepherd.

"ROOKIES": A rookie is a player not more than 45 days on a major league roster during 25-man roster cutdown dates or who has not exceeded 90 times at bat or 45 innings pitched if short of 45 days.

First base coach lone holdover from 1967 Met staff . . . Joined Mets in 1965, and was persuaded by Casey Stengel to resume active status late in April . . . Three-time Most Valuable Player of the American League (1951-54-55) during illustrious 18-year Yankee career (1946-63), and named 14 times to All-Star squad . . . No. 1 home run hitter among catchers in major league history with 313; and with 45 as outfielder and pinch-hitter, has lifetime total of 358 . . . Shares AL record with Gus Triandos for most home runs by catcher in one season: 30 . . . Player-coach for Yankees in 1963, he succeeded Ralph Houk as manager in 1964, winning pennant . . . Gil Hodges hit the first home run in Met history. It came off the Cardinals' Larry Jackson in the fourth inning of the Mets' first game — April 11, 1962 in St. Louis.
