The GM: Joe McDonald

It's 17 long miles and 32 short years from the obscurity of pushing an Ebbets Field turnstile in Brooklyn to the prestige of running a front office at Shea Stadium in Queens. Joseph Anthony McDonald knows. He made the trip. Not, as one might assume, by Arabian Night-like magic flying carpet, but rather by New York every day-like subway.

Born here—Staten Island, to be precise—New York's his town. Oct. 1, 1974 he owned it. That's the day the smiling Irishman was introduced as general manager of the Mets, a job voluntarily relinquished by Bob Scheffing.

"It's the happiest day of my life," said 45-year-old Joe McDonald. He paused slightly. "I just wish my father could have been here to share it with me," he wistfully continued. "Pop would have been proud."

Jim McDonald died three years ago. A city employee, he had spent the better part of his life in a big league ball park, moonlighting as a ticket-taker at Ebbets Field from the day it opened in 1913 until it closed in 1957. His son Joe also made it to Ebbets Field—in 1942, as a 13-year-old schoolboy with doctored working papers. He was assigned to the "stiles" on summer afternoons on the heels of mornings spent chasing sandlot baseballs and major league rainbows.

Now, 32 years later, he stood there, trying to mask the emotion of the moment, flanked by M. Donald Grant and Bob Scheffing. Joe McDonald had caught a rainbow. So what if he didn't have a first baseman's glove in his hand, too. There are other ways to get to the big leagues if you give it your best shot.

Somebody asked Don Grant if the Mets had considered anyone else for the job. "No," firmly replied the Chairman of the Board. "We believe in developing our own people. We believe in Joe McDonald. He must have had something to do with producing the talent that won a world championship and two pennants in the 12 years he's been here. He's been well trained."

Bob Scheffing beamed. The handsome old Cub catcher had groomed McDonald for the job. McDonald's not about to forget it. Not in this century. Or the next.

The gaunt Yonkers transplant from Flatbush, where his family moved when he was a toddler of three, is the fifth GM appointed by the Mets. He follows in the footsteps of the late George Weiss; Bing Devine, who succeeded him on Nov. 14, 1966, after Mr. Weiss retired; Johnny Murphy, who replaced Devine on Dec. 27, 1968, after the latter resigned to return to St. Louis; and Scheffing, who took over for Murphy on Jan. 19, 1970, five days after the one-time Fordham Fireman succumbed to a heart attack. Scheffing had stipulated he would serve a limit of four years and was persuaded to stay on a fifth.

The new boss came up from the ranks. From how far back? You name it, he did it. Would you believe club statistician? Well, you better believe. That was in 1962, the first year the Mets sent a team out on the field ("a team built on nostalgia," as Don Grant put it). And after they lost the last of an unprecedented 120 games that season, the club statistician was given an opportunity in the minor league department.

The decision was a pivotal one in the fortunes of both the Mets and Joe McDonald. With the September, 1964, arrival of Bing Devine as chief lieutenant to George Weiss, McDonald advanced steadily in a variety of roles, notably (and most personally gratifying) as director of scouting and administrative secretary. In the process he was a vital factor in the implementation of a program dedicated to the development of pitching talent—the cornerstone on which the Mets were to build distinction as the first expansion team in history to win a pennant, climaxed, of course, by the World Series "Miracle" which made them objects of international adulation. By that time McDonald had already assumed command of the farm system as Director of Operations.

He teamed with Whitey Herzog as a tireless "Mr. Inside and Mr. Outside" combination. Herzog was responsible for the field cultivation and McDonald for the administrative decisions. The results? They could proudly claim as

The Manager: Joe Frazier

Eddie Stanky called him Cobra Joe—"he'd strike like a snake" as a pinch-hitter.

In the dugouts they called him Smokin' Joe because of his fiery personality.

His North Carolina mill town folks called him Joseph Fillmore (after America's 13th president).

And the hard-bitten press-radio-tv corps assembled at Shea Stadium last October 3 to meet the new manager of the Mets, was prepared to call him "Joe Who?"

But what no one can ever call Joe Frazier is timid or counterfeit. He's all man. And he's all there. After the mass interview the media concluded that he's also alright. Joe Frazier, self-styled country boy, made quite an impression—by not trying to make an impression. All he did was give homespun, straight-from-the-shoulder answers to cold, flush-on-the-jaw questions.

That's the only way he knows. It's one of the reasons his friends call him Plain Joe—as unsophisticated upon suddenly surfacing as a figure of national prominence, as the gypsy ball player who survived 14 years in the shadow of minor league eclipse and three of virtual obscurity in the majors.

The tally sheet added up to a playing career of 1,993 games—of which a mere 217—encompassing a .241 batting average and a total of 10 home runs represented the big leagues. It was scarcely a track record that threatened to run Ty Cobb out of Cooperstown. But swarthy, bull-shouldered Joe Frazier made his mark on the bench rather than the field. He paid his dues with a 10-year apprenticeship as a minor league manager. And now he was being introduced three days short of his 53rd birthday, as the manager of the Mets.

Questioned about the departure from name-oriented Shea tradition, Joe McDonald's explanation was simple and succinct: "Joe Frazier's got all the qualifications you could want. He wins." The general manager is Frazier's loudest cheerleader.

Regarding the risk involved in naming an "unknown", McDonald referred to the accomplishments of Walt Alston, Earl Weaver and Sparky Anderson (each of whom jumped directly from the minors) parenthetically adding, "the game is played the same way up here as it is down there."

Joe Frazier need never apologize for his 10-year managerial credentials. He won five pennants—and was deprived of a sixth by less than one percentage point, because of a rainout that wasn't made up! Four of those championships were produced for the Mets' organization, after he signed on in 1968. But more remarkable is his achievement of three consecutive pennants: back-to-back Texas League titles at Memphis and Victoria, followed by the International League flag at Tidewater last season en route to designation as "Minor League Manager-of-the-Year."

The blue-eyed Tarheel with the face of a bulldog and the tenacity to match had been the beneficiary of increasingly strong sideline support from McDonald's minor league administrative offices since leading Visalia to the California League championship in 1971.

The knob on the door to Shea turned slightly last August 6, after Yogi Berra was relieved of his command. When Don Grant, Chairman of the Board, solicited thoughts about a successor, McDonald unhesitatingly pointed in the direction of Tidewater. Grant, however, expressed a reluctance to make a late-season move that might interfere with the No. 1 affiliate's blazing stretch bid, whereupon the GM promptly endorsed the suggestion that Roy McMillan come off the first base coaching line and take over for Berra in an interim role.

McMillan finished out his 53-game term with a 26-27 record. And after a decision to make a change was made, "Frazier was the only man seriously considered for the job," said McDonald. To which Grant nodded: "That's right. He backed Frazier 100 per cent, and our board agreed he deserves the chance."

The first was within two outs of becoming a Perfect Game, July 9, 1969, when Jimmy Quals of the Cubs singled with one gone in the 9th. Mike Compton of the Phillies was the spoiler on May 15, 1970, with a third-inning single; Vic Davalillo was the culprit on Sept. 26, 1971, with a seventh-inning single for the Pirates, and Leron Lee of San Diego connected for a ninth-inning single with one out in the first game of a July 4, 1972, doubleheader.

Sparked stirring 1973 stretch drive to pennant after August return from second tour on disabled list; had tied major record of 14 assists May 24, in 19-inning win over Dodgers. . . Won Gold Glove and second of back-to-back All Star selections in 1971. . . Outstanding 1970 contributions included club record 95 walks, errorless streak of 54 games that equalled Don Kessinger's major league mark for shortstops, and 23 of 27 steals (two of home). . . Won basketball scholarship at San Francisco State after spectacular high school career culminated by senior year captaincy of baseball, hoop and football (QB) teams; signed by Mets over offers of Yankees, Cardinals & Cubs following .430 freshman campaign at SF State.

Dozen victories raised career total to 207, topped among current pitchers only by Kaat's 235 and Gaylord Perry's 216. . . Completed 19 starts for lifetime 190 excelled among current pitchers only by Gaylord Perry's 236 & Fergy Jenkins' 200. . . Was 10-5 on July 11, when dropped 13 of next 14 decisions, with Tigers giving him total of 11 runs in the 13 defeats, marked by seven shutouts and five other occasions when he received one run!

Natural righthander until accident as 3-year-old resulted in triple fracture of left collar bone, necessitating exercise program designed to restore left shoulder mobility; had ridden tricycle into parked motorcycle, which fell on him. . . Signed by Detroit as 17-year-old bonus baby for reported \$30,000 in June of 1958, but didn't turn in winning professional season until 1964, when was 18-9 with six shutouts, for Tigers. . . Thereafter enjoyed only modest success until last half of 1967 campaign: after going 84 days without victory, abruptly turned "Woolworth" 5-19 record into 14-13 log, winding up season with scoreless string of 28.2 innings. . . Twice in '69 set 16-strikeout club records (against Angels & Seattle) while packing 9-game streak into 19 wins. . . Literally went from ridiculous to sublime next two years: AL's biggest loser of 1970 with 19 setbacks; but rebounded spectacularly in '71, when led majors in wins (25), strikeouts (308), starts (45) & innings (376—most in 55 years in big leagues). . . Added another 22 wins in 1972, when gained third All Star berth, was AL runner-up in strikeouts, complete games & starts, and tossed 1.42 ERA at Oakland in two starts, covering 19 innings, of Championship Series.

Reached peak of brilliant career (spotlighted by All Star representation as catcher, third baseman & first baseman) in 1971, when extraordinary credentials resulted in MVP Award and included: league-leading stats in batting, RBI, hits & total bases (352); it marked first time NL player set pace in four batting departments since Stan Musial captured eight in 1948, and in preceding 35 years his total of 230 hits was surpassed only by Joe Medwick's 237 of 1937. Earl Averill's 232 of 1936 & Matty Alou's 231 of 1969. . . Moved from catcher to third base in 1970, playing position for first time since St. Francis Prep days of late Fifties, but operated primarily at first base after inflamed shoulder affected throwing in 1973. . . Traded to Cardinals for Orlando Cepeda in spring training, Mar. 17, 1969, when Mets lost out in trade bid. . . Partner in sport equipment stores bearing his name. . . Brother Frank, former first baseman with Milwaukee & Phillies, vice-president of Rawlings Sporting Goods Co.

homebreds on the 1969 world championship club such "Miracle Men" as Tom Seaver, Tug McGraw, Jerry Koosman, Nolan Ryan, Cleon Jones, Ed Kranepool and Bud Harrelson.

It is worthy of parenthetical note here to cite the role destiny played in Koosman's survival as a Met farmhand. En route to the Homestead (Fla.) training camp in 1966, the big lefthander wound up in a racked car. McDonald apprehensively heeded Koosman's plea for a \$75 loan. Weeks later, when the minor league officials and managers sat down to determine which players were to be released, all but one hand was raised when Koosman's name came up. The lone dissident was McDonald. "We just gotta keep him," he sighed. "Jerry still owes me the \$75." Which only goes to show that not all bad debts are bad debts. Koosman was subsequently to pay off with two victories in the 1969 World Series.

McDonald's light red hair has gotten a little bit lighter (and a little bit thinner) since those days. Back in the early Fifties the color of that head was the source of deep pride. Not out of vanity. But because when the Cardinals or Cubs were in town it enabled him to be mistaken by autograph seekers for Red Schoendienst or Paul Minner, as he got off the Prospect Park subway station and headed for his ticket-taking duties.

And thereby can be traced a further extension of the long arm of coincidence. For he had been "moved up" to the Press Gate by Ebbets Field superintendent Jim Thomson, who 20-odd years later, as a Vice President and Board member of the Mets, was to participate in the decision to "move him up" to GM at Shea.

Behind him is the frustration of becoming a lefthanded big league first baseman. So is a St. Francis Prep career; star sandlot status with the Mercurys ("we had the best club in Brooklyn and represented New York in the 1948 Junior All America Federation tournament"); a Fordham accounting degree (1951); and a 1952-54 Air Force hitch.

Upon his service discharge he went to work for General Dynamics, where he eventually caught the eye of Fred Corcoran. A prominent sports figure, Corcoran was director of the International Golf Association, which initiated the prestigious Canada Cup matches, and whose spinoff is still a major event under the World Cup label. He was also director of the Ladies PGA and business agent for a stable of notables which included Ted Williams, Sam Snead and Stan Musial. Corcoran took the young man under his wing and soon McDonald was representing the former in all of his enterprises.

McDonald subsequently became acquainted with Ty Cobb, through whom he met George Weiss. With the organizational birth of the Mets in 1961, he asked Weiss for a job. That's how statisticians are born. Not to mention general managers. ("I couldn't work for a better man than Corcoran, but baseball was my first love.").

His poise and wit have been satisfactorily tested on the Fourth Estate under fire. During the press conference of his appointment he had expressed an eagerness to deal. Asked whether he considered anyone untouchable, he replied: "The only untouchables I know is a TV show." What he doesn't know at all is fear. At least not at a trading table. He went right out and dealt for Joe Torre and then swapped Tug McGraw. Queried as to how the popular relief pitcher reacted to the news, McDonald said: "After I told him I traded him we both broke down. It figured. We're both lefthanders."

McDonald married the former Therese Mulcahy of Yonkers on Sept. 2, 1959. Two sons—15-year-old Jody and 12-year-old Timmy—and a 14-year-old daughter, Marni, are products of that union.

The rugged pecan farmer (he owns a 40-acre tract on the Tulsa outskirts of Bixby, Okla.) is free to confess that managing saved his baseball life. He had thrown in his bat as a player at Spokane after the 1960 campaign ("I was too damn old and makin' too little money") and accepted Bobby Bragan's offer to work for Houston as a scout.

But four years of "too many rides on too many long roads" became a drudgery he could no longer endure. Only the opportunity to take over Houston's 1965 Florida Rookie League club at Bradenton influenced him to keep his hand in the game. He won the pennant the first crack out of the box and was hooked on managing ("It gave me a new lease on life").

The Astros advanced him to Cocoa in the Florida State League in 1966 and then made him the organizational batting instructor. But after a year he stepped out ("managing was in my blood") and Whitey Herzog stepped in.

A frequent sidekick of Frazier's when both were soldiers in the scouting trenches, Herzog was now farm director of the Mets and put Joe in charge of Mankato's 1968 Northern League entry. That's where he missed the pennant because of the unplayed rainout. It was Pompano in '69 and then Visalia for three years before he clicked on the stunning Memphis-Victoria-Tidewater Trifecta that put him in the Shea managerial company of Casey Stengel, Wes Westrum, Salty Parker (interim), Gil Hodges, Berra and McMillan.

It all started in Liberty, N.C., (pop. 800), where he grew up during the Depression and most everyone, including his parents, worked in the hosiery mill. Joe didn't play much baseball before high school ("those were the hard days, when there wasn't much money for bats and balls"). But he attracted a lot of attention of Burlington High (where he was also a tough basketball guard and pile-driving halfback) and with the hosiery mill team whose star pitcher was fire-balling Max Lanier.

He gave up the notion of going to college (turning down a North Carolina State football scholarship) for a \$75-a-month contract to play third base for Leaksville (N.C.) of the Bi-State League in 1941. Cleveland bought and sent him to Cedar Rapids in '42, after which he volunteered for the Coast Guard in World War II. A seaman with the "Eighth Amphibs"—a landing craft unit assigned to the Navy in the Mediterranean Theater—he was aboard the flagship USS Duane during the invasion of southern France.

After the war Joe thrashed around the minors for eight more years (except for a 14 at-bat sip of coffee with Cleveland in 1947) as a left-handed hitting first baseman and outfielder until he racked up the Texas League as 1953 Player-of-the-Year and batting champion. The Cardinals purchased him, and the 1954 campaign represented the highlight of his playing career; at age 31 he led the majors in pinch hits with 20, a figure exceeded only six times in history. But it was just a brief moment of glory. For he was reduced to 70 appearances in '55, and the next year was shuffled to Cincinnati (with Alex Grammas), which a month later dispatched him to Baltimore. Then it was back to the "chain" gangs for three seasons at Vancouver and a fourth at Spokane, where he played the last of 1,776 minor league games.

He was reconciled to being a "a travellin' ball player". But it had its compensations in 1947 at Oklahoma City. That's where he met Thelma McClure, a local school teacher he subsequently took to the altar on Feb. 11, 1948. They're now a family of five. Joe, Jr., is a Tulsa fireman, Marty is a West Point cadet, and Cindy this year completed medical school at Tulsa.

And while there's no guarantee he'll find the right combination filling out the line-up card, give him plenty of room with a fishing rod, hunting rifle or golf club. He's scratch with all three.

There you have Joe Frazier, who comes to Shea with (a) the best managerial record in the history of the Mets' organization (b) the reputation of being a first sergeant and (c) a sincere appreciation "of the different techniques I learned along the way from people like Eddie Stanky, Paul Richards, Birdie Tebbetts and Preston Gomez."


