





BBWAA cards or credential issued by the New York Yankees are necessary for admittance. NO OTHER CREDENTIAL WILL BE HONORED. All bags are subject to search upon entry. Photo ID will be required.

TO OBTAIN CREDENTIALS: Fax the Yankees' Media Relations Department. Credentials will be issued only to legitimate news-gathering agencies. REQUESTS MUST BE MADE 24 HOURS IN ADVANCE OF GAME. ALL CREDENTIALS ARE NON-TRANSFERRABLE.

MAIN PRESS BOX: Take elevator to Loge Level and follow signs to Press Box. PRESS BOX IS NOT ACCESSIBLE THROUGH YANKEE OFFICES. Please sit in assigned seats. If no seat is assigned, please sit in any unmarked or unassigned seat in the second or third row.

ELEVATORS TO PRESS BOX: Entrance is through the basement level near the press room.

WORKING PRESS ROOMS: Working Press Room is open to those with BBWAA cards or applicable print credentials issued by the New York Yankees, Coinless phones for collect or credit card calls are available. An Audio Work Room is also available to those with applicable broadcast credentials.

PRESS DINING ROOM: Open to those with BBWAA cards or applicable credentials issued by the New York Yankees. Meals will be served starting two hours prior to game time. The room will remain open (bar service) for one hour after games for those with appropriate credentials.

CLUBHOUSES: The Pete Sheehy (Yankees) Clubhouse is open to those with BBWAA cards or applicable credentials issued by the New York Yankees. NO OTHER CREDENTIAL WILL BE HONORED. The Clubhouse is open from three and a half hours prior to game time until 45 minutes before game time. At times, certain additional restrictions may be imposed. TRAINER'S ROOM AND PLAYERS' LOUNGE CLOSED TO MEDIA AT ALL TIMES. Visiting clubhouse is governed by visiting club.

POST-GAME TV INTERVIEWS: Available upon request whenever possible. Please notify Yankees Media Relations representatives so assistance can be provided.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Photographers will not be permitted on the field during games. All photographers will work from assigned locations. NO ROVING PHOTO PASSES WILL BE ISSUED.

TELEVISION CREWS: Space for game highlights available upon request. Crews will not be permitted on field during games. NO LIVE TRANSMISSION PERMITTED DURING GAMES. NO ROVING TV CREW PASSES WILL BE ISSUED.

ADMISSION TO FIELD: All media, with BBWAA cards or applicable credentials issued by the New York Yankees, are permitted on the field during pre-game practice. FOR SAFETY PURPOSES, ALL MEDIA MUST LEAVE THE FIELD ONCE THE BATTING CAGE IS REMOVED. DUGOUTS ARE TO BE CLEARED ONE-HALF HOUR PRIOR TO ALL GAMES. PLEASE DISPLAY PASSES AT ALL TIMES.

**NOTES, RECORDS, ETC.:** Statistics and press notes are available in the press box and working press room prior to games. Play-by-play sheets and post-game notes are available in the press box and working press rooms after games.

MEDIA GUIDES: Major League media guides are available in the press box and can be obtained from a Yankees Media Relations representative.

### GEORGE M. STEINBRENNER III PRINCIPAL DWNER

On January 3, 1973, a group formed by Mr. Steinbrenner purchased the Yankees from CBS for a net of \$8.7-million. It took just five years for his aggressive leadership to turn the Yankees into World Champions once again. And, in the 31 years in which he has owned the club (1973-03), the Yankees have posted the highest winning percentage in the Major Leagues at .558 (2,729-2,158) with 10 American-League pennants and six World Championships (also the most in the Majors).

In addition to the team's on-field success, the Yankees have consistently shattered franchise attendance records both at home and on the road. The Yankees became the first New York team ever to top the three million mark in home attendance five times when they drew a frachise-record 3,465,585 in 2003. They also broke their own American-League record for road attendance in 2002 when they drew 2,940,029.

With 31 seasons of ownership now completed, Mr. Steinbrenner's stewardship has exceeded any other Yankee owner by seven years. (Colonel Jacob Ruppert purchased the Yankees with Tillinghast L'Hommedieu Huston on January 11, 1915, bought out his partner on May 21, 1922 and owned the club for 24 years until his death on January 13, 1939.) He is the only Major-League owner from 1973 still on the job and, in the 31 years in which Mr. Steinbrenner has owned the Yankees, the other 29 clubs have had 94 owners or ownership groups while the Yankees have had just the one.

Mr. Steinbrenner's success in the sports world began at an early age. He was a multi-sport athlete at Culver Military Academy, where he is in the Athletic Hall of Fame, and at Williams College. He began his coaching career as an assistant football coach at two Big Ten schools, Northwestern and Purdue, and followed that by assembling championship basketball teams in both the National Industrial and American Basketball Leagues. In 2002, he was honored with the prestigious gold medal award from the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame for a lifetime of "outstanding commitment, dedication and dynamic leadership in both his business and personal lives." It is the highest and most prestigious award bestowed by the College Football Foundation.

Mr. Steinbrenner has probably devoted as much time and effort to the U.S. Olympic Committee as he has to his many other sporting endeavors. He has served on the NCAA Foundation Board of Trustees since 1990, was Chairman of the U.S.O.C. Foundation (1997-2002) as well as the Olympic Overview Commission (1988-89), which was created to evaluate the structure and efforts of the United States Olympic program. He also served as Vice President of the U.S. Olympic Committee (1989-96) and has been honored with both the General Douglas MacArthur USOC Foremost Award and the F. Don Miller United States Olympic Award.

In 1997, Mr. Steinbrenner was honored as "Outstanding New Yorker" and was named Tampa's "Citizen-of-the-Year" in 1998. He was also named the Number One "Most Powerful Man in Sports" for 2002 by *The Sporting News*.

Mr. Steinbrenner currently serves as a trustee for the NCAA Foundation and is also a member of the Baseball Hall of Fame's Board of Directors.

May 21, 1922: Col. Ruppert buys out Col. Huston for \$1,500,000.

January 13, 1939: Col. Ruppert dies.

January 25, 1945: Dan Topping, Del Webb and Larry MacPhail purchase the Yankees for

\$2,800,000 from the estate of the late Col. Ruppert.

November 2, 1964: CBS purchases 80 percent of the Yankees for \$11,200,000, later buys the

remaining 20 percent.

January 3, 1973: A limited partnership, headed by George M. Steinbrenner as its Managing

General Partner, purchases the Yankees from CBS.

In addition to being named President of the Yankees, Mr. Levine was named Senior Counsel to the New York offices of the firm of Akin, Gump, Strauss, Hauer and Feld in January, 2000.

Born on February 22, 1955 in Brooklyn, NY, Mr. Levine received a Bachelor of Arts Degree from George Washington University in 1977 and his J.D. from Hofstra University School of Law in 1980. Mr. Levine and his wife, Mindy, reside in Manhattan.

### BRIAN GASHMAN SEKIOR V.P. AND GENERAL MANAGER



Entering his seventh season as General Manager of the New York Yankees, 36-year-old Brian McGuire Cashman has guided the Yankees' to American-League-East Championships in each of his first six seasons. He is also only the third GM in baseball history to win at least four consecutive League Championships and the first to do it in his first four seasons (1998-01). Only former Yankee General Managers Ed Barrow (four straight, 1936-39) and George Weiss (five straight, 1949-53) have also achieved the feat.

After serving five years as Assistant General Manager, Mr. Cashman was named General Manager of the Yankees on February 3, 1998. At 30 years old when promoted, Mr. Cashman became the then-second-youngest General Manager in baseball history (Randy Smith was 29 when named General Manager of the San Diego Padres on June 9, 1993). Upon winning the 1998 World Championship, he became the youngest GM to

win a World Series, breaking the previous record held by the Minnesota Twins' Andy McPhail (33) in 1987. He went on to become the first GM to win three World Championships in his first three seasons.

In his first six seasons as General Manager, the Yankees have compiled a cumulative record of 598-370—the best winning percentage (.618) in the Major Leagues during that period—and have appeared in post-season play each year. The Yankees earned ESPY awards—presented by *ESPN*—as "Outstanding Team of the Year" in both 1998 and 2000 and they have also been named "Organization of the Year" by *Baseball America* in 1998 and *USA Today* in 1999. In addition, the Yankees established single-season franchise attendance records in 1998 (2,951,467),1999 (3,292,736), 2002 (3,461,644) and 2003 (2,465,585) and are the only New-York sports franchise ever to top the three-million mark five times (1999-03).

Mr. Cashman joined the Yankees family as an intern in the Minor League and Scouting Department in June 1986 and, upon graduation from Catholic University in Washington, D.C. in June 1989, became a full-time Assistant in Baseball Operations. He was named Assistant General Manager, Baseball Administration on November 24, 1992 with responsibilities which included contract negotiations, player waivers, arbitration, budgeting and scheduling. He also served the club as Assistant Farm Director (1990-92).

Mr. Cashman attributes his quick rise through the organization to the direct tutelage he received from current and former General Manager's Bill Bergesch, Jim Bowden, Clyde King, Gene Michael, Bob Quinn, Brian Sabean, Syd Thrift, Bob Watson and Woody Woodward.

In 2001, Mr. Cashman received his third consecutive "40 Under 40" Award presented by *The Sports Business Journal* to recognize the top 40 people under the age of 40 who have made the greatest impact in the sports business industry. It was his final year of eligibility for the award and he has since been inducted into the publication's "40 Under 40" Hall of Fame. In 2003, Mr. Cashman was honored by the Latino Sports Writers and Broadcasters with their annual "Latino Achievement Award" for his contributions to Latino media. He was also honored as "Executive of the Year" in 2000 by the Boston Chapter of the BBWAA and in 1999 and 2003 by the New Jersey Sportswriters' Association. He is the Chairman of the Major League Baseball's Rules Committee and serves as a judge for the College Board's Inspiration Awards. On February 11, 2004, Mr. Cashman was given the honor of ringing the opening bell at the New York Stock Exchange. (The market closed at 10,737.70 on that day, its highest close since June 13, 2001.)

Born on July 3, 1967 in Rockville Center, NY, Mr. Cashman grew up in Lexington, KY. He attended Georgetown Prep in Rockville, MD, before attending Catholic University in Washington, D.C. to major in history and play intercollegiate baseball. His love for baseball developed when long-time family friends (former Brooklyn Dodger) Ralph and Ann Branca arranged for him to serve as bat boy for the Los Angeles Dodgers in spring training in 1982.

He and his wife, Mary, have a daughter, Grace Eva, born on October 7, 1998; and son, Theodore John, born on June 5, 2003.

The Yankees recorded their sixth consecutive first-place finish in 2003 and the 42nd in team history, the most of any professional sports franchise...the Yankees are followed by the Montreal Canadiens (32), Minneapolis/Los Angeles Lakers (27), Boston Celtics (24), Brooklyn/Los Angeles Dodgers (24), Boston/Milwaukee/Atlanta Braves (24), New York/San Francisco Giants (22) and the Philadelphia/Oakland A's (21)...the Yankees' first-place total includes the strike-shortened 1981 season when they won the first-half American-League-East title.

# MARK NEWMAN SENIOR V.P., BASEBALL OPERATIONS



Mark Newman begins his fifth season as the Yankees' Senior Vice President of Baseball Operations and his 16th season with the Yankees. Prior to being named to his current position in 2000, Mr. Newman served as the club's Vice President of Player Development and Scouting from 1997 through 1999.

During his tenure, the Yankees' Player Development System has been recognized for producing "home-grown" talent including All-Stars Derek Jeter, Andy Pettitte, Jorge Posada, Mariano Rivera, Alfonso Soriano and Bernie Williams. The Yankees were selected the 1998 "Organization of the Year" by Baseball America and the 1999 "Organization of the Year" by USA Today, designations which go to the organization with the most prospects. In addition to appearing in post-season play for nine consecutive seasons (1995-2004), the Yankees are one of only two teams whose minor-league affiliates have posted win-

ning records in each of the last 14 seasons since 1990 (also Cleveland Indians).

Mr. Newman began his career in the Yankee organization in 1989 as Coordinator of Instruction and served in that position until his promotion to Director of Player Development and Scouting in 1996. He was named Vice President of Player Development and Scouting in 1997. In his first role with the club, he oversaw all managers and coaches in the farm system and planned both Major and Minor League spring training.

In 1972, Mr. Newman began a baseball coaching career at 22 years old as pitching coach for Southern Illinois University in Carbondale, IL. After spending nine successful seasons there—during which he earned his law degree—he was named Head Baseball Coach at Old Dominion University in 1981. Mr. Newman's impressive 321-167-3 record in nine seasons (1981-88) was recognized with his induction into the ODU Hall of Fame in 1997. He was inducted into the SIU Hall of Fame in 2000.

# JEAN AFTERMAN V.E., ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER



Jean Afterman begins her third season as the Yankees' Assistant General Manager (second as Vice President) and is only the third female to hold such a position in Major League Baseball and the second with the Yankees. In 2001, she succeeded Kim Ng, who was Baseball's second female Assistant General Manager from 1998 through 2001.

In her first year with the Yankees, Ms. Afterman was instrumental in developing the club's relationship with the Yomiuri Giants of the Japan Central League and the signing of three-time Central-League Most Valuable Player Hideki Matsui.


Ms. Afterman joined the Yankees with a diverse business and legal background, including corporate-, labor- and immigration law as well as international sports and licensing with an emphasis on US-Japan issues. She has traveled and lectured in Japan on business issues and, in 1996, Ms. Afterman was appointed by the U.S. Secretary of

Agriculture to a federal advisory committee, the National Organic Standards Board. Ms. Afterman managed her own practice since 1999, providing athletic representation and management with a specialization in arbitration proceedings.

It was the 11th unassisted triple play in Major-League history and the first against the Yankees.

With the victory, Torre moved past Walt Alston for fifth place on the all-time list with 21 World Series wins as a manager. Derek Jeter led the Yankees' offense with the club's first three hits of the game, going 3-for-4 with two runs scored. Aaron Boone and and Bernie Williams each homered in the ninth inning and Hideki Matsui hit safely for the third consecuitve game in the series. Mariano Rivera recorded his ninth World Series and 30th post-season save, improving his post-season ERA to 0.64 (1ER/14IP). The win also snapped the Yankees' four-game losing streak on the road in the World Series.

Bernie Williams led the Yankees' offense in the game, going 4-tor-5 -- the 52nd four-hit game in World Series history. Derek Jeter hit safely for the fourth straight game of the series with a double in the 10th inning, Jeff Weaver made his World Series debut in the bottom of the 11th inning, but surrendered a walk-off home run to Alex Gonzalez in the bottom of the 12th inning which gave the Marlins the victory and tied the series at two games apiece.

The Marlins added three more runs over the next three innings and the Florida pitching staff held the Yankees to just two runs before Jason Giambi hit a pinch-hit home run in the ninth inning, the 19th pinch-hit home run in World Series history. Still, it was too little, too late for the Yankees; they would return to New York behind in the series, three games-to-two.



QUALIFICATIONS FOR BATTING & SLUGGING CHAMPIONSHIP—The player with the highest batting average or slugging percentage, provided he is credited with as many or more total plate appearances in League Championship games as the number of games scheduled for each club, multiplied by 3.1 (502 plate appearances for a 162-game schedule). EXCEP-TION: If there is any player with fewer than the required number of plate appearances or official at-bats, whose average would be the highest if he were charged with the required number of plate appearances or official at-bats, then that player shall be awarded the batting or slugging championship.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR PITCHING CHAMPIONSHIP—The pitcher with the lowest earned-run average, provided he has pitched at least as many innings as the number of games scheduled for each club in his league that season.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR A FIELDING CHAMPIONSHIP—The individual fielding champion shall be the players with the highest fielding average at each position, provided: (1) A catcher must have participated as a catcher in at least one-half the number of games scheduled for each club in his league that season; (2) An infielder or outfielder must have participated at his position in at least two-thirds of the number of games scheduled for each club in his league that season; (3) A pitcher must have pitched at least as many innings as the number of games scheduled for each club in his league that season. EXCEPTION: If another pitcher has a fielding average as high or higher, and has handled more total chances in a lesser number of innings, he shall be the fielding champion.

PLAYER LIMITS—40, until Opening Day when the number must be reduced to no higher than 25 until September 1st, when it again becomes 40.

WAIVER AND DRAFT PRICE INFORMATION: Waiver Price Waiver Price (Draft Excluded) \$25,000 Major League Draft Price \$50,000

TRADING DEADLINE—The "trading deadline" is July 31. Waivers are required for any inter- or intra-Major League assignment during the period beginning August 1 and ending at 5 pm ET the day after the end of the season. During the other 10 months of the year, no waivers are required and trades may be made between clubs of both leagues at any time.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR A SAVE—A relief pitcher shall be credited with a save if he is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club and he is not the winning pitcher and he enters the game with a lead of no more than 3 runs for at least one inning, or he enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, at-bat, or on deck, or he pitches effectively for at least three innings.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR A "ROOKIE"—A player shall be considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has (A) exceeded 130 at-bats or 50 innings pitched in the Major Leagues or (B) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a Major-League club or clubs during the period of the 25-player limit (excluding time in military service).

### DISABLED LISTS-

15-DAY: No limit on number of players.

2) 60-DAY: No limit on number of players. Players may only be placed on this list when club is at the maximum of 40 players. Players carried on this list are not counted in 40-man roster limit. If placed or transferred here after 60 days prior to the final game of the season, player must remain here through post season.

2000: Was 13-6 with a National-League leading 2.58 ERA in 33 games started...also recorded five complete games and one shutout...including 1999, the Dodgers have scored a total of 12 runs in his 10 losses, including being shut out five times...held the opposition to three earned runs or less in 28 of his 33 starts and one run or less in 14 of his starts...struck out a career-high 13 batters in a 2-1 complete game victory vs. San Diego on 9/23 for his 71st career complete game...pitched three-straight complete games from 6/5-15, posting a 2-1 record and a 1.29 ERA (4 ER/26.0 IP) in those games...it was the most consecutive complete games by a Dodger pitcher since Carlos Perez had four from 9/2-20/98...the Dodgers were shut out in three of his six losses and scored a total of 10 runs in the six games...pitched his 17th career shutout on 6/15 vs. Arizona, defeating the Diamondbacks 4-0 on four hits while striking out 10...fanned 10 or more batters four times in 2000...went 7-1 with a 1.79 ERA (23 ER/115.2 IP) in 16 starts at Dodger Stadium...was 2-0 with a 2.25 ERA in May and 3-1 with a 2.06 ERA in June...had a 1.98 ERA (9 ER/41.0 IP) in Sept./Oct....was selected to his fifth All-Star Game and pitched 1.0 inning, allowing one run in the game won by the AL, 6-3 on 7/11 in Atlanta...became just the fifth player in history to represent four different teams in an All-Star Game (Rangers, 1992, Marlins, 1996-97 and Padres, 1998)...joined Roberto Alomar, Walker Cooper, Goose Gossage and Lee Smith as the only players to represent four different teams in the Mid-Summer Classic (no one has ever worn five different uniforms in the history of the game)...tied for second in the National League with 14 sacrifice bunts...was on the disabled list from 4/9-24 with a fractured right pinky finger suffered while attempting to bunt in the game on 4/8 at New York.

1999: Went 18-9 with a 3.00 ERA in 35 starts in his first season with Los Angeles...the 35 starts tied a career high for the third time in his career (also 1992 and 1998)...led the Dodgers in most pitching categories, including victories, innings (252.1) and strikeouts (221)...among NL pitchers, ranked fourth in ERA, tied for fourth in victories, tied for first in starts, second in innings and strikeouts, third in opponents' batting average (.222) and fourth in complete games (5)...also ranked seventh in fewest walks per nine innings (2.1) and eighth in strikeouts per nine innings (7.9)...tied for sixth in NL Cy Young Award voting...his 18 wins were the most by a Dodger starter since Ramon Martinez went 20-6 in 1990...also posted the most victories by a Dodger starting pitcher acquired via free agency...other Dodger free-agent pitchers in their first year in Los Angeles include Kazuhisa Ishii (14-10 in 2002), Hideo Nomo (13-6 in 1995), Tom Candiotti (11-15 in 1992), Kevin Gross (10-11 in 1991) and Dave Goltz (7-11 in 1980)...lost final start of the season on 9/29 at San Francisco, allowing four runs in 6.0 innings...the 5-1 defeat was the first loss in his career at Candlestick/3Com Park...entered the game with a 0.63

ERA (3 ER/43.0 IP), which was the lowest by any opposing pitcher in the 40-year history of the ballpark...loss to Giants also snapped seven-game road winning streak...became Dodgers' fourth Opening Day pitcher in the 1990s, joining Orel Hershiser (1990, 1993-94), Tim Belcher (1991) and Ramon Martinez (1992, 1995-98)...received no decision in Dodger debut on 4/5 vs. Arizona...allowed five earned runs on 10 hits in 5.2 innings vs. Arizona...it was the only time he allowed 10 or more hits in a home start...was 9-3 with a 1.95 ERA in 16 starts at Dodger Stadium...had a seven-game winning streak from 7/20-9/4 which tied Chan Ho Park for team lead...held opponents to two or fewer earned runs in 20 of his last 29 starts and one run in 13 of 29 starts...was 11-4 with a 2.44 ERA (30 ER/110.2 IP) following a Dodger loss...pitched only shutout of season 9/4 at Chicago...struck out 12 batters in 3-2 loss at Cincinnati on 5/25.

1998: Led his club to the World Series for the second-consecutive year after posting one of the greatest seasons in Padres' history, winning 18 games and setting a franchise record with a career-best 257 strikeouts...finished third behind Atlanta's Tom Glavine (99) and Padre teammate Trevor Hoffman (88) in Cy Young Award voting with 76 votes, including eight first-place votes, eight second-place votes and 12 third-place votes...his 46 strikeouts in 39.1 innings during the postseason set a Major League record in the playoffs, surpassing Baltimore's Mike Mussina with 41 K's during the playoffs in 1997...his 16 strikeouts in Game One of the Division Series on 9/29 at Houston was the second-best total in a postseason game in Major League history...St. Louis' Bob Gibson struck out 17 Tigers in Game 1 of the World Series 10/2/68...was named to his fourth All-Star team

and third in a row...retired the only two batters he faced at the Mid Summer Classic at Coors Field...ranked among league leaders in every major pitching category, leading the league in starts, second in ERA, strikeouts and innings (257.0), tied for third in shutouts (3), fourth in strikeouts per nine innings (9.0), tied for fourth in wins and complete games (7), fifth in fewest walks per nine innings (1.7)

and seventh in opponents' batting average (.235)...he surrendered three earned runs or less in 31 of 35 starts...29 of his 35 starts (83%) were quality starts...did not suffer a loss between 5/26 and 8/5, posting a NL season-best 11 consecutive wins...working on three days rest for the first time since 1994 and the only time during the regular season in 1998, he tossed 6.1 shutout innings to earn a 2-0 win in Atlanta on 8/20...is 4-4 with a 2.60 ERA (20 ER/69.1 IP) in 10 career starts on three days rest...made the second relief appearance of his career on 7/4 vs. Colorado, striking out the side in the seventh inning...his first relief outing came 5/10/94 with Texas vs. California...made 127 consecutive starts between the two relief stints...was named NL Pitcher of the Year by The Sporting News.

1997: Helped lead the Marlins to their first World Series championship, posting a 16-8 record and a 2.69 ERA in 33 starts...was named to his second-consecutive NL All-Star team, making his third appearance in the Midsummer Classic at Jacobs Field...ranked among NL leaders in ERA (fifth), strikeouts (sixth with 205), innings pitched (sixth with 237.1), complete games (tied for sixth with six), starts (tied for seventh), victories (eighth), winning percentage (tied for eighth at .667) and strikeouts per nine innings (tied for eighth with 7.8)...tossed his first career no-hitter, the second in Marlins history, in a 9-0 win at San Francisco on 6/10...walked none and struck out seven...allowed only one baserunner, hitting Marvin Benard with a pitch with two out in the eighth inning...became the third pitcher in Major League history (George "Hooks" Wiltse for the New York Giants on 7/4/08 and Lew Burdette for the Milwaukee Braves on 8/18/60) to fall short of a perfect game by allowing only a hit batsman...named the NL Pitcher-of-the-Week for the week of 6/9 after the no-hitter...also threw a one-hitter in a 5-1 win on 7/16 vs. Los Angeles to become the first major leaguer to throw a no-hitter and a one-hitter in a single season since Nolan Ryan turned the trick for Texas in 1990...tied Greg Maddux for the Major League lead with an 81.8 percent quality start percentage, completing 6.0 or more innings and allowing three earned runs or less in 27 of his 33 starting assignments...allowed only one hit in 7.0 shutout innings to earn the win in his third career Opening Day start on 4/1 vs. Chicago.

1996: Signed as a free agent with the Marlins and went 17-11 with a 1.89 ERA in 32 starts...in his first NL season finished second to Atlanta's John Smoltz in Cy Young Award voting...was named first or second on every ballot cast after leading the Majors with a 1.89 ERA, the lowest by a NL pitcher in a non-strike shortened season since Dwight Gooden posted a 1.53 mark for the 1985 Mets...set Marlins' club records with 17 victories, 233.0 innings pitched, five complete games and a Major League high three shutouts...placed on the 15-day disabled list on 5/20 (retroactive to 5/13) with a bruised fibula...activated on 5/28, and was 15-7 with a 1.76 ERA in 23 starts after his return...threw a scoreless inning at the All-Star Game on 7/9 in Philadelphia...recognized as the NL Pitcher-of-the-Month for August, going 5-1 with a 1.71 ERA...notched his 100th career victory 8/19 at Chicago...named the third-best pitcher in the NL in Baseball America's annual survey of Major League managers.

1995: In his lone season with the Orioles, was 10-9 with a 3.60 ERA in 26 games started...finished seventh in the AL with a 3.60 ERA and a .241 opponents' batting average...surrendered only 0.52 homers per 9.0 innings, the second-best ratio in the league...was 5-2 with a 2.63 ERA through 6/2, but did not win again until 8/26...went 0-6 in 12 starts during the skid...sustained a dislocated right index finger on 6/22 vs. Boston while attempting to knock down a line drive off the bat of Troy O'Leary...was on the 15-day DL from 6/23-7/17.

1994: In his final season with the Rangers, went 7-9 with a 4.82 ERA in 26 games (25 starts)...worked at least 7.0 innings in 16 of 25 starts in his final season with the Rangers...allowed three earned runs or less in 16 of his final 20 starts...after 169 starts, made the first relief appearance of his major league career on 5/10 vs. California and suffered the loss...allowed three earned runs on three hits and a walk in 2.0 innings...matched his then career-high with 10 strikeouts in a complete-game 4-3 win vs. Cleveland on 7/5.

1993: Went 15-12 with a 3.59 ERA in 34 games started...threw a career-best 12 complete games, second best in the Majors...tied for second in the AL with three shutouts...ranked 10th in the league with 233.0 innings pitched, the third consecutive season in which he topped 200 innings...allowed only 14 home runs (0.54 per 9 innings), the second-best ratio among AL starters...struck out a then career-high 10 hitters in a game twice: 4/28 vs. Detroit and 7/20 vs. Milwaukee...shared AL Player of the Week honors with Oakland's Mark McGwire for the week of 5/3.

1992: Tied Toronto's Jack Morris for the AL lead with a career-high 21 victories, going 21-11 with a 3.32 ERA in 35 games started...became only the second 20-game winner in Rangers' club history (Ferguson Jenkins won 25 games in 1974)...led the league with a career-high 265.2 innings pitched...also ranked among league leaders in complete games (tied for second with 11), starts (tied for third with 35), winning percentage (sixth at .656), strikeouts (seventh with 173) and ERA (11th at 3.32)...was the first Texas hurler to start an All-Star Game...worked a perfect first inning and earned the victory for the AL at San Diego's Jack Murphy Stadium.

1991: In 33 starts with Texas, was 9-12 with a 4.40 ERA...established then-career highs with 33 starts and 210.2 innings pitched, both team highs...tied for the AL lead with 13 hit batsmen.

1990: Went 12-10 with a 3.60 ERA in 26 starts...became the first Texas pitcher to open a season with victories in each of his first five starts...tied for sixth in the AL with two shutouts and tied for eighth with six complete games...was retired in his only career pinch-hitting appearance.

1989: Was 12-9 with a 3.35 ERA in 28 games started for Texas...finished fifth in AL Rookie of the Year voting, was the Rangers' Rookie of the Year and was named to Baseball Digest's Major League All-Rookie Team...went 12-9 with a 3.35 ERA...led all MLB rookies and tied for ninth in the AL with seven complete games...his 12 victories tied a Rangers' rookie record (Edwin Correa, 1986).

1988: After winning 12 games at Double-A Tulsa, was promoted to Texas on 9/12...authored a six-hit complete game victory at Oakland in his first start on 9/14, carrying a shutout into the ninth inning.

1987: In his only full minor league season, went 1-11 with a 6.49 ERA in 17 starts for Single-A Charlotte, Double-A Tulsa and Triple-A Oklahoma City...his lone win came on 4/8 for Tulsa vs. Jackson...lost his final 11 decisions in-a-row.

1986: At the age of 21, after making only two professional starts (six appearances), was promoted to Texas and allowed two runs over 5.0 innings to beat Oakland in his big league debut on 9/30...registered his first strike-out on the same day, as he caught Dwayne Murphy looking...joined the Rangers' Bobby Witt and the Angels' Jim Abbott as one of only three pitchers in the 1980s to earn his first professional victory in the Major Leagues...made three appearances at Rookie-level Sarasota after being selected in the first round (fourth overall) by the Rangers...promoted to Tulsa on 8/21, before being purchased by Texas at the end of the Texas League season.

PERSONAL: Signed by Andy Hancock of Texas...was a chemical engineering major at Georgia Tech University, where he pitched three seasons and was named First Team All-American by The Sporting News in 1986 after setting then-single-season school records with 11 wins and 122 strikeouts...was also named to the second-team all-Atlantic Coast Conference in 1986...after walking on to the Yellow Jackets' baseball team as a freshman, left Tech with a then-school-record 28 victories and 249 strikeouts, though both marks were later surpassed by current big league pitcher Doug Creek...guided the Yellow Jackets to back-to-back ACC Championships in 1985-86...was inducted into the Georgia Tech Hall of Fame in 1991...graduated from Wilkinson County High School in Irwinton, GA in 1983...played baseball, football and tennis...participated in Little League and American Legion baseball programs...was the Dodgers' nomination for the annual Roberto Clemente "Man of the Year" award in 1999...one month after signing with the Dodgers, he donated \$1 million to the Los Angeles chapter of the Reviving Baseball in Innercities program (R.B.I.) to establish the Kevin Brown RBI Academy of Excellence...the academy helps inner-city youth with baseball skills instructions, SAT preparatory classes, time management seminars, human development courses, retreats, college tours and college scholarships.

1997: In his second full season in the Majors batted .293 with 20 HR and 81 RBI...broke his own club record for doubles with 41 and became the fourth player in Athletics history with 40 doubles in consecutive seasons, joining Al Simmons (1925-26 and 29-30), Frank Baker (1911-12) and Harry Davis (1905-06)...started slowly as he was batting .248 entering play on 5/12...doubled that night against Baltimore to start an Oakland record 25-game hitting streak that lasted through 6/23...hit .409 (38-for-93) during the streak to break Carney Lansford's previous record of 24 set in 1984...hit his first career grand slam on 5/22 at Texas off John Burkett and 14 of his 20 home runs came with men on base...10 of his home runs either tied the game or put the A's ahead as did 28 of his 81 RBI...finished May with a team leading .353 batting average and followed that up by

hitting .364 in June...had seven straight multiple hit games from 8/31-9/7 and posted his second career two homer game on 9/20 vs. Seattle...finished September with a .366 average, his third month in 1997 over .350...led the team with 66 runs scored, 152 hits and 44 multiple hit games and tied for the team lead with 81 RBI and 21 multiple RBI games...began the season as the A's left fielder, starting 30 of the A's first 32 games in left...13 of his next 15 starts came at DH before he returned to left field...moved to first base following the McGwire trade on 7/31 and started 47 of the A's final 53 games at first...for the season, made 67 starts in left, 48 at first and 22 at designated hitter.

1996: In his first full season in the Majors, batted .291 with 20 HR and 79 RBI in 140 games while starting games at five different positions (LF, 1B, 3B, DH, RF)...by starting 43 games in left, 42 at first and 38 at third, he became the first player in Oakland history to start at least 30 games at three different positions...set what was then an Oakland record with 40 doubles...began the year as the A's first baseman while McGwire was injured and had a 19-game hitting streak in April that had his average at the .344 mark for the month...made his first professional appearance in the outfield with a start in right at Kansas City on 5/4...he then took over as the A's starting third baseman on 5/5, starting 38 of the A's next 47 games at third base due to an injury to Scott Brosius...earned AL Player-of-the-Week honors for the week of 5/6-12 by hitting .538 with 8R, 5 doubles, 1 HR, and 5 RBI...hit the 4,000th home run in Oakland history on 5/17 at Boston off of Tim Wakefield...moved to left field following the return of Brosius and immediately homered in four consecutive games from 6/25-29...had an Oakland record tying five hits on 7/2 at Seattle...was hitting .323 at the All-Star Break but batted just .245 after the break...average was at the .305 mark on 9/10, but he then went 1-for-28 over his final nine games to finish the year at .291...missed the final seven games because of a sprained right wrist.

1995: Made his Major League debut with the A's in 1995 with two separate stints in Oakland...began the year at Triple-A Edmonton but was recalled to Oakland on 5/8 when Mike Bordick was injured...made his Major-League debut that night with a start at DH vs. Texas and picked up his first Major League hit with an eighth inning single off of Roger Pavlik...went 2-for-11 in four games and was optioned back to Edmonton on 5/15 when rosters were cut back to 25...while at Edmonton, he hit .342 with 26 doubles and 41 RBI in 55 games as the Trappers third baseman...came back to Oakland for good on 7/7 and hit his first Major-League home run the next day off of Toronto's David Cone...homered in three consecutive games at Kansas City 8/14-16...injuries limited his playing time over the final six weeks of the season, missing five games with a strained hamstring, seven games with a mild concussion suffered on 8/26 in Boston and the final eight games with a sore right rib cage...split his playing time between third base (26 starts) and first base (20 starts) and he also made two starts at DH...batted .313 with RISP and upping his average from .235 in innings 1-6 to .298 from the seventh inning on...came to the plate 11 times with a runner on third and less than two outs and knocked the runner in 10 times.

1994: Split his year between Double-A Huntsville and Triple-A Tacoma and had his best success at the higher level...opened the year in Huntsville, but when Craig Paquette was promoted from Tacoma to Oakland, Giambi moved up a step in the A's system...spent a month playing at Triple-A then returned to Huntsville on 6/29 when Paquette was optioned down from Oakland...betted two homers on 7/8 at Birmingham...after 18 games in Double-A made his second trip to Tacoma when Paquette fractured his ankle and finished the season there...with Tacoma was 18-for-56 (.321) with runners in scoring position and kicked that up to .346 (9-for-26) with runners in scoring position and two outs...spent the fall playing third base for the Arizona Fall League Champions, the Peoria Javelinas, and hit .283 with two homers and 21 RBI in 39 games.

1993: Played the full year at Single-A Modesto of the California League and was the starting third baseman for the North squad in the California League All-Star Game played in June...went on the disabled list in late July with a sore right thumb and missed nearly a month of the season...finished at .291 on the season with 30 extrabase hits and 60 RBI in 89 games...spent part of the winter playing for the Kauai Emeralds of the Hawaiian League.

1992: Was the A's second round selection but spent most of his summer playing for the U.S.A. Olympic team that competed in Barcelona...returned from the Olympics in late August and was assigned to Single-A Southern Oregon of the Northwest League...in his 13 games at Southern Oregon he hit .317 with three homers and 13 RBI.

PERSONAL: Was signed by Ed Crosby...graduated from South Hills High School (1989) in West Covina...lettered three seasons in baseball, three in basketball and two as a quarterback in football earning all-league honors in each sport...was the league basketball MVP his senior season...drafted by Milwaukee (43rd round) out of high school but elected to attend Long Beach State University where he played baseball and majored in business...was the Big West Conference Freshman of the Year in 1990 and earned all-league first team honors twice...as a sophomore led the Big West Conference in hitting with a .407 average and for his college career hit .397...was a member of the 1991 All-College World Series team....was a member of the bronze medal winning U.S. baseball team at the 1991 Pan Am Games in Havana, Cuba, and a member of the U.S. Olympic club that competed in Barcelona in the summer of 1992...lists off-roading and the WWF as two of his hobbies...launched "Operation Gumby" in 1999 which reaches out to children across the country to deal with the issue of bed-wet-

ting...is also a spokesman for CAP Cure which helps raise money and awareness in the fight against prostate cancer...received the Dave Stewart Community Service Award and the Fred Hutchinson Award in 2000...grew up a Yankees fan and his favorite baseball player is Mickey Mantle...brother Jeremy plays for the Dodgers.

1998: Emerged as one of the game's premier talents, batting .324 with 19 HR and 84 RBI in 149 games (148 starts at SS)...finished third in the American-League MVP voting (behind Juan Gonzalez and Nomar Garciaparra)...was among the American-League leaders in batting average (5th), runs (1st), hits (3rd), triples (T4th), multi-hit games (T2nd) and at-bats (6th)...broke the single-season home-run record for Yankee short-stops (previously held by Roy Smalley in 1982 with 16)...with 203 hits, he joined Phil Rizzuto as the second Yankee shortstop to collect 200 or more hits in a season (Rizzuto had 200 in 1950)...broke the Major-League record for the most runs scored by a shortstop in his first three full seasons with 352 (previously held by Detroit's Donie Bush with 343 from 1908-11)...joined Frank Crosetti as the only Yankee shortstops to score 100 or more runs in three or more consecutive seasons (Crosetti did it in four straight seasons from 1936-39)...combined with second-baseman Chuck Knoblauch to become the first pair of Yankee middle infielders to each hit 15 or more home runs in the same season (Knoblauch had 17)...they also became the third pair of middle-infield teammates in American-League history to record at least 30 stolen bases each in a single season (also SS Jack Barry and 2B Eddie Collins of the 1911 Philadelphia Athletics and SS Bert Campaneris and 2B Phil Garner of the 1976 Oakland Athletics)...was named to his first All-Star Team by Cleveland manager Mike Hargrove (0-for-1)...drove in a career-high five runs on 5/6 at Texas...had a season-high 15-game hitting streak

Wright went on the DL...over his three starts he was 2-0 with a 4.15 ERA (13.0 IP, 11 H, 6 ER) before being placed on the D.L. with a strained right forearm tendon after his 3.0 IP (5 ER, 2 HR) start at Oakland on 8/24...collected his first victory as starter on 8/14 vs. Baltimore (5.0 IP, 3 H, 1 R), his first as a starter since 7/17/97 vs. Kansas City (with Oakland)...as a reliever was 8-2 with a 2.74 ERA in 47 outings (65.2 IP, 60 H, 20 ER, 60 K)...he held batters to .247 (71-for-287) average against with 6 HR...on the year he was 1-for-3 in save situations and retired 63.8% of his first batters faced (30-of-47)...ten of his 29 inherited runners (34.5%) scored...appeared two Division Series games against Boston and allowed 3 ER in 3.0 IP (5 H, 1 BB, 3 K, 1 HR)...was bothered by pain in the forearm and elbow that limited his ability to throw all of his pitches...visited Dr. James Andrews in Birmingham, AL after the season and had arthroscopic surgery on his right elbow to remove loose bodies (bone chips) and some cartilage on 10/26.



hamstring for nearly half of the season, yet posted his fifth 100-run campaign...named to his sixth straight All-Star game (4th election)...Cleveland was 40-22 (.645) when he scored a run and 24-7 (.774) when he crossed the plate twice...connected on five leadoff home runs (4/23 at Boston, 4/30 at Texas, 5/17 at Chicago (AL), 6/11 at Cincinnati, and 9/13 vs. Boston)...stole just two bases from 6/27 thru the remainder of the season...recorded an infield hit and scored a run in the Mid-Summer Classic at Fenway Park...strained his right hamstring trying to stretch a

single into a double on 7/27 vs. Detroit...at time of injury, led the leauge in runs (89) and was tied for fourth in stolen bases (24)...was placed on the 15-day disabled list from 7/18-8/14...reinjured the hamstring on 8/14 vs. Baltimore and was placed on the shelf for the second time on 8/17...was activated on 9/1, going 2-for-3 with a double and a run scored before re-aggravating the injury...missed nine games from 9/2-12 and received cortisone shots in lower back to alleviate nerve and muscle irritation in the hamstring...all told, played in just two games from 7/28 to 9/12...hit just. 263 (20-for-76) over his final 20 games...suffered a dislocated left shoulder in Game 5 of the American League Division Series vs. Boston while sliding into first base...initial X-rays were negative but an MRI in November revealed a torn rotator cuff...underwent surgery to repair the injury on 12/15 in Birmingham, Ala (performed by Dr. James Andrews).

batted .329 and stole 14 bases in 22 games.

1988: In his first year of pro ball, batted .214 and stole 26 bases in 48 games at Single-A Auburn.

PERSONAL: Is a 1985 graduate of Washington High School in East Chicago, IN...attended the University of Arizona where he played baseball and basketball...was the sixth man on the 1988 squad that reached the NCAA Final Four (lost to Oklahoma, 86-78)...was the starting point guard on the 1989 team that was ranked No. 1 in the country at one point during the season and entered the NCAA Tournament as a No. 1 seed (lost to UNLV in the Regional Semifinals)...average 4.8 points, 1.4 rebounds, 2.6 assits and 1.6 steals per game over his career...was a college teammate of former NBA player Sean Elliot and San Antonio Spurs guard Steve Kerr...left as the Wildcats single-season (67 in 1988-89) and career (200 from 1985-89) leader in steals...did not play baseball until his junior year, when he appeared in just five games...donated money to refurbish the Indiana Harbor Little League baseball field in his hometown of East Chicago. IN.



seven starts in a season since Randy Johnson in 2000 and the first American Leaguer since Baltimore teammate Ben McDonald in 1994...failed to become the first Yankee to win his first eight starts since Eddie Lopat in 1951...struck out a season-high 12 batters without walking a batter on 5/7 at Seattle, allowing 2ER and 5H in 8.0 IP to earn the win...in 5/18 loss vs. Texas, struck out Hank Blalock (leading off the fourth inning) to become the 60th Major-Leaguer to record 2,000 strikeouts...on 6/10 vs. Houston-in his first career start vs. the Astros-recorded the victory, snapping a four-game losing streak, in a 5-2 Yankees' win...had lost four straight games only one other time in his career (also 5/4 - 5/20/00 with Baltimore)...with 296 decisions, only three pitchers in the expansion era (since 1961) have started their career with more decisions without a five-game losing streak: Tom

one-hitter was the 57th in Yankee history and first since Andy Pettitte, Brian Boehringer, Mariano Rivera and Jeff Nelson combined to limit the Tigers to one single on 9/26/97 at Detroit (the last complete-game one-hitter was tossed by Jimmy Key on 4/27/93 at California)...was named the AL Player-of-the-Week for 8/27-9/2...recorded wins in both of his starts during the week and did not allow a run in 17.0 IP, surrendering only seven hits and two walks while striking out 19...it was the second time this season he was honored as AL Player-of-the-Week...did not allow an earned run in six of his last nine starts of the season, going 6-1 with a 1.31 ERA...also allowed one run or less in six of his last seven starts, allowing 6 ER in 49.0 IP (1.10 ERA)...made four starts for the Yankees in the post season, going 2-1 with a 2.63 ERA...made his first post-season start with the Yankees' in a must-win Game Three of the Division Series at Oakland, trailing two games to none...threw seven shutout innings allowing 4 H to earn the win in a Yankees' dramatic 1-0 victory...had his 18.0 inning post-season scoreless streak snapped in the fourth inning of Game Two of the ALCS at Seattle...lost his only game of the '01 post season in Game One of the World Series at Arizona, allowing 5 R (3 ER) in 3.0 IP.

liquid nitrogen is sprayed on the wart...the procedure was performed by Dr. Mark Lowitt at University of Maryland Hospital...was placed on the 15-day disabled list on 4/17 and activated on 5/3...tossed his 13th career shutout on 5/9 at Tampa Bay, blanking the Devil Rays, 7-0...on 5/14 vs. Cleveland, he was struck above the right eye by a line drive off the bat of Sandy Alomar, Jr. with one out in the sixth inning...suffered laceration over his right eye and a displaced nose fracture and was placed on 15-day D.L. on 5/18, retroactive to 5/15...was activated from D.L. on 6/6 and that day allowed 8 ER in 4.2 innings against Atlanta, but recorded 10 strikeouts...on 8/4 vs. Detroit, he had a perfect game with two outs in the eighth inning...after retiring first 23 Tiger batters, he allowed a double to Frank Catalanotto...Moose finished the game with a 2-hit, 4-0 shutout, his 14th career shutout.

1995: The Orioles' ace tied Greg Maddux for the ML lead with a career-high 19 victories, going 19-9 with a 3.29 ERA...left-handed hitters batted just .210 (102-for-486) against Mussina, the best average against left-handers in the league...in addition, he averaged 3.16 strikeouts for every walk allowed, the second best K/BB ratio in the league, second only to Seattle's Johnson and his on-base percentage allowed was .270, second lowest to Johnson's .266...on the year, opposing baserunners stole four bases with Mussina on the hill, but were caught stealing six times...the 40% success rate was the third lowest among AL pitchers...through his first 11 starts of the year he was 5-5 with a 5.13 ERA (66.2 IP, 61 H, 38 ER) and 15 HR allowed...over his final 21 starts he was 14-4 with a 2.50 ERA (155 IP, 126 H, 43 ER) and 9 HR allowed...compiled a career-best eight-game winning streak over nine starts, 6/23-8/2...had a string of 24.0 consecutive innings without a walk spanning from 4/26-5/18...with runners in scoring position, held opponents to a .212 average (31-for-146) and with runners in scoring position and two out he limited batters to a .208 average (16-for-77)...put together a string of 26.0 consecutive scoreless innings, 9/21-10/1 as he ended the season with three straight CG victories...it was the second longest consecutive scoreless innings string in the league behind Kenny Rogers' 39.0...named as the right-handed pitcher on The Sporting News AL All-Star Team and the right-hander on the USA Today Baseball Weekly AL "Best of '95"...finished fifth in the AL Cy Young balloting behind Randy Johnson, Jose Mesa, Tim Wakefield and David Cone.

was in '76 when Mark Fidrych (2.34) and Frank Tanana (2.43) did it at 22 and 23, respectively...led the 0's in innings pitched (241.0) and was eighth in the AL...his IP total was the most by an Oriole since Mike Boddicker's 261.0 in '84...allowed two runs or less in 20 of 32 starts and one run or less 14 times...began the season 5-0 and finished the year with a seven-game winning streak over his last nine starts...in his first start after the All-Star Break, 7/17 at Texas, pitched the 29th one-hitter in club history, winning 8-0 with 10 strikeouts over 20-game winner

Kevin Brown...Kevin Reimer broke up the no-hit bid with a one-out double in the fifth...at 23 years-8 months, became the youngest Oriole pitcher to make the All-Star Team since Chuck Estrada (22) in '60.





2001: Continued his reign as baseball's most dominant closer, going 4-6 with a 2.34 ERA and established a Yankees' single-season record with 50 saves, appearing in a career-high 71 games...his 50 saves were the third highest total in A.L. history behind only Bobby Thigpen, Chicago, 57 in 1990 and Dennis Eckersley, Oakland, 51 in 1992 and became only the sixth player in Major-League history to reach the 50-save plateau in a season...saved at least 30 games in five straight seasons, surpassing Dave Righetti for most ever by a Yankee...earned his 30th save in season's 91st game, the fewest games in his career to reach that milestone...converted 50-of-57 save opportunities (88%)...had to record more than three outs in 13 of his 50 saves...saved two consecutive games nine times...saved three consecutive games three times (4/27-29 vs. Oakland: 6/14 vs. Montreal and 6/15-16 at New York Mets; 7/16-17 at Philadelphia and 7/18 at Detroit)...retired 57-of-71 first batters faced (80%) and prevented 20-of-25 inherited runners from scoring...made appearances in consecutive games 13 times, three straight games six times and pitched in four straight games once...was selected to participate in the All-Star Game, but did not attend to rest an injured right ankle...in 4/29 win vs. Oakland, recorded his third straight save (#6) with scoreless ninth (1 H)...last registered saves in three consecutive games on 7/7-8/00 vs. NY Mets (including split DH on 7/8)...made third straight appearance and fourth in five games in 6/16 win vs. the NY Mets at Shea Stadium, saving his third straight game for the second time this season (also 4/27-29)...in 8/1 vs. Texas, recorded his 200th career save and 35th of the season pitching 2.0 scoreless innings (2 K)...recorded 46th save of the season in 9/19 win at Chicago--with 1.2 scoreless IP-to establish his single-season career high and tie Dave Righetti's single-season franchise record (set in 1986)...was 2-1 with a 1.13 ERA and five saves in 11 postseason relief appearances...allowed two runs in the bottom of the ninth in Game Seven in World Series and recorded the loss and his first career blown save in World Series play (was 8-for-8 in save opportunities)...of the 8 SV, seven have been more than one inning...the eight saves are the most in World-Series history...had converted 23 consecutive saves in post-season play (last blown save was Game Four of 1997 ALDS at Cleveland)...has appeared in 18 World Series Games, the third most all-time behind Whitey Ford (22) and teammate Mike Stanton (20).

2000: In another season that showcased his pitching talents, Rivera was 7-4, with a 2.85 ERA and 36 SV while tying a career-high with 66 appearances...has recorded 30 or more saves in each of his last four seasons (tying Righetti for most 30-save seasons by a Yankee)...converted 36-of-41 save opportunities...saved two consecutive games three times (4/3-4 at Anaheim; 8/26-27 at Oakland; and 9/23-24 vs. Detroit)...saved three consecutive games twice (5/1-3 at Cleveland; and 7/7-8 at NY Mets, Game 2 on 7/8 played at Yankee Stadium)...was

asked to record more than three outs in 13 of his 36 saves...retired 51-of-66 first batters faced (77%)...prevented 14 of 24 inherited runners from scoring (58%),...permitted only four home runs in '00 and has allowed only 13 in 385.1 IP over the last five seasons...made first-ever Opening-Day appearance on 4/3 at Anaheim and recorded the save, allowing 1 ER in 1.0 IP...tossed 2.2 IP to record second win of the season--and series--on 4/19 at Texas after suffering first blown save since 7/16/99 vs. Atlanta (had converted 27 straight save opportunities)...the 2.2 IP was his longest outing since tossing 3.0 IP and earning the win on 9/6/96 vs. Toronto...recorded first loss and second blown save of season on 5/7 vs. Baltimore, allowing 4 H and 3 ER in the ninth inning...was the first time he received the loss when leading by two or more runs in the ninth inning or later since 8/2/96 at Kansas City when he allowed 4 ER in 0.2 IP...made third straight appearance on 6/2 at Atlanta, retiring all four batters faced (2K) to record 13th save...with the save, moved past Sparky Lyle for third place on the Yankees' all-time saves list with 142...saved both games (#20 and 21) of 7/8 double-header vs. the Mets (Game 1 at Shea Stadium and Game 2 at Yankee Stadium), pitching scoreless ninth innings...sayed each of the Yankees' three wins of the series...pitched a scoreless 1.1 IP (1 K, 1 BB) on 7/24 at Baltimore to record his 23rd save of the season to move into sole possession of second place on the Yankees all-time saves list with 152, one ahead of Goose Gossage...from 8/24 through the end of the season, converted last 10 save opportunities...was 0-0 with a 1.72 ERA and six saves in a team-high 10 post-season relief appearances...with

his save in Game Five of the Division Series at Oakland on 10/8, Rivera established the Major-League record for most saves in post-season play with 16 (surpassing Dennis Eckersley)...it was also his eighth career save in Division-Series play, most by any pitcher...with 1.2 scoreless innings in Game Three of the ALCS at Seattle on 10/13, Rivera recorded 33.1 scoreless innings over 23 appearances in the postseason (since Sandy Alomar's solo HR in Game Four of the 1997 Division Series)...is the longest scoreless-innings streak in post-season history, surpassing Whitey Ford's 33.0 consecutive scoreless innings from 1960-62...had his post-

season scoreless streak end at 33.1 IP in Game Six of the ALCS on 10/17 vs. Seattle, allowing 1 ER in 2.0 IP...had his World-Series scoreless streak snapped at 14.1 innings when he allowed 2 ER in the ninth inning of Game Two vs. the Mets on 10/22...saved Games Four and Five of the World Series and with seven career Series saves is the all-time leader, surpassing Rollie Fingers' six.

1999: Evolved into one of the premier pitchers in all of baseball...was 4-3 with a 1.83 ERA and a career-high 45 saves in 66 appearances, also tying a career high...converted 45 of 49 save opportunities (92%)...led the American League in saves, save percentage and relief ERA...his 45 saves place him second only to Dave Righetti's 46 saves in 1986 on the Yankees all-time single-season list...became the first Yankee pitcher to have two 40-save seasons (also had 43 saves in 1997)...retired 60 of 66 first batters faced (90%)...prevented 22 of 27 inherited runners from scoring (81%)...did not allow a run in his final 28 appearances of the season (30.2 IP), converting his last 22 save opportunities...permitted only two home runs in '99 and has allowed only 11 in 309.2 IP over the last four seasons...appeared in a career-high six consecutive games from 4/20-27 (previous high was four consecutive appearances)...on 7/6 at Detroit suffered his second blown save of the season before recording his first win...in the game, allowed his first home run of the season and first since 8/14/98 vs. Texas...was selected to participate in his second All-Star Game, but did not attend because of personal matters in his native land of Panama...was named American League Pitcher of the Month in August...saved a leagueleading 11 games in the month and did not allow a run in 13 appearances (14.2 IP, 15 K)...on 9/11 vs. Boston, walked the first batter he faced for the first time since 7/9/98, a span of 81 appearances...pitched a perfect ninth inning on 9/23 vs. Chicago to earn his 43rd save--tying his career high (also 1997)...saved his career high 45th game while making his career-tying 66th appearance in his final regular season game on 10/2 at Tampa Bay...tossed 12.1 scoreless innings in eight post-season appearances and was six-for-six in save opportunities...pitched 4.2 scoreless innings with a win and two saves in three games in the World Series and was selected as the Most Valuable Player...became only the third reliever to ever be named World Series MVP, joining Oakland's Rollie Fingers in 1974 and former Yankee John Wetteland in 1996...has tossed 25.2 straight scoreless innings over 18 appearances in the post-season since allowing a home run to Cleveland's Sandy Alomar in Game Four of the 1997 Division Series at Jacobs Field...has two wins and 12 saves in that span...including post-season play, did not allow a run in his final 43.0 innings of the season, a span of 36 appearances.

1998: The anchor of the Yankee bullpen, Rivera posted another impressive season in his second year as closer...was 3-0 with a 1.91 ERA and 36 saves in 54 relief appearances...converted 36 of 41 save opportunities (88%)...retired 41 of 54 first-batters faced (76%)...prevented 20 of 23 inherited runners from scoring (87%)...opponents batted just .215 off him (LH batters hit .237, RH batters hit .193)...was placed on the 15-day disabled list on 4/6 with a strained right groin suffered on 4/5 at Oakland (missed 13 games)...retired 19 straight batters over six appearances before allowing a two-out hit in the eighth inning to Ivan Rodriguez on

5/13 vs. Texas...in a 6/1 blown save vs. Chicago, he was asked to record as many as six outs for the save for the first time in his career...entered the eighth with no outs and a 4-2 lead, but allowed two inherited runners to score (Yankees won 5-4 in 10 innings)...converted 22 consecutive save opportunities before blowing a save on 8/18 at Kansas City (Yankees won 3-2)...with his 36th and final save of the season on 9/20 at Baltimore, tied Dave Righetti (1990) for third-highest, single-season save total by a Yankee...tossed 13.1 scoreless innings in 10 post-season appearances and was six-for-six in save opportunities...saved three of the Yankees' four wins vs. San Diego in the World Series...earned his first career World Series save in the Yankees' 9-6 victory in Game One at Yankee Stadium...completed the Yankees' sweep with a save in Game Four at San Diego...retired Mark Sweeney on a ground ball to third base for the final out.

1997: Established himself as one of baseball's best closers, going 6-4 with a 1.88 ERA and 43 saves in 66 relief appearances...in his first season as the Yankee closer, Rivera ranked second among American-League relievers in ERA and saves...he also ranked first in save opportunities (52), sixth in games finished (56) and batting average with runners in scoring position (.151, 11-for-73) and seventh in save percentage (.827)...converted 43 of 52 save opportunites...opponents hit just .237 (LH batters hit .243, RH batters hit .230)...recorded saves in four straight games from 6/23-27, becoming only the third Yankee pitcher to save four consecutive games...John Wetteland accomplished the feat twice in 1996 and Sparky Lyle did it in 1973 (Wetteland also saved four straight in the '96 World Series)...his 27 saves at the All-Star Break were the sixth-highest total since the inception of the save rule...he became the first Yankee to earn a save in the All-Star Game, tossing a perfect ninth on 7/8 at Jacobs Field...earned his 30th save of the season on 7/17 at Chicago, becoming only the sixth Yankee reliever to record 30 saves in a season...picked up his 42nd and 43rd saves in a doubleheader on 9/16 vs. Boston, tying John Wetteland for second on the Yankees' single-season save list (Righetti, 46 in 1986)...was 0-0 with a 4.50 ERA and one save in two games vs. Cleveland in the Division Series...earned his first career postseason save in the Yankees' 8-6 victory in Game One at Yankee Stadium...suffered a blown save in the Yankees' 3-2 loss in Game Four at Cleveland, surrendering the game-tying home run to Sandy Alomar, Jr. in the bottom of the eighth.

1996: Was one of the most dominant pitchers in baseball, going 8-3 with a 2.09 ERA and five saves in 61 relief appearances...his 2.09 ERA led all Yankee pitchers and eight wins led all Yankee relievers...opponents hit just .189 (LH batters hit .215, RH batters hit .157)...struck out the side (facing only three batters) four times...had

at least one strikeout in 54 of his 61 appearances...first batters were 5-for-56 (.089) with 27 K, 4 BB and 1 HBP...recorded 130 strikeouts in 107.2 innings, the most ever by a Yankee reliever (Gossage had 122 in 1978)...had a 26.0-inning scoreless streak from 4/19-5/21, the most by a Yankee since Steve Farr went 27.0 innings without allowing a run from 5/29-8/4/91...picked up wins vs. Minnesota on 4/26 and 4/28, tossing three no-hit innings in each game...had a streak of 15.0 consec-

2000: Put together one of the best offensive seasons in Dodger franchise history, batting .325 (163-for-501) with 105R, 43 HR and 109 RBI in 141 games...set a Los Angeles Dodgers record with 41st homer of the season on 9/8, surpassing Mike Piazza (40HR in 1997)...tied Duke Snider's franchise record for homers in a season set in 1956 with his 43rd home run on 9/29 at San Diego ... set record for most homers at Dodger Stadium in a single season with 23 when he connected on 9/26 vs. San Francisco, passing Piazza's total of 22 in 1997...named N.L. Player of the Week twice, 6/12-18 (.542, 3 HR, 9 RBI) and 7/9-16 (.417, 4 HR, 6 RBI)...reached base by hit, walk or hit-by-pitch in 123 of 141 games...finished the season ranked among the N.L. leaders in average (.325, 9th), walks (101, 6th), home runs (43, 6th), on-base percentage (.438, 3rd), slugging percentage (.643, 4th), road average (.341, 7th), average vs. RHP (.339, T-5th), and average with runners in scoring position (.357, 4th)...his .643 slugging percentage set a Los Angeles Dodgers record, surpassing Piazza's mark of .638 in 1997...had just 71 strikeouts, the least among any major leaguer with 40 or more home runs...had second best home run ratio in the N.L., hitting one every 11.7 at bats (Barry Bonds hit one every 9.8 at bats)...had 30 RBI in June, the most RBI in a month by a Dodger since Steve Garvey had 30 in June 1977...prior to contracting a viral illness on 8/21, was batting .331 with 40 homers and 96 RBI...hit 29th and 30th home runs on 7/14, becoming the quickest Dodger to reach 30 homers in franchise history, breaking Snider's mark, set on 7/16/55...had an RBI in 6 straight games from 6/17-23, and homered in four straight games from 6/20-23...hit in 13 straight games from 6/10-7/13, during which he hit .500 (25for-50) with 8 HR...reached base safely in 10 straight plate appearances from 6/9-11.

1999: In his first full season with Dodgers, batted .301 (165-for-549) with 34 HR and 101 RBI in 152 games...became the first Dodger outfielder to play in consecutive All-Star Games since Dusty Baker in 1981-82...also selected to All-Star teams as a member of Padres in 1992 and Marlins in 1993 and 1997...joined Eric Karros and Raul Mondesi as the first Dodger trio to each hit at least 30 homers in one season since they had

four players in 1997: Mike Piazza (40), Karros (31), Todd Zeile (31) and Mondesi (30)...coming off offseason shoulder surgery, batted .171 (6-for-35) during spring training with one homer and 2 RBI in 16 games...reached the 30th home run plateau for the third time in his career on 9/25 vs. San Diego...also hit 42 home runs with Florida in 1996 and 33 with San Diego in 1992...ended season on powerful note with home runs in 4 of his last 6 contests, 5 of 8, 6 of 10 and 8 of his last 13...Hit 11 home runs in September...walked a season-high 4 times on September

20, which tied a career high for the 5th time...slugged his 6th career grand slam on 8/22 at Philadelphia against reliever Steve Montgomery...drove in 6 runs in that game for the 2nd time in his career (also 6/18/92 at San Francisco)...hit 2 home runs on 5/21 vs. St. Louis, giving him 2 in a game for the 14th time in his career and the 3rd time in 1999...had a team-high 101 walks, the most by a Dodger since Brett Butler's 108 in 1991...among N.L. batters, ranked 6th in walks, 9th in on-base percentage (.407) and tied for 3rd in sacrifice flies (9) in 1999.

1998: Saw action in 130 games with Florida and Los Angeles and batted .302 with 27 doubles, 22 HR and 85 RBI despite missing the last 25 games of the season because of injury...led the Dodgers in batting average, slugging percentage (.524), on-base percentage (.428) and walks (69)...after being acquired from Florida in a 7-player trade on 5/15, he batted .316 in 90 games with the Dodgers and collected 16 doubles, 16 HR and 57 RBI...batted .272 with 11 doubles, a triple, 6 home runs and 28 RBI in 40 games with the Marlins...stole 22 bases and hit 22 home runs, marking the first time in his career that he reached the 20-homer/20-steal plateau...started 126 games in right field (89 as a Dodger) and committed a career-low two errors in 228 total chances for a career-best .991 fielding percentage...among N.L. leaders, he ranked tied for 4th in sacrifice flies (9), 5th in on-base percentage, tied for 5th in walks (95) and 7th in intentional walks (12)...was the 7th toughest batter to fan among N.L. players, striking out just once every 11.9 plate appearances (46 times in 549 trips to the plate)...threw out two runners from right field on 7/3 at San Francisco...was a member of the N.L. injury attempting to make a diving catch on 5/10 at Pro Player Stadium...aggravated the injury with another diving catch on 5/25 at Candlestick Park...went back on the disabled list three days later...started in right field on Opening Day, his first start out of the infield in 580 career major league games...selected as the N.L. Player of the Week for the period 4/25-5/1 after hitting .462 (12-for-26) with 6 HR and 14 RBI.

1993: Combined to play in 140 games for San Diego and Florida, batting .295 (145-for-492) with 20 HR and 73 RBI...started the season with the San Diego Padres before he was traded to the Marlins along with Rich Rodriguez for Trevor Hoffman, Andres Berumen and Jose Martinez on 6/24...was the youngest of the six defending batting champions to be traded in the last 60 years...Bill Madlock was the last to be traded after winning a title, going from the Cubs to the Giants for Bobby Murcer in 1977...made history when he was voted onto the N.L. All-Star team, making him the first player from a first-year expansion team to start an All-Star Game...hit a home run off Angels' Mark Langston in his first at-bat.

1992: Made a serious run to become the first N.L. Triple Crown winner since Joe Medwick in 1937...led the N.L. in hitting (.330) and finished 3rd in home runs (33) and 5th in RBI (100)...finished 3rd in the MVP voting...was named The Sporting News Player of the Year, Comeback Player of the Year and was selected to the Silver Slugger team...became the youngest batting champion since Los Angeles' Tommy Davis in 1962...was also the first right-handed batter to win a batting title since Bill Madlock in 1983...his 33 home runs were the most by a batting champion since Fred Lynn hit 39 to go with his .333 average in 1979...it is also the best figure in the N.L. since 1972 when Billy Williams hit .333 with 33 homers...his average stood at .295 on 5/5 when he started a career-best 18-game hit streak that raised his average to .345 on 5/25...was named N.L. 



# HISTORY OF THE **NEW YORK YANKEES**



What would become the most successful team in sports history actually began as the Baltimore Orioles in 1901. When that franchise folded after only two seasons, it was purchased for \$18,000 by two colorful New Yorkers, Frank Farrell and Bill Devery.

New York's third Major-League team, joining the New York Giants and Brooklyn Dodgers of the National League, would play its home games in a hastily constructed, all-wood park at 168th Street and Broadway. Because the site was one of the highest spots in Manhattan, the team was named the "Highlanders" and their home field "Hilltop Park." They played their inaugural game on April 22, 1903, losing 3-1 to the Senators at Washington New York recorded the first win in franchise

7-2 decision at Washington.

history the next day, a 1903 Highlanders The Highlanders nearly captured the American-League

pennant in 1904-only their second season-as they finished only 1.5 games behind the Boston Pilgrims in the first of three second-place finishes from 1904 to 1910.

After a spectacular fire severely damaged the Polo Grounds in 1911, the Highlanders' owners invited the Giants to share Hilltop Park. Two years later the Giants returned the favor and allowed the Highlanders to move into their rebuilt and vastly superior park. With the move, the Highlanders officially changed their nickname to "Yankees" (by which they had actually been known for most of their history). Two years after the move-on January 11, 1915-Colonel Jacob Ruppert and Colonel Tillinghast L'Hommedieu Huston purchased the franchise from its by-now disgruntled owners.

From 1911 to 1919, the Yankees won as many as 80 games in a season only twice, but the franchise's fortunes would change forever on January 3, 1920. On what is perhaps the most significant date in club history, the Yankees purchased the contract of George Herman "Babe" Ruth

> from the Boston Red Sox for \$125,000 and a \$350,000 loan against the mortgage on Fenway Park.

> Ruth's impact immediate. The Yankees won 95 games in 1920, their highest victory total to date, and captured their first American-League pennant a year later. Their attendance at the Polo Grounds doubled to 1,289,422 in 1920 and, in 1921, the Giants notified their tenant to vacate the Polo Grounds as soon as possible. Now bitter rivals, the two teams squared off in the World Series in

1921 and 1922 with the Giants winning both times.

With their departure from the Polo Grounds inevitable, the Yankee owners set out to build a spectacular ballpark of their own. Baseball's first triple-decked structure with an advertised capacity of 70,000, it would also be the first baseball facility to be labeled a "stadium."

Construction began on May 5, 1922 and, in only 284 working days. Yankee Stadium was ready for its inaugural game on April 18, 1923 vs. the Boston Red Sox. An announced crowd of 74,200 fans packed Yankee Stadium for a glimpse of Baseball's grandest facility while thousands milled around outside after the fire department finally ordered the gates closed. Appropriately, Ruth christened his new home with a three-run homer to cap a four-run third inning as the Yankees coasted to a 4-1 win.





Because it was widely recognized that Ruth's tremendous drawing power made the new stadium possible, it would immediately become known as

"The House That Ruth Built." Later that season, the Stadium hosted the first of 37 World Series and Yankees won their first World Championship over their former land-lord, the Giants. Of course, as the Stadium became the stage for a staggering number of World titles—now totaling 26—it would also become known as "The Home of Champions."

On June 1, 1925 in a 5-3 loss vs. Washington, Manager Miller Huggins inserted a 21-year-old rookie first baseman as a pinch hitter for light-hitting shortstop Pee Wee Wanninger. No one could have imagined at the time that this appearance would be the first of 2,130 consecutive

games played by Lou Gehrig, who, with Babe Ruth and later Joe DiMaggio, anchored some of the greatest ball clubs of all time.

After a disheartening loss to the St. Louis Cardinals in the 1926 World Series, the Yankees rolled to World Champion-ships in both 1927 and 1928, sweeping

the Series both years. The 1927 club, the first Yankee team to be labeled "Murderers' Row," became the yardstick by which athletic greatness is measured. During that season, Ruth shattered his own single-season home run record with his 60th on September 30,1927.

In his 15 seasons in pinstripes, Ruth helped build a tradition of winning with seven American-League pennants and four World Championships. He finished his unparalleled career (with the Boston Braves in 1935) with 714 home runs, 12 American-League home-run titles and six RBI crowns, including five seasons with more than 150. A charter member of Baseball's Hall of Fame, he remains widely regarded as the greatest player of all-time.

After the 1934 season, Ruth's last in New York, the Yankees purchased the contract of a budding star named Joseph Paul DiMaggio from the San Francisco Seals of the Pacific Coast League. Two years later, DiMaggio made his debut in pinstripes and helped the Yankees to an incredible string of four consecutive World Championships under Manager Joe McCarthy from 1936 through 1939. The decade of the thirties also produced one of the game's greatest lefty-righty pitching combinations in future Hall of Famers Lefty Gomez and Red Ruffing. A four-time 20-game winner—including 24-7 in 1932 and 26-5 in 1934—Gomez was also 6-0 in five World Series. Ruffing posted seasons of 20,

20, 21 and 21 wins on four World-Championship clubs from 1936-39.

Sadly, in 1939, Gehrig was diagnosed with a crippling disease and his streak of 2,130 games came to an end on May 2 when he did not appear in a 22-2 Yankees' win at Detroit. On July 4, the Yankees honored their captain with an emotional "Lou Gehrig Appreciation Day" at Yankee Stadium and his uniform number (4) became the first in Baseball to be retired. He died on June 2, 1941.

With the departure of Gehria. DiMaggio became the pillar of the generation of Yankee champions. In his 13 seasons in pinstripes, the Yankees played in the World Series in all but two years and won 10 World-Series titles. The legendary "Yankee Clipper" compiled one of game's remarkable-and per-

haps unbreakable—records in 1941 when he hit safely in a record 56 consecutive games.

The Yankees also made a seamless transition after DiMaggio's retirement at the age of 37 after the 1951 season. With Whitey Ford and Mickey Mantle joining future Hall of Famers Yogi Berra and Phil Rizzuto, the Yankees won eight American-League pennants and six World Championships under Manager Casey Stengel during the 1950's. Their streak of five consecutive World-Series titles from 1949 through 1953 remains a Major-League record with no other team winning as many as four straight.

Mantle would achieve greatness despite an arrested case of osteo-myelitis and numerous injuries. The powerful switch-hitter belted 536 home runs, collected 2,415 hits and batted .300 or more 10 times in an 18-year career. In his first 14 seasons in pinstripes, the Yankees missed the World Series only twice (in 1954 and 1959).

Ford's lifetime record of 236-106 gives him the best winning percentage (.690) of any 20th century pitcher and paced the American League in victories three times and in ERA and shutouts twice. He still holds many World Series records, including 10 wins, 33 consec-



10 wins, 33 consec- Mickey Mantle utive scoreless innings and 94 strikeouts.

The heart of the Yankees for 18 seasons, Berra played on an incredible 14 pennant winners and 10 World Champions. He was a three-time MVP and was selected to the All-Star team in every season from 1948 through 1962.

Rizzuto was recognized as the glue of 10 pennant winners and eight World-Series Champions from 1941-56 and captured the league's MVP award in 1950, batting .324 with 200 hits and 125 runs scored.

And not every contributor to Yankee and Baseball history was a future Hall of Famer. In Game Five of the 1956 World

Series VS. the Brooklyn Dodgers on October 8th Stadium, Yankee right-hander Don Larsen authored what is perhaps the game's greatest pitching performance when he retired all 27 Dodger batters for the only perfect game in World-Series history.

The Yankees opened the decade of the sixties in their usual fashion, winning

pennants in the first five seasons (1960-'64) and World-Series titles in 1961 and 1962. Incredibly, in the 29 seasons from 1936 to 1964, the Yankees won a remarkable 22 pennants and 16 World Championships. The 1961 club is still regarded as one of the best teams in Baseball history. With Mantle and Roger Maris embroiled in a season-long race to break Ruth's single-season home-run record, the Yankees rolled to 109 wins en route to the World Championship. Maris smashed Ruth's record when he belted his 61st home run on October 1 at Yankee

Stadium in the last game of the season.

But age finally caught up with the ball club after a seven-game Series loss to the St. Louis Cardinals in 1964. The Yankees would finish first in the division

only once in the next nine seasons and actually plummeted to last place in 1966 for the first time in 53 years.

The team's fall from grace ended on January 2, 1973, when the most storied franchise in sports history was sold by CBS to a group headed by George M. Steinbrenner III. With the addition of Catfish Hunter—Baseball's first marquee free agent—shrewd trades which brought Ed Figueroa, Mickey Rivers, Chris Chambliss and Willie Randolph and a strong nucleus which included Thurman Munson, Graig Nettles, Roy White and Sparky Lyle, the Yankees would make their first post-season appearance in 12 years in 1976 by

winning their first American-League-East title. Then on October 14, 1976, in the deciding fifth game of the League Championship Series VS. the Kansas City Royals, Chambliss launched a ninth-inning, pennant-winning home run to put the Yankees back in the World Series.

After a disheartening four-game sweep vs. the Cincinnati Reds in the 1976 World Series, the Yankees introduced Reggie Jackson—the most prolific slugger of his era—as the club's newest free-agent acquisition. Jackson then capped an exciting 1977 season with one of Baseball's greatest individual performances. In Game Six of the World Series vs. the Los Angeles Dodgers at Yankee Stadium on October 18, "Mr. October" belted three home runs on three swings of the bat.

In 1978, the Yankees overcame a 14.0-game deficit in the American League East to force a one-game playoff with the Boston Red Sox at Fenway Park to decide the American-

League pennant. Shortstop Bucky Dent erased a 2-0 Red Sox' lead in the seventh inning with a dramatic three-run homer and the Yankees went on to a 5-4 win en route to a second straight World Championship.

The '78 season also saw the emergence of Ron Guidry as one the franchise's greatest pitchers. A four-time American-League All-Star, Guidry compiled one of the most dominating seasons in baseball history in 1978 and became known as "Louisiana Lightning." He went 25-3 with a 1.74 earned run average in leading



the Yankees to their dramatic comeback, compiling a club-record 248 strikeouts and nine shutouts en route to a unanimous selection as the A.L.'s Cy-Young-

Award recipient. On June 17, 1978 vs. the California Angels at Yankee Stadium, Guidry shattered the club record for strikeouts with 18. The Yankees' co-captain—with Willie Randolph—from 1986 through 1988, Guidry also won 20 games in 1983 (21-9) and 1985 (22-6).

The seventies ended with tragedy as Thurman Munson, the Yankees' first captain since Gehrig, was killed in the crash of his private jet on August 2, 1979. Only 32 at the time of his death, Munson was the undisputed leader of the clubs that won three consecutive pennants and two

After their Captain's death, the Yankees would make only one more World-Series appearance (1981) in 17 years despite compiling the best record in the Major Leagues during the decade of the eighties.

Championships.

The eighties also saw the development of one of the franchise's greatest and

most popular players, Don Mattingly. "Donnie Baseball," the team captain from 1991 through 1995, batted .307 in his Yankee career (1982-95) and compiled an incredible six-year stretch from 1984-89. During those years, he batted .327 and topped 100 RBI five times, including a career-high 145 in 1985 when he captured the A.L. MVP award. A year earlier, he outdueled teammate Dave Winfield on the final day of the season for the league's batting crown (.343 to .340).

Winfield, who came to the Yankees as the game's mostsought-after free agent in 1981, compiled Hall-of-Fame credentials in his eight-plus seasons in pinstripes (1981-90). He belted 205 home runs for the Yankees with 818 RBI and won five gold gloves.

After an absence of 13 years, the Yankees returned to postseason play in 1995 as the American League's first-ever

"Wild-Card" entry. A devastating five-game loss to the Seattle Mariners in the Division Series was only the start of an incredible run of eight consecutive post-season appearances, a record shared only by the Atlanta Braves.

In 1996, under new skipper Joe Torre, the Yankees returned to the World Series and would win four of the next five World Championships, including three straight from 1998 through 2000. Their 114 victories in 1998 shattered the 44-year-old American-League mark of 111 wins by the 1954 Cleveland Indians (was broken by Seattle in 2001) and their 125 total victories (with 11 post-season wins) remains Baseball's best single-season total.

era of greatness featured a consistent lineup of great home-grown and acquired players to rival any period in franchise history. Since the arrival of Bernie Williams in 1991, the Yankees' farm system has produced All-Stars Derek Jeter, Andy Pettitte, Jorge Posada, Mariano Rivera and Alfonso Soriano. In addition, shrewd trades and free-agent acquisitions have brought such All-Stars as Wade Boggs, Scott Brosius, Roger Clemens, David Cone, Jason Giambi, Tino Martinez, Mike Mussina, Paul O'Neill, Mike Stanton and David Wells

In 2001, the Yankees failed to become only the second team in history to win four consecutive World-Series titles, but captured the hearts of the nation in the aftermath of the September 11th attacks. The Yankees dropped the first two games of the Series vs. the Arizona Diamondbacks at Bank One Ballpark, but rallied to win the next three at Yankee Stadium behind dramatic ninth-inning comebacks in both Games Four and Five. On consecutive nights, Tino Martinez and Scott Brosius erased two-run, ninth-inning Diamondback leads with the Yankees winning both games in extra innings. It marked the first time in World-Series history that a team won two games in the same series

when trailing by at least two runs in the ninth inning.

Entering their 102nd season in 2004, the Yankees seek to extend their franchise record of consecutive post-season appearances to 10 (a record matched only by the Atlanta Braves, 1995-03). They will do so by expanding upon the kind of innovation that set their first century—and its 26 World Championships—in motion. More than 100 years ago, the original 1903 team was built with stars

from no fewer than eight different major-league teams. The 2004 Yankees—with the additions of Cuban All-Star pitcher Jose Contreas and three-time Japan Central League MVP Hideki Matsui in 2003—will be comprised of stars from no fewer than six nations.

In the seventh consecutive season of interleague play in 2003, the Yankees completed the first-ever season-series series sweep and have won seven straight games vs. the Mets (dating back to 2002)...the Yankees lead the regular-season series 24-12 since the inception of interleague play in 1997...in 2000, the two teams also met in the first "Subway" World Series since 1956 with the Yankees capturing their 26th World Championship, four games to one...the two teams have now played 144 times with the Yankees holding an 87-56-1 edge all-time...the Yankees lead the spring-training series, 45-32, including a 4-3 edge in home-and-home series at Yankee and Shea Stadiums...the 1989 home-and-home series was the first involving two New York teams since the Yankees and Dodgers played each other from the early 1940s until 1957...the Yankees also hold a 10-8-1 edge in Mayor's Trophy games played from 1963-83 (except 1980-81)...since 1962, 79 players have played for both the Mets and the Yankees (in 2003, Jason Anderson became the 12th player to appear for the Yankees and Mets in the same season).

On July 18, 1999, David Cone tossed only the 16th perfect game in Major-League Baseball history. It came only one season after David Wells accomplished the feat and gave the Yankees a record three perfect games in their history, including Don Larsen in the 1956 World Series. Prior to Wells' and Cone's, perfect games had only been pitched in consecutive seasons once (by Jim Bunning of the Phillies in 1964 and the Dodgers' Sandy Koufax in 1965) and never by pitchers from the same team. Yankee Stadium also became the only park to host as many as three perfect games (Dodger Stadium was the site of perfect games by Koufax in 1965 and Montreal's Dennis Martinez in 1991).

#### **ONE-HIT GAMES**

Yankee pitchers have thrown 58 one-hitters, the most recent by Ted Lilly on 4/27/02 at Seattle (Lilly became the first Yankee pitcher ever to lose a one-hitter in the regular season)...the Yankees' last complete-game one-hit win was by Mike Mussina on 9/2/01 vs. the Boston Red Sox at Fenway Park in a 1-0 Yankees' victory...Mussina retired 26 consecutive batters before Carl Everett singled with two outs in the ninth...it was the first complete-game one-hitter by a Yankee since Jimmy Key on 4/27/93 at California in a 5-0 Yankee win...the Yankees last authored a combined one-hitter on 9/26/97 at Detroit, when four pitchers—Andy Pettitte, Brian Boehringer, Mariano Rivera and Jeff Nelson—limited the Tigers to a third-inning single by Travis Fryman.

Bob Turley and Whitey Ford each hurled three CG one-hitters for New York and both men participated in a fourth...Bob Shawkey, Rip Collins, Lefty Gomez, Vic Raschi and Floyd Bevens each threw two, with one of Bevens' coming in Game Four of the 1947 World Series vs. Brooklyn...Bevens was one out from a no-hitter when the pinch-hitter Cookie Lavagetto doubled in two runs to give the Dodgers a 3-2 victory...It was the last game Bevens and Lavagetto ever played in the Majors.

On 7/8/03 at Cleveland, the Yankees were held to one hit (by LHP Billy Traber) for the 52<sup>nd</sup> time in franchise history and the first time since the Indians' Bartolo Colon also tossed a complete-game one hitter in a 2-0 Cleveland win on 9/18/00 at Yankee Stadium (were no hit by six Astros pitchers on 6/11 at Yankee Stadium)...Joe Wood, Earl Hamilton and Nolan Ryan are the only three men with a pair of one-hitters against the Yankees with both of Hamilton's coming in 1913...Hoyt Wilhelm, who no-hit the Yankees in 1958, also tossed a one-hitter against them in 1959.

Horace Clarke and Don Mattingly are the only Yankees to twice serve as no-hit spoilers...Clarke had the only hit in no-hit bids by Jim Palmer and Joe Niekro...in a single month in 1970, Clarke broke up three no-hitters in the 9th inning, two of which wound up being more than one-hitters...on 5/2/84 at Chicago, Mattingly ruined a perfect game for LaMarr Hoyt with a wind-blown single in the seventh inning, and on 6/29/85 vs. Milwaukee, he also broke up a no-hit bid by Moose Haas, again with a seventh-inning single...on 9/12/81 at Yankee Stadium, Boston LHP Bob Ojeda took a no-hitter into the ninth inning only to have Rick Cerone lead off with a double, followed by a Dave Winfield double.

#### **VANKEES GRAND SLAMS**

The Yankees hit nine grand slams in 2003, equaling the second-highest single-season total in franchise history (also hit nine in 1998)...the Yankees hit a franchise-record 10 grand slams in 1987, tying the major-league mark (since exceeded by seven teams)...Don Mattingly hit a Major-League record six of the 10 grand slams in 1987...on 5/17/02 vs. the Minnesota Twins, Jason Giambi became only the 21st player in Major-League history-and the second Yankee-ro hit a last-inning grand slam to take a team to sudden victory when trailing by three runs (Babe Ruth did it on 9/25/25, hitting a one-out grand slam off Chicago's Sarge Connally in the 10th inning of New York's 6-5 win)...on 9/14/99 at Toronto, Bernie Williams and Paul O'Neill hit grand slams in the seventh and eighth innings respectively, the only time in franchise history that players have hit grand slams in consecutive innings...it was also only the third time in franchise history that the Yankees had two grand slams in the same game (also Tony Lazzeri on 5/24/36 at Philadelphia; and Dave Winfield and Don Mattingly on 6/29/87 at Toronto)...in 1998, Shane Spencer led the club with three grand slams (most ever by a Yankee rookie)...he also became the first Yankee rookie to hit at least two slams in one season since Yogi Berra in 1947...Yankee pitchers allowed three grand slams in 2003 for the third straight year...they gave up nine in 2000, the most in franchise history (surpassing eight in 1995)...four pitchers have hit grand slams for the Yankees, including Red Ruffing (1933), Spud Chandler (1940), Don Larsen (1956) and Mel Stottlemyre (1965)...there have been 21 pinch-hit grand slams in Yankee history (by 17 players), the last by Joroe Posada on 6/6/01 vs. Baltimore.

Beginning with Lou Gehrig's number 4 in 1939, the Yankees have retired 15 uniform numbers to honor 16 players and managers.

### 1 Billy Martin



Born: May 16, 1928 in Berkeley, CA Died: December 25, 1989 in Binghamton, NY. Height: 5-11, Weight: 165. Threw and batted righthanded Number retired in 1986

Had as much "Yankee Pride" as any player or manager to wear pinstripes and he implanted his own fierce desire to win in his teams. Played an integral part in four World Series in the 50's as a player, and added another ring managing the Yankees in 1977. His .333 lifetime series batting average is fourth with at least 75 AB on the all-time series list. Combative and daring, Martin was a brilliant baseball strategist and a legend in Yankee history.

### 3 Babe Ruth



Born: February 6, 1895 in Baltimore, MD Died: August 16, 1948 in New York, NY Height: 6-2, Weight: 215 Threw and batted lefthanded Number retired in 1948

Baseball's greatest slugger and the most colorful figure in the game's history. Debuted as a pitcher for the Boston Red Sox, winning 89 games over six seasons before being converted to the outfield because of his tremendous power. Was sold to the Yankees for \$120,000 in 1920 and his 54 home runs that year were more than any other American-League team. Enroute to 714 career home runs, won 12 home run titles, hitting 60 in 1927, Added 15 home

runs in World Series competition as he led the Yankees to seven Series appearances and four World titles. A member of the inaugural class of Hall of Fame inductees in 1936.

### 4 Lou Gehrig



Born: June 19, 1903 in New York, NY Died: June 2, 1941 in Riverdale, NY Height: 6-1, Weight: 212 Threw and batted lefthanded. Number retired in 1939

Durable, powerhitting first baseman who played in an amazing 2,130 consecutive games between 1925 and 1939. Drove in at least 100 runs for 13 straight seasons (1926-38) and established an American-League record with 184 RBI in 1931. Compiled a .340 lifetime batting average and belted 493 home runs in a career shortened by terminal illness. Was honored at Yankee Stadium on July 4, 1939 and made memorable "Today, I consider myself the lucki-

est man on the face of the earth" speech. Life was immortalized in classic 1942 motion picture, The Pride of the Yankees, starring Gary Cooper. Elected to the Hall of Fame in 1939.

### 5 Joe DiMaggio



Born: November 25, 1914 in Martinez, CA Died: March 8, 1999 in Hollywood, FL Height: 6-2, Weight: 193 Threw and batted righthanded Number retired in 1952

The "Yankee Clipper" is considered by many experts as the best all-around baseball player in history. Was a sensational hitter for average and power, a splendid, graceful, ball-hawking center fielder with a powerfully accurate arm and a daring and alert baserunner. Compiled a .325 lifetime batting average from 1936 to 1951. The two-time batting champion and three-time MVP powered the Yankees to the first of four consecutive World Championships in his 1936 rook-

ie season. Many rate his 56-consecutive-game batting streak in 1941 as the top baseball feat of all time. Elected to the Hall of Fame in 1955.

## 7 Mickey Mantle



Born: October 20, 1931 in Spavinaw, OK. Died: August 14, 1995 in Dallas, TX Height: 6-0, Weight: 201 Threw right and switch hit Number retired in 1969

"The Mick" was the most feared hitter on the most successful team in history. In his best seasons, and there were many, Mantle was simply a devastating player. He could run like the wind and hit tape measure homers, like his famous 565-footer in Washington in 1953. He led the Yanks to 12 fall classics in 14 years, and seven World Championships. He still owns records for most homers, RBI, runs, walks, and strikeouts in World Series play. In

1956, Mantle had one of the greatest seasons ever at the plate. He hit 52 homers with 130 RBI and a .353 average to win the Triple Crown. Mantle was elected to the Hall of Fame in 1974.

## 8 Yogi Berra



Born: May 12, 1925 in St. Louis, MO. Height 5-8, Weight: 191. Threw righthanded and batted lefthanded. Number retired in 1972.

A mainstay for the most dominating teams in history, the Yankee that played from the end of World War II until the early 1960's. Although he never led the league in a single major offensive category, he was just the third man to win three Most Valuable Player awards. Selected to play in 15 successive All-Star games. Played on 14 pennant winners and 10 World Champions, more than anyone in history. Led Yankees to the 1964 pennant as manager, Elected to the Hall of Fame in 1972.

### 8 Bill Dickey



Born: June 6, 1907 in Bastrop, LA Died: November 12, 1993 Height: 6-1, Weight: 185

Threw righthanded and batted lefthanded

Number retired in 1972

Regarded as one of the greatest catchers of all-lime. A durable and tireless worker, he caught more than 100 games in 13 consecutive seasons (1929-41), an American-League record. He did not allow a single passed ball in 125 games behind the plate, another AL record. Dickey also excelled at the plate, batting over .300 in 10 of his first 11 seasons while hitting 202 homers during his career. He handled Yankee pitching staffs on eight World Series teams, winning seven championships.

## 9 Roger Maris



Born: September 10, 1934 in Hibbing, MN Died: December 14, 1985 in Houston, TX Height: 6-0, Weight: 197 Batted lefthanded and threw righthanded Number retired in 1984

In one of the most dramatic assaults on a baseball record, Maris caught, then surpassed Babe Ruth's famous home run record of 60. In 1961, Maris hit 61 home runs, a Major-League record which stood until 1998 and still the American-League mark.The two-time American League MVP (1960-'61) is also considered as one of the best fielding right fielders in Yankee history.

### 10 Phil Rizzuto



Born: September 25, 1917 in New York, NY Height: 5-6, Weight 150. Threw and batted righthanded Number retired in 1985

Playing 13 years for the Yanks, "Scooter" went to the World Series in 10 of those seasons. That stat may best explain why the diminutive shortstop is regarded as a true Yankee legend. He was a durable, outstanding shortstop, skilled bunter and enthusiastic baserunner with a solid .273 lifetime batting average. In 1950 Rizzuto earned the A.L. MVP Award, batting .324 with 200 hits, 92 bases on balls, and 125 runs scored. He batted .320 in the 1951 World Series and was named Series' MVP. Spent 40 years as a Yankee broadcaster (1957-96). Elected to the Hall of Fame in 1995.

## 15 Thurman Munson



Born: June 7, 1947 in Akron, OH Died: August 2, 1979 in Canton, OH Height: 5-11, Weight: 190 Batted and threw righthanded Number retired in 1979

Was the undisputed leader and most respected man on the Yankee teams that won three AL pennants in a row (1976-78) and two World Championships. Munson was a tremendous defensive catcher, winning the Gold Glove Award in three consecutive seasons (1973-75). From 1975-77, Thurman drove in more than 100 runs and hit better than 300 in each of those three seasons. He hit the first Yankee home run in the "new" Yankee Stadium. There is no more trag-

ic date in Yankee history than August 2, 1979. On that date Munson passed away when the plane he was flying crashed while landing.

### 16 Whitey Ford



Born: October 21, 1928 in New York, NY Height: 5-10, Weight: 181 Threw and batted lefthanded. Number retired in 1974.

"The Chairman of the Board" was the ace pitcher on the great Yankee teams of the 1950's and early 60's. The wily southpaw's lifetime record of 236-106 gives him the best percentage (,690) of any 20th century pitcher. He paced the American League in victories three times, and in ERA and shutouts twice. The 1961 Cy Young Award winner still holds many World Series records, including 10 wins, 33 consecutive scoreless innings and 94 strikeouts. Elected to the Hall of Fame in 1974.

## 23 Don Mattingly



Born: April 20, 1961 in Evansville, IN Height: 6-0, Weight: 185 Batted and threw lefthanded Number retired in 1997

'Donnie Baseball' was only the 10th captain to be named by the Yankees in their storied history. The premier first baseman of his era, Mattingly was a nine-time Gold Glove winner. The 1985 American League MVP set records for most grand slams in a season (6), most home runs in seven consecutive games (9) and eight consecutive games (10). A humble man of grace and dignity, Mattingly carried on the legacy of the pinstripe tradition and dedicated his career to the pursuit of excellence.

### 32 Elston Howard



Born: February 23, 1929 in St. Louis, MO Died: December 14, 1980 in New York, NY Height: 6-2, Weight: 196 Batted and threw righthanded

Number retired in 1984. Became the first black player in Yankee history when he made the club in the spring of 1955. The versatile two-time Gold Glove catcher was an important member of the A.L. pennant-winning Yankee teams in nine of his first ten seasons with the club. The 1963 American League MVP, Howard was a clubhouse leader who was respected as both a player and a man. Howard's dignified manner off the field and competitive spirit on the field were positive influences on the Yankee team.

## 37 Casey Stengel



Born: July 30, 1889 in Kansas City, MO Died: September 29, 1975 in Glendale, CA Number retired in 1970

In a distinguished 54-year professional career, "The Old Professor" emerged as one of the game's greatest managers. His feat of guiding the Yankees to 10 pennants and seven world titles in a 12-year span ranks as the top managerial accomplishment of all time. Simply put, Casey Stengel was one of the best things to ever happen to the game of baseball. He was an authentic baseball ambassador, making the game fun for millions of Americans. Elected to the Hall of Fame in 1966.

### 44 Reggie Jackson



Born: May 18, 1946 in Wyncote, PA. Height: 5-10, Weight: 181. Threw and batted lefthanded. Number retired in 1993.

One of the game's premier power hitters, "Mr. October" blasted 563 career roundtrippers, sixth all-time. In Game Six of the 1977 World Series, Jackson hit three home runs, all on the first pitch, as the Yankees beat the Dodgers to wrap up the club's first World Championship since 1962. Jackson was an exciting clutch player and an intimidating cleanup hitter with a .490 career slugging percentage. The 1973 American League MVP once said, "Some people call October a time of pressure. I call it a time of character," Elected to the Hall of Fame in 1993.

### 49 Ron Guidry



Born: August 28, 1950 in Lafayette, LA Height: 5-11, Weight: 165 Threw and batted left-handed Number retired in 2003.

Won 20 games three times, in 1978 (25-3), 1983 (21-9) and 1985 (22-6). Compiled one of the most dominating seasons in baseball history in 1978 and became known as "Louisiana Lightning." He went 25-3 with a 1.74 earned run average in leading the Yankees to a dramatic comeback—from 14.0 games behind the Boston Red Sox—to capture their second straight World Championship. In 1978, he compiled a club-record 248 strikeouts and nine shutouts en route to a unanimous selection as the American League's Cy-Young-Award recipient. On June 17, 1978 vs. the

California Angels at Yankee Stadium, Guidry shattered the club's single-game record for strikeouts with 18. The Yankees' co-captain—with Willie Randolph—from 1986 through his retirement in 1989, he remains in the Top 10 on the Yankees' all-time list in games pitched (368), innings pitched (2392.0), wins (170), winning percentage (.651), strikeouts (1778) and shutouts (26). A four-time American-League All-Star.

#### IMPORTANT DATES IN YANKEES HISTORY

January 9, 1903 - Frank Farrell and Bill Devery purchase the defunct Baltimore franchise of the American League for \$18,000 and then move the team to Manhattan.

March 12, 1903 - The New York franchise is approved as a member of the American League. The team will play in a hastily constructed, all-wood park at 168th Street and Broadway. Because the site is one of the highest spots in Manhattan, the club will be known as the "Highlanders" and their home field "Hillton Park."

April 22, 1903 - The Highlanders play their first game, a 3-1 loss at Washington.

April 23, 1903 - The Highlanders record the first win in franchise history, a 7-2 decision at Washington, Harry Howell recorded the win,

April 30, 1903 - The Highlanders notch a 6-2 win vs. Washington in their inaugural home opener at Hillton Park.

April 11, 1912 - Pinstripes first appear on Highlanders' uniforms, creating a look that would become the most famous uniform design in sports.

April, 1913 - The Highlanders are officially renamed the "Yankees" after moving to the Polo Grounds, home of the National League's New York

January 11, 1915 - Col. Jacob Ruppert and Col. Tillinghast L'Hommedieu Huston purchase the Yankees for \$460,000.

April 24, 1917 - George Mogridge becomes the first Yankee to throw a no-hitter in a 2-1 win at Fenway Park.

January 3, 1920 - The Yankees purchase the contract of Babe Ruth from the Boston Red Sox for \$125,000 and a \$350,000 loan against the mortgage on Fenway Park.

September, 1921 - The Yankees clinch the first of their 38 A.L. pennants.

May 5, 1922 - Construction begins on Yankee Stadium.

Giants

May 21, 1922 - Col. Ruppert buys out Col. Huston for \$1,500,000.

April 18, 1923 - Yankee Stadium opens with a 4-1 win over the Boston Red Sox before a reported crowd of 74,200. Babe Ruth hits the Stadium's first home run.

October 15, 1923 - The Yankees defeat the New York Giants, after World Series losses to their cross-town rivals in 1921 and 1922, for the first of 25 World Championships.

June 1, 1925 - Lou Gehrig begins his record streak of 2,130 consecutive games played, pinch-hitting BABE RUTH ACQUIRED BY YANKEES for Pee Wee Wannioer.

September 30, 1927 - Babe Ruth breaks his own Major-League record with his 60th home run on the season's final day.

April 20, 1928 - The Yankee's sixth season at Yankee Stadium opens with the left-field stands enlarged to three decks.

April 16, 1929 - The Yankees become the first team to make numbers a permanent part of the uniform (numbers would become standard for all teams by 1932).

September 25, 1929 - Manager Miller Huggins, who guided the Yankees to their first six A.L. pennants and three World Championships, dies of blood poisoning.

June 3, 1932 - Lou Gehrig becomes the first player to hit four home runs in a single game in the Yankees' 20-13 win at Philadelphia. He remains the only Yankee to hit four home runs in one game.

July 14, 1934 - Babe Ruth hits the 700th home run of his career off Tommy Bridges in the second inning of a 4-2 Yankees' win at Detroit's Navin Field.

November 21, 1934 - The Yankees purchase Joe DiMaggio from the San Francisco Seals of the Pacific Coast League for \$50,000.

April 20, 1937 - The Yankees' 15th season at Yankee Stadium opens with the right-field stands enlarged to three decks. The wooden bleachers are replaced by a concrete structure with the distance to center field dropping from 490 to 461 feet.

May 30, 1938 - A franchise-record crowd of 81,841 attends a doubleheader sweep of the Boston Red Sox.

May 2, 1939 - Lou Gehrig's playing streak of 2,130 consecutive games ends when he does not make an appearance in a 22-2 Yankees' win at Detroit. Babe Dahlgren plays first base for the Yankees and contributes a double and a home run.

July 4, 1939 - "Lou Gehrig Appreciation Day" is held at Yankee Stadium. His uniform number (4) is the first to be retired in Major League Baseball and Gehrig makes his famous "Today I consider myself the luckiest man on the face of the earth" speech.

May 15, 1941 - Joe DiMaggio's 56-game hitting streak begins with a single off Edgar Smith in a 13-1 loss vs. Chicago at Yankee Stadium. June 2, 1941 - Lou Gehrig dies of Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis at the age of 37.

July 17, 1941 - Joe DiMaggio's consecutive-game hitting streak ends at 56 when he goes 0-for-3 in a 4-3 Yankees' win at Cleveland. Indians' third baseman Ken Keltner twice robs DiMaggio of hits with great fielding plays. DiMaggio then hits in the next 16 straight games to give him hits in 72 of 73 games.

January 25, 1945 - Dan Topping, Del Webb and Larry MacPhail purchase the Yankees for \$2,800,000 from the estate of the late Col. Jacob Ruppert. MacPhail replaces Ed Barrow as President and General Manager.

May 28, 1946 - The first night game is played at Yankee Stadium and the Yankees suffer a 2-1 loss vs. Washington before 49,917 fans.

April 27, 1947 - 'Babe Ruth Day' is celebrated throughout Major League Baseball.

June 13, 1948 - Babe Ruth's uniform number (3) is retired at Yankee Stadium's 25th Anniversary celebration. The Babe makes his final Stadium appearance.

August 16, 1948 - Babe Ruth dies in New York of throat cancer at age 53.

October 12, 1948 - The Yankees announce that Casey Stengel will replace Bucky Harris as manager.

April 17, 1951 - Mickey Mantle makes his Major-League debut, going 1-for-4 in a 4-0 win vs. Boston at Yankee Stadium.

September 28, 1951 - In Game One of doubleheader vs. Boston at Yankee Stadium, Allie Reynolds tosses his second no-hitter of the season (he had previously no-hit the Indians at Municipal Stadium in Cleveland on July 12).

December 12, 1951 - Joe DiMaggio officially announces his retirement.

April 17, 1953 - Exactly two years after his Yankee debut, Mickey Mantle hits what is recognized as the game's first "tape-measure" home run, a 565-foot clout off the Senators' Chuck Stobbs at Washington's Griffith Stadium.

October 5, 1953 - The Yankees win a record fifth consecutive World Championship.

October 8, 1956 - Don Larsen hurls the only perfect game in World Series history, a 2-0 win over Brooklyn in Game Five at Yankees Stadium.

October 1, 1961 - Roger Maris hits his 61st home run in the season's final game to establish a Major-League record.

June 24, 1962 - Jack Reed's two-run, 22nd-inning home run ends the longest game in Yankee history, a 9-7 win at Detroit.

November 2, 1964 - CBS purchases 80% of Yankees for \$11,200,000. The network later buys the remaining 20%.

May 14, 1967 – Mickey Mantle becomes only the sixth player—and second Yankee—to reach the 500 home run plateau when he connects off Baltimore's Stu Miller at Yankee Stadium.

June 8, 1969 - "Mickey Mantle Day" is celebrated at Yankee Stadium and his uniform number (7) is retired.

August 8, 1972 - The Yankees sign a 30-year lease to play in a remodeled Yankee Stadium to be completed in 1976.

January 3, 1973 - A limited partnership, headed by George M. Steinbrenner III as its managing general partner, purchases the Yankees from CBS.

September 30, 1973 - Ralph Houk resigns as manager.

April 6, 1974 - The Yankees begin the first of two seasons at Shea Stadium, playing the first home game outside Yankee Stadium since 1922 (go 90-69 there in 1974-75).

December 31, 1974 - Free agent Catfish Hunter signs a then-record five-year contract.

August 1, 1975 - Billy Martin replaces Bill Virdon for his first of five stints as manager.

April 15, 1976 - Remodeled Yankee Stadium opens with an 11-4 win over Minnesota Twins. The Twins' Dan Ford hits the first home run.

October 14, 1976 - Chris Chambliss' ninth-inning home run off Mark Littell in Game Five of the ALCS vs. Kansas City gives the Yankees their 30th pennant.

November 29, 1976 - Free agent Reggie Jackson signs a five-year contract.

October 18, 1977 - Reggie Jackson hits three home runs in Game Six of the World Series vs. the Los Angeles Dodgers at Yankee Stadium.

June 17, 1978 - Ron Guidry establishes a franchise record by striking out 18 batters in the Yankees' 4-0 win vs. California at Yankee Stadium.

July 24, 1978 - Billy Martin resigns as manager.

July 25, 1978 - Bob Lemon is named manager, replacing Billy Martin.

July 29, 1978 - On Old Timer's Day, the Yankees announce that Billy Martin will return as Yankee manager in 1980 and Bob Lemon will become general manager.

October 2, 1978 - The Yankees, 14 games behind Boston at one point, defeat the Red Sox, 5-4, at Fenway Park in only the second playoff game in AL history.

June 18, 1979 - Billy Martin returns as Yankee manager, replacing Bob Lemon.

August 2, 1979 - Yankees Captain Thurman Munson dies in a plane crash in Canton, Ohio, at age 32 (his number "15" is immediately retired).

December 15, 1980 - Free agent Dave Winfield signs a then-record 10-year contract.

September 6, 1981 - Bob Lemon is named manager for second time, replacing Gene Michael.

April 26, 1982 - Gene Michael becomes manager for second time, replacing Bob Lemon.

August 3, 1982 - Clyde King is named Yankee manager, replacing Gene Michael.

July 4, 1983 - Dave Righetti pitches only the sixth regular-season no-hitter in franchise history and the first since 1951, a 4-0 win vs. the Red Sox at Yankee Stadium.

July 24, 1983 - The Yankees and Kansas City play the infamous "Pine Tar" game at Yankee Stadium as George Brett hits a two-out, ninth-inning home run off Goose Gossage to give the Royals an apparent 5-4 lead. The umpires nullify the homer because the pine tar on Brett's bat is above the allowable 18 inches and Brett is called out for using an illegal bat. The Yankees win 4-3 (see August 18, 1983).

August 18, 1983 - Kansas City's protest is upheld and the "Pine Tar" game concludes with the Royals winning 5-4. When play is resumed, Yankee pitcher Ron Guidry is in center field for the final out of the top of the ninth while lefthanded first baseman Don Mattingly is at second. Royals' reliever Dan Quisenberry retires the Yankees in order in the bottom of the ninth.

April 28, 1985 - Billy Martin is named manager for fourth time, replacing Yogi Berra.

October 17, 1985 - Lou Piniella is named manager, replacing Billy Martin.

December 14, 1985 - Roger Maris dies at age 51 in Houston, Texas.

July 18, 1987 - Don Mattingly homers off Texas' Jose Guzman to tie Dale Long's Major-League record of hitting a home run in eight consecutive games (Mattingly hits 10 home runs during the streak).

September 29, 1987 - Don Mattingly hits a grand slam off Boston's Bruce Hurst, setting a Major-League record with six grand slams in a season.

**June 23, 1988** - Billy Martin is replaced as manager of the Yankees for the fifth and final time. Lou Piniella is named manager for the second time.

December 9, 1988 - The Yankees sign a 12-year television contract with Madison Square Garden Network.

August 18, 1989 - Bucky Dent replaces Dallas Green as Yankee manager.

December 25, 1989 - Billy Martin dies in an automobile accident at age 61.

June 6, 1990 - Stump Merrill replaces Bucky Dent as Yankee manager.

August 14, 1993 - "Reggie Jackson Day," his uniform number (44) retired.

September 4, 1993 - Jim Abbott pitches a 4-0, no-hit win over the Indians at Yankee Stadium.

August 13, 1995 - Mickey Mantle dies of cancer at age 63 in Dallas, Texas.

September 6, 1995 - Lou Gehrig's Major League record of 2,130 consecutive games played is broken when Baltimore's Cal Ripken, Jr. plays in his 2,131st.

May 14, 1996 - Dwight Gooden hurls only the eighth regular-season no-hitter in Yankee history, a 2-0 blanking of the Seattle Mariners at Yankee Stadium

June 16, 1996 - Mel Allen, the legendary "Voice of the Yankees" from 1939-64, dies at age 83 in Greenwich, Connecticut.

August 25, 1996 - A monument in honor of Mickey Mantle is unveiled in Yankee Stadium's Monument Park.

January 22, 1997 - Don Mattingly officially announces his retirement at a media conference at Yankee Stadium.

May 17, 1998 - David Wells tosses only the 14th regular-season perfect game in baseball history, the first ever by a Yankee.

September 25, 1998 - The Yankees establish an American-League record with their 112th win of the season (a 6-1 win vs. Tampa Bay at Yankee Stadium), breaking the mark of 111 by the 1954 Cleveland Indians (they complete the season with an AL record 114th victory on September 27 vs. Tampa Bay).

October 21, 1998 - The Yankees complete an incredible season with a four-game sweep of the San Diego Padres in the World Series to capture the franchise's 24th World Championship. Their 3-0 win gives the club a record of 125-50 (114-48 in the regular season, 11-2 in postseason).

March 8, 1999 - Joe DiMaggio dies at age 84 in Hollywood, Florida.

April 25, 1999 - A monument in honor of Joe DiMaggio is unveiled in Yankee Stadium's Monument Park.

July 18, 1999 - On "Yogi Berra Day," David Cone tosses only the 15th regular-season perfect game in baseball history one season after David Wells accomplishes the feat. Ironically, Don Larsen--who tossed a perfect game in the 1956 World Series--throws out the ceremonial first pitch.
September 9 1999 - Jim "Catfish" Hunter dies at age 53 in Hertford, North Carolina.

October 27, 1999 - The Yankees play Baseball's last game of the century and complete a four-game sweep of the Atlanta Braves to capture their 25th World Championship.

October 26, 2000 - The Yankees win their third consecutive World Championship with a five-game triumph over the New York Mets in the first "Subway Series" since 1956. The 4-3, 12-inning win in Game One at Yankee Stadium is the club's 13th straight in World-Series play, breaking the record of the 1927, 1928 and 1932 Yankees.

November 1, 2001 - In Game Five of the World Series vs. Arizona at Yankee Stadium, Alfonso Soriano's game-winning, 10th-inning single gives the Yankees their second straight come-from-behind win. With game-tying, two-run homers by Tino Martinez (in Game Four) and Scott Brosius (in Game Five), the Yankees became the first team in World-Series history to win two games in the same series when trailing by at least two runs in the ninth inning.

May 17, 2002 - Jason Giambi becomes only the 21st player-and second Yankee--to hit a walk-off grand slam with his team trailing by three runs (Babe Ruth did it on 9/24/25. His 14th-inning slam off Minnesota's Mike Trombley erased a 12-9 Twins' lead to give the Yankees a 13-12 win.

October 16, 2003 – Aaron Boone becomes only the fifth player—and second Yankee—to end a postseason series with a "walk- off" home run when his solo shot to lead off the 11th inning (off Boston's Tim Wakefield) gives the Yankees a seven-game victory in the ALCS and their 39th American-League pennant.

#### **INSIDE-THE-PARK HOME RUNS**

The Yankees did not hit an inside-the-park home run for the fourth straight season in 2003...their last inside-the-park home run was by Ricky Ledee on 8/29/99 vs. Seattle...It was the Yankees' second inside-the-park home run of the season (also by Chuck Knoblauch on 4/29 at Texas) and marked the first time the Yankees had two inside-the-park homers in the same season since 1990 (Deion Sanders and Alvaro Espinoza)...Knoblauch's inside-the-parker was the first by a Yankee since Derek Jeter on 8/3/96 at Kansas City...Ledee's was the first by a Yankee at Yankee Stadium since 7/17/90 (Deion Sanders vs. Kansas City)...the last inside-the-park home run by an opposing player was by Oakland's Terrence Long on 5/9/03 at Network Associates Coliseum.

#### THE HISTORY OF YANKEE STADIUM

Only a year after they changed Baseball forever with the purchase of Babe Ruth from the Boston Red Sox, the Yankees made another buy that would forever change the way the game was watched.

On February 6, 1921, the Yankees issued a press release to announce the purchase of 10 acres of property in the west Bronx. The land, purchased from the estate of William Waldorf Astor for \$675,000, sat directly across the Harlem River from the Yankees' current Manhattan home, the Polo Grounds, which they shared unhappily with the landlord Giants of the National League since 1913.

The relationship between the Giants and their tenant crumbled after the 1920 season when Yankee attendance—boosted by their new slugging sensation—doubled to 1,289,422. That was over 100,000 more than the Giants, who, in 1921, notified the Yankees to vacate the Polo Grounds as soon as possible. With their departure from the Polo Grounds now inevitable, Yankee co-owners Jacob Ruppert and Tillinghast l'Hommedieu Huston set out to build a spectacular ballpark of their own, Baseball's first triple-decked structure. With an advertised capacity of 70,000, it would also be the first to be labeled a "stadium."

Original plans of the architect—the Osborne Engineering Company of Cleveland, Ohio—had the Stadium triple-decked and roofed all the way around. An early press release, in fact, described the Yankees' new home as a field enclosed with towering embattlements, rendering the events inside "impenetrable to all human eyes, save those of aviators." But the initial, grand design was quickly scaled back with the triple-decked

grandstand not reaching either foul pole. Contrary to the owners' wishes, the action would be more than visible from the elevated trains that passed by the outfield as well as from the buildings that would spring up across River Avenue. Fortunately, a purely decorative element also survived the project's early downsizing and would become the park's most recognizable feature. A 15-foot deep copper facade would adorn the front of the roof which covered much of the Stadium's third deck. It would give Yankee Stadium an air of dignity that no park has possessed—either before or since.

The new stadium would favor left-handed power with the right-field foul pole only 295 feet from home plate (though it would shoot out to 429 by right center). Though the left-field pole measured only 281 feet from the plate, right-handed hitters were neutralized by a 395-foot left field and a whopping 460 to left center. It would also be friendly to patrons, boasting an unheard of "eight toilet rooms for men and as many for women scattered throughout the stands and bleachers." (When the Stadium was remodeled 50 years later, it included more than 50 restrooms.) The club's executive offices would be moved from midtown Manhattan and located between the main and mezzanine decks with an electric elevator connecting them with the main entrance.

The construction contract was awarded to New York's White Construction Co. on May 5, 1922 with the edict that the job must be completed "at a definite price" (\$2.5-million) and by Opening Day 1923. Incredibly, it was, In only 284 working days, Yankee Stadium was ready for its inaugural game on April 18, 1923 vs. the Boston Red Sox.

Officially, 74,200 fans packed Yankee Stadium for their first glimpse of Baseball's grandest facility while thousands more milled around outside after the fire department finally ordered the gates closed. Before the game began, John Phillip Sousa and the Seventh Regiment Band led both clubs to the flagpole in deep center field where the American flag and the Yankees' 1922 pennant were raised. Appropriately, Babe Ruth christened his new home with a three-run homer to cap a four-run third inning as the Yankees coasted to a 4-1 win.

Because it was widely recognized that Ruth's tremendous drawing power made the new stadium possible, it would immediately become known as "The House That Ruth Built." Later that season, the Stadium hosted the first of 35 World Series and the Yankees won their first World Championship over their former landlord, the Giants. Of course, as the Stadium became the stage for a staggering number of World titles—now totaling 26—it also would become known as "The Home of Champions."

In its early years, when wooden bleachers surrounded the outfield, a grass slope approached the outfield walls from foul pole to foul pole. Outfielders, especially Ruth in right, routinely backed up the small hill to pull down fly balls. Atop the bleachers were advertising signs except for a lone, manually operated, wooden scoreboard in right-center field which was "big enough to record 12 innings for games played by every

club in the two major leagues." Over the years, the board would be replaced by more modern models. The Yankees, in fact, would unveil the first electronic message board in 1959.

By 1928, the Stadium was ready for its first major facelift as the triple-deck grandstand in left field was extended beyond the foul pole to its current termination point. The right-field grandstand was extended in 1937, allowing "upper-deck" home runs in both directions. With the '37 expansion of the grandstand, the remaining wooden bleachers were replaced by a concrete structure and the distance to center field dropped from 490 feet to a still-astronomical 461 feet.

Except for the addition of lights in 1946, the look of Yankee Stadium would now remain relatively the same until the winter of 1966-67. Then, under the direction of its new owner, CBS, the 44-year-old facility received a \$1.5-million modernization, most of which was spent on paint (90 tons of it). The brown concrete exterior was painted white as was the by-

now greenish copper facade. And all of the grandstand seats went from green to blue, a color scheme that would be retained when the Stadium was completely remodeled after the 1973 season.

On August 8, 1972, after years of debate about the future of the aging ballpark, the Yankees signed a 30-year lease with the City of New York which called for Yankee Stadium to be completely modernized in time for the 1976 season. After completing the Stadium's 50th-Anniversary season in 1973, the Yankees moved to Shea Stadium for two seasons while their home was almost completely demolished and then rebuilt.

The most striking change of the modernization would be the removal of the numerous, obstructive steel columns which supported the second and third decks as well as the

roof. By "cantilevering" the upper decks and by lowering the playing field while increasing the slope of the lower stands, sight lines for fans would be dramatically improved. Of course, with the removal of the original roof, the Stadium almost lost its most-recognizable feature: the facade. But an innovative design concept included an exact replica of the facade atop the new 560-foot-long scoreboard which stretched across the rear of the bleachers. The board would also include baseball's first "telescreen," which could provide instant replays of the action by employing a then-incredible "nine shades of gray."

Yankee Stadium's exterior changed dramatically, too, as three escalator towers were added, one at each of the Stadium's three entrances. And, with 10 additional rows of seats added to the upper deck, the already-grand Stadium would have an even more majestic look.

The remodeled Yankee Stadium opened on April 15, 1976—with the Yankees topping Minnesota 11-4—and, like its predecessor, would host the World Series in its inaugural season. The Stadium, in fact, hosted the Fall Classic in its first three seasons with the Yankees winning back-to-back World titles in 1977 and 1978.

As one of the world's most-prestigious addresses, Yankee Stadium has also

been the home of scores of other sports, entertainment and cultural events. While the Yankees were on the road or out of season, the Stadium opened its gates to college and pro football, soccer, political assemblies, religious conventions, concerts and even the circus.

Boxing immediately found a home at Yankee Stadium with Benny Leonard winning a 15-round decision over Lou Tendler for the lightweight title three months after the gates opened on July 24, 1923. Until Muhammed Ali stopped Ken Norton on September 28, 1976, 30 championship fights had been fought at the Stadium; perhaps none more memorable than the one for the heavyweight title between Joe Louis and Germany's Max Schmeling on June 22, 1938. After suffering a knockout loss in the initial non-title encounter at the Stadium two years earlier, Louis—now the heavyweight champ—avenged his defeat with a stunning first-round KO in the rematch.

Football also became an immediate fixture at Yankee Stadium with the 1923 Army-Navy game inaugurating a rich history of collegiate and later professional football matchups. On November 12, 1928, with Notre Dame and Army locked in a scoreless game at halftime, the legendary Knute Rockne made his famous "win one for the Gipper" pep talk and the Fighting Irish went out and beat the Cadets. 12-6.

The New York football Giants also called Yankee Stadium home from 1956 through 1973 and, on December 28, 1958, played in what is widely recognized as "the greatest game ever played." With the NFL championship at stake, a crowd of 64,185 watched the Baltimore Colts tie the game 17-17 on a Steve Myrha field goal with seven seconds left. Eight min-

utes into professional football's first-ever "sudden-death" overtime period, the Colts' Alan Ameche crashed through from the one yard line, ending a contest that would help establish pro football as a major sport.

The Stadium was also an important stop for religious conventions with the conventions of the Jehovah's Witnesses the major outside activity each year. Beginning in 1950, the convention attracted as many as 123,707 people in a single day—far more than any other Stadium event. On October 4, 1965—with the Yankees out of the World Series for only the third time in 17 years—the Stadium hosted an event of worldwide significance. During the first visit to North America by a Pope, Paul VI celebrated mass before a crowd in excess of 80,000. Fourteen years later, John Paul II also made Yankee Stadium a stop on his tour of the United States.

#### WHY THE YANKEES?

When the American League moved the Baltimore Orioles to New York for the 1903 season, the club made its home at 168th Street and Broadway, one of the highest spots in Manhattan. The team would, therefore, be known as the "Highlanders" and their field "Hilltop Park." As early as 1905, however, the name "Yankees" began popping up in newspapers whose editors undoubtedly were searching for a shorter name for their headlines. By the time the franchise moved from decaying Hilltop Park to the Polo Grounds in 1913, it officially changed its name to the by then commonly-used "New York Yankees."

# THE HISTORY OF THE YANKEE UNIFORM

What would become the most recognizable insignia in sports—the interlocking "NY"—made its first appearance on the uniforms of the New York Highlanders in 1909. The design was actually created in 1877 by Louis B. Tiffany for a medal to be given by the New York City Police Department to Officer John McDowell, the first NYC policeman shot in the line of duty. Perhaps because one of the club's owners, Bill Devery, was a former NYC police chief, the design was adopted by the Highlanders. It first appeared on both the cap and on the jersey's left sleeve, replacing the separated "N" and "Y" which had appeared on the left and right breast each season since 1903 with the exception of 1905. For that season only, the "N" and "Y" were merged side by side into a monogram on the left breast—actually a forerunner of the now legendary emblem.

In 1912, their final season at Hilltop Park, the Yankees—as they were now commonly known—made a fashionable debut at their home opener on April 11. Their traditional white uniforms were now trimmed with

black pinstripes, creating a look that would

become the most famous uniform design in sports history. The Yankees, however, were not the first team with pinstripes and would actually abandon the look for the next two seasons. By 1915, though, the pinstripes were back for good and, with the exception of the cap, the uniform would remain relatively unchanged.

The Yankees utilized numerous cap designs—including pinstripes—from 1903 until 1922 when they finally settled on a solid navy cap with the interlocking "NY" insignia. Only one more element would now be needed to achieve a look that remains in place today. In 1917, the Yankees removed the "NY" monogram from the jersey and went with a plain, pinstripes-only look. The "NY" remained off the uniform—except for the cap—for the next 20 years until it was reinstated in

1936. The legendary Babe Ruth, therefore, actually played his entire Yankee career without ever wearing the club's now-legendary insignia on his jersey. With the exception of minor alterations—including bolder pinstripes in the forties—the Yankee uniform has remained unchanged for more than 60 years and has, of course, grown into another of the team's great traditions.

#### YANKEES WERE FIRST TO MAKE UNIFORM NUMBERS PERMANENT

In 1929, the New York Yankees became the first team to make numbers a permanent part of the uniform. Other teams quickly adopted the idea and, by 1932, uniform numbers became standard for all teams. The initial distribution of numbers to the Yankees' roster was made according to the player's position in the batting order. Therefore, in 1929, leadoff hitter Earle Combs wore #1, Mark Koenig #2, Babe Ruth #3, Lou Gehrig #4, Bob Meusel #5, Tony Lazzeri #6, Leo Durocher #7, Johnny Grabowski #8, Benny Bengough #9, Bill Dickey #10 (Grabowski, Bengough and Dickey shared the catching duties).

#### YANKEE STADIUM'S MONUMENT PARK

Since 1932, the New York Yankees have honored their all-time greats with the erection of monuments and plaques in the outfield section of Yankee Stadium.

On May 30, 1932, the first monument was dedicated to the memory of Miller Huggins, who died suddenly in 1929. The diminutive manager guided the Yankees to six American-League pennants and three World Championships in his 11-plus seasons.

The first plaque was placed on the center-field wall in April 1940, a tribute to Jacob Ruppert, the former owner who built Yankee Stadium and brought the tradition of winning to the Yankees.

Two more monuments followed in 1941 for Lou Gehrig and in 1949 for slugger Babe Ruth. Later plaques were placed in center field for General Manager Edward Barrow (1954) and the Yankees' two great center fielders, Joe DiMaggio and Mickey Mantle (1969). After his death, Mantle's plaque was removed and replaced by a fourth monument in his honor on August 25, 1996. On April 25, 1999, DiMaggio--who passed away less than two months earlier--was honored with the Stadium's fifth monument. (The two plaques which once honored DiMaggio and Mantle--before being replaced by monu-

ments--were donated by the Yankees to the Yogi Berra Museum and Learning Center in Montclair, NJ).

Originally, the monuments and plaques were part of the playing field. The monuments and flag pole were located in straight-away center field on the warning track about 10 feet in front of the wall. Sometimes long hits and fly balls forced.

fielders to go through or behind the monuments to retrieve the long drives.

As much of a tradition as the monuments and plaques themselves was the policy of allowing fans to exit Yankee Stadium through the center-field gates via the warning track, pausing and reflecting on the achievements of these great men. When Yankee Stadium was closed for renovations in 1974 and 1975, the monuments and plaques were relocated to an area off the field between the Yankee and visiting bullpens. However, fans were not allowed to exit via the warning track and viewing of Monument Park was only allowed at a great distance.

In 1976, two more plaques were added to memorialize managers Joe McCarthy and Casey Stengel. In the 1980's, plaques were dedicated to Yankee greats Thurman Munson (1980), Roger Maris and Elston Howard (1984), Phil Rizzuto (1985), Billy Martin (1986), Lefty Gomez and Whitey Ford (1987), Yogi Berra and Bill Dickey (1988), and Allie Reynolds (1989). Two recent plaques were dedicated for non-uniformed Yankee legends: the "Voice of the Yankees," Mel Allen, on July 25, 1998; and the "Voice of Yankee Stadium," public-address announcer Bob Sheppard, on May 7, 2000. Reggie Jackson (2002) and Ron Guidry (2003) are the most-recent Yankee greats to be honored with plaques in Monument Park.

Plaques commemorating the visits of Pope Paul VI in 1965 and Pope John Paul II in 1979 were dedicated by the

Knights of Columbus.

In 1985, after the left-center-field fence was moved in, the Yankees were able to open the Monument Park area for fan viewing. Long lines and increased fan interest caused the Yankees to move the fence in further in 1988 and expand the Monument Park area. The Yankees have included a special walkway honoring those Yankees who have their uniform numbers retired.

In a pregame ceremony on September 11, 2002, the Yankees dedicated a monument in remembrance of the victims and heroes of the 9/11 tragedy. It was the sixth monument dedicated in Yankee Stadium and the first to non-Yankee personnel.

# BOB SHEPPARD "THE VOICE OF YANKEE STADIUM"

As synonymous with Yankee Stadium as the copper facade and Monument Park, Bob Sheppard enters his 54th season as the public address announcer in 2004.

The legendary "Voice of Yankee Stadium," who has also been dubbed the "Voice of God" by generations of admiring players and fans, began his tenure with the Yankees on April 17, 1951 with Joe DiMaggio and Mickey Mantle sharing the outfield on Opening Day for the only time in their careers.

Sheppard's incredible career behind the mike actually started when he volunteered his services for a charity football game in Freeport, Long Island in the late 1940's. A former collegiate and semi-pro athlete who was then working as a high-school speech teacher, Sheppard's background certainly made him a natural for the public-address role as did his love of sports.

An executive from the Brooklyn Dodgers football team of the All-America Conference was at the game, liked

Sheppard's style ("clear, concise and correct") and hired him. The football Dodgers folded after only one season at Ebbets Field (1948), but one of their opponents—the New York Yankees—heard Sheppard's booming voice and offered their PA job at Yankee Stadium. Baseball's Yankees then heard him and offered him the same role for them for the 1950 season. But Sheppard's teaching schedule could not accommodate the 77-game home schedule for baseball (plus World Series games) and he turned down the offer.

"You must remember that in those days there were a lot of afternoon games," Sheppard said. "It was just not possible to do both things."

But the Yankees were persistent and again offered the PA job to Sheppard for the 1951 season with one attractive addition. The Yankees would allow Sheppard to hire a replacement for any games he would have to miss. And the rest, as they say, is history.

"A temporary job," Sheppard said, "that has lasted a half century."

And in the 53 years since Sheppard announced his first lineups, few things in sports have changed as little as Sheppard's distinctive voice and style.

"My style has not changed at all," Sheppard said. "This is how I speak. I speak the same way at home, in the classroom and at church where I'm a lector. I don't change it in the announcer's booth."

Sheppard's unique style has not been limited to Yankee games. In addition to more than 4,200 baseball games (including an incredible 101 post-season contests), Sheppard has also been the public-address voice for the football Giants since their move to Yankee Stadium in 1956.

Among the events he lists as the most-memorable of his incredible career are: Don Larsen's perfect game in Game Five

of the 1956 World Series on October 8, 1956; Roger Maris' 61st home run on October 1, 1961; Reggie Jackson's three home runs in Game Six of the 1977 World Series on October 18, 1977; and the Giants-Colts overtime NFL Championship Game on December 28, 1958.

Sheppard has also served the New York Titans of the American Football League at the Polo Grounds, the New York Stars of the World Football League at Downing Stadium as well as the New York Cosmos (soccer) and St. John's University basketball and football games. Sheppard also handled the PA duties for five Army-Navy games in Philadelphia.

Two events at Yankee Stadium in which Sheppard would have enjoyed being a part were the two Papal Masses in 1965 and 1979. "I offered my services," Sheppard said, "but they were declined."

Over the years—in his dual role as PA Announcer for the Yankees and Giants—the eloquent linguist has also written and delivered hundreds of moving tributes and eulogies to departed legends ranging from Mickey Mantle and Joe DiMaggio to those lost in the attacks of September 11, 2001.

In 1998, Sheppard was presented with the prestigious William J. Slocum "Long and Meritorious Service" award by the New York chapter of the BBWAA as well as the "Pride of the Yankees" award by the ball club. He was even honored with a ceremonial first pitch before Game Two of the 1998 World Series at

Yankee Stadium (he recorded his own introduction). And, during his 50th season as the Yankees' PA announcer in 2000, he presented his most-recent Yankee-Stadium microphone to the Baseball Hall of Fame during induction ceremonies in Cooperstown, NY. The native New Yorker has also been elected to the St. John's University Sports Hall of Fame, the Long Island Sports Hall of Fame and the New York Sports Hall of Fame. He has been awarded honorary doctorates from St. John's University (Pedagogy) and Fordham University (Rhetoric).

In one of the game's truly memorable moments, Sheppard introduced President George W. Bush before Game Three of the 2001 World Series (on October 30) as Mr. Bush became the first sitting President to throw out a ceremonial first pitch at Yankee Stadium.

"Mickey Mantle was the perfect name. Both names starting with the same letter. I just loved announcing his name. And one day, shortly before he died, we were both being interviewed on a television program. All of a sudden, he turned to me and said—right there on the air—that every time he heard me announce his name, he got goose bumps. And I felt the same way about announcing him."

Sheppard has also made cameo appearances in numerous motions picture and television shows, including 61\*, It's My Turn, It Could Happen to You, Anger Management, Seinfeld and Mad About You.

Not bad for a part-time job.

"Most men go to work, but I go to a game," Sheppard said. "How many men would love to do that?" Sheppard resides on Long Island with his wife, Mary. They have four children, four grand children and seven great grand children.

# EDDIE LAYTON Yankee Stadium Organist, 1967-2003



Like Bob Sheppard, Eddie Laytonwho retired after completing his 37th season behind the keyboards in 2003—is synonymous with Yankee Stadium...he joined the Yankee family in 1967 when team President Michael Burke inaugurated organ music at Yankee Stadium...has also performed hundreds of concerts for the Hammond Organ Company in more than 700 cities around the world...writes commercial scores for radio and television and has performed on the "Mighty Wurlitzer" at famed Radio City Music Hall for the past 26 years...also performed at the Music Hall's gala reopening on October 4, 1999 between legendary performers Sting and Billy Crystal...his albums/CDs, including "Ya Gotta Have Heart" (released in 1997), have sold

more than three-million copies...prior to coming to the Yankees, Layton wrote musical scores for soap operas, including *Secret Storm*, and was the organist for the New York Knicks and Rangers for 18 years...has made numerous guest appearances on David Letterman's TV shows...is a member of the New York Sports Hall of Fame.

# "THE LITTLE FELLOW WITH THE BIG VOICE"



No one—not even Bob Sheppard himself—remembers who preceded the current Yankee Stadium Public Address Announcer behind the microphone. The last game by this forgotten man would have been 54 years ago, probably the fourth and final game of the 1950 World Series between the Yankees and Philadelphia's "Whiz Kids" Phillies.

But the search for the name of Sheppard's predecessor was not without fruit. Newspaper clippings tucked away at the National Baseball Library in Cooperstown, NY, revealed that the first public address announcer at Yankee Stadium was a man named Jack Lenz, who resided in Washington Heights. Described by the newspaper accounts as the "little fellow with the big voice," Lenz was there when the legendary Stadium opened in 1923 and remained the park's "general announcer" until at least the mid-thirties.

Lenz actually began his career with the New York Giants in 1915 and was later invited to handle the same chore for the Yankees, who shared the Polo Grounds. "I grabbed the offer," Lenz said. "Who wouldn't, with the old Bambino holding forth at the Stadium?"

To do his job, Lenz sat in a box alongside the Yankees' dugout (then on the third-base side of Yankee Stadium) and shouted the batting orders and batteries (each team's pitcher and catcher) as well as the changes throughout the game. Unlike today, players were not announced each time they came to bat as Lenz was called upon only when a change was made.

According to a feature article which appeared in the *New York Evening News* in the early thirties to celebrate a career of more than 2,000 consecutive games, Lenz—the "mild-mannered megaphone man"—would receive the lineups and batting orders from both managers approximately 15 minutes before the start of the game (3:15 p.m. in those days). After telephoning the press box with the "necessary dope," Lenz would pick up his megaphone and shout the batting orders and batteries. He directed his voice first toward the bleachers, then to the upper tiers of the grandstand and again to the lower stands.

Due to the vast size of their new ballpark, the Yankees actually began the 1927 season with two public address announcers to service Yankee Stadium. After the idea proved successful before a crowd of more than 65,000 on Opening Day, the "two-ply announcer system" of Lenz and a man named George Levy was used again for the second game when the crowd was only about 7,000. The experiment was likely short lived.

## JOE GIRARDI

Joe Girardi will make his television debut this season as the newest addition to the YES Network team. (The extent of his role will be determined by the Yankees, as he was signed to a one-year contract as a non-roster player on February 4, 2004.) He will bring his wealth of baseball knowledge and 15-plus years of on-the-field experience to the broadcasting booth in 2004. Girardi will do in-game analysis for the YES Network as well as selected pre/post game analysis in the studio among his 50-plus assignments. His only previous broadcasting experience came in the 2003 playoffs, where Girardi worked as an analyst for ESPN Radio's national coverage of the National League Division Series between the Chicago Cubs and the Atlanta Braves.

The 39-year old Girardi spent four years as a catcher with the New York Yankees and was a part of three World Championships from 1996-1999. In addition to his Yankee Championships, he was the catcher

behind the plate for Dwight Gooden's no-hitter on May 14, 1996 versus Seattle as well as David Cone's perfect game on July 18, 1999 versus Montreal. In 1997, Girardi was the recipient of the New York "Good Guy" Award, presented by the New York BBWAA. A teammate of fellow YES Network broadcaster Paul O'Neill, Girardi owns a .267 career batting average over 15 Major-League seasons with four different teams. After leaving the Yankees, he joined the Chicago Cubs and was named to the National League All-Star team in 2000.

Girardi lives in Chicago, IL with his wife, Kim and his two children, Serena and Dante,



# FRED HICKMAN

Fred Hickman is the studio anchor and host for YES Network. He will anchor the Yankees hour-long pregame show and a post-game report. One of CNN Sports originals, he was a senior anchor on CNN/Sports Illustrated and co-anchored CNN's Sports Tonight with Vince Cellini. He joined the CNN team in 1980.

Hickman previously anchored TBS Superstation's Wednesday night NBA Studio show in 1995; Turner Sports' coverage of the Goodwill Games in 1986, 1990 and 1994; TNT's studio show for the 1984 Winter Olympics from Lillehammer, Norway; and the 1992 Winter Olympics—cable television's first Olympics.

Hickman began his career in 1977 at WLWW-AM in Cedar Rapids, IA, where he was a news anchor. He then moved to WFBM-AM in Springfield, IL. Before joining CNN, he was sports director and anchor at Springfield's television station, WICS. Hickman spent three years away from CNN from 1984-86 at

WDIV-TV in Detroit, MI, as sports anchor. Hickman won CableACEs (award for Cable Excellence) for best sports host in 1993 and 1994 and was nominated for the award in 1991 and 1992.

Hickman attended Coe College in Cedar Rapids, IA, and lives in Scarsdale, NY with his family.



# JIM KAAT

Former Major League Baseball pitcher Jim Kaat is the Yankees' Game Analyst for the YES Network and WCBS-TV. Kaat has established himself over the past 20-years as one of the most well respected analysts in the business.

In 1995, while at the MSG Network, Kaat was nominated for a New York Emmy award in the "On Camera Achievement" category. In 1996, and 1998 respectively, he was on the team that won New York Emmy Awards for "Outstanding Live Sports Coverage-Single Program" for coverage of Dwight Gooden's no hitter and David Wells' perfect game. In 1998, MSG's Yankee telecasts also won the New York Emmy for "Outstanding Live Sports Coverage Series- Professional".

Kaat also provided pre-game insights on the "Yankees Score Card," a half-hour pre-game show that aired prior to most MSG Network telecasts. In 1995, he also called the Yankees/Mariners playoff series for the Baseball Network and ABC Sports.

Previously, he spent one year as the chief analyst on ESPN's "Baseball Tonight." He also served as the primary analyst for CBS Sports when they held the rights to Major League Baseball from 1989-93.

During the strike season of 1981, Kaat began his baseball broadcasting career as an analyst working for the Home Team Sports Network, covering minor league games before resuming his playing career for two more seasons. In 1984 and 1985, Kaat was the chief correspondent for ABC's "Good Morning America," and covered the World Series. During the 1986 season, he was the analyst and play by play announcer for WPIX-TV, covering 100 New York Yankees games.

The following year, he handled a variety of analyst duties with WTBS (in Atlanta), ESPN and NBC Sports. While in Atlanta, he also did play by play and analyst work for WSB-AM radio. In 1988, Kaat covered Olympic baseball on NBC and handled spring training feature sports, the college World Series and the Major League Playoffs and World Series for ESPN. During the same season, Kaat was the primary analyst for 75 Minnesota Twins' games on the CBS affiliate WCCO-TV before moving to CBS Sports.

Kaat, who has served as the President of the Major League Baseball Players Alumni Association, pitched professionally (1957-83). He reached the big leagues in 1959 with the Washington Senators and went on to play for the Minnesota Twins, Chicago White Sox, Philadelphia Phillies, New York Yankees and the St. Louis Cardinals. Kaat was a member of six divisional champions, two pennant winners and the 1982 World Champion St. Louis Cardinals.

An avid golfer and fan of horse racing, Kaat lives with his wife MaryAnn in Stuart, FL. He has four children, Jim Jr., Jill, Stacey and Drew.



## MICHAEL KAY

Play-by-Play Announcer for the YES Network and WCBS-TV, Michael Kay immerses himself in all things New York in order to provide his listeners and viewers with original opinions and the most exclusive, up-to-the-minute Yankees information. Additionally, he is the Host of YES' CenterStage, an interview show with the superstars of sports and entertainment.

Before joining the YES Network, Kay worked at the MSG Network since 1989 as a Yankees reporter. In 1992, he added the assignment of Knicks locker room reporter to his responsibilities and continued in that role until the 1998-99 season.

In addition to his television work, the Bronx, NY native has worked as Yankees analyst on WABC Radio since 1992, teaming with John Sterling. Kay was a winner with Bob Goldscholl (WBBR) for "Best Sports Reporter" at the 2000 New York Metro Achievement in Radio Awards, After the Yankees

World Series victories in 1996, 1998, and 2000, Kay and radio partner Sterling were asked by New York City Mayor Rudy Giuliani to host the post parade victory celebration at City Hall.

Shortly after graduating from Fordham University in 1982 with a BA in Communications, Kay became one of the hot sports reporters in New York City with a style that combined great reporting skills with quality writing. While at Fordham, he honed his skills working for the school newspaper and radio station, working at SportsPhone and as the public address announcer for the New York Pro Summer Basketball League.

In 1982, Kay landed a job as general assignment writer for the *New York Post*. Two years later he began covering College Basketball (1984-85) and then the New Jersey Nets, who he covered for two seasons before becoming the newspaper's general basketball writer. In 1987, he was moved to baseball, serving as the Yankees "beat reporter." While he was in that position, he got his first television job with MSG Network as host of the "Hot Stove League" segment of MSGs "SportsNight."

Kay moved from the *Post* to the *New York Daily News* in 1989, still covering the Yankees, and served in that capacity until 1992. In October 1991, he broke the story of Buck Showalter's hiring for the News. Four years later for MSG, he tracked Yankees managerial contract developments from the time Showalter started talking about returning to his eventual signing with the Arizona Diamondbacks.

Kay hosted a sports talk show for WABC Radio from 1992-93. He rejoined the Daily News to pen "The Kay Korner" in 1993.

A classmate of Knicks TV play-by-play man Mike Breen at Fordham, Kay was given the Dick Young award for Excellence in Sports Media by the New York Pro Baseball Scouts in 1995. He was also a part of the Yankees/MSG Production team that was nominated for New York Emmy Awards for six consecutive years. In 1998, he was on the MSG team that won for "Outstanding Live Sports Coverage- Series." In 1996 and 1997 he was a member of the MSG team that won New York Emmys for "Outstanding Live Sports Coverage- Single Program" for Dwight Gooden's no-hitter and "The Battle for New York: Yankees vs. Mets." Kay is single and resides in Hartsdale, NY.



#### BOBBY MURCER

Bobby Murcer is the Pre- and Post-Game Host for Yankees games on the YES Network. Murcer symbolizes the tradition and history of the New York Yankees. For five decades, he has continued to exude class, charisma and professionalism both on and off the playing field.

Over a 17-year career, Murcer played in 1,908 games, hitting .277 with 252 HR and 1,043 RBI. He joined Lou Gehrig, John Blanchard and Mickey Mantle as the only Yankees to hit home runs in four consecutive at bats. He appeared in the 1980 and '81 American League Championship Series and the 1981 World Series. A five-time All-Star (1971-75), Murcer is known to fans as a teammate of the late Thurman Munson, hitting-great Lou Piniella and Graig Nettles. He is also the only player to have played alongside both Mickey Mantle and Don Mattingly.

In 1983, Bobby traded his glove and bat for a microphone and began broadcasting Yankees baseball, serving as color analyst for WABC-Radio until 1985. After serving a season as Assistant GM for the Yankees, he returned to the booth as color analyst on SportsChannel New York. In 1989, the first year Yankee games appeared on MSG, Murcer served as color commentator along side Tommy Hutton. In 1990, he joined the WPIX broadcast team and served in that capacity though the end of the 1998 season.

Murcer resides in Oklahoma City, OK, the town he grew up in, with his wife Kay. They have two children, Tori and Todd.



# PAUL O'NEILL

Paul O'Neil returns for a third consecutive season in broadcast television in 2004, serving as a Preand Post-Game analyst for the YES Network. The gritty and revered five-time All-Star outfielder played 17-years in the Major Leagues, spending his final nine seasons in pinstripes. O'Neill was a pillar in the Yankees' run to four World Championships, his passionate play embodying a team-first formula that lead to unequaled success.

Affectionately known as 'a warrior' to most Yankee followers, O'Neill began his ML career in 1985 with the Cincinnati Reds, earning the first of his five World-Series Championships in 1990. He joined the Yankees in 1993 after eight seasons with the Reds, and in 1994 claimed the American-League Batting Championship with a .359 average.

In 2001—at the age of 38—O'Neill became the oldest player in Major-League history to steal 20 bases and hit 20 home runs in the same season. He lives in native Cincinnati, OH with his wife Nevalee and their three children: Andrew, Aaron and Alexandra.



# KEN SINGLETON

Game Analyst for the YES Network, veteran analyst Ken Singleton had a 15-year Major-League career as an outfielder and designated hitter. Known in the field as a consistent power hitter, he has proven to be equally as reliable since joining the radio and television broadcast booths.

Previously, Singleton divided his time calling play-by-play and providing commentary at the MSG Network. In 1998, he was part of MSG's production team that won four New York Emmys for its Yankees coverage.

He joined MSG Network in 1997 from The Sports Network (TSN), where he served as an analyst for the Montreal Expos (1985-96). From 1991-96, he also called play-by-play and served as analyst for CIOC Radio, the Expos' flagship radio network. In 1996 and 1997, he was named by FOX Sports as a lead analyst for Saturday afternoon baseball broadcasts. In 1997 and 1998, he worked as an analyst for MLB International.

Born in Manhattan and raised in Mount Vernon, NY, Singleton has fond memories of visiting Ebbets field, seeing Willie Mays play at the Polo Grounds, sitting in the bleachers at Yankee Stadium for Roger Maris' 47th home run in 1961 and listening to Red Barber announce Brooklyn Dodger games.

Singleton played both baseball and basketball in high school and played baseball in the Bronx Federation League at McCombs Dam Park right across from Yankee Stadium. After receiving a scholarship to play basketball at Hofstra University, and playing both sports for one year, Singleton was drafted by the Mets.

In April 1972, he was traded to the Expos with Mike Jorgenson and Tim Foli for Rusty Staub. It was in Montreal that he had his first of many productive seasons, hitting 23 HR with 103 RBI (fifth in the NL), 100 R, 123 walks (one behind the NL leader), and a .302 batting average. In 1974, he was traded to the Orioles with Mike Torrez for Dave McNally and two others.

In Baltimore, Singleton established himself as a true offensive asset. His .328 batting average in 1977 was the third best in the AL, and is still an Orioles record, which he currently shares with Roberto Alomar. His .438 on base percentage (in 1977), 118 walks (in 1975), and 35 switch-hit home runs (in 1979) are still Orioles records.

Singleton is one of only six players in ML history to hit 35 or more switch-hit homers in a season. He also ranks in the Orioles' top 10 All-Time in most offensive categories, including HR, RBI and batting average. During his career, Singleton was named to the AL All-Star Team in 1977, 79 and 81. He was named Most Valuable Oriole in 1975, 77 and 79.

Retiring after the 1984 season as a three-time All-Star with a 1983 World Championship ring and 15 years as a high caliber player, he continued his association with the game by becoming a broadcaster.

Singleton, who enjoys golf and reading historical novels, lives with his wife Suzanne in Sparks, MD and has three sons and a daughter. He is the first cousin of former Knicks player Doc Rivers.



# **SUZYN WALDMAN**

An award winning journalist and sports commentator, Suzyn Waldman, is the Pre- and Post-Game Analyst for the YES Network. Waldman has spent the greater part of two decades overcoming all the obstacles that go along with being a female sports broadcaster, and has risen to the top of her profession.

In 1987, Waldman became the first voice heard on WFAN, the first All-Sports Radio station in the country, and was a mainstay on that station for almost 15 years, creating the job of the radio beat reporter, covering both the New York Yankees and New York Knicks. Her news breaking reports, exclusive interviews and always original and controversial opinions won her countless journalism awards, including the International Radio Award in for her live and emotional reporting from the upper deck of Candlestick Park during the 1989 San Francisco earthquake, the 1996 NY Sportscaster of the Year,

by The National Sportscasters and Sportswriters the American Women in Radio and TV's Star Award for Radio in 1999. Waldman became a popular talk show host at WFAN and co-hosted the coveted midday slot until leaving WFAN to join the YES Network.

The word "first" invariably precedes the name of Suzyn Waldman in every facet of her television and radio career. The first woman to work on a nationally televised baseball broadcast, Waldman added another first, being the first woman to provide play-by-play for a Major League team, when she started broadcasting New York Yankees games for WPIX, MSG Network and WNYW/FOX5 in the mid 90s. The first and only woman ever to host an NBA pre- and post-game show, working in that capacity for the NY Knicks on WFAN, Waldman provided play-by-play for the WNBA on Lifetime TV and was an analyst on St John's Basketball games for MSG and WFAN.

She has been honored by countless organizations, including the Thurman Munson Foundation, the March of Dimes, the B'nai B'rith, the Jimmy Fund of Boston, the NY Baseball Scouts and the US Federal Women's Program for her contributions as a role model and a pioneer in Women's Sportscasting. She is a tireless speaker at schools on the subject of following your dreams and at Cancer Centers around the country to give support to women going through what she survived in 1996, how to continue to live your life, while undergoing treatment for breast cancer.

Waldman's life and struggles have been the subject of hundreds of magazine and newspaper articles, and chapters in books, including the "MacMillan Book of Baseball Stories," "You Go Girl" and "That's Outside My Boat" both by Charlie Jones and Kim Doran. She has been profiled on the Today Show, CBS Evening News with Dan Rather, ABC's 20/20 and NBC's Dateline.

A native Bostonian, with a degree in Economics from Boston's prestigious Simmons College, Suzyn spent 15 years on the Broadway Musical Stage, and is proudest of her two years starring opposite Richard Kiley in MAN OF LA MANCHA. She was a mainstay on the NY nite club circuit in it's heyday in the 1970's, and now lives in Westchester with her German Shephards, Kiley and A.J.

# JOHN STERLING

"Yankees win! Theeeeeee Yankees win!"

If anything has become synonymous with the Yankees' run of success over recent years, it is John Sterling's memorable conclusion to so many Yankee victories. And as the radio voice to 162 games a year, plus pre-season and post-season, he has called more than 2400 games over the last 15 seasons, without missing a one, making him one of the most recognized – and imitated voices – in all of New York sports.

Sterling joined the Yankees broadcast team in 1989 from Atlanta's TBS and WSB Radio, where he called Hawks basketball (1981-89) and Braves games (1982-87), but for John, it was really a return to the town where he first achieved fame, hosting a talk show on WMCA from 1971-78, and calling the Nets (1975-80, and as a fill-in, in 1997) and Islanders (1975-78) for WMCA, WVNJ, WOR-TV and SportsChannel.

John has also broadcast Morgan State Football (8 years), and did Washington Bullets basketball in 1981. In addition to his seven years at WMCA and a year at WSB in Atlanta, he has also hosted talk shows on WFAN, and WABC in New York. He has not missed a broadcast since the fall of '81.

As the host of the YES Network's acclaimed "Yankeeography" series, Sterling won two Emmy awards in 2003. He has also been honored by the New Jersey Sportswriters Association with its Radio-TV Excellence award (1999), and was the winner of the 2001 Whitney Radio Jimmy Cannon Award. In addition, his call of a Jason Giambi home run on WCBS radio in 2002 was voted the "best baseball call" of the year in a poll conducted by MLB.com.

When he's not in the booth, Sterling also serves as a master of ceremonies on the field for major Yankee events. He is also well known for his MC work at City Hall, with his longtime radio partner Michael Kay, at "Key to the City" ceremonies following Yankee World Series victories.

Sterling enjoys attending Broadway shows and boasts an extensive knowledge of the lyrics to many American pop standards. For the past eight years, he has been a spokesman for the Leukemia Society of America. He enjoys reading, movies and swimming. He lives in Bergen County, N.J., with his wife Jennifer, their daughter Abigail, and their triplets, Veronica, Bradford and Derek.



# **CHARLEY STEINER**

2004 marks Charley Steiner's third striaght season in the WCBS-AM radio Yankees'broadcast booth with John Sterling. In addition to Steiner's on-air duties, he also hosts occasional specials for the YES network.

Before joining the Yankees' broadcast team, Steiner spent 14 years at ESPN, where he anchored the 6 p.m. Monday-Friday SportsCenter, was the play-by-play voice of Major League Baseball on ESPN Radio, announced Big-10 and SEC College Football and was the boxing analyst for the network during his time there.

Steiner won two Emmy's, a cable ACE and a Clarion award for his work at ESPN. In addition, Steiner had a role in the movie America's Sweethearts, appeared on the HBO series Arli\$\$, in a Hootie and the Blowfish music video and in more than a dozen SportsCenter promos.

Steiner began his professional broadcasting career in 1969 at WIRL Radio in Peoria, Illinois as a newscaster. After a nine-month stint at KSTT Radio in Davenport, Iowa, Steiner moved to Connecticut, where he served as News Director at WAVZ radio in New Haven and later at WPOP radio in Hartford.

After a year and a half in Cleveland working at WERE radio and WKYC television as a sportscaster, Steiner moved home to New York, where he worked at WXLO and for seven years served as the morning sportscaster on the Rambling with Gambling show on WOR radio.

In addition, Steiner called the play-by-play for the USFL New Jersey Generals and later for the New York Jets on WABC radio. He won the UPI Best Radio Sportscaster award for New York, New Jersey and Connecticut in 1981, 1983 and 1985, and the New York State Broadcasters Award for best radio play-by-play in 1983, 1984 and 1987, before moving to ESPN.

Steiner is a 1971 graduate of Bradley University, where he was inducted into the Peoria, Illinois' school Hall of Fame of 1995.







# NEW YORK YANKEES FAN GUIDE TO YANKEE STADIUM

### m Prohibited Items

The following items are not permitted into Yankee Stadium: bottles, cans, collers or containers,

briefcases, attaché bags or any type of large bag, noise makers or laser pointers. The New York Yankees will not store any of the aforementioned. All bags should be left at home/work. Signs are posted at each gate and in parking lots to inform guests of this policy. If any of these items are discovered in the Stadium, they will be disposed of in the nearest trash receptacle. This will be in effect for the duration of the 2004 season.

# Banners and signs

- The following rules apply to the display of these items: 1. They may not be hung in fair territory or any part of the playing field or as to obstruct the view of fans or Stadium signage.
- 2. They may only be held up in, or paraded through, the general seating area between innings.
- 3. The use of weights of any kind to keep a banner or sign in place is strictly prohibited.

NOTE: If any banner or sign interferes with the sight line of the players, the umpires may request its removal.

# Monument Park

Contains historic monuments and plaques dedicated to former Yankee greats such as Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig, Mickey Mantle and Joe DiMaggio. Park is open from the time the gates open until 45 minutes prior to the game. Access the park via staircase at the end of the aisles between Field and Main Level Section 36. The park is closed between doubleheaders and during inclement weather.
