The Babe Hits 100

T*o the very end, George Herman Ruth cradled the world in the palm of his hand. With a playful wink and a sultry swing, the immortal Babe enraptured the hearts of many, and an icon was born. In celebrating the 100th anniversary of the esteemed slugger's birthday, memories of his legacy are rekindled, and with it, a legend continues.*

He was born 100 years ago. He made his major league debut 81 years ago as a pitcher with the Boston Red Sox. He hit his last home run 60 years ago. He died 47 years ago.

Census figures reveal that more than 50 percent of the people living in the United States today were not born when he died. More than 70 percent were not born when he played his last baseball game. Children whose fathers were not alive when he died know his name. Across the length and breadth of this nation, there is hardly a person alive, man or woman, adult or child, black or white, rich or poor, educated or illiterate, industrialist or factory worker, lawyer or laborer, financier or farmer, who does not know his name. He is the greatest American sports hero. He is Babe Ruth. He is baseball. And it will ever be.

His name lives on, and it will continue to live on forever. It is part of the language. Prodigious home runs are described, matter-of-factly, as Ruthian blasts. The Stadium where he enjoyed his greatest success is endearingly called, "The House That Ruth Built." Young men everywhere, big, burly and strong, and with the ability to hit a baseball great distances, are invariably nicknamed, "Babe."

He was part of a majestic era, a golden era of sports, at a time when the names were magic, bigger than life. Dempsey. Grange. Jones. Tilden. Longden. His was the biggest name of all. He was the greatest hero of them all. He hit the most, and the longest, home runs, ate the most hot dogs, drank the most beer, had the flashiest cars, was seen with the most dazzling women, wore the most fashionable clothes, had the most prodigious appetite, the heartiest laugh, the most booming voice, the biggest belly, and the skinniest legs. And he saved baseball.

When the game needed a hero, a savior, George Herman Ruth, the

Babe, stepped in to accept the role, capturing the imagination of a public that had become suspicious, that had grown disillusioned, that felt betrayed. Babe Ruth was the right man at the right time. He was the only man who could save baseball, who could capture the fancy of a skeptical American public, who could restore faith in the game. Who is to say we would still have baseball as we know it now if not for Babe Ruth? The years go by, the game has expanded and flourished, the Babe retired, then, ravaged by cancer, he died. Another generation came along. There are new sports heroes, new baseball stars. But Babe Ruth remains the first name of the game, as big as ever. Bigger. As sports memorabilia dealer Alan Rosen said, he is number one, he always was and he always will be. There will never be another number one.

Why?

"Why?" Rosen repeated incredulously. "Because he's the Bambino. He's Babe Ruth. He's an American hero. He's larger than life. He's like Tiffany."

With each passing decade, the legend grows.

Did he really point to a spot in the far reaches of Wrigley Field where he intended to hit Charlie Root's next pitch in the 1932 World Series, and then hit the ball right in that spot?

Was it really the world's most famous belly ache that caused him to miss almost half of the 1925 season?

Did he really promise a hospitalized boy named Johnny Sylvester that he would hit a home run in the 1926 World Series, then make good on that promise?

Did he really say, "Why not, I had a better year than he did," when he was told his 1930 salary of \$80,000 was more than President Herbert Hoover earned?

Did he really say upon meeting President Warren G. Harding one brutally hot summer afternoon, "Hot as hell, ain't it, Prez?"

Did he really say to the famous French war hero, Field Marshall Foch, "I suppose you were in the war?"

Did the Yankees really install a telephone in their clubhouse exclusively for his use?

These are the stories, handed down from year to year, decade to decade, generation to generation; stories that enhance the Ruth legend, and we don't want to hear that they are apocryphal. We prefer to believe they are true.

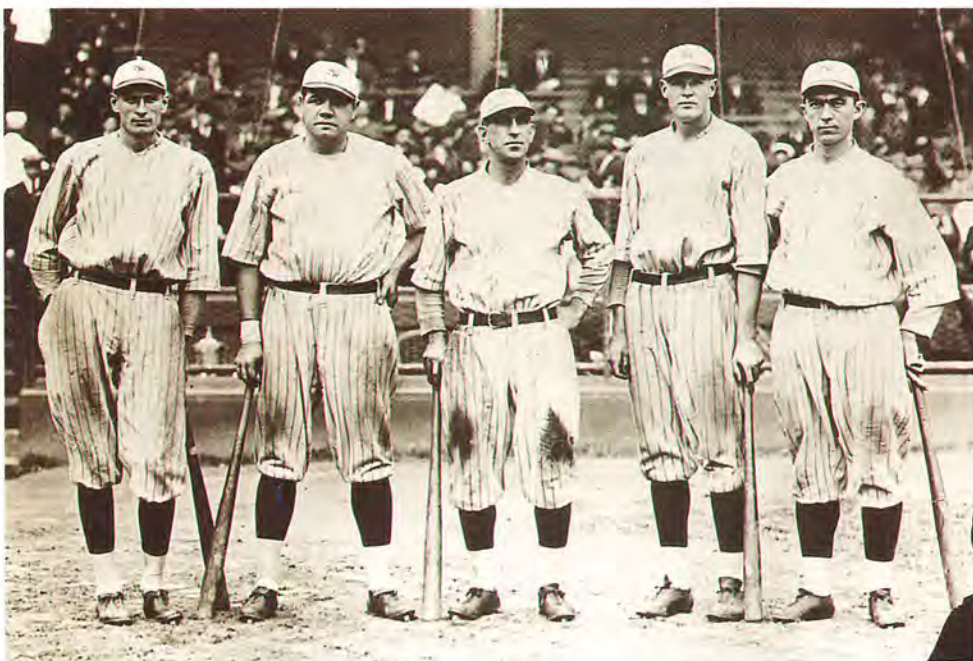
The stories we know to be true, the ones that are well-documented, are legendary in themselves; that in 1920, the New York Yankees paid the Boston Red Sox the unheard of sum of \$100,000 to purchase his contract; that his popularity was so immense, the Yankees were evicted from tenancy in the Polo Grounds and forced to build their own ballpark across the river in the Bronx; that, most fittingly, he hit the first home run ever in Yankee Stadium and the first home run ever in an All-Star Game; that his skill was so awesome as a pitcher, he beat the Yankees 17 times in 22 decisions, set a World Series record of 29.2 consecutive scoreless innings and won two games the last time the Boston Red Sox won a world championship, 77 years ago this fall.

He came out of Baltimore, MD, the son of a saloon keeper, a mischievous youth teetering on the brink of delinquency. Unable to control him, Ruth's father hustled him off to St. Mary's School for Boys, where a perceptive cleric, Brother Mathias, quickly recognized young George's rare ability to hit a baseball. If Babe Ruth would eventually save baseball, baseball saved Ruth from potential tragedy.

He began his professional career with the Baltimore Orioles of the International League and was sold to the Boston Red Sox midway in the 1914 season. Ruth was 19. By 1917, he had won 67 games, including 23 in 1916 and 24 in 1917, had completed 75 of 110 games, including a league-leading 35 in 1917, and pitched 16 shut-outs, including a league-leading

nine in 1916, when he also led the league with a 1.75 earned run average.

"He was already the best lefty in the league," said Ruth's teammate, Harry Hooper. The Babe was all of 22.

But a controversy, and a dilemma, was brewing in Boston. In addition to being the Red Sox best pitcher, Ruth also was their best hitter. In 92 at-bats in 1915, he belted four home runs. The Red Sox as a team hit 14. The American League leader, Braggo Roth, hit seven.

Traditionalists held that a pitcher who could win 24 games or more was infinitely more valuable than any home run hitter, while the new breed, seeing the game change, subscribed to the belief that a home run hitter of Ruth's unique ability was the wave of the future, and worth his weight in left-handed pitchers, even those who could win 24 games a year.

In 1918, a compromise was struck. Ruth pitched in 20 games, winning 13 and losing 7, and played the outfield or first base in 72 others. He hit 11 home runs and tied for the league lead. By 1919, Ruth's days as a pitcher were just about numbered. He pitched only

In danger of losing his beloved Longacre Theater, unable to finance the show, "No, No, Nanette," and facing a \$300,000 mortgage on Fenway Park, Frazee had no choice but to sell his most valuable baseball commodity, Babe Ruth.

In five years under the ownership of Col. Jacob Ruppert and Col. Tillinghast L'Hommedieu Huston, the Yankees had finished fifth, fourth, sixth, fourth and third. Ruppert, especially, was eager to produce a winner and he entered the bidding for the mighty Babe Ruth, ready, willing and able to meet Frazee's price. That price was an astounding \$100,000, twice as much as ever was paid for any player, plus a \$300,000 loan guaranteeing Frazee's mortgage on Fenway Park.

Ruth joined the Yankees for spring training, 1920, and was an

on occasion, winning nine games, but hit the staggering total of 29 home runs, two more than the all-time baseball record that had existed since 1884, 17 more than any other player in the game in either league, more than were hit by 10 entire major league teams and all but four hit by Ruth's Red Sox.

Babe Ruth was the game's greatest star at the age of 24 and in the first year of a three-year contract calling for the princely sum of \$10,000 per season. If 1919 was a great year for Ruth, it was a horrendous one for the owner of the Red Sox, Harry Frazee, whose interest in the Broadway theater far outweighed his interest in baseball.

immediate hit with the sportswriters covering the team, but an immediate bust with the fans as he labored through a terrible spring.

"Spring training don't mean nothing," Ruth bellowed to reporters.

Asked if he thought he could match his 1919 total of 29 home runs, Ruth boldly predicted, "I'll hit 50 this year."

It was an outrageous boast since no team in either league hit 50 home runs the previous season. The Yankees led the major leagues with 45. Ruth's start in a Yankees uniform was hardly auspicious. In the season opener in Philadelphia, he dropped a fly ball that allowed the Athletics to score the two runs

that beat the Yankees. In the home opener a week later, Ruth pulled a rib cage muscle after one at-bat and left the game. He did not hit his first home run as a Yankee until May 1, 1920. After that, they came in bunches.

Ruth finished the season with 10 homers in his final 24 games for the astounding total of 54, 25 more than his major league record. George Sisler of the St. Louis Browns, second in the American League, hit 19 homers. The National League champion, Cy Williams of Philadelphia, hit 15. Babe's 54 home runs were more than any team except the Phillies, who belted 64, and, of course, his Yankees, who crushed the astonishing total of 115 homers.

Playing in the financial, cultural, entertainment and communications capital of the world, Ruth was bigger than ever, easily the most famous, most recognized individual in the United States. His prodigious appetite for the good life and his nocturnal forays in the city that never sleeps soon became legend. When reporters, in constant pursuit of new stories about the prodigious Babe, asked his roommate, Ping Bodie, what it was like to room with the mighty one, Bodie replied, "I don't know. I never see him. I room with his suitcase."

The Ruth persona, his legend and his booming home runs paid immediate dividends for the Colonels Ruppert and Huston. Although their dream of a champi-

onship remained unfulfilled as the Yankees finished third in 1920, Ruth helped them draw a staggering 1,289,422 customers to the Polo Grounds, more than doubling the previous year's attendance.

Despite beating the Yankees in the 1921 and 1922 World Series, the Giants found it a source of embarrassment having the American Leaguers as tenants in the Polo Grounds. Because of Ruth's enormous popularity, the upstart team consistently outdrew the established National Leaguers, a humiliating situation for the landlord. Hostilities between the two teams escalated as Giants manager/owner John McGraw grew increasingly envious of the Yankees' success at the gate. McGraw decided some-

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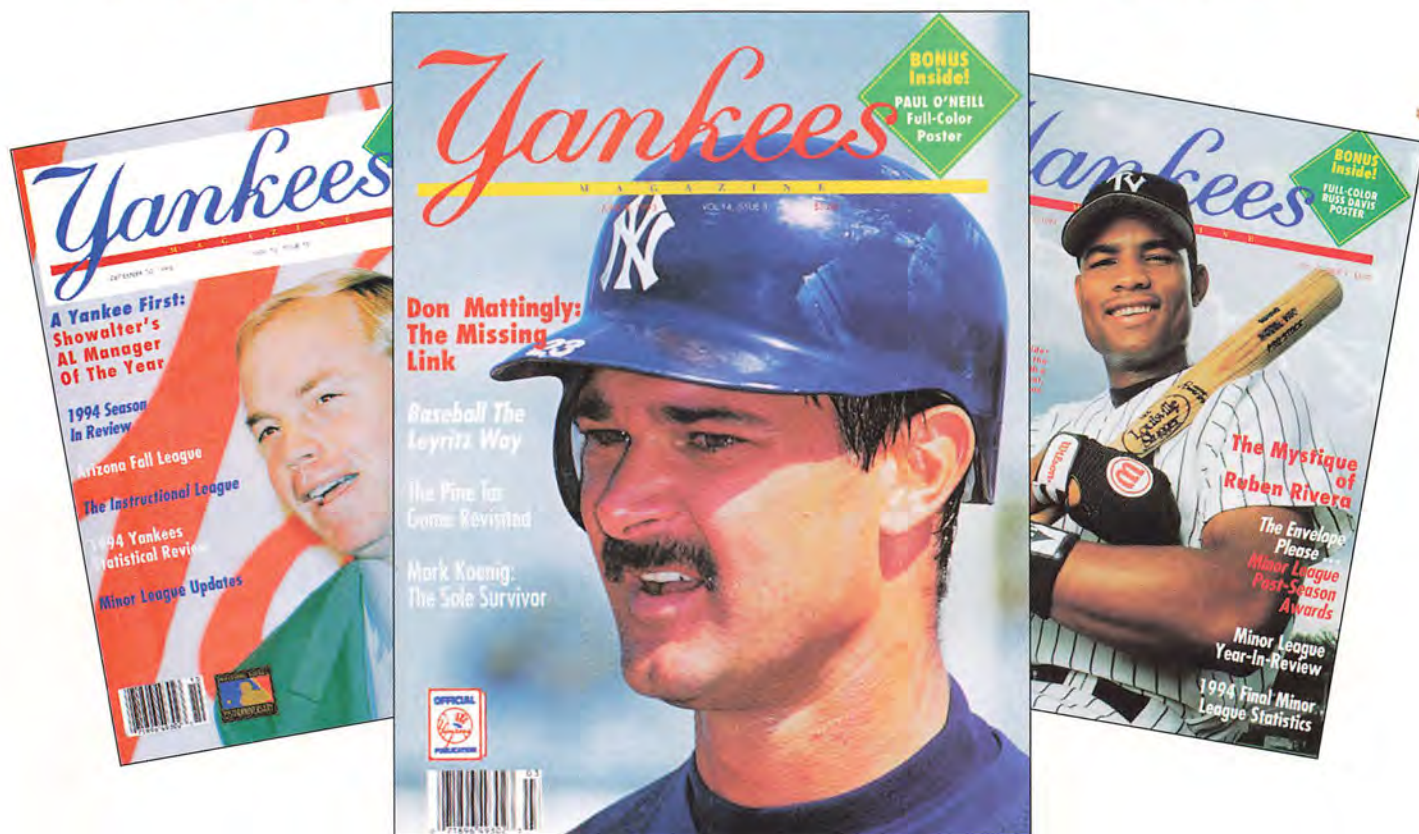

thing had to be done, so he informed the Yankees that their lease would not be renewed following the 1922 season.

With his team in danger of being homeless, Col. Ruppert purchased a 10-acre parcel of swampland in the Bronx for \$1.5 million and construction began on May 5, 1922, on a magnificent new structure. It would be called Yankee Stadium and it would sit just across the Harlem River from the Polo Grounds.

On Wednesday, April 18, 1923, Yankee Stadium opened with New York Gov. Al Smith, New York City Mayor John Hyland, Baseball Commissioner Kenesaw Mountain Landis, police commissioner Richard Enright and bandmaster John Philip Sousa on hand to help dedicate the newest, largest and most modern stadium in baseball.

The official attendance was 74,217, with an additional 15,000 milling around outside, having

been denied admittance. Those inside saw Yankees shortstop Everett Scott play in his 986th consecutive game; they saw Bob Shawkey pitch a three-hitter against the Boston Red Sox; and they saw what they came for, Babe Ruth hit the first home run ever in Yankee Stadium in the third inning, “four base drive into the rightfield bleachers with two mates on that drove the fans into a frenzy,” according to sportswriter James Cruisenberry in the *Daily News* the following day.

The mighty Babe “showed it could be done,” wrote Cruisenberry, “and above all, it probably returned the old-time confidence of the Babe. He hadn’t been going so good on the spring training trips. He was in great condition, but he wasn’t smacking them. The season opened and on the first day — in his second time at-bat — he smacked one as he never smacked before. It was great!”

The Yankees thrived in their new digs, winning the American League pennant by 16 games in their first year in Yankee Stadium and beating their across-the-river rivals, the Giants, in six games to win the first World Championship in the team's history.

In their first 10 years in their new home, the Yankees won five pennants and four World Championships and drew more than one million paying customers six times. Meanwhile, the Babe Ruth legend, on and off the field, grew with every passing year. In the 10 years from 1923 through 1932, Ruth hit 455 home runs, led the league in homers eight times and raised his all-time single season home run record to 60.

So widespread was Ruth's appeal that wherever he went, fans flocked around him for autographs, asked him to pose for pictures with their babies and pleaded with him for special blessings as if he were some faith healer with supernatural powers. After the second game of the 1926 World Series against the St. Louis Cardinals, a fan from Essex Falls, NJ, managed to get word to Ruth that a young boy named Johnny Sylvester, an avid fan of Babe's, lay near death in a hospital. He had undergone a serious operation and apparently had lost his will to live.

The next day, a telegram from the Babe arrived at the boy's bedside. In it, Ruth promised to hit a home run for little Johnny in the game that day. He hit three. Two years later, Johnny Sylvester was the Babe's guest at a game at Yankee Stadium.

By 1932, Ruth was in his 19th major league season, had passed his 37th birthday and had slowed perceptibly. He played in only 133 games, his fewest since 1925, the year of the "Belly Ache." His average skidded to .341, his home runs to 41, his RBI to 137. He had been displaced as the American League's King of Clout by Jimmie Foxx of the Philadelphia Athletics, but Ruth still was a force for a team that won

the pennant by 13 games and met the Chicago Cubs in the World Series.

There was no love lost between players from the Yankees and Cubs over an incident involving Mark Koenig, the beloved shortstop of the '27 Yankees. Koenig, who had been traded by the Yankees to the Tigers in 1930, was picked up by the Cubs in August of 1932 to lend his experience and his defense to the Cubs for their National League pennant run.

Koenig helped the Cubs beat out the Pirates for the National League flag, but was voted only a half share of the pennant and World Series money, a slight that enraged Koenig's old Yankees teammates, Ruth in particular. He called the Cubs cheapskates and they responded with a blistering verbal attack against the Babe throughout the Series, which was one of the most hostile in memory.

The Yankees won the first two games of the Series, then traveled to Chicago, where the ugliness continued as the Chicago fans joined their Cubs in the verbal assault on Ruth.

The score was tied, 4-4, in Game Three when the Yankees came to bat in the fifth. After Joe Sewell grounded out, Ruth came to bat. What happened next has been the subject of much debate, conjecture and interpretation. What is fact is that Ruth took a strike and pointed out to the field, took another strike, pointed again, then hit Charlie Root's next pitch, a change-up, into the centerfield seats.

By pointing, was Ruth saying he was going to hit a home run? Did he call his shot?

Cubs manager Charlie Grimm's version is that Cubs pitcher Guy Bush was needling Ruth from the bench, and the Babe's response was to point to the mound as if to tell Bush, "You'll be out there tomorrow."

Ruth further obfuscated the legend by, at different times, confirming and denying that he had called his home run. During spring training of the following year, Ruth attended a dinner party and one of

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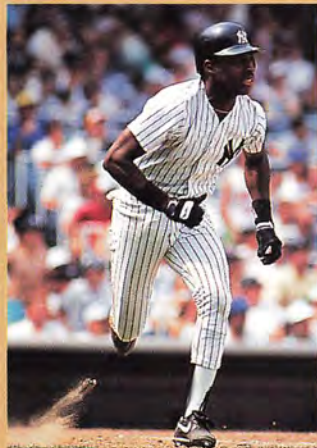

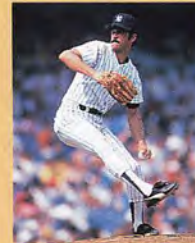
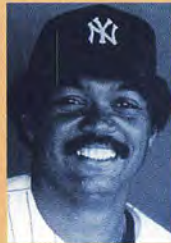
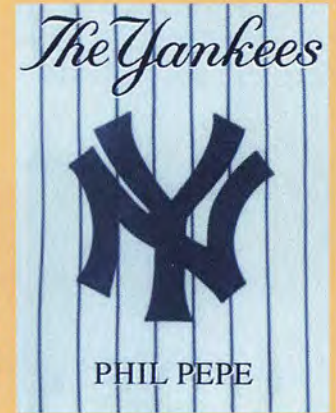
the guests asked him about the "called shot." This, according to sportswriter Grantland Rice, was his response:

"The Cubs had bleeped my old teammate Mark Koenig by cutting him in for only a measly, bleeping half share of the Series money.

Well, I'm riding the bleep out of the Cubs, telling 'em they're the cheapest pack of bleeping crumbums in the world. We've won the first two and now we're in Chicago for the third game. Root is the Cubs' pitcher. I park one into the stands in the first inning off him, but in the fifth,



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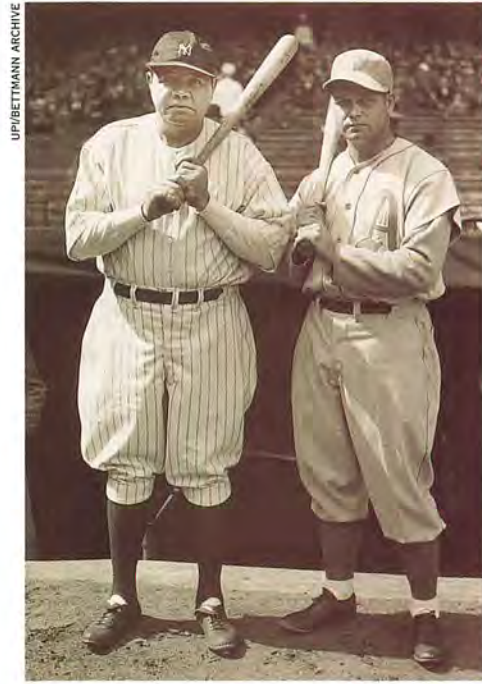

it's tied four to four when I'm up. The Chicago fans are giving me hell. "Root's still in there. He breezes the first two pitches — both strikes. The mob's tearing down Wrigley Field. I shake my fist after that first strike. After the second, I point my bat at these bellerin' bleachers — right where I aim to park the ball. Root throws it and I hit the bleeping ball on the nose, right over the bleepin' fence. "How do you like those apples you bleep, bleep, bleep," I yell at Root as I head towards first. By the time I reach home, I'm almost fallin' down I'm laughin' so hard. And that's how it happened." Ruth's descent after the 1932 season continued rapidly. His home runs slipped from 41 to 34 to 22, until it was painfully obvious his days were numbered. He would live out the remainder of his life in disappointment and frustration.

Ruth had campaigned strongly and vociferously to be named manager of the Yankees, but the opportunity was never presented to him. Instead, he finished up his career as a part-time player for the Boston Bees in 1935, then put in one year as first base coach for the Brooklyn Dodgers. He lived out his life almost as a sideshow freak, playing in barnstorming games, appearing on the stage, playing golf and lamenting the fact he never was given a chance to manage a ball club. On August 16, 1948, ravaged with cancer and looking 20 years older than his 53 years, the great Babe died. His body lay in state in the lobby of Yankee Stadium. More than 80,000 filed past his casket to pay their last respects.

Babe Ruth was dead, but his name would remain immortal. His legend not only endures, it grows bigger. His fame expands with each passing year. Today, he is the greatest baseball hero of all-time. It is why collectors of baseball memorabilia are eager to possess anything of the Babe's they can find. It is why Babe Ruth is the cornerstone of the collection of baseball memorabilia of New Jersey businessman Barry Halper, possessor of the largest private collection extant. It is a collection valued at millions and it started with an autograph.

"I was eight years old and I had no thought of collecting baseball memorabilia," Halper said. "My

father was a Yankees fan and he took me to a ball game one day in 1947. It happened to be Old Timers Day. We were standing outside the Stadium when a car pulled up and Babe Ruth stepped out. I had a zippered notebook. I stuck it in front of him and he signed it. That's the same piece of paper I used to get the autograph of every player who ever hit 500 major league home runs."

From that day, collecting Babe Ruth memorabilia became an obsession with Halper. Included in his collection are Ruth's 1927 World Series ring; uniforms worn by the Babe at St. Mary's School, with the Baltimore Orioles, the Boston Red Sox, the Yankees, the Boston Bees and as a coach with the Dodgers; the purchase order for Ruth's casket; the Babe's 1925 divorce papers; the 1912 yearbook from St. Mary's Industrial School, Baltimore; the papers documenting the sale of Babe Ruth to the Yankees; Ruth's pocket watch; a lock of Babe Ruth's hair; the Babe's monogrammed bathrobe; Ruth's last will and testament; the Babe's spittoon; and Halper's prized possession, the Babe's famous camel's hair coat and matching polo cap.

"People know I'm a fanatic when it comes to Babe Ruth," Halper said. "So they call me and offer me things. I got a call recently from somebody who said he had a baseball signed by the Babe. He wanted \$1,500 for it. I told him, 'What do I need that for? I have 170 of them.'"

Ruth is known to have been extremely generous with his autograph. He signed liberally, everything from scraps of paper to menus to scorecards to baseballs. It has been estimated by collectors that Ruth signed more than one million baseballs in his lifetime. Considering the proliferation of Babe Ruth autographs, it may be somewhat surprising that any item autographed by the Babe commands top dollar.

"You can put Babe Ruth's name on toilet paper and sell it," said

Rosen. "Mention his name and people's eyes light up. Take the 1933 Gowdy baseball card set. Most player's cards in the set sell for from \$15 to \$20. Babe Ruth's card commands \$3,000. It's funny, in my 15 years in this business, I have never seen a ball signed by Lou Gehrig alone. But I must have seen more than 500 signed only by Babe Ruth. People get his name on a baseball and they don't want to desecrate it by getting anyone else

to sign the same ball."

"Everything about him is magnified," said Halper. "He truly is bigger than life. Hank Aaron broke the Babe's home run record, but how many people know that Aaron hit 755 home runs? Everybody knows the Babe hit 714 home runs. Did you know that the 1927 Yankees, the greatest team of all-time, won 110 games and lost 44? And do you know what that computes to? A winning percentage of .714."

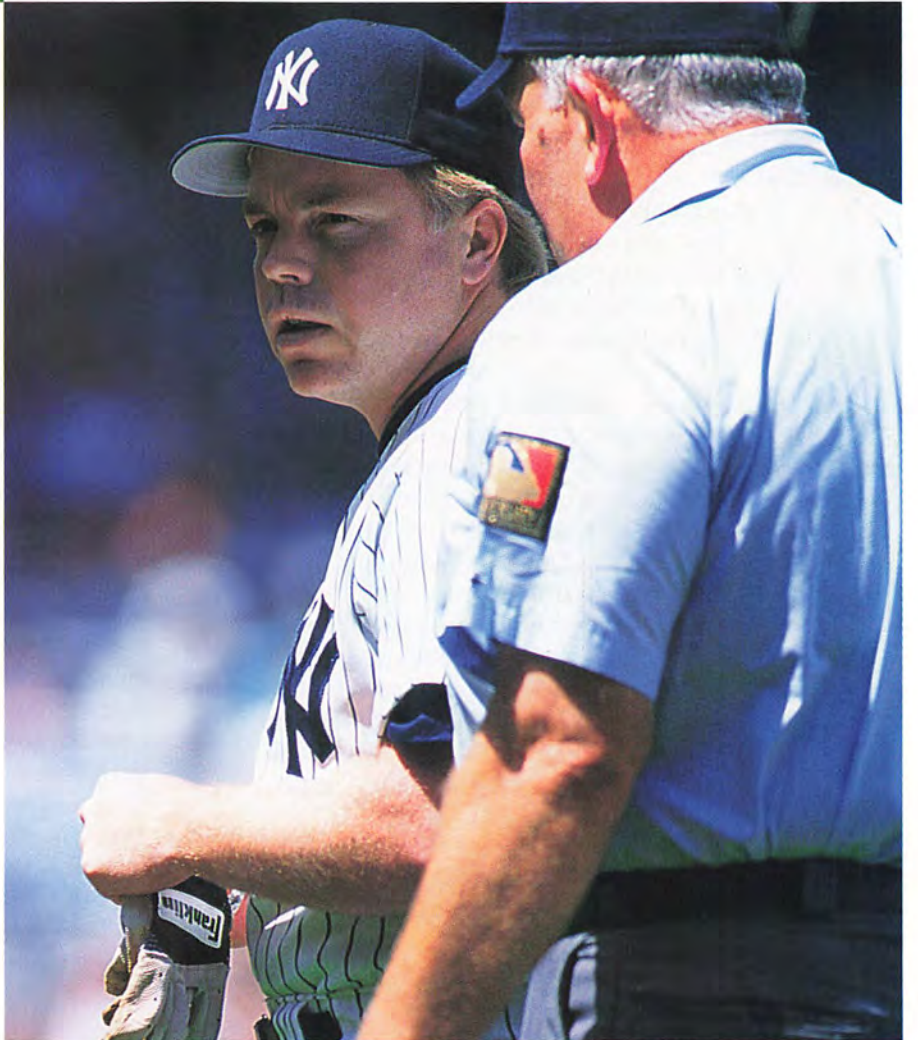
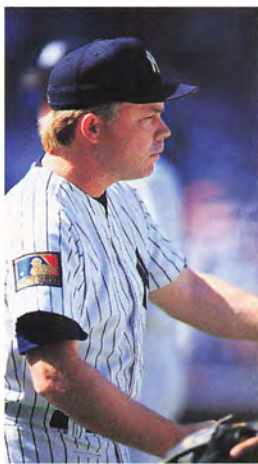
It must have been all too tantalizing for Yankees manager Buck Showalter. He was heading down the back stretch of the 1994 season with a six-and-a-half-game lead and the finish line clearly in sight. He carried the burden of winning for an organization whose last divisional crown was 14 long years ago — and he wore it on his sleeve. Then suddenly, the rug was pulled out from under him.

William Nathaniel Showalter III, 38, has always looked at the big picture. That is why 1995 is a season of unfinished business. Since his days as a Yankees minor leaguer began in 1977, Showalter has kept his eyes on the bigger prize. When it was apparent his physical talent alone would not lead to a major league playing career, Buck channeled his energy toward managing. Now, only 10 years after his first job as the Oneonta Yankees skipper, Showalter is on the brink of returning the Yankees to their glory days.

While the core of the squad that finished with the second-best record in the majors last season has returned, Showalter sees no sure things in '95.

“Even if we were to bring back the same exact team, that doesn’t guarantee the same results. Too many factors come into play such as age, injuries, scheduling and even the weather. There’s so many things left to chance,” explained Showalter. “Our club could potentially change, but you have to hope the change is for the better. That’s why I have so much respect for teams who win year after year.”

The AL’s 1994 Manager of the Year (the first-ever Yankee skipper to garner the award), Showalter is in his 19th season as a Yankee employee, and a distinguished one at that. But personal achievements aside, all Buck wants now is to take care of a little unfinished business.

THIRD BASE COACH

The number 30 on his back was the same, but it wasn't the same Willie Randolph. The man who last year made headlines for his



aggressive style as Yankees' third base coach, seemed a far cry from the one who played second base in the Bronx for 13 seasons.

In his first year down the third base line Randolph was a standout coach, consistently taking chances and challenging outfielders by waving home Yankee runners when the opportunity arose.

But Randolph's baseball smarts are nothing new to Yankees fans. An All-Star second baseman, Randolph was a quiet cornerstone of the Yankees' World Championship teams in 1977-78. The Brooklyn native retired in 1992 after successful years with the Dodgers, Athletics, Brewers and Mets. And now, after spending 1993 as an assistant to the general manager in the Yankees' front office, the former team captain enters his second season back in Pinstripes.

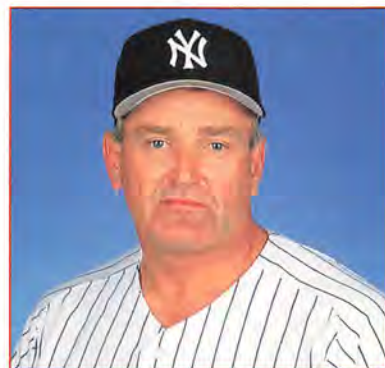
Having played in six League Championship Series and four World Series, this 40-year-old coach is now looking to help guide the Yankees back to glory.

RICK DOWN

BATTING COACH

When it comes to Rick Down's performance, the numbers speak for themselves.

Down has been the Yankees' batting coach for two seasons, and the team has led the major leagues in hitting in both years. The 1994 team average of .290 was the Yankees' best since 1936 (.300).



Success is nothing new to Down, who is in his eighth year in the organization. In the three years he managed the Triple-A Columbus Clippers (1990-92) his teams won three straight division titles and two consecutive Governors Cup Championships, and were in first place for 385 of 391 game days. The 44-year-old Down began his coaching career in 1976, after playing seven years in the Montreal Expos minor league system.

After two successful seasons at the major league level, Down is determined to keep the hits coming in '95.

BILLY CONNORS

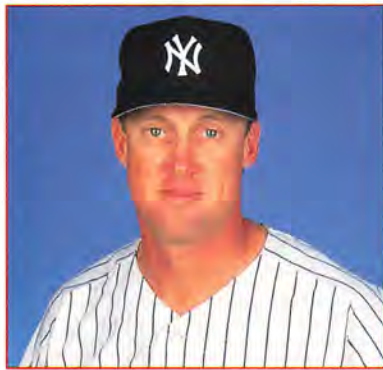
PITCHING COACH

The big number in pitching is 20. For pitchers, the measure of a great season is 20 wins. But for Billy Connors, the Yankees' 53-year-old pitching coach, that number translates into 20 years of professional coaching experience.



Connors, regarded as one of the best pitching coaches in the game, is back for his second straight year in the Bronx. His impressive credentials include more than 12 years as a major league pitching coach, including a previous stint with the Yankees (1989-90), and over eight years as a minor league pitching instructor. He was also the pitching coach on two playoff teams — the World Champion 1980 Kansas City Royals and the 1984 Chicago Cubs. Connors' knowledge and experience help Yankee pitchers stay an arm's length ahead of the competition.

It seems appropriate that Brian Butterfield should hold the job of first base coach, perhaps the most unheralded spot on a big league coaching staff. That is because he has quietly been serving the Yankee cause since 1979, first as a minor league player and later as a coach and manager.

Butterfield is in his second straight year as Yankees first base coach. Prior to that the 36-year-old had been a manager or coach in the organization since 1984. He made his managerial debut in 1988 at Sarasota when he guided that team to a Gulf Coast League Championship and was named the league's manager of the year. "Butter" also managed at Oneonta, Greensboro and Fort Lauderdale, amassing a solid .506 winning percentage before coming to the Bronx to assist manager Buck Showalter. So, while he has performed efficiently and without fanfare or recognition, Butterfield has earned his spot in the majors.

Another key member of Buck Showalter's staff is 34-year-old bullpen catcher Glenn Sherlock. This is Sherlock's ninth season in the Yankees' organization as either a player, coach or manager and his third season in his current role. A former minor league catcher with Houston and the Yankees, Sherlock's deep knowledge of the game makes him a perfect candidate to help Yankees relievers prepare for their assignments.

Returning for his fourth straight year on the Yankees' field staff is Tony Cloninger, who will again handle the duties as bullpen coach. Cloninger, who joined the big league club as bullpen coach in 1992 before spending the 1993 season as team pitching coach, brings the Yankees relievers 17 years of pitching experience.

The 54-year-old Cloninger joined the organization in 1987 as a pitching coach in Oneonta. He moved to Albany in 1988, then became the roving minor league instructor from 1989-91. His 1992 "call-up" to the majors was not, however, his first trip to The Show. Before taking up coaching Cloninger won an impressive 113 major league games as a pitcher with five teams, including the pennant-winning Reds in 1970.

This string of success as a coach and pitcher will continue to be a real asset in the Yankees' bullpen.

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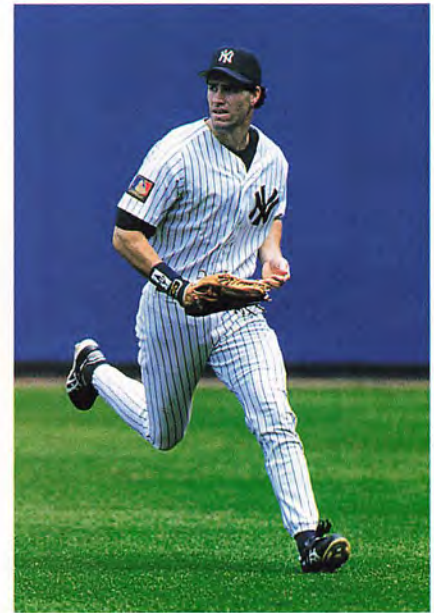

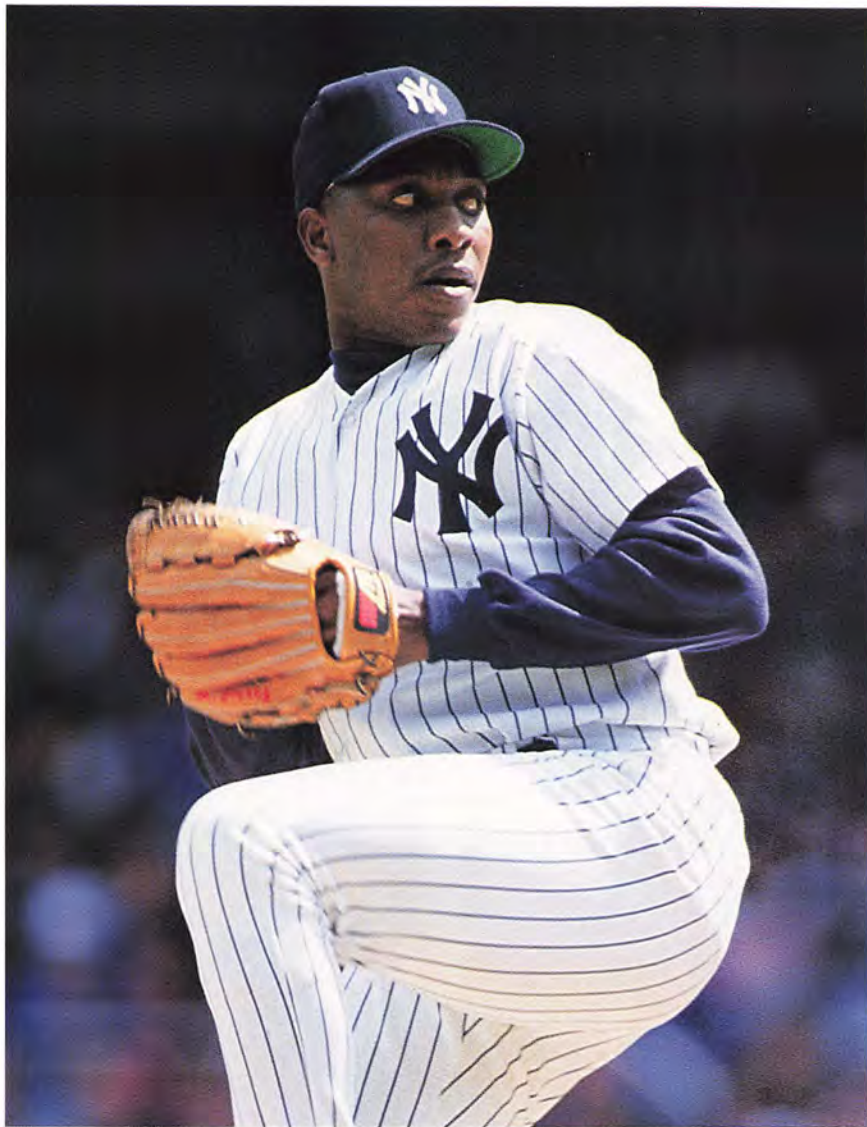
There is the old adage in baseball that when a hitter is going well, every pitch looks as big as a beach ball. Well last season must have been one long day at the beach for Paul O'Neill who amassed a .359 batting average with 21 homers and 83 RBI.

The Yankees' rightfielder started out of the box on fire hitting .448 in April, and continued at a .410 clip in May, .345 in July and .351 in August. O'Neill's season average, which led the AL, was the highest by a Yankee since Mickey Mantle hit .365 in 1957.

In addition to his BA, HRs and RBI, O'Neill led the Yankees in hits (132), total bases (222), walks (72) and intentional walks (13). The 32-year-old slugger was most productive in the clutch. His .385 average with runners in scoring position further solidified his status as the team's most prolific hitter.

O'Neill got the job done defensively, too. He committed just one error in 211 total chances, which ranked fourth in the league. To top it off, he appeared in his second All-Star Game. His first was in 1991 as a Cincinnati Red.

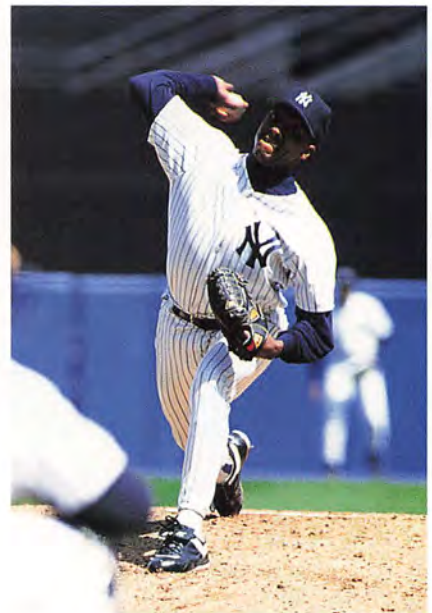

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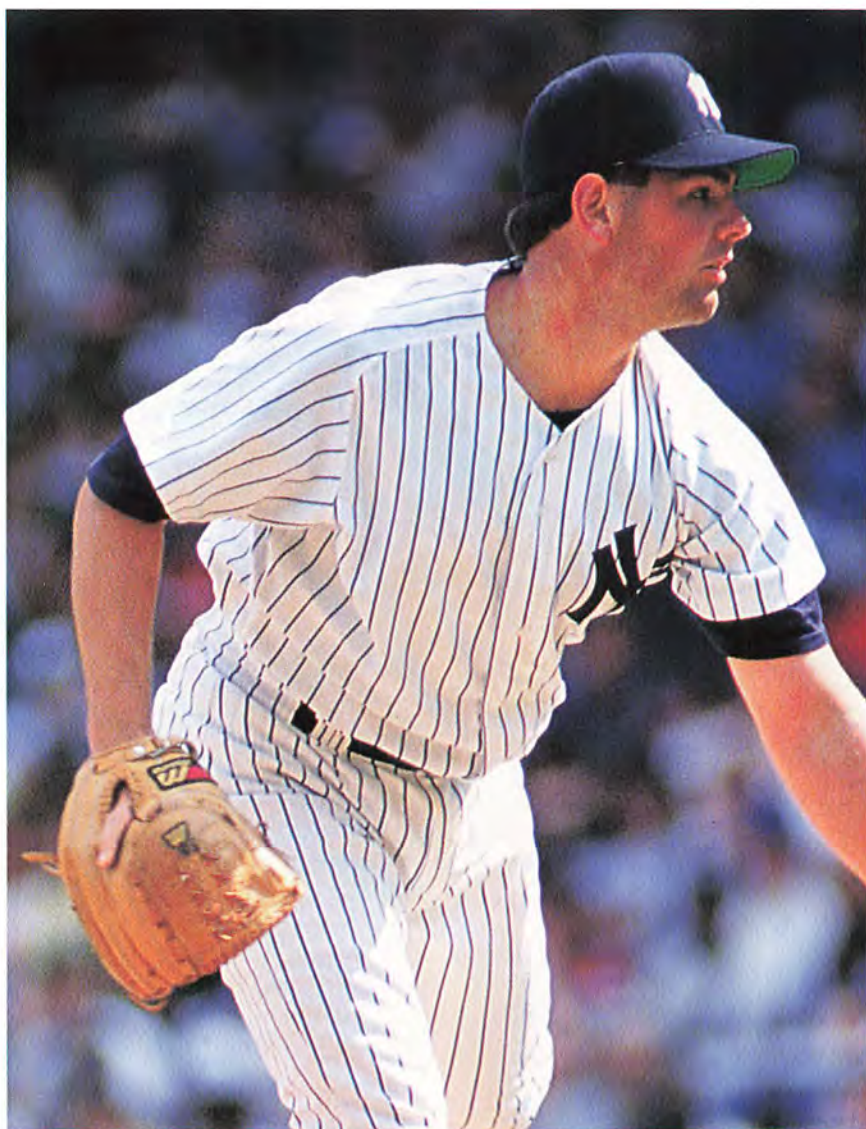


Don Mattingly has made a career out of professing team accomplishments rather than personal goals. Yet it is impossible to ignore his many individual achievements, and soon-to-be milestones that have marked his 12-year Yankees career.

To his many legion of fans, the Yankees' captain is the embodiment of a throwback player. Still only 34, that characterization speaks volumes for the manner in which he approaches his profession. Last season Mattingly collected his 1,000th RBI and 2,000th hit, the latter of which places him in exclusive company. The other five Yankees who accomplished the feat are all Hall of Famers (Lou Gehrig, Babe Ruth, Mickey Mantle, Joe DiMaggio and Yogi Berra).

Word of Mattingly's demise in the early '90s, precipitated by a bad back, were obviously premature. In 1994 he earned his ninth Rawlings Gold Glove Award for fielding excellence. Only National League first baseman Keith Hernandez, with 11, earned more. Through last season, he had the best fielding percentage of any position player in major league history. And his 1,469 games at first base entering the '95 campaign are second only to Gehrig's 2,137.

Mattingly would most assuredly trade in every accolade and award for a World Series ring. He will keep his eyes on that prize throughout the '95 season.

T rue, Sterling Hitchcock's career in New York has been brief. But what the Yankees and their fans have seen thus far could make for a very bright future.

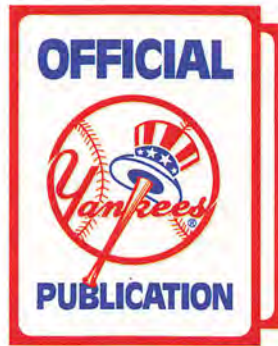
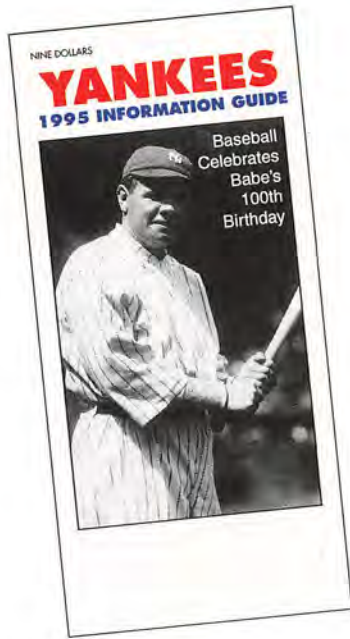

From mid-July through the season's end, the southpaw ripped off four of five wins as a starter, and in the process tied a career-high with seven strikeouts against the hard-hitting Indians on July 29. In his next start he recorded his first complete game, a 2-1, rain-shortened victory over the Milwaukee Brewers.

But Hitchcock's season did not escape the expected pratfalls of an inexperienced pitcher. He is still learning to reduce his number of walks per inning which partially account for his 4.92 career major league ERA. In addition, the 6-1, 192-pounder has allowed more than one hit per inning, a statistic that will send any manager looking for the Roloids.

Hitchcock's goal is simple this season: stay on the major league roster an entire season. A member of the Yankees' organization since 1989, Hitchcock won three strikeouts titles in three different leagues as a minor leaguer. The Florida native has shuttled between the minors and Yankee Stadium since 1992 and knows a little consistency will go a long way in his attempt to become a steady performer in the Yankees' 1995 starting rotation.

The resident of the Dominican Republic loves to make things happen and the Yankees love to watch him.

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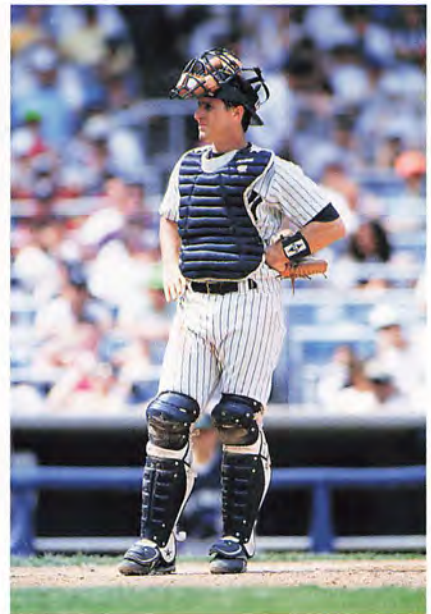

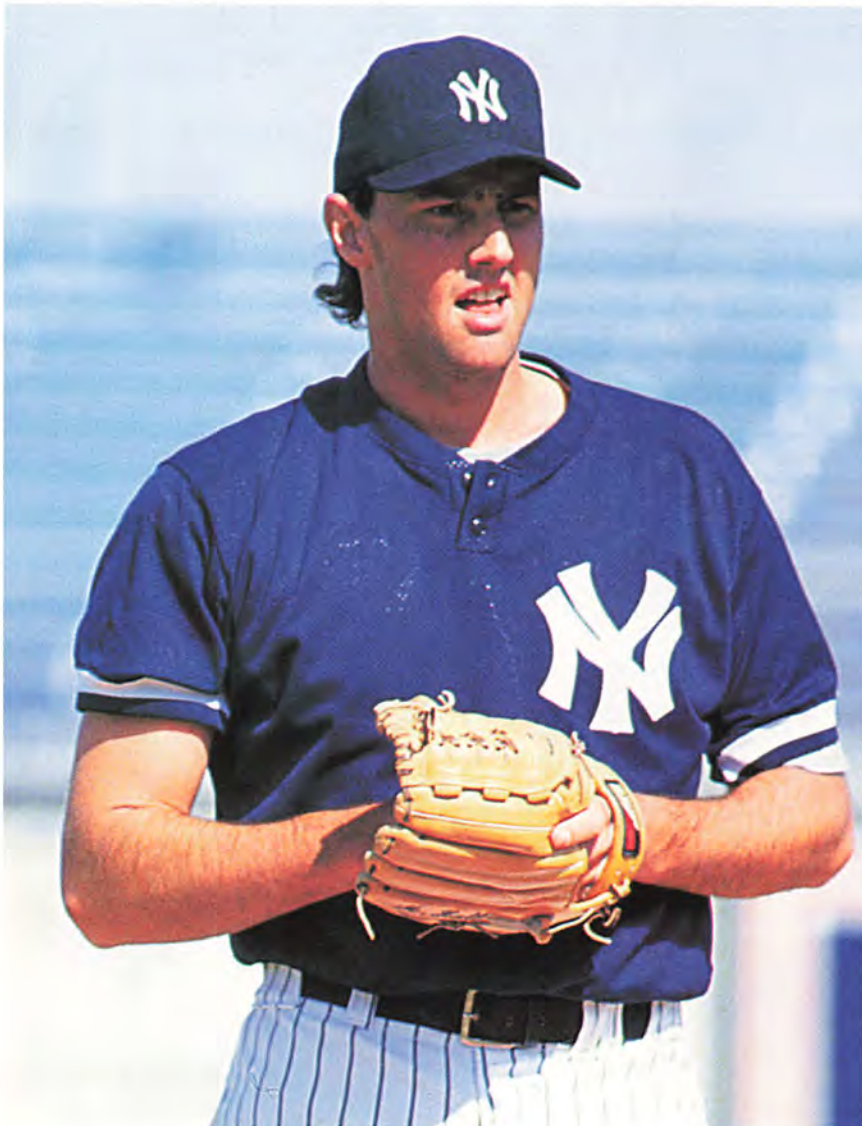
Since his professional career began in 1988, Pat Kelly understood he would go only as far as his performance at the plate. Well, Pat Kelly has arrived.

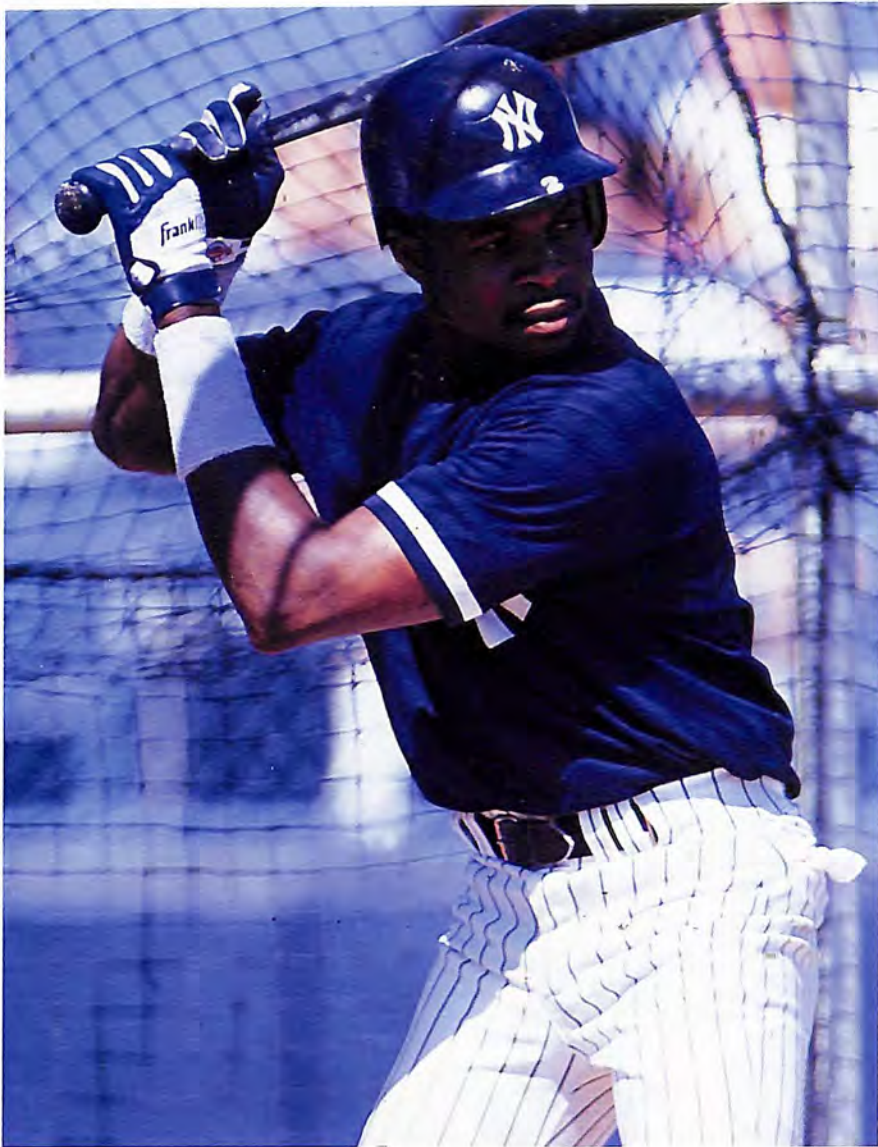

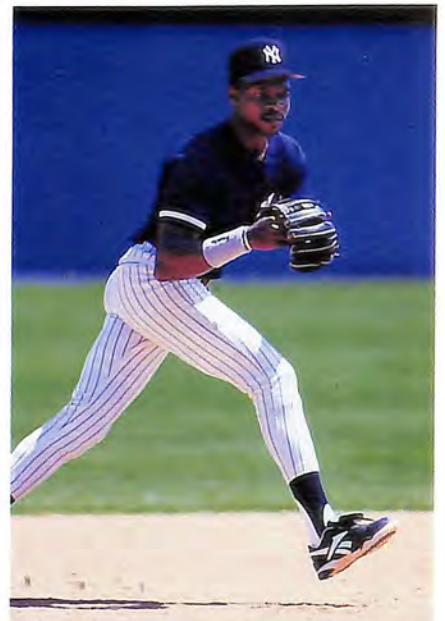

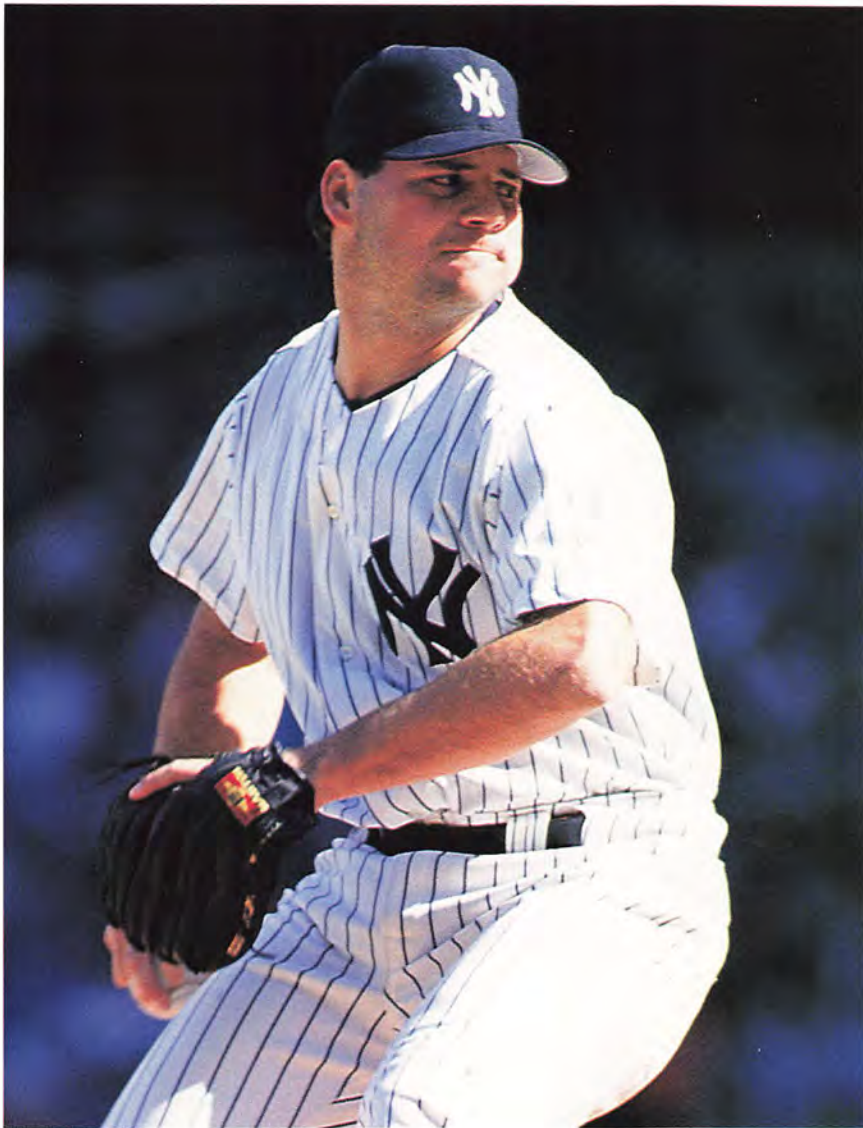

Names like Jimmy Key, Wade Boggs, Paul O'Neill, Luis Polonia and Mike Stanley come to mind. It's time to add another name to that list — Tony Fernandez.

A 12-year veteran and author of over 1,700 career hits, Fernandez will be the Yankees' everyday shortstop as they reload a year after finishing first in the AL East. At age 32, Fernandez still ranks among the finer fielders in baseball. He has won four Gold Gloves and shares the major league career record for highest fielding percentage (.980) by a shortstop who has played 1,000 or more games.

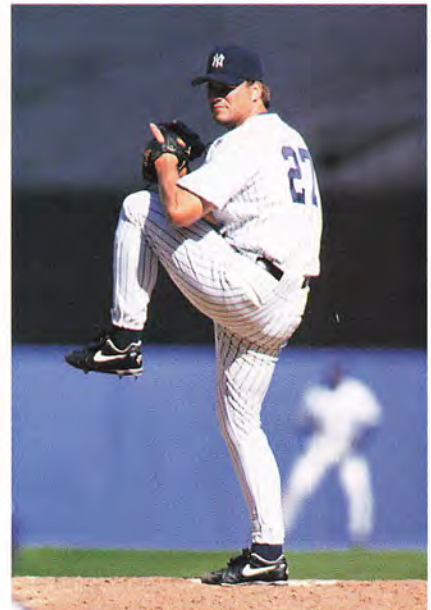

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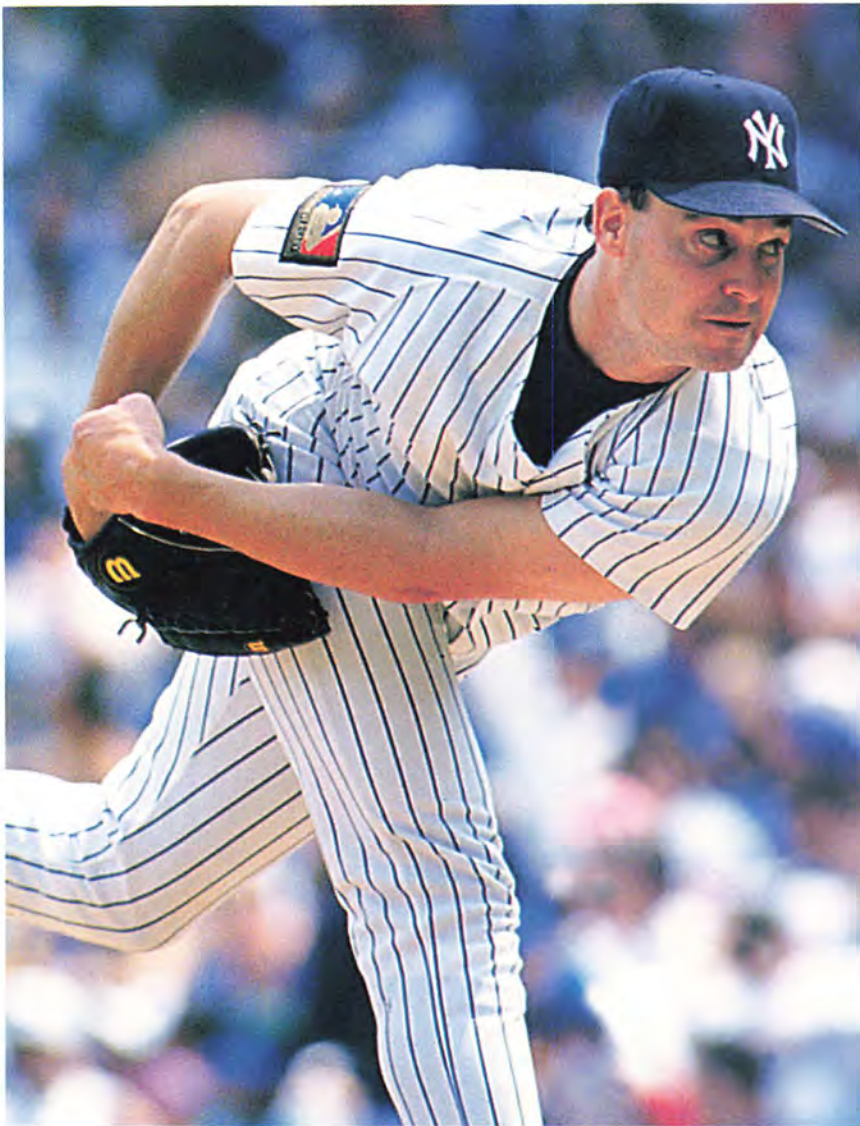

The reliever/starter possesses some gaudy statistics and fills every and any need manager Buck Showalter has requested.

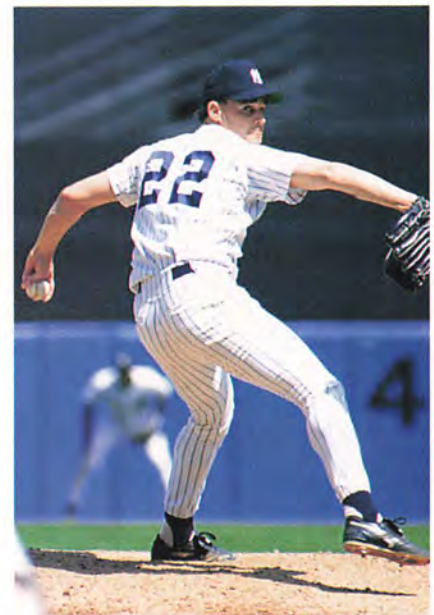

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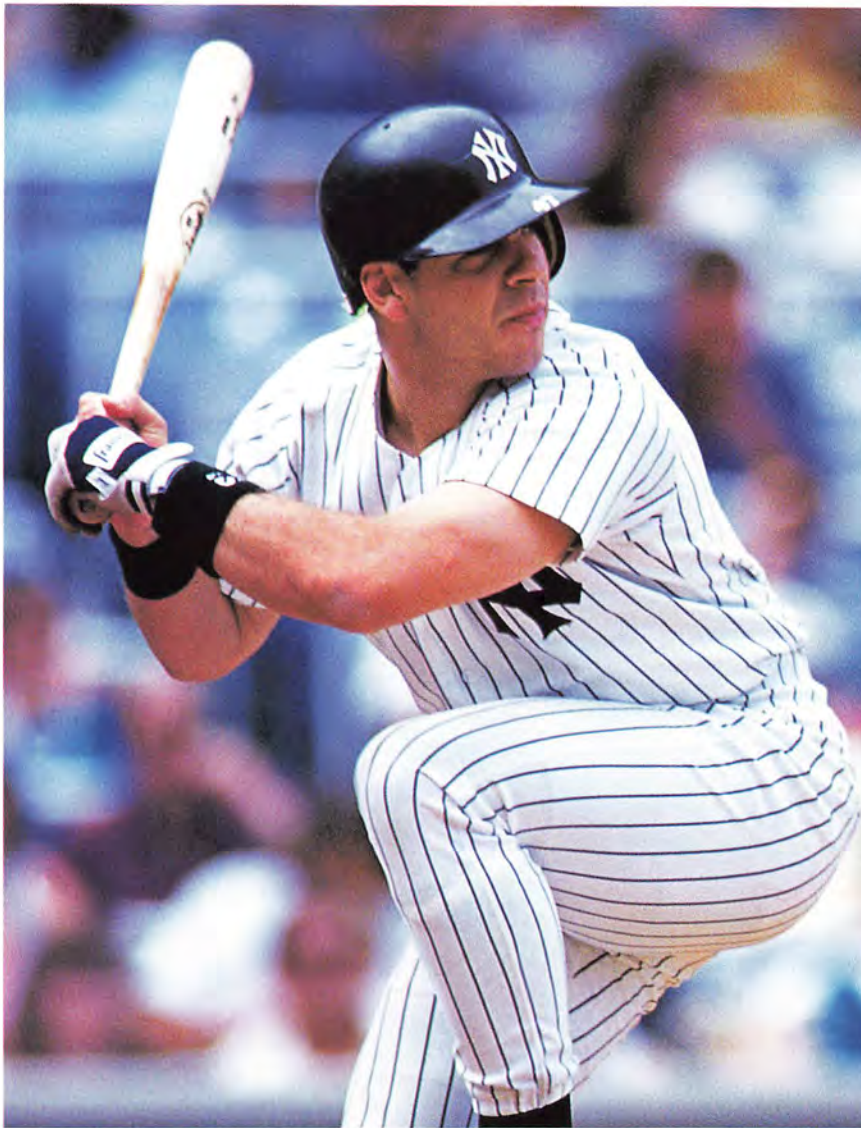

The former Blue Jay abused American League batsmen to the tune of 17 wins, four losses and a 3.27 ERA to finish a close second in the AL Cy Young Award voting. Over two seasons in the Bronx, the lefty is 35-10 and has emerged as the undisputed ace of the staff and one of baseball's premier pitchers.

Last season he led the team in wins, starts (25) and innings (168). His victories also led the majors. For his efforts, Key was named the American League's starting pitcher in the All-Star Game, the first Yankee to be so honored since Mel Stottlemyre in 1969.

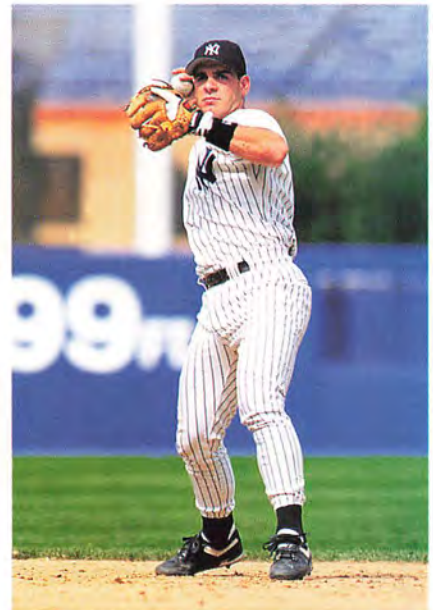
The 33-year-old was so consistent throughout the abbreviated season he never lost consecutive decisions and his 11-game winning streak was the longest in the majors. What makes the lefty's accomplishments even more amazing is the manner in which he performs. 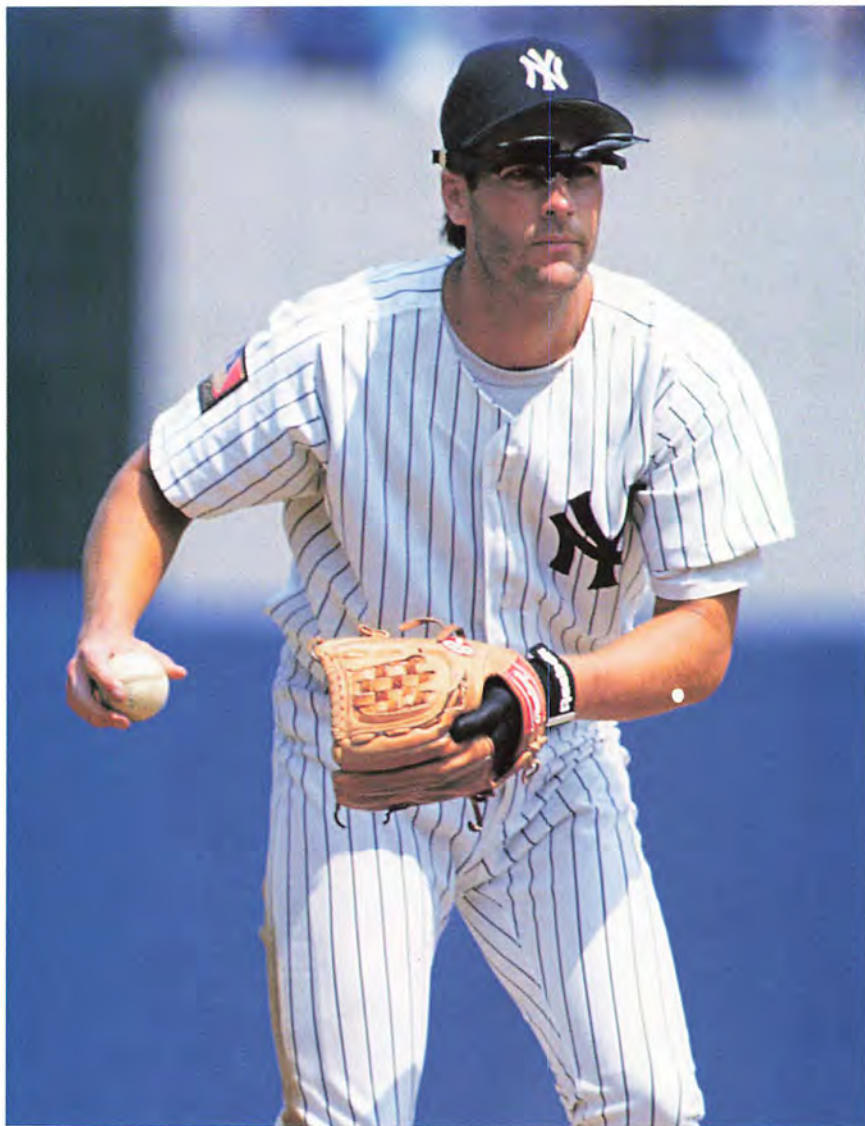

Last year in Columbus, the 27-year-old produced another fine season hitting .251 with 25 homers (tying Russ Davis) and 83 RBI (a team-high) in only 114 games. Silvestri played 12 games in the Bronx in '94 — his third stint with the Yankees — and hit .111 in nine games at second, two at short and one at third. Originally used as a starter, the 6-2, 215 pounder was moved to the bullpen full-time in '91 and has earned high praises.

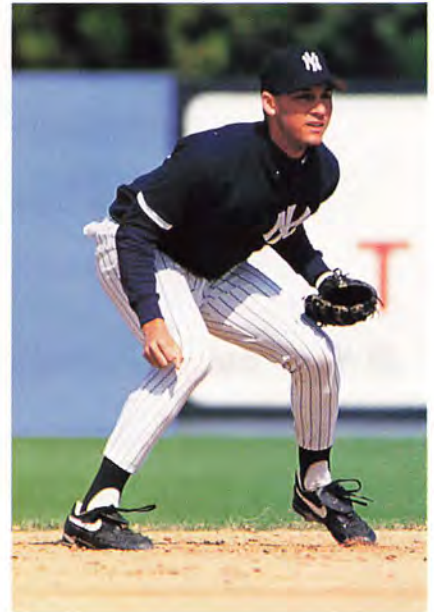

THE YANKEES ARE Tampa Bound

After spending the last 34 springs in Fort Lauderdale, FL, the Yankees are building a new state-of-the-art training facility in Tampa. The big league club will officially arrive in February 1996.

Look out, Tampa, the Yankees are coming. The world's most famous sports franchise is constructing its new winter and spring home in time for its arrival in 1996. After spending the last 34 years in Fort Lauderdale, the Yankees will soon move into a state-of-the-art facility that for starters will have the same playing dimensions as Yankee Stadium.

Of course, there's many a Yankees fan who can remember when the team

"I think that's one of the biggest benefits," Showalter said. "The logistics of being able to operate as one will be really helpful."

General Manager Gene Michael added: "It's the best setup we can have. We've had a problem with it being split."

Both liked the idea of their minor-leaguers playing at the new stadium, which will allow them the opportunity to familiarize themselves with

Yankee Stadium. "The more

trained in St. Petersburg in the days of DiMaggio, Mantle and Ford. Now the team will be back on the west coast of Florida. The Yankees moved spring training to Fort Lauderdale from St. Pete in 1962. However, their minor-league complex has been in Tampa since 1988.

"This is one great highlight for the Yankees organization to get a home in one location," said Joe Molloy, the Yankees' General Partner and an integral player in getting the Tampa project off the ground.

Buck Showalter, the 1994 AL Manager of the Year, looks forward to having the major- and minor-league operations working in closer proximity.

similarities to Yankee Stadium, the better," Showalter said. "This way if a kid hits 30 homers, you know he can get around on it. The only variables will be wind conditions and weather."

Hall of Famer Phil Rizzuto fondly recalls training in the Tampa Bay area.

"Oh, geez, I love Tampa," Rizzuto said. "We used to have spring training in St. Petersburg and we'd always go to Tampa to eat dinner. I got to know a lot of people here."

"This will be great for the local people. They'll get to see the kids on the way up, then they'll get to see them when they're major leaguers."



The project involving the Yankees, the Tampa Sports Authority and Hillsborough County is moving right along. All work seems to be on schedule for the mini-*House That Ruth Built* in Tampa, the city Yankees Principal Owner George Steinbrenner calls home.

Lescher and Mahoney of Tampa was the principal architectural firm for the project. Stan Meradith of Lescher and Mahoney is a baseball zealot and has studied many ballparks. What makes this park unique? According to Meradith, it is the fact it will have "an urban presence on a suburban site."

Through Meradith's study of baseball parks, he's explored the likes and dislikes of fans. "A lot of times fans can't put a finger on what they like," he explained.

According to Meradith, though, intimacy is integral to a spring training facility. "So you want to have seating down low," he said. "(The Yankees facility) will literally have no bad seats."

Meradith said the new facility will be "the palace of all spring training facilities in Major League Baseball" noting that the real challenge was to incorporate parts of Yankee Stadium with a Florida flavor.

"You can't just replicate what's in the Bronx," he added. "So you want to use materials indigenous to Florida. Emblematically it recalls Yankee Stadium while looking like it fits into Tampa."

Located on the southwest corner of Dale Mabry Highway and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Drive — directly across from Tampa Stadium, home of the National Football League's Tampa Bay Buccaneers — the Yankees Baseball Complex will be a combined baseball management, training and event facility opening in time for spring training in 1996. Within the confines of the 31-acre, \$17.5 million complex will be three baseball fields: a 10,000-seat stadium, a community use field and a major league practice field.

Approximately 315,000 fans are projected to visit the complex annually, which does not include

attendance at special events such as concerts and community sponsored events.

The Yankees' marketing effort is also going very well. An intensive season ticket campaign kicked off last November which included radio and print advertising (see ad on page 53) and an on-site ticket sales office is open. There have even been city buses traveling throughout Tampa showcasing Yankees billboards.

Tampa's Director of Marketing, Melissa Twomey, said there is tremendous opportunity in Tampa to reach die-hard Yankees fans.

"All of the research on the Yankees' fan base suggests a higher-than-average loyalty," she explained. "There's no reason at all to suspect we won't get at least what Broward County got (in terms of fan support). Being a new facility and with all the things going on in the area, I think we'll have a greater impact with the New Yorkers. There will be a heightened interest."

Once finished, the Yankees will play its Grapefruit League games at the new facility during the spring while the Class-A Florida State League and



Gulf Coast Rookie League teams will play their games at the facility in the summer.

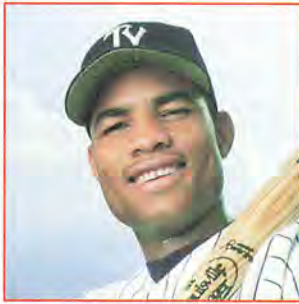
The community-use field will also serve as a permanent home field for the Hillsborough Community College baseball team. Additionally, both fields will be used for baseball related and non-baseball related special events, such as concerts.

Other special features to the stadium include a festive plaza located between the stadium and the community-use field. It will provide space for kiosks, vendors and corporate tents. A Yankees clubhouse novelty store will be located under the stairways providing plaza access to the stadium and a formal courtyard will be located adjacent to the stadium ticket windows in the plaza.

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Since 1933, the Yankees and First Fidelity Bancorporation have joined forces to aid community youth programs in the New York metropolitan area. As part of that commitment the Yankees and First Fidelity sponsor free baseball clinics at Yankee Stadium. Here, Yankees first base coach Brian Butterfield gives intense instruction at a 1994 clinic.

A strong commitment to the community has always been one of the most important objectives of the New York Yankees. Again in 1995 the Yankees are heavily involved with numerous charities, non-profit organizations, schools, and youth groups in the New York City metropolitan area. Here is a brief list of some of the organizations the Yankees work with to help build a better community:

THE YANKEE FOUNDATION

Since its formation in 1973, the Yankees have contributed to the New York community through this philanthropic organization, founded by Yankees Principal Owner George Steinbrenner. The Foundation has raised over \$2.5 million for athletic, recreational and educational programs for New York's young people. Some of the organizations which receive assistance from the Foundation include the New York Urban League, Boys Club of Greater New York, the Harlem R.B.I. Program, Boy Scouts, Big Brothers of New York, Catholic Youth Organization, Fresh Air Fund, Instructional Television, Police Athletic League, Special Olympics, Patrolmen's Benevolent Association, the YMCA as well as other numerous university programs.

THE WHITNEY M. YOUNG, JR. MEMORIAL FOOTBALL CLASSIC

Since 1977, the Yankees have sponsored and underwritten the Whitney M. Young, Jr. Memorial Football Classic in association with the New York Urban League. Proceeds from the game provide needed funds to help minority youth gain financial assistance in pursuit of a college education. The Yankees have raised over \$650,000 since 1977.

THE CON EDISON/YANKEES BASEBALL PROGRAM

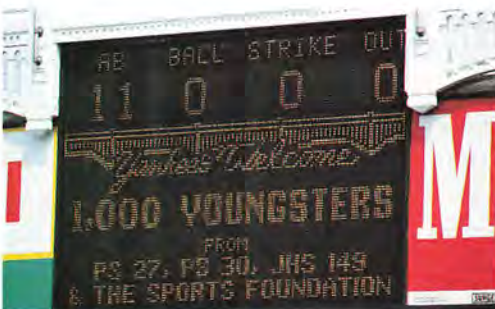
This is the 28th year of the Con Edison/Yankees baseball program. Since 1968, Con Edison and the Yankees have provided free admission to Yankees games for more than 2.5 million area youngsters, ranging in age

from 8 to 16. Every five children are accompanied by an adult chaperone. For many young people in New York City and Westchester County, this program has provided their first opportunity to attend a professional baseball game.

Tickets are distributed by Con Edison to youth organizations in New York City and Westchester County on a first-come, first-serve basis. More than 3,000 seats per game are made available to these youth organizations for 26 games a season.

As part of the program, Earl Battey, a former Minnesota Twins catcher and five-time American League All-Star, attends games with the children and serves as an expert "answer man" for their questions on the baseball action.

The program was enshrined in 1976 in the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, NY. It has also been recognized as "a public service worthy of special recognition" in a New York City mayoral proclamation and has won top public service award of the American Gas Association.

THE SILVER SHIELD FOUNDATION

Established in 1981 by George Steinbrenner, the Foundation provides college scholarships for the children of New York Police Officers, Firefighters and State Troopers killed in the line of duty. Since its inception, over \$2 million has been contributed through the Yankees' donation of proceeds from the annual Silver Shield game and from New York's top business leaders and concerned citizens.

ANNUAL BLOOD DRIVE

In conjunction with Hudson Valley Blood Services, the Yankees annually host a blood drive at Yankee Stadium. The blood collected helps stabilize supplies during the summer, a season when donations typically drop.

YANKEES COMMUNITY TICKET DISTRIBUTION PROGRAM

Each year, over 25,000 complimentary Yankees tickets are donated to various non-profit organizations in the tri-state area.

Daily News & THE YANKEES

The Yankees and the *Daily News* co-sponsor a number of programs to help benefit New York's young people. *The Daily News*/Yankees Annual Public School Attendance Recognition

Day program provides 5,000 free tickets as well as hot dogs, soda and peanuts to many of the city's school children who own excellent attendance records.

Super Youth Night at Yankee Stadium honors 10 sophomores, juniors and seniors from every New York City high school. These students are chosen by their principal according to their outstanding contributions to their school. *The Daily News* Principals' "Pride of the Yankees" Award is presented to students who demonstrate outstanding achievement in academic and extra-curricular activities.

The Yankees and Daily News also sponsor and present the High School Baseball All-Star Doubleheader each year at Yankee Stadium.

PSAL/CHSAA SCHOLARSHIPS

The Yankees donate five college scholarships to the Public School Athletic League and the Catholic High School Athletic Association. The scholarships total \$10,000 for each league and each borough is represented.

THANKSGIVING TURKEY DONATION

One thousand turkeys are donated to needy families so that they may enjoy a traditional Thanksgiving meal. White Rose Food, a division of DiGiorgio Corp., is instrumental in making the program a success. In 1994 the turkeys were donated to Share New York.

INNER-CITY SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The Fund provides needed tuition for underprivileged children who attend the 79 schools run by the Archdiocese of New York. The Yankees, MSG Network, WABC Radio and Nobody Beats The Wiz help promote and raise money for the Fund.

"DON'T STRIKE OUT ON DRUGS"

In association with the FBI's New York office, the Yankees produce a workbook for school children so that they are made aware of the risks of drugs to their health and life.

YANKEES CAP PROGRAM

The Yankees donate blue "NY" caps to all New York PSAL and CHSSA high school varsity baseball teams to kick off each baseball season.

BROADCASTERS



PHIL RIZZUTO

The one and only "Scooter," the greatest shortstop in Yankees history, is in his 39th year of giving viewers the inside word on the Bronx Bombers. The 1994 Hall of Famer moved into the broadcast booth immediately following his playing career (1941-56). Phil is also a member of the American Sportscasters' Hall of Fame. His dedication to the Yankees overflows during broadcasts which always translates into fun for fans.



BOBBY MURCER

Murcer, one of the most popular Yankees of his era, returns for his seventh season and fifth consecutive as a Yankees broadcaster on WPIX. Murcer has found much success working in the broadcast booth upon completion of his playing career and fans are always excited to see this familiar face talking Yankees baseball.



PAUL OLDEN

Olden is in his second season in the WPIX broadcast booth with partners Rizzuto and Murcer. He has also been heard for the past two seasons as the play-by-play voice of the New York Jets. Olden's smooth delivery and deep baseball knowledge were welcomed by fans in 1994 as they will be this year.



DAVE COHEN

Cohen, most recently the radio man for the Syracuse Chiefs, Toronto's Triple-A club, embarks on his first season as an announcer for MSG Network. A graduate of Brooklyn's Stuyvesant High School, he has also served as the play-by-play announcer for the Syracuse University football and basketball teams.



JIM KAAT

Kaat, also entering his rookie season with Cohen at MSG, has served nationally as a broadcaster for ESPN and CBS-TV and as a team announcer for the Yankees on WPIX (1986), Atlanta on WTBS (1987) and Minnesota on WCCO (1988-93). Kaat went 283-237 with a 3.45 ERA in 898 appearances (ninth all-time) covering 25 seasons with the Senators, Twins, White Sox, Phillies, Yankees and Cardinals (1959-83).



AL TRAUTWIG

The multi-dimensional Al Trautwig, winner of three New York Emmy Awards, will again host MSG Network's pre-game show "Yankee Scorecard" for the sixth consecutive year. He is also responsible for hosting the post-game show as well as joining Cohen and Kaat during game broadcasts. Trautwig also hosts other programs on MSG Network and calls play-by-play for selected New York Knicks and Rangers telecasts.



STEVE PALERMO

Former American League umpire and native of Worcester, MA, Steve brings his articulate insight to MSG's "Yankees Scorecard," providing periodic feature reports. He will also serve as a back-up color analyst. Steve began his broadcasting career in 1992 calling Seattle Mariners games and in 1994 he was named one of the analysts for The Baseball Network.



JOHN STERLING

Although Sterling broadcasted Yankee games in the 1970s, 1995 marks his seventh consecutive year with the Yankees in the WABC radio booth and his fourth paired with Michael Kay. Formerly a play-by-play announcer for the New Jersey Nets, New York Islanders and Baltimore Bullets, John was also an Atlanta Braves broadcaster for five years and handled play-by-play duties for the NBA's Atlanta Hawks.



MICHAEL KAY

Kay, a Bronx native and Fordham University graduate, begins his fourth season coupled with John Sterling behind the mike at WABC Radio. A Yankee beat writer for five years, Michael joined MSG Network in 1991 on the post-game show where he provides viewers with vital up-to-the-minute insights from the Yankees' clubhouse. Kay also serves as the color analyst for Seton Hall basketball.

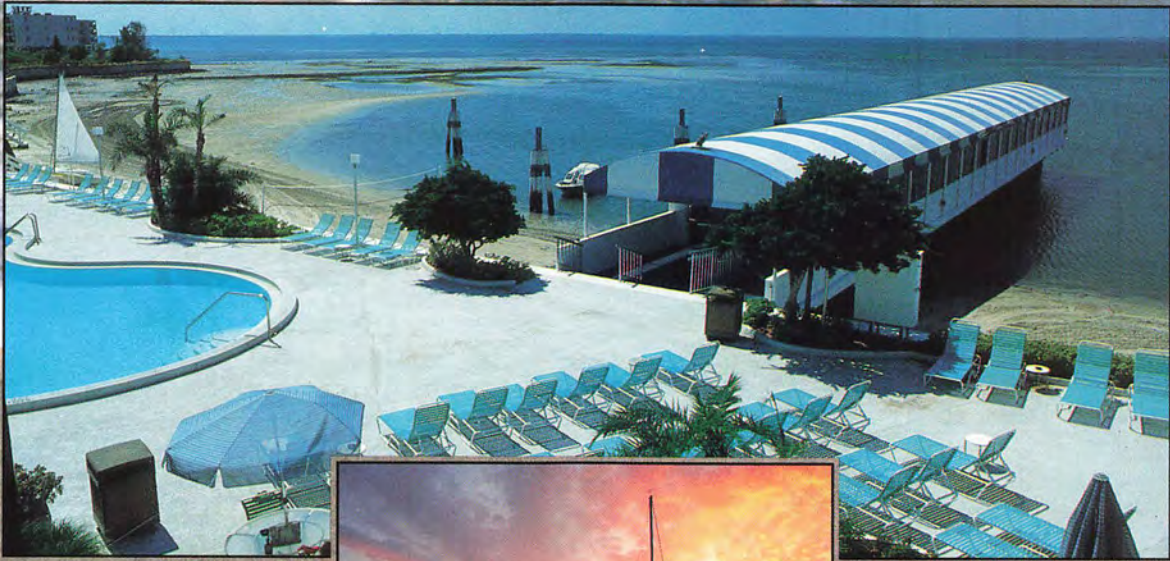

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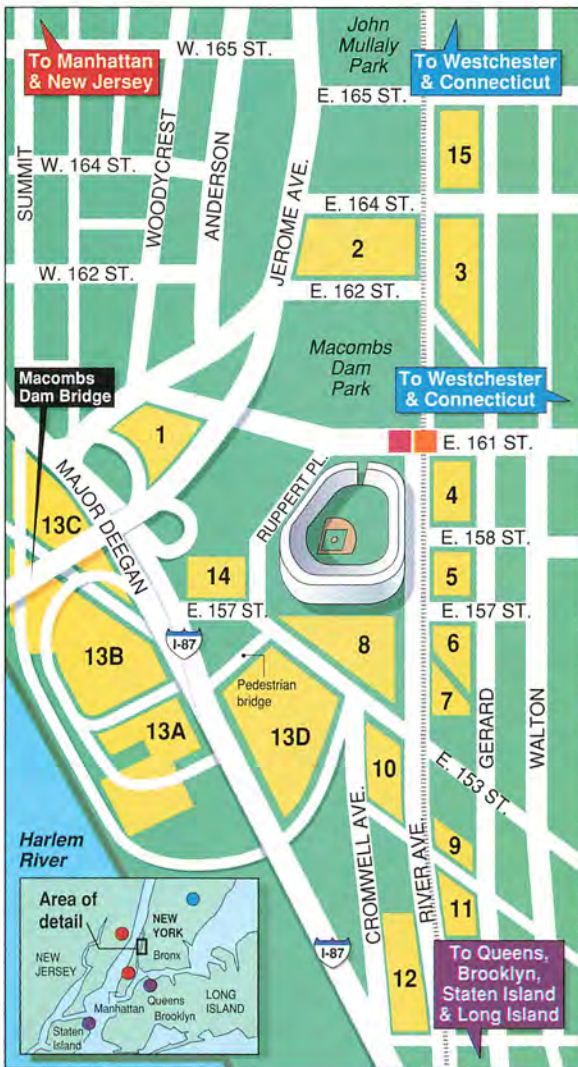
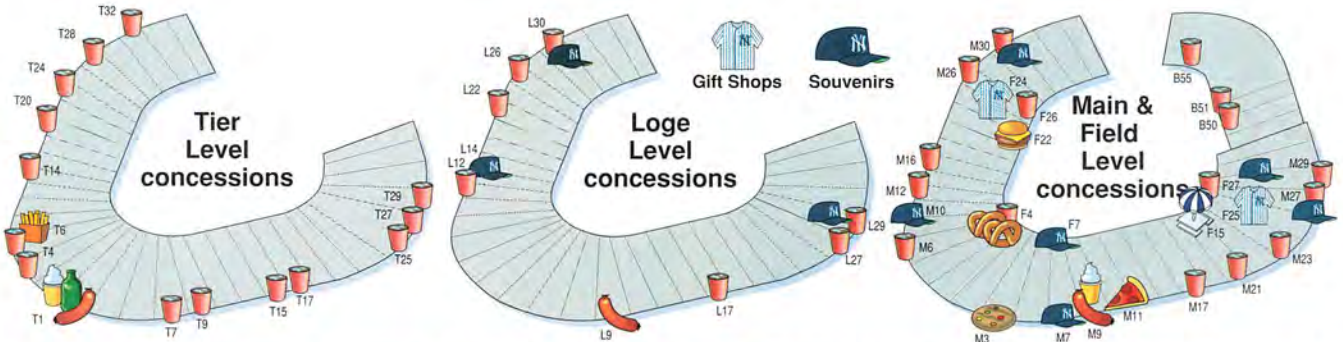

Yankee Stadium is located at 161st St. and River Avenue in the Bronx.

SUBWAY

The Yankee Stadium subway stop is located right outside the Stadium at the corner of 161st St. and River Ave. The Stadium is conveniently reached by several subway lines and a trip from midtown Manhattan takes less than 25 minutes. The #4 train, as well as the C (weekdays only) and D trains make stops at 161st St./Yankee Stadium. Metro North train service to Connecticut and Westchester County is available at the 125th St. subway stop.

BUSES

Several New York City Transit Authority Bus Lines provide convenient service to Yankee Stadium. The **BX 6**, **BX 13** and **BX 55** buses stop at 161st St./Yankee Stadium. Also, the **BX 1** bus stops at 161st St./Grand Concourse, a short walk from the Stadium.

If you or your group travels to Yankee Stadium in a private bus, parking is located at 164th and 165th Streets and River Ave. Police will direct you to that area. The fee is \$15, cash only upon arrival.

For more information on subway and bus transportation to Yankee Stadium, contact the NYC Transit Authority at 718 330-1234, 6am-9pm.

Bottles and cans

A New York City ordinance prohibits fans from bringing cans, bottles (glass or plastic), jugs, coolers or hard containers of any kind into the stadium. This is a safety measure to protect fans as well as team and stadium personnel. If these items are found to be in your possession prior to entering the stadium, Yankee Security Personnel will ask you to dispose of the item(s) to your car. Once you enter the stadium, canned or bottled goods will be confiscated and disposed of, and coolers, jugs, etc. will be checked at the gate to be picked up as you leave the stadium.

Banners and signs

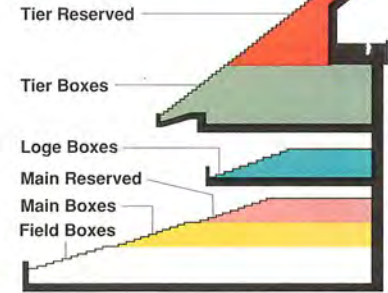
- The following rules apply to the display of these items:
1. They may not be hung in fair territory or any part of the playing field or as to obstruct the view of fans or stadium signage.
 2. They may only be held up in, or paraded through, the general seating area between innings.
 3. The use of weights of any kind to keep a banner or sign in place is strictly prohibited

NOTE: If any banner or sign interferes with the sight line of the players, the umpires may request its removal.

Monument Park

Contains historic monuments and plaques dedicated to former Yankee greats such as Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig and Miller Huggins. Park is open from the time the gates open until 45 minutes prior to the game. Access via staircase at end of the aisles between the Field and Main level seats, section 36.

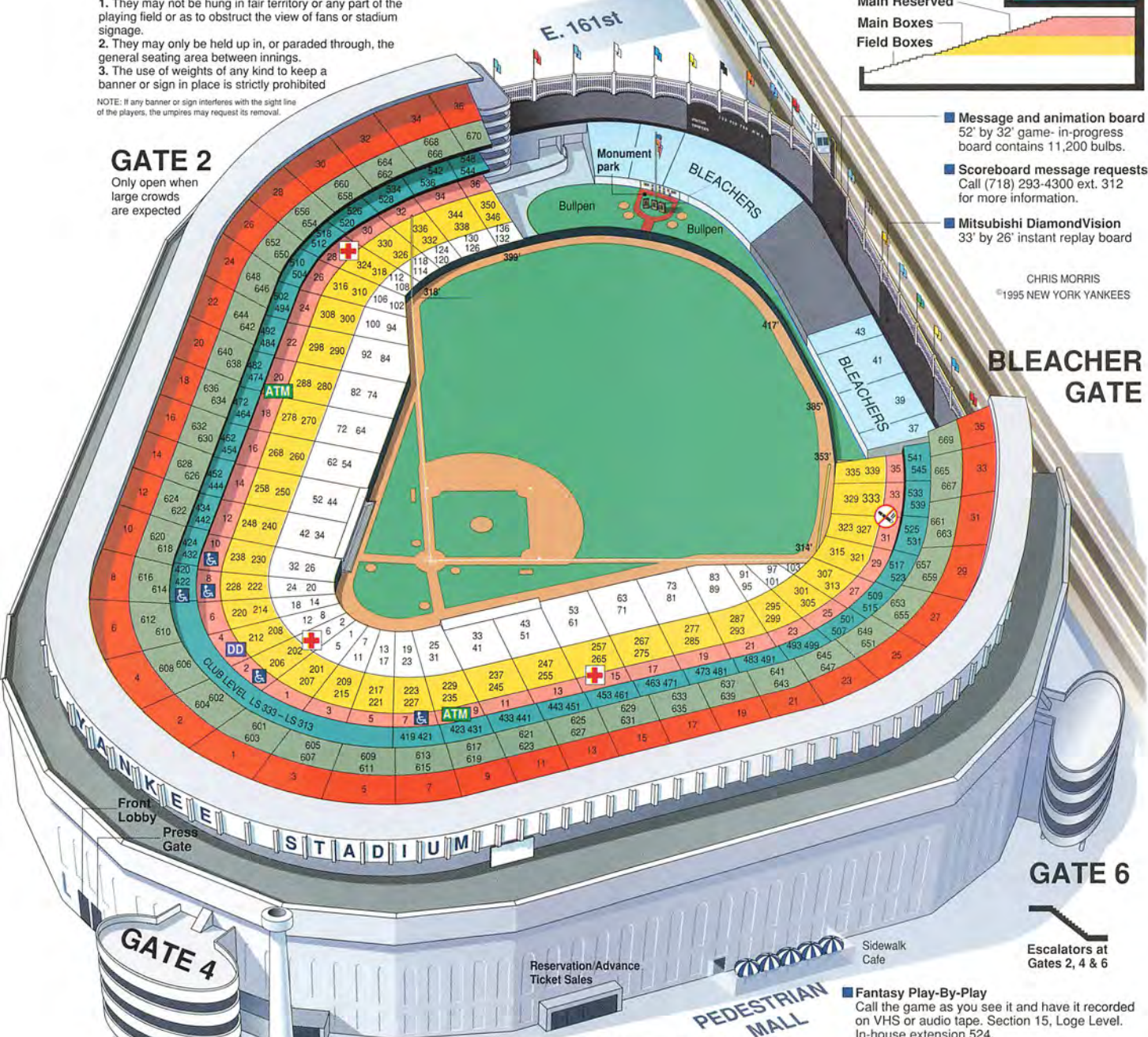
