**HUGH NOYES MULCAHY** was the first major league player to enter Uncle Sam's fighting forces. Inducted into the army on March 8, 1941, Hughey was sent to Camp Edwards, Mass., and assigned to Regimental Headquarters Company of the 101st Field Artillery. Although he reached his 28th birthday on September 9th, 1941, Mulcahy decided to stay with his "outfit." Hugh is a private, first class, and rates as one of the best machine-gunners in the regiment.

**JOHN A. "BUDDY" BEHRENDIS** is a member of the Coast Guard Reserve, having enlisted on December 17, 1941, and is stationed at Philadelphia for preparatory training. Buddy was a power-house hitter secured by the Phils from Martinsville of the Bi-State League where he was the batting champ for 1941. Behrends is a resident of Media, Pa., a suburb of Philadelphia.

**DALE JONES** will do his training with the Naval Reserve, "joining up" on January 20, 1942, and stationed at Detroit as a yeoman, third class. This tall right hander was on option at Allentown last year where he won 10 and lost 12. Much was expected of Dale this season but now he will be striving just as hard to make good for his new manager, Uncle Sam.

**WILLIAM HARMAN** reported to the U. S. Marine Corps at Quantico, Va., on February 1, 1942. Harman joined the Phils after graduating from U. of Va. in June, 1941. Listed as a catcher, Bill also made a college rep as a one man battery, often taking his turn on the mound. Was one of Virginia's outstanding court players. Six foot, four inches, Harman would have rated as the tallest catcher in the majors. Instead of studying opposing hitters, he is absorbing information that he hopes will gain him a commission with the "Soldiers of the Sea."

**BILL BURICH** was the outstanding second sacker in the Inter-State League and was selected by the scribes around the circuit for the All-Star team. Quiet and unassuming off the field, he is a great hustler and team player during a game. Best hitting second baseman in the league. Starting his fifth year in pro ball, he was with Joplin, Mo., in '38 as a third baseman, played second and third for Americus, Ga., and Paducah, Ky., in '39 and keystone tender for Olean, N. Y., and Macon, Ga., in '40. Grad of Chicago's Bowen High in '36 where he played basketball and baseball. Parents are Croatians and his hobby is photography.

**PAUL BUSBY** decided to ignore family tradition and become a professional ball player. His father is a circuit court judge and two brothers are prominent attorneys in Meridian, Miss. All grads of University of Mississippi where Busby also attended and played football and basketball. Also attended and got his degree from Mississippi State Teachers. Coached football at Teachers' College Demonstration School. Played on same team at U. of M. with Ike Pearson. Fourth year in baseball, '39 with Mayodan, N. C., Martinsville, Va., in '40 and '41, from whom he was selected by the Phils. Joined them latter part of last season. Breaking into game at Pittsburgh Busby started a ninth inning rally with a single, driving in a run and later scoring to win the game. Married and has a daughter.

**"TEE" FRYE** made his professional debut last season with Martinsville, Va., of Bi-State, but had four years experience with the better semi-pro clubs in North Carolina. He was three years with Elizabethton, Tenn., and then moved up to the class C Greenville, Miss., club in '40. One year was enough for him to attract attention and he was purchased by Memphis. It's a long jump from class C to A-1 but Hodge gave all the competitors for the keystone job a real battle and finally won a permanent berth for himself. Married, has a winter job with the Fulton Sylphon Company and likes to hunt and fish.

**ANDY LAPIHUSKA** was an outfielder and because of his rifle-like throwing arm was converted into a third baseman. His ability to throw finally put him on the mound. That was on the lots of Millville, N. J. Then at 18 years of age he joined Allentown and proceeded to look like a veteran in the class B Interstate League. Of Polish decent and grad of Millville High in '40 where he was one of their diamond greats. Played for Express Company in Millville Industrial League for 3 years before turning pro. Learning the glass business in winter and keeps in shape chopping wood and exercising his bird dog.

**EDDIE MURPHY** has been a consistent "department leader" or near the top since he first broke into organized ball. He started with Albany in the Georgia-Florida and in his freshman year led the RBI department and made the All-Star nine. In '39 he moved up to Portsmouth, Ohio, of the Middle Atlantic and copped the hitting laurels, including the title of leading home run slugger and All-Star team first sacker. With Elmira and Wilkes-Barre in '40, Eddie didn't take the lead but his power hitting and fielding were known all around the Eastern League. Last year at Allentown, Murphy got back into stride. Tied for RBI lead, tops in homers, sixth in triples and made another All-Star aggregation. Eddie was practically born into baseball, his father, Frank, played organized ball for many years, managed minor league clubs in the St. Louis Cardinal organization.

**EARL NAYLOR** has a reputation of being a distance clouter and has a habit of doing it with men on the bases. Right up with the leaders of the S. A. in RBI department. Thrilled Memphis fans last year with long wallops but most impressive was one he line-driven over 410 foot left field fence and just as far in height, for the longest hit ever made in Memphis' Russwood Park. Broke distance hitting records all around Southern circuit. Purchased from Memphis Chicks with whom he played in '40 and '41. Started with Fayetteville, Ark., in '37 and '38 and was with Greenville, Miss., in

'39. All around athlete at Topeka High from which he graduated in '38. Won letters in basketball, football and track, being a high jumper and javelin thrower in the latter. Also quite a golfer. Been working in aircraft factory since close of last season.

**RON NORTHEY** was one of the best school-boy athletes in Pennsylvania coal regions and is carrying on in pro baseball with the same zip. Not only best RBI man in Eastern League, was fourth in hitting doubles. Played basketball, football and baseball at Frackville High, graduating in '37. Was a star in all three sports, at age of 15, captained court team that went into state regional tournament. Played year of semi-pro ball at Montpelier, Vt., under guidance of Stuffy McInnis, former Phil manager. Was with Federalsburg in Eastern Shore in '39 and Williamsport, from whom he was purchased, in '40 and '41. Married Hazleton, Pa., girl last spring, and works in steel rope mill in Williamsport.

**BILL PETERMAN** is native of Feltonville section of Philly. Went right from high school field into pro ball, ready to start his third season. Graduated from Olney High in '39, where he played baseball, basketball and soccer. In 1940 signed with Centreville in Eastern Shore and later in season went to Ottawa of Canadian-American. Last season with pennant winning Wausau, Pete not only did a swell job of receiving but was one of the top notch hitters in league, hitting in number four spot for Wausau. Was sixth in hitting, fourth in total bases, third in hits, fifth in doubles and runs batted in. Employed during winter in defense plant in Philadelphia.

**DANNY REYNOLDS** is one of those pepper boxes, in fact, so active that his teammates at Martinsville, Va., nicknamed him "squirrel." 1939 grad of Scotts High School, near his native Stony Point, N. C. Captained both basketball and baseball teams while there and last two years of school was awarded medals for being best athlete. Played on American Legion nine at Statesville, N. C. Was taught plenty about baseball by brother, Spencer, who was star for 14 years in Sally and Piedmont leagues. Started his pro career with Henderson, N. C., in '39, with Martinsville, of Bi-State, in '40 and '41. Was selected on all-star team last season. Married and has a son. Works in furniture factory during off season.
