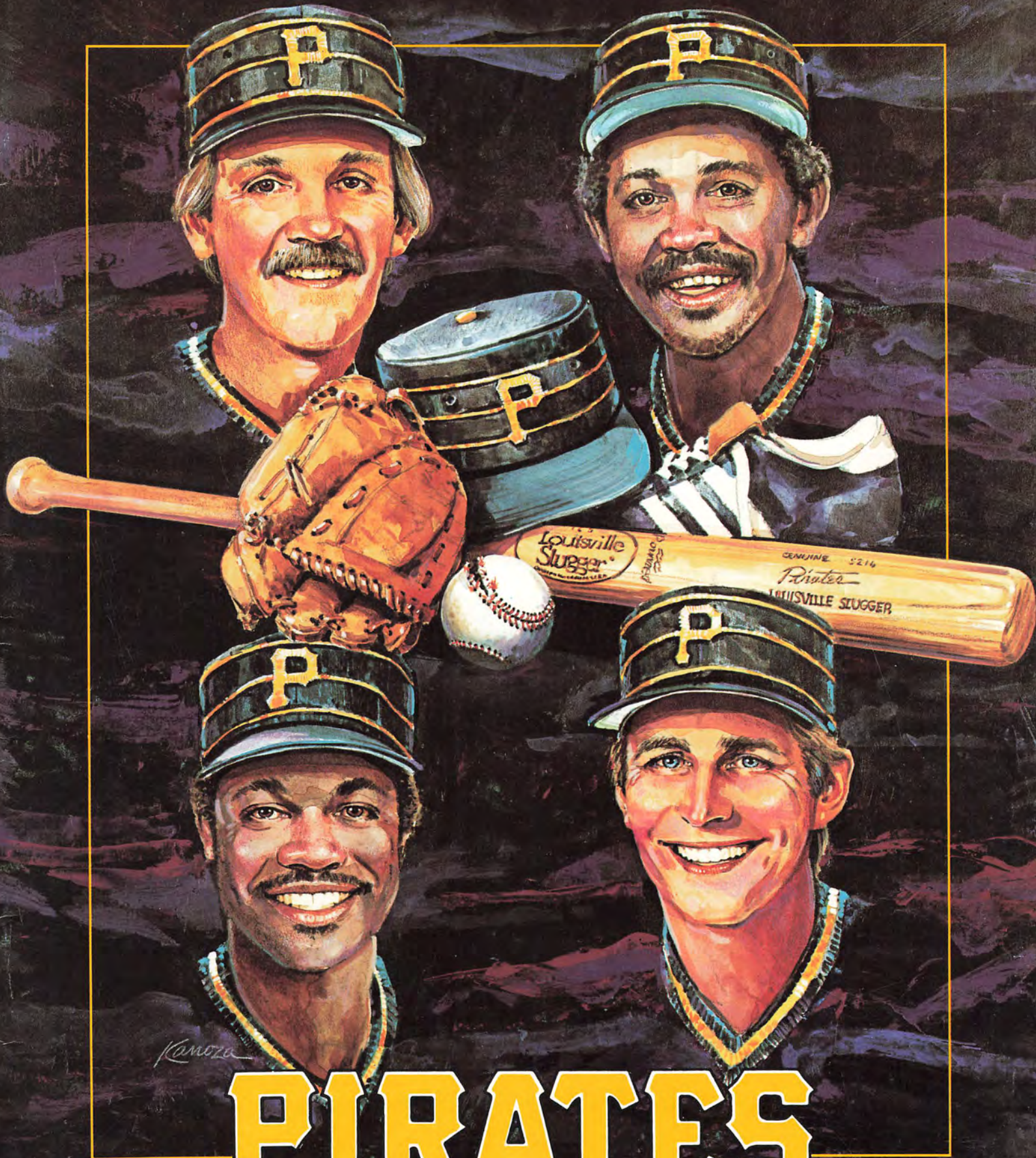


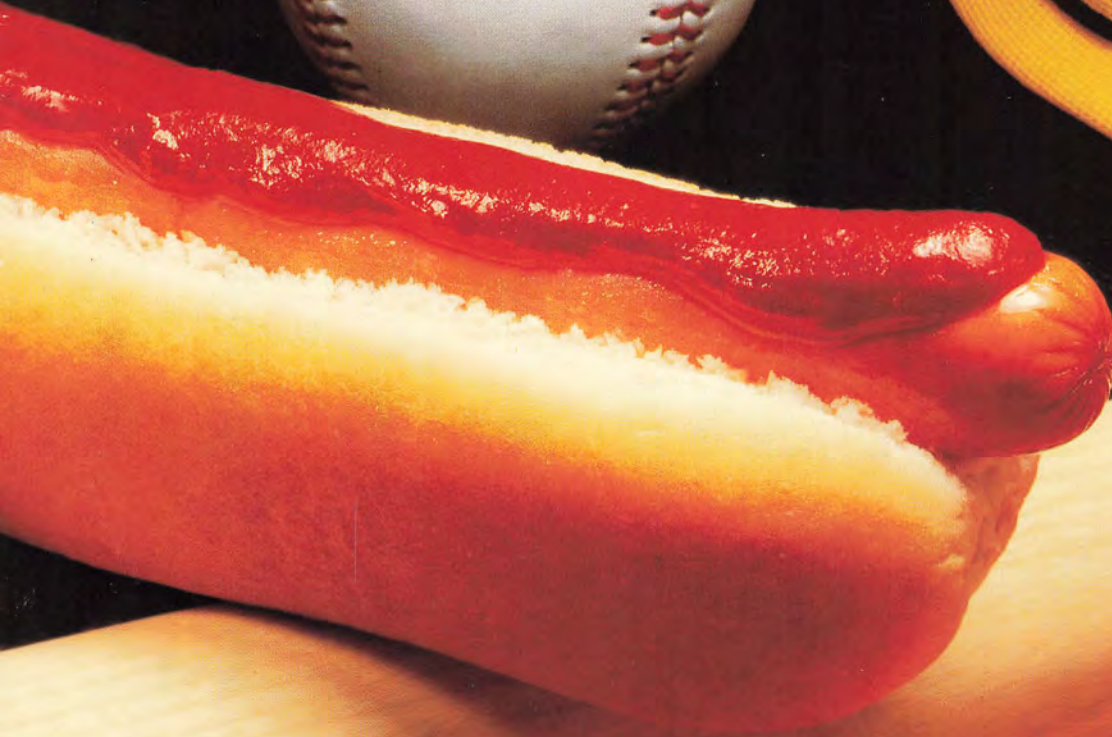
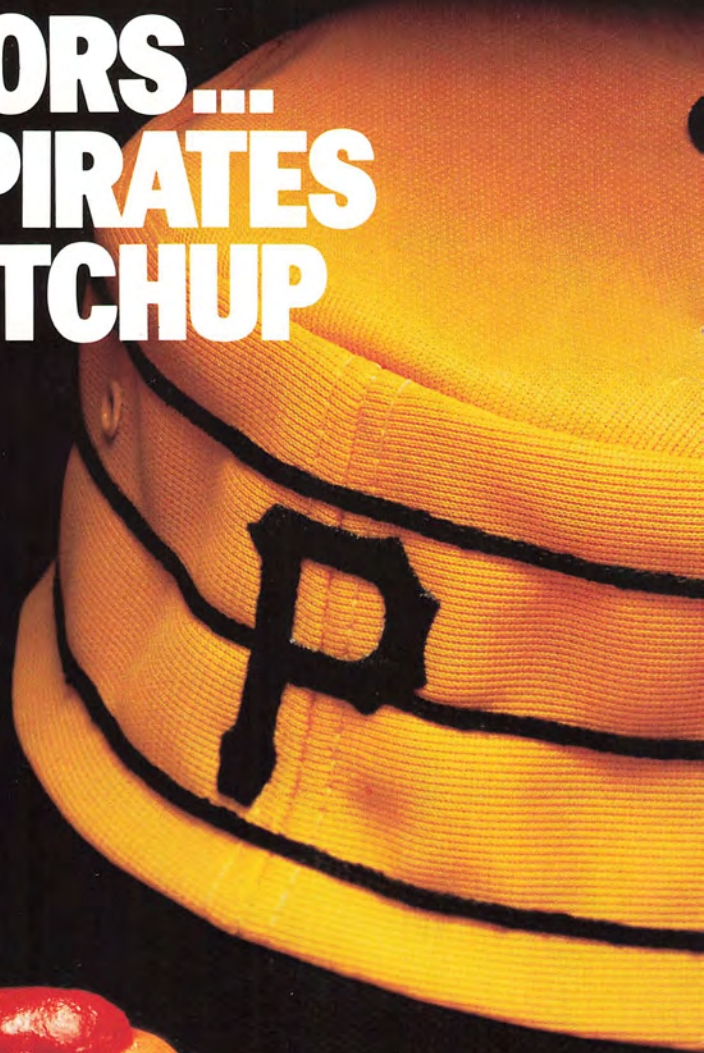

## 14 JIM LEYLAND

Jim Leyland was a hotshot, all-everything high school athlete, a catcher with big league dreams.

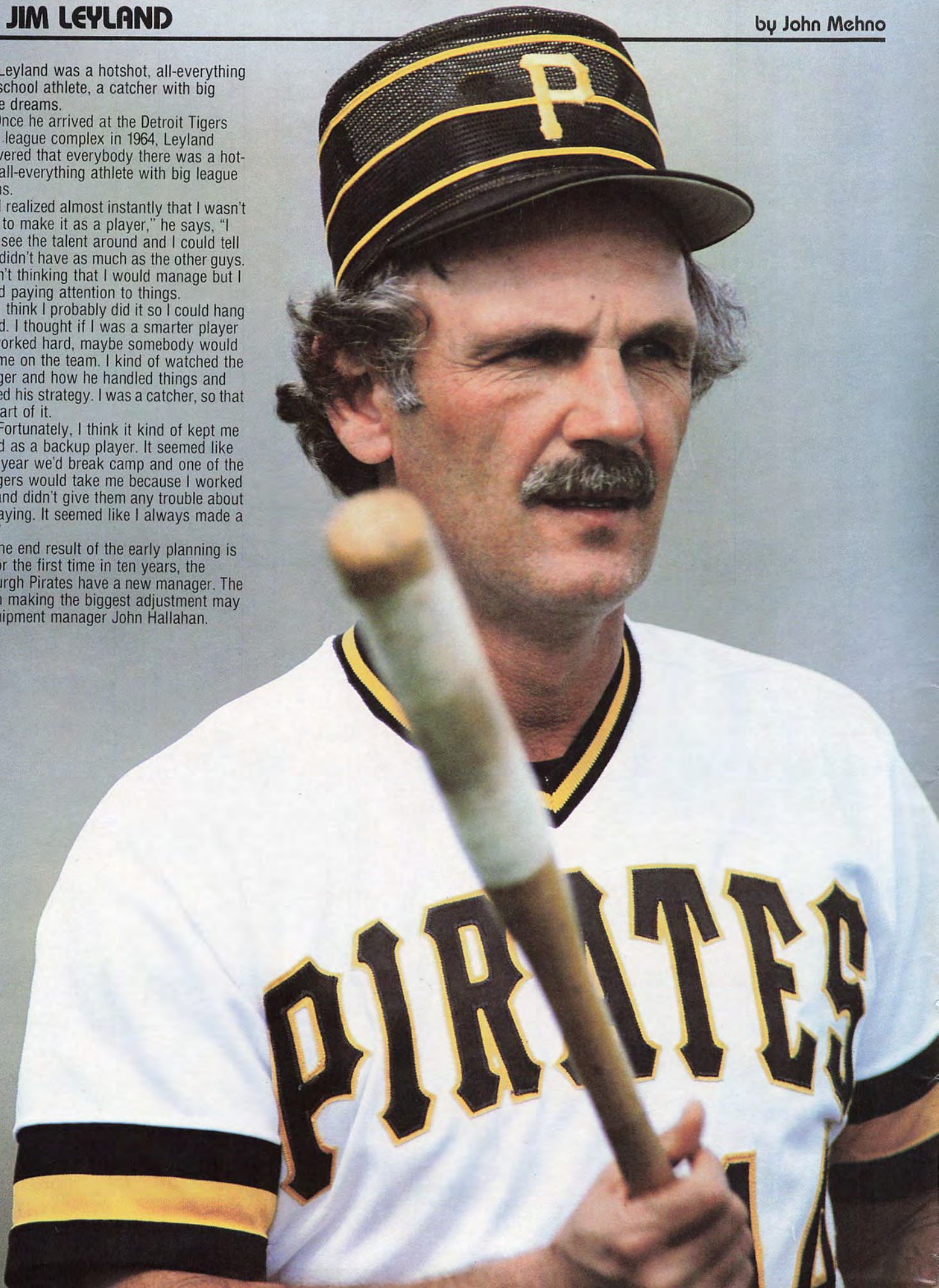
Once he arrived at the Detroit Tigers minor league complex in 1964, Leyland discovered that everybody there was a hot-shot, all-everything athlete with big league dreams.

"I realized almost instantly that I wasn't going to make it as a player," he says, "I could see the talent around and I could tell that I didn't have as much as the other guys. I wasn't thinking that I would manage but I started paying attention to things.

"I think I probably did it so I could hang around. I thought if I was a smarter player and worked hard, maybe somebody would keep me on the team. I kind of watched the manager and how he handled things and planned his strategy. I was a catcher, so that was part of it.

"Fortunately, I think it kind of kept me around as a backup player. It seemed like every year we'd break camp and one of the managers would take me because I worked hard and didn't give them any trouble about not playing. It seemed like I always made a team."

The end result of the early planning is that for the first time in ten years, the Pittsburgh Pirates have a new manager. The person making the biggest adjustment may be equipment manager John Hallahan.



## THE FIELD STAFF

Hallahan is responsible for opening and closing the clubhouse every day. He should know that the new man likes to keep hours most often associated with a convenience store.

"I like to get there early to prepare and I like to stay around late and talk baseball," Leyland says. "Being single, I really don't have anywhere else to go. I don't have to get home to the family so I enjoy sitting around after a game and relaxing."

The ideal solution might be to give Leyland his own set of keys. Throw in a full-season supply of coffee, cigarettes and Pirate wins and Leyland will be happy. A typical day won't get him on *Lifestyles of the Rich and Famous*.

"I like to get in early, look at statistics and the lineup, things like that," Leyland says. "I like being at the ballpark. I like the camaraderie, the clubhouse conversation, the hustle of the players getting ready. I like that kind of stuff. It gets me fired up."

"I'm kind of hyper and uptight all the time and I found that I make my best decisions that way. I have to be involved and I'm kind of a nervous type individual anyway. After a game, I like to take my time going over things in my mind and getting out of the clubhouse. If there's anybody there who wants to talk about baseball, I'll talk."

The 41-year-old Leyland spent much of the winter talking about who he is, where he's been and how he came to be the Pirate manager.

James Richard Leyland was born in Perrysburg, Ohio and has gone back there every offseason. Jerry Glanville, the new head coach of the Houston Oilers, graduated from Perrysburg High three years ahead of Leyland.

Leyland's past summer homes have included the ballpark at Clinton, Iowa, and a Holiday Inn in Chicago. When a newspaper survey asked a whimsical question about the three items most likely to be found in his refrigerator, Leyland answered that he didn't own a refrigerator.

Presumably his Mount Washington apartment will be equipped with one. It will, however, hold no spaghetti, which he hates. The new Pirate manager is the fifth of James and Veronica Leyland's seven children but not the first to look after a flock. Thomas Leyland is a Catholic priest in Toledo.

Trim and greying, Jim Leyland is not married, has 12 nieces and nephews and enjoys singing and hunting. His taste in clothing is casual — jeans, boots and sweaters.

He spent his entire playing career in the minor leagues, becoming a player-coach before the Tigers offered him a chance to manage their rookie league team in 1971.

"I said I'd like to give it a shot because I didn't have a lot else to do," Leyland says. "I just wanted to see how it would work. I enjoyed it." (continued on page 50)

Four of the five members of Jim Leyland's coaching staff are new to the Pirates while the fifth, Bill Virdon, renews a relationship with the organization that dates back more than 30 years.

What follows are capsule profiles of the 1986 Pirate coaches, along with Leyland's comments about each:

Ron Schueler, 38, pitching coach. Compiled a 40-48 lifetime record with the Atlanta Braves, Philadelphia Phillies, Minnesota Twins and Chicago White Sox. Coached for the White Sox and Oakland A's and worked as a special assignment scout for the A's.

"I worked with him a little bit in Chicago. Like all the coaches, he's a workaholic. He has a great knack, a sixth sense, about judging talent. He has a great rapport with the pitchers and a great capacity for evaluation."

Rich Donnelly, 39, bullpen coach. Was a minor league catcher in the Minnesota Twins and Washington Senators-Texas Rangers organizations. Coached four years with the Rangers.

"Being a former catcher, he has a good idea of what to look for with the pitchers. He'll be Schueler's sidekick because Schueler can't be down in the bullpen."

Gene Lamont, 39, third base coach, former catcher with the Detroit Tigers and former minor league manager in the Kansas City Royals system, most recently at Class AAA Omaha.

"He's managed for eight years in the minor leagues, where you rarely have a lot of coaches to help you so he knows all phases of the game. He had Bret Saberhagen, Danny Jackson and Mark Gubicza in Omaha. There was always an air of poise about those guys when they came up and I figured he had to be doing something right."

Mick Kelleher, 38, first base coach and infield instructor, former major league infielder.

"He was a major league utility player, which meant he had to know how to play all the infield positions. He's a very personable guy and he comes out of the Cardinals organization, which speaks for itself. He's also very familiar with the National League."

Bill Virdon, 55, dugout assistant and outfield instructor. Former outfielder with the St. Louis Cardinals and Pirates, former Pirate coach and manager of the Pirates, New York Yankees, Houston Astros and Montreal Expos.

"He certainly adds a touch of class to the staff. He was an outstanding player and he's been a fine manager in both leagues. I'm going to have to be cautious that I don't abuse him because when you have a guy with Bill's background you want to take advantage of it. He has a real down to earth approach and we're flattered that he decided to join us."

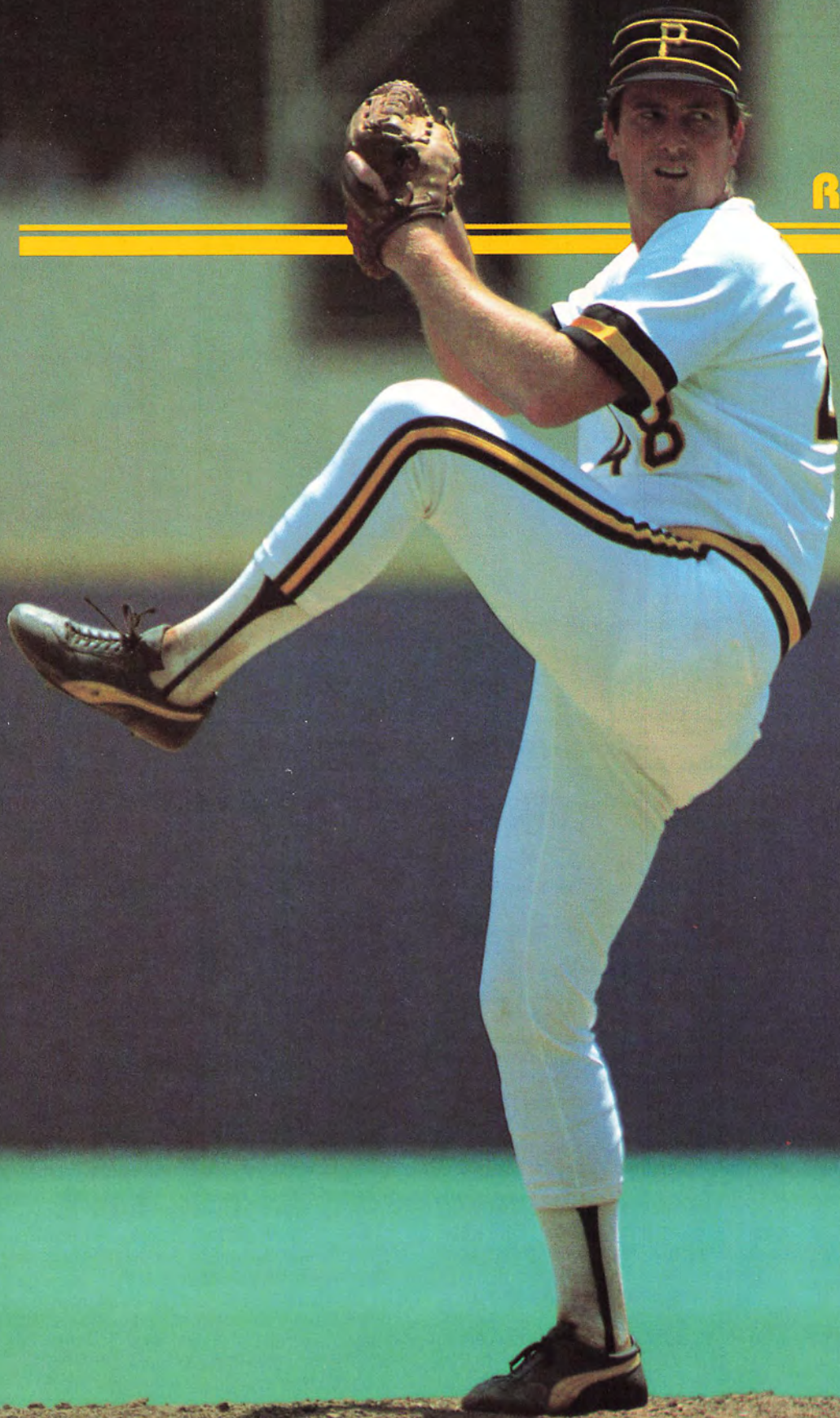

## THE PRINCE OF PIRATE BROADCASTING

Bob Friend was a rookie pitcher at his first spring training camp, trying to watch and learn.

He saw the skinny man storm through the clubhouse, moving and talking with a sense of utter urgency, shaking hands, slapping backs, and calling everyone a big donkey. Friend wasn't sure who the man was, but he was certain it was someone important.

"I thought it was one of the owners," Friend says.

In a sense, he wasn't wrong. Bob Prince didn't own the Pirates, just the town.

That's why the headline in last June 11's Post-Gazette was technically correct yet still terribly inaccurate when it said, "Bob Prince dies, Bucs Broadcaster."

Bucs broadcaster? Save that title for a generic talent who happens to be passing through. Bob Prince was the Voice of the Pirates, capital letters please.

He delighted most of his listeners, infuriated some, but who didn't know who he was? He did Pirate games for 28 years, long enough to teach the game to millions and long enough for his narrow neckties to go in and out of fashion several times.

He had already done 5,000 or so Pirate games when a very bad mistake was corrected last spring and he returned to his booth. For at least one magical night, a dismal season was brightened.

Illness had taken the power out of the familiar foghorn rasp but there were bugs on the rug, pitches that couldn't have been hit with a bed slat and at least one opposing player who was a big donkey.



Prince started his Pirate broadcast career in 1948, teaming up with another local favorite, Rosey Rowswell.

He was very sick and maybe those too young to have ever kissed one goodbye couldn't understand why the adults were misty-eyed. They didn't realize that

were being referred to as The Quail or The Tiger. You listened, you knew.

And it seemed like everyone listened. You could walk along a residential street

whatever he was saying wasn't nearly as important as the fact that Bob Prince was saying it.

He was a bigger than life figure who functioned in his own universe where people had names like Gunner and Possum and routinely wore hot pink sportcoats to work.

His former partner, Nellie King, still marvels at the way Prince could take command of a room upon entering.

The style was bombastic. His listeners always knew with whom and at what country club Prince had played golf that afternoon. He balanced with the folksy touches, the get-well greetings and birthdays and frequent asides to, "all you ladies just getting interested in this great game of ours."

As he gradually became an institution, a bond was cemented between Prince and his audience that allowed comprehension of the code. Call it Gunnerspeak.

Other announcers had sore throats; Prince invariably had a hummer than had gone south. Novices and out-of-towners unwittingly identified themselves with the confused look they offered at suggestions that a twener or vacuum was in order.

There weren't any reference books to consult for the proper definition of a can of corn. No encyclopedia ever pictured a gnat's eyelash or a tick's ear. You couldn't tell the players *with* a scorecard when they

on a summer night and not miss a pitch for all the radios blasting from porches. In winter, he hit most of the small towns on the banquet circuit.

A city that has a low tolerance for nonsense grew to accept a man who would dive into a swimming pool from a hotel window to win a small-stakes bet. Had anyone else asked fans to wave Green Weenies, the whole idea might have collapsed under its own silliness. But Prince made the fad so big in 1966 that a Time magazine story on the contending Pirates included two photos. One featured players, the other showed Prince demonstrating the proper use of the Green Weenie.

Prince was an interesting bundle of contradictions. He'd brag endlessly about the piece of advice he'd just given a board chairman in the Allegheny Club, then he'd patiently answer routine questions for a nervous kid from a school paper.

He'd chastise other announcers for not wearing a tie but Prince himself was known to strip to his underwear on hot days in the booth. And on days when the temperature rose above 50, he wouldn't wear socks, dismissing his favorite fashion aberration with a flip, "It's gauche to wear socks with Gucci."

He sold an ocean of beer as a commercial spokesman but was a confirmed vodka-and-orange juice man who never touched beer.

He seemed to regard publicity as his birthright, but the author of any article about him invariably received a polite thank-you note.

For all the bluster, he was a soft touch who couldn't say no to charity.

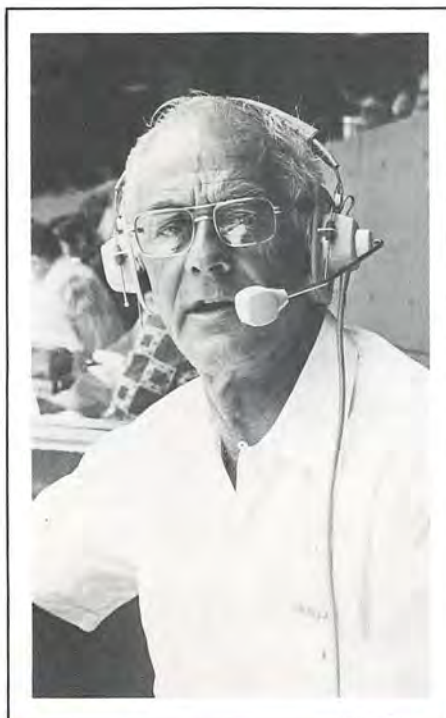
His nine-year exile from baseball did nothing to diminish his image, even when he decided to cut through the clutter of hockey play-by-play by saying, "We got it . . . now they got it." Penguin fans still smile and shake their heads about that.

He had paid his dues in this town, trying to teach everyone how a curve ball rotated by spinning a baseball in his bony fingers during television rain delays.

At the press conference to announce his return last April, a sudden breeze scattered the stack of releases. Appropriately, the wind was a factor. Prince had just been released from the hospital and was struggling to maintain his strength.

He sat behind a table at home plate and made time for everyone. On three occasions, well-intentioned people from the Pirates and KDKA came to rescue him, but Prince waved them off each time.

He was back where he belonged and savored the moment. So did his listeners.



Unfortunately, his return only lasted three games. His health deteriorated and Prince died of cancer on June 10, less than a month short of his 69th birthday.

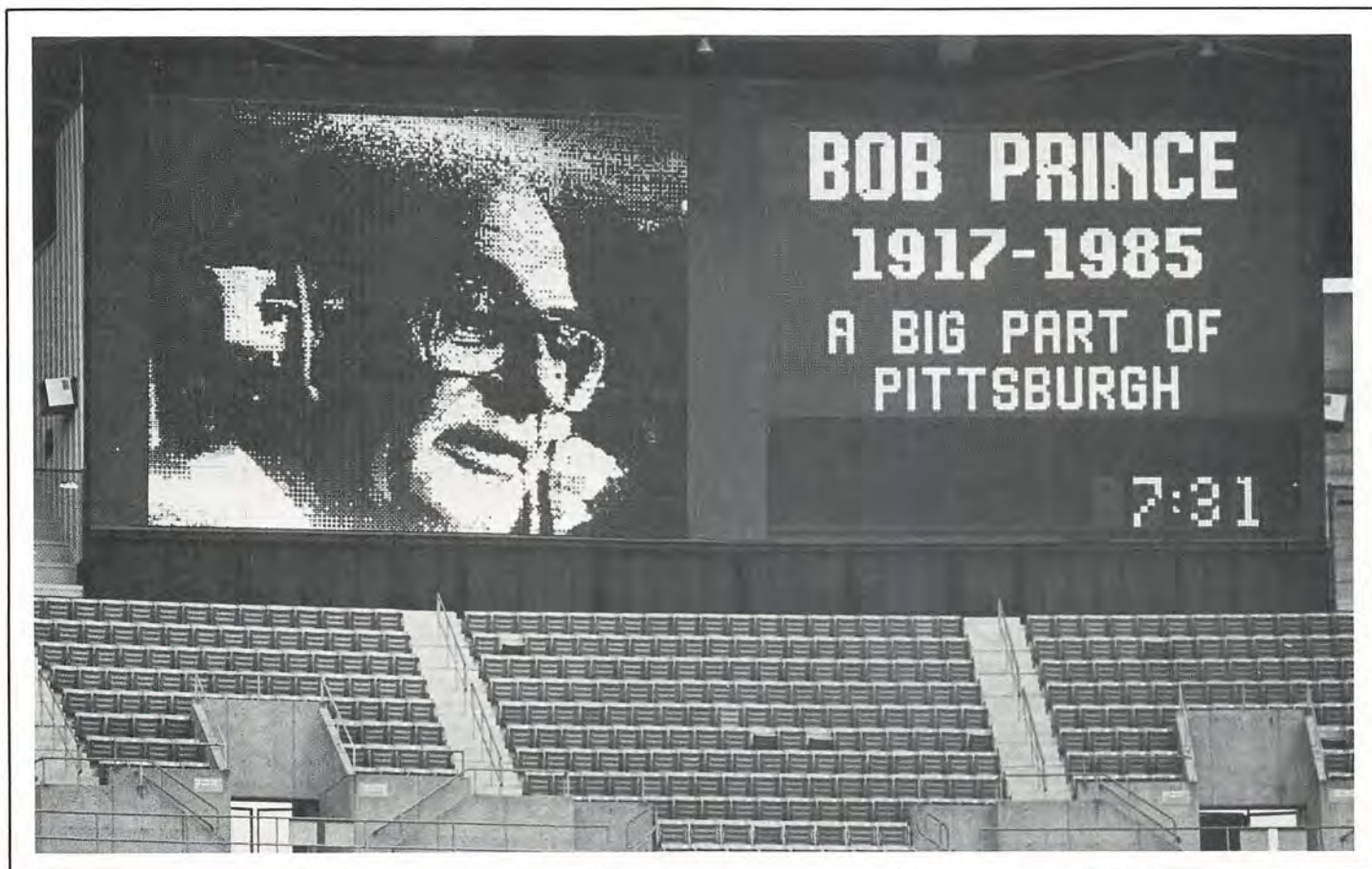
His friends went before the television cameras that night to remember the man. Their sadness was quickly lifted with the retelling of the stories, each more outrageous than the one before it, the supply inexhaustible. While everyone groped for the right words, Nellie King said it best.

"He may have been 68 years old but he did about 90 years worth of living," King said. "He didn't get cheated. He got his three swings every day."

For 28 years, his listeners shared in that energy and joy of life. The baseball Hall of Fame acknowledged his contributions with the March announcement that Prince was this year's recipient of the Ford Frick Award. It is the way announcers take their place alongside the game's greats.

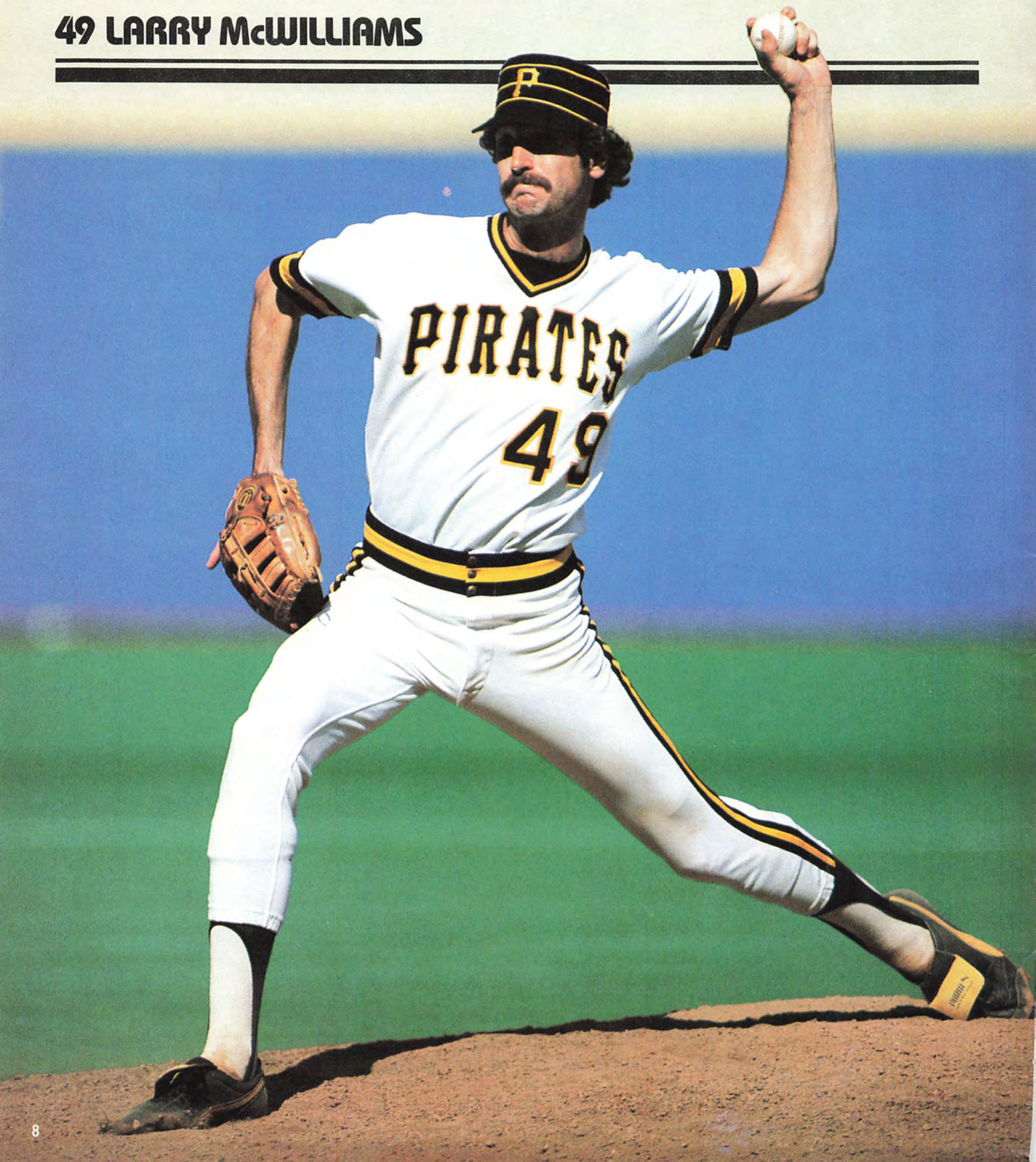
It is sad that it has taken this long but appropriate that Prince is honored.

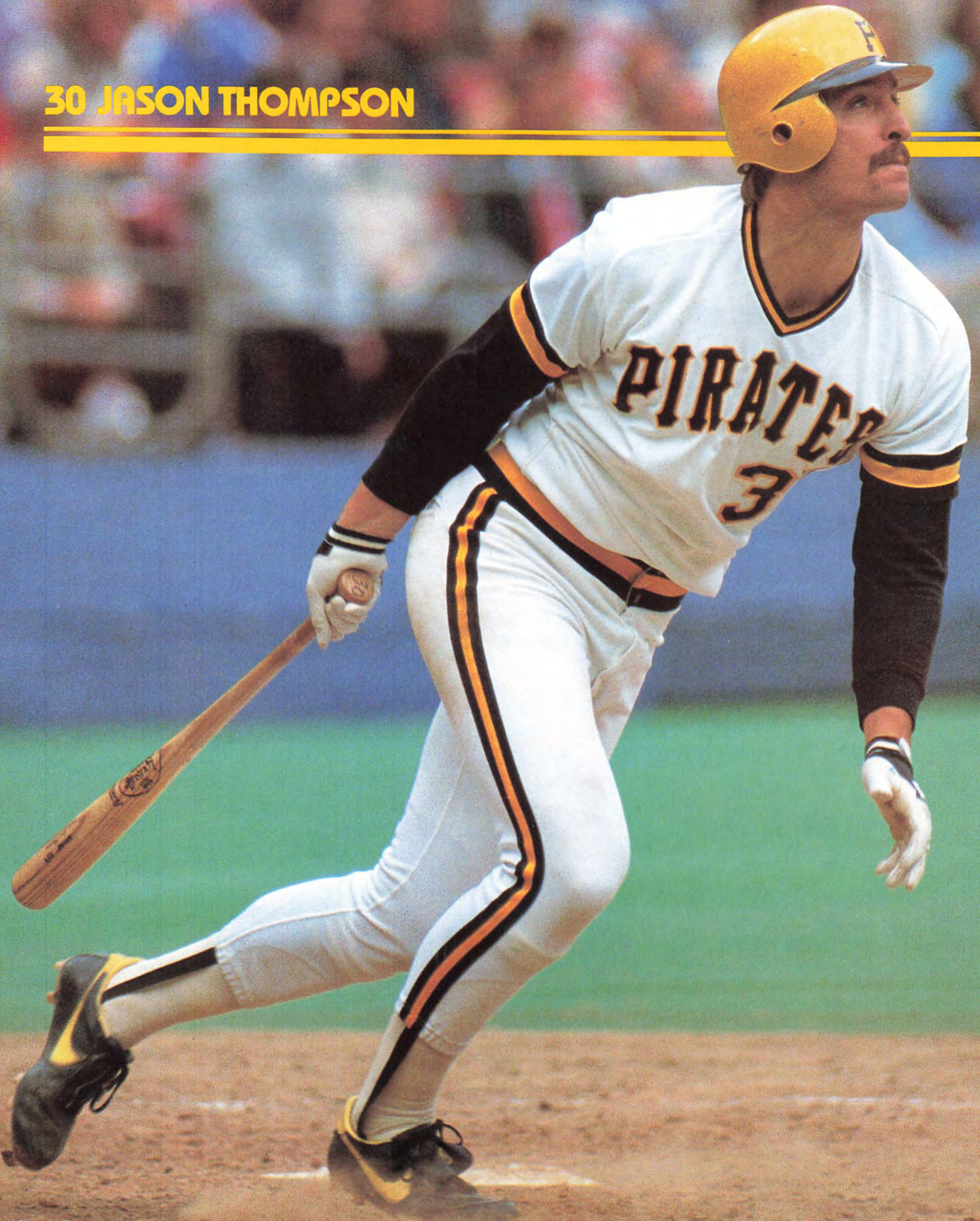

# THE KDKA RADIO AND TV BROADCASTERS

Now in their 32nd consecutive year with the Pirates, KDKA-Radio and KDKA-TV have been originating Pirate broadcasts each year since 1955. The affiliation, however, started long before the current streak. KDKA-Radio, for example, broadcast the first baseball game ever, when Harold Arlin was behind the microphone on August 5, 1921 when the Pirates faced the Phillies.

For the sixth straight year, Lanny Frattare and Jim Rooker team up on the radio side. Frattare is the senior member of the Pirate broadcast team. Now in his 11th season with the club, only Bob Prince, Rosey Rowswell, and Jim Woods have described Pirate action longer than the Rochester, N.Y. native.

Lanny began his distinguished career as a baseball broadcaster in 1968 when he did play-by-play for the Geneva (NY) Senators in the Class A New York-Penn League. In 1970 he handled some of the Rochester Red Wings' International League telecasts. His association with the Pirates began in 1974 when he served as a broadcaster for the Charleston Charlies, the Pirates' AAA affiliate. After two years with the Charlies, he joined the Pirates' broadcast crew in 1976.

Rooker is now in his sixth season with KDKA-Radio. A former lefthanded pitcher, Rooker won 103 major league games, including 82 with the Pirates. Signed originally as an outfielder by the Detroit Tigers, he made his major league debut with that club in 1968 pitching in two games. The Kansas City Royals drafted him in the expansion draft following the '68 season and he remained with the Royals until October 25, 1972 when he was acquired by the Pirates.

The Pirates' TV broadcast crew has a new look this year. Back for his fifth full season is KDKA-TV Sports Director John Sanders, but he is joined by two newcomers to the KDKA-TV/Pirate microphones. Joining

him are fellow KDKA-TV sports reporter Alan Cutler and former Pirate pitcher Steve Blass.

Sanders' affiliation with the Bucs actually began in 1980 when he filled in on some telecasts. A native of Manhattan, KS, Sanders has been with KDKA-TV since February of 1978, joining the station after spending 12 years at KMBC-TV in Kansas City, MO where he was twice presented with the Missouri Broadcasting Assn. Sports Reporting Award.

Cutler joined the KDKA-TV sports team in August of 1984 after serving as sports director of WLEX-TV in Lexington, KY for three and a half years. A native of Brooklyn, NY, Cutler received his B.A. degree from Cortland (NY) State in 1975 and has worked

as a broadcaster in Farmington, NM, Grand Junction, CO, Boise, ID and Monroeville, PA, as well as in Lexington and Pittsburgh.

Former Pirate righthander Steve Blass worked with Bob Prince on Pirate cable telecasts, and was retained when the cable rights were secured by Home Sports Entertainment in 1983. A native of Canaan, CT, Steve was signed by the Pirates in June of 1960 and pitched in 10 major league seasons (1964-74) with the Pirates, compiling a record of 103-76. He ranks seventh on the Pirates' all time list in strikeouts (896) and 14th in wins (103). He was a member of the 1972 All-Star squad and was a hero in the 1971 World Series against Baltimore, picking up complete game wins in games 3 and 7.

The Tigers promoted him to Class A the following year. He spent two seasons there, finishing first in the second half of the 1973 season. That earned him another promotion, this time to Class AA. The next year, he was back in Class A Clinton.

"I got a setback because some of the guys I was managing had been teammates of mine and I didn't do too good a job," Leyland says, "I kind of let them take advantage of our friendship and it got me sent back to A ball.

"That woke me up and I was never going to let that happen again. I had to be more responsible. I started working harder. I started having pretty good success back in A ball and the next move, I skipped Double A and went up to Triple A."

In his first year with Class AAA Evansville, Leyland's team won the 1979 American Association championship and the manager thought it might be his long-awaited ticket to the major leagues. There would be two more seasons in Evansville before the call finally came.

When it did, he wasn't sure what to say. After all the 39-cent hamburgers and bus rides, Jim Leyland took his time answering when the major league team called. The problem was the Chicago White Sox, not the Tigers, were on the line.

"The White Sox had gotten permission from the Tigers before they called me," Leyland says. "I had been with the Tigers for 18 years so I called them and asked if they had any room for me on their major league staff before I took the White Sox job. I wanted to make sure that everything was on the up-and-up with the Tigers because I didn't want to leave with any bad feelings."

Chicago provided much-needed visibility and a chance to work with White Sox manager Tony LaRussa.

"A lot of people in Chicago probably thought he brought me in because we were friends but that's not true," Leyland says. "We were opponents, fierce competitors and we didn't get along too well if you want to know the truth."

Their paths had crossed in the minors when LaRussa managed the White Sox farm team at Des Moines. A misunderstanding once led to a cross-field shouting match between the two.

"We weren't enemies but we weren't friends, either," Leyland says. "We had kind of a mutual respect, I guess. I liked the fact that he had the guts to go out on the line and hire an unknown like me as his third base coach. I really respected that."

Leyland served on LaRussa's staff for four seasons. Their friendship grew and LaRussa enthusiastically recommended Leyland to the Pirates.

Leyland's moustache and sloping shoulders have led to Billy Martin compar-

isons, but there's another manager he'll measure himself against.

"There's no doubt in my mind that LaRussa's the best I've been around," Leyland says.

LaRussa has also been an unofficial consultant during the offseason. Leyland had several long conversations with his former boss and says the advice helped him endure a media crunch that was new to him.

"He really instructed me on how to budget my time," Leyland says. "If I had gotten all these calls two years ago, it would have been chaos. Tony's one of the people I really respect, along with (Tigers general manager) Bill Lajoie, (Tigers' special assignment scout) Hoot Evers, (former White Sox general manager) Roland Hemond and (Tigers' president) Jim Campbell."

Leyland made several speaking appearances for the Pirates over the winter. He had a couple of standard jokes and no promises.

What does a man say when he's taking over a team that lost 104 games?

"You get on press tours and sometimes you can get carried away with talk," Leyland says. "I really didn't want to say too much other than people will get their money's worth when they come to see the Pirates. We'll work hard and we'll give our best effort. I did a lot more talking than I have in a long time."

The time for talking ended on April 8, the day the National League's youngest manager officially went to work. Jim Leyland is one of two National League managers (Houston's Hal Lanier is the other) without previous major league managing experience.

"I certainly don't have any secrets and I'm sure I'm going to get some lessons this year," he says. "I know that people are going to be watching me and I have to earn their respect. The only way to do that is by doing a good job for the Pirates."

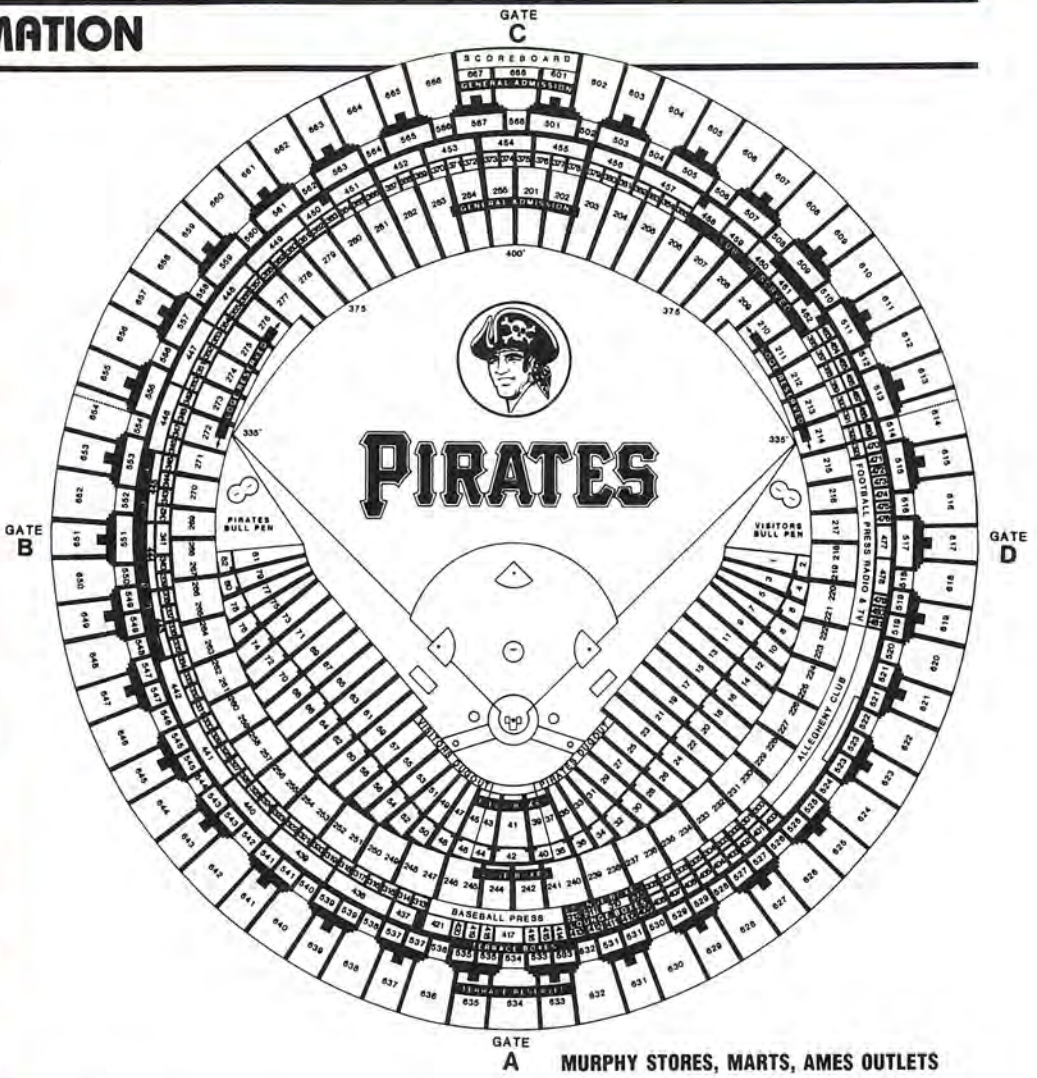

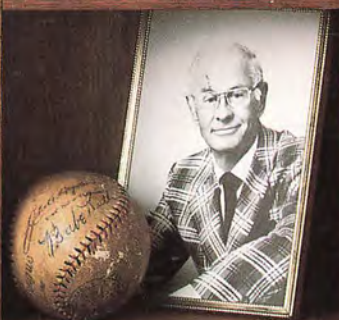
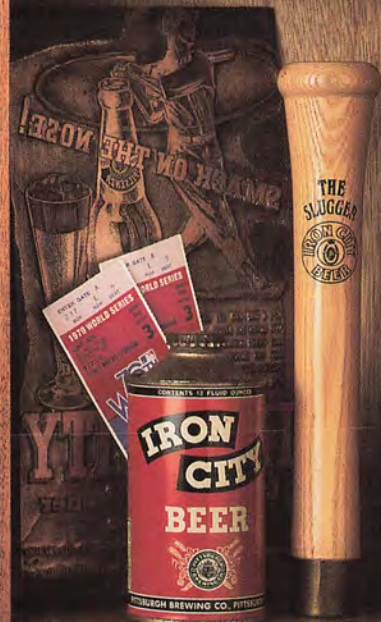
