**RAY A. KROC**  
**CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD & PRESIDENT**



The love affair between Ray Kroc and the baseball fans of San Diego began in January of 1974 when at the proverbial eleventh hour he bought the staggering franchise and saved major league baseball for San Diego. At the time the club appeared headed for Washington, D.C. with the highest paid attendance in 5 years of operation in San Diego only 644,000.

In the 6 years Ray Kroc has owned the franchise, attendance has always been over one-million reaching a high of 1,670,107 in 1978 when the team finished above the .500 mark for the first time. The 1978 season was especially gratifying to the Padre owner since it was the first year he took an active part in its operation following the move of Buzzie Bavasi to the California Angels.

Ray Kroc began his love of baseball as a Cubs fan in Chicago following the exploits of famous players like Hack Wilson, Gabby Hartnett, Rogers Hornsby, Stan Hack, Phil Cavarretta, Andy Pafko and many others. His strong interest in baseball led him to buy the Padres in 1974 and eventually to move his home to the San Diego suburb of La Jolla which he says he now loves as much as the Padres.

Although his purchase of a major league baseball team made him a strong personality among sports fans throughout the nation he was already well known in the business community as the man who built the McDonald Corporation into the largest fast-food operation in the world.

In 1955 at age 52 he took the concept of licensing independent owners and was instrumental in creating the modern fast-food industry. Today there are over 5,000 of his restaurants around the world.

Working for the Lili-Tulip Cup Corp., he served as the Midwest Sales Manager for 17 years and eventually took over the exclusive sales for a new invention, the milk shake multimixer machine.

A small hamburger restaurant in San Bernardino, California owned by the McDonald brothers attracted his attention by purchasing eight of his machines. Realizing that a chain of similar restaurants would use a lot of his multimixers he started his own system under a royalty agreement with the brothers, whom he has long since bought out.

The rest is history.

Now Kroc is hoping to make history as the owner of a World Championship Baseball team.

# JERRY COLEMAN



Named Padre Manager October 1 after serving for eight seasons as the club's number one play-by-play announcer.

Despite no previous managerial experience, Coleman has a vast background in baseball. He broke into professional baseball in 1942 with the New York Yankees organization, but had his career interrupted by World War II. He finally made it to the Yankees in 1949 where he led American League 2nd baseman in fielding and was voted AP Rookie of the Year.

A veteran of nine years in the majors, all with the Yankees, Coleman compiled a lifetime average of .263 with a best of .287 in 1950. That was probably his best all around season as he was chosen for the American League All-Star team and won the Most Valuable Player Award in the World Series as the Yankees swept the Phillies in four straight games.

Coleman knows a thing or two about winning baseball. The Yankees captured the American League pennant in eight of the nine seasons Coleman played, winning the World Series six times. Because of war interruptions, Coleman appeared in six World Series (four winning efforts) and batted .275. In his final series in 1958 he had eight hits against Milwaukee, batting .364.

Apart from service in World War II, Coleman also had his career interrupted by the Korean conflict. He finished with a combined total of 120 missions, receiving two Distinguished Flying Crosses, 13 Air Medals and three Navy Citations. He holds the rank of Lt. Colonel in the Marine Corps (Ret).

In addition to his broadcast work with the Padres, Coleman was one of the Yankees announcers for seven years after serving as the New Yorker's Personnel Director for two seasons. The Yankees had a 10-club farm system at the time and Coleman supervised the signing of such Yankee stars as Jim Boutton, Joe Pepitone and Tom Tresh.

## CHUCK ESTRADA — PITCHING COACH



Chuck Estrada begins his 2nd full season as the Padres pitching coach. Chuck began 1978 as the Padres Co-ordinator of Field Activities with additional duties of assisting the pitchers in the minor league system. Suddenly he found himself as major league pitching coach when Roger Craig was named manager following the mid-March dismissal of Alvin Dark.

Estrada certainly rose to the occasion as the Padres pitching staff finished second to the Dodgers in National League ERA honors at 3.28. Two members of Estrada's staff won post-season honors. Gaylord Perry

was chosen Cy Young winner and relief ace Rollie Fingers was the Fireman of the Year.

Estrada brings experience to the job both as a successful major league pitcher and major and minor league pitching coach . . . spent seven years in the majors with the Baltimore Orioles, Chicago Cubs and New York Mets . . . posted a lifetime record of 50-44, 4.07 . . . had 535 strikeouts in 764 innings . . . broke into the majors in 1960 leading the American League with an 18-11 record as a rookie . . . overall, was 18-11, 3.58 with 144 whiffs in 209 innings . . . named the Rookie Pitcher of the Year and was on the A.L. All-Star squad and pitched one inning in the annual classic . . . followed the next year by going 15-9, 3.69 with 160 strikeouts in 212 innings . . . began his professional career right out of Atascadero (Ca.) High School in the Orioles organization . . . toiled three years in the minors and led each league in strikeouts . . . after his playing career he joined the Mets as their pitching coach on the minor league level for 1970-72 . . . was the Texas Rangers pitching coach in 1973 and then the Atlanta Braves minor league instructor in 1974 . . . from 1975-77 he was the California Angels minor league pitching coach.

was the MVP in the Pacific Coast League for Tacoma, batting only .264 but driving in 98-runs . . . has managed and coached many current Padres at Hawaii and the Arizona Instructional League, including John D'Acquisto, Juan Eichelberger, Barry Evans, Tim Flannery, Brian Greer, Mark Lee, Steve Mura, Broderick Perkins, Don Reynolds, Rick Sweet and Tom Tellman.

## AL HEIST—COACH



Heist is joining the Padres major league coaching staff for the first time in 1980, although he has been associated with the club since 1975 . . . he was the Padres Midwest Scouting Supervisor for four seasons and helped draft and sign pitcher Bob Shirley and the top two picks in the in the 1978 June draft, Andy Hawkins and Doug Gwosdz . . . In 1979 Heist was the Padres co-ordinator of instruction . . . Al has also worked with many of the current Padre players in spring training and during the Arizona Instructional League . . . Heist was regarded as an exceptional defensive outfielder during his playing days and is considered a superb teacher of outfielding fundamentals . . . he began his

pro career in 1949 at Redding as a member of the St. Louis Browns organization . . . in 1955 he joined the Sacramento Solons of the Pacific Coast League and played in Sacramento for six seasons . . . in 1960 he was batting .299 with 13-homers and 66-RBI in 89-games when he was called up to the majors for the first time by the Chicago Cubs . . . he went from the Cubs to Houston in 1962 during the National League Expansion Draft . . . however, Al injured a knee in 1962 and never fully recovered, although he played three more seasons at Oklahoma City before ending his playing career in 1965 . . . he worked as a coach for the Astros and a scout for the Cubs before joining the Padres in 1975 . . . Heist figures to be the Padres 3rd base coach in 1980 under new manager Jerry Coleman.

Don Williams is beginning his fourth season as a member of the Padre coaching staff after serving the organization in a number of different capacities since the club's inception back in 1969. Rising through the ranks, so to speak, Williams first served with the club as the Midwest Supervisor from 1969-73 and then took over as the Southwest Supervisor for 1974. For the next two seasons he was the Padres Co-ordinator of Instruction which encompassed making sure all four

of the Padres' minor league teams were functioning under the same guidelines as set down on the major league level.

While serving as a Padre scout, he signed outfielder Dave Winfield to a major league contract right off the University of Minnesota campus.

Prior to joining the San Diego Padres in 1969, he had been with the Los Angeles Dodgers organization for 11 years both as an infielder in their minor league system and then lastly as a manager.

Williams began his professional career in 1957 at Shawnee of the old Sooner League and three times made it up to the Dodgers top minor league franchise, Spokane of the Pacific Coast League. His best season was 1961 when he led the California League in hitting (.363), at bats (542), runs scored (132) and hits (197) while at Reno. Additionally, he was second in doubles (32) and fifth in RBI (97).

He also hit .297 at Albuquerque of the Texas League in 1967 in his last full year as a player. The next season he took over as manager of the Dodgers Bakersfield club in the California League.

## RULES OF INTEREST

- PLAYER LIMITS:** 40 until opening day, when the number must be reduced to 25 until Sept. 1, when it again becomes 40.
- DETERMINING BATTING AVERAGE:** Divide the number of at bats into the number of hits.
- DETERMINING AN EARNED RUN AVERAGE:** Multiply the number of earned runs by nine; take the number and divide it by the number of innings pitched.
- DETERMINING SLUGGING PERCENTAGE:** Divide the total bases of all hits by the total times at bat (At bats do not include walks, sacrifices, hit by pitcher, or times awarded first base because of interference or obstruction).
- DETERMINING FIELDING AVERAGE:** Divide the total putouts and assists by the total of putouts, assists and errors.
- DETERMINING PERCENTAGE OF GAMES WON AND LOST:** Divide the number of games won by the total games won and lost.
- CONSECUTIVE HITTING STREAKS:** A consecutive hitting streak shall not be terminated if the plate appearance results in a base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or a sacrifice bunt. A sacrifice fly shall terminate the streak.
- CONSECUTIVE-GAME HITTING STREAKS:** A consecutive-game hitting streak shall not be terminated if all the player's plate appearances (one or more) result in a base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or a sacrifice bunt. The streak shall terminate if the player has a sacrifice fly and no hit.
- CONSECUTIVE-GAME PLAYING STREAK:** A consecutive-game playing streak shall be extended if the player plays one half-inning on defense, or if he completes a time at bat by reaching base or being put out. A pinch-running appearance only shall not extend the streak. If a player is ejected from a game by an umpire before he can comply with the requirements of this rule, his streak shall continue.
- SUSPENDED GAMES:** For the purpose of this rule, all performances in the completion of a suspended game shall be considered as occurring on the original date of the game.
- TRADING REGULATIONS:** Players are available on waivers in reverse order of standings, at the time waivers expire, if more than 30 days after start of the season; otherwise in reverse order of standings at close of preceding season.
- INTER-LEAGUE TRADES:** Midnight, five days after the World Series—Midnight, night preceding the last scheduled day of the Winter Meetings—No waivers are necessary. Plus Feb. 15 to Mar. 15.
- TRADING WITHIN LEAGUE:** Midnight, the last day of the season—Midnight, June 15—No waivers necessary. Midnight, June 15—Midnight the last day of the season—League waivers necessary.
- DETERMINING THE MAGIC NUMBER:** Determine the number of games yet to be played, add one, then subtract the number of games ahead in the loss column of the standings from the closest opponent.
- DOCTORED BAT:** If a filled or "doctored" bat is used, the player is to be ejected from the game and suspended three days. Any balls hit by an illegal bat do not count. If the umpire sees the illegal bat before it is used, he issues a warning, but there is no penalty.
- DETERMINING A "MAJOR LEAGUE YEAR":** 172 days constitute a full year in the major leagues.

## IS IT DAY OR NIGHT?

However, both games of a two-night doubleheader shall be considered night games. When afternoon and night games are played on the same day and separate admissions are charged, they will be counted as one day and one night game, and will not be included in doubleheader statistics.

The 81 games played by the Padres in San Diego Stadium in 1979 required 12,843 minutes to play.

That's an average of 1 hr. 59 mins. for each home contest.

## SAN DIEGO STADIUM

The San Diego Padres play their home games in San Diego Stadium located in the heart of the Mission Valley area in San Diego.

Built at a cost of \$28 million by the people of San Diego, the facility seats 51,362 for baseball. With the move to the football configuration, permanent seating is 52,552.

Ground breaking for the natural turf facility was on December 24, 1966 with the official dedication ceremonies on August 30, 1967. The first baseball game in the stadium was on April 5, 1968 between the San Francisco Giants and Cleveland Indians in an exhibition contest at the close of spring training.

**Padre Broadcast Team of Dave Campbell, Eddie Doucette and Tommy Jorgensen**

**DAVE CAMPBELL**

Former Padre Infielder Dave Campbell returns for his third season in the broadcast booth and his first as the number-one play-by-play man. Campbell succeeds Jerry Coleman, now the Padre Manager, and will be joined by Eddie Doucette as the 1980 Padre broadcast team.

Dave played for Detroit in 1967-69 and then came to the Padres in a multi-player deal that saw pitcher Joe Niekro go to the Tigers. Campbell spent three seasons with the Padres before being traded to the St. Louis Cardinals in June, 1973. He later went to the Houston Astros where he finished out his playing career in 1974.

Dave put together an eight-year major league career with a lifetime batting average of .213. His best was .227 in 108-games for the Padres in 1971.

Following his retirement from the playing ranks he went to work for KCST-TV in San Diego as a cameraman and reporter and later as a sportscaster. In August, 1975 he moved to KSDO Radio as a sportscaster. Campbell then changed his career plans again in December, 1976 by accepting an offer from the Padres to manage their Amarillo Club in the Texas League.

Born in Manistee, Michigan the 37-year-old Campbell holds a B.S. Degree from the University of Michigan where he played on their NCAA Championship team of 1962 and Captained the 1964 squad.

**EDDIE DOUCETTE**

Eddie Doucette joins Dave Campbell as the regular Padre broadcast crew for 1980. It will be Eddie's first full year in the Padre booth but his 7th season of working major league baseball games. In 1979 Doucette was involved on radio during the 30 Padre telecasts. Doucette came to San Diego in 1979 after working primarily in the Milwaukee area for 15 years. During that tenure Eddie was involved in various television and radio sports shows as well as working as radio-TV voice of the NBA Milwaukee Bucks from their inception in 1968. Doucette is continuing as the television voice of the Bucks while also handling San Diego State football and basketball plus the Thursday night NBA Network Cable TV game of the week. Eddie is a 1961 graduate of Michigan State and he worked in Cincinnati and Chicago before travelling to Milwaukee in 1964. In addition to his NBA basketball work Eddie has worked Milwaukee Brewers, Houston Astros and Cleveland Indians baseball as well as several football bowl games on network TV. He now resides in Poway with his wife Karen and two sons, Brett (7) and Cory (5).

**TOMMY JORGENSEN**

Popular Tommy Jorgensen returns to the Padre Broadcast Booth for his 7th straight season as Producer-Engineer. Tommy began his broadcast career in El Centro back in 1948 as a Disc Jockey-Engineer. He moved to San Diego in 1949 where he has since worked at almost every level of radio broadcasting. However, it was his producing and engineering talents that led him into the Padres booth in 1974 and he has since become an invaluable member of the broadcast team.

**TED LEITNER**

Leitner joins the Padre Broadcast team for the first time in 1980. Ted will assist on channel-8 and KFMB Radio during the 42 Padre telecasts this season. Leitner has been the sports director at channel-8 in San Diego for the last two years, handling telecasts of the NBA San Diego Clippers games in addition to his daily TV shows. Ted has also worked San Diego State football and basketball games over KFMB Radio as well as helping out on some Padre broadcasts last spring. Before coming to San Diego Leitner worked television sports in Oklahoma City, Hartford, Connecticut and Philadelphia. Along the way he handled Philadelphia Eagles football, University of Connecticut and Oklahoma University football and basketball. Leitner is a 1970 graduate of Oklahoma State and attended graduate school at the University of Oklahoma in 1971 obtaining a degree in speech communications.



**BOB CHANDLER**

Padres Public Relations Director Bob Chandler will help broadcast the games on radio during the 42 Padre telecasts in 1980. Chandler is no stranger to the booth, having worked with Jerry Coleman as the San Diego broadcast team from 1972 thru 1977. Chandler has been involved in the San Diego radio-TV scene since 1961 working as a newsreel cameraman, TV sports director, radio sports-talk host and handling play-by-play of San Diego Chargers football, NBA Rockets basketball, San Diego State football & basketball as well as various highlight and coach's shows.





### MEXICAN BROADCAST TEAM

Lopez, Thomas and De La Torre have been together since the Padres first season in the National League back in 1969. Lopez was also selected to broadcast the National League playoffs and World Series to Latin America the last three years and the All Star game the last two years. Over the winter Thomas does the play-by-play for the Aguilas team of Mexicali in the Pacific Mexican League.

All regular season San Diego home games will be broadcast, plus all games from Los Angeles and San Francisco and selected games from other National League cities.

The San Diego Padres and KFMB-TV (Channel 8) will team up to televise 39 regular season and 3 pre-season games in 1980. The schedule includes games from every city in the National League and involves telecasts during every Padre road trip.

The Padres regular broadcast team of Dave Campbell and Eddie Doucette will be joined by Channel 8 sportscaster Ted Leitner for the 42 television games with Doucette, Leitner and Bob Chandler handling the chores on KFMB Radio during TV games.

John DeMott

John DeMott in 1980 begins his second decade of handling the Public Address Announcing duties for the Padres. The versatile DeMott is the sports director at KSDO and in addition to handling several daily sports shows he works the color on Chargers football broadcasts, calls the play-by-play for the Sockers and does the PA for the Clippers. John has been doing the Padre PA work since the 1970 season.



Dr. Paul Bauer

Dr. Bauer has been the Padres team physician since the franchise entered the National League in 1969. His services have also been in demand by many of the other sports teams in San Diego, having served as team doctor for the basketball Rockets and Conquistadors, Hockey Mariners and volleyball Breakers. Bauer came to San Diego from Pennsylvania where he attended college and Medical school. He received his orthopedic training at the University of Pittsburgh and got his start in sports medicine working with the Pittsburgh Pirates, including the Pirates world championship team in 1960.



Ray Peralta

Ray Peralta is beginning his 12th season as the Padres equipment manager, thereby making his 27th year in professional baseball. Ray served as equipment manager for the Padres of the Pacific Coast League from 1952-68. A nine-year Navy veteran, he has more than 30 years of government experience to his credit, having worked for more than 21 years at the Naval Air Station, North Island in San Diego.



Dick Dent

Trainer and Conditioning Coach Dick Dent is beginning his 5th year with the Padres. A certified member of the National Athletic Trainers Association, Dent has served with the former San Diego Conquistadors of the ABA, plus the Chargers, San Diego State and San Diego Mesa College. Dent also runs a very popular off-season conditioning program at San Diego Stadium for the Padres and other interested baseball players in the area. An army veteran, Dent is married (Mary Lou) with two children. He received his education at San Diego State.



Whitey Wietelmann

Whitey Wietelmann and baseball in San Diego are synonymous. Whitey, for the first time in many years, will be out of uniform in 1980 but certainly not out of sight. The popular Wietelmann will help out in spring training and work with Ray Peralta in the clubhouse as well as perform a multitude of chores that only he can do including the cooking of his world famous chili. There are very few people more knowledgeable about the game of baseball than Whitey Wietelmann. He began his pro career in 1937 and has served the game in almost every capacity imaginable including coaching with the major league Padres since 1969.

In their 11-year existence, the Padres have used 173 players. Of that number, 78 have been pitchers, including 23 southpaws.

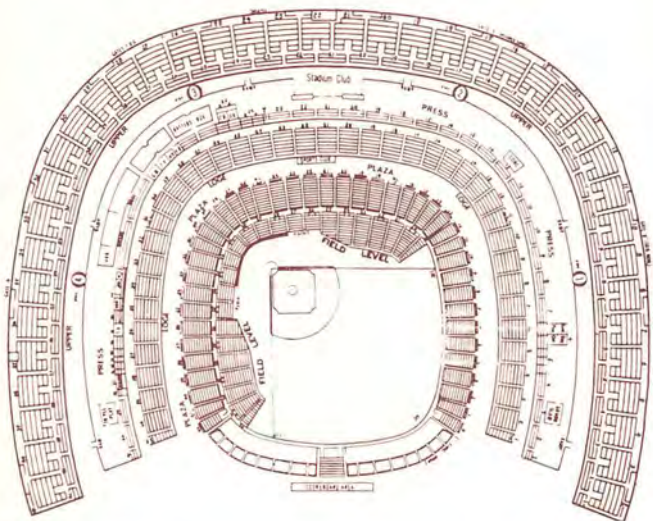
