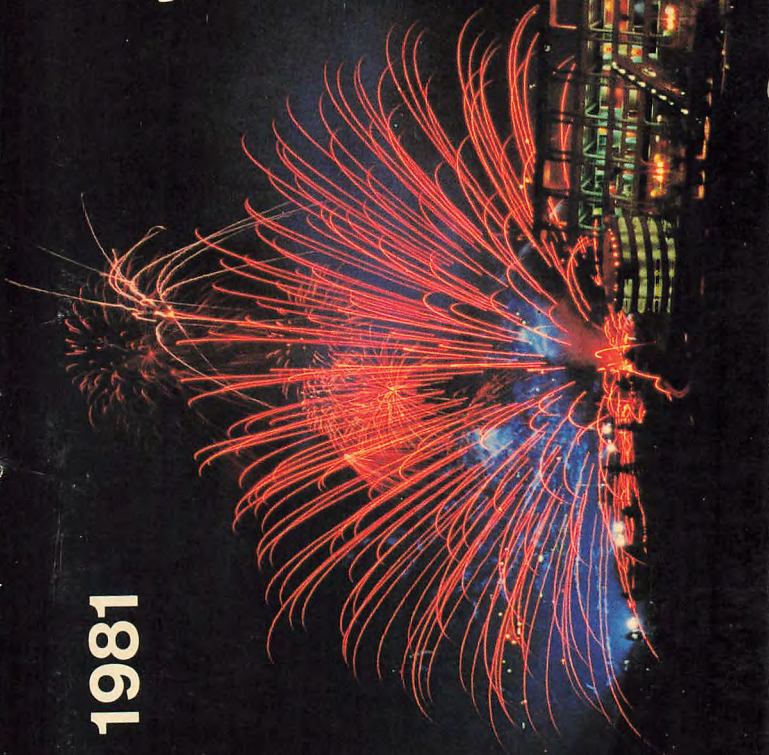

**RAY A. KROC**  
**CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD & OWNER**



The love affair between Ray Kroc and the baseball fans of San Diego began in January of 1974 when at the proverbial eleventh hour he bought the staggering franchise and saved major league baseball for San Diego. At the time the club appeared headed for Washington, D.C. as the highest paid attendance in 5 previous years of operation in San Diego was only 644,000.

In the 7 seasons Ray Kroc has owned the franchise attendance has always been over one-million, reaching a high of 1,670,107 in 1978 when the team finished above the .500 mark for the first time and San Diego had the honor of hosting major league baseball's All-Star Game.

Ray Kroc began his love of baseball as a Cubs fan in Chicago following the exploits of famous players like Hack Wilson, Gabby Hartnett, Rogers Hornsby, Stan Hack, Phil Cavarretta, Andy Pafko and many others. His strong interest in baseball led him to buy the Padres in 1974 and eventually to move his home to the San Diego suburb of La Jolla which he says he now loves as much as the Padres.

Although his purchase of a major league baseball team made him a strong personality among sports fans throughout the nation he was already well known in the business community as the man who built the McDonald Corporation into the largest fast-food operation in the world.

In 1955 at age 52 he took the concept of licensing independent owners and was instrumental in creating the modern fast-food industry. Today there are over 5,000 of his restaurants around the world.

Working for the Lili-Tulip Cup Corp., he served as the Midwest Sales Manager for 17 years and eventually took over the exclusive sales for a new invention, the milk shake multimixer machine.

A small hamburger restaurant in San Bernardino, California owned by the McDonald brothers attracted his attention by purchasing eight of his machines. Realizing that a chain of similar restaurants would use a lot of his multimixers he started his own system under a royalty agreement with the brothers, whom he has long since bought out.

The rest is history.

Now Kroc is hoping to make history as the owner of a World Championship Baseball team.

## JOAN KROC – DIRECTOR



Joan Kroc is a Director of the Padres and founder of Operation Cork, a national communications program for alcohol education. Married to Ray Kroc, founder and senior chairman of McDonald's Corporation and owner of the Padres, Mrs. Kroc launched Operation Cork in 1975 as a program of the Kroc Foundation, with the intent to communicate a message of help and hope to the millions of family members living in an alcoholic situation. She is also on the board of the University of San Diego and is a vice president of the Kroc Foundation, which in addition to funding Operation Cork, gives grants for research in arthritis, multiple sclerosis and diabetes.

## BALLARD SMITH – PRESIDENT, DIRECTOR



Ballard is beginning his 4th full season with the Padres and his 2nd as Club President. He joined the San Diego organization in mid-season 1977 as Vice President-General Counsel, was elevated to Executive Vice President by the end of the season and was named President in September, 1979. Prior to entering the baseball business Smith was the district attorney of Crawford County, Pennsylvania after previously being associated with a law firm in Meadville, Pennsylvania. Smith is a graduate of the University of Minnesota Law School and also holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree in sociology from Carleton College in Minnesota. Ballard and his wife Linda reside in La Jolla with their four young daughters. Allison (8), Amy (5), Amanda (4) and Holly (1).

## ELTEN SCHILLER

### VICE PRESIDENT & DIRECTOR OF BUSINESS OPERATIONS



Elton has directed all the business operations of the Padres since joining the organization in 1972. He came to San Diego after spending 25 years in the Los Angeles Dodgers organization, serving as General Manager of Spokane, Albuquerque, Omaha and St. Paul. Schiller started at St. Paul as a part-time helper following his discharge from the Navy in 1947 and before leaving worked his way up to Assistant to the President. Elton was born in Germany and raised in Blair, Ohio. He currently makes his home in the University City area of San Diego.

## JACK McKEON

### VICE PRESIDENT, DIRECTOR OF BASEBALL OPERATIONS



Jack McKeon officially took over the baseball end of the San Diego Padres September 23, 1980 after serving on an interim basis since July. Jack totally revamped the ballclub with a series of trades that saw many veterans leave the organization and a spirited group of younger players arrive. McKeon had originally joined the Padres in September of 1979 as assistant to then general manager Bob Fontaine. During his long and colorful career in baseball McKeon has managed in 13 major and minor league cities as well as serving as coach, scout, scouting director, farm director, assistant general manager and general manager. He began his baseball career as a catcher in the Pittsburgh organization in 1949. McKeon and his wife Carol have four children, sons Kelly and Kasey and daughters Krish and Kori.

# THE MANAGER

## FRANK OLIVER HOWARD

Born August 8, 1936 at Columbus, Ohio — Resides: Green Bay, Wisconsin — 6-8, 270 — married Carol — 6 children, Tim, Cathy, Dan, Mitchell, Mary and Becky.

**33** Frank was named to replace Jerry Coleman as Padre Manager October 6, 1980 with Coleman returning to the Padres broadcast booth. Howard had been a coach with the Milwaukee Brewers the last four seasons after managing the Brewers' Spokane farm club in 1976.

The 44-year-old Howard is literally a giant of a man, standing 6' 8" tall and weighing 270 pounds. He played 15 seasons in the major leagues, including seven each with the Los Angeles Dodgers and Washington Senators.

Howard joined the Dodgers in 1960 after a sensational minor league season in 1959 at Victoria of the Texas League and Spokane of the Pacific Coast League. He hit 23 homers and drove in 77 runs for the 1960 Dodgers and was honored as National League rookie of the year.

In 1962 with the Dodgers, Howard batted .296 with 31 homers and 119 RBI. He was traded to Washington after the 1964 season and twice led the American League in home runs, belting 44 homers in both 1968 and 1970. Actually his career high in home runs was 1969 when he hit 48. His 126 RBI and 132 walks led the American League in 1970.

Howard holds the major league record for most home runs in one week (10), most home runs in five consecutive games (8) and most homers in six consecutive games (10). He played in one world series (1963) with the Dodgers and four All-Star games (1968-71) for the American League while a member of the Senators. He concluded his major league career with Detroit in 1973.

Howard was born in Columbus, Ohio and attended Ohio State University where he became an All Big-10 selection and team captain in basketball as well as starring in baseball. He and his wife Carol currently live in Green Bay, Wisconsin with their six children.

# THE COACHES

## EDDIE BRINKMAN

Coach — B-R — T-R Hgt. 6-0 — Wgt. 171 — Born 12-8-41 in Cincinnati, Ohio — Residence, Cincinnati — Married (Donna) with daughters Kimberly (13) and Shari (11).

**37** First coach hired by new Padre manager Frank Howard. Brinkman and Howard were teammates on the Washington Senators and Howard wants Brinkman to handle the Padre infielders in 1981. Brinkman was an outstanding shortstop with Washington and the Detroit Tigers from 1962 thru 1974. He was traded to St. Louis in 1975 and ended his career that year with the New York Yankees. In 1972 with Tigers, Brinkman established five major league shortstop fielding records—fewest errors in season (7), most consecutive errorless games (72), highest fielding average (.990) in 100 or more games, highest fielding average in 150 or more games (.990) and most consecutive errorless chances (331) . . . won the Gold Glove, named Tiger of the Year and finished 9th in American League MVP balloting. Originally signed out of Western Hills High School in Cincinnati where he was a high school teammate of Pete Rose. Attended the University of Cincinnati. Has been managing and coaching in the Detroit organization since 1977.

## BRINKMAN HIT .203 BUT WAS NAMED MVP

Coach Eddie Brinkman, while playing with Detroit in 1972, was named Most Valuable Tiger that season by the Detroit baseball writers. He batted only .203 but his fielding exploits won him the honor.

## CHUCK ESTRADA

Pitching Coach — 6-1 — 185 — Born Feb. 15, 1938 in San Luis Obispo, California — Residence, San Diego, California — Married (Jo). Named as Padre major league pitching coach on March 21, 1978.

**23** Chuck Estrada begins his 3rd full season as the Padres pitching coach. Chuck began 1978 as the Padres Co-ordinator of Field Activities with additional duties of assisting the pitchers in the minor league system. Suddenly he found himself as major league pitching coach when Roger Craig was named manager following the mid-March dismissal of Alvin Dark.



Estrada certainly rose to the occasion as the Padres pitching staff finished second to the Dodgers in National League ERA honors at 3.28. Two members of Estrada's staff won post-season honors. Gaylord Perry was chosen Cy Young winner and relief ace Rollie Fingers was the Fireman of the Year. Chuck served as pitching coach under Craig again in 1979 and under Jerry Coleman in 1980. In 1981 he begins service under new Padre skipper Frank Howard.

Estrada brings experience to the job both as a successful major league pitcher and major and minor league pitching coach . . . spent seven years in the majors with the Baltimore Orioles, Chicago Cubs and New York Mets . . . posted a lifetime record of 50-44, 4.07 . . . had 535 strikeouts in 764 innings . . . broke into the majors in 1960 leading the American League with an 18-11 record as a rookie . . . overall, was 18-11, 3.58 with 144 whiffs in 209 innings . . . named the Rookie Pitcher of the Year and was on the A.L. All-Star squad and pitched one inning in the annual classic . . . followed the next year by going 15-9, 3.69 with 160 strikeouts in 212 innings . . . began his professional career right out of Atascadero (Ca.) High School in the Orioles organization . . . toiled three years in the minors and led each league in strikeouts . . . after his playing career he joined the Mets as their pitching coach on the minor league level for 1970-72 . . . was the Texas Rangers pitching coach in 1973 and then the Atlanta Braves minor league instructor in 1974 . . . from 1975-77 he was the California Angels minor league pitching coach.

**34** Krol joined the Padres as third base coach January 15, 1981. He had been scheduled to manage the St. Louis Cardinals farm club at Springfield after serving as third base coach for the Redbirds the last four seasons. Krol had been with the Cardinal organization since signing as a third baseman in 1954. He played for ten different St. Louis farm clubs from 1954 thru 1966 when he began managing teams in the Cardinal farm system. Although he appeared in two world series for St. Louis (1967 and 68) his greatest success as a player occurred in Cincinnati during the 1969, 70 and 72 seasons. ### QUALIFYING MARKS

**QUALIFICATION FOR BATTING CHAMPIONSHIP**—highest batting average and 502 or more plate appearances.

**QUALIFICATION FOR PITCHING CHAMPIONSHIP**—lowest ERA and 162 or more innings pitched.

**QUALIFICATIONS FOR A "ROOKIE"**—not more than 45 days on a major league roster between opening day and Sept. 1, and has not exceeded 130 official At-Bats (or 50 innings pitched).

**QUALIFICATIONS FOR A SAVE**—Credit a pitcher with a save when:  
 1. He is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club, and  
 2. He is not the winning pitcher, and 3, he qualifies under one of the following conditions: (a) He enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitches for at least one inning, or (b) He enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, at bat, or on deck (that is, the potential tying run is either already on base or is one of the first two batsmen he faces), or (c) He pitches effectively for at least three innings. No more than one save may be credited in each game.

### BITS ABOUT BATS

Not too much thought is usually given to the baseball bat, but there are a couple of important points to remember.

The newer model cupped bats may have an indentation in the end of the bat up to one inch in depth and may be no wider than two inches and no less than one inch in diameter. The indentation must be curved with no foreign substance added.

If a filled or "doctored" bat is used, the player is to be ejected from the game and suspended for three days. Any balls hit by an illegal bat do not count. If the umpire sees the illegal bat before it is used, he issues a warning, but there is no penalty.

**17** Had outstanding 1980 season as the Padres regular left fielder . . . was 2nd in the National League in hits (193), 5th in stolen bases (61). 8th in runs (91), 12th in batting (.301) and led the major leagues in outfield assists (21) . . . his hits, stolen bases and assists also established club records . . . June 21 he threw runners out at 3rd and home vs Montreal and September 15 nabbed runners at 2nd and 3rd at Houston . . . his 335 total chances were the most for any left fielder in the NL . . . Gene had 13 3-hit games, including 4 straight July 11-14 . . . he also had 4-hit games July 19 at Chicago, August 6 at Cincinnati and September 1 vs Montreal . . . he had five 6-game hitting streaks, one 7-game streak, one 8-game streak, two 9-game streaks and one 13-game streak from June 28 thru July 15 (24 for 55 for .436) . . . Wright's mark was 601 assists and Oz finished the season with 621 . . . Ozzie's .974 fielding average was the best in the NL of those shortstops who play on natural fields . . . overall, Tim Foli (.981) and Dave Concepcion (.978) finished ahead of Ozzie, but Oz had 307 more chances than Foli and 201 more chances than Concepcion . . . ## RULES OF INTEREST

**PLAYER LIMITS:** 40 until opening day, when the number must be reduced to 25 until Sept. 1, when it again becomes 40.

**DETERMINING BATTING AVERAGE:** Divide the number of at bats into the number of hits.

**DETERMINING AN EARNED RUN AVERAGE:** Multiply the number of earned runs by nine; take the number and divide it by the number of innings pitched.

**DETERMINING SLUGGING PERCENTAGE:** Divide the total bases of all hits by the total times at bat (At bats do not include walks, sacrifices, hit by pitcher, or times awarded first base because of interference or obstruction).

**DETERMINING FIELDING AVERAGE:** Divide the total putouts and assists by the total of putouts, assists and errors.

**DETERMINING PERCENTAGE OF GAMES WON AND LOST:** Divide the number of games won by the total games won and lost.

**CONSECUTIVE HITTING STREAKS:** A consecutive hitting streak shall not be terminated if the plate appearance results in a base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or a sacrifice bunt. A sacrifice fly shall terminate the streak.

**CONSECUTIVE-GAME HITTING STREAKS:** A consecutive-game hitting streak shall not be terminated if all the player's plate appearances (one or more) result in a base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or a sacrifice bunt. The streak shall terminate if the player has a sacrifice fly and no hit.

**CONSECUTIVE-GAME PLAYING STREAK:** A consecutive-game playing streak shall be extended if the player plays one half-inning on defense, or if he completes a time at bat by reaching base or being put out. A pinch-running appearance only shall not extend the streak. If a player is ejected from a game by an umpire before he can comply with the requirements of this rule, his streak shall continue.

**SUSPENDED GAMES:** For the purpose of this rule, all performances in the completion of a suspended game shall be considered as occurring on the original date of the game.

**DETERMINING THE MAGIC NUMBER:** Determine the number of games yet to be played, add one, then subtract the number of games ahead in the loss column of the standings from the closest opponent.

**DOCTORED BAT:** If a filled or "doctored" bat is used, the player is to be ejected from the game and suspended three days. Any balls hit by an illegal bat do not count. If the umpire sees the illegal bat before it is used, he issues a warning, but there is no penalty.

**DETERMINING A "MAJOR LEAGUE YEAR":** 172 days constitute a full year in the major leagues.

## PADRES, CARDS DEAL BIGGEST EVER?

The deal last Dec. 8 between the Padres and Cardinals which saw 11 players change uniforms was the biggest in Padre history and one of the biggest in all of baseball.

Technically, it may have been the largest one day transaction of all time.

Baltimore and the New York Yankees swapped 18 players in November, 1954. That deal, however, was consummated in two parts.

On Nov. 18 that year, the Orioles traded Bob Turley, Don Larsen and Billy Hunter to New York for Harry Byrd, Jim McDonald, Hal Smith, Gus Triandos, Gene Woodling and Willie Miranda.

The other nine players changed clubs in the second part of the deal Dec. 1.

The San Diego Padres play their home games in San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium located in the heart of the Mission Valley area in San Diego.

Built at a cost of \$28 million by the people of San Diego, the facility seats 51,362 for baseball. With the move to the football configuration, permanent seating is 52,552.

Ground breaking for the natural turf facility was on December 24, 1966 with the official dedication ceremonies on August 30, 1967. The first baseball game in the stadium was on April 5, 1968 between the San Francisco Giants and Cleveland Indians in an exhibition contest at the close of spring training.

### SPIEZIO HIT FIRST PADRE HOMER

Ed Spiezio is credited with the first Padre hit, first RBI, first extra base hit and first homerun: all on the same time at bat.

In the fifth inning vs. Houston, April 8, 1969, Spiezio rocked Pitcher Jim Wilson for a bases empty homerun into the leftfield seats. It was the first hit of the game given up by Wilson. The Padres went on to win, 2-1.

### 3 HOMERUNS IN SAN DIEGO STADIUM

Only three players have hit three homeruns in one game in San Diego Stadium. Lee May, then with Houston, was the first to do it June 21, 1973. Jimmy Wynn, with Los Angeles, was next when he drove three into the stands May 11, 1974:

Johnny Bench, of the Reds, was the last to hit three homeruns in the same game. He connected May 29, 1980, and all came off Randy Jones.

**Padre Broadcast Team of Jerry Coleman, Dave Campbell and Tommy Jorgensen**

**JERRY COLEMAN**

Jerry Coleman returns as the Padres number one radio-TV voice after spending the 1980 season as Padre Manager. One of the most respected play-by-play men in baseball, Jerry has been selected the last four years by CBS radio to handle the action for the worldwide network of the National League championship series and this will be his 9th season as the Padres voice. Jerry previously worked in broadcasting in Los Angeles and New York where he broadcast Yankee games for seven years. Red Barber, Mel Allen, Joe Garagiola and Phil Rizzuto are among the distinguished baseball broadcasters who have worked with Coleman. Coleman had played 9 seasons for the Yankees and in 1949 led American League 2nd basemen in fielding and was voted AP Rookie of the Year. Coleman had a lifetime batting average of .263 with a high of .287 in 1950. In 1950 he was also chosen on the American League All-Star team and won the MVP Award in the World Series as the Yankees swept the Phillies in four straight games. Coleman twice had his baseball career interrupted by wars. He served in World War II and the Korean Conflict as a Marine pilot and finished his service career with a combined total of 120 missions, receiving two Distinguished Flying Crosses, 13 Air Medals and three Navy Citations.

**DAVE CAMPBELL**

Former Padre infielder Dave Campbell returns for his 4th season in the broadcast booth. Dave played for San Diego from 1970 until he was traded to St. Louis in 1973 after originally coming to the Padres from Detroit after the 1969 season. He concluded his playing career in 1974 with Houston, then sandwiched broadcasting jobs at KCST-TV and KSDO Radio in San Diego around one season of managing the Padres Amarillo, Texas farm club. In 1978 Dave joined the Padres broadcast team. Born in Manistee, Michigan, the 38 year old Campbell holds a B.S. Degree from the University of Michigan where he played on their NCAA Championship team of 1962 and captained the 1964 squad.

**TOMMY JORGENSEN**

Popular Tommy Jorgensen returns to the Padres broadcast booth for his 8th straight season as Producer-Engineer. Tommy began his broadcast career in El Centro back in 1948 as a Disc Jockey-Engineer. He moved to San Diego in 1949 where he has since worked at almost every level of radio broadcasting. However, it was his producing and engineering talents that led him into the Padres booth in 1974 and he has since become an invaluable member of the broadcast team.

**TED LEITNER**

Leitner will be involved with Coleman and Campbell on the 42 Padre telecasts this season over KFMB-TV (channel 8) where Ted is the sports director. In addition to Padre baseball the past two seasons, Leitner has handled Clippers basketball on TV and San Diego State football and basketball over KFMB Radio. Before coming to San Diego, Leitner worked television sports in Oklahoma City, Hartford, Connecticut and Philadelphia. Along the way he handled Philadelphia Eagles football, University of Connecticut and Oklahoma University football and basketball. Leitner is a 1970 graduate of Oklahoma State and attended graduate school at the University of Oklahoma in 1971 obtaining a degree in speech communication.



**EDDIE DOUCETTE**

Eddie will handle the Padre radio broadcasts over KFMB when the games are televised on channel 8. It will be his third season working San Diego baseball and his 8th year in major league baseball having previously worked Houston, Cleveland and Milwaukee games. Doucette came to San Diego in 1979 after working primarily in Milwaukee for 15 years where he was involved in various TV and radio shows as well as Milwaukee Bucks basketball. For the last two years Eddie has been involved in the Thursday Night Cable-TV NBA telecasts. Doucette is a 1961 graduate of Michigan State and



now resides in Poway with his wife Karen and two sons, Brett (8) and Cory (6).

**BOB CHANDLER**

Padres Public Relations Director Bob Chandler will help broadcast the games on radio during the 42 Padre telecasts in 1980. Chandler is no stranger to the booth, having worked with Jerry Coleman as the San Diego broadcast team from 1972 thru 1977. Chandler has been involved in the San Diego radio-TV scene since 1961 working as a newsreel cameraman, TV sports director, radio sports-talk host and handling play-by-play of San Diego Chargers football, NBA Rockets basketball, San Diego State football & basketball as well as various highlight and coach's shows.





### MEXICAN BROADCAST TEAM

**Announcer Mario Thomas Zapiain and Gustavo Lopez Moreno with engineer Juan De La Torre.**

Lopez, Thomas and De La Torre have been together since the Padres first season in the National League back in 1969. Lopez was also selected to broadcast the National League playoffs and World Series to Latin America the last four years and the All Star game the last three years. The trio of Jerry Coleman, Dave Campbell and Channel 8 sports director Ted Leitner will work the telecasts with Eddie Doucette and Bob Chandler handling the chores over KFMB Radio during TV games.

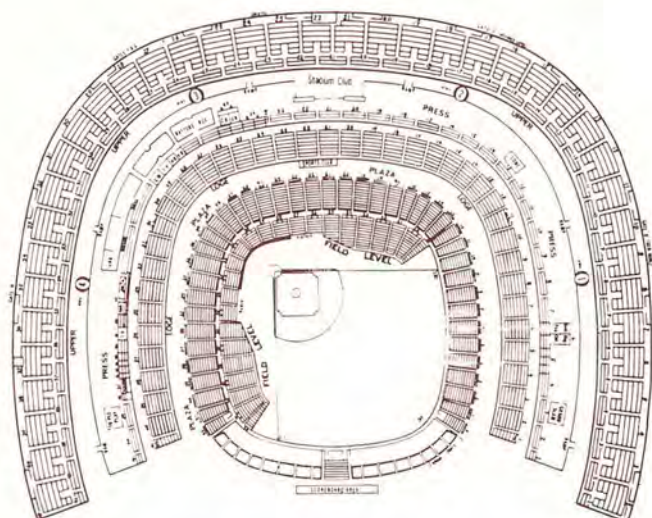
## 3 GUYS NAMED DAVIS ON CLUB
