## **DANIEL F. O'BRIEN**

### **President & Chief Executive Officer**

Born March 26, 1930 in Elizabeth, N.J. . . . appointed to his position Jan. 17, 1979, a week after resigning as Vice President and General Manager of the Texas Rangers . . . spent five years with the Rangers, beginning in 1973 when he took over a club that had finished last for two consecutive years . . . during his tenure Texas had 3 2nd-place finishes and set 3 club attendance records.

Began his baseball career in 1955 when Branch Rickey hired him as General Manager of the Pittsburgh Pirates' Burlington, N.C., affiliate . . . later worked as G.M. of the Milwaukee Brave farm clubs at Boise, Idaho; Jacksonville, Fla.; Louisville, Ky.; and Greenville, S.C.

Prior to joining the Rangers, spent 9 years as Assistant to the President of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues . . . in this position as one of baseball's top administrators, was involved in the adjudication of baseball rule violations, participated in the realignment of the minor league structure, and administered Baseball's Winter League program involving Mexico, Venezuela, Puerto Rico and the Dominican Republic . . . attended Seton Hall University and was graduated from Florida Southern College . . . he and his wife Mary Ann have 2 children, Dan and Lori.

## **KIP HORSBURGH**

### **Executive Director**

Born July 28, 1947, in Cleveland, Ohio, where he was raised . . . named Executive Director of the Seattle Mariners on May 18, 1978, succeeding Dick Vertlieb . . . originally joined the Mariner organization soon after the club's inception in the summer of 1976 . . . in December, 1977, was appointed to the post of Assistant to Executive Director under Vertlieb.

Prior to joining the Mariner staff, spent 3 years as Director of Marketing for the Texas Rangers (1974-76) . . . was co-owner and general manager for 2 minor league clubs: the Magic Valley Cowboys (Twin Falls, Idaho) of the Pioneer League in 1971; and the Elmira (N.Y.) Pioneers of the Eastern League in 1972.

Also served as Director of Season Ticket Sales for the Cleveland Barons Hockey Club (American Hockey League) in 1969, and for the Cleveland Cavaliers Basketball Club (National Basketball Association) in 1970.

Graduate of Bowdoin College (Brunswick, Maine) in 1969, where he played baseball for 4 years . . . also earned Master's in Business Administration from Stanford University . . . now resides on Mercer Island with his wife Jean.

## **HAL KELLER**

### **Director of Player Development**

Born July 7, 1927 in Middletown, Md. . . . named Director of Player Development by the Mariners on Jan. 22, 1979 . . . resigned as Farm Director of the Texas Rangers on the same date after 16 years in that position . . . began in baseball in 1948 as a minor league catcher in the Washington Senator organization . . . following his 7 years as a player, including 25 games in 3 different seasons in the majors with Washington, he was a high school teacher in his hometown Frederick, Md., for four years . . . brother of former Yankee star outfielder Charlie "King Kong" Keller.

He then returned to pro baseball as a minor league manager for the Senators in 1958 . . . moved into the front office as Assistant Farm Director of the "old" Washington Senators for two years (1959-60) . . . when the Senator franchise moved to Minnesota in 1961, he became the first Farm Director of the expansion Washington Senators . . . in 1963-64 served as eastern scouting supervisor of the Minnesota Twins.

Returned to the Senators in 1965, and moved with the franchise to Texas in 1972 . . . some of the players developed in systems guided by Keller include Jeff Burroughs, Bill Madlock, Jim Sundberg, Toby Harrah, Roy Smalley and David Clyde among a total of over 50.

## MAURY WILLS (30)

**POSITION:** Former shortstop

**BORN:** 10-2-32 in Washington, D.C.

**NAMED MANAGER:** Became manager of the Mariners on Aug. 4, 1980, replacing Darrell Johnson.

**PERSONAL:** Maurice Morning Wills . . . Resides in Playa del Rey, Cal. . . . Son Bump is the second baseman of the Texas Rangers . . . After retirement served as commentator for the NBC Game of the Week from 1973-78 . . . In 1979 prior to joining the Mariners, hosted a weekly baseball show for Home Box Office, as well as broadcasting Thursday Night Game of the Week . . . Serves as a consultant during the off-season for the Hankyu Braves in Japan.

**MANAGER/INSTRUCTOR:** Managed in the Mexican Winter League with Hermosillo (1970-73) and Mazatlan (1978-79) . . . Following his retirement as a player in 1972, served as a special instructor for 8 teams, including the Los Angeles Dodgers, San Diego Padres, Houston Astros, Chicago Cubs, Pittsburgh Pirates, Oakland A's, Cleveland Indians and San Francisco Giants . . . Has instructed teams in Japan over the past 7 years.

**MARINERS** — Seattle posted a 20-38 record after Maury took over on Aug. 4 in Anaheim . . . In the 58 games under Wills, the M's stole 64 bases; in the 105 games prior to his arrival, the team stolen base total was 52.

**FATHER VS. SON:** When the Texas Rangers played the Mariners in the Kingdome on September 25, 1980, it marked the first time a father (Maury Wills) managed in a major league game against his son (Bump Wills).

**PLAYING CAREER:** Performed for 14 years as a shortstop in the National League (1959-72) with the Los Angeles Dodgers, Pittsburgh Pirates and Montreal Expos . . . Played in 4 World Series with L.A. . . . Spent 8½ seasons in the Dodgers' minor league system before being called up in 1959; was the Dodger captain.

**STOLEN BASES** — Ranks 8th on the all-time stolen base list with 586 . . . Set major league record for most stolen bases, season (104) in 1962, a mark since eclipsed by Lou Brock (118) in 1974 . . . In 1962 broke the 47-year old record of Ty Cobb (96 in 1915) . . . Established N.L. record for most consecutive seasons leading in stolen bases, 6 (1960-65) . . . In the 41 years before Wills swiped 104 in 1962, no National Leaguer had stolen half that many in a single season.

**HONORS** — In 1962, was named the N.L. Most Valuable Player, as well as *The Sporting News* Major League and N.L. Player of the Year . . . Gold Glove winner at shortstop in 1961-62 . . . Selected to N.L. All-Star team in 1961-62-63-65-66.

**OTHER RECORDS** — Holds major league record for most games played (165) in 1962, when the Dodgers lost a 3-game playoff . . . Tied N.L. record for most years leading league in singles, 4.

## TOMMY DAVIS (12)

**POSITION:** Batting coach,  
former outfielder  
**AGE:** 41, turns 42 on March 21  
**BORN:** 3-21-39 in Brooklyn, N.Y.

**BATS:** Right  
**THROWS:** Right  
**HEIGHT:** 6-2  
**WEIGHT:** 200

**PERSONAL:** Herman Thomas Davis, Jr. . . . Resides in Los Angeles, Cal. . . . Played baseball at Boys High in Brooklyn, and was a teammate of Seattle Supersonics' Coach Lenny Wilkens on the basketball team . . . Is active in the off-season giving hitting clinics in the Southern California area.

**COACHING CAREER:** First year in a coaching capacity was in 1980, when he served as the minor league batting coach for the California Angels' organization.

**PLAYING CAREER:** Compiled a lifetime .294 batting average over his 18-year major league career . . . Came up to the majors in 1959 with the Los Angeles Dodgers and remained with them through the 1966 season, a teammate of Maury Wills . . . Ended his playing career in 1976, having played for 10 different teams, tying a major league record; the only others to see action for 10 teams were 3 pitchers (Dick Littlefield, 1950-58; Bob Miller, 1957-74; and Ken Brett, 1967-80) . . . Won back-to-back N.L. batting titles in 1962 (.346) and 1963 (.326) . . . During 1962 he also led the N.L. in hits (230) and RBIs (153); the 153 mark has not been matched in the majors since then . . . Played in the 1962-63 All-Star Games, and was named outfielder on *The Sporting News* N.L. All-Star team the same seasons . . . His career was slowed down by a broken ankle suffered May 1, 1965, vs. San Francisco . . . Came back in 1966-67 to put together .300-plus seasons at the plate . . . In the final 4 years of his career he was used mainly as a designated hitter, hitting .284 with 27 HR and 241 RBIs in that role.

**PERSONAL:** Franklin Ray Funk . . . Resides in Phoenix, Ariz., with his wife Sue and children Roberta, David and Jim . . . Graduated from Bethesda-Chevy (Md.) High in 1953 . . . Played basketball at Sheperd State (W.Va.) Teachers College; also attended American University and the University of Maryland.

**COACHING CAREER:** Following his retirement as a player in 1967, Frank managed at the Class A level in the San Francisco Giants' organization for 5 seasons (1969-71 at Decatur of the Midwest League; 1972-73 at Fresno of the California League) . . . Served as the Giants' organizational pitching instructor in 1974-75 and 1977-78, and coached for San Francisco in 1976 . . . Joined the Phillies' organization as a coach at Reading, Pa. (Eastern) in 1979, and prior to joining the Mariner staff in Aug., 1980, was the Phils' organizational pitching instructor.

**PLAYING CAREER:** Pitched for 14 years in pro ball (1954-67), including 4 years in the majors (1960-63) . . . In first year (1954) made Kitty League All-Star team, and tied for league high in complete games (17) . . . Called up by the Cleveland Indians in 1960, and pitched strictly out of the bullpen for the Tribe . . . Top season was 1961 when he appeared in 56 games, posting an 11-11 mark with 11 saves and a 3.31 ERA . . . Was 3-3 for the Milwaukee Braves in 1963 . . . Had lifetime major league record of 20-17 with 18 saves and a 3.00 ERA.

**BASEBALL'S ALL-STAR GAME** was played at the Kingdome on Tuesday, July 17, 1979. The host team Mariners were represented in the contest by first baseman Bruce Bochte. Bochte provided a game-tying RBI single in the contest, but the American League dropped a 7-6 decision to the National League. A Seattle baseball record crowd of 58,905 was on hand for the All-Star contest.

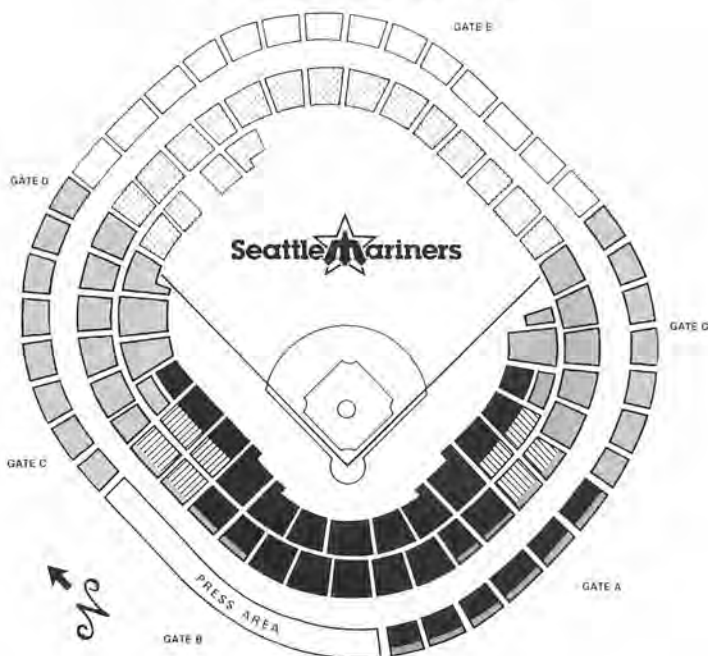

- 1) **Photographers' Area:** The ball is in play if it hits retaining wall and bounces back onto playing field.
- 2) **Batted Ball Hitting Speakers or Roof:** In FAIR territory—in play and judged fair or foul in relation to where it lands or touched by a fielder. If caught, the batter is out and runners advance at their own risk.  
In FOUL territory—is automatically a foul ball. If caught the batter is out, and runners advance at their own risk, otherwise ball is dead.
- 3) **Outfield Area:** Fairly batted ball in left, center or right field hitting above yellow line is a home run. If ball strikes protruding objects from recessed football bleachers in right and right center, it is automatically a home run.  
Any ball bouncing above yellow line is automatically a two-base hit.

## FOUL BALLS HITTING SPEAKERS

Batted balls have hit speakers in foul territory several times in the four years of action in the Kingdome. In addition to the regular Kingdome speakers, other hanging objects have come into play. The special basketball speaker system that hangs above first base has been hit several times, as well as the basketball scoreboard that hangs behind the plate. In 1980, five fouls hit objects, three by Mariner batters.

Three times a fielder has caught the carom off a foul speaker, with the Mariners Bruce Bochte tracking down two of the bounces. Oakland pitcher Matt Keough made the first catch in 1979 (Aug. 3), while Bochte hauled down one in 1979 (Sept. 3) and in 1980 (May 19).

## MISCELLANEOUS NOTES

On Aug. 4, 1979, **Ruppert Jones** popped a foul ball that stuck in the speaker above the first base dugout; it was ruled a strike . . . the three speakers in fair territory (left, left center and center) are approximately 110 feet above the playing surface.

# ITEMS OF INTEREST

**AMERICAN LEAGUE CURFEW RULE**—All night games must be called at 1 a.m. local time. But if an inning is started prior to 1 a.m. city time, it can be completed.

**BATTING/PITCHING (ERA) CHAMPION QUALIFICATIONS**—502 or more plate appearances, 162 or more innings.

**DEFINITION OF NIGHT GAME**—Any game scheduled to start after 6 p.m. will be considered a night game. If a game is scheduled to start at 6 p.m. and is delayed for any reason, it will be considered a day game. If a game is scheduled to start at 6:01 p.m., it will be considered a night game. Two-night double-headers shall be included in double-header statistics and shall be considered two night games. When afternoon and night games (separate admissions) are played on the same date, the games shall be day and night and count as single games.

**DESIGNATED HITTER RULE**—A hitter may be designated to bat for the pitcher in any spot in the batting order in any game without affecting the status of the pitcher. The designated hitter must be selected and be included on the lineup cards presented to the umpire-in-chief prior to the game. Failure to do so precludes the use of a designated hitter for that game. The designated hitter is "locked" into the batting order but may be removed for a pinch-hitter or pinch-runner, who in turn becomes the designated hitter. The designated hitter, while still in the game, may be used defensively but the pitcher then assumes the batting order of the replaced defensive player, thus terminating the designated hitter role. The designated hitter is eligible for all American League batting titles.

**FREE AGENT DRAFT RULE**—A BRIEF SUMMARY: Major League and National Association clubs meet twice a year for the purpose of drafting free agent player talent. . . The winter meeting is conducted by conference phone. . . Selection of a free agent entitles the club to the exclusive right of negotiation with that player for a specified period (from date of selection until 15 days prior to next draft meeting). There are two phases to each draft meeting:

(1) **Regular Phase**—Clubs choose in inverse order of major league standings, selecting free agents and previous draftees who had not signed contracts but had instead enrolled in four-year colleges and since had either completed his junior year or become 21 years of age. . . Each organization may select only one player for each of its major league, AAA and AA rosters but is not limited to the number of picks for "A" level. . . Minor league clubs select in the same relative order as their parent clubs.

(2) **Secondary Phase**—Selection of free agents who had been drafted previously but who had not signed contracts before the negotiation right expired (except those draftees who had enrolled in a four-year college and had since graduated or become 21 years of age—now drafted in Regular Phase). . . It is possible for a club to redraft a player whom it had been unable to sign after the original selection, but only with the express written consent of that player. . . The order of selection is by lot with the 26 major league clubs divided into two 13 team groups with the groups alternating having first selections in respective drafts.

**GAME-WINNING RBI**—The game-winning RBI became an official baseball statistic in 1979. It is determined by the "run batted in that gives a team a lead that it never relinquished."

**INTERLEAGUE TRADING PERIODS**—From 12:01 A.M. on fifth day after completion of world series thru midnight preceding the last scheduled day of the winter meetings, and from 12:01 A.M., Feb. 15 thru midnight, March 15.

**MAJOR LEAGUE SERVICE**—Baseball measures service in years and days (years + days). 172 days on the active roster during the regular season constitutes a full year.

**MAJOR LEAGUE TRADING REGULATIONS**—A.L. waivers are *not necessary* to assign a player contract from one club to another within the league from *midnight on the last day of the season thru midnight, June 15 (Pacific time)*.

A.L. waivers are necessary to assign a player contract from one club to another within the league from *12:01 A.M., June 16 thru midnight, the last day of the season (Pacific time)*.

A.L. waivers are necessary before a player contract may be assigned from the American League to the National League except during inter-league trading periods. Both A.L. and N.L. waivers are necessary *between 12:01 A.M., June 16 and midnight, the last day of the season*.

**PLAYER LIMITS**—25 players from opening day through August 31. . . 40 players from September 1 through end of season. . . Players in military service do not count against the under control list while on active duty. Upon separation from the service, a player will be reinstated to his club's normal player limits after he has completed a 15-day trial period or has participated in a championship game, whichever comes first.

**ROOKIE QUALIFICATIONS**—A player shall be considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has (a) exceeded 130 at bats or 50 innings pitched in the major leagues; or (b) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a major league club or clubs during the period of the 25-player limit (excluding time in military service).

**SAVE RULE**—A relief pitcher shall be credited with a save when he meets all three of the following conditions: 1.) he is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club; 2.) he is not the winning pitcher; and 3.) he qualifies under one of the following conditions: a.) he enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitches for at least one inning, or b.) he enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, at bat, or on deck (i.e., the potential tying run is either already on base or is one of the first two batsmen he faces), or c.) he pitched effectively for at least three innings.
