KIRO NEWSRADIO 71 is the flagship station of the Mariners radio network, an association that begins in 1985 and extends through the 1989 season. KIRO is a 50,000-watt AM station in Seattle. All 162 regular season games will be broadcast, as well as 20 spring training games.

KSTW-TV (Ch. 11) in Tacoma-Seattle, for the fourth straight year, carries a 50-game schedule of Mariner baseball throughout the Pacific Northwest. The slate includes 49 road games and 1 live home broadcast. KSTW-TV is available on most cable systems in the state of Washington.

DAVE NIEHAUS (radio and TV) has been behind the microphone for every Mariner regular season game since joining the American League in 1977 — except one (his son Andy was graduated from Interlake High School in June, 1982). He is recognized as one of the best and most exciting broadcasters in the game of baseball, and he has become instantly identified with Mariner baseball wherever he goes. His expressions like "My Oh My" and "It will fly away" (for home runs) have become familiar throughout the Northwest.

Dave was born and raised in Princeton, Indiana, and is a graduate of Indiana University, where he worked for the campus radio station. He then went to work for the Armed Forces radio and TV service, calling the action for Los Angeles Dodger games before moving to New York to handle Yankee baseball as well as basketball and hockey from Madison Square Garden. After leaving the service, he returned to work in Los Angeles to broadcast the Dodgers, Rams and Lakers. From 1969-76, he teamed with Dick Enberg and Don Drysdale to call the action for the California Angels on KMPC Radio. Dave also broadcast UCLA football and basketball (1973-76). He now resides in Bellevue with his wife Marilyn and their children Andy, Matt and Greta.



RICK RIZZS (pronounced RIZ) joined the Mariners in 1983 and handled the play-by-play with Dave Niehaus on radio and television. Rizzs, 31, broadcast the Columbus (Ohio) Clippers of the International League (AAA) and Ohio State football for two seasons on WBNS Radio, where he also served as sports director. He is a 1975 graduate of Southern Illinois University in Carbondale. From 1975-80, Rick was the play-by-play announcer at the AA level with the Alexandria Aces, Amarillo Gold Sox and Memphis Chicks. He was named the Ohio "Sportscaster of the Year"

in 1981 by the Ohio Sportscasters Association. Rick is single and resides in Bellevue, WA.



NELSON BRILES will return for a second season as the color commentator on all Mariner TV broadcasts in 1985. A veteran of 14 major league seasons, Nellie's career was spent with five different organizations (St. Louis, Pittsburgh, K.C. Royals, Texas, and Baltimore). He compiled a 129-112 record and 3.42 ERA (450 games/279 starts) prior to retiring in 1978. He appeared in three World Series (with St. Louis in '67 & '68 and Pittsburgh in '71), compiling a 2-1 mark in 5 games/4 starts. Graduated from Santa Clara University in 1965. Nellie joined the Pittsburgh TV broadcast team following his retirement (1979) and worked with the Pirates prior to joining USA Network ("Game of the Week" team) in 1983. He and his wife Ginger have 4 children and reside in Greensburg, Penn.

MARINER OWNERSHIP



GEORGE L. ARGYROS

Chairman and Chief Executive Officer

George Argyros, since purchasing the Seattle Mariners on January 14, 1981, has become one of the most active owners in major league baseball. He is very involved in numerous activities in the Pacific Northwest, while serving on some of the most important action committees in the game of baseball.

An aggressive and innovative owner, Mr. Argyros has served as a member of Baseball's Revenue Sharing Committee, Restructuring Committee, member of Board of Directors of the American League, and Commissioner

Selection Committee.

In his four years as owner of the Mariners, George has placed a priority on community involvement, continually encouraging the players, staff and business groups throughout the Northwest, while participating himself. For three years, he and his wife Judie, served as chairpersons of Western Washington's United Cerebral Palsy Telethon. He has also been chairman of the Puget Sound Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society's fundraising effort.

Mr. Argyros, 48, was born in Detroit, Michigan, and raised in Pasadena, California. He attended Michigan State University and Chapman College, graduating with a major in Business and Economics in 1959.

George Argyros is Chief Executive Officer and President of Arnel Development Company and Affiliates, a prominent West Coast real estate company. In 1981, he became a Director, Chairman of the Executive Committee and a principal shareholder of AirCal, an airline serving the West Coast, including Seattle and Portland. He also serves as a member of the Advisory Board, Rainier Venture Partners.

Mr. Argyros is Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Chapman College, one of the West's finest private colleges; serves on the Board of both the National Council of Independent Colleges and the Independent Colleges of Southern California; Executive Board, Orange County Council, Boy Scouts of America; Trustee, Orange County Performing Arts Center; is active in the Young Presidents' Organization, and is a recognized business leader in the community, with involvement in numerous other civic and community activities.



CHARLES G. ARMSTRONG

President

Born August 31, 1942 in Louisville, Ky. . . . Named President and Chief Operating Officer on Oct. 19, 1983 . . . Is responsible for all aspects of the Mariner organization, reporting directly to owner George Argyros . . . Spent previous four years as President and Chief Executive Officer of Mr. Argyros' Arnel Management Company in Orange County, California . . . Also served as General Counsel and Member of the Executive Committee of Arnel Development and Arnel Financial, affiliated companies.

Grew up in Louisville, Ky., where he starred in baseball, basketball and football, being named "Most Athletic" in his high school graduating class, while also earning National Merit Scholarship Finalist recognition . . . Following his senior year (1960), was offered professional baseball contracts by the Kansas City A's and the Cincinnati Reds, but declined in order to attend Purdue University where he played as a varsity infielder . . . While at Purdue he was named "Outstanding Senior Man" for his academic and leadership achievements, and earned a bachelor of science degree in industrial engineering in 1964 . . . Matriculated to Stanford University Law School graduating with a J.D. degree . . . Currently a member of the State Bar of California and the American Bar Association . . . Has been active on numerous professional committees.

After law school, served as a line officer lieutenant on active duty for three and one-half years (1967-70) in the U.S. Navy as an Officer of the Deck for flight operations and formation steaming on an attack aircraft carrier . . . In 1971 joined Hill, Farrer & Burrill, a major West Coast law firm . . . Specialized in business and corporate law making partner before taking a leave of absence to become President and Chief Operating Officer of a leading national furniture manufacturer and importer.

Chuck, his wife Susan and their daughters Dorrie (14) and Katherine (11) and son Chuck (3) make their home in Bellevue.



HAL KELLER
Vice President, Baseball Operations & General Manager

Born July 7, 1927 in Middletown, Md. . . . Elevated to Vice President, Baseball Operations & General Manager on October 7, 1983 from his previous position as Director of Player Development, where he served for five years . . . Responsible for the Mariners' entire baseball operations at both the major and minor league levels.

Named Director of Player Development for the Mariners on Jan. 22, 1979 . . . Resigned as Farm Director for the Texas Rangers on the same date after 16 years in that position . . . In his 28 years as a baseball administrator, he has drafted, signed and developed more than 70 major league players, including 22 players on the M's major league roster this spring . . . A graduate of the University of Maryland, he began in baseball in 1948 as a minor league catcher in the Washington Senators' organization . . . Following his seven years as a player, including 25 games in three different seasons in the majors with Washington, he was a high school teacher and baseball coach in his hometown of Frederick, Md., for four years . . . Brother of former Yankees' star outfielder Charlie "King Kong" Keller.

He then returned to pro baseball as a minor league manager for the Senators in 1958 . . . Moved into the front office as Assistant Farm Director of the "old" Washington Senators for two years (1959-60) . . . When the Senator franchise moved to Minnesota in 1961, he became the first Farm Director of the expansion Washington Senators . . . In 1963-64 served as eastern scouting supervisor of the Minnesota Twins.

Returned to the Senators in 1965, and moved with the franchise to Texas in 1972 . . . Built excellent farm system for the Rangers, one of the most productive in baseball . . . Since joining the Mariners in 1979, has had the first pick in the nation in June twice, selecting Al Chambers in 1979 and Mike Moore in 1981 . . . since 1977 the M's have signed 80 per cent of their draft picks, the highest mark in all of baseball.

Hal and his wife, Carol, reside in Issaquah with their sons Hank (21), currently a junior at Western Washington University, and Bill (19), is a freshman at University of Washington.



BRIAN BEGGS
Vice President, Finance

Born October 18, 1946 in Palo Alto, California . . . Promoted to Vice President on March 15, 1983 from his previous position as the club's Controller which he held for two years . . . Responsible for all financial and administrative functions of the organization.

A graduate of Whitman College in Walla Walla with a B.A. in Economics and the University of Santa Clara with an M.B.A. . . . Joined the Mariners in March of 1981 . . . Prior to entering baseball, he spent seven years with the Dole foods division of Castle & Cooke, Inc., one of the original large Hawaiian corporations . . . Immediately prior to coming on board with the Mariners he was chief financial officer of Dole Thailand, Ltd. . . . While in this position he and his family lived in Bangkok, Thailand.

While being relatively new to the business of baseball, he has been involved with the sport for many years as a player in youth leagues and, more recently, as a coach and manager of youth baseball teams . . . As a specialist in strategic planning and financial management, his skills are well suited to the ever increasing needs for the sound application of proven business principles to the unique undertaking of providing major league baseball to the Pacific Northwest.

Brian and his wife, Vicki, reside in Redmond with their son, Rob (16) and daughter, Kristen (12).

Born October 13, 1943 in Missoula, Montana . . . Named Vice President of Sales and Marketing on October 8, 1984 . . . His responsibilities include the management of all sales and marketing programs, the Mariner radio and television network, advertising, ticketing, promotions, public affairs, corporate sponsorship and special events.

Graduated from Shoreline High School in 1961 and attended the University of Washington and Northwestern University Business School in 1967 . . . Prior to joining the Mariners he served as Vice President/General Manager of KSEA radio in Seattle, (a division of KIRO, Inc.) a position he held since January 1981 . . . He was responsible for planning and executing programming, promotion, sales, advertising and overall station direction with the ultimate goal of maximizing station listener rating and revenue shares.

Before his stint at KSEA he held positions as General Sales Manager of KVI AM, Seattle, and General Sales Manager of KOL AM/FM, Seattle . . . Began his business career as a stockbroker in Seattle in the mid-60's at Fox-Raff & Company where he held the position of Vice President; and Shearson Hammill & Company where he was sales manager.

TEMPE DIABLO STADIUM

Tempe's Diablo Stadium was completed in 1968, and was used by the Seattle Pilots and Milwaukee Brewers for spring training from 1969-71. In addition to the stadium, the complex includes two and a half diamonds for baseball and two recreational fields. Stadium capacity is 5,600; dimensions are 360 down each line, 420 to the power alleys, and 430 to center. The Mariners have been training there since the 1977 expansion season. It is owned and operated by the City of Tempe Parks and Recreation Department.

IMPORTANT DATES IN THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE MARINERS

- Feb. 6, 1976 — Partners Stanley Golub, Danny Kaye, Walter Schoenfeld, Lester Smith, James Stillwell, Jr., and James A. Walsh enter into a formal agreement with the American League.
- Aug. 24, 1976 — "Mariners" is selected as the team's nickname after a contest which attracted 15,000 entries.
- Sept. 30, 1976 — First player acquisition is the purchase of pitcher Dave Johnson from the Baltimore Orioles.
- Nov. 5, 1976 — Mariners and Toronto each select 30 players in the Expansion Draft. Ruppert Jones is the number one pick from Kansas City.
- Nov. 17, 1976 — Pitcher Gary Wheelock, second pick of the M's in the Expansion Draft from California, is the first to sign a contract.
- Dec. 7, 1976 — In the club's first trade, pitcher Grant Jackson is sent to Pittsburgh for infielders Craig Reynolds and Jimmy Sexton.
- Mar. 1, 1977 — 42 players report for the Mariners' first official workout at spring training camp in Tempe, Ariz.
- Mar. 10, 1977 — In the first exhibition contest, the Mariners drop a 16-10 decision to the Oakland A's at Tempe Stadium.
- Apr. 6, 1977 — In Major League regular season debut, the Mariners drop the American League opener 7-0 to the California Angels before a crowd of 57,762 at the Kingdome.
- May 14-15, 1977 — Boeing Weekend with the Mariners sets a Major League group sales record, as 65,432 Boeing employees and their families watched two games vs. Boston.
- Aug. 5, 1977 — The Mariners pass the million mark in home attendance. The final season crowd mark was 1,338,511, the best-ever by an expansion team in the United States.
- April 5, 1978 — In the Major League season opener, the Mariners top the Minnesota Twins 3-2. Joe DiMaggio throws out the first pitch.
- Jan. 17, 1979 — Daniel F. O'Brien is named President and Chief Executive Officer.
- June 9, 1979 — "Willie Horton Night" honors the Mariner DH who belted his 300th career home run June 6, the 43rd player to reach that milestone. A crowd of 40,314 was in the Kingdome.
- July 17, 1979 — The Mariners host the 50th All-Star Game in the Kingdome, before a Seattle record baseball crowd of 58,905. The National League edges the American League 7-6, and the M's Bruce Bochte produces a run-scoring single.
- Jan. 14, 1981 — George Argyros becomes Principal Owner of the Mariners, purchasing majority interest in the club. The sale was approved by the League Jan. 29.
- May 6, 1982 — Gaylord Perry wins 300th career game, beating the New York Yankees in a 7-3 complete-game victory at the Kingdome before a crowd of 27,369. He became the 15th pitcher in major league history to win 300 games.
- Oct. 7, 1983 — Hal Keller is elevated from Director of Player Development to Vice President, Baseball Operations and General Manager.
- Oct. 19, 1983 — Charles G. Armstrong is named President and Chief Operating Officer.
- Nov. 20, 1984 — Alvin Davis wins A.L. Rookie of the Year (BBWAA); teammate Mark Langston finishes second. First Mariner to win a major BBWAA post-season award.

NAMING THE MARINERS

The nickname "Mariners" was selected by the ownership of the Seattle franchise after a "Name the Team Contest" that resulted in over 15,000 entries and over 600 different names being submitted.

When the name "Mariners" was chosen, all the entries suggesting the name were reviewed for their reasons (in 25 words or less).

The winner was Roger Szmodis of Bellevue, Wash. His entry read, "I've selected Mariners because of the natural association between the sea and Seattle and her people, who have been challenged and rewarded by it."

HOW TO FIGURE

Batting Average — divide the total number of hits collected by a player by the total number of at bats. Example: Player A is 12-for-40 or .300.

Slugging Percentage — divide the number of total bases by the total number of at bats. Example: Player A's 12 hits include six singles (6), one doubles (2), two triples (6) and three home runs (12) for 26 total bases in 40 at bats and a .650 slugging percentage.

Earned Run Average — the total number of earned runs allowed by a pitcher is divided by the total number of innings pitched and then multiplied by nine for his per-game average. Example: Pitcher B has allowed 12 earned runs in 45 innings of work for a 2.40 ERA.

Fielding Average — the sum of putouts and assists is divided by the sum of putouts, assists and errors. Example: Player C has made 16 putouts and 24 assists and two errors. That's 40 putouts and assists divided by 42 chances for a fielding average of .952.

Won-Loss Percentage — divide the number of victories by the total number of games played. Example: 22 wins and 18 losses produce a winning percentage of .550.

Magic Number — determine the number of games yet to be played by the division leader, add one, then subtract the number of games ahead in the loss column of the standings from the closest opponent.

SUSPENDED GAME RULE: A game terminated for any of the following reasons will be a suspended game **IF** it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e., 4½ or 5 innings): (1) a curfew imposed by law, (2) a pre-arranged time limit, and (3) darkness where local law prohibits turning on the lights.

A game terminated by light failure or malfunction of a mechanical device under the control of the home club will be a suspended game **AT ANY TIME AFTER IT STARTS.**

Beginning in 1980, if **WEATHER** forces the termination of a legal game while an **INNING IS IN PROGRESS**, it will become a suspended game if either of the following two conditions exists:

- (1) The visiting team has scored one or more runs to tie the game and the home team has not scored, or
- (2) the visiting team has scored one or more runs to take the lead and the home team has not tied the score or taken the lead.

If a legal game is tied when called because of weather and neither situation listed above prevails, it is a tie game and must be re-played in its entirety.

Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension immediately preceding the next scheduled single game between the two clubs on the same ground. If this is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in A.L. Regulation 3.8.

A game called at the **END** of a completed inning **AFTER NINE INNINGS** for any reason shall be a suspended game. Prior to 1969, the game would have been declared a tie and re-played in its entirety at a later date.

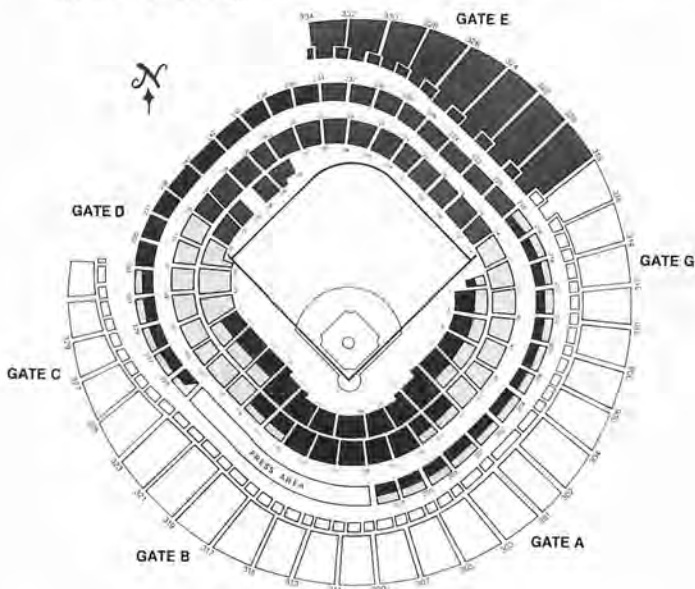

GROUND RULES

PHOTOGRAPHERS' AREA

The ball is "in play" if it hits the retaining fence and bounces back into the playing field.

HITTING ROOF OR SPEAKERS

Batted ball hitting roof or speakers in *Fair Territory* shall be judged fair or foul in relation to where it lands or is touched by a fielder. If caught by a fielder, the batter is out and base runners advance at their own risk.

Batted ball hitting roof or speakers in *Foul Territory* is a foul ball, regardless of where it lands or is caught. If the ball is caught by a fielder, the batter is out and base runners advance at their own risk.

Batted ball sticking in speaker in foul territory shall be called a strike. Batted ball sticking in speaker in fair territory shall be called "no play".

OUTFIELD AREA

Fairly batted ball clearing the wall is a home run. Fairly batted ball bouncing over the wall is a ground rule double.

DUGOUTS

A ball shall be considered "thrown into the dugout" only if it hits an object or person within the dugout. A thrown ball hitting the lip at the base of the dugout or the frame around the dugout and bouncing back into the playing field shall be "in play".

SPEAKER NOTES

The outfield speakers in left, left center and center fields were raised prior to the 1981 season from 100 ft. to 132 ft. above the playing surface. From 1977 through 1980, a total of 7 batted balls hit speakers in fair territory. The first was by Boston's **Butch Hobson** on April 25, 1979; the last was in back-to-back games by New York's **Bob Watson** Aug. 19-20, 1980. All 7 times the ball fell safely for a base hit.

Batted balls have hit speakers in foul territory many times. In addition, the special basketball speakers above first base and the basketball scoreboard behind the plate have been hit . . . On Aug. 4, 1979, Mariner outfielder **Ruppert Jones** popped a foul that stuck in the speaker above the first base dugout; it was ruled a strike.

In 1983, the foul territory speakers and basketball scoreboard came into play 10 times . . . 6 of the 10 occasions resulted in balls being caught and the batter being called out . . . On May 20 vs. Milwaukee, 3 balls were affected, including **Ricky Nelson's** pop fly that stuck in the speaker above the first base dugout (ruled a strike).

Only 5 balls hit ceiling obstacles last season . . . The first 2 resulted in "no play"; the third was caught in foul territory by catcher **Bob Kearney** . . . The final 2 were of greater significance . . . On Aug. 10 vs. Minn., **Alvin Davis** made the most of his second chance, belting a 3-run HR after his apparent, foul out hit the speaker above the 3rd base area . . . On Aug. 24, Ken Phelps' foul pop was caught by Yankee third baseman **Toby Harrah** with 2 outs in the bottom of the second and the bases loaded (NY eventually won 6-4 in 10 inn.).

AMERICAN LEAGUE CURFEW RULE—All night games must be called at 1 a.m. local time. But if an inning is started prior to 1 a.m. city time, it can be completed.

BATTING/PITCHING (ERA) CHAMPION QUALIFICATIONS—502 or more plate appearances, 162 or more innings.

DEFINITION OF NIGHT GAME—Any game scheduled to start after 6 p.m. will be considered a night game. If a game is scheduled to start at 6 p.m. and is delayed for any reason, it will be considered a day game. If a game is scheduled to start at 6:01 p.m., it will be considered a night game. Two-night double-headers shall be included in double-header statistics and shall be considered two night games. When afternoon and night games (separate admissions) are played on the same date, the games shall be day and night and count as single games.

DESIGNATED HITTER RULE—A hitter may be designated to bat for the pitcher in any spot in the batting order in any game without affecting the status of the pitcher. The designated hitter must be selected and be included on the lineup cards presented to the umpire-in-chief prior to the game. Failure to do so precludes the use of a designated hitter for that game. The designated hitter is "locked" into the batting order but may be removed for a pinch-hitter or pinch-runner, who in turn becomes the designated hitter. The designated hitter, while still in the game, may be used defensively but the pitcher then assumes the batting order of the replaced defensive player, thus terminating the designated hitter role. The designated hitter is eligible for all American League batting titles. The designated hitter named in the starting lineup must come to bat at least one time, unless the opposing club changes pitchers.

FREE AGENT DRAFT RULE—A BRIEF SUMMARY: Major League and National Association clubs meet twice a year for the purpose of drafting free agent player talent. . . The winter meeting is conducted by conference phone. . . Selection of a free agent entitles the club to the exclusive right of negotiation with that player for a specified period (from date of selection until 15 days prior to next draft meeting).

There are two phases to each draft meeting:

(1) **Regular Phase**—Clubs choose in inverse order of major league standings, selecting free agents and previous draftees who had not signed contracts but had instead enrolled in four-year colleges and since had either completed his junior year or become 21 years of age. . . Each organization may select only one player for each of its major league, AAA and AA rosters but is not limited to the number of picks for "A" level. . . Minor league clubs select in the same relative order as their parent clubs.

(2) **Secondary Phase**—Selection of free agents who had been drafted previously but who had not signed contracts before the negotiation right expired (except those draftees who had enrolled in a four-year college and had since graduated or become 21 years of age—now drafted in Regular Phase). . . It is possible for a club to redraft a player whom it had been unable to sign after the original selection, but only with the express written consent of that player. . . The order of selection is by lot with the 26 major league clubs divided into two 13 team groups with the groups alternating having first selections in respective drafts.

GAME-WINNING RBI — The game-winning RBI became an official baseball statistic in 1980. It is determined by the "run batted in that gives a team a lead that it never relinquished."

INTERLEAGUE TRADING PERIODS—From 12:01 A.M. on fifth day after completion of world series thru midnight preceding the last scheduled day of the winter meetings, and from 12:01 A.M., Feb. 15 thru midnight, April 1.

MAJOR LEAGUE SERVICE—Baseball measures service in years and days (years + days). 172 days on the active roster during the regular season constitutes a full year.

MAJOR LEAGUE TRADING REGULATIONS—A.L. waivers are not necessary to assign a player contract from one club to another within the league from midnight on the last day of the season thru midnight, June 15 (Pacific time).

A.L. waivers are necessary to assign a player contract from one club to another within the league from 12:01 A.M., June 16 thru midnight, the last day of the season (Pacific time).

A.L. waivers are necessary before a player contract may be assigned from the American League to the National League except during inter-league trading periods. Both A.L. and N.L. waivers are necessary between 12:01 A.M., June 16 and midnight, the last day of the season.

PLAYER LIMITS—25 players from opening day through August 31. . . 40 players from September 1 through end of season. . . Players in military service do not count against the under control list while on active duty. Upon separation from the service, a player will be reinstated to his club's normal player limits after he has completed a 15-day trial period or has participated in a championship game, whichever comes first.

ROOKIE QUALIFICATIONS—A player shall be considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has (a) exceeded 130 at bats or 50 innings pitched in the major leagues; or (b) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a major league club or clubs during the period of the 25-player limit (excluding time in military service).

SAVE RULE—A relief pitcher shall be credited with a save when he meets all three of the following conditions: 1.) he is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club; 2.) he is not the winning pitcher; and 3.) he qualifies under one of the following conditions; a.) he enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitches for at least one inning, or b.) he enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, at bat, or on deck (i.e., the potential tying run is either already on base or is one of the first two batsmen he faces), or c.) he pitched effectively for at least three innings.
