ABOUT THE COVER . . .

In 1994, the Mariners will debut an alternate cap and jersey that will be worn during selected home games. The alternate cap (featured on the cover of the information guide) consists of a Northwest green base with a navy blue bill and a metallic silver "S" that incorporates the "Nautical Compass Rose" logo. The alternate cap will be worn on selected dates at the Kingdome.

The alternate jersey is Northwest green with "Mariners" emblazoned across the chest in bold silver print with navy blue trim. The back of the jersey has the player's name and number in metallic silver trimmed in navy blue. The alternate jersey will be worn during all day games at the Kingdome.

The Mariners also have a new jacket that will be worn during all home games in 1994. It is primarily navy blue and has "Mariners" in silver across the chest. The left sleeve is Northwest green and features the "S" logo.

The team's current logo and colors were introduced in 1993. The logo represents the importance of the sea to the livelihood and the enjoyment of the region, while the colors signify the sea, technology and the great outdoors.

JOHN ELLIS

Chairman & Chief Executive Officer

A life-long resident of the Seattle area, John W. Ellis serves as the Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of the Baseball Club of Seattle, a position he has held since the group assumed control of the Mariners on July 1, 1992. Ellis also serves as the owner's representative to Major League Baseball for the Baseball Club of Seattle.

Ellis, 65, served variously as President, Chief Executive Officer and Chairman of the Board of Puget Sound Power & Light Company, the investor-owned electric utility which serves nearly 1.7 million people in western Washington, from 1976 to his retirement in 1993. He joined Puget Power in 1970 after 17 years as an attorney with the Seattle firm of Perkins Coie. He is also chairman of the Electric Power Research Institute, which conducts research and development for the electric utility industry.

He serves on the board of directors of Puget Sound Power & Light Company, Washington Mutual Savings Bank, SAFECO Corporation, UTILX Corporation and the Associated Electric & Gas Insurance Services Limited (AEGIS). Ellis has been chairman of the Edison Electric Institute and the Seattle Branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco.

Ellis has been just as active in the community, as he was the founding chairman of the Seattle-King County Economic Development Council. He is past chairman of the Greater Seattle Chamber of Commerce and the Washington Business Roundtable, and a past president of the Bellevue Boys & Girls Club. In January of 1992, he was named Regent of Washington State University and serves on the Governor's Council on Education Reform and Funding. He is also a member of the Board of Trustees of Seattle University and chairs their 21st Century Capital Campaign. He headed a successful four-year campaign that privately funded a city park in downtown Bellevue.

Ellis and his older brother Jim were presented the 1992 A.K. Guy Award by the YMCA of Greater Seattle for outstanding community service. Ellis has received numerous other awards and honors, including Seattle's First Citizen in 1987 presented by the Seattle-King County Board of Realtors, The Citizen of the Year Award in 1984 from the Municipal League of Seattle and King County, the Frederick T. Haley Leadership in Education Award in 1989, and he was inducted into Seattle's Franklin High School Hall of Fame in 1992.

Ellis was born and raised in the Seattle area, receiving his undergraduate and law degrees from the University of Washington. John and his wife, Doris, live in Bellevue and have four children and three grandchildren. His hobbies include sailing, tennis, golf, flying, skiing and music.



CHUCK ARMSTRONG

President & Chief Operating Officer

Chuck Armstrong was named President and Chief Operating Officer of the Seattle Mariners on June 29, 1992. Armstrong is responsible for all operations of the Mariners' franchise and works directly with Chief Executive Officer John Ellis.

Armstrong, 51, was previously President of the Mariners from 1983 to 1989. He served as Interim Athletic Director for the University of Washington from January through July, 1991.

Born and raised in Louisville, Kentucky, Armstrong earned a B.S. degree in Industrial Engineering from Purdue University where he was recognized as Outstanding Senior Man. He graduated from Stanford University Law School in 1967 and then served three and one-half years on active duty in the U.S. Navy.

Following his tour in the Navy, Armstrong joined a major West Coast law firm in 1970. He left to become president of a leading national furniture manufacturer and importer from 1977 to 1980. From 1980 to 1983, he served as president and chief executive officer of Arnel Management Company in Orange County, California.

Armstrong and his wife, Susan, make their home in Bellevue. They have three children: daughters Dorrie (23) and Katherine (21); and a son, Chuck (12). The Armstrongs are active in numerous civic, charitable and community activities, including the Greater Seattle YMCA and the Bellevue Boys and Girls Club.



WOODY WOODWARD

Vice President, Baseball Operations

William Frederick "Woody" Woodward enters his sixth full season as the Mariners' Vice President of Baseball Operations. He is directly responsible for the Mariners' Major League personnel and operations, player development and scouting departments.

Woodward and his baseball staff have used the trade route to acquire nine of the current players on the 40-man roster, including deals this past winter that added pitcher Bobby Ayala, catcher

Dan Wilson, infielders Felix Fermin and Reggie Jefferson and outfielder Eric Anthony. The remainder of the roster has been completed through the June draft (16 players), free agency (eight), Rule V draft (four) and waiver claims (three).

A native of Miami, FL, the 51-year-old Woodward began his front office career in 1978 as the Cincinnati Reds' minor league field coordinator, a position he held for two years before his promotion to assistant general manager in 1980.

In October, 1984, he joined the New York Yankees as Vice President, Baseball Administration. Under his direction, the Yankees won the 1985 Topps Award for the best overall minor league system.

On October 10, 1986, he was promoted as the Yankees' Vice President and General Manager, a position he held until his resignation on October 21, 1987. One week later, he moved on to the Philadelphia Phillies and served as their Vice President, Player Personnel from October 28, 1987 until June 7, 1988. He joined the Mariners on July 28, 1988.

A former NCAA All-American, Woodward earned a bachelor's and master's degree in Education from Florida State University. Following his graduation, he signed his first professional contract with the Milwaukee Braves' organization in 1963 and made his Major League debut with Milwaukee later that same season.

He spent nearly five years with the Braves, moving with the club to Atlanta in 1966, before he was traded to Cincinnati in 1968. While with Cincinnati, he played in the 1970 NLCS sweep of Pittsburgh and the World Series loss to Baltimore.

Following his retirement in 1971, he entered private business, but came back to baseball in 1974-75 as the Reds' TV color analyst. He returned to his alma mater as a head baseball coach, posting the second-best winning percentage in Seminole history (170-57, .749) from 1975-78.

Woodward and his wife, Pamela, have three children, Natalie (25), Emily (23) and Mattson (18). They reside in Redmond, WA.



ROGER JONGEWAARD

Vice President, Scouting & Player Development

Roger Jongewaard is in his ninth season with the Mariners, and his fifth since being named as the club's Vice President of Scouting and Player Development on October 26, 1989. Jongewaard oversees the club's scouting operations, the annual June free agent draft effort and all minor league player movement throughout the Mariners' farm system.

Jongewaard, 57, joined the Mariners in December, 1985 as director of scouting. In his years as scouting director, the Mariners drafted such players as Ken Griffey, Jr., Tino Martinez, Roger Salkeld, Dave Fleming, Marc Newfield and Alex Rodriguez.

Jongewaard has been in professional baseball for 31 years, including six as a minor league catcher with the Milwaukee Braves, Los Angeles Dodgers and Cincinnati Reds organizations (1954-59). In 1959, he was a member of the Seattle Rainiers.

After spending ten years in private business, Jongewaard returned to baseball in 1969 with the California Angels. He moved on to scouting with the Texas Rangers in 1973 and the New York Mets in 1976. In 1983, the Detroit Tigers named him as a special assignment scout to general manager Bill Lajoie, a job he held until joining the Mariners.

Among the Major League players signed by Jongewaard during his scouting years are: 1986 National League Cy Young winner Mike Scott; 1989 N.L. MVP Kevin Mitchell; 1983 N.L. Rookie of the Year winner Darryl Strawberry; Tim Leary; Lenny Dykstra; Hubie Brooks; Randy Milligan; and Greg Harris.

A Long Beach, CA native, Jongewaard starred in baseball at Long Beach Poly High School and signed a professional contract with Milwaukee upon his graduation in 1954. Jongewaard resides in Woodinville, WA with his wife, Carol. They have five grown children, Terry (35), Diane (35), Janice (34), Kristin (31) and Don (25). They also have nine grandchildren.



RANDY ADAMACK

Vice President, Communications

Now in his 17th season with the Mariners, Randy Adamack has served the club as Vice President of Communications since September 23, 1990. Adamack directs the club's broadcasting, community relations, marketing, promotions, public relations and stadium operations efforts.

Adamack, 42, joined the Mariners in 1978 as director of public relations, a position he held until becoming director of marketing in 1983. In 1987, he was promoted to senior director of communications.

A native of Conneaut, OH, Adamack served the Cleveland Indians as director of public relations from 1975-78. Following his 1973 graduation from Wittenberg University in Springfield, OH, he attended the sports administration graduate program at Ohio University.

Adamack lives in Seattle. He has a daughter, Elizabeth (10) and a son, Joe (8).



BRIAN BEGGS

Vice President, Finance & Administration

The 1994 season is Brian Beggs' 14th year with the Mariners and his 12th as Vice President of Finance and Administration. A native of Palo Alto, CA, Beggs joined the Mariners in March, 1981 as the club's controller, a position he held for two years before his promotion in 1983. Beggs is responsible for all financial and administrative functions of the club.

Prior to the Mariners, Beggs spent seven years with the Dole Foods division of Castle & Cooke, Inc. He last served as the chief financial officer of Dole Thailand, Ltd., during which time he and his family lived in Bangkok.

Beggs, 47, earned a B.A. degree in Economics at Whitman College and an M.B.A. degree at the University of Santa Clara.

Beggs and his wife, Vicki, reside in Woodinville and have two children: son, Rob (25) and daughter, Kristen (21).



BOB GOBRECHT

Vice President, Sales & Marketing

Bob Gobrecht joined the Mariners on June 7, 1993 as Vice President of Sales & Marketing.

Prior to the Mariners, Gobrecht spent over 20 years developing sponsorships, merchandising and marketing programs as an executive or volunteer for such prestigious properties and events as Disney International Sports Program, Seattle Seafair, the Pasadena Tournament of Roses and the New York Welcome Home the Troops Festivities. Most recently, Gobrecht is credited for rejuvenating Seattle Seafair during his five-year tenure as managing director.

Currently, Gobrecht is responsible for the club's revenue-producing activities that include sponsorships, season and group ticket sales and broadcast sales in association with KSTW-TV and KIRO-AM radio. He is currently serving on Major League Baseball's Marketing Blueprint Committee and The Baseball Network's Advisory Committee. Gobrecht, 43, earned a B.S. and an M.B.A. from the University of Southern California and served as a Peace Corps volunteer in Western Samoa.

Gobrecht lives in Bellevue with his wife Chris, who is the University of Washington women's basketball coach, and their two children Eric (8) and Madeline (5).



PAUL ISAKI

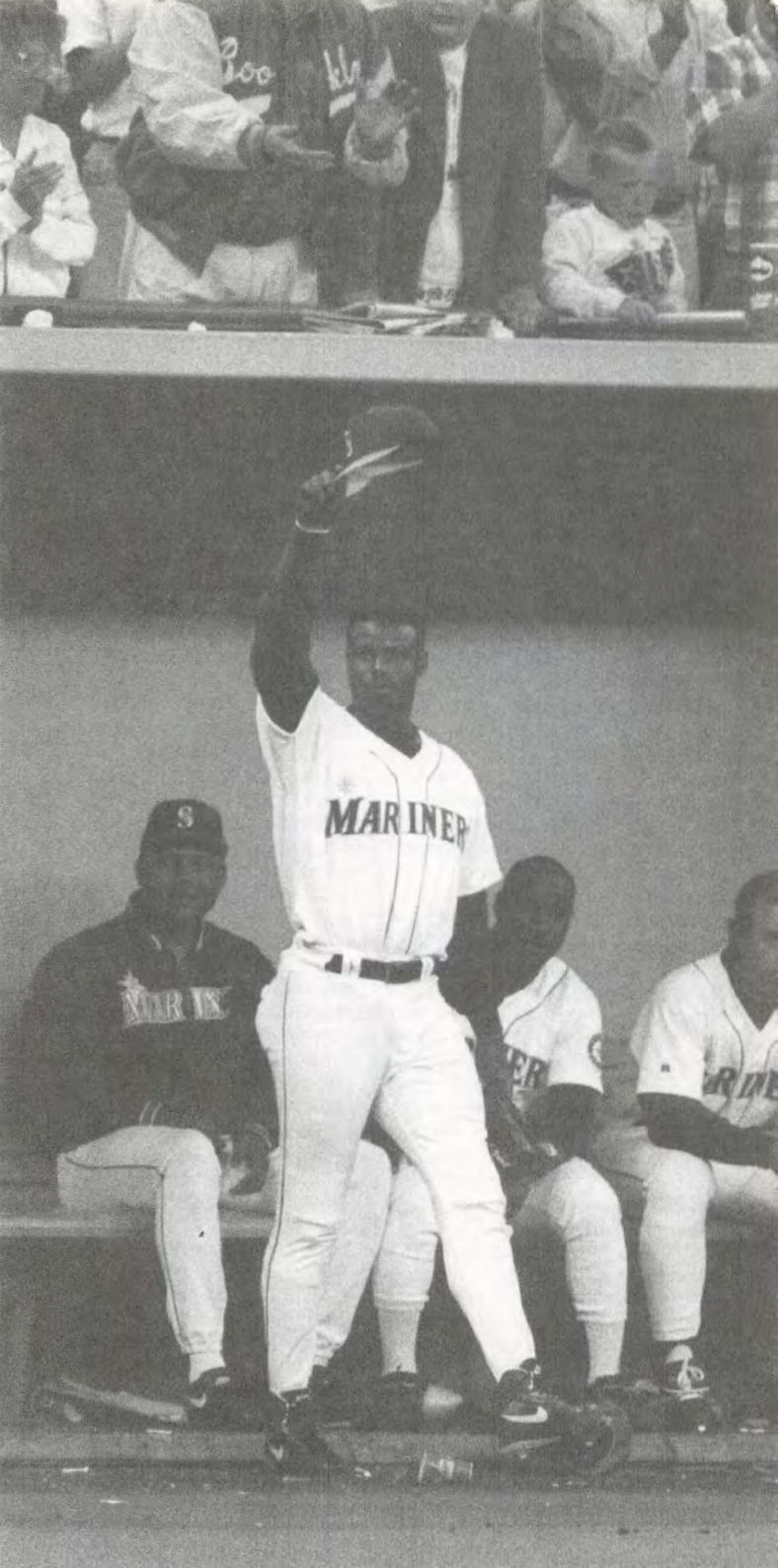
Vice President, Business Development

Paul Isaki joined the Mariners on December 1, 1992 as the club's new Vice President of Business Development. Isaki oversees efforts to open new and enhance existing revenue opportunities in the Pacific Northwest market and is the club's liaison for governmental affairs.

Isaki, 49, was a key adviser on international trade and business development for former Washington State Governor Booth Gardner for eight years, most recently serving as the director of the State of Washington's Department of Trade and Economic Development. He also spent five years as the Governor's special assistant for economic development. Isaki played a major role in an important chapter of Mariners' history. When Kingdome lease negotiations reached an impasse in 1985, Isaki helped put together a mediation panel that resolved the matter.

Before 1985, Isaki served five years as director of development and acquisitions for a national commercial real estate company. Prior to that he ran his own real estate consulting business, and at one time served five years as assistant director of the Central Puget Sound Economic Development District.

Isaki resides in Seattle with his wife Lucy, who is a partner with the Seattle law firm of Bogle and Gates.

MANAGING/COACHING CAREER: Enters his eighth season as a big league manager, and second with the Mariners . . . has posted a winning record in five of his six full seasons as M.L. manager . . . began coaching career as a player/hitting instructor with the New York Yankees in 1981 . . . became a full-time coach after his retirement in June of 1984, a position he held through the 1985 season . . . was named manager of the Yankees for 1986 and led the pin-strippers to a second-place finish in the A.L. East with a 90-72 mark, the fifth-best record in the Majors . . . was named General Manager of the Yankees in October of 1987, following the resignation of Woody Woodward . . . returned to the dugout on June 23, 1988 to replace Billy Martin and posted a 45-48 mark over the season's final 93 games . . . was a special adviser and TV broadcaster for the Yankees in 1989 . . . was named manager of Cincinnati for the 1990 season and guided Reds to their first pennant since 1976 with a 91-71 mark . . . Reds set club record with nine straight wins to start season and then stayed in first place the rest of the way, becoming first N.L. team ever to go wire-to-wire under 162-game format . . . after topping Pittsburgh four games to two in NLCS, pulled off a stunning sweep of the Oakland Athletics in the World Series . . . was skipper of the 1991 National League All-Stars . . . guided the Mariners to an 82-80 mark in 1993, the second winning season in club history . . . the Mariners won 18 more games than in 1992, the largest improvement in the American League . . . joined Hall of Famers Clark Griffith and Joe McCarthy as the only managers in history to post a winning record in their first season with all three clubs they managed (Griffith did it with four clubs) . . . won his 500th career game as a manager at Kansas City on May 23 with 10-7 triumph.

PLAYING CAREER: Originally signed with the Cleveland Indians on June 9, 1962 . . . was drafted by the Washington Senators for 1963 and was assigned to Peninsula . . . was traded to the Baltimore Orioles on Aug. 4, 1964 to complete March 31 deal that sent pitcher Buster Narum to Senators . . . after 20 games at Aberdeen, made Major League debut with Orioles . . . was traded back to Cleveland prior to the 1966 season for catcher Cam Carreon . . . After three seasons at Portland, played in six games with the Indians in 1968 . . . was selected by the Seattle Pilots in 1968 Expansion Draft, but never played in a game for the Pilots as he was traded to expansion cousin Kansas City on April 1, 1969 for outfielder Steve Whitaker and pitcher John Gelnar . . . collected first hit and scored first run in Royals history . . . went on to win A.L. Rookie of the Year honors in 1969, hitting .282 with 11 HR and 68 RBI . . . spent five seasons with Kansas City . . . received All-Star honors

in 1972 and led the A.L. with 33 doubles . . . on Dec. 7, 1973, was traded with pitcher Ken Wright to the New York Yankees for pitcher Lindy McDaniel . . . spent the next 11 seasons with Yankees . . . missed most of 1975 with inner ear problem that required mid-season surgery . . . returned to action in 1976 and finished second in A.L. Comeback Player of the Year voting . . . was an excellent post-season performer . . . hit safely in all five 1977 ALCS games and all six 1978 World Series contests . . . also hit in first three games of 1981 World Series, running his personal WS streak to nine . . . became player/coach on August 24, 1981, serving as a hitting instructor . . . officially retired on June 17, 1984 and was named a full-time coach . . . was honored at Yankee Stadium with "Lou Piniella Day" on Aug. 5, 1984.

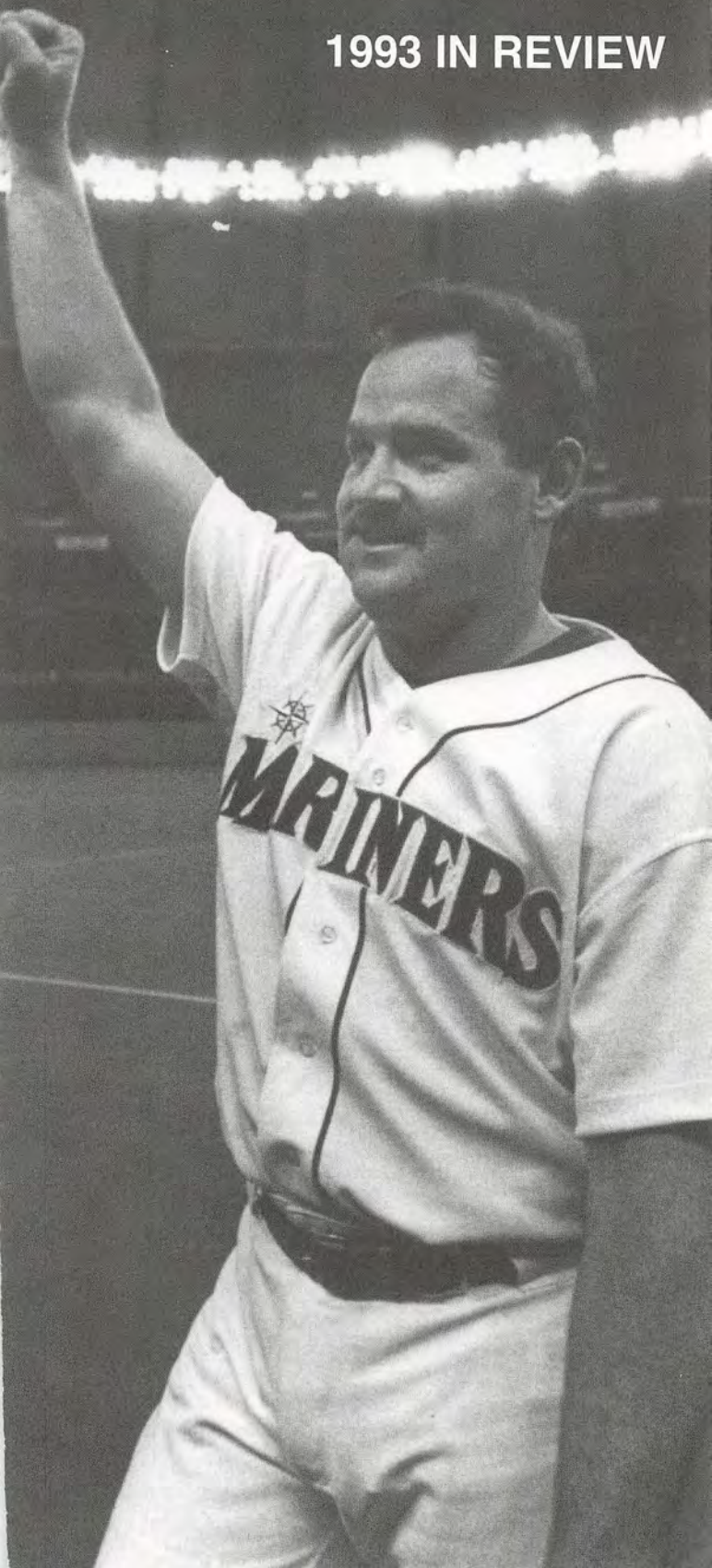

#1 IN IMPROVEMENT — Lou Piniella's Mariners won 18 more games in 1993 than the 1992 Mariners (64-98), the largest such improvement in the American League and third best in the Majors . . . the 18-game improvement is also a new Mariners' record, breaking the previous mark of 14 set in 1984 (74-88) after a 60-102 record in 1983 . . . the Mariners' 82-80 record marked just the second time in the franchise's 17-year history that the club finished above .500 . . . 82 wins are the second most in club history, trailing only the 1991 club's 83-79 mark.

LOU PINIELLA — Posted a winning record for the fifth time in his six full seasons as a Major League manager . . . joins Clark Griffith and Joe McCarthy as the only managers in history to post a winning record in their first season with all three clubs they managed (Griffith did it with four clubs) . . . career managerial winning percentage of .527 (561-504) is fifth highest among active managers with five years experience . . . the others are: Cito Gaston .575; Davey Johnson .573; Sparky Anderson .552; and Tony La Russa .535 . . . won his 500th career game at Kansas City on May 23 with 10-7 triumph.

HOME RECORD — The Mariners finished with a club-record 46-35 mark in the Kingdome, breaking the 1991 mark of 45-36 . . . the Mariners were 8-3 during the August 26-September 5 homestand, setting a new club record for wins in a homestand (old was seven done nine times) . . . **ON THE ROAD**, Seattle finished with the fourth-best road mark in club history at 36-45, after posting a 26-24 mark in its final 50 road games . . .

VS. THE EAST, Seattle was 44-40, their second-best record ever (48-36 in 1991) . . .

VS. THE WEST, the Mariners were 38-40, their best mark since posting the same record in 1987.

ATTENDANCE — The 1993 Mariners drew the second-most fans in club history with 2,051,853 paying customers . . . only the 1991 season total of 2,147,905 was higher (the 1991 total included 181,672 buyout tickets) . . . Seattle averaged 25,332 fans per game, which ranked 10th in the A.L. and 20th in the Majors . . . ROAD ATTENDANCE — For the seventh time in the past eight years, Seattle set a club record in road attendance . . . 2,307,636 fans saw the Mariners play in the other 13 A.L. cities, breaking the 1991 mark of 2,205,667.

FOUR-GAME RECORD — Seattle set a new four-game home series attendance record by drawing 150,956 fans for Toronto on August 26-29 . . . the previous mark was 149,353 set against the Blue Jays on July 16-19, 1992.

#1 IN FIELDING — Seattle was the Major's best defensive team in 1993, leading with a .985 fielding percentage . . . Seattle's .98543 fielding percentage was the seventh best in Major League history and the Major League-low 90 errors were the sixth-lowest total in history (see below) . . . the .985 mark shattered the club record of .983 set in 1991 . . . the Mariners also set a new club mark for the fewest errors, destroying the 1991 mark of 110 . . . Seattle set another club record with 11 consecutive errorless games from August 9-21, one more than the 1979 Mariners from June 1-11 . . . Seattle finished second with 173 double plays, one behind Cleveland.

- Feb. 6, 1976** — Partners Stanley Golub, Danny Kaye, Walter Schoenfeld, Lester Smith, James Stillwell, Jr. and James A. Walsh enter into a formal agreement with the American League. Dick Vertlieb is later named the club's first Executive Director and Lou Gorman is named Director of Baseball Operations.
- May 18, 1978** — Lou Gorman is promoted from Director of Baseball Operations to General Manager.
- Jan. 17, 1979** — Daniel F. O'Brien is named President and Chief Executive Officer.
- Nov. 6, 1980** — Lou Gorman resigns to accept a position with the New York Mets. President Dan O'Brien assumes responsibility for baseball operations.
- Jan. 14, 1981** — George Argyros becomes principal owner of the Mariners, purchasing majority interest in the club. The sale was approved by the League January 29.
- Oct. 7, 1983** — Hal Keller is promoted from Director of Player Development to Vice President, Baseball Operations and General Manager.
- Oct. 19, 1983** — Chuck Armstrong is named President.
- Oct. 8, 1985** — Dick Balderson is named Vice President, Baseball Operations.
- July 27, 1988** — Woody Woodward is named Vice President, Baseball Operations.
- Oct. 5, 1989** — The Mariners are purchased by a partnership of Jeff Smulyan, Emmis Broadcasting, Michael Browning and the Morgan Stanley Group, Inc. Smulyan assumes the role of Chairman.
- Oct. 24, 1989** — Gary Kaseff is named President.
- July 1, 1992** — The Baseball Club of Seattle, L.P., assumes control of the Mariners. The Board of Directors includes John Ellis (Chairman), Minoru Arakawa, Chris Larson, Howard Lincoln, John McCaw, Frank Shrontz and Craig Watjen. Chuck Armstrong is named President.

IMPORTANT DATES IN MARINERS HISTORY

- Aug. 24, 1976** — "Mariners" is selected as the team's nickname after a contest which attracted 15,000 entries.
- Nov. 5, 1976** — Mariners and Toronto each select 30 players in the Expansion Draft. Ruppert Jones is the number one pick from Kansas City.
- April 6, 1977** — In Major League regular season debut, the Mariners drop the American League opener 7-0 to the California Angels before a crowd of 57,762 at the Kingdome.
- Aug. 5, 1977** — The Mariners pass the million mark in home attendance. The final season crowd mark was 1,338,511.
- June 9, 1979** — "Willie Horton Night" honors the Mariners DH who belted his 300th career home run June 6, the 43rd player to reach that milestone. A crowd of 40,314 was in the Kingdome.
- July 17, 1979** — The Mariners host the 50th All-Star Game in the Kingdome, before a Seattle record baseball crowd of 58,905. The National League edges the American League 7-6, but the M's Bruce Bochte produces a run-scoring single.
- May 6, 1982** — Gaylord Perry wins 300th career game, beating the New York Yankees in a 7-3 complete-game victory at the Kingdome before a crowd of 27,369. He became the 15th pitcher in Major League history to win 300 games.
- Oct. 1, 1982** — Floyd Bannister makes his final start of the season and finishes the year with 209 strikeouts. That total leads the American League, a first for a Mariners player.
- Nov. 20, 1984** — Alvin Davis wins A.L. Rookie of the Year (BBWAA), teammate Mark Langston finishes second. Davis is the first Mariner to win a major BBWAA post-season award.
- Oct. 4, 1987** — Harold Reynolds finishes the season with 60 stolen bases and becomes the first Mariner ever to lead the league in an offensive category.
- April 13, 1990** — The Mariners register the first sellout in club history as 54,597 fans turn out for the home opener against the World Champion Oakland Athletics.
- April 20, 1990** — Brian Holman retires the first 26 Oakland players in order and comes within one out of tossing the 15th perfect game in M.L. history before Ken Phelps homers in 6-1 Mariners win.
- June 2, 1990** — Randy Johnson becomes the first player in club history to throw a no-hitter as he blanks the Detroit Tigers 2-0.
- Aug. 31, 1990** — Ken Griffey and Ken Griffey Jr. become the first father and son to play in the same major league lineup, after Ken Griffey signs with the Mariners as a free agent on August 29.
- Oct. 6, 1991** — The Mariners establish a new club single-season attendance record as a total of 2,147,905 tickets were purchased for the 1991 season.
- Sept. 27, 1992** — Randy Johnson strikes out 18 batters at Texas, setting a new club record and tying the American League mark for a LHP (also Ron Guidry in 1978).
- Oct. 4, 1992** — Edgar Martinez finishes the season with a .343 average and becomes the first Mariner ever to lead the league in hitting.
- April 22, 1993** — Chris Bosio throws the second no-hitter in club history, blanking the Boston Red Sox 7-0. After two leadoff walks in the first inning, he gets a double-play ball on his way to retiring the final 26 batters in a row.
- May 16-17, 1993** — Mike Blowers becomes the 13th player in M.L. history to hit grand-slam home runs in consecutive games.
- June 23, 1993** — Jay Buhner becomes the first player in Mariners history to hit for the cycle in a game against the Oakland Athletics.
- July 20-28, 1993** — Ken Griffey Jr. homers in eight straight games, tying the M.L. record set by Dale Long (1956) and Don Mattingly (1987).
- Sept. 26, 1993** — Randy Johnson becomes the 12th M.L. pitcher since 1900 to strike out 300 batters in a season with a ninth-inning whiff of Oakland's Ruben Sierra. He finishes the year with 308 strikeouts.

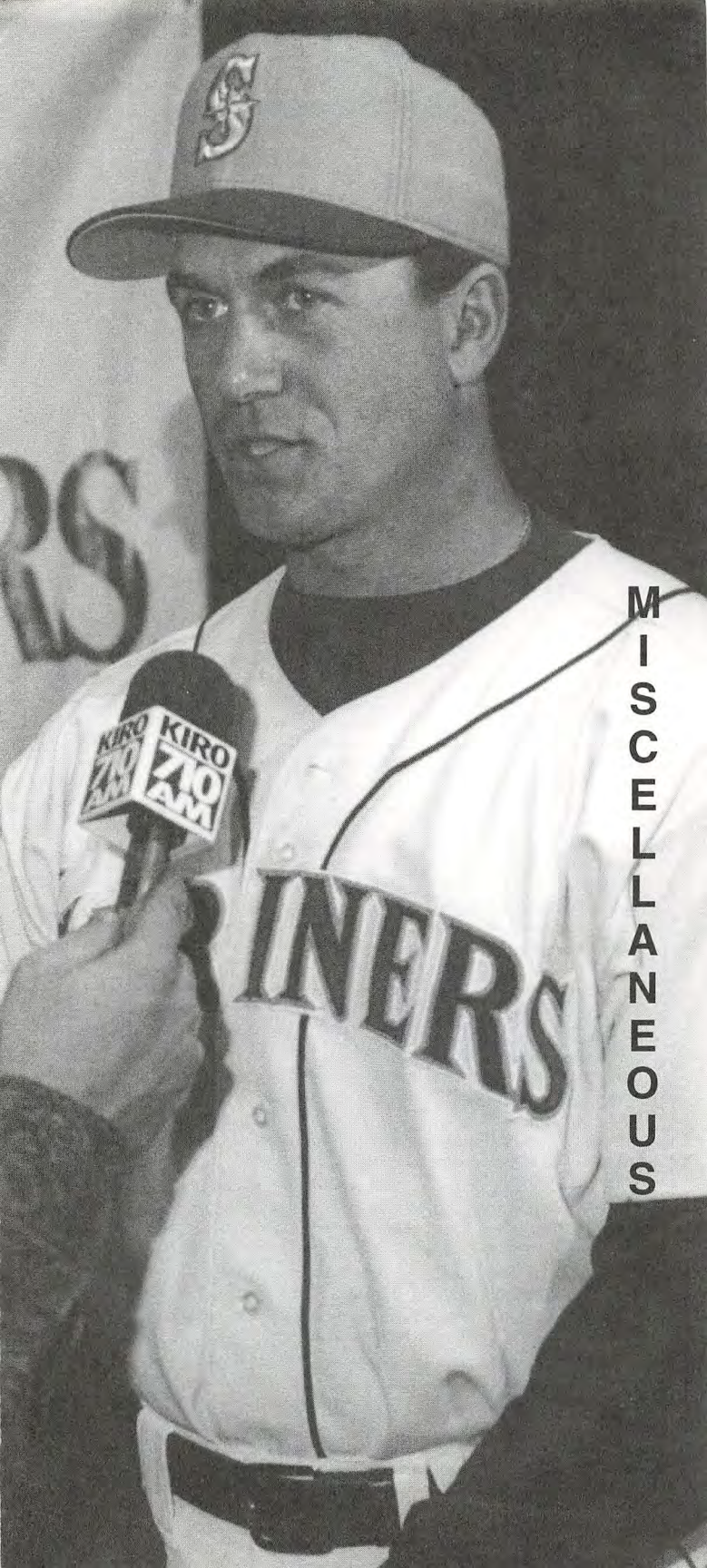

HOW TO FIGURE

Batting Average — Divide the total number of hits collected by a player by the total number of at bats. Example: Player A is 12-of-40 or .300.

Slugging Percentage — Divide the number of total bases by the total number of at bats. Example: Player A's 12 hits include six singles (6), one double (2), two triples (6) and three home runs (12) for a total of 26 total bases in 40 at bats and a .650 slugging percentage.

Earned Run Average — The total number of earned runs allowed by a pitcher is divided by the total number of innings pitched and then multiplied by nine for his per-game average. Example: Pitcher B has allowed 12 earned runs in 45 innings of work for a 2.40 ERA.

Fielding Average — The sum of putouts and assists is divided by the sum of putouts, assists and errors. Example: Player C has made 16 putouts and 24 assists and two errors. That's 40 putouts and assists divided by 42 chances for a fielding average of .952.

Won-Lost Percentage — Divide the number of victories by the total number of games played. Example: 22 wins and 18 losses produce a winning percentage of .550.

Magic Number — Determine the number of games yet to be played by the division leader, add one, then subtract the number of games ahead in the loss column of the standings from the closest opponent.

GROUND RULES

PHOTOGRAPHERS AREA

The ball is "in play" if it hits the retaining fence and bounces back into the playing field.

HITTING SUSPENDED OBJECTS

A batted ball hitting any suspended object, such as speakers, wires, etc. in fair territory shall be judged fair or foul in relation to where it lands or is touched by a fielder. If caught by a fielder, the batter is out and base runners advance at their own risk.

A batted ball hitting any suspended object in foul territory is a foul ball, regardless of where it lands or is touched by a fielder. If the ball is caught by a fielder, the batter is out and the base runners advance at their own risk.

A batted ball sticking in any suspended object in foul territory shall be called a strike. A batted ball sticking in any suspended object in fair territory shall be a ground rule double.

OUTFIELD AREA

Fairly batted ball clearing the wall is home run. Fairly batted ball bouncing over the wall is ground rule double.

DUGOUTS

A ball shall be considered "thrown into the dugout" only if it hits an object or person within the dugout. A thrown ball hitting the lip at the base of the dugout or the frame around the dugout and bouncing back into the playing field shall be "in play".

A thrown ball hitting any player's equipment that is left on or in front of the dugout yellow line shall be considered in the dugout.

BULLPEN AREAS

A ball going into the bullpen area and coming back out onto the playing field shall be considered in play. A ball going into the bullpen area and obstructed by a player, equipment or bench should be called dead.

PEORIA SPORTS COMPLEX

The City of Peoria, the Seattle Mariners and the San Diego Padres proudly open baseball's best spring training facility in 1994. Located 20 miles northwest of downtown Phoenix, the 145-acre Peoria Sports Complex provides separate practice facilities for the Padres and Mariners that include 6-1/2 practice fields, batting cages and a clubhouse.

Peoria Stadium, which was designed by HOK Sports Group of Kansas City, is the jewel of the \$32-million complex and accommodates 10,000 fans (7,000 seats and 3,000 on lawn). Dimensions for the park are 340 ft. down each line, 385 ft. in the power alleys and 410 ft. to center.

Peoria is only the second spring training site in Mariners history, as the club trained in Tempe from 1977-92. Seattle played all road games in 1993, but used the Peoria facility for morning workouts as it was under construction.

DIRECTIONS: Take Bell Road exit off I-17 north; travel west to 83rd Avenue; travel south and enter facility at Stadium Way.

BROADCASTERS



DAVE NIEHAUS has been a Mariners broadcaster since the club's inception into the American League in 1977. During his 17 seasons behind the microphone for the Mariners, he has missed only 11 games (one in 1982, three in 1988, four in 1992, and three in 1993). Entering the 1994 season, he has witnessed 2,689 of the 2,700 games played by the Mariners. He is recognized as one of the best and most exciting broadcasters in the game of baseball, and has become instantly identified with the Mariners. His expressions like "My Oh My" and "It will fly away" (for home runs) have become familiar throughout the Northwest.

Dave was born and raised in Princeton, Indiana, and is a graduate of Indiana University, where he worked for the campus radio station. He then went to work for the Armed Forces radio and TV service, calling the action for Los Angeles Dodgers games before moving to New York to handle Yankees baseball as well as basketball and hockey from Madison Square Garden. After leaving the Armed Forces Network, he returned to Los Angeles to broadcast the Dodgers, Rams and Lakers. From 1969-76, he teamed with Dick Enberg and Don Drysdale to call the action for the California Angels on KMPC Radio. Dave also broadcasted UCLA football and basketball (1973-76). He resides in Bellevue with wife Marilyn. They have three children: Andy, Matt and Greta.



RON FAIRLY begins his second season with the Mariners in 1994. The former Major Leaguer brings 36 years of professional baseball experience to the Mariners broadcast booth, 21 as a player and 15 as a broadcaster.

Ron was born in Macon, GA and attended the University of Southern California as a finance major. After earning All-America honors on the diamond for USC, he was signed by the Los Angeles Dodgers in 1958. Fairly played in the Major Leagues from 1958-78 with the Dodgers (1958-69), Montreal Expos (1969-74), St. Louis Cardinals (1975-76), Oakland Athletics (1976), Toronto Blue Jays (1977) and California Angels (1978). In 2,442 games, he compiled a lifetime average of .266 with 215 home runs and 1,044 RBI. He was a two-time All-Star (1973 and 1977) and played in four World Series (1959, 1963, 1965-66).

After retiring as a player, Ron worked as the sports director at KTLA radio in Los Angeles for three years. From 1982-86, he teamed with Bob Starr to broadcast Angels games on KMPC. He then moved to San Francisco, where he handled the Giants play-by-play and color duties on both radio and television for six years. Ron resides in Westlake Village, CA with wife Mary. The couple has three sons: Steve, Mike and Patrick.



CHIP CARAY begins his second season as a broadcaster with the Mariners in 1994 and is the third generation of the Caray family to work behind the microphone in Major League Baseball. His father, Skip, has spent the last 18 years in the Atlanta Braves broadcast booth and his grandfather, Harry, is the legendary voice of the Chicago Cubs.

Chip graduated from the University of Georgia in 1987 and worked as a weekend television sports anchor in Panama City, FL and Greensboro, NC for two years. He joined the NBA's Orlando Magic in 1989 as the television play-by-play broadcaster and has continued in that role for the last five years. In addition to spending last season with the Mariners, his baseball experience also includes a season on radio with the Minnesota Twins' double-A Orlando affiliate (1990) and two years on cable television broadcasts with the Atlanta Braves (1991-92). He resides in Orlando, FL with wife Marla.



KEN LEVINE returns for his third season as a Mariners broadcaster in 1994. An Emmy-Award winner, Levine is perhaps best known for his script writing on such television shows as M*A*S*H and Cheers.

Ken's broadcasting career began as a student at UCLA from 1968-72, where he called a variety of sports on radio for the Bruins. Following his graduation, Levine worked as a disc jockey until turning his attention to script writing in 1974. During a very successful Hollywood career, he decided to further pursue his broadcasting interest and was hired by triple-A Syracuse in 1988. He spent 1989-90 with triple-A Tidewater and also filled in on radio for the Toronto Blue Jays and California Angels. He became a full-time M.L. broadcaster with the Baltimore Orioles in 1991 and served in the same capacity with the Mariners in 1992. Last season, Levine filled in on Mariners broadcasts from time to time. He resides in Los Angeles, CA with wife Deborah, son Matthew and daughter Diana.



KEVIN CREMIN begins his 12th season as producer-engineer for all Mariners radio broadcasts in 1994. He is responsible for the technical aspects of each broadcast, as well as relaying updated game information to Dave Niehaus and Ron Fairly.

The Tulsa, OK native attended the University of Oklahoma and studied journalism. After spending eight years in the circulation department of the Tulsa World & Tribune, Cremin joined the Mariners Radio Network full-time in 1983. He is currently senior engineer in the American League. He resides in Seattle with wife Margaret and daughters Colleen and Kate.



MARK ENGELBREKT is entering his ninth season of involvement with Mariners television broadcasts in 1994. He currently serves as the producer and director for all telecasts and also coordinates the broadcasts with flagship station KSTW-TV in Tacoma.

Mark graduated from the University of Washington in 1974 with a B.A. in communications. After working as a floor director for KING and KOMO, he joined KSTW in 1977 as producer/director of the Ten O'clock News. He produced Mariners telecasts from 1982-85 and served as producer/director from 1989-91. He joined the Mariners organization as television network producer in 1993. He resides in Seattle with wife Dianne and son Max.

A CAPSULE HISTORY OF PROFESSIONAL BASEBALL IN SEATTLE

- 1890 The first professional baseball team in Seattle was organized. The Seattle Reds played in the Class-C Pacific Northwest League.
- 1892 The Reds (first-half champions) won the P.N.L. Pennant when the Portland club declined to enter the playoffs because of financial problems.
- 1896 Club was re-named "Braves" and moved into its first stadium (Athletic Park – 14th and Yesler).
- 1903 The Pacific Coast League was formed and Seattle was a charter member. Thus, Seattle had two professional baseball teams for one season (the Braves were now in the Pacific National League and folded after one year).
- 1906-17 Seattle ended its membership in the P.C.L. and joined the Class-B Northwestern League.
- 1919 Seattle re-joined the Pacific Coast League. The club was named "Indians" and played a 225-game schedule (the extended season format continued through the 1957 P.C.L. season).
- 1937 Emil Sick bought the Seattle franchise for \$115,000 and immediately changed the nickname to "Rainiers" (Sick also owned and operated the Rainier Brewing Company).
- 1938 On June 15, the Rainiers moved into the newly-built Sicks' Stadium (seating capacity of 11,500). Local sports hero Fred Hutchinson began his rookie season and posted a 25-7 record.
- 1939-41 The Rainiers won three consecutive P.C.L. pennants.
- 1955 Hutchinson returned as manager of the Rainiers and led the club to another P.C.L. crown. In addition, the first official proposition for a domed stadium in Seattle was made (bond issues for the project failed in 1960 and 1964).
- 1960 Sick sold the club to the Boston Red Sox. Seattle became the Red Sox triple-A affiliate.
- 1966-68 The California Angels purchased the club and Bob Lemon managed Seattle to its last baseball championship.
- 1967 Public approval was given for funds needed to build a domed stadium (completion was scheduled to be prior to the 1972 season).
- 1969 The Seattle Pilots came into existence and began to play in the American League. Sicks' Stadium was expanded to seat 28,500, and 677,944 fans came out to watch the 64-98 expansion team. Third baseman Tommy Harper led the junior circuit with 73 stolen bases.
- 1970 On March 31, financial difficulties forced the Pilots to move to Milwaukee (club was re-named "Brewers"). Plans to build a domed stadium were temporarily interrupted.
- 1972-76 Seattle fielded a team in the Class-A Northwest League.
- 1977 On April 6, Major League Baseball returned to Seattle when the Mariners played the California Angels before a Kingdome crowd of 57,762. The Mariners starting pitcher that night was Diego Segui, a member of the 1969 Pilots.
