Chairman of the Board
President

Eddie Chiles has the Texas Rangers Baseball Club "Coming Alive." Mr. Chiles is a staunch believer in — and a prime example of — free enterprise. He is a firm advocate of getting involved. This belief in the American Free Enterprise System and advocacy for getting involved has been carried to millions of Americans via his radio and television messages.

His involvement with the Rangers since he officially assumed command last April 29 has been no tentative, part-time venture. He observed, then acted incisively.

"We are dedicated to providing the baseball fans of this area with a winning team and a first class operation," Mr. Chiles said.

He has implemented that concise statement with action designed to thrust the Rangers to the top. He has supervised the sensible segmenting of the club's activities, instituting sweeping changes in both areas, by placing Samuel G. Meason in charge of business operations and Eddie Robinson in charge of baseball operations.

Plans to enlarge and refurbish Arlington Stadium have been announced. Nautilus equipment has been installed in an expanded clubhouse which also features a new players' lounge. A physical fitness consultant and a physical fitness instructor, who will travel with the team, have been appointed.

There has been a fresh and exciting approach to baseball as a business, innovative in concept yet realistic and pragmatic in design. There has been, and will continue to be, increased community involvement. There has been a strong commitment to new techniques in marketing under the direction of newly elected Vice President James T. Medick.

The driving force behind it all is Mr. Chiles, enthusiastic and aggressive at age 70. He has stabilized the Rangers through fiscal responsibility and has established the peppy pace of progress which infiltrates the ranks of his employees.

He's an energetic man who cannot tolerate inefficiency, but he also is an outgoing, friendly man who invites ideas. He believes in delegating responsibility and providing authority to accomplish the mission but firmly expects results and accountability. His standards and objectives are high.

He has fought the tough battle. It was 42 years ago when he started his own business, The Western Company of North America, of which he is Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer. That was after he had been a merchant seaman at \$29.50 a month, after he had worked as a roughneck and roustabout in the Texas oil fields, after he had hitchhiked to the University of Oklahoma to work his way through the University and receive a degree in petroleum engineering.

He struck out on his own at age 29, in Seagraves, Texas, in 1939. He had three employees, two trucks and a lot of determination. The Western Company of North America now has 5,000 employees worldwide and does business in the \$500 million range annually.

The company serves the petroleum industry with technical knowledge and operations required in the discovery and production of oil and gas. These services are fracturing, acidizing and cementing. Since 1969 the company also has performed contract drilling operations offshore with mammoth submersible drilling vessels and jackup rigs in the Gulf of Mexico, the North Sea, the Gulf of Alaska, the Mediterranean Sea, the Arabian Gulf and off the coast of western Africa.

Mr. Chiles has received a multitude of honors and awards from all segments of America in appreciation of his leadership and accomplishments in his many fields of endeavor. Mr. Chiles considers it his civic responsibility to encourage political candidates at every level of the American governmental process, lending moral and financial support.

He's a man who goes all out. He's going all out to get the Texas Rangers Baseball Club into a lasting position of prominence as well as pride for the community it represents.

MANAGER
ZIMMER, Donald William (Don)

The Texas Rangers' 1981 commitment, "Coming Alive," has been entrusted on the field to new manager Don Zimmer. New to the Metroplex, perhaps, but regarded throughout baseball as a winner, as a dedicated individual who reports to work hours before his athletes appear, as a direct and firm fellow who tempers discipline with consideration, as a warm person with a sense of humor.

Executive Vice President Eddie Robinson explored the field exhaustively in a six-week search for a manager last fall. Zimmer's name kept coming back to him from trusted sources throughout baseball. Meetings with Don intensified Robinson's interest and Zimmer was named manager of the Rangers on November 12.

Of his former manager, General Manager Haywood Sullivan of the Boston Red Sox said, "The man has been with us for seven years and he's never given less than 100 per cent. I don't believe we're going to find a better baseball man than Zimmer."

Zimmer managed three full seasons and parts of two others for the Red Sox. In those three full years his clubs averaged 96 wins (287-197, .593). Overall with Boston his record was 412-308, .572. He also managed the San Diego club for two years and his entire managerial career in the major leagues is a highly creditable 526-498, .514.

"Zimmer's years as a player not only reflected the aggressive, hustling attitudes he exemplifies in managing, but also indicated the ability to 'bounce back' from adverse circumstances," Robinson said. "In 1953 and 1956 Zimmer incurred serious injuries which could have ended his playing career. His dedication to the game has been the secret to his success as a player and as a manager."

Don managed in the minor leagues at Knoxville, Buffalo, Key West and Indianapolis and has been third base coach for the Montreal Expos, Padres and Boston.

Zimmer launched his professional career as a shortstop in the Brooklyn Dodgers' system in 1949. In 1953 he was leading the American Association with 23 home runs and 63 runs batted in at St. Paul when he was struck on the head by Jim Kirk of Columbus on July 7. He missed the remainder of the year.

He had to overcome another potential career-ending injury when he got a cheek bone fracture on June 23, 1965, on a pitch from Hal Jeffcoat of Cincinnati, again being disabled for the remainder of the season.

But Don also has experienced elation. He was the second baseman in the final game of the 1955 World Series, when Johnny Podres defeated the New York Yankees, 2-0, for the Dodgers.

On October 10, 1961, Zimmer was selected by the New York Mets from the Chicago Cubs in the National League expansion draft. He later was with the Washington Senators for three years.

Zimmer's experience, hustle, aggressiveness and dedication is the foundation for the 1981 Texas Rangers' "Coming Alive" commitment.

1980 SEASON: Had an outstanding year despite missing two games with a pinched nerve in his back, 20 games with a pulled muscle in his rib cage and 11 games with a pulled hamstring in his right leg. He also saw limited action — pinch-hitting — in nine other games due to the pulled hamstring. During those 42 games, the team had a record of 16-26. Buddy registered the longest hitting streak of his career from June 24 to July 17 when he hit safely in 21 straight contests. What makes the accomplishment even more significant is the fact the streak began on the day he was activated off the 15-day disabled list because of the pulled muscle in the rib cage — June 24. During the streak, he was named American League Player of the Week twice. He batted .385 for the week of June 23-29 and .500 for the week of July 10-13. Had the first

5-hit game of his career on August 1 at Arlington Stadium in a 7-5 win over the Boston Red Sox. He went a perfect 5-for-5 (all singles) with two RBI. Had highest batting average with men in scoring position, among the regulars — .361 (53-147). Slugged two homers in a game four times last season, twice against the Minnesota Twins. His .329 batting average was a new career-high and ranked sixth in the American League. Buddy's 17 home runs were second only to Al Oliver and Richie Zisk, who had 19, while his 10 game-winning RBI finished second to Oliver's 16. His .980 fielding percentage was the highest among regular third basemen in the league and earned him his second straight Gold Glove. He received the most votes of anyone at any position. Buddy wound up making only eight errors in 409 chances. Was named to the All-Star team for the second time in his career.

1980 SEASON: Made four starts — losing two, winning one with one no-decision — before being bothered by a sore shoulder which would plague him for the remainder of the season. He beat the Detroit Tigers, 10-5, on April 29 while scattering nine hits in 5.1 innings of work. However, on his next start May 4 at Arlington Stadium, Steve lasted only .1 of an inning against the Baltimore Orioles before departing with a sore shoulder. After retiring leadoff man Al Bumbry on a ground out, he gave up three hits, including a two-run homer by Ken Singleton, and he plunked Eddie Murray. He wound up losing, 9-5. He missed four starts before getting the call again on May 21 at Arlington Stadium. Steve worked 4-innings against the California Angels and permitted 4 runs (all earned) on six hits. He departed trailing, 4-0, but didn't figure in the decision of the 9-8 defeat. Steve appeared again on May 24 at Oakland in a relief role. He worked .2 of an inning and was pulled because of soreness in the shoulder. The following day he was placed on the 21-day disabled list and wasn't activated until June 28, when he started against Minnesota at Arlington Stadium. Steve hurled five innings and allowed an earned run on two hits while picking up the 11-3 victory. He made four other starts — three no-decisions and a loss — but was still bothered by the sore shoulder. He was optioned to Tulsa on July 28 in hope that he could work out his problem there. Steve flew back and forth from Arlington for his three starts with the Drillers. He won his first game and then lost the next two and finished with a 6.28 ERA. He was recalled on August 15 and placed on the 21-day disabled list again. He finally came off the list in late September but didn't see any more action. Steve was 1-2 in the instructional league at Sarasota, Florida. He allowed 15 earned runs in 28.1 innings for a 4.77 earned run average.

CAREER/MAJORS: His 17 victories in 1979 were tops on the staff and fifth-best in the American League. His 3.68 ERA was also lowest among the Ranger starters. Won six games with one no-decision during a stretch in the '79 season from June 27 until August 1. Owned the American League champion Baltimore Orioles in '79 with three wins in three starts, including one shutout and a sterling 0.75 ERA. Had a career-high seven strikeouts against the Birds on July 17, 1978 — his first big league starting assignment. Though he didn't notch the win, Steve worked nine scoreless innings, allowing only four hits. Reggie Cleveland took over and was a 2-0 winner in 11 innings. Comer's first 15 appearances in '78, his first season in the majors, were all in relief as he compiled an impressive 0.90 ERA before the start on July 17. Relies on control and an effective change up that he throws at five different speeds.

CAREER/MINORS: Completely overlooked in the 1976 June Free Agent Draft when 786 hopefuls were selected. Was picking up scrap lumber on a construction crew in Minnesota when the word got out that the Rangers needed pitching help for their rookie team in Sarasota, Florida. Accepted an invitation and that's when the Cinderella story began as he registered a 7-2 record and 0.90 ERA.

Next appearance was a start in Anaheim as he worked 6.1 innings against the Angels but didn't figure in the decision of the 6-5 victory. He

allowed three runs (two earned) on six hits while walking two and striking out six. Started again on June 1 and was a 7-3 winner over the Oakland A's at Arlington Stadium (8.2IP 12H 3R 2ER 3BB 4K). Then misfortune struck as Danny fractured the knuckle on his right little finger while coming to the aide of teammate Mickey Rivers in a scuffle with fans outside Chicago's Comiskey Park on June 4. He was placed on the 21-day disabled list the following day and activated on June 26. Danny notched the first of eight saves two days later when he preserved an 11-3 victory for Steve Comer against Minnesota. He hurled 2.1 scoreless innings and continued to operate out of the bullpen from then on. Had a stretch from August 3 to 16 when he fanned 15 of 28 batters in eight innings of relief work over a five-game span. Struck out eight in 3.1 innings of work against Detroit on August 16 and whiffed seven in 4.1 innings against Minnesota on July 4.

1980 SEASON: Was a season of milestones for the Canadian pitcher as he became only the fourth pitcher in history to win 100 games in each league and the 29th pitcher to register his 250th career victory. Notched his 100th win in the American League with a 3-2 decision over Baltimore on May 3 at Arlington Stadium (91 8H 2R 2ER 8K). Only Cy Young, Jim Bunning and former teammate Gaylord Perry also have accomplished the feat. Picked up his 250th victory about three weeks later in Oakland. Fergie handcuffed the A's on two hits to post a 3-1 win while walking three and striking out eight on May 23. Established a new strikeout high as a Ranger by whiffing 13 Chicago White Sox batters in a 2-1 loss at Arlington Stadium on July 15. His previous high had been 10 (10 times). His career-high is 14 while with the Chicago Cubs. Was 4-1 in his five starts in June last season, including two wins over Seattle and one each over Milwaukee and Toronto. The loss came on June 15 at Exhibition Stadium. Ironically it was Ferguson Jenkins Day as Jenkins was honored for being Canada's greatest baseball player and for receiving the Order of Canada, a medal bestowed for outstanding humanitarian achievement. After the ceremonies, Fergie was roughed up for five runs (all earned) on eight hits and dropped a 5-3 decision to the Blue Jays.

CAREER/MAJORS: Has averaged two walks per nine innings over 15 full seasons. Has compiled 47 career shutouts and amassed 2,899 strikeouts to rank him seventh on the all-time list. Figured prominently in

turning the Rangers around in 1974. He won 25 games that year, when the Rangers topped the million mark in home attendance for the first time, and became competitive with a second place finish. Has won 20 or more games seven times. Jim Palmer is the only active pitcher who has accomplished that feat eight times. Was named Comeback Player of the Year in 1974. Received the Cy Young Award in '71 for a 24-13 record plus 2.77 earned run average. Also named the Sporting News National League Pitcher of the Year in '71. Tied the major league record for most 1-0 games lost in a season with five in 1968. Led the National League in complete games with 20 in '67, 24 in '70 and 30 in '71. His 29 complete games in 1974 were tops in the American League. Has been named to the National League All-Star team three times — 1967, 1971 and 1972. Has 88-64 record as a Ranger.

1980 SEASON: Injuries and a heavy dose of bad luck combined to make the '80 season a forgettable one for Jim. He truly made the transformation from Dr. Jekyll to Mr. Hyde. The year before, he had been the premier relief pitcher in the American League with a 13-5 record, 29 saves and sparkling 1.57 earned run average. However, he finished the '80 campaign with a 3-11 slate, only two saves and a bloated 4.83 ERA. Things just didn't get off on the right foot for him as he blew out his elbow against Atlanta near the end of spring training and it plagued him through the early part of the season. His fastball just didn't have the zip it had in '79. Kernie picked up a win and save in his first four appearances, but then he was saddled with three losses in his next five outings and eight defeats in 16 appearances. After battling back from the elbow problem, Jim was bothered by a pinched nerve in his neck in late July. Then on August 9 he was hit in the mouth while warming up on the sidelines at Arlington Stadium. He decided to watch a foul ball after throwing a pitch and the return throw struck him in the mouth. The cut required nine stitches and because he hit his head after falling back across the mound, he suffered a concussion and temporary amnesia. After the incident, Jim was quoted as saying he was afraid to take his boat out fishing on Lake Arlington because he thought it would sink. He went on the disabled list in mid-August and wasn't removed until September 15, but he never appeared in another game. Made his last appearance on August 17 at Tiger Stadium as he worked an inning against Detroit (3H 1R 1ER 1BB 1K).

CAREER MAJORS: Registered his 500th strikeout last year when he fanned Jim Spencer on April 13 at Arlington Stadium. Has 539 strikeouts in only 602 innings in the majors. Won the Rolaids Relief Man Award in the American League in '79, edging Minnesota's Mike Marshall after a season-long struggle. Ten of his first 11 decisions with the Rangers in '79 were victories. He also had 29 saves that season establishing a new team record. Broke into the majors as a starter and made his first appearance on September 6, 1974. Dropped a 1-0 toughie to the Baltimore Orioles and Mike Cuellar. Registered his first major league

TRIPLE PLAYS

The Rangers have been involved in five triple plays in their nine year existence - one by them and four against them.

The only Texas triple play materialized on August 8, 1977, in the second game of a doubleheader with Oakland at Arlington Stadium . . . Roger Moret opened the fifth inning by walking Mitchell Page and Rich McKinney . . . Manny Sanguillen then slapped a grounder to Toby Harrah, who stepped on third base and fired to Bump Wills, who made the force, then relayed to Mike Hargrove at first base . . . The Rangers won, 3-0.

The first triple play against the Rangers came in their first season in Texas, on August 13, 1972, with Kansas City pulling it off under unusual circumstances . . . With Dick Bosman on second base and Elliott Maddox on first, Harrah tapped in front of the plate . . . Catcher Ed Kirkpatrick threw to Paul Schaal for the force on Bosman at third . . . Schaal's throw to Cookie Rojas, covering first base, nailed Harrah . . . When Maddox tried to race from first to third on the play he was out on Rojas' return throw to Schaal . . . The Rangers won, 13-4.

Texas was a three-time victim in 1979 . . . On June 10 at Baltimore, with runners going from first and second bases, Buddy Bell lined sharply to Doug Decinces and the resulting triple play was a snap . . . Baltimore won, 5-4 . . . On June 23 at Oakland there was mass confusion after John Grubb hit a soft liner at Third Baseman Wayne Gross with runners on first and second . . . The ball was trapped and Third Base Coach Frank Lucchesi waved madly for Oscar Gamble to come on over to third base and for Billy Sample to move from first to second . . . Lo and behold, Umpire Bill Kunkel ruled the ball had been caught on the fly, so Gross attempted to throw to second, only to throw into centerfield . . . Out there, Tony Armas retrieved the ball and tossed to Shortstop Dave Chalk for the out at second . . . Then Armas came in, took the ball from Chalk and ran over to first base to catch Sample off for the third out . . . Thus, the centerfielder got an assist and a putout on a triple play . . . Texas won anyway, 8-5.

There was another dilly at Arlington Stadium on July 28 against Boston . . . Grubb was on third base and Bell on first when Al Oliver hit a looper to right . . . It seemed impossible that the ball would be fielded, so both runners took off . . . Jack Brohamer, Red Sox second baseman, made the impossible play, sprawling to achieve the grab . . . He recovered and threw to First Baseman Bob Watson, who then fired to Butch Hobson at third . . . Too bad, for Dennis Eckersley carried on to defeat Fergie Jenkins, 1-0.
