EDDIE CHILES
Chairman of the Board
President
Chief Executive Officer

Eddie Chiles has been involved in baseball for less than two years, but it now is recognized in the Metroplex and nationally that when he becomes involved in something he immerses himself completely.

He didn't like the direction the Rangers were taking when he assumed command on April 29, 1980. He has charted a different course, designed to convert the Rangers into baseball's most admired and efficient organization.

On a national level Mr. Chiles has been outspoken that baseball requires a more business-like structure. He is not wedded to procedures of the past when it can be demonstrated that innovative new methods will produce more effective results.

Enthusiastic and aggressive at age 71, he has instituted sweeping changes in the Rangers' approach, supervising the segmenting of baseball and business operations while fostering the team concept of working together for a common, successful cause.

In past months he has provided the Rangers with a show-place clubhouse which is the envy of all athletic teams. He has opened negotiations to purchase Arlington Stadium and if successful in his quest will provide extensive improvements. There is sharply increased community involvement, an accent on physical fitness, upgrading of all aspects of the Rangers' operation, plus financial stability.

Mr. Chiles is a firm believer in — and an excellent example of — the American Free Enterprise System. He has been a merchant seaman at \$29.50 a month. He has worked as a roughneck and a roustabout in the Texas oil fields. He hitchhiked to the University of Oklahoma, worked his way through the University and received a degree in petroleum engineering.

Nothing has come easy. It was 43 years ago at Seagraves, Texas, when he started his own business, The Western Company of North America, with three employees, two trucks and fortitude. Now The Western Company of North America, of which he is Chairman of the Board, employes over 5,000 persons worldwide and does business in excess of \$500 million annually.

He delegates responsibility, but he also demands accountability. Energetic, outgoing and friendly, he can be tough when the situation demands it. His objectives and standards are high. His accomplishments have led to a multitude of honors and awards from all segments of America in appreciation of his leadership qualities and successes in his many fields of endeavor.

The Western Company of North America serves the petroleum industry with technical knowledge and operations required in the discovery and production of oil and gas. These services include fracturing, acidizing and cementing. Since 1969 the company also has performed contract drilling operations offshore with mammoth submersible drilling vessels and jackup rigs in the North Sea, the Gulf of Alaska, the Gulf of Mexico, the Mediterranean Sea, The Arabian Gulf and off the coast of western Africa.

Mr. Chiles considers it his civic responsibility to encourage political candidates at every level of the American government process, lending financial and moral support.

He also regards his leadership of the Texas Rangers Baseball Club as a public trust to provide the fans of the Metroplex with wholesome entertainment at a reasonable cost, with the ultimate aim focused on a lasting position of prominence.



MANAGER

**ZIMMER, Donald William (Don)
No. 23**

Don turned the Rangers in the right direction last year in his first season as manager of the Texas club. He took over a team which had finished nine games under .500 in 1980 and transformed it into a unit which wound up nine games over .500, an improvement of 18 games in an abbreviated season.

One game, it developed, kept the Rangers out of the playoffs. If they had defeated Milwaukee on June 11, the final game before the strike, they would have nudged into first place ahead of Oakland. Under the split season format later adopted that contest cost the Rangers a playoff berth.

Zimmer has managed 7½ years in the major leagues with San Diego, Boston and Texas and displays a creditable 583-546 (.516) record. He averaged 93 wins in four full seasons with the Red Sox and overall was 412-308 (.572) at Boston, where he finished second, second, third and fourth.

He started his professional career as a shortstop in the Dodgers' system in 1949 and played every position during his 19 years on the field. He spent 12 years in the major leagues with the Brooklyn and Los Angeles Dodgers, the Chicago Cubs, New York Mets, Cincinnati Reds and Washington Senators. He played in Japan for a year before becoming a minor league manager in 1967.

Two serious injuries hampered his career, when hit in the head by Pitcher Jim Kirk of Columbus while playing for St. Paul in 1953 and when struck in the face by Pitcher Hal Jeffcoat of the Reds while playing Brooklyn in 1956.

He had played only half a season when Kirk hit him and had compiled a .300 batting average, 23 home runs and 63 runs batted in. Don was out of action for the remainder of the year. He also was a .300 hitter with Brooklyn when Jeffcoat hit him on June 23, costing Don the remainder of that season.

Don was known as an all-out performer as a player and he has been no less dedicated as a coach and a manager. All of his pay checks have been derived from baseball and he even married his high school sweetheart (she prefers Soot to Jean) at home plate in Elmira, N.Y., August 16, 1951.

Zimmer managed in the minor leagues at Knoxville, Buffalo, Indianapolis and Key West and was third base coach for Montreal, San Diego and Boston. He hasn't seen it all, perhaps, but he hasn't missed much either.

He has known the agony of playing with poor and mediocre clubs and the elation of victory in the World Series. He was the second baseman in the final game of the 1955 World Series, when the Dodgers' Johnny Podres defeated the New York Yankees, 2-0.

The ball park, home or road, is his office. He's not quite like the fellow in the television commercial who arrives at his desk at dawn seeking a fruitful investment for his clients, but Don arrives hours ahead of his players. He is devoted to his family and his job.

Zimmer signed to manage the Rangers on November 12, 1980, and last year his contract was extended through the 1983 season.

Born: New Castle, Pennsylvania, August 25, 1949 (32). 6-5 210 B-R T-R Single. Attended Beaver County Community College (Monaca, Pennsylvania). Resides in New Castle, Pennsylvania.

1981 SEASON: The last spot on the Rangers' pitching staff was up for grabs in spring training and Babcock latched on to it with continued impressive outings. He toiled in 10 games and didn't permit a run until the last of those contests, when Montreal nicked him for the only run off him in 18 innings. He wound up with a 2-0 record, an 0.50 earned run average and a job. During the season he was 1-1, with a 2.17 ERA, but did not pitch in the second half.

CAREER/MAJORS: Notched his first major league victory on June 16, 1980, when the Rangers erupted for six runs in the ninth inning to defeat Kansas City, 6-3. His longest appearance with the Rangers was on May 7 last year when he won a 9-4 decision against Chicago as the Rangers rallied for seven runs in the eighth inning. Bob worked 3.2 innings in that game. His shortest effort was against the California Angels on May 26, 1980 when he was ejected by Umpire Bill Haller after throwing his first pitch behind Dan Ford. 1981 SEASON: Was named the Rangers' Player of the Year for the second time in his three seasons with the club and was named to The Sporting News American League All-Star Team at third base for the third successive season. Made the American League All-Star squad for the fourth time. Led the Rangers with 10 home runs and 64 runs batted in, led the American League with 10 sacrifice flies. Buddy hit the Rangers' only grand slam of the year off Roy Jackson of Toronto at Texas on June 7. He had five runs batted in at Milwaukee on June 10. Batted .293 the first half and .296 the second half. Played hurt down the stretch with back and groin problems. Won his third straight Gold Glove.

BELL continued

CAREER/MAJORS: Has batted .306 in his three years with the Rangers and has been awarded a Gold Glove each of those seasons for his brilliance at third base. He has hit 19 of his 109 career home runs against Boston. Buddy is a .334 lifetime batter vs. the Red Sox, .326 vs. Kansas City, .316 vs. Seattle and .308 vs. Cleveland. Born: Glendale, California, March 8, 1957 (25). 6-4 190 B-R T-R Single. Graduate of Yavapai Junior College (Prescott, Arizona). Resides in Glendale, California.

1981 SEASON: The record shows a win and two defeats with the Rangers after being called up from Wichita in September, but the statistics also show a 1.63 earned run average which is more indicative of his performance. He didn't have a bad outing in five appearances. Two innings, two hits, no runs against Toronto. Four innings, one hit, no runs against California. Six and two-thirds innings, the first six scoreless, against Seattle. Six innings, two earned runs against Minnesota, and a route-going five-hit 1-0 triumph over California when Bobby Johnson hit a home run with two out in the ninth. Was 8-10 with Wichita and permitted 19 home runs, allowing 171 hits in 136 innings. Then, in his test with the Rangers, he allowed 18 hits in 28 innings, with no home runs.

CAREER/MAJORS: Called up from Charleston on September 2, 1980. The doubters dominated after his first appearance on Opening Day at Yankee Stadium in relief. Single by Dave Winfield. Single by Bob Watson. Single by Lou Piniella for one run. A sacrifice, an intentional walk to Graig Nettles, then a pinch grand slam by Bobby Murcer. Willie Randolph followed with a triple and in one inning Steve had yielded five hits and five runs. ERA — 45.00. For the remainder of the year his ERA was 2.00 and he wound up with an 8-2 record and a 2.56 ERA. Manager Don Zimmer didn't despair and Comer cashed in on his opportunity to prove he still could win. Steve had two other appearances against the Yankees last season — eight innings, two hits, no runs. He had 36 appearances and after the first one he was about as consistent as could be desired. He was 4-1 in the first half with a 2.00 ERA after that disastrous start. He was 4-1 in the second half with a 2.01 ERA.

1980 SEASON: Was 7-4 in the first half, then 2-5 after the strike was settled. In five of his 22 starts he worked 16 innings and permitted 25 earned runs for a 14.06 ERA. In the other 17 starts his ERA was 2.35. Lost 2-1 games to Oakland (home run by Dwayne Murphy), Minnesota (home run by Danny Goodwin) and New York (unearned run) and a 2-0 decision to the Yankees (home runs by Graig Nettles and Oscar Gamble). Had a one-hitter vs. Boston, a three-hitter vs. Seattle and four-hitters against Milwaukee, Seattle and Toronto. Gave up a home run every 12 innings as compared with one every 28 innings in 1980.

No. 9 C-1B**

Born: New London, Connecticut, August 21, 1948 (33). 6-2 210 B-R T-R Married. Attended Mitchell Junior College (New London, Connecticut). Resides in East Lyme, Connecticut.

1981 SEASON: John has been plagued by injuries the past couple of seasons and his power production has diminished from 12 home runs in 1979 to one in 1980 and one in 1981, while the runs batted in have deflated from 61 to 23 to seven, combined with a batting average which has shriveled from .285 to .236 to .138. His three-run double in the ninth inning at Seattle on May 23 enabled the Rangers to tie the Mariners, 4-4, and the Rangers won it in the twelfth, 6-4. His lone homer, at Minnesota off Jerry Koonsman on June 2, figured in a 5-3 win.

CAREER/MAJORS: He has put in more than 12 years in the majors, five of them after it was believed his career had ended on May 9, 1976, at Boston when he made a disastrous slide into second base at a time when he was hitting .419. He sustained a broken left leg, a dislocated ankle, severely torn ligaments, but went through a punishing rehabilitation program and was back on the field in 1977. His first 16 hits of the 1979 season resulted in 16 runs batted in. On June 7 that season he contributed a double and two home runs at Milwaukee to drive across six runs and tie a club record. Smashed a career-high 14 homers and batted in 68 runs with Cleveland in 1973.

CAREER/MINORS: Batted .345 his last two seasons at the Triple-A level to earn a promotion to the parent New York Yankees in 1969.

1981 SEASON: Opened the season by hitting safely in eight straight games and on April 29 was leading the league with a .377 batting average. Hit a home run on May 7 against San Francisco's Doyle Alexander for his first homer since September 6, 1979. Batted .300 through May 25. Doug didn't make an error in his first 49 games.

CAREER/MAJORS: Won a Gold Glove in 1980, when he made only six errors in 157 games, and led the league in fielding with a .991 average. He went 80 games before making an error on a ground ball. He was Gold Glove runner-up to Dave Lopes of the Los Angeles Dodgers in 1978 and Manny Trillo of the Philadelphia Phillies in 1979. He committed only 34 errors in four full seasons with the Mets. He hit three triples on August 5, 1980, at Montreal to tie the modern record. It was last previously accomplished by Ernie Banks in 1966. He was named National League Player of the Week August 4-10, 1980. Sustained a fractured right wrist in a collision at first base with San Francisco's Mike Ivie on August 19 and missed 35 games. Doug was a member of two World Championship clubs with Cincinnati in 1975 and 1976. Hit his first major league home run at Cincinnati, a three-run shot off the New York Mets' Tom Hall, on May 21, 1975. Joined the Mets in mid-June, 1977, in the Tom Seaver deal and took over as the club's regular shortstop after Bud Harrelson broke his hand on July 8. Collected four hits (two singles, a double and a triple) against the Pirates at Pittsburgh on May 23, 1978. Led the league's second basemen in 1979 with 369 putouts, 762 total chances and 98 double plays. Opened the season at shortstop until the Mets acquired Frank Traveras from Pittsburgh on April 19. Batted in 61 runs despite hitting eighth. Had his biggest RBI night on May 1, 1979, at New York when he thumped across four runs in a 10-5 loss to San Diego.

CAREER/MINORS: Signed to his first contract as a free agent by Chet Montgomery of Cincinnati. In 1973 he led Eastern League shortstops with 231 putouts, 453 assists and 97 double plays. In 1974, with Indianapolis, he led American Association shortstops with 392 assists, 91 double plays and 605 chances accepted and was named to the league's All-Star team.

PERSONAL: Earned nine letters in baseball, basketball and football at Bryan Station High School in Lexington and was All-City in three sports. Played baseball and basketball at the University of Kentucky. His father, Robert, played in the Brooklyn Dodgers' organization for one year. Is a country western singer and has appeared with Loretta Lynn's band, the Coal Miners, in New York.

1981 SEASON: The thing that remained constant for John last season was his hitting against Boston. He batted .381 (8-21), and collected seven of his 26 runs batted in against the Red Sox. That's the way it has been during his six years in the American League. He displays a .373 lifetime mark against Boston and has clubbed nine of his 39 home runs against the Red Sox. He was hitting .321 on May 9, sat out a couple of games with an ailing back and never rebounded, winding up at .231, his worst year as a pro. Doctors discovered a circulation problem in his right arm, removed a rib to alleviate the condition, and he's looking forward to 1982 with optimism.

CAREER/MAJORS: Although he has dealt particular punishment to the Red Sox, Grubb also has inflicted agony on other clubs. He shows a .363 lifetime batting average against Baltimore and has hit .345 against Minnesota and .337 vs. Toronto. Had a 21-game batting streak in 1979, tying with Seattle's Dan Meyer for the longest string of the season in the American League. Batted .311 his first full season at San Diego in 1973 and was named to Topps and Baseball Digest All-Rookie teams. John was named to the National League All-Star team in 1974. He had a club record 36 doubles with the Padres in 1975 and batted .406 in 20 games with the Rangers in 1978 after being acquired from Cleveland.

CAREER/MINORS: John was selected in the first round of the secondary phase of the 1971 January free agent draft by San Diego. He batted .308 with Lodi, CA and .296 with Alexandria, LA, to merit quick promotion to the majors. He made the Texas League All-Star team in 1972.

PERSONAL: Played baseball, basketball and football at Meadowbrook High School in Richmond, VA. Was a member of the 1968 Manatee Junior College baseball team which won the Junior National championship. Went to the College World Series with Florida State.

John Lowenstein contributed an insider at Chicago on June 14, 1978, and in 1979 Wills hit one against Paul Splittorff at Kansas City on July 15.

TRIPLE PLAYS

The Rangers have been involved in six triple plays in their ten year existence - one by them and five against them.

The only Texas triple play materialized on August 8, 1977, in the second game of a doubleheader with Oakland at Arlington Stadium. . . Roger Moret opened the fifth inning by walking Mitchell Page and Rich McKinney. . . Manny Sanguillen then slapped a grounder to Toby Harrah, who stepped on third base and fired to Bump Wills, who made the force, then relayed to Mike Hargrove at first base. . . The Rangers won, 3-0

The first triple play against the Rangers came in their first season in Texas, on August 13, 1972, with Kansas City pulling it off under unusual circumstances. . . With Dick Bosman on second base and Elliott Maddox on first, Harrah tapped in front of the plate. . . Catcher Ed Kirkpatrick threw to Paul Schaal for the force on Bosman at third. . . Schaal's throw to Cookie Rojas, covering first base, nailed Harrah. . . When Maddox tried to race from first to third on the play he was out on Rojas' return throw to Schaal. . . The Rangers won, 13-4.

Texas was a three-time victim in 1979. . . On June 10 at Baltimore, with runners going from first and second bases, Buddy Bell lined sharply to Doug Decinces and the resulting triple play was a snap. . . Baltimore won, 5-4. . . On June 23 at Oakland there was mass confusion after John Grubb hit a soft liner at Third Baseman Wayne Gross with runners on first and second. . . The ball was trapped and Third Base Coach Frank Lucchesi waved madly for Oscar Gamble to come on over to third base and for Billy Sample to move from first to second. . . Lo and behold, Umpire Bill Kunkel ruled the ball had been caught on the fly, so Gross attempted to throw to second, only to throw into centerfield. . . Out there Tony Armas retrieved the ball and tossed to Shortstop Dave Chalk for the out at second. . . Then Armas came in, took the ball from Chalk and ran over to first base to catch Sample off for the third out. . . Thus, the centerfielder got an assist and a putout on a triple play. . . Texas won anyway, 8-5.

There was another dilly at Arlington Stadium on July 28 against Boston. . . Grubb was on third base and Bell on first when Al Oliver hit a looper to right. . . It seemed impossible that the ball would be fielded, so both runners took off. . . Jack Brohamer, Red Sox second baseman, made the impossible play, sprawling to achieve the grab. . . He recovered and threw to First Baseman Bob Watson, who then fired to Butch Hobson at third. . . Too bad, for Dennis Eckersley carried on to defeat Fergie Jenkins, 1-0.

Then, on May 22, 1981, at Seattle John Grubb and Pat Putnam walked. On a hit-and-run Mario Mendoza lined to Shortstop Rick Auerbach, who stepped on second to nail Grubb, then threw to Bruce Bochte at first base to catch Putnam. The Rangers won, 6-2.

1981 SEASON: Was Rangers' Co-Pitcher of the Year with Steve Comer. Zipped to a 6-1 start before the strike and his 7-0 five-hit victory over Kansas City at Arlington Stadium on April 30 gave Texas a club record of four successive shutouts. Was 5-0 in his first seven starts at Arlington Stadium and the Rangers won the two in which he had no decision. Subtract only three innings from his record, in which he yielded 14 runs (four to Chicago in one inning, five to Milwaukee in one-third of an inning and five to Minnesota in 1.2 innings) and his earned run average would have been 2.38. After the strike he beat New York, 1-0, and Boston, 3-0, to boost his record to 8-1 on August 16, at which point he had won five in a row. Then he lost a 2-0 toughie to Detroit.

CAREER/MAJORS: He's a swift starter. He came out of the bullpen in 1979 with Seattle and won seven of his first 10 starts. In 1980 he got off to a 7-1 spurt with the Mariners and in 1981 he zoomed to 8-1 with the Rangers. Was handed a 10-day suspension (last five days of 1980, first five days of 1981) when Umpire Bill Kunkel detected a tack taped to a finger on Rick's gloved hand while pitching for the Mariners at Kansas City as Honeycutt was en route to losing 14 of his last 15 decisions. Also was ejected from a game on April 11, 1979, vs. Oakland, hitting a batter with a pitch immediately after being warned by the umpire.

CAREER/MINORS: Rick was Pittsburgh's 17th selection in the June, 1976, draft and was signed by Harding Peterson, now the Pirates' Executive Vice President. Was 5-3 with Niagara Falls that year, with a 2.60 earned run average, and set New York-Penn League records for complete games (7), innings (97) and strikeouts (98). Played first base when he wasn't pitching and batted .301. Started the 1977 season with Shreveport and had a 10-6 record with a 2.47 ERA when traded to Seattle. At that point he was hitting .304. Was named Topps Double-A All-Star lefthanded pitcher in 1977.

PERSONAL: Resides in Arlington, Texas, with wife Debbie and daughter Holli. Led Lakeview High, Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia, to two state baseball championships as a pitcher-first baseman and also quarterbacked the football team. Was All-SEC baseball player as a junior and senior at the University of Tennessee and was an All-America as a first baseman in his senior year (1976).

1981 SEASON: Charlie's 1981 season really focused on the final month, when he had an opportunity to start after Fergie Jenkins and Jon Matlack faltered. Rickey Henderson greeted him with a homer leading off the first inning at Oakland, but thereafter the A's collected only two more hits. Charlie lost, 3-0, on September 8, but thereafter reeled off four successive victories over Oakland, 12-2; Minnesota, 4-3; Minnesota, 5-2, and Seattle, 3-1. His earned run average was 2.26 the last half of the season. He had started only 23 of 438 games in the majors, but Manager Don Zimmer has him inked in as one of his starters in 1982. "He was just sensational," said Zimmer, "and he deserves the opportunity."

CAREER/MAJORS: Charlie started only 16 of his 401 games with the Los Angeles Dodgers and completed none. He has started seven times with the Rangers and completed four, including an 8-0 five-hitter at Toronto on August 26, 1980, after being purchased from the Dodgers on July 11. Made an impressive major league debut by fanning Pittsburgh's Willie Stargell with the bases loaded. After first coming up to the Dodgers in 1970 he got his first start with them in 1977 and worked five scoreless innings against the San Francisco Giants to earn the win. He also hit his only home run that season. In 1974 Mike Marshall worked a record 106 games with the Dodgers, but Hough also appeared in 49 games and had a 9-4 record.

CAREER/MINORS: Credits Tom Lasorda, current Dodger manager, and longtime Dodger scout Goldie Holt with rescuing his career in 1969 when he came up with a sore arm at Albuquerque. They taught him a knuckleball, later refined on advice from Jim Brewer and Hoyt Wilhelm. Then he became a three-time Pacific Coast League All-Star pitcher, from 1970-1972. His first season with the knuckler was 1970, when he had a 12-8 record at Spokane, with a 1.95 earned run average and a league-leading 18 saves.

PERSONAL: Charlie throws about 80 per cent knucklers, which generally will break down and away to a righthanded hitter. He has followed the sun. Born in Honolulu, raised in Florida, where he was a third baseman at Hialeah High, pitched four years in New Mexico, nine in California, now works in Texas and lives eight miles from Anaheim Stadium in Brea with his wife, Sharon, daughter Tracie Ann and son Aaron. His father, Richard, was a minor league third baseman, served in the Air Force and was a Japanese prisoner of war for three years. He was awarded the Silver Star with two clusters.

It was a wicked grounder which Buddy Bell fielded cleanly at third, but threw off balance into the dirt past First Baseman Pat Putnam. Hosken Powell got the Twins' other hit, a trickler to second base, opening the ninth.

CAREER/MAJORS: Has a 10-1 record vs. Seattle and is 11-5 vs. Boston, with 10 wins in his last 11 decisions against the Red Sox. Led the Rangers with 14 victories in 1980 and is 43-32 in four seasons with Texas, with every year a winning one. Started the 1979 season with an 0-3 record and an 8.27 earned run average out of the bullpen, but since has been a starter with a 30-17 record. Won 49 games in three years with the Yankees and sparkled as a rookie with a 14-9 mark and a 2.95 ERA. He was a 19-game winner in 1974, when he won five straight complete games in July.

He demonstrated himself to be a master at fielding the bad hop, with a clock in his head for rating the speed of opposing runners. The style is unusual — one-handed and frequently side-saddle — but the prouists nevertheless are captivated by his consistency. His day-in-day-out handling of routine plays escalates his value. He helped at the plate in the early going, too, and had 15 runs batted in by May 26, one more than he had in all of 1980 with Seattle. He was 4-for-5 against Detroit on May 18 and 3-for-3 vs. Minnesota a week later after hitting into a triple play at Seattle on May 22.

1981 SEASON: It was a dream world for Bill until the strike came along. He compiled seven straight pinch hits to establish an American League record, breaking the mark of six set by Baltimore's Bob Johnson in 1964. He amassed an 18-game batting streak in which he batted .545 (24-44) and he continued that string seven times by getting a hit in his only time at bat. He batted .441 in the first half of the season and was a .511 hitter in May (24-47), when he was named the Rangers' Player of the Month. Fernando Arroyo of Minnesota checked Stein's bid to tie Dave Philley's major league record of eight consecutive pinch hits when he got Bill on a grounder to short on June 4 at Minnesota. He batted a combined .463 vs. six clubs (25-54) - .417 vs. Kansas City (5-12), .429 vs. Seattle (6-14), .429 vs. Boston (3-7), .467 vs. Chicago (7-15), .500 vs. Cleveland (1-2) and .750 vs. Baltimore (3-4). For the season he batted .450 (9-20) as a pinch-hitter. He was .330 overall. Hit .444 subbing for injured Buddy Bell in early May.

STEIN continued

CAREER/MAJORS: His first major league hit, for the St. Louis Cardinals in 1972, was a home run off Philadelphia's Ken Reynolds. He saw action at all four infield positions and in the outfield while playing two full seasons for the Chicago White Sox in 1975-76. Hit 13 home runs and batted in 67 runs for Seattle in 1977. Was employed in a backup role by the Mariners in 1980 and was hampered by injuries. Severely sprained his left thumb playing first base at Cleveland on June 1 and was on the disabled list until July 22, later was bothered by a recurring back injury.
