The three owners, each holding a third interest, were J. W. (Bill) Ringsby and his son, Don, of Denver, and James Trindle of Los Angeles.

The senior Ringsby is Chairman of the Board of the Rockets. Bill is also Board Chairman of the transcontinental trucking firm that bears his name. An avid, long-time area sports booster, he jumped at the chance to get in on the ground floor of the exciting, new professional basketball league.

Gary Ringsby, 31, brother of Don, recently joined his brother and father in the ownership of the Rockets. A CU graduate, he is president and general manager of Grand Canyon Caverns in Dinosaur City, Ariz., and is also a devotee of all sports. Gary and his wife, Linda, have two girls—Trudi and Greta Sue.

Vice Chairman of the Denver Rockets is James Trindle of Los Angeles. He is one of the organizers of the ABA, and the man responsible for bringing pro basketball to Denver. Trindle, 47, heads the engineering firm of Voorheis-Trindle-Nelson, Inc., the third largest of its kind in California, with headquarters in L.A.

An honor graduate of Kansas State University, he recently completed a term as president of the Southern California Chapter of Civil Engineers and Land Surveyors Society. A member of the ABA Board of Trustees, Jim and his wife, Ellen, live in Southern California with son Jim Jr., and daughter Nancy. Another daughter, Carolyn (Mrs. J. A. Lentz), lives in Denver.

Less than a week after the Denver franchise was granted, the Rockets appointed Dick Eicher to the dual post as Executive Vice President and General Manager. Eicher, 38, is a former Eastern Washington collegiate star, and for years was a standout in local AAU and NIBL play. The popular 6-6 former cager was named to the AAU All-America in 1956, and was an NIBL All Star in 1955 and 1957. Most recently, he was Director of Trade and Public Relations for D-C International, the trucking firm for whom he starred on the hardwood. He and his wife, Gerry, have three children—daughters Jadie and Lynn, and son David.

## TICKET OUTLETS

The Rockets opened 15 ticket outlets throughout the greater Denver area in August, under the direction of the Harry Fowler Central Ticket Agency, located in the American National Bank Bldg. At the same time, a season ticket direct mail campaign was launched and more than 70 "captains of industry" canvassed the state in a concentrated drive. The combined efforts proved fruitful when, a week before Denver's opener in mid-October, Business Manager Del Klone reported that more than 700 season ducats had been purchased.

Service men in uniform and accredited high school and college students will be admitted to all Rockets games for \$1.00 in the general admission section. Regular prices for tickets, which may be purchased at the Arena or Coliseum box office the day of the game, are \$4, \$3, \$2 for reserved seats, and \$1.50 for general admission.

## BOB BASS . . .

Head  
Basketball Coach

After 15 years as one of the best college basketball coaches in the country, Robert Eugene Bass left the collegiate ranks and cast his lot with the pros—and the Denver Rockets were glad that he made his cast in the right direction.

Under his skilled hand, the Oklahoma Baptist University Bisons of Shawnee, Okla.,

ripped apart the Oklahoma Collegiate Conference (OCC) from 1952 through 1957, posting 275 wins against 143 losses, and winning six OCC titles.

Bass began his coaching career at Cromwell (Okla.) High School in 1950, at the age of 21. He returned to his alma mater in 1952 when he was named Athletic Director, Basketball Coach and Associate Professor of Physical Education.

Coach Bass is the author of three fine books on basketball, and is considered an authority on hardwood procedures. He holds a Master's Degree in Physical Education from Oklahoma University (1954).

He took the Bisons to the National Assn. of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) Championships in Kansas City six times, copping the title once (1966) and finishing runnerup twice (1965 and 1967). Bass' NAIA tourney record is a fine 14 wins, 5 losses.

Bass, 38, capped his collegiate career his last year at OBU by scoring 25 victories in 32 contests and earning the accolade as "Coach of the Year" in small college play by the Basketball Writers Assn. (BWA).

The Rockets boss has toured South America as the coach of a collegiate all-star quintet (1964), traveled to Southeast Asia as a head mentor (1966), and last season was selected one of the NAIA coaches for the Pan American Trials.

Bob and his wife, Billie, have two sons—Kelly and Kip.

# Denver Rockets Launched

From Los Angeles to Kansas City to Denver—that's the way the old (basket) ball bounced when the American Basketball Assn. (ABA) sought a city in the middle part of our great country to be the hub of the fledgling cage loop.

James Trindle of Los Angeles finally picked Denver as the site of his franchise, one of 11 allotted by Commissioner George Mikan and trustees of the ABA. On June 15, 1967, Trindle sold two-thirds of his franchise to J. W. (Bill) Ringsby and his son, Donald, well-known Denver businessmen.

The senior Ringsby is Chairman of the Board of the new pro team, named the Rockets, while Don is its President. Trindle is Vice Chairman of the Board. Gary Ringsby, Don's brother, has since acquired a part of the Ringsby family's majority holdings.

The Ringsbys are executive officers of the transcontinental trucking firm that bears their name, The Ringsby System, while Trindle is the President of Voorheis-Trindle-Nelson, Inc., the third largest engineering firm in California, with headquarters in Los Angeles.

The Denver ownership wasted little time in getting a front office boss. Less than a week later, the Rockets announced the appointment of Dick Eicher to a dual post as Executive Vice President and General Manager.

Eicher, 38, is a former Eastern Washington collegiate star and for years was a standout in local AAU and National Industrial Basketball League (NIBL) play.

After reviewing a list of qualified coaching prospects, Eicher reached into the small college ranks on July 1 and selected Robert Eugene Bass, Athletic Director and highly successful Basketball Coach of Oklahoma Baptist University.

Coach Bass signed a two year contract and "We hope that we have the coaching find of the year in the ABA," Eicher said of Bob.

Eicher and Bass continued the fast pace of the Rockets by appointing, in rapid succession, a business manager, club trainer, public relations and promotions director, and a publicist. They put the Rockets in orbit by scheduling a couple of tryout camps—all of which was accomplished in a very short span of time.

On Sept. 2, Eicher announced that the radio broadcast rights for the 1967-68 season were purchased by Denver's KTLN, one of the area's most popular stations, with a power of 5,000 watts, and broadcasting 24 hours a day.

Bass' first tryout camp was held at Azusa Pacific College in California on July 7-8. From the 22 players in camp, a half-dozen were invited to the Denver tryout at Regis College, July 20-23.

From these two camps came 16 players when the Rockets opened practice at Regis College Sunday, Sept. 10. Two more players were brought in by Bass the opening week prior to the first public Intra-squad game Saturday, Sept. 16.

The original sixteen candidates were:

**CENTERS:** Rich Parks, 6'8", St. Louis University; Elton McGriff, 6'8", Creighton University, and Ted Werner, 6'8", Washington State University.

**FORWARDS:** Charles Gardner, 6'8", Colorado University; Wayne Hightower, 6'9", Kansas University; Gary Keller, 6'10", Florida University; Byron Beck, 6'9", Denver University; Julian Hammond, 6'5", Tulsa University; Ron Horn, 6'7", Indiana University, and Willie Murrell, 6'6", Kansas State.

**GUARDS:** Larry Jones, 6'3", Toledo University; Grant Simmons, 6'3", Nebraska University; C. D. Wilson, 6'2", Cal State; Larry Armstrong, 6', Arizona State University; Steve Chubin, 6'2", Rhode Island University, and Willis (Lefty) Thomas, 6'2", Harbor Jr. College.

Joining the Rockets prior to their first public scrimmage were guard Sherman Dillard, 6'3", Tulsa University, and center Tom Hoover, 6'10", Villanova University.

The Rockets played a four game set of pre-season encounters with the Oakland Oaks late in September, and a trio of games with the Minnesota Muskies early in October. They split with the California club and took two out of three from Minnesota, winning the odd game each time.

Jack Grunwald, Denver business executive, was tapped to head a drive for season tickets among industry and professional people. And what a job he and his more than 70 co-chairmen did! With a week to go before opening tip-off, Grunwald's Guerrillas were a potent force in sending Denver's season ticket sales past the 700 mark. This figure should be the standard for each of the other 10 ABA clubs to shoot at.

The Rockets will play 39 league games at home, 31 in the Downtown Arena (Capacity: 6,900) and eight in the Denver Coliseum (Capacity: 10,000). They open their 1967-68 ABA campaign at home against the Anaheim Amigos Sunday, Oct. 15, 1967. Game time for all Rockets home games is 8 P.M.

General Manager Dick Eicher sums it up by stating that, "We are optimistic that Denver will be one of the best, if not the best, franchise in the ABA."

Eicher based his optimism on the solid Denver ownership.

"They (the owners) have pledged a five year program and an all-out effort to make it (the basketball program) successful," said Eicher.

"That, plus the fact that Denver is a good basketball city, rich in history and success with the AAU and NIBL (National Industrial Basketball League) background. We look forward to our first season of professional basketball," Eicher noted.

The popular Martin has long been the radio "Voice of the Denver Broncos" of the American Football League. In addition, he broadcasts University of Colorado football for KTLN and the Intermountain Network. In the past, Martin has described the play for hockey, basketball and baseball teams throughout Colorado.

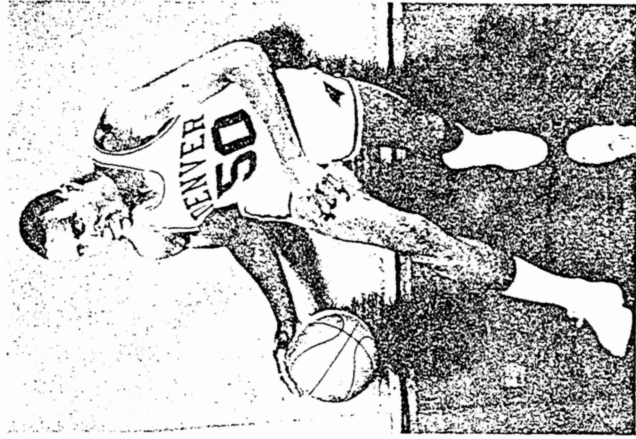

## HOME GAMES

Denver will play 39 home games—31 in the downtown City Auditorium Arena, eight in the Denver Coliseum. By months: Oct.—2, Nov.—10, Dec.—8, Jan.—7, Feb.—6, Mar.—6. They will host Anaheim, New Orleans, Oakland and Dallas five times; Houston 4, and Pittsburgh, Indiana, Minnesota, New Jersey and Kentucky, 3 times each. During the week, they will play on 6 Sundays, 7 Mondays, 6 Tuesdays, 7 Wednesdays, 4 Thursdays, 4 Fridays and 5 Saturdays.

## UNIFORMS

The Rockets will be one of the best dressed teams in professional sports. The team colors are Orange, Black and White. At home, they will wear basic white with orange and black trim and black lettering. Their warmups will include the latest basketball fashion—a turtleneck sweater.

## TICKETS

All seats except general admission are sold on a reserved basis. Season tickets are sold prior to opening game as follows: \$4.00 per game, \$140 per season; \$3.00 per game, \$105 per season; \$2.00 per game, \$70 per season, and \$1.50 per game, no season ticket. In addition, a "20 Game Plan" or "Half-Season Ticket" program was recently instituted, in which buyers would get to see each ABA team twice during the season, beginning Nov. 1. The top ticket sold for \$76 for the 20 games; the \$3.00 ticket for \$57, and \$38 for the \$2.00 ticket.

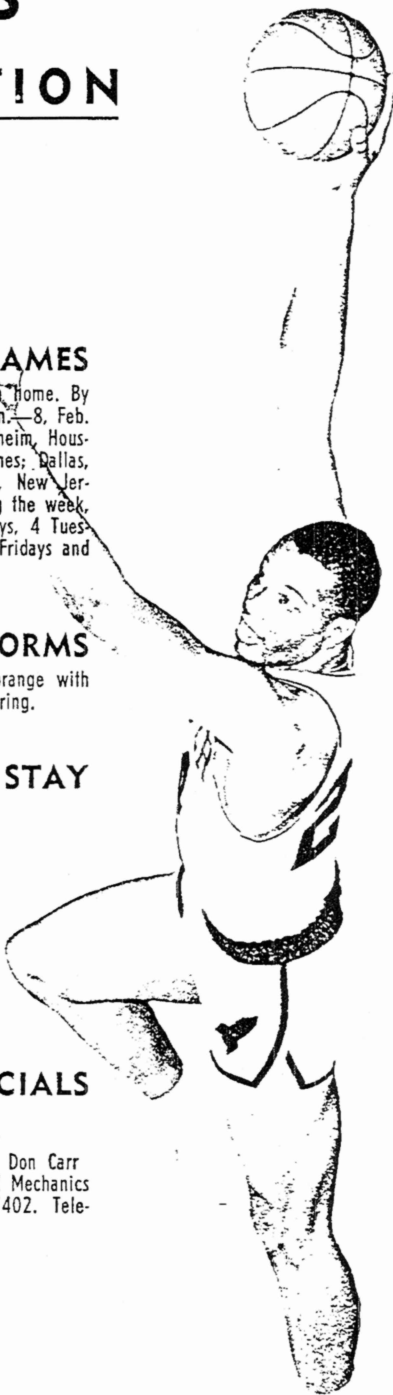

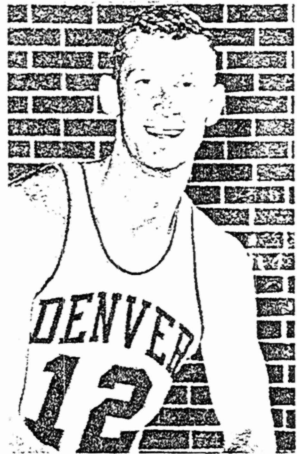
