"1965-66 OUTLOOK"

Two factors encourage me as the Pistons prepare to embark on the 1965-66 season:

1. The complete recovery of Ray Scott's ankle.
2. The strength we expect to receive from our new faces.

Scott was in the midst of, perhaps, his finest season since joining the Pistons when he was injured in a game with Los Angeles last winter. Although he was able to rejoin us, the injury continued to bother him and he was never the Scott we had seen earlier in the campaign.

With Ray back at full strength, he figures to give us the scoring and rebounding punch we so need. Also, it should be noted that Scott is one of the best playmaking forwards in the NBA.

As for our rookies, I feel that at least three of them -- Bill Buntin (Michigan), Tom Van Arsdale (Indiana), and Bill Chmielewski (Dayton) -- all stand an excellent chance of making our team and from what I have heard Ron Reed (Notre Dame) and Barry Smith (High Point) also have the stuff that could make them NBA players.

We are going to need help because Terry Dischinger, our top scorer last season, has been called to military duty and will be lost to the team for the next two years, and Hub Reed retired at the close of last season.

Bill Buntin and Tom Van Arsdale should prove valuable additions at our forward slots where we have Joe Caldwell, Don Kojis and Jack Moreland returning in addition to myself. With the loss of Dischinger, I think that I may move myself back to a guard position which would not be strange to me since Dick McGuire used me there back in my rookie year in the NBA.

Chmielewski could prove most valuable with Reed's retirement as we have no back up center for Reggie Harding. Chmielewski is a Detroit boy who appears to be very serious on making the team which he has shown by working all summer to bring his weight down from 250 to 235.

Our returning guards, with valuable pro experience, are Rod Thorn, Eddie Miles and Donnis Butcher. Eddie had a tremendous season for us a year ago and there is no reason why he can't continue to blossom into an NBA star. Rod proved very valuable as our third guard and did a fine job in making the Club run.

As for the Western Division race, I look for Baltimore to have the edge on the championship and a dog-fight between Los Angeles, Detroit, San Francisco and St. Louis for the other two playoff spots.

FRED ZOLLNER

Basketball Pioneer

Detroit Pistons' President Fred Zollner is one of the pioneers of major league basketball, organizing his first professional team in 1941 as an entry in the National Basketball League.

Success on the basketball floor was not long in coming to the president of the Fort Wayne piston-manufacturing corporation that bears his name. Bolstered by such stars as Bobby McDermott, Paul Birch and Buddy Jeannette (now General Manager of the Baltimore Bullets), the Pistons won the National Basketball League Championship four straight years (1943 through 1946) and captured three world tournaments (1944-1945 and 1946) in Chicago Stadium, then recognized as the pinnacle of pro cage fame.

Zollner and his Pistons led three other N.B.L. teams into the Basketball Association of America in 1948 and the following year joined the National Basketball Association, an amalgamation of the old N.B.L. and the rival B.A.A.

In 1954-55, the Pistons won their first Western Division Championship even though forced to play all playoff games on neutral or opponents' courts due to the presence of the American Bowling Congress tournament at Fort Wayne Coliseum, then the Pistons' home base. After hurdling Minneapolis in the semi-finals for the divisional flag, the Pistons extended Eastern Champion Syracuse to the full seven games before bowing in the title game, 92-91.

The Pistons repeated as Western Division Champions in 1955-56 and were beaten in the World Championship playoffs by Philadelphia.

Despite two consecutive divisional pennants, attendance at Fort Wayne failed to improve and Zollner decided to move his club to a city with major league standards. He decided to wait, however, until after the 1956-57 season, which saw the Pistons share first place in the regular season race with St. Louis and Minneapolis, then bow in the first round of the playoffs.

Through his long affiliation with automotive leaders in Detroit, and because of his firm belief that the Motor City is the world's finest sports town, Zollner negotiated to bring the Pistons to Detroit in the spring of 1957.

In the eight years the Pistons have played in Detroit, they have strived through rebuilding, to bring the Motor City its first Championship in the National Basketball Association.

EARL LLOYD - CHIEF SCOUT

Earl Lloyd knows his way around the National Basketball Association. The likeable 37-year old graduate of West Virginia State played in the NBA for nine seasons before retiring at the start of the 1961-62 season. No sooner did he hang up his shoes as an active performer than the Pistons signed him to scout and help McGuire.

Lloyd never was a high-average scorer in the NBA. In fact, only once did he hit double figures. But few could match him defensively and he was rough to stop when sent into a game on a spot assignment.

He broke into the NBA with Washington in 1950-51, but his career was interrupted by the Selective Service draft. In 1952 he joined the Syracuse Nats. He remained with the Nats until 1958-59 when Lloyd came to the Pistons.

As the Pistons' head scout, Lloyd travels thousands of miles to check future prospects. Based on what he sees hinge many of the selections the Pistons make at the draft of collegiate stars.

Earl and his wife have two sons and have made the Motor City their permanent home.

A veteran Detroit newspaperman, Maskin served on the Detroit Times sports staff for more than 25 years until the paper suspended operations in 1959. He joined the Pistons in January, 1960.

Maskin performs multiple duties for the Pistons -- handles publicity, the team's travel arrangements, the regular and exhibition schedules, the Pistons Official Game Magazine, etc.

He was a well-known sports official for many years, umpiring in baseball and refereeing in basketball and football.

Maskin and his wife have two sons and one daughter.

D O N F R I E D E R I C H S

T R A I N E R

The dean of all trainers in the National Basketball Association. He spent twelve years with the New York Knickerbockers before coming to Detroit where he is now starting his third year.

He is a native Detroiter who starred in football and basketball at De La Salle High School. He later became one of the city's top bowlers and carried an average of 200 before becoming a trainer.

Don served as trainer one season for the Richmond, Virginia, team when the club was the No. 1 farm club of the New York Yankees.

During the off season, Friederichs and his wife run the Burkemo's Motel located on Lake St. Clair, two miles north of St. Clair, Michigan.

MEET THE COACH - DAVE DE BUSSCHERE

Sport's busiest man. That's Dave DeBusschere who knows no such thing as a day off -- or a vacation.

DeBusschere spends half the year performing as the player-coach of the Detroit Pistons Basketball Club. As soon as his cage work is completed, DeBusschere switches to baseball. He hurred for Indianapolis of the Pacific Coast League (top Chicago White Sox farm club) this past season. If time permitted, DeBusschere very well might be a golf star. During his infrequent visits to the links, he shoots in the high 70's.

The hectic sports schedule has been part of DeBusschere's life since his grade school days in Detroit. He made the big sports headlines very early when he enrolled at Austin High on the Motor City's east side.

Besides leading Austin to city and state titles in basketball and the Catholic League crown in baseball, DeBusschere covered himself with personal honors be winning All-Catholic, All-City and All-State honors on the hardwoods and attracting scouts from every major league club to watch him in baseball.

When his prep days ended, DeBusschere picked the University of Detroit from more than 50 schools of higher learning. At U. of D., DeBusschere helped write the three greatest years the Titans have known both in basketball and baseball.

Thrice the Titans gained post-season tourneys in basketball -- the first two years U. of D. went to the National Invitational; as a senior, Detroit landed in the NCAA. In baseball, the strong-armed DeBusschere paced the Titans into three straight NCAA district tourneys. Once the Detroiters reached the finals against Minnesota.

DeBusschere was made the Pistons No. 1 draft choice in 1962 and provided the spark from mid-December on, when the Pistons played at better than a .500 clip to make the playoffs. The following season, his action with the Pistons was limited to 15 games due to a fractured leg.

Last year DeBusschere was back with the Detroit cagers and -- after 11 games -- he was named the team's interim coach. The fact that he had become the youngest coach in the history of the National Basketball Association and one of the youngest ever to guide any major league team, didn't affect his performances on the court.

His averaged swelled to 16.7 points per game. He finished as the team's second highest rebounder and was No. 1 in the assist department. Under him, the Pistons won 29 games, while losing 40.

DeBusschere received a bonus estimated at \$65,000 from the Chicago White Sox in 1962. He spent his first year in organized baseball with the Savannah, Ga., farm club, the next with the Chisox and the last two with Indianapolis. The experts insist DeBusschere has a "major league arm" and should make it in the Major League soon.

The 25-year old DeBusschere, who still makes his home on Detroit's east side, is single.

Reggie is a native Detroiter who stands seven feet and weighs 245. Nonetheless he is one of NBA's fastest big men. Reggie joined the Pistons midway through the 1963-64 season. He has averaged 11.7 points and just over 11 rebounds per game since entering the pro ranks. He is rated a potential NBA star. He is a good man on the fast break. He played his high school basketball at Detroit Eastern where he gained All-City, All-State and All-American honors.

Don hails from Marquette University. He stands 6'5", weighs 210. He is starting his third season in the NBA. Don played with the Phillips Oilers in the AAU League for two years before joining the Baltimore Bullets in 1963-64. He came to the Pistons in the summer of '64. Has been used exclusively in a reserve capacity in his two years as a pro. Has an overall average of 6.4 points. He is a strong-type player who is able to jump into the action on a spot basis. Works in a Milwaukee brokerage office during the off season. He was the highest scoring player in Marquette University's history.

Eddie hails from Seattle University. He stands 6'4", weighs 196. Found his own with Pistons last season in his sophomore campaign in the NBA after a poor rookie year. Averaged only 5.4 points in initial year with Detroit, but once he got a chance to play regularly in 1964-65, Miles caught fire and he finished the season with a 13.7 average. Now figures prominently in the Pistons' plans for the coming season. A speedster and solid defensive performer. Excellent shot from the outside. At Seattle Miles earned the title of the "Man with the Golden Arm" as he averaged 21.3, 22.3 and 25.8 points. Miles, his wife and four children make their home now in Detroit. Has attended U. of D. in off season to complete work toward a degree in accounting.

Walter Dukes is the only other played to last six seasons with the Pistons. Has been used chiefly as a reserve forward during his NBA record. Excellent man to have on deck for fast-breaking attacks. His overall NBA average stands at 7.7 points. Made small-college All-American in Louisiana Tech after scoring 5030 points in 3½ seasons in high school play in Minden, Louisiana. Primarily a left-handed shooter. Jack makes his home in Royal Oak, Michigan, and has become a very successful insurance salesman in the off season. Married, one daughter and expecting a second child in the near future.

BILL BUNTIN

Stands 6'7", weighs 230, age 22. A product of Detroit Northern High. Buntin made All-Big Ten in each of his three seasons at Michigan, one of the few times in history this feat has been accomplished. He also made Fourth District-NCAA as a junior and senior in leading Michigan to two Big Ten titles and to the NCAA semifinals in 1964 and this past year's NCAA finals. In his 3 seasons at Michigan he averaged 21.8 points and 13.1 rebounds. An excellent shooter, he averaged better than 45 percent from the floor in his final two seasons. A power on defense and a tiger under the backboards. Figures to help the Pistons both as a center and cornerman.

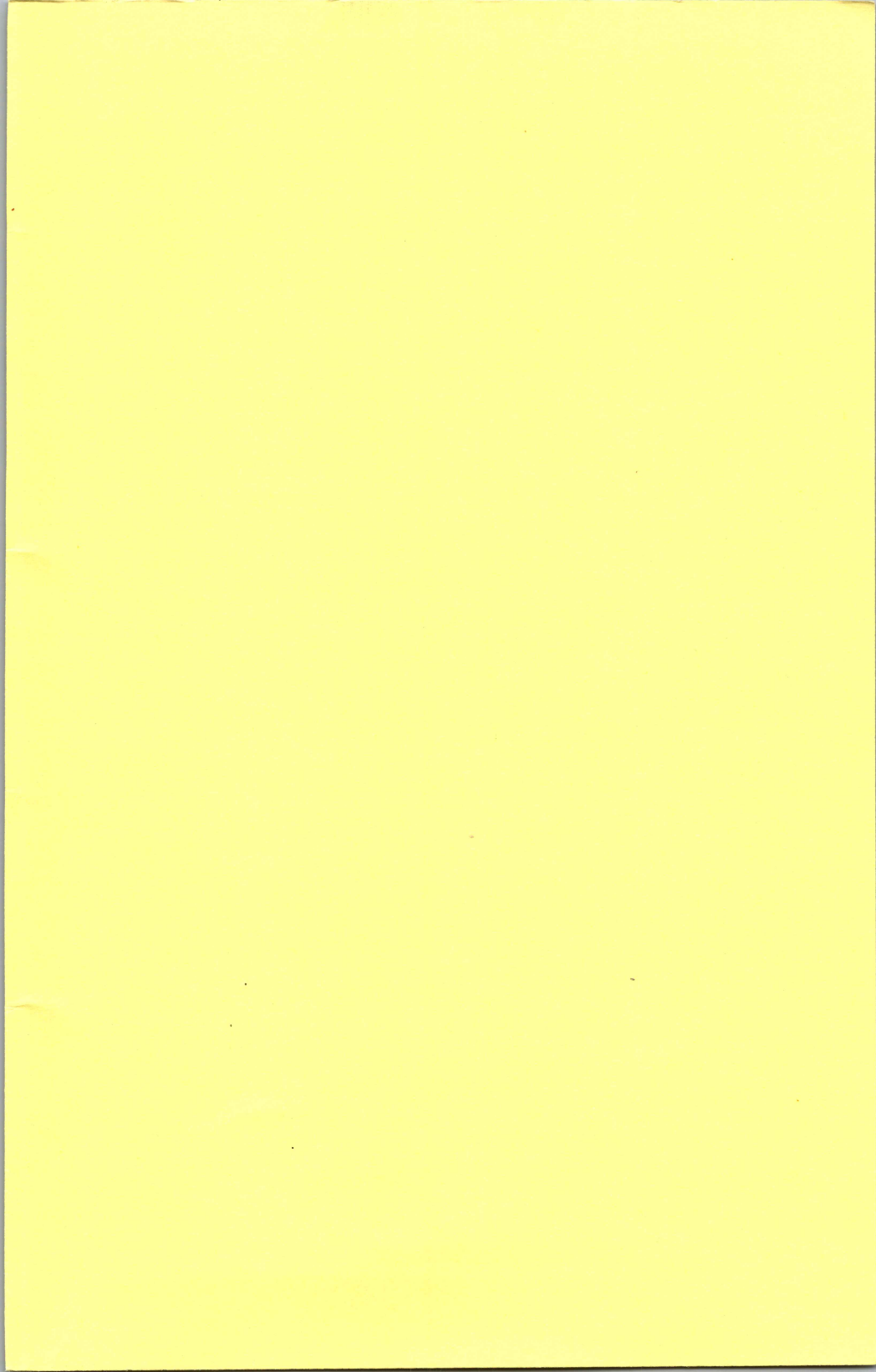
