**MIKE STOREN**  
**Vice President**  
**And General Manager**



When someone says that Mike Storen is a hard worker, it is like saying Mel Daniels plays pretty good basketball. The driving force behind the Pacers, Mike has made the Indiana franchise possibly the best in all of pro basketball. Last season, the Pacers, in a town of only 600,000, drew over 300,000 people for the year. This made the Pacers the best drawing team, per capita, in professional basketball.

Mike knows fans don't like to see a loser; so, to build a winner, two years ago he traded a future draft choice, two little known ball players and cash for Mel Daniels, who was last year's Most Valuable Player. Then when the team started slowly last year, he went after a new coach and came up with Bob Leonard, who was last year's ABA Coach of the Year. To go with these two top ingredients, Mike has helped create an enthusiasm which has made the Pacers the hottest thing to hit the state of Indiana since the hula hoop.

Mike served his apprenticeship for being a General Manager by acting as Promotion Director for the Baltimore Bullets, and Promotions and Business Manager for the Cincinnati Royals, both of the NBA. Apparently, Mike learned his lessons well, because today he is one of the most dynamic and efficient general managers in professional basketball.

Besides trying to keep Indiana on top, Mike has also been most instrumental in the growth of the league and along with the club attorney, Dick Tinkham, is one of the strongest influences in the new league.

A native of Michigan City, Indiana, Mike is an ex-Marine Captain and a Notre Dame graduate. He and his lovely wife, Hannah, have three children, Hannah Lynn age 7, Mark age 6, and Stephen age 1.

## **BOB LEONARD**

**Coach**



Last season Bobby Leonard took over as Coach when the Pacers were 2-7 and in the Eastern Division cellar. However, at the season's end the Pacers were the Eastern Division Champions and Bob Leonard was named the ABA's Coach of the Year. This is just one more example of Leonard's determination to win and to excel.

Ever since Bob was a high school star in Terre Haute, Indiana he has always been a winner. In his three year career at Indiana University, the Hoosiers were Big 10 Champions twice, and National Champions once, in 1953. His sophomore season, "Slick," was named Indiana's Most Valuable Player. His junior year, he was named to several All-American units, while teaming with Don Schlundt to lead the Hoosiers to the NCAA Championship. His final season, the Hoosiers repeated as Big 10 Champs and Bobby was again selected as an All-American while serving as Indiana's Captain.

During his professional playing career, Bob was with the Minneapolis (now Los Angeles) Lakers and the Chicago Zephyrs (now Baltimore Bullets). In his 7 year career, Bob averaged 11 points per game, while also averaging about 200 assists a year when teams were only playing 60-65 games a season.

Bob did a great job with the club last season. He possess that rare combination of strict discipline and personal understanding which has gained for him the respect of all the Pacers. Perhaps Pacer captain Freddie Lewis put it best when he said, "It is great to play under Slick. He has a complete knowledge of what professional basketball is all about; but more important, being an ex-player himself, he knows what each of us is going through out on the court."

In addition to performing all of those functions which led to Bob being named the ABA's Coach of the Year, Leonard is a Manufacturer's Representative for the Herff-Jones Company.

Bob, his wife Nancy, and their four children currently live in Kokomo, but are anxiously awaiting the completion of their new home in Carmel, Indiana.

## **BERNIE LAREAU**

**Business Manager and Trainer**



When the Indiana Pacers vote for their team's most valuable member, Bernie Lareau is always near the top of the list. If there is a question about anything, Bernie is usually the man with the answer.

Besides taking care of all travel arrangements, payment of bills, cleaning and inventory of all equipment and season ticket information, as Business Manager, Bernie also travels with the team as the team's trainer. Bernie is a full time doctor, taking care of all the players' injuries, and a part-time psychiatrist.

Before joining the Pacers two seasons ago, Bernie had spent three seasons as an assistant trainer with the Chicago Bears, and had also served as head trainer at St. Joseph's College in Rensselaer, Indiana for seven years. Bernie is highly regarded for his knowledge as a trainer, and is often asked to speak at training clinics.

Raised in Kankakee, Illinois, Bernie is a bachelor and lists watching the Chicago Bears and fishing and golf as his favorite hobbies.

Indiana's recognition as the best drawing team per capita in the country is due in no small part to Chuck's efforts.

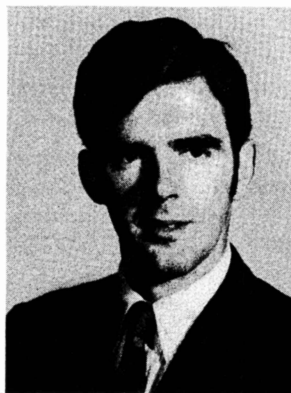
**TOM FESKE**

John and his wife and their three children, Johnny, 9, Schylar, 7, and Elayna, 4 months, make their home in Indianapolis.

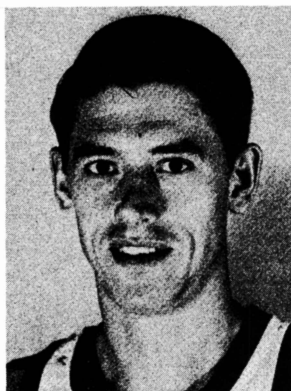

A hustler every minute, Art was a member of the A.B.A. All-Star Team two years ago and last season was the Maverick's leading player. In that 1968 All-Star game, Art pulled in 5 rebounds and also added 11 points.

Between college and the A.B.A., Art played two seasons with the Akron Goodyears of the A.A.U. He also served one year, 1967, as freshman coach at Arizona State while he was working on his master's degree.

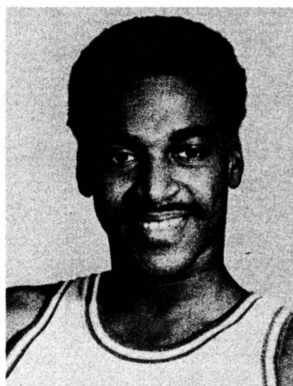
**ROGER BROWN**      **No. 35**

Roger Brown is often labeled "the Man with a 1,000 moves." A ballplayer in the same category as Elgin Baylor and Oscar Robertson, Roger is always a great crowd pleaser.

When "Rog" makes his move to the basket it is like a large cat on the prowl . . . smooth, quick and graceful. Not a giant at only 6'5", Roger is still able to hold his own underneath the basket; however, he is most effective in the 15 foot range.

In Indiana, Roger is also known as "Mr. Clutch." When the Pacers need an important basket, Roger Brown is the man who gets the ball. Last season in 17 playoff games Roger averaged 26.6 points per game, and hit on nearly 52 per cent of his shots from the floor. In addition, Roger also handed out 60 assists.

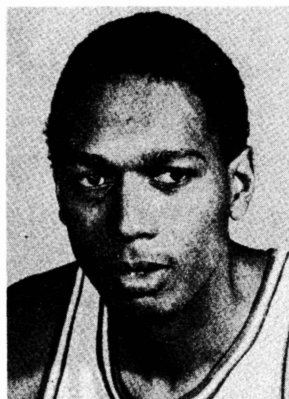
Roger Brown holds several Pacer records, such as most assists in a single game, 14; and most free throws made in a single game, 17. Another Pacer record held by Roger is also an ABA League record. Over a three game span Roger connected on an incredible 21 consecutive field goal attempts.

A native of Brooklyn, New York, Roger still holds the New York City high school career scoring mark.

Roger attended Dayton University and now makes his home in Indianapolis.

Mel Daniels came to the Pacers last season from the Miami Floridians in one of the most significant trades in ABA history.

After a good rookie year, in which he was named "Rookie of the Year," and to the All-Pro team, Mel Daniels came back in 1968-69 to have even a better year. This past season, Mel Daniels finished first in the league in rebounding, collecting 1266 rebounds, 50 more than the 1213 he gathered in '67-'68. Mel also put in 1824 points for a 24.0 average.

In view of his great year, Mel was named the ABA's Most Valuable Player, and had the added honor of being the only unanimous choice to the All-Pro squad.

Two years ago Mel was the number one pick of the Cincinnati Royals of the NBA. Today, he is playing his professional basketball in the ABA, and is one of the brightest young stars in all of professional basketball.

In addition to all his individual achievements, Mel was a great factor in the Pacers' rise to the top of the Eastern Division. In one year last season, Mel Daniels accomplished more than many players do in their entire career.

Mel is 24 and hails from Detroit, Michigan where he attended Pershing High School, the same school attended by Spencer Haywood of the Denver Rockets. Mel and his wife, Cece, make their off season home in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

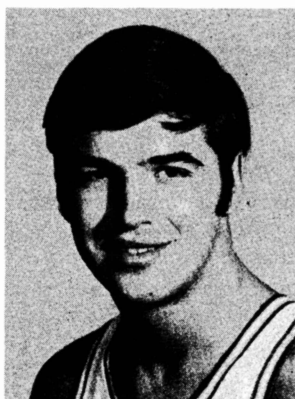
**DICK GRUBAR**      **No. 15**

In three years at the University of North Carolina, Dick Grubar quarterbacked the Tar Heels to the NCAA Eastern Division finals three times and to the NCAA Finals twice.

If Dick ever took more than 15 shots in a game, it was purely by accident. Not a scorer, Dick's job was to control the Tar Heel offense and to guard the opponent's best guard.

Playing for North Carolina, Dick played against such ABA stars as Louie Dampier (U. Kentucky) Kentucky; Bob Verga (Duke) Carolina; Ron Perry (VPI) Carolina; and Mike Lewis (Duke) Pittsburgh.

Dick is being counted on by the Pacers to provide them with the big defensive guard needed to stop such ABA stars as Don Freeman, Miami, Larry Jones, Denver, and Jimmy Jones of New Orleans.

Dick measures in at 6'4" and 190 pounds. During the last part of August, Grubar underwent knee surgery to remove small bits of cartilage from his left knee. Dick is expected to be ready for competition about Thanksgiving.

The Pacers drafted Dick in their first round of five and won the war with the Los Angeles Lakers for his services. Dick was born and raised in Schnectady, New York, but, the young bachelor plans to make his off season home in Indianapolis.

Bill Keller was born and raised in Indianapolis, Indiana. He has always been a winner throughout his basketball career and sees no reason to stop now.

In his senior year in high school, Bill led his team to the state championship. He was also selected as the state's No. 1 player and named "Mr. Basketball" for a two game all-star series with the Kentucky youths.

He then went on to Purdue where he was named their Most Valuable Player for the 1967-68 season. In '68-'69, his senior year, Bill was the captain of the Boilermakers and quarterbacked them to the NCAA finals in Louisville where Purdue lost to UCLA, and Lew Alcindor, in the Championship game.

After his great senior season Bill was named the Most Valuable Player, under six feet tall, in the country by the Naismith Foundation. He was also selected by the State Department to make a tour of Europe this past summer with an United States All-Star team.

Bill is unbelievably quick and often forces his opponent into making errors. He is also a great ballhandler, and is brilliant at leading the fast break. In addition, Bill is a deadly outside shooter, which is a quality the Pacers will welcome to their club.

Bill is single, and still resides in Indianapolis on the city's west side.

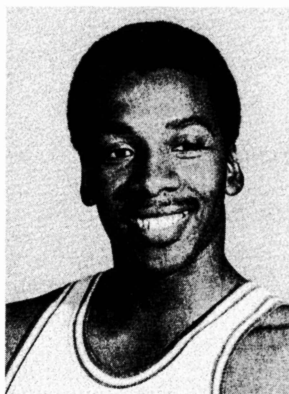
**FREDDIE LEWIS**      **No. 14**

For two seasons Freddie Lewis has been the captain of the Indiana Pacers. In those two years, Freddie has played in the All-Star game, led the Pacers in scoring in 1967-68, and was the third leading Pacer point producer last season.

Freddie came to the Pacers from the Cincinnati Royals of the NBA, where his main complaint was the Royals concentration on their two stars, Oscar Robertson and Jerry Lucas. Lucas and Robertson not only had the concentration of attention from the Royals, but also from the Cincinnati press and fans. "Indiana is a great place to play professional basketball because the fans know what you are doing and they can appreciate a player when he is performing well."

Freddie has been a great floor leader for the Pacers' and last season led them in assists with 346. He also hit on .822% of his free throws to rank eighth in the league standings. Freddie's job is to get the club running and also to relieve some of the pressure under the basket by hitting from the outside.

With Freddie Lewis running the Pacer offense and helping to open up the middle for Roger Brown and Mel Daniels, Indiana looks toward another championship year.

Freddie and his lovely wife, Inez, have two children, Benji, 5, and Sherri Lynn, 4. Freddie was raised in McKeesport, Pa., and attended Arizona State Univ. He and his family now make their home in Indianapolis.

Before joining the L.A. Stars, Jay had brief stays with both the St. Louis Hawks, and Milwaukee Bucks of the NBA.

A native of Goshen, Indiana, Jay, still a bachelor, now resides in Indianapolis. Jay is currently one of the major stockholders in All-Pro Guest Ranch U.S.A. 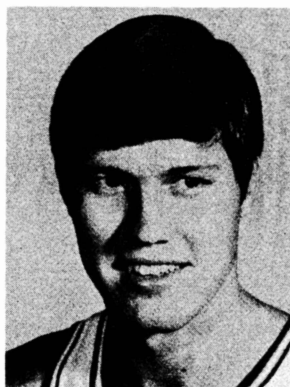

Two years ago Bob Netolicky was a top draft choice of both the Pacers and the San Diego Rockets of the NBA. Bob made his decision to play in the ABA and is now one of the great young players in the newer league.

At 6'9" and 224 pounds, "Neto" plays the strong forward position for the Pacers. Teaming with Mel Daniels, Bob gives the Pacers one of the best 1-2 scoring and rebounding punches in professional basketball. And, when you add Roger Brown to the front line it gives Indiana one of the best young front lines today.

Last season Bob's strong play was one of the biggest reasons the Pacers made it into the finals and almost won the ABA Championship.

Netolicky's combination of strength and agility make him one of the toughest men in the league to guard.

Bob, 24 and single, was raised in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, but now resides in Indianapolis.
