COACH JOE LAPCHICK

Lanky Joe Lapchick, one of the great names in basketball, is in his ninth season as coach of the New York Knickerbockers and the 20th campaign in his overall coaching career in professional and college competition.

Lapchick's greatest successes in the N.B.A. came in the 1951, 1952 and 1953 post-season playoffs when his charges went to the final round. In 1951, the Knicks were thwarted by Rochester, 4 to 3; in 1952 Minneapolis topped them by the same margin and in 1953 the same Lakers came out on top, this time by a 4-1 count.

The Knicks, under Lapchick, have always wound up in the top bracket of the Eastern Division. In 1947-50 they finished second; 1950-52, third; first in 1953-54 and last year runner-up. The Knicks' first coach was Neil Cohalan who took over when the team was formed in 1946. At that time Lapchick was serving as head coach at St. John's University in Brooklyn.

During Lapchick's eight years the Knickerbockers won 300 and lost 222 in regular season competition. In eight playoffs, the team has won 30 and lost 30. In addition, Lapchick has had the honor of coaching the East team in the NBA's annual East-West classic for three years. He won at Boston in 1951, 111-94; lost in Fort Wayne in 1953, 79-75, and won in the Garden two years ago, 98-93.

Lapchick came to the Knicks in 1947 after 11 years at St. John's where his Brooklyn Redmen gained national recognition. Under his reign, St. John's won four New York City titles and qualified for seven National Invitation Tournaments, winning that coveted championship in 1943 and 1944. Lapchick is the only coach to have captured the Invitation in successive years and his seven participations are another record. His St. John's team notched 181 victories, lost 53 for a .773 percentage. In the N.I.T., he won nine and lost six.

Fifty-five years of age, Lapchick was born, raised and still resides in Yonkers, N.Y. He has three children, Joe, Jr., a West Point graduate who is in the Air Force; Barbara Ann, a graduate of Barnard College and Richard, aged 10.

Lapchick broke in as a pro with the Hollywood Inn quintet of Yonkers. Subsequently he played with Holyoke, Schenectady and the Brooklyn Visitations. In 1922 he signed with the Original Celtics and performed at center with that immortal team until 1927 when the old American League disbanded. He then joined the Cleveland Rosenblooms and helped them capture two titles before moving to Toledo for a campaign as a player-manager. In 1930, he reorganized the Celtics and they toured until 1936 when he took over the coaching post at St. John's, ending an 11 year association with the Celtics. Among his greatest St. John's products were Fuzzy Levane, former coach of the Milwaukee Hawks, Dutch Garfinkle, Dick McGuire who is one of his current stars, Harry Boykoff, Jerry Bush, coach at Nebraska University and Jim White. His hobby is gardening and his most popular relaxation is golf.

Third year with Knicks; fourth year in NBA. Came to Knicks in 1953 from Baltimore in trade for Max Zaslofsky. Had outstanding rookie year with Baltimore scoring 661 points in 64 games for 10.3 average. Last year he played in 72 games, scoring 1003 points, per game average of 13.9, fourth best on the team in both departments.

Played four years at Eastern Kentucky, scoring 443 points in senior year for 19.2 average. One-hand jump shot specialist. Went to Army straight from high school.

Seventh season with Knicks, three prior to Army induction in 1950 and fourth since return for the 1952-53 campaign. Has led team scoring every year he has worn Knick uniform. Last year he tallied 1074 points 12th best in the league for a 15.1 per game average. Runner-up to team-mate Dick McGuire in assists with 274.

Signed with New York in 1947 and took team scoring title in freshman year with 671 points in 47 games. His 47 points against Providence that season was then a league record. His best per game average was in 1949-50 with 15.4, seventh best in the NBA. He once held the all-time Colgate scoring mark as a freshman with 296 points in 16 games during the 1945-46 campaign. Held Long Island scholastic record of 396 points in 17 games while at Garden City High.

Quit organized baseball in 1948 following a year's pitching stint with Binghamton of the New York Yankee chain.

Played service basketball at Fort Bragg, N.C., averaging 31.0 points for 24 games in 1950-51 and 32.0 in 34 games in 1951-52.

Named to 1952-53, 1953-54, 1954-55 NBA Eastern All-Star teams.

Sixth season with New York after two years with Harlem Globetrotters. Spends summer months touring with Trotters. Fast for size, tremendous rebounder and ball handler. Last season, third to Harry Gallatin and Ray Felix in rebounds with 612. Fifth in total points, 944, and his per game average of 13.1 was his best in Knick uniform. New York's top rebounder in 1951-52 with 731, seventh in NBA. Led team scoring in playoffs last season with 59 in three games.

Former first baseman in Cleveland Indians' farm system. Hit .304 for Wilkes Barre in 1950. Native of Chicago, now resides on Long Island. Married, has two children.

Boasts largest hands in basketball. "Sweetwater" tag stems from fondness for soft drinks.

WALTER DUKES

Age--25, born June 6, 1930 in Youngstown, Ohio.
Height---7'0". Weight---220.
Home--Rochester, N.Y. College--Seton Hall.

Playing his first season with the Knickerbockers, Walter was New York's first draft choice in 1953 but elected to sign with the Harlem Globetrotters for whom he played two seasons.

At Seton Hall, where he won All-American fame, Dukes broke all scoring records, hitting his peak in the 1952-53 campaign with 861 points for an average of 26 a game. This output ran his varsity total to 1,789. Behind this spree, Seton Hall won 27 straight games, as Walter scored 30 or more points on 10 different occasions. He led Seton Hall to the National Invitation Tournament title and was voted the most valuable player award.

The 7-foot Dukes studied international law in Paris this past summer. Coach Joe Lapchick says that Dukes can outleap any big man in the league in clearing the boards and he can outspeed any big man downcourt on the fast break.

One of the Knicks' brightest rookies, Dick created a fine impression in camp two years ago, then departed for the armed forces. He was named to the 1953 Helms Foundation All-America and to the 1953 NAIB tournament team after scoring 98 points in five games, including a single game NAIB record of 32 against Arkansas Tech. His college total was 1,119 points in 85 successive starts. Has an excellent one-hand shot from the outside and is a clever, hustling playmaker. In 1951 he was a member of the U. S. team which won the Pan American Olympics in Buenos Aires.

RAY FELIX

Third year in pro ball. Came to the Knicks in 1954 in a four player deal sending New York's Connie Simmons and Al McGuire to Baltimore for Felix and rookie Chuck Grigsby. In his first season with the Knicks, Felix scored 1038 points with a 14.4 per game average, 15th best in the league. His 43.8% field goal percentage was fourth best in the NBA while he finished fifth in the loop in rebounds with 818.

Unanimously voted "Rookie of the Year" in the 1953-54 campaign, he led Baltimore in every department but assists and personal fouls. With the Bullets he scored 1,269 points for an average of 17.6, fifth in the league as was his field goal percentage of 41.7.

Eighth season with New York. One of pro league's greatest rebounders. Led the NBA in that department two years ago with 1098 and finished second last year with 995. Second in Knick scoring for sixth straight year and twelfth in the league with 1053 points for a 14.6 average. Named to NBA all-star second team.

Has not missed a game since joining the Knicks with a skein of 522, including 56 playoff tests. Received his Masters degree in Physical Education two summers ago from the University of Iowa.

Boasted second best field goal percentage in NBA in 1951-52, 44.2. Fifth in 1950-51, 41.6. Led the team in rebounds in 1951 and 1952 playoffs, lost honor to Clifton in 1953. Has never averaged less than double figures in scoring in seven consecutive playoffs.

Joined Knicks in 1948. Led Northeast Missouri State scoring in 1947-48 with 465 points, 15.0 average. All-MIAA Conference selection two years.

Pitched two years for Chicago Cubs' Decatur (Ill.) farm club.

This famous playmaker and ball handler is in his seventh season with New York. Led NBA in assists in 1949-50. Second in assist column last year with 542. Scored 647 points for a 9.1 per game average, his best as a Knick. The tireless six footer is an amazing rebounder and leader of the Knicks' fast break.

Voted No. 1 player in St. John's history. Captain and leading scorer from 1947 to 1949. Four times all-New York City first team selection, twice winner of Haggerty Award as best Metropolitan player. Only unanimous choice on 1948-49 All-Met team. All-American second team choice for three years running. Star at Dartmouth and Great Lakes as naval trainee during World War II. Coach Lapchick protege for two seasons at St. John's. Took up basketball when Junior in high school. Single.

The Knickerbockers' first draft choice, Sears resembles Easy Ed Macauley in physique. His total last season at Santa Clara was 535 points in 24 games for a 22.3 average behind a 50.1 shooting average from the floor. He was seventh in the nation in foul shooting with an average of 83.8 and his rebound average was 17.5.

West coach scribes named Sears the outstanding player in Northern California the last two years, giving him the nod over San Francisco's Bill Russell, 6-10 All-America center.

Nicknamed the "Big Cat", Sears boasts an excellent outside shot and is extremely fast on the downcourt break. Among his honors was his being named to the NCAA Western Regional tournament first team three successive years.

First draft choice of Philadelphia in 1954, Shue was purchased from the Warriors early in the '54 campaign. He scored 259 points in 62 games, earning a starting role on several occasions late in the season.

A crafty backcourt performer with a fine set shot, Shue won All-America honors at Maryland in the 1953-54 campaign. Holder of 14 Maryland records, Shue tallied 1,397 points in his career, winding up with a 21.8 senior average. He is an excellent defensive player.
