Any coach who is asked to predict how his team will fare in the NBA is bound to become a pessimist. When you talk about beating the best basketball teams in the world, you've got to be a pessimist. It's that hard.

East year when I'm asked what I think the League teams will do, I have the same thought. It's going to be tough, tougher than ever. There still isn't any team in the NBA who can't beat any other team on a given night. And to take the championship, you've got to beat them all consistently.

In my opinion, any team in the League is capable of finishing on top. Especially in the Eastern Division I expect it to be close.

The Philadelphia Warriors, defending champions, are the team to beat, but they will miss Tom Gola. His loss will really hurt, since he was a set-up man as well as a scorer and rebounder.

Boston has to be a top contender. Last season the Celtics broke all kinds of scoring records, and with their one-two punch of Cousy and Sharman, they'll be burning up those hoops again.

Last year the New York Knicks tied the Nats for third place in the East, despite problems with players and a change of coach. Vince Boryla demands 100% effort from each of his men, and a team that's trying every minute will give any opponent headaches.

I'll leave the Nats for last, but I do NOT expect them to finish in that position.

Fort Wayne figures to take the title again in the West. They have dominated play there for the past two seasons, and Charley Eckmann can count on many of the same men once again.

Unfortunately for my friend Red Holzman, the St. Louis Hawks lost Stephens and Ferrari to the armed services after last season, and I think that is going to cost them the Western title. With those two fine rookies back, St. Louis could have been the class of their division.

Rochester also has a big question mark in the person of last year's "rookie of the year", Maurice Stokes. He is suffering currently with thrombosis of the leg and has been undergoing treatment for several weeks. The outcome of this condition will tell the story on the Royals' chances in 1956-57.

I don't think Minneapolis has the necessary depth and balance, but Johnny Kundla may have some surprises. I know that the Lakers have always given us plenty of trouble, and I don't think this season will be any exception.

As for the Nats, I can only say that our rookies can mean an awful lot as to the way we finish. Syracuse will have more new faces this year than for several seasons.

When we opened training, we had only one experienced backcourt man, Paul Seymour. That leaves a big job for the freshmen to handle. They all have excellent college backgrounds, and they look good in practice. But Syracuse's standing will depend on how much help they can give the veterans.

Our two men of longest standing, Co-Captains Seymour and Dolph Schayes, look better than they did last year at this time. Paul had some bad luck last season with injuries, but he's in good condition now and hopes to throw off the jinx that dogged him in 1955-56.

Dolph has consistently been the top team scorer and rebounder since he came with the Nats in 1948-49, and has always been among the League's best. He has a lot of pro savvy, and I expect he'll have another great year.

From last year's squad we also have Red Rocha, Earl Lloyd, Jim

Tucker, John Kerr, and Ed Conlin. I haven't seen Red in action much as yet since he has been bothered with leg injuries from the first days of training, but if he's like the Rocha of past seasons, he's a tough man for the rookies to beat out of a job.

Both Lloyd and Tucker are working hard and will give us help in the big man department. Our biggest big man, Kerr, reported this year with his weight back up to normal, and in good condition. Last season he was below par physically, and his play was not up to the usual standard. I'm looking for him to return to and improve upon his rookie form of 1954-55.

Ed Conlin showed the makings of a fine ballplayer last season, and I think he looks even better this year. He'll play a full schedule and we're counting on him heavily for "middle man" duty.

Currently we are carrying four rookies plus one returnee, Don Savage. Savage was with the club between his graduation from LeMoyné College and his entering the Marine Corps. At that time he weighed 225. Now he's down to 195 and moves much better.

Our four rookies are Forest Able and Jim Ray, backcourtman, and Bob Hopkins and Joe Holup, both big men. Holup, who stands 6'6", was our No. 1 draft choice and should help us. He's big, rough, and strong around the boards.

Hopkins has proved a pleasant surprise. He's 6'8" tall, a good runner and shooter, and also an effective boardman. Right now he's in need of polish, but the potential is there, and I think he's a good prospect.

Ray has a good head for the game as well as the usual playing talents, and in my opinion he can develop into a valuable man. Able is also a capable ball handler and shooter. His greatest weakness right now is defense, but that's a common fault among college players.

All in all, I think our rookies will stand up favorably against any in the League. How they fare in actual competition will tell a lot about Syracuse's final NBA standing.

So I have to stick to my first idea. The League will be tougher than ever. I hope that we will be too.

Ed Conlin came to the Nats last season as their number one draft choice and a highly rated rookie. He remained to prove himself one of the most versatile performers on Coach Cervi's squad.

As a rookie he showed fine playmaking ability, expert rebounding, good shooting, and unusual ball handling to justify the innumerable awards he received as a Fordham collegian.

In addition to many all-American honors, he was named to the College East All-Star squad, playing with the All-Stars on the Globetrotter tour, and for two successive years captured the most highly sought award in the metropolitan area, the Haggerty Award, the second man to attain this honor twice.

In his professional debut, Ed played in 66 games with the Nats, his schedule limited because of his attendance at Syracuse University Law College. He scored 543 points for an 8.2 average, making 36.8% of his shots.

He ranked fifth on the squad in rebounds and sixth in assists, despite his curtailed appearances.

A native of Brooklyn, Conlin stands 6-6 and weighs 200. He holds a reserve commission in the Army Transportation Corps and is scheduled to report for active duty in approximately a year.

Coach Al Cervi's most pleasant surprise of the young 1956-57 season has been the performance of rookie Al Bianchi in the Syracuse Nationals backcourt.

Recently acquired from the Minneapolis Lakers, Bianchi is playing his first season of professional basketball, after an outstanding career as a collegian and with service teams. A graduate of Bowling Green, Al holds a total of 20 records for his Alma Mater, including several established earlier by Charlie Share, now big man of the Fort Wayne Pistons.

As a senior, Bianchi finished eighth in the nation among major college scorers with 600 points for a 25-point per game average. He received All-American mention on INS, UP, and Colliers Magazine teams; All-Ohio on INS and AF teams; was selected as Ohio's top collegiate player; and was named to the East-West All-Star game at Madison Square Garden.

After graduation in 1954, Al served two years with the Army Medical Corps and played guard with the Brooke Army Medical Center team in Texas.

Second draft choice of the Lakers in 1954, Al was obtained by the Nats the week before league play opened, and figured strongly in the Cervimen's first two wins of the season.

A jump shot artist, Bianchi also can hook with either hand, has fine spring, and can "dunk" the ball on a driving layup.

Standing 6-3 and weighing 135, Al is one of the biggest backcourtmen to perform with the Nationals in several years. Teamed with Ed Conlin, Paul Seymour or Jim Ray, he can give the Syracuseans the speed and ball handling skill necessary for Cervi-type basketball.

To gain needed experience and balance in the backcourt, the Syracuse Nationals have added to their roster one of the finest competitors in basketball, Bob Harrison, formerly of the St. Louis Hawks.

A high school teammate and long time friend of Nats Coach Paul Seymour, Harrison has played seven seasons of professional ball; four with the Minneapolis Lakers and three with the Hawks.

One of the most accurate shooters in the NBA, Harrison scores best from outside on a one-hand set. He had his best offensive season in 1954-55 when he totaled 724 points for a 10.1 per game average. Last year he averaged 8.6 per game.

Bob is also a fine defensive player and playmaker, and has been characterized by some in the NBA as the most aggressive backcourt man in the league.

As a member of the Lakers squad, Harrison brought grief to the Nats a few seasons back by sinking a 40-foot shot as the gun sounded to give Minneapolis a victory which ultimately meant the World Championship for them.

A former all-American at the University of Michigan, Harrison will team with Seymour at the guard posts for the Nats.

HOLUP, JOSEPH 21 6'8" 205 Arlington, Va. George Wash. U.

Big Joe Holup was Syracuse's No. 1 draft choice at the N. B. A. meeting last spring, and on the basis of his college record and pre-season appearances should give the Nats' veterans strong competition for a starting berth.

One of the greatest all-around players in the history of college basketball, Joe graduated from George Washington University in Washington, D. C.

He was No. 1 rebounder in the nation, averaging 25.6 grabs per game, and also ranked first in field goal percentage with a record mark of 65%. His lifetime career average is 58%, approximately two baskets for every three shots he has taken. In addition, he rated among the top ten in scoring, with an average 26 points per game.

Last spring he made the tour with the College All-Stars playing against the Harlem Globetrotters.

Joe is a husky 6'6", 22 years of age, and weighs 215 lbs. A native of Swoyersville, Pa., he now makes his home in Arlington, Va. He is married and the father of a seven-months old son, David. In April 1957, Joe is scheduled to report for duty with the Air Force, in which he holds an R. O. T. C. commission.

One of the sleepers among the Syracuse Nationals college draft choices last spring was Big Bob Hopkins, a lanky Southern boy who may be one of the N.B.A.'s top rookies.

Bob is a native of Grambling, La., and graduated from a small school in his hometown, Grambling College. He was top man on his college basketball team, but did not receive outstanding national recognition because of the size of his Alma Mater and the comparatively unknown schedule they played.

A tall 6'8", Bob uses his height effectively under the boards and in addition is a good runner and shooter. He is unusually fast for a big man and moves well.

According to Coach Al Cervi, Hopkins needs polish to face the rugged N.B.A. competition, but he is improving steadily and has a willingness and ability to learn that will serve him well.

Jim had good news from his draft board recently when he received a deferment for being over the height limit.

The "big man" of the Syracuse Nationals is redhead Johnny Kerr, who starts his third year with the Nats.

No. 1 draft choice for Syracuse in 1954-55, Big John had a fine record as a rookie averaging 10.5 points per game on a 41.8% shooting percentage. Last year he increased his scoring to 13.3 per game, with a 40.3 shooting percentage.

The "most valuable player" in the Big Ten as a college senior, Johnny broke all standing Illinois scoring records. He competed in the All-Star game as a senior and made the tour with the College All-Stars.

Kerr, who stands 6-9, had troubles with his weight last year. As a freshman he reported in at 240, and finished the season at 210. Last year he started light, and the weight drop cost him in durability as the season progressed, but nonetheless his play warranted him a position on the East All-Star squad as a sophomore pro.

Coach Al Cervi is counting heavily on Kerr to regain his stamina and take over more of the rough duty in the pivot. John has an easy hook shot and has learned much about positioning himself for rebounds. With continued improvement, he could be one of the League's best.

A native Chicagoan, Johnny and his wife Betty make their home there in the off season.

The 1956-57 season will mark Earl Lloyd's fifth with the Nats, and "The Cat" is being counted on heavily for the backboard strength the Syracuse squad needs.

Standing 6-6, Earl has extraordinary spring in his legs and has averaged about 500 rebounds per year for the past three seasons. Last year he ranked third on the squad behind Dolph Schayes and John Kerr.

In the scoring department, Earl's 8.5 scoring average was somewhat lower than usual, and Coach Al Cervi will stress increased use of the corner shot which is Lloyd's specialty.

Earl came to the Nats from the Washington Capitols via the U.S. Army after playing his college ball at West Virginia State. A resident of Washington, D.C., he was married in September.

One of the most popular Syracuse players, Lloyd was honored on "Earl Lloyd Night" during his second season with the Nats. Married this past September, Earl and his wife are both school teachers by profession

Whenever professional basketball is discussed, Syracuse and Schayes are synonymous. Co-Capt. Dolph Schayes leads the Nats, and also the League, in several departments.

Playing his ninth year under Coach Al Cervi, Dolph was "rookie of the year" in his freshman season, and has been on the All-Star squads since the classic's inception. In 1949-50, 1950-51 and 1955-56, he was named to the all-League second team; other years he has been a first team choice.

A tall 6-8, weighing 220, Dolph has the twin threats of speed and size. He is a versatile and prolific scorer, averaging 20.4 points per game last season on a 38.7 shooting percentage. In addition to an easy two-handed outside shot, he can throw with either hand and drive with equal ease. His 1472 points last year is an all-time high for the Nats.

Statistically, he ranked No. 5 in League scoring last year, No. 2 in free throw percentages, and No. 4 in rebounds.

A native New Yorker and a graduate of NYU with an engineering degree, Dolph came to the Nats in 1948 with all the Metropolitan area's top collegiate honors. He was an All-American as a collegian, playing under famed Coach Howard Cann.

Since joining the Nats, Dolph has made his home in Syracuse. He and his wife Naomi have two daughters.

The "basketball player's player" has been converted into a "basketball playing coach." The Syracuse Nationals' Paul Seymour made the big switch in his 11th year of professional basketball, and now leads the Nats in the dual capacity of player and coach.

Long the "Iron Man" of the squad, now the youngest coach in the N. B. A., noted for his extensive play throughout the schedule, Seymour can make good use of the invaluable savvy and experience he gained through active competition.

Basketball has been a long time career with Seymour, although he is now only 28 years of age. He started in his high school days at Toledo, Ohio, continued for one season with Toledo University, and then turned pro. After service with the Toledo Jeeps, New Orleans, and Baltimore, he came to Syracuse for the 1947-48 season. Like the man who came to dinner, he never left.

In the first few years of league competition, Paul was never noted as a high scorer, but came into his own as an offensive ace in 1952-53. That year he scored 952 points for a 14.2 per game average; 931 for 13.1 in 1953-54; 1050 for 14.6 in 1954-55; and 642 for 11.2 last season, when he saw limited action because of injuries.

He was named to the Eastern Division All-Star squad in 1952-53, 1953-54,

and 1954-55, and was also a second team selection on the All-League squad in 1953-54 and 1954-55.

For several years the Syracuse team captain under Coach Al Cervi, Seymour has shared the title with Co-Captain Dolph Schayes for the past two seasons. He officially named Schayes to the post when he took over coaching duties.

A fine playmaker and defensive expert as well as backcourt general, Paul favors the fast break attack which requires expert ballhandling and quick thinking. Himself an apt student of this "Cervi-type" basketball, which has proved so effective for the Syracuse club in former years, he has announced that he plans no radical departure from that system.

Seymour is the second player-coach now active in the N. B. A. Only he and Bobby Wanzer of the Rochester Royals hold down both jobs.

A native of Toledo, Seymour and his wife, Doris, now live in Liverpool, a Syracuse suburb, where Paul operates a hardware store in the off-season. The Seymours have two children, Shaun and Paul, Jr.

TEAM HISTORY

The 1956-57 season marks the 11th consecutive year that Syracuse has been represented by a professional basketball team, and the history of that team speaks well for the future of the game in Central New York.

The Nats had their start in the summer of 1946 when Daniel Biasone and several associates organized the Syracuse Professional Basketball Club, Inc. and obtained a franchise in the now-defunct National Basketball League.

Home games were played in the Jefferson Street Armory, but the crowds who watched Coach Benny Borgmann, formerly of the Original Celtics, and his crew were scant, and the hopeful promoters took a bad first year loss.

The 1947-48 campaign saw a strengthening of NBL with Minneapolis and Mikan in the loop, but Syracuse had a bad year, winning only 24 games out of 60 for their poorest record in history. The decline in turnstile counts continued.

To darken an already dismal picture, Rochester, Minneapolis, Fort Wayne, and Indianapolis jumped the NBL in favor of the rival Basketball Association of America after the 1947-48 race.

Club owner Biasone was hard pressed to withdraw from professional basketball at that point, but with encouragement from Ike W. Duffy, then owner of the Anderson club, Danny decided to continue.

His first step was to bring Leo F. Ferris, then executive vice-president of Tri-Cities, to Syracuse to reorganize the Nats. The enterprising Ferris approached a score or more of leading Syracusans and sold 25 shares of stock at \$1,000.00 each.

An extensive publicity and promotional campaign was instituted, home games were transferred to the State Fair Coliseum, and Ferris went after the best talent playing available.

Al Cervi moved from Rochester's BAA club as player-coach and headed a team which included Dolph Schayes, Johnny Macknowski, Billy Gabor, and Ed Peterson. The dismal record of the previous season was erased and the Nats won 40 of 63 contests.

Cervi was named to the NBL's All-League team and was voted coach-of-the year. Schayes won rookie-of-the-year honors. But most significant, attendance at the Coliseum reached an all-time high.

Before the 1949-50 season opened, Ferris engineered the deal which brought the University of Kentucky champions into the League, playing under the Indianapolis banner. With this move the BAA directors decided it was time to join the enemy, and the result was the 17-team National Basketball Association.

That year the Nats hit their zenith as an attraction, with as many as 10,613 jamming the Coliseum to see their favorites win 51 of 64 games for the Eastern Division championship. The World championship eluded them during the playoff with Minneapolis.

The 1950-51 season saw the NBA shaken down to a more sensible structure of 10 teams, but the Nats did not fare so well, winning 32 while losing 34.

The Onondaga County War Memorial opened for the 1951-52 season and the Nats, finishing first in the NBA's Eastern Division, played before a record 221,580, only to lose in the playoffs.

In 1952-53, Syracuse finished in a second place tie with Boston, a dead-lock which the Nats won, only to lose the first round playoffs to the same Celtics.

Attendance fell during the campaign, but the Nats management determined to carry on, even in the face of a handsome purchase offer from the same Ike Duffy of Anderson, who hoped to move the Syracuse squad to Chicago.

The Nats finished second again in 1953-54 and swept the post-season round robin play in their Division, only to lose once again the final series with Minneapolis.

Playing the late stages and post-season competition with practically every member of the club in plaster casts or bandages, the spirited Nats drive won them the designation "The Bandaged Brigade."

Once again Syracusans nearly lost their franchise, this time to Detroit interests, but a rallying group of 150 enthusiasts raised \$200,000 in stock sales and purchased the Nationals. Danny Biasone was again active in the drive and was unanimously elected president of the newly-formed corporation.

Midway through the 1954-55 campaign, Ferris stepped down as general manager and Publicity Director Bob Sexton took over the additional duties of business manager.

A thrilling final bid was made by the Nats that season and they brought the first World Championship to Syracuse, defeating Fort Wayne in the final seconds of the seventh game of the championship series.

The World Champions made a valiant effort to retain their title in 1955-56. They finished the season tied with New York for third place, defeated the Knickerbockers in a deadlock-breaking single game, and eliminated the favored Boston Celtics in first round playoffs.

But Philadelphia was the team of destiny in 1955-56, and they took the Eastern Division crown and the World Championship as well.

At the close of league action, the Nats went abroad as good will messengers for the State Department. They traveled 30,000 miles, visiting Iceland, Germany, Iran, Lebanon, Italy, Spain, and Egypt, conducting clinics and playing exhibition games for the Europeans and Middle Easterners.
