ALEX HANNUM



Birth Date—July 19, 1923; Height 6 feet, 7 inches;

Alex Hannum, returning last season to coach where he had played two years in his early professional career, rallied his team strongly after a slow start to provide the Nats with a playoff berth for an unprecedented 15th successive season. He faced a situation of losing three front court veterans from the previous season, but developed Dave Gambee, Barney Cable and Swede Halbrook to fill the voids created by the losses of George Yardley, Bob Hopkins and Connie Dierking. Climax of the "Bald Eagle's" first local coaching season was a sweep over Philadelphia in the semi-final divisional playoffs, after he had directed Syracuse to an edge over the Warriors in regular season play. Although the Nats missed out on a .500 or better finish for the first time in five seasons, Hannum's club earned the advantage in seasonal competition against four of the seven rival teams. In five seasons of coaching in the NBA and NIBL ranks, Hannum has one of the most impressive winning records in the nation. But, as he looks ahead to his second year handling the Nats, he says that rugged problems are ahead in the fore court, with Cable lost in the draft to Chicago and Hopkins probably through due to the injury that put him on the shelf all last season. Hannum brings to his coaching assignment the same fighting, colorful spirit he maintained as a player. Despite the misbelief of many that defense has become a lost art, Alex maintains that basketball defense is as good as it ever was, and that it's the combination of time-limit shooting, fast break basketball and unstoppable jump shooting that has vaulted scoring to record levels.

AL BIANCHI



Birth Date—March 26, 1932; Height—6 feet, 3 inches; Weight—185 pounds; Home—Long Island, N.Y.; College—Bowling Green.

A series of injuries limited Al Bianchi to participation in only two-thirds of the Nats' schedule last season, coming after similar injuries a year earlier had broken off his string of playing 166 successive games. Heading into his sixth Syracuse season, the solid back court veteran ranks only behind Dolph Schayes and John Kerr of currently active Nats in the matter of games played, and he is sixth in the all-time Syracuse list, having appeared in 330 contests. Thruout his pro career, Bianchi has filled a reserve role but has been noted for his consistency through the years, and is termed by Alex Hannum as an extremely valuable defensive performer. He has been known for the excellence of his defensive hands and more often than not draws the assignment of defending against the biggest back court operators in the NBA. A flashy driver on attack, Bianchi had spent most of his college career performing as a forward before being switched to a guard as a pro. He joined the Nationals in a deal with Minneapolis during the training schedule in 1956 and prior to last year had missed only a dozen games during his first four seasons. Because of his defensive aggressiveness, he is often called on during periods of play when the Nats need to gain possession, or when his exceptional dribbling talents are needed.

LARRY COSTELLO

A succession of mid-season injuries gave Larry Costello more than his share of problems a year ago, but the tremendous speedster recovered in time to play a vital hand as the Nats went to the final round of the Eastern Division playoffs. He tallied more than 1,000 points for the third time in the past four seasons in playing a key role among the Nats' explosive back court attackers. Costello, whose home is in suburban Syracuse, has been an annual all-star choice since coming to his home area from Philadelphia four years ago. He is termed by Alex Hannum as one of the all-time great back court men, and the best one operating in the game today. Hannum says this takes into consideration all phases of the game—defense, individual and team offense, and leadership. In referring to his star two-handed set shot artist who set an all-time Syracuse field goal accuracy record with a percentage of .482 last year, Hannum says Costello is worth ten points a game with his team defense, in breaking up plays and stealing the ball from his defensive assignment. Many of these maneuvers lead to potential scoring opportunities for the Nats. Larry produced the greatest assist performance in local history the season before last when he registered 18 against Boston, adding a half-time mark of 11 and one-quarter mark of 8 in the process. The combination of his two-handed accuracy, short-distance jumper and driving layups makes him one of the pro sport's most versatile point getters.

DAVE GAMBEE



Birth Date—April 16, 1937; Height—6 feet, 6½ inches; Weight—215 pounds; Home—Corvallis, Oregon; College—Oregon State.

Development of Dave Gambee into a full-fledged pro top notcher last season was a prime reason for the Nats continuing their uninterrupted record of always qualifying for a playoff berth. Acquired just before the start of fall training from St. Louis, Gambee won a starting berth which he rarely relinquished during the season as he performed in every game. Oddly enough, it was against the clubs he formerly played for, St. Louis and Cincinnati, that he enjoyed his greatest success. Gambee climbed above the 1,000-point mark in scoring, more than tripling his entire point production of two previous years. Gambee is exceptionally fast for a big man, a scrappy rebounder and exceptionally accurate from both the field and foul line. He was seventh best in the league in free throw accuracy, and with Paul Arizin was rated as tops among the underhand shooters. Defensively, Gambee proved to be one of the NBA's most efficient performers and drew the assignment of checking the toughest rival forward in virtually all games. He was drafted to the professional ranks after a career of consistent brilliance at Oregon State, where he set school and Pacific Coast Conference scoring standards, plus earning a big share of all-star nominations. Gambee's brilliant first year effort with the Nats establishes him as one of Syracuse's foremost players during the new season. Dave also was highly ranked as a scholastic and college baseball performer. Gambee's top scoring performance at home last season was 27 points against St. Louis. He registered a road high of 26 points against Cincinnati.

HAL GREER



Age—23; Height—6 feet, 3 inches; Weight—176 pounds; Home—Huntington, W. Va.; College—Marshall

Now ranked in the upper echelon of NBA rear court performers, Hal Greer's performances have tremendously improved in each of his three seasons with the Nats, and last year he was honored by selection to participate in the all-star game for the first time. He very nearly duplicated the combined scoring totals of his first two pro seasons when he tallied 1551 points last season, second only to Dolph Schayes, and barely shy of a 20-point average. Greer's remarkable accuracy is shown in three-year figures of a .459 field goal percentage and a performance of .779 from the foul line. Hal's total of 623 field goals scored last season stands as an all-time Syracuse record. In keeping with the upward trend of his scoring, Greer has also increased his rebound and assist totals considerably with each succeeding season. He has completely lived up to his top flight college reputation earned in three standout seasons at Marshall, where he performed under Jules Rivlin. Greer still possesses one of the game's most remarkable records, set against Boston in his freshman campaign when he notched 18 field goals and 39 points in one half on Feb. 14, 1959. Last season, Hal's burst of 19 points in one period against St. Louis on Feb. 23 represented a home high for a Syracuse player. He also managed to take part in every league game for the first time in his career. Exceptional speed and driving ability, plus his great accuracy on middle-distance jumpers, makes Greer one of the top scoring threats among the game's little men, and his patented one-handed jump on free throw attempts is unique in league history.

SWEDE HALBROOK



Age—27; Height—7 feet, 3 inches; Weight—255 pounds; Home—Portland, Ore.; College—Oregon State

Swede Halbrook, the NBA's tallest player, came to professional basketball as a question mark last season, but had the distinction of being one of four rookies throughout the league to perform in every regular season and playoff game. Although he played only about 15 minutes a game, his rebounding and shot-blocking performances helped the Nats tremendously and established the easy going Oregonian as a tremendous favorite with Syracuse fans. Halbrook's efforts were keys in the Nats' accomplishment of copping the season series with Philadelphia, and ousting the Warriors from the playoffs in three straight games. Despite his height he has most often been used during his career on offense as a feeder, but coach Alex Hannum feels Swede will be shooting more frequently to add to the scoring potency of the Syracuse front court. Halbrook's debut as a pro was long delayed since he spent five seasons with the Wichita Vickers and played one season there under Hannum before joining the Nats. He was a Syracuse draft choice in the spring of 1956. Lacking the stamina for route-going performances, Halbrook nevertheless came through handsomely in a season when it was necessary to change 50 per cent of the Nats personnel up front. In the NIBL, Halbrook set an all-time single game record of 33 rebounds against Peoria, also establishing a record average of 19.1 rebounds per game. His four-year scoring average for 131 games in the amateur ranks was 12.1, and he registered more than 1,000 points in a season and a half of college competition.

JOHN KERR



Birth Date—July 17, 1932; Height—6 feet, 9 inches; Weight—230 pounds; Home—Dewitt, N.Y.; College—Illinois

Only two Syracuse players have participated in more games for the Nats than eight-year veteran John Kerr, who has never missed a regular season or playoff contest since joining the club in the fall of 1954. His total of 514 successive regular season games is second only to Dolph Schayes' total among active competitors in the league today. Always an unselfish player, coach Alex Hannum rates Kerr as the best team offensive center in the NBA, unusually fast for a big man who gives much effectiveness to the Syracuse fast break. Kerr has become rated as a top ball handler among the game's big men and is known as one of the best at picking up other players besides the one he is assigned against on defense. One of his strongest defensive points is excellent timing in blocking shots. Offensively, Kerr is an accurate hooker with either hand and has an effective medium range one-hander. Kerr, now a year-round resident of suburban Syracuse, has averaged more than 1,000 points and 800 rebounds per season with the Nats, following a career as a record making scorer at Illinois. He possesses more club records than any other Nat excepting Schayes including the home rebound high of 27 for one game, set three seasons ago. Kerr recorded his fourth successive 1,000-point season last year, and achieved a career high in assists.

CHARLES OSBORNE

A standout product of a school which is well-known for developing a number of excellent players, Charley Osborne of Western Kentucky comes to the roster of the Syracuse Nats after three seasons of steady brilliance under coach Ed Diddle. The rugged Osborne, touted as a hustler, strong rebounder and remarkably fine shooter, was the Nats' third round choice in the draft of college players last spring, and is given an excellent chance of developing into a top-notch in the pro realm. Osborne was accorded a variety of honors after his college career, including selection on the All-Ohio Valley Conference team in his junior and senior years. He also was tapped for all-star recognition in the Sugar Bowl and Bluegrass tournaments. Remarkable shooting accuracy keyed Osborne's career with the Hilltoppers. In his senior season, he hit .472 of his field goal attempts, and reached an efficiency of .834 from the foul line. The season before, he paced the conference with a field goal percentage of .512. Only one Western Kentucky player, Art Spoelstra, tallied more career points in three seasons than Osborne. The Nats are hopeful that this scoring touch, plus an average of more than 10 rebounds a game in the college ranks will propel him to a fine start in the NBA. Diddle says that Osborne's shooting effectiveness is more potent because of versatility. He is rated an exceptional hook shooter with either hand, has a driving layup that was labeled a "lunge shot" by writers and broadcasters, as well as an accurate one-handed set.

Joe Roberts moved to his first season of professional basketball a year ago after playing with the national champions from Ohio State. Not a spectacular appearing player, Roberts won his spurs with the Nats by showing in pre-season training that he gets the job done in most phases of the game. His hustle, jumping ability and likeness for team play caught the eye of Alex Hannum, and in a season when front court reinforcement was needed, Roberts responded with a steady performance in a reserve capacity. He missed a number of games because of an injury during the first part of the season, but was out of the line-up for only 11 games of the regular season schedule. Roberts' top collegiate season was in Ohio State's championship year when he played on the same squad with Jerry Lucas, and contributed 308 points to the Buckeye attack. His rugged physical strength and ability to get off his feet have made him an excellent rebounder. Most often used as a corner man, his best shot is a jumper which he hits for a high percentage. When considering that he averaged only about a dozen minutes per game during his freshman pro season, his scoring and rebounding work was of a capable variety. His performance against all seven rivals was relatively the same. His best single-game production was 15 points in a home meeting with New York. A 13-point total topped his road efforts, scored against Los Angeles.

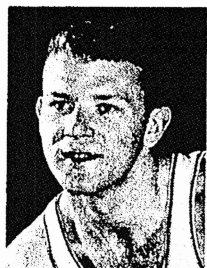
The records and milestones of Dolph Schayes' great career are scheduled to become even more significant this season, when he heads into an unprecedented 14th workhorse year. The league and club records possessed by Schayes are almost too numerous for listing, but most noted are his regular season scoring figure of 17,666 points, and 1,865 points in playoffs. But one of Dolph's most remarkable records will occur when the Nats take the floor for their tenth game this season. Schayes then will appear in his 683rd consecutive game to shatter the best previous iron man performance held by Harry Gallatin. Dolph expects to continue his Syracuse career long enough to at least hang up a record of playing in 1,000 games and score 20,000 points. Always a premier free throw shooter (career percentage .773), Dolph at one time made 50 in succession. His single game scoring high was 50 points three seasons ago at Boston. Schayes last year set a scoring record for the Nats and produced his second best average in history. He has now averaged more than 20 points per game for the past six seasons.

The Nats have high hopes that the versatile abilities of Lee Shaffer will beef up the front court, which has taken a number of setbacks in the past two years due to player retirements and injuries. Shaffer comes to the club a year after he was claimed as the top draft choice, after three stand-out seasons under Frank McGuire at North Carolina. He competed a season ago in the National Industrial League for the Tuck Tapers. After signing with the Nats late last spring, he immediately established residence in the city where he is serving during the off season as sales representative for Technical Tape Corp. Shaffer gained more than his share of honors as a collegian. Twice he was named to the all-star team of the Atlantic Coast conference and was tapped as that circuit's player of the year after his senior season. Additionally, he was chosen to the All-American team by the U.S. Basketball Writers, and received high recognition in the year-end polls by AP, UPI, NEA, The Sporting News, Look, Converse and Helms. McGuire considers Shaffer as having the best chance of any of his players of making good in professional ranks. Shaffer has played both in the pivot and as a corner man, is rated as a strong rebounder and has quick defensive moves. His top scoring has come on jump and hook shooting. Since he is rated as fast for a big man, with ruggedness and aggressive play to boot, he figures to fit well into the fast break tendencies of the Nats. He was North Carolina's pace maker in field goal and free throw accuracy, canning better than 45 per cent of his field goal attempts and close to 80 per cent from the foul line. During his college career, North Carolina teams won 57 of 74 games.

PAUL NEUMANN

Classy back courter Paul Neumann, the fifth highest scorer in the history of Stanford University, comes to the Nats' roster two seasons after the Syracuse club picked him in the draft of collegians as their fourth choice. He decided to join the pro ranks after two seasons with San Francisco and New Rochelle in the NIBL. Neumann carries exceptional credentials from his amateur career, hailed as a complete player who does everything well, with a standout chance of earning a berth in professional competition. In recent years, Neumann has done considerable overseas basketball travelling, participating in the Venture for Victory basketball tour of the Orient in 1959, and last spring joining the United States All-Star team for a tour of Russia, when the Americans won all eight games played. Last season he was named to the AAU All-American team. Neumann reaped numerous honors in his career at Stanford, where he served as captain of the squad one year, and co-captain in another season. He was named Northern California player of the year, most valuable player in NCAA District 8, selected to the Converse All-American team, with high ranking in the all-star polls of both the AP and UPI. Additionally he was on the All-Pacific Coast Conference team in two different seasons. Neumann tallied 997 points in the 73 games of his varsity career, an average production of 13.2 points per game. Indicative of his scoring touch are the accuracy marks he set in his last full season in amateur basketball, when he canned a field goal percentage of .431, and clicked at a rate of .872 from the foul line. Neumann is also rated exceptionally capable as a rebounder despite his comparative lack of height. With the Nats in quest of a talented guard to take the place of departed Dick Barnett, Neumann faces the opportunity of joining the brilliant carry over trio of Larry Costello, Al Bianchi and Hal Greer. He and South Dakota State's Don Jacobsen are the men fighting for the post.
