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# NOW HEAR THIS!

All three have the same problem—the Army, the Navy, the Royals.



The Army needs flashy fighter escorts for its heavy bombers. The Navy needs fleet, capable escorts for its battleships. The Royals need a pair of darting destroyers at guard to go with their own battleships.

As the Navy once rallied with pride around the power of its battleship the "Mighty Mo" so have the Royals looked to the talents of their own Mighty Mo, Maurice Stokes, to lead them out of troubled water.

This season Mo should be getting plenty of help from a Royal newcomer, a husky giant who fits into the battleship category in fire-power and board work. He's the 6'9" Clyde Lovellette, the league's sixth highest scorer and fifth highest rebounder.

Lovellette, along with Jimmy Paxson, a 6'6" forward, were acquired by Les Harrison, Royal president, in a post-season trade with Minneapolis.

Harrison also has helped Royal Coach Bobby Wanzer toward a solution of the guard problem by purchase of George King from Syracuse.

With Stokes, who set a league rebound mark of 1256 last season, and Lovellette, the Royals have a running start at one of the best front lines in the NBA.

To fill the other forward spot besides Paxson, Cincinnati has Jack Twyman, the team's leading scorer last year; Dick Ricketts, one of the most versatile players in the game; or Dave Piontek, a 6'6" husky with a year of seasoning behind him.

Besides the experienced and talented King the Royals have veterans Richie Regan, fourth in point production last season, and Tom Marshall, ready for a full season after Army service, seeking the guard positions.

All three will have to fight off bids by four hopeful rookies. The plebes challenging for the destroyer assignments are Dick Duckett of St. John's; Gerry Paulson of Manhattan; John Maglio of North Carolina State and the 5'9" Columbia All-American, Chet (the Jet) Forte.

A pair of capable guards to keep his battleships from becoming sitting ducks is Wanzer's problem. The Army and Navy solved their problem. The question is . . . can the Royals?

# TOP

You own a major league basketball team. You know there should be a separation of yourself as an individual and as a club owner. You find that difficult because of your intense devotion to basketball.

As an individual you are thoughtful, humorous, sentimental, humble, but here you live in an abstract world, for tucked away in the background still are thoughts of basketball. You slip back into your life as club owner.

Because you are so intense, when an idea strikes you, no matter what hour of the day or night, you want to take action. Sometimes you make the wrong move, say the wrong thing. But you ask yourself—who doesn't?

And you do act, you do move. There's no standing still.

You've always been wrapped up in basketball. Since those days almost four decades ago when you shot baskets alongside old School No. 9 in Rochester.

You had built basketball dreams before the roarin' 20's were even a rumble. When your father died in 1923 you had to pass up a college scholarship and take over his produce business, but you still held tightly to those plans, those hopes.

You played, coached, promoted semi-pro basketball teams through the years you were building up your produce business. World War II set back your plans.

In 1946 it took 11 trucks to handle your business, but you decided to cast your lot with your first love—basketball. You sold your business. You and your brother, Jack, now an attorney, were granted a franchise in the National Basketball League.

You've seen and suffered with professional basketball as it struggled and grew to major league status. You've been a part of that growth . . . the station wagon travel, the one-night stands in dinky gyms, the Barnum approach to some of the promotions.

Time hasn't quelled your intensesness. You are still enthusiastic, perhaps too much so at times. You are always driving, working, but now you may be close to fulfilling your dreams.

The potential seems there—the team, the organization, the arena. You may shortly realize your ambition to have one of the finest operations, team and front office, in major league basketball.

You know you'll have to have patience a bit longer. But you think you can do that. You are Les Harrison, president and general manager of the Cincinnati Royals.

A national magazine once blacktopped a story with "Wanzer's A Wizard"—he's a "small" wonder. If Robert Francis Wanzer can lick a problem in logistics the Royals' former playing wizard can become their coaching wizard.

Bobby Wanzer's problem is supplying the particular talent the Royals may need at the time and place they need it most. The 34-year-old seems to have the basketball background to handle the problem.

He has eight and a half seasons of professional play behind him and he played under Les Harrison, a coach with a winning history.

Tall by normal standards but short at six-feet by basketball requirements the flashy Wanzer was regarded as an outstanding guard. He was a perennial member of league All-Star teams and his 7090 points place him 16th among the league's all-time scorers.

Wanzer began his basketball early at New York's Eastside Settlement House. He sparked Benjamin Franklin High to two undefeated seasons in his junior and senior year before moving across the state line to South Orange, N. J., and Seton Hall College.

War service with the Marine Corps, from 1943 to 1946, interrupted his college play although he did get a bit of basketball at Colgate while there under the Navy's V-12 program. Wanzer's final season of play at Seton Hall was under Bob Davies.

In the 1948-49 season Wanzer and his former coach, Davies, teamed at guard for Harrison at Rochester. They were an outstanding backcourt combination through the years for the Royals.

When Harrison started his "youth movement" in '55-56 he set out to round up talent and named Wanzer as player-coach. Wanzer played until mid-season last year. Then with the Royals in first place, Bobby was named to coach the West in the East-West All-Star game.

Wanzer changed to "street clothes" for that game and hasn't returned to a uniform since, though the temptation is there. This is the third season, the pay-off one, in the Royals rebuilding plans. It's Wanzer's first as non-playing coach. By March, 1958, he may rate that headline again.

Bobby's married. He and his wife, Nina, and their two children, Mary Elizabeth, 7, and Robert John, 4, now live in Cincinnati.

They are Clyde Lovellette and Jimmy Paxson who came to the Royals from Minneapolis for Bob Burrow, Ed Fleming, Art Spolestra, Don Meineke and Cincinnati's first draft choice rights (the Lakers had Cincinnati pick Hot Rod Hundley).

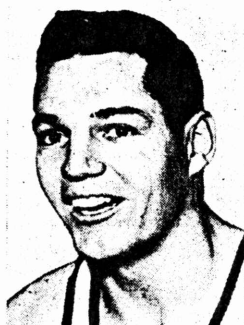
The Royals also acquired George King in a cash purchase from Syracuse.

George dropped from pro ranks last season to coach at his alma mater, Morri Harvey, and get his sporting goods store in Charleston on its feet . . . he was elevated to athletic director at Morris Harvey in June, 1957 . . . King found he couldn't stay away from the playing side however and resigned from Morris Harvey . . . the Royals purchased him from Syracuse during the summer . . . he had played five seasons with the Nats . . . at Morris Harvey, King led the nation's collegiate scorers in '48-49 with a 29.1-point per game average and in '49-50 with a 31.1-point per game mark . . . he played a season with the AAU Phillips Oilers before joining the Nats . . . the State Department sent him to Mozambique, Africa, last summer to lay the groundwork for a 1960 Olympic cage team for the Portuguese province . . . King, a fast break specialist, may be the answer to the Royals backcourt problems . . . wife, Jeanne; son, George III, 6; daughters, Kristy Jeanne, 4, and Kathy Jan, 3.

Bobby Wanzer, Royal coach, once held the record for best free throw percentage in a season. Wanzer hit 377 of 417 for a percentage of .904 in the 1951-52 season. Bill Sharman of Boston set the new record last year with a .905 percentage in scoring on 381 of 421 shots.

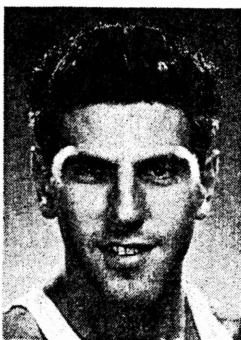

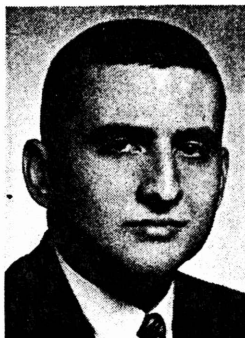

# THE ROYALS PALACE

After a dozen years in Rochester the energetic, effervescent Les Harrison has moved his beloved Royals into the Queen City of the midwest.

No little part in plans for the future and influence in Harrison's change of address are facilities of the new palace into which his Royals have moved. The trim and neatly compact Cincinnati Garden with its comfortable theater-type seats and unobstructed view will provide the home court for the Royals.

This move also gives the Royals territorial draft choices from a 50-mile sweep that is a hotbed of basketball. Located in that area besides the fine teams turned out by George Smith at the University of Cincinnati and cross-town rival Xavier University are Miami University and Tom Blackburn's University of Dayton Flyers.

This proximity could fill the Royals ranks with outstanding "local" stars which in not too distant future could include Middletown High School's famed Jerry Lucas.

Cincinnati, a usually conservative community sprawled over seven hills along the banks of the Ohio River, was pleasantly surprised that caution was cast aside in July, 1946 when the Cincinnati Garden corporation not only proposed but set about constructing a winter sports arena.

The Garden opened its doors to the public on Feb. 22, 1949.

There are no poles behind which to sit your mother-in-law and no balconies to challenge mountain climbing technique. Poles were eliminated by 40-ton trusses 30 feet deep and 240 feet long. The main roof is high enough above the court to shelter a 10-story apartment building.

The Cincinnati Garden makes no claim at being the nation's largest, but it takes a back seat to no arena in providing close-to-action, unobstructed visibility to the 14,000 sports fans it can and has handled.

Cincinnati businessman Tom Wood is president of the Garden corporation with on the spot direction handled by soft-spoken Tom Grace, executive vice president, and Alex Sinclair, general manager.

The Garden provides the home ice for the Cincinnati Mohawks of the International Hockey League. Across the ice have flashed the talented blades of the nation's spectacular ice shows as well as the halting slashes of Greater Cincinnati's skate-for-fun old and young.

The Garden walls have rebounded the roar of midget racing cars; the snorts of rearing, unbroken horses; the zing of tennis balls; the splash of trim divers and the solemn, sacred songs of religious groups.

Into this setting Harrison has moved his Royals.

# OFF THE ROYAL CUFF

This, the 1957-58 season, will be the 13th Les and Jack Harrison have had a team in organized professional basketball.

Royals (as Rochester), Minneapolis and Syracuse hold NBA record for most wins in a season—all won 51 games in 1949-50 season. Royals were in Central Division playoffs with Minneapolis and lost to Lakers.

Royals have faced 26 different franchises in their 12 years of organized basketball. Only three teams have advantages over them—the Chicago Gears, (3-5, 4-8 with play-offs); the Minneapolis Lakers (37-55, 44-70 with play-offs) and the New York Knickerbockers (31-33, 35-36 with playoffs). George Mikan was with the Gears and Lakers during those games.
