# *Improved Royals Question Due To Division Transfer*

Charley Wolf called his 1962 training camp squad the best of three he has had as Royals' coach. How optimistic the Royals may be for 1962-63 in comparing themselves to last season's record-makers must be somewhat contained by the team's switch to the league's Eastern Division.

**How the Royals can top their 1961-62 exploits is difficult to imagine. The Royals set a new all-time record of 43 victories, best mark since the club moved to Cincy from Rochester in 1957, knocking off the previous "best" by 10 wins. They were second in the Western Division, six games ahead of Detroit.**

Wolf's Royals erased their own NBA field goal shooting record by 14 percentage points with their new .452 mark. As a club, the Royals set a league assist record of 2,154, mostly decided by Oscar Robertson's 899 total. And, while going through the rigorous 80-game schedule, Cincy averaged a devastating 123 points per game on offense!

Charley looks for improvement in his squad, based on the composition of his roster. First, he looks for guard Adrian Smith—only surviving rookie of last season—to be better with a year of NBA "knowhow."

He feels that the veteran starting five of forwards Jack Twyman and Bob Boozer, Capt. Wayne Embry at center and guards Arlen Bockhorn and Robertson should enjoy an even finer season together.

**The Royals coach looks to a stronger bench this winter. Acquisition of Tom Hawkins from Los Angeles adds not only a strong forward reserve and a so-called "sixth man" but also a possible starter replacement.**

Wolf is looking for additional rebound strength and defensive talents, only weaknesses last winter.

Bud Olsen, top Royals' rookie on this season's club, shows excellent offense from the corners including the ability to make plays with impressive passes. The return of Dave Piontek to the Royals should help.

Wolf feels his crew of forwards will help make Hub Reed a more confident center behind Embry. Over the past two seasons, the "Hubber" has been a "swing man" at both forward and pivot.

The Royals came up with a vacant guard this fall and Dan Tieman proved the best of four rookies despite his absence at training camp.

The change to the Eastern Division makes it impossible to plot the Royals in a pre-season "look." Boston is definitely the division and league champion favorite because of its superlative 1961-62 performance. The Royals are setting their sights, however, no lower than second place in the East.

# Wolf Begins Third Year On New Royals Contract

Charley Wolf began his third season as Cincinnati Royals' coach this fall with a new two-year contract. The 36-year-old Greater Cincinnati native signed the pact in April after leading the Royals to their most successful winter in five years.



The Royals chalked up 43 wins in 80 games last winter for the city's best record on the hardwood. In Wolf's first coaching season (1960-61), the Royals went 33-46 which equaled the previous all-time win mark of 1957-58: 33-39.

Before the Royals moved into the Eastern Division this season, Wolf's cagers made notable impressions in the West: His first team missed the playoffs by one game from third place and three from second spot. Last winter, the Royals finished No. 2, six games better than third-place Detroit.

Tall, dark and handsome Charles Anthony Wolf (6'2½") came to the Royals after six years of coaching basketball and baseball and directing athletics at Villa Madonna College, Covington, Ky. He succeeded Tom Marshall, the one-time Royal.

Charley is "local timber." He was born in Covington, Ky., starred in three sports at St. Xavier High School and now resides at Taylor Mill near Covington with his wife Sis and sons Martin (born June 21, 1957) and Stephen (born March 23, 1960).

The World War II Naval signalman was an All-Ohio football end at St. Xavier and went on to Notre Dame for one year, playing varsity basketball and baseball before beginning a seven-year stint in minor league baseball.

His pro career on the diamond included action in three Class A leagues. He left baseball to take the Villa post in 1954. His Rebels won 81 games and lost 56 over six campaigns.

Charley's wife is former Cincinnati TV performer Sis Camp. They have been married seven years. Until this past August, Charley was a partner in a Latonia, Ky. bowling alley for five years.

Popular Charley is now affiliated on a year-round basis with the Grumbine-Duffy-Wolf Insurance agency here.

Nickname: Bucky . . . In virtually every phase, this Royals veteran of four seasons set career highs last winter: Scoring, shooting of both field goals and free throws and assists. Check the statistics below to see Bucky's impressive 1961-62 figures as compared to his previous years.

Bockhorn hasn't missed a Royals' game the past three seasons. His first year ('58-'59) showed him with one absence because of an ankle injury . . . One of four Royals to play all 80 games last season, Bucky ranked second in assists, third in free throws and fourth in scoring.

His best scoring last season was 28-pointer December 26th at St. Louis when he hit 12 of 20 field goal shots and 4-4 free throws in 43 minutes . . . "Buckshot" counted double-figures in 73 of 80 games as compared to 52-of-79 during 1960-'61.

He had 27 points against New York at home December 10th by driving home 12-of-21 FG in 35 minutes. Bucky had nine rebounds in that same game . . . In '60-'61 home finale, Bockhorn popped 11 straight baskets on jumpers and layups in first half on way to his career's best game . . . It was 17-26 FG in 45 minutes with 9 rebounds in that memorable game.

How necessary is Bockhorn in Royals' lineup? His 3,062 minutes last season was second to only Oscar's 3,503. Two seasons ago, he ranked No. 3 in minutes (2,669) in his previous best campaign.

Lean, muscular Bucky has developed into one of the better NBA guards since he was the Royals' surprising No. 3 draft choice in '58. Royals GM Pep Wilson, then Royals' public relations chief, suggested Bockhorn after seeing him during his sports publicity stint at University of Dayton.

Assists-wise, Bockhorn's best game last season was 12 January 18th at Philadelphia in 48-minute show. He had 11 against Boston at home February 28th and 10 versus Philley here February 13th . . . In rebounds, Bockhorn reaped 13 at home against Chicago November 10th, 11 versus Syracuse January 1st at Cincy and 10 at Philley January 18th.

The Bockhorns live year-round in Dayton . . . Peggy and Bucky are parents of David Arlen (born June 7, 1959) and Daniel Alan (born July 27, 1960) . . . Off-season occupation: Dayton real estate and home improvements.

Nickname: Big Bob ... Robert Lewis Boozer was another of the Royals' most improved players last season. In every statistical phase, this former two-time All-American improved over his 1960-61 rookie campaign, taking over one of the starting forward slots.

His new one-game career high came in the Royals' first home game of '61-'62. In 37 minutes, "Booz" potted 9 field goals in 16 shots, added 10-for-13 in free throws and grabbed 12 rebounds . . . In December 13 game at Syracuse, Bob had 25 points on 10-15 FG and 5-7 FT showings. He had 15 rebounds in that same game.

Boozer's best rebound performance came in December 19th home game with Philadelphia on 20 grabs. He had 18 rebounds November 29th against Syracuse at home . . . Boozer's 804 rebounds ranked third on Royals . . . His 1,083 points (13.7) were fifth along with his 2,518 minutes' action.

Bob was the Royals' No. 1 draft choice in '59, stayed away from the pros to play with the Peoria Cats of the NIBL one year and participate in the '60 Olympics at Rome and saw spot service as a Royals' rookie.

He averaged but 19 minutes a game as a rookie but was one of four Royals to play all 79 games. As an NBA sophomore, he saw a norm of 32 minutes' service per game.

Wolf feels that Boozer's potential as an NBA frontliner has yet to be reached in both scoring and rebounding. He has encouraged Bob to take more advantage of his driving ability besides asserting himself more as a rebounder-fighter.

During the past two seasons, Bob has taken the opponent's star forward on defense . . . On offense, he once scored 32 points against Wilt Chamberlain when the latter was at Kansas Univ. . . He was Big Eight Conference's Player of the Year two straight years.

Bob is one of three Royals bachelors . . . He was an art major and education minor at KSU and contemplates commercial art as a strong possible post-basketball career . . . Off-season occupation: Omaha, Neb. Boys Club of America and Schlitz Brewery Co. representative.

Nickname: Goose . . . Royals' squad captain second consecutive season, **Wayne Richard Embry** is now regarded in the Big Four of the NBA's top centers. Some feel he is the strongest pivotman in the pros from a physical point of view. Despite bulk, Wayne has impressive speed and endurance.

Embry set new career highs in almost every phase last season. He moved from a 14.4-point average scorer of '60-'61 to 19.8 last season . . . In rebounds, he had 977 total or 113 more than the year before when he played four more games.

Goose missed five February games because of ankle sprain, causing him to lose a 20-point-plus average at season's end . . . Injuries and size fail to keep Embry from being an annual candidate for the club's mythical "most improved player" honor.

Big Wayne upped everything in the statistical columns last season, including assists! His scoring rise of 5.4 points a game over previous season was best growth of Royals, edging Boozer's 5.3.

His best point output last season: 35 points versus Los Angeles at home Christmas Night. He made 15 of 26 field shots and grabbed 16 rebounds in 43-minute performance . . . Six games found Goose scoring over 30 points . . . Next-best effort was 33-point against Syracuse at home November 29th.

His best '61-'62 rebound show was 21 November 3rd at LA and 21 March 13th at LA . . . Had 20 in two other games . . . At LA two years ago (March 12, 1961), he counted career high of 25.

Wayne's play has won him places the past two years on the West All-Star teams for games at Syracuse and St. Louis . . . At Miami of Ohio, he was a two-time All-Mid American Conference star, specializing in hook shots. As a pro, he has perfected a deadly inside jump shot and a fine outside set.

Off the court, Goose has become one of the most popular Royals through his friendliness with young and old alike and public appearances throughout Greater Cincinnati.

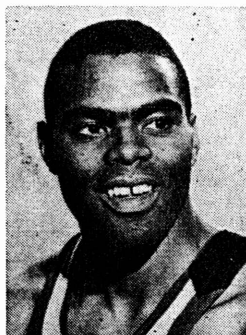

Nicknames: Hawk, Tommy . . . Royals obtained this former unanimous college All-American in September 14, 1962 trade with Los Angeles for player to be named at later date. Additional rebound and scoring strength at the forwards were sought in Tom's acquisition.

Coach Charley Wolf and many other NBA mentors have regarded Tom as the second-best sixth man in the league, following only Boston's Frank Ramsey. "If he plays as well with us as he has against us, he should be a tremendous help," feels Wolf. Says Tommy: "I am not here for the casual existence. I felt I still had a positive future in pro ball after the trade by turning down a full-time position with my off-season employer."

The Royals see versatility in Hawkins because of his ability to spark in a great number of situations. Despite his 6'5" stature, he may even see service as a guard or center when speed and board control demand . . . One of the most colorful NBA performers, Tom has tremendous jumping power and compares well with Johnny Green and other top leapers.

The Hawk was a key in the Lakers beating out the Royals for the Western Division flag and in the seven-game championship playoff series with Boston . . . Against Cincy, Tom scored 130 points (10.8) and posted 85 rebounds (7.0) in 12 games, averaging 25 minutes each outing. Best games: 20 points February 8th at Dayton and 18 at Cincy on December 25 and February 24. His 15 rebounds February 24th were his best all season.

Hawkins found himself a Lakers' starter last season after Elgin Baylor went into the Army. He ranked fifth in rebounds for LA although his 1,903 minutes placed sixth . . . His best scoring game: 22 at New York February 6th vs. Knicks.

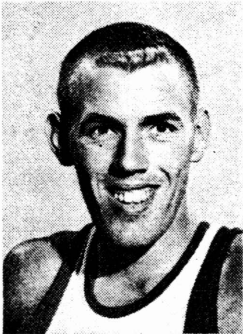
Tom was LA's No. 1 draft choice in 1959 as he emerged the finest cager in Notre Dame's history. He started every varsity game over three seasons except three senior contests because of an ankle injury. His team desire besides natural abilities strongly attracted the Lakers.

The Hawkins family in LA includes wife Doris and children Kevin (born October 2, 1959), Karel (born August 6, 1961) and tiny Traci Doran (born November 4, 1962). Off-season occupation: Great Western Financial Corp., Los Angeles, public relations.

Nickname: Bud . . . Enoch Eli Olsen III was the Royals' No. 2 choice in the April '62 NBA player draft as the club sought to build up its corps of rebounding forwards. At college, Bud earned plenty of "ink" with his offense, defense and rebound performances . . .

Olsen played both forward and center at Louisville. As a senior pivotman, he outscored 23 of the 25 centers he opposed, holding them to an average of 9.6 points per game . . . He averaged 20.8 points and 13.2 rebounds in 25 senior games while holding down the captain's slot . . . Look at his varsity field goal shooting stats below.

Royals Coach Charley Wolf may intentionally bring Bud around to pro maturity through the slow-but-gradual route. In training camp, it wasn't until scrimmages and exhibition games that Bud began to show his wares . . . For a big man, Olsen boasts natural court savvy in all phases. He doesn't "loudly" exhibit impressive speed but yet, he has excellent moves and floor presence.

Olsen has been "around" . . . Born at Gary, Ind., he moved with his family to Vincennes when he was five-years-old. After his sophomore year in high school, his family moved to Dayton . . . Since graduation from UL, Louisville seems to be his current home since his wife's family hails from there. He is the second eldest of four sons and two daughters in the Olsen clan.

An honorable mention All-American, Olsen was seen by a number of NBA clubs as a diamond in the rough as they envied the Royals' claim to him . . . Bud made the All-Bluegrass Holiday tourney team two straight years as well as most of the all-opponent teams named by UL foes. Dayton's Agonis Club named him the best out-of-town cager from that city during 1961-62.

Olsen is Louisville's fourth-best career varsity scorer with 1,192 points in 80 games . . . His 33.0-point average as a Cardinal yearling four years ago set a new UL school mark . . . An All-Ohio scholastic pick, he played in the Ohio North-South game with one of the state's finest senior crops.

Bud was married to sweetheart Donna (Wilham), a Louisville model, on June 15, 1962. If their first child in March is a boy, he will be named Enoch Eli IV despite Olsen's insistence to be called Bud. Off-season occupation: General Adjustment Bureau, Inc. handling storm claims in Kansas and Iowa.

Nicknames: Big O, Ozz . . . Oscar Palmer Robertson has reached such heights his first two seasons in the NBA that it is difficult to imagine the goals he will attain in '62-'63. Most agree he is THE super-star of the NBA's greatest active players, "most complete player" to ever rove the NBA and the most gifted all-around player at the arts of scoring, passing and rebounding.

As a "sophomore" last winter, here are some of Big O's feats:

**SCORING:** He ranked third among NBA marksmen in total scoring, and fourth in field goal shooting. His new one-game career best was set on 19-of-34 field shooting and 11-of-16 in free throws. Popped 47 vs. Detroit February 6, 1962 at home on 19-31 FG showing. Canned 35 straight free throws through four games in late January and early February. Set new Royals club records for total points, free throws made and attempted during regular season.

**ASSISTS:** His 899 total and 11.4-game norm are new NBA records. Bob Cousy's 715 total fell and Oscar's 9.7 rookie record of '60-'61 went with it. His 22 assists in October 29, 1961 home opener is new Royals' club mark, new Gardens floor standard and was the best one-game effort in the league all season. In that game, he played 45 minutes, scored 26 points (6-12 FG and 14-17 FT) and had 11 rebounds. Posted 22 assists in 32-pointer December 11th against Chicago at Dayton.

**REBOUNDS:** Oscar led all NBA guards with 985 total rebounds and 11.2-game average. Royals' best boardsman despite backcourt status most of the time as he was forced to battle the giants. Career high of 22 rebounds came in top scoring effort at Philly (49 above). He had 20 or more in three games.

Ozz is the highest scoring guard in NBA history. Complete Sports 1962 magazine named him the most perfect pro player with 19.5 rating out of possible 20.0, putting him five-tenths of a point over Elgin Baylor and Bob Pettit. Other magazines followed.

As a rookie, he was East-West All-Star game's MVP at Syracuse. "Big O" settled for second in voting last January as hometown Pettit took 27 votes to his 11 in St. Louis. Oscar had 26 points in 37 minutes and 13 assists. In NBA President's Cup voting, he had 135 votes along with Wilt Chamberlain to place second to Bill Russell's 297. His first season showed him fifth with 70 votes as Russell won with 213.

First taste of playoff action netted Oscar 115 points (28.7), 44 assists, 44 rebounds and 185 minutes of four 1962 games. He hit 52% in field goals and 80% free throws.

Former three-time All-American at University of Cincinnati, Oscar is still remembered for collegiate feats: Nation's Player of Year all three varsity years, No. 1 performer for U. S. in '60 Olympics and '59 Pan-American games and best major college pointmaker.

He and his wife Yvonne are parents of Shana Yvonne, born April 6, 1962. Off-season occupation: Cincinnati Pepsi Cola Co.

Nicknames: Odie, Smitty . . . The Royals' No. 3 guard as a rookie last season, Adrian Howard Smith will no doubt be counted on for heavier spot duty in 1962-63 because of the NBA experience he acquired last season. Smitty's sophomore campaign could be THE big season for him.

Royals like Smith's capacity of being able to come into a game and quickly add speed, ball movement and outside shooting to the team's offense.

Odie averaged 18 minutes per outing as a rookie but he was one of four Royals to play all 80 games . . . He posted 30-minutes-plus in seven games, scoring double-figures each time . . . Only failed to score once all winter: A three-minute stint in the season's third game!

His best game last season came in 23 minutes' action as he blasted the Hawks on 7-for-10 field performance and 6-for-7 in free throws, adding four rebounds and 5 assists . . . Best passing nights: 7 assists vs. Detroit at Chicago November 19 and 7 vs. Los Angeles at New York October 24 . . . Best rebounds: 9 vs. New York at Cincy November 7.

Smith acquired his nickname during high school days when he and brother Ed were called Odie and Pappy after Grand Ole Opry radio stars of Nashville, Tenn. Adrian resented his monicker so it stuck; Ed disregarded his and it was soon forgotten.

Odie was placed on Royals' negotiation lists after his Kentucky team won the '58 NCAA crown (UK's Fiddlin' Five) . . . He saw two years' Army duty and played one year with amateur NIBL Akron Goodyears before becoming a pro . . . Chicago's Johnny Cox on same UK team which upset Elgin Baylor's Seattle club in Louisville NCAA finals.

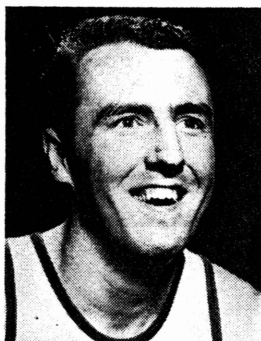
During Army hitch, Smith played with Boozer and Robertson on victorious Yank teams in '59 Pan-American Games at Chicago and '60 Olympics at Rome . . . At UK, Adrian scored 518 points in 51 games (10.1) over two years . . . He was Little All-American first two college years at Northeast Mississippi JC where he averaged 24.0 points in 64 games . . . Scored 644 points in 31 games (20.8) for Goodyears.

Adrian was married September 8, 1962 to the former Miss Paula Jones of Mayfield, Ky. Opening Royals' pre-season drills 11 days later cut short their honeymoon . . . Nicknames: Twy, Twacky . . . Now in NBA season No. 8, John Kennedy Twyman is far and away the oldest member of the Royals in point of service. His perfect attendance string is now at 522 consecutive regular-season games over eight seasons. Add to this the fact he's never missed a playoff game! He played part of one season with a wired broken jaw and last winter, shoulder and leg injuries failed to keep him out of action.

His 11,472 points in league play ranks seventh among the NBA's all-time highs and his 22.0-point game norm is fourth. His ranking is truly outstanding when you consider that his seven years are the least of the top scorers!

His best '61-62 game was a 39-point explosion in the October 21, 1961 season opener at St. Louis as he connected on 15-of-28 field goal shots and 9 of 13 free throws. In a December 10, 1961 home game against New York, he popped 38 points on 18-of-31 field success (18 his season's best).

Boston Celtics Coach Red Auerbach is one of Twyman's strongest admirers. Says he: "Jack probably has the quickest hands in the league. The man has unusual stamina, probably traceable to his powerful legs and thighs. They seem to give him a kind of built-in endurance."

Jack posted 30 points or more in 16 games. On the boards, his best game last winter was the October 29th home opener against Syracuse when he had 15 grabs. He counted 14 rebounds in four other games.

In NBA statistics last season, Twyman's .479 field goal showing ranked No. 3, trailing only giant centers Walt Bellamy (.513) and Wilt Chamberlain (.505). He was second-best scorer on the Royals and third in rebounds.

One of the best outside shooters in the pros, Twyman led the league in 1957-58 with a .452 mark. His .488 showing of 1960-61 was topped by only Chamberlain's .505.

Jack has played in five of the last six East-West All-Star games.

Nationally and locally, Jack has been recognized for his work with one-time Royals star Maurice Stokes, hospitalized since March 1958. One of the top awards he and Stokes received in '62 was the Philadelphia Sportswriters Association's courage citation.

Twyman has been selling insurance over the past five years and last spring, he went into his own business with three other partners. He and wife Carole became parents of their third child, Julie Ann, on September 7, 1962. Preceding Julie were Lisa Ann (September 1, 1957) and John Kennedy Jr. (May 15, 1960). Off-season occupation: Twyman, Dunning, Temple, Berg and Associates.

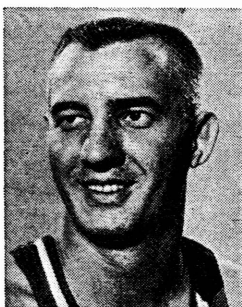
