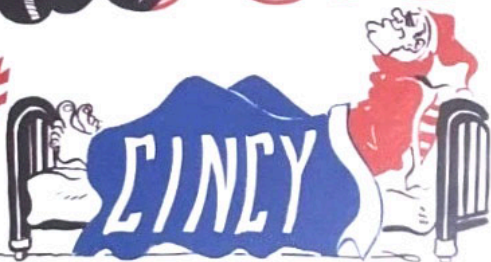

McMahon Expected To Give

It did not take the Royals long to hire a successor to Charley Wolf last May when he resigned to become coach of the Detroit Pistons. Less than a month later, fiery Jack McMahon was signed to a one-year contract.

To say that McMahon is expected to bring a new "flavor" to the Royals' is short: His mannerisms, excitable Irish anger and coaching techniques should provide a radical change from Cincinnati teams of the past.

McMahon is quite suited to his role as a coach. His basketball background is superb: All-American at St. John's University, eight years as a standout pro guard, married and the father of three children, and three "cracks" at coaching other teams.

Cincinnati Gardens' fans will no doubt quickly adopt McMahon as their new leader during high-pitch moments of home games. . . In the past, they have been quick to "boo" the opponents' off-the-bench coaches. . . He may even win a presidential nomination with crowd reaction!

* * *

John Joseph McMahon will be 34 on December 3rd. Brooklyn-born, he first attained basketball recognition at St. Michael's Prep, winning All-New York City honors. St. John's Coach Frank McGuire—who saw skipper service one year with the Philadelphia Warriors—took him in toe for his college roundball training.

McMahon helped St. John's Redmen into two NCAA and three NIT classics. He was team captain as a senior. In the '52 NCAA finals, St. John's lost to Kansas University and away went a chance to go to the Olympic Games at Helsinki, Finland. On that same Kansas team was Clyde Lovellette who later was to star with Jack on the St. Louis Hawks.

Jack finished as St. John's second-greatest career scorer, following teammate Bob Zawoluk. In 1952, the Rochester Royals made him their No. 1 draft choice.

The McMahon NBA story is one of a steady, ball-

handling backcourt performer. At Rochester, Jack played behind the Royals' talented duo of Bobby Wanzer and Bob Davies. Wanzer, by the way, coached the Cincinnati Royals, 1957-58.

When Jack Twyman started his pro career at Rochester in 1955, he roomed with McMahan. Before that 1955-56 season was up, however, McMahan was traded to St. Louis with Jack Coleman for Chris Harris and Dick Ricketts, the latter a '57-'58 Royal.

IN 524 regular-season games over eight seasons, Jack scored 4,237 points, 1,930 assists and 1,390 rebounds. His best year was his second at Rochester with 711 points for a 10.0 game norm. He had 367 assists with St. Louis in 1956-57 for another top mark.

McMahan starred with the Hawks when they won the '58 NBA world title, only time Boston has lost the "marbles" in the past six seasons. During four straight seasons he was a Hawk starter, the Hawks won the Western Division flag.

His last season as a player was 1959-60 and it was split with duties as assistant coach and player personnel chief of the Hawks. Before that winter, Jack had missed only seven games over seven seasons.

Jack played on eight consecutive playoff clubs, too.

* * *

IN 1961, McMahan was tapped to coach the Kansas City Steers of the American Basketball League: He directed them to a 58-28 overall record. The Steers won the first and second half crowns but the Cleveland Pipers won the final playoff marbles.

His immediate success won him the Chicago Zephyrs' post in 1962. Frank Lane, then Zephs' general manager, picked him but the club's owners later forced his release when the club had a 12-26 record in mid-season. The Zephs played 27 games on the road until that time. An added handicap was rookie Terry Dischinger's availability only on weekends, due to college courses until the mid-semester.

Jack and Kay McMahan have been married since November 3, 1951. She's a Brooklynite, too. They are parents of Jack Jr. (born August 5, 1952), Katherine (born November 28, 1959) and Brian (born October 28, 1961).

Are Royals' Dreams Possible This Season?

Dreams come true? The Royals feel they are a possibility during 1963-64 because of some key new additions to the club and some important indications last winter.

Overall, the Royals expect to improve upon their 42-38 regular-season record and third-place finish in the Eastern Division of 1962-63. They have hopes, too, of surpassing their surprising performance in the '63 playoffs.

Coach Jack McMahon — one of the key new ingredients in this season's Royals picture—figures his club's potential can lead them all the way to the NBA championship. He feels he can strengthen past weaknesses and at the same time, take full advantage of the club's strong points.

The Royals can afford "cocky" confidence when it comes to their offensive power: Last season, they broke their own NBA field goal shooting record for the third straight year with a .459 finish. They averaged 119.1 points over the 80-game schedule, second-best mark among the nine teams.

Had Lady Luck treated the Royals a bit more kindly their first campaign in the Eastern Division in many years, they might have given Syracuse (now Philadelphia) and Boston more fight for first and second places: The Royals dropped 19 games of their total 38 losses by two baskets or less.

The division playoff semi-finals sweep over Syracuse and forcing Boston the full seven games in the finals proved the Royals' win potential last season.

Jerry Lucas is the Royals' BIG addition this season and he should directly remedy one weakness of the past: Rebounding. Whether he be at forward or center, 6'8" Jerry is expected to make his presence felt as a rookie with his work on both boards, probably more so than his first-year scoring.

The Royals' defense last season gave up an average of 117.8 points per game, only seventh-best in the NBA. This will no doubt be the club's main concern throughout the season.

Personnel-wise, the Royals have a new look in their quest for '64 laurels: Along with Lucas, rookie guards Jay Arnette and Tom Thacker are the new faces. Oscar Robertson heads the group of eight veterans.

The Royals will run more set plays under McMahon but they will still take advantage of their ability to fast break. If they can combine a balanced offense with improved defense and rebounding, the Royals may be a chief NBA threat in '64.

The Royals' No. 2 draft choice in 1960 behind incomparable Oscar Robertson, Jay H. Arnette signed a \$20,000 bonus contract with the Los Angeles Dodgers organization rather than gamble on winning a spot on the hoopsters. Now, after three summers of minor league baseball, he has decided to pursue basketball, too.

Curly-haired Jay was a baseball-track-basketball star in both high school and college... Before that he was a 12-year-old Little League star with the Austin, Tex. team in the Williamsport, Pa. national finals... Jay scored his college career points high in the NCAA Midwest Regionals, by making 16 of 34 field shots.

Since playing on the '60 Yank Olympic championship team with four other present Royals, Arnette's only organized basketball was confined to his hometown Austin's city league one winter. His showing in '63 fall workouts, therefore, was somewhat remarkable.

After playing Class AA Texas League ball at Albuquerque, N. Mex. and in the Class A Pioneer League at Great Falls, Mont., Jay has decided to give basketball a try: "I always regretted giving it up," he said last fall. He may still accept a Class AAA Pacific Coast League pact at Spokane next spring. He posted his top pro batting mark of .295 as a Great Fall centerfielder last summer.

Only surviving guard of five candidates from Royals' pre-season rookie camp, Arnette impressed Coach Jack McMahon with his speed and tempo to team's offense in exhibition games. He is so fast on the hardwood, one would think he was falling on his face during a drive or fast break.

Talk about speed, Jay is the fastest recognized minor leaguer in the Dodger organization. He has clocked 60 yards in 6.3 seconds and has a watch to prove it. Talk about jumping ability, Jay easily dunks despite his size: He high-jumped 6'5" in college.

A Converse All-American at Texas, Jay became the school's No. 2 career scorer... As a senior, he was the lone unanimous All-Southwest Conference pick... On his birthday as a junior, he popped 29 points against North Texas State. A year later, he scored 28 versus Tulsa.

Jay was a pharmacy major at Texas and now needs several courses to become a druggist. His Dad is secretary of the Texas State Board of Pharmacy. Jay married high school sweetheart Betty during his early pro baseball days.

Arlen Dale Bockhorn seeks a return to the form he enjoyed during his career-busting 1961-62 season. Last winter, early ankle troubles started him off on a hard-luck campaign.

Bockhorn is known as one of the most rugged guards in the NBA. He is a good defensive man, a pretty fair passer and a frequent "hot-hand" shooter. Bobby Wanzer, first Cincinnati Royals coach, said of rookie Bockhorn in '58: "He will make the clutch play—He can't stand to lose." Since then, Wanzer has proven an excellent prophet.

Reared on a Southern Illinois farm as one of 10 children, Bockhorn has been tintyped for his endless hustle, aggressiveness and stubborn refusal to face defeat ever since his NBA start. He plays equally hard in training camp and practice as he does during a league game. Quite a few fallen rookies can testify to his intense play.

The Royals' "Old Reliable" has never been a bench-warmer. He stepped into the Royals' lineup immediately in '58 following the retirements of George King and Richie Regan, now head basketball coaches at West Virginia and Seton Hall Universities, respectively.

Bockhorn has played in 357 consecutive regular-season games plus 16 playoff games. A twisted ankle in December of his rookie year kept him out of one game.

Bucky is a Cincy favorite. Fans remember the '59-'60 night at Detroit when he held now-retired Bob Cousy to a 4-for-27 shooting night as the Royals stopped a record 17-game winning Boston streak. Or, it might have been the night he sank 11 straight first-half field goals without a miss (club record) en route to his 36-point career-best show in 45 minutes.

He made 17 of 26 shots from the field in that historic game.

Co-captain at University of Dayton, Buck helped UD to a 69-17 three-year record. In the '57 National Invitational Tournament (NIT) against Elgin Baylor's Seattle club, Bockhorn canned 24 points and grabbed 22 rebounds.

His 1962-63 highs: 24 points vs. New York at home, Jan. 19th; 13 rebounds vs. San Francisco at home, Oct. 28th; and 8 assists vs. Chicago at Dayton, Jan. 27. Those 13 rebounds are his career high along with 12 assists vs. Philadelphia there, Jan. 18, 1962.

The Dayton family includes wife Peggy and sons David Arlen, born June 7, 1959 and Daniel Alan, born July 27, 1960. Off-season occupation: Real estate and home improvements.

Robert Lewis Boozer has to undergo a season of adjustment with the Royals: For the past two seasons, he has been a consistent Royals' starter. With Jerry Lucas now on the scene, Boozer must compete with the other Royals' frontliners for game action as a "sub" as well as an occasional starter.

Bob should be a prominent member of the club this season, any way you look at him, simply because of his fine three-year background. He has been among the team's most improved annually: Check his growth in scoring and rebounds since 1960.

The Nebraskan was fourth-best Royals' scorer and shooter among the regulars and the No. 2 rebounder on the team. He was the defensive stopper among the forwards and this may be reflected by his team-leading 299 personal fouls and eight game disqualifications.

Boozer tied his 28-point career high game Nov. 14th at home against Syracuse in a 39-minute performance: He hit 8 of 13 field goals and 12 of 14 free throw shots. He had 19 rebounds, too. The first time he hit 28 he made 9-16 FG and 10-13 FT, posting 12 rebounds (see top).

His other career highs: 20 rebounds, 7 assists, 18 FGAs, 11 FGMs, 14 FTAs and 12 FTMs. In playoffs, he has scored 21 points, 16 rebounds, and 4 assists.

Bob's 19 rebounds in that Nov. 14th Syracuse home tussle was his season's high, tied with a similar home show against Detroit on Christmas Night... In a 25-pointer at Boston Feb. 19th, he sank 11 of 17 field shots... His 12-14 in free throws Nov. 14th vs. Syracuse and 10-11 vs. Detroit Nov. 10th were highs.

Top draft choice of the Royals in '59, Boozer played one season with Peoria 'Cats of the NIBL and went on to help '60 Olympic team win gold medals before signing his first pro contract that same year.

Strong Bob has developed his driving particularly with the Royals... He is noted for his high, long jump shots from the corners and foul stripe... Played against Oscar in '59 NCAA Midwest Regional tournament... Bob was twice Player of the Year in Big Eight circuit.

Bob was commercial art major at K-State... He and Tom Thacker are lone Royals bachelors... Spent first off-season in Cincy last spring and summer as public relations representative for Burger Beer.

Wayne Richard Embry looms to be an important factor in the championship efforts of the Royals this season. He must strive to make his sixth pro season the best in the rebound phase, attempting to match his scoring with his boardwork. A ferocious rebounding Embry will have much to do with the Royals enjoying their most successful year in Cincinnati.

Goose is recognized as one of the league's Big Four pivot-men. Some say he is the strongest NBA center because of his massive physique. Don't let his size fool you: He shows good speed for a 250-pound "tank"!

Big Wayne had the second-best season of his career in 1962-63, following his '61-'62 top figures. He might have matched those statistics had it not been for a bruised right hand (his shooting arm) which put him on the sidelines for three games and hindered his late-season play.

A serious cold knocked him out of his third East-West All-Star game appearance in January plus one other league game.

Last season, Goose closely approached his career highs of 37 points (see top of page) and 25 rebounds (at LA 3-12-62): He scored 34 points at LA Nov. 24th and posted 24 rebounds Nov. 7th at home vs. Boston.

Embry's other career top marks: 12 assist vs. Syracuse at home, 1-1-62 plus 18 FGMS, 34 FGAs and 11 FTMs.

Wayne's goals include breaking Maurice Stokes' Royals rebound records of 1,142 for the season ('57-'57) and 30 for a game (vs. Boston at home, 11-8-57). And, no doubt "Maurie" hopes to see Goose attain these feats. Stokes averaged better than 18 grabs in 63 games to set his mark. Embry needs a 14-plus average in 80 games this season to set a new high.

At nearby Miami, Goose was a two-time All-Mid American Conference star, racking up many offensive school marks. He was a Class AA all-state performer at Tecumseh High at the same time as major leaguers Bill Mazeroski and Frank Howard.

Tom Hawkins has been the Royals' biggest conquest by the trading route over the past several years. He came to the Royals from Los Angeles just before the club's 1962 training camp opened. The Royals' price for Tommy? Just their No. 2 draft choice last April from a generally-agreed weak senior college crop.

He was an immediate success with the Royals last season: The Tommyhawk gave the Royals immediate frontline spark whenever he entered a game... He is generally acclaimed the NBA's second-best sixth man... His leaping antics on rebounds and blocking shots won him Royals' fans overnight.

Last winter was Tom's best of his NBA career with 543 rebounds and a 48 percent field-goal shooting mark. It was his second-best scoring season.

Despite his 6'5" size, the Royals even used Tom in a three-forward frontline setup during some games against foes, probably because of the Hawk's ability to defense players much taller than himself with his shot blocks.

Tom's best scoring game last season was Feb. 27th against New York at home with a 24-point flurry: In 29 minutes, he counted 9-10 FGs and 6-8 FTs. He had 14 rebounds... He had 15 rebounds at Syracuse in a March 26th playoff game for another top mark... Against his ex-teammates at LA on Nov. 24th, Tom had 9-11 FGs in a 21-point, 26-minute effort.

The Hawk was a key in the Royals' 12 playoff games as he hit 51 percent of his field shots (46-91).

Jumping-jack Tom was the No. 3 shooter on the Royals last winter, the fifth-best rebounder despite his 22-minutes' action per outing and the sixth-leading player in minutes played (1,721).

An All-American at Notre Dame, Tom was the Lakers' top draft pick in '59 while they were still at Minneapolis... Fans compare his jumping talents continually to those of Jumpin' Johnny Green.

His career highs: 32 points, 15 rebounds, 5 assists, 21 FGAs, 15 FGMs, 11 FTAs and 9 FTMs. In playoff games, Tom has had 16 points, 15 rebounds and 5 assists.

Tom and Doris Hawkins head a family which includes Kevin (born Oct. 2, 1959), Karel (born Aug. 6, 1961) and Traci Doran (born Nov. 4, 1962). Off-season occupation: Great Western Financial Corp., Los Angeles, public relations.

Jerry Ray Lucas requires reams of copy to fairly describe insofar as his basketball notoriety since his junior high school days. He easily can qualify as one of the most publicized players since the 1930 days of Stanford's great Hank Luisetti. Just for a start, consider this morsel: Big Luke is the first and only three-time All-American in both high school and college.

Oscar Robertson has put the Royals in contention three straight years and the addition of Jerry may complete the Royals' efforts for a first-class contender for division, league and playoff honors. Lucas may be the so-called "big man" the Royals have sought as a rebounder as well as a scorer.

The Royals' 1962 high school territorial choice, tapped actually in 1958 when a Middletown, O. High School senior, showed in fall training drills that he has the moves, scoring ability and ruggedness to be a cornerman in the NBA. Anyone who has ever seen him play knows his jump and one-hand set shots, his speed going both ways, his sneaky blocks of foes' shots and his excellent passing ability.

One of only four college All-Americans all three varsity years (Oscar, Terry Dischinger and Tom Gola are the others), Jerry was the nation's Player of the Year two seasons. He was the most valuable player in the Big Ten three years (first player to do so) and most valuable player of seven of eight major tournaments represented by Ohio State, his alma mater.

It was Lucas who powered OSU's Buckeyes to the 1960 NCAA championship as a sophomore and runnerup honors in the '61 and '62 classics, three Big Ten titles, a 78-6 overall record, a 32-game win streak and many, many other marks.

Jerry led the nation's field goal shooters three straight years. After his sophomore season, he paced the U.S. Olympic team at Rome through an 8-0 championship record with 138 points in eight games. Olympic Coach Pete Newell said later: "Jerry is the finest player I've ever coached."

Luke was one of 10 Big Ten athletes to receive the conference Medal of Honor for proficiency in both sports and scholarship. . . . In 1961, he made an AAU team tour through Russia, helped the Yanks to an 8-0 record and fulfilled a desire to learn about the Russians.

His Middletown High School exploits are legendary: 2,460 points in 77 varsity games for a 31.95 average . . . Led Middies to 76-1 record over three years, two state crowns, 76-game winning streak . . . First Buckeye to win All-Ohio honors three years . . . As a Middie senior, he was class president and met his wife, Treva, the night of team's only loss of his career, the state semi-finals. She was Columbus North (Middies' only loss) student at the time.

Sports Illustrated named Jerry its 1962 Sportsman of Year despite Roger Maris' homer-hitting exploits the preceding summer.

Enoch Eli Olsen III is no doubt the darkhorse of this season's Royals despite his second-year status... He saw little service last season as a rookie, averaging but seven minutes per game in 52 outings... He will get ample opportunity under Jack McMahon to prove himself as a relief man on the Royals' frontline.

Bud was the Royals' No. 2 draft choice in '62 behind Jerry Lucas... The Royals were attracted to him because of his defense and rebounding and secondly, due to his scoring abilities... He graduated as Louisville's fourth-best career scorer with 1,192 points in 80 varsity games.

He is a favorite with Royals' fans and officials alike, probably because of both his likeable personality and his fine "bit" showings. He has shown the ruggedness, shooting and rebound abilities and most of all, excellent passing talents as a cornerman to be a mainstay in the NBA.

Cincy fans saw Bud's top rookie game at Indianapolis over TV Feb. 13th against Syracuse: He scored 13 points in 16 minutes' play, shot 6-for-8 in field goals and grabbed 7 rebounds... In 18 minutes Nov. 10th at home against Detroit, he scored 12 points and 6 assists.

Bud had three top 7-rebound games last season... He counted 5 assists in 12 minutes at home Jan. 13th against St. Louis... He saw 10 minutes or more play in 14 games... In five '63 playoff games, Olsen made 7 of 9 field shots for a .778 mark.

Captain his final year, he showed 13.2 rebounds per outing... An All-Ohio scholastic star, Bud played alongside of Jerry Lucas and John Havlicek in the North-South All-Star game at Troy, O. in '58.

Bud has been a travelling man: He was born at Gary, Ind., spent some schooling at Vincennes, Ind., finished high school at Dayton, O. and now lives near Cincinnati Gardens following his four Louisville years. His parents now live in Indianapolis: He's one of four boys in family of six children.

Bud and his wife Donna are parents of Kimberly Paige, born Jan. 1, 1963... Off-season occupation: Royals' season ticket salesman.

Oscar Palmer Robertson is without a doubt Mr. Basketball of the NBA, the pros' most complete player, the best combination star when it comes to scoring, passing and rebounding, and the main key to any championship hopes the Royals have in 1963-64.

After three years, Oscar leaves little unsettled when it comes to his status in the NBA. He has been a first-five NBA All-Star all three years. Big O has been the most valuable player once and the honor's runnerup twice in the East-West All-Star game.

Said Laker Coach Fred Schaus after the '63 classic: "Oscar has been on the winning team three years in a row (West twice before East in '63). It must mean something." He now has one of the Top Five field goal shooting marks in All-Star play, 26-for-48 (.541) in three games.

Among the many accolades he received, Oscar earned the Hickox belt award for March '63, making him a candidate for the year's diamond belt prize. As teammate Jack Twyman once publicly introduced him, Ozz is "the greatest basketball player in the world."

As a third-year pro, Big O last winter set two new Royals' club records: His .518 field goal showing was not only a new team high but placed third in the NBA. He played 3,521 total minutes for the other standard.

Besides his many Royals' records, Oscar is the NBA's assists standard-bearer with 899 total and 11.4 game average of 1961-62. He had the second-best marks to Guy Rodgers of the Warriors last winter. In the playoffs last spring, "Robby" set a new NBA mark by sinking 21 free throws at Boston April 10th. His .864 overall free throw showing led '63 playoffers and his 21-for-22 (.955) second.

Robertson's best scoring games last season were three 43-point efforts against the Celtics: On Jan. 23rd, he sank 16-24 FGs and 11-13 FTs, coupled with 9 rebounds and 13 assists . . . On March 28th at Boston, he hit 17-25 FGs and 9-12 FTs with 14 rebounds and 10 assists . . . In the seventh playoff game, he dropped 11-24 FGs and 21-22 FTs, adding 6 rebounds and 6 assists, April 10th at Boston.

His best passing nights were two 19-assist performances: Against Chicago at Indianapolis Dec. 13th and at home versus San Francisco on Jan. 4th . . . In rebounds, he grabbed 20 off Chicago Dec. 21st.

Ozz led both the club's scoring, rebounds and assists twice '62-'63. . . He scored 40 points or more 11 times, three of which came during the playoffs. . . He posted 15 assists or more four times . . . And, he showed 15 rebounds or more in 14 contests.

His career highs: 22 rebounds at Phila. 11-15-61, 22 assists vs. Syracuse 10-29-61, 34 FGAs, 19 FGMs, 22 FTAs and 21 FTM, In playoffs: 43 points, 19 rebounds and 15 assists.

The Robertsons include wife Yvonne and daughter Shana Yvonne, born April 6, 1962. The stork is expected in January. Off-season occupation: Cincinnati Pepsi Cola Co. special representative.

Adrian Howard Smith has been the explosive, sparkplug "formula" to the Royals' backcourt crew the past two seasons with his ability to speed up the club's offense during moments of slow and indifferent floor play.

Smith averaged but 18 minutes a game as a rookie and 19 minutes as a sophomore but his service has been important: Look at his perfect attendance record in 160 regular-season games the past two seasons to prove his need to the team.

He is a top-notch outside shooter, a sneaky scat-like driver and can both set up the play and make it, too. If he has lacked anything, it might be confidence but he has gained quite a bit over the past two seasons.

Odie improved his play in all phases as a second-year pro last winter. His 81 percent free throw shooting tied Oscar Robertson and Jack Twyman for top team honors.

His new career one-game scoring high of 22 points came in 30 minutes of action, Smith hitting 7-of-13 fielders and 8-of-8 free throws.

In the March 28th playoff game at Boston, Odie registered 8 assists for a new individual high. Although he is but 6'1", he once counted 9 rebounds with the Royals and last season, he had 8 against New York at Cincy in a 34-minute stint Feb. 27, 1963.

Off the court, Smith is a very friendly person and as he labels himself "a country boy." Odie has but one principal interest: Basketball. He's dedicated to the sport.

Smith's career began to shine after receiving honorable mention All-Kentucky at Farmington High. The major schools overlooked him due to his height so he went to Northeast Mississippi Junior College.

In two years at Northeast, Smith averaged 24.0 points in 64 games. At Kentucky, he helped the Wildcats win the '58 NCAA championship with their "Fiddlin' Five" combination.

Smitty played with Oscar, Lucas, Arnette and Boozer on the Yanks' '59 Pan-American Games champs and the '60 Rome Olympic titlists during his two-year Army stint. With the NIBL's Akron Goodyears in '60-'61, Odie counted a 20.8 norm over 31 games.

Adrian married the former Miss Paula Jones of Mayfield, Ky. on Sept. 8, 1962, 12 days before the Royals' training camp opened.

Off-season occupation: First National Bank, Cincinnati.

Thomas Porter Thacker, lone player tapped by the NBA's territorial draft procedure in April '63, was a unanimous All-American and one of four top seniors in the nation during the 1962-63 season.

He missed Royals' pre-season training last fall because of the Army reserve's active six-months program: As a member of the 83rd Infantry Division, he trained at Fort Jackson, S. C. and did not join the Royals until Oct. 22nd.

In three varsity seasons, Thacker was a key performer as the Bearcats won 82 games and lost but 7, swept two NCAA championships and posted one runnerup finish.

Lone Royals '63 draft pick to make the squad, Tom graduated as UC's fourth-highest all-time scorer, following teammates Oscar Robertson and Jack Twyman and Baltimore's Paul Hogue.

Thacker's play in college won him numerous post-season acclaim last spring: He played in the East-West All-Star games at Kansas City and Lexington, totaling 28 points and 28 rebounds in the two contests. He counted 24 in two outings with the NCAA University All-Stars in the Pan-American Games trials.

A selection on the all-star teams of the NCAA Midwest Regional and national tourneys the past two seasons, Tom was recognized on the "first fives" chosen by six All-American groups.

At William Grant High School, Covington, Thacker led that school to the state quarter-finals in the '59 tourney. In his top schoolboy game against Erlanger St. Henry, he had 36 rebounds... He toted 43 points and 35 rebounds against Danville, Ky. Bates... Tack won all-state honors two years, first team as a senior.

In his best college game, Tom sank 9 of 18 field goal tries against Houston... He showed 22 rebounds against Tulsa as a junior and 9 assists versus Bradley as a sophomore for other college highs.

As a senior, he was the team's second-best scorer and rebounder. He was the No. 2 rebounder and No. 3 scorer as a junior. As a sophomore, he was third in both phases.

Thacker scored in double-figures in 25 of 28 senior games, including the last 22 straight... He has the reputation for making the clutch plays: Against Bradley as a soph, he showed game highs of 22 points, 11 rebounds and 9 assists in a one-point win. He had 21 points in '62 NCAA title win over Ohio State and 15 points in '61 national crown victory over same club.

He and Boozer are the Royals' lone bachelors this season... His off-season occupation in '63 was with Uncle Sam in active Army duty.

John Kennedy Twyman has established himself over the past eight seasons as one of the NBA's sharpest shooting forwards, one of the league's better outside marksmen and among the top offensive players. Oldest Royal in point of service:

He has played 602 consecutive regular-season games to rank among the "Iron Men" of the pro circuit. He has never missed a league or playoff game since 1955 and only counted his first absence from an exhibition contest during '63 pre-season workouts, all this prior to '63-'64 campaign.

Twyman is the fifth-ranking pointmaker among the NBA's all-time scorers with 13,058 points for a 21.7 average. Only active player ahead of in the bucket derby is St. Louis' Bob Pettit who started the '63-'64 campaign with 17,566 points. If Dolph Schayes decides to play besides coach the 76'ers, he will head this trio with 19,115 points.

Jack had his second-best season of his career last winter in both field goal and free throw percentages. It was his lowest scoring year since the '57-'58 winter, granted, but his 1,335 field goal tries were his lowest since that same year.

Twyman has proof he can shoot with the best: He has posted 48 percent or better from the field the past three seasons. His .452 in '57-'58 led the NBA, his .488 was second in '60-'61 and his .479 in '61-'62 ranked third.

Jack's memorable top career points game (59) showed him making 21-39 FGs, 17-20 FTs and 14 rebounds in 45 minutes.

Last winter, his best games were a pair of 35-pointers: Jan. 4th versus 'Frisco at home on 15-25 EG shooting and Jan. 8th against Syracuse at Dayton on 15-24 FG firing. He had 18 rebounds March 13th against Syracuse at home and 17 in that Jan. 4th Warriors date.

His other career highs: 47 FGAs, 22 FGMs, 21 FTAs, 17 FTMs, 26 rebounds and 8 assists. In playoffs, he has had top games of 31 points and 14 rebounds.

At LA in January, Jack played in his sixth East-West All-Star game, popping 6 of 12 shots for 12 points. In the '60 game at Philadelphia, he scored 27 points. Career-wise, his 38-68 All-Star field goal record (.558) ranks second only to Wilt Chamberlain's .565.

Jack is known nationally for his guardian efforts on behalf of Maurice Stokes, the ailing one-time Royal who has been in Cincinnati's Christ Hospital since 1958 with post-traumatic encephalitis.

The Twyman family includes wife Carole, daughters Lisa Ann (born Sept. 1, 1957) and Julie Ann (born Sept. 7, 1962) and son John Kennedy Jr. (born May 15, 1960). Off-season occupation: Twyman, Dunning, Berg, Temple and Associates, insurance.

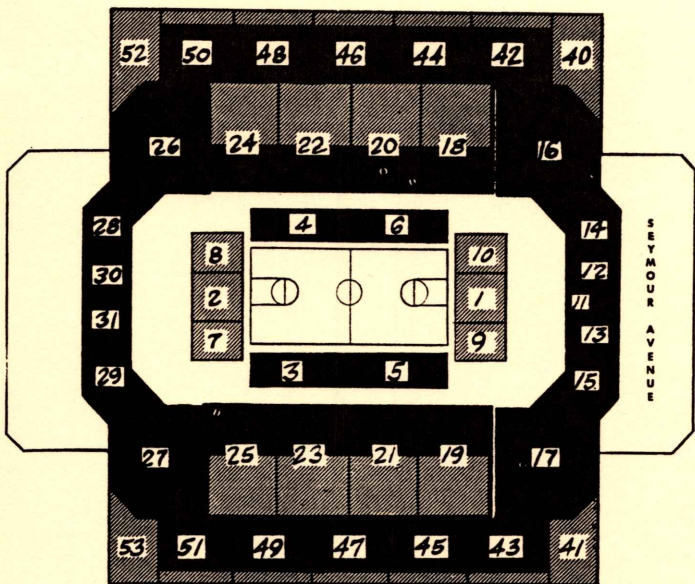
