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## David C. Trager

Dave Trager, President of the Chicago Packers Basketball Club is one of the midwest's most ardent sportsmen. He has been a rabid fan of all sports, both amateur and professional since his school days, but always has had a special interest in basketball.

A busy executive as President of the Associated Life Insurance Co. Mr. Trager is now devoting a great deal of his energy in the promotion of NBA basketball in Chicago. With his associates in the professional sports venture his main ambition is to give the sports fans of Chicagoland a team they can be proud to support and will bend every effort to achieve that result.

This is not Dave Trager's first sports promotion. He was actively associated in the staging of boxing and wrestling shows at Rainbo Gardens a few years ago.

A graduate of the Kent College of Law Mr. Trager has made his home in Chicago most of his life. He is married and his wife Elizabeth is as much a sports fan as he is. The Tragers have one daughter, Lynn, a student at Ohio State University.

# Meet Jim Pollard Chicago Packers Coach

Few men, if any, are better qualified than Jim Pollard to direct the Chicago Packers in this, their rookie season in the National Basketball Association. Pollard, 39, has spent most of his years on the basketball court and has had coaching and playing experience at virtually every level of competition.

He was a standout from the beginning, as a seventh and eighth grader at Lafayette grammar school in Oakland, Calif., his home-town. He was named to California all-state high school team when he competed at Oakland Tech. and as a sophomore led his teammates to the first of three successive state championships.

Pollard attended Stanford University for two years and played one year of varsity basketball. It was in 1941-42, a memorable season for, as a sophomore, he led the Trojans to the NCAA title. Though he missed the NCAA title game because of illness he, nevertheless, was selected as the "Player of the Year" and as a starting forward on all of the All-American teams.

He spent the next three years with the United States Coast Guard. He played basketball during his last year in the service, leading his Coast Guard unit, which was stationed in Honolulu, to the 13th Naval District championship. Pollard topped the league in scoring, was named the Most Valuable Player.

After his discharge he played two years in the National AAU League, first with the San Diego Doris and then with the Oakland Bittners. Honors followed. He was the league's MVP with both clubs and then, in 1947, started his career as a professional with the Minneapolis Lakers of the NBA.

His career with the Lakers was such that it requires no detailed telling at this point. For six years he was chosen on the NBA's all-pro team. One year he was selected for the highest of all possible honors—his fellow professionals voting him the Players' Basketball Player.

George Mikan, who was to become Mr. Basketball and set numerous professional scoring records, was the Lakers' starting center during Pollard's career. A lesser player than Pollard would have been completely overshadowed. Somewhere in Pollard's attic (in suburban Mount Prospect where he now lives with his wife and three children) is a clipping from a Minneapolis paper which testifies to Pollard's status as a pro. The headline reads:

#### MIKAN JOINS POLLARD ON LAKERS

Statistics weren't kept in all categories during much of Pollard's NBA career. But he was one of the most versatile players in the league and always among the top ten in scoring, rebounds and assists. This is akin to winning the triple crown in baseball—in batting, homers and runs batted in.

Pollard ended his career as a player after the 1954-55 season and has since coached at DeLaSalle College in Philadelphia, and also returned in 1959-60 to direct the Lakers, taking a club that had finished last the season before and boosting it into second place, narrowly missing catching the St. Louis Hawks for the Western Division title.

It was with understandable pride several months ago when Dave Trager, after acquiring the Chicago NBA franchise, announced: ". . . that we have hired the finest man possible to coach the Packers." Trager was referring, of course, to James Pollard.

# National Basketball Association

The National Basketball League has begun its sixteenth season of operation and there's a distinctly new look to the circuit. There is one new franchise, the Chicago Packers, and it is the first expansion of the league in many years. Since 1954 the NBA has been an eight team organization, now it's nine and further growth is being contemplated.

With the beginning of this new season the teams in the league, including the Packers are all shouting the same old war cry, "Beat the Celtics and the Hawks." The Celtics and the Hawks are Boston and St. Louis, the current champions of the Eastern and Western Divisions and the teams to knock off their top perch this season.

This will be the first year in 12 that Chicago has been represented and the new club and new ownership possesses the energy and determination, plus the roster to give the fans the rugged hard fighting type of basketball they want to see.

The Packers have the toughest row to hoe. New clubs always have a rough time. But coach Jim Pollard, a playing great in his day knows what faces him and he's ready for it.

The nine clubs in the league are, the Eastern division, Boston Celtics, New York Knickerbockers, Philadelphia Warriors, and the Syracuse Nationals. Western division, St. Louis Hawks, Los Angeles Lakers, Cincinnati Royals, the Detroit Pistons and the Chicago Packers.

Aside from Pollard, the new coaches in the NBA are associated with eastern clubs. Frank McGuire, former mentor at the University of North Carolina, with whom he won a NCAA championship in 1957, succeeds Neil Johnson as coach of the Philadelphia Warriors.

Eddie Donovan, who masterminded the St. Bonaventure Bonnies to the National Invitational title last spring, replaces Carl Braun as coach of the New York Knickerbockers, Eastern Division cellar-dwellers the past two years.

The other Eastern coaches include Arnold (Red) Auerbach, shooting for his fourth consecutive world's championship in his twelfth year at the Boston helm, and Alex Hannum, starting his second season at Syracuse.

In addition to Pollard at Chicago, Western mentors are Paul Seymour at St. Louis, Fred Schaus at Los Angeles, Dick McGuire at Detroit and Charley Wolf at Cincinnati. All, curiously, are in their second season with their current clubs.

But now for a closer look at the clubs:

Boston—Although the Celts lost Sharman, they gained Carl Braun and the former Knick coach, who sat out last season, could be just the "old head" the club needs to win again. The set-shot artist, working with the incomparable Bob Cousy and Sam and K. C. Jones, provides Red Auerbach with the deepest backline in the game.

Bill Russell, the demon defenseman, is still about the best pivot in the game for all-around value, and up front Auerbach can call on Tommy Heinsohn, Jim Loscutoff, Frank Ramsey, the swing man who also doubles as a backliner, Tom Sanders, who found himself in the second half last season and finished fast, and Gene Guarilia.

At Philadelphia, Frank McGuire takes over what had been a hot seat. Success will depend on his ability to mesh Wilt Chamberlain, the No. 1 headliner in the game today, and a number of lesser lights into a smooth machine.

One of McGuire's first steps after taking over the club was to shift Tom Gola to the front line. As a result of the move, McGuire now can place on the floor the equivalent of a "seven-man team," with Gola and Ed Conclin able to play the front or back, along with Chamberlain. Paul Arizin, who terminated his "retirement" just before the Warriors went into training, and Guy Rodgers.

The Syracuse Nats always crowd-pleasers under dynamic Alex Hannum, whether winning or losing, will rely on ageless Dolph Schayes, the game's only 17,000 point-maker; Dave Gambee, Johnny Kerr, Swede Halbrook and Bob Hopkins, attempting a comeback after a year's layoff, up front, and Larry Costello, Hal Greer and Al Bianchi in the back.

The New York ranks possess many newcomers. Still around are Willie Naulls, Richie Guerin, Phil Jordon, Johnny Green, Dave Budd and Darrall Imhoff. Coach Donovan expects good mileage from rookies Whitey Martin and Sam Stith, St. Bonaventure; Bill Smith, St. Peter's; George Blaney, Holy Cross, and Cleveland Buckner, Jackson State. A young and ambitious squad.

Swinging to the West, the Hawks are rated very strong. With matchless Bob Pettit, Cliff Hagan and Clyde Lovellette dividing the scoring burden up front, Seymour will try to scrape up more punch on the back line.

Si Green, an in-and-outer heretofore, has made Seymour's eyes bulge in pre-season exhibitions.

Other backliners include Johnny McCarthy, Cleo Hill from Winston-Salem Teachers; Fred LaCour and Al Ferrari.

If the Lakers pick up where they left off last spring as tormentors of the Hawks, the Western Division flag could very well go to the West Coast, come March. The Lakers, for the second year in succession, pushed the Hawks to the seven-game limit before succumbing in the playoffs.

A year ago, Elgin Baylor and Jerry West averaged 51 points a game between them. With added experience under West's belt, that figure should jump several points this year.

With Rudy LaRusso and Tom Hawkins sharing the front line with Baylor and Frank Selvy and Rod Hundley teaming up with West, the Lakers feature four players who can run-run-run all night, and score besides. At center, however, the Lakers need help. Ray Felix and Jim Krebs split the chores last season, but neither scored consistently.

The Detroit Pistons rate the nod as the most-improved old club in the division. Coach Dick McGuire has come up with two rookie prizes in Johnny Egan from Providence and Ray Scott, who played one year at Portland University and three for the Allentown Jets of the Eastern League before becoming eligible for NBA play.

With the two kid hotshots, Tricky Dick has hold-overs Gene Shue, All-Star guard; Don Ohl, Chuck Noble and Willie Jones for backline duty, and Walter Dukes, Bailey Howell, Bob Ferry, Shellie McMillon, George Lee and Jackie Moreland up front.

Any club that has Oscar Robertson and Jack Twyman, premier scorers, as Cincinnati does, is potentially strong.

Returnees include Wayne Embry, Bob Boozer and Hub Reed among the big fellows and Arlen Bockhorn in the backcourt.

That is the opposition the Packers have to face between now and the middle of March. A long hard season. The finest in basketball for Chicago fans with the greatest stars to ever play the game is being featured on the International Amphitheatre court.

# National Basketball Association Records

The National Basketball Association record book was rewritten completely by Wilt Chamberlain of the Philadelphia Warriors who smashed ten all-time records including a 38.3 per game average to become the first player in loop history to tally over 3,000 points with 3033. Dolph Schayes of Syracuse and Oscar Robertson of Cincinnati also had a share in the league record breaking.

Chamberlain's records are: Most points scored (3033); highest average (38.3); most field goals attempted (2479); most field goals scored (1251); most free throws attempted (1054); highest field goal percentage (.505); most rebounds (2149); highest rebounding average (27.2); most minutes played (3773); most games scoring 50 points (8).

The rookie, Robertson, created a new assist standard of 9.7 per game, but failed to exceed Boston's Bob Cousy on numerical set ups. Last season Cousy fed successfully 715 times to Robertson's 690 assists this season. Robertson, however, missed eight games this year due to a leg injury.

Schayes, with 680 free throws smashed Bob Pettit's record of 667 successful foul attempts made during the 58-59 campaign.

League scoring increased 2.8 points per game as compared with a 7.1 point increase a year ago.

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# Chicago Packers Organization

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When the National Basketball League decided to expand in 1959 the city everyone on the NBA expansion committee wanted back in major league basketball was Chicago. The question in the minds of the cage executives was who should be awarded the franchise and how soon? Chicago's love of sport was nationally known. Football, baseball, hockey and other athletic activities prospered. It was the Hub of the nation in both sports and industry and the ninth team in the NBA was destined from the start for the big city on the shores of Lake Michigan.

As soon as the news leaked out that the National Basketball Association was ready to increase in size, there was a ready market for the right to own and operate a team in Chicago. There was no scarcity of monied interests who wanted to become part of the circuit. Group after group was screened by the Selection committee and after thorough investigation and sifting of qualifications an organization of sportsmen headed by insurance company executive David Trager was awarded the franchise, but only after almost 15 months of negotiations.

Trager's syndicate was composed of six other prominent businessmen and sportsmen. Sam Karlov, of the Karlov Roofing Co. who was elected Vice-President; Charles Lubin, the head of the famed Sara Lee Kitchens (bakery firm) also elected Vice-President; Morrie Goldman, midwest investor and Chairman of the Board of the Associated Life Insurance Co. and many other interests, named Secretary; Will Chulock, prominent CPA who was given the post of Treasurer. Two realtors Henry Mann and Arthur Ludwig were named to the Board of Directors along with the other officers. Dave Trager, president of the Associated Life Ins. Co., the prime mover, was named President of the basketball club.

This group of realistic Chicago businessmen are gambling a half million dollars and their success in other fields in their efforts to successfully promote the major league brand of basketball in Chicagoland. They know NBA basketball will succeed in Chicago and they'll spare neither expense nor effort to give Chicago fans a team they can really cheer. The game has been given far greater national acceptance in the past decade and means far more to the average sports fan than it ever did in the past. That fact alone will prove a magnet for the fans. Stars of the magnitude of Bob Cousery and Bill Russell of the Boston Celtics, Wilt Chamberlain and Tom Gola of Philadelphia; Adolph Schayes of Syracuse, Oscar Robertson, the Big "O" of Cincinnati; Bob Pettit, the all round great and Cliff Hagan of St. Louis, Gene Shue of Detroit and the fabulous Elgin Baylor of Los Angeles' Lakers are now as well known as the greats of other sports and better than most.

The task that lay ahead of the management of the new Chicago club in establishing a lineup and roster to compete with the other teams in the league was a great one. The Directors knew that, and Dave Trager, who had much promotional experience in the entertaining and sports field as the operator of Chicago's Rainbo Gardens was handed the job of working with Maurice Podoloff, President of the NBA, and the league expansion committee in organizing the playing personnel.

The other club owners in the National Basketball Association welcomed the chance to expand under the proper auspices in Chicago. A plan to stock the new club with proven professional basketball players plus outstanding college cage talent was evolved and carried out. Jim Pollard, former Lakers star and one of the greatest players of all time, was named coach. He had done an excellent job as a college coach at Philadelphia's LaSalle College and as a pro mentor with the Minneapolis Lakers. He was persuaded to vacate a career as a sales executive in Minneapolis and take over the coaching task on a two-year contract.

The club management secured the International Amphitheatre on Chicago's south side as the home arena. The huge building is nationally known as the home of the National Stock Show, and is a building that has housed many exhibition basketball games, ice shows, horse shows, circuses and other events. The Amphitheatre has better parking facilities than any other indoor auditorium in the city. The visibility is without par and it will seat in the neighborhood of 9,000 fans for basketball.

The executive management of the Packers have installed sound professional basketball know-how in the day to day management of the club. Jerry Kobin, a member of the executive staff of the Lakers during their championship era in Minneapolis and the ticket director was named business manager. Harry Hannin, veteran promotional expert who staged the College All star cage games and many other events in Chicago, is General Manager. Jack Burnett, formerly sports director of W-G-N- and WBBM in Chicago, and publicity director of the Chicago Stadium and many other sporting and entertainment attractions, was named publicity director. Mickey Rottner, prominent in Chicago cage circles, heads the speakers' bureau. Ed Kelly, former C.Y.O. and Chicago Park District sports expert, is Director of Promotions.

He scored 646 points for 19 a game and picked off 458 rebounds, a 13.5 record. His shooting was deadly and his percentage was 43.9 from the field and 74.8 from the foul line.

Walker was drafted by St. Louis in the 1960 College pool. He didn't play for the Hawks and was traded by St. Louis to the Packers for Chicago's second draft choice next spring. Coach Jim Pollard, who tried to get Walker for his LaSalle College team when Horace was playing for Chester High School, is very high on the ex-Michigan State star.
