



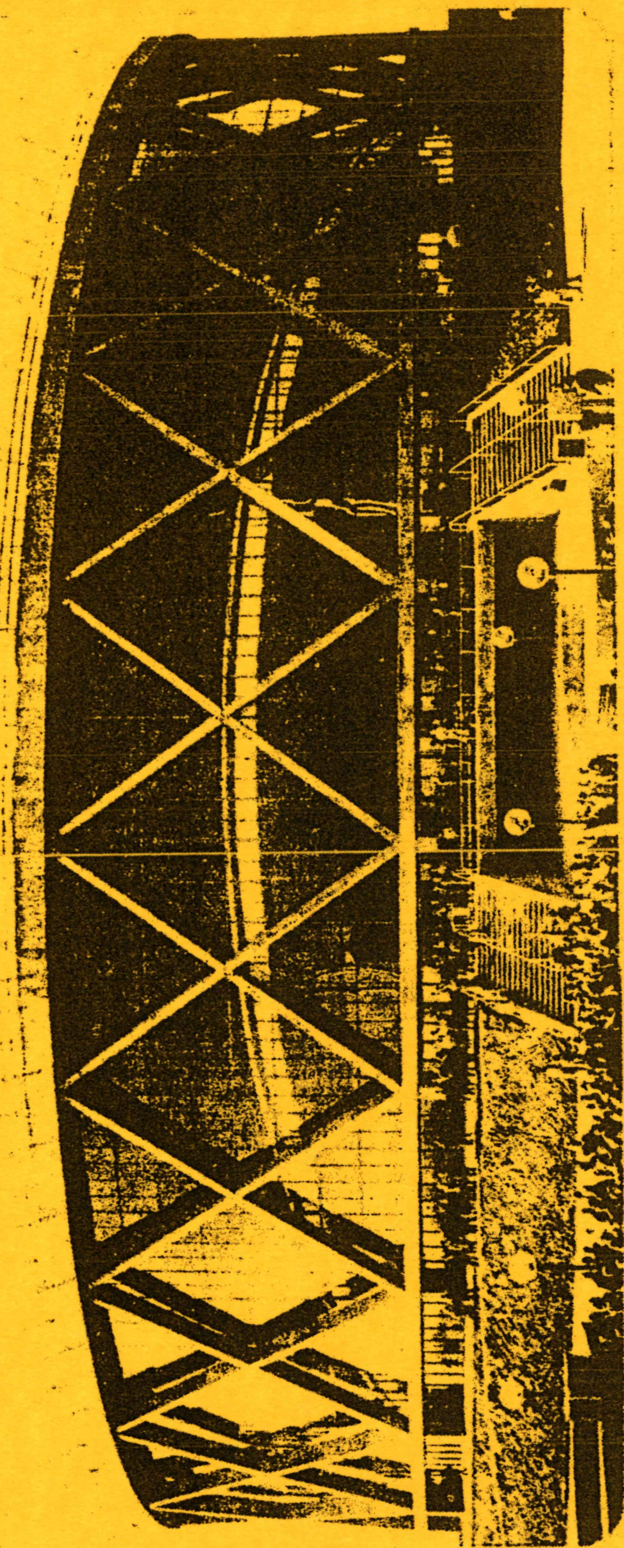

# OAKLAND OAKS STORY

Major League professional basketball has arrived in Oakland.

And make no mistake, the American Basketball Association is here to stay. Ditto for the Oakland Oaks.

Coach Bruce Hale and his Oaks are as alive as Pepsi or Coke, as vibrant as an Olympic sprint champion, and as exciting as, well, ABA basketball in Oakland!

The Oaks emerged from the drawing board on January 18, 1967 with the initial announcement that a new professional basketball league was being formed. Oakland was one of 11 cities awarded franchises.

Plenty of progress was being made until a reorganization on the ownership level developed in April and the franchise temporarily ceased to function. However, after Commissioner George Mikan considered the offer of several local groups to maintain the franchise in Oakland, Pat Boone, while fulfilling a singing engagement in Reno, announced that he had purchased 100 percent of the action. That was May 11.

From that point on, the Oakland franchise zoomed into orbit.

On May 18, Bruce Hale of the University of Miami (Fla.), was hired as coach and general manager.

On June 21, Oakland officially adopted its nickname, "Oaks," following a contest to determine the most fitting name. Actually, "Oaks" was the most popular name and a drawing was held to award the grand prize of two season tickets. John Leary, Oakland advertising man, won 'em.

Meanwhile, Coach Hale launched on a player safari, combing the country for the best available talent. And with his wide-flung reputation as a top-notch coach and gentleman, Hale made a runaway of the contract signing derby against the NBA.

The players came from all sections of the country: Al Salvadori from South Carolina, No. 5 pick of the Baltimore Bullets; Wes Bialosuknia from Connecticut, the 3rd choice of the St. Louis Hawks; Andy Anderson from Canisius College of Buffalo, No. 6 of the Boston Celtics, and Ron Franz from Kansas, No. 5 by the Detroit Pistons.

From the Eastern League Hale picked off two gems: Willie Porter from Harrisburg (Pa.) and Tennessee A&I, and Levern Tart from Wilkes-Barre (Pa.) and Bradley.

The ownership structure of the Oaks now consists of three major principals: Pat Boone, president; S. Kenneth Davidson, insurance executive from Los Angeles, vice-president, and Rick Barry.

**PAT BOONE**, at age 33, has crammed more excitement and activities into his young life than most people ever hope to.

The handsome, personable Boone is considered one of the finest singers today, popular with young and old alike; he has completed 13 movies, mostly in starring roles; hosts the Pat Boone Show, a daily network TV show; holds a B.S. degree in speech and English, graduating Magna Cum Laude from Columbia University; owns his own production company, Cooga Mooga, Inc.; has traveled around the world entertaining U.S. troops, and has received numerous honors from foreign countries; has authored two books, "Twist Twelve and Twenty," the top selling non-fiction book in 1959, and "Between You, Me and the Gatepost" with all proceeds going to charities, and has more than a hundred hit recordings to his credit.

In addition, he's quite a basketball player. In fact, he has a team in the Hollywood Studio League, the Cooga Moogas that includes Bill Cosby, Rafer Johnson, Gardner McKay, Don Murray and Denny "Tarzan" Miller.

Pat and his wife Shirley, daughter of Western recording star Red Foley, reside in Beverly Hills with their four lovely daughters: Cherry 12, Lindy 11, Debby 10, and Laury 8.

**S. KENNETH DAVIDSON**, besides being an avid basketball fan, lends an acute insight into the club's business aspect as a life insurance executive and property owner and developer.

Displaying a quiet, friendly exterior, Davidson is motivated by an insatiable desire to succeed in whatever venture he undertakes. Born in Hannibal, Ohio, Davidson, 44, now directs a highly successful Life Insurance firm, S. Kenneth Davidson and Company.

# Hale the Oaks' Coach!



A master tactician on the court, affable and a gentleman off the court.

That would describe Bruce Hale, Oakland's dynamic coach and general manager. Before being hired by Owner Pat Boone, Hale served 13 glorious years at the University of Miami (Fla.) where his Hurricanes blazed 12 straight winning seasons.

His teams from 1954 to 1967 won a total of 220 games, lost 112.

From 1963-65, when a young sharpshooter named Rick Barry crashed the headlines, Miami enjoyed further national prominence with an envious 65-16 record.

When Hale signed with Oakland, it was something of a homecoming.

A native of San Francisco, Hale graduated from Galileo High where he was All-City, then went on to star at Santa Clara. In three seasons with the Broncos (1939-41), Hale was a regular and the team's top scorer and leader.

During the Hale regime, Santa

Clara enjoyed prosperous campaigns, posting a total 47-15 record. In Hale's senior year ('41), when he was the leading scorer and team captain, the Broncos roared to a 17-3 record, which still is the school's best won-lost mark.

In 1963 Hale was inducted into Santa Clara's Hall of Fame.

After his graduation, Hale served four years in the Army Air Force. Before his discharge in 1945, Hale played at Moffett Field (Calif.) and Miami Beach (Fla.) and coached Wright Air Field (Dayton, O.) to a service title. He was also selected to the All-World Pro team in 1945.

Following his discharge, Hale put in 10 seasons in the NBA, mostly as a player, partly as a coach.

Hale is married to the former Doris Ravizza, his high school sweetheart. They have three children, Pam, married to pro basketball's Super Star Rick Barry; Alan, 16, and Bruce, Jr., 23. The Hales now reside in Oakland.

### THE HUSTLER PUTS ZIP INTO THE OAKS

A tremendous hustler, scorer and defender, he gives 100 per cent in every game. Outstanding long-range or medium shooter, one of Oaks' top three-point threats. Drafted No. 6 by Boston Celtics. Led Canisius' Golden Griffins in scoring (535) and rebounds (217) last season, elected team captain. A starter all three seasons, racked up career total of 1,173 points (17.0) and 425 rebounds. Holds Griffins' single-game scoring record of 46 points, set February 22, 1967 against LaSalle to break Oscar Robertson's Palestra Auditorium (Philly) record by one point. Played two years at forward, most of senior season at guard. Shot 83 per cent (129 of 157) from the free throw line in '67. A prep star at Maryvale High in Cheektowaga (N. Y.), he was All-Western Conference in football as a quarterback, in baseball as an infielder, as well as in basketball. Majored in German at Canisius. Married his high school sweetheart, Judy, last June 5. They now reside in Alameda.

### TOUGH TO PRONOUNCE AND STOP

Tough as his Polish name, young Wes should become one of the most exciting players in the ABA with his great three-point threat from the 25-foot range. In the Oaks' first eight games, he put away six three-pointers, one of the best marks in the league. A No. 3 draft choice of the St. Louis Hawks (Oakland's fourth pick), he was fifth-leading scorer in the NCAA last season with 673 points for a 28.0 average. Holds nearly every UConn record in book: most points in a single season (673), best single season average (28.0), most points in single game (50 versus Maine, 2-4-67), most career points three years (1,673), etc. His 85.9 per cent (159 of 185) free throw percentage last season ranked 11th in the nation. "Mr. B" led the Huskies in scoring all three years in compiling an overall 56-18 record, including 17-7 in '67. All-New England, All-Yankee Conference and loop's All-Academic three straight years. Topped UConn in scoring in 22 of 24 games last season with top marks of 50 and 38 against Maine, 40 and 38 against Rhode Island, 40 against Rutgers, 32 against New Hampshire, and 31 against Virginia. Carried a 3.0 grade average in economics during three years, making the Dean's roll each year. Earned 10 varsity letters in basketball, baseball and soccer (he was a goalie) at Franklin D. Roosevelt High, Hyde Park, New York in three years, graduating in 1963. After last season, he formed Bialosuknia All-Stars and barnstormed New England area with Jimmy Walker's All-Stars, scoring 76 points in one game. Shares apartment in Alameda with teammate Ron Franz.

BUCKEYE ALL-AMERICAN OWNS HANDSOME CREDENTIALS

After Lucas, Bradds; after Bradds. . . . Ohio State Coach Fred Taylor compiled a fabulous record since taking over in 1959, recruiting some fantastic talent, such as Jerry Lucas, John Havlicek, Larry Siegfried, Mel Nowell. . . and Gary Bradds! He joined Taylor's great varsity crew in 1961-62 to back up Lucas. Bradds jumped into the national spotlight the next two seasons, winning All-American honors both years. He led the Buckeyes in scoring and rebounding as a junior (672 points, 28.1, 31.2 rebounds) and senior (735, 31.6 and 32.2), and a share of two Big 10 Championships, plus percentage shooting in field goals and free throws. He ranks third on Ohio State's all-time scoring list behind Lucas and Robin Freeman with 1,530 points. Holds Ohio State's single-game scoring record of 49 set against Illinois (2-10-64). During one stretch in January and February of '64, Bradds scored 40 or more points in six consecutive games! After graduation in 1964, Bradds was the No. 1 draft choice of the Baltimore Bullets. After a year spent mostly watching veterans play, Bradds launched his teaching career in his hometown of Jamestown, and continued playing basketball on a part-time basis with the Columbus Comets of the North American League, leading all scorers in '66 with a 27.0 average. Was sitting out this season until the offer came from Oakland. A graduate of Greneville High ('60) where he was All-State. Gary and wife Eileen have two young girls, Melinda 2 1/2, and Lori Lynn 15 months.

### THE KID FROM K C HAS TOUCH, MUSCLES

Drafted 5th by the Detroit Pistons, No. 10 by Oakland, Franz is a strong board man and outside shooter. He was Jayhawks' leading rebounder last season with 185, and third in scoring with 334 points, 12.4 average. He now ranks 15th on KU's all-time scoring list with 737 points. Hauled in total of 472 rebounds in three years. Best '67 efforts were 22 points against Oklahoma, and 15 rebounds against Florida State. Very quick for a big man, positions himself well for good shots. A high school All-American at Kansas City's Bishop Ward High ('63), he was a subject of Sports Illustrated about the pressures encountered in college recruiting. Was team captain both in high school and college. Was very active in other college activities, such as Young Republicans, Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and a member of the KU Relays Committee. A major in business administration and a bachelor still, he shares an apartment in Alameda with Wes Bialosuknia.

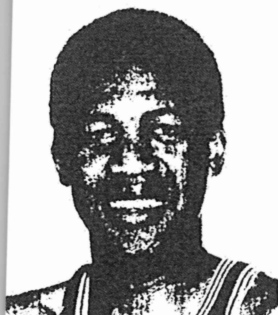

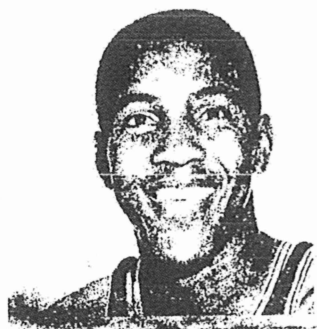

### THE RETURN OF JUMBO JIM

Hadnot has battled his way through much adversity to earn the starting center position with the Oaks. After graduating from Providence College in 1962 with All-American and All-Eastern honors, he was drafted by the Boston Celtics on the recommendation of fellow-Oaklander Bill Russell. Hadnot played through the Celts' 12 exhibition games but was released prior to the NBA opener. He joined the Oakland Oaks of the old ABL and was a starter until the loop went under. That was followed by a year (1963-64) with Trenton (N.J.) of the Eastern League, enjoying a resounding season by leading the team in rebounds, fourth in scoring, and was voted MVP in the All-Star game. However, he dropped out of competition after that, except for city league action in the East Bay, until Oakland became one of the franchise cities in the new ABA. At Providence he led the Friars in scoring and rebounding all three years, totaling 1,467 points, 1,299 rebounds (15.5 per game), making him school's all-time leader in rebounds, third in scoring. Top efforts: 43 points against Gonzaga ('60) and 35 rebounds against Niagara ('61). Led Friars to three straight NITs, winning it in 1962. Selected All-NIT three years; All-Northern California at Oakland's McClymonds High ('58) where he led Warriors to Tournament of Champions title under Coach Paul Harless. Resides in Berkeley with wife Norma, daughter Julie. Owns Hadnot's Liquors in Berkeley.

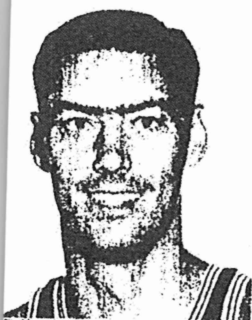

Speed and accuracy, tenacious defender makes this ex-Duck a valuable asset, despite his lack of greater height. Has developed into Oaks' reliable defense specialist. Was Oregon's top scorer in senior year ('64) with 422 points, 16. 2. Tallied 943 points (12. 1) during three-year career, plus 567 rebounds. Snared 253 rebounds in '64, nearly 10 per game. In addition, he usually was assigned opponents' top scorer. Was an All-City star at Portland's Franklin High ('60). During the last three years, he has been performing with the Jamaco Saints of Chicago and the San Francisco A.C. in the AAU. Still a bachelor, he resides in Berkeley.

### WHEATON WONDER PLAYS FIREMAN

Valuable No. 6 man who comes in and puts away quick buckets in crucial moments. Mel has this ability and does it well. Once played with the Baltimore Bullets ('64) but an illness forced him to cut short the season. Oldest player on the squad, but romps about like a young colt. Has great soft touch, effective up to 25 feet. Holds nearly every scoring record at Wheaton, including most points in single season 677 in 1958 as soph, best single-season average (24.1 in 1959 as junior), most three-year career rebounds (1,313), most career points for three years (1,951) and best career average (23.5 for three years). Led Crusaders in scoring and rebounding for four years (freshman eligible), graduating in 1960. AP and UPI Little All-American for three years, team MVP for four years, and elected team captain as senior. Was an All-American prep and All-Stater at Stephenson High ('56), Michigan, where he averaged 36.0 points per game. State's leading scorer, led Stephenson to State Class B Championship, scoring winning bucket in sudden death overtime (73-71). Served two years in Army, made U. S. Pan-American Games team in 1963. After stint with Bullets, settled down to teach and coach, mostly at Simi High in Southern California. Kept active by playing in tough Southern Cal Industrial League with Simi Valley All-Stars, averaging close to 40 points per game. Worked as a counselor with Job Corps at Camp Luna, Las Vegas, New Mexico last year. Wife Joan and two boys, Cary 5, Craig 2, reside in San Rafael.

### ABA "FIRST"

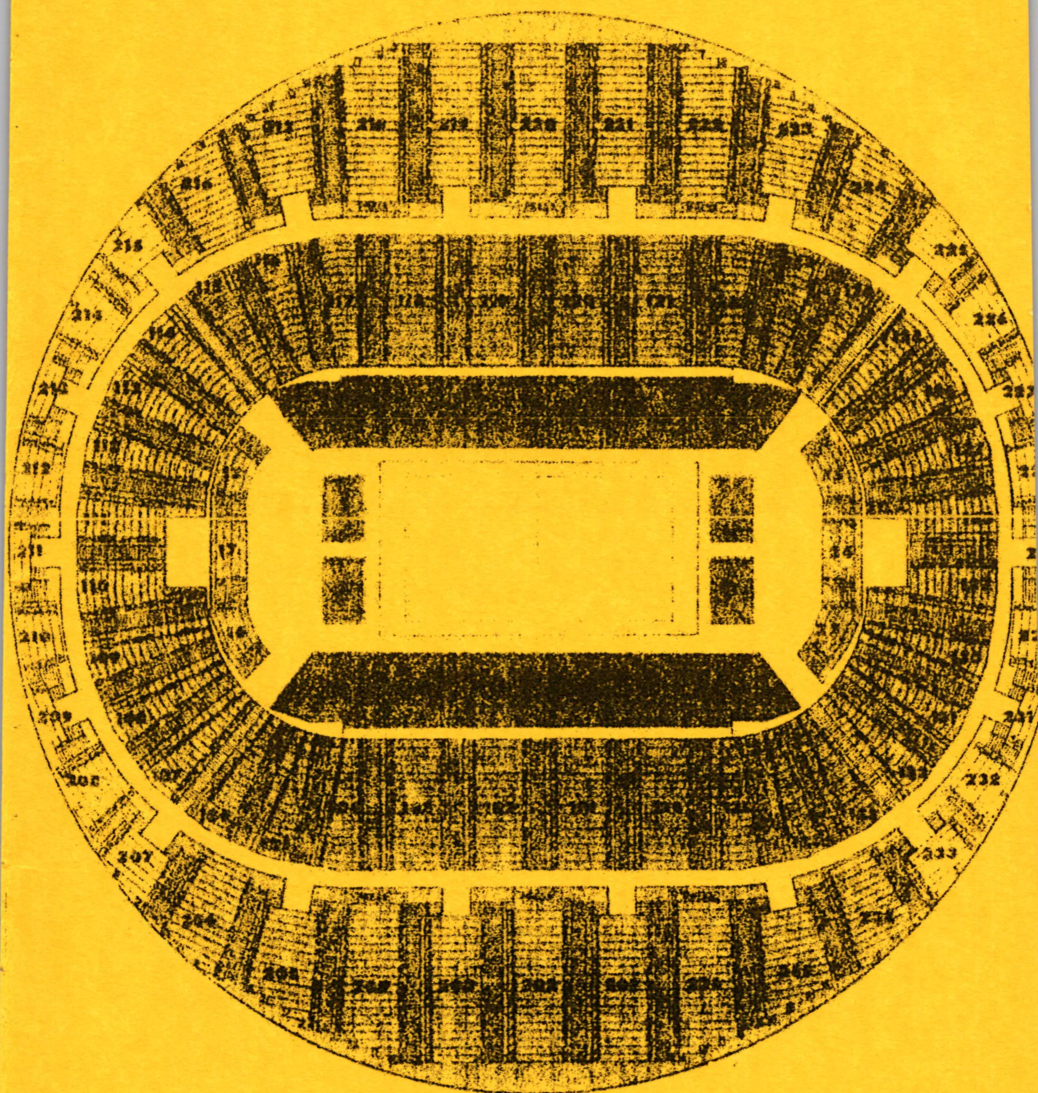
