Head Coach James Conzelman

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Although he is making his debut as coach of the Chicago Cardinals after a highly successful tenure at Washington U. of St. Louis, Jimmy Conzelman is no stranger to professional football. Years ago — when franchises sold for \$50 instead of the \$200,000 they do now — Conzelman was one of professional football's brightest stars. He started with the old Staleys in Decatur, later to become the Bears, in 1920. From there he went to Milwaukee, where he doubled as quarterback and coach of the Milwaukee Badgers. His pro grid trail then led to Detroit, a franchise Conzelman bought and sold for \$50. From Detroit, the gray-haired Jimmy went to Providence, where he attained his greatest heights as coach. He led the Steam Rollers to the National league championship in 1928.

Conzelman has installed the Notre Dame system for the Cardinals, and while his material is the youngest in the league, he is expected to field a ball club that will play interesting ball at all times!

In addition to his football coaching, Conzelman is one of football's finest after-dinner speakers, a newspaper columnist, actor, song-writer and playwright.

Assistant Coach Phil Handler

Probably no line coach in the National Football League has produced finer forward walls than has Phil Handler since he took over the position with the Cardinals 6 years ago. Season after season the Cardinals have come up with the splendid lines that more than held their own with the opposition. Handler first earned national recognition as a guard with Texas Christian University. He was plucked from the college ranks by Ernie Nevers in 1928, Nevers then serving his first term as Cardinal coach. He was rated one of the finest guards in pro football for the next five years, and when Milan Creighton became head coach, he immediately asked for Handler as his assistant. Handler now has served under Creighton, Nevers and Conzelman.

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Assistant Coach Charles Walsh

Charles F. "Chili" Walsh needs no introduction to football fans the nation o'er. He was a star end at Notre Dame for three years — 1925-26-27 — and then moved to St. Louis to assist Hunk Anderson at St. Louis University for the next two years. The good looking Walsh, whose home is in Hollywood, Cal., stepped into professional football as coach of the St. Louis Gunners in 1934. As soon as Conzelman was named coach of the Cardinals, he wired to Walsh to come along as his backfield coach.

Walsh was an "all-western" end in 1927 and played with the East team against the West that year.

SO YOU MAY KNOW THEM

CHARLES "KI" ALDRICH

(Center; Texas Christian U.)

All-American center in 1938 and rated as one of the best pivot men in the play-for-pay circuit last season. Aldrich, was the main-stay of the Cardinals line last year. He'll be twice as valuable this season for he will have some relief at center. "Ki" did all of the work for the Red Birds in 1939, being a 60-minute man. Born: Rogers, Texas, June 1, 1916. Off season occupation: Rancher in Rio Grande section in the Lone Star State. Aldrich is a 200 pounder and stands 5 feet 11 inches. Home: Temple, Texas.

CONWAY BAKER

(Tackle; Centenary)

He's been policing the Cardinal line for the past four years and is known as one of the best defensive and offensive linemen in the National Football league. The veteran tackle was born in Marlin, Texas, September 9, 1911. Now lives in Shreveport, La. Baker was All-League tackle in 1937. Weighs 225 pounds and is 5 feet 11½ inches tall.

JOSEPH EDWARD BEINOR

(Tackle Notre Dame)

An All-American choice in 1938 as a member of the Notre Dame team, Joseph Edward Beinor was graduated in 1938. Beinor spent last year coaching the Bloom Township High School, at Harvey, Ill., where he played prep ball. Came to the Cardinals this fall from the Brooklyn Dodgers along with Joe Kuharich in a trade for Benny Kish and George Cafego. Born: November 16, 1918. He is 23 years old, weighs 210 and is 6 feet 2 inches. Home: Harvey, Illinois.

TONY BLAZINE

(Tackle; Illinois-Wesleyan)

Dean of the Cardinal tackles. This is his sixth season with the Cardinals and reported in the finest physical condition of his entire athletic career. Blazine came up from Illinois Wesleyan in 1934. He captained the football, basketball and track teams. Blazine was born in Canton, Ill., January 2, 1912. Home: Chicago, where he is studying law. Weight 230 pounds and is a six footer.

RAY BUSLER

(Tackle; Marquette U.)

Recommended by Marquette's head coach Paddy Driscoll and line coach Tarzan Taylor. Busler is a husky fellow and looks as though he will be able to stand the "pushin' around" the rookies usually get in the professional ranks. Busler was born in Watertown, Wis., January 16, 1916. He is a 225 pounder and towers 6 feet 1 inch. Home: Watertown, Wis.

ANDY CHISICK

(Center; Villanova)

"Handy Andy" is this newcomer's nickname. The youngster comes to the Cardinals highly touted and is just what the Red Birds need as an understudy for Ki Aldrich. Chisick played in 25 of the 28 undefeated games his Alma Mater engaged in. Starred in football and basketball, playing guard on the cage team. Born: Sagamore, Pa., June 10, 1917. Weight 205. Height six foot one. Home: Newark, N. J.

MARTY CHRISTIANSEN

(Fullback; Minnesota)

First string fullback on the powerful Minnesota eleven. Good plunger, fast runner and great defensive man. Member of the 1940 College All-Stars. Born in Minneapolis, Minn., April 23, 1917. Weight 200 pounds. Height 6 feet. Home: Minneapolis, Minn.

BERYL CLARK

(Halfback; Oklahoma)

Leading scorer in the Big Six Conference and had one of the best passing averages in the country last year. Was member of the Oklahoma football squad for three years. Played his first game in sophomore year, but injured knee. Rode the bench for two years and didn't see action again until his final year. Born: Cherokee, Oklahoma, October 13, 1917. Graduated—Oklahoma, June, 1940. Weight 170 pounds. Height 5 feet 11 inches. Home: Norman, Okla.

ALTON COPPAGE

(End; Oklahoma)

Another member of the championship Oklahoma eleven. Coppage's ability to reach out and grab a pass has brought him national recognition. He was one of the first to be drafted by the Cardinals last winter. Besides football, Alton was a member of the track team. On the gridiron he was paired with Beryl Clark as a passing combination. He caught one of the longest touchdown passes in the conference when he snared Clark's 55 yard toss in the Nebraska game last year. Born: Hollis, Oklahoma, February 8, 1916. Weight 195 pounds. Height 6 feet 1½ inches. Home: Norman, Okla.

WILLIAM DAVIS

(Tackle; Texas Tech.)

A knifing, slashing tackle at Texas Tech., Bill Davis hopes to make the grade in the big league. Challenged Max Baer, when the former heavy-weight champion was in Lubbock, Texas last year. Davis gained some fame as a shot put star in college. Born: Grapevine, Texas, November 10, 1916. Weighs 235 pounds and stands 6 feet 1½ inches. Home: Grapevine, Tex.

BILL DEWELL

(End; Southern Methodist)

A crack all around athlete from Southern Methodist. Dewell was all-conference selection in baseball, basketball and football. Dewell is the lad who made the 50 yard end around run to defeat Pittsburgh in 1938. Born: Concordia, Kansas, January 2, 1917. Weight 205 pounds. Height 6 feet 4 inches. Home: Newton, Kan.

MARSHALL GOLDBERG

(Halfback; Pittsburgh)

Three time All-American and voted the Nation's best halfback in his final year at Pitt, Marshall "Biggie" Goldberg figures to have his best football year under the guidance of Coach Jimmy Conzelman. The new Cardinal coach is expected to build an offense around Goldberg. Goldberg earned three varsity football letters at Pitt. Born: Elkins, W. Va., October 25, 1917. Off season occupation: Insurance. Weight 188 pounds, height 5 feet 11 inches. Home: Chicago, Ill.

WILLIAM MURPHY

(Guard; Washington U. of St. Louis)

Selected by the Associated Press as All-Missouri guard in 1938 and '39. Murphy played football at Washington U. in St. Louis for three years. Born, Owensboro, Ky., April 7, 1914. Home: Mount Carmel, Ill. Weight 205. Height 6 feet.

RAYMOND (BUDDY) PARKER

(Quarterback; Centenary)

Back for his sixth season, veteran Buddy Parker is set for his best year in the majors. Parker was once the property of the Detroit Lions and is a well versed player. His best is the spinner play. Born: Slaton, Texas. December 16, 1913. Weight 195. Height 6 feet 1. Home: Shreveport, La.

RUPPERT PATE

(Quarterback; Wake Forest)

Member of the All Southern eleven who played All Northern star squad at Montgomery, Alabama last December. Football and track star at Wake Forest College, North Carolina. Born: Goldsboro, N. C., September 6, 1917. Weight 210 pounds. Height 6 feet 2 inches. Home: Goldsboro, N. C.

MILT POPOVICH

(Fullback; U. of Montana)

A hard running fullback, Popovich is making his third attempt to better his record of a 105 yard touchdown run he ran in 1936 against Oregon. Born: Butte, Montana, December 25, 1916. Weight 190 pounds. Height 5 feet 11 inches. Off season occupation, steel and concrete worker. Home: Missoula, Mont.

JOHN HALL

(Halfback; Texas Christian U.)

A fleet halfback from Texas Christian. Graduated in 1930, coaches the Corsicana County High School, near Dallas, Texas last fall. Played football at T.C.U. in '36, '37 and '38. Also member of track team. Born: Kaufman, Texas, December 14, 1916. Weight 195. Height 6 feet. Home: Kaufman, Texas.

FRANK HUFFMAN

(Guard; Marshall College)

An asset to the Cardinal line is Frank Huffman who is developing into one of the finest guards in the National League. Last year Huffman reported as an end, but showed so much spark and fire that he was shifted to guard. Born: Pittsburgh, Pa., May 22, 1915. Home: Beckley, W. Va. Weight, 205 pounds. Height 6 feet 1/2 inches.

BERT JOHNSON

(Halfback; U. of Kentucky)

Second season with the Cardinals and third year in the National Football league. Was member of the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1938. Started 1939 with the Chicago Bears and was purchased by the Cardinals in mid-season. Good field general and will be used at quarterback position. Played college ball at University of Kentucky. Exceptionally fast for his 215 pounds. Age 26 and height 6 feet 2 inches. Home: Lexington, Ky.

ROBERT KELLOGG

(Halfback; Tulane)

A high scoring halfback from Tulane, Robert (Jitterbug) Kellogg hoped to prove that a "good little man" is as good as a "good big man," The Tulane youngster who played 20 minutes in the All-Star line-up against the world's champions Green Bay Packers at Soldier Field, is one of the best open field runners on the gridiron. Bobby weighs 165 and is only 5 feet eight but he says he's big enough. Made the longest run in college football in 1939, running 108 yards against Mississippi. Home: Wynne, Ark.

JOHN KLUMB (End; Washington State)

His second season with the Cardinals. Klumb is great on defense at left end, is 25 years old, weighs 195 pounds and is six feet two inches. Home: Tacoma, Washington.

JOE KUCHARICH (Guard; Notre Dame)

After two years of coaching high school football, Joe Kuharich, former star lineman at Notre Dame, is making his professional debut as a player. Graduating in 1937 he became the property of the Brooklyn Dodgers. Reported this summer to the Dodgers and came to the Cardinals in a trade which also brought his school team-mate Joe Beinor to the Red Birds. A South Bend, Ind., product, where he played both prep football as well as college ball. Kuharich is 23 years old, weighs 200 pounds and is five feet 11½ inches tall. Home: South Bend, Ind.

LLOYD MADDEN (Halfback; Colorado School of Mines)

Nation's leading scorer in 1939 with 141 points in eight games. Madden is a shifty fellow and was one of the first choices in the draft. Good on track—does 200 yards in 20 flat; 50 yards in 5.4 and 60 yards in 6.3. Runs 100 in 9.8. Born: Lewis, Kansas, August 27, 1918. Weight 195 pounds. Height 6 feet 1 inch. Home: Golden, Colo.

HUGH McCOLLOUGH (Halfback; Oklahoma)

Rated as a great halfback when he was graduated from Oklahoma in 1938. Was star in his freshman year in the National Football League last season as a member of the Pittsburgh Steelers. Came to the Cardinals from the Cleveland Rams in return for Earl Crowder. Went to Rams in return for their No. 2 choice in draft—Meryl Condit, Carnegie Tech. star. Hugh is a triple-threater. Born: Anadarko, Okla., May 18, 1916. Weight 185 pounds, stands six feet. Home: Oklahoma City, Okla.

MARIO TONELLI (Fullback; Notre Dame)

Better known as "Motts" Tonelli. Played with Notre Dame in 1936, '37 and '38. Noted for his spectacular run against Southern California in 1937. Ran 85 yards for a touchdown in the last two minutes of play, winning the game 14-7. In 1936 made a 75 yard touchdown run against the Army. Born: Lemont, Illinois, March 28, 1917. Weight 200 pounds. Height 5 feet 11 inches. Home: Chicago, Ill.

ARTHUR (TARZAN) WHITE (Guard; Alabama)

A National League veteran. Formerly with the New York Giants. A first string lineman with the Giants in 1936, '37 and '38. Born: Lockhart, Alabama, December 6, 1915. Weight 220 pounds. Height 5 feet 9 inches. Home: Los Angeles, Cal.

REX WILLIAMS (Center; Texas Tech)

Claimed from the New York Giants. Williams is a rough and rugged fellow. He will be a third stringer on the Cardinals as Ki Aldrich. All-American center from T. C. U. and Andy Chisick of Villanova have the previous call for action at the pivot post. Williams was graduated from Texas Tech in 1939. Home: Bonham, Texas.

ROBERT WOOD (Tackle; Alabama)

A hard charging and rugged lad of 22 summers and winters. The former Alabama tackle comes to Coach Conzelman well recommended. His 230 pounds should help fortify the Cardinals' forward wall. Stands six feet two.

LOU ZONTINI (Halfback; Notre Dame)

A Notre Dame halfback who will fit right into Coach Jimmy Conzelman's scheme of things since the astute Conzelman has installed the Notre Dame system in the Cardinal style of play. Zontini was purchased by the Cardinals from Cleveland. Ran 84 yards for a touchdown against Minnesota. Excellent place-kicker. Was a member of the 1940 All Stars. Home: Whitesville, W. Va.

CHARLES KI ALDRICH is buying a ranch near his home at Temple, Texas. . . . HERMAN SCHNIEDMAN is a relief investigator in Quincy, Illinois. . . . CONWAY BAKER, burly 225 pound tackle does a "Dick Tracy" off season. He's a member of the Shreveport, La., police force. . . . TARZAN WHITE is a professional wrestler. . . . BILL DEWELL, crack end, is a baseball pitcher. Played with the Muskogee (Okla.) nine last season. . . . BOBBY KELLOGG answers to the name of "Jitterbug." Called that because of his fast running and weaving in and out of the opposition. . . . TONY BLAZINE, veteran tackle lost his appendix but failed to lose any heft. He still weighs 230. . . . THE FAVORITE DISH when the boys are traveling is steak. . . . Four of the new faces are ex-Notre Dame stars. They are MARIO "MOTTS" TONELLI, fullback; JOE BEINOR, tackle, JOE KUCHARICH, guard, and LOU ZONTINI, half-back. . . . Four are from University of Oklahoma—HUGH MCCOLLOUGH and BERYL CLARK, halfbacks and ALTON COPPAGE and JOHN SHIRK, ends. . . . (Guard; The Citadel)

A fine defensive lineman is returning for his second year. He turned up from college as a center, but fitted in as a guard to perfection and has been at that position ever since. Born, Aurora, November 25, 1916. Home: Chicago. Occupation, die caster. Weight 210. Height 5 feet 11 inches.

HERMAN SCHNEIDMAN

(Quarterback; Iowa)

A seasoned field general who will fit well into the Chicago Cardinals' young team. Schniedman is a steady fellow under fire and will be a great help to his rookie teammates. This is his sixth year in professional football, having played five years with the Green Bay Packers. Herman is 26 years old, weighs 200 pounds and is five feet 10½ inches tall. Home: Quincy, Ill.

JOHN SHIRK

(End; Oklahoma)

Another member of the Coppage-Clark-Shirk trio at Oklahoma. Was a member of the East-West game in 1940. First string end for two years. Fast and agile. Born: Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, June 24, 1917. Weight 200 pounds. Height 6 feet 4 inches. Home: Oklahoma City, Okla.

GAYNELL TINSLEY

(End: Louisiana State)

In his first year with the Cardinals in 1937 he set an all-time record for yards gained as a pass receiver. Tinsley gained a total of 675 yards. He was picked as an All-League wingman in his first year in a Red Bird uniform. Beside picking up that honor he picked up a nickname. He's Gus to his teammates and rivals in the pro circuit. Coached at Haynesville (La.) high school last year. Born: 1917 Vivian, La. Age 23. Height 6 feet one, weight 200 pounds. Home: Haynesville, La.

HUFFMAN, the guard, is employed by the State road department of West Virginia. . . . MARTY CHRISTIANSEN and HERMAN SCHNIEDMAN are the only two men on the squad from the Big Ten. HERMAN hails from Iowa and MARTY from Minnesota. . . . RUPPERT PATE of Wake Forest College, North Carolina, reported as a tackle but was so fast and shifty that he was shifted to the backfield. . . . JOHN HALL, T. C. U. halfback; JOE BEINOR, N. D. tackle, and JOE KUCHARICH, N. D. guard, coached high school football teams last year. . . . TINSLEY holds several National Football league records. In pass receiving, most catches single season, he is tied with Don Hutson, each catching 41; single game; eight and most yards gained by pass catching one game, 167. . . . E. D.
