THE CARDINALS OF 1945

Sports writers and radio commentators have been using the expression, "Most improved team in the league" when they refer to the 1946 Cardinals of the National Football league, and they could have added "It's new to the hilt".

The "hilt", naturally, is none other than the incomparable James G. Conzelman, back as coach of the Cards after three years with the St. Louis Browns. Jimmy, in a class by himself as an after dinner speaker, has written songs, plays the piano with reckless abandon, has been a baseball player, champion light-heavyweight boxer at Great Lakes, played college and professional football, coached both college and pro ball and most important, won a National Football league title while coaching and playing with the Providence Steam Rollers back in 1928.

Football has come a long ways since the days when Jimmy won a National league title—but so has James G. Since those days Jim has changed from the "rough-and-ready" to the "drawing-room" type. He's the suave, polished performer on any occasion. A few years ago, his speech, "Commencement Day Address", at the University of Dayton, was so good it was read into the Congressional Record and became required reading at West Point and Annapolis.

He will have the same two assistants, Phil Handler and Raymond "Buddy" Parker, that he had when he finished a three-year tenure as Cardinal coach in 1942. During Conzelman's absence, Handler was head coach and did a fine job considering the material he had. Now Phil becomes Jim's right hand man. Other aides are Carl Brumbaugh, great Chicago Bears quarterback some years back, and Richard Plasman, former Bears star who will play end and help coach the wingmen.

The Cards have gone on record as being one of the teams using the "T" formation. The Conzelman touch should unquestionably have its various maneuvers bordering on the sensational at all times during the coming season.

In transferring the "newness" theme from coach to players, we mention that only six of the fifty-odd players scheduled to report to the Cards training camp at Waukesha, Wis., were on hand for the opening game of the 1945 season and only eleven of the 52 were with the club at the windup of the '45 season. Owner Charles W. Bidwill has gone "alt out" to give Chicago's football fans the greatest team the Cardinals have had in the National Football League.

So it's a new season, new personnel with wonderful, aggressive spirit, and a new coach, the latter with more enthusiasm than a child with a new toy.

BACKS

ELMER JOSEPH ANGS MAN JR., versatile running back from Notre Dame, makes his debut in pro ball just a few miles from where he was born and raised. In other words, Elmer is a South side boy who attended Mt. Carmel high school before entering Notre Dame. Last year this blond speedster led the Notre Dame team in scoring, was the team's leading ground gainer and averaged 7.1 yards per ball carrying attempt. Has 75-yard and 35-yard touchdown runs called back against Wisconsin in 1944 and last year scored two touchdowns against Georgia Tech when he was supposed to be side-lined because of injuries. He had taken part in seven plays, scored twice. Started collegiate career as fullback, shifted to left half back, back to fullback and last season played right half throughout the year. Nickname "Bud". Has B.A. degree in Journalism. If you see a guy running down the field with a football in one hand, a pencil in the other sketching missed tackles by the opposition, it'll be Angsman. That's his hobby—Sketching.

ERNEST BERNARD BONELLI, U. of Pittsburgh right halfback, is starting his second season with the Cardinals. While at Pitt he won two letters in baseball and three in football. In high school he competed in track and basketball, in addition to football. Tossed the javelin 178 feet for a prep record at Aspinwall, Pa. Did a lot of passing for his teams in high school, college and in service. Was in the Air Corps for four years, much of that time being spent in the European Theatre. Was at Turisian, Sicily, Naples, Foggia, Rome, Arno, and Balkans. Was a Tech. Sergeant. Has B.S. degree in Industrial Engineering. Was class president in college. Is salesman during off-season. If he hadn't entered professional football he would have gone into Industrial Engineering. Is married. Weighs 200 and is 5 feet 11 inches in height. Born in Russellton, Pa., July 27, 1919. Makes his home in Pittsburgh.

PAUL JOSEPH CHRISTMAN is "Pitchin' Paul" of Missouri fame. Paul was a two-time All-America selection (1939, 1940) and joined the Cardinals for the 1941 season. However, before the whistle had blown in the first game, Paul was wearing the uniform furnished by the U. S. Navy. Paul arrived a bit too late to open the 1945 season, after 52 months in service, but managed to play most of the schedule, and, despite being a bit rusty and at the same time playing the "T" formation for the first time, had a very good year. This year, with Coach Conzelman and Quarterback Coach Carl Brumbaugh working with him, he may develop into the top "T" signal-caller in the National league. At least that's the berth picked for him by some pretty cute critics of the gridiron. His coolness under fire is something out of this world. While at Missouri he would chew a piece of lemon peel, pay no attention to a rather serious-minded opposing tackle who had visions of taking him apart, and nonchalantly pitch passes

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to teammates. He's still that way. Paul was a Lieutenant (j.g.) in service and spent nine months in South America with an Anti-Sub Patrol. Hobby is saving counterfeit coins. Is six feet tall, weighs 208, is married and has two sons, one about four years old and the other a recent addition to the family. Is a Radio Broadcaster during off-season. Won three letters in football and three in baseball in college. Gave up baseball because of a weak throwing arm. Can throw a football fifty yards but a baseball gives him trouble. Mark Christman of the St. Louis Browns is a brother. Home is in Kansas City, Mo.

WARD LLOYD CUFF, obtained in August this year in a deal which sent Guard Robert Dobelstein to the New York Giants, is starting his tenth year in the National league and his first with the Cardinals. Attended Marquette U., graduating in 1937. Won three letters in football and three in track at Marquette. Was born in Redwood Falls, Minn., Aug. 13, 1914, and attended high school there, winning nine letters and setting records in track. Has been one of the league's top field goal kickers, his best season being 1939 when he booted seven to lead the league. In 1943 he topped the ball carriers in average gain per ball carrying attempt with a 6.5 yard average in 80 attempts. He finished fourth in yards gained with 523. In sporting goods business during off-season. Is married and has three children, two girls and one boy. Is 6 feet one inch in height, weighs 192.

ALBERT ANTHONY DRULIS, used most of last season as a defensive back, is a tough 195-pounder from Girardville, Pa. He captained the varsity at Temple University in 1942, receiving his third football letter and the plaudits of his coaches and fellow players for unstinted and unselfish effort throughout his collegiate activity. In addition to football, Al participated in Intramural basketball, swimming and track. He graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Physical Education. He was in the Infantry and saw action in the European theatre, in Italy, South France and was in the battle of the Rhineland.

JACK CALVIN FAUBION, a newcomer to pro football, joins The Cardinals with a great reputation as an offensive star. Faubion has the nickname "Diamond", pinned on him while playing at Oklahoma A. & M. when he scored two touchdowns in a game against Oklahoma U. in 1940. In his last game in college he rang up five touchdowns against Wichita. Won three letters in football and one in baseball and received a B.S. degree in Physical Education. Was in the Infantry for 46 months and wound up his military career with the rank of Major. Saw service in the South Pacific. Coached and played with the 41st Division football team in Japan and won 2nd place in the "Pacific Olympics" in 1945 with three grid victories and one loss. Jack is one-quarter inch short of six feet in height and weighs 205.

WILFORD BENJAMEN GARNAAS, great back who played with the Golden Gophers of Minnesota, is making his debut in the "T" formation

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with the Cardinals. Bill played a lot of quarter back and was an excellent right half at Minnesota before going into the Navy. Was a Specialist 1st Class, spent much of his two and one-half years in the South Pacific and wound up in Japan. Considers making the '41 Minnesota team his greatest accomplishment and looks upon a field goal he made against Michigan, resulting in a 16-14 win for the Golden Gophers, as his happiest moment on college gridirons. Bill's hobby is a rather extensive library. Member of Alpha Delta Phi. Majored in Business Administration and has a B.B.A. degree. Born in Oberon, North Dakota, Oct. 8, 1921. Makes his home in Minneapolis. Won three letters in football at Minnesota. Is of Norwegian descent. Off-season business: Insurance. Is 5 feet 11½ inches, weighs 195.

MARSHALL GOLDBERG, a "gridiron phantom" at the University of Pittsburgh prior to his graduation in 1939, became one of the outstanding players in the National Football league as a member of the Cardinals prior to joining the Navy in 1943. While at Pitt "Mad Marshall", "Biggy", or just plain Marshall, whichever you prefer, was everybody's All-America selection, and was selected particularly by Pittsburgh opponents as their pin-up "The Guy We Don't Want to Meet in a Close Game." Tempus has Fugit-ed, but Marshall, being anything but a waster or loafer, has made the most of it. Unfortunately, for him, Cardinal teams were not what you'd call offensive units. He worked hard and as a rule, was always among the leading ball carriers in yards gained, but, fortunately, for the Cardinals, Marshall developed into one of the greatest defensive players in the pro game. Fans, remembering his explosive speed, and the knack of running at top speed the moment he starts, are awaiting his appearance as a "T" formation back. Marshall attained the rank of Lieutenant (J.G.) in the Navy and spent close to two years in the South Pacific. He is a salesman during the off-season—and a good one. He is 28 years old, was born in Elkins, W. Va., and received the nickname "Biggie", because he was so small when toting the ball for the Elkins prep team. He's a member of Phi Epsilon Pi, majored in Economics and Sociology and has an A.B. degree. He is married, has a four-year-old son and—you guessed it—his name is "Biggy".

VAN EDWARD HALL, Texas Christian University halfback, is a brother of Johnny Hall, who played with the Cards a few years back. Van was in the Marines and finished with the rank 1st Lieutenant. Was in three years, part of the time in the South Pacific in Hawaii, Marshall and Marianas Islands. Was born in Kemp, Texas, Aug. 21, 1921; now makes his home in Fort Worth. Won three letters in football, one in track at T. C. U. Considers big collegiate moment a pass he caught for a T. C. U. victory over Texas U. in the last eight seconds of play. Was class president his sophomore year at T. C. U. Majored in Business Administration but hasn't received degree yet. Plans to continue schooling. Is 6 feet 1½ inches, weighs 204.

MARLIN M. HARDER. To football fans throughout the nation the name "Marlin M. Harder" doesn't mean much but when you take off the

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"Marlin M." and substitute "Pat", then grid fans sit up and take notice because the former Wisconsin University star was recognized the greatest fullback in the nation a few short years back—before Uncle Sam took charge of Pat as one of his hardy, rough-and-ready Marines, where he spent twenty-two months. Pat's short-cropped haircut and bulldog determination are his trade-mark in athletics. He led the Big Ten, generally conceded the toughest football conference in the country, in scoring in 1941, and then was honored by being voted the most valuable player in the conference. He played in the 1943 College All-Star game and was voted the Most Valuable player in that game. Pat, after being out of football for two seasons, is ready and extremely anxious to pick where he left off in 1943, and his dad, who is—and should be—his greatest booster, thinks he's going to do just that.

JAMES EVERETT JOHNSTON, starting his first season as a member of the Cardinals, was in the Artillery for four and one-half years. Much of the time was spent in the South Pacific—one of the engagements being Leyte. Johnston became a member of the Cards via the trade route, the Cards sending Center Ki Aldrich to the Washington Redskins for the University of Washington halfback. Jimmy is 6 feet one and one-half inches in height and weighs 195. He played with the Redskins in 1939 and '40. In 1940 Jimmy finished third among the league's pass receivers with 29 catches good for 350 yards and three touchdowns and finished sixth in scoring—had four touchdowns running, for a total of 42 points. Won three letters for football in college and captained the team his last year. Is of English, Irish and Bohemian descent. Was born in Parma, Idaho, and now makes his home in Caldwell, Idaho. Is 29 years old, married and has a three-year-old boy. Has a meat market and slaughter house in Caldwell.

TRUMAN LEROY JOHNSON, another newcomer to the pro ranks, is a 210-pound speedster who answers to the nickname "Chief". Truman earned four letters in football and one in track while attending Centenary College in Shreveport, La. Was Boatswain Mate first class in Coast Guard for four years and visited Australia, New Guinea, Philippines, New Caledonia, New Zealand and Alaska. Among engagements and invasions were: Admiralty Islands; Hollandia, Aitape, Lae, Neumfor and Sensaphor at New Guinea; Wakde, Biak, Morotai and Leyte Gulf. In high school he played end, tackle and guard, as well as quarterback and fullback. In College he played half and fullback. His greatest thrill was returning a kick-off 87 yards for a touchdown against Texas Christian Univ. in 1941. Plays the trombone, sang in the glee club and took part in dramatics in college. Majored in history and physical education. Hasn't got his degree yet but plans to continue school until he gets the credits he needs. Is 5 feet 9½ inches in height; was born in Idabel, Okla., Dec. 28, 1918. Is Irish-Dutch-Indian.

RAYMOND LUCIAN MALLOUF, the "Syrian Slinger", returns to the Cardinals after four years in Uncle Sam's Navy where he attained the

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rank of full lieutenant. Ray has been nicknamed the "Syrian Slinger" or "Syrian Sniper" because of his Syrian ancestry and ability to hit you between the eyes with a football. Attended Southern Methodist Univ. where he was a teammate of End Bill Dewell. Won four letters in football and one each in basketball, track and baseball. Class graduated in 1941 and Mallouf joined the Cards that fall. He attempted 98 passes during the '41 campaign and completed 48 for a total gain of 725 yards, had the record high—80 yards—for a completed pass that season and only four of his pitches were intercepted. He punted 28 times for an average of 41 yards. Biggest day in football was on Christmas Day, 1940, when he played in an All-Star game in San Antonio, Texas, and threw five touchdown passes. Is 5 feet 11 inches, and weighs 180 pounds. Is married and has two boys. Was born in Sayre, Okla., and now makes his home in Dallas, Texas.

KENNETH AUSTIN MATTHEWS, Texas U. halfback, is a half inch short of six feet and weighs 186 pounds. Was 1st Lieutenant in Marines. In service three years and visited Okinawa and China. Born in Hugo, Okla., April 8, 1922, and now lives in Corpus Christi, Texas. Won three letters in football at Texas U. Attended high school in Corpus Christi and competed in football, track and basketball. Has always played on winning teams. In 68 games, starting in high school, teams have won 61, tied 3 and lost 4. Has degree in Business Administration and belongs to ATO fraternity. Returned an intercepted pass 94 yards for touchdown against Lubbock (Texas) Air Station while in service in 1943. Won honorable mention All-America while in college.

FRANCIS ALOYSUIS MOOCK is joining the Cards for the first time. Is a Philadelphia boy who played football at La Salle College in that city. Is 5 feet 10 inches in height, weighs 210. Was in the Seabees with the rank Chief Warrant Officer. Was in the thick of things at Okinawa and was also at Guam, Saipan and Oahu during his two years in service. Nickname "Moe", don't know why. Is 28 years old and a Longshoreman during the off-season. Played two years of pro football in the East. Most unusual day was 24 to 6 victory for the Philadelphia Yellow Jackets over the Harrisburg Trojans, Mook scoring three touchdowns, three points after and a field goal to account for all the points.

WALTER RANKIN, former Texas Tech star, is starting his fourth season with the Cardinals. One of the greatest defensive players in the league. Nicknamed "Bull" and charges like one of the male pinups in the bovine set. Collects victrola records as a hobby. Has roped calves—best time 15.4. Height six feet, weighs 204 pounds. Was intercollegiate heavy-weight boxing champion. Won letters in basketball in addition to football. Was in the Navy and had rank of Petty Officer. Was physical instructor at Pensacola, Fla. Had charge of boxing team which won seventy-five percent of its bouts.

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JAMES STEPHEN REYNOLDS, one of the outstanding backs coming out of college last season. Attended Oklahoma A. & M. where he was sophomore sensation before going into Air Corps. Was in three years and flew 52 fighter missions. Was based in England and made 2nd shuttle run to Russia and down to Italy. Was there from "D" Day until Dec. 1944 and won the rank of first lieutenant. Is 25 years old, six feet in height and weighs 195. Born in Bethany, Okla. Now makes his home in Oklahoma City. In 1940 when he was picked the outstanding college sophomore of the nation he carried the ball 202 times, gained 685 yards running; had 31 pass completions good for 687 yards; ran back 34 punts for 421 yards; punted 58 times for a 40-yard average and scored 57 points to lead the Missouri Valley Conference in scoring. Played left half in 1940 and fullback last season after his return from service. Playing freshman ball with the Oklahoma Aggies he caught pass he threw and gained five yards against Murray Aggies at Tishomingo, Okla. Is married and has two daughters. Is of Indian-Scotch-Irish descent.

JAMES THOMAS RICHARDSON, great quarterback at Marquette U. prior to graduation in 1942. Is "9½" in height and weighs 165. Was in the Marines with rank of captain. Spent three and one-half years in service and was at Bougainville, New Zealand and Japan. Jim was born in Independence, Kan., Feb. 23, 1920 and now makes his home in Milwaukee, Wis. His dad was born in Missouri and his mother in Arkansas. He captained both high school and college football teams, winning three letters in football in college and three in football and track in high school. In 1941 he had the best collegiate passing mark in the nation. Against Manhattan in 1940 he passed and ran for a gain of more-than 300 yards in a single game. Hobby is collecting pipes. Majored in Sociology and has Ph. B. degree. Member of Alpha Gamma Phi fraternity. Is single.

ALBERT ANTHONY RUCINSKI, brother of Cardinals End Ed Rucinski. Both attended Indiana University, Al, however, being about three years behind Ed. Al was in the Marine Corps for four and one-half years and wound up with the rank of captain. It was the Air Corps and he spent practically all his time in the South Pacific, visiting most of the islands and Tarawa, Kwajalein, Guam, Saipan and Okinawa. All together he had more than 700 combat hours. Born in East Chicago and still makes his home there. Is 28 years old, weighs 180 and is 6 feet 1 inch. Al was a passer in high school and college and in one game, completed 28 out of 36 passes attempted. He competed in basketball and track also, and is one of those rare individuals who have made a hole in one in golf. As a matter of fact he's twice as rare—he did it twice. Is a Sigma Pi man.

FRANK SENO, back for his second season with the Cardinals, is about to start his fourth year in the league. The Cards obtained the 190-pound, six foot tall Mendota, Ill. speedster at the start of the 1945 season in a three-corner deal which involved also the Boston club. Frank had a good year in 1943, carrying the ball 26 times for a 5.9 yards average, catching

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12 passes for a 16.2 yards average gain, returned 3 for an average of 20.3 yards; in 1944 he carried the ball 43 times for a 3.2 average; caught 17 passes for an 8.5 yards gain per catch, returned 10 punts for an average of 12.9 yards, and 8 kickoffs for an average of 24.1 yards per return. In 1945 Frank carried the ball 93 times for 355 yards and a 3 yard average, and returned 19 kick-offs for 408 yards and a 21.4 average.

JAMES EDWIN STRAUSBAUGH, a speedster from Ohio State, was purchased—straight cash deal, along with Jim Richardson, from the Green Bay Packers in late August this year. Jim is the type of runner who can pick 'em up and lay 'em down—a scat back which the Cards needed very badly. Class graduated in 1940. Was in Army Air Forces and had rank of sergeant after four years. Born in Chillicothe, O., Feb. 25, 1918, and still makes his home there. Is married and has a daughter two and one-half years old. Captained football, basketball and track teams in high school in Chillicothe. Won three letters in football and one in track in college. Was All Big Ten halfback in 1930. Set state scoring record in prep football in 1936. Is electrician in off-season. Hobby is hunting.

GEORGE RUSSELL SUTCH JR., who played his college football at the University of Rochester and Temple University, is a triple threat who may turn out to be one of those exceptional backs who does everything well. Sutchie started at Temple and was switched to Rochester due to his enlistment in the Marine Corps. Was in the Marines for three years and got as far as Japan—the windup, that is. Was in the Guam and Iwo Jima engagements and finished his stint with the rank 1st Lieutenant. He'll be 25 years old the 28th of August, was born in Jeffersonville, Pa., and now makes his home in Norristown in the same state. Is of Welsh and German descent. He scored all 14 points to beat Yale, ran 90 yards for a touchdown against Bucknell and scored three touchdowns against Holy Cross in 1942. Holy Cross was odds-on favorite to win. Intercepted pass with only 90 seconds to play and ran for touchdown, then kicked point to tie Oklahoma, 7-7. Won All-America honors. Majored in Statistics and Economics and has Bachelor of Science degree at school of Commerce this year. Is a Sigma Pi Kappa fraternity man. Weighs 205 and is 6 feet 1 inch.

JOSEPH J. VODICKA, back, who weighs 190 pounds, is five feet ten and one-half inches in height, was obtained by the Cardinals, from the Bears, near the end of the 1945 season. Attended Lewis Institute and, as a result, didn't play any college football. Was a Specialist 2/C in the Navy. Is married and has two daughters. Was on football, swimming and boxing teams in high school in Chicago. Hobby is aviation. Is of Bohemian descent.

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ENDS

LEONARD JOHNSON DARNELL, Duke University, who won All-America recognition while in college, is a first year man with the Cardinals. His class graduated in 1941 and he has spent more than four years in the Army Air Force. Has rank of Sergeant. Born in Winston-Salem, N. Carolina, and makes his home in Durham, N. C. Is married and has two children, a boy and a girl. Off-season occupation is with Western Union Telegraph Co. Nickname—"Dink". Won three letters in football, two in track and one in basketball in college. Competed in same sports in high school, also baseball and swimming. Won 15 letters and established records as a prep sports star in the shotput, discus and 100-yard dash. Has A.B. degree, majored in economics and belongs to Phi Delta Theta fraternity. Is 29 years old.

WILLIAM AUSTIN DEWELL, a Cardinal star before joining the Navy in 1942. Was in the Navy 41 months and wound up with rank of full lieutenant. Graduated from Southern Methodist U. in 1938 and was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles. Purchased by the Cards in July, 1940, and turned out to be one of the best deals Cards ever made. Played with the Cards in 1940 and 1941 and was one of the National League's leading pass receivers the latter season when he made 28 catches good for 262 yards to finish third in the individual standings. Last year he topped the Cardinal pass receivers and finished sixth in the individual standings by catching 26 passes for 370 yards. His best day was against the Giants in the Polo Grounds in 1941 when he caught 8 passes for 131 yards. Born in Concordia, Kan., 29 years ago, now makes his home in Newton, Kan. Is married and has a boy less than a year old. Played three years of football, basketball and baseball in S.M.U. Is southpaw pitcher in baseball and has pitched organized baseball. Coaches basketball and baseball in off-season.

RAYMOND HENRY EBLI, former Notre Dame end, is starting his 2nd year with the Cards. His first season was 1942. Joined the Navy the following year and spent much of his two and one-half years of service in the South Pacific visiting the Hawaiian Islands, the Marshalls, Carolinas, Mariannas, Pelelieu and Admiraltys. In addition to New Hebrides, Philippines, New Guinea and Okinawa. Attained rank of Lieutenant (j.g.) Ray was born in Ironwood, Mich., 27 years ago, and still lives there. Nickname—"Li'l Abner",—because of resemblance to comic strip character. Never played football in high school. Considers passes caught in the clutch to set up touchdowns against Southern California and Navy, his outstanding accomplishments. Has B.S. degree. Majored in Business Administration. Is single, height 6 feet 2½ inches, weight 200.

ALBERT HUST, U. of Tennessee All-America selection, is making a bid for a starting berth with the Cardinals after four years in the service. Home is in Strawberry Plains, Tenn. Is 25 years old. Won three letters

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in football and two in track in college. Has B.S. degree in Electrical Engineering. Is married and has a boy one year old. Attended high school in Cleveland, Ohio, and won three letters in each of three sports, football, basketball and track.

FRANK LEE IVY, veteran Cardinal end, is returning for his first full season since entering service with the Infantry in 1943. Was in service for two and one-half years and in four major battles. Visited England, France, Belgium, Holland and Germany. Born in Skiatook, Okla., Jan. 25, 1916, and still lives there. Is married and has a boy four years old. Frank won three letters for football at Oklahoma and also was selected All-America. Was drafted by Pittsburgh in 1939 and Cardinals obtained him in October, 1940. In 1941 he finished eighth among the league's pass receivers with 20 catches good for 183 yards. In 1942 he was second in the league with 27 catches for 259 yards. Frank joined the Cards last season in time to take part in the last two games. In addition to being a good pass receiver, Frank is without question one of the great defensive ends in the league.

MALCOLM JAMES KUTNER, playing his first season for the Cardinals, was obtained in a player trade with the Pittsburgh Steelers, the latter club having had draft rights to the Texas University All-America star pass receiver. He is 6 feet 2 inches and weighs 197. Born in Dallas, Texas, and still makes his home there. Is married and has an 18-month-old daughter. Attended Woodrow Wilson high school in Dallas and was captain of the football and basketball teams in 1937 and 1938. The basketball team won the state title in 1938 and he was chosen captain of the All-State team selected. Played guard and center in high school and was shifted to end in college because of height, speed and pass catching ability. Also played two years at left halfback in the Navy and was selected All-Midwest Service team left half. Mal was in the Navy for three and one-half years, won a full Lieutenantcy and visited Tianan, Midway, Enewetoc, Rota, Hawaii, Guam, Saipan and Okinawa. Has B.B.A. degree majoring in Business Administration and is member of Delta Tau Delta. Won seven letters at Texas U., three each in football and basketball and one in track. Ran the hundred yard dash in 9.7 seconds.

EDWARD RUCINSKI, one of the National league's outstanding wingmen, is a former Indiana U. star acquired by the Cardinals from the Brooklyn club for Gaynell Tinsley in August, 1943. Was fourth among the pass receivers in 1943. In 1944 played end and also left half. Was picked by both Associated Press and United Press as member of National league All-Star team. Born in East Chicago, Ind. Now lives in Indianapolis, Ind. Is 6 feet 2½ inches in height. Weighs 198. Sixth year in the league, fourth with the Cards.

WAYNE ROBERT WALLIS, Northwestern end whose class graduated in 1944. Was in the Navy for four years and attained rank of Lieut. (j.g.) Was in on carrier strikes on Japan. Was at Hawaiian Islands, Gilberts, Marshalls, Philippines, Bonins, Okinawa, Iwo Jima and Japan. Born in

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Decatur, Ill., but now makes home with parents on Chicago's far south side. Has a resort and boys' camp at Rhineland, Wis., which he owns. Played in every game for three years at Northwestern and won three letters. Also won a letter in baseball. Has B.S. degree in Physical Education. Belongs to Phi Kappa Psi fraternity. Is just over six feet in height and weighs 175.

TACKLES

JOSEPH J. ALLTON returns to the Cardinals after three years in the Infantry. Was a corporal. Played at Oklahoma U. Is 6 feet 2 inches and weighs 245. Played with Cards in 1942. During the war he was in the European Theatre and visited England, France, Holland and Germany. Born in Claremore, Okla., and lived there until this year when he married a Chicago girl and now makes his home in Chicago. Played football only in college but competed in basketball and baseball, in addition to football, in high school. Majored in history and physical ed. in college.

CHESTER NOYES BULGER, one of the league's outstanding tackles, is starting his fifth season with the Cardinals, and it should be his best. Chet weighed 238 when he reported this season, which is 32 pounds lighter than he was at the start of last season. Attended Auburn and won three letters in football and track. Holds his school's shotput record and tossed the discus 149 feet 11½ inches. While in high school Chet kicked a 43-yard field goal. Had two brothers, Charlie and Ray, who were great football and baseball players. Home is in Rumford, Maine. Is 6 feet 3 inches in height.

WILLIAM ZUEHL CONOLY is starting his first season with the Cardinals. Conoly attended U. of Texas, was born in San Antonio and now makes his home in Corpus Christi, Texas. Is Scotch-Irish. Was in the Navy. Is 26 years old. Won three letters in football and considers being selected as a member of Southwest All-Conference team his outstanding football accomplishment. Belongs to Delta Tau Delta fraternity. Majored in Physical Education. Plans to return to school to get degree. Hobby is golf. He is six feet one-half inch in height, and weighs 227.

RALPH ELLSWORTH FOSTER, JR., is starting his second year with the Cardinals. Was game captain a few times last season and was known as one of the league's most agile and aggressive tackles. Attended Oklahoma A. & M. and captained varsity football teams in 1939 and 1944, the latter year after returning from two years in the Navy where he was an Ensign. Is married and has a boy four years old. Attended Drake University and earned two letter in football. Considers a game against Creighton his greatest. STANLEY HUBERT MAULDIN was one of the greatest tackles ever turned out at Texas U. Is first year man with Cardinals, after three years in the Air Corps. Was 1st Lieutenant and flew 35 bombing missions as pilot, Nickname "Big Stan". Born in Amarillo, Texas, and now makes home in Greggton, Texas. Is married and has a boy three years old. If he hadn't gone in for professional football he would have joined one of the air line companies. Was awarded "Outstanding Athlete" trophy at U. of Texas in 1942. Considers being selected a member of the All-Army Air Force team last year as being his greatest football accomplishment inasmuch as there were a number of men with professional experience competing for the same honors. Was one of thirteen Immortals at Texas U. In 1940, he was the only sophomore to compete with Texas U. against a great Texas A. & M. team which was headed for the Rose Bowl until Texas U. beat them. Is 25 years old, weighs 215 and is 6 feet two inches in height.

WALTER STANLEY SZOT of Bucknell U. is starting his first season with the Cardinals. Walter is 6 feet 1 inch and weighs 215. Born in Clifton, N. J., and now makes his home in Wallington, N. J. Is married. Was in the Marine Corps for three years and won rank of 1st Lieut. Was in South Pacific all the way to Japan. Won three letters in football and one in boxing at Bucknell. Majored in accounting and has B.S. degree in Commerce and Finance. Brothers Al and Steve played football at Rutgers and Fordham. Is 26 years old and is member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity.

ROBERT JOHN ZIMNY, second year man with the Cardinals, attended Indiana University. Bob was born in Chicago and still lives on the south side. Will be 25 years old October 11. Earned three letters in football and one in wrestling at Indiana. While in high school Bob set a Catholic high school shotput record (12-pound shot) that still stands. Won four letters in football and four in track in high school. Captained prep football squad and was co-captain at Okla. A. & M. Majored in history and physical education and has Bachelor of Science degree. Born Sept. 24, 1919. Plans to take up coaching when he quits playing football. NICK BURKE, Northwestern guard, is a first year man with the Cardinals. He is 5 feet 10½ inches and weighs 205. Earned three letters in football at Northwestern. Was captain 1942 team.
