# WILLIAM V. BIDWILL

## *Managing General Partner*

William V. Bidwill, managing general partner of the Football Cardinals, has spent his entire life in professional football.

A son of former Big Red president and owner, the late Charles W. Bidwill, Sr., a member of Pro Football's Hall of Fame, Bill has served in varying capacities of the Cardinals' organization. He became the team's chief executive at the start of the 1972 season.

Last year, Bill served as co-chairman of the Salvation Army's annual "Tree of Lights" Christmas program, which raised more than \$283,000 to service 115,000 needy persons in the St. Louis area. Of that total, \$7,350 was raised by the St. Louis Quarterback Club at a Big Red home game. This year, Bill will be the event's general chairman.

The 43-year-old Bidwill, a graduate of Georgetown University and a veteran of Navy service, lives in St. Louis with his wife Nancy and their four sons and one daughter.



# JOE SULLIVAN

## *Director of Operations*

Responsible for the Cardinals' personnel operations is energetic Joe Sullivan, who begins his second season as the Big Red's director of operations and his 18th year of association with the National Football League.

Sullivan's endless list of duties specifically involve trades, supervision of the Cardinals' college and professional scouting, contract signings and personnel relations.

Sullivan, 49, came to the Big Red from Washington, where he had served as assistant general manager and assistant coach in 1971-72. He began his NFL affiliation with the Green Bay Packers' personnel department during the 1957 draft. In 1959, he joined the Chicago Bears in a similar capacity.

He spent seven seasons with the Bears before going to Los Angeles in 1966 as special assignments coach under George Allen, and then followed Allen to Washington in 1971. A native of Milwaukee and a veteran of Marine service, Sullivan and his wife Joan live in St. Louis.



# DON CORYELL, Head Coach

The Football Cardinals' record in 1973 was 4-9-1, the same as in 1971 and 1972. Yet, it was a different season, primarily so because of the arrival of new head coach Don Coryell—and the spark he provided to rejuvenate the Big Red's offense.

Under the soft-spoken but fiercely-determined mentor, the Cardinals showed marked improvement on offense last year, boosting their point output from 193 in 1972 to 286, and gaining nearly 800 more total yards, divided almost evenly between passing and rushing.

"We are looking forward to 1974," says the man who quickly gained the confidence of the Cardinal players and fans with his enthusiastic and honest coaching approach. "We weren't happy with last year's record, but progress was made. As a coaching staff, we will be better prepared this year, and we feel we have a good group of players with whom to work."

The 49-year-old Coryell was handed the Cardinal reins on January 18, 1973, after an outstanding 15-year college head coaching career in which he won more than 83 per cent of his games and never experienced a losing season. The last 12 years were at San Diego State, where Coryell's teams, using a pro-style attack that stressed the passing game, posted an amazing 104-19-3 record (84%).

Before Coryell's emergence at San Diego State, he had left his mark at Whitier College, where in 1957 he succeeded George Allen, now head coach of the Washington Redskins. In three years, Coryell posted a 23-5-1 record and three conference championships. His 1959 team led the nation's college division teams in total offense and passing.

After a year as backfield coach at Southern Cal in 1960, Coryell landed the head coaching job at San Diego State and inherited a team that had won only two games in the two previous seasons combined. Things quickly changed. Coryell posted a 7-2-1 record his first year—that would be the Aztecs' second poorest mark in his 12 seasons.

At San Diego, Coryell had three unbeaten seasons—11-0 in 1966, 9-0-1 in 1968 and 11-0 in 1969. His teams won 25 consecutive games during a period from 1965-67, and after that streak ended, Coryell coached the Aztecs 31 games in a row without a defeat.

He was named NCAA District College Division Coach of the Year four times (1963-66-67-68), and San Diego State was selected the nation's top college

division team by both wire services in 1966-67, and first by UPI in 1968. The Aztecs were promoted to university division status in 1969 and when Coryell left four seasons later, the school had laid claim to 18 individual and team NCAA offense records.

Born in Seattle, Wash., on Oct. 17, 1924, Coryell graduated from high school there in 1943, then spent the next three years in the U.S. Army. After his discharge, he attended the University of Washington, graduating with a B.A. degree in 1950 and a M.A. degree a year later.

His first coaching stops were as an assistant at Punahou Academy in Honolulu in 1951 and head coach at Farrington High School, also in Honolulu, a year later. He returned to Washington as an assistant in 1953-54.

In 1955, Coryell moved to Wenatchee (Wash.) Junior College and turned a team which had not won a game the season before into undefeated state champions. A year later, he was athletic director and head football coach at Fort Ord, Calif., and recorded another unbeaten season. From there, it was on to Whittier and the start of the success story.

Coryell is married to the former Aliisa Gronroos, and they live in suburban St. Louis with their two children: Mike, 17, and Mindy, 13.

### **RAY WILLSEY,** **Defensive Coordinator**



The important duties of defensive coordinator will be handled for the second successive season by Ray Willsey, 44, who is in his second tour of coaching duty with the Big Red. Willsey was with the Cardinals for their first two years in St. Louis (1960-61) as a defensive coach, went to the Washington Redskins from 1962-63 and then became head coach at California (Berkeley) from 1964-71.

A quarterback-defensive back at California in 1951-52, Willsey played in more minutes as a senior than any other Golden Bear. In 1953, he played with Edmonton of the Canadian Football League under head coach Darrell Royal. He was an assistant at California (1954-55) and then rejoined Royal at Washington in 1956. When Royal became head coach at Texas in 1957, Willsey went along and stayed for three years before joining the Big Red. A native of Regina, Saskatchewan, Ray and his wife Barbara are the parents of three daughters.

## Assistant Coaches

### **JIM CHAMPION, Defensive Line**



Back for a second time with the Big Red is Jim Champion, who has moved to the coaching staff after working as a scout last year. Champion, 48, was the Cardinals' defensive line coach in 1966 and then served as head coach of Vancouver in the Canadian Football League from 1967-70. Jim previously had been an assistant there from 1962-65, including a Grey Cup winning team in 1964.

A native of Natchez, Miss., Champion was an all-conference tackle at Mississippi State and played in the NFL for three years--with the New York Yankees in 1950-51 and in 1952 when the team moved to Dallas. After three years of high school coaching, he was an assistant at his alma mater from 1957-61 before moving to Vancouver. In 1971-72, he was an assistant with the New Orleans Saints. Champion and his wife Sara are the parents of three sons.

### **JOE GIBBS, Offensive Backs**



Joe Gibbs, 33, both a player and coach for Don Coryell at San Diego State, begins his second season in charge of the Big Red's running backs. Gibbs, who coached nine years in college before joining the Cardinals, played as an offensive lineman and linebacker at San Diego State in 1961-63. He was a graduate assistant there in 1964-65 and became offensive line coach in 1966--with the Aztecs finishing 11-0.

His other college stops included offensive line positions at Florida State (1967-68), Southern California (1969-70) and Arkansas (1971-72). At Florida State, where he was offensive coordinator in 1968, both Seminole squads made bowl appearances. The 1969 Trojans finished as undefeated Rose Bowl champions. Born in Mocksville, N.C., Gibbs and his wife Pat are the parents of two sons.

### **SID HALL, Linebackers**



A former defensive coordinator for Don Coryell at San Diego State, Sid Hall assumes a new assignment in his second season with the Big Red--moving from the defensive line to coach the team's linebackers. The experienced NFL assistant previously had served as linebacker coach with the Oakland Raiders (1969-70) and as line coach with the Los Angeles Rams (1971-72).

Hall, 48, played at Bakersfield (Calif.) Junior College and College of the Pacific, gaining all-Coast honors as both a center and linebacker as a senior in 1950. He coached at Porterville (Calif.) Junior College (1953-56), Pacific (1957-60) and Idaho (1961) before his five-year stay at San Diego State (1964-68). Hall, born in Maricopa, Calif., and his wife Mary are the parents of two sons and two daughters.

# Assistant Coaches

## **JIM HANIFAN, Offensive Line**



Experienced in offensive coaching, Jim Hanifan, 40, begins his second season as mentor of the Big Red's young, improved offensive line. He served in a similar position for Don Coryell at San Diego State in 1972 and had been passing-game coach at California (Berkeley) in 1970-71 under head coach Ray Willsey, now also with the Cardinals.

Hanifan starred for California as an end from 1952-54, leading the nation in receiving as a senior and earning all-coast honors. He was with Toronto of the Canadian Football League in 1955 and then played service ball under Coryell in 1956. Other college coaching stops were at Yuba (Calif.) Junior College (1959), Glendale (Calif.) Junior College (1964-65) and offensive coach at Utah (1966-69). A native of Compton, Calif., he and his wife Mariana are the parents of a son and daughter.

## **WAYNE SEVIER, Special Assignments**



The newest member of the Cardinal coaching staff is Wayne Sevier, 33, who will handle special assignments, the Big Red's computer programming and some special teams work. Sevier, whose duties will run through the end of the football season, was the quarterback on Don Coryell's first two San Diego State football teams in 1961-62.

A native of San Diego, Sevier played freshman football at the University of Washington in 1959 and as a sophomore at Chaffey Junior College before playing for Coryell and leading the Aztecs to a two-year record of 15-4-1. A mathematics major, he graduated with a 3.12 grade point average, and has taught and coached since then at San Diego area schools, including two years (1968-69) at Cal-Western, now called U.S. International. Sevier is married and the father of nine children.

## **BILL SIMMONS, Equipment Manager**



The task of assembling and caring for the Big Red's vast equipment resources falls for ninth straight season into the capable hands of Bill Simmons. Prior to joining the Cardinals in 1966, Simmons had been a teacher at Ferguson Junior High School.

Born in Kansas City, Simmons, 50, earned bachelor's and master's degrees from Northwest Missouri State University around tours of military duty in World War II and the Korean War. He and his wife Katie are the parents of five children--with the eldest son Dan starting his second season as equipment manager of the New Orleans Saints.

# Personnel Department

## **GEORGE BOONE, Personnel Director**



George Boone, in his second year as the Big Red's personnel director, is well qualified to lead the team's college scouting operation. Boone, 35, began his NFL work in 1966 as a scout for the Central-Eastern Professional Organization (CEPO), a scouting combine for seven league teams, including the Cardinals. He came to the Big Red in 1968 as assistant personnel director, a post he held for five seasons. He was promoted to his present position in March, 1973.

Born in Louisville, Ky., Boone was a three-year starter at offensive and defensive tackle at the University of Kentucky from 1957-59 and was an assistant coach with the Wildcats from 1960-65. While at Kentucky, Boone received both a bachelor's and master's degree in education. He and his wife Dedee are the parents of four girls and a boy.

## **LARRY WILSON, Pro Scouting**



Larry Wilson, the most popular player ever to play professional football in St. Louis, begins his second off-the-field season with the Cardinals as director of pro scouting. Wilson, 36, was named to the newly-created post at the end of the 1972 season--following 13 years as a premier NFL safety. The legendary No. 8 is kept busy throughout the year.

A seventh-round draft choice from Utah in 1960, Wilson switched from running back to defense and immediately became a starter--making famous the safety blitz devised by the late assistant coach Chuck Drulis. From there, he proceeded to lay claim to ten all-time Big Red records, including almost every interception mark. He made eight Pro Bowl trips, led the NFL in interceptions in 1966 with 10 and tied a league mark that year for interceptions in seven straight games. Born in Rigby, Ida., Larry and his wife Dee Ann are the parents of two sons and a daughter.

## **STAN WEST, Personnel Scout**



Stan West, with the longest tenure of the Big Red's personnel scouts, begins his tenth season as a full-time scout. A former all-American lineman at the University of Oklahoma, the 48-year-old West also starred for eight years in the NFL.

West gained his all-America honors with the Sooners in 1949 and was a first-round draft choice by Los Angeles in 1950. He started at linebacker for five years for the Rams and also played for the New York Giants (1955) and the Chicago Cardinals (1956-57). He was an assistant coach with the Minnesota Vikings from 1961-63, stayed out of football for a year, and joined the Cardinals in 1965. West lives in Norman, Okla., with his wife Mary Frances and their two sons.



### **BO BOLINGER, Personnel Scout**

An all-American at Oklahoma, like his fellow scout Stan West, Bo Bolinger begins his fourth season as a full-time scout on the Cardinal staff. Bolinger, a small but sturdy guard, received his all-America honors in 1955 and was also a two-time all-conference selection with the Sooners.

Bolinger, 41, came to the Cardinals before the start of the 1971 season after serving as an assistant coach from 1969-70 with Calgary in the Canadian Football League. Before going to Calgary, Bolinger had coached at Utah State, New Mexico, Tulsa and Denver. He lives in Tempe, Arizona, with his wife Barbara and their three daughters.



### **MATT LAIR, Personnel Scout**

The newest member of the Cardinals' personnel staff is Matt Lair who starts his first season as a full-time scout with the team after accumulating more than 25 years of football coaching and scouting experience. Lair, 49, came to the Big Red after working for six years with the Central-Eastern Professional Organization (CEPO), a scouting combine of seven NFL teams including the Cardinals.

Born in Paris, Ky., Lair played at the University of Kentucky from 1941-42 and 1946-47. He was a high school coach in Kentucky and Alabama for five years and then spent the next 15 years in assistant roles at Kentucky, Texas A&M and Texas Tech. He joined CEPO in 1968. Lair and his wife Helen live in Tupelo, Miss.

## **Training Department**



### **JOHN OMOHUNDRO, Trainer**

The increasingly important job of caring for the health of the Football Cardinal players again will be handled by hard-working and dedicated John Omohundro, who begins his fourth season as head trainer. Previously, "Johnny O." had served four seasons as assistant trainer.

A native of Salt Lake City, the 31-year-old Omohundro earned a bachelor's degree in physical education at the University of Wyoming. He worked there as an assistant trainer and was head trainer at the College of Southern Utah before coming to the Big Red in 1967. Omohundro and his wife Martha live in St. Louis.



### **JIM SHEARER, Assistant Trainer**

Jim Shearer, who also received his training experience at the University of Wyoming, is the Big Red's new assistant trainer. Shearer, 24, received his bachelor's degree from Wyoming in 1972 and later returned for graduate work in 1973-74.

The native of Worland, Wyo., spent the 1972-73 school year in Gillette, Wyo., where he served as the town's assistant recreation director and worked with the local high school's athletic program. He served as graduate assistant trainer at Wyoming last year. Recently married, he and his wife Nelma live in St. Louis.

Giants, including a 54-yard sprint, matching his previous career best . . . Has rolled up four 100-yard rushing outings in two years with Cardinals . . . Scored three TDs in each of Big Red's first two games, had streak of five straight games rushing for TD to tie team record . . . Came to Cardinals Feb. 22, 1972 in trade with Green Bay for MacArthur Lane, led Big Red in rushing that season . . . Currently ranks as NFC's 4th-leading active rusher . . . First-round draft choice of Green Bay in 1965 and member of Packers' Super Bowl champions in 1966-67 . . . Was Green Bay's leading rusher in 1968 and 1970 . . . Has totaled 50 career TDs on runs, receptions and returns, has passed for two more . . . Consensus college all-American for two years and named outstanding player in 1965 Gator and Hula Bowl games . . . Twice named Southwest Conference back of year . . . Played in 1969 Pro Bowl . . . Smart, aggressive middle linebacker has wound up in starting roles in each of first two NFL seasons . . . As rookie, assumed starting assignment in fourth game, performed capably under fire and was named Big Red rookie of year . . . Durable performer again played in all 14 games last year, starting four of last five . . . Quick, smart defender has recovered four opponent fumbles in two years, recorded first interception in 1973 . . . Two-time

all-Western Athletic Conference selection was first Arizona player to gain first-team all-America honors . . . Played in East-West, Senior Bowl and College all-star games after senior season . . . Received bachelor's degree this year . . . Native of Iowa City, married (wife, Kris), lives in Tucson, Ariz.



## James Leroy Bakken 25

Kicker Wisconsin 13th Year  
Ht: 6-0 Wt: 200 Born: 11/2/40 FA-62

Big Red's all-time place-kicker had record-setting season in 1973, becoming fifth NFL player in history to reach both 1,000-point and 200-field goal plateaus . . . Has led team in scoring for 11 straight seasons, collecting an even 100 points in 1973 and setting a Big Red record for field goal accuracy (71.9%) . . . 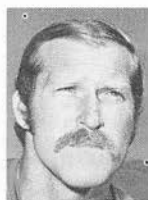

### 1974 NFL RULES CHANGES

1. All NFL tie games will be extended into sudden death overtime. Preseason and regular season games will be extended until a score has been made or an additional 15-minute period has been played. All playoff games will continue to use as many periods as necessary to determine a winner.
2. Goal posts will be moved from the goal line to the end line.
3. Kickoffs will be moved from a team's 40 to 35-yard line.
4. Missed field goals attempted outside the 20-yard line will be returned to the previous line of scrimmage. Missed field goals attempted from inside the 20-yard line will continue to be returned to the 20.
5. On any kick, one kicking team player from each side of line may go downfield when ball is snapped. All other kicking team members may not proceed beyond line of scrimmage until kick from scrimmage has been made. Penalty--15 yards from previous spot.
6. An eligible pass receiver who takes position more than two yards outside of his own tackle may not be blocked below the waist. Penalty--5 yards.
7. An eligible pass receiver can be contacted (chucked) only once beyond an area extending from line of scrimmage to a point three yards downfield. Penalty--defensive holding, 5 yards, first down.
8. An offensive player who is aligned in a position more than two yards laterally outside of offensive tackle may not contact an opponent below the waist if blocker is moving in toward position of ball either at snap or after it is made and contact occurs within an area three yards on either side of line of scrimmage. Penalty--illegal crackback block, 15 yards.
9. To reduce severity of holding and tripping fouls, penalty yardage will be reduced from 15 to 10 yards.

# NFL Procedures

## WAIVER PROCEDURES

**WAIVERS** — The waiver period begins at 4 p.m., New York time and expires at 4 p.m., New York time, on the following day, beginning with the first working day following July 4, except that if waivers are requested on either Friday or Saturday, they do not expire until 4 p.m., New York time, on the next Monday. Between the end of the season and the first working day after July 4, waivers expire on the 10th following day. A 24-hour recall period follows each of the two waiver periods. Notice of waivers will be made simultaneously to each conference with claims recognized in priority by conference.

**INJURED WAIVERS** — The difference between a waived injured player and a player waived normally is that the "waived injured" player who clears waivers remains under contract to the waiving club and receives salary, medical and life insurance benefits and pension credit.

**TRADING DEADLINES** — The inter-conference trading deadline will be on the final player cutdown date (September 9). Inter-conference trading commences on the day following the Pro Bowl game. The intra-conference trading deadline again will be the day following that on which all 26 teams will have played six regular season games (Tuesday, Oct. 24). Intra-conference trading commences each year on the day following the Super Bowl.

## RESERVE, INACTIVE LISTS

**INACTIVE LIST** — The regular season Inactive List is established on the Thursday prior to the first regular season game. Thereafter, unlimited player movement between a team's Active List and Inactive List will be permitted. Each team will have a limit of 40 active and seven inactive players during the season, with teams having until one hour before game-time to decide which 40 players will be on the active list.

**RESERVE LIST** — A player may be placed on reserve for one of the following reasons: Military service, retirement, injury, did not report, left squad, physically incapable of performing or ineligible. Players who report to training camp and are subsequently placed on reserve for reason of retirement or injury cannot be reactivated during the season unless they clear "no-recall" waivers. These players do not count toward a team's Inactive List.

**INJURED PRESEASON INACTIVE LIST** — Each team is permitted to place a maximum of three injured players on an Inactive List during the preseason, beginning with the first cutdown date (August 6) and ending on the final cutdown date (September 9). At that time, the preseason list becomes part of the regular season Inactive List. A player must be on the list for 16 days or two preseason games, whichever comes first, and can be moved from the list only by being activated, traded or placed on waivers or reserve.

## CUTDOWN DATES

On the following dates, each NFL team must reduce to a corresponding number of active players:

Tues., Aug. 6--60  
Tues., Aug. 27--49

Tues., Sept. 3--44  
Mon., Sept. 9--40

Chicago All-star team players need not count as active players until the 44-player limit is reached, even if they play in preseason games prior to the reduction to 44. Waivers may not be recalled on the last four players released to meet the 40-player limit. Claims on all players waived after the active roster is reduced to 49 cannot be withdrawn.

However, any player waived during the reduction from 49 to 40 can be reactivated at any time by the waiving team. In all other cases--both prior to the mandatory cutdowns and after the start of the regular season--a period of 16 days or two games must elapse before a waived player can be reactivated by the waiving team.
