WILLIAM V. BIDWILL, Managing General Partner

William V. Bidwill, managing general partner of the Football Cardinals, has spent his entire life with the Big Red — the last five years as the team's chief executive.

In those five seasons, the team has enjoyed its greatest success since moving to St. Louis, having recorded a 31-11 record and two NFC Eastern Division championships since 1974. Much of the credit for the resurgence has been the work of head coach Don Coryell, director of operations Joe Sullivan and assistant Larry Wilson, picked by Bidwill after the 1972 season to run the football end of the organization.

A son of former Big Red president and owner, the late Charles W. Bidwill, Sr., a member of Pro Football's Hall of Fame, Bill gained his football know-how from firsthand experience, having worked in almost every area of team operations when the Cardinals were in Chicago and later when the Big Red came to St. Louis.

Active in St. Louis civic affairs, Bidwill, 46, is a past chairman of the St. Louis Salvation Army's "Tree of Lights" Christmas program. A graduate of Georgetown University and a veteran of Navy service, Bill lives in Clayton, a suburb of St. Louis, with his wife Nancy and their four sons and a daughter.

JOE SULLIVAN, Director of Operations

Joe Sullivan, whose personnel moves have been major contributions in the dramatic improvement of the Football Cardinals the past three years, begins

his fifth season as the team's director of operations and his 21st year of association with the National Football League.

Sullivan's endless list of duties specifically involves trades, supervision of the Cardinals' college and professional scouting, contract signings and personnel relations. Sullivan also was instrumental in the moving of the Big Red's preseason training camp to Lindenwood College in nearby St. Charles, Mo.

Sullivan, 53, came to the Big Red from Washington, where he had served as assistant general manager and assistant coach in 1971-72, with the Redskins going to the Super Bowl in the latter season. He began his NFL affiliation with the Green Bay Packers' personnel department during the 1957 draft. In 1959, he joined the Chicago Bears in a similar capacity.

He spent seven seasons with the Bears before going to Los Angeles in 1966 as special assignments coach under George Allen, and then followed Allen to Washington in 1971. A native of Milwaukee and a veteran of the Marine Corps, Sullivan and his wife Joan live in Clayton, a suburb of St. Louis.

LARRY WILSON, Assistant Director of Operations

Larry Wilson, ol' Number 8 to Cardinal fans, assumes expanded duties and responsibilities in 1977 in his new role as the Big Red's assistant director of operations. Since retiring after the 1972 season, Wilson had served four years as the team's director of pro scouting.

In addition to continuing his pro scouting duties — with emphasis on the overseeing of Cardinal and other NFL teams' personnel transactions — Wilson will be working more closely with director of operations Joe Sullivan in the overall football operation of the Big Red.

Wilson, 39, played with the Cardinals from 1960, the team's first year in St. Louis, to 1972. As a rookie, the seventh-round draft choice from Utah was switched from running back to defense and immediately became a starter — making famous the safety blitz devised by the late Chuck Drulis. Thirteen years later, he had laid claims to ten all-time Big Red records, including almost every interception mark.

Larry made eight Pro Bowl trips and was named all-pro six times. He turned in his best individual season in 1966, when he led the NFL in interceptions with ten and tied a league mark with interceptions in seven straight games. Born in Rigby, Ida., Larry and his wife Dee Ann reside in a suburb of St. Louis and are the parents of two sons and a daughter.



DON CORYELL, HEAD COACH

When the news reached the Cardinals' chartered plane, some 30,000 feet above western Pennsylvania enroute to St. Louis, that the Big Red had been eliminated from the NFL playoffs for the first time in three years — Don Coryell's goal became clearly-defined: To return in 1977.

The Big Red had stretched the final outcome of the season about as far as possible. Tied with Washington for the NFC wildcard

berth at the beginning of the season's final day, the Cardinals had defeated the New York Giants to stay alive and would be headed for Minnesota if Dallas topped the Redskins in Dallas. But the Cowboys lost, and so did the Big Red — becoming the first team in the seven-year history of the NFC to go 10-4 and not gain entry into the playoffs.

The dramatic ending was a dose of bitter disappointment to the fiercely-determined Coryell, who in his second season as coach, had turned a team which had posted three straight 4-9-1 campaigns into a 10-4 NFC Eastern Division champion in 1974, and repeated the title with an 11-3 mark in 1975, the best one-season record ever by the Cardinals in St. Louis.

The 31-11 record from 1974-76 marks the most successful three-year period in the Big Red's 56-year history, and for a team which has employed 22 different head coaches in that span, Coryell is supplying some stability to the position. In starting his fifth season this year, Coryell's tenure will have been surpassed only by Jimmy Conzelman, who coached six years from 1940-42 and 1943-45. And Coryell's first victory in 1977 — No. 36 — will be the most ever by a coach in team history (Conzelman and Charley Winner each had 35).

The Coryell success story is measured in victories (the 31 from 1974-76 being the most by a NFC East team in that span) and team and individual honors (seven Big Red players went to the Pro Bowl and five made various all-pro teams), but also in Coryell's ability of playing — and most often winning — the close games.

It has led to the birth of the "Cardiac Cards," which in 1975 won five games in the final minute and last year won eight of its ten games by seven points or less. But the come-from-behind formula misfired in two crucial late-season losses to Washington and Dallas.

"I think it's fairly obvious that we are really looking forward to the 1977 season," Coryell said. "We felt we were a playoff team last year, but we didn't make it. We had the toughest schedule in our division and so many injuries on defense. Yet, we went 10-4. And we found out the hard way that you can't depend on another team to get you into the playoffs."

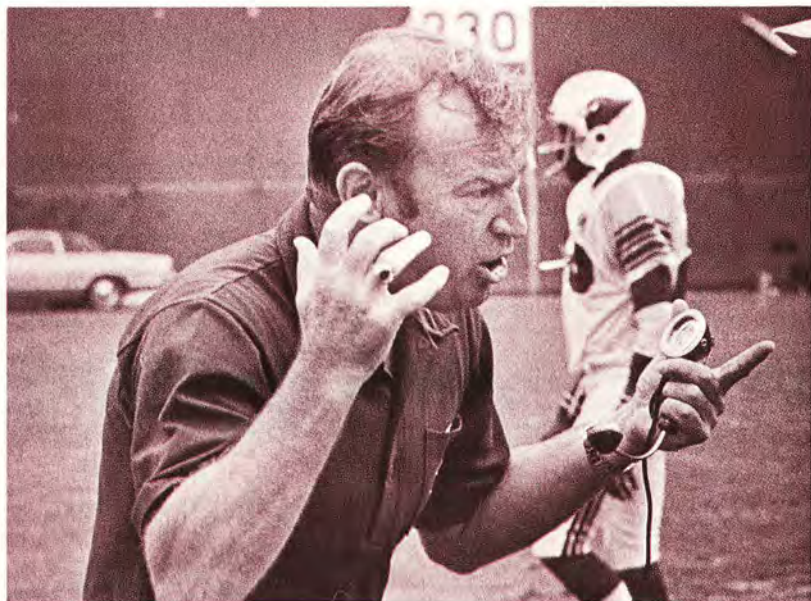

"Coryell is the catalyst, the trigger, the motivator. He is the leader. The source of confidence. He is without con. He is a simple man and so is his philosophy."



He added, "I would have settled for 10-4 at the beginning of last season and been very happy. But it was the wrong 10-4. It was tough to sit on the sidelines after having made the playoffs twice, and I hope it gives everyone on the team that much more incentive to return this season."

The 52-year-old Coryell was handed the Cardinal reins on January 18, 1973, after an outstanding 15-year college head coaching career in which he won more than 83 per cent of his games and never experienced a losing season. The last 12 years were at San Diego State, where Coryell's teams, using a pro-style attack that stressed the passing game, posted an amazing 104-19-2 record (84%).

Before Coryell's emergence at San Diego State, he had left his mark at Whittier College, where in 1957 he succeeded Washington Redskin coach George Allen. In three years, Coryell posted a 23-5-1 record and three conference championships. His 1959 team led the nation's college division teams in total offense and passing.

After a year as backfield coach in Southern Cal in 1960, Coryell landed the head coaching job at San Diego State and inherited a team that had won only two games in the two previous seasons combined. Things quickly changed. Coryell posted a 7-2-1 record his first year — that would be the Aztec's second poorest mark in his 12 seasons.

At San Diego, Coryell had three unbeaten seasons — 11-0 in 1966, 9-0-1 in 1968 and 11-0 in 1969. His teams won 25 consecutive games during a period from 1965-67, and after that streak ended, Coryell coached the Aztecs 31 games in a row without a defeat.

He was named NCAA District College Division Coach of the Year four times (1963-66-67-68), and San Diego State was selected the nation's top college division team by both wire services in 1966-67, and first by UPI in 1968. The Aztecs were promoted to university division status in 1969 and when Coryell left four seasons later, the school had laid claim to 18 individual and team NCAA offense records.

Born in Seattle, Wash., on Oct. 17, 1924, Coryell graduated from high school there in 1943, then spent the next three years in the U.S. Army, receiving an honorable discharge as a first lieutenant after paratrooper duty in Japan. He attended the University of Washington, graduating with a B.A. degree in 1950 and a M.A. degree a year later.

His first coaching stops were as an assistant at Punahou Academy in Honolulu in 1951, head coach at Farrington High School in Honolulu in 1952, and head coach at the University of British Columbia in 1953-54.

In 1955, Coryell moved to Wenatchee (Wash.) Junior College and turned a team which had not won a game the season before into undefeated state champions. A year later, he was athletic director and football coach at Ford Ord, Calif., and recorded another unbeaten season. From there, it was on to Whittier and the start of the success story.

Coryell is married to the former Aliisa Gronroos, and they live in suburban St. Louis with their two children: Mike, 20, and Mindy, 16.

RAY WILLSEY, Defensive Coordinator

The head coach for the Cardinal defense is Ray Willsey, 47, who begins his fifth season as defensive coordinator after previously serving as a Big Red assistant for the team's first two years in St. Louis (1960-61). Despite a series of devastating injuries, which sidelined five starters last year, the Big Red defense showed considerable improvement over the 1975 season — allowing fewer points, more than 500 fewer passing yards, and collecting seven more sacks. In 1974, the Cardinal defense allowed only 218 points, lowest in the team's 17 St. Louis seasons.

A quarterback-defensive back at California in 1951-52, Willsey played in more minutes as a senior than any other Golden Bear. In 1953, he played with Edmonton of the Canadian Football League under coach Darrell Royal. He was an assistant at Cal in 1954-55 and rejoined Royal at Washington (1956) and Texas (1957-59). After leaving the Big Red in 1961, he was an assistant with the Washington Redskins (1962-63) and head coach at Cal (1964-71) before rejoining the Cardinals. A native of Regina, Saskatchewan, Ray and his wife Barbara are the parents of three daughters.

JOE GIBBS, Offensive Backs

Joe Gibbs, 36, both a player and coach for Don Coryell at San Diego State, begins his fifth season in charge of the Big Red's running backs. Gibbs, who coached nine years in college before joining the Cardinals, played as an offensive lineman, tight end and linebacker at San Diego State in 1961-63. He was a graduate assistant there in 1964-65 and became offensive line coach in 1966 — with the Aztecs going 11-0.

His other college stops included offensive line positions at Florida State (1967-68), Southern California (1969-70) and Arkansas (1971-72). At Florida State, where he was offensive coordinator in 1968, both Seminole squads made bowl appearances. The 1969 Trojans finished as undefeated Rose Bowl champions. Born in Mocksville, N.C., Gibbs and his wife Pat are the parents of two sons.

HARRY GILMER, Quarterbacks and Receivers

Harry Gilmer, an outstanding college and NFL performer, begins his 20th NFL coaching season and the third year of his second tour of duty with the Cardinals. Gilmer was the Big Red's quarterback coach from 1967-69, before coaching with the Atlanta Falcons from 1970-74. Other NFL stops were at Pittsburgh (1957-60), Minnesota (1961-64) and head coach at Detroit (1965-66).

A legendary quarterback at Alabama, Gilmer, 51, was the NFL's No. 1 draft choice by Washington in 1948. The versatile performer was with the Redskins until 1954 as a quarterback, running back and defensive back — twice gaining all-pro honors — and played at Detroit in 1955-56. A native of Birmingham, Ala., Gilmer and his wife Katherine have a son, three married daughters and three grandchildren.

JIM HANIFAN, Offensive Line

Jim Hanifan, 43, begins his fourth season with the Big Red's offensive line, which last year led the NFL in fewest quarterback sacks for the third straight season. (In 1974, the line tied a league record for fewest sacks in a season (8), with one coming on an aborted field goal try.) He served in a similar capacity for Don Coryell at San Diego in 1972 and had been passing-game coach at California in 1970-71.

Hanifan starred for Cal as an end from 1952-54, leading the nation in receiving as a senior and earning all-coast honors. He was with Toronto of the Canadian Football League in 1955 and played service ball under Coryell in 1956. Other college coaching stops were at Yuba (Calif.) Juco (1959), Glendale (Calif.) Juco (1964-65) and offensive coach at Utah (1966-69). A native of Compton, Calif., he and his wife Mariana are the parents of a son and daughter.

CHUCK WEBER, Defensive Backs

A former standout National Football League linebacker and an experienced defensive coach, Chuck Weber begins his second season on the Big Red defensive staff. Weber, 47, came to the Cardinals from Cincinnati where he had been the Bengals' defensive coordinator and backfield coach under Paul Brown since 1970. He also has been an assistant with the Boston Patriots (1964-67) and the San Diego Chargers (1968-69).

DON CORYELL ON HIS FOOTBALL PHILOSOPHY

"Having respect for one another is extremely important. We have the knowledge that if you separated us, we'd just be a group of average people. We need each other. That's our theme. You don't see a bunch of prima donnas out there when you look at the Cardinals. Hell, we've got individuals. We're all selfish. We just won't allow personal goals to interfere with team goals."

"There isn't an ounce of bull in him. He's direct, forceful, factual. No pretense. He's enthusiastic. He's sincere. His players respond to him and the fans appreciate that."



Born in Philadelphia, Weber is a graduate of West Chester (Pa.) State College, where he was a Little All-America selection. He was a linebacker under Brown with the Cleveland Browns in 1955-56, was a defensive captain with the Chicago Cardinals (1956-58) and also played with the Philadelphia Eagles (1959-61). Two of the teams — the 1955 Browns and the 1960 Eagles — won NFL championships. Weber and his wife Ginnie are the parents of four sons and a daughter.

WILLIE ZAPALAC, Defensive Line

Lone-time and highly-respected college coach Willie Zapalac starts his second season as the mentor of the Big Red's defensive line, an area that improved considerably last year. For the previous 12 seasons, Zapalac had coached under Darrell Royal at the University of Texas, serving early as a defensive coach and later as offensive coordinator and line coach. Other college coaching stints were at Oklahoma State (1963), Texas Tech (1961-62) and Texas A&M (1953-60).

A native of Sealy, Tex., Zapalac, 54, scored a record 265 points as a senior fullback at Bellville (Tex.) High School in 1938. He played fullback at Texas A&M before and after military duty in World War II (1941-42, 46), and played in two East-West Shrine and two College all-star games. Zapalac and his wife Dorothy have two sons and a daughter. Both sons played football at Texas — Bill on the Longhorns' national championship teams in 1969-70 and Jeff in 1971.

DAN BROOKS, Special Assignments

The newest member of the Cardinals' coaching staff is Dan Brooks, special assignments aide to head coach Don Coryell. Brooks, 29, was hired at the beginning of the Big Red's training camp last year and quickly became an integral part of the staff.

Born in Jacksonville, Ill., Brooks was a quarterback at Illinois College in Jacksonville in 1967-71. He coached at Jacksonville High School in 1972-73, and then moved to the University of Illinois where he was an assistant in 1974-75. He and his wife Vickie live in St. Louis.

GEORGE BOONE, Personnel Director

George Boone, in his fifth year as the Big Red's personnel director, is well qualified to lead the team's college scouting operation. Boone, 38, began his NFL work in 1966 as a scout for the Central-Eastern Professional Organization (CEPO), a scouting combine for seven league teams, including the Cardinals. He came to the Big Red in 1968 as assistant personnel director, a post he held for five seasons. He was promoted to his present position in March, 1973.

Born in Louisville, Ky., Boone was a three-year starter at offensive and defensive tackle at Kentucky from 1957-59 and was an assistant coach with the Wildcats from 1960-65. While at Kentucky, Boone received both a bachelor's and master's degree in education. He and his wife Dedee are the parents of four daughters and a son.

STAN WEST, Personnel Scout

Stan West, with the longest tenure of the Big Red's personnel scouts, begins his 13th season as a full-time scout. A former all-America lineman at the University of Oklahoma, the 51-year-old West also starred for eight years in the NFL.

West gained his all-America honors with the Sooners in 1949 and was a first-round draft choice by Los Angeles in 1950. He started at linebacker for five years for the Rams and also played for the New York Giants (1955) and the Chicago Cardinals (1956-57). He was an assistant coach with the Minnesota Vikings from 1961-63, stayed out of football for a year, and joined the Cardinals in 1965. West lives in Norman, Okla., with his wife Mary Frances and their two sons.

BO BOLINGER, Personnel Scout

An all-American at Oklahoma like his fellow scout Stan West, Bo Bolinger begins his seventh season as a full-time scout on the Cardinal staff. Bolinger, a small but sturdy guard, received his all-America honors in 1955 and was also a two-time all-conference selection with the Sooners.

Bolinger, 44, came to the Cardinals before the start of the 1971 season after serving as an assistant coach from 1969-70 with Calgary in the Canadian Football League. Before going to Calgary, Bolinger had coached at Utah State, New Mexico, Tulsa and Denver. He and his wife Barbara are the parents of three daughters and live in Tempe, Ariz.

MATT LAIR, Personnel Scout

With more than 27 years of football coaching and scouting experience, Matt Lair begins his fourth season as a full-time personnel scout with the Big Red. Lair, 52, came to the Cardinals after working for six years with the Central-Eastern Professional Organization (CEPO), a scouting combine for seven NFL teams including the Cardinals.

Born in Paris, Ky., Lair played at the University of Kentucky from 1941-42 and 1946-47. He was a high school coach in Kentucky and Alabama for five years and then spent the next 15 years in assistant roles at Kentucky, Texas A&M and Texas Tech. He joined CEPO in 1968. Lair and his wife Helen live in Tupelo, Miss.

ACE PARKER, Personnel Scout

Clarence "Ace" Parker, member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, is the Big Red's newest personnel scout, having joined the Cardinals during last year's training camp. Parker, 64, who played in both the NFL and the National Baseball League, was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1972.

Parker was an all-purpose offensive and defensive back with the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1937-41, the Boston Yanks in 1945 and the New York Yanks in 1946. In 1938, he was in 11 games — playing 58 minutes in two and all 60 in the other nine. His best season was in 1940 when he was the league's MVP. His career totals were 498 rushing yards and 14 TDs on 148 attempts, and 335 completions in 718 passing attempts for 4701 yards and 30 TDs. Ace and his wife Thelma currently reside in his native town of Portsmouth, Va.

DAVE McKINNIS, Conditioning Coordinator — Personnel

A new member to the Big Red staff is Dave McKinnis, 32, who will split time between the team's personnel department and flexibility program. His personnel duties will be primarily in the computer area. His main function will be the development of daily conditioning programs for each Cardinal player.

McKinnis graduated from Butler (Pa.) High School, where he studied under Paul Uram, now flexibility coach of the Pittsburgh Steelers. He was captain and MVP on the gymnastics team at the University of Pittsburgh, where he received bachelor's and master's degrees. In the last ten years as gymnastics coach at Butler, his teams won two state titles, finished second eight times and placed six individual state champions. A native of Butler, he is single.

JOHN OMOHUNDRO, Trainer

The increasingly important job of caring for the health of the Football Cardinal players again will be handled by hard-working and dedicated John Omohundro, who begins his seventh season as head trainer. Previously, "Johnny O." had served four seasons as assistant trainer.

A native of Salt Lake City, the 34-year-old Omohundro earned a bachelor's degree in physical education at the University of Wyoming. He worked there as an assistant trainer and was head trainer at the College of Southern Utah before coming to the Big Red in 1967. Omohundro and his wife Martha are the parents of two sons.

JIM SHEARER, Assistant Trainer

Jim Shearer, who also received his training experience at the University of Wyoming, begins his fourth year as the Big Red's assistant trainer. Shearer, 27, received his bachelor's degree from Wyoming in 1972 and later returned for graduate work in 1973-74.

The native of Worland, Wyo., spent the 1972-73 school year in Gillette, Wyo., where he served as the town's assistant recreation director and worked with the local high school's athletic program. He served as graduate assistant trainer at Wyoming in 1973. Shearer and his wife Nelma live in St. Louis.

BILL SIMMONS, Equipment Manager

The task of assembling and caring for the Big Red's vast equipment resources falls for the 12th straight season into the capable hands of Bill Simmons. Prior to joining the Cardinals in 1966, Simmons had been a teacher at Ferguson Junior High School.

Born in Kansas City, Simmons, 53, earned bachelor's and master's degrees from Northwest Missouri State University around tours of military duty in World War II and the Korean War. He and his wife Katie have five children and three grandchildren. Eldest son Dan is in his fifth year as equipment manager for the New Orleans Saints.

1977 POST-SEASON GAME PRIORITY

On December 24-26, the NFC and AFC divisional playoff game matchups will be as follows: The two division winners with the best regular season won-lost percentage will be the home teams. The division winner with the best percentage will be host to the wild card team and the division winner with the second best percentage will be host to the third division winner.

If the wild card team is from the same division as the winner with the best percentage, the division winner with the best percentage will be host to the third division winner and the second highest division winner will be host to the wild card team.

For the NFC and AFC conference championships on January 1, 1978, the surviving division winners with the best regular season won-lost percentages will be the home teams.

FORMULA TO BREAK STANDINGS TIES FOR POSTSEASON PLAYOFFS

To break a tie within a division, these steps will be taken, in order: (1) Best won-lost percentage in head-to-head competition; (2) Best won-lost percentage in games within division; (3) Best won-lost percentage in games within conference; (4) Best point differential in head-to-head competition; (5) Best point differential applied to division games; (6) Best point differential applied to 14-game schedule; (7) Coin flip.

In selecting the wild card team, if there are two or more teams tied with the leading won-lost percentage, these steps will be taken: If there are more than two teams tied and two are from the same division, the division tie first will be broken. The surviving ties would then be broken under the following conference tie-breakers.

To break a tie within a conference, these steps will be taken, in order: (1) Best percentage in head-to-head competition. This is applicable in a three-way tie only if one club beat both others or one club lost to both others; (2) Best won-lost percentage in games within conference; (3) Best point differential in head-to-head competition; (4) Best point differential applied to conference games; (5) Best point differential applied to 14-game schedule; (6) Coin flip.
