

In Memory of Falcons Owner Rankin Smith

Oct. 29, 1925 - Oct. 26, 1997

From the time in 1946 that he returned from World War II as a combat pilot, Rankin Smith was always working to make his city of Atlanta and his state of Georgia better.

The community-minded citizen was on the Board of Directors of the city during a time long before Atlanta had



become the capital of the South. He served on the Atlanta Chamber of Commerce, the Georgia Chamber of Commerce, the Atlanta Better Business Bureau and the Central Atlanta Progress Committee. Many of those goals he and other city pioneers set were the building blocks that put Atlanta on its track to become the leader it is today. If it needed done, Rankin was the type to step up to help. His college roommate, Carl Sanders, went on to become a Governor in the 1960's and Rankin was instrumental in his election. He helped build a stadium to lure pro baseball, then responded quickly to bring America's number one sport, pro football to Atlanta. So much of what Smith did for the community was quiet and behind the scenes. From business decisions to "seed planting" for Olympics, Smith was a friend the city, county and state could count on.

A visionary thinker, Smith got involved with the Fernbank Museum of Natural History, the first major museum built in the U.S. since the 1930's, as he wanted to create a model of a museum for the next century. His first million dollar donation came in 1979, but it didn't stop there. The \$43 million facility is a showpiece of the South and a tribute to his behind the scenes dedication.


For his city, he donated millions to the arts, including the Arts Alliance, the Atlanta Symphony, and High Museum of Art. For education, he donated over a million dollars to Lovett School, to Atlanta University, to Reinhardt College, to Georgia, to Emory, to Georgia Tech.

For children, he always stepped forward.....He created a Falcons Youth Foundation, the first of its kind in pro sports in this city, to help and has benefitted over 200 children's charities since.....His team the past four years has been honored by the Humanitarian Hall of Fame for its work. With NFL charities, he and his fellow owners have done incredible deeds for this area and the whole country.

His love for nature and the outdoors was also a passion...From his State Game and Fish commission post over 35 years ago, he was a pioneer in stocking the Chattahoochee River with trout....For Ducks Unlimited, a pioneer in restoration and preservation, Smith has been one of their silent leaders. They created a "Quiet Leader Award" years ago in his honor for his unselfish giving of time and money.

Smith touched thousands of individual Atlantans personally, but affected all others as a pioneer in the growth of this city. All those who knew him as a person understood how big his heart was. All those who saw him only as an NFL football owner never really knew him.

"One thing about this group is that we never stopped trying to win (last year). We were always trying to get better and that gave us hope. When you see that, you know you have the right kind of people and you can build on it."

Building a solid foundation for the Falcons' future is the task of the NFL's winningest active coach Dan Reeves. The foundation began last season when Reeves' team won seven of their final 11 games, including five victories in-a-row, to finish with one of the best second half records in the NFL. The 6-2 second half record put the birds in select company as one of just three teams since '78 (when the NFL switched to 16 games) to fight back from a 1-7 start to finish strong. The Falcons under Reeves' direction made great strides in '97 such as learning what it takes to win on the road, as they captured three road wins in-a-row for the first time since '86 and the four road victories overall were the most in six seasons.

Atlanta's four-game improvement in wins over the '96 season was tied for the 3rd best turnaround in the NFL. The hard working message that Reeves preached proved to be a winning formula for success and even reaped the Georgia native credit for "the best coaching job" in the NFC West by one publication and coach-of-the-year votes by another news service. With Reeves' guidance the Falcons improvement was witnessed in all areas from offense to defense to special teams. "Hopefully, the fans can see the discipline, effort and the attitude of our players."

As the person in charge of making all the football decisions in Suwanee, the 54 year-old product of Americus, Ga. boasts a lengthy and successful resume to draw from.

Reeves' athletic career began as the MVP of the Georgia High School All-Star game in Atlanta and successfully continued at the college level, culminating into an induction into South Carolina's Hall of Fame (1962-64). His next role would be carving out a niche on legendary Tom Landry's Dallas Cowboys teams for seven seasons as a running back. Landry realized Reeves would make a good "player-coach" and then hired him as a full-time assistant. His training in Dallas was the impetus for becoming the youngest head coach in the NFL at 37 with the Denver Broncos in '81.

He captured 10 games as a rookie coach in Denver and now is among the top 10 in League history in victories (156). His winning years with the Broncos included five AFC West titles, four AFC Championship game appearances, and three Super Bowls. His team in Denver won 10 games or more in a season seven times and he amassed a 72-21 record at Mile High Stadium, the best home mark in the NFL over that span. Reeves has honored as the NFL's "Coach-of-the-Year" at both Denver in '84 and with the New York Giants in '93. He was named AFC Coach-of-the-Year on three occasions in '84, '89, and '91. In his first year in New York in '93 he compiled an 11-5 record, the eighth overall season in his illustrious career with 10 or more wins.

Dan Reeves' winning background has taken him to the ultimate heights of his profession. He's competed in 45 Playoff games, 15 as head coach, 16 as an assistant, six as a player-coach, and eight as a player. Reeves has been an active participant in eight of 32 Super Bowls played. His first Super Bowl ring came as a player in '71, and also has included a Super Bowl championship as an assistant coach in '77.



Asst. Head Coach/ Defensive Coordinator

Rich deserves much of the credit for the impressive turnaround of the Falcons defense last year. The unit improved in EVERY single category from '96, including moving from 27th overall to 20th in '97. The defense held opponents to 17 points or less in five of the seven victories, boasted the 8th best rushing defense in the NFL, and registered the second-most sacks with a club record 55. Brooks spent the '95-96 seasons as the Head Coach of the St. Louis Rams

before directing the defense in Atlanta. He was the Head Coach at the University of Oregon for 18 seasons prior to returning to the League. His program enjoyed four Bowl appearances in his final six seasons, including a trip to the Rose Bowl in '94 as PAC 10 champions. The '94 National Coach-of-the-Year and PAC-10 Coach-of-the-Year staked the Ducks to a final ranking of 9th in the nation in '94. Oregon's playing field at Autzen Stadium was renamed after Brooks before the '95 campaign as a tribute to his successful coaching career, which also included three years as Athletic Director. Richard L. Brooks was born August 20, 1941 in Forest, CA. and was a four-sport athlete at Nevada Union High in Grass Valley, CA. He played QB and DB under Coach Tommy Prothro at Oregon State and earned a masters degree in Education at Oregon State while working as the assistant freshman coach. He and his wife, Karen, have four children: Denny, Brady, Kasey, and Kerri.

Offensive Coordinator/Running Backs

George produced another 1,000 rusher last year in Jamal Anderson and guided an offense that controlled the line of scrimmage by finishing 6th in the NFL in time of possession with 21 drives of 10 or more plays. The experienced Sefcik will begin his 26th season in the League's coaching ranks in '98. In New York all-time rusher Rodney Hampton produced three of his five career 1,000-yard seasons with Sefcik's direction. The Giants rushing game was tops in the NFL in

'93 with 138.1 yards per game. With his influence the Cincinnati Bengals advanced to Super Bowl XVI behind 1,000-yard rusher Pete Johnson. His running back corps in '75 gained more yardage and scored more touchdowns than any unit in team history. George was born on December 27, 1939 in Cleveland, Ohio, where he helped lead Benedictine High School to the state title in '58. He was a three-year letterman as a two-way halfback for Notre Dame from 1959-61, taking handoffs from Daryle Lamonica. Sefcik began his coaching career by spending six years at Notre Dame under the legendary Ara Parseghian and was on the staff at Kentucky for four seasons before coming to the NFL. Sefcik and his wife, Lorie, have three children.

Offensive Line

Art Shell's presence commands respect among all the Falcons and he will continue to mold his offensive line in his second season. His first unit in Atlanta enabled the birds to post the 6th best time of possession mark in the NFL en route to providing a time advantage in 10 out of 16 games. His forces opened up holes for a 1,000 yard rusher with Jamal Anderson and allowed protection so QB Chris Chandler could have a Pro Bowl year with the second-best QB rating

in the League. From '95-96, Shell tutored the line for Kansas City who led the NFL in rushing one season (in '95) and were fourth in that department in '96. Art's line surrendered just 21 sacks in '95, the third lowest total in the League and the second lowest mark in KC's history. The head coach of the Raiders from' 89-94, Shell boasted 54-38 record. His team captured an AFC West title with a 12-4 mark in '90 and marched into the second round of the playoffs in '93 after a 10-6 record. Art won a Super Bowl ring as a Raiders assistant in '83 on the offensive line in his first stint on the sidelines. He was also a member of two Super Bowl Champions during his playing days with the Raiders. He reached the pinnacle by being inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame for his stellar 15-year 207 game career on Aug. 5, 1989. He was selected for eight Pro Bowls and missed just six regular season games in his career. Shell, born Nov. 26, 1946, attended Bond-Wilson H.S. in Charleston before attending Maryland State College. He earned All-America honors in '66 and '67 while playing both offensive and defensive line at Maryland State. Art and his wife, Janice, have two sons, Arthur III, and Christopher.

Joe was in charge of one of the best special teams units in the NFL in his first season in Atlanta. His special teams saw improvement by leading the NFL in punt coverage, ending up second in kickoff coverage, returning two kickoffs for TD's, setting records for most forced fair catches, and blocking three kicks. The 2.6 punt return average forced by the Falcons' coverage units established a new team record for the lowest ever. On the heels of these

accomplishments DeCamillis' units finished #5 overall in the League by a ranking of all special teams categories. In '96 with the Giants his special teams led the NFL with 32 punts downed inside the 20-yard line and the punt return unit was #6 in the NFL (11.4 average) with two touchdowns scored. DeCamillis' pro experience has included four years in New York and five years in Denver where he served as defensive quality control and assistant special teams coach. Joe was an all-state quarterback and wrestler at Arvada (Co.) High School and went on to become an All-America wrestler at Wyoming. The success of Bill's defensive line last year was a testament to the hard working efforts and prodding of their intense coach. Kollar's line contributed 43 out of a team record 55 QB sacks to rewrite the team's record books. His unit was also directly responsible for the club record 10 sacks at New Orleans and played a huge role in allowing opponents an average of only 104 rushing yards per game to finish 8th overall in the NFL in that department. But getting the most

out of his players is nothing new to Kollar. His '95 line sent a player to the Pro Bowl and proved again to be one of the toughest against the run in the League (9th). His coaching has produced a Defensive Rookie-of-the-Year and two All-Rookie selections in Atlanta. Bill was a first round pick of the Bengals in '74 NFL draft and competed for three seasons in Cincinnati which included an All-Rookie first year. He closed out his consistent career in Tampa Bay as he started at every position along the line from '77-81. During his playing days he was a member of three playoff teams, including the Bucs '79 team which played in the NFC Championship game. Kollar's college success included an All-American selection, three Big Sky nods and an MVP of the Senior Bowl Game while at Montana State. Ron Meeks Secondary

Ron's hands-on tutoring of the Falcons secondary was a positive step for the unit that dramatically improved in '97. Under his direction, the secondary jumped to 6th in the League in interceptions up from 30th in '96. Meeks' unit also held five passers under 50% and six opponents under 200 yards passing while helping the defense post three shutouts. The secondary finished 20th in his first season which was up from 27th in '96 and his unit's tight coverage also

aided in the club record 55 QB sacks. Ron coached the defensive backs for the Bengals for five seasons before accepting the challenge in Atlanta. His charges in Cincinnati led the NFL in interceptions with 34 interceptions in his final season in '96. One of his pupils, Ashley Ambrose, (8 thefts) was named the AFC Defensive Back of the Year. The Bengals ended up second in the League in pass defense in '93. 

Business/Sports Background

 $Taylor's \ determined \ to \ keep \ the \ club \ headed \ in \ the \ upward \ direction \ that \ last \ year's \ 4-2 \ finish \ showed \ the \ team \ was \ capable \ of \ accomplishing. Last \ year \ was \ painful \ on \ and \ off the \ field \ for \ Taylor. The \ frustrating \ 0-5 \ start \ ruined \ the \ debut \ of \ Dan \ Reeves' \ return \ to \ his \ home \ state. Then, \ on \ Oct. 26, \ his \ father \ passed \ away. As the \ hundreds \ of \ admirers \ of \ his \ father \ reminded \ Taylor \ of \ what \ Rankin \ Smith \ had \ meant to \ them \ and \ as \ the \ Falcons \ began \ to \ win, \ the \ '98 \ year \ dawned \ with \ new \ enthusiasm \ and \ purpose.$

The 45-year old Taylor has been President since 1990 and has seen the inner workings of the organization and professional football since he was a 13-year old at the Falcons first training camp in 1966. He began working for the club over 20 years ago, moving from department to department to see the behind the scenes tasks that had to take place. In '86, at age 33, Taylor was moved into a Vice-President role.

Smith has been doing more with the NFL matters over the years as well. Currently, he's on the owners board to oversee the workings of the NFL's marketing arm and pro sports best, NFL Properties. He's also on the NFL's Rozelle retirement committee and on the NFL's steering committee to work on programs for players aiming to complete their college degrees and improve themselves off the field.

Community

Smith's love for his hometown Atlanta community and his father were evident when he pulled an upset and landed a second Super Bowl for Atlanta in 2000 after bringing the first one here in 1994. As Art Modell said: "Their bid was tremendous, but so were Taylor's remarks. He probably swung the thing (vote) for Atlanta." Taylor played a role in lending support for Atlanta's 1st Super Bowl cause which brought an economic impact of \$166 million to the area.



A runner in his spare time, he has taken on the hills of the July 4th Peachtree Road Race in the past.



Sports Background

On January 15, Harold was named General Manager, a position the Falcons hadn't officially had in over a decade. His new role enables him to oversee the day-to-day operations of all club administration with special concentration on finances and the salary cap.

Richardson had just joined the Falcons staff of Dan Reeves in February of '97 as the assistant head coach/football operations from the Denver Broncos. Obviously, his four previous seasons overseeing Denver's salary cap structure helped construct that roster into the Super Bowl champions.

With his financial degree from SMU and a football playing background that included an SWC title as a tight end, Richardson has balanced the two fields well over the past three decades.

The 6-4 Richardson also has a tall resume that includes 12 years of college coaching (Colorado State, North Texas State, TCU, Oklahoma State and SMU), nine years of professional coaching (New Orleans, Denver) and five years now in personnel and cap management.

From his first coaching staff assignment for Hayden Fry, through the days with Bum Phillips, Dan Reeves and Mike Shanahan, Richardson gained a knowledge of doing the little things that can turn into big successes.

As a "thirty-something" special teams coach after his first year in the NFL, he helped scout kickers and sat in the New Orleans draft room pleading for the Saints to take a kicker for his special teams. Sure enough, at spot 86, between New England taking DE George Crump from East Carolina and Cleveland following with WR Dwight Walker from Nicholls State, the Saints drafted a left-footed non-American soccer-style kicker from Denmark by way of Michigan State. Richardson is still enjoying that kicker's success with the Falcons: Morten Andersen. His first year with Dan Reeves in '89 saw the Broncos win the AFC and participate in a Super Bowl as he coached specialists David Treadwell and Mike Horan for Reeves. Then, as tight ends coach, he helped take a 7th round WR from Savannah State and turn him loose into a TE role (Shannon Sharpe).

Personal

Born (9-27-44) and raised in the Houston, Texas, area, Richardson moved over to Dallas to play two sports at Southern Methodist University. The Mustangs football team included QB Mike Livingston (13-year NFL career with KC-Minn) and WR Jerry Levias (6-year NFL career with Houston-S.D.). The '66 squad won the SWC title with an 8-3 mark, including a six-game sweep of every Texas major college (Texas, Texas Tech, Texas A&M, TCU, Rice and Baylor), but lost in the Cotton Bowl to Georgia. The Mustangs baseball team also included Livingston and Richardson and produced strong 32-6 and 27-7 records.

Richardson and his wife, Ramona, have a son, Blake Lee, 12, and reside in Alpharetta, GA. Harold is also a golf enthusiast, playing and scoring with a low handicap, or watching the professionals compete.



IIM HAY

Executive VP Administration

Deservedly given a new title this year, Hay continues to guide the Falcons business operations into the new millenium. Jim sets quite a pace for others to follow, always arriving at the office before the sun rises and always doing his thorough research to undertake any project. In his early career, Jim was a professional baseball player with the Atlanta Braves organization, earning a reputation as

a four-time all star minor league player. He was even most valuable player on two different teams, but never got a chance to succeed in the major leagues. But, many future Braves were his teammates in the minors, including a unique knuckle-ball throwing future Hall of Famer Phil Niekro pitching to him and stars like Rico Carty, Tommy Aaron and his roommate was current Braves exec. Paul Snyder, From 1965-78, Jim worked with the Stadium Authority and the Atlanta Braves, getting to know the Falcons operations as well. 

Adams has performed in the NFL trenches for six teams in eight years. He was signed as a college free agent by the Cowboys in '89, but was released before the season opener (9/5). The next year he was in the Falcons training camp but fell short of making the final roster. To prove his mettle, Scott decided to play in the World League (NFL Europe) with the Barcelona Dragons in the spring of '91. His solid spring showing which included starting all 10 games for the Dragons who advanced to the World Bowl (vs. London) earned him an invitation to the Minnesota Vikings training camp. After being waived on the final cutdown, he made a good enough impression to be signed to the Vikes practice squad. He practiced with the team for 15 games until being activated to the regular roster for the season finale against Green Bay. In '92 after going through another training camp with Minnesota he was released but re-signed again the next day to the club's practice squad. Adams was elevated to the active roster during the second week of the season (9/8) and he ended up playing in 15 games as a back-up left tackle and special teams performer. He broke into the Vikings' starting lineup 10 straight times at right guard in '93 and even played on the team's kickoff return, field goal and point after units. He was released by Minnesota on August 22, 1994 and signed with New Orleans on Sept. 28. He played 11 games in a Saints uniform. Scott signed an unrestricted free agent contract with Chicago (3/21/95) the next season and performed mainly on special teams. In '96, he started two games and played in seven total games for Tampa Bay before signing on with the Broncos in '97.

College Career

After redshirting as a freshman in '84 for the University of Georgia, Adams went on to start 23 games in his four-year career under Coach Vince Dooley. He was switched from his guard position to tackle as a senior and started all 11 games including an appearance in the Gator Bowl. For his efforts, he was afforded second All-SEC honors as well as being named an honorable mention All-American by the *Associated Press*.

Notebook/Personal

Scott's pro career has been about perseverance. He missed making the final roster on the last cut for four consecutive years (1989-92) with three different teams before landing a spot on the Vikings practice squad. His pro experience has included playing in the playoffs (Minnesotavs. Washington in '92), receiving a game ball (New Orleans vs. Rams in '94), and performing as a tight end (in four games for Bears in '95). He received a game ball as part of a special teams unit which was responsible for 304 kickoff return yards, the second-most in a single game in NFL history. Adams was named Columbia High School's (Lake City, Fla.) outstanding offensive and defensive player as a two-way tackle. He also garnered 4A all-state accolades and was USA Today honorable mention All-American. Scott Alexander organizes an annual motorcycle rally called "Ride for Life/Ride for Youth" in honor of his father which raises money for the American Cancer Society.

"Ripken-esque" Streak

In similar fashion to Cal Ripken's and Joe DiMaggio's all-time baseball longevity streaks, Andersen has built up an NFL record longevity streak of 222 consecutive games scored in from 1983 through 1997 and counting. He broke Jim Breech's mark of 186 at Miami with his first extra point in '95 and he continues "The Streak" into its 16th season. This is a rare streak of scoring success that may never be broken.

Notebook

The Falcons ensured that the future Hall of Famer would be in an Atlanta uniform for another three years when they inked him his new three-year deal before the start of the free agent period. Morten was released for salary cap reasons after 13 seasons in New Orleans and quickly signed by the Falcons 24 hours later on July 21, 1995. He left his name in the Saints record book for career points with 1,318, field goals with 302, and consecutive games scored in with 174. A longtime Falcons nemesis, Andersen had kicked five gamewinning field goals against the birds in the past. One of the most recognizable and loved Saints players in team history, there once was 16,000 copies sold of a poster bearing his likeness in the "Crescent City." In 85, he and punter Brian Hansen cut a song, "Take It To the Top", which sold 5,000 copies. A former Danish soccer player, Morten's route to the U. S. came as a foreign exchange student at the age of 17 (in August of '77). He stayed at the home of the Dale Bakers of Indianapolis, Indiana. He was invited to watch something called football for the first time at a practice for one of Bakers' sons. When he was asked to kick some field goals (of course, soccer-style) by the coach he impressed everyone by booting a 50 yarder. Soon after, he was hitting them through the uprights for Ben Davis High School. College recruiters began to take notice as he hit five of seven field goals and he chose Michigan State over Purdue to continue his education at an American school. He displayed his overall athletic ability in high school by also excelling as a long jumper on the track team. Andersen is fluent in four languages namely; Danish, German, French, and



English. He once said he would have probably become a translator if he hadn't decided to pursue pro football. The "Outstanding Sports Citizen of the Year" by the New Orleans Sports Foundation (in '90). Morten has lent a hand in the community whenever possible. He was involved in a "Kicks for Kids" program in which raised over \$400,000 for New Orleans hospitals. Morten is a believer in creative visualization everyday in practice will walk himself through different kicking scenarios in which each one ends with a successful kick. He's not a person who ever dwells on the negative. He deletes each kick from

memory so as not to lose focus on the next kick. "The ball leaves your foot, and the kick leaves your mind," he said. Known as one of the best pressure kickers ever, he even breaks down that notion with a positive approach. "The pressure associated with important kicks is a perceived notion, something created by the fans and media. As long as I'm relaxed and at peace, then pressure is nonexistent." One of the most popular and friendliest players in the NFL, he keeps his job in perspective by saying... "There are one billion people in China who could care less about what I do."

College Career

A first team All-America as a senior at Michigan State, he is still the school record holder at Michigan State for his 63-yarder during his final season. Morten was also named to the all-academic team for sporting a 3.25 GPA in communications and German with minors in marketing and French. His penchant for booming kickoffs began in college as 39 of his 56 kicks as a senior were touchbacks. He set a then-Big 10 Conference record with 45 career field goals, while establishing Spartan school records for PAT's (126) and total points (261).

Personal

The son of Hanne, a school teacher and librarian, and Erik Andersen, a psychologist and supervisor of educational programs for handicapped children, Morten was raised in Struer, Denmark (9,000 pop.), but was born in Copenhagen. He has a twin brother, Jakob, who is in the exporting business in Moscow. Andersen made it to his seventh Super Bowl in '97 in New Orleans, serving as an analyst for Danish television - TV 3 ScanSat. Morten became so good at his native sport of soccer that he almost made the Danish national team. He is married to the former Jennifer Rich.

Last Season

Jamal's second year as a full-time starter produced another 1,000 yard rushing season as he totaled 1,002 yards to finish 8th in the NFC. Let's breakdown his productive '97 season.

- Finished 5th in the NFC in scoring with a career-high 10 touchdowns (7 rush., 3 rec.). Also, tossed a 27 TD vs. S.F. to account for 11 total TD's.
- Ended up 10th in NFC in yards from scrimmage with 1,286.
- Rushed for a personal-best of 162 yards on 20 carries (8.4 avg.) vs. St. Louis and had 152 yards on 33 carries in the season finale @ Arizona. (He needed 150 yards in the last game to reach 1,000).
- Gained 78 yards vs. Philly, 72 @ St.L., 65 vs. N.O. & 62 @ N.O. in other top rushing efforts.
- Became only the third Falcon running back to record back-to-back 1,000 yard seasons (William Andrews, '79-80, Gerald Riggs, '84-85).
- Team was 5-2 in games when he carried the ball 20 or more times.
- Totaled 3 all-purpose 100-yard games @ Arizona (188), St. Louis (162), Denver (113).
- Named offensive MVP by coaches three times (Phil., St. L., Den.).
- Displayed his pass receiving skills by hauling in 3 catches for 68 yards, 3rd most most yds. ever, vs. Den. and tied a career-high with 7 receptions for 47 yards vs. T.B. Scored receiving touchdowns vs. Den., @ Car., and @ Sea.
- Ranked 8th in NFL in 1st downs rushing with 69, and 15th in big play runs (10 yds or more) with 25.

Pro Career

Anderson became the first Falcon running back to score 10 touchdowns in a season since Gerald Riggs totaled 10 (rushing) in '85. If he gains 1,000 yards on the ground again this season, it will mark the first time a Falcon runner has rushed for 1,000 in three consecutive seasons since Gerald Riggs accomplished the feat in 1984-86. He would also tie the club of William Andrews and Riggs with three straight 1,000 yard seasons. Jamal heads into the '97 season ranked #7 in team history books with 2,217 career rushing yards. To show how far he has come in such a short time, if he rushes for 1,274 yards this year, he will move into third place all-time, surpassing Dave Hampton ('72-76), and behind only Riggs and Andrews. In his two seasons as a starter, he has an all-purpose total of 2,814 yards, including 14 all-purpose games with 100-yards or more. His first two years in Atlanta he served an apprenticeship, learning from veteran Craig Heyward. He watched Heyward have consecutive career years and perform in a Pro Bowl (in '95). But Anderson showed his future promise in a reserve role when provided an opportunity. For example, he gained 56 rushing yards in the second half at Tampa Bay in '95. He registered the 5th highest total in kickoff return yardage in team annals for a single game by totaling 180 yards on eight returns at Arizona that same season.

College Career

Jamal was an All-WAC pick for the Utes of Utah as a senior, averaging a punishing 5.7 yards per carry. He totaled 1.275 yards during his career in Salt Lake City on the ground, including 1,030 with five 100 yard games in '93, and 242 yards on 35 receptions through the air. The strong runner was known for his ability to run either inside or outside like a tailback or fullback.

Despite playing for a college that doesn't receive much national media coverage, Anderson made the most of his opportunity in the Freedom Bowl. He closed out his career with 133 all-purpose yards with a 34-yard touchdown run against Southern Cal. He stole the spotlight from heralded S.D. State runner Marshall Faulk in a '93 game. Jamal had 23-156 and three TD's to outshine Faulk's 22-141-1 TD game as Anderson's Utes prevailed.

Notebook

Whether it's addressing a school assembly at Shiloh Middle School in Lithonia, Ga. during the season or talking to 4,000 6th graders as part of a Project Youth conference in Los Angeles in the off-season, Jamal enjoys any opportunity to positively impact kids. In 1996, Iamal read a Sports Illustrated article about a high school football player who gave up his kidney and ended his football career to save his grandmother. Anderson was so moved by the character of Daniel Huffman of Rossville, Illinois that he flew him into Atlanta to be his guest all weekend for a game against the Rams. Jamal was asked by the school's principal to give the commencement address at Huffman's graduation from Rossville-Alvin High School for the class of '97, "Off the field, Jamal is a giving person," said Huffman. "No matter what he does, he does it with a lot of heart." Jamal has a lethal weapon in his trademark stiffarm that he learned at the age of nine, playing in Pop Warner (although he started playing at age 7) from his father, James, a former bodyguard of three-time heavyweight champion Muhammad Ali, It's hard to believe that Anderson's name wasn't called on draft day '94 until the final (7th) round. Two hundred players were selected before him, including 24 running backs. An articulate and engaging person, he appeared on CNN's nationally-seen "Talk Back Live", along with baseball great Hank Aaron, discussing the state of professional sports and role models. He appeared on the "Oprah Winfrey Show" along with Dorsey Levens, Michael Cheever, and Brian Roche to discuss the lifestyles of a young, single pro athlete. All four players became volunteers for Oprah's Angel Network which will help build an "Oprah House" in conjunction with Habitat for Humanity. One of his latest ventures was setting up his own web page ("Athlete's Direct") on America On-line this past off-season, which includes a message board with return reply's from Jamal, a daily journal produced by Jamal, photo gallery, and merchandise to buy. The always active Anderson also hosted his own one hour radio show last fall on WZGC FM Z-93. His off-seasons are split between managing his restaurant, Soul Food, in Salt Lake City, and with his production company, JAM Productions.


Anderson was an All-League, All-Region, and All-Valley selection at El Camino Real H.S. in California. The All-State and *LA Times* all-star choice was a team captain and Most Valuable Player as a senior in '89. He was recruited by some of the best colleges in the West like California, USC, UCLA, Arizona, and Arizona State but chose Utah because it was the school which stressed his educational opportunities as much as his football skills. Before Utah, he attended Moorpark Junior College. One of eight children, Jamal is used to being in the spotlight surrounded by stars. His father, James, (former New Jersey police officer) was chief of security for sports stars and Hollywood entertainers. Muhammad Ali used to

entertain Jamal and his friends with magic tricks when he came to visit and "Uncle" Muhammad was in hospital waiting room when he was born. Sugar Ray Leonard sang at his father's birthday party once and he let Jamal visit his dressing room after fights. (He was there when Sugar Ray beat "Marvelous" Marvin Hagler.) Former Lakers guard Byron Scott would come over to cut his hair. Other guests who paid visits to the Anderson house included Mike Tyson, Richard Pryor, Donna Summers, and Diana Ross, among others. He displayed his confident demeanor as a rookie when after seeing his name listed on a blackboard at the bottom of the depth chart (as the fifth running back) he quickly drew an arrow from his name to the top of the list. His father is now the security consultant for Boys II Men and the group watches Falcon games on a satellite dish. Anderson is also friends with the group, New Edition, who wear his #32 jersey on stage and he toured with them in the spring of '97. He can squat 670 pounds with his huge legs and bench press 465 pounds.

Last Season

Lester settled in as the team's starting left end for all 16 games for the first time in his career after splitting time in previous seasons as end and tackle. The results were impressive as Archambeau finished with career-highs in sacks with 8.5 (3rd best on team), QB pressures with 26 (3rd best), forced fumbles with a team-high 5, and fumble recoveries with a teamhigh 3, while making 66 tackles. Archambeau was part of a defensive line which rang up 43.5 QB sacks out of the new team record of 55 (2nd-best in NFL). Led by the charges up front, Archambeau also helped the unit finish with the 8th best rushing defense in the NFL (only 104 per game). He started out strong in the season opener at Detroit (8/31) by establishing personal-bests with two QB sacks of Scott Mitchell, two forced fumbles, and two fumble recoveries, while holding Barry Sanders to just 33 yards rushing. Archambeau continued his torrid pace the following week by sacking Carolina's Steve Beuerlein twice, forcing a fumble, recording 9 tackles with 4 QB pressures. After the first three weeks of the season, he led the NFL in sacks with four. In the return encounter with the Panthers (10/ 26) he had 6 tackles, a fumble recovery, and a half a sack. At Seattle (11/30), he accounted for 1.5 sacks, 1 forced fumble, and a personal-best 5 QB pressures. Against New Orleans (11/23), he had another sack, 4 tackles and a pressure and at San Diego (12/7) Lester registered 4 tackles, a sack, 2 QB pressures, and 1 pass defensed. In the Falcons' victory over the Eagles, he intercepted a Bobby Hoying pass to record his first NFL theft and totaled a half a sack, 2 pressures, and three tackles to earn defensive player of the game honors by the coaching staff. In the season finale at Arizona (12/21), Archambeau collared 4 tackles, 3 pressures and 1 pass defensed. His accomplishments last season were even more impressive when you consider he fought through a variety of nagging injuries, but still managed to be in the lineup for every game. With that in mind, Lester was named to USA Today's sixth annual All-Joe team which honors "the unrecognized, the overlooked, the hard-working stiffs" of the NFL.

Pro Career

Since coming over from the Packers in a '93 trade (for WR James Milling) dependable Lester has now worked his way into the **starting lineup in 60 out of 78 games played** in a Falcons uniform. He's now an NFL vet of 114 games total. His pro debut was curtailed when he suffered a freak back injury in Green Bay's weight room in his initial season (in '90). Archambeau's role in his first year on the field was as a pass rusher for a Packer defense that finished 10th and he led all linemen with 4.5 QB sacks (including 1.5 vs. Jeff George of the Colts) in playing 16 games. He continued in that role the next season in '92 before heading to the South. Lester's first year with the Falcons produced a then career-high 67 tackles in a personal-best 11 starts in '93. He posted consecutive 48 and 45 tackle seasons the next two years before having a career-year in '96. That season the former Stanford Cardinal contributed heavily with a personal-best 91 tackles and 51 solos to finish tied for third on the team's tackle charts (just seven away from second place). Included in those totals were 10 games where he had five or more tackles in a single game. Lester's first NFL sack came at the hands of QB Dan Marino.

Notebook

Lester has made some memorable plays since arriving in Atlanta. Archambeau's critical sack and subsequent fumble recovery of Carolina QB Frank Reich in overtime led to Morten Andersen's 35-yard game-winning FG in the opener in '95 that was Carolina's first

ever game. He helped ensure the Falcons' '95 Playoff berth in the season's last game against San Francisco, as he sacked Steve Young in the final minute of play to force a 3rd-and-14 and set-up a game-saving interception on the next play. It was his key stop on New Orleans' Torrance Small on a two-point conversion attempt that secured the birds' 17-15 victory in '96. It's Lester's relentless never-say-die attitude which has allowed him to make these plays and earn a starting position in the NFL. "I've never been around anybody more intense," noted Falcons Head Coach Dan Reeves last year. "He studies the game and does a good job of transferring that knowledge from the tape to the field." His style of play has earned him respect from players and coaches around the league. "If you don't finish him with the block, he's going to get involved in the play," said Panthers Head Coach Dom Capers. It wouldn't be a stretch to say Archambeau's career has taken off since coming to Atlanta. Over the past five years with the Falcons, he has accumulated 317 tackles for a productive average of 63 tackles per season. Lester received his degree in Industrial Engineering from Stanford. He has three sisters, one who holds a PhD from Cal-Berkeley, one who is an Executive at IBM, and another one who is a Director of Resources of a Pharmaceutical company.

College Career


A four-year starter for the Stanford Cardinal from 1986-89, he started every game he played during his career, **tying a school record with 45 consecutive starts**. The second team All-PAC 10 choice was fourth on the squad with 57 tackles as a senior, including six for minus 22 yards in losses.

Personal

A devout family man, Lester Milward III was particularly pleased last season when his parents, Mera and Lester II, were in town visiting when he was going on his early sack streak. Archambeau was the recipient of the Jim Reynolds Award at Stanford for "his courage on the field and devotion to the game." Lester graduated from Montville (N.J.) High School with a 4.4 GPA (on a 4.0 scale) because he took some calculus, advanced science and engineering courses. He earned eight total letters in three sports as a prep and still found time to run a newspaper route. He was a high school academic All-America as well as a USA Today All-America on both offense and defense. He was awarded the Garden State Distinguished Scholar Athlete Award at Montville High. He and his wife, Kathleen, have one son, Lester IV (2), who goes by the name of "Trey," and a daughter, Kellyn.

Last Season

Chris' first season in the pro's was mainly spent playing on special teams and learning the safety position from veterans William White and Devin Bush. Bayne was inactive for the first two weeks of the season because of a lingering hamstring injury sustained in the preseason and made his debut vs. Oakland (9/14) on special teams. He recorded his first pro tackle from his safety position vs. S.F. (10/19). Chris performed the challenging task as one of the "gunners" or outside cover men on punts. His job was to fight through double-team blocks, while at the same time, sprint downfield to try to disrupt a return or force a fair catch. He and the rest of the punt cover team helped punter Dan Stryzinski by only allowing 21 of 89 punts to be returned for 55 yards, fewest in the NFL. In the final 12 games, Bayne and his punt coverage teammates allowed just 2 returns for positive yardage. Also, because of Bayne's ability to get downfield in time, Stryzinski led the NFL in forcing fair catches with 45. The Falcons' kickoff coverage units were the sixth-best in the NFL (23.5). Bayne made the Falcons roster after a strong preseason showing where he collected 10 total tackles, including 5 tackles, an interception, and a pass defensed against the Redskins (8/16).

College Career

Chris was moved to outside linebacker as a senior at Fresno State under coach Jim Sweeney and responded with 77 tackles, 6 passes defensed, 3 QB sacks, and an interception. Bayne collared a career-high 16 tackles vs. Air Force and had 12 vs. Wyoming. In his first season with the Bulldogs in '95, Bayne lined up as a safety and he made 25 tackles, four passes defensed, and one interception despite missing the final six games of the year with a right shoulder injury that required surgery. His top tackle game was six stops vs. UCLA, Pacific (45-yd interception) and New Mexico. Bayne played two years at San Bernardino Valley Junior College as a safety, recording seven interceptions, including an 80-yard return for a score. A two-year starter in the secondary at San Bernardino, he earned first-team All-Football Conference honors in '93 and on the second-team in '94.

Notebook/Personal

Bayne was introduced to the physical aspect of the pro game early when he drew the assignment of performing on special teams in his first season. Often times, he and fellow "gunner" Juran Bolden would make side wages to see would get down the field first. "You have to do something to take your mind off the fact that you're getting killed out there on every play," Bayne joked. "It's the equivalent of running an obstacle course in the middle of a game," he continued. "You scratch and claw every step of the way and do almost anything to shake free." The significance of his role wasn't lost on his head coach. "Being a gunner is one of the toughest jobs in this league, because it seems like nothing the other guy does to you is illegal," said Dan Reeves. Because of his athletic ability Fresno State switched Bayne from safety to the linebacker position (known as "Strike") for his senior season and he collected a career-high 77 tackles. An outside linebacker and running back at North High School in Riverside, CA., he also ran track, performing in the 100 meters and long jump. He was highly recruited by the likes of Arizona, Utah, Nevada, and Pittsburgh. A biology major at Fresno State, he would like to attend Medical school after his football career is over. Christopher hails from a family of two sons of Ralph and Deborah Bayne. His hobbies are computers and bowling.

Last Year

Cornelius amassed the second-most tackles in his career with 115 to finish third on the team. It was his 5th 100+ tackle season of his career and the 75 solo stops were second only to Jessie Tuggle's 86. Bennett also collared his most sacks since '91 with seven to end up with the 5th highest total on the team as the Falcons set a new club record with 55 QB sacks on the season. He was named player of the game by the coaches for a team-high 9 tackles, 1.5 sacks, a forced fumble and 2 passes defensed at San Francisco (9/21). At Carolina (10/26), he had a club-best 1.5 sacks to go along with 10 tackles and a QB pressure. "Biscuit" led the team in tackles on three other occasions with 10 vs. Tampa Bay (11/9), 9 at St. Louis (11/16) and 8 vs. New Orleans (11/23). Bennett's fumble recovery vs. New Orleans was his 21st of his career and moved him into 10th in NFL history.

Pro Career

Bennett is ranked 16th in active total tackles leaders in the NFL and 15th in solo stops, heading into the '98 season. Cornelius has now started 157 of 158 career games played in 11 seasons. He has played in 17 post season games, including five AFC Championship games (winning four) and four Super Bowls during the 90's. "Biscuit" has been voted to the Pro Bowl by his peers five times. He was tabbed "Defensive Player of the Year" by playing five different positions for the Bills (DE, OLB, ILB, NT, MLB) and finished with 107 tackles and 9 sacks in '91. He totaled four seasons with over 100 tackles in Buffalo, while recording 52.5 QB sacks and establishing a Bills team record with 18 career fumble recoveries. Bennett was named "Rookie of the Year" by Sports Illustrated in '90 and became the first player to be voted "Player of the Week" by the NFL in consecutive games. He has scored on an interception return (69 yds vs. New England in '95), a fumble return (6 yds vs. Miami in '91), and a blocked field goal return (80 yds vs. Denver in '90). In a three-team deal involving four players and six draft picks. Cornelius became a Buffalo Bill and RB Eric Dickerson went from the Rams to the Colts in one of the biggest trades in NFL history on Oct. 31, 1987.

Year-by-Year

1996: In his first season in the NFC with a new defensive system, Cornelius had a solid year, finishing 5th on the team in tackles with 87, despite missing the final three games with a quad injury. Bennett ended up with three QB sacks and 17 QB pressures, tops among nonlinemen. Against the Vikings one of his eight total tackles on the day included a sack of QB Brad Johnson for minus nine-yards in which he forced a fumble on the play and the birds recovered. In the third quarter, he forced another fumble (by Robert Smith) and he recovered the ball at the Viking 19 yard line.

1995: Cornelius had one of his best NFL seasons, earning first alternate status to the Pro Bowl, in leading the Bills in total tackles (134), despite playing just 14 games. His '95 highlights included a 69-yard TD run with an INT of Drew Bledsoe in a division game (Nov. 26). Cornelius had a career-high 19 tackle game in Week 14 at S.F., just one week after a 15-tackle effort vs. New England. He also came up with a big play in the Week 15 game that won the Division title for the 10-6 Bills, knocking away a Marino third down pass in the final five minutes of the game with the Bills up by just three points.

1994: Led the team in QB Pressures (16) and fumbles recovered (3) and made his 100th career start at N.E. (9-11).

1993: Bennett set a club career mark for fumbles recovered (vs NE). He recorded first sack ever of Drew Bledsoe (9-5) and led Bills in tackles in Super Bowl, 4th on team with 102 in regular season.

1992: Had 21 tackles in postseason, second on team. Ended streak of 91 straight starts in regular season finale to rest hamstring for playoffs. Played 11 games at OLB, 7 at ILB, including Playoffs.

1991: Lined up during course of season at five different spots for Bills (OLB, ILB, MLB, DE, and NT). Led team in QB sacks (9), QB pressures (21) and had 4 forced fumbles. Scored TD on Monday Night football, sacking Marino, forcing fumble, recovering fumble, and running six yards for the touchdown. Had at least one sack in five straight games.

1990: Had 80-yard TD on blocked FG return vs. Denver (9-30). He totaled a QB sack and four tackles for losses on runs vs. Raiders, plus a forced fumble and fumble recovery.

1989: Hampered by knee and shoulder injuries.

1988: Second on team with 103 tackles and 9.5 QB sacks. Had first career interception (vs Minn.) and fumble recovery in overtime to set up game-winning FG (lets) in game that clinched AFC title.

1987: Fifth on team with 69 tackles in just eight games after trade on Oct. 31. Had a QB sack in first career game (vs. Denver Nov. 8). Was Player of Week vs. Eagles in season finale (Dec. 27) when he had 17 tackles, four QB sacks, and three forced fumbles. Had 8.5 QB sacks as rookie in just 8 games.

College Career

One of the greatest in a long list of Alabama stars, Cornelius won the nation's Vince Lombardi Trophy (making him the first LB to ever win an award designed for linemen), Bennett was chosen as Alabama's Player of the Decade for the 1980's and a member of the all-decade team of the SEC for the 1980's. Indianapolis made him the second player picked in the '87 draft (behind QB Testaverde) after a senior year that included 10 QB sacks, 6 forced fumbles, 21 total (ackles for losses, and two passes tipped, despite missing first two games of season. He was a **three-time All-SEC pick** with 287 tackles, 16 sacks, 15 passes defensed, and three fumbles recovered. He added a big-play on special teams (48 yard blocked punt and TD return vs. LSU). Cornelius played on three Bowl teams and was the most valuable player when the Crimson Tide beat Washington in the Sun Bowl. He was defensive most valuable player the year before when Alabama beat Southern Cal, 24-3, in the Aloha Bowl. His first Bowl was a 28-7 win over 5th ranked SMU in the Sun Bowl, the only TD his team allowed in the three Bowl games he played. Bennett enjoyed other moments like being SEC player of the week after a win over Georgia and a game-saving deflection on a two-point PAT attempt to Bo Jackson to save a 25-23 win over powerhouse Auburn.

Notebook/Personal

The youngest of six children to Lino, a steelworker, and Lillie, a homemaker, Cornelius O'landa Bennett was born in Birmingham, AL. on August 25, 1965. His nickname of "Biscuit" has been with him since a young age when he would devour his mom's tasty biscuits. Bennett was raised in a strong Southern family with an inherent work ethic. "I have more respect for my dad than any person in the world," Cornelius believes. So his 74 year-old father could see him play is one of the main reasons he stated for signing with the Falcons. For Ensley High School in Birmingham, "Biscuit" was an intimidating force on both offense and defense. This Alabama high school legend had his #32 jersey officially retired in '87 and placed in the trophy case for posterity. The bruising fullback rambled for 1,099 rushing yards and scored 12 more TD's when lining up as the tight end. He also found time to play a little quarterback. His dominance continued on defense as a DE, LB, and even DB.

Last Year

Bolden turned into a special teams standout and capable nickel back when called on in his second season in Atlanta. Juran (pronounced JUR-on) played in 13 games with one start in nickel coverage at Seattle (11/30). He recorded four special teams tackles and six other tackles in the secondary in '97. Performing the difficult chore of being an outside "gunner" on the Falcons' punt coverage teams, he played a role in helping punter Dan Stryzinski lead the NFL in fair catches forced (45) and by allowing only 21 of 89 punts to be returned. The 2.6 yards per average surrendered by the punt coverage teams was tops in the NFL and the lowest mark allowed in 10 years by a special teams unit. Bolden was also part of a kickoff coverage team which was the sixth-best by allowing just 23.5 yards per return. According to rankings compiled annually by the Dallas Morning News (teams were rated in 19 categories), the Falcons' special teams were #5 in the entire NFL. Juran recorded his first NFL start at Seattle (11/30) when the Falcons opened with three cornerbacks and he registered a personal-best four tackles and knocked down a potential touchdown pass. He also saw action in the secondary vs. Oakland (9/14), at S.F. (9/21), Denver (9/28) with two tackles, S.F. (10/19), and Philly (12/14).

Pro Career

Juran has played in 22 out of a possible 32 games in his two years in Atlanta. In '96, his contributions came mainly on special teams as he ended up fifth on the squad with 11 tackles. He recorded a team-high three tackles on 'teams' at Dallas, which also included a stop on Herschel Walker for no gain on a kickoff, and nearly blocked a punt in the third quarter. Just as he started to log time in the secondary in nickel coverages, he injured his right elbow trying to block a punt against S.F. (12/2) and was placed on Injured Reserve (12/ 9). His pro experience includes a stint with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League in '95. The Falcons bought out his contract with the Blue Bombers so they could pick him in the 4th round of the '96 draft. Bolden was third in the league with a teamhigh six interceptions in nine games while finishing with 17 tackles and four passes defensed. Juran picked off a pass in his first CFL start and registered three tackles and a pass defensed versus Ottawa. In a Week 3 contest against Shreveport, he stole two passes (off former Falcons QB Billy Joe Tolliver), had a pass defensed and a tackle. His first theft came while covering ex-NFLer Odessa Turner. Juran played with a deep thigh bruise early in the year and then was bothered late in the year by a shoulder injury that was corrected after the season.

College Career


He earned All-America and All-Mississippi JUCO first-team accolades in '94 as well as Defensive Player-of-the-Year (in the region) by registering 69 tackles, 41 solo's, making six interceptions for 27 return yards and two TD's, and having four forced fumbles. He also was credited with 17 passes defensed and a pair of recovered fumbles. In 1993, he was afforded All-America and All-Mississippi first-team status again by notching 55 tackles, 35 solos, six interceptions for 129 return yards with another TD and a 6-yard sack. He was named the Mississippi Delta Defensive Player-of-the-Year. Bolden also displayed his knack for making big plays on special teams by blocking four punts in just two seasons. In a battle versus Northwest Mississippi, he rose to the occasion to steal a pass, deflect three others, and block a kick. His best performance of '93 came against Northwest Mississippi as he hauled in a pair of interceptions, including one he returned 57 yards for a touchdown, and had seven tackles. He picked off a pass in the end zone, knocked down another pass, totaled six tackles, and recovered a fumble against Nassau Community College.

Notebook/Personal

Juran jumped from the junior college level directly to the Canadian Football League as a 21 year-old rookie. So with the extra year of seasoning he begins his fourth overall season as a pro, third season in the NFL, at the age of 24. Bolden is a physical specimen for a DB at 6-2, 201 with long arms and legs who matches up well with the big receivers now in vogue in the NFL. Nicknamed, "Big Stick", for his ability to deliver a big hit, he earned the moniker for his play on special teams in '96, which included leveling players like Herschel Walker of the Cowboys. His speed is another skill that was developed through his days on the track. Juran established two state junior college records with a 100 meter time of 10.28 and a 200 meter clocking of 20.9. Bolden just missed by a single vote of being tabbed the J.C. Gridwire's National Defensive Player-of-the-Year in '94 at Mississippi Delta College. He stole 12 passes for 266 return yards (22.0 avg.) with three touchdowns in 20 games at the JUCO level. He also blocked three punts and a field goal on special teams. He competed in the junior college championship game his last season and playing on a bad turf toe still managed to pick off a pass in the end zone. In just 29 career games at both junior college and the CFL, he managed 18 interceptions. Bolden hails from the same Hillsborough High School in Tampa that produced future professional athletes such as the Dodgers outfielder Gary Sheffield and Cleveland Indians pitcher Dwight Gooden. He excelled as a safety and running back at Hillsborough High.

Last Season

Michael's rookie year saw him steadily improve as the season progressed. He started three out of 15 games played and ended up with 22 tackles, three interceptions, six passes defensed, and four special teams tackles. He started for an injured Ronnie Bradford against St. Louis (11/2) and Tampa Bay (11/9) as well as lining up as a starter in the Falcons' nickel package vs. New Orleans (11/23). He recorded personal-bests in tackles with 6 vs. Carolina (9/7) and interceptions with two at New Orleans (10/12). The second theft (1:21 left) ended any Saints hope for a comeback in a close 23-17 victory. In his third start (nickel back), Booker stole another New Orleans pass as all three of his rookie interceptions came from the hands of Saint passers. In a win over the Eagles (12/14), he registered two solo tackles as a reserve cornerback and added another two stops on special teams in one of his best overalloutings. The onlygame he missed on the year was at Seattle (11/30) due to a hamstring injury.

College Career

Booker was a two-year starter and three-year letter winner for the perennial powerhouse Nebraska Cornhuskers under Tom Osborne. With his athletic presence in the secondary, Nebraska captured two National Championships from '94-95 and compiled an incredible overall three-year record of 36-2. Michael put an exclamation point on the Cornhuskers' second straight National title by being named the defensive Most Valuable Player at the Fiesta Bowl with an interception for a touchdown, three other passes defensed (an NCAA Bowl game record) and four tackles in the 62-24 win over Florida and Danny Wuerffel. In his first ever collegiate start as a junior he earned Player of the Game honors versus Arizona State with his first career interception off QB Jake Plummer. His career in Lincoln spanned 32 games with 21 starts and he amassed 68 tackles, five thefts for 100 return yards with a score, and 17 passes defensed. Michael was a winner on three Bowl teams with victories coming in a pair of Orange Bowls and one Fiesta Bowl. In 1996, he was a first-team All-America and All-Big 12 choice by *The Poor Man's Guide to the NFL Draft*.


He competed with fellow NFC rookies in a flag football game against other AFC rookies dubbed "The Beach Bowl" at the Pro Bowl in Honolulu in February. Booker showed off his athleticism by catching a TD pass from Arizona's Jake Plummer for a late score in an eventual close NFC loss. Michael will get another chance to play against his former high school teammate and good friend Bryant Westbrook when the Falcons travel to Detroit in the preseason and regular season. (Westbrook was a late hold-out last year.) Both players were stellar two-way players for El Camino (Ca.) High (enrollment of 3,000). Booker and Westbrook could be a draft day trivia question namely; What two players played together in the same secondary in high school and went on to become #1 draft picks in the NFL? The talented pair guided El Camino to consecutive county titles in '91 (13-1) and '92 (12-2) en route to being ranked #1 in the state of California (in '91). As a tailback, he gained 113 rushing yards on just 19 carries with two touchdowns and caught a 12-yard scoring pass. The one time the two players met in college it was for the first-ever Big 12 conference championship in '96 and Westbrook's Texas team upset highly-favored Nebraska. Michael received some form of revenge when the Falcons defeated the Chargers last year at Qualcomm Stadium because Booker was on the losing end of the score in the CIF Championship played at that same stadium in '92. He's glad to have Texas Tech's Byron Hanspard as a teammate after trying to tackle the elusive runner for two seasons in college. Booker's vertical leap of 39.5 was the 7th-best mark of any Nebraska player EVER.

Personal

A multi-talented athlete, Michael was a star forward on El Camino's highly successful basketball team for three seasons. His team was good enough to carry around the No. 1 ranking in the entire country for much of the '92 campaign. (Westbrook was also a member of that impressive team.) The son of Fostoria and Michael Booker, Sr., a career Marine officer, from Oceanside, CA was Southern California's Co-Defensive Player of the Year and on the Long Beach Press-Telegram's "Best of the West" list. He recorded 77 tackles, three interceptions, two forced fumbles, and a blocked punt in his last season in high school to earn All-League, All-City, All-California Interscholastic Federation and second-team All-State honors. Booker was a highly sought after recruit out of high school by college powerhouses such as Colorado and Ohio State. His younger brother, Dion, will be lining up to play for Nebraska this fall.

Last Season

Ronnie emerged as a dependable starter in a revamped secondary in his first season wearing a Falcons uniform. Bradford was in the starting lineup in 14 out of his 16 games played and totaled 51 tackles (41 solos), **second-highest of his career**. His four interceptions and 14 passes defensed were both second-best on the club's charts. His top tackle games came at Seattle (11/30) with a season-high 7 stops, at New Orleans (10/12) with 6 and vs. Denver (9/28) with 5 tackles. Against his former Bronco teammates, Ronnie was named the team's player of the game with those five stops, plus an interception off QB John Elway deep in Falcon territory. In the rematch with the 49ers (10/19), he had an interception of QB Steve Young, three tackles, and two passes defensed. Bradford's other thefts were from the hands of Scott Mitchell of the Lions (8/31) and Doug Nussmeier of the Saints (11/23). In a tough loss at Detroit, Ronnie also contributed a blocked punt to his efforts which led directly to a Falcon touchdown drive. For his play, Ronnie was named to the sixth annual All-Joe team by USA Today for being one of the best "unrecognized, overlooked" players at his position in the league.

Pro Career

Bradford has now started 25 out of 28 games played over the last two seasons. Before signing with the birds, he was an 11-game starter at right cornerback for Arizona in '96. That season he finished with a career-high 61 tackles, an interception and a team second-best 15 passes defensed in 15 games played. He broke into the Cardinals' starting lineup in high fashion at New England (9/15/96) by amassing a season-high 11 tackles. He went on to start the next seven consecutive games. Ronnie has upped his NFL games played number to 57 games with 30 starts through five seasons. He has totaled 153 tackles, 41 passes defensed, six thefts, three fumble recoveries, and one QB sack. A fourth round draft choice of Miami in '93, he found a place in Denver that same year and performed in 10 games. He logged time in 26 games in all for the Broncos in three seasons before moving on to Arizona in '96.

College Career

Ronnie was a two-year starter and four-year letterman for national powerhouse Colorado Buffaloes. This first-team All-Big Eight performer as a senior was instrumental in helping Colorado land its first National Championship in '91. His extra-point block was the margin of victory as Colorado edged Notre Dame in the Orange Bowl 10-9 to claim a National title. His productive career in Boulder included 53 solo tackles out of 74 total stops three picks, and two fumble recoveries.

Notebook

Bradford displayed his competitive nature to Coach Reeves and his new Falcon teammates by playing through a nagging injury that would have sidelined some other players longer. He played most of the season with a painful torn rib cartilage yet only performed in every game. His teammates witnessed the depth of his courage first hand when he dove on the Georgia Dome turf against S.F. to try to block a punt, sacrificing his painful ribs. "Ronnie epitomizes what you look for in a football player," said secondary coach Ron Meeks. "All he does is make things happen and does whatever it takes to win." A consummate professional, he was a role model for the younger Falcons with his daily business-like approach to his job. "When I come to work, I have an agenda," he said. "I know every day, before I walk in here, exactly what I want to do." Clearly, Bradford is a man with a plan. "You can't say



enough good things about Ronnie, and I wish we had some more just like him," noted Reeves. "He's one of the most courageous players I've ever been around." His four thefts last season are two more than he totaled in four previous NFL seasons. This introspective athlete who deflects attention can be caught flipping through the Wall Street Journal or the Investors Business Daily in the lockerroom. Before being drafted by the Dolphins in '93, he studied for his financial adviser's license on the heels of an internship with Prudential Securities.

Personal

Ronald L. Bradford was born in Minot, North Dakota. He was an honorable mention All-America by USA Today as a senior at Adams City High School in Commerce City, CO. He picked off four passes, registered 14 passes defensed, recovered a pair of fumbles and also blocked a field goal in his last prep season. Bradford also found time to leap hurdles for the indoor and outdoor track team and graduated high school with a 3.0 GPA. Bradford painted houses for the elderly during the summers in the Mile High city as part of a Denver-based program. Ronnie played with some powerful Colorado teams which were loaded with future NFL players such as Chad Brown, Alfred Williams, Deon Figures, Greg Biekert, Mike Pritchard, Eric Bieniemy and Kanavis McGhee.

Last Season

David started the first four games of the season at RLB before sustaining a broken left leg in the third quarter at San Francisco (9/21) to end his season. Brandon recorded five tackles, a sack, and a QB pressure vs. Carolina (9/7) in his best game of the year.

Brandon is a veteran of 77 games played with 66 starts in his 11 seasons in the NFL. He made his first ever interception as a pro count as he returned it 30 yards for a game-winning touchdown in overtime against his ex-teammates in San Diego for the Browns in '91. Some of Brandon's other career highlights have also included scoring off a blocked punt as a rookie and collecting three QB sacks in a game vs. the Colts in '92. He and his wife, Zondra, have one son, Xzavian (8/7/90).

Last Season

In his first season in Atlanta, Ray solidified the secondary and emerged as a team leader to help the Falcons defense drastically improve.

- Intercepted a team-high 5 passes (for 49 return yards), which was tied for the 6th highest total in NFC (10th NFL). Led the charge to improve team interceptions from 30th in '96 to 6th in entire NFL in '97.
- Team leader in passes defensed with 15, matching up with opponents' best receiver each game as pass defensed improved from 27th in '96 to 20th in '97.

return (12 for 201 yds.) in '96. He went the distance vs. San Diego (11/3/96) 82 yards on a punt for a score, longest on the team and a personal-best. Established a Colts Playoff record with 46 yard PR.

Year-by-Year

1996: He was second among Colt defensive backs in total tackles with 71 and fourth overall on the team with 52 solo stops. His streak of 36 starts in-a-row was halted. In their '96 Playoff run to the AFC Championship game, he held Pro Bowl WR Tony Martin of the Chargers to just three catches for 39 yards after Martin hauled in 90 catches during the regular season.

1995: Ray logged all 16 games at LCB and finished sixth on the team and third among DB's in tackles with 105. His top tackle games were 10 vs Buffalo and SF. He posted 18 tackles in three Playoff starts.

1994: He started the first 10 games of the year at free safety before occupying the left cornerback spot for the final six contests. (He was moved to his present spot in the fourth quarter in a game at Miami). He led all DB's with a career-high 137 tackles. In six of the last seven games, he recorded at least one interception and his eight total tied Eugene Daniel ('85) for most by Colt since Lyle Blackwood had 10 in 1977. He was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week at Seattle with a 37-yard interception return TD, 11 tackles, one QB sack, and a fumble recovery. In his first season as a starter in '94, two of his three TD's off thefts came from Dan Marino (28 yards) and Drew Bledsoe for 90 yards.

1993: He made *Football News'* All-Rookie team by starting the final five contests at free safety and ending up with 65 tackles, second on the team's list of DB's, with a team-high four picks. Against Philadelphia, he collected 14 tackles, one pick, and one pass defensed in his top rookie game.

1993: All-Rookie Team, Football News; 1994: AFC Defensive Player of the Week (12/4) at Seattle , UPI All-AFC Second team

College Career

A three-year starter for the Louisville Cardinals, he was moved from cornerback to free safety as a freshman. He totaled 273 tackles, 177 solos, 15 interceptions for 159 yards, 13 passes defensed, three fumble recoveries, three fumbles forced, six blocked kicks. He also averaged 9.1 yards on 18 punt returns. Ray closed out his strong collegiate career with 95 tackles, four thefts for 61 return yards, 10 passes defensed, three fumble recoveries, and two forced fumbles. As a junior, he amassed 108 tackles (68 solos), and a school record eight interceptions (for 89 yards). Buchanan was the Fiesta Bowl Defensive MVP versus Alabama with a fumble recovery for a touchdown off a blocked punt and another recovered fumble in a 34-7 victory. (He actually thought of transferring away from Louisville when they wanted him to play safety instead of running back.)

Notebook

The Falcons aggressively pursued the best cornerback on the free agent market in the spring of '97 and got their man. Ray was the Colts' designated "transition" player and was signed to an offer sheet on February 25. Indianapolis decided not to match the offer by the March 4 deadline so Buchanan switched teams. The Colts thought so highly of Ray out of college that they traded two draft picks to the Rams so they could move up and select him (65th overall). He became known as "Big Play" Ray by picking off a Dan Marino pass and running it back 28 yards for a score in his first game at cornerback after being moved to his. new spot from free safety late in the third quarter. The following week in his first career start at left cornerback, he stole a potential game-winning pass from the hand of Cincinnati's Jeff Blake in the end zone with :45 remaining to secure a 17-13 victory and the nickname stuck. This smooth talking former communications major with the flashy personality is also meticulous about his appearance. He was named to Mr. Blackwell's annual best dressed list, joining such sports stars as Michael Jordan, Evander Holyfield, Tiger Woods and Pat Riley. A giving athlete, he has continued to be as community-minded in Atlanta as he was in Indianapolis. Through the auspices of his Ray Buchanan Foundation and "Big Play Ray of Hope" he traded his cleats for ice skates to host a Christmas ice skating party

for 30 underprivileged children in Atlanta last year. Besides spending time with the kids, he also gave each one a personalized Christmas present. He donated \$200 for each interception last season to raise money for children's charities. His "Big Play For Kidzz" program provided an Easter egg hunt for underprivileged kids in Indianapolis last year. With his amiable demeanor and winning smile, he is quickly becoming of the most popular Falcons on the roster. Ray showed off his diverse talents by cutting a rap song that was sold at stores as a "NFL Jams" CD and featured on MTV two years ago. Not bashful, he and NFL player Scott Galbreath performed the song live at the Super Bowl festivities in New Orleans. In the '98 off-season, he recorded his first album called, "Favor", in Dallas consisting of inspirational songs from soft ballads to jazz to rap songs with friend Ashley Ambrose of the Bengals, among others. He's also cutting a single with the group, Xscape, with hopes that it will be released before the season.

Personal

Raymond Louis was a four year letterwinner in football as a safety and running back at Proviso East High School in his birthplace of Chicago, IL. He was recruited by Louisville as a wide receiver/running back before being moved to cornerback as a sophomore and then to safety for his final two years. He returned to play cornerback in the East-West, Blue-Gray, and Hula Bowl all-star games but was still drafted by the Colts with the intention of playing him at safety. The Ray Buchanan Football Camp benefits the Wish Foundation and Boys & Girls Club but is not all about football because they have a strong stay in school and away from drugs message. He also volunteers his time for other NFL camps which also stress similar messages such as Marshall Faulk's and Rod Woodson's. Ray followed his brother, Richard, who was the first Buchanan to play in college (wide receiver at Northwestern (from 1987-90.) He and his wife, Sheree, have three children a daughter, Destinee (3/11/92), a son, Ray, Jr. (12/8/93) and newborn son, Baylen (6/19/98).

Last Season

John was a steady contributor along the Falcons' deep front line in '97 as a reserve in all 16 games. Burrough eclipsed by one tackle his personal-best by posting 30 tackles and recorded the first QB sack of his career. In the season opener at Detroit (8/31), he registered his first ever QB sack (of Scott Mitchell) and also chipped in with three tackles. Against Denver (9/28), John tied his career-high with seven tackles, second-best on team. His other top games came against St. Louis (11/2) where he collared two stops, a pair of QB pressures and a special teams tackle, and at San Diego (12/7) with four tackles. He was in the starting lineup vs. Philadelphia (12/14) for the opening series when Chuck Smith was attending to an eye problem on the sideline.

Pro Career

Burrough has played in every game in his three seasons in Atlanta which currently stands at 48 consecutive games heading into '98. As a rookie in '95, John chipped in with 11 tackles and three QB pressures on defense and two special teams stops. He played in 16 games again (with one start) in '96 and finished with a then career-best 29 tackles. It was his jolting tackle on Panthers returner Winslow Oliver which caused a fumble that the Falcons recovered in a 20-17 victory.

College Career

Burrough played his last three years at Wyoming after transferring from Washington State, finishing his career with 129 tackles (73 solo), 24 tackles for losses, 12.0 sacks, eight passes defensed, five fumble recoveries, and three forced fumbles. A second team All-Western Athletic Conference selection, John finished the '94 season as Wyoming's third leading tackler with 52 stops (33 solo). The **defensive captain** was third in the WAC with 11 tackles for loss, while garnering 3 QB sacks, 5 passes defensed, 2 forced fumbles, and 4 fumble recoveries (2nd in WAC). Burrough also blocked one field goal and scored a touchdown off a blocked punt. John had one of his best games of the season vs. Nebraska with 10 tackles, including two for losses, in a 42-32 loss to the national champions. In '93, Burrough moved to right tackle after playing end as a sophomore and responded with an excellent season. He finished with 42 tackles, 7 tackles for losses, and 7 QB sacks in 11 starts. Wyoming went 8-3 in the regular season.

Notebook

John was in the trenches of another sport this past off-season when he was part of the pit crewfor race car driver Kyle Petty at the Atlanta Motor Speedway during the Primestar 500 on March 9th. He also was in the pits for Petty at Daytona, the Food City 500 in Bristol, TN, and at the Diehard 500 at Talladega . "I want people to think of a guy who is out there not for the politics, the glory, or the fame, but for the pure love of playing football." That statement sums up John Burrough's personal approach to playing football. It's that inherent love for the game coupled with a healthy dose of hard work that has allowed him to survive for three seasons in the NFL. The 245th player selected in the last round of the '95 draft, Burrough has quietly built up a consistent streak of playing in the last 48 games as a part of the Falcons' defensive line rotation. He made the most of his opportunity to prove himself as a rookie in the preseason. In a game against Miami, Burrough amassed three tackles, a pass deflection, and a sack of QB Bernie Kosar. Then, versus Buffalo, he collared another sack, four solo tackles, and a forced fumble to confirm he belonged. He has possessed a

penchant for working hard since he was a walk-on at Washington State in '90. When Cougars offensive coordinator Joe Tiller left to assume the head coaching duties at Wyoming, Burrough wasn't far behind. Besides his football exploits, John is a proud diploma-waving graduate of the geophysics program (spring of '96) at Wyoming. He has aspirations of going to graduate school or being a part of the oil industry for an environmental firm when his football days are over.

Personal

One of two children of Les and Barbara Burrough, his grandfather, Morris Burrough, played football at Colorado State. As a youth on the farmlands of Wyoming, some of his daily chores would be to tend to the horses and work the cows. John excelled at five positions (defensive end, linebacker, kicker, fullback, & tight end) at Pinedale (Wyoming) High School. He was voted team MVP and was named on the All-Conference team. But football wasn't the other sport that he was good at because he also was skilled in basketball, track and skiing. Because of his upbringing, John's an outdoorsman, who enjoys hunting, fishing and sailing.

Last Year

Devin was switched back to his rookie position, going from strong safety to free safety, in a rebuilt secondary in '97. Bush responded to the move with a career-best 105 tackles, including a personal-high of 68 solo stops, in starting every contest. He also added a personal-best of 10 passes defensed to his totals which also read one interception, and one fumble recovery. He tied his career high for tackles by collaring 12 at Seattle (11/30) in a win with a pair of passes defensed. He posted the second highest tackle total of his career with a team-high 11 stops in a victory over the Eagles (12/14). Devin was named defensive player of the game by the coaches with eight tackles and a key interception that stopped New Orleans' (11/23) last shot to get into the end zone to keep the Falcons' winning streak alive. His other top tackle games included 9 stops with a season-high three passes defensed at San Diego (12/7), eight tackles each vs. St. Louis (11/2) and at New Orleans (10/12), as well as amassing seven apiece at St. Louis (11/16), vs. Tampa Bay (11/9), and vs. S.F. (10/19).

Pro Career

His career began at free safety, albeit late in his first season because of a 19-day contract holdout, plus a pulled hamstring, and a hairline fracture of his left fibula. He fought through those setbacks to make five starts out of 11 games played at that position to earn All-Rookie honors with 38 tackles, an interception, and three special teams stops. His career-high 15 tackle (13 solos) performance against his hometown Dolphins (12/3/95) came in his first NFL start. In his first year as a starter at a new strong safety position in '96, he registered the most tackles in the Falcons secondary with 68. With 16 more games played added to his totals, Bush enters '98 with a streak of 40 consecutive games played in.

College Career

During his three seasons at FSU, Bush helped lead the Seminoles to a 33-3-1 (.917) record, including a National title in '93 with a win over Nebraska in the Orange Bowl. FSU finished the season ranked #2 in 1992 and #4 in '94. Bush entered the draft after his junior season, although he was at Florida State four years, where he redshirted his first season. He played in 37 games at FSU, starting the last 24 games, compiling 164 tackles (90 solo), three INT's, including one returned for a TD, 2.5 sacks, two fumble recoveries and one forced fumble. In his final season in '94, Devin started all 12 games at strong safety, earning All-America and All-Atlantic Coast Conference second team honors. He totaled a career-high 75 tackles (40 solo), two interceptions, five passes defensed, one sack, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. His season highlights included 13 tackles vs. Miami, picking off a pass in a 23-16 win over Notre Dame, and making 8 stops in a 23-17 win over Florida in the Sugar Bowl. Twenty-year old Devin moved into FSU's starting lineup, taking over for a pair of seniors, in his first year as a starter during his '93 sophomore year. Bush took full advantage of the opportunity, finishing with 68 tackles (39 solo), while returning one big interception for a TD against Miami.

Notebook

After coming out of college as a junior, Devin can add to his 43 games played total as a pro (40 in-a-row) at the age of only 25 (on July 3rd). Bush joins Bobby Butler (class of '81) and Deion Sanders (class of '89) as the third Florida State Seminole defensive back and #1 draft pick to come to the Falcons. He along with former FSU players have a T-shirt business with their best-selling brand which carries the slogan, '3 And Out' (referring to a goal of the defense). An all-around athlete, he once set an Seminole record with a 41-inch vertical leap and won a 110 meter hurdle even at a District meet in high school. This 'B' average student in high school is only 30 hours shy of receiving his degree in Social Sciences. His wife, Kesha, is a nursing major at FSU.

Personal

Bush was afforded third team All-America honors as well as being named to *Super Prep Magazine's* All-Dixie team and to *Miami Herald's* Super 24 Squad as a senior season at Miami's Hialeah Lakes H. S. After recording 85 tackles and six picks his final season he was invited to play in the Florida-Georgia All-Star Game. Devin has two younger brothers and the oldest, Davin, plays football at Hialeah High. He was tabbed the nation's "fourth-best free safety" coming out of the highly competitive high school system of Florida. As a 10th grader, Bush used to **spend time working (for \$40) as an usher at Miami Dolphin games** at the old Orange Bowl. When he's not found with his two children in Atlanta, Devin visits his mother (Patricia) and father (Sammy) who still reside in Miami.

Last Season

One of the key factors in the Falcons turnaround which produced a 6-2 second half record (three road wins) was the play of Chris Chandler. His strong second half play included 12 passing TD's and just three picks. In 6 of 8 games during the winning streak, he completed 65% of his passes, while producing QB ratings of 116, 111, 107.7, 107, 106, and 105.8. Chandler's presence in the lineup produced impressive results in his 10th season.

- #2 in NFL in QB rating with a career-high of 95.1 to earn first appearance in Pro Bowl.
- #2 in NFL in average gain per pass completion at 7.87 yards.

- #8 in NFL in completion percentage at 59.1%. (4th best of his career)
- #9 in NFL in lowest interception percentage at 2.04. (3rd best of his career)
- #12 in NFL in big play passes (of 25 yards or more) with 23 and he had at least one 30-yard pass in 11 of 14 games.
- #4 in NFL in passes completed in 4th quarter (42 of 64 for 65.6%).
- Threw a touchdown pass in 12 consecutive games (streak continues in '98), 4th best alltime in team history. Needs TD in first 2 games of '98 to tie record, 3 to break.
- Found 10 different receivers with TD passes (tied for #1 in NFL) to show he could locate whoever was open.
- Only threw three interceptions in final 10 games, 4 in last 13 games, to finish with the 4th lowest interception percentage in team annals (at 2.04).
- Completed over 60% of his passes in 8 of 14 games and passed 200 yards or more 8 times.

CHANDLER

Chris' season began with a series of injuries "after the play" but when he was in the lineup the Falcons posted a 7-3 record and scored an average of 22 points a game when he started. He suffered a mild concussion when spin-slammed to the Ga. Dome turf by Mike Fox (penalized for late hit) in the second quarter in the second game against Carolina (9/7). The following week after starting the Oakland game (9/14) he had to leave in the third quarter (16-25-199-2 TD's) when rookie linemen Darrell Russell drilled his helmet into Chandler's sternum in the third quarter (which he was penalized and drew a major fine from the NFL). He did not play at San Francisco (9/21), but dressed as the third quarterback. Against the Broncos (9/28), Chris injured his left ankle (high ankle sprain) on a collapsing pocket after he released the pass which forced him from the game at the beginning of the fourth quarter (did not return). With a bye week aiding the healing process, Chandler led the Falcons to their first victory the next game at New Orleans (10/12). After throwing for 230 yards and two TD's vs. S.F. (10/19) in three quarters, he was felled with another concussion in the fourth stanza (and did not return). That latest injury resulted in him missing the rematch at Carolina (10/26). But he started and finished the remaining eight games of the year to land a spot in the Pro Bowl. In '97 Chris missed two starts and parts of four other games as the Falcons lost all six

Pro Career

The Falcons were lauded by one publication for making "the trade of the year" in acquiring an experienced starting quarterback the caliber of Chandler from the Oilers for just 4th and 6th round selections. He has been a consistent starter in five of his 10 NFL seasons now with 15,372 total passing yards and he played in his first Pro Bowl in '97. After 84 career starts in 104 games played, he stands among the top 35 rated passers in all-time NFL history.

- √ Accurate thrower has completed 60.2% of his passes (719 of 1,194) over the last four seasons with a 2-to-1 touchdown to interception ratio with 60 passing TD's to just 30 interceptions. Year-by-Year

1996: He started 12 games in Houston and completed 184 of 320 passes for 2,099 yards with 16 TD's and 11 picks. A clutch performer, 10 of his 16 TD passes came on 3rd down. He tossed three TD's against the Jaguars, Saints, and two each vs. the Ravens, Bengals, and Dolphins. He only failed to complete at least 55% of his passes in one game.

1995: In 13 games as a starter for the Oilers, he enjoyed personal-bests in TD's with 17 and completion percentage at 63.2. His 352 yards passing vs. Cin. was first 300-yard passing game by an Oiler since Warren Moon in '93. His QB rating of 87.8 was 3rd highest in AFC behind Marino & Harbaugh and he had a streak of 125 straight passes without an interception.

1994: His first season with the Rams included six starts and 12 overall appearances. He ended up with the best QB rating of his career to date with a high 93.8 mark. (The 93.8 was second only to Steve Young but his 176 passes didn't qualify for rankings.) 1993: Chris played in four games with two starts in a back-up role to the Cardinals' Steve Beuerlein. Hit 27-46 for 214 vs. Dallas.

1992: He started the year by completing **84 passes in-a-row**. He established career-bests in completions, attempts, passing yards, and yards rushing in 13 starts in Arizona. Had 383-yard game vs. Dallas and 8 games over 200 yards.

1991: He started the season in Tampa Bay before being released and his contract claimed off waivers by Arizona. He played in six games for the Bucs and three games for the Cardinals with two starts.

1990: He was acquired by Tampa Bay from Indy for a '92 first round pick but saw limited action. (The Colts selected Jeff George with the #1 overall pick.)

1989: He was playing a game against the Falcons on Sept. 24 when he suffered a seasonending knee injury. One week earlier he had completed 20 of 33 passes for 266 yards with a personal-best 82 yard TD versus the Rams.

1988: He unseated Jack Trudeau in his first season and earned All-Rookie honors with 1,619 yards.

College Career

At the University of Washington, he started 26 consecutive games and finished third in school history in total offense with 4,442 yards and TD passes with 32. He led his team to the Independence Bowl his final season with 1,739 yards through the air and 11 TD's. As a junior, he set a school record with 20 TD's and tied a NCAA record with four second quarter TD passes in a game against Stanford in leading the Cougars to an 8-3-1 record and a berth in Sun Bowl. He showed his leadership qualities early in college as he guided the Huskies of Don James to a 20-17 victory in the Freedom Bowl in only his fourth collegiate start as a sophomore. He capped off a consistent college career which included 10 200-yard passing days by being honored as the Offensive Player of the Game at the Senior Bowl.

Notebook

Chris is a "scratch" golfer who was invited to play in the annual Isuzu Celebrity Golf Classic at Lake Tahoe (spring of '97) and tied ex-Falcon QB Steve Bartkowski for 7th place (with a three-round total of 216), three shots off the lead. His passion for golf is satisfied by the courses at his off-season home in Palm Springs, Ca. and Atlanta. At the Neil Lomax Quarterback Shoot-Out he won a long drive contest by outdistancing the opposition with a powerful 331-yard shot. When Chandler stepped under center for the first time in Atlanta last year, he set an NFL record by starting for his sixth different NFL team (since the '70 merger). He grew up a huge University of Washington fan and was excited to play in the Kingdome last year for the very first time against one of his all-time favorites. Warren Moon. As a twelve-year old, Chandler fondly still remembers watching Moon engineer an upset of Michigan in the '78 Rose Bowl, 27-20. His father-in-law is former 17-year veteran 49ers QB John Brodie. Chris owns a condo next to Brodie and the pair are quite a formidable two-some on the links. (His career QB rating of 77.99 is better than Brodie's 723.) Chandler was the youngest starting quarterback in the NFL in '88. During his rookie campaign, he earned a starting assignment with the Colts after four games and led them to a 9-4 record the rest of the way as the starter. The nine victories were the most by a Colt OB since Bert Jones (10 wins) in '77. He was traded to Tampa Bay by Indy (who acquired the first pick in the draft from the Falcons to select Jeff George) in exchange for the Bucs' first round pick in the '92 draft (where they selected DL Steve Emtman with the #1 overall choice).

Personal

The ninth of ten children born from a large Chandler family out of Everett, Washington, Christopher Mark received his first name by being delivered on Columbus Day. If buying presents for his immediate family wasn't enough, Chris has 17 nieces and nephews. He was an all-around athlete at Everett High School in football (49 passing TD's and 2,000 passing yards), basketball (averaging 21.5 points per game to lead conference) and baseball (batting .425 as a catcher). He also found time to garner letters in golf and track (a 6-4 high jumper). This *Parade* football All-America wasn't the first pro athlete in the family as his brother, Greg, was behind the plate for the San Francisco Giants organization in '78. He and his wife, Diane, a top-notch tennis player at Southern Cal, have two daughters, Ryann Mae (3/9/95), and Skye (born in '96). His brother-in-law, Larry Stfanki, is the former tennis coach of John McEnroe and the current coach of Marcelo Rios of Chile who was the #1 player in the world earlier this year.





Last Season

Bob was an invaluable all-around player for the Falcons in '97. Whether it was opening up holes for Jamal Anderson's 1,052 rushing yards and 10 TD's as a blocking fullback, catching passes or running down kicks for the special teams coverage units, Christian was equal to any task that was asked of him by the Falcon coaches. A testament to his value on offense was witnessed when he was twice named offensive player of the game by the coaches because of his BLOCKING efforts (at S.F., 9/21 and at N.O., 10/12). His determination on the birds' kick coverage teams was quite evident as he finished second on the team in special teams tackles with 11 and garnered two special teams player of the game nods. Of course, he was ready when called upon to carry the ball or to catch it out of the backfield (22 receptions for 154 yards with one TD). As a receiver, he hauled in a season-high 3 passes on four different occasions and totaled 32 yards to help the Falcons defeat the Seahawks (11/30), Half of Christians receptions (11) and yards (82) were recorded in the team's second half turnaround. Solid contributions were also seen in his blocking exploits for Anderson's 162 yards vs. St. Louis (11/2), tied for 7th-best ever in team history, and 152 yards at Arizona (12/21). Byron Hanspard was the beneficiary of Christian's tough blocks on his record-breaking 77 yard run and 57 & 53-yarders.

Pro Career

Christian rebounded to have a solid year for the Falcons after being sidelined for all of the '96 campaign in Carolina because of a torn right pectoral suffered in a preseason game with the Giants (8/23/96). Bob is now a veteran of 58 games with 27 starts in five seasons with three different teams. He **scored the first-ever touchdown in Panther history** with a 16 yard pass reception in the Hall of Fame game (7/29/95) and was **on the receiving end of the first pass in team history** vs. Atlanta (9/3/95). With 12 starts that year he set personal-bests with 158 rushing yards and 29 catches for 255 yards. After being a 12th round draft choice of the Falcons in '91, he was released in training camp. He was drafted in the 16th round by the London Monarchs (175th overall) of the new World League (2/4/92) but released (on 2/25). Bob was invited to the Chargers '92 camp before being waived on the final cut but was signed to the Bears practice squad. He was activated for the last two games of the season and he amassed three special teams stops. He worked his way onto the roster in '93, becoming a key special teamer. Christian finished fourth on the Bears with his nine tackles and his five stops inside the 20 paced the club. He played in the first 12 games in the Bears backfield in '94 before missing the rest of the season with a sprained right MCL.

College Career

Bob left Northwestern as the school record holder in rushing yards with 2,643 (since broken). He collected the most all-purpose yards in a game in school annals with 319 (220 rushing, 99 receiving) against Wisconsin. The 220 rushing yards on 42 carries were the third-best day of any Wildcat back ever. He was also a two-time Big 10 Offensive Player of the Week as a senior. His junior year included a single season school record of 1,291 yards with seven 100-yard games. He rushed for 413 yards as a sophomore playing in every contest. His freshman season was cut short due to a broken jaw suffered in his fifth collegiate game.

Notebook


One of the busiest Falcons on gameday, Bob's body takes a physical pounding each Sunday. After knocking down linebackers and knocking back defensive linemen as a blocking fullback on offense for three plays, Bob would then have to fight off blocks to get downfield to cover punts on fourth down for special teams. Of course, he also would line up every time to cover kickoffs and block on some of the kickoff return teams. "Satisfaction for me comes from a lot of little things that might not show up in the statistics but that the coaches and my teammates know are critical to our success," Bob explained. Two player of the game honors by the coaches each on offense and special teams was an indication of the respect he receives for his daily work. "Everybody needs to play consistent week-in and week-out like Bob Christian does and we'll be a winning team," noted Dan Reeves. Bob's journey in the NFL has been a study in perseverance. After being released by the Falcons and then the Chargers in '92, Bob enrolled back into Northwestern to complete his degree in electrical engineering. Once his studies were underway, the Colts came calling and wanted to add him to their practice squad. Bob respectfully declined the invitation because he would have to withdraw from school and start all over again. "I wanted to graduate and I was really close," he rationalized. He didn't pass up his next opportunity the following year with the Bears and he ended up landing on their regular roster at the end of that season. But he wasn't protected by Chicago three years later and his name was placed on the expansion list and he was eventually drafted by the Panthers (his fourth team in four years). Christian loves music and has been a serious plano player for over 20 years and is the proud owner of a hammer dulcimer and trumpet. A quiet, unassuming person, Bob definitely looked out of character when he was in his first NFL training camp with the Falcons. Veteran John Rade shaved the rookies heads one night and Bob sported an uncharacteristic mohawk for weeks.

Personal

A football, baseball and track standout at McCluer North High School in Florissant, MO (outside of St. Louis), Robert Douglas is the oldest in a family of three children of Jim and Kay Christian. His parents visit Atlanta from their suburban St. Louis home to watch their son play and lead a big contingent of Falcons fans in the TWA Dome each season. Bob is the leader of the Falcons' weekly bible study classes and a member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes as well as Athletes in Action. Bob and some Athletes in Action (including former Falcon Darnell Walker) took a 14-hour plane ride to reach South Africa on a mission trip during the spring of '98 which included football camps.

Last Season

Calvin's rookie season saw him earn the team's starting center spot four games into the season and go on to earn All-Rookie honors. He started his first NFL game at San Francisco (9/21) and went on to line up in the last 13 consecutive games. With his presence as a starter, the birds were able to finish 6th in the NFL in time of possession and churned out 21 drives of 10 or more plays with 18 drives of 70 or more yards. His blocking efforts allowed the Falcons to improve their rushing game from 27th in '96 to 20th last year and the club finished 13th in the NFL in scoring TD's in the "Red Zone". His signal-caller, Chris Chandler, made the Pro Bowl with the second-best QB rating in the League and a 59.1% accuracy mark while the teams's 26 passing TD's were the 5th best. Collins helped paved the way for Jamal Anderson's 1,052 rushing yards with 162 (7th-best ever) and 152 (14thmost) yard individual games. His solid blocks enabled rookie Byron Hanspard to record two of the longest runs in team history with 57-yards vs. Denver (9/28) and 53-yards vs. Philadelphia (12/14). In almost half of the games he started (6 of 13) the Falcons' offense racked up over 300 yards worth of total offense, including a season-high 462 vs. St. Louis (11/2), 386 vs. Philly (12/14), and 356 at Arizona (12/21). In the final back-to-back games of the season with Collins' help Atlanta racked up 400 total rushing yards. Calvin helped hold NFL sack leader at the time Wayne Martin of the Saints without a sack at New Orleans (10/12) in one of his best performances of the year.

College Career

Calvin was a huge presence on the offensive line for four seasons for the Aggies of Texas A&M. This talented four-year starter was either a first or second-team all-conference member EVERY season. Collins was a second-team All-Big 12 choice in '96 as he opened holes for an Aggie rushing attack that averaged 230 yards per game with high of 257 vs. BYU. He contributed 78 knockdown blocks to opponents his final season. In '95, Calvin was a first-team All-SWC selection as a right guard for displaying his pass blocking skills as a junior by helping Texas A&M average 201 passing yards a contest, highest in a decade by an Aggie team. He recorded six knockdowns as the team piled up 276 rushing yards in a 33-17 win over LSU. With Collins protecting the line, the unit allowed only nine QB sacks all season. As a sophomore, he started five games at center and five at guard in earning a spot on the All-SWC first-team blocking for #1 pick Leeland McElroy and an offense that scored 319 points, while averaging 360.2 yards of total offense per game. His impressive freshman season landed him on the All-SWC first-team as a right guard as he was part of an O-line that helped Texas A&M score 404 points (36.7 per contest) with 27 rushing TD's and an average rush per game of 234.3 yards. He registered a season-high 10 knockdowns vs. TCU when his team gained 493 total yards.


Notebook

Calvin received praise from other players around the League last year for looking like "a keeper" (said Chargers defensive lineman John Parrella) on film. Collins battled through the usual transition period for a rookie player with an unusual maturity beyond his years and progressed each week. Trying to block the likes of Defensive Player of the Year Dana Stubblefield (twice), Pro Bowler Warren Sapp, Martin, and D'Marco Farr can be a daunting task for a rookie, but he more than held his own in these individual wars. "It's like taking a major exam every week", he explained. "Going up against competition that I've faced can be nerve-racking." This smart and articulate native of Beaumont, Texas was a business

analysis major at A&M and once had a home page on the Internet and aspires to someday design web sites for a living. He was so close to deciding to turn pro after his junior year that he was actually in his dorm room rehearsing his speech to head coach R.C. Slocum while good friend and teammate Leeland McElroy was telling Slocum he was turning pro. Needless to say, Collins changed his mind and relented that it was one of the best decisions he ever made. Falcons management listened to a draft day recommendation from Collins' Senior Bowl offensive line coach and selected the lineman after positive remarks from Hall of Famer Art Shell. Even a mature player as a freshman in college, Calvin was the only underclassman to start on Texas A&M's senior-dominated offensive line.

Personal

Calvin Lewis is the son of Donald and Linda Aplon of Beaumont, He was callled "the third best offensive lineman in the state of Texas and the 13th-best prospect in the Southwest". His productive high school career included mention in Super Prep magazine and Blue Chip Illustrated as an All-America for his play at West Brook High. Collins was a stalwart at guard, center, and as a long snapper. Calvin was named the Student-Athlete of the Year by the Beaumont Enterprise and a member of the National Honor Society. In college, he established a school record for offensive linemen with a 555-pound squat in addition to placing second on the squad with a 410-pound bench press.

Last Season

The Falcons acquired one of the best special teams players in the NFL and an emerging wide receiver when they signed Keith Crawford to a two-year contract on March 16. The Rams' special teams captain totaled 14 tackles in 15 games last year, second-best on the

team. Crawford also started a pair of games at wide receiver, catching a career-best 11 passes for 232 yards, and leading the NFL with a 21.1 per catch average. Ten of his 11 catches were good for first downs last year. He hauled in a team-high three passes for 86 yards, including a career-long of 69-

yards from Tony Banks, at San Francisco. Keith recorded a career-high four receptions for 85 yards vs. Kansas City (10/26) with a long of 45 before leaving with a knee injury. Crawford's best games of the year on special teams were vs. S.F. (9/7) and the N.Y. Giants (9/21) as he amassed three tackles on each occasion. Busy Keith also rushed the ball two times for 32 yards last year with a long of 23 on a reverse play.

Pro Career

Crawford has established his name among the top special teammers in the League over the past three seasons by collaring 45 tackles on the heels of a team-leading 15 in '96. During the last three years he has finished no lower than second on the his team in special teams stops. He's also lined up on both sides of the ball as a wide receiver and cornerback during his five year pro career. Keith broke into the League as an undrafted free agent of Dan Reeves' New York Giants in '93. After playing in seven games as a rookie he caught on with the Packers midway through the '94 season after being released by the Giants. In '95, he was moved to defensive back in Green Bay and collected 24 tackles and 16 special teams stops.


College Career

Crawford displayed his athleticism for the Yellow Jackets of Howard Payne College in track by qualifying for the NCAA nationals in the long jump. Falcons special teams coach Joe DeCamillis is happy he doesn't have to game plan against stopping the aggressive Crawford anymore as an opponent and can concentrate instead on letting him wreck havoc for his own units. "Keith Crawford is the most SPECIAL special teams player I've ever been around," said veteran coach Dick Vermeil. With his huge smile and friendly disposition, Keith should be popular in the Falcons locker room and in the community. Born on November 21, 1970, Keith L. is the youngest of seven children in a single-parent home. He captured nine letters in football, basketball, baseball, and track at Westwood High School in Palestine, TX. With a leap of over 22 feet, he won the Texas state long jump title in '89 for the Panthers' track team. But this skinny 5-10, 160 pounder wide receiver/safety wasn't highly recruited because of his size. Former Westwood High coach Bill Anderson was running the program at NCAA Division III Howard Payne college and gave Crawford a shot. Because the school does not provide athletic scholarships, Keith was forced to put himself through school and some of his jobs included mowing lawns for a friends' lawn service and working in the laundry room washing the team's uniforms after practice.

Last Season

After beginning the season as a reserve linebacker and special teams player, Henri (pronounced ON-Ree) gained a starting spot when David Brandon broke his leg at San Francisco (9/21) fourgames into the season. Crockett occupied the right outside linebacker position the rest of the season and responded with 46 tackles (28 solos), two QB sacks, 7 QB pressures, and a fumble recovery in 11 starts. He posted a season-high 8 tackles in the rematch with the 49ers (10/19) and collared 7 stops against the Rams (11/2). He grabbed

his first NFL sack of Kerry Collins at Carolina (10/26) and trapped Tony Banks of the Rams (11/2) the following week for a sack in back-to-back games. Henri's totals also included a team-high two special teams tackles against Oakland (9/14).

College Career

Henri emerged as a reliable starter in his senior season on a powerful Florida State team. Crockett collected 98 tackles to finish third on one of the nation's best defenses that featured two #1 top 15 picks in Peter Boulware and Reinard Wilson. He also added 12 tackles for loss, 4.5 quarterback sacks, and an interception for the 6th ranked Seminoles. He performed in 45 games during his four-year career and finished with 192 tackles, 20 for losses, 6.5 QB sacks, two picks, and a forced and recovered fumble.

Notebook

Henri made a name for himself and earned a spot on the roster with a strong performance in a preseason game against the Buccaneers. In that Tampa Bay game, he recorded a gamehigh seven tackles with four coming on solo stops, but it was his goal-line, fourth down hit of Reggie Brooks and subsequent forced fumble with :32 left which sealed the win for the birds and made an impression on the coaches. In his senior season, Crockett's 98 tackles at Florida State were actually more than heralded future top #1 pick (4th overall) and NFL Defensive Rookie-of-the-Year Peter Boulware. Henri only started his final season but he came up big in some of the Seminoles' most important games such as the showdown with #1 Florida (10 solo tackles, 3 for loss, in the FSU win) and the rematch in the Sugar Bowl (11 tackles). He committed to FSU, following in the footsteps of brother, Zack (Colts), after being recruited heavily by the likes of in-state rivals Miami, Florida and Oklahoma. Crockett teammed with Devin Bush in Tallahassee for two seasons and his name goes on the list of Florida State products to wear a Falcon uniform (Deion Sanders, Bobby Butler, Bush).

Personal

Crockett was afforded several honors as a highly-decorated prep player at Ely High School in Pompano Beach, Florida. A *Parade Magazine, Super Prep,* and *Football Report* All-America, he was also named to *USA Today's* second-team and dubbed the **South's top prospect** as a senior by *Southern Recruiting Magazine* with 165 tackles. In all, he **collected 392 tackles in a solid prep career** and played in the Georgia-Florida high school all-star game in Atlanta. Henri was a criminology major at FSU and is a big fisherman around the lakes in his hometown of Pompano Beach.

Last Season

Nathan was on the Falcons' inactive list for the first 12 games of the season. Davis was activated and saw his first action of the year vs. New Orleans (11/23). The next week at Seattle (11/30), he registered a QB pressure. He was placed on the club's inactive list for the final three games of '97.

College Career

For the Indiana Hoosiers, he registered 37 tackles for losses in his career, 3rd most in school history. Nathan started 32 of 44 career games and finished with 133 tackles and 13 QB sacks. Big Nathan collected 28 tackles for loss and 10 sacks over his final two seasons at Indiana, while also adding 61 solo tackles to earn second-team All-Big 10 honors. His teammates named him their Most Valuable Lineman in '95. He was slowed last year with a pelvic injury that wasn't fully discovered until the season was over. In '96, Davis started every game except the Michigan State contest at left defensive end, recording 34 tackles with 23 solos, and 4 sacks for minus 25 yards. In his junior season, he amassed a career-high 60 tackles and he paced the team with six sacks (for minus 38 yards). His 20 stops for losses were also a personal-best and 13th best in the nation. There was only one player in the history of Indiana football to have more tackles for losses in a single season (Van Waiters with 24 in '86).


Notebook

At a huge 312 pounds, he's the biggest Falcon defensive lineman ever. He bulked up from 265 pounds to his present weight to fill out his 6-5 frame. A talented shot putter, Nathan finished 10th at the Olympic Trials for the right to compete in Atlanta for the USA in '96. The All-America and All-Big 10 selection in track captured conference titles in the shot put during the indoor (62' 8 3/4") and outdoor track seasons his last two years of college. He finished third indoor and fourth outdoors at the NCAA's and is the school record holder. Davis has athletic roots as his cousin is perennial All-Star SS Barry Larkin of the Cincinnati Reds. He carries a tattoo of a scorpion on his shoulder. His role model is his brother, Tim Jr., who was an all-state football player and state qualifier in the shot put at Richmond (IN) High. Nathan exceeded his older brother's accomplishments by winning two state shot put titles and was a national scholastic indoor champion.

Personal

Born in Hartford, CT., his parents divorced when he was young. He moved to Indianapolis with his mother before she decided to enlist in the Air Force and put him up for adoption. Nathan was adopted by Tim and Mary Davis of Richmond, Indiana at the age of four. He went searching for his natural parents during Christmas of '94. Nathan's natural birth father (Nathan Gibbs) is a truck driver living in Atlanta while his natural mother (Cheryl) remarried and relocated to Lima, Ohio. A reunion took place between the families during the weekend of the Indiana-Ohio State game in fall of '96. As a defensive end at Richmond High, he was named All-Conference, second-team All-State, and area Defensive Player of the Year with 108 tackles and 18 QB sacks as a senior. He also caught 13 passes for 220 yards with 2 TD's as the team's tight end. Nathan heaved the shot put to win the state title during his junior season and a national indoor championship his final track season.

Last Season

Gary was a special teams leader last season for the Falcons. Downs paced the #4 ranked special teams unit in the NFL (according to Dallas Morning News ratings) with 13 tackles. His tight coverage allowed the birds to lead the NFL in punt coverage by limiting opponents to just 2.6 yards per return. He also played a major role in being part of a unit which led the NFL in fair catches forced with 45. His aggressive play had the Falcons second in kickoff coverage, allowing opponents to start their drives at only the 23-yard line. He was named special teams player of the game by coaches for his two-tackle performance at San Francisco (9/21). His jarring hit on Pro Bowl returner Michael Bates at Carolina (10/26) knocked Bates' helmet off.

Pro Career

Downs' pro career has now reached 37 games played in four seasons. This third round draft pick of the Giants in '94 performed in 14 games as a rookie. Gary finished with 51 yards on 15 carries and caught two passes for 15 yards besides excelling on special teams. After battling in '95 training camp against the likes of Herschel Walker, 1,000 yard rusher Rodney Hampton and #1 pick Tyrone Wheatley, he was released on the last cut. He was picked up by Denver and played in one game, while being inactive for 14 games. In '96, Gary replaced injured WR Amani Toomer on the Giants roster on October 31 and proceeded to perform in six games with one start for Dan Reeves. When injuries in the Giants backfield felled Hampton (knee) and Wheatley (ankle) during the Saints game(12/15) Downs responded with a career-high 42 yards on seven carries with a long of 27 yards in a New York win. The following week Gary beat that performance with a new personal-high of 52 yards, including 40 in the first half, as New York jumped out to a 22-0 lead against AFC Champion New England.

College Career


When his career at North Carolina State was over Gary would leave his name in the school record book as the 10th best rusher ever with 1,642 yards. He would also rank third in rushing touchdowns with 23. To close out his fine career, Downs gained 937 yards and scored nine TD's on 186 carries as a senior to be named first-team All-ACC and third-team All-America. He wrapped up his senior season with 102 yards on 13 rushes and four catches for 34 yards against Michigan in the Hall of Fame Bowl.

Notebook/Personal

A former all-state product out of Georgia's Spencer High in Columbus, Gary amassed 683 yards on 100 rushes as a senior in a wishbone offense. Downs crossed the goaline for three TD's on offense and then stole a pass and scampered 95 yards for a score on defense. For his overall efforts, he was given Spencer's "Golden Helmet Award" as team most valuable player. Gary played in Atlanta's old Fulton County Stadium for N.C. State against East Carolina in the Peach Bowl where he rambled for 63 yards and a TD. He was an immediate hit in his very first collegiate game when he scored a pair of TD's. An accomplished member of Spencer's track team, he finished second in the 100-meter high hurdles at a Junior Olympics national track meet. He was a sprinter on the Wolfpack track team. The articulate and introspective athlete was a member of the National Honor Society in high school and was on the Academic All-ACC honor roll at N.C.State. During Gary's brief hiatus before returning to the Giants (in October of '96), he was coaching a junior high team in the Atlanta area and staying in shape at a local gym. He participates in Sho Do Kahn karate as well as being a student of Metaphysics. His father, Gary, Sr., played collegiately at North Carolina Central.

Last Season

Shane was a key addition to the Falcons' rotating defensive line when he was picked up off of waivers from the Lions before the season opener at Detroit. Dronett (pronounced DROnett) appeared in all 16 games with one start and was part of the line that helped the Falcons establish a new team record with 55 QB sacks. He added four sacks to the d-line's productive total of 43.5. In addition, Shane totaled 40 tackles (25 solos), 14 QB pressures, and two blocked field goals. He was singled out by the coaches as player of the game vs. New Orleans (11/23) for registering six tackles, 2 sacks, a pass defensed, and a blocked field goal. He also collared a season-high seven tackles (one for a loss) vs. Carolina (9/7) and five stops and a sack at St. Louis (11/16).

Pro Career

Dronett averaged 55 tackles and recorded 19.5 QB sacks in his first three seasons in the NFL from '92-94. As a rookie second round pick for Dan Reeves in Denver in '92, he ranked third on the team with 6.5 sacks to go along with 53 tackles and two forced fumbles. In '93, Shane worked himself into a starters' role and set a personal-best with seven sacks. The following season saw him establish a career-high with 63 tackles, which included dropping opposing QB's six times (second on team), including a personal-best of three sacks of Raiders QB Jeff Hostetler. A surgically repaired knee slowed him to 13 games and 13 tackles in his last season in Denver in '95. The Falcons signed Dronett in the '96 off-season and he made eight tackles in the first four games before being released. The Lions picked him up immediately and he finished the season in Detroit by making two tackles each vs. Green Bay and San Francisco. Shane's career numbers read 89 games played in six seasons with 227 tackles and 25.5 sacks.

College Career

Afirst-team All-America and two-time All-SWC pick for the Texas Longhorns, he registered 181 tackles, 22 sacks, 52 QB pressures, seven forced fumbles, two recovered fumbles, and seven blocked kicks in three years. Texas' left defensive end broke in as a starter as a freshman and he declared himself eligible for the NFL draft after his junior season after posting 72 tackles, 25 QB pressures, four forced fumbles, nine passes knocked down and four blocked kicks

Notebook / Personal

Shane was Golden Gloves boxing champion during his high school days in Texas. He's relied on that boxer-type intensity to battle and survive through six seasons in the NFL's physical trenches. With his long arms and keen anticipation, Dronett has blocked seven field goals in the NFL (4 in '94) with two more last year. If you count his seven blocks in college, he has 14 total blocks which draws attention by every special teams coach each week. Teammate Morten Andersen is very familiar with Dronett's special knack for blocking kicks as he was the victim of two of his blocks in New Orleans in '94. He's also used those long arms to record 21 batted down passes in his career in the pro's. An all-state product in the highly competitive state of Texas as a tight end, Shane was rated the best prospect at that position in the state out of Bridge City H.S. The native of Orange, TX. majored in landscape architecture at Texas. He and his wife, Chris, have a pair of daughters, Berkley, 6, and Haley, 4.

Last Season

The Falcons signed a versatile, experienced lineman who can play every position along the line in Matt Elliott. Matt displayed his flexibility by starting six games and performing in four different positions (RT, RG, LG, TE) for the Division rival Carolina Panthers while seeing action in all 16 contests. Elliott began the season as the Panthers' starting right guard vs. Washington (8/31) and at Atlanta (9/7). With his presence in the lineup, the team recorded 158 and 141 rushing yards, respectively, in those first two games. He registered his fifth start of the season at left guard vs. Kansas City (9/21). Matt also saw time at right guard after Greg Skrepenak was ejected. Elliott continued to contribute on special teams and in short yardage situations until tight ends Wesley Walls and Walter Rasby were lost with injuries at Dallas (12/8). He filled in at tight end during the Cowboys game. He received a start at right tackle vs. St. Louis (12/20) for the injured Norberto Davidds-Garrido.

Pro Career

Elliott has provided depth and versatility in 63 games with 34 starts for two teams through five seasons. The last player taken in the 12th round of the '92 draft by the Redskins, he started in two games including a Monday Nighter. In '93, Matt was forced to spend the entire season on Injured Reserve after tearing his left MCL in a scrimmage. He was released by Washington in training camp the following season and caught on with the expansion Panthers in '95. He started 14 games at right guard in their inaugural season and was part of a Panther line that did not surrender a sack in four games. The next season in '96 he was in the starting lineup for the final 12 games at left guard in Carolina's run to the playoffs. With his steady work in the trenches, Carolina finished 7th in offense and allowed sacks to Kerry Collins just three times in the last four games and only 11 times in the final 10 games. He was also responsible for RB Anthony Johnson's six 100-yard rushing games in last 14 weeks.

College

Matt was a three-year starter at center and guard for the powerful Michigan Wolverines. He earned first-team All-American accolades from College & Pro Football Weekly as well as first-team All-Big 10 honors for his senior season. His play during his junior season saw him be named an honorable mention All-Big 10 choice and he capped the year off by winning co-MVP honors at the Gator Bowl. He bulldozed holes for RB Jon Vaughn's 288 rushing yards vs. UCLA in '90, third-most ever by a Wolverine back.


Notebook/Personal

Matt was a conscientious role model during his days as a Panther. He started Fat Guy Charities ("because one of my rules is you can't take yourself too seriously") and a "Run for Daylight"program which has raised tens of thousands of dollars for Carolina's children's charities. He started the charities because of his relationship with Jason Kostelnik. Elliott met Jason in '92 at a children's fund-raising telethon (Children's Miracle Network) while playing for the Redskins. He lost his 14 year-old friend after a heart transplant failed (born with a degenerative heart) in July of '97. His Fat Guy Charities was started because of Jason's inspiration and has raised over \$250,000 and he even has his own web page (www.fatguy.com). Matt captured the Paul A. Hunsicker Memorial Award at Michigan for the undergraduate "demonstrating superior scholarship along with professional zeal and promise in kinesiology". He was a two-way starter for a 14-0 state champion Carmel (IN) High School team as a senior. He was also an all-state selection on the track in '86 and he served as co-captain for the school's football, hockey and track teams his final prep season. His father played college basketball at Indiana, while his older brother, Mike, Jr., played pro soccer in Europe and younger brother, Marc, played center at Michigan. His sister, Megan, also showed off her athleticism as a champion ice skater. Elliott's already been accepted into the Masters program in telecommunications at his alma mater. One of his favorite bands is Hootie and the Blowfish and he struck up a friendship with the band members and often times plays golf with them. Before being signed by the Panthers in '95 he was preparing to serve as a color commentator on Friday night high school football games in Loudoun County, Va. In '94, he was a sideline reporter for 'Skins games and was an ABC Sports production assistant for the Indy 500. Matt was called "Lego Lineman" by his Panther teammates for his ability to step in and play all the positions along the line. Eric Matthew was named after one of his father's heroes, "Eric the Red".

Last Season

Randy Fuller adds another winning veteran presence in the Falcons secondary. He started three games at left cornerback and played in 12 total games for the AFC Central Division Champion Pittsburgh Steelers in '97. Randy amassed 30 tackles, 28 solo stops, while collecting a forced fumble and QB sack to his totals. An excellent special teammer, Fuller collared 13 tackles on the Steelers' special units. He was second on the team in tackles in a start at Jacksonville (9/22) with 11. In another start the following week at Tennessee (9/28), he chipped in with his first career sack, four tackles and a forced fumble which led to a Jason Gildon touchdown return. His best effort on special teams came at Philadelphia when he had three tackles. Fuller played on defense and special teams vs. Denver in the AFC Championship game.

Pro Career

Randy's veteran NFL dossier now reads 49 games played with five starts in four seasons. In addition, he's competed in seven post-season games, including Super Bowl XXX. He spent the last three seasons in Pittsburgh after beginning his pro career in Denver as a fourth round draft choice in '94. One of his most memorable plays came in the '95 AFC Championship game when he batted down a "Hail Mary" pass by Colts QB Jim Harbaugh in the Steelers' end zone intended for Aaron Bailey that earned Pittsburgh a trip to Super Bowl XXX, As a rookie with the Broncos, Fuller played in 10 games and ended up with 22 tackles. He tied a season-high by posting four tackles along with a pass defensed against Atlanta (11/20) as an extra DB. When he was released in Sept. of '95, the Steelers quickly signed him. He played in 13 games that season and tied for fifth on the team in special teams tackles with 12. He also performed in every playoff game for the Steelers and came up with four tackles and a special teams stop. In '96, he suffered fractured ribs and a broken clavicle which forced him on the inactive list for the first two games. He returned to play in a career-high 14 games in the team's dime package and also added 19 special teams tackles, 6th-best on the squad. He's made an impact on 'teams' by totaling 59 special teams tackles during his career.

College Career



Fuller picked off 15 passes with 187 tackles in a busy senior season which included earning All-Big City honors and being named the school's "Athlete of the Year". His exploits on the track were highlighted by a Georgia state record with a long jump of 24' 6". Fuller earned his degree in criminal justice from Tennessee State and likes to fish and play golf in his spare time. He and his wife, Gussie, live in Pittsburgh in the off-season.

Last Season

Tony's initial season in the pro's was spent mainly on the sideline learning and watching Chris Chandler earn a Pro Bowl berth. Graziani was inactive six of the first seven weeks of the season as the club's third quarterback. He entered the 49ers game (9/21) in his first action as a pro in the fourth quarter and completed three of five passes for 17 yards with a scramble for a yard. He received a start in the pouring rain when Chandler was injured in a nationally-televised game on the road at Carolina (10/26). Tony completed just four of 18 passes for 24 yards and two picks in one half of work. He remained the Falcons' second-string quarterback the rest of the season and only entered one game (vs. New Orleans, 11/23) but did not attempt another pass.

College Career

An athletic, mobile quarterback, Tony Graziani finished his career at Oregon as the fifthmost prolific passer with 4,498 yards. The southpaw tossed 24 passing touchdowns and scrambled for 335 more yards on the ground with five rushing scores, Graziani started 19 of 28 games for the Ducks and completed 54% of his passes. His best season came in '95 as he completed 231-of-426 passes for 2,604 yards with 13 TD's. He was also a threat to run, gaining 236 yards on scrambles with four rushing TD's to end up with 2,840 all-purpose yards, 3rd most in team history. Tony started every game except the Illinois contest and enjoyed his finest college season in '95 in leading the Ducks to the Cotton Bowl. The '95 season also saw him lead Oregon to an upset over UCLA as he threw for two scores and scrambled for another in a big 38-31 win. He tossed for a personal-best 340 yards on 27 of 55 tries vs. Arizona State and added 322 yards on 23 of 49 attempts with a pair of scores in a 27-20 defeat of Utah. In the upset over UCLA, he hit on 76% of his passes on 19 of 25 for 255 yards with two TD's and a 19-yard rush for a score. His overall performance left him 8th in the nation in total offense. His college career included passing games of 340, 322, 316, 292, 287, 282, 276, and 255 yards. Tony was limited to six games in '96 due to a knee injury. He was recruited to Oregon by Rich Brooks.

Notebook


Tony received an unexpected thrill when he had a chance to play against a team he grew

up cheering for. A childhood 49er fan, he played almost half the fourth quarter in a 34-7 loss at 3Com Park the fourth week of the season. Graziani used to attend 'Niner games and actually was in the stands two months before his pro training camp taking in a Giants baseball game. He became the third Falcon signal-caller and the first rookie since '93 to start for the Falcons after only eight weeks of action when he lined up under center at Carolina. Falcon coaches are hoping Tony's elevation to second-string status over the second half of the season helped his game as he was afforded more experience by getting additional reps in practice each day. His presence gives the birds a totally different type of quarterback than Chandler. He's a mobile, left-hander who matured at the college level by guiding the lesser-known Oregon team over higher-profile programs such as UCLA in '95 and Southern Cal in '94. It was Oregon's first win at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum against USC in 23 years as he helped lead the offensive assault that ended with 478 total yards. This political science major at Oregon racked up numbers that were second only to Dan Fouts and former Falcon QB's Chris Miller & Bob Berry.

Personal

Anthony Robert was born in Las Vegas and has one brother and two sisters in the family of Michael and Debbie Branham. A phenomenal passer at Downey High in Modesto, Ca., Tony set every school record, throwing for 3,956 yards with 35 TD's. He helped capture a share of the Central California Conference crown (with a 7-3 record) by completing 129 of 221 attempts for 1,869 yards and 19 scores as a senior. The team captain garnered all-league and all-district accolades during his last prep season. In a big showdown with crosstown rival Modesto High., he tossed five TD's. As a junior he established a record with 2,087 yards passing and 141 completions with an accuracy rate of 56%.

Last Season

Harold proved to be an important contributor to a pair of last second Falcon victories last year. In the final minute vs. St. Louis (11/2), Green caught a pass for 19 yards, then ran a draw for 22 tough yards to set-up Morten Andersen's 27-yard game-winner with:02 left. In the final minute vs. Philadelphia (12/14), Harold took a screen pass for 47-yards to set-up another game-winner from Andersen from 33-yards away at:05. He was named player of the game for his efforts against the Eagles. On the year, he caught 29 passes for 360 yards and gained 78 more yards on 38 carries in appearing in every contest. Harold grabbed season-highs in catches and yards with five for 55 at Detroit (8/31) and also snatched a team-high four receptions for 54 yards vs. Tampa Bay (11/9). His adept pass blocking also made him an all-purpose player for the birds. He was re-signed to a new two-year deal on Feb. 28.

Pro Career

Green is a savvy veteran of 118 games with 81 starts through seven seasons for three NFL teams. He was the St. Louis Rams' second leading rusher for Head Coach Rich Brooks before coming to Atlanta with 523 yards and a team-best 4.1 rushing average in '96. Harold

scored a personal-best four rushing TD's to tie for the team lead and was third on the team with 37 receptions (second-highest ever) for 246 yards and one score. He managed his ninth career 100-yard game with 106 yards on 13 carries versus the Falcons with two TD's to earn a game ball. He also produced eight of the team's 15 first downs, including five third down conversions and scored the game-winner against New Orleans. Green was a second round draft pick (38th overall) of Cincinnati in '90. He performed six years for the Bengals and totaled 3,727 rushing yards, eight TD's, plus 1,004 receiving yards. Included in his rushing totals in Cincy were a **Pro Bowl nod in '92** with 1,170 rushing yards and a **career-high 190 yard game**.

College Career

He finished **second all-time** behind former Heisman Trophy winner George Rogers on South Carolina's all-time charts with 3,005 yards. Green tied Rogers for most career rushing touchdowns with 33. An honorable mention All-America at South Carolina as a senior, he gained 989 yards his final season in '89. Harold established a **school record with 16 rushing TD's** as a junior. His 102 points scored was tied for the eighth-best mark in the nation. In his other college seasons he picked up 565 yards as a junior, 950 as a sophomore and 388 during his freshman campaign.

Notebook/Personal

Harold is a military brat who had addresses in Panama, Japan and the United States (born in Sacramento, CA) as a child. Harold, Sr. is a retired Master Sergeant from the U.S. Air Force. Green returned home to the South last year and his family had a chance to see him play with more frequency then ever before. He was an All-America, All-South, all-state, two-time All-Conference and All-Low Country choice at Stratford High School in Goose Creek, SC. He resides in Ladson, SC. in the off-season. He was honored as South Carolina's Class 4A "Back of the Year" and conference Offensive Player of the Year as a senior with his 2,203 yards and 30 TD's. In one of the most productive careers ever in the state his three-years totals were 4,411 yards and 54 TD's as a prep runner.

Pro Career

Hall has now been a steadying influence on the interior of the Falcons defense with 29 total starts in the last two seasons and **21 in-a-row**. His production has increased each season. He has broken his previous career-high in tackles each of the past two seasons by boasting 98 and then 107, respectively. Travis has also increased his sack output each campaign from 6.0 to 10.5 and his QB pressures from 26 to 29. He made a quick impression in **his first ever NFL start at Carolina (9/1) in '96** by **sacking QB Kerry Collins and forcing a fumble** in the first quarter. His initial campaign as a pro in '95 was spent behind a deep Falcons line which included veterans Jumpy Geathers, Pierce Holt and Moe Gardner. In '96, Hall earned a starting spot in training camp and went on to finish second on the team in tackles with 98, QB sacks with 6, QB pressures with 26, and forced fumbles with a pair (despite missing two games). The 98 tackles represented the most stops by a Falcons defensive lineman in three years (since Moe Gardner tallied 128 in '93).

College Career

A Super Sleeper Team and All-Western Athletic Conference first team choice by the *NFL Draft Report*, Hall started all 13 games at right defensive end for the Top 20 ranked Cougars in '94. Travis recorded 61 tackles (38 solo), 8 sacks, 19 QB pressures, and 13 stops for losses. Despite playing on the line, he still managed to lead the team with 10 pass deflections, while corralling an interception and recovering two fumbles. One of his best all-around games came in a 13-12 win over Hawaii when he recorded 3 solo tackles, 3 QB pressures, deflected 3 passes, intercepted a pass to set up a score, and forced 3 fumbles, earning WAC Defensive Player-of-the-Week honors.

Notebook

Travis' hard working road to becoming a reliable NFL starter with Pro Bowl potential took a drastic turn from one year to the next. The 181st player selected on the 6th round of the '95 draft, Hall only came off the bench for just three plays from scrimmage as a rookie. The next season he was a big-time performer and team leader, finishing second on the team in FOUR defensive categories, including tackles and sacks. In only his third NFL start, Travis totaled a career-best 14 tackles and two QB sacks against Philadelphia to start to draw attention (and double-teams) from the rest of the League. He gained an extra 15 pounds of muscle in the off-season between his first and second years by being a workout warrior at the team's headquarters. Hall is a self-made player who credits his time growing up in the wild of Kenai, Alaska (150 miles south of Anchorage) for his trademark intensity and relentless drive. For food he hunted live game (mostly moose) and to heat the old wood burning stove he chopped wood daily. Sometimes he would have to fight through heavy snow at knee length to find fuel. His father always told him... "Moose meat and firewood build athletes." One of his summer jobs while with his father in Alaska was working on commercial fishing boats. Of course, some of his natural hobbies include salmon fishing, riding horses, and camping. Hall was beyond humbled when his West Jordan (Utah) High School retired his #78 jersey in May of '97. Travis' famous pass rush move was named "The Mormon Maneuver" by his teammates. Hall is just the sixth native Alaskan to ever play in the NFL.

Personal

His father, Mark Hall, played center and every defensive position except safety as well as excelling as a wrestler in high school, so it's easy to see where Travis receives his athletic ability from in the family. But sports highlights came in Utah while staying with his mother, Judy Crockett. Travis was an All-State selection by the Salt Lake Tribune/Desert News as a senior. A conscientious student he earned academic all-state honors for his 4.0 GPA as a senior and 3.76 mark as a junior. An excellent hockey player, he captured a medal in hockey at the 1989-90 Utah Winter Games as a junior club player. He laced up the skates in the '97 off-season and won a division title played at the old Omni after starting out

competing in pickup games at the Atlanta Ice Forum in nearby Duluth, Ga. He and his wife, Tonya, are the proud parents of two sons, Austin (1/26/96) and Jacob, who was born in April.


Personal


Notebook

Hanspard's development into one of the most feared kick returners in the NFL last year is even more impressive when you consider that the last time he returned a kickoff was as a sophomore at Dallas' DeSoto High School. "Some of it is instinct and some of it is survival. There's a healthy kind of fear. You run scared because you're a target and there are 11 bullets all aimed full-speed at you," Byron explained. This former Heisman Trophy finalist (6th in voting) would have likely surpassed Tony Dorsett's NCAA record of 6,082 career rushing yards if he had played another college season for he was only 1,864 yards away from the record. When he gained 272 yards at Oklahoma State's Texas Stadium his final season he reached a milestone no previous runner had ever achieved at that stadium including talented collegians Eric Dickerson, Emmitt Smith, and Dorsett. Hanspard was already a familiar name in Georgia even before he was drafted by the Falcons because in the fall of '96 he ran through the University of Georgia defense for 214 yards and two touchdowns up the road in Athens. Byron is a licensed Pentecostal minister in the Lay Ministers for Christ International since the summer of '95, a national evangelical organization which has Reggie White as member. He spent his spare time in college at the Lubbock Community Baptist Church, serving as a part-time minister.

Personal

The guiding influence in Byron's life has been his father, Leon Hanspard (a truck driver). Leon spent most of his weekends teaching Byron how to play football on the playgrounds of Wheatland Park and Keist Park in Dallas. His father played on the same high school team as former Cowboys TE Billy Joe Dupree. The devoted father missed only one of his Byron's college games. As a six-year old it was quite apparent to everyone that watched young Byron play Pop Warner that his speed and quickness were something special. He once caught a player from behind to save an obvious touchdown. Sports was so important to him growing up that he only wanted to receive sports equipment for birthday presents and at Christmas. One of the most sought-after running backs in the nation at the high school level, Byron was a Parade All-America out of DeSoto High School (a Dallas area suburb). He made on-campus visits to Notre Dame, Colorado and Nebraska, before settling on in-state school Texas Tech. During a prolific junior and senior season, Hanspard gained 4,013 rushing yards, the 12th highest all-time total in the state (5A competition). This Dallas area Male Athlete-of-the-Year averaged 8.7 yards per carry, rushed for 2.101 yards, and scored 35 TD's. Byron's top rushing effort was a 313-yard game against North Mesquite as he guided DeSoto H.S. to a 12-1 record and a state quarterfinal appearance. He lined up as the school's starting defensive back as a sophomore. His second cousin is ex-Bengal runner Essex Johnson. Byron married the former Yolanda Sargent this off-season.

Last Season

Mercury's second season began in New Orleans but he did not catch a pass in four games. He signed with the Falcons on October 27 and remained inactive for six games. Hayes was activated for the final two games of the season in Atlanta when the Falcons' coaching staff was eager to gauge the potential of this speedy wideout.

Pro Career

Hayes performed in seven games as a rookie in New Orleans in '96 and was inactive for the other nine games. He hauled in four passes for 101 yards with a long catch of 50 yards. In addition, he returned two kickoffs for 30 yards with a long of 17 and also rushed the ball one time for five yards. On special teams, he registered two tackles. Against the Falcons (11/17), he collected his first NFL pass reception of 17 yards in the second quarter. Playing primarily as the third wideout vs. St. Louis (12/1) he caught two passes for 60 yards, including a 50-yard bomb from Doug Nussmeier.

College Career


For the Michigan Wolverines, Hayes played in the maximum of 45 regular season games and each of the school's four post-season appearances. He performed the role of big-play receiver with his 17.5 average per catch. A dangerous returner, he handled all the punting and kickoff duties as well. His final season in Ann Arbor saw him snag a career-high 46 passes for 888 yards with four TD's. Mercury was afforded a first-team All-Big 10 nod in starting all 12 games for the nationally-ranked Wolverines.

Notebook/Personal

He was named after a planet because his mother, JoAnn, looked to the sky for a name for her son and Jupiter and Mars didn't fit. He lives up to his name by being a speed burner who earned a reputation at Michigan for running past defenders to haul in plenty of clutch catches in his four-years. Hayes **played NINE different positions** including all four secondary spots as well as halfback, quarterback, split end, flanker, returner and punter at Booker T. Washington High in Houston. According to *Super Prep Magazine* he was rated the 14th-best receiver in the country as a senior. The **communications degree holder** showcased his talents for NFL scouts at the Senior Bowl and East-West Shrine Game.

Last Season

Todd made an impact on special teams by totaling the **second-most punt return yards ever** in team history with 446. He also was a capable third wide receiver with his 16 receptions for 266 yards and one TD. Kinchen's top return games came at the hands of Carolina (10/26) with 5 PR's for 61 yards (long of 38), at Seattle (11/30) with 4 for 53 yards and Denver (9/28) with 4 for 40. On offense, he was named player of the game for his work against San Francisco (9/21) and at San Diego (12/7). Against the Niners, he hauled in three passes for a team-high 83 yards, including **a career-best 53-yard TD**. Todd also came up big vs. his former Ram (11/2) teammates with 2 catches for 42 yards and vs. the Eagles (12/14) with 3 receptions for 39 yards (long of 22).

Pro Career

Kinchen is a veteran of 72 games in his six seasons in the NFL. He has returned 158 punts for 1,455 yards for an impressive career average of 9.2. Todd's caught 84 passes for 1,201 yards as a receiver with nine TD's. In '96, he switched conferences after being traded from the Rams to Broncos (on 8/27) just before the season started. For Denver, he returned punts after Rod Smith was lost with a broken collarbone in the preseason. Kinchen boasted an 11.5 average (26-300), 3rd-best in AFC, with a long of 40 yards. In 49 games for the Rams in his first four seasons, he returned 80 punts for 709 yards with two scores and grabbed 67 receptions for 935 yards with eight TD's. This former third round draft choice led the Rams in punt return yards with 416 and finished second in kickoff return yards with 743 in '95. Add in his reception totals (36-419) and he posted a career-best 1,578 yards, second on the club. His first NFL start as a receiver came in '94 and resulted in him leading Ram pass catchers with 64 yards against San Francisco. As a rookie, he tied the NFL record (held by six others) for punt return touchdowns in a single game (61 & 35 yds.) and most TD's by a combined kick return with two against the Falcons in the season finale in '92. The first time he fielded a punt in the pro's came in that game and he took it the distance for a 61yard touchdown. Todd holds the Ram record for the most punts returned in a game with seven against the Jets in '95. He's scored TD's three different routes when you include a 44yard score off a reverse in '94.

College Career

Todd left Baton Rouge as LSU's fourth all-time receiver with 112 receptions and fifth all-time in yards with 1,911. This All-SEC choice as a senior also returned 36 punts for 9.4 average with two TD's in his career. His pair of return TD's tied Tommy Casanova's '70 school mark. He broke a 22 year-old SEC record and set a school mark with his 248-yard receiving game on nine catches against Mississippi State to earn conference Player of the Week honors his last season.

Notebook

A spiritual person, Todd began a non-profit organization that provides guidance and inspiration to athletes through biblical principles called God Rules Ministry, Inc. in '92. He plays host to a group of approximately 100 athletes from around the southeast in Birmingham each year. Kinchen even proudly displays the words GOD RULS on his jewelry and license plate. Todd is the second Kinchen to strap on the pads in the pro's, following his brother, Brian, a tight end/long snapper for Baltimore who started in the league in Miami in '88. Todd's faced Brian one time in his career and that came in '96 (Broncos vs. Ravens). This football lineage was passed on by their father, Gus, a former defensive end 90

on a unit nicknamed the "Chinese Bandits" that helped capture LSU's only National Championship in '58. The Kinchen brothers have now played in a combined 215 NFL games with 225 career receptions during their careers heading into '98.

Personal

One of the most celebrated all-around high school athletes to come out of the state of Louisiana in years, Todd Whittington was an all-sport standout at Trafton Academy in Baton Rouge. For the Tigers, he garnered state MVP honors on the gridiron as well as winning state title's in both basketball and baseball. He was also voted team and district MVP in football. Somehow he also found time to long jump, high jump, and triple jump for the track team and played on the tennis team. He became a local hero for staying in his hometown and playing college at LSU. A giving player, he donated \$10,000 to LSU's athletic department. A movie buff and collector, he revels in the fact that he owns every single of Disney's classics in his personal library. Kinchen completed the requirement for his degree in May of '96 in general studies with an emphasis in psychology, sociology, and speech. He and his wife, Mary, are the proud parents of a daughter, Lauren Grace, born Feb. 3, 1998.

Last Season

Brian started the final five games of the season (and six overall) with an injury to Ed West and produced with seven catches for 99 yards and one TD. When starter O.J. Santiago was lost with a broken leg at St. Louis (11/16) the veteran Kozlowski stepped in and responded. He caught two passes for seven yards, including a big two-yard TD grab with six minutes left which gave the Falcons the lead, 24-21, in a six-point win. Because of his blocking exploits and for hauling in one pass for 28 yards at Seattle (11/30) in his first start, "Koz" was named co-offensive player of the game by the coaches. Brian's '97 contribution included one tackle on special teams, a kickoff return for 26 yards vs. S.F. (10/19), and another kickoff for 23 yards vs. St. Louis on a squib kick just before the half which set-up a field goal in an eventual 34-31 victory. He signed a new three-year contract on March 4th.

Pro Career

Kozlowski's career started with New York's practice squad in '93. He earned the right to be added to the regular roster one year later and went on to **play in 32 consecutive games** Brian performed in five games in '96 with his one touchdown reception coming in a huge win over the Cowboys. He moved his career games played number to 53 in four seasons with 16 more under his belt in '97. This solid special teammer has 16 tackles with a fumble recovery on his career ledger. Brian's 12 tackles on special teams for the Giants in '94 were good enough for second place on the team's charts.

College Career

Brian's consistency at the collegiate level was seen in his 43 consecutive starts for the Huskies of the University of Connecticut. He moved into the starting lineup the second game of his freshman season and was a stalwart for the remainder of his career. A capable receiver, he caught 43 passes for 526 yards with a TD his final season in '92. He was part of a group of pass catchers which set a school record for most receptions by three different receivers with 207 in '91.


Notebook/Personal

"Koz" fits into Dan Reeves' offensive system which asks the tight ends to be possession receivers. His presence on the roster was key when the Falcons lost their starter (Santiago) and back-up (West) with four games to go in the season. Brian Scott was a **team most valuable player** and an All-County selection on offense at Webster (NY) High. He was also good enough to garner second-team All-County honors on defense. This all-around athlete also **played lacrosse** as a prep. One of **only four true freshman at Connecticut** to earn a varsity letter, Brian's best game as a collegian came versus Villanova as the sophomore caught 10 passes. His pass catching exploits at UConn were even more impressive when you consider he played with two All-America wide receivers for much of his career. This **political science major** in college married the former Ellen Wilson this past off-season.

Last Season

The Falcons tabbed the mammoth 6-8, 305 pound four-year veteran from the Buffalo Bills as their first free agent signing. Louchiey (pronounced LOU-chee) started six games in Buffalo while playing in all 16 contests. This former 3rd round draft pick will line up and compete for the starting right tackle position. He started his first career opener vs. Minnesota (8/31) and helped the Bills accumulate 147 rushing yards and 426 total yards of offense. He made several key blocks as Buffalo gained 260 total yards in a six point victory at Jets (9/7). Corey also paved the way for the Bills to rush for 164 yards in a win over Detroit (10/5). He replaced an injured John Fina at left tackle vs. Miami (11/2) as the Bills racked up 179 yards rushing and at Chicago (12/7). He signed a two-year contract on March 2nd.

Pro Career

Corey, at only 26 years-old, moved his NFL games played number to 45 and career starts to 13 with his totals last season. His first season in the pro's in '94 was spent learning from a veteran line that included the likes of Kent Hull. In '95, Louchiey's first taste of pro experience came in the season opener at Denver (9/3) as he replaced an injured John Fina at left tackle late in the first half. He played the second half for injured Glenn Parker at right tackle vs. Jets (10/8). On the strength of his play that game, Corey made his first NFL start the next week vs. Seattle (10/15) and was given a game ball for his performance. He went on to stay in the lineup the following two weeks to finish with three starts on the year. His '96 totals read four productive starts in another 16 games played. Louchiey received another game ball for his strong start at Philadelphia (11/10) that included holding Pro Bowler William Fuller sackless and the Eagles as a team without a sack for the first time all season. The next week he helped lead the way for 308 yards in total offense vs. Cincy (11/ 17) in drawing his second consecutive start. In a start at left tackle for Fina against the Jets (11/24) he was key player in holding New York to zero sacks. Corey came in for an injured Parker (at right tackle) in the second quarter and the Bills finished with a season-best 19 passing first downs en route to a season-best 370 passing yards. With his help Thurman Thomas gained over 1,000 yards in '95 and for the NFL record tying eight straight season in '96.

College Career/Notebook

He started out as a student at South Carolina State and was asked to play defensive line by coach Willie Jefferies. Corey transferred to South Carolina a year later. He broke into the starting lineup for the Gamecocks halfway through the SEC battle with Tennessee and continued to start every game the following senior season. It was ironic that he received his opportunity to showcase his talents against the Volunteers because Louchiey enrolled at Tennessee first before eventually finding his way to South Carolina. Under the auspices of 'it takes one to know one' he started out as a defensive tackle at S.C. State but became an "excellent pass blocker" at USC. His senior season he increased his strength and weight

from 280 to 310 and became dominant. Corey was credited with 71 knockdown blocks and graded out 82% for blocking consistency. Against Kentucky, he pounded the Wildcat defense to register seven knockdown blocks en route to 401 total yards. In his last 14 quarters of action as a junior, he collared 35 knockdown blocks. Louchiey has always prepared himself during the week like a professional and that was put to the test in '96. He didn't know he was going to be starting until the Saturday before the Eagles game and he wound up containing dangerous William Fuller (13 sacks) without a sack. Corey brings a winning presence to Atlanta after being surrounded with such solid players as Jim Kelly, Thurman Thomas, Bruce Smith, Kent Hull, Andre Reed and Steve Tasker in Buffalo. He's played in three playoff games in four seasons and his '96 totals included catching a pass (for no yards). Beneath the warm smile and deep voice is a player with a "mean streak" which is evident on game day. "I'm a brown bag kind of guy. I'm going to give you an honest day's work for an honest day's pay." In the past Corey has trained in the heat in Dallas with brother-in-law Jim Jeffcoat (now Cowboys assistant) to get ready for training camp. He is the second South Carolinian on the roster following the footsteps of Harold Green. Those huge footsteps also measure out to a size 18 shoe, biggest on the team, and he boasts a 500 pound bench press. He has a license tag that reads "Big C's Explorer".

Personal

Corey is coming home to play again in SEC country. Hailing from Greenville, S.C. (less than two hours from Suwanee), he was an All-America choice by Super Prep Magazine as well as an all-state, all-conference, and all-area nod at Carolina (Greenville) H.S. He started every game on both sides of the line for his three-year career. He recorded 80 tackles with six QB sacks as a senior and made 3.5 sacks in the South Carolina North-South All-Star game to finish runner-up in MVP balloting. An accomplished discus thrower, his heave of 158' on the school's track team was good enough to place second in an Upper Carolina state meet. A retailing major at South Carolina, he graduated with his degree early in August of '93. Corey and his wife, Nicole, were introduced for the first time by Tammy Jeffcoat, Nicole's sister.



Last Season

The Falcons acquired Pro Bowler Tony Martin on June 3 to solidify their starting wide receiver corps. The fleet-footed Martin provides a deep threat and has been a big-time producer in his eight seasons in the NFL. He made the adjustment to a new offensive system under first-year head coach Kevin Gilbride, plus injuries to starting quarterbacks, but still had another outstanding season for the fourth consecutive year in San Diego.

 Δ Led the Chargers in receptions with 63, receiving yards with 904 and touchdown catches with six.

Δ Dependable Tony was one of just 10 players to start every contest for the third straight year in a Charger uniform.

Δ Totaled two 100-yard receiving games despite having four different quarterbacks throwing to him and led the team in catches in six games.

Δ Caught four passes for **season-high 155 yards**, a 38.3 average, and **three TD's** (tying a personal-high), **including a 72-yard score** vs. Baltimore (9/28) to win **AFC Offensive Player-of-the-Week honors**.

A Hauled in five catches for 100 yards and two scores, including a 61-yard TD vs. Seattle (11/9).

Δ Caught a season-high eight passes (for 78 yards) vs. Denver (11/30).

Δ Streak of 53 straight games without at least one catch was broken at KC (10/16).

Pro Career

Martin has established himself as an elite player in the NFL through nine seasons.

- Named to Pro Bowl and voted by teammates as Most Valuable Player after tying team record (Lance Alworth) and co-leading NFL with 14 touchdowns in '96.
- Tied an NFL all-time record with a 99-yard TD catch at Seattle in '94.
- In only four seasons in San Diego ranked 8th all-time with 288 receptions. Also, he totaled 4,184 receiving yards, a 14.5 average, and 33 TD's.
- Set Charger record for catches in a season with 90 in '95 to break Hall of Famer Kellen Winslow's mark. Grabbed 85 catches in '96.
- Averaged 72 catches, 1, 046 yards and 8.25 TD's per season in San Diego.
- Has recorded 16 100-yard games with 5 over 150 yards as well as 36 games with 5 or more catches.
- Totaled 24 career catches of 40 or more yards which includes 6 over 60 yards, 9 over 50 yards and 9 more over 40 yards in distance.
- \bullet His "big-play" touch downs in his career have covered 99, 80, 72, 61, 55, 54, 51, 50, 46, 43 and 41 yards.

- He's amassed 2 games with 3 TD's, plus 5 more games with 2 TD's and 3 games with 10 or more catches in his career.
- Tough and reliable he has started the last 52 games in-a-row.
- Scored a TD in both an AFC title game (at Pittsburgh) and a Super Bowl (XXIX).
- Named AFC Player of the Month (Dec. '95) and NFL Alumni Wide Receiver of the Year after '96 season.
- His post-season numbers read 20 receptions for 309 yards, a 15.5 average, and three touchdowns in eight games.

College Career

He was a **two-year starter at quarterback** for Mesa College Mavericks in Grand Junction, Colorado. He led the Mavs to a 21-3 record as a starter at Mesa and was tops in the country in scoring (53 pts a game), rushing (364.4) and total offense (540.5) during his senior season. Tony completed 85 of 144 attempts for 1,603 yards with 17 TD's and only two interceptions his last season which also included 531 yards rushing. He hit on 72 of 134 attempts for 953 yards with six scores and rushed for eight TD's as a junior. Martin originally enrolled at Colorado before attending Bishop (TX) College for two years prior to moving on to Mesa.

Notebook/Personal

After playing quarterback in college, Tony was converted to wide receiver in the New York Jets' training camp in '89 after being the club's 5th round draft choice. He was released by the Jets on the final cutdown but added to the Dolphins' developmental squad. Martin worked his way into five starts a year later while playing in all 16 games in Miami and began to establish himself as a legitimate wide out. He was traded to the Chargers for a fourth round choice on March 24, 1994. Tony made an impression with Charger fans immediately as his first catch was a 61-yarder versus Cincy. A week later he tied an NFL record by recording a 99-yard TD catch at Seattle. His "winning" experience in the pro's has included catching the "winning" TD pass from 43-yards out at Pittsburgh which gave the Chargers a 17-13 lead in an eventual win to advance to Super Bowl XXIX. He credits his receivers coach in San Diego, Jerry Sullivan (now with the Lions), for turning him into a dangerous receiver by running precise routes. "In this League, you've got corners who are either good or great. That's what separates you from them is precise route running. It's going to be close all the time and then it's who gets out of their routes the best. That's what good, precise route-running does for you." Martin worked himself into a complete pro wide receiver after playing quarterback at both the high school and college levels. Coach Bill Parcells called Tony "the most explosive player we've played against this year" during his break-out season of '95. He has played against the likes of veterans Eugene Robinson and Ray Buchanan in the past and the pair of former AFC defensive backs are more than glad to have this speedster as a teammate. Tony already has a big fan in his new town as his father, Hal, lives in Stone Mountain, Ga. Martin was tabbed San Diego's "franchise" player following the '96 season until the Chargers re-signed him to a four-year contract in May of '97. With his presence in the lineup, the Falcons now boast a pair of Pro Bowl wide receivers and a Pro Bowl quarterback on offense. Martin's love for golf will be enhanced at all of the beautiful courses at his disposal in Atlanta. Tony Derrick was born on Sept. 5, 1965 in Miami and was a three-sport stalwart for the Northwestern High School Bulls in his hometown. He spends the off-seasons between his residences at Miami Lakes and Escondido, CA.



Terance has averaged a solid five catches per game (320 out of 64 games played) every time he laces up his Falcon cleats. He, Bert Emanuel, Craig Heyward, and Eric Metcalf set are in the NFL record books for having four different players from the same team each eclipse 1,000 yards receiving or rushing in the same season. Despite taking a number of hits over the last four years, Mathis has only fumbled one time with the Falcons. He would have led the NFL in punt return average (15.0) as a rookie with the lets, but he didn't have enough returns to qualify. College Career

Terance was New Mexico's first-ever consensus All-American in 1989 as he amassed 88 receptions for 1,315 yards and 13 TD's. When that senior season was over, he became the NCAA's Division I career record holder in receiving yards with 4,254. In addition, his 263 receptions (from 1985-87, '89) ranked second on the NCAA's all-time list only behind Jerry Rice's leading mark of 310 catches. Mathis was the first player in NCAA history to record the triple feat of more than 250 receptions, 4,000 receiving yards, and 6,000 all-purpose yards. He caught at least one pass in 28 straight games and 43-of-44 career contests as a Lobo. He tallied nine games of 150 or more yards and six games with 10 or more catches. His three kickoff returns for TD's (96, 95, 95) tied an NCAA season all-time record. He set a school record as a senior in kickoff returns with 31 for a 25.3 average and 3 TD's. The WAC marks he established were for combined yards with 6,691 and TD's with 36, while tying Cris Carter's NCAA record of a TD in nine straight games. Mathis began his college football career as a lifth-string quarterback at New Mexico until he went 65 yards for a score off an option the first time he touched the ball. He was then moved to wide receiver after that play.

Notebook

The Falcons' "Man of the Year" and 1998 "Peach of an Athlete" award winner is highly respected in the Atlanta community for his civic-minded projects. His Terance Loves Children Foundation (TLC) began in Atlanta in '96 and is always busy during the holidays as he personally helps hand out 1,000 turkeys to six area clusters (Fulton, West Fulton, Grady, Southside, Archer, Harper). He has adopted 10 families at Christmas, given out Easter baskets to community centers in New Mexico, played a charity basketball game, and hosted a holiday party for Atlanta's inner city youth, among others. The project's roots date back seven years ago in his college town of Albuquerque, New Mexico. Of course, a lot of his good deeds are never publicized on purpose. Mathis was given a "Community Achievement Award" at the Salute to Georgia Legends ball from the city. Terance grew up

"T-Math" is as popular with Falcon fans as he is on the speaking circuit. His platform is a



Last Season

Lenny was a contributor as a nickel back for the birds in '97. McGill played in 15 games and finished with 14 tackles with nine solo stops. His lone interception of the season was huge as it sealed a close win at Seattle (11/30) to help the Falcons post their third straight victory. He also added a season-high five tackles against the Seahawks. Lenny's other top efforts included two tackles apiece vs. Oakland (9/14) and New Orleans (11/23).

Pro Career

McGill has performed in 42 games through four seasons in the NFL since making Green Bay's roster as an undrafted college free agent in '94. His rookie campaign included a pair of interceptions in six games played before he tore the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee at Minnesota (10/20). He returned to the Pack in '95 to play in 15 games and finished with 27 tackles, a pass defensed, and four special teams tackles. Lenny was acquired by the Falcons in a trade with the Packers on June 6, 1996. He finished the year with 32 tackles, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery, two passes defensed, and six special teams tackles. He became a starter at right cornerback in Week 11 and remained in the lineup the remainder of the season. He amassed seven tackles each against the Jaguars (12/22) and Niners (12/2) and recorded five tackles as well as two special teams stops at the Bengals (11/24).

College Career

He was a two-year starter and four-time letterwinner for Arizona State. An honorable mention All-PAC 10 choice as a senior, Lenny's last season in Tempe included career highs for tackles with 62, solos with 44 and passes defensed with 9. He was named ASU's "Most Improved Defensive Player" by his teammates after his junior season in which he led them in interceptions with four. His first two seasons at Arizona State were spent playing behind Phillippi Sparks. This natural athlete competed for three seasons with the school's track team and once finished second in the triple jump with a leap of 51' 11 3/4" to end up second at the '91 PAC 10 championships.

Notebook/Personal

Lenny received a chance at redemption when he played at Qualcomm Stadium for the Falcons last season. This former San Diego county product played his final prep season at that stadium in a CIF Championship game but his Orange Glen High team lost to Morse in '88. But McGill helped the Falcons continue their winning ways last year with a 14-3 win. Charles Leonard was born on May 31, 1971 in Long Beach, Ca. He was a first-team all-league selection from his cornerback position while also garnering three letters at Orange Glen H.S. in Escondido, Ca. A highly recruited player, he was named as one of the top 10 defensive backs in the nation as a senior prepster by *The Sporting News*. McGill was also an excellent track athlete, posting a triple jump of 51' 2" to be among the best in the country. A friendly and unassuming person, he was voted class president and homecoming king by his fellow students in high school. His college roommates over the years included future NFLers Phillippi Sparks (Giants), Kevin Miniefield (Bears), and Craig Newsome (Packers). This resident of San Diego holds a BA degree in criminal justice.

Pro Career



Year-by-Year

1996: Green Bay acquired Robinson for defensive end Matt LaBounty on June 27th. He paced the Pack and **finished tied for second in entire NFC with six thefts** in first year with new club en route to earning All-Pro honors by Sports Illustrated. His 87 tackles were fourth-best on the team and he made at least six tackles in 10 games. In a divisional playoff win over Niners, he stole two passes in the fourth quarter (and one other was negated due to false start penalty). He was third on the Super Bowl champions in tackles in the post-season with 14.

1995: He was the only Seattle defensive player to perform in every play of every game. He amassed 105 tackles, second-highest on club, and led the team in tackles in three games. Robinson made a season-high 13 tackles with an Elway pick vs. Denver (12/10).

1994: His **club-record streak of 120 straight games played** was halted after 14 weeks when an Achilles injury forced him onto injured reserve for the first time. He still ended up with 80 tackles and tied for the team lead with three interceptions. He collared 8 tackles in four contests and had at least 5 stops in 11 games.

1993: For the fourth straight campaign he lined up at free safety in all 16 games. He tied

Nate Odomes of the Bills for the NFL lead with a career-best nine picks, the third-highest total ever in team history. His 11 total takeaways were a League-best mark and his 111 tackles were tops on the club's defensive charts. He broke up a personal-high 15 passes and amassed four double-digit tackle games in being invited to the Pro Bowl for the second straight season.

1992: Named to his first Pro Bowl, Eugene was first on the team with 94 tackles and tied for second in the conference in interceptions with seven. He tied Kenny Easley's team record with three picks at Pittsburgh (12/6). He made the 100th start of his career vs. Raiders (11/15) and had a season-high 13 tackles vs. Philly (12/13).

1991: Robinson tied a club record with an interception in four consecutive games and his 5 on the season was a team-high. He made at least five tackles in 11 games and his 93 total stops was second-best on the Seahawk charts. A first-team All-NFL selection by SI, he was voted Most Valuable Player for the first time by his teammates.

1990: His three thefts and four fumble recoveries were tied for the best totals on the team, while finishing second in tackles with 82. He picked off a fourth-quarter pass at San Diego (11/25) and returned it 30-yards to set-up a game-tying TD. Against Denver (12/23) he set-up a game-winning score by picking off a pass in the third quarter and running it back 39 yards. He also returned a Detroit fumble 16-yards (second career TD) to break a 10-10 tie and propel Seattle to a 30-10 victory.

1989: Eugene became the first DB in team history to lead the team in tackles in two consecutive seasons with his 107 stops. He also paced the team with five picks.

1988: He collared a team-high 115 tackles, the most by a Seattle DB since Dave Brown in '76. He also set a personal-best with 15 tackles at New England (12/4). He had a standout game in the divisional playoffs at Cincinnati (12/31) with a game-high 11 tackles.

1987: He started 12 games and finished third on team with 69 tackles. He blocked a Don Bracken punt vs. Green Bay (11/15) and returned it eight-yards for his first NFL TD. At Houston in a wild-card playoff game (1/3), he recorded 15 tackles, including 11 solos.

1986: In his first year as a starter, he was second on the teams ledger's with 99 tackles and paced the club with three recovered fumbles. He had a takeaway in four consecutive games (1 INT, 3 FR's).

1985: He began as a cornerback but was switched to safety and went on to play in all 16 games as a reserve. He posted a season-high 9 tackles in season's final games vs. Denver (12/20). His interception in the San Diego end zone sealed a 26-21 win and he returned another theft vs. K.C. (12/1) 47-yards to set-up a TD in a victory.

Notebook

"Tenjoy life. God has blessed me tremendously. I'm not pretentious and stuck up and all that other stuff. I'm just a regular guy." This 'regular guy' has been working his special magic in the communities of Seattle and Green Bay for 13 years now. Robinson is Seattle's four-time "Man of the Year" ('91-93,'95) honoree for his philanthropic work with such organizations as the Boys & Girls Club of King County (WA), MDA, and the Union Gospel Mission. One of his projects was his work with Seattle's Urban Academy, an organization that helps children who have dropped out of school. In Green Bay, he was heavily involved in a cerebral palsey program and was an enthusiastic speaker to local schools and churches. He's also been a familiar face with numerous hospital visits through the years.

ROBINSON

"It's just part of my personality to reach out," he explained. This heady former Colgate standout revels in being the 'quarterback of the secondary' and his game preparation as well as film study is legendary. Besides being the vocal leader of the secondary, he was also one of Green Bay's spiritual leaders off the field. He was a guiding force in weekly bible study and often times gave the pre-game prayer before the team took the field. "I tell people I'm a Christian who just happens to play football." An A-student in high school, Robinson was a 5-10, 165 pound walk-on at Colgate who had to earn an academic scholarship to play football. Because he believed he's had to out-work his competition every year, Eugene is a big proponent of staying in shape year-round. For the past 12 years, he's worked out in the off-season with a track coach (Mark Dell) who puts him through a grueling regimen. An immensely popular player in the locker room, he was voted team MVP twice ('91 and '93), team captain four years ('91-95) in Seattle and was given the Steve Largent Award for the player who best exemplifies the spirit, dedication, and integrity of Seahawks. A charming, gregarious person, he plays the saxophone and is the co-promoter of a jazz musician in Seattle (Tony Gable) and a vocal group called 2nd Nature. The part owner of music label, InterMix Records, Robinson has also written a song ("We Believe") and actually put some re-mixes together with pals Reggie White and Robert Brooks about the Packers Super Bowl season.

Personal

Eugene Keefe was born on May 28, 1963 in Hartford, CT. He garnered letters in football and wrestling at Weaver High in his hometown. He will be able to satisfy his need to hit the links whenever time allows as this "golf freak" as his wife, Gia, calls him will have plenty of golf courses to choose from in Atlanta. An articulate, insightful, engaging person, Eugene played co-host to a weekly TV show ("Monday Night Kickoff") in Green Bay and received overtures from CBS in the off-season about joining their TV booth when his football career is over. Robinson flew to Atlanta last year and was a studio guest on TNT. He and his wife, Gia, have a daughter, Brittany (8/12/87), and a son, Brandon (1/16/90) and reside in Woodinville, WA. in the off-season.

Last Season

With an accomplished, winning resume that bears a **Super Bowl MVP** among his accolades, the Falcons signed experienced QB Mark Rypien to a two-year deal on April 1st. In five games with the St. Louis Rams in a reserve role, he completed 19 of 39 passes for 270 yards. In his most extensive action on the year, Mark completed an efficient 10 of 19 passes for 138 yards in place of Tony Banks who left with a concussion vs. Carolina (11/23). He filled in for an injured Banks in the second half at Green Bay (11/9) and completed nine of 18 passes for 132 yards. Rypien's other action came at Carolina (12/20) when he played in his 100th NFL game, at New Orleans (12/7), and vs. Kansas City (10/26). Mark will be reunited here in Atlanta with a pair of his former Redskin coaches in Jack Burns and Rennie Simmons.

Pro Career

Mark's pro career has been full of impressive accomplishments through the years.

- Boasts a plus-27 TD to interception ratio in his career with 115 TD's & 88 thefts.
- Thrown for 18,416 passing yards, completing 1,461 out of 2,604 passes for 56.1%.
- Registered a 47-31 record as a starter and voted to two Pro Bowls ('89, '91).
- Amassed 13 300-yard passing games, including a Redskins record 442-yard, 6-TD game vs. Falcons in '91.
- Led NFC in passing in '91 en route to earning Super Bowl XXVI MVP honors (292 yards, 2 TD's) by directing 'Skins to a dominating 17-2 overall record.
- · Guided Redskins to playoffs three straight years ('90-92).
- Started the final three games of the '95 season for the Rams (in his last NFL starts), throwing for a team-record 372 (31-55), 347 (34-50) and 320 yards.

Year-by-Year

1996: He signed with the Eagles three days after starter Rodney Peete suffered a season-ending injury on Oct. 3rd. He threw for 76 yards on 10 of 13 completion's with a TD in his only regular season action in the fourth quarter at Indianapolis. He did complete five of 12 passes for 77 yards in a playoff loss at San Francisco.

1995: Mark played in 11 games and started the final three games of the season for the Rams. His 59.4% completion percentage was a career-best and he tossed nine TD's. He directed second half comeback win over the Jets when Chris Miller was knocked out with a concussion. Rypien broke single game pass attempts record of 53 set by Jim Hardy in '48 with his 31 of 55 day for 372 yards vs. Buffalo in a start. He turned around the next week against his former team and completed his most passes ever with 34 out of 50 attempts for 347 yards with one TD vs. Washington. He registered his third straight 300-yard passing game for the first time in his career by completing 27 of 42 passes for 320 yards and two scores vs. Miami.

RYPIEN

1994: He replaced an injured Vinny Testaverde and guided the Browns to a 2-1 record in his three starts, beating New England and Philadelphia.

1993: Rypien started 10 of 13 games in his final season in Washington. He went 22 of 34 for 161 yards and three TD's in a 35-16 rout of the defending Super Bowl champion Cowboys on Monday Night.

1992: He led the Skins to the playoffs for third consecutive season with 3,282 yards.

1991: Mark earned various awards including NFC Player of the Year, and NFL All-Pro in addition to Super Bowl MVP honors. He produced the second-best passer rating in Washington history and in NFL with a 97.9 mark with a plus-17 TD to interception ratio (28/11). In three post-season victories, he completed a torrid 44 of 79 passes for 690 yards and a 91.2 rating. He completed 17 passes over 45 yards and his 442 yards vs. Atlanta was second in team history to Sammy Baugh's 446.

1990: "Ryp" posted a 5-2 record in the final seven games to help 'Skins to a playoff berth after missing six weeks with a sprained right knee. He tossed four TD's on 26 of 38 for 311 yards vs. New Orleans (11/18),

1989: His 3,758 passing yards was the second best total ever in Redskins history and only Sonny Jurgensen and Joe Theismann completed more than his 280 passes in any single season. He registered an 88.1 passer rating and led Washington to five consecutive victories at the end of the season.

1988: He edged out Jay Schroeder in training camp for a back-up role behind Doug Williams. When Williams was sidelined with an appendicitis for the Cardinal game, he responded by completing 26 of 41 passes for 303 yards and three scores.

1987: In the final pre-season game against the Rams, Mark injured his back and spent the first 10 weeks on injured reserve. He was activated for the Giants game (11/29) but did not see action in any game.

1986: Rypien was placed on IR for the entire season with a knee injury.

College Career

Rypien was an Associated Press honorable mention All-American as both a junior and senior at Washington State. A first-team All-PAC 10 choice during his junior season, he completed 134 of 270 passes for 1,927 yards and 14 TD's. His final season he upped those marks to 159 of 273 for 2,417 yards with 14 scores. Mark left the school with two records for most yards in a game with 403 and average total offense with 441. As a freshman, he was a member of the Cougars' first Bowl team (Holiday Bowl) since the '31 Rose Bowl game.

Notebook

Mark and his wife, Annette, learned their son, Andrew, was diagnosed with a brain tumor last summer. It was removed during a 4.5 hour operation (July 31) and after waiting eight days the Rypien's found out that the tumor was cancerous. Andrew received chemotherapy treatments at the St. Louis Children's Hospital last year as Mark continued to play for the Rams. Father Mark shaved his head to show support for his son and is counting on the excellent health care that is available in Atlanta. One of the most civic-minded players in the NFL over the years, Mark puts on a yearly golf tournament to benefit Cystic Fibrosis and is the national spokesperson for Spina Bifida. He was one of two people to be honored with the first-ever Henry P. Iba Citizen/Athletes Award from the Rotary Club of Tulsa, OK. in May of '94 "presented to the athlete who demonstrates good citizenship and personal involvement in the community". He was given a Catholic National Figure Award by Cardinal Hickey. During his Redskin career he helped fund "Opportunity Park" in

Bowie, Md. which is the only 100% Handicapped Accessible Recreational Facility in the country. An avid golfer with a one handicap, he became the first non-tour golfer to play on tour when he performed in the '92 Kemper Open in Washington, DC. He lists winning the inaugural Celebrity Golf Championship in Lake Tahoe in '90 as one his best moments behind the Super Bowl. The "Mark Rypien Motorsport Team" began their first tour on the NASCAR circuit in '93 with his driver being hometown friend and NASCAR veteran Chad Little.

Personal

Mark Robert was born in Calgary, Alberta on Oct. 2, 1962. His family moved to Spokane, WA at an early age and he developed into quite an athlete. Rypien turned into one of the nation's top 10 career passers with 6,460 passing yards, 65 touchdowns, and 423 completion's at Shadler Park High School. He broke all the passing records for the city of Spokane of former Chicago Cub second baseman Ryne Sandberg. As a senior, this multitalented performer was voted to the all-state of Washington teams in football, basketball and baseball. "Ryp" was named the tournament's outstanding player in guiding Shadler to the state basketball title. The Rypiens are an athletic family as brother, Tim, played in the Toronto Blue Jays organization after a stint on the Canadian Olympic baseball team. His other brother, Dave, performed on the national baseball team for Canada which played in the Pan-Am Games. The Rypien's also have two daughters, Ambre ((10/26/88) and Angela (10/22/90), and reside in Post Falls, Idaho.



Last Season

O.J. was making weekly strides of improvement in his first season in the pro's when he was lost for the year with a broken left fibula at St. Louis (11/16). Santiago was the Falcons' starting tight end for the first 11 weeks of the season. He finished with 17 receptions for 217 yards (12.8 avg.) with two TD's. He was second only to #1 pick Freddie Jones of the Chargers in catches and TD's at the time of his injury ahead of a talented group of tight ends in the NFL, including Tony Gonzalez (#1 Chiefs), John Allred (#2 Bears), David LaFleur (#1 Cowboys), and Greg Clark (#3 49ers). In his first ever start at Detroit (8/31) he began the season with a solid performance in the blocking game and added two catches for 47 yards. O.J. was named player of the game by the coaches for his performance vs. Oakland (9/14) when he hauled in a career-best five passes for 40 yards, including his first career touchdown (10 yards). Santiago broke free in the secondary to record long catches of 30, 26, 20, 16, 15, 13, and 11 yards on the year. In just 11 games, he still posted the most catches by a Falcon tight end since Gary Wilkins had 12 in '90. O.J. earned an opening day start by leading the Falcons in catches and touchdowns with two in the preseason.

College Career

Santiago caught 62 passes for 730 yards for an 11.8 career average with four touchdowns for the Golden Flashes of Kent State. O.J. tied for team honors as a junior when he hauled in 28 receptions and combined with his 26 catches as senior totaled 54 in his final two seasons. (He missed two games his last year with an ankle injury.) Santiago opened up holes for the #2 ranked offense in the Mid American Conference in '96 so running back Astron Whatley could post two 1,000-yard rushing seasons and 3,113 rushing yards in three seasons. In addition, his sturdy blocks enabled Whatley to gain 15 100-yard rushing games in three years and earn MAC freshman-of-the-year honors in '94. He showcased his talent by dominating heralded DE Jason Taylor of Akron and future Dolphins draft choice in a 32-17 upset his senior season. He started every game and tied Kantroy Walker for the team lead in the receiving department with a personal-best 29 catches for 297 yards, a 10.6 average, with two TD's. O.J. started 22 of 33 career games at Kent State and was named to the MAC All-Academic first team for three straight seasons for his exploits in the classroom.

Notebook

O.J.'s introduction into the sport of football started late. As a 6-5, 218 pounder, he decided not to play football until grade 12 in Canada (which would be his junior season in high school in the U.S.). He was "recruited" by the football coach who saw him tower over the other students walking down the hall in between classes one day. He had just transferred to St. Michael's High School because of their strong basketball tradition. "The next day I had two touchdown catches in a scrimmage and I guess I was hooked," he said. Santiago became the first tight end ever drafted out of Kent State and the highest player taken from the school since Jack Lambert and Gerald Tinker (by Atlanta) in '74. He showed he was going to be something special in his first collegiate game vs. Kentucky by grabbing a 20-yard pass for his first reception. Proving to be a player his teammates could count on, he hauled in four passes for 44 yards in his first start against Bowling Green. O.J. possesses a dogged determination and inherent mean streak which was noticed by Falcon coaches early and then opponents each week. The physically imposing 6-7, 267 pounder now is part of the new wave of tall, athletic tight ends that came out of the class of '97. When veteran 49ers safety Tim McDonald caught a glimpse of Santiago up close for the first time at San

Francisco (9/21) during warm-ups he was impressed. "What did they do, hijack the Golden State Warriors team bus or something?" Seven-year pro Eric Turner of the Raiders noticed last year... "For a guy that big, he's very fluid. If you let him get an easy release (off the line) it's going to be a problem because then he's just a huge target running unchecked through the secondary. Sort of like a runaway giraffe." This so-called runaway giraffe has 9% body fat and a vertical leap of 38 inches. O.J. worked so hard to rehabilitate his broken leg that he was well enough to play some games in his favorite other sport on the Falcons' off-season basketball team. By playing some basketball at Kent, he joined a list of current tight ends with hardwood experience such as Gonzalez (power forward for Sweet 16 California team), Rickey Dudley (Ohio State), and Ben Coates (Livingstone College).

Personal

Otis Jason was an all-Canadian first-team tight end at St. Michael's High School in Toronto. Santiago led his school to two district titles while being selected to the *Toronto Star* and *Toronto Sun* all-star teams. A versatile athlete, he **returned kickoffs and punts** as well as playing both ways as a defensive lineman (Defensive MVP honors at the Metro Bowl) and tight end O.J. was an **All-Academic choice three times** and was a **GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-District first-team member**. He walked away with the **prestigious Arthur Ashe Award** by Black Issues in Higher Education. His **older brother was a 100 and 200 meter champion in Canada** and a **younger sister won a junior national championship in the pentathlon**. Santiago guided St. Michael's to a pair of district championships in basketball. In track, he threw the shot put and discus. One of three children of Marion and Winston (a draftsman) of Whitby, Ontario, he was a business administration major at Kent and is a big fan of the Toronto Raptors.



Last Season

Craig proved to be a valuable special teams player and capable reserve linebacker in '97. Sauer played in all 16 games and received his second NFL start vs. New Orleans (11/23). He ended up with six special teams tackles, tied for fourth on team, and seven stops on the defensive side. He recovered his first fumble of his career vs. Carolina (9/7) on a muffed punt return. He registered two special teams tackles at Arizona for his best individual performance. Craig recorded three tackles and a QB pressure in the start against the Saints.

He also added a pair of tackles as a reserve linebacker at Seattle (11/30).

Pro Career

Sauer has played in every game in his Falcon career over the past two seasons to run his total to 32 straight. As a rookie in '96, he was provided an opportunity at left linebacker in the last four contests and totaled 14 tackles. This special teams leader amassed 21 tackles which were second-best on the club, just one off the lead. Sauer registered a-then personal-best four each vs. the Rams and Jaguars (in his first NFL start). His best overall game as a pro came at New Orleans when he recorded three stops on defense and a career-high five special teams stops. Sauer's two-year career highlights also include a forced fumble from Eddie Kennison of the Rams during his rookie campaign to stop a St. Louis scoring drive at the Falcons' seven-yard line.

College Career

Craig was the team captain and leading tackler for the Golden Gophers of Minnesota in '95, totaling 76 tackles with 55 solo stops. He captured the school's prestigious Carl Eller Award as the team's top defensive player as a junior. The overall college numbers for this three-year starter read 239 tackles, 27 tackles for 113 yards in losses, four fumble recoveries, three INT's, a pair of forced fumbles, and seven sacks. He was named an All-Big Ten choice with a career-high 95 tackles as a junior in '94.



Craig hails from an athletic family that boasts a father who played for the Minnesota Twins organization and a brother who is playing in a junior hockey league. Kent Sauer is on the NHL's list as a ranked player. A true 'student-athlete', Craig was an academic All-Big Ten choice at the University of Minnesota. He boasted a solid 3.3 GPA as a Scholar-Athlete Award winner in earning a degree in business. His first college quarterback coach was former Seattle Seahawk star Jim Zorn. Craig will be able to visit with Zorn this season because he's the new QB coach of the Detroit Lions. Before being switched to linebacker, Sauer made one call from his quarterback position as a sophomore vs. Colorado.

Personal

At Sartell (Minn) High School, Craig was an All-America safety and quarterback. He completed 158 passes for 2,134 yards with 21 passing TD's. As a senior, he registered 64 tackles, rushed for 590 yards, and returned 16 punts for 325 yards with a pair of TD's. A National Honor Society member, he also earned three letters in basketball. Craig has five brothers and sisters. His mother, Peggy, is an anesthetist, and his father, Curt, works in construction. He has aspirations to become a stockbroker or work in commercial real estate after football. He married the former Shari Dold last June.

Last Season

Brian was added to the Falcons' roster on Dec. 3 prior to the San Diego game. Saxton performed as a reserve tight end and special teams player in the final three games of the season. He competed for a position in the New York Giants training camp before being released on the final cutdown at the end of August.

Pro Career


Saxton's NFL career began in New York as an undrafted free agent in '95. He was released on the last cut but was re-signed to the team's practice squad where he remained for the rest of the '95 season. After a strong preseason showing in '96 (14-yard TD), Brian made the Giants' regular roster in '96. He played in all 16 games that season and worked his way into the lineup for two starts. Saxton hauled in four passes for 31 yards and as an up-man on kickoffs returned four kicks for 31 yards. He took over after an injury to starter Aaron Pierce at the H-back position on the third play of the game vs. Arizona (11/3). When New York opened with an H-back at Carolina (11/10) the next week, made his first NFL start. He registered his first NFL reception with a nine-yard catch to keep a scoring drive alive the following week at Arizona (11/17). Brian was used as a blocker out of the backfield in the third and fourth quarters when Charles Way was forced to leave the game vs. Dallas (11/24). In the season finale vs. New England (12/21) he made his second career start at H-back.

College/Notebook

This huge drive blocker logged plenty of time at Boston College under former NFL head coach Dan Henning. He appeared in 11 games and when he wasn't blocking, he slipped out in the open to catch eight passes for 83 yards. As a pitcher for the Eagles, he once threw one inning against the Boston Red Sox in an exhibition his last season on the mound. Paul Brian Saxton was born on March 13, 1972. He was an all-conference and All-Morriss County product his final two seasons at Whippany Park (NJ) High School. Saxton was captain of the football, baseball, and basketball teams. This hard-throwing pitcher also holds numerous school records as well as a school mark for rebounds in a game with 29. He earned his bachelor's degree in marketing and his Master's in human development.

Last Season

Adam was a training camp addition to the Falcons roster and went on to perform the snapping duties in all 16 games as well as subbing for center Calvin Collins on occasion. Because of some snapping difficulties suffered in the club's first preseason game at Detroit (8/1), Schreiber was signed to add stability to the crucial position. His accurate snaps helped K Morten Andersen hit 23 of 27 field goals and every extra point (35-35). His consistent snaps also allowed P Dan Stryzinski to lead the NFL in fair catches forced with 45. The Falcons were the best in the League in covering punts (just 2.6 yards per return) and second-best in covering kickoffs (start at only 23-yard line) with Adam's presence on special teams. The units were also ranked the 4th-best in the NFL by the annual ratings compiled by *Dallas Morning News*.

Pro Career

This 14-year NFL veteran has performed now in 182 games since breaking in with the Seahawks in '84. Originally a ninth round draft choice by Seattle, he's put on a uniform for the Seahawks, Saints, Eagles, Jets, Vikings, Giants and Falcons. Adam has filled in at center and guard to collect 33 starts in addition to his snapping responsibilities during his tenure in the League. He handled all of the snapping duties for Coach Reeves during the '94, '95 and '96 seasons in New York. The most starts he has totaled in his career was 16 at center for the Vikings in '93. In '87, he was the Eagles' starting left guard for all 12 non-strike games. He played in all 16 games for the first time in his career in Minnesota in '90. In '89, he was primarily a back-up at all of the line positions through 15 games with the Jets.

College/Notebook

Schreiber captured four letters for the Longhorns of Texas. He settled in as the starter as a junior and was in the lineup his final two seasons at guard. His versatile career in Austin included stints at guard, tackle, and center in college. Adam was an all-state selection and honorable mention All-America on the offensive line at S.R. Butler High School in Huntsville, AL. He's been a serious member of the community in his time in the League through his work with Easter Seals, National Paralysis Foundation, Special Olympics, United Negro College Fund, and Youth Advocacy Program of Austin. Adam's pro career has included receiving a pair of game balls for his play with the Giants in '94 and the Eagles in '87, a rare feat for an offensive lineman. He was featured in a *GameDay* program and in a team newspaper article as well as featured on the Dan Reeves show, explaining the intricacies of the "art of snapping".

Chuck established himself as one of the premier pass rushers as well as complete defensive players in the NFL in '97. Smith's stellar play was one of the main reasons for the Falcons' overall defensive improvement last year from 27th (in '96) to 20th, the best overall mark since '90.

A Finished tied for 6th in the NFL in QB sacks with a career-high 12, 4th-best ever in team history, as club established a new team-record and finished #2 in NFL with 55.

A Tied a club record with 5 QB sacks at New Orleans (10/12), going against All-Pro Willie Roaf, to become only the 9th player in NFL history to record 5 in a single game. It was the most in a game since Derrick Thomas of Chiefs set the mark with 7 in '90.

Smith has produced an eye-opening 173 tackles, 18 QB sacks and 97 QB pressures over the last two seasons. His 40 career QB sacks are the second-most in club history and his 34.5 as a starter over the last four years is the 15th-most. Here's a look at his yearly highlights.

College Career

Chuck was the second Tennessee defensive player (Chris Mims the other) off its '92 squad to get drafted in the first two rounds. The All-SEC defensive end totaled 111 tackles, 13.5 QB sacks, 19 tackles for losses, and 23.5 batted balls during his two-year stay in Knoxville. He transferred to Tennessee after two years at Northwestern Oklahoma A&M, where he collected over 120 tackles in leading his club to a Top Ten ranking and nine wins each season. Chuck capped off his career by adding 3 sacks in the Senior Bowl.

Notebook

Chuck continued to add to his off the field resume by becoming a sports reporter for one of top morning shows in Atlanta on popular hip-hop station Hot 97.5 FM (WHTA). The self-proclaimed "Hip-Hop Jock" of the airwaves interviewed national sports stars like Deion Sanders and Scottie Pippen during the off-season. This latest journalistic venture follows up an internship he performed last year at local ABC affiliate WSB-TV. Smith got started in the medium in college as he labored on the school's TV station as well playing host on his own radio show. This off-season he traveled to Washington, D.C. to pick-up the Falcons' "Unsung Hero" award for '97. Chuck believes in giving back to the community. Under the umbrella of "Chuck Smith Delivers", he passed out toys to underprivileged kids in the Athens, Ga. area during the holidays. His "Celebrity Birthday Party" also collected toys for

the "Make A Wish Foundation". Smith also showed his giving side by distributing 60 turkeys at Thanksgiving to feed the homeless of Athens. A charity basketball game he organized, featuring NFL stars, benefited the local Boys & Girls Club. Chuck is a big proponent of buying Falcons tickets and giving them to needy groups. He's taking classes in the offseason at Georgia State University in order to meet the requirements for his degree in Communications. A NFL history buff, Smith has a vast video library of over 30 tapes in his home of some of the League's best sack artists. He constantly reviews tapes of a Reggie White, Lawrence Taylor, or Bruce Smith to try to get any advantage he can over an offensive lineman. As young player, Chuck used to pick the brains of older veterans Jumpy Geathers, Pierce Holt, and Chris Doleman about hand placement, leverage, and countermoves. He remembers watching old highlights on television of players like Dick Butkus and Wilber Marshall and admiring their relentless tenacity. "I love to hit people. I love to chase people. I love to dive into piles and all that stuff," said Smith who leads the team each year in displaying his trademark intensity on game day.

Personal

Chuck led Athens' Clarke Central H.S. to new heights by capturing 19 consecutive games over his final two years. His junior season saw him boast a perfect 15-0 and #2 national ranking en route to a 4A state title in '85. As a senior, his team won 14 straight before slipping in the state championship game. This all-around athlete was a catcher on the baseball team and a 200-meter sprinter in track. Charles Henry III was born in Athens, Ga. and grew up a huge Falcons fan. He used to wait outside old Fulton County Stadium as a 12 year-old to catch a glimpse of his favorite players and get autographs. He pays tribute to his favorite pass rushers and players by mounting framed jersey's on his wall at his home. He added a Jessie Tuggle jersey to his new wall this season which also includes such players as Reggie White and Richard Dent. Smith will be able to perfect his lifelong hobby of fishing at his recently purchased home on the banks of Lake Lanier.

Last Season


Ed's dream to become a pro athlete was realized on Nov. 23rd against New Orleans when he was activated off the practice squad. He spent the last two football seasons on the practice squad for the Rams and Redskins and before that played nine seasons of minor league baseball. The game was also significant because he faced his younger brother, Irv, the Saints' starting tight end, and their parents were in attendance in Atlanta. Smith went on to play in a total of five games at the end of the year.

Pro Career

Smith was signed as a free agent by the Rams on July 9, 1996 after giving up a baseball career. He was released at the end of training camp but was signed to the Redskins' practice squad on October 16 where he remained for the rest of the season. His pro career was jump started through NFL Europe in the spring of '96. Ed caught three touchdowns and a total of six passes for 36 yards with the Frankfurt Galazy. He missed three games with a knee injury.

Notebook/Personal

He turned down a football and baseball scholarship to attend the University of North Carolina and instead signed a minor league baseball contract with the Chicago White Sox out of high school. Smith was a 7th round draft choice of the Sox in '87 and played seven seasons in the minors with three different teams, including an assignment with the AAA Cleveland Indians club, the Buffalo Bisons in '95. He led the Orlando Cubs of the Southern League in homers with 16 and RBI with 60 in '94. With the White Sox in South Bend of the Class A Midwest League in '88, Ed led the league in every fielding category as a third baseman. Edward Martin was a football and baseball star at Pemberton (NJ)H.S. as the "Athlete of the Year" in '87 from the tri-state area of Delaware, Pennsylvania and N.J.



Last Season

Dan's stellar season included **leading the NFL in fair catches forced for the fifth time in the 90's** with a **personal-best 45** (18 ahead of next best). Stryzinski's high angling kicks were an effective weapon as only 21 of his 89 punts were returned for just an NFL-low 55 yards, besting his 18 allowed for 94 yards with the Buccaneers in '94. That figures out to a remarkable 2.6 per punt return average, tops in the NFL. His net punting average of 36.7 was 3rd-best in the NFC and the 9th-best mark in the League. On the heels on his booming kicks permit tight coverage on special teams, the Falcons allowed just two returns for POSITIVE yardage in the final 12 games of the year. Dan's 89 punts for 3,498 yards were the second-most in a season in both categories for his career. Stryzinski was twice singled out by the coaches as special teams player of the game vs. Denver (7-297-5 FC's) and S.F. (5-229-41.8 net-4 FC's-0 return yards). He also had 20 punts inside the 20 and only 9 touchbacks.

Pro Career

Dan has a streak of 356 punts over the last 73 games without a block (10/13/93 vs. Falcons was his last) and has just 1 block in the last five years, covering 465 punts and 95 games. Against the Bucs (11/9) last season, he had a punt of 18 yards that was tipped but not considered a block (it went beyond the line of scrimmage). Dan has been the NFL leader in forcing fair catches in '90, '91, '92, '94 and '97. He has dropped at least 20 punts inside the opposition's 20-yard line for the last five straight seasons. In '94, he led the NFL in fewest punt returns allowed (18), fewest yards (with only 94), and lowest punt return average (5.4). Stryzinski was released by New Orleans, Indianapolis and the Cleveland Browns before landing a permanent job in Pittsburgh in '90.

Year-by-Year

1996: Stryzinski broke his personal-best for gross punting average by almost an entire yard with a 42.0 mark. He ranked second in the League in fair catches with 25 and was second in fewest touchbacks with just four.

1995: Dan enjoyed his second best season ever in terms of gross average with a mark of 41.2. Stryzinski also ranked 11th in the NFL in lowest net average at 36.2 per game, 4th in the NFL for fewest touchbacks with five, and 10th in fewest returns with only 28. He also had a career long kick of 64 yards at Buffalo.

1994: He led the NFL in fewest punt returns allowed with 18 and for the fewest yards with only 94. He set a Tampa Bay record for forced fair catches with 42 while boasting the lowest punt return average at 5.4.

1993: He posted the third highest mark in the NFL with his 23 forced fair catches. He dropped 24 punts inside the 20-yard line, with only three touchbacks and had a gross average of 40.6 and a net of 35.3. Dan established a personal high with 10 punts at Green Bay, downing three inside the 20.

1992: Once again, he was the League leader in forcing fair catches (tying Rick Tuten of Seattle) for the third time in his career with 26. With his high, booming kicks, he set a Buccaneers record for net average with a 36.2 mark, tying for fourth in the NFC. His foot also enabled the Bucs to allow a NFL-low 117 punt return yards as just 22 of his 74 punts were returnable.

1991: The eighth best punter in the NFL boasted a net average of 36.4 yards for the Steelers. Of course, he was tops in the NFL in the fair catch department forcing 27. His last season in Pittsburgh included a 63-yard boot at Denver.

1990: In his first season with the Steelers, he was atop the League charts for the first time in forcing fair catches with 32. He also paced the NFL in percentage of punts fair caught at 49% and registered a League-low 16 punts returned. In two games, he placed three punts each inside his opponents' 20-yard line.

Notebook

For the third straight season, Dan will again proudly donate \$100 for every fair catch forced to the Gwinnett County Children's Shelter in his "Kicks For Kids" program. (Last year UPS and Motorola matched his gift of \$4,500.) This community giver also supports the shelter's new "Safe Place" program, a service for runaway and troubled youth needing a safe haven. He and his wife Angie used to drive to local Harley-Davidson events on their '93 Wide Glide motorcycles and even traveled to Daytona Beach in '95 for Bike Week (a gathering of Harley-Davidson owners from around the world). But he recently sold his Harley's and now rides a Honda CBR 1100 that he tools around town. Dan goes by the

moniker of, "The Hangman", because of his towering, booming punts which are virtually unreturnable. Dan formed a 'dynamic kicking duo' with University of Indiana kicker Pete Stoyanovich in college from '85-88. A public finance and economics degree holder was laying the groundwork for life after football when he served an internship with a brokerage firm in Buckhead (downtown Atlanta) last off-season.

Personal

Daniel Thomas played four positions for Lincoln High in Vincennes, IN., which included quarterback, defensive back, wide receiver, and, of course, punter. The athletic Stryzinski led the school's basketball team in scoring and rebounding as a forward. Dan was a freshman walk-on for the Hoosiers but left as a two-time All-Big 10 selection and school record holder with a 40.6 average. This native of Indianapolis helped Indiana edge powerhouses Michigan and Ohio State on the way to playing in the Peach Bowl in Atlanta. Dan and his wife have two sons, Daniel, Jr. (8) and Eric (6).

Last Season

Eddie was a standout on special teams for the Falcons in his first season and played a reserve linebackers role. Sutter ended up third on the special teams units in tackles with nine. He was singled out by the coaches as the special teams player of the game for his big hits against Philadelphia (12/14). He collared two special teams stops at San Diego (12/7) and at St. Louis (11/16) and one each at Detroit (8/31), vs. Denver (9/28), New Orleans (11/23), and at Seattle (12/7).

Pro Career

Sutter is a veteran of 79 games in his pro career which started with the Cleveland Browns in '92. As a rookie free agent of the Vikings, he was released on the final cut but signed to the Browns' practice squad. He was activated to the regular roster for one game but was inactive. The following season he was signed by the Patriots but waived on the last cut again. Cleveland claimed him and Eddie went on to play in 15 games and lead the Browns with 19 special teams tackles. He tied Bennie Thompson for the team's top spot in that

category in '94 with 21 tackles. Sutter topped Cleveland's special teams charts in '95 along with Louis Riddick with another 21 stops. He established his career-best with five special teams tackles, including four solo stops, vs. Cincinnati. In '96, he started four of the last six games at linebacker for the Ravens for an injured Ray Lewis, including an 11-tackle performance at Carolina and a 10-tackle day at Cincy. He tied for the third spot on the team with 11 special teams stops.


College Career

Last Season/Pro Career

The hard-working Talley will be trying to make a comeback in Atlanta after tearing ligaments in his left knee during the New York Giants' first training camp practice in '96. He underwent corrective surgery on July 30 and was lost for the season. He battled back from the knee injury and competed for a position in the Giants' '97 training camp but was released. Ben was originally a fourth round (133rd overall) pick of the Giants in '95. He made the team and performed on special teams in four games as a rookie.

College Career



Notebook/Personal

Benjamin Jermaine hails from the "Peach State" and the same Griffin High School that produced current linebacker teammate Jessie Tuggle. He excelled at Griffin, earning Class 4A all-state first-team honors as a senior defensive tackle, on an 11-3 state qualifier. This senior team captain was rated 36th out of top 100 players by the Atlanta papers. Talley displayed his athleticism by starting three years at tight end in addition to starting for two-years on the defensive line. As a member of the school's track team, he finished in third place in the state shot put finals with a heave of 54'0" and was fourth in the discus as a junior. He makes his off-season home in Griffin and would like to open a soul food restaurant there when his playing days are over. He lists tennis, raquetball, and volleyball as his hobbies.



Last Season

Robert's 4th season started slowly when a fractured left thumb in the first preseason game at Detroit (8/1) forced him out of the remaining three preseason games. In the season opener at Detroit (8/31), he returned to play a reserve role at left guard. Tobeck worked his way back as a starter at that position for the final 15 games. His blocks enabled the Falcons to finish as the sixth-best team in the League in controlling the clock and held a time of possession advantage over their opponent in 10 out of 16 games. He was partly responsible for QB Chris Chandler registering the second-best QB rating in the NFL while completing 59.1% of his passes en route to his first Pro Bowl appearance. Robert paved the way for Jamal Anderson's 1,052 yards, including two 150+ yard games, and Byron Hanspard's record breaking long run of 77 yards with additional scampers of 57 and 53 yards. Tobeck was in the lineup as the Falcons amassed season-highs of 462 total yards vs. St. Louis (11/2), 386 vs. Philly (12/14), 366 vs. Oakland (9/14) and 356 at Arizona (12/21). For the seventh straight season, the birds scored over 300 points in the '90's for an average of 20 per game.

Pro Career

Tobeck has been a Falcon starter in 47 of the last 48 games with the one missed assignment in the season opener which stopped his streak at 32 in-a-row. He spent his first season in the NFL on the club's developmental squad in '93 but earned a spot on the regular roster the following season, seeing action in five games. Against the LA Rams (9/11/94) in the second week of the '94 season, he lined up for the first time along the line when center Roman Fortin went down in the fourth quarter. In the '95 training camp, Tobeck took advantage when Dave Richards was late reporting and he has been a starter ever since. Robert has opened holes for three 1,000 yard rushing seasons by Falcon backs, three 1,000 yard receivers, and a 4,000 yard passer. Tobeck's work in the trenches was also responsible for a record setting performance never equaled in NFL history as four different Falcons each gained over 1,000 yards in '95.

College Career

Tobeck started all 12 games at center for a 9-3 Washington State team as a senior in 1992. He was moved to center from guard prior to his last year and quickly became entrenched as the starter, earning second-team All-PAC 10 honors. Robert was especially impressive against Stanford, Fresno State, and Oregon State, winning the school's Outstanding Offensive Lineman accolades. He was also the recipient of the Frank Butler Award by his teammates. Robert played two seasons at Kilgore Junior College in Texas but missed most of his second year with an injured knee. His first two seasons were as a defensive end for Kilgore (TX) Junior College. He overcame knee surgery to earn Comeback Player-of-the-Year honors on a 9-2 team

He used his financial background to become an entrepreneur by purchasing and then managing pay phones around the country. Robert's other hobby is following the wrestling game. Ironically, he "wrestled" in practice everyday with former defensive lineman and current pro wrestler Bill Goldberg. He also lists "Nature Boy" Rick Flair as his other favorite wrestler to follow. Tobeck received unique training in college as his first coach, George Yarno, played 12-years in the NFL including a stint in Atlanta. Yarno made the transition smoother when Robert switched from defensive to offensive line after spring drills before his junior season. Tobeck was Drew Bledsoe's best man at his wedding in '96. The former college roommates proved to be a formidable battery mate at Washington State as Tobeck served as Bledsoe's center for their senior season. A big-time weight lifter, he has added muscle through the years going from 275 as a rookie to 300 as a starter in three seasons.

Tobeck was a big running back and was the leading tackler from his linebacker position for New Port Richey High School in Tarpon Springs, FL. A versatile athlete, he was a presence in the middle for the basketball team by averaging an eye-catching 21 rebounds a game. He also scored 21 points for an undefeated 20-0 team which was ranked #2 in the state of Florida. He feeds his appetite for basketball by performing for the Falcons' off-season team. Robert and his wife, Beth, have a daughter McKenzie (5) and son, Mason (2).

Robert's experience across the Falcons' front line has also included catching a one-yard touchdown pass vs. Pittsburgh (10/27/96) and a 14-yard pass vs. New Orleans (11/17/96) as an extra tight end two seasons ago.

Last Season

Esera was signed by the Jacksonville Jaguars on November 5 when DT Kelvin Pritchett was placed on injured reserve. Tuaolo (pronounced too-ah-OH-lo) made 26 tackles with one sack in six games played. In his only start of the season at Oakland (12/21) he responded with a sack, four tackles, and 2 QB pressures. He amassed a season-high nine tackles vs. Tennessee (11/16) and had three tackles with two coming for losses at Cincinnati (11/23). His season started in the Bills training camp before being released on August 18.

Pro Career

Esera was drafted by the Green Bay Packers in the second round (35th overall) in '91. 
College Career

1995: This Pro Bowl starter recorded a career-best 126 solos out of his team-high 180 tackles. He averaged 11 tackles per game with 20 stops as a seasonal-high at New Orleans. He sealed the big win over the Saints with a endzone theft with 1:11 left. He scored his first interception TD on 27-yard return vs. Arizona.

1994: He posted the third highest tackle total of his career with a team-high 195 stops to earn another spot on the NFC Pro Bowl squad. Tuggle pounded the opposition to register 10 or more tackles in 12 of his 16 starts and his 111 solo stops were tops on the club's charts and the second highest tally of his career.

1993: Jessie recorded over 100 tackles for the sixth straight season with a team-high 185 stops. After missing all of the preseason in a contract dispute, he started the opener at Detroit and delivered 10 tackles, including two for losses. Tuggle recorded the 1,000th tackle of his career in Week 8 against the Saints. Three weeks later, he led the team with 12 tackles and a sack in his 100th NFL game at Los Angeles Rams.

personal high and were included in a streak of 10+ tackle efforts in eight consecutive weeks.

1989: In his first full season as a starter, he collared a club-high 183 stops from the inside and paced the team in tackles in 10 out of 16 games.

1988: He developed a reputation around the League by dealing out vicious blows in a sophomore campaign that included his first 100-plus tackle season. Jessie started 8

out of his 16 games played and recovered a fumbled punt return for his first NFL TD at the Rams, while chipping in with 17 tackles and a blocked field goal.

1987: As a rookie, young Jessie played in 12 games with four starts, and impressed with plenty of hard hits. He made the roster as am undrafted free agent after a strong camp.



The answer is linebacker John Rade back in '88 with 137! Jessie's resume in community involvement is just as long and impressive as his playing career. Last season he served as the official spokesperson for the Fatherhood Campaign throughout Georgia as Tuggle's picture with his two kids was on billboards and posters statewide, promoting responsible fatherhood. The governor of Georgia even recognized the program when he proclaimed Sept. 7th "Atlanta Falcon Fatherhood Day" in the state. He has been the Falcons' "Man of the Year" in '93 and United Way national spokesperson in '95-'96. Whether it's speaking to a group of 5,000 youngsters at a Drug Enforcement Agency rally in Nashville, TN or taking time to visit every kid he could at local hospitals, Jessie touches all kinds of groups. He also shows his big heart at the Falcons' yearly holiday feed the homeless drives. For his many efforts on behalf of the community, Tuggle was presented the prestigious "Peach of an Athlete" award for 1996, As a 15 year-old, Jessie fell in love with video games, especially "Space Invaders", on his Atari video game system. It has grown over the years to now include owning SuperNintendo, Sega Genesis, Sony Play Station, and a Panasonic 3DO. This video buff even had a state-of-the-art home theater system complete with a 126-inch screen, 11 theater-style rocking seats, a THX sound system, a laser disc player, and Super VHS system built in his dream home. Don't forget the 10 televisions sets he has strategically placed around the house plus two personal computers for his wife and kids. Tuggle's chiseled body comes from countless hours in the weight room. The 165pound high school junior almost bench pressed twice his own weight while hoisting 300 pounds. He went from benching 330 pounds as a sophomore in college to nearly 500 pounds (475 bench) by the time he was a senior. With strong and loyal roots, Tuggle donated \$25,000 to begin a scholarship fund at Valdosta State and was surprised to learn the school named their new workout facility after him ("Jessie Tuggle Strength & Fitness Complex") to say thanks. Jessie's nickname comes from the simple fact that his pounding hits are so hard fans sometimes hear them in the stands and cringe. A teammate once noted, "The Hammer hits 'em so hard their mammas can feel it!"

Personal

Jessie Floyd, Jr. hails from Spalding County and Griffin, Ga. This football hotbed also produced Willie Gault of the Bears and Rayfield Wright (his uncle by marriage) of the Cowboys. Tuggle worked his way up from being a member of the "B" team at Griffin High to the team's MVP as a senior. Jessie's solid work ethic was forged through the influence of Jessie Floyd, Sr. (a tractor trailer driver) and Ada Tuggle (a factory worker). The Falcons learned more about Tuggle's potential first-hand at an off-season banquet in '87 attended by Falcons coach Marion Campbell and Valdosta State coach Mike Cavan. This huge Falcons fan while growing up has quite a cheering section at home, and at some road games, as he has six brothers and sisters. Jessie married his high school sweetheart, Dujuan, and the household boasts a son, Justin, a Pop Warner terror, and beautiful daughter, Jessica Dujuan.

Last Season

William had a career-best 119 tackles to finish second on the team's defensive charts. His 71 solo stops were the third highest behind Tuggle and Bennett. He also added one interception for 11 yards and three passes defensed to his '97 credits. William ended up sixth in coach Rich Brooks' grading system with 297 points in starting all 16 games. He was named defensive player of the game by the coaches for his team-high 8 tackles, two for losses, and one pass defensed vs. Denver (9/28). His other top tackle games were 10 vs. St. Louis, 9 vs. Carolina (9/7) and Philadelphia (12/14), 8 at New Orleans (10/12) and at Arizona (12/21).

Pro Career

The experienced White upped his numbers to 116 starts out of 155 games played with last years totals. He is in the **top 50 in active tackle leaders** (with 652) **in the NFL** as he heads into his 11th campaign. Selected by the Lions in the fourth round in '88, he started 79 out of 95 games played in Detroit and recorded 450 tackles, 13 interceptions, and 29 passes



White rushed for 1,444 yards with 12 TD's as a running back as a senior at Lima (Ohio) Senior High School. He reaches back into the Columbus community with the Carter/White Charities (established in '91) with former college teammate Cris Carter of the Vikings. Along with Carter he has sponsored a golf tournament that funded a youth football camp in Columbus. He's also been involved with Pro Challenge, a program which delivers speakers to schools to talk about substance abuse. For his community endeavors with the Lions, he was named Detroit's "Man of the Year" in '92. William spends countless hours of film study on his opponent each week. He has tried to teach the younger players on the roster the value of preparation. White is also a leader when it comes to the Falcons' bible study. He is heavily involved in the off-seasons in a program called, Community Rebuild, Inc., which is a initiative by NFL players to rebuild inner-city Los Angeles. This smart and articulate player holds a degree in metallurgical engineering from Ohio State. He was close to experiencing the ultimate in pro football in '91 when his Lions team faced the Redskins in the NFC Championship game. William Eugene and his wife, Nikol, own an off-season home in Columbus.

Last Season

Bob was the leader of the line again in '97, starting every contest at left tackle for the fifth consecutive season. He was a huge reason why the Falcons were able to control the line of scrimmage enough to finish 6th in the NFL in time of possession with a three minute difference over their opponents. With the 6-5, 310 pounder anchoring the line, the birds scored over 300 points for the eighth consecutive season and finished 13th in the League in TD's scored in the Red Zone. The Falcons also had 21 drives or 10 or more plays and 18 drives of 70 or more yards thanks to his presence. He pushed the pile to help spring rookie Byron Hanspard for a team record 77-yard run vs. Oakland (9/14), a 57-yarder vs. Denver (9/28) and 53-yarder vs. Philadelphia (12/14). He also paved the way for Jamal Anderson's 162 rushing yards (7th-most ever) vs. St. Louis (11/2) and 152 yards at Arizona (12/21) on the way to his second straight 1,000 yard season. Whitfield's adept pass blocking allowed Chris Chandler to boast the second-highest OB rating in the NFL en route to the 5th-most passing TD's with 26. His aggressive play along the line allowed the Falcons to amass a season-high 462 total yards of offense vs. St. Louis (11/2), 386 vs. Philly (12/14), 366 vs. Oakland (9/14), and 356 at Arizona (12/21). Bob was voted as a third alternate to the Pro Bowl.

Pro Career

Whitfield has been in the starting lineup in 80 straight games and has played in 86 in-arow. Since the 1970 merger, no offensive tackle in pro football had started as many games as soon as Bob by the age of 25 last season. He started as a 17 year-old freshman at Stanford under Denny Green and was a 20 year-old starter (youngest in League) in the pro's at the beginning of the '93 season. Only three non-rookie's were younger than Whitfield on last year's roster but he still has six seasons of experience under his belt. Through his help five of his offensive teammates have earned Pro Bowl nods since he became a starter. Over the past five years as the stalwart on the line, the offense has enjoyed four 1,000-yard rushing seasons, four 1,000-yard receivers, and a 4,000 yard passer. His strong line play was instrumental in the Falcons becoming the first team in NFL history to have four different players with over 1,000 yards each in '95. Because of a contract dispute, he did not report until two days before the '92 opener and performed in 11 games as a rookie.

College Career

The consensus junior All-American tackle led the Cardinal of Dennis Green to an 8-3 record and a Bowl bid in his final season at Stanford. A starter for three seasons, Bob was a **two-time finalist for the Vince Lombardi Award** and also a nominee for the Outland Trophy as the best lineman in college football. During his final season, the 290-pounder bulldozed holes for "Touchdown" Tommy Vardell, helping Stanford post big victories over top 20 teams like Colorado and UCLA, while the offense averaged almost 400 yards and 32 points a game. In his sophomore season, Whitfield garnered second team All-America honors and All-PAC 10 accolades by not allowing a sack all season for a unit that averaged 384 yards per outing. He was the only sophomore nominated for the Outland Trophy out of the 14 finalists. He was afforded first team freshman NCAA All-America honors as a 17-year-old starter.

Notebook

A likable, smiling 'gentle giant' off the field, Bob turned a childhood hobby into an ambitious undertaking which has paid dividends. "Growing up, I played piano, drums, trumpet and even breakdanced when that was the craze," he explained. So in January of '94, the humble beginnings of PatchWerk Recordings was started in the basement of his Alpharetta home. The business has grown into a 3,000 square-foot facility in downtown Atlanta that increased its bookings from 12 to 22 hours per day and calls Columbia/Sony Records, LaFace Records, Def, Arista, and Priority Records, as clients. Whitfield was smart enough to earn a place on Banning High School's honor roll in Los Angeles rather than follow his brother's (Paris) path of gang life. "A lot of guys have to go to the streets to be noticed, but I always enjoyed being a good student - school was fun to me." In '95, he was part of the NFL's Golden Circle of 50 players who each donated \$10,000 in honor of the 50th Anniversary of the United Negro College Fund in a program which help fund 39 scholarships at black colleges. Bob was just the fifth lineman in Falcons history (at the time) to be chosen in the first round. Whitfield was the first recruit of Minnesota's Dennis Green at Stanford and was the highest drafted player (#8 overall) at the school since John Elway in '83.

Personal

"Big Whit" actually began as an imposing 6-4, 270 pound defensive lineman as a 9th grader at Banning High. He listened to his older brother, Paris, and swayed away from gangs and into athletics and academics. His counseling paid off when Whitfield was named the prestigious *Gatorade* Circle of Champions Player-of-the-Year in '88. That season he guided Banning to a berth in the city of Los Angeles finals with an 11-3 record. Bob spurned offers from powerhouses Michigan, Notre Dame, and Miami to sign with Stanford so his mother and best friend, Eartha, could see him play. Academics are still a driving force in his life as he continues to work on his economics degree at Georgia State. He is the proud father of a daughter, Laniece (8), and son, Kodi (4).

Last Season

Dave started 12 of the 16 games at center for the playoff bound 11-5 Jacksonville Jaguars. His three-year career in Jacksonville included starting in a team record 42 of 47 games played. Widell opened up holes for the Jags to score a team-record 394 points and a set a new club mark with 20 rushing TD's, second best in NFL. He was also responsible for three teammates setting new individual team records. QB Mark Brunell was the highest rated passer in the AFC with his 91.2 QB rating. RB Natrone Means gained 823 rushing yards and WR Jimmy Smith set a new mark with his 1,324 receiving yards. Dave was part of a successful line which finished seventh in total offense with 12 300+ games, including a 538 yard effort at St. L (10/20), 442 at N.E. (9/22), and 422 vs. Cin. (12/1). The high scoring Jags also finished tied for the League lead in red zone TD's with 33.

Pro Career

Big Dave has now been a reliable NFL starter in 92 games out of his 155 total games played through 10 seasons. His time in the trenches has been spent at center, guard and tackle as well as long snapper. Widell started the first 21 games in Jaguars history before missing two starts in October of '96 which also stopped a streak of 38 consecutive starts. His career began as a fourth round draft choice of the Cowboys in '88 where he started nine games. He was traded to the Broncos on Aug. 24, 1990 for 7th (in '91) and 8th round (in '92) picks. In his first season in Denver, he was in the starting lineup for the final five games and handled the snapping chores on punts. He broke in as a full-time starter in '94 when he logged time in every game at center. Dave joined the new Jaguars as an unrestricted free agent on March 15, 1995. In Jacksonville's inaugural campaign of '95, he anchored the line as one of only two offensive players to start every game along with T Brian DeMarco and performed all of the snapping duties on field goals and extra points. He was the only Jag to play every offensive play that first season. In '96, Widell started 14 of 15 games played for the Playoff Jags. He and the rest of the o-line received a game ball for their work against the Bengals (12/1).

College Career

For the Eagles of Boston College, he was a three-year starter at right tackle. He played his first season under offensive coordinator Tom Coughlin. As a freshman, he was a back-up left tackle and moved to center as a sophomore. His final season at BC garnered him All-East Coast recognition as well as an honorable mention All-Amercia nod. His responsibilities also entailed handling all of the snapping duties for more than three seasons.


Notebook/Personal

Dave is a big, pile-driving blocker who is known for his toughness. He started and played the entire game for the Jaguars against the Panthers in '96 despite pain in his knee from pregame warm-ups. He underwent an MRI the day after the game and had to undergo an arthroscopic procedure to repair a torn meniscus cartliage. He continued his tough ways by returning to the lineup 13 days later. In the last game of the season Widell started and played the entire game at Buffalo despite suffering a strained calf during the contest. He had the distinction of playing for future Hall of Fame coach Tom Landry during the coach's last season in Dallas and will now play for the second time for Landry disciple, Dan Reeves. Dave and his brother, Doug, started together along the line for Boston College one season and both went on to establish themselves in the pro's as Doug lined up last season for the Colts. He was a an all-state of Connecticut choice at two positions as a tight end and nose tackle at South Catholic H.S. in Hartford. During his time in Jacksonville, he was involved in the community through a series of public service announcements for antiviolence, leukemia awareness and anti-smoking campaigns. Widell was a spokesperson for a shelter for abused women called the Hubbard House and was an active participant in Special Olympics. David Harold Widell, Jr. and his wife, Shawn, have a daughter, Corinne (8/30/94), and a son, Daniel (4/2/96).

Last Season

Gene started every game at right guard except vs. Carolina (9/7) in Week 2. Williams was responsible for opening holes for an offense that gained 300 or more yards in eight out of 16 games, including a season-high of 462 vs. St. Louis (11/2). He helped pave the way for Jamal Anderson's second straight 1,000 yard rushing season and two of his career-best rushing days with 162 vs. St. Louis (11/2) and 152 at Arizona (12/21). Gene's drive blocking also enabled Byron Hanspard to record three of the 12 longest runs in team history with a record-breaking 77-yarder vs. Oakland (9/14), a 57-yarder vs. Denver (9/28) and a 53-yard run vs. Philadelphia (12/14). His pass protection allowed the Falcons to post the 5th highest total of passing TD's in the League with 26 as his QB Chris Chandler earned a Pro Bowl berth for the first time with a 95.1 rating, the second-highest in the NFL. The birds also were the 13th most-productive unit in TD's scored inside the "Red Zone" and scored over 300 points for the eighth straight season with Williams' presence in the lineup.

Pro Career

Williams saw his games played total rise to 84 and his games started number reach 41 in seven pro seasons with last year's additions. He's performed for three different teams during that span which had beginnings in Miami in '91. Gene broke in as a backup to Pro Bowler (and former Iowa State teammate) Keith Sims with the Dolphins from '91-92 and played in 15 games in two seasons. He was dealt to Cleveland on July 12, 1993 for a '94 fourth round draft choice and his career took off. He was in the starting lineup in 23 out of 32 games played for the Browns before being acquired by the Falcons for a fifth round pick on August 29th just before the '95 season opener. The Falcons' offense amassed 348 and 375 total yards, in consecutive victories after he replaced an injured Mike Zandofsky in Week 4. He started one other game for Zandofsky and also added a blocked 21-yard field goal attempt at Miami in 12 games played. In '96, back surgery in the preseason followed right knee surgery at the end of September, limiting his work to 10 games. Williams started 22 consecutive games for the Cleveland Browns from 1993-94 and 23 out of 29 overall games played. He was part of a line that set an NFL record by allowing only 14 QB sacks in '94 as the Browns posted a 7-2 record in his nine starts.

College Career / Notebook

Gene was a first team All-Big Eight choice and first team All-America pick by *Pro Football Weekly* as a senior at Iowa State. The four-year starter for the Cyclones teamed with Keith Sims to lead an offense which averaged 378 yards a contest. Williams was given the '94 Doug Dieken Humanitarian Award by the Cleveland Browns Touchdown Club for his community involvement. Needless to say, he's happy pro football fans in Cleveland will again field a team in 1999. This guitar player's spare time in the off-season is spent with his rock 'n roll band. His resume lists a background in television as he directed and screen produced a pair of shows. This speech communications and English major also was the host of his own jazz radio show in college.


Personal

Last Season

Marcus' first season in the pro's was spent on special teams and learning the safety position from veterans William White and Devin Bush. Wimberly played in six games while being on the club's inactive list for the other nine games. He suited up in his first pro game vs. Oakland (9/14) after being on the inactive list the first two weeks of the season and performed on special teams. The following week at San Francisco (9/21) he made his only special teams tackle of the season.

College Career

Wimberly amassed 71 tackles, an interception, four passes defensed, and a forced fumble as a hard hitting starting free safety for the 8-3 Miami Hurricanes in '96. Marcus was converted to his present position after his first two seasons as a wide receiver. The 71 tackles were the second highest total among all Hurricane defensive backs (to Tremain Mack of Bengals) and was good enough for fourth overall. His top tackling effort was a career-best 12 tackles against East Carolina. He also picked off a pass versus Syracuse. In '95, he was slowed by tendenitis in his right knee all season which limited him to four games played at his new position. He ended up with five tackles (four solos) with two stops each coming against Temple and Baylor. Marcus hauled in nine passes for 86 yards with a long of 19 in two seasons playing behind a talented receiving corps which would produce the likes of future NFLers like Chris T. Jones and A.C. Tellison.

Notebook/Personal


Marcus graduated with a degree in systems analysis from the business school at Miami. A first-team All-Conference and honorable mention all-state of Tennessee product, Wimberly played three positions (running back, wide receiver, defensive back) at East High School in Memphis. He rambled for 1,200 rushing yards with 16 TD's and 160 yards receiving and two scores. Patrolling the secondary, he stole three passes and knocked down seven others, collared 38 tackles and recovered two fumbles. Marcus has benefited from the influences of talented Hurricanes who have gone on to the pro's like Warren Sapp, Michael Barrow, Ryan McNeil, James Stewart, Horace Copeland, Chris T. Jones, Kenneth Holmes, and Kevin Williams. Miami's defensive coaches were impressed when this smart athlete was able to learn their defense in less than a week after he was converted from wide receiver. The son of Alvin and Glenda Taylor frequently spoke to local Miami schools such as Joe Hall Elementary School.

College Career

The Falcons picked their first player ever from the state of Georgia in the first round of a draft and selected "the complete package" in Keith Brooking. With the size and strength (6-3, 242) to shed blockers; the speed, quickness and range (4.5 in the 40) to chase down ball carriers or cover backs; and the intensity to pursue opponents from sideline-to-sideline on every play (nicknamed Dick Butkus after legendary Chicago Bear), Brooking possesses all the attributes coaches are looking for in an every down pro linebacker. Take a look at the impressive college career of a player who "Wrecked" havoc at nearby Georgia Tech.

√ Leading tackler in school history with 467 career stops.

√ Team leader in tackles the last three seasons, while averaging 12.8 per game.

√ Recorded two of the top tackle seasons in Tech history with 147 and 146, respectively, as

a junior and sophomore.

Year-by-Year

1997: A second-team All-ACC linebacker, Keith was ranked 5th in the conference with an average of 11.9 tackles per contest. He also led the team with eight tackles for losses. Brooking tied his personal-best for the FOURTH TIME in his career with 20 tackles against Clemson. He also collared 17 tackles, including two for losses, against Notre Dame and made 13 tackles vs. 5th-ranked North Carolina with an interception at the UNC 24-yard line. He totaled a sack and nine tackles against 3rd-ranked Florida State and 12 tackles (two for losses) and a blocked 35-yard field goal against rival Georgia. Keith registered 15 tackles, a sack and a fumble recovery vs. Virginia. With nine tackles against Duke, Keith established a new school record to eclipse the previous Tech record of 437 by linebacker Jerrelle Williams from 1989-91.

1996: The durable Brooking played every snap in every game except lopsided games versus Wake Forest, Duke and Florida State. He equaled his career-best with 20 tackles against Clemson, including 13 solo tackles. Keith added 18 tackles vs. nationally-ranked North Carolina and 15 versus Navy. He keyed a superb defensive effort in a 13-7 victory over 12th ranked Virginia when he recorded 15 tackles, with a sack, a pass deflection, and a forced fumble. He came up big again versus Georgia as he made 14 tackles, one tackle for loss, one sack for an 11-yard loss, a pass defensed, and a QB pressure. His totals also included

blocked field goals against North Carolina and Clemson.

1995: The leading tackler in the ACC achieved double-figure tackles in every game over the last nine games. Two of Brooking's most impressive games came against Clemson and Georgia where he collected 20 tackles each. His all-around outstanding effort propelled the Yellow Jackets over 17th-ranked Maryland as he had a game-high 13 stops, one for a 10-yard loss, a fumble recovery, a QB pressure, and a pass break-up. His effort against the Terps also included allowing -30 yards in the rushing department.

1994: He was one of only four 'true' freshmen to see action on defense for the Yellow Jackets. He made an impression as a back-up weakside 'backer as he totaled 43 tackles, including four for losses. His steady improvement earned him three starts on the year and his best outing was a season-high 10 tackle effort against Wake Forest.

Notebook

Projected by some people to go as high as #5 overall in the first round, the Falcons were ecstatic he was still on the board when their turn came at #12 and quickly phoned in their selection to New York from their war room. Keith was the highest player drafted from the area since former Georgia RB Garrison Hearst was the third overall choice by the Cardinals in '93. Besides being the first ever player selected by the birds in the first round from the state, Brooking was the first Georgia Tech player taken by the team since TE Ken Whisenhunt was chosen in the 12th round in '85. The last Yellow Jacket to go in the first round was DE Marco Coleman (also 12th) in '92. A longtime fan of ferocious former Steeler great Jack Lambert, Keith also plays the game with the same trademark intensity of a player his high school coach called him after - Dick Butkus. "On the first day (as an inside linebacker) I laid a guy out. That's when they started calling me Dick, after Dick Butkus," Keith explained. He also loves to be called "a throwback player" and competes with a tough guy, lunch-pail type mentality. He came to The Flats at Georgia Tech as a 198-pounder and put on 20 pounds of muscle while working a summer construction job with good friend and former linebacker teammate Ron Rogers after his freshman year. After a grueling eight-hour shift in the sweltering heat of the Georgia sun, the pair would THEN lift weights for two more hours THEN run for another hour. The hard work paid off as Keith set Tech records with 402 pounds in the clean and 700 pounds in the squat. Brooking and Rogers would end their careers with 467 and 437 tackles, respectively, to finish first and third all-time on the school's charts. On numerous occasions (three as a senior) Brooking's aggressive nature had gotten him "kicked off" the Tech practice field by Head Coach George O'Leary for being too aggressive during non-contact segments of practice. At the age of five, Keith's parents (Harvey Brooking and Brenda Hembree) divorced and his mother brought foster children into their home whose parents were drug or alcohol-addicted and in rehabilitation. He was a surrogate brother to those children and grew up faster than most. "You learn some of life's lessons fast in those circumstances," said the mature 22 year-old. Keith has still remained close to both parents through the years and they were amongst 30 relatives and friends at a draft day party in Senoia, Ga. The town (with a pop. of 900) was so proud of him that the local police force gave him an escort out of town as he drove the hour and a half to his press conference in Suwanee. Besides playing some little league baseball, football has been his passion for the last 17 years ever since he strapped it up as a five year-old in peewee football. "I love the contact. I love the competition. I love everything about it."


Personal

Keith Howard Brooking was born on October 30, 1975 in Senoia. He played about every snap at East Coweta High School as a linebacker and tight end as well as long snapper on punts and a member of the kickoff coverage and punt return teams for coach Danny Kronic. "Icame out one play a game - kickoff return," Brooking recalled. The Coweta County Player-of-the-Year was also voted co-team MVP by his teammates. This team captain helped East Coweta to an 8-2 record as a senior and was the winner of the school's Scholar-Athlete award. As an inside linebacker, he made 62 solo tackles and 62 assists for a 124 total. For his career, he managed 250 tackles, including 141 solos, in lettering three times. Keith also hauled in 28 receptions for 487 yards with five TD's that '93 season and for his career

totaled 53 catches for 622 yards and seven scores. Brooking has three brothers and sisters and majored in management at Tech. His new pro locker is next to his favorite Falcon, Jessie Tuggle, the only other Falcon to have played football in high school, college and now in the pro's all in the state of Georgia.

College Career

The Falcons drafted a big, versatile, athletic lineman with their second round pick. Bob was a first-team All-Mid American Conference choice last year for starting each game at right tackle and delivering 137 knockdown blocks. Hallen graded out a high 89% for his blocking consistency in '97 to help Kent State boast the 12th ranked offense in the nation with an average of 442 yards per game. He bulldozed holes for RB Astron Whatley to gain 373 rushing yards vs. Eastern Michigan and to record 17 100-yard games in his career. He protected Kent State QB Todd Goebbel so well that the line surrendered only eight sacks the entire year and provided enough time to finish with the 10th-best passing attack, averaging 295 passing yards per game. Hallen started all four years at Kent State with his first three years coming at the center position and played all of a possible 44 games. This strong and powerful drive blocker recorded 334 total "pancake" blocks, including 20 in ONE game, and as a junior was voted the team's most outstanding offensive player. He was such a dominating force for the Golden Flashes that he was named the team's Offensive Player-of-the-Week four times during his career. An All-American according to The Poor Man's Guide to the NFL Draft in '97, Hallen also was voted all-conference at center during his productive junior season. Bob opened up holes for the #2 ranked team in the conference in '96 and for RB Astron Whatley's two 1,000 rushing seasons and his 17 100yard rushing games.

1997: Big Bob collected an unheard of **20 knockdown blocks** in putting on a blocking clinic as Kent State rolled to 551 yards in the air against Central Florida. He collared 10 knockdown blocks to aid the Golden Flashes rushing game to 367 yards vs. Eastern Michigan. He bulldozed a block in the backfield that brought down nose guard Lional Dalton to spring tailback Astron Whatley for a 91-yard scoring run in that game.

1996: Hallen was the school's recipient of the Jack Lambert Award given to the outstanding

offensive performer for anchoring the line from his center position. This All-MAC choice earned team Player-of-the-Week honors twice for his efforts against Pittsburgh and Youngstown State. He amassed 91 knockdowns on the year and grading out 83%. Bob provided outstanding pass protection as the Golden Flashes averaged 230 passing yards per game. He brought down linebacker DeShone Myles (Seahawks #4 pick this year) with a cut block on Goebbel's 76-yard TD pass to Eugene Baker as the offense piled up 585 yards vs. Nevada. He leveled DE Jason Taylor (Dolphins #3 pick in '97) on Goebbel's 8-yard scoring pass to Baker in a win over Akron.

1995: He totaled 90 knockdown blocks in his second season as the starting center. He opened the season with 11 "pancakes", including a timely block that brought down LB Leon Jones on a two-yard TD run by flanker Kantroy Walker on a reverse as the team gained 386 yards vs. Youngstown State. He was named Offensive Player-of-the-Week for his play vs. Eastern Michigan.

1994: Hallen was shifted to center during fall practice and earned a starting spot in every contest. His first season as a starter included 55 knockdowns with six coming on a crushing upfield block to take down LB Phillip Dunn on Whatley's 71-yard TD run vs. Akron. He helped the Golden Flashes ramble for 259 rushing yards in that game as Whatley was named Freshman-of-the-Year in MAC. His efforts were recognized by the coaching staff as he captured his first Offensive Player-of-the-Week award after the Youngstown State game.

1993: Redshirted as a freshman.



Bob is a good friend of former Kent State teammate and Falcons '97 draft pick, O.J. Santiago. O.J. stopped by the Falcons offices before Hallen was introduced to the media on the second day of the draft to welcome his new pro teammate. The pair started on the productive front lines for the Golden Flashes for three seasons ('94-96). Bob excelled at the Senior Bowl and was listed as the fastest interior lineman in the country by USA Today with a combine time of 4.97 and the #1 rated center, according to The Sporting News and Buchsbaum's pre-draft reports. He showed what kind of a team player he was when the coaching staff asked him to make the unusual switch to right tackle for his senior season and all he did was earn another all-conference nod in impressive fashion for the fourth straight season. Bob was the recipient of the L&L football scholarship provided by a school alum at Kent State for his academic and athletic excellence which included a perfect 4.0 GPA for the spring and fall semesters last year. He joins a list of Kent State players to be drafted in the pro's which dates back to tackle Al Kilgore of the old Chicago Cardinals in 1954 and includes the likes of former Falcons Gerald Tinker ('74-75) and Mike Zele ('79-83), Don Nottingham of the Baltimore Colts/Dolphins ('71-73, '73-77), Andy Harmon of the Eagles, Ken Walter of the Panthers, and the most famous alum in ex-Steeler Jack Lambert. The Falcons' honor roll now lists two centers from the same high school as Paul Ryzcek ('74-79) also attended Mentor (Oh.) High School. He is the fifth Golden Flash alum to be drafted in the second round, the highest selection by any player in school history. Bob will be able to reminisce with his roommate of four years, Steve Zahursky (free agent) when the Falcons practice against the Jaguars this summer. Considered the strongest player on the team during his time in the Kent, OH. school, he holds the team record with a 495-pound bench press and says he always been... "the first player into the weight room and last to leave". This steadfast dedication to weightlifting began as a 10th grader in high school and helped him add 60 pounds of muscle to his frame since arriving on campus. He bench pressed 225 pounds 34 times at the combine (with a personal-best of 43 reps coming in the school weight room) and also boasts a 555-pound squat. A quiet, unpretentious player, he majored in community health in college.

HALLEN/GERMAN

Personal

The son of Robert and Carol Hallen, Bob was born on March 9, 1975. The Hallen household also includes two older sisters and a pair of younger brothers. An All-Greater Cleveland League first-team pick, he was also an all-district, all-Lake County and an All-Ohio honorable mention choice at Mentor (Oh.) High School. Hallen anchored the offensive and defensive lines and served as **team captain** as well as being member of the school's **academic honor roll**. In '92, he was a big reason Mentor High posted a 10-2 record, captured a GCL title, and reached the regional finals before losing to St. Agnatius. Bob collected two letters in football and three in track. After football he has aspirations to be a fireman.



College Career

An All-Big East Conference first-team pick in '95, Jammi (pronounced JAY-me) led the Hurricanes with 41 receptions for 730 yards for a 17.8 average and three touchdowns as their starting flanker. The 730 receiving yards is the 10th highest total ever for a singleseason in Miami history. German's top game was an 169 yard effort on six catches with touchdowns of 77 and 30 yards against Temple. The 77-yard grab was the longest by a Hurricane in four years since Horace Copeland's 80-yarder in '91. Jammi snatched 8 passes for 111 yards vs. Pittsburgh, had four receptions for 66 yards vs. Syracuse, and totaled 90 yards on 4 receptions vs. West Virginia. His best collegiate season as a wide receiver also included a 59-yard scoring catch against Rutgers and six receptions against rival Florida State. In '94, German was an All-Big East choice as a returner, sporting a 9.1 average on punts and 21.6 mark on kickoffs. He returned 27 punts for 245 yards and 11 kickoffs for 237 yards. His season also included starting the first 10 games (and 11 of 12 overall) and posting 33 receptions for 391 yards for a 11.8 average with two scores to finish second on the team's charts (behind current Eagles starter Chris T. Jones). He began the season off in a big way by returning the opening kickoff 64-yards vs. Georgia Southern. Jammi amassed 136 yards on 4 catches, including 56 and 49-yard TD's off screen passes. while returning two kickoffs for 43 more yards in his second career start against Arizona State. He collected seven receptions for 65 yards vs. Washington and a pair of punt returns for 54 yards against West Virginia. He gained 67 yards on three punt returns vs. Virginia Tech and hauled in three passes against Nebraska in the Orange Bowl. As a freshman for Miami în '93, he played in eight games and caught 16 passes (5th highest on squad) for 213 yards (13.3 average) and one score. He returned 13 punts for 129 yards (9.9 avg.) and four kickoffs for 69 yards (17.3). German returned six punts for 60 yards and had 3 catches for 41 yards against Temple. He caught four passes for 34 yards, including his first career TD from 13 yards out and added 70 yards on 5 punts in a win over Pittsburgh. He finished his career with 90 receptions for 1,334 yards and six TD's.

Jammi suffered through some hardships in college. Because of an injury in '96 spring drills, he underwent reconstructive surgery on his right knee and was lost for the season. He was suspended by the NCAA for the '97 season because of involvement with an agent and a limo

ride, and subsequent investigation. But because of the strong upbringing of his mother, Claire Douglas, German worked as a student assistant volunteer coach with the Hurricanes last year and continued to try to complete requirements for his degree. Jammi owned up to his responsibility after his NCAA appeal was denied and voluntarily stayed at the football offices at Miami until every last media outlet had finished their interviews with him. When he wasn't helping to tutor the young Hurricane receiving corps and providing encouragement to the entire team, German was visiting South Florida area high schools such as Carol City and Miami Beach and talking to kids. He once told his mother, who raised five sons and a daughter as a single parent, that he would buy her a house someday when he was an eight-year old. Jammi has always been practical and his mother remembers him price-shopping before making purchases and he bought useful items for his family at Christmas rather than sentimental ones. A meticulous person, German always arranged his closets and drawers impeccably ."Jammi has always been a leader," said Douglas. "My other children were more of followers." After suffering a nagging hamstring and knee injury as a freshman, he worked hard over the summer to get better and in one of his workout regimens he would harness himself to a 45-pound sled and run sprints. Before the summer was over he had competed and won a job as the starting flanker against current teammate Marcus Wimberly. Before the '98 draft The Sporting News called German "the sleeper of the draft".

Personal

Jammi Darnell hails from the same Ft. Myers, Fl. area that produced former Falcon Deion Sanders. He was a USA Today Defensive Player-of-the-Year and a Parade first-team All-America as a senior at Ft. Myers High. This talented athlete played flanker, tailback and returner in addition to roaming the secondary. German caught 15 passes for 500 yards and four TD's, rushed for 625 yards with seven more scores for a total of 11 TD's, and averaged 45.2 yards per kickoff return as an offensive weapon. On defense, he registered 107 tackles with three pickoffs, six fumble recoveries and five forced fumbles while being named Ft. Myers Press Player-of-the-Year as well as a Football News Prep All-American, and Blue Chip Illustrated's Southeast Region Defensive Player-of-the-Year. Jammi established three records in the Georgia/Florida All-Star game including a 92-yard TD catch and 125 receiving yards to lead his team to a 21-7 victory. He started two years for the school's basketball team and competed in the 100 and 200 meter dashes for the track team. He ran the anchor leg for the 4x100 relay team that finished second in the state finals in his last season. German was one of the top prep players in the entire nation and one of the most highly recruited players in the country as a senior. Jammi's cousin, Donald Ellis, was a cornerback for the Hurricanes. A liberal arts major, he once spoke at William Turner High School during their Red Ribbon week festivities during the fall of '93. He has a built-in support group in Atlanta as a few of his cousins live in the area.

College Career

Omar was one of the leaders of the powerful Tar Heels defense that boasted a total of six players drafted and seven overall, the 4th highest by any school in the country. The team's defensive backfield signal-caller the last two seasons amassed 275 tackles in 46 career games. Brown was an especially productive player in '96 and '97 as a starter at free safety as he collected 178 tackles, including a career-high 97 stops as a senior, 3rd-best on team. An All-ACC selection by The Sporting News in '97, he started at least one game at all three secondary positions during his career. He played cornerback in '94, strong safety in '95 and free safety in '96-97. Omar was a steadying influence in the secondary as a junior when he was teamed with three new starters and he molded the unit into the top pass defense in the ACC and the third overall defense in the country. With Brown's guiding hand, the secondary allowed only seven TD passes that season. As a sophomore starter in '95, he garnered conference Player-of-the-Week honors twice.

Year-by-Year

1997: His **all-conference** season included plenty of big games as he registered 10 or more tackles in six games. He made a season-high 12 tackles and an interception vs. Florida State and 10 stops with a theft in a close 16-13 win over Georgia Tech. Brown also added 11 tackles with a forced fumble and a pass defensed vs. Wake Forest, 10 stops vs. Virginia, and 11 more tackles against TCU.

1996: The All-ACC second-team selection moved to free safety and finished third on the team with 71 tackles, two forced fumbles, and a recovered fumble. He made eight tackles with 5 solos, a forced fumble, and pass defensed in a shutout of Georgia Tech. Omar collared seven tackles against Florida State, 10 stops vs. Houston and Louisville.

1995: Brown started the first nine games at strong safety and recorded 66 tackles with an interception. He collared a **career-high 13 tackles with 9 solos** and forced a fumble to earn Player-of-the-Game honors vs. Georgia Tech. Against Virginia, Omar was selected as the **ACC Defensive Back-of-the-Week** with his seven tackle performance which also included a pair of batted down passes on the Cavaliers' final possession to seal a 22-17 win. He did not play vs. N.C. State and in the Carquest Bowl against Arkansas because of a concussion suffered in the Duke contest (Nov. 18).

1994: As a redshirt freshman, he played in every game and started against TCU and Florida State. He made three tackles, forced a fumble, and picked off his first career pass to help the Heels defeat the Wolfpack 31-17. In a 50-0 rout of Wake Forest, Brown recorded a seasonhigh eight tackles.

Omar was the fourth Carolina defensive player to be drafted following first rounders

selections of DE Greg Ellis (Dallas - 8th), Brian Simmons (Cincy - 17th) and DT Vonnie Holiday (Green Bay - 19th). LB Kivuusama Mays (Minnesota - 4th), CB Robert Williams (Kansas City - 5th) and RB Jonathan Linton (Buffalo - 5th) were the other Tar Heels selected this year. With Brown patrolling the secondary, the Tarheels boasted a 35-12 record and .745 winning percentage in his four years, including 10-1 and 10-2 finishes, respectively, the last two seasons. He also enjoyed three straight Bowl victories and four total trips to the post-season with two games at the Gator Bowl, a Carquest Bowl bid and Sun Bowl appearance. Brown seemed to have his best college games against nearby Georgia Tech (35 total tackles, including a personal-best of 13 in '95 with two forced fumbles, a fumble recovery, and theft), but will now be on the same defense with fellow draftee Keith Brooking. Omar lists Walter Payton as the football player he pretended to be as a kid and Gary Payton as his favorite athlete to watch play today. A communication studies major in college, he was a member of a 15-player Leadership Committee. He's an aggressive hitter who built up his neck and shoulders between his sophomore and junior seasons so his body could withstand those hits he hands out and he improved his bench press to 365 pounds. Because of their temperament to deliver the big hits, the Carolina secondary dubbed themselves the "Rude Boys".

Personal


Omar L. Brown was an Associated Press all-state choice as both a cornerback and running back at William Penn Senior High School in York, Pa. He was also the Daily Record's County Player-of-the-Year and the York Dispatch & York Quarterback Club Player-of-the-Year. His stellar defensive play as a senior included 78 tackles (36 solos) and five pickoffs as he guided William Penn to the county title. Brown also averaged 10.7 yards per rush as a senior, gaining 855 yards with 11 TD's as a runner, and scored on a punt and kickoff as a returner. He rushed for 150 yards or more in three games with his best effort covering 168 yards on just seven carries. This two-time All-County choice was named to the state's "Super 24" team. Omar's high school basketball team reach the state semifinals and he lettered three times in basketball and track as a 100 meter sprinter.

Year-by-Year

1997: For his punt return TD's vs. Indiana, Michigan and Minnesota was voted the conference's special teams Player-of-the-Week. Tim was also named offensive MVP by lowa coaches vs. Iowa State, Indiana, and Wisconsin as well as the offensive hustle award vs. Ohio State, Michigan, Minnesota, and Northern Iowa. He ran away with the AT&T Long Distance award for leading the nation in punt return yardage. Dwight started all 12 games at wide receiver to end his career at 35 in-a-row. He ranked 7th in the Big Ten in scoring (6.0), and all-purpose yards with 121.3 a game. He hauled in eight receptions for 187 yards and three scores at Iowa State with scoring catches of 41, 33, and 29 yards. Tim caught seven passes for 90 yards vs. Ohio State, accounting for nearly half of Iowa's receiving yards. He returned three punts for 80 yards and two kickoffs for 82 yards and his 61-yard punt return TD on the final play of the first half gave Iowa a 21-7 lead over Michigan. Most of his kickoff return yardage came on a 72-yarder in the third quarter and led to a Hawkeye field goal and a 24-21 advantage. Besides his 92-yard TD on a punt return vs. Indiana, he also added a 64-yard pass to Damon Gibson for a score.

1996: Tim set Iowa single-season record with 440 punt return yards on 24 runbacks for a 18.3 average, which was second-best in the nation. He also established an Alamo Bowl mark for receptions in a game with 6 and longest catch with a 51-yarder en route to his third 100-yard receiving game of the season with 105. His 86-yard punt return vs. Ohio State was the 4th longest ever at the school and his 83-yarder vs. Penn State was the 5th longest ever. He was the teams top receiver with 51 catches for 751 yards and four TD's. He averaged 123.8 all-purpose yards a game and 15.5 yards every time he touched the ball. He scored four times on receptions, three on rushes, and twice on punt returns. His longest reception came on a 65-yard catch vs. Penn State and had a career-best 188 receiving yards (6th-best ever on school's charts) on eight receptions vs. Northwestern. He also

added 134 yards through the air on seven catches and a score vs. Minnesota.

1995: Dwight led the Hawkeyes in receptions and yards with 46 for 816 in his first season as a wide receiver. His nine receiving TD's was the second-best season mark ever to Quinn Early's 10 in '87. He averaged 121.8 all-purpose yards per game and even added eight tackles on kickoff and punt teams. Tim set an Iowa record for kickoff returns in a game with nine vs. Ohio State and gained 143 yards. He hauled in eight passes for 147 yards and two scores vs. Minnesota along with 50 more yards on two kickoff returns. His totals also read a 56-yard rushing TD vs. Indiana and a 55-yard TD grab vs. Ohio State.

1994: He saw action in all 11 games on both offense as a running back and a defensive back. Tim led the Big Ten in punt returns with a 12.4 average and was 13th in kickoff returns with a 19.9 mark. Tim became the first Hawkeye to play both ways in a game since Jonathan Hayes in '82. He amassed nine solo tackles and three assists on defense for the year and carried the ball 13 times for 58 yards. His first-ever touchdown came on a one-yard run vs. Central Michigan. Dwight also threw a nine-yard TD pass to QB Matt Sherman against Minnesota and added three special teams tackles and a forced fumbled punt that led to lowa's first score.



Iowa Head Coach Hayden Fry's quote sums up the impact that Tim Dwight had in the Hawkeye program for four years. It's quite a compliment when you consider Fry has coached such Pro Bowl players as Ronnie Harmon, Andre Tippett, Reggie Roby and Merton Hanks. Dwight's kamikaze style is not limited to just the football field. Called "a little crazy" by former teammate and current Jaguars 4th rounder Tavian Banks, Tim has raced motorcycles, jumped off apartment balconies into snowdrifts, and run headlong into oncoming tacklers on purpose. While swimming with some friends in the Wisconsin River he noticed a towering cliff that he just had to climb and jump off. So after letting a tour boat pass Tim leaped over the edge and landed in the middle of group of jet skiers. "They were, like, 'Where did you come from? I said, 'From up there,'" said Dwight. "They said, 'You're crazy, dude!". Of course, there are plenty of other things Tim hasn't done yet which include "bungee jumping, skydiving, and whitewater rafting", to name just a few. Dwight made an impression on other coaches throughout his outstanding career. After he zigzagged his way to a 61-yard punt return TD against Michigan, returned a kickoff 72-yards to set-up a field goal and a caught a pass for seven yards Wolverines Head Coach Lloyd Carr praised his all-around play AND called him "the best blocking receiver" he'd ever seen. Penn State Head Coach Joe Paterno noted, "One of the guys who beat us almost by himself last year is the kid at Iowa. He's amazing." Iowa coaches even had the all-purpose dynamo as a nickel back on defense last season, but shelved the plan for fear of burning him out. The senior team captain was given another honor when he was compared to another lowa legend who played both ways on the Hawkeye's Ironmen squad of '39 and captured the Heisman Trophy in Nile Kinnick, Dwight has also drawn comparisons to former perennial Pro Bowl special teammer Steve Tasker of the Bills. A big-time track athlete, Dwight competed on both the indoor and outdoor teams for his last three seasons. He finished second in the 55 meters (6.36), fifth in the 200 meters (21.94) and sixth in the long jump (23' 41/4") at a Big Ten indoor meet. He followed that up with a third place clocking in the 100 meters (10.45) and a fifth place showing (20.99) at the Big Ten outdoor meet as a junior. Tim has qualified for the NCAA indoor finals before with a 21.21 time in the 200 meters and at the NCAA outdoor finals in the 100 meters with a 10.31 time. His busy track schedule also had him run a leg on the 4x400 meter relay team which ended up second and the 4x100 meter relay squad that finished third at the Big Ten finals in '96,

Personal

A high school All-American by Street & Smith, Blue Chip Illustrated, Super Prep and Prep Football Report at Iowa City (Iowa) H.S., Tim scored 80 touchdowns and rushed for 4,047 yards during his career. The '93 Gatorade Circle of Champions Player-of-the-Year became the first player to ever earn back-to-back Missouri Valley Conference Player-of-the-Year honors. This two-time all-state performer led Iowa City to the Class 4A state title as a senior, rushing for 2,113 yards on 196 carries with a state record 43 TD's. He also excelled in track by winning 12 state, 10 Drake Relays and 15 conference titles as he led the team to three straight state championships. He was one of three Iowa prep athletes to win the state title four times in one event, the 200 meter dash. For his efforts he was afforded the Gatorade Iowa Track Athlete-of-the-Year honors in '92-93. Dwight is looking to earn his degree in sports management next May.

College Career

Elijah made the transition from college tailback to cornerback for his senior season in the competitive SEC and was the co-winner of Florida's "Unselfish Award". One of the leaders on the 10-2 Gators, he was chosen as a team captain by his fellow players. Williams started the final 10 games on the corner and totaled 33 tackles with 26 solo stops. He also added a forced and recovered fumble with nine passes defensed to his '97 credits. A special teams contributor, he blocked two kicks on the year vs. LSU and South Carolina. In his first career start he made three solo tackles and deflected a pass vs. Central Michigan. In a big showdown with Tennessee, Elijah had four tackles and two pass breakups and posted five stops and another deflection vs. Vanderbilt. He collared a season and career-high six solo tackles with a pair of deflections in a huge 32-29 victory over Florida State. Williams closed out his college career and only season on defense in high fashion with five tackles, a 6-yard sack, two stops for losses, an interception, a pass break-up, and a 26-yard kickoff return in a win over Penn State in the Citrus Bowl.

In '96, he started nine games at tailback and led the team with 671 yards on 106 carries with four TD's. He rushed 13 times for 109 yards and a TD vs. LSU and picked up 116 yards on 16 attempts vs. Auburn. His sophomore season in the backfield included a school-record 7.5 rushing average in seven starts and 858 rushing yards with seven scores. Elijah also led all running backs with his 22 receptions for 277 yards. He punished Georgia with 143 rushing yards on just 15 tries in a 52-17 rout. He exploded for a 70-yard TD run vs. South Carolina and 215 all-purpose yards (126 rush, 89 rec.) with three TD's (two on the ground) against Vandy. Williams was afforded All-Freshman honors in the SEC by the *Knoxville News-Sentinel* for finishing second on the team with 652 yards and four scores in 11 games played. In his first college game, Williams collected 96 yards on 13 attempts and a 15-yard catch vs. New Mexico State.



Elijah changed backfields for his senior season at the request of the Florida coaching staff and was an important contributor for the defense. He opened the door for Fred Taylor to gain 1,292 yards with 13 TD's, the 4th highest total all-time for a single-season in school history. Taylor was selected by the Jaguars with the ninth overall selection in the first round. Williams posted some impressive numbers of his own in three years as a Gator runner and his 2,181 rushing yards was more than first round choice Robert Edwards (1,955) from Georgia. His winning experience at Florida included a National Championship (in '96) and three consecutive SEC Championships ('94-96). He started three Bowl games for the Gators in the '96 Fiesta Bowl, '97 Sugar Bowl and the '98 Citrus Bowl as well playing in the '95 Sugar Bowl. With the position change, he now has a chance to try to knock down passes instead of catch them from his former QB Danny Wuerffel of the Saints. An honorable mention All-American by USA Today, Elijah was one of the most highly regarded backs in the high school ranks in '92. This first team all-state of Florida choice from Milton (FL) High was also a Scholastic Coach/Gatorade and Super Prep Magazine All-American. He gained 1,232 rushing yards with 20 TD's on 120 carries for a 10.3 average and caught 11 passes for 240 yards in one season. Williams was also one of the state's top defensive backs as a junior. The son of Joseph and Elizabeth Cobb has a stepbrother, Greg Allen, who was a former standout runner at Florida State. He lists "Rocket" Ismail as his favorite sports personality.

College Career

Ephraim (pronounced EE-frum) was a solid three-year starter as both a right and left tackle for the Aztecs of San Diego State. Salaam played in 31 games during his college career and recorded 203 knockdown blocks. He graded out a stellar 91% for his blocking consistency in his career. With his long arms and quick feet he was able to register 25 touchdown producing blocks, according to the San Diego State coaching staff, and also added 67 downfield blocks in four seasons. As a freshman, he lined up as a defensive end but was moved to the offensive line as a starter in '95. He showed off his athleticism by averaging 4.4 points per game for the Aztecs basketball team last year.

1997: He was a force in nine games at 'quick' tackle vs. Washington, Wisconsin, and Air Force before switching to 'split' tackle for the final six contests. Salaam collected 56 pancake blocks and he graded out 84% for an offense that averaged 222 yards per game passing as he earned a spot on the All-WAC second-team. He finished with eight pancakes as the Aztecs rushed for 200 yards in a 48-21 defeat of rival San Jose State.

1996: An All-Western Athletic Conference second-teammer, Epraim started 10 games at the all-important left tackle spot. He recorded a personal-best of 96 knockdown blocks and cleared the way for a San Diego State offense to average 477 yards a contest. He posted a career-high 11 pancakes as SDSU gained 343 yards through the air against San Jose State. His crunching block near the goal line pushed two defenders into the end zone to pave the way for a 7-yard TD run by George Jones as the offense racked up 537 yards in a win over Fresno State.

1995: In his first season on the O-line, he was in the starting lineup for every game at left tackle. Big Ephraim notched 51 pancake blocks for a unit which led the WAC with an average of 482 yards per game. His blocks enabled the Aztecs to roll up 229 rushing yards vs. California, and 421 total yards vs. Nevada.

1994: He made one appearance against Hawaii as a reserve defensive lineman.


Because of his academic prowess, Ephraim was able to skip two grades in elementary school and enrolled at San Diego State as a 16 year-old. Salaam teamed up with best friend and roommate Kyle Turley (first round pick by the Saints) as a formidable pair on the line at San Diego State for three seasons. The other offensive player from that SDSU squad to be drafted into the NFC West was RB Az Hakim by the Rams. Salaam and Turley will get a chance to showcase their talents in front of their offensive line coach in college as Ed White will tutor the line for the Rams for the first time this season. Both players credit their development to the expertise delivered by White as both were concerted defensive lineman. "We said five years ago that in our senior year we're going to lead the nation in sacks," said Salaam. "But instead of trying to lead the nation in sacks, we tried to lead the nation in NOT giving up sacks." Ephraim had one of his best games of his collegiate career against former #1 pick of the Buccaneers in Cal defensive end Regan Upshaw in '95. In his very first game on offense, he leveled Upshaw on a one-yard scoring play and registered seven knockdowns in all to help SDSU pile up 229 rushing yards. In '96, Salaam took down current teammate Barry Mitchell with a jarring forearm to spring an Aztec for a 10-yard scoring run against

Idaho as his team amassed 476 yards. The 6-7, 290 pounder was known as the "Shaq of the WAC" for his powerful moves to the hole for the Aztec basketball team.

Personal

Ephraim Mateen Salaam was born on June 9, 1976 in Chicago. His brother played on defensive line for legendary coach Eddie Robinson at Grambling and his father was a basketball player at South Carolina. A two-time All-Delta League choice, Salaam was also a second-team All-Metro choice during his three-year career as a two-way lineman at Florin H.S. in Sacramento, Ca. He collared 46 tackles, including 11 stops in one game with four sacks, three recovered fumbles and two forced fumbles. Ephraim was a tall presence on the school's basketball team and received two Bronze Panther academic awards during his prep days.



College Career

Ken rushed for 2,872 yards, 5th best all-time, with 12 100-yard games for the Hokies of Virginia Tech. Oxendine (OX-indine) earned second-team All-Big East honors as a senior and first team accolades as a junior. This durable back totaled 237 carries in '97, the most by any back at the school since '81. A tough, workhorse, he still averaged over 5 yards per carry for his career despite logging 568 carries in 43 games. The quick-footed Oxendine helped the Hokies to four prestigious Bowl games (Sugar, Orange and Gator twice) while producing 210 total yards in the Orange Bowl vs. Nebraska (150 rush, 60 receiving). His 161 points scored stands as the 6th best mark in school annals.

1997: Ken gained 904 rushing yards, including five 100-yard games, with eight TD's as a senior. He picked up 160 yards on the ground on 28 tries with a 30-yard and one-yard TD runs in a defeat of Temple. In a big win over Miami, Oxendine rambled for 147 yards and tallied 105 and 104, respectively, vs. Miami of Ohio and Rutgers.

1996: The All-Big East first-teamer led Virginia Tech with 890 yards, a 5.9 average, and a career-best and single-season school record 13 TD's. In a shutout of Temple, Oxendine rushed for personal-best 163 yards and three TD's, including a 71-yarder. He added 140 yards and two TD's vs. Southwestern LA. and 111 yards on 19 carries with two scores against Pitt. Included in his super season was the 150 yard rushing day with 60 more yards receiving in the Orange Bowl.

1995: Despite playing in only nine games as a reserve, he flashed his skills by finishing with the fourth best total in the Big East with 593 yards and four TD's. Ken ran for 135 yards on 14 attempts with a score vs. Akron and 118 yards on 19 carries vs. Syracuse.

1994: He played in 10 games with starts against East Carolina and Temple. His best outings were a 78-yard rushing day against Syracuse and a 71-yard game vs. Temple.



Ken showed the kind of runner he would be in his first season in '94 as he reeled off a 53-yard TD scamper against West Virginia on his second collegiate carry to become the first

'true' freshman at Tech to run for a TD in one of his first two carries since Cyrus Lawrence did the same on his second run back in '79. He also had a 62-yard TD jaunt against Syracuse to become the first true freshman to record two rushing TD's of 50 or more yards in a season since freshmen became eligible in '72. He continued to get better the next season when the opportunity presented itself as he ended up as the fourth-leading rusher in the competitive Big East despite missing the first two games and not starting a game all season. The thicklegged runner set a Hokie record for backs with a 570 pound squat. Ken was a Virginia High School (4A). USA Today and Associated Press Player-of-the-Year at Thomas Dale H.S. in Chester, Va. His career which totaled 3,256 yards and 34 TD's saw him land on the All-Southern Team, Dixie Dozen and Gatorade Circle of Champions. He was also named an AP All-Group first-team linebacker and was the second-leading tackler on the team while picking off four passes. He guided Thomas Dale to a 35-4 record in his three years as a starter and advanced to the Central Region Division 6 final three times, winning twice. Oxendine rushed for 189 yards in an overtime loss to eventual '93 state champion Annandale. Also, in three playoff games he ran 69 times for 595 yards for an average of 8.6 yards and 198 yards per contest. On the heels of those lofty numbers he was named the ninth-best recruit in the country by the National Recruiting Advisor, Ken Owarious was born on Oct. 4, 1974 in Richmond, Va. The son of Carl Waller and Viola Oxendine was a psychology major at Virginia Tech.

College Career

Henry was a three-year starter as the anchor in the middle of the line for West Virginia's defense as he registered 203 tackles and added 15 QB sacks in 46 games played and 39 starts. Slay was responsible for **28 tackles for losses** in his career, tying him with Daryll Talley for **second most in school history**. He also forced four fumbles and recovered a pair of fumbles. Last year, he was second on the team in sacks with 7 and tackles for losses with 6 (for a minus 26 yards) and was fifth on the Mountaineers in tackles with a career-high 59 to earn third-team All-American honors by *AP* and **All-Big East first-team** accolades. A second-team All-Big East defensive tackle in '96, he amassed 58 tackles, including a **career-high 10 tackles for losses**, with three sacks. In a big 28-17 win over Miami, Slay had three QB sacks to go along with his nine tackles in being named the Big East and *College Sports News*' Player-of-the-Week. With his presence in the trenches, he guided a unit that was #1

in the entire nation for much of the season. He dominated Pitt with three tackles for losses out of his six overall stops and added a sack. He collared nine tackles and had six tackles at Purdue with a six-yard sack. In '95, Henry was an All-ECAC nose tackle with his 59 tackles, 6th-best on the team. Against Temple, he recorded six solo stops with two sacks and two tackles for losses. At East Carolina, Slay collected seven tackles, one for a loss, while forcing two fumbles and recovering one with just:44 left in the game. He played every game in '94 with six starts. He totaled seven tackles with a sack and a forced fumble vs. Virginia Tech. Slay was selected as West Virginia's defensive rookie-of-the-year in '93 for his work on the scout team and was the units rookie-of-the-week five times (Maryland, Miami, Missouri, Boston College, Rutgers).

Voted a team captain last year, Henry is a tough-nosed, hard working self-made player. "Henry Slay is everything good in college athletics," said WVU defensive coordinator Steve Dunlap, "He's a product of hard work and determination. It's fun to watch players develop over the years and with Henry it's been especially satisfying." He was named the "best conditioned athlete" heading into his senior season after spring drills. His impact in the community was so strong that the General Assembly of Ohio (and two senators in particular) singled him out with a resolution honoring his leadership on and off the field through the years. Mountaineer fans will receive a chance to see how Slay's new pro career is coming along in the preseason when the Falcons play the Steelers at his old stadium on August 22. He patterns his quickness and tenacity after his favorite player, Bruce Smith, of the Bills. His older brother, Ed, was the first Slay to play football at the college level as he excelled at Ohio University. Henry graduated early by earning his marketing degree from West Virginia in December with a 3.25 GPA and was a member of the athletic directors' academic honor roll. Henry was a conference MVP and all state of Ohio product at Elyria (Ohio) West H.S. He was the Lorraine Plain Dealer Player-of-the-Year and named as one of the top 33 players in the state by the Cleveland Plain Dealer. He was a three-year letterman and team captain. Slay followed closely the path of another Elyria West High product in Cincinnati Bengal Steve Tover.

David Akers signed last year as a rookie with the Carolina Panthers (behind John Kasay). David had kicked collegiately at Louisville, scoring 219 points in four seasons. His 36 FG's tied the school record, while he nailed 111 PAT's. He boomed a 51-yarder in '94 vs Texas A & M, while nailing 47 and 45-yarders in the same game in '95. David was a two-time first team All-State pick in high school in Kentucky (Tates Creek in Lexington). He got the college's attention with a 50-yard FG in high school and booming 74% on his kickofs into the end zones. He also doubled as the punter (40.7). David Roy Akers is married (Erika).

Jeremy Akers arrived in Atlanta as an undrafted college free agent and spent his entire rookie season on the practice squad, learning from Coach Art Shell. Jeremy played major college ball for the Fighting Irish, helping the team rush for 271 yards a game as a senior. He came back from a shoulder dislocation and knee surgery to prove himself at Notre Dame. He grew up in the Washington, D.C. area after being born in New York City. Jeremy played at St. Albans, where he also was a standout defensive lineman. In prep school, he once had a game that featured 22 tackles, 3 QB sacks and a fumble recovery. As good in the classroom as he was on the field, Akers earned his college degree in economics with a concentration in computer applications (3.3 average).

Corey Allen hails from right here in metro Atlanta, having been a two-time first-team All-State player at North Clayton High in the suburb of Riverdale. Corey was a captain on an 11-0 team as he caught 11 TD passes on offense, intercepted 5 passes on defense and returned a punt for a TD on special teams. Then, Allen "stayed home" and went to the University of Georgia in '94, where he played seven games as a true freshman and catching passes from senior Eric Zeier. Allen leaves Georgia with 35 games played in with 68 catches for 957 yards and 5 TD's. His career as a Bulldog ended on a high note as he caught the game-winning pass in the closing seconds to bear arch-rival Georgia Tech in the season finale. Allen had made a memorable play as a junior, too, when he caught a 30-yard TD pass from Mike Bobo on the last play of regulation at Auburn to send that game into overtime as the Bulldogs came back to win that wild 56-49 four-OT game. He's already played in the Georgia Dome ('95 Peach Bowl).

Octavus Barnes set a trio of Tar Heel all-time records with 19 TD's receiving, with an 18.6 per catch average for his career, and most 100-yard games (7). Octavus finished 2nd all-time at UNC in yards and 10th all-time in the ACC (2,398 yards) and 3rd all-time at UNC in catches (129). "Tay" produced 10 "big play" catches of 50 or more yards. These impressive numbers do not include his Bowl performances, either, that were record-setting. In the '94 Sun Bowl vs. Texas, Barnes had a 9-catch, 165-yard day with a 50-yard TD catch. He had also scored an 18-yard TD vs. West Virginia in the Gator Bowl in '96. As a sophomore, Octavus set the Carolina mark for most yards receiving in a season (970) on 53 catches. Barnes had a 211-yard game in '95 (vs. Ohio U.) that was second best ever in Tar Heel history. With his 8 catches that day, he averaged 26.4 per catch. He had a streak of four straight 100-yard receiving games that year (Louisville, Ohio, Virginia, Georgia Tech). Barnes made his entry into the ACC a conference record-setting 609 yards, most ever by a freshman. Punt returning was another skill of Barnes, as he led the ACC in '94 with his 10.8

return average (14-151). A North Carolina native, Barnes hails from Wilson (Hunt High) where he played quarterback two years before becoming a WR.

Brian Brennan passed for over 5,000 yards for the Vandals of Idaho, overcoming shoulder surgery his junior year. The 6-5 Brennan certainly saw his targets, hitting an impressive 42 TD passes against just 10 career interceptions. Brian's senior year saw him complete 218 of his 387 passes (56%) for 2,708 yards with 19 TD's and just 5 picks. Brian had become a starter as a freshman at Idaho, hitting 116-200 (58%) for 1,766 yards with 18 TD's and just 4 Int's that first year in college. Brennan followed QB Doug Nussmeier ('94 spring draft) as the starter at Idaho. Idaho plays their home games in a Dome Stdaium, so he'll be comfortable inside the NFL dome stadiums, including Atlanta's Georgia Dome. Brennan hails from the northwest, playing his high school ball in Lacey, Washington (North Thurston High). He was born Nov. 5, 1974 in Olympia, Washington.

Mark Campbell had been a 3rd round draft pick in 1996 (78th) by Denver out of the U. of Florida. In two years with Denver, he was on the 53-player active roster for two years, but was made "inactive" before each game. On August 14 last year, Denver released him and he was immediately claimed on waivers and went to the Arizona Cardinals the next day. In '97 for Arizona, Mark dressed out for 7 games and played in 4, while being inactive the other 9 games. His '97 NFL totals included 5 tackles. Mark started every game his final three years for Florida ('93-95), playing in 46 games (37 starts) over his four years for the Gators and playing in a Bowl each year. As a senior DE, Campbell was All-SEC on a defensive line that featured Kevin Carter and Ellis Johnson. Campbell's U. of Florida numbers were 127 tackles, 17 QB sacks, 37 QB pressures, 33 tackles for losses, three fumble recoveries, and five forced fumbles. He had stayed in-state for college after a big 18-sack senior season at Miami's Sunset High School. Mark was born on Sept. 12, 1972 in Jamaica.

Michael Edwards was an all-Big West selection at the tough left tackle spot in passoriented Nevada's offense. Nevadaled the nation in Mike's junior year in total offense with QB John Dutton (Confernce Player of Year) throwing 22 TD passes. Last year, Edwards protected Dutton to throw for 3,526 yards and 20 more TD's. A California native, Mike played three sports (Soccer, Basketball and Football) as the Sierra Foothills Athlete of the Year at Placer High in Auburn, CA. His 6-6 size made him a formidable basketball player and he remembers fondly a game with three different power dunk shots.

Darren Fisk epitomizes the teamwork involved in football. He accepted his role as the blocking fullback for Colorado and peformed it well. He even won the team's "Tough Buff" award for his tenacity. Fisk's other role was as a special teams where he was recognized with the Brian Cabral Award for his play. As a sophomre, Darren began the year as a strongside inside linebacker, but was asked to move to fullback and even learn the tight end position. Darren had played one year at Cal-San Luis Obispo before transferring to Colorado. In high school, Darren was All-Coast as a linebacker and picked for the California High School all-star game. In the classroom, Darren was a business finance major and an All-Academic Big-12 selectee. He hails from Los Gatos, California.

Antonio Edwards is a Georgia native from Colquitt County High School in Moultrie. Antonio played in one game with the Seahawks in '97 and three others with the Giants and finished the year with two tackles with one sack. The 28 year-old upped his career totals to 53 games played and 24 starts. Edwards has amassed 87 tackles during his career with 14 QB sacks and two safety's. Antonio was an 8th round draft choice of the Seahawks in '93. He played in nine games as a reserve during his rookie season and made his first NFL tackle count when he was credited with a safety on an end zone sack against Cleveland. In '94, he started 14 games and collared 37 tackles with 1.5 sacks coming against the Raiders. The '95 season saw Edwards start 7 of 13 games played and finish third on the team with 10 tackles for losses as well as adding a personal-best 6.5 sacks to his totals. He returned a forced fumble 83 years for his first career TD at Denver. Antonio registered 1.5 sacks against the Broncos that day and also managed the same sack total vs. the Giants. He recorded two sacks vs. the Bills in '96 after being limited to 13 games played with a knee injury. Edwards was a four-year letterman and the Gulf South Conference Defensive Player-of-the-Year at Jessie Tuggle's alma mater. Valdosta State. He finished his career with the Blazers as the school record holder with 34 sacks. Antonio has a daughter, Ashanti (1/29/94) and a son, Amahn (1/30/96).

Schad Freeman earned recognition last fall as the team's Defensive Player-of-the-Year for the Valdosta State (GA) Blazers and a first-team All-Gulf South Conference pick. His senior year included 14 QB sacks (a new school record), 71 tackles, 9 tackles for losses, a pair of fumble recoveries and two TD's scored. He set a school record for sacks in a game with four. His junior year featured 8 QB sacks, giving him 22 sacks over his final two seasons at the south Georgia school.

Ben Huff played his final two years at defensive tackle for the Wolverines after beginning as a linebacker. Ben played in 37 career games for Michigan. Huff grew up in the Charlotte, NC, area as an All-City LB at Providence High. As a high schooler, he didn't get to sit much, making 135 tackles, recovering three fumbles, making two interceptions for the defense. When the offense was on the field, he was catching 26 passes for 490 yards and 3 TD's as the tight end.

Van Johnson went through his first NFL training camp last year with the Giants new coaching staff, but was released at the end of August. Now, he'll try to impress Reeves and his staff here in Atlanta. For the Temple Owls, Van had 106 career catches for 1,869 yards with 15 TD's. As a senior, his 50-902 season was 2nd best in the Big East. He set Temple all-time records for a game (7 for 214 with 3 TD vs Pitt), as well as career and season 100-yard games. Van has an advantage with the defense, having played DB all through high school and knowing what the DB's are trying to do to him. He grew up in the Washington, D.C. area and played his high school sports at Woodrow Wilson High.

Barry Mitchell was a rookie free agent with the Falcons last year and spent the season on the practice squad, learning from Bill Kollar and the Falcons line that had 55 sacks. At Idaho, he played 43 games (26 starts) and recorded 134 tackles, 28.5 QB sacks (3rd all-time school history), 60.5 tackles for a loss (4th all-time), 4 passes batted down and 2 fumble

recoveries. As a senior, he was the Big West Conference Defensive Player of the Week vs. Nevada and vs. Boise State. He scored a collegiate TD with a 17-yard fumble return as a sophomore vs. Weber State. Barry lived in Germany for a while and didn't move back to the states until after his junior year in high school, meaning he played just one year at Gateway High in Aurora, CO. But, that one season included a record 19 QB sacks. Mitchell's father is a U.S. Army vet (retired) and his mother is a native of Korea. Barry was born in Fayetteville, N.C.


Jose Portilla was a mammoth presence on the Arizona Wildcats line, having experience at both left and right tackle. He started every game his final two years with an offensive unit that averaged 402 yards a game, while he earned 2nd team All-PAC 10 recognition. The 25-year old's path so far has been unusual since his high school days in Houston, Texas (MacArthur-Class of '90). First, he went to Ricks Junior College (Rexburg, Idaho) for two seasons after one year as a medical redshirt. He earned All-American honors there, Then, in 1994 and 1995, he served a Mormon mission obligation. In 1996, he started at LT at Arizona for an offense that averaged 173.5 yards per game rushing. Last year he moved to right tackle. In two years at AU, he had 123 "pancake" blocks in the tough PAC-10. Jose won the school Jim Ewing Award for character, leadership, scholarship, and spirit. He was a Studio Art major, compiling a 3.5 grade point average and winning the school Roby Academic Achievement Award. Jose Casiano Portilla is married (Joleen).

Shawn Swayda was a 1997 6th round draft choice of the Chicago Bears, but was released. The Arizona State alum rang up 126 tackles with 15 QB sacks, 21 tackles for losses, 8 passes batted down, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. As a senior, Shawn finished with 48 tackles and six sacks as an honorable mention PAC-10 honoree. He was a native of that area, having grown up in Phoenix and playing both OL and DL at Brophy High. His football family tree includes a dad (Wayne) who played at Washington State and a brother (Mike) at Murray State (KY).

Kevin Thornal used his size and speed to earn a spot last year on the practice squad with Atlanta. Kevin led SMU in receiving his final two years (37-501-7 as a senior; 44-531-6 as a junior). He also set a school record with TD catches in five straight games. Kevin proudly had a 138-yard, 2 TD game vs. rival Texas Tech. He was second team All-SWC and caught at least one pass in a 24-game stretch for the Mustangs. Kevin had become a starter as a true freshman, but had to red-shirt as a sophomore with a knee injury. He played at DeSoto High in Texas with Falcon teammate Byron Hanspard. Kevin graduated with a 3.2 from SMU in history. His father (Royce) was a high school coach in Waco and was a basketball player in college at Baylor.

Brad Trout was an invited "walk-on" at the Falcons mini-camp and was signed thereafter. Brad started all 11 games last fall for Valdosta State in south Georgia and produced 66 tackles, 3 interceptions, 5 passes broken up, and 5 tackles for loss. He had made 60 tackles in 8 starts as a junior for the Blazers. Brad won't mind the summer heat in Suwanee after having grown up down in Miami, FL.

Chandler threw for 290 yards and a 24-yard TD to Michael Haynes in his Falcons debut. The Falcons defense, meanwhile, sacked Mitchell four times.

DE Lester Archambeau had an excellent game with six tackles, one sack, two forced fumbles, and two fumble recoveries.

"I'm proud of the way we battled back and took the lead," said Coach Dan Reeves, "And I hate to waste a defensive effort like that."

Game 3 (September 14) Oakland 36, Atlanta 31 Georgia Dome (47,922)

Napoleon Kaufman ran for a career-high 140 yards as the Oakland Raiders edged out the Falcons behind

the help of two controversial plays.

What turned out to be a game-breaking play took place in the third quarter when the Falcons were about to get the ball back with a 21-17 lead in hand. Todd Kinchen took Leo Araguz's punt at the 25 and was immediately tackled. The ball popped loose, but seemingly after Kinchen's elbow had hit the ground, under which scenario the play should have been whistled dead. But officials ruled it a fumble, which Oakland's Kenny Shedd picked up and returned 25 yards for a TD and 24-17 Raiders lead.

The other game-changing play happened in the third quarterwhen rookie DT Derrel Russell was flagged for a late hit on Chris Chandler, who was knocked out of the game for the second time in two weeks.

Billy Joe Tolliver came in relief, and after Morten Andersen's 51-yard FG tied the game at 24-all, the teams traded touchdowns to knot the game at 31. Chris Ford then hit on a 31-yard FG with 4:24 remaining to put Oakland ahead, 34-31. But Atlanta was unable to muster anything on offense on the ensuing drive and eventually gave up two more points when Tolliver was sacked out of the end zone for a safety.

Steve Young threw for 336 yards and a pair of touchdowns as the 49ers caught the Falcons during a week without their starting quarterback.

Billy Joe Tolliver got his first NFL start since 1994, filling in for injured starter Chris Chandler, who had suffered an injured sternum the previous week against Oakland. After trailing just 3-0 after the first quarter, the Falcons let the game get away from them in the second quarter. Equipped with a 17-0 lead, the 49ers had the ball at their own 8-yard line with just 1:42 left in the first half. Instead of running out the clock, Young orchestrated a five-play, 92-yard drive that culminated in his 56-yard TD strike to Terrell Owens that put San Francisco on top 24-0 at halftime.

Bert Emanuel scored the lone Atlanta touchdown in the third quarter, capping a 15-play, 77-yard drive over 8:07. Tolliver avoided a sack on the play and hit Emanuel in the back left corner of the end zone

Rookie QB Tony Graziani received his first NFL action, replacing Tolliver with 6:58 left in the fourth quarter, Another rookie, guard Calvin Collins, started his first NFL game, replacing Roman Fortin at center.

Falcons LB David Brandon suffered a fractured left fibula in the second quarter, an injury that ended his 1997 season.

The Falcons battled back from a 23-0 first-half deficit, but couldn't quite complete the comeback against the eventual Super Bowl XXXII champions. This game drew national attention since it marked the first head-to-head matchup for Dan Reeves against the Broncos team he coached from 1981-92.

Denver jumped out of the gate early as Pro Bowl TE Shannon Sharpe hauled in a 65-yard TD pass from John Elway just minutes into the game. On Denver's next possession, Elway struck again, this time to Willie Green on a 10-yard TD pass. RB Terrell Davis, who was held relatively in check with 79 yards, scored on the two-point conversion/run to put Denver ahead 15-0 mid way through the first quarter. Davis added a 13-yard TD run in the second quarter for a 23-0 Broncos lead.

But Atlanta battled back. Ed West's 1-yard TD catch from Chris Chandler put the Falcons on the board. Bert Emanuel later caught a 3-yard TD pass from Chandler that cut the deficit to 23-14. Emanuel's score was set up by Byron Hanspard's 57-yard run. After another Broncos touchdown (failed two-point coversion), Jamal Anderson took a screen pass from Billy Joe Tolliver, who filled in for an injured Chandler early in the fourth quarter. 47 yards for the score as the Falcons closed to within 8 points. But the Falcons were unable to tie the game up on the Ifinal two possessions.

Atlanta's defense established a franchise record with 10 sacks, including a career-high five by Chuck Smith, as the Falcons picked up their first victory of the season under new head coach Dan Reeves, who earned his 150th career win.

Smith's five sacks tied a franchise record set by Falcon great Claud Humphrey, while DT Travis Hall also set his personal best with three sacks. Rookie CB Michael Booker posted his first two NFL interceptions, contributing to the all-around excellent defensive effort.

Former Saints kicker Morten Andersen continued to haunt his former team by hitting field goals of 25, 32, and 55 yards, the last of which he nailed with one second left on the clock before halftime.

Atlanta got off to a flying start, thanks in part to its defense, which limited the Saints to just one first down in the first quarter and held a commanding 11:31 to 3:29 time of possession advantage.

The Falcons took a 23-3 lead after three quarters behind the strength of three Andersen field goals, a Bert Emanuel 9-yard TD reception, and a two-yard TD run by Jamal Anderson. QB Chris Chandler, meanwhile, had a solid performance, notching his second complete game of the season.

Atlanta's defense held the Saints to 179 yards.

The 49ers rushed for 197 yards and came up with a huge play in the fourth quarter that provided the winning cushion needed for victory.

With a 28-21 lead early in the fourth, San Francisco had the ball 3rd-and-12 from its own 17. As Steve Young dropped back to pass, he narrowly escaped Atlanta's furious pass rush and hurriedly dumped a screen pass off to Terry Kirby, who followed his blockers up the sideline all the way to Atlanta's one-yard line. On the next play, William Floyd bolted in for the touchdown, giving the 49ers a 35-21 lead. "That play came at a time when our defense was playing really well, too," LB Jessie Tuggle said after the game. "We had them backed up in a hole and that was a killer play."

Atlanta closed the gap back to 7 points when Terance Mathis caught a 4-yard TD pass from Billy Joe Tolliver, who again came in for injured starter Chris Chandler in the fourth quarter.

The Falcons appeared to have hope when they successfully converted the ensuing on-sides kick. But Atlanta's offense managed only four yards on the next drive.

Just hours before the team was to play in front of a packed stadium on TNT, the sad announcement came that Falcons owner and Chairman of the Board, Rankin Smith, passed away from heart complications.

With Mr. Smith weighing on their minds, rookie QB Tony Graziani took the field for his first NFL start filling in for Chris Chandler, who was still recovering from his second concussion in six weeks.

Atlanta's defense held Carolina to just 228 yards, but its offense never mounted a serious challenge after falling behind, 14-0 in the first quarter.

From there, Atlanta let the clock run down to set up Andersen's game-winning 27-yard FG.

Chandler, meanwhile, was very sharp in his first action in two weeks, throwing for 276 yards and three touchdowns.

Game 10 (November 9) Tampa Bay 31, Atlanta 10 Georgia Dome (46,018)

Tampa Bay's one-two scoring punch of FB Mike Alstott and RB Warrick Dunn combined for over 200 yards of offense and three touchdowns as the Bucs showcased their talent in a lopsided victory.

Tampa capitalized on Todd Kinchen's first-quarter fumble to strike first on Allstott's 47-yard, powering run. The Falcons countered late in the first quarter when Chris Chandler found Bert Emanuel for a 30yard TD, his 6th TD catch in 7 games. But just as the Falcons seemed to gain momentum from that score. they followed with a couple of miscues that cost them 10 points in 45 seconds. First, they allowed Tampa to drive 73 yards on eight plays, capped by Trent Dilfer's 24-yard scoring pass to Dunn with 45 seconds left in the first half. The Falcons then went backwards on three plays and were forced to punt near their goal line. Dan Stryzinski's punt traveled just 21 yards to the 36. And with nine seconds left, Michael Husted connected on a 54-yard FG that gave the Bucs a 10point lead. Atlanta struck within 7 points on Morten Andersen's 34-yard field goal in the third quarter, but would not score again.

Tampa's offensive line held the Falcons without a sack, ending Atlanta's streak of 21 games with at least one sack. Mathis made his 300th career reception and LB Cornelius Bennett had his 1,000th career tackle.

The Saints started a new quarterback in Doug Nussmeier, but after throwing three interceptions, he was replaced by Billy Joe Hobert. Neither one could spark the Saints, who were held to just 1-of-13 thirddown conversions.

Atlanta continued its sack assault, coming up with 7 on the afternoon. Defensive tackles Travis Hall and Shane Dronett each had 2.5 sacks apiece, while All Pro tackle Willie Roaf held Chuck Smith without a sack after giving up five in their previous meeting.

Cornelius Bennett's fumble recovery in the first quarter was the 21st of his career, tying him for 10th on the NFL's all-time list.

Todd Peterson's 35-yard field goal with 8:57 remaining pulled the Seahawks to within 7. But Seattle's chances of catching up ended when CB Lenny McGill picked off a pass intended for Mike Pritchard at the Atlanta 29 with 1:27 left. "As the receiver made his move. I glanced back at the quarterback, saw the ball coming and went after it," McGill said.

Hanspard's 93-yard return was the 8th longest in Facons history.

For the second straight week, rookie RB Byron Hanspard proved to be the difference. He returned the second half kickoff 99 yards for a touchdown, providing the needed spark in Atlanta's fourth road victory of the

Hanspard, whose return was the third longest in club history, became the first Falcon ever to return two kickoffs for TD's in the same season. He also became the first rookie to return kickoffs for TD's in back-toback games since Isaac Thomas did so with the Cowboys back in 1971.

With the victory the Falcons successfully completed a two-game west coast road trip. Following the victory at Seattle, the team flew directly to San Diego, where they trained all week at UCSD. The saved time from flying back and forth across the country obviously paid off for the Falcons, who won back-to-back road games for the first time since 1994.

Atlanta took a 7-0 lead in the second quarter when Chris Chandler connected with Terance Mathis on a 19-yard scoring pass. Following Hanspard's touchdown, San Diego finally got on the board when former Falcon Greg Davis was good on a 37-yard FG with 7:13 left in the third quarter.

The Chargers threatened on their next possession, driving down to Atlanta's 3-yard line. But on 3rd-and-3 from the 3, Craig Whelihan's pass was intercepted by Ray Buchanan.

Morten Andersen kicked the 25th game-winning field goal of his career - this one a 33-yarder - as the Falcons remained one of the hottest teams in the NFL with their 5th consecutive victory.

The Falcons rushed for a season-high 211 yards, including 78 from Jamal Anderson and 76 from Byron Hanspard. Atlanta held a 10 point lead in the fourth quarter only to see Philadelphia tie the game at 17-all on Chris Boniol's 39-yard field goal with 1:55 left in the game.

But the Falcons weren't about to let this game slip away. On the third play of their next drive, Chris Chandler flipped a screen pass to Harold Green, who made a nice catch on a low throw, before scampering 47 yards down to Philadelphia's 18-yard line. Chandler followed with a 3-yard run up the middle to run the clock down to five seconds remaining. That set up Andersen, who calmy nailed the ball through for the winning margin.

Green's catch and run was similar to one he had earlier in the season to beat the Rams at the Georgia Dome. "The throw was kind of short, so I wanted to make sure I caught the ball before I worked my way up field," Green later said. "I was just trying to get as many yards as I could to put us in field goal position."

Besides the winning kick, Andersen passed Hall of Famer Jan Stenerud for third place on the NFL's alltime FG list with the 374 of his career.

Rookie QB Jake Plummer's 1-yard TD pass to Larry Centers capped an improbable comeback for the Cardinals, who halted Atlanta's 5-game winning streak in the final game of 1997.

The Falcons appeared to be in control when Morten Andersen's 26-yard FG gave Atlanta a 26-14 lead with 8:41 remaining in the game. The Cardinals countered. however, with an 8-play, 69-yard drive, that culminated with Plummer's 21-yard TD strike to Rob Moore to pull Arizona within 26-21 with 4:55 left.

The Falcons then methodically drove down to Arizona's 37-yard line at the two-minute warning and needed just one more first down to run out the clock. But on 3rd-and-1, LB Mike Caldwell broke through unblocked to stuff Jamal Anderson for a 1-yard loss. The Falcons lost about 30 seconds prior to that play when game officials illegally stopped the clock to measure for a first down, but the Falcons were obviously a yard short.

Dan Stryzinski proceeded to punt the ball into the end zone, giving Arizona the ball at its 20-yard line with 1:52 to go. The Cardinals also benefitted on their winning drive from a pair of questionable pass interference calls - one that went for 39 yards against Ronnie Bradford, and a one-yard call against Juran Bolden that gave Arizona the ball at the Falcons' one-

Anderson's 152 yards rushing gave him his second straight 1000-yard season (1,002).







In rainy 40 degree weather conditions, Steve Bartkowski turned it on for the final 30 minutes, completing 13-of-20 passes for 193 yards and two louchdowns, both scoring aerials coming with less than five minutes remaining, leading the Falcons to their first franchise playoff victory. His primary target was Wallace Francis, who scored the winning touchdown with 1:39 remaining on a 37-yard strike. He set up Bartkowski's first TD to Jim Mitchell at the 4:56 mark with a 49-yard reception down to the Eagles' 26 yard line. Francis finished the day with six catches for 135 yards. The first half was mostly a defensive struggle with teams exchanging punts eight times. The Falcons fumbled the ball away twice, one resulting in a Philadelphia TD, while the other came just 15 yards from paydirt. After leading 6-0 at halflime, Philadelphia took advantage of a shanked 17-yard punt by John James, driving 60 yards on eight plays early in the third period to take a 13-0 lead.

Playoff Experience!

Eight members of Atlanta's coaching staff have participated in a total of 22 Super Bowl games, and 4 coaches own Super Bowl rings. The list includes Dan Reeves, Art Shell, George Sefcik, Rennie Simmons, Don Blackmon, Jack Burns, Joe DeCamillis, and Al Miller.

The Start June 30, 1965 The NFL awards a franchise to 41-year-old Rankin M. Smith, Executive Vice President of Life Insurance Company of Georgia, for \$8.5 million. At the time there were 14 NFL franchises in existence, 8 AFL clubs. Officially, Atlanta became the 23rd professional football club in existence, the 15th in the NFL prior to the merger of the Leagues.

Officially Titled Aug. 20, 1965 "Five Smiths, Inc." is registered as the corporate name for the Atlanta franchise. It is so named for Rankin Smith's five children: Rankin, Jr., Carrol Christine, Dorothy Ann, Taylor, and Nancy Karen.


Stockholders Aug. 24, 1965 The listed stockholders of the franchise included Lindsey Hopkins, Jr., Howard Dobbs, Jr., Cody Laird, Jr., I. M. Sheffield III, Dorothy Laird Williams, W. Barrett Howell, and M. E. Kilpatrick.

The Nickname Aug. 29, 1965 "Falcons" was suggested by many, with reasons from a school leacher from Griffin, Georgia singled out. Miss Julia Elliott said: "the Falcon is proud and dignified, with great courage and fight. It never drops its prey. It is deadly and has a great sporting tradition." A logo was designed by Wayland Moore Studios.

You Need Players Sept. 9, 1965

Halfback Bob Paremore and split end Gary Barnes, who had been in the NFL with the Cardinals and Bears, were the first two players to sign with the Falcons.

The First Draft Nov. 27, 1965



The Head Coach Jan. 26, 1966

Norb Hecker, 39, left the Green Bay staff of Vince Lombardi to accept the job as the Falcons first head coach. He was with Lombardi seven years as they won three world titles and four conference titles. Gene Cronin, the Director of Player Personnel, deserves the distinction of being the first member of the Falcon organization named by Mr. Smith.

Supplemental Draft Feb. 16, 1966 Allotted three picks from each of the 14 other NFL teams, the Falcons added 42 more players. Each team, who had a 40-man roster, placed 11 available for the Falcons to select from. Among those picks was their first leading rusher (Junior Coffey from Green Bay), their first leading receiver (Alex Hawkins from Baltimore), and a defensive captain (Bill Jobko from Minnesota).

Head for the Mountains March 26, 1966

A YMCA Camp, Blue Ridge Assembly on Black Mountain, N.C. (near Asheville) is selected as the first summer training camp home.

The Merger Occurs June 8, 1966 The AFL and NFL agree to merge with a Championship Game to be played. The teams would not actually begin playing regular season games until 1970. Atlanta was assigned to the NFL's Western Conference, Coastal Division, with the Los Angeles Rams, Baltimore Colts, and San Francisco 49ers.

The First Practice July 2, 1966 Training Camp opened with some 130 players checking in for physicals and their chance to be an NFL player. One of the camp's visitors was Rev. Billy Graham, who lived just a few miles from the Blue Ridge Assembly. All told, 66 rookies reported with the vets checking in on July 9.

The First Game Aug. 1, 1966 (Preseason) Before 26,072 at Atlanta Stadium, Philadelphia claims a 9-7 win over the Falcons. Trivia fans might want to note that QB Dennis Claridge passed one yard to Tom Wilson for the Falcons first ever touchdown (second quarter) to provide a 7-6 halftime lead.

This Game Is For Real Sept. 11, 1966 The Los Angeles Rams handed the Falcons a 19-14 loss before 54,418 at Atlanta Stadium. The Rams of George Allen were led by QB Roman Gabriel (294 yards). After a 16-0 lead, Atlanta rallied to make it 16-14 before a third quarter Ram FG ended the scoring. Pre-game ceremonies included Commissioner Pete Rozelle, Governor Carl Sanders, and Mayor Ivan Allen. Falcon RB Ernie Wheelwright ran for 91 yards and caught a pass for 25 more to lead the offense.

The First Points Sept. 11, 1966

It was the second quarter when QB Randy Johnson hit Gary Barnes for a 53-yard louchdown to officially score the first points for the Atlanta Falcons.

The First Official Win Nov. 30, 1966 After nine straight losses, the Falcons claimed one for the W column at Yankee Stadium (62,746), 27-16. Former Giant Ernie Wheelwright scored two TD's receiving and ran for 51 more yards as QB Randy Johnson hit for a trio of TD's.

Tying an NFL Record With 1st HOME Win Dec. 11, 1966 The Falcons tied an NFL record for an expansion team (Minnesota) by winning a third game. This victim was the St. Louis Cardinals, 16-10, before 57,169. The second win had been at Minnesota with Bobby Riggle returning an interception 62 yards for a touchdown.

Atlanta's First All-Pro Dec. 15, 1967

Linebacker Tommy Nobis was named to the AP all-pro team, a Falcon first. This honor followed his Rookie of the Year performance in 1966 (Bert Bell Award and Pro Football Writers Association).

A New Regime Oct. 1, 1968 Norm Van Brocklin, formerly head coach of Vikings, is named to replace Norb Hecker after three games of season. Two weeks later, his Falcons beat New York, 24-21, in first meeting between Van Brocklin and his former QB, Fran Tarkenton.

Starting On the Right Foot Sept. 21, 1969 Falcons win first season opener ever, beating 49ers, 24-12, before home fans. Rookie Tight End Jim Mitchell scored two TD's and club set team record with 229 yards rushing.

The Triple Play Dec. 7, 1969

Harmon Wages had a game to remember in this 45-17 rout of the Saints. The second year back threw for a TD in the first quarter (16 yards to Flatley), then caught a pass for a TD in the second quarter (88 yards), and then ran for a TD in the fourth quarter (66 yards).

A Passing Feat Sept. 27, 1970 In Week Two at Green Bay, QB Bob Berry sets club records with the Franchise's first 300-yard passing game (28-44 for 302), but Packers rally for 27-24 win.

Cannonball Explodes Oct. 4, 1970 Jim "Cannonball" Butler, just one week after Berry's passing record, sets a new club rushing record in the home opener against the 49ers. The seven-year veteran set two club records that day. One was for most yards (127 on 17 carries), the other was for most fumbles (4).

National TV! Nov. 30, 1970 Over 30 million Monday Night TV viewers saw their first game from Atlanta as the Miami Dolphins came to town with ABC-TV. Larry Csonka (108) and Mercury Morris (76) ran away with a 20-7 Miami victory.

A Hall of Famer Feb. 23, 1971. Coach Norm Van Brocklin is elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Catch This Act Oct. 3 and Dec. 19, 1971 Rookie sensation Ken Burrow made more yardage receiving in one game than any NFC receiver, and he wrote his name in the club record book TWICE. He had 190 yards at Detroit and duplicated that feat at New Orleans. All of this was done playing the final 11 games with a broken wrist.

A Winning Season Dec. 19, 1971 In dramatic fashion with 40 seconds left, the Falcons score to beat New Orleans, 24-20, to finish the season at 7-6-1, thus giving them the first winning season in club history.

A Coast to Coast Win Nov. 22, 1971 Falcons win their first Nationally televised game with a 28-21 triumph over Green Bay in Atlanta. Atlanta had 77 plays to the Packers 33, outgaining them 386-143, as Monday Night TV televised the action.

A Jinx Is Ended With 1-2 Punch Oct. 1, 1972 After 10 unsuccessful tries, Falcons finally defeat the L.A. Rams, in humiliating fashion, 31-3 at Atlanta Stadium. Hampton and Art Malone set a club record by each running for over 100 yards (161 Hampton and 103 Malone).

"Unofficial" 1,000 Dec. 17, 1972 Dave Hampton technically was the club's first 1,000- yard rusher. At Kansas City, the veteran running back scampered around end for his 1,000th yard. However, his next carry was a six-yard loss and his final carry a one-yard gain. Thus, he ended at 995, never officially getting his name in the Falcon record book.

Lighting Up Scoreboard Sept. 16, 1973 Opening against New Orleans, Falcons smash 35 team records en roule to 62-7 victory.

Monday Night Madness Nov. 19, 1973

Unbeaten Vikings (9-0) come to town to face surging Falcons (five in a row) before national audience. No Falcon fan is disappointed as club responds to challenge with 20-14 win for 6th straight.

"Hard-Luck" Hampton and Falcons 1973 Season After missing by five yards for a 1,000-yard season last year, Dave Hampton comes even closer this year. Needing 87 yards in the finale, he gets just 84 and finishes three yards shy of the magic number. The Falcons are equally close, finishing 9-5 for their most wins and best record ever, but losing out for the playoffs by one game.

Trading for the Future Jan. 27, 1975 In order to obtain the rights to the number one pick in the college draft, the Falcons send offensive tackle George Kunz and a draft choice to Baltimore. Falcons also got a 6th round pick (and took LB Fulton Kuykendall).

The Future is Here Jan. 28, 1975

With that top choice, the Falcons select all-America QB Steve Bartkowski from California.

Hooray for Hampton Dec. 21, 1975 Running Back Dave Hampton becomes first Falcon to gain 1,000 yards rushing (1,002) with 61 in final game vs. Green Bay.

Front Office Moves Feb. 1-3, 1977

Former NFL quarterback Eddie LeBaron is named General Manager, with Rankin M. Smith, Jr. assuming the title of Club President, Two days later, Leeman Bennett, a Rams assistant becomes fifth Head Coach in club history.

Zero Hour Nov. 27, 1977 In shutout of Bucs, Falcons set club record by allowing just 78 total yards. It is also the second 0 performance by the defense on the season, also a club first.

NFL Record! 1977 Defense With 35-7 final win over Saints, Falcons establish new NFL modern day record for 14-game season by allowing just 129 points all year as club finishes 7-7.

June Jones, Gritz Blitz Go National Oct. 30, 1978 In their first national TV game in four years, the Falcons lose Bartkowski in 2nd quarter. Enter June Jones, kicker Tim Mazzetti's five field goals, and the hard hitting Gritz Blitz defense and you have a 15-7 Rams upset.

"Big Ben Right" Nov. 12, 1978 With 2:23 remaining the Falcons were trailing 17-6 at their own 20-yard line. An 80-yard march made it 17-13 with 59 seconds left. With 19 seconds left, Bartkowski threw 57 yards into a cluster where Alfred Jackson caught a pass deflected by Wallace Francis and the Falcons clock struck victory.

Clinching a Play off Berth the Easy Way Dec. 15, 1978 When Redskins lose to Bears, Falcons are ensured their first Playoff berth. The next day, L.A. beat Green Bay to give the Falcons a home field game.

Dealing the Wild Card Dec. 24, 1978

With two TD's in the final eight minutes, the Falcons overcame the rainy weather to win their Playoff game over the Eagles, 14-13. The Christmas Eve present to the fans was not complete until the Eagles missed a 34-yard FG in the final seconds. Merry Christmas!

Valiant Underdogs Dec. 30, 1978 As 14-point underdogs in Texas Stadium, the Falcons came ready to win. They jumped out to a 20-13 halftime lead and knocked QB Roger Staubach unconscious just before the half. The home-team Cowboys regained the lead 27-20 as the Falcons marched for a tying score. With 4th-and-1 at the Cowboy 32, the Falcons came up inches short and never got the ball back.

William Who? Sept. 2, 1979 Third-round draft choice William Andrews made his NFL debut memorable with a club-record 167 yard effort in a 40-34 overtime win at the Superdome. Each team gained over 500 yards offense before Falcons won with special teams interception TD.

Adding Up The Totals Dec. 16, 1979 Records were broken for the season by William Andrews with 1,023 yards, by Wallace Francis with 74 catches for 1,013 yards and by Steve Bartkowski with 2,502 yards (203-379).

The Bigger They Are, the Harder They Fall Sept. 28 -Oct. 5, 1980 Undefeated opponents fall on successive weekends to the Falcons. First, the 49ers are upset 20-17 at Candlestick, then with a record-breaking 34-point first half, the Lions fall, 43-28

How the West Was Won Dec. 14, 1980

Bartkowski's 28th, 29th and 30th TD passes, Andrews, sixth 100-yard game and a rugged detense led to a 35-10 rout of the 49ers and the Falcons had earned their first-ever NFC Western Division Title. The win was the Falcons 9th straight and 12th of the season, both club bests.

Heartbreak in Georgia Jan. 5, 1981 Leading 24-10 heading into the 4th quarter, Falcons end up on short end of 30-27 score as Cowboys rally for 20 points in Atlanta Fulton County Stadium before record 60,022 fans.

Feb. 1, 1981 Seeing is

Aloha

Record six Falcons selected to Pro Bowl as Bartkowski passes for new high 178 yards (55 TD to Alfred Jenkins) to lead NFC to 21-7 win.

Believing! Sept. 13, 1981 Green Bay Packer fans were enjoying a 17-0 lead after three quarters, but no one knew what was in store next. In a nine-minute span, the Falcons erupted for an NFL record tying 31 points (4 TD's, 1 FG) to win 31-17.

Good News, Bad News Sept. 20, 1981 Atlanta fans were treated to a 34-17 thumping of the rival 49ers (soon to be Super Bowl bound) and the fastest start in club history, 3-0. The Falcons had now won 12 of the last 13 regular season games and 14 of last 15. Tommy Pridemore even set a club record with a 101-yard interception return. The bad news: three starters were lost in a five-minute span (LB Joel Williams, DE Jeff Merrow and T Warren Bryant).

Numbers To Remember 1981 Season The team will look back on seven losses of five points or less as to why they were 7-9. The defeats were by 1, 2, 2, 3, 3, 3, and 5 points. Individually, records were set by Steve Bartkowski (3,830 yards). William Andrews (81 catches), Alfred Jenkins (1,358 yards, 13 TD's - 3 in one game), and Mick Luckhurst (114 points). A team high seven Falcons are picked for the Pro Bowl.

No More Tickets May 17, 1982

Season ticket sales are halted after reaching a club record 55,144.

Back on Track Nov. 21, 1982 In first game after strike, William Andrews gains 207 yards (119 rush, 88 rec.) and rookie Gerald Riggs scores his first two NFL TD's in 34-17 win over Rams. Falcons are 2-1 and thinking playoffs in short season.

A National Clinch Dec. 19, 1982 With a powerful 17-7 win over the Super Bowl Champion 49ers before a national Sunday Night audience, the Falcons become third NFC team to clinch a playoff berth as they up record to 5-2. Team controlled ball for 43 minutes to 17 for 49ers and ran the ball 57 times for 223 yards.

Indoor Playoffs Jan. 9, 1983 Falcons journeyed to Minnesota's Metrodome for the opening round Playoff game and led 7–3 after one quarter and 21-16 after three quarters, but Vikings rallied for 30-24 win. In an oddity, all 24 Falcon points were scored by the special teams (blocked punt for TD, pass to Luckhurst for TD, and FG) and the defense (Glazebrook TD interception).

A Two-Time Hero Nov. 27, 1983 Kenny Johnson became only the 12th player in NFL history to score two TD's in the same game with interceptions. His first one put the Falcons ahead of Green Bay, 41-34, but the Pack came back to force overtime. With another chance to be the hero, Johnson returned an interception 31 yards to win the game.

Stats to Remember Dec. 18, 1983

William Andrews sets new club record with 331 rushes for 1,567 yards, Steve Bartkowski has third 3,000-yard season and sets mark with 63,4% completion rate and just 1.1% interception rate (5 in 432), while C Jeff Van Note starts his 200th game as a Falcon.

Surgery for William Aug. 21, 1984

Falcon all-time leading rusher, William Andrews, injures knee ligaments, cartilage and nerve in practice session and is out indefinitely.

A New Leader Sept. 2, 1984

Gerald Riggs gets the starting call and sets new club records with 35 attempts for 202 yards in 36-28 opening win at the Superdome in New Orleans.

A Catchy Record Dec. 2, 1984

Receiver Alfred Jackson broke the club record with 11 catches for 193 yards vs. San Francisco in 35-17 loss.

"White Shoes" Is #1 Sept. 8, 1985

Billy "White Shoes" Johnson becomes the NFL's all-time career punt returner with 58 yards against Detroit.

Determined Gerald Dec. 22, 1985

With 158 yards in the 16-10 win over New Orleans, Gerald Riggs had a club best 9 100-yard games and a season record 1,719 yards to lead the entire NFC.

A Record Start Sept. 1986

The Falcons came out roaring with four straight wins over New Orleans, St. Louis, Dallas and Tampa Bay for the best-ever start in club history. The Cowboy game featured a 10-point rally with a game-winning FG with 20 seconds left and the Buc game featured a 20-7 come-from-behind win with an overtime FG the decider. Gerald Riggs ran for a touchdown in each game to tie a club mark. The opener also featured the return of William Andrews after a two-year layoff following knee surgery.

Leading the Way Oct. 12, 1986

In a game that featured the return of QB Steve Bartkowski to Atlanta (as an LA Ram), the Falcons rolled to a 26-14 win to up their mark to 5-1. The next week, the Falcons fought to an overtime tie with the 49ers to stay atop the Western Division.

A Note of Thanks Dec. 14, 1986

It was Jeff Van Note day at Atlanta Fulton County Stadium as the 18-year veteran center was honored after 246 games. With all his family present, he was presented gifts including a vintage 1957 Chevy (symbolic of his #57 and being a classic). Mick Luckhurst extended his club record to 117 consecutive PAT's.

Riggs' Record Breaking Day is Doomsday For Dallas Dec. 6, 1987

Gerald Riggs becomes the club's all-time leading rusher, surpassing William Andrews with a five-yard run in the third quarter at Dallas, giving the six-year pro from Arizona State a career total of 5,987 yards. Riggs finishes up the day with 119 yards to help the Falcons break a seven-game losing streak and knock the Cowboys out of the playoffs for the second straight year with a 21-10 victory in Texas Stadium.

Making a Case for Himself Nov. 6-27, 1988

CB Scott Case laid claim to a spot in the Pro Bowl by being named NFC Defensive Player of the Month for November. Case intercepted five passes (two each vs. Packers and Raiders), registered a forced fumble and QB sack and made 20 tackles with nine passes defensed to help the Falcons to a 3-1 record during the month.

Settling for a Place in History

RB John Settle put his name in the League's record book by becoming the first free agent in NFL history since the 1970 merger to gain 1,000 yards in a season as he rushed for 66 yards against the Saints to finish with 1,024. Paul Lowe (Chargers) and Clem Daniels (Raiders) of the AFL were the only other undrafted players to accomplish the feat (in 1963 and 1965). The former Appalachian State star was fourth in the NFL in total yards (1594) and the club leader in receptions with 68 as he garnered his first trip to the Pro Bowl.

History Dec. 18, 1988

A Case of a Perfect 10 Dec. 18, 1988

CB Scott Case picked off his 10th pass of the year against the Saints to finish atop the NFL charts. Case set a new Falcon record for interceptions in a season eclipsing the old mark of nine by Rolland Lawrence in 1975. The Oklahoma product stole seven passes in the second half of the season when the young Falcons defense began to jell.

Prime Time Scores Twice 1989

Deion "Prime Time" Sanders ends his lengthy Sept, contract holdout and reports to camp. He takes a Friday practice and Saturday walk through and puts on the football pads for the first time in seven months in the season opener vs. the Rams. In the first quarter, Deion returns a punt 68 yards for a touchdown. After hitting a home run for the New York Yankees earlier that week, it makes him the only modern day athlete to hit a HR and score a TD in the same week.

Herschel & GA Homecoming Sept. 17, 1989

Heisman trophy winning Herschel Walker returns to Homecoming, his native Georgia, for his first NFL game. The hometown Falcons spoil his party, but the sellout crowd enjoys a 27-21 Atlanta win over the Cowboys and Herschel.

Good Job Dec. 1989

Guard Bill Fralic goes to a fourth consecutive Pro Bowl (the only guard in the NFL to do so). Rookie WR Shawn Collins leads all NFL rookies and sets a club rookie mark with 58 catches, while fellow rookie Deion Sanders gains post-season recognition by leading all rookie DB's with five thefts and gaining over 1,000 yards in returns.

Back in Black March 20, 1990

The Falcons announce plans for their 25th Anniversary season that include going back to their original black jerseys of 1966. In addition black helmets are unveiled along with the 25th anniversary logo patches for the uniforms.

Showstopping Trade April 20.1990

With the number one pick overall in the Draft, the Falcons deal with the Colts for sixtime Pro Bowl lineman, Chris Hinton, all-rookie WR Andre Rison, and next year's #1 pick.

That's Super! May 23, 1990

Falcons owner Rankin Smith leads the way in securing Super Bowl XXVIII for the City of Atlanta at the NFL Owners Meeting in Dallas.

Opening Day Sept. 9, 1990

Houston, Jerry Glanville's former team, comes to town to face the new black-clad Falcons. With the defense scoring three touchdowns, the Falcons win in a rout, 47-27, before a sellout crowd.

National TV Oct. 28, 1990

With a national TV audience watching for the first time since 1984, the Falcons storm the Cincinnati Bengals, 38-17. The prime time viewers see "Prime Time" Deion Sanders set a club record with a 79-yard punt return TD in what was TNT's highest rated game of the season.

Happy Ending Dec. 30, 1990

With the Dallas Cowboys coming to town, needing a win to secure a playoff berth, the Falcons close out with a second straight win and a 26-7 romp behind a club record 68-yard run by Mike Rozier. The Falcons donated 2,000 tickets from the sellout to the USO for servicemen to attend.

Two-Timer Jan. 30, 1991

Deion Sanders becomes both an Atlanta Brave and an Atlanta Falcon as he signs a baseball contract. He's the first to play two sports in the same city in 30 years.

Big Ben III Rings Nov. 3, 1991

QB Billy Joe Tolliver, subbing for injured Chris Miller, lofted a 44-yard "Big Ben" pass caught in a crowd of seven players by WR Michael Haynes with nine seconds remaining. That gave the Falcons a 17-14 victory and season sweep over the San Francisco 49ers. San Francisco had just taken the lead with only 53 seconds left in the game.

Coming Up 3's Nov. 17, 1991

The Falcons go on a scoring spree in the second quarter and set a new club record for most points in one quarter with 33. WR Andre Rison scores 3 TD's (18 of the 33 points) with scores of 39, 12 and 15 yards. Rison also tied a club record for most points scored by an individual in a game. The 33 in a quarter were seventh highest ever in NFL history.

West Coast Sweep 1991

Atlanta recorded an NFL rarity by sweeping all western opponents either on the road or at home. The Falcons were 7-0, defeating the Rams and the 49ers twice, along with the Raiders, Chargers and the Seahawks. Atlanta was the only team in 1991 to defeat the 49ers in Candlestick Park.

Long Flights

WR Michael Havnes led the entire NFL in average yardage per catch with a 22.4 rate (the NFL's highest since 1983). Mike had 50 receptions on the year for 1,122 yards and 11 touchdowns. His 11 touchdown catches averaged 44.9 yards per play as he recorded 12 receptions over 30 yards.

Prince of Thieves

CB's Deion Sanders and Tim McKyer both co-led the NFC in interceptions with six thefts apiece.

National OT Victory Nov. 24, 1991

The Falcons scored 10 points in the last two minutes of regulation to send the New Orleans game into overtime on ESPN's Pigout Game of the Week. A 54-yard completion from QB Chris Miller to WR Michael Haynes set up the 50-yard field goal by K Norm Johnson for the OT win before ESPN's largest TV audience of the season.

The Tuggle Struggle

Falcon LB Jessie Tuggle, who had over 200 tackles the previous two seasons, had led the entire NFL in tackles, only to be forgotten when All-Pro teams and Pro Bowl selections were made. A 1992 Pro Bowl selection rejection, Tuggle was finally recognized as a first team All-Pro pick by Sports Illustrated.

Road Kill

The Falcons made club history as they swept through their NFC West road trips by defeating the Rams 31-14 in Anaheim, dropping New Orleans in Overtime 23-20 at the Superdome, and by giving the 49ers their only loss in 1991 at Candlestick Park 39-34. This was the first time ever the birds had beaten all their division rivals on the

A Final Game Outdoors Dec. 15, 1991

One Last Time A sellout crowd witnessed the Falcons' final home game of the 1991 season, as well as the birds' final game in Fulton-County Stadium. Atlanta defeated the Seattle Seahawks' 26-13, to run their home win streak to five straight. NFL thieves Tim McKyer and Deion Sanders combined on a 55-yard interception and lateral for a memorable touchdown. On hand with the 59,000 fans were Hammer, World Heavy Weight Champion Evander Holyfield, singer Wayne Newton, and country and western group Diamond Rio.

Playoff Win! Dec. 29, 1991

On the road at arch-rival New Orleans on ABC's national TV, the Falcons came from 10 points down to win their first-ever Playoff game away from home. New Orleans native Michael Haynes scored two touchdowns, including the game winning 61yarder in the fourth quarter, then CB Tim McKyer ended any suspense by intercepting a pass.

While all fans Aug. 23, 1992 received a special souvenir ticket and commemorative pin, the day of entertainment included performances by megastar MC Hammer, doing the "Too Legit to Quit" theme song of the team, plus a Georgia native halftime show featuring major country recording stars Travis Tritt, Alan Jackson, Trisha Yearwood, Doug Stone, and T. Graham Brown. Recording star John Denver preformed the national anthem, while Las Vegas boxing announcer Michael Buffer began the proceedings with his trademark, "Let's get ready to rumble." The pre-game festivities also included a Michael

Rankin M. Smith.

Haynes

This First One Counts as A "W" Sept. 6,1992

In the regular season opener in the Dome, the Falcons scored on their first four possessions en route to a 20-17 win over the New York Jets before a sellout of 65,585. The first play saw rookie RB Tony Smith run for 32 yards and the first points came on a Norm Johnson 25-yard FG. Just 17 seconds later, the Falcons scored the first TD in the Dome on a Chris Miller-to-Michael Haynes pass of 14 yards. Miller and Haynes hooked up again on an 11-yard play later in the first quarter as the Birds ran up a 17-0 lead. In the second period, Norm Johnson tied a club record with a 54yard FG. Miller's 72% passing (21-29) and 117 yards from the ground game led the Falcons to victory.

100-yard red ribbon cutting by Commissioner Paul Tagliabue and Falcons owner

Double Duty Oct, 11, 1992

Deion Sanders pulled off yet another first by participating in two pro sports in the SAME DAY. On Saturday night, he played in the Braves Playoff game in Pittsburgh, flew to Miami to play for the Falcons, then flew back to Pittsburgh for a game Sunday night. His presence helped the Falcons hold Dan Marino to a rare game without a TD pass, but the Falcons lost a 17-7 third quarter lead to bow, 21-17.

Shut 'Em Out Nov. 29, 1992

The Falcons defense posted the first shutout since 1988 in a 34-0 rout of the New England Patriots. Atlanta allowed just 15 net yards passing, second best in club history, and just 105 total yards with five QB sacks, two pass interceptions (both by Deion) and two fumble recoveries. Rookie Tony Smith had another hot day with an 8.1 rush average (10-81-1 td) and a 15-yard average on PR (5-75) for 151 yards.

Of Passing Interest: The '92 Season

The Falcons led the NFL with a club record 33-TD passes and became the only team to have 30 or more TD's in both '91 and '92. The 336 pass completions were a club season best as were the 194 passing first downs. Andre Rison set a club record with 93 receptions and became the first player in NFL history to have 300 catches in their first four years in the League. The Rison-Haynes tandem netted 21 TD's to lead the NFL for a second straight year (23 in '91). Mike Pritchard's 77 catches were the 5th most in club history, 9th in the NFL. Wade Wilson finished with three consecutive 300-yard games (324, 342, 374) and 10 TD's in those three games and two consecutive 30-completion games.

Offensive Warfare The '93 Season

Led by Pro Bowlers Andre Rison, Bobby Hebert and Norm Johnson, Atlanta's offense scored over 300 points for the fourth consecutive season. Rison scored a club-record 15 TD's, and set a new standard for most receptions in his first five seasons with 394. Hebert, meanwhile, finished third in the NFL with a career-high 24 TD passes and had the NFL's longest play of the year, a 98-yard TD strike to Michael Haynes. Johnson nearly had a perfect season, connecting on 26-of-27 field goals (.963), while stretching his consecutive FG streak to 26 in a row, the second best mark in NFL history. On defense, LB Jessie Tuggle led the team in tackles for the fifth consecutive season (183). Pro Bowl cornerback Deion Sanders continued to be an impact player, picking off seven passes while shutting down the league's top receivers. Third-year RB Erric Pegram more than made a name for himself, rushing for 1,185 yards, the fourth highest total in '93.

June Jones Named Coach Jan. 24, 1994

June Jones III is named the Falcons' 10th head coach, replacing Jerry Glanville, who resigned following the 1993 season.

Falcons lose long-time friend Nov. 3, 1994

Whitey Zimmerman, the Falcons original equipment manager since 1966, passes away. Always a constant in the locker room, "Zeke" will always be remembered as former Falcon Tommy Nobis stated, the "Original Falcon."

111 Catches! Dec. 24, 1994

Terance Mathis closes out a brilliant season against Arizona, finishing the '94 campaign with a club-record 111 receptions, the 4th highest total of all-time. His 1,342 receiving yards ranks second on Atlanta's all-time charts. For his efforts, he is voted to '95 Pro Bowl.

Mike Kenn Retires Dec. 24, 1994

Offensive lineman Mike Kenn finally closes out 17-year NFL career after being drafted by the Falcons in 1978. His last game against Arizona was his 251st game played, ranking 6th on the NFL's all-time list. He played in five Pro Bowls and all six of Atlanta's playoff games.

Falcons Land Morten Andersen July 21, 1995

The birds kick off camp by signing Morten Andersen, one of the best kickers in NFL history. Andersen, a long-time Falcons nemisis with New Orleans, had been cut by the Saints, who wanted to re-work his contract. The Falcons act swiftly by waiving Norm Johnson and bringing in the former Saint.

I-85 Rivaly Begins Sept. 3, 1995

The new Carolina Panthers make NFL debut in Georgia Dome and jump out to a 10-0 lead. Atlanta then takes over, building a 20-13 lead on first drive of third quarter. But, Carolina hits on a 44-yard bomb with 26 seconds left to force overtime. The Falcons register their recordlying 9th QB sack of the game, forcing a fumble, and go on to quickly kick the game-winning 35-yard field goal.

Sweet Revenge! Sept. 17, 1995 Morten Andersen goes against his former team for the first time as a Falcon and boots the game-winning field goal from 21-yards out in overtime at the Superdome.

Morten Sets NFL Record Dec. 10, 1995 Morten Andersen beats his old team again, but this time sets another NFL record in the process. Andersen establishes a new League mark with three field goals from beyond 50 yards in one game, including shots from 55, 55, and 51 yards, as Atlanta comes away with a 19-14 victory and sweeps the Saints for the first time since 1985

Playoff Bound! Dec. 24, 1995

Needing a win to make the playoffs, the Falcons pull off the improbable, defeating the world champion 49ers, 28-27, in front of a frenzied crowd at the Georgia Dome on Christmas eve. Bobby Hebert connects with Terance Mathis on two touchdowns, including the game-winner as Mathis makes an incredible run to the end zone with 1:45 remaining. Hebert was filling in for an injured Jeff George, who was knocked out with a concussion and neck injury just before halftime. Atlanta finishes 7-1 at home, the second best home record in the NFL in '95, tying a club record.



The Falcons play in their first playoff game since 1991, but face a hot Packers team who had never lost a post-season game in Lambeau Field. That record stays in tact as Green Bay's balanced offensive attack offsets a 366-yard passing day by Jeff George. The Falcons outgain Green Bay, 360-307, despite the muddy conditions of Lambeau.

Four 1,000yard Players! 1995 Season

Dec. 31, 1995

The Falcons establish an NFL record by having four players each gain 1,000 yards, including receivers Eric Metcall (1,189), Terance Mathis (1,039), Bert Emanuel (1,039), and running back Craig Heyward (1,083). Jeff George, meanwhile, became only the 18th QB in League history to have over 4,000 yards passing (4,143).

Jamal Anderson Hits 1,000 Dec. 15, 1996 RB Jamal Anderson becomes the 7th Falcon in club history to rush for over 1,000 yards in a season, combining for 111 yards against the Rams in Atlanta. Anderson had previously signed a 3-year contract extension on 10-28-96, taking him through the 1999 season.

Jones Let Go As Falcons Coach Dec. 23, 1996 Head Coach June Jones was fired with two years left on his contract following Atlanta's 3-13 season in 1996. During his three years (1994-96) he compiled a 19-29 record and led the Falcons to a playoff berth in 1995.

Tuggle Hammers Out Extension Jan. 3, 1997 Jessie Tuggle, fresh off a club-leading 184-tackle season in '96, signs a 2-year contract extension, taking him through the 1999 campaign. Tuggle, a 3-time Pro Bowler, has led the Falcons in tackles for eight sraight seasons.

Dan Reeves Becomes 8th Falcons Coach Jan. 20, 1997 Dan Reeves becomes the 8th head coach in franchise history, signing a 5-year contract as Exec. VP of Football Operations/Head Coach. He quickly assembles an impressive staff, including Rich Brooks as Asst. Head Coach/Defensive Coord. and Hall of Famer Art Shell as Offensive Line Coach.

Falcons Owner Rankin Smith Passes Away Oct. 26, 1997 Team owner and founder Rankin M. Smith passed away from heart complications just hours before the Falcons were to play a nationally-televised game at Carolina on TNT. The 72-year old was remembered at a Tuesday memorial service as a quiet, behind-the-scenes "pioneer" who helped bring professional sports, and other major contributions, to his beloved city of Atlanta.

Falcons sweep West Coast Trip! Nov. Dec., 1997 Due to back-to-back west coast trips, the team spent all week practicing in La Jolla, Calif., following its 24-17 win at Seattle to get ready for the Chargers. The extra time saved from not traveling across the country twice in four days translated into a 14-3 win at San Diego.

Falcons finish Season 6-2 Under Reeves 1997 Season After a difficult 1-7 start, the Falcons went 6-2 in their final eight games to finish 7-9, marking one of the best second-half comebacks in NFL history. QB Chris Chandler came on strong and ranked second in the NFL in QB rating (95.1) behind Steve Young en route to his first Pro Bowl appearance, joining teammate Jessie Tuggle. The real story of the season, however, was the tremendous play of the defensive line, which established a club-record 55 sacks to rank 2nd in the NFL. Chuck Smith (12.0 sacks) and Travis Hall (10.5 sacks) led the charge.


