



RALPH C. WILSON, Jr.
President and Owner

The face of modern professional football has been shaped by men like Ralph C. Wilson, Jr., only owner of the Buffalo Bills since their induction as an original member of the American Football League in 1960.



A sports interest that dated from boyhood stimulated Wilson to first purchase a minority interest in the NFL Detroit Lions and later to join ranks with Lamar Hunt and the other principals of the new AFL. The youthful owner chose Buffalo as the home for his fledgling franchise on October 17, 1959, and six weeks later named it "the Bills."

In the 21 years that have passed since, professional football has enjoyed explosive popularity and expansion, completed a major merger and experienced first labor strife and, more recently, labor peace. Ralph Wilson has remained involved.

It was Wilson and the late Carroll Rosenbloom, then owner of the Baltimore Colts, who had the first tentative talks in January, 1965, that would ultimately lead to the AFL-NFL merger. A past president of the AFL, Wilson served as a member of the expansion committee and the AFL-NFL Negotiations Committee.

The Bill's owner was prominent in the negotiations which resulted in a new agreement between the NFL Management Council and the Players Association.

A resident of Detroit since moving there with his family as a youngster, Wilson won his undergraduate degree from the University of Virginia and later attended the University of Michigan law school. He enlisted in the Navy during World War II, earning his commission within a year and serving aboard minesweepers in both the Atlantic and Pacific theatres.

Among many business pursuits, Wilson is president of the Ralph C. Wilson Insurance Agency and Motorcar, an auto transport business. His interest in sports, however, extends beyond football. He owns a stable of thoroughbred race horses and is an avid tennis player, skier and golfer.

From the inception of the Bills, Wilson has played a dynamic and active role in the organization. He is determined in his effort to bring two things — "winning football and a Super Bowl trophy" — to the NFL faithful of Western New York.

Wilson's contribution to the game was recognized by the weekly publication, Football News, which named him "Man of the Year" in 1973. "He has been a tower of strength in the administration of professional football," the newspaper said.

STEW BARBER

Vice President In Charge of Administration

Stew Barber who established a reputation for dependability and excellence as a player, was appointed to the new post of Vice President in Charge of Administration in January. The position encompasses all of the duties formerly assigned to Bob Lustig, who departed the football organization to become president and chief operating officer of a new insurance company being formed by Bills' owner Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. Barber's responsibilities include directing the club's administrative, ticket and stadium operations; arranging the pre-season schedule; coordinating travel arrangements and representing the Bills at official League meetings. He will also continue to supervise player signings. In announcing Barber's new position, Wilson said he was confident Stew would "attack this challenge with the same skill and vigor that typified his career with the Buffalo Bills." After a distinguished playing career at Penn State, that included All-East recognition and appearances in three post-season all-star games, Barber was drafted in the fourth round of the 1961 AFL selection meeting by Buffalo. He spurned an offer from Dallas of the NFL, which made him its third choice, to play for the Bills. Over the next nine seasons, Barber started 112 consecutive regularly-scheduled games, was a five-time All-AFL choice and appeared in five League All-Star games. Barber was a member of both the Bills AFL Championship teams. During his playing days, Barber worked part-time for a rendering company that hired him as General Manager at the time of his retirement following the 1969 season. Barber got into the bakery business in Erie, Pa., in 1971, heading his own firm for two years and doing some part-time scouting for the Bills. He landed a pro

coaching job as an assistant with the WFL New York Stars in 1974 and moved with the Stars to Charlotte before the team finally folded. Barber was hired by the WFL Chicago Wind for the 1975 season but left before the year began to accept a fulltime scouting position with the Bills. He was named assistant to Lustig in December, 1976.

PATRICK J. MCGRODER, Jr.
Vice President

An early champion of Buffalo's AFL franchise was Patrick J. McGroder, the city's sports coordinator at the time Ralph Wilson brought the young Bills to Western New York. At Wilson's insistence, McGroder joined the club's front office staff in 1962 as Vice President. The longtime Buffalo native serves as the organization's advertising sales coordinator and handles other special duties at the management level. McGroder attended St. Joseph's Collegiate Institute and Hutchinson High School, Canisius and Chattanooga Colleges. He founded McKinley Liquor Company in 1942 after achieving the position of National Sales Representative for W.A. Taylor Importers. McGroder was the Buffalo Athletic Club's "Sportsman of the Year" in 1955 and winner of the Chamber of Commerce "Good Government Award" three years later. His efforts in promoting professional football games for Buffalo nearly enabled him to secure an NFL franchise for the city. He has remained fast friends with such legendary pro football figures as George Halas of Chicago and Art Rooney of Pittsburgh. In addition to sports coordinator, McGroder also served as Buffalo Parks Commissioner and President of the Police Athletic League.

CHUCK KNOX

Vice President in Charge of Football Operations

Chuck Knox didn't promise any miracles and the 1978 Buffalo Bills didn't produce any.

At the time he was appointed Buffalo coach in January a year ago, Knox did say he hoped to build a program that would be competitive. The 1978 Bills were that . . . immediately.

Buffalo finished 5-11 in Knox's first season and was involved in ten games decided by a touchdown or less. With a 21-14 victory over Baltimore in the season finale, the Bills lifted themselves out of the AFC Eastern Division basement for the first time since 1975.

"We won our first game on the road and escaped the cellar," Knox said after the Colt game. "That may not be much to brag about but it's a definite step up for us."

The Bills' five victories matched the win total of the previous two seasons. Buffalo produced a 1,000-yard rusher — rookie Terry Miller, who became only the tenth first-year player to gain 1,000. The Bills' led the NFL in pass defense also.

Knox put the punch back in the Bills with a roster that featured ten rookies and 22 players with two or less years NFL experience. Three of his 1978 draft choices — Miller, defensive tackle Dee Hardison and linebacker Lucius Sanford — were named to All-Rookie teams.

With the infusion of new talent added in the college draft, Knox hopes the Bills' rebuilding program can take another giant step forward.

In his six-year career as an NFL head coach, Chuck Knox has built an impeccable reputation for winning football.

An offensive line coach with the Detroit Lions, he was hired in 1973 to lead the Los Angeles Rams, a team that limped home 6-7-1 in 1972.

Knox wasted no time. He turned the Rams into a 12-2 Western Division Champion in 1973, an achievement that earned him NFL "Coach of the Year" honors. It was only the beginning. In five years as LA coach, Knox orchestrated five consecutive division titles, a string

unmatched in NFL coaching annals and won a stunning 77 percent of his regular season games.

Ralph C. Wilson, Jr., brought Knox to Buffalo with a new long-term contract on January 11, 1978. "Chuck has the kind of imagination and experience that will give our program the kind of leadership and direction it requires to again be successful," the Bills president said at the time.

Knox's penchant for leadership, imagination and hard work are well documented. They date from the days of his youth in the steel mill town of Sewickley, Pa.

The eldest of two sons of immigrant Scotch-Irish parents, Knox was an 180-pound high school tackle. He received an athletic scholarship to Juniata College in Huntingdon, Pa., where he won four varsity letters and was football co-captain as a senior.

After break-even seasons as freshman and sophomore, Knox played on two winning Juniata elevens, including the 7-0-0 1953 club that fashioned the first undefeated record in the history of the school.

"I got a quality education," Knox, an American History major recalls. "I've always been interested in things of a historical nature. I think the past can give you guidance in dealing with the present."

For Knox, there wasn't any question about the future. "I wanted to be a coach for as long as I can remember," he says. "I wasn't good enough to play in the pros so I started coaching in high schools and moved up. It's more difficult that way."

Success was instantaneous for Chuck Knox, football coach. In 1954, he was the only assistant to Juniata skipper Bob Hicks and, together, they guided the Indians to a perfect record of 8-0-0.

The next season, Knox was an assistant at Tyrone, Pa., High School, departing in 1956 for a three-year turn as head coach at Elwood City, Pa., High School where his teams were 10-16-2.

He landed his first college job at Wake Forest in 1959, working for Deamon Deacon coach Paul Amen. After two seasons in Greensboro, it was off to Kentucky for the 1961-62 campaigns with Blanton Collier and the Wildcats.

New York Jet skipper Weeb Ewbank gave Knox his first pro position in 1963. The AFL Jets of those years played second fiddle in the Eastern Division to the Buffalo Bills, who collected back-to-back championships in 1964-65. Knox quickly gained respect as an offensive line coach and developed a well-disciplined forward wall that would be a Jet strength for years to come.

From New York, Knox went to the Detroit Lions. He coached Joe Schmidt's offensive lines from 1967-72, creating the kind of credentials that won him the Los Angeles job in 1973.

For all of his success, Knox remains low key and takes pride in his reputation as a "player's coach."

"I try," he has said, "never to get too low or too high. I have a saying that regardless of what is written about you or your team no one is as good or as bad as he is made out to be. No one likes criticism but you have to understand it's a part of this business."

TOM CATLIN

Defensive Coordinator — Linebackers

An All-America for Bud Wilkinson at Oklahoma, Tom Catlin is defensive coordinator and linebacker coach for the Buffalo Bills. Catlin spent 12 seasons (1966-77) with the Los Angeles Rams, the longest continuous coaching assignment in the club's history. His linebackers were a key element in six Western Division title teams. A native of Ponca City, Okla., Catlin played center and linebacker for the Sooners during the 1950-51-52 seasons. He was drafted by Baltimore but traded to Cleveland where he started midway through his rookie season and called defensive signals for the 1954 NFL Champions. He was in the Air Force during the 1955-56 seasons but stayed in touch with football by coaching the West Point Plebes for one year under Army skipper Earl "Red" Blaik. Returning to the NFL in 1957 with Cleveland, Catlin played there two more seasons before finishing his career in Philadelphia in 1959. Catlin broke into coaching with Hank Stram and the Dallas Texans, moved with the franchise to Kansas City in

1963 and spent three seasons there before going to LA in 1966. In Los Angeles, Catlin handled the linebackers for three different Rams coaches — George Allen, Tommy Prothro and Chuck Knox.

JACK DONALDSON

Receivers

The Jack Donaldson-Chuck Knox relationship dates from their days as assistant coaches with the New York Jets. Donaldson handled the defensive line and backfield for Weeb Ewbank, Knox the offensive line. They started together in 1963 and Donaldson remained five seasons, one more than Knox. When Paul Brown was putting together his new Cincinnati franchise in 1968, Donaldson was the first coach he hired. The new Buffalo assistant spent 10 seasons (1968-77) with the Bengals, one working with the defensive line and the next nine the offensive backfield. A 1949 graduate of Ohio State University, Donaldson was a highly-successful high school coach in Ohio for 10 years. He had teams at McArthur, Xenia, Carey and achieved particular success at Perrysburg HS, near Toledo, where he fashioned a 38-8 won-lost mark that included two undefeated seasons and two conference championships. Donaldson was an assistant at the University of Toledo for two years before joining the Jets.

STEVE MOORE

Special Assignments

A college assistant for three seasons, Steve Moore joined the Bills' staff in 1978 as special assignments coach. His duties include responsibility for tight ends and off-field work in film breakdown, scouting of the upcoming opponent and coordination of computer analysis. The 31-year-old Moore spent the 1976-77 seasons at Rice University where he coached the Owl's passing game, working with quarterbacks and receivers. Prior to Rice, Moore was quarterback and receiver coach at the U.S. Military Academy under Homer Smith. A native of Southern California, Moore was born in Los Angeles and attended high school and junior college in Glendale. A junior college All-America at Glendale JC, Moore transferred to the University of California-Santa Barbara where he finished his undergraduate career by winning All-Coast honors and appearing in the Coaches All-America game. Moore's first two years of coaching (1970-71) were as a graduate

assistant at UC-Santa Barbara. In 1972, he was named assistant football and head track coach at Temple, Tex., HS. After two seasons there, he became head football coach at Mesa Verde, Calif., HS, a job he left in 1975 to join the West Point staff.

ELIJAH PITTS

Offensive Backs — Special Teams

A 13th round draft choice out of Philander Smith College in Little Rock, Ark., Elijah Pitts played for 11 years in the National Football League. He was on six Green Bay title teams — the NFL Champions of 1961-62, 1964, 1966 and the 1967-68 Super Bowl winners. A running back and return specialist, he scored two of the Packers' touchdowns in the 35-10 win over Kansas City in Super Bowl I. Traded to Chicago in 1970, Pitts also played briefly with the Rams, New Orleans and, finally, returned to Green Bay before finally retiring in 1971. In his pro career, Pitts averaged 3.5 yards per rushing attempt, gained nearly 1,000 yards on kick returns, caught more than 100 passes and scored 35 touchdowns. He went to work as a fulltime scout for the Packers in 1972 then joined Chuck Knox's new Los Angeles coaching staff in 1973. In his five seasons as a Ram assistant, Pitts was instrumental in the development of All-Pro running back Lawrence McCutcheon, who passed Dick Bass as Los Angeles' all-time rushing leader. Pitts was inducted into the Green Bay Packer Hall of Fame in March, 1979. He joins teammates Bart Starr, Willie Davis and Coach Vince Lombardi, among others, in the Packer shrine, established in 1970.

RAY PROCHASKA

Offensive Coordinator — Offensive Line

Ray Prochaska's association with football spans 40 years. An offensive end at Nebraska, he capped his college career by playing in the 1941 Rose Bowl against Stanford and the College All-Star game. Prochaska played one season for the Cleveland Rams before departing for 4½ years of Army service, reaching the rank of Major prior to his separation. He went back to Nebraska as an assistant coach in 1946 and stayed nine years. Pop Ivy introduced Prochaska to professional football with the Edmonton Eskimos of the CFL. A member of Ivy's staff from 1955-57, Ray joined the Chicago Cardinals for the 1958 season as offensive line coach. He stayed with the Cards for seven seasons, moving with the club to St. Louis in 1960. George Allen hired Prochaska at Los Angeles in 1966 where he remained until Allen went to Washington after the 1970 season. Two years in Cleveland (1971-72) followed before Prochaska's return to LA with Chuck Knox. This is Prochaska's third season as an offensive coordinator.

KAY STEPHENSON

Quarterbacks

A former Buffalo quarterback himself, Kay Stephenson works with the Bills' signal-callers. Originally signed as a free agent by the San Diego Chargers, the former Florida quarterback played with Buffalo during the 1968 season. Inserted as the starter against Houston, Stephenson was the regular for three weeks before suffering a season-ending fracture of the collarbone against the Miami Dolphins. In his abbreviated season, Stephenson completed 29 of 79 passes for 364 yards and four touchdowns. Kay spent time with Atlanta and Oakland in 1969-70 before his first coaching position at Rice in 1971. He was away from football in 1972 but returned as Athletic Director and Head Coach at Baker County, Fla., HS in 1973. Stephenson played a year with the WFL Jacksonville Sharks (1974), then became the team's Director of Player Personnel and offensive coordinator in 1975. He had been out of football for a year when Chuck Knox tapped him to join the Rams' staff in 1977.

JIM WAGSTAFF

Defensive Backfield

One of the original Buffalo Bills, Jim Wagstaff was a defensive mainstay of the 1960-61 teams. The graduate of Idaho State, where he played running back and cornerback, intercepted nine passes and had 166 yards in returns during his two seasons in Buffalo. A Detroit draft choice, Wagstaff never played there but did spend one season with the NFL Chicago Cardinals (1959). He got into the coaching profession at South Fremont, Idaho, High School in 1962, later moved on to head coaching jobs at Pocatello HS (1963-65) and Idaho Falls HS (1966-68). He was the defensive coordinator, secondary and linebacker coach at Boise State University for four seasons (1969-72). Named to the Los Angeles staff by new coach Chuck Knox in 1973, Wagstaff turned a suspect Ram secondary into the League Leader in 1976 when LA backs picked off 32 passes and had the NFL's interception leader — Monte Jackson with 10. Wagstaff's 1978 Buffalo secondary led the NFL in pass defense, surrendering an average of only 104.0 yards per game.

Defensive Line

A native of Sealy, Tex., Willie was a legendary high school running back at Bellville, Tex., where he scored a record 265 points his senior season. Zapalac coached for eight seasons at his alma mater (1953-60), was at Texas Tech for two years and Oklahoma State for one before landing at the Uni-

versity of Texas in 1964. He worked for 12 years under the Longhorns' Darrell Royal, first as a defensive coach and later as offensive coordinator and line coach. Zapalac's two sons both played at Texas — Bill on the National Championship teams of 1969-70 and Jeff in 1971. He left Texas to accept his first pro job in St. Louis.

NORM POLLOM **Director of College Scouting**

He left the school system to pursue a fulltime scouting career. While in LA, Pollom isolated such prospects as Rams All-Pro Jack Youngblood, Lawrence McCutcheon and Isaiah Robertson. Twenty-seven of the 31 Ram choices in the first five rounds of the 1973-76 drafts won positions in the National Football League.

HARVEY JOHNSON
College Scout

Harvey Johnson has served the Bills as an assistant and head coach, director of player personnel and, now, as college scout. A part of the Buffalo organization from the first days of the franchise, Johnson was the Bills' defensive backfield mentor in 1960-61. Harvey was appointed Director of Player Personnel in 1962, succeeding Lou Saban when Lou took over the football program. Harvey was Buffalo's head coach for 12 games of the 1968 season, following the departure of Joe Collier, and for the entire 1971 campaign. A product of William & Mary, Johnson played for the Bainbridge, Md., Naval Training Center from 1943-45. A draft choice of the All-American Conference New York Yankees, Johnson played regularly in the pros as a de-

fensive back but earned his principal recognition as a placement specialist, once stringing together 146 consecutive conversions. Harvey remained with the New York franchise when it joined the NFL in 1950 but retired as a player in 1953 to take an assistant coaching job with the Hamilton Tiger-Cats. He became head coach of the Kitchener team (Rugby Football Union) in 1954 and guided them to four titles in as many years. He left Kitchener to coach with the Montreal Alouettes in 1958-59.

New Bills' scout Dave Smith showed his eye for talent when he recruited Joe DeLamielleure for Michigan State. An assistant for the Spartans at the time, Smith helped lure the Bills' All-Pro guard to East Lansing. In his new capacity as a member of the Buffalo scouting staff, Smith will be criss-crossing the country in the search of the next generation of All-Pros. Born in Detroit, Smith graduated from Charlevoix High School and Michigan State University. He played end on three MSU teams including two that went to the Rose Bowl. Dave got his introduction to coaching at two Michigan high schools — Walled Lake and Ferndale — where he fashioned a composite record of 83-14-0 and orchestrated nine Conference championships. He signed on with Duffy Daughtery in 1966 and, for five seasons, worked at Michigan State, first with the linebackers and, later, with the receivers and passing game. Named head coach at Ferris State College in Big Rapids, Mich., in 1972, Smith put together a 5-5 record before moving to the newly-formed World Football League with the Detroit Wheels. Since the demise of the WFL, he has been teaching Physical Education at Ferndale and scouting part-time for the Oakland Raiders.

But, at season's end, not only had Curtis Brown emerged as a key figure in the Bills' backfield, he was voted the ballclub's most valuable player for 1978 by his teammates. . . a powerful runner, who became solidly entrenched as the ballclub's fullback by mid-season after being used strictly on special teams during the first four games. . . his 102-yard runback of a kickoff in the fourth game of the season against Baltimore rates as the most spectacular play of 1978 for Buffalo. . . in his second season, Curtis compiled 1,149 all-purpose yards, 130 on pass receptions, 428 on kickoff returns and 591 as a running back. . . was the team's second-leading rusher and tallied four TD's from his fullback position including one on a 58-yard scamper against Miami at Orchard Park. . . After struggling early in the season, Miller was nothing short of sensational in the closing weeks of the campaign. At season's end he emerged as only the 10th rookie in NFL history to rush for 1,000 yards and his final total of 1,060 was the sixth highest ever by a first-year back. He was among just 11 NFL players a year ago to reach the 1,000-yard plateau. Overall, Terry carried 238 times for a 4.5 average. But his average per carry in the season's final four weeks was a spectacular 7.1 as he gained 462 yards on 65 attempts. His late bid to reach the magical 1,000-yard mark began with an awesome performance against the New York Giants in the Bills' final home game last Nov. 26. In 21 carries that afternoon, he ripped through the New York defense for 208 yards and two touchdowns. It marked the only time all season that an NFL running back gained 200 yards in a game. Three weeks later in the season finale at Baltimore, Miller turned in another memorable performance, rushing for 123 yards on 15 carries (8.2 avg.) to achieve his final total of 1,060 yards. Early in the fourth quarter on a sweep to the left, Terry raced 60 yards for a TD. The run was his longest of the season. In all, Miller rushed for seven touchdowns, tops on the ballclub in that category. In addition, he proved to be a very capable pass receiver with 22 receptions for 246 yards, an 11.2 average. He ranked fourth on the ballclub in pass receptions and was the leader among the running backs.

When making requests for working press credentials, please allow time for mailing. Press tickets are normally issued approximately 10 days before the game. Should transmission facilities be required, please arrange for same through local representatives.

WORKING PRESS: Admittance to the Bills' press box is restricted to the **WORKING PRESS ONLY**. Credentials are marked with a row and seat number. Passes are non-transferable.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Photographers are asked to take special note of the following conditions for use of press credentials:

"Any secondary non-editorial or commercial use of any picture, film, or drawing of the game taken or made by the accredited organization or individual to whom this credential has been issued (including but not limited to use in advertising, sales promotion, or merchandising) is prohibited without prior specific written approval by the Buffalo Bills football club of the National Football League. Television stations filming or taping NFL games recognize that any films or tapes can be used only in connection with regularly scheduled television newscasts within a seven-day period following the game and the film clip or tape portion of each such showing will not exceed two (2) minutes in length."

Sideline photo passes will be tightly controlled by the Public Relations Department and generally limited to photographers shooting for a daily newspaper, wire service, or magazine of national circulation. No tripods are permitted on the field. Photographers may also shoot from a camera platform that runs the length of the press box.

RADIO-TELEVISION: There are spacious radio and television accommodations in the Bills' new press box. In making requests for broadcast credentials, please specify requirements for spotters and/or statisticians.

Van Miller, sports director of WIVB-TV, and Stan Barron, sports director of WBEN Radio, will handle the broadcasts of Bills games on WBEN (930) during the 1979 season. Miller will do the play-by-play and Barron, the color commentary.

STADIUM INFORMATION

Orchard Park is headquarters for NFL football in Western New York. Before a sellout crowd of 80,020, the Buffalo Bills dedicated their spanking new playing facility on August 17, 1973. While the visiting Washington Redskins captured the inaugural game 37-21, even defeat could not dull the enthusiasm of fans who had long awaited completion of the project.

Built on a 113-acre tract approximately 30 minutes from downtown Buffalo, the stadium was constructed at a cost of \$22 million, financed by the taxpayers of Erie County. From the ground-breaking on April 4, 1972, to the inaugural, actual construction time was slightly over 14 months.

To form the lower level of the stadium more than 370,000 feet of shale was removed — putting the field 50 feet below ground level. The outside of the stadium rises only 60 feet above the horizon. The AstroTurf field has an 18-inch crown to assure proper drainage.

The Bills have approximately \$3 million of their own money in the attractive physical plant. The scoreboard, most technically advanced in the nation, was purchased by the team for \$1.3 million. Rising 30 feet in the air and extending a length of 105 feet, the scoreboard has a computerized matrix of nearly 10,000 light bulbs. Using the advanced techniques built into the system, the scoreboard operators are able to show instant replays of the action on the field.

Another million dollars of the club's money went to build and furnish 34 luxury private suites, which are leased on an annual basis. In addition, there are more than \$700,000 in other capital expenses that were paid directly by the team.

Terms of the lease agreement, which gives the Bills an exclusive 25-year tenancy, also gives the club financial responsibility for maintenance and operation of the stadium, a figure estimated at approximately \$1,000,000 annually.

Surrounding the stadium are parking facilities for 16,000 cars and 300 buses. Scattered throughout the concourses are 38 concession stands and 42 rest rooms.



THE SEASON IN REVIEW

ORCHARD PARK, N.Y., Sept. 3 — Stymied for three quarters by Pittsburgh's famed "Steel Curtain," the Bills' offense came alive in the fourth period under the direction of backup quarterback Bill Munson. A 20-yard second quarter Tom Dempsey field goal and a fourth period safety provided the only points in a penalty-filled game as the Bills posted their second shutout in as many seasons. The loss was the eighth in a row for the Bengals. Sharing the day's laurels with Brown and the Buffalo defense was Rusty Jackson, who turned in the most spectacular punting display in the stadium's six-year history. Jackson totaled 447 yards on 10 punts. Five times he dropped the ball inside the Cincinnati 10, and with two minutes remaining in the game, he booted a 70-yarder. The Bengals managed only 244 total yards against the Buffalo defense which picked off three Cincinnati passes. Mario Clark had two of the thefts including one on the Buffalo 11 with five minutes remaining to thwart the most serious Cincinnati scoring threat of the afternoon. Curtis Brown carried 18 times for his 100 yards rushing, and also combined with Lou Piccone to nail punt returner Dennis Law in his own endzone for a safety early in the final quarter. Law had fielded the punt on his own 1-yardline and circled behind the goal line where he was slowed by Piccone and brought down by Brown.

BALTIMORE, Md., Dec. 17 — Terry Miller rushed for 123 yards to hit 1,060 for the season as the Bills concluded the 1978 campaign with their first win at Baltimore since 1975. Miller's rushing total was the sixth best ever for an NFL rookie and it marked the first time since 1962 that a first-year Bills back rushed for 1,000 yards. Cookie Gilchrist did it that year. After falling behind 0-7 in the second quarter, the Bills earned a 7-7 halftime deadlock on Dennis Johnson's two-yard run with less than seven minutes left in the second period. They went ahead for good early in the third on Joe Ferguson's record-breaking 78th career touchdown pass, a 39-yarder to Frank Lewis. The previous mark of 77 was held by Jack Kemp, now a U.S. congressman. Along with his 123 yards rushing, Miller tallied his seventh touchdown of the season on a 60-yard scamper early in the fourth period. It was his longest run from scrimmage during 1978 and also the longest TD run by any Bills player during the campaign. The Buffalo defense turned in one of its best efforts of the season, recording four quarterback sacks in the process. And, linebacker Lucius Sanford, who blocked two field goal attempts two weeks ago in Kansas City, set up the Bills' first TD when he blocked a David Lee punt on the Baltimore 28 in the second quarter.

BILLS HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

It all began with Lamar Hunt's dream, and a meeting in Chicago on August 14, 1959. Eight days later, the American Football League came into being. On October 17, Buffalo was granted the seventh franchise in the upstart AFL.

The new league started its initial draft on November 22, and Buffalo selected Penn State's Richie Lucas in the first round.

On November 30, Buffalo owner Ralph C. Wilson, Jr., named his team the Bills. In December Buster Ramsey was named the first Head Coach of the Bills and Dick Gallagher was appointed General Manager.

The Bills opened their first training camp in East Aurora, N. Y., on July 10, 1960, and 20 days later played their first preseason game, bowing to the Boston Patriots 28-7, before 16,000 at War Memorial Stadium.

Buffalo finished its first season with a 5-8-1 record, drawing 111,860 fans in seven home games. The Bills improved to 6-8 in 1961 and home attendance grew to 133,408.

In January, 1962, Lou Saban replaced Buster Ramsey as the Buffalo Head Coach and Saban led the Bills to their first winning season, 7-6-1. In 1963 the Bills duplicated the 7-6-1 record, and home attendance grew to 209,719. On December 7, 1963, Buffalo fullback Cookie Gilchrist set a pro rushing record with 243 yards while scoring five touchdowns in a 45-14 rout of New York.

Buffalo's 1963 season ended in disappointment as the Bills lost an Eastern Division playoff game to Boston 26-8.

The next two years were glory years for the Buffalo Bills. In 1964 the Bills won their first nine games en route to a 12-2 season, capped by a 20-7 win over the San Diego Chargers in the AFL Championship game on December 26 in Buffalo.

Buffalo repeated as AFL champions exactly one year later, scoring a 23-0 shutout of the Chargers in the championship game in San Diego. Buffalo's home attendance jumped to 257,324 in 1964 and 306,675 in 1965.

In January, 1966, Lou Saban resigned and was replaced by Joe Collier. Buffalo won its third straight Eastern Division title by defeating Denver 38-21 in the 1966 season's finale, but the Kansas City Chiefs stopped the Bills, 31-7, in the AFL Championship Game.

On August 14, 1967, the Bills, playing their first game against a team from the National Football League, dropped a 17-14 decision to the Detroit Lions in Tiger Stadium.

Joe Collier's tenure as the Bills Head Coach ended on September 15, 1968 and he was replaced by Harvey Johnson. On January 17, 1969 John Rauch signed a four-year pact to lead the Bills. Rauch lasted until July 20, 1971 when he resigned and Johnson once again stepped in.

Six months later Lou Saban returned to Buffalo after a six-year absence. On December 23, 1971 Saban was named Vice President in Charge of Football and Head Coach of the Bills.

After a lengthy controversy over the sight and type of stadium, ground breaking ceremonies for a new home for the Buffalo Bills were held in Orchard Park, N. Y., on April 4, 1972.

1973 saw a resurgence in the Bills' fortunes. On August 17 a sell-out crowd of 80,020 watched the Washington Redskins defeat Buffalo 37-21 in the inaugural game in the new stadium in Orchard Park. It was the first of six sell-outs that year as the Bills drew 531,270 fans at home, leading the NFL in attendance.

In the opening game of the 1973 season, September 16, O. J. Simpson set an NFL rushing record with a 253-yard performance against New England. Simpson surpassed the 1,000-yard plateau in the seventh game of the season, October 29, in the Bills' Monday Night debut, a 23-14 victory over Kansas City.

Simpson ended the 1973 season in spectacular style on December 16, gaining 200 yards against the New York Jets to up his season total to 2,003 yards, bettering Jim Brown's NFL season rushing mark. On that day the Bills became the first NFL team to rush for over 3,000 yards in a single season.

The Buffalo resurgence continued in 1974 as the Bills finished with a 9-5 mark and qualified for the post-season playoffs. Again Buffalo topped the NFL in attendance, attracting 547,237 fans to Orchard Park (six sell-outs). On December 22, 1974, the Pittsburgh Steelers, eventual Super Bowl Champions, crushed the Bills 32-14 in an AFC Divisional Playoff game in Three Rivers Stadium.

In 1975 the Bills again led the NFL in attendance with a home total of 514,386. The team record slipped to 8-6, but Simpson continued his assault on the record book. On December 20, in a 35-13 loss to the Minnesota Vikings, Simpson scored his 23rd touchdown of the year, an NFL mark.

Lou Saban's second term as the Bills Head Coach ended on October 15, 1976 and Jim Ringo was appointed his successor. On November 25, 1976, Simpson broke his own single game rushing record with a 273-yard performance against the Detroit Lions on Thanksgiving Day.

Another Bills' coaching change was initiated on December 22, 1977 when Ringo was relieved of his responsibilities. The man assigned the job of rebuilding the Buffalo Bills was Chuck Knox, winningest coach in the history of the Los Angeles Rams. Knox's appointment as Bills Vice President and Head Coach was announced on January 12, 1978.

A Bills era ended on Friday, March 24, 1978 when O. J.

Simpson was traded to the San Francisco 49ers for a package of draft choices.

It was "Miller Time" in 1978 as the Bills regained respectability. The campaign saw the unveiling of exciting running back in Terry Miller, a two-time consensus All-American at Oklahoma State and Buffalo's top draft choice in 1978. Miller rushed for 1,060 yards, the sixth highest total for a rookie in NFL history. In a late season game at Orchard Park against the New York Giants, he gained 208 yards on 21 carries, making him the lone NFL player to rush for 200 yards in a game during the 1978 season.

The campaign also saw quarterback Joe Ferguson become the Bills' all-time leader in the touchdown passes category with 78, one more than Jack Kemp's career total.

Buffalo, N.Y., Dec. 28, 1963 — Babe Parilli passed for 292 yards and a pair of touchdowns and Gino Cappelletti kicked four field goals to lead the Boston Patriots over Buffalo 26-8 in the Eastern Division playoff game. The Boston defense limited the Bills to just seven yards rushing and intercepted four Bills' passes to ruin Buffalo's first post-season playoff appearance. Buffalo had just 38 yards total offense in the first half as the Patriots broke to a 16-0 lead. The Bills' only scoring threat was set up by a 62-yard kickoff return by Elbert Dubenion, but Buffalo couldn't move and a 39-yard field goal attempt fell short. In the second half, Buffalo scored first on a 93-yard pass play from Daryle Lamonica to Dubenion late in the third quarter, but Boston answered with a 68-yard touchdown drive capped by a Parilli pass to Larry Garron that put the game out of reach.

The Bills used a punishing ground attack and stingy defense as its main weapons. The Chargers scored first and made it look easy, driving 80 yards in just four plays, but the momentum quickly changed hands. On the Charger's second possession, the Bills' Mike Stratton crashed into San Diego running back Keith Lincoln, putting the Charger star out of the game, and a sense of excitement rippled through the Buffalo stands. The rest of the game belonged to the Bills. Cookie Gilchrist's 122 rushing yards complimented the varied Bills passing attack as Buffalo scored 20 unanswered points. A pair of Pete Gogolak field goals and a four-yard run by Wray Carlton gave Buffalo a 13-7 halftime lead and Jack Kemp's 47-yard pass to Glenn Bass set up a Kemp sneak for a TD in the third quarter that finished the scoring.

Jack Kemp, voted the game's most valuable player, hit Ernie Warlick with an 18-yard touchdown pass to open the scoring and three minutes later the Bills' Butch Byrd returned a punt 74 yards for a score to put Buffalo on top 14-0. The rest of the game belonged to the Bills' defense as time and again they thwarted San Diego's explosive offense. Three Pete Gogolak field goals in the second half added icing to the Bills' championship cake.

CHIEFS 31, BILLS 7

Buffalo, N.Y., Jan. 1, 1967 — Led by the impeccable quarterbacking of Len Dawson, the Kansas City Chiefs earned the right to play the Green Bay Packers in Super Bowl I by defeating Buffalo 31-7. Dawson completed 16 of 24 passes for 227 yards and a pair of touchdowns while the Kansas City defense forced four Buffalo turnovers and limited the Bills to nine first downs and 40 yards rushing. It was a turnover that turned the game around. The teams traded early touchdowns as the Chiefs took advantage of a Buffalo fumble on the opening kickoff to grab a 7-0 lead. The Bills countered with a 69-yard bomb from Jack Kemp to Elbert Dubenion to tie the game. Dawson hit Otis Taylor with a 29-yard TD pass in the second quarter to put the Chiefs on top, but Kemp moved Buffalo into scoring position near the end of the half. A Johnny Robinson interception and long return set up Mike Mercer's 32-yard field goal with three seconds left in the half and Kansas City had the momentum. Buffalo never penetrated the Chief's 40-yard line in the second half while Kansas City added a pair of scores by Mike Garrett to turn the game into a rout.

Pittsburgh, Pa., Dec. 22, 1974 — A four-touchdown explosion in the second quarter propelled the Pittsburgh Steelers to a 32-14 win over the Bills, spoiling Buffalo's first post-season appearance in eight years. The Bills moved out to an early 7-3 lead on a 22-yard touchdown pass from Joe Ferguson to Paul Seymour. Buffalo's advantage was short-lived against the eventual Super Bowl Champions. Terry Bradshaw ran the Steeler offense to perfection in the second quarter, completing seven of eight passes for 143 yards and repeatedly hurting Buffalo with scrambling gains. Rocky Bleier began the Pittsburgh scoring avalanche with a 27-yard TD reception and Franco Harris scored three times from inside the five yard line as the Steelers moved out to an insurmountable 29-7 lead. In the second half Buffalo's comeback hopes were stymied by the tough Pittsburgh defense and a stubborn ball control offense that kept the ball away from the Bills.


