RALPH C. WILSON, Jr.
President and Owner

The face of modern professional football has been shaped by men like Ralph C. Wilson, Jr., only owner of the Buffalo Bills since their induction as an original member of the American Football League in 1960.



A sports interest that dated from boyhood stimulated Wilson to first purchase a minority interest in the NFL Detroit Lions and later to join ranks with Lamar Hunt and the other principals of the new AFL. The youthful owner chose Buffalo as the home for his fledgling franchise on October 17, 1959, and six weeks later named it "the Bills."

In the 24 years that have passed since, professional football has enjoyed explosive popularity. Ralph Wilson has remained involved.

It was Wilson and the late Carroll Rosenbloom, then owner of the Baltimore Colts, who had the first tentative talks in January, 1965, that would ultimately lead to the AFL-NFL merger. A past president of the AFL, Wilson served as a member of the expansion committee and the AFL-NFL Negotiations Committee.

The Bills owner was prominent in the negotiations which resulted in a 1977 agreement between the NFL Management Council and the Players Association.

A resident of Detroit since moving there with his family as a youngster, Wilson won his undergraduate degree from the University of Virginia and later attended the University of Michigan Law School. He enlisted in the Navy during World War II, earning his commission within a year and serving aboard minesweepers in both the Atlantic and Pacific theatres.

Among many business pursuits, Wilson is president of the Ralph C. Wilson Insurance Agency and Motorcar, an auto transport business. His interest in sports, however, extends beyond football. He owns a stable of thoroughbred race horses and is an avid tennis player, skier and golfer.

From the inception of the Bills, Wilson has played a dynamic and active role in the organization. He is determined in his effort to bring two things — "winning football and a Super Bowl trophy" — to the NFL faithful of Western New York.

Wilson's contribution to the game was recognized by the weekly publication, Football News, which named him "Man of the Year" in 1973. "He has been a tower of strength in the administration of professional football," the newspaper said.

STEW BARBER

Vice President in Charge of Administration

Former All-AFL offensive tackle Stew Barber is the Bills' Vice President in Charge of Administration. Appointed to his current post in January, 1979, Barber is responsible for the team's administrative, ticket and stadium operations; pre-season scheduling; coordinating travel arrangements and representing the club at official league meetings. Barber also supervises player signings. Barber has the unique insight of having served the organization as a player, scout and administrator. After a distinguished undergraduate career at Penn State, that included All-East recognition and appearances in three post-season all-star games, Barber was drafted in the fourth round of the 1961 AFL selection meeting by Buffalo. He spurned an offer from Dallas of the NFL, which made him its third choice, to play for the Bills. Over the next nine seasons, Barber started 112 consecutive regularly-scheduled games, was a five-time All-AFL choice and appeared in five League All-Star games. Barber was a member of both the Bills' AFL Championship teams. During his playing days, Barber worked part-time for a rendering company that hired him as General Manager at the time of his retirement following the 1969 season. Barber got into the bakery business in Erie, Pa., in 1971, heading his own firm for two years and doing some part-time scouting for the Bills. He landed a pro coaching job as an assistant with the WFL New York Stars in 1974 and moved with the Stars to Charlotte before the team finally folded. Barber was hired by the WFL Chicago Wind for the 1975 season but left before the year began to accept a full-time scouting position with the Bills. He was named assistant general manager in December, 1976.

PATRICK J. McGRODER, Jr.

An early champion of Buffalo's AFL franchise was Patrick J. McGroder, the city's sports coordinator at the time Ralph Wilson brought the young Bills to Western New York. At Wilson's insistence, McGroder joined the club's front office staff in 1962 as Vice President. The longtime Buffalo native serves as the organization's marketing, promotion and advertising sales coordinator and handles other special duties at the management level. McGroder attended St. Joseph's Collegiate Institute and Hutchinson High School, Canisius and Chattanooga Colleges. He founded McKinley Liquor Company in 1942 after achieving the position of National Sales Representative for W.A. Taylor Importers. McGroder was the Buffalo Athletic Club's "Sportsman of the Year" in 1955 and winner of the Chamber of Commerce "Good Government Award" three years later. His efforts in promoting professional football games for Buffalo nearly enabled him to secure an NFL franchise for the city. He has remained fast friends with such legendary pro football figures as George Halas of Chicago and Art Rooney of Pittsburgh. In addition to sports coordinator, McGroder also served as Buffalo Parks Commissioner and President of the Police Athletic League.

CHUCK KNOX
Vice President
in Charge of
Football Operations

Nine victories are all that stands between Chuck Knox and one of the National Football League's most exclusive clubs.

Rounding out his first decade as an NFL coach, Knox is at the threshold of 100 career triumphs, a figure reached by only four other pro coaches in their first 10 seasons. That distinguished quartet includes Miami's Don Shula (112 at Baltimore, Miami from 1963-72), Oakland's John Madden (112 from 1969-78), Bud Grant of Minnesota (106 from 1967-76 and the late Vince Lombardi (105 at Green Bay and Washington from 1959-69).

There are only 14 NFL coaches who have reached 100 career victories in their pro lifetime just four of whom are still active (Shula, Grant, Tom Landry and Chuck Noll).

Knox-coached teams in Los Angeles (1973-77) and Buffalo (1978-Present) have won six division championships and reached the playoffs seven times. His composite regular and post-season mark is 91-53-1, a winning percentage of .631.

Knox's nine-year regular season percentage of .653 (87-46-1) ranks him second only to Shula among active NFL skippers.

In 1981, Knox piloted Buffalo into the playoffs for the second consecutive season, one of only four 1980 playoff teams to repeat in the NFL's championship tournament. The Bills finished with a 10-6 record, the first time Buffalo has had back-to-back seasons of ten or more victories in nearly two decades.

While the Bills were deposed as AFC Eastern Division champion in a showdown loss at Miami on the final weekend of the campaign, Buffalo earned one of two AFC "wild card" berths and defeated the Jets 31-27 at Shea Stadium to post the Bills' first post-season victory since 1965.

Doing irreparable harm to his "conservative" image, Knox outfitted the 1981 Bills with the most productive offense in the history of the franchise. Buffalo gained 5,640 yards and ranked among the top ten offensive teams in the NFL.

Knox has achieved these stunning results in Buffalo despite the handicap of building on a base eroded by a 5-23 won-lost record the two years before he arrived (1976-77). In the four years since, the Bills are 33-31 and now firmly established as a legitimate contender.

Buffalo's startling 1980 season, when the Bills went 11-5 and captured their first AFC Eastern Division championship since 1966, won Knox NFL "Coach-of-the-Year" honors for the second time in his brief pro career. He was previously cited his first year at Los Angeles (1973) when he turned the Rams from a 6-7-1 also-ran in 1972 into a 12-2 Western Division champion.

Two of Knox's ex-assistants, Dick Vermeil of Philadelphia and Leeman Bennett of Atlanta, are not surprised by the quick success of their former boss.

"If I had to list the qualities that make Chuck an outstanding coach," Vermeil said, "I'd start with one thing — his honesty. He is a very down-to-earth, honest man. There's not a phony bone in his body. That's so important if you're a coach. You have to be yourself. If you can just be yourself, then you will be consistent in your approach, your program . . ."

Bennett says: "His (Knox's) basic philosophy is one of not making mistakes so that you beat yourself. You do the little things, and do them well, and the big things will take care of themselves. The team that can execute a particular offensive or defensive play is the team that's going to win . . ."

Knox showed his versatility by constructing a record offense just one year after his defense led the NFL. He has not been afraid to experiment, changing the Bills from a 4-3 team to a 3-4 in 1979 and installing the shotgun in obvious passing situations in 1980. Last fall, he employed seven defensive backs on passing downs.

Knox's imprint has extended from the football team to the community. He has served as chairman of the Children's Hospital-Variety Club Telethon and the Cerebral Palsy Telethon. He has also chaired the National Conference of Christians and Jews Brotherhood Week observance. *The Buffalo Evening News* chose Knox as one of eight "Outstanding Citizens of the Niagara Frontier for 1980," an honor bestowed annually on the community's most dynamic leaders.

An offensive line coach with the Detroit Lions, Knox was hired in 1973 to lead the Los Angeles Rams, a team that limped home 6-7-1 in 1972. He wasted no time turning the Rams into a 12-2 Western Division champion his first season, an achievement that earned him NFL "Coach-of-the-Year" honors. He won a stunning 77 percent of his regular season games in LA and brought home five straight divisional crowns, a feat unmatched in NFL coaching annals.

Little wonder Ralph C. Wilson, Jr., president of the Bills, tapped Knox on January 11, 1978 to give the Buffalo program "the kind of leadership and direction it requires."

Knox's penchant for leadership, imagination and hard work are well documented. They date from the days of his youth in the steel mill town of Sewickley, Pa.

The eldest of two sons of immigrant Scotch-Irish parents, Knox was an 180-pound high school tackle. He received an athletic scholarship to Juniata College in Huntingdon, Pa., where he won four varsity letters and was football co-captain as a senior.

After break-even seasons as freshman and sophomore, Knox played on two winning Juniata elevens, including the 7-0-0 1953 club that fashioned the first undefeated record in the history of the school.

"I got a quality education," Knox, an American History major recalls. "I've always been interested in things of a historical nature. I think the past can give you guidance in dealing with the present."

For Knox, there wasn't any question about the future. "I wanted to be a coach for as long as I can remember," he says. "I wasn't good enough to play in the pros so I started coaching in high schools and moved up. It's more difficult that way."

Success was instantaneous for Chuck Knox, football coach. In 1954, he was the only assistant to Juniata skipper Bob Hicks and, together, they guided the Indians to a perfect record of 8-0-0.

The next season, Knox was an assistant at Tyrone, Pa., High School, departing in 1956 for a three-year turn as head coach at Ellwood City, Pa., High School.

He landed his first college job at Wake Forest in 1959, working for Demon Deacon coach Paul Amen. After two seasons in Winston-Salem, it was off to Kentucky for the 1961-62 campaigns with Blanton Collier and the Wildcats.

New York Jet skipper Weeb Ewbank gave Knox his first pro position in 1963. The AFL Jets of those years played second fiddle in the Eastern Division to the Buffalo Bills, who collected back-to-back championships in 1964-65. Knox, however, quickly gained respect as an offensive line coach, developing the forward wall that carried the Jets to glory in Super Bowl III as the first AFL team to win a World Championship.

From New York, Knox went to the Detroit Lions. He coached Joe Schmidt's offensive lines from 1967-72, helping the Lions to their last NFL playoff appearance in 1970. The credentials Knox created in New York and built upon in Detroit won him the Los Angeles job in 1973.

For all of his success, Knox remains low key and takes pride in his reputation as a "player's coach."

"I try," he has said, "never to get too low or too high. I have a saying that regardless of what is written about you or your team no one is as good or as bad as he is made out to be. No one likes criticism but you have to understand it's a part of this business."

TOM CATLIN

Assistant Head Coach Defensive Coordinator-Linebackers

Chuck Knox elevated Tom Catlin to the new position of assistant head coach following the 1980 season. According to an informal survey, Catlin is one of only six NFL assistants to be so designated. Catlin continues to coordinate Buffalo's defensive plans, handle the linebackers and assume certain other administrative duties. When Catlin arrived in Buffalo, he took over a defense that was near the bottom of the NFL rankings (23rd among the 28 teams in 1977). The Bills capped a remarkable resurgence when they wound up as the League's number one team in total defense in 1980. Much of the credit must go to the astute Catlin, a former All-America for Bud Wilkinson at the University of Oklahoma. He came to Buffalo with Knox in 1978 after serving for a dozen seasons on the Rams staff (1966-77), the longest continuous coaching stint in the club's history. A native of Ponca City, Okla., Catlin played center and linebacker for the Sooners during the 1950-51-52 seasons. He was drafted by Baltimore but traded to Cleveland where he started midway through his rookie season and called defensive signals for the 1954 NFL Champions. He was in the Air Force during the 1955-56 seasons but stayed in touch with football by coaching the West Point Plebes for one year under Army skipper Earl

"Red" Blaik. Returning to the NFL in 1957 with Cleveland, Catlin played there two more seasons before finishing his career in Philadelphia in 1959. Catlin broke into coaching with Hank Stram and the Dallas Texans, moved with the franchise to Kansas City in 1963 and spent three seasons there before going to LA in 1966. In Los Angeles, Catlin handled the linebackers for three different Rams coaches — George Allen, Tommy Prothro and Knox.

JACK DONALDSON

Receivers

The Jack Donaldson-Chuck Knox relationship dates from their days as assistant coaches with the New York Jets. Donaldson handled the defensive line and backfield for Weeb Ewbank, Knox the offensive line. They started together in 1963 and Donaldson remained five seasons, one more than Knox. When Paul Brown was putting together his new Cincinnati franchise in 1968, Donaldson was the first coach he hired. The Buffalo assistant spent 10 seasons (1968-77) with the Bengals, one working with the defensive line and the next nine the offensive backfield. A 1949 graduate of Ohio State University, Donaldson was a highly-successful high school coach in Ohio for 10 years. He had teams at McArthur, Xenia, Carey and achieved particular success at Perrysburg HS, near Toledo, where he fashioned a 38-8 won-lost mark that included two undefeated seasons and two conference championships. Donaldson was an assistant at the University of Toledo for two years before joining the Jets. Donaldson was added to the Bills staff in 1978.

GEORGE DYER

Defensive Line

The newest member of Coach Chuck Knox's staff is defensive line coach George Dyer, for the past two seasons (1980-81) defensive coordinator of the Arizona State Sun Devils. Dyer succeeds Jim Carmody, who left following last season to become head coach at Southern Mississippi. Dyer went to Tempe from Michigan State in 1980 with Darryl Rogers and promptly turned the ASU defense from a liability into an asset. His 1981 Sun Devils led the tough Pac-10 Conference in rushing defense. Arizona State defenders scored a remarkable seven touchdowns in 1980, Dyer's first season at Tempe. Defensive line coach at Michigan State from 1977-79, Dyer has previous professional experience from three years (1974-76) as defensive line coach of the Winnipeg Blue Bombers in the Canadian League. A graduate of the

University of California at Santa Barbara, where he played center and linebacker and was twice football captain, Dyer immediately embarked on his coaching career as a defensive assistant at Humboldt, Calif., State where he served from 1964-66. Other stops in Dyer's career include: Coalinga, Calif., Junior College, head coach, 1967; Portland, Ore., State University, defensive coordinator, 1968-71; University of Idaho, defensive line coach, 1972, and San Jose State, linebacker coach, 1973.

Chick Harris has handled offensive backs, receivers and defensive backs during his coaching career that includes one previous professional season, with the WFL Detroit Wheels in 1974. An outstanding athlete at Northern Arizona, where he lettered in both football and track, Harris got started in coaching at Colorado State University (1970-71) working with receivers and the passing game. He left CSU in 1972 to join the Long Beach State staff. His Long Beach responsibilities included offensive backs, receivers and the passing game. A scholastic standout at St. John's HS in Washington, D.C., Hawkins played at Maryland under the late Jim Tatum and Tommy Mont. He launched his coaching career at Bishop Denis J. O'Connell HS in Arlington, Va., in 1958. He was a graduate assistant at Maryland a year later (1959) and took a leave of one season to play defensive back for the AFL New York Titans (1960). 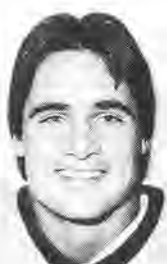

Running Back, Auburn, Draft (#2A-1980) 5-11, 190, Born 1-5-58, 3rd Year

One of the most feared all-purpose performers in professional football ... Only the second back in the history of the Bills (O.J. Simpson the other) to gain one thousand yards in back-to-back seasons ... Final statistics showed 1,097 yards on 257 carries, an average of 4.3 ... Was fifth in the AFC and 12th in the NFL in yards gained rushing ... A 35-yard run from scrimmage against Baltimore, 10/4, was his longest of the '81 regular season but he had two longer scoring runs in the NFL playoffs (45 yards vs. Jets, 44 vs. Bengals) ... At his best in big games as his '81 playoff stats of 173 yards on 30 carries, a 5.8 average, and three touchdowns reflect ... While his rushing total was 88 yards less than 1980, he improved on his pass receiving and all-purpose yardage marks ... Caught 40 passes for 603 yards, a personal single season high, and accounted for seven touchdowns as a pass receiver ... His 159-yard rushing performance against the Colts on 10/4 was the best of his NFL career as was his five reception, 163 yard, three touchdown effort against the Browns on 11/1 ... Hit the century mark three times against Alabama and burned the Tide on the longest run of his collegiate career — 85 yards in 1977 ... Scored 34 touchdowns, 30 of them in his final two seasons ... Rushed for over 1,000 yards as both a junior (1,205) and senior (1,120) ... Scored five TDs in a

1978 game at Vanderbilt ... Set school records for career TDs (34), TDs in one season (16) and single season rushing attempts (253) ... Auburn's top punt returner his final two seasons, ranked fifth in the SEC as a senior ... Caught 30 career passes for 268 yards and one touchdown ... Once carried the ball 288 times without fumbling and had just five fumbles in 657 career rushing attempts ... Among the top five vote-getters in the 1979 Heisman Trophy balloting ... Bills acquired the second choice they used to select Devlin from St. Louis in exchange for defensive end Walt Patulski.

Quarterback, Arkansas, Draft (#3 — 1973)
6-1, 195, Born 4-23-50, 10th Year

Holder of virtually every Buffalo Bills passing mark ... Went over 20,000 yards passing last fall, one of only 30 pro quarterbacks who have exceeded that mark in their NFL lifetime ... Established new single season marks for attempts (498), completions (252) and passing yards (3652) in 1981 and improved on his career standards in all three categories ... Helped the most productive offense in the history of the Buffalo franchise generate a record 3,515 passing yards ... Threw 24 touchdown passes, one short of his personal single season high established in 1975 ... Was at his very best in Bills Monday Night victory over Miami, hitting 20 of 29 attempts for 338 yards and three touchdowns, third best single game performance of his career ... Had one other 300-yard plus game last season (301 at Dallas) and now has seven such marks in nine pro seasons ... Career stats show 127 starts, 1,572 completions in 3,050 attempts for 21,007 yards and 136 touchdowns with 132 interceptions ... His lifetime completion percentage is 51.5% ... Including four playoff appearances, has now been in 131 games for the Bills, tying him with Mike Kadish for third spot on the club's all-time list ... Only time he has missed a start for the Bills was during the 1976 season when he sat out the final seven games with four fractured bones in his lower back ... Owns a current string of 78 consecutive starts behind center, tying him with Ron Jaworski of the Eagles for the most straight starting appearances by an NFL quarterback ... Has guided Buffalo into the playoffs three times, twice as the "wild card" team (1974, 1981) and as the AFC East Champion in 1980 ... Has passed for 814 yards and six touchdowns in playoff starts ... Orchestrated Buffalo's first post-season victory since 1965 at Shea Stadium on 12/27/81 when he tossed for 268 yards (17 of 34) and two touchdowns in "wild card" win over the Jets ... Gave a courageous performance in the 1980 playoffs at San Diego when, despite a badly sprained ankle that rendered him virtually helpless, had Buffalo on top 14-13 before a San Diego rally in the final two minutes finished the Bills ... Only Buffalo quarterback to pass for more than 300 yards four times in one season (1979) and to exceed 3,000 yards passing in a campaign (1979, 1981) ... Tossed a team record five TDs against the Jets on 9/23/79 (four to Jerry Butler) and hit for 367 yards, a personal high mark but 11 short of Jack Kemp's record 378 vs. Houston in 1964, in the same game against New York ... Once hit on 15 of 18 passes, a club record percentage of 83.3, in a game against Kansas City on 10/1/78 ... Established two NFL marks in 1976, the season cut short by seven games due to an injury, when he threw only one interception in 151 attempts, the fewest interceptions by a quarterback in a season and the lowest interception rate (0.66) ... Threw scoring passes in 12 consecutive games in 1975, another club mark ... Longest completion of his career was a 92-yard touchdown pitch to Frank Lewis vs. Miami on 9/17/78 ... Was a third round draft choice of the Bills in 1973, the 57th player taken that year.

COLLEGE/PERSONAL: An All-America quarterback at Arkansas where he set numerous passing records for Coach Frank Broyles' team ... Named MVP in the Southwest Conference as a junior ... Selected to play in the North-South Game and Hula Bowl ... Also named to the College All-Star squad which used to play the NFL champion in a pre-season game ... A native of Alvin, Tex., Joe and his wife, Sandi, now reside in Natchitoches, La. ... Full name is Joe Carlton Ferguson Jr. ... Has a B.S. degree in physical education ... Attended Woodlawn High School in Shreveport, La., as did Terry Bradshaw of the Steelers ... Buffalo's representative for the 1980 United Way television spots ... Also has done a number of other television and radio spots on behalf of charitable organizations including Roswell Park Memorial Institute in Buffalo, known world-wide for its research in the field of cancer and for treatment of cancer patients ... Is a pilot and owns a single engine Cessna ... Has worked with the quarterbacks during spring practice at Northwestern (La.) State University in Natchitoches the last seven years ... Has the longest consecutive game string on the squad at 106, the last 55 as a starter ... After leading the '80 squad in interceptions with seven, did not pick off a pass in '81 ... Made 12 tackles in two playoff appearances last fall and had an interception against the Jets erased by a penalty ... Finished in a fourth place tie in the AFC interception rankings in 1980 ... Has returned three interceptions for touchdowns, including two in the last three seasons ... Had a 47-yard scoring return for Buffalo's only touchdown in a 10-7 win over the Rams in 1980 ... Ranks tenth on Buffalo's career interception list with 13 ... Only two ex-Bills, Butch Byrd and Tom Janik with five each, have had more career interceptions for TDs ... Freeman relishes his role in run support: "You just have to stuff the hole," he says. "Sometimes you're just an extra linebacker. Buffalo, N.Y., Jan. 1, 1967 — Led by the impeccable quarterbacking of Len Dawson, the Kansas City Chiefs earned the right to play the Green Bay Packers in Super Bowl I by defeating Buffalo 31-7. Dawson completed 16 of 24 passes for 227 yards and a pair of touchdowns while the Kansas City defense forced four Buffalo turnovers and limited the Bills to nine first downs and 40 yards rushing. It was a turnover that turned the game around. The teams traded early touchdowns as the Chiefs took advantage of a Buffalo fumble on the opening kickoff to grab a 7-0 lead. The Bills countered with a 69-yard bomb from Jack Kemp to Elbert Dubenion to tie the game. Dawson hit Otis Taylor with a 29-yard TD pass in the second quarter to put the Chiefs on top, but Kemp moved Buffalo into scoring position near the end of the half. A Johnny Robinson interception and long return set up Mike Mercer's 32-yard field goal with three seconds left in the half and Kansas City had the momentum. Buffalo never penetrated the Chief's 40-yard line in the second half while Kansas City added a pair of scores by Mike Garrett to turn the game into a rout.

Pittsburgh, Pa., Dec. 22, 1974 — A four-touchdown explosion in the second quarter propelled the Pittsburgh Steelers to a 32-14 win over the Bills, spoiling Buffalo's first post-season appearance in eight years. The Bills moved out to an early 7-3 lead on a 22-yard touchdown pass from Joe Ferguson to Paul Seymour. Buffalo's advantage was short-lived against the eventual Super Bowl Champions. Terry Bradshaw ran the Steeler offense to perfection in the second quarter, completing seven of eight passes for 143 yards and repeatedly hurting Buffalo with scrambling gains. Rocky Bleier began the Pittsburgh scoring avalanche with a 27-yard TD reception and Franco Harris scored three times from inside the five yard line as the Steelers moved out to an insurmountable 29-7 lead. In the second half Buffalo's comeback hopes were stymied by the tough Pittsburgh defense and a stubborn ball control offense that kept the ball away from the Bills.

CHARGERS 20, BILLS 14

San Diego, Calif., Jan. 3 — Making their first playoff appearance since 1974, the Bills had a victory within their grasp until the waning moments. Then, in dramatic fashion, the San Diego Chargers rallied from a 14-13 deficit as Quarterback Dan Fouts connected with Wide Receiver Ron Smith on a 50-yard scoring pass with just 2:08 remaining in the game. The reception was only the fifth of the season for Smith. Playing courageously on a badly sprained left ankle, Quarterback Joe Ferguson tried to direct a last ditch bid by the Bills. His efforts were thwarted, however, when a pass was picked off by a San Diego defender after Buffalo had reached midfield. Meeting for the second time at San Diego within a three-month span, the teams battled on even terms until the Chargers got a late first quarter field goal. Then the Bills took command with two second period scores. The first came on a one-yard burst up the middle by Roosevelt Leaks early in the quarter. With only 16 seconds remaining before halftime, Ferguson connected with wide receiver Frank Lewis on a 9-yard scoring play, upping the Bills' margin to 14-3. San Diego countered with a third quarter TD and fourth period field goal before the late heroics by Fouts and Smith. With Ferguson badly hobbled by his ankle injury, the Buffalo offense never got into gear in the second half, managing just 94 total yards. Even so, it took a spectacular play to keep the Bills from achieving their third consecutive win over the Chargers in playoff competition, the last one coming in the 1965 AFL title game.

BILLS 31, JETS 27

NEW YORK, N.Y., Dec. 27, 1981 — In a "wild card" game that lived up to its name, the Buffalo Bills stormed to a 24-0 lead but needed a last-second pass interception by Bill Simpson to preserve their first post-season victory since 1965. Charles Romes got the visitors off and winging by picking up Bruce Harper's fumble on the opening kickoff and returning it 26 yards for a touchdown. The play took 16 seconds and was the second fastest score in NFL playoff history. Touchdown passes of 50 and 26 yards to Frank Lewis, who caught seven for 158 yards in the game, were sandwiched around a 29-yard Nick Mike-Mayer field goal to put the Bills, who lost in New York 33-14 during the regular season, up by 24-0. The Jets hung up 10 points before halftime and trailed 24-13 after Pat Leahy's 19-yard field goal in the third quarter. Joe Cribbs, who rushed for 83 yards and caught passes for 64 more, staked the Bills to a 31-13 lead with his 45-yard scoring run five minutes deep into the final period. The Jets, however, refused to die. Richard Todd moved them 80 yards in eight plays, hitting Bobby Jones with a 30-yard touchdown toss. After Buffalo failed to move, Todd, helped by a big interference call against Mario Clark that wiped out an apparent interception, got New York on the board again with a 58-yard march that ended on Kevin Long's one-yard plunge to paydirt. Buffalo could not generate a first down and turned the ball back to New York at the Jets' 20 with 2:36 remaining. Todd passed the Jets downfield, reaching the Buffalo 11 with just 10 seconds to play. Simpson stepped in front of his second-and-ten try for Derrick Gaffney in the end zone to intercept at the Buffalo one to seal the Jets' doom.

BENGALS 28, BILLS 21

CINCINNATI, OHIO, Jan. 3, 1982 — AFC Champion Cincinnati, cashing in on a long punt return and a pass interception, jumped to a 14-0 first quarter lead and held on to defeat Buffalo 28-21 in a divisional playoff game at Riverfront Stadium. It was the first post-season victory in the history of the Bengals franchise and, for the second straight year, eliminated the Bills in the semi-finals of the NFL's post-season tournament. The Bengals' Mike Fuller returned a Greg Cater punt 27 yards to start Cincinnati's first possession at the Buffalo 42. Charles Alexander, who was a surprise rushing leader for the Central Division champs with 71 yards, capped a seven-play drive with his four-yard scoring run. After Ken Riley intercepted a Joe Ferguson pass, the Bengals marched

48 yards in eight plays and took a 14-0 advantage on Pete Johnson's one-yard run. Buffalo breathed new life just before halftime, hitting a 54-yard pass from Ferguson to Jerry Butler, and drawing to within 14-7 on Joe Cribbs' one-yard run. Early in the third quarter, the Bills evened the issue on a 44-yard scoring run by Cribbs, a play that would later prove costly as the Buffalo rushing leader injured a knee and played only one more down before retiring for the afternoon. The teams traded touchdowns, Cincinnati scoring on a 20-yard run by Alexander and Buffalo on a 21-yard pass from Ferguson to Butler, to make it 21-21 after one play of the fourth quarter. Bengal quarterback Ken Anderson orchestrated a 78-yard drive in nine plays to put Cincinnati back in the driver's seat 28-21 on a 16-yard scoring pass to Cris Collinsworth. Buffalo's last gasp reached the Bengal 20 late in the final stanza but a controversial delay-of-game penalty wiped out an apparent third down conversion pass to Lou Piccone and Ferguson overthrew Roland Hooks in the end zone on fourth down.

STADIUM INFORMATION

Orchard Park is headquarters for NFL football in Western New York. Before a sellout crowd of 80,020, the Buffalo Bills dedicated their spanking new playing facility on August 17, 1973. While the visiting Washington Redskins captured the inaugural game 37-21, even defeat could not dull the enthusiasm of fans who had long awaited completion of the project.

Built on a 113-acre tract approximately 30 minutes from downtown Buffalo, the stadium was constructed at a cost of \$22 million, financed by the taxpayers of Erie County. From the ground-breaking on April 4, 1972, to the inaugural, actual construction time was slightly over 14 months.

To form the lower level of the stadium more than 370,000 feet of shale was removed — putting the field 50 feet below ground level. The outside of the stadium rises only 60 feet above the horizon. The AstroTurf field has an 18-inch crown to assure proper drainage.

Surrounding the stadium are parking facilities for 16,000 cars and 300 buses. Scattered throughout the concourses are 38 concession stands and 42 rest rooms.

Ralph C. Wilson, Jr., was granted the seventh franchise in the new American Football League on October 17, 1959. The Bills opened their first training camp at East Aurora, N.Y., on July 10, 1960, and played in the first AFL game, a pre-season clash with the Boston Patriots, on July 30, 1960. The Bills first coach was Buster Ramsey and their first draft choice was Penn State quarterback Richie Lucas.

Buffalo won back-to-back AFL Championships in 1964-65 and was champion of the AFL Eastern Division in 1966. The Bills won the AFC Eastern Division crown again in 1980. The Bills moved from War Memorial Stadium, which had been their home since the birth of the franchise, to Rich Stadium in Orchard Park in 1973, losing the inaugural game there 37-21 to the Washington Redskins on August 17.

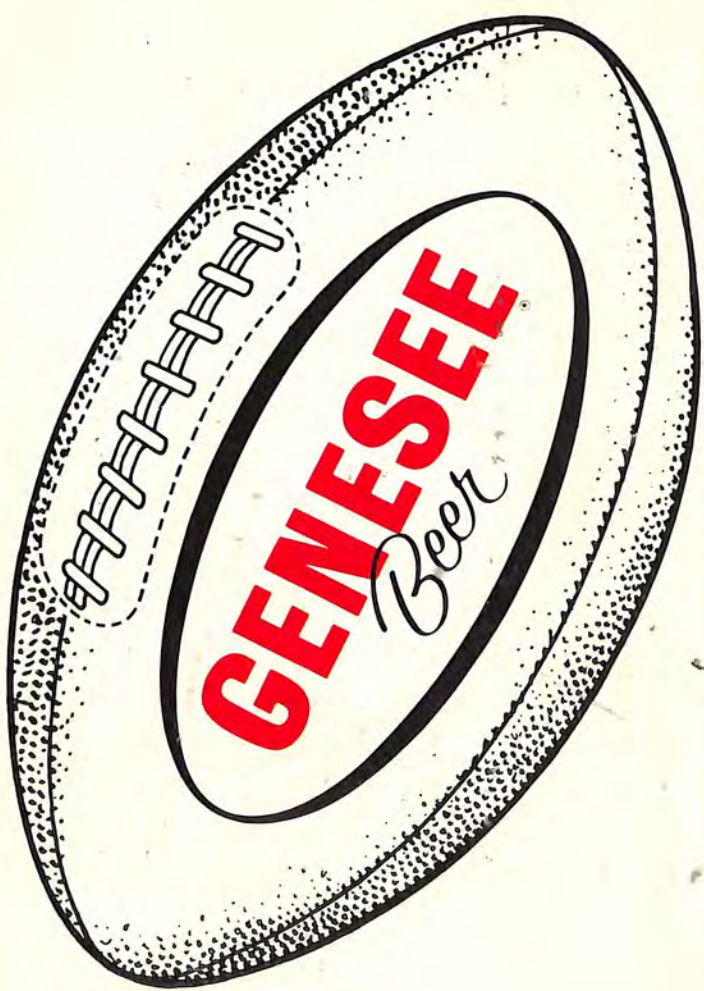
