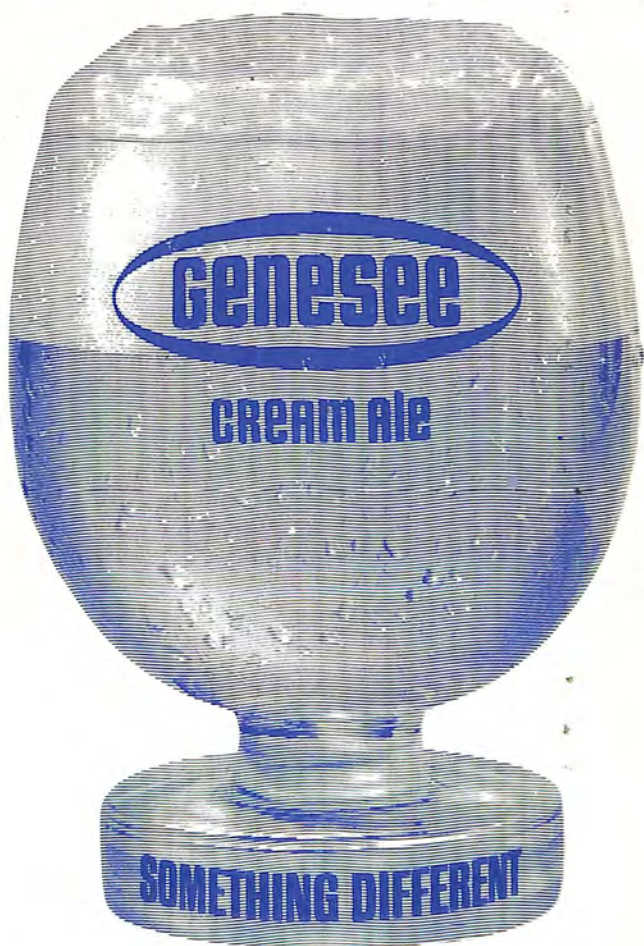

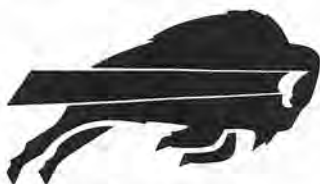

RALPH C. WILSON, JR.
President and Owner



Ralph Wilson marks his Silver Anniversary in professional football this fall.

The only owner of the Buffalo Bills since they joined the American Football League as a charter member in 1960, Wilson has watched them grow from a struggling infant into the full flower of manhood.

He has tasted the sweet success of two American Football League championships (1964-65) and endured the frustration of the 1968 and 1971 seasons, when the Bills won only one game in each.

He watched one of his players, O.J. Simpson, become the dominant offensive player of the 1970's and saw another, quarterback Jack Kemp, win a landslide election to the U.S. House of Representatives.

For Ralph Wilson, football has been important since he was a young man, accompanying his father to University of Detroit and Detroit Lion games. "I was an avid fan in the early part of my teens," Wilson recalls. "I could see the interest developing in professional football in the days of Leon Hart, Bobby Layne and Doak Walker. We could see how popular the sport was becoming."

Wilson's enthusiasm for professional football led him to first purchase a minority share in the NFL Detroit Lions and later to join ranks with Lamar Hunt and the other members of "The Foolish Club" in an ambitious, but risky, venture known as the American Football League.

In the beginning there were indignities, like dressing in the boiler room below a high school gym because the principal didn't want "pros" using the locker room, but "The Foolish Club" persevered and finally merged with the older National Football League.

Looking back on the formative days of the AFL, Wilson says he "never thought about throwing in the towel, never considered selling the team. Of course, in the first three years we lost money. There were times when I reminded myself I used to pay five dollars for a ticket to the Lions' games and I enjoyed myself and had no headaches. I would ask myself what I was doing here."

It was Wilson and the late Carroll Rosenbloom, then owner of the Baltimore Colts, who had the first tentative talks in January, 1965, that eventually led to the AFL-NFL merger. A past president of the AFL,

Wilson served as a member of the expansion committee and the AFL-NFL Negotiations Committee.

He was also prominent in the negotiations which resulted in a 1977 agreement between the NFL Management Council and the NFL Players Association. Just this year, Wilson was named to a two-year term on the Board of Directors of NFL Charities. He joins AFC President Lamar Hunt, NFC President Wellington Mara, NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle, Congressman Jack Kemp, Lowell Perry and David Mahoney on the distinguished panel. Since its inception in 1973, NFL Charities has made grant commitments totaling more than \$5 million.

A native of Detroit since moving there with his family as a youngster, Wilson earned his undergraduate degree from the University of Virginia and later attended the University of Michigan Law School. He enlisted in the Navy during World War II, earning his commission within a year and serving aboard mine-sweepers in both the Atlantic and Pacific theatres.

Among many business pursuits, Wilson is president of the Ralph C. Wilson Insurance Agency. Other enterprises under the "Wilson Industries" banner include two television stations, an oil drilling company, a construction firm, tool and die manufacturing companies and a number of other businesses.

Wilson's interest in sports extends beyond football. He owns a stable of thoroughbred race horses and is an avid tennis player, skier and golfer.

From the inception of the Bills, Wilson has played a dynamic and active role in the organization. He is determined in his effort to bring two things—"winning football and a Super Bowl trophy"—to the NFL faithful of Western New York.

The weekly publication, Football News, recognized Wilson's contribution to the game in 1973 when it named him NFL "Man-of-the-Year." "He has been a tower of strength in the administration of professional football," the newspaper said.

PATRICK J. McGRODER, Jr. Sr. Executive Vice President



Since the foundation of the Buffalo franchise in 1960, Pat McGroder has been a vital part of the Bills' operation. Ralph Wilson, his friend for 25 years, admits he's never met "a more dynamic personality or a more knowledgeable businessman."

Just a year ago, McGroder stepped in on an interim basis to handle the delicate matter of player negotiations and did an outstanding job in what can be one of the most complex and sensitive assignments in all of professional sports.

"Pat has done a wonderful job for the franchise," Wilson said. "He is going to remain with us as Senior Executive Vice President."

McGroder is coordinating many of the Bills' Silver Anniversary plans in addition to supervising the club's activity in the marketing and promotion areas. He also conducts the advertising sales and handles a variety of other activities at the executive level.

A native of Buffalo, McGroder nearly landed an NFL franchise for the city during the late 1950's when he promoted a series of professional football games at War Memorial Stadium. Pittsburgh Steelers chairman of the board Art Rooney has been a friend of McGroder for more than 30 years. Rooney was impressed by Pat's love of his hometown:

"I've never met a man who cared more for his city and the people in his city than Pat McGroder...I don't believe anybody could think more of his city than Pat thinks of Buffalo."

In addition to Rooney, McGroder had a long-standing friendship with the late George Halas, president of the Chicago Bears and one of the founding fathers of the NFL.

When pro football came to Buffalo in 1960, it was the American Football League, not the NFL, that set up shop in War Memorial Stadium. The chairman of the city's Board of Stadium and Memorial Auditorium, McGroder reached agreement with Ralph Wilson on a lease for the fledgling pro football team and a new friendship was formed that endures to the present day.

An All-High guard and tackle for St. Joseph's Collegiate Institute, McGroder played for the University of Chattanooga. The son of a West Side grocer, he got into the liquor retailing business as a salesman for W.A. Taylor Importers, rising to National Sales Representative. He left Taylor to form his own firm, McKinley Liquor Company.

In addition to the stadium post he held at the time he met Ralph Wilson, McGroder also served the city

as Parks Commissioner and Coordinator of Planning and Development. He was the winner of the Chamber of Commerce's "Good Government" award in 1958.

A past president of the Police Athletic League, McGroder was the Buffalo Athletic Club's choice as "Sportsman of the Year" in 1955.

At Wilson's insistence, McGroder joined the Bills' front office staff soon after the team's formation and he has remained involved in the club for each of its 24 years in Buffalo.

TERRY BLEDSOE

General Manager and Vice President-Administration



Former New York Giants executive Terry Bledsoe, whose background includes such diverse subjects as sportswriting, labor-management negotiations and player contract bargaining, was appointed to the post of General Manager and Vice President-Administration on December 10, 1983.

Bledsoe, 49, has responsibility for the business operations of the team, handles player negotiations and serves with Owner Ralph C. Wilson as the Bills' representatives at National Football League meetings.

Assistant General Manager of the Giants for five and a half years (1978-83), Bledsoe first became acquainted with Wilson when he was working with the NFL Management Council and Wilson was a member of the League's labor committee. Bledsoe joined the Management Council in 1973 and, as assistant executive director, was one of the four negotiators who represented the clubs in talks leading to the landmark 1977 Collective Bargaining Agreement.

In 1982, Bledsoe was a member of Jack Donlan's negotiating team in bargaining toward a succeeding agreement.

"The vital part of a relationship, more specifically a negotiation, is to allow both sides to enter and leave it with dignity," Bledsoe said at the time of his appointment. "It is desperately important that the players and employees of an organization feel they're being treated fairly."

While born in Chicago, Bledsoe was raised in Clinton, Iowa, after his father was fatally wounded at the Battle of the Bulge.

He originally enrolled at St. Ambrose College in

Davenport, Iowa, and transferred to the University of Iowa where he earned his degree in journalism in 1956.

Bledsoe was a sportswriter and columnist for the Milwaukee Journal for 11 years, covering the Green Bay Packers from 1962-73 and Marquette University from 1962-68. He wrote a sports column from 1966-73 and was chosen Wisconsin "Sportswriter of the Year" in four straight years, until he entered professional football in 1973.

Bledsoe and his wife, Shirley, have six children—Anne, Chris, Tom, Katie, Carolyn and Ellie.

NORM POLLOM

Vice President—Player Personnel

One of the most astute judges of football talent in the business, Norm Pollom was promoted to Vice President—Player Personnel in March, 1983, after serving for the previous five years as director of the Bills' college scouting department. In his new capacity, Pollom will be responsible for the acquisition of talent, assist with player negotiations and continue to coordinate the team's college and pro scouting departments. Pollom joined the Buffalo organization in 1978. The native of Chehalis, Wash., was a scouting and personnel specialist with the Los Angeles Rams for 16 years and worked one year with the Tampa Bay Bucs. Pollom graduated from Puget Sound, where he played offensive and defensive end, in 1950. He coached seven years in Pacific Northwest high schools, putting together a scholastic won-lost record of 54-16-2. Named to Jim Owens' Washington staff in 1957, Pollom was with the Huskies for three seasons and had a hand in the 44-8 victory over Wisconsin in the 1960 Rose Bowl game. He left in 1960 to take a position on John McKay's Southern California staff. From SC, Pollom went into the educational field, serving four years as assistant principal of Palo Verdes, Calif., Unified High Schools. He started work-

ing for the Rams as a part-time scout while a school administrator and joined the Los Angeles organization fulltime in 1965. When he left the Rams in 1976, Pollom was Director of Player Personnel.

Tickets have always been Jim Cipriano's business. The likable native of Youngstown, Ohio, was named Bills' Ticket Director in April, 1969. Prior to his Buffalo appointment, Cipriano was Assistant Business Manager of Athletics for 12 years at the University of Pittsburgh.

KAY STEPHENSON

Vice President Football Operations and Head Coach

In a game that puts a high premium on experience and sophistication, Kay Stephenson proved that youth is no liability.

Last fall, as the youngest head coach in the National Football League at age 39, Stephenson brought the Bills to within a breath of a winning season and kept their playoff hopes glimmering until the final Sunday of the regular season. Of the coaches in their first NFL season, only one, John Robinson of the Rams who finished 9-7, posted a record superior to Stephenson's "rookie" mark of 8-8 in Buffalo.

Stephenson kept the Bills in the chase despite what many considered the worst run of injuries in the history of the franchise. Twenty-two players, ten of them starters, missed at least one game.

Kay Stephenson did an exceptional job in his rookie year," BUFFALO NEWS Sports Editor Larry Felser wrote. "Buffalo lost more players per game than any team in the NFL in 1983. The team with the next most grievous casualty list was 32 missed games less than the Bills."

Another veteran professional football observer, columnist Len Shapiro of the WASHINGTON POST and PRO FOOTBALL WEEKLY, recognized Stephenson's achievements by hailing him as the NFL's "best first-year coach."

Following the campaign, Stephenson and his Buffalo staff were selected to coach the North team in the annual Senior Bowl Classic at Mobile, Ala. It was the first visit to Mobile for a Buffalo coaching staff since 1972.

Stephenson prefers to pass around any praise for the Bills' courageous efforts of a year ago. "We got an exceptional effort from our players," he says. "When someone went down with an injury, every man on the team seemed to accelerate his performance. We never got down on ourselves and, for all of the problems we encountered, never believed our situation was anything but positive."

While Stephenson's maturity, boldness and judgment were unveiled for the first time to many, such qualities came as no surprise to friends like Bill Carr and Bum Phillips and to Ralph Wilson, president of the Bills.

"Anyone who saw him under fire would see that he has a great capacity to perform under stress," Carr, a Pensacola HS teammate who is now athletic director at the University of Florida, said, "...You could see that resilience in him. Some of his better qualities were displayed under stressful situations."

Phillips, whose friendship with Stephenson dates



from the early 1960's in San Diego, says Stephenson "is a level guy, and those are the kind of guys I like—guys who aren't going to be up one minute and down the next. He's one of the more stable young people I've ever seen."

At the February 1, 1983 press conference called to announce Stephenson's appointment as the successor to Chuck Knox, Wilson said "a young person like Kay should be given the chance and I know he'll do an outstanding job for us."

No newcomer to Western New York, Stephenson was Buffalo's regular quarterback for three games in 1968, taking the starting job vs. Houston and calling the signals until he suffered a fractured collarbone against Miami on November 10, 1968. He completed 19 of 79 passes for 364 yards and four touchdowns.

Stephenson is the first former Buffalo player to serve as the Bills' head coach and the second youngest man ever to hold the position (Joe Collier was the youngest.)

A native of Pensacola, Fla., Stephenson was a prep All-State quarterback in high school who elected to enroll at the University of Florida which also recruited a promising youngster named Steve Spurrier. "He always had a great understanding of football," says Ray Graves, Florida coach at the time. "You know, sometimes the guys on the sidelines, not in the game, can learn those fine points that turn you to coaching. He was a smart quarterback in college. He simply came along at the wrong time."

Following his graduation, Stephenson earned a free agent contract with the San Diego Chargers where he spent one season before being traded to Buffalo in 1968. Injured again in 1969, he had brief stints with Oakland and Atlanta before retiring in 1970.

He broke into coaching as a college assistant at Rice University in 1971. Out of football in 1972, Kay returned as athletic director and head coach at Baker, Fla., High School in 1973. He played one year with the WFL Jacksonville Sharks in 1974 and, a year later, served in the dual capacity of offensive coordinator and director of player personnel for the Jacksonville franchise.

After a year away from the game in 1976, Stephenson was tapped for Knox's Los Angeles staff in 1977 and worked with Ram quarterbacks Pat Haden and Joe Namath during LA's Western Division championship season. He followed Knox from LA to Buffalo in 1978.

As the Bills' quarterback coach, he had a hand in assembling the most productive offense in the history of the franchise, which took Buffalo to a second straight playoff appearance in 1981 by accumulating 5,640 yards in 16 games.

Stephenson feels fortunate to have been associated with outstanding football coaches throughout his grid lifetime:

"It started at Pensacola High and at the University of Florida. I had great coaches at both places, includ-

ing assistant coaches, and both programs were outstanding. I didn't play much at Florida, but I was there when the Gators were as good as they've ever been. Then I was under Sid Gillman as a player with the Chargers and he was instrumental in a lot of offensive things I picked up."

"Charlie Tate, coach of the Jacksonville team in the WFL, was one of the soundest football people I've ever been around. And, Chuck Knox was very special. He gave me coaching jobs with the Rams and here in Buffalo and there was so much I learned from him."

ORCHARD PARK, N.Y., Sept. 4—Those who thought they were watching an instant replay could be forgiven. For the second straight year, the Buffalo-Miami game at Rich Stadium was marked by the Buffalo defense's refusal to surrender a touchdown to the Dolphin's offense only to watch Miami escape with a victory on the toe of placekicker Uwe von Schamann. The Dolphins won 12-0 on four von Schamann field goals (33, 23, 36 and 50 yards). On November 21st last year, the result was much the same—no Dolphins touchdowns but three von Schamann field goals in a 9-7 Miami triumph. For the Bills' offensive unit, it was an afternoon of total frustration. Buffalo had the edge in total yards (258-177), first downs (14-13) and passing yards (172-26) but nothing to show for it on the scoreboard. The Bills' only scoring opportunities were three Fred Steinfort field goals—one blocked and the other two unsuccessful. Quarterback Joe Ferguson passed for 233 yards but was sacked an uncharacteristic six times and suffered two interceptions, both of which led to Dolphin field goals. Veteran defensive end Ben Williams was a terror for the Bills. Williams had three sacks, participated in nine tackles, forced a fumble and recovered a fumble.

ORCHARD PARK, N.Y., Sept. 18—Quarterback Joe Ferguson, who had thrown only three scoring passes in his last nine games, came roaring out of his personal slump with three touchdown tosses to bring the Bills from behind four times in a 28-23 victory over the pesky Baltimore Colts. The Colts led 6-0, 9-7, 16-14 and 23-21 before finally bowing. Ferguson hit 18 of 27 passes for the afternoon, including scoring strikes to Frank Lewis and Joe Cribbs twice. It was the Ferguson to Cribbs combination that produced Buffalo's first and last touchdowns of the afternoon. Ferguson found Cribbs on a three-yard pitch in the second quarter to cap a march of 67 yards in 11 plays. They clicked again in the final period, this time for the game-winner of two yards to finish off a short push of 14 yards in three plays set up by Chris Keating's recovery of a Mike Pagel fumble. Cribbs led all of the game's rushers with 82 yards on 24 carries, had three catches for 14 yards and scored three TDs (including one of one-yard rushing) for only the second time in his four-year NFL career. Baltimore's long-range striking power wrote a finish to Buffalo's string of 20 quarters without surrendering a touchdown at Rich Stadium.

BUFFALO 30, HOUSTON 13

ORCHARD PARK, N.Y., Sept. 25—With Joe Cribbs running for a personal high of 166 rushing yards, Buffalo mounted a productive ground game to polish off another "jinx" team, defeating the Oilers 30-13 for the first time since 1966. Houston had reeled off 10 straight victories in the series, the longest current streak by one team over another in the National Football League. Buffalo had its best rushing total of the young season, accumulating 228 yards on 32 attempts—the Bills' best single game total on the ground since they rolled up 245 yards vs. the Colts on Nov. 28, 1982. Cribbs collected 166 yards on 22 carries to surpass his top previous total of 159 vs. Baltimore in 1981. He scored the first Buffalo touchdown on a one-yard run. Booker Moore, the ex-Penn State fullback making his first start for the Bills, turned in his best single game performance to date with 62 yards on ten carries. With the running game functioning efficiently, Ferguson tried only 22 passes but cashed in on two of his eleven completions for touchdowns to Jerry Butler and Frank Lewis. The Buffalo defense recorded seven quarterback sacks and turned in the first defensive touchdown since December 7, 1980. Rookie David Kilson did the honors, scooping up a fumble by Houston quarterback Gifford Nielsen, forced by Ken Johnson's sack, and going a record 87 yards for the final TD.

NEW YORK JETS 34, BUFFALO 10

ORCHARD PARK, N.Y., Oct. 3—ABC Television's primetime spotlight brought out the best in the New York Jets and the worst in the Buffalo Bills as Richard Todd's passes and Mark Gastineau's dances beat a 34-10 tattoo on the Bills before 79,933, largest crowd ever to see a regular season game in Rich Stadium. Despite a wide statistical edge, the Jets managed only a 7-0 halftime lead as the Buffalo defense turned aside two New York drives into Bills' territory, one ending on an abortive field goal try of 38 yards by Pat Leahy and the other crumbling when Chris Williams intercepted Todd in the end zone. New York moved up 10-0 on Leahy's 19-yard field goal in the third period but Buffalo counterattacked quickly with Joe Ferguson completing three passes and making two key runs to put the ball deep in New York territory. On a third and goal from the Jets one, however, Joe Cribbs fumbled and New York recovered. Ferguson suffered a slight concussion in the third quarter drive and was sidelined for the remainder of the evening. Matt Kofler, who had not thrown a pass in his brief career of 13 NFL games, came into a tight spot on his first series. The Bills were backed up to their own one-yard line by a Chuck Ramsey punt. On first down, Cribbs got the call and fumbled with Gastineau recovering in the end zone for a Jet touchdown. Gastineau also recorded three quarterback sacks for the Jets' defense, which dumped Ferguson and Kofler a total of seven times.

BUFFALO 38, MIAMI 35

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 9—Kicker Joe Danelo sent a 36-yard field goal squarely between the uprights to end 17 years of frustration for the Buffalo Bills, who had not defeated Miami in the Orange Bowl since 1966. Danelo's kick, which came with 1:02 remaining in overtime and produced a 38-35 Buffalo triumph, triggered a wild celebration by Buffalo players, not one of whom had ever been part of a victory over the Dolphins in Miami. Bills' quarterback Joe Ferguson, who had his share of Orange Bowl trauma in eleven starting assignments against the Dolphins there, had the most brilliant afternoon of his 11-year NFL career, setting six different Buffalo passing records and tying two others as triggerman of the Bills' high-octane attack. Ferguson completed 38 of 55 passes for 419 yards, all individual and team marks, and connected for five touchdowns, which tied the Bills record in both departments. For awhile, it appeared Miami's mastery might continue for another year. Buffalo squandered an early lead of 14-0 and, after edging in front 28-21 early in the fourth quarter, saw the Dolphins rally to a 35-28 lead with just 3:06 to play. Ferguson saved the Bills from cardiac arrest with a march of 80 yards in 13 plays, capped by a one-yard scoring pass to Joe Cribbs in a fourth and goal situation with only 23 seconds remaining. In the drive, Ferguson hit a monstrous third down and 16 pass to Byron Franklin (for 20 yards) and converted a big third and three situation with a 10-yard toss to Mark Brammer. Miami had two shots at winning in the overtime period but long field goal attempts of 52 and 43 yards by Uwe von Schamann misfired. Buffalo began its winning drive from its own 26 with 5:15 left in the extra period. After picking up one

first down, Ferguson was faced with a third and 10 situation at the Buffalo 36, Frank Lewis, one of his most trusted receiving partners, was on the sidelines for a breather from the 80-degree day and second-year man Mike Mosley was in the unfamiliar flanker position. Ferguson went right to Mosley for a 35-yard gain that put Buffalo in business at the Dolphin 29-yard line. Three plays later, Danelo kicked the winning field goal.

BUFFALO 30, BALTIMORE 7

BALTIMORE, Md., Oct. 16—The showdown for first place in the AFC East turned into a Joe Ferguson—Joe Cribbs hoedown as Buffalo's two big offensive weapons personally accounted for 335 yards in a surprisingly-easy 30-7 victory over the Baltimore Colts. Both teams went into the games with 4-2 marks tied for top spot in the division standings. The Colts moved 75 yards on their first possession only to come up empty when Randy McMillan fumbled at the goal line and the ball rolled out of the end zone for a touchback. ORCHARD PARK, N.Y., Nov. 20—A 36-yard field goal by Matt Bahr with no time left spoiled the Bills' spirited comeback as the Raiders posted a 27-24 win before 72,393 fans at Rich Stadium. Trailing 24-3 following a 15-yard pass from Jim Plunkett to Todd Christensen just over four minutes into the final period, Buffalo put together a furious rally behind backup quarterback Matt Kofler, who had replaced an injured Joe Ferguson in the second period. Kofler strung together four straight completions following the score and teamed up with rookie tight end Tony Hunter on a 23-yard scoring toss to help Buffalo pull within two scores, 24-10. Three minutes later the Bills struck again, thanks to a big play by their defense when it forced punter Ray Guy to run on fourth down which resulted in a 10-yard loss. Four plays later, Joe Cribbs dove in from a yard out to cut the margin to 24-17. The Bills special teams came through once again following Cribbs' TD. Rookie Darryl Caldwell recovered the ensuing kickoff at the Raiders' 23-yard line and it took Buffalo just four plays to score. Kofler continued his magic with just over four minutes left when he hit Perry Tuttle with a 28-yard TD on fourth and 15. However, that would be the last time that Buffalo would touch the ball in the game. The Raiders used up the remaining time behind Plunkett and drove 65 yards in 13 plays with Bahr's field goal capping the drive. Kofler finished the day with nine completions in 14 attempts, including seven of 10 in the second half for 111 yards.

ANAHEIM, Calif., Nov. 27—Quarterback Vince Ferragamo and rookie running back sensations Eric Dickerson proved to be the offensive heroes and Johnny Johnson and Eric Harris spearheaded the defense as the Los Angeles Rams posted a 41-17 win over the Bills at Anaheim Stadium. Ferragamo tossed three TD passes in the win and Dickerson rolled up 125 yards on 32 carries as the Rams' defense intercepted five Joe Ferguson passes all in the second half. Harris and Johnson each had two thefts as Joe Ferguson suffered through one of his worst second halves as a pro. The Bills actually hung in until early in the fourth period when the roof caved in. Trailing at the half, 14-7, Buffalo managed to stay within a TD until early in the fourth period following a 20-yard field goal by Joe Danelo which made it 24-17, but the Bills were unable to put another score on the board after that. On the other hand, the Rams got a 15-yard TD from Ferragamo to Preston Dennard, (his second TD of the game) a 49-yard field goal from Mike Lansford and a 60-yard interception return by Johnson which broke open the game. Both of Johnson's interceptions came in the final period and came on subsequent Buffalo possessions. The Bills did get solid efforts in the loss from Byron Franklin and Booker Moore. Franklin caught four passes for 106 yards which included a 43-yard TD, while Moore had eight receptions for 63 yards. Statistically, it was a close game. BUFFALO 14, KANSAS CITY 9

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 4—Running back Joe Cribbs rushed for a career high 185 yards and some big plays by the Buffalo defense were the keys in the Bills 14-9 win over Kansas City at Arrowhead Stadium. Cribbs set personal bests in both the number of rushes and single game yardage with his 36 carry, 185-yard effort. It was also the second year in succession that Buffalo had held Kansas City without a touchdown in a game. The Bills posted a 14-9 win in 1982, staving off a late KC rally with an interception just as they did on this afternoon at Arrowhead Stadium. Ironically, when Chris Williams' intercepted a Bill Kenney pass at the Buffalo 26-yard line with just 1:08 left, it was almost a similar situation to a year earlier when Bill Simpson halted a KC drive with a last minute interception. The Bills struck first when Joe Ferguson teamed up with Perry Tuttle from 17-yards out in the second period before a pair of Nick Lowery field goals drew the Chiefs within one, 7-6. However, the Bills defense came up with one of the many big plays it turned in during the game early in the final period when safety Mike Kennedy intercepted a Kenney pass and raced in from 22 yards out to help Buffalo build a 14-6 lead. Earlier in the game, the defense led by safety Steve Freeman, stopped Kansas City on seven consecutive tries inside Buffalo's 10-yard line, including five times from the one-yard line just prior to halftime. Cribbs was particularly effective in the second half for the Bills, gaining 141 of his yards after intermission in his finest effort of the year.

SAN FRANCISCO 23, BUFFALO 10

ORCHARD PARK, N.Y., Dec. 11—Buffalo threw a scare into NFC power San Francisco by building a 10-6 halftime lead, but the 49ers roared back with 17 unanswered second half points to post a 23-10 victory over the Bills in Buffalo's final home appearance of the 1983 season. While it seemed everything went right for the Bills in the first half, it was just the opposite in the second half as the visitors took advantage of three turnovers, including a pair of costly fumbles to grab the lead for good. period. A high snap on a field goal attempt by Joe Danelo caused him to miss a 38-yarder and Joe Ferguson had a pass intercepted in the end zone after Buffalo had driven to the SF one-yard line. The Bills had built their first half lead with a strong first half effort by both its offense and defense. Joe Cribbs picked up 74 of his game-high 100 yards before intermission while the defense limited the 49ers to just two field goals and just 40 yards rushing. San Diego, Calif., Jan. 3 — Making their first playoff appearance since 1974, the Bills had a victory within their grasp until the waning moments. Then, in dramatic fashion, the San Diego Chargers rallied from a 14-13 deficit as Quarterback Dan Fouts connected with Wide Receiver Ron Smith on a 50-yard scoring pass with just 2:08 remaining in the game. The reception was only the fifth of the season for Smith. Playing courageously on a badly sprained left ankle, Quarterback Joe Ferguson tried to direct a last ditch bid by the Bills. His efforts were thwarted, however, when a pass was picked off by a San Diego defender after Buffalo had reached midfield. Meeting for the second time at San Diego within a three-month span, the teams battled on even terms until the Chargers got a late first quarter field goal. Then the Bills took command with two second period scores. The first came on a one-yard burst up the middle by Roosevelt Leaks early in the quarter. With only 16 seconds remaining before halftime, Ferguson connected with wide receiver Frank Lewis on a 9-yard scoring play, upping the Bills' margin to 14-3. San Diego countered with a third quarter TD and fourth period field goal before the late heroics by Fouts and Smith. With Ferguson badly hobbled by his ankle injury, the Buffalo offense never got into gear in the second half, managing just 94 total yards. Even so, it took a spectacular play to keep the Bills from achieving their third consecutive win over the Chargers in playoff competition, the last one coming in the 1965 AFL title game.

BILLS 31, JETS 27

NEW YORK, N.Y., Dec. 27, 1981 — In a "wild card" game that lived up to its name, the Buffalo Bills stormed to a 24-0 lead but needed a last-second pass interception by Bill Simpson to preserve their first post-season victory since 1965. Charles Rome's got the visitors off and winging by picking up Bruce Harper's fumble on the opening kickoff and returning it 26 yards for a touchdown. The play took 16 seconds and was the second fastest score in NFL playoff history. Touchdown passes of 50 and 26 yards to Frank Lewis, who caught seven for 158 yards in the game, were sandwiched around a 29-yard Nick Mike-Mayer field goal to put the Bills, who lost in New York 33-14 during the regular season, up by 24-0. The Jets hung up 10 points before halftime and trailed 24-13 after Pat Leahy's 19-yard field goal in the third quarter. Joe Cribbs, who rushed for 83 yards and caught passes for 64 more, staked the Bills to a 31-13 lead with his 45-yard scoring run five minutes deep into the final period. The Jets, however, refused to die. Richard Todd moved them 80 yards in eight plays, hitting Bobby Jones with a 30-yard touchdown toss. After Buffalo failed to move, Todd, helped by a big interference call against Mario Clark that wiped out an apparent interception, got New York on the board again with a 58-yard march that ended on Kevin Long's one-yard plunge to paydirt. Buffalo could not generate a first down and turned the ball back to New York at the Jets' 20 with 2:36 remaining. Todd passed the Jets downfield, reaching the Buffalo 11 with just 10 seconds to play. Simpson stepped in front of his second-and-ten try for Derrick Gaffney in the end zone to intercept at the Buffalo one to seal the Jets' doom.

BENGALS 28, BILLS 21

CINCINNATI, OHIO, Jan. 3, 1982 — AFC Champion Cincinnati, cashing in on a long punt return and a pass interception, jumped to a 14-0 first quarter lead and held on to defeat Buffalo 28-21 in a divisional playoff game at Riverfront Stadium. It was the first post-season victory in the history of the Bengals franchise and, for the second straight year, eliminated the Bills in the semi-finals of the NFL's post-season tournament. The Bengals' Mike Fuller returned a Greg Cater punt 27 yards to start Cincinnati's first possession at the Buffalo 42. Charles Alexander, who was a surprise rushing leader for the Central Division champs with 71 yards, capped a seven-play drive with his four-yard scoring run. After Ken Riley intercepted a Joe Ferguson pass, the Bengals marched

48 yards in eight plays and took a 14-0 advantage on Pete Johnson's one-yard run. Buffalo breathed new life just before halftime, hitting a 54-yard pass from Ferguson to Jerry Butler, and drawing to within 14-7 on Joe Cribbs' one-yard run. Early in the third quarter, the Bills evened the issue on a 44-yard scoring run by Cribbs, a play that would later prove costly as the Buffalo rushing leader injured a knee and played only one more down before retiring for the afternoon. The teams traded touchdowns, Cincinnati scoring on a 20-yard run by Alexander and Buffalo on a 21-yard pass from Ferguson to Butler, to make it 21-21 after one play of the fourth quarter. Bengal quarterback Ken Anderson orchestrated a 78-yard drive in nine plays to put Cincinnati back in the driver's seat 28-21 on a 16-yard scoring pass to Cris Collinsworth. Buffalo's last gasp reached the Bengal 20 late in the final stanza but a controversial delay-of-game penalty wiped out an apparent third down conversion pass to Lou Piccone and Ferguson overthrew Roland Hooks in the end zone on fourth down.

STADIUM INFORMATION

Orchard Park is headquarters for NFL football in Western New York. Before a sellout crowd of 80,020, the Buffalo Bills dedicated their spanking new playing facility on August 17, 1973. While the visiting Redskins captured the inaugural game 37-21, even defeat could not dull the enthusiasm of fans who had long awaited completion of the project.

Built on a 113-acre tract approximately 30 minutes from downtown Buffalo, the stadium was constructed at a cost of \$22 million, financed by the taxpayers of Erie County. From the ground-breaking on April 4, 1972, to the inaugural, actual construction time was slightly over 14 months.

To form the lower level of the stadium more than 370,000 feet of shale was removed—putting the field 50 feet below ground level. The outside of the stadium rises only 60 feet above the horizon. The Astro Turf field has an 18-inch crown to assure proper drainage.

Surrounding the stadium are parking facilities for 16,000 cars and 300 buses. Scattered throughout the concourses are 38 concession stands and 42 rest rooms.

Current capacity of the stadium is 80,290 which makes it the third largest in the NFL.

SIMPSON HEADS UP BILLS SILVER ANNIVERSARY TEAM

Running back O.J. Simpson was the only unanimous choice for the Buffalo Bills' Silver Anniversary all-time team, selected by a special committee to commemorate the team's 25th season of professional football this coming fall.

Simpson, the All-Pro running back who set the single season rushing record of 2,003 yards in 1973, was named on each of the 29 ballots cast. Four other players—guard Billy Shaw, defensive end Ron McDole, defensive tackle Tom Sestak and punter Paul Maguire—missed unanimous selection by only one vote.

The Bills' Silver Anniversary squad is heavy with heroes from Buffalo's AFL Championship teams of 1964 and 1965. Sestak, Shaw, McDole and Maguire are among 15 players from the 1964-65 clubs to make the all-time team. Simpson and three others represent the decade of the 1970's while five members of the current Buffalo squad comprise the legacy of the 1980's.

Joining the mercurial Simpson, who rushed for 10,183 yards and scored 70 touchdowns in his Bills' career, in the Silver Anniversary backfield are the bruising Cookie Gilchrist at fullback and Congressman Jack Kemp at quarterback.

Gilchrist was the first Buffalo player to gain 1,000 yards rushing (1,098 in 1962) and was the ground gaining leader of the 1964 AFL titlists with 981 yards on 230 carries. Gilchrist gained 3,056 yards and scored 35 TDs with Buffalo. While most of Kemp's passing records have since been surpassed by Joe Ferguson, the Western New York congressman was the catalyst of two championship teams and passed for 15,128 yards and 77 touchdowns in his career with the Bills.

As wide receivers, the selectors tapped the Bills' number one and number two all-time receiving leaders, Elbert Dubenion of Bluffton College and Bob Chandler of Southern California. Dubenion, whose skill earned him the nickname "Golden Wheels," caught 296 passes from 1960-68 for 5,309 yards and 35 TDs. Chandler caught 295 for 3,999 and 34 scores. The tight end is Ernie Warlick of North Carolina Central, who averaged 17.2 yards on 90 receptions in four seasons with the Bills.

Shaw, a five-time consensus choice All-AFL and one of three Bills' players chosen on the all-time AFL team, is joined at guard by Reggie McKenzie, sparkplug of the fabled "Electric Company" that "turned loose the Juice" in 1973. Joe Devlin of the present Bills and Stew Barber, a five-time all-AFL selection in the 1960's are the Silver Anniversary tackles. Syracuse is represented on the all-time team by center Al Bemiller, who appeared in 126 consecutive regularly-scheduled games from 1961-69.

Sestak was one of two defensive players the Bills landed on the all-time AFL team selected by the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1969. The other, safety George Saines, also claimed a spot on the Silver Anniversary defense.

From little McNeese State, Sestak was a tight end in college but never played that position for the Bills. He quickly became one of the AFL's most feared defensive linemen and was a first team All-League choice in 1964-65-66. Sestak's partner at defensive tackle is current nose tackle Fred

Smerlas, who made his fourth consecutive trip to the Pro Bowl this past January and has won frequent mention on both All-Pro and All-Conference teams in his five Buffalo seasons.

At the defensive ends, the Silver Anniversary team features Ron McDole from the 1960's and Ben Williams, Buffalo's current standout and the team leader in quarterback sacks a year ago (with 10). First team All-AFL in 1965-66, McDole played eight years with Buffalo before being traded to the Washington Redskins. Williams, who has a career total of 48½ quarterback sacks, was elected to the Pro Bowl in 1983.

Mike Stratton, who played in more games than any defensive performer in Buffalo history, attracted a heavy vote in balloting for the three linebacker positions. The late John Tracey and Jim Haslett, a current standout, captured the other two spots.

Stratton, a 13th round draft choice out of Tennessee, made first team All-AFL from 1964-67 and was a second team pick in 1968-69. He finished with 17 career pass interceptions ranking him in a tie for eighth spot on the Bills' all-time list. Tracey died of cancer in 1978. In his Buffalo career he started 56 games with Stratton and Harry Jacobs as part of the Bills most famed linebacking triumvirate. A 29-year old free agent tight end who had been cut loose by both the Cardinals and Eagles, Tracey was converted to linebacker by Coach Lou Saban.

The final linebacking position went to Haslett, the National Football League "Defensive Rookie-of-the-Year" in 1979 following a spectacular inaugural season. From Little Indiana, Pa., University, Haslett missed eleven games last fall with back miseries but, in his five seasons, has made nearly 500 tackles.

All-time interceptions leader George "Butch" Byrd and Robert James, the Fisk College product who first attracted attention with his ferocious special teams play, are the committee's choice as Buffalo's all-time top cornerbacks.

Byrd picked off 40 passes from 1964-70 and racked up 666 yards in interception returns, both still Buffalo records. He also ranks number four on the lifetime list for punt returns with a 6.8 average and two touchdowns on 85 returns. A pre-season knee injury against the Rams on Aug. 23, 1975, prematurely robbed the Bills of the services of Robert James, who made the transition from small college free agent defensive end to one of the best man-on-man defenders in professional football. James was an All-NFL pick in 1983 and 1984 and played in three Pro Bowl games.

The top vote getter at safety was Saimes, who logged a career total of 22 interceptions in seven seasons and was a first team All-AFL choice four consecutive years. Saimes' teammate at safety is Steve Freeman, senior partner in the current Buffalo secondary. Named to The Sporting News All-NFL team in 1983, Freeman has played in 34 consecutive games, just six short of the team record, and ranks seventh on the all-time list in pass interceptions with 20.

Maguire, currently a broadcaster with ESPN, was the Buffalo punter for seven seasons after coming to the Bills from the San Diego Chargers. He punted a record 552 times and averaged 42.1 yards, still the best ever for a Buffalo punter. In only two Buffalo seasons, kicker Pete Gogolak accumulated the kind of statistics that made him a run-away pick as the Bills' all-time kicker. He topped both of the championship teams in scoring with 102 points in 1964 and 115 in 1965. He missed only one extra point (76-of-77) and converted 63.5% of his field goal attempts (47-of-74).

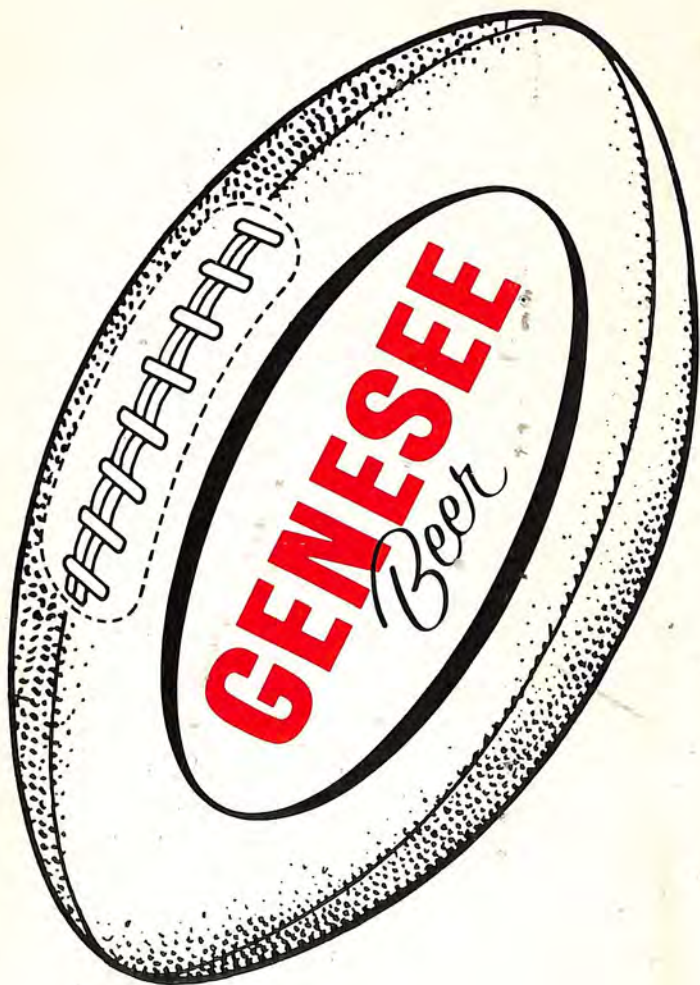
