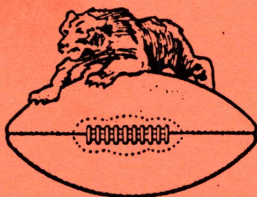

## CHICAGO BEARS . . . CHAMPIONS

*From the Texas prairies, Kansas, the effete east they come.  
Theirs is a legacy of zest for competition, of a dauntless  
fighting spirit, steeped in a tradition that Bears are Champions.*

Few teams in the history of sportsdom have attained greater prominence than the Chicago Bears. It is doubtful that any football organization has reached greater heights throughout the years, 1921-1946. Here is a team which has won six National Football League championships . . . which has finished on top in the Western Division seven times . . . and which, in 1941, produced probably the most outstanding football team of all time. Then, there is the 73 to 0 triumph over Washington in 1940.

The progress of the Bears throughout the years has been record breaking. It is a club that has broken record after record, as a team, and one that has produced such record-breaking individuals as Red Grange, Bronko Nagurski, Beattie Feathers, Jack Manders, George McAfee, Sid Luckman . . . and some, who like Danny Fortman and Bill Hewitt seldom received the opportunity to break records, but possessed a greatness that no observer could overlook.

The Bears actually didn't begin as the Bears, nor did they first play at Wrigley Field. It was back in 1920 when George Halas organized the Staley's at Decatur, Illinois. That was in the early days of professional football. It was the day of mighty men of the gridiron, too. Men like Jim Thorpe, Paddy Driscoll, Guy Chamberlain, the Sternman's, George Trafton, Ed Healey, Wilbur "Fats" Henry, Doc Spears, Link Lyman, and Duke Slater. On Sept. 16, 1921, at Canton, Ohio, a group of 16 football-minded men, including Halas, formed the American Professional Football Association. Halas then moved his club to Chicago, but retained the name, "Staley's" until 1922.

Red Grange's debut with the Bears on Thanksgiving Day, 1925, was the start of the pro football boom. Performing under the Halas colors, and with a powerful supporting cast, the famed Galloping Ghost played before crowd packed stadiums, from Chicago to Los Angeles. The Bears became as well known as Notre Dame and the New York Yankees. Today, they are truly "Champions of the Gridiron."

## GEORGE McAFEE . . . *All-Time All-American*

George McAfee is one of the greatest football players of all time. You need not take our word for it. We merely refer you to such astute gridiron judges as Wallace Wade, Frank Leahy, Greasy Neale, Steve Owen, Curly Lambeau, Red Grange, Hunk Anderson, Jock Sutherland, Patsy Clark, Clark Shaughnessy, Jimmy Conzelman, Whizzer White, Bill Dudley . . . and of course, George Halas. Some of these gentlemen go so far as to call McAfee the classiest halfback ever to step on a gridiron.

The immortal Grange labels McAfee "the most dangerous man with a football in the game." Lambeau says he is the best and most dangerous Man the Green Bay Packers have ever faced. "George McAfee is the greatest plunging and quick opening back I have ever seen," says Greasy Neale. Shaughnessy pronounces McAfee the greatest all around back he has ever seen. Sutherland says he is one of the all time greats. Wade says there never has been a better back. Frankly, all of these leading football men can't be wrong.

Why is McAfee so great? Jimmy Conzelman has perhaps the best answer to that question. Says Jimmy: "McAfee is a sprinter, and yet he has in addition to the cross step, which most great runners possess, a hip shift. That's something few fast men ever develop. He puts the defense off balance, and fakes you with his head, as well as his legs and body.

Boys who play on the same team with him say McAfee is a dancer on the field. He is a rhythm runner, with no lost motion. Some of the greatest tacklers in the pro league admit they still haven't laid a hand on him.

What has he done? Actually, George McAfee hasn't played a great deal of football. Wade, Sutherland, Halas and some of the others predict his greatest seasons are still ahead of him. George saw little service at Duke as a sophomore and junior, and it wasn't until his senior year that he became a regular. In two seasons with the Bears he has averaged less than 25 minutes a ball game.

Yet, in spite of this, George McAfee is the first, and only back, ever to run wild through the entire National Football League. It's been 75 yards against Brooklyn with only 17 seconds to go . . . 86 yards against Green Bay . . . 95 against Cleveland . . . 74 yards against the Cardinals. No one ever did that before in the pro game. And McAfee showed he was still McAfee in his return appearance at Wrigley Field last November, scoring three touchdowns in five tries, good for a total of 105 yards.

As a rookie in 1940, McAfee gained a total of 253 yards in 47 attempts, for an average of 5.4 yards per try. In 1941 it was 474 yards for 144 yards.

## CHICAGO BEARS ALL TIME GREATS

No team in the National Football League has produced the outstanding stars, and as many, throughout the years as the Chicago Bears. In the early days of the club there were the Healeys, the Sternamans, Trafton, Jim McMillin, Hunk Anderson, and of course, George Halas. Official all-league selections have been in vogue since 1931. A perusal of the records show a steady march of Super Bears to the Hall of Fame season after season.

## SID LUCKMAN . . . Mister Quarterback

Most football men rate Sid Luckman and Sammy Baugh as the two greatest forward passers of all time. They hold, between them, most of the passing records established in the National Football League. Year after year it's Luckman and Baugh. They have been the closest of competitors ever since Sid entered the league in 1939. Slinging Sammy has his backers, and then there are coaches like Greasy Neale who contend that Luckman is the peer of them all as a passer. Sid's followers point out that he may throw less aerials, and as a result complete a few less. But in the matter of touchdown passes, and yardage gained by passes, Luckman is tops by himself. George Halas naturally thinks his ace is tops, although he holds Baugh in the highest esteem. But Halas really likes to talk about Sid Luckman, "Mister Quarterback". George knows the T-Formation inside out, so when he calls Luckman the greatest quarterback ever to work the "T", it must be accepted as the gospel truth. Halas, and there are others, too, insist that Sid is the slickest ball handler and smartest signal caller in the history of the T-Formation. He is strictly a Halas product. Luckman was a tailback at Columbia University for Lou Little before he joined the Bears. Halas saw in him the type of quarterback the Bears required for their intricate system. So he schooled Sid in all the fine arts of the "T", and today, after seven seasons with the Bears, Luckman really deserved to be called "Mister Quarterback".

## GEORGE STANLEY HALAS

The history of the Chicago Bears is the story of George Halas, professional football pioneer, coach and psychologist, business man . . . leader of champions.

It is one of the most interesting stories in sports annals. It begins on Chicago's west side at Crane Tech. Young Halas was a pretty fair high school baseball and football player, and in the fall of 1914 found himself at the University of Illinois, under that master strategist, Bob Zuppke. Halas was a back in those days, and Red Grange passes the word along that "Zup" was afraid this newcomer from Crane would get hurt, because he ran so hard. So the newcomer from Crane Tech was converted into an end. Western Conference players of the 1915-17 era still recall that a certain end named Halas was a pretty potent factor in most of the games the Illini played, and while he never made All-American, he won the respect of every man he played with, or against.

George Halas left Illinois upon his graduation in January of 1918, and entered the Navy. He was a member of the mighty Great Lakes eleven, which tied Notre Dame, defeated Annapolis, and went on to play Mare Island in the Tournament of Roses game at Pasadena. Among his teammates were Paddy Driscoll, Jimmy Conzelman and Charley Bachman. Great Lakes defeated Mare Island for the Service championship, and Walter Camp placed Halas on his second team All-American.

Halas had a fling at big league baseball, with the New York Yankees. That was in 1919. But football was his first love, and he joined the A. E. Staley Company at Decatur, Ill., the following year, where he formed the famed Staley's. Halas dreamed that pro football some day would fill major league ball parks, and he moved to Wrigley Field in 1921, where today his Bears stand as one of the bulwarks of the National Football League.

As a coach he ranks among the greatest of his day. Halas first of all is a psychologist. He has that rare ability of being able to handle men, and command their respect. Ever since we can remember he has personified the spirit that is the Bears. Bear teams under Halas never lack for fighting spirit. They are well drilled, and well schooled in all phases of the intricate T-Formation. Many teams, collegiate and pro, have switched to the "T" since that December afternoon in 1940 when Halas' Bears trounced the Washington Redskins, 73 to 0. But the Bears today still are the Number One T-Formation team in all the land. And chiefly because of Halas' great faith in the "T", and his untiring efforts toward developing it, and making it the finest system in football.

George Halas gave up the top spot in football back in 1942 to make his contribution to the Navy. He shunned the limelight throughout his three years of active duty, and while his heart was always with the Bears, his only objective during that period was to provide first class recreation facilities for naval personnel in the far-reaches of the Central and Southwest Pacific Ocean areas, from Pearl Harbor to New Guinea and Okinawa. He received the Bronze Star Medal from Admiral Nimitz, and only recently was recalled to active duty for one day to be elevated to captain. Now that Halas is back Bear fortunes are on the rise again.

## CHICAGO BEARS' ASSISTANT COACHES

### HARTLEY "HUNK" ANDERSON

Few men in football have made a more thorough study of line play than "Hunk" Anderson. As a result, he holds the respect of the entire team, and that of all opposing clubs in the league. Anderson is one of the "Original Bears". He was a great guard at Notre Dame and a member of one of Knute Rockne's best teams. "Hunk" joined the Bears after graduating and continued his fine play as a professional. Later he rejoined Rockne at Notre Dame as a line mentor. He was chief assistant in 1929-30, and took over the reins at the Irish Institution upon Rockne's tragic death early in 1931. Anderson moved to North Carolina State College after leaving Notre Dame, and also has served as a coach at Michigan, Cincinnati University, St. Louis U, and the Detroit Lions. He became line coach of the Bears in 1940.

### LUKE JOHNSOS

A graduate of Northwestern University where he was a football and baseball star, Luke Johnsos joined the Chicago Bears in 1928. He was a member of the squad nine seasons, and in 1933 received All-League recognition. Johnsos teamed together with Bill Hewitt to give the Bears a great end combination in the championship seasons of 1932-33. He was appointed assistant coach in 1937 and has served as a member of the staff every season since, save 1940. Luke and Hunk Anderson acted as Co-Coaches from November, 1942 to December, 1945, while Head Coach George Halas was in the Navy.

### PADDY DRISCOLL

Another Northwestern great. Paddy Driscoll was one of the early stars of professional football. He performed with the Chicago Cardinals for six seasons, and then joined the Bears in 1926. It was a reunion with George Halas, for they teamed together on the famed Great Lakes Service championship aggregation of 1918. Driscoll is one of the top backs of all time. There have been few greater kickers. Paddy coached St. Mel's in Chicago and acted as head coach at Marquette University from 1938-40.

## Ends

SID HEMPLEY . . . Promising newcomer from South Carolina. Strong defensive end, exceptional long kicker.

JACK KARWALES . . . One of the promising new Bears. Starred at Michigan and played with College All Stars. Member of 3rd Air Force eleven in 1944. Gained recognition as outstanding end in Service ball. A protege of All-American Benny Oosterbaan.

KEN KAVANAUGH . . . is one of football's standout pass snaggers. Like the famed Don Hutson, he is a product of Arkansas. Fast, tricky, and can really reach for the long ones. Ken had his greatest day against Holy Cross in 1939 when he scored 3 touchdowns. Unanimously selected for All American honors. Served with the 8th Air Force in Britain and performed many missions over France and Belgium. Now makes California his home, and ranching his off season profession.

JIM KEANE . . . Member of Iowa's great sophomore team which upset Wisconsin's title-bound Badgers in 1942. All-Service recognition in 1944 at Great Lakes. Classy pass snagger; fast and tricky. Comes from Bellaire, Ohio family, famous in football circles.

WALTER "DUB" LAMB . . . One of most promising new Bears. All Big Six selection at University of Oklahoma. Standout end with College All Stars in 1945. With Forth Worth Skymasters (Army Air Forces) fall. Tabbed the best end to come out of Oklahoma in years, and dubbed the "Tinsley type" by coaches. Good pass catcher. Strong defensive end.

ED SPRINKLE . . . One of the team's youngsters, although this is his third season. A rugged Texas, who has been converted into an end. Fast and tricky. A good pass catcher and fine defensive end. Starred with Naval Academy in 1943. Won All-Eastern honors as tackle. Another Bear to watch this fall.

GEORGE WILSON . . . Rugged veteran of three championship Bear elevens. Played at Austin High and Northwestern. One of best defensive ends ever to play in loop. Standout blocker and good pass snagger.

### Tackles

FRED DAVIS . . . Outstanding tackle from Alabama. Big and spirited. Promises to develop into one of the league's top linemen. Acquired from Los Angeles in trade for Tom Harmon. The Rams purchased his contract from Washington. He played with the Redskins in the championship game last fall after being released from service. Was with the Fourth Air Force.

JOHN FEDEROVICH . . . Member of '41 Super Bears. Best new lineman on that squad. A Little All-American from Davis-Elkins. Big, fast . . . and has that spirit so essential to line play on the Bears' squad. A fellow to watch this fall.

MIKE JARMOLUK . . . Giant newcomer from Temple. Promises to become one of greatest tackles ever with Bears. A star in the North-South game last fall. Philadelphia is his home. Rejoined Temple last fall after two years in service. One of the reasons his team achieved one of the best records in the East.

ED KOLMAN . . . Great lineman from championship era. A football player's player. Destined to win all-league honors this season. All-service selection with Fleet City in '45. Fourth year with Halas clan. Hails from Brooklyn.

WALTER STICKEL . . . Hails from the University of Pennsylvania. One of the fastest linemen on the squad. Rated a great tackle prospect by eastern coaches. Runs the hundred in 10:6. Showed continuous improvement in service ball and seems to have attained full coordination. First year with Bears.

JOE STYDAHAR . . . Mighty cog in the powerful pre-war Bear forward walls. Four times All-League tackle. One of the greatest linemen ever to play in loop. All-time West Virginia great. Three years' service with Navy, made All-Service team in 1944 as Fleet City ace. Served as gunnery officer aboard tanker and troop transport. On flat top in Pacific. Played in East-West game and member College All-Stars.

## Guards

AL BAISI . . . Member of 1940-41 championship teams. Hard hitting guard, who followed Stydahar and Bill Karr from West Virginia to the Bears. Four years' army service. Gained All-Service recognition in 1943 with Camp Robinson team.

RAY BRAY . . . Strong Man from Iron Mountain, Mich. Little All-American at Western State Teachers. Earned spurs with Bears' championship teams. Served in Navy during war. All service selection at Del Monte, Calif. Played on North Carolina Pre-Flight eleven that upset Annapolis. A guard with plenty of drive.

CHUCK DRULIS . . . Hard hitting, fast charging guard from Temple. All-Eastern before joining Bears in 1942. Three years with Marines. Fought at Guam, Tinian. Awarded Battle Star. Rejoined team late last fall.

WILLIAM ORVILLE JOHNSON . . . Hard-hitting guard from Southern Methodist U. All-Southwest Conference selection. Also played blocking back. A big, fast fellow, who runs the 100 in 10:8. Played service ball at North Carolina Pre-flight.

RUDY MUCHA . . . Won All-American honors as center. Will play guard this fall. All-Service selection while with Great Lakes in 1942. Chicago product. Won all-state honors as fullback at Fenger High. Big and fast. Cleveland's first pick in 1941 player draft.

PAT PRESTON . . . Converted from tackle to guard. All-Southern at Wake Forest; All-American at Duke. Wounded in Okinawa invasion. Hailed as one of greatest linemen ever to play in the south.

GEORGE ZORICH . . . One of best boys uncovered by Bears in war years. Product of Northwestern University. All-Western Conference honors 1941. From Michigan Iron Mountain region which produced Gipp, Hunk Anderson, Ojay Larsen.

**STUART CLARKSON** . . . A Little All-American from Texas A. & I. Made debut with powerful 1942 Bear eleven. Strong tackler, fine line backer and pass defense center. In service three years. Dubbed a second "Bulldog Turner" by Texas coaches.

**AL MATUZA** . . . Standout pass defense man and one of best tacklers on squad. Back after more than two years with Navy. All-Eastern as member of Georgetown's greatest team. Won All-Navy honors on Hawaii.

**JOHNNY SCHIECHL** . . . Gained All-American honors at Santa Clara. Member of West team in Shrine game. Rival of Bulldog Turner for center post on College All-Star squad. Previously with Detroit Lions.

**CLYDE TURNER** . . . The "Bulldog" from down Texas way. Football's top center virtually from day he joined Bears. Rated by Clark Shaughnessy greatest of all time at position. All-League selection 1941-'42-'43 and '44. All-Service team last fall. Big, powerful and fast. Outstanding line backer, terrific blocker, exceptional pass defense man.

### Quarterbacks

**TOM FARRIS** . . . A Chicago boy who won his spurs at Wisconsin. Rated as one of best quarterbacks ever coached by Harry Stuhldreher. Starred with Badgers in 1941 against Northwestern and Indiana. Smart signal caller, good passer and exceptional defensive back.

**OWEN GOODNIGHT** . . . Second season in NFL, but first with Bears. Spelled Parker Hall with Cleveland in '41. Like Turner and Sprinkle, a product of Hardin Simmons. Fine passer and ball carrier.

**SID LUCKMAN** . . . Ace of all T-Formation quarterbacks. Most valuable player in National League 1943. Four times All-League selection, 1941-'42-'43 and '44. His passes have gained a total of 8,718 yards in seven seasons as pro. Completed seven touchdown passes in single game against New York Giants in 1943. Set loop mark of 2,194 yards on passes same season. Fine kicker. All-American at Columbia.

### Halfbacks

**HUGH GALLARNEAU** . . . Outstanding quick-opening artist. Shared right halfback with George McAfee on great 1941 championship team. Starred with Clark Shaughnessy's Stanford Rose Bowl eleven. Rejoined Bears last fall after serving as radar night flying officer with Marines in Pacific. Took part in six invasions. All around athlete. Set to make 1946 his top season.

**BILL GEYER** . . . One of the outstanding stars developed at Colgate by Andy Kerr. Dangerous safety man and break-away artist. Joined Bears in 1942 but was handicapped by injuries. Began to hit stride in 1943 with champions until receiving Navy call. Exceptionally fast.

**GEORGE McAFEE** . . . Lightning-like back from Ironton, Ohio, also known as the "Nijinsky of the Gridiron". A rhythm runner with a style all his own. No lost motion. Rated by most coaches as one greatest football players of all time. Broke into the National loop with a 91-yard touchdown sprint against Green Bay. Returned last fall in a blaze of glory, scoring three times on Pittsburgh. Averaged better than 7 yards per try in 1941.

**RAY McLEAN** . . . The "Scooter" from St. Anselm's. Greatest athlete in school's history. A real Little All-American. Starred for Bears in very first league game against Green Bay. Great pass catcher. Dangerous runner. Exceptional pass defense man. Seventh season with Bears. Played baseball in New England League past season.

**DANTE MAGNANI** . . . Obtained along with Davis in the Harmon deal. Played with the Bears in 1943 on lend-lease from Cleveland and was one of the top ball carriers in the loop. Averaged better than 6 yards per try. Caught two touchdown passes in play-off game with Washington. Entered Navy in 1944. Fast, shifty runner. Possesses breakaway speed, and is one of the most dangerous pass catchers in the game. Product of St. Mary's.

**FRANK MAZNICKI . . .** Hard running "Rhode Island Thunderbolt". Won starting berth with Bears in first season, 1942, and turned in finest ball carrying performance in National Football League. Gained total of 343 yards for the high average of 6.3 yards per try. Starred with Iowa Seahawks in Service ball to gain further recognition. Fine place kicker. Known as "Monk".

**NOAH MULLINS . . .** A 9.6 speed boy from Kentucky. One of top newcomers uncovered at training camp. Shifty runner. Standout defensive back and long distance kicker. Entered Army, 1942. Played on Ft. Benning Infantry eleven '43. Won All-Service recognition. Comes from same home town as Baseball Commissioner "Happy" Chandler . . . Versailles, Ky.

**DICK SCHWEIDLER . . .** Returns to club after four years' army service. Very fast.

### Fullbacks

**DON PERKINS . . .** Joined Bears late last season after starring with Green Bay Packers. One of best backs on field in 1945 College All-Star game. Runs well from T. Good line backer. A Wisconsin boy. Hails from Platteville Teachers' College. Played with Milwaukee Chiefs, 1941. Headed for his greatest season.

**BILL OSMANSKI . . .** Another returning ace from the championship era. One of the greatest of all Bear fullbacks. All-American at Holy Cross, 1939. Member College All-Star squad 1939. Voted most valuable player in game. Made All-League fullback in first season with Bears. Known as the "Bullet" to his mates. Left Bears in mid-season 1943 to enter Navy. Coached at Great Lakes. Active duty in Pacific. Took part in Okinawa invasion. Sixth season with team.

**JOE OSMANSKI . . .** Bill's "little brother". All-Eastern at Holy Cross. Fast, hard runner. Exceptional kicker. Entered Army 1941 as private. Discharged from service with rank of major. Played service ball in Puerto Rico. Led team to championship. Professional baseball player. Batted .323 in New England League. First year man. Acquired in trade with Boston Yanks for Tackle Pat O'Brien. Fighting it out with Brother Bill and Don Perkins for starting fullback job.

## ALL STAR GAME RECORDS

The Chicago Bears have participated in more All Star games than any other National Football League club. George Halas led the first pro team into the classic when it was originated back in 1934. All told, the Bears have faced the All Stars five times in Soldiers' Field. And the Bears are the only National Football League representative with a perfect record for the game. The Halas entry has scored a total of 87 points, as for 34 on the part of the All Stars.
